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
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


Nov./Dec. phases of the moon

"I want to really compliment Robert Goddard. That guy worked his fanny off and he's a comer. I probably worked as hard or harder than I ever did before." Schwettmann said. "I did it because I want to represent the county a little more. I hope for more harmony to start off the first of the year. Now I've got to roll my sleeves up and maybe be a bit more positive in my approach.

"I'm elated. I have to thank a lot of people who helped. This is my biggest victory, but it has nothing to do with Robert. He's a fine young man and a clean politician. You have to admit

the (Republican) numbers are there, but if you do a real bad job, that may not mean anything."

Rick Simpson, a former county commissioner and school bus line owner, will return to the commission to occupy the District 5 seat. The Republican notched up 502 votes, 61 percent, to Democrat Jimmy McTeigue's 320.

McTeigue, who has served on the Hondo School Board off and on since 1975, said he and Simpson ran a clean race and left it up to the people to choose the person they thought could do the best job.

Simpson said he sent letters to voters in his district and

went door to door.

"Campaigning is kind of a circus atmosphere and now the circus is over and it's time to go to work," he said. "I'd like to see the commission get off the front pages of the newspaper. All we have to do is tend to business and I think that can be done in a calm and quiet, sensible manner."

Simpson will take the seat now held by Monroy Montes who lost in the Republican Primary this year.

Although former banker Karen Morris, a democrat, lost her bid for the office of county treasurer, she was upbeat after seeing the final total of 1,891 votes (95 percent) to incumbent Republican Joan Park's 3,496

votes, about 65 percent of the votes cast in the countywide election.

"We've given the voters a choice," Morris said. "I'm excited. I'm proud of both the Republicans and the Democrats for turning out."

This may not be her last run for office, Morris said, adding, "I may just surprise them."

Park, who won her second four-year term, said she's appreciative and humbled by the strong vote for her.

"I won in every precinct except one that's still out," she said earlier in the evening.

The newly elected officials will be sworn into office after the first of the year.

unofficial national returns that four Republican seats were lost in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Dub Williams wins big

In the state District 56 race, Williams, a Glencoe Republican, on Tuesday seemed less concerned with his own state legislature race against contender Jeni "Bebe" Flores Alexander than he was in watching other contests.

"I still have some concerns about my colleagues about the state," Williams said Tuesday night, adding that some races for the state Legislature were very close. "For us, to hold what we need up in Santa Fe — it's important that we keep those seats.

In Lincoln County, Williams led Alexander with 75 percent of the vote — 4,164 votes to 1,453. In Otero County, with 43 of 50 precincts reporting, Williams' lead was smaller at 60 percent of the votes — 1,105 to 741.

Williams said he was pleased Gov. Gary Johnson is back in as well as Parsons.

"And, of course, I'm pleased that Republicans swept Lincoln County from top to bottom. I think that's a great thing," Williams said.

His next pressing concern is the upcoming game for Ruidoso High School's Warriors, said Williams, who is putting in his 42nd year in the school stadium's press box during the games.

Alexander, a long-time Tularosa council member, could

not be reached for comment about the election results.

Judge Parsons keeps her gavel

Parsons won an overwhelming majority over contender Patricia Ortiz, a Ruidoso attorney, for the position of New Mexico 12th Judicial District Court judge.

Parsons, appointed to the bench in early 1997, carried 77 percent of Lincoln County, receiving 4,341 to 1,285 votes. In Otero County, Parsons netted 61 percent of the vote with 43 out of 50 precincts reporting — 5,186 to 3,300.

"Well, assuming that it continues to go this way, I am just really thankful for all my friends and just thankful for the all the support I've gotten from this county," Parsons said from her Alto home Tuesday night shortly before the results were finalized.

"I really can't say that I am surprised because I have had an awful lot of feedback from precincts all over the county," Parsons said of the election's results.

Ortiz said she "ran a good, hard race."

"I thought I did well for a person who has only been here six years against someone who has been here more than 30 years," Ortiz said.

Ortiz said her immediate plans including "sleeping late tomorrow."

"And then I have to put my law practice back in order," Ortiz said. "I've kind of put that on hold. But I had fun, I did."

Parsons' term as district

judge will be for four years. If re-elected, she will only need to seek retention every six years.

Judge Butts is reelected

Butts, a New Mexico magistrate judge since 1993, received an endorsement from 73 percent of voters in Lincoln County, with 4,071 votes compared to 1,500 for contender Rejeana "Susie" Fuqua, a Ruidoso woman.

"It's just wonderful. I just didn't have any idea," Butts said. "That just means, I think, the citizens of Lincoln County think I have done a good job. And I want to thank the overwhelming majority of citizens for their support."

"Five and a half years ago I promised to make the streets a safer place to live and I think I have done that," he added. "And that's why I won by 73

percent. But I'm not a politician — I'm a judge and I work for the people and not for politicians."

"Butts ran a real good race and I wish him good luck in the next four years," said Fuqua, a first-time office seeker and a member of artist Dave McGary's staff.

"However, he does need to be on his toes about DWIs," she said, adding that she believes Butts should be stricter on DWI offenders.

Rather than disappointed with the election results and the campaign, Fuqua said she enjoyed the experience.

"It was wonderful. We were just discussing how I didn't even know that we knew 1,500 people," Fuqua said. "I really enjoyed the experience of running for public office and I will probably do so again."

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County to discuss Glencoe give-away

County attorney says proposal could be unconstitutional

If the Lincoln County Commission gives away the Glencoe Rural Events Center, it will be violating the state constitutional, in the opinion of County Attorney Alan Morel.

A discussion of the future of the center on U.S. 70, 12 miles east of Ruidoso Downs, is on the agenda of the commission meeting that begins at 9 a.m. Friday in the courthouse in Carrizozo.

Some commissioners say it's time for the county to find either a private company or a community group to handle the center, which was purchased with money from the state Legislature. Subsequently, an outdoor arena was added with federal money.

Although events staged there bring money into the county's economy, direct rental revenue isn't enough to cover the overhead of running the complex and employing a director.

New County Manager Thomas Stewart has recommended opening the center on an "as needed" basis, but without a director. Commissioner Rex Wilson said he envisions a non-profit community group managing the center, just as the county Fair Association manages the county fairgrounds in Capitan.

But past attempts of the county to find an organization to manage the property have failed. The Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs submitted a proposal, but commissioners said the organization wanted too much money.

Acting on a suggestion from Chairman L. Ray Nunley, last month commissioners agreed to explore the possibility of giving the center to the board that runs the annual Lincoln County

Cowboy Symposium, the major event at the center. At the time, symposium representative Glen Barrow told commissioners the board is composed of volunteers who work under the museum board's umbrella. They most likely would not be able to accept such a responsibility, he said.

In his memo to the commission, Morel wrote, "I believe that gifting or donating the (center) to any individual, entity or corporation, private or nonprofit, would violate (the state constitution). It is possible that a government to government transfer of the facility would be permissible, however, this too would require approval of the (state Department of Finance and Administration) and the (U.S. Department of Agriculture)..."

Morel cited other restrictions tied to the acceptance of federal money for the Joe Skeen Arena, including prior state and federal approval of any lease.

"One of the instructions on the (grant) goes into detail regarding how the funding utilized in the Glencoe Rural Events center would have to be repaid in the event that county of Lincoln no longer elects to own and operate the facility," Morel wrote.

In another issue, commissioners are scheduled to take action on a resolution authorizing a grant application for a safe house project.

Last month, commissioners were told that to pursue the grant they should have a piece of property under option, but the only sites mentioned were too expensive at about \$750,000.

Commissioner Wilton Howell suggested the county use a building purchased near the county jail several years ago for storage.

"Are we going to go out and buy a piece of property on the

chance that we'll get a grant?" he asked.

Tony Elias, executive director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, said the county could take a 90-day option with the purchase contingent on the county receiving a grant.

Josie Jaramillo, director of Kids Inc., a program designed to protect abused children, piqued the interest of commissioners a few months ago when she told them about the project started in Otero County. She asked for help because children in Lincoln County also will benefit from the program. But she told commissioners last month, her group isn't pushing for something to happen right away. The county could wait until next year to apply for the grant, she said.

Commissioner Monroy Montes said land costs are less outside of Ruidoso and proposed finding a building in Capitan, Ruidoso Downs or Carrizozo.

The building would be used as a shelter and also as a quiet place for counselors or law enforcement officials to interview children.

Other items on the commission agenda include:

- A follow-up report on creation of an indigent fund and a request for a public hearing on the issue by county Health and Wellness Board representatives.
- A proposed county detention center update
- A reassignment of the Enhanced 911 addressing grant project.
- Approval of funding requests by the county Lodgers Tax Committee
- Review of a contractual agreement for Census 2000
- An appointment to represent the county on the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

Alleged drug traffickers go to court

Three of four people charged with trafficking heroin last week will go to court today at 1:30 p.m. for a bond hearing, according to a court clerk.

A sting operation Tuesday, Oct. 27, resulted in warrants for four people for allegedly dealing heroin out of a house at 217 Cambridge Way where three of them lived.

Two were arrested that day and the other two turned themselves in Friday, Oct. 30, at 11:20 a.m., according to Jeannette Walker, detention officer at the Lincoln County Detention Center in Carrizozo.

Michelle McCarty, 48, who lived in the house, and Dion Reynolds, 21, of Capitan, who bought heroin from an undercover agent and started to leave to take it to someone else, were arrested the day of the

sting. The other two, Henry Padilla, 46, and Diane Harding, 44, turned themselves in at the detention center Friday morning.

The four defendants are believed to have been the major dealers of heroin in Lincoln County for many years, both wholesaling and retailing, said Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan.

Walding, McCarty and Padilla were requested to be transported tomorrow for a bond hearing before Magistrate Court William R. Butts, said court clerk Lorena Lamay.

McCarty's bond was set at \$250,000, and bonds for Walding and Padilla were set at \$100,000 each, with the stipulation that the full bond be paid, not a percentage, said Hooper.

Lamay said the issue of

today's hearing is "what the bond is and how it is that they might wish to satisfy that bond, either through property or monetary or whatever that might be, whether the bond will be reduced and the percentage allowed."

Agents from six agencies confiscated 6 grams of heroin, \$800 in cash, and drug paraphernalia from the house after entering it on the basis of a search warrant, said Frank Hooper of the Lincoln County Narcotics Unit.

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, the Ruidoso Police Department, the New Mexico State Police, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the Otero County Narcotics Unit, and the Alamogordo Public Safety Department participated in the heroin sting.

This was the first heroin bust in 12 years in Lincoln County, Hooper said.

focus will be on marketing, he said.

'The long goodbye' in Lincoln County

A letter on this page written by the Ruidoso daughter of an Alzheimer's disease patient brings close to home the impact of an illness that has stricken the famous (former President Ronald Reagan, actress Rita Hayworth), about 150 Lincoln County people, and something like 4 million other Americans.

Along with her letter, Margaret Bowles sent a fact sheet prepared by the Alzheimer's Association, a national organization established in 1980 to begin fighting a disease first identified 74 years earlier by an Austrian physician named Alois Alzheimer.

Only since 1980 has there been any significant effort to battle a disease that impacts family caregivers even harder, perhaps, than the victim—because the sad characteristic of Alzheimer's is the gradual diminishing of mental faculties, ultimately to the point of a loss of self-awareness. Then, the family and other caregivers must pick up the entire burden that might last for decades.

It is notable that President Reagan in 1982 signed legislation designating a disease awareness week, and the following year approved creation of a task force to coordinate scientific research on Alzheimer's disease. A decade later, in 1994, President Reagan announced that he had Alzheimer's, the start of his own "Long Goodby" that continues today.

Between those years, others began to study the disease. Congress in 1984 allocated \$44 million to Alzheimer's research. The next year, "Rita Hayworth Galas" founded by the actress's daughter, Princess Yasmin Aga Khan, began raising money for research. The first government report on Alzheimer's was published in 1987, titled "Losing a Million Minds."


That figure, it turned out, was low; the National Institute on Aging in 1989 released revised figures suggesting that about 4 million people are affected, with a warning that, due to the aging population, the number could grow to 14 million by the year 2040.

But the research is in its infancy. Only two drugs, Tacrine (in 1993) and Donepezil hydrochloride (in 1996), has been approved as treatments for the disease.

And only this year, the new Reagan Institute published the first guidelines for assessing early diagnostic tests for the disease.

Is it all something that happens to somebody else?
No.
One of every 10 persons over age 65 has Alzheimer's disease.

Nearly half of people over age 85 have the disease.
And nobody knows what causes it.

3. The items are a significant contributor to local tourism.

Caregivers are often reluctant to ask for help, thinking that they can do everything by themselves. They're wrong. I thank God I have many supporters and loving friends here in Ruidoso. ... If anyone would like to call me for information, or becoming a part of our support group, a member of the New Mexico or National Alzheimer's association, please do so.

There is help for caregivers with mild or more severe loved ones affected by this devastating and often misunderstood disease. These people are living in what I call the "now" and quality of life is what we are striving for them as long as we can.

But he made the request, and his ships sailed, and he set out to claim La Florida with about 300 men and 42 horses.

Each man carried two pounds of biscuits and a half pound of bacon. Most carried many more pounds of weapons and armor.

By interrogating some Indians they captured, whose language they did not know, the Spaniards concluded that there was much gold at a town called "Apalache" to the north. The evidence upon which they based this belief was extremely weak; for all they knew, "Apalache" meant "Don't go there." But their desire for gold

skewed their logic, and on May 1 they set out for a golden city they were sure existed.

It took them over a month to get to Apalache, led by the captives. The settlement consisted of some 40 huts. The only gold they found was yellow corn, but they were glad to see that.

Their relations with the residents of Apalache started out wrong and then got worse. The Spaniards appropriated the huts and stayed for a few weeks, eating the corn and other food the natives had stored and fending off their arrows. Several in the company were killed and more were wounded. Then they moved on to another town, Aute, where they added dysentery to their list of complaints. Finally they made it back to the sea.

What happened next shows the mettle of the Spanish explorers. Their excursion into the forests and swamps of Florida had been a disaster, and now they faced the open ocean without hope of rescue.

So they built boats. Using whatever materials they could find and adapting what they had brought with them, they constructed five vessels, each 38 feet long, all the while subject to volleys of Indian arrows. It took them 47 days, and by the time the boats were launched, 40 of their company had died of starvation or illness and another 20 had been killed by the Indians.

While they were there they gradually killed and ate their horses. The last of them was butchered just before they departed. They called the place the Bay of Horses.

For weeks the crude vessels sailed west, searching for the mouth of the River of Palms, today's Río Grande. They had few provisions and were at the mercy of the weather. Their few encounters with the coastal natives were unrewarding at best.

On Nov. 1, six months after they had set out to conquer the golden city of Apalache, they reached the mouth of the Mississippi. Its immense flow of fresh water was welcome, but its force

also made it impossible for the boats to stay together. Only two of them are known to have made landfall. Nothing was ever heard again of the other three, including the one carrying Narvéz.

Their sea voyage was over.

Next week: Three soldiers and a slave.

Elsewhere: While Narvéz and his men were sailing to find the River of Palms, the black plague was claiming many lives in Europe.

County zoning codes around Ruidoso may be changed to conform with village

Zoning regulations governing a one-mile border around Ruidoso may be changed to conform more with the village's requirements.

The changes may include turning over enforcement responsibility to village officials.

Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson told Lincoln County Commissioners last month that before the village spends the money to revamp the ordinance, he wants to be sure county and village officials agree on some basic principles, including:

- That the new code should closely resemble Ruidoso's planning and zoning code.

- That the Ruidoso Planning Office would take over the operation and enforcement of the new code.

- That citations would be handled by the Ruidoso Municipal Court, if possible.

If not, that a process be established to provide for effective court enforcement.

- That the approval/denial process of the Extraterritorial Zoning (ETZ) commission and ETZ authority should be the same as the village's code.

- That a business permitting process be developed at the county level to ensure people know what is required and that they meet those requirements prior to development.

The extraterritorial ordinance was approved by the village and the county in 1983 and has never been revised, even the original version was borrowed from other towns and was not designed to meet the specific needs of the county and Ruidoso, Donaldson said.

Two county commissioners and one village councilor or the mayor serve on the ETZ authority, the board of final appeal.

The ETZ commission is appointed by the commission and village governing boards.

On a motion by Commissioner Monroy Montes, commissioners last month agreed to move ahead with a hearing on proposed changes.

Donaldson said the village staff will prepare the working draft.

The ETZ zone is meant to create an easy annexation or transition area from the village into the county, Donaldson said.

But that isn't always the case, because over the years subdivisions have been approved around Ruidoso without road standards or other infrastructure requirements, he said.

"Certainly, nothing that meets the village's standards," Donaldson said.

To bring a subdivision up to village standards could cost taxpayers \$1 million per development, he said.

The issue of liability will have to be covered, in case a lawsuit is filed over a decision or enforcement action, he said.

Donaldson added that the county could track development in unincorporated areas better if businesses were required to be licensed.

"From the village's point of view, we need to make it work to make sure no businesses go in right next to a residence or other conflicts occur," Donaldson said. "Licensing businesses is a great planning tool."

The village is equipped to handle enforcement because it already has building inspectors who check construction within a three-mile zone around Ruidoso.

The village also has a planning staff that handles reviews of proposed developments, he said.

"We're proposing the village take over the day to day operation. We're more concerned about what happens here. Patsy (Sanchez, the county

planner) is busy with other things and works out of Carri-zozo," he said.

Commission Chairman L. Ray Nunley said developers in the county have told him they don't want the village dictating what they can do with their property.

"We're only talking about one mile and that's existed since

1983," Donaldson pointed out.

The village can not force the annexation of a development unless it can provide municipal services and that would be too costly, he said.

If an area petitioned to be included in the village, different terms could be negotiated.

"All we can do is take the land not developed and ensure

that new subdivisions meet the standards of Ruidoso (within the one mile zone)," Donaldson said. "We're trying to prevent conflicts between neighbors."

The extraterritorial boards cannot force changes of existing situations, he said.

To move ahead, the majority of commissioners must agree on the first four points. The

fifth is negotiable, the mayor said.

Commissioner Rex Wilson said about the only point he doesn't have fundamental differences with is number five - licensing of businesses in unincorporated portions of the county.

"I can understand that, given your district," Donaldson

said, referring to the largely rural ranching area represented by Wilson.

Newly appointed ETZ commission member Al Junge urged commissioners to turn over responsibility to the village.

"I'd give this to Ruidoso and let them handle it," he said. "We've failed on this."

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
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
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

State playoff hopes remain alive with victory over Portales

Ruidoso moves one step closer

After their ho-hum, 24-7 victory over Portales Friday, the Warrior football players now turn their attentions to extending the season into the playoffs.

To do that, Ruidoso will have to defeat a team with the same mission, the Lovington Wildcats.

Both teams enter Friday's District 4AAA showdown with the same records - 7-2 overall and 1-1 in districts. Both teams traded places as either No. 2 or 3 for the last several weeks in the A.P. Top 10.

But both teams won't make the playoffs.

Friday's loser is done for the season. The winner enters the state playoffs as the District 4AAA runner-up.

In order to make the playoffs, the Warriors must rely on the qualities that have gotten them this far, said senior offensive tackle Adam Graham.

"Working as a team, making sure the job gets done, staying together - we don't fall apart easy," Graham said Monday at practice. "It's all about staying together, working as a family."

Ruidoso coach Les Carter preaches teamwork, but he's also a disciple of carrying out the Xs and Os.

"It's just going to come down to where we're going to have to execute," Carter said.

Carter singled out the Ruidoso offensive line for its consistency this season.

"Where we've got to control the game is in those trenches, and we feel like we've got those people," Carter said. "I just really think we have a good offensive line. There's time after time where we're outsized, but we never play a team that has more heart."

Friday against Portales, Ruidoso's offensive line met the challenge of protecting sophomore quarterback Todd Schrader, who started his first varsity game for the injured Corey Saenz, while opening gaping holes for senior fullback Brett Meyer.


Meyer rushed 25 times for 133 yards, and Schrader finished six-for-17 in passing for 98 yards, one touchdown and two interceptions.

"He did a lot of good things in his first start. He threw the ball pretty well. We've got to do some things to make it better for him, too," Carter said of Schrader's performance.

That was all the offense the Warriors needed. The Ruidoso defense was its typical, dominating self. The Warriors yielded just 62 rushing yards. Portales was three-for-nine passing for 30 yards. The Rams were penalized for more yards - 110 yards

- than they gained on the ground and through the air.

Senior linebacker Reny Reidhead said there's was no extra pressure on the defense.

"We just had to play ball," Reidhead said. "If the defense stopped them, then that's all we had to do."

Carter described the victory over Portales as "OK."

"We had just come off a very intense week with Artesia. The intensity level just wasn't high. We knew

the things we had to do to win, and we did," Carter said.

Ruidoso will have to reach an emotional peak when it plays Lovington. The return of Saenz will play a big part in achieving the level of intensity.

Saenz hobbled around practice Monday, his right ankle supported by an air cast. But he could be as close as 90 percent healthy by game time, Carter said.

"This morning (Tuesday) he had a treatment. We're doing ice, heat and ultra sound. It's just going to be a continual day-by-day process," added the Warrior coach.

To Ruidoso's advantage, Saenz has run the triple option for two years now. He and wide receiver Josh Varnadore have the timing of a Swiss watch.

Saenz can spend the week healing and rehabilitating while Schrader will take most of the repetitions in practice.

"We're not going to do anything different at this point in time. Corey understands our offense. He understands what we're doing," Carter said.

Tigers deliver fifth district title in 6 years

• Capitan upends the Demons in Dexter for the District 6AA Title and a No. 1 seeding for the Region G Tournament.

Capitan volleyball coach Bryan Massé thinks the Class AA state championships might as well be played a week early. He suggests Saturday in the Tigers' gym.

"I think everybody is saying these are the four best in the state. This weekend is the state tournament - it's the four best AA volleyball teams in the state," Massé said. "Whoever comes out of the region here has the inside track to the state championship."

Dexter, Hatch and Animas join the host Tigers for the Region G Tournament Saturday. In the semifinals, District 6AA runner-up Dexter

(15-7) meets District 5AA champion Hatch (21-1) at 11 a.m. Then 6AA champ Capitan (18-4) takes on 5AA runner-up Animas (17-5) at 1 p.m. The losers go home for the season while the winners play at 5 p.m. for the Regional championship.

The Tigers earned the right to host the regional tournament when they came from behind to win the district championship in Dexter on Halloween. Capitan overcame a nightmarish start to win, 13-15, 10-15, 15-7, 15-7 and 15-12.

The victory gave the Tigers their fifth district title in six years. It came just four days after the Demons downed the Tigers in Tularosa in a special playoff match to determine the district's No. 1 seed.

"We were making too many mistakes and mentally were not in the match," Massé said of the Tigers' early play in Dexter.

Before the third game, Massé took the Tigers to the locker room and asked them if they were going to hand over the district championship to the Demons.

Based on their play for the rest of the match, the Tigers' answer to Massé's question was a definite "no."

Most notably, Capitan improved its defensive play.

"We started moving better and we changed coverage too. We pulled off the middle blocker and let her cover the dink," Massé said. "They weren't really hitting the ball with any power. That's when we went to a single block on the outside."

And then sophomore middle hitter Lindsey Bush got going. Bush shrugged off her underclassman status and led the Tigers with her play at the net, outthanking Dexter's Emmilyn Trammel.

"I just think a light switch went on and Lindsey decided to step up," Massé said. With Bush leading the charge, outside hitter Adrianna Scaff joined in to give the CHS a one-two punch.

Capitan's run to the district title was nearly derailed Thursday by Tularosa. The Wildcats pushed the Tigers to the limit before falling, 13-15, 15-5, 7-15, 15-9, 15-11.

"They came out fired up and ready. They were everywhere," Massé said of the Tularosa visitors. "At moments it looked like our season could be over."

Capitan was six points away from turning in uniforms in the fourth game when it trailed 9-5.

"It was pretty much close to looking like we were going to be done for the year," Massé said.

But as she did in the Dexter match, Bush rescued the Tigers.

"Lindsey kind of turned in on in that fourth game and we just kept getting her the ball," Massé said.

Capitan also was boosted by the return of senior outside hitter K'rin Autrey. Autrey missed a match and two days of practice with a sprained ankle.

"It was good because the pressure was really, really on us and we had to perform. We had everything to lose," Massé said. "I just felt fortunate because we weathered the storm."

The victory over Tularosa Thursday stretched Capitan's home court winning streak to 10. The Tigers are undefeated at home in 1998. You can bet Massé will play up that streak as regionals arrive.

"That's one of the things that we've got to believe - that we can't be beat on our own floor," Massé said.

One teen's parents say they still might sue

'Co-Queens' to reign over Lincoln County Rodeo Club, but case may not be ended

Advice from its legal counsel tips the balance in club board's decision to compromise.

The fairest resolution to a battle over the Lincoln County Rodeo Club Queen's crown is for two girls to share the honor, the club's board of directors has decided.

In a letter dated Oct. 5, but not received by the parents of Chelsea Black until Oct. 12, board president Shannon Brazel wrote that on the advice of legal counsel, the board will recognize two queens this year.

"By action of the board, Chelsea is hereby designated as co-queen for the 1998-99 season, along with Lucera Montes," Brazel wrote. "A

crown and buckle will be issued to your daughter in recognition of the title."

The presentation is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. at the next club meeting Thursday in the Lincoln County Fair Building.

Brazel wrote that "Your daughter's acceptance of the crown, buckle and duties of the position of queen...will be interpreted as complete and final settlement of this matter."

But Chelsea's parents, DeLane and Justin Black, say that's not necessarily the case.

Speaking from Arizona, DeLane Black said Tuesday that her daughter will accept the crown, but that the family attorney and her daughter's counselor want a written apology from the board.

Rumors are circulating that her daughter "stole" the crown by winning the

horsemanship contest by one point. She wants that issue cleared up to ensure the incident doesn't come back to haunt her daughter in any future competition. The family's attorney, Don Dutton, also will ask for assurances that Chelsea will be treated equally with Lucera Montes, Black said.

The parents are concerned that Chelsea will not be on an equal footing with Lucera. Black said her daughter showed up at the annual Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium, several days after the date of the letter, wearing her Rodeo Queen shirt, but Lucera was wearing the crown and Chelsea was ignored.

The Blacks contend the board acted without authority when some members voted on Sept. 26 to strip Chelsea of a

crowns she earned in an Aug. 29 competition by decision of a panel of judges. They decided, instead, to hand the crown to the next runner-up, because Chelsea was not at the awards ceremony in time for the crowning.

In a previous board meeting on the issue, Dutton pointed out that the rules don't require a new queen to be at the crowning ceremony. The rules do not allow for a crown to be removed for someone being late or to override the decision of the judges of the competition.

Board members who voted for that action complained that Chelsea had been late on other occasions and that part of the queen's responsibility is to show up on time and represent the club.

In her letter, Brazel wrote:

"You were previously advised that the other young lady was crowned as a direct result of your daughter's failure to present herself at the awards banquet in a timely manner. While it is unfortunate that your daughter (was) unable to present herself at the queen crowning, it is also the board's position that the runner-up should not be penalized in any way for things of which she was totally unaware and which were beyond her control."

The Blacks also contend one of the board members yelled at their daughter, who showed up after the crowning. They also claim they were misled into thinking the awards banquet began an hour later than the actual

schedule.

The board member denies that she raised her voice to the 14-year-old girl or that she allowed family members to think the banquet started at an incorrect time.

"The directors and officers of the corporation serve on a volunteer basis, without pay and have no motives other than to help the children of this county," Brazel wrote in the letter.

Because of the threat of litigation, Brazel directed inquiries to the board's attorney Alan Morel, who said he had no comment at this time.

"Accepting the crown doesn't mean the board is exempt from any lawsuit, but we decided not to sue at this time," Black said. "We have three years to do so."

County's new budget gets state approval, but remains short of mandated reserves

Lincoln County's treasurer says it's sometimes a matter of when grant money is received that creates an apparent imbalance.

Lincoln County is operating on a \$10.2 million fiscal year budget that fails to meet the level of reserve money required by the state Department of Finance and Administration.

In giving the agency's written approval of the July, 1998, through June, 1999, budget, state executive budget analyst Susan M. Rodriguez noted the county's general fund's ending cash balance is below the local government division's three-twelfth (or three-month) reserve requirement.

"The county should make every effort to build reserves by the end of the fiscal year 1998-99," she wrote.

But County Treasurer Joan Park said the problem isn't lack of money, it's how grants are handled and reported.

To show a balanced figure at the end of the year for each grant, it is necessary to transfer money temporarily from the general fund until lagging

reimbursements catch up, she said.

In the most recent budget adjustment, approved late last month by the commission and the state, four temporary transfers were completed for a DWI monitoring program grant, a narcotics investigation project grant, a safe communities grant and an enhanced 911 grant.

"Note that these funds are anticipated reimbursements from prior years," Park stated in a summary given to commissioners. "As soon as these reimbursements are received, the general fund must be reimbursed by a budget adjustment resolution transferring the money back."

County Commissioner Wilton Howell previously suggested that the "paper" problem could be solved by simply reducing the \$100,000 set aside toward the construction of a new county detention center to \$50,000 and putting the other half into the reserve item temporarily.

Howell voted against approval of the budget that failed to meet its reserve requirements.

But Park said DFA staff specified the method being used by the county finance office.

The required cash reserve for the \$3.1 million general fund is \$789,162, about \$74,201 more than the amount now listed as ending cash balance.

The \$1.1 million road department budget is projected to have a \$176,708 ending cash balance, about \$83,500 more than is needed for its required reserve.

Commissioners started debating the budget last April, received a preliminary nod from the state in May, went through a series of reviews over the summer, approved a final budget in August and then forwarded that version to the DFA for its approval.

The cash reserve overall shows that a decline started a few years ago and is projected to drop from \$4.181 million on June 30, 1988, to \$2.195 million by June 30, 1999.

One of the major drains on the budget is the operation of the county jail in Carrizozo. The budget for that item increased from less than \$300,000 last year to about \$625,000, and the county still faces the job of building a new detention center.

Presbyterian (USA) moderator to speak here

The Rev. Doug Oldenburg, moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA), will be the keynote speaker when Presbyterians from throughout Southeastern New Mexico gather this Saturday at the First Presbyterian Church in Ruidoso.

President of Columbia Theological Seminary since 1987, Oldenburg was elected moderator of the U. S. church at the denomination's general assembly in June. During his term as moderator, and as the denomination celebrates a "Year with Education," a year-long emphasis on the church's educational ministry, Oldenburg will visit Presbyterian churches in the U. S. and abroad, emphasizing what he calls "our noble her-

itage of a loving God whom we are called to love with our minds as well as our hearts."

Prior to serving as president of Columbia, Oldenburg spent 26 years as a pastor of Presbyterian churches in Virginia, West Virginia and North Carolina. 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Animal control officers from across the state hold meeting in Ruidoso Downs

Participants attend wide range of training programs

A training conference for animal control officers from all over New Mexico was held in Ruidoso last week.

Called "Furry & Friendly or Hairy & Horrible," the workshop, held Oct. 29 and 30 at the Inn at Pine Springs in Ruidoso Downs, drew animal control officers from all over the state.

Topics ran the gamut from diseases humans can get from animals, presented by Ruidoso veterinarian Robert M. Owen, to wildlife capture and restraint presented by Ron Moore from the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish.

"If there's any animal anywhere found," said Ruidoso animal control officer Peggy Williams, coordinator of the event, "the animal control officer is called. I don't care whether it's a snake, a boa constrictor or a crocodile. Think about it, who are they going to call? Not Ghostbusters."

Other topics included animal abuse recognition by Ruidoso Downs veterinarian Warren Franklin; court demeanor and being an effective witness by Ruidoso Municipal Judge Michael S. Line; and rabies and plague update by the state epidemiologist from Santa Fe, Paul Ettestad.

Terrance Vestal, editor of the *Ruidoso News* talked about

media public relations and what to do if you're misquoted, because, said Williams, "so many people are afraid to talk to reporters because they're misquoted or they had a terrible encounter ... so they think they have to only talk about the good parts, or to cover up the bad, or to lie."

The last formal speaker, Coy Willis, director of the Midland, Texas, Animal Control Department and Williams' former boss, gave a presentation on chemical immobilization of animals.

"This is the first time a training has been held in Ruidoso," said Williams. "The emphasis is on education. When you're dealing with animals you've got to be knowledgeable."

She said the conference was a success "beyond her wildest dreams."

Specialist says loan consolidation must be carefully considered

LAS CRUCES - Loan consolidation may seem the best way to reduce financial problems and the quickest and easiest way to end the harassment from bill collectors. But people considering consolidation loans may not realize all of the financial implications of combining their debts, said a consumer education specialist with New Mexico State University here.

A consolidation loan is a specific amount of money borrowed from a bank, credit union, savings and loan institution or finance company to pay several bills under one debt, said Susan Wright of NMSU's Cooperative Extension Service. Bills are paid with borrowed money.

"Although monthly payments for consolidation loans are smaller than payments for the previous bills these loans usually are more costly than the original bills because the repayment

period is longer," she said. "In some instances, consolidated loans are calculated to include bills that originally had no interest. There also may be fees, such as a closing fee, which will increase the cost of the consolidation loan."

People who are considering a loan consolidation should get quotes from several different financial institutions for interest rates, special fees, monthly payments, total cost time for repayment and total interest to be paid, Wright advised. Compare costs and decide which loan will cost less over the period of the loan. Then calculate the total cost and how long it will take to pay off the original debts.

"You may find that, with some belt-tightening and simple changes in your spending habits, you will be able to pay off the original debt for much less than a consolidation loan costs," Wright said. Before taking out a

consolidation loan, consider getting some financial counseling, she advised. The Consumer Credit Counseling Service offers free assistance to help consumers manage debt. A payment schedule with debtors can be arranged. Consumers have smaller payments and more time to get out of debt.

"Other alternatives to loan consolidation include using a very strict budget to lower expenses until debts are reduced," Wright said. "Increase income by selling items that are not used or needed. A family member might get a job or a second job. Some families may be eligible for assistance such as food stamps to make it through tough times."

The important thing, she said, is for people to reevaluate their lifestyles and consider where expenses can be eliminated or reduced.





Entrepreneur offers snippets about the area's culture, character and history

Sherry Barrow in no way resembles Charles Kuralt, the journalist known for his "On the Road" series.

Even so, the vivacious Ruidoso woman is doing a mean impersonation of the man.

Just as Kuralt traveled America's roadways documenting community lifestyles, oddities and culture, Barrow has toured Lincoln County, specifically the Billy the Kid Byway, focusing on the attractions and interesting people along the way.

Those conversations, as well as basic information about the area, have been preserved on a cassette tape and in a series of radio segments that will air this December on KENW, the public radio station found locally at 91.3.

The 57-minute cassette is called "Let's Tour: You Drive — I'll Talk," and is meant to be played as people actually drive the byway loop — starting and ending at the Billy the Kid Scenic Byways Interpretive Center next to the Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs.

"This tour takes 97 minutes," Barrow said. "I have driven it 14 times within the last month. And it takes an average of 97 minutes with good driving conditions and driving the posted speed limit without any difficulties."

She has tried to time the tape so it corresponds with the drive time from one location to another.

"And it has facilitation in-

formation, because if you want to get from 'A' to 'B,' you need information," Barrow said. "But I wanted to give them a little more depth in the way of color, culture and history."

The idea for the tape began to percolate, she said, about three years ago after she married Glen Barrow, a Ruidoso area resident for about 20 years.

"When I first moved, here I said to my husband, 'Okay, where is there a museum where I can go and learn the history of Ruidoso?'" she said.

But there wasn't one, and Barrow, whose resume includes being a planning and marketing consultant as well as a public relations and freelance writer, began thinking about ways to provide basic information about the area.

"There are some wonderful books written, but they are not

nearly enough," she said. "I would just go out and talk to people and read and compare what I heard and what people told that isn't written down ... And it became really fascinating."

Barrow's project has generated a lot of interest from area organizations, including state development at Rural Economic Development Through Tourism (REDTT).

Support also has come from tourism promoters such as the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, she said. And businesses have supported the project either with technical assistance, such as Robertson Media out of Clovis, or financially.

"As they say on the radio: 'This program was made possible in part by Sierra Blanca Motors,'" Barrow said with a laugh.

Virginia McReynolds, de-

velopment director at KENW, said the idea for the radio segments spun out of the cassette tape.

"I thought it was an interesting idea when she first brought it up, and I think there are a lot of people in our listening audience who are curious about these things and they may be thinking about places to visit," McReynolds said from the station's offices in Portales.

That listening audience covers one of the largest geographic areas for a public radio station in the country, encompassing all of East New Mexico and much of West Texas — from Raton to Midland, McReynolds said.

Barrow's segments, about 3 minutes each, are to run on the station's daytime programming schedule five times a week starting in December, McReynolds said. Barrow said 12 segments have been completed so far.

"I would like to see it go further," McReynolds added of Barrow's roadside tours. "We have talked about going to some other places inside our listening area."

Barrow has a curiosity and a vitality that brings the stories to life, McReynolds said.

"The way she approaches a story is with a great deal of excitement about the smaller things," she said.

Barrow herself already is planning her second tape.

"After talking to people after all this time, I have hours and hours of tape," she said. "I didn't have time to put all of the heavy-duty, comprehensive stuff in it ... And I know they

didn't want to pull over and sit for 10 minutes every time we come to a different subject.

The first tape introduces motorists to the center, the Museum of the Horse, the "Y" and then the Old Mill, where the first interview starts.

"We start out with Delana Michaels," Barrow said. "Just some colorful fun information about things that used to happen there. The Old Mill really was the first white settlement in this area, so it seemed appropriate to me to cover because it was Ruidoso's birthplace."

She talks to various people about Fort Stanton, Ski Apache, the Coe Ranch, the town of Lincoln and Bonito Lake, among other attractions. She even interviews a chuckwagon cook at the Cowboy Symposium, an event held in Ruidoso every fall.

"And we got a really nice little piece from Michael Hurd, from the Hurd LaRinconada Gallery ... And it's history. It's not just about art," she said.

Though the cassette tape is a commercial venture, Barrow has no expectations of getting rich from it. The project is a philanthropic effort, she said.

"However, 'I would like to break even,'" she said.

The tape is just a basic orientation for visitors as well as a reference for residents, many of whom probably don't know all the facts revealed in the vignettes.

"It's shocking really," Barrow said regarding the number of people who don't know, for example, that Sierra Blanca is the remains of a volcano that erupted here 20,000 years ago.

"It's not going to tell them everything they want to know," Barrow said of the tape. "But it's enough information that they can go on their own and do the things that, as I say on the tape, break their fancy."

The Obligatory Finesse
South dealer.

The bidding:

The obligatory finesse is a trick used by declarer to win a trick which he would otherwise surely lose.
As an example, examine

the North-South spade holding in this hand. The normal way for declarer to manage this holding is to lead a low spade toward the queen in dummy.

Let's assume the queen holds the ace, marking West with the ace. Declarer then returns a spade from dummy and East produces the ten or jack.

It would be wrong for South to cover with the king because the king would lose to the ace and South would later have to lose another spade trick. Instead, West plays low, hoping that West was dealt the A-x originally and will be forced to play the ace on his partner's ten or jack. This is the obligatory finesse, and when the cards are favorably placed for declarer, it gains him a trick.

The defense can sometimes invoke a countermeasure to the obligatory finesse, as in the present deal. South is declarer at four-spades and West chances the K-A of clubs, then contin-

ues with the queen.

If South is allowed to go about his business unimpeded, he will, as we have seen, lose only one trump trick and thus make the contract.

But if the defense functions perfectly, South can be defeated. When West leads the queen of clubs, East ruffs with the ten, even though it appears routine to discard on his partner's high club.

South is helpless against this defense. He is forced to overruff with the king — otherwise, he is down immediately — and lead a trump toward the queen.

This does him no good because West rises with the ace and returns the ten of clubs. Dummy has to follow suit, whereupon East once again trumps his partner's high club — this time with the jack — to secure a one-trick set.

Don't fight it...

Thirty 9-year-olds at White Mountain Elementary are responsible for peace-making during recesses for the school year.


Volunteers to the school's mediation program, they work in teams of two, wearing gold and blue vests and carrying clipboards, walking the playground and watching for conflicts. Through intensive training at the beginning of the school year, they learn to help other kids collaborate to find solutions to their conflicts in ways ensuring that everybody wins.

The clipboards hold a script for problem-solving, and a student mediation report form, on which they write the names of the parties to the conflict; describe the type of conflict — argument, fight, rumor, or something else; what it was about, where it took place, how they found out about it, whether or not the conflict was resolved, and what the students agreed to at the end.

"Tell me what happened and how you feel," they are trained to ask each person involved in a conflict. And then, "What ideas do you have for a solution? What can both of you do so this won't happen again?"

Sometimes the solution is an agreement to avoid each other during recess. At other times, just having felt listened to is enough to resolve the problem.

Susan Carter, a fourth-grade teacher on playground duty, said having the volunteers mediating conflicts makes her job easier — when students come up and complain that someone's not taking turns or usurped the ball,

she just refers them to the mediators. The process also changes how all the students deal with problems, not just the mediators.

"Students are able to talk about their problems more now, not just react," she said. She explained that each teacher at White Mountain has a notebook with lessons that teach students how to listen and to give an "I-statement" about their feelings.

"It helps them realize everybody gets angry, and it's okay to get angry, and it teaches them how to deal with anger," Carter said.

This is the fourth year of the program at White Mountain, said counselor Ubaldo Skinner who, along with social worker Emily Kerrigan, trains the 34 volunteers each year at the beginning of school.

Selection of students

Skinner explained that fourth-grade students are selected by talking to third-grade teachers as well as the fourth-grade teachers, and reading the letters of students who want to be mediators.

"We try to get cross-representation," he said, "in the number of females and males and ethnic representation."

Some of the kids selected are what Skinner calls "negative leaders." They've shown their leadership abilities in negative contexts, and by becoming student mediators, "they learn to funnel their energies in a more positive manner," he said.

This year Kerrigan and Skinner conducted the training of new recruits during two mornings and one afternoon, taking them through the process of conflict resolution by having them role-play and discuss their feelings.

They learn to do active listening, said Kerrigan, "and they practice restating a story and reflecting the meaning back: one minute of listening and then telling a partner how they're feeling."

After the training activities, students are encouraged to reflect on and express their feelings during the activities.

After a session of role-playing, Loren Sportman said she liked it because "it's kind of fun to act and pretend. When you're the disputant, you know how important it is for somebody to listen to you."

Their training continues at their monthly meetings, said Kerrigan. She and Skinner get feedback from them,

on what's happening on the playground.

"We see kids weak in a certain area, and we work on that," she said. "We do team building exercises; it's a sophisticated technique to get disputants to come up with solutions. We refine the process of problem-solving more and come up with more solutions."

Why they make the commitment

Why some to do it because siblings did it, some in order to make more friends, others are interested in helping other kids solve their problems without fighting. And some just like the perks: the snacks that come with the three half-days of training and the monthly training meetings, going to the head of the line to get popcorn at the cafeteria on Fridays, the end-of-the-year activity, such as an overnight trip to the Lonetree Bible Ranch, or a trip to Alto to swim and play tennis.

The student mediators make a commitment for the entire school year. Skinner said no one has dropped out of the program since it began four years ago.

New recruit Garrett Griffin volunteered because he thought it would be pretty cool, and he knows from personal experience that it works.

"It works because I've been in a situation and they solved my problem," he said.

Some "veterans" of the program, now in the seventh grade, talked about how it affected them even after they were not participating in it.

"We helped them solve the problem instead of telling them they can't do this, which is what police officers

do," said Justin Huffman.

Jessica Francis, whose sister Michaela is a mediator at White Mountain, said they stopped students from getting into worse trouble.

All the veterans agreed that by being mediators, they learned how to cooperate with other people, and how to stay out of fights themselves.

What's it like to be in a school that doesn't have a mediation program? Pretty rough, say the veterans.

Whether the difference in conflicts is due to advancing age and hormones or to the lack of a mediation program, the mediators observed that disagreements among students at the middle school are different.

"Here we don't have problems," said Erika Lugo, "we have fights."

Brendan LaCount agreed, saying there were more and bigger problems.

Skinner and Kerrigan were trained by the New Mexico Center for Dispute Resolution in Albuquerque, through professional development monies, Skinner said, and the center contracts with Sue Martinez to provide technical assistance or conduct refresher trainings for about 15 school districts, including Ruidoso, Capitan, Hondo, Roswell, Carrizozo, Alamogordo and Artesia.

Can 9-year-olds pick up the skills? "Absolutely," Martinez, of Ruidoso, said. "Often times I find that kids can pick up the skills even more quickly than adults just because they have fewer years of things to overcome. Sometimes I find that kids are more willing to just sit with differences of opinion than adults...that they understand that it's possible to see different things in the same picture because you're a different person."



Judges take 'a bite out of crime' through the wallets of offenders

Minor traffic violators in local courts are given a chance to 'donate' to Crimestoppers effort

Area judges not only are hearing cases in court, they

also are helping to solve crimes and keeping criminals in jail, said Ruidoso Chief of Police Lanny Maddox at a luncheon honoring judges

Oct. 27. The board of directors of Ruidoso/Lincoln County Crimestoppers, Inc. recognized local judges for their support of a statute allowing judges to order minor traffic violators to donate to Crimestoppers instead of paying a fine and having the charges go on their driving records.

Maddox said it took a lot of work to get the statute lobbied and passed eight years ago.

Maddox and Magistrate Judge William Butts pointed out that Crimestoppers is totally funded through the efforts of the judges.

This provision has been instrumental in the continuation and success of Crimestoppers, providing continuous funding for payment of rewards for information on much greater crimes committed in Lincoln County, Maddox said.

Butts, a member of the Crimestoppers board, explained how the statute works.

"At a judge's discretion," he said, "a person who doesn't have a criminal record or a bad traffic record can keep the charges off his record with a deferred sentence. They are instead assessed a Crimestoppers donation, limited to \$100 ... and once they

do that, the charge will be dismissed and not go on their record."

Butts said a lot of Texans get tickets for speeding when they're passing a car or committing some other minor traffic violation, and in Texas the alternative to having it go on their records is to go to defensive driving school, which means that Texas benefits instead of New Mexico.

By ordering the defendants to make a contribution to Crimestoppers, he said, the money stays in New Mexico.

It doesn't apply just to traffic violations, Butts said, but also to Game Department violations.

These offenses can include exceeding the bag limit of fishing regulations, or dogs running at large, if the owners have fixed the fence through which the dog got out and showed the court they intend to maintain it.

Butts said the people who commit these minor offenses are called "NORPS."

"Normal, ordinary, productive citizens," and they deserve a break, the judge said.

More serious traffic violations, such as driving while intoxicated, are not given this leniency, and the charges against these violators do go on their driving records.

Butts said he calls these people "glugs" who don't deserve any breaks.

"The jail is full of them," he said.

Ruidoso Municipal Court Judge Michael Line said the program not only provides an effective alternative form of punishment, but the money collected from it goes into solving crimes that wouldn't otherwise be solved as quickly.

Plaques were presented to District Court Judge Karen L. Parson, Magistrate Court Judge Gerald Dean Jr., Magistrate Court Judge William R. Butts, Ruidoso Municipal Court Judge Michael Line, and Ruidoso Downs Municipal Court Judge Harold Mansell.

Crimestoppers' record

Between 1986 and 1997, Crimestoppers has recovered \$2,664,412 in stolen monies and \$2,237,123 in stolen property, according to statistics compiled by Maddox.

"We should be the insurance company's dream child," Maddox said, after pointing out that figure on money recovered from burglaries and robberies.

The organization's work at finding the right suspects is reliable, too.

More than 420 defen-

dants have been tried in the 11 years of the statistical analysis, and 426 were convicted, Maddox said.

The chief added that Crimestoppers has solved 962 cases, including six murders, eight rapes, 11 armed robberies, 195 burglaries, 151 thefts, and 23 auto thefts.

Through the efforts of Crimestoppers, officers have seized \$427,289 in wholesale value of narcotics and solved 381 narcotics cases.

They have paid rewards to 238 people, totaling \$40,782.

Some 29 people declined reward money after offering information on crimes, the chief said.

Maddox said the national bylaws of the statute stipulate that Crimestoppers can pay no more than \$1,000 in rewards for information.

He said statistics show that this amount gets as much response as a larger reward.

Ruidoso/Lincoln County Crimestoppers, Inc. was created in January of 1983.

Maddox is the current coordinator, and Don Miller is chairman of the board of directors.

Keeping heating bills cool

Lower temperatures are just around the corner, and with them are potentially higher heating bills.

Texas-New Mexico Power Company offers timely tips to assist in keeping heating bills within reason during the winter months.

"The most important means of reducing electric bills is knowing how to decrease the impact of cold or hot weather on energy consumption," said Jim Bassett, customer relations coordinator. "Otherwise, heating and cooling can equate to nearly half of residential electricity use."

Consider the following to assist in controlling winter energy use:

- Keep the damper of your fireplace tightly closed when not in use to prevent warm air from being pulled up the chimney.

- Install a glass door in front of the fireplace to keep warm air inside when the fireplace is not in use.

- Install storm windows to increase insulation.

These windows can save up to \$100 annually on heating bills.

- Weather-strip around doors. This can result in annual savings of approximately \$15.

- Check for air drafts at electric outlets, along baseboards, around plumbing pipes and fireplace dampers.

Securing leaks of this nature can amount to \$50 in annual savings.

- Calk around doors and windows. An average saving of around \$30 yearly can be achieved.

- Avoid the temptation to turn your thermostat up to combat a temporary chill.

The recommended thermostat setting in the winter is 68 degrees.

POOP SCOOP

Here's a few things to think about when faced with the question of what to do with your pets while you're traveling. We looked at veterinary hospitals and professional sitters last week.

Boarding kennels are a third option. But don't board at a facility where dogs and cats occupy the same room, or where they are within earshot on each other. Cats become stressed easily.

Make sure the boarding establishment is clean, animal-friendly, spacious and with lots of natural light. Ask what kind of food they serve, or if you can bring your own.

Does the proprietor live on the premises? Is there a "house vet" on call for medical problems? Can the caretaker give medications, or cater to special diets?

If the facility "flea-free?"

Do the animals have recreational time? Will your dog get walked? Will your cat be brushed and petted?

What are the vaccine requirements?

Reputable board facilities will not admit feline AIDS/leukemia positive cats, or dogs with kennel cough. These cases should be referred to a pet sitter.

4. Home Alone

You almost never hear about

dogs being left alone for 24 hours, but most people feel it's all right to leave cats for days with big food and water bowls, or outdoors to fend for themselves during good weather.

How does the cat know only to eat one-third or one-quarter of the food daily so that it will last during your absence? What if they spill the water bowl and become thirsty? Who will notice and take them to the vet if they become ill? What if the litter box gets full, and they start using the carpet?

5. Take the Pet with You

This option can work if the pet is welcome at your destination, travels well and you will be available to tend to its needs.

I have cats who have traveled well cross-country in our motor home.

Be sure to take all of your pet's veterinary records with you, and have your pet checked by your vet the month of the trip. Books now are available that list motels, hotels, bed and breakfasts across the country that welcome your pet.

Book a reservation for your pet at the same time you reserve your own. That way, you'll both be happy and healthy upon your return.



Frank Lloyd Wright, a new film by Ken Burns, tells the story of a man whose exceptional life and revolutionary designs offer insights into both the history of architecture and the broader sweep of history from the 1890s to the 1950s. The two 90-minute segments interweave Wright's extraordinary career — during which he designed more than 800 buildings — with his equally tempestuous life. He was by turns mercurial, self-absorbed, generous, devious, arrogant, funny, romantic, uncompromising, visionary, conservative, iconoclastic, down to earth, and always brilliant. He was a man who once said, "Early in life, I had to choose between honest arrogance and hypocritical humility. I chose honest arrogance." Wright was born in Richland Center, Wisconsin, in 1867. His parents' unhappy marriage guaranteed a stormy and chaotic childhood, but his mother lavished love and admiration on him and dreamed that he would become an architect. Wright dropped out of college, found a job with the great Chicago architect, Louis Sullivan, and in 1893, left to spend the next 10 years building a successful solo practice, designing 135 houses and perfecting his revolutionary Prairie Style. In the course of his long career he would go on to design everything: banks, businesses, hotels, resorts and churches, a filling station, a synagogue, a beer garden, and, at the end of his life, the Guggenheim Museum — each time creating buildings that were strikingly fresh and new.

However, Wright was never happy unless he was "living on the edge." He always lived well beyond his means, was often in debt, and rarely completed projects on time or within budget. In 1909, he left his wife and their six children for the wife of a client and neighbor, and eventually married twice more. During the next 20 years, he was constantly embroiled in scandals of his own making, which made it almost impossible for him to attract clients.

During the boom years of the 1920s, Wright's career hit rock bottom as the International Style of architecture began to emerge on the American architectural scene and Wright was then seen as a has-been. The stock market crash and the Depression left Wright penniless, without prospects for new commissions. But he refused to admit defeat. In the ensuing years, he established a fellowship program in which young apprentices paid for the privilege of studying and working with the great master; he gave speeches, wrote an autobiography, and eventually landed two key commissions — Fallingwater in Bear Run, Pennsylvania, his most famous house, and the Johnson Wax Building in Racine, Wisconsin. At age 70, his career was soaring; the last 20 years of his life proved the most productive of all.



Sixth season of *X-Files* sets small screen afire

Temperatures rise on *The X-Files* as the popular Fox series begins its sixth season Sunday, Nov. 8.

Hot on the heels of this summer's feature film, the new season begins with an episode set in Phoenix, an unfamiliar terrain for Mulder and Scully (David Duchovny, Gillian Anderson).

But there's a good reason why the two agents are traipsing around the sweltering city. After several years of filming in Vancouver, British Columbia, the series now is shot in Los Angeles.

"The (episode's) opening shot starts on the sun and we hold on it - a bit longer than we should probably - and then we come down and we reveal the desert landscape, and it's sort of a wink to the audience," executive producer Frank Spotnitz reveals.

The new locale isn't the only thing causing blood to boil. In the film, Mulder and Scully almost shared a kiss. Now, as outside forces threaten their partnership, the two agents must come to terms with how that intimate moment changes things between them.

"I think you will see the good and the bad of that moment, not just in the first episode but in several of the episodes in the new year," Spotnitz says. "It leads to tensions as well as increased closeness between the two of them."

Also in the season premiere, Spender and Fowley (Chris Owens, Mimi Rogers) return and are partnered up to protect chess prodigy Gibson Praise (guest star Jeff Gulka).

Spotnitz says the teaming of Spender and Fowley creates an intriguing contrast to Mulder and Scully's pairing.

"There's also the interesting personal connection between Mulder and Fowley because they were once romantically involved, whereas Mulder and Scully have never been," he notes. "And then Spender's connection to the Cigarette-Smoking Man becomes increasingly clear in the new season."

The next mythology episodes won't air until February, but the producers have plenty planned for fans. Episode 3 is filmed in the wide-screen format and plays in real time, while episodes 4 and 5 feature a two-part comedic story line set in Nevada's Area 51.


I would guess your friend is thinking of actor John Vernon, who played Dean Vernon Wormer in *Animal House*.

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
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

Haley's Mama Flora mixes history, storytelling

When *Roots* author Alex Haley died in 1992, he left unfinished the story of his mother's life, an uphill struggle against harsh circumstances.

Mama Flora's Family, a two-part drama adapted from the recently published novel of the same name, is the fulfillment of Haley's vision.

"It was meant to be a novel and a miniseries," says executive producer Jon Avnet (*Fried Green Tomatoes*), who recalls Haley as a mentor and friend.

"There was a story inside (Haley), and he sort of hammered it out. (We intended) to do the miniseries after he finished the book. He worked on the book for a number of years and wrote quite a bit of it but ultimately never completed it."

That task fell to David Stevens (*Breaker Morant*). Stevens also co-wrote the script for the film, which airs Sunday and Tuesday, Nov. 8 and 10, on CBS.

Mama Flora's Family opens in 1970, as 74-year-old Flora Palmer (Cicely Tyson) collects her granddaughter Diana (Queen Latifah) and toddler great-grandson from a trashy apartment to take them under her own roof. Unwilling at first, Diana learns from her grandmother's life story, which begins before the turn of the century.

Flora (played in flashbacks by Erika Alexander) is a sharecropper's daughter. In her teens, she gives birth to the child of a well-to-do young man and is forced to give the infant up. Crushed, Flora leaves home to start life over, working as a laundress and housekeeper.

Flora's marriage to farmer Booker T. Palmer (David Ramsey) brings happiness, but Booker pays for his ambition with his life. Flora is then left to raise their son, Willie. She tries to keep the boy in school, but he quits to work in a cotton field. Later, Willie heads for Chicago, where money slips through his fingers.

During the 1940s, Flora finally meets her estranged son, Luke (Mario Van Peebles), who has had the benefit of a

law-school education but resents the absence of his mother for so many years.

At the same time, Willie envies the maternal pride Flora has in Luke.

"Willie goes through the same struggle a great many men go through in life," says *L.A. Law* star Blair Underwood, who plays Willie from 17 to 55.

"I see Willie as almost three different people. In the beginning, he's a kid trying to find himself. I liken it to a young deer trying to find his legs.

"Then when he goes up to Chicago and he's drinking and gambling and running around with women, he's trying to find his manhood in many ways. And later on, he's trying to find his heart, around age 45 or 50."

Mama Flora's Family is a big story, and Avnet fits as much as he can into four hours. The characters' lives intersect with World War II, the civil rights movement and the Vietnam conflict, but the story stays focused on Mama Flora's values and determination.

"As I read the script," Underwood recalls, "and saw the broken English, and (the story) starting off with slavery, there was a side of me that said, 'I don't want to see that, much less be a part of it or do it.'"

"But as I continued to read, I came to the realization that a lot of kids don't know the history of African-American families in this country. So it's worth exploring."

And, he adds, "it's by far the most challenging role I've ever played."

The roster of actors attending is a veritable Who's Who of soap stars.


