

# Albuquerque hiker found unharmed

• *Cody Fagan, 17, was dehydrated but in reported good health Tuesday night after being lost in the Capitan Mountains for four and a half days.*

Almost a day after the search for Cody Fagan was officially called off, the 17-year-old Albuquerque youth on Tuesday evening walked into a remaining rescue party made up of people from his church.

"We did find him and he's in great shape," said Dan Hill, a state police official as well as the boy's youth minister. "He was walking. He actually found them ... It is amazing."

Fagan, who had been lost for four and a half days in the Capitan Mountains, appeared to be suffering only from some dehydration after being found at 4:44 p.m. Tuesday, Hill said.

The youth was found about a third of a mile from the base camp established for the massive rescue effort mounted for Fagan since Friday afternoon.

The search involved roughly 250 volunteers at various times, including search and rescue teams from about the region, horseback teams, state and federal agencies and two helicopters, Hill said.

Somehow, Fagan, who is 6 feet 4 inches tall, and weighs 225 pounds, was not spotted by any of the search crews until Tuesday.

Though he at one time saw a helicopter, he did not describe either of the two helicopters involved in the search, Hill said.

"He's just been hiking this whole time," Hill said.

Fagan was taken to Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso for a more complete medical evaluation. Fagan, who is on daily medication to prevent seizures, apparently did not suffer any seizures while lost, Hill said.

State police had officially called off the search for Fagan as of 8 p.m. Monday, John Lieftinck, with the White Mountain Rescue team, said. At the time, search teams had covered a 50-square mile area, and helicopters had swept the area for several days, even

using infrared scopes at night to locate Fagan by body heat.

"This is just terrible news for the family," Lieftinck said when the search was called off. "It comes to the point where we do the best we could — and we just didn't find him," he added, his voice cracking with emotion.

A state police official in Alamogordo said some people continued the search for Fagan into Tuesday, including a group from the Eastern Hills Baptist Church, where Fagan attends with his family.

Fagan had been last seen at 8:30 a.m. Friday. He and a friend had accompanied with two adult men from their church to the

## State attorney general asked to investigate trust

AG could look at Lincoln County Heritage Trust finances

• *Trust board members were to meet Tuesday afternoon to discuss the future of the closed Lincoln County Heritage Trust Museum in Lincoln.*

Requests have been filed with New Mexico Attorney General's Office for an investigation of the Lincoln County Heritage Trust, a state official has confirmed.

"The request for an investigation concerns the financial management and the way in which the organization is being run," said Kay Bird, a spokesperson for the New Mexico Attorney General's Office.

Bird, based on policy, would neither confirm nor deny that an investigation has been initiated by the Attorney General's Office into the failed Lincoln County Heritage Trust Museum in the town of Lincoln.

Nor could she release the names of the people requesting the investigation, Bird said.

Some Lincoln residents had earlier announced their intention of seeking an investigation into operation of the museum, which closed Nov. 1 because of a lack of funds.

Corporations in New Mexico, including the Lincoln County Heritage Trust, must file financial records with the state Attorney General's Office.

Enough money, \$50,000, remains from a \$2.5 million trust to pay for a custodian/caretaker of the museum during the winter, board members have said.

The museum and the Dr. Wood's House, also in the town of Lincoln, document the history of the town and the county, including the infamous Billy the Kid and the Lincoln County War.

On Tuesday afternoon, the trust board met in a closed meeting to discuss the future of the foundation, which is a non-profit organization.

At an earlier board meeting, in mid-October, members discussed reopening the museum during summer months only, when the tourism was at its peak. However, by Oct. 21, board members were discussing turning the two museums over to the state for operation.

The \$2.5 million trust was established by oilman Robert O. Anderson to preserve the community's history. At least one board member has contended the museum's finances have been mismanaged.

## Front entrance to be used for LCMC emergencies

Emergency patients will use front doors

Patients entering Lincoln County Medical Center's emergency room today and Thursday will need to use the hospital's front doors, an administrator said Tuesday.

Suzanne Leland, director of nursing, said the emergency room's side doors will be closed while a large piece of hospital equipment is moved from the west side of the facility to the east side.

The move is to facilitate pending construction at the hospital.

The emergency room will remain open during the move and accessible


through the hospital's main entrance, Leland said.

"Patients who normally use the emergency room doors will need to use the front lobby doors," Leland said. "We will have signs up directing them to the front lobby, but local people will try to go to those back doors."

The building being moved houses the Computerized Axial Tomography, commonly referred to as a CAT scan, Leland said. The equipment is being housed in a portable building about the size of a semi-truck.

The hospital is about to undergo several improvement projects, including an expansion of the emergency room.

## County travel, per diem rules tightened

If a Lincoln County commissioner has collected \$1,500 in travel and per diem reimbursements during the year, he'll have to ask the board for permission to spend more — if he wants to be paid for his expenses.

That requirement is part of a revised travel and per diem procedure adopted last week by the commission in a 4-1 vote and after a lengthy explanation about when commissioners can collect for mileage.

The \$1,500 limitation already was part of the county's rules, but had never been followed, Commissioner Wilton Howell said.

"I don't know why it was in there," County Attorney Alan Morel said. "It's not in the state regulations. However, (what the county adopted) is a resolution, not a law, so I don't know what we'd do to you if a commissioner violated it any way."

The new procedure follows state

definitions by declaring the commission office at the county courthouse in Carrizozo the "post of duty" of commissioners.

Previously, commissioners had considered their homes as the point from which they could charge for mileage.

But now, they collect from the county offices and will not be paid to drive to the courthouse from Honda or Ruidoso or Alto.

However, if they are going to a special meeting away from the courthouse, they can charge from their homes and back — unless they stop at the county office.

Then they can't collect to drive there, but they can for any additional mileage, Morel said.

Commissioner William Schwettmann voted against the motion.

"I think we're the only ones in the whole state with that home base definition," Schwettmann said Thursday. "It won't keep me away (from coming to the county office between meet-

ings), but I don't think we ought to be treated like bunch of children."

"Most counties have their own cars (for commissioners). No one is really abusing it and I think it's well worth people spending their money over there (Carrizozo). It should have been brought up."

But Howell, who called for a review of the procedures, said it was time to bring the county in line with the state and the \$1,500 limit. "It's a good place for commissioners to be reminded that only \$2,000 is allowed for each person on the board."

"If a trip is warranted, then the commissioners will approve it," he said. "We need to abide by the same thing employees do. If it's not some, we can adjust it in the future."

Morel also said it was time for the county to update its approach to travel and per diem to bring it in line with state requirements.

The new rules allow employees and commissioners to receive tickets in advance of a trip to pay for the tickets and other expenses that might be difficult for a person to pay personally and then have to wait for reimbursement.





## LOST: Cody Fagan was uninjured although apparently dehydrated

Capitan Mountains. The men had been deer hunting on a nearby ridge at the time Fagan became lost, Hill said.

"They were going hiking and he became separated somehow. Brian (Fagan's friend) turned around and looked for him and he just wasn't there," Hill said.

Fagan, like all the members of the party, had a water canteen with him as well as matches, a solar blanket, gloves, a cap and a pair of binoculars.

He was wearing a good jacket, hiking boots and a fluorescent orange vest so deer hunters wouldn't shoot him by mistake, Hill said.

The men and Fagan's friend looked for the young man until about 2:30 p.m.

Friday before notifying state police, who then initiated an official search.

Hill said 80 percent of most search efforts end in the first 10 hours.

Fagan was lost for 104 hours before running into his church group Tuesday.

Lieftinck, who has been with the White Mountain Search and Rescue Team for six and a half years, called the search effort one of the largest

he had seen in terms of the number of people and resources involved.

"There's been a lot of media attention, but it's absolutely astounding to me how many volunteers are coming here from all over the state," he said. "And the other day we had seven border patrol cars (at the base camp)."

On Monday afternoon, searchers had been optimistic about finding Fagan in good health because of the mild temperatures over the weekend.

"And I've talked several times to the father (Charlie Fagan), and he seems to be in good spirits," Lieftinck said Monday.

"But I just feel so sorry for him because time seems to be running out.

"It's just absolutely amazing to me that so much manpower and so much air power has failed to turn him up," Lieftinck said at the time.

The base camp for the search had been set up in a cow pasture in the mountains about 10 miles north of Lincoln.

The town of Arabela is about 8 miles east of the base camp.

The camp was set up close to where Fagan was last seen, Hill said.

## Traffic expected to be delayed because of blasting

A 15-minute wait could be in store for travellers on Mechem Drive this afternoon

A large explosion is planned by road crews for today on Alto Hill, a road construction manager said.

Traffic will be stopped for about 15 minutes to allow for the blasting, which is to remove a hill to the west of the existing Mechem Drive for the on-going \$7.6 million road construction project, Kevin Clower, with Meadow Valley Contractors, Inc., said.

"It could possibly stop it for little bit longer if we get stuff on the road," Clower said Tuesday. "It could be stopped for 20 minutes, but no longer than that."

The project, which is one of

several road construction projects in progress, is to realign the existing road, making it straighter, drop the road's elevation in several places and

add a turn lane the length of the project.

Clower said the explosion should take place between noon and 3 p.m., but may occur

earlier if the crews complete preparations sooner.

A pre-split blast, a smaller explosion intended to slice the rock face that will border the future road, occurred Tuesday, Clower said.

The explosion had been postponed from late last week, he said.

The explosion scheduled for today will be larger than Tuesday's pre-split blast, Clower said.

"We don't think it will really hold traffic up much longer than normal," he said of today's blasting. "The thing is if there is any debris on the road we will have to clear that, but we will have equipment on stand-by and ready to take care of that."

**VILLAGE NEWS**

**Political signs hearing**

Changes may be made to Ruidoso regulations for political signs following a public hearing at the Dec. 8 session of the Ruidoso Village Council.

Some proposed changes to the village's municipal code include raising the fee for placing political signs in the village, not allowing signs in parks, and limiting the number of signs for a candidate in a certain square-foot area.

The village initiated changes to Ruidoso's election codes, under which political signs are regulated, based on complaints about the number of signs placed around the village during the recent elections.

**December meet earlier**

The Ruidoso Village Council last week rescheduled a December council session because of the holiday season. Instead of Dec. 29, the council will meet on Dec. 22.

**Camelot zoning revised**

Village councilors recently approved a zoning change to the Camelot Mountain Tracts subdivision, providing that seven lots will be used for single family homes.

Salvador M. Vela Jr., of El Paso, applied for the zoning change, which was recommended to the council by the Planning and Zoning Commission at its Oct. 6 meeting.

No nearby property owners objected to the zoning change and several were in favor of it, according to a memo from the planning staff to the council.

Because the new zoning does not comply with the village's master development plan, the commission recommended the council change the area to low-density housing in the master plan.

**No televised session**

The Ruidoso Village Council session of Nov. 10 was not broadcast on Cablevision's

Channel 11 last week because of an unexpected staffing problem at On Track, Inc., the company which provides programming for the public access channel, a company official said. On Track, Inc., known as OTI, provides the village with coverage of the council sessions.

**Right-of-way traded**

Ruidoso will share surveying costs with a land owner in the White Fir subdivision in exchange for a trade of right-of-ways through the property.

Following a lengthy discussion last week, the council approved trading 3,700 square feet of right-of-way with landowner Dalton Cobb, a Midland, Texas, resident. In exchange, Cobb will dedicate a strip of his land at 107 West Riverside Drive to the village as right-of-way.

The village's existing right-of-way through the property not only wasn't being used but has a building jutting onto it. A non-dedicated road going through the property will become dedicated in exchange for the village giving up claim to the unused right-of-way.

The surveying costs are expected to be some \$750 to \$1,000, village administrators said.

**14 lodgings to be audited**

Two village councilors excused themselves last week from a random drawing of 14 lodging businesses to undergo audits for lodgers tax revenues.

The audits are required by state law, according to a staff memo to the council.

Councilors Ron Anderson and Leon Eggleston did not participate in the random drawing because both own a lodging establishment themselves.

This year, the council choose to have 14 businesses audited rather than seven as in previous years. Last year's audit turned up three establishments that were assessed fees because of apparently under-reported revenues.

Because of previous council discussion about increasing the number of lodging establishments audited, Manager Alan Briley said the cost for the additional audits had been included in the 1998-99 budget. Additionally, the village recovers some revenues because of the audits, village leaders said.

Identities of the lodging establishments selected in the drawing are being withheld by the village because of the Taxation and Revenue Privacy Act, Village Clerk Tammie Maddox said.

**EMS grants sought**

Emergency Medical Services has applied for two state grants that may require matching funds from the village of Ruidoso, EMS Director Jim Stover told Ruidoso village councilors recently.

The first grant is for a \$40,000 heart monitor. Though the grant should cover the entire cost of the monitor, the chances of receiving the grant increase if there is a local contribution of \$10,000, Stover told the council. The second grant request is for a new ambulance to replace one that has more than 300,000 miles on it. The village's contribution, or local match, for the ambulance would be \$40,000.

Stover, in a letter to Manager Alan Briley, said he didn't expect the state to award the request for the ambulance because the agency has received funding for two new ambulances in the past two years.

The agreements for the grant matches will have to come back to the council for final approval, Briley said.

**Engineers contracted**

Village councilors have approved a contract with International Consulting and Associates, Ltd., to provide on-call engineering consulting services to the village.

The consultant will provide small design engineering and other projects for the village based on need, according to a

memo to the council from Manager Alan Briley.

The council approved the contract with International on the consent agenda, in which several items are voted on at one time by the council without discussion.

The village's contract with the firm of Molzen-Corbin and Associates expired on Nov. 15. Village staff earlier requested qualification-based proposals from interested firms and opened those proposals on Oct. 15, Briley said. A council subcommittee rated the proposals and found International to have the highest rating, he said.

Briley said the village expects to spend about \$25,000 a year for the consultant's services, based on expenses in past years.

**Test consultant chosen**

Quality Control Engineering, Inc. by contract will provide Ruidoso with on-site materials testing, such as road construction materials, and with geotechnical engineering services.

The village's current contract with AGRA Earth and Environmental expires in January. Village staff earlier requested qualification-based proposals from interested firms and opened those proposals on Oct. 14, Manager Alan Briley advised councilors. A council subcommittee rated the proposals.

Briley estimated that the village will pay the company about \$10,000 for a year's services.

**Snow removal**

Ruidoso resident curious about the village's snow removal policies should check the village's recent newsletter, Manager Alan Briley said at a recent meeting of the village council.

**Commissioners seek to fix judicial fences**

Trying to mend fences and come up with programs to lower the Lincoln County jail population, Commission Chairman L. Ray Nunley and Commissioner Rex Wilson will meet today with some of the judges who send prisoners there.

Frank Wilson, chief judge of the 12th Judicial District Court, which covers Lincoln and Otero counties, will attend, said County Manager Tom Stewart, but he was unsure who else will come to the session in Alamogordo.

At a meeting earlier this month, commissioners directed Stewart to try to work with judges who impact the jail. Commissioner Wilton Howell acknowledged the relationship with judges is a bit rocky since a verbal confrontation a few

months ago between Howell and District Judge Robert Doughty

Stewart didn't know if the county's two magistrate judges, William Butts in Ruidoso and Gerald Dean Jr. in Carrizozo also would attend.

The county is spending as much as \$70 a day to send some of its inmates to other jails, because the State Fire Marshal has put a cap of 30 prisoners on the 35-year-old structure. Although commissioners have said they intend to build a new jail in Carrizozo, Howell contends the cost of jail operation will eat up the county budget unless alternative programs to jail time are established for non-violent inmates or those who need treatment for alcoholism or other addictions.

**County OKs rehab rule change**

County commissioners have agreed to waive a requirement that homes rehabilitated under a 1991 Community Development Block Grant project cannot be sold for 10 years.

Commissioner Monroy Montes explained last Friday that some of those homes belonged to elderly people who have died and their heirs cannot sell the property, because it violates the grant agreement.

"If they do sell, the money spent on the repairs must be paid back to the state on a pro-rated basis," Montes said.

He said the state has agreed to waive the requirement and proposed the county do the same.

"Let's do the right thing," Chairman L. Ray Nunley agreed.

The vote was unanimous to approve the waiver.



## A future for the children

In Great Britain, history relates, the people would mark the passing of their ruler with a simple cry: "The king is dead. Long live the king!"

It was not a denial of mortality for their departed leader, but a simple declaration of understanding that the passing of a man who wore a crown did not mean the end of a kingdom.

They honored the office, and with an oath of fealty acknowledged that the kingdom was greater than the king, and must continue. Ideally (and rarely) through the centuries of English history, a son — or occasionally a daughter — of the old king was there to pick up the scepter.

Now, in most sovereign nations, national leaders are elected, and the natural order of things is to provide for succession of leadership at the ballot box.

Such was the case in recent days on the Mescalero Apache reservation, as honor was paid to the memory of a towering leader who was no more. Wendell Chino had led his people longer than all but a few of Britain's kings, and had left a legacy of material progress that no one could deny; he had created in the Sacramento Mountains a modern Camelot, and in many ways he was a king to his people, dominating and powerful, whose will few could deny.

Yet he was an elected leader, and the power expressed by the people at the ballot box ultimately prevailed.

Now there is a new president of the Mescalero Apache people, duly elected and sworn into office.

President A. Paul Ortega in the months ahead will be probed, and tested, and tested again by federal and state officials and by the people of the tribe who voted for and against him. Some of the people, no doubt, will seek a continuation of the "old ways" as practiced by Wendell Chino. That is understandable, because those ways got results, and were formed over decades as the modern Mescalero Apache nation was created.

But President Ortega was not anointed by his predecessor; in fact, he defeated President Chino's choice for vice president, and now heads this dynamic tribal entity that has prided itself on its success and its defense of tribal sovereignty for generations.

President Ortega stands at a fork in the road. One is well-traveled and familiar, paved with Wendell Chino's style and goals — irritating perhaps, and controversial, but nevertheless effective in many ways.

The other fork offers greater challenges, because it would lead the Mescalero Apache people into a different world. Tribal youth counselor Joseph Geronimo hinted at that future last week as he urged tribal councilors to make the tribe's governmental process more accessible to the people through broadcasting council meetings in the Apache language or by opening council meetings to press coverage.

Joseph Geronimo also urged that the council order the first complete audit of tribal enterprises in 20 years.

And, speaking for a delegation of tribal members, he told council members that parents are concerned that their children are not receiving a proper education. "Our kids don't trust anyone," youth counselor Joseph Geronimo told the tribal council.

That statement, perhaps more than anything else, delineates the future of the Mescalero Apache people. If the tribe is to have a future, it must be by and for the children.

Nothing else is of greater importance.




## A journey of healing and hope

After the survivors of the Narvaez expedition were shipwrecked on the Gulf Coast in 1528, they were separated, and it was five years before the four

men who would live to tell about the journey were reunited.

They had lived as slaves of one group of natives after another. They were routinely abused and learned firsthand that life in the state of nature is "nasty, brutish and short."

Starvation was their constant companion except on rare occasions when they found some source of food in the abundance of its season. Then they gorged themselves and traded hunger pains for the stomachaches that came from overeating.

They had scant rags for clothing, and their skin flaked off in sheets from unaccustomed exposure to the sun.

Captains Alonso Castillo de Maldonado and Andrés Dorantes de Carranca and Dorantes's slave, Esteban, were living with a band of Indians they called Yguazes. One day a haggard Spaniard came walking to their camp. It was Don Alvar Nuñez Cabeza de Vaca, Treasurer and High Sheriff of La Florida. His name and title

seemed to weigh more than he did.

It had been five years since they had seen each other, but still more time would elapse before they could escape. The Yguaze chief refused to, accept Nuñez as another slave, so the four made plans to meet again when the prickly pears were in season — six months later.

It was customary for many groups of Indians to meet where the prickly pears grew and to mingle together while they feasted on its seedy fruits. But this year, a quarrel over a woman started a free-for-all, and all festivities were cancelled. The four men met briefly and then were dragged back to where they had come from as the various groups dispersed. It would be yet another year.

Finally the prickly pears were in season again. The men met again — it was now 1534 — and made their escape.

What happened next can only be described as bizarre. Four naked men with no weapons and no food, with different skin colors and speaking an unknown tongue, encountered group after group of Native Americans as they walked west, where they hoped to find their fellow countrymen. They were no longer slaves, but came to be accepted as walking gods.

This transformation came from their ability to heal the sick. We can only speculate

about why the natives were so sure they had healing powers, but the natives were sure. And when they were asked, they would kneel and pray and make the sign of the cross — and the afflicted person would be healed. It happened again and again.

So word of the travelers preceded them. One group would lead them to another, there would be feasting and exchanges of gifts, the sick would be healed, and the next group would lead them further on their journey to the west.

Scholars have pored over their descriptions of the lands through which they traveled, trying to reconstruct their route. They seem to have taken a northwesterly route across what is now Texas, and they may have gone through the southern portion of what is

now New Mexico. They almost made it to the Gulf of California before they finally heard stories of others of their kind who had come from the south, and they turned that way.

In the spring of 1536 — eight years after the Narvaez expedition had been presumed lost — the four men reached the northern outposts of Spanish settlement in Mexico. They were greeted with astonishment, like men who had returned from the dead, and they looked the part.

Next week: Esteban makes another journey.

Elsewhere: In 1536, an Act of Parliament annulled the authority of the Pope in England.

She also attributes the success of the pageant to show director Sally Field, of Napa, Idaho, who's been with the pageant for 21 years. Jeff Gates and Kriston Killgore Rutherford hosted the pageant.

## PBS video features area group homes for certain disabled

CARRIZOZO - "Home Away," a video recently aired on PBS-Channel 5 (Albuquerque), was viewed by members of the Carrizozo FCE (Family and Community Education) at their October meeting.

The video, produced by Cooney Productions of Albuquerque, is being shown to increase public awareness of the choices parents, guardians, and advocates of persons with developmental disabilities have in New Mexico, and to emphasize the success and popularity of group home settings for as many as 15 persons each.

Six New Mexico ICF-MR (Intermediate Care Facilities for the Mentally Retarded), are filmed briefly in the 30-minute production, which includes highlights from Carrizozo's New Horizons Developmental Center. Rosalie Ruiz, supervisor, and 88-year-old resident Edwin Andrews converse about his typing skills and bowling trophies, and are seen taking an ice cream break at Roy's Gift Gallery. The average age of the 19 persons in group homes at New Horizons is 70.

The unit at Ruidoso Care Center for the developmentally disabled also is filmed, showing some clients able to work at such places as Furr's Supermarkets.

The remainder of the six facilities filmed are in Carlsbad, Santa Fe, and Albuquerque.

Following the video, Phyllis Schlegel, president of the local FCE, introduced Jenny Kelly, administrator of New Horizons Developmental Center. Kelly, who has served the program since 1980, led a discussion and answered questions from the group. The video is available to other groups who wish to view it.

A 10-minute overview of this video will be shown to New Mexico Legislature in January and the group will lobby for choices and express the positive aspects of group home living for persons with developmental disabilities.

## Indigent care hearings due throughout Lincoln County

Residents of Lincoln County will have a chance to voice their views about how to finance indigent care in the county at a series of town meetings set for Nov. 30 through Dec. 8.

Members of the county's Health and Wellness Board have pointed out to county commissioners that, as now structured, only indigent clients receiving services through Lincoln County Medical Center are covered.

The county-owned hospital in Ruidoso managed by Presbyterian HealthCare Systems is paying the county's contribution to the state indigent fund using a special property tax levy dedicated to its operation.

Those who need the care of a private physician, home

health service or a pharmacy are not covered by the county's indigent arrangement. It is also difficult for patients to find care outside of the county, wellness board members say.

The arrangement with the hospital should come to an end within the next year, hospital officials have said. The hospital needs the tax levy money and can no longer afford to contribute for the county, they have told commissioners.

An independent fund would allow patients who qualify under income and other guidelines to receive medical care under the indigent program, not just those using the local hospital. While county residents already have indicated they want such a fund, the meetings are to hear sugges-

tions as to how to finance the program, possibly through additional property taxes or a gross receipts tax.

- the Capitan Fire Station, 7 p.m. Dec. 1.
- the Lincoln County Commission Room in the county courthouse in Carrizozo, 7 p.m. Dec. 2.
- the Ruidoso Downs Village Hall Meeting Room, 7 p.m. Dec. 7.
- the Ruidoso Senior Citizens Center, 7 p.m., Dec. 8.

After the meetings, county commissioners have said they will schedule a hearing to review citizens input and to discuss options with specifics.

## 'No surprises' in county audit

An interview with county auditor Terry Jones at the conclusion of his review of county financial records for 1997-98 contained no surprises, County Manager Tom Stewart said Monday.

"I have a lot of work to do," he said, declining to discuss specifics until the auditor's comments and criticisms are

released in about 10 days.

Commissioners Rex Wilson and Bill Schwettmann attended the exit interview with Jones, a chance for the auditor to point out trouble spots and improvements to commissioners first hand.


This year, the meeting was announced in advance to allow more than two commissioners

# Deck job variance wins OK

Council overrules P&Z, backing homeowner

In a split vote, the Ruidoso Village Council has overturned a decision by the village Planning and Zoning Commission to deny a variance for a house deck.

The deck was built even though the contractor knew it would require a village variance. However, the homeowner, according to his attorney, Don Dutton, was not informed of the building code violation by his contractor.

Mayor Robert Donaldson, while saying he didn't want to set a precedent that people could violate codes and apologize later, urged approval of the variance, saying the council should look at whether the variance would have been granted if it had gone through proper procedures. On top of which, the homeowner will have to pay double the application fees for the project because it was completed before applications were sought, Donaldson said.

Councilor Bob Sterchi was alone in voting against granting the variance request.

"To me it was just a flagrant violation of village ordinances and codes,"

James Kinsey, a Texas man, in August had a \$12,000 deck added to his house at 301 Cree Meadows Drive. The deck extended an existing deck to wrap around the home, and was completed in time for Kinsey to have guests for the All American Futurity on Labor Day.

The deck extended 7.5 feet into the lot's side setback of 10 feet, so Kinsey needed a variance before construction began.

On Sept. 15, after the deck was built, Kinsey's contractor asked the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission for the variance. Rocky Trapp told commission members he had informed Kinsey earlier that the deck would need a variance, but that Kinsey told him to complete the work anyway.

The commission in a split vote denied the variance request. Commissioner Bill Hirschfeld voted for the variance.

Last week, Kinsey, speaking through local attorney Don Dutton, asked for that denial to be overturned, saying Trapp had misled Kinsey and the commission. Dutton said his client had thought Trapp was taking care of all the proper building applications for the project and had been unaware of the need for prior variance approval.

Cleatus Richards, director of the Ruidoso Planning Department, told the council most of the deck would have to be replaced anyway because of substandard construction.

# Is an accurate county census worth \$25 per hour?

What will Lincoln County get for the \$25 an hour it's being asked to pay for a Census 2000 coordinator?

County commissioners want to know the answer to that question before they agree to pay Marshall Conover.

"Can't we get the Census to pay for him?" Commissioner Rex Wilson asked last week.

"This is the build-up to the census," County Manager Tom Stewart said.

Commissioners directed Stewart and County Attorney Alan Morel to meet with Conover and come back to the commission in December with de-

tails, the parameters of his work and a negotiated fee.

"This sounds kind of crazy to me" Wilson said. "I think we need to be careful. I trust the man and I think he'd do a good job, but how did we arrive at \$25 an hour. Maybe (the state census coordinator) could give us some advice and estimate the number of hours it should take."

Commissioner Monroy Montes told Stewart to see if the state will pay for the coordinator, because the county has no business subsidizing the federal government in its census efforts.

"They told us to pick a coordinator," Wilson agreed.

"We need to know what effect we can expect from the federal government if he finds something going wrong," Commissioner Wilton Howell said.

Commission Chairman L. Ray Nunley reminded board members that the county lost thousands of dollars (indirectly through programs tied to population), because it was under counted in the 1990 census. "I think this would be worth the money," he said.



# Warriors discover a new, daytime weapon

Ruidoso's big offensive numbers may belong to quarterback Corey Saenz and receiver Josh Varnadore.

But in the last three games — including Saturday's first-round playoff victory over Santa Teresa — other Warriors have contributed big numbers to the winning equation.

Against Portales Oct. 30, it was Brett Meyer's 25 rushes for 133 yards in a 24-7 Ruidoso win.

Versus Lovington Nov. 6, it was Brad Davidson's 25-yard field goal with 4:24 remaining in the game that provided the winning margin, 10-7.

Then on Saturday, it was junior receiver Thomas Schiele who multiplied the Ruidoso passing attack by two. Schiele caught seven passes for 271 yards and two touchdowns. A 60-yard Schiele reception set up yet another Warrior touchdown in a 59-21 Ruidoso victory.

"They were keying on Josh a lot. They didn't even respect Thomas, and now that he did it, they have to watch for a new weapon," Saenz said. "We were just seeing what they were going to do on the veer (offense). The safeties bit, so it was open deep."

After his performance, Schiele explained the importance of having a big game for the Warriors.

"They have to cover both of us — not just one receiver — making it easier for us to throw..." Schiele said.

But the victory was not as easy as it looked.

Ruidoso coach Les Carter and his staff were prepared for a mental lapse by the team after its highly charged, emotional win over Lovington. Figure in a 53-28 Ruidoso victory over Santa Teresa earlier in the season, and you've got a game that doesn't generate much excitement.


"It's a tough game to get up for when you've won like that before," Carter said. "The kids came out and did what it took to win."

Added defensive coordinator Rodney Webb, "I knew it wasn't going to be as easy as most people thought it would be. It wasn't."

"They're a pretty good football team. We knew we were going to come out a little bit flat and we did. We knew they were going to come out fired up and they were. And the heat was a detriment. We knew all those factors going in."

Even though Ruidoso immediately established control of the game with 14-0 lead at the 6:21 mark of the first quarter, Santa Teresa made a game of it with a kick-off return for a touchdown.

The Warriors added nine more points to their lead with a safety and Schiele's first touch-

down catch of the day. But Santa Teresa responded with an impressive 75-yard drive that ate up nearly four minutes and cut the Ruidoso lead to 23-14.

The Desert Warriors defense forced a Ruidoso punt. From its own 11-yard line, Santa Teresa marched all the way to the Ruidoso 15. A touchdown would cut the Ruidoso lead to three. But that drive stalled when STHS quarterback Edward Anaya threw three straight incomplete passes.

Santa Teresa opted to try a 32-yard field goal. Ruidoso called a timeout. It was a critical point in the game, and Carter made the walk to the defensive huddle rather than assistant coach Jerrett Perry. "Reach inside right now!" Carter told the Warrior defensive unit.

STHS indeed attempted the field goal — no fake was in the works — and Ricky Francis' effort wasn't even close.

The dodged bullet seemed to energize the Warriors. Saenz promptly directed an 80-yard scoring drive that was capped off by a nine-yard reverse TD run by Varnadore with 27 seconds in the half. That made the score 30-14.

It was the second reverse of the day for Varnadore, who ironically gained more yards running (33) and returning punts (179) than his receptions through the air.

For those who have followed the Warriors throughout the season, the reverse is a new wrinkle in Ruidoso's triple option/veer offense.

"We thought we needed a little bit more misdirection (in the offense)," Carter said.

In the second half, the Warriors picked up where they left off, scoring 17 points on their first three offensive possessions.

It was Saenz's limping off the field early in the third quarter that drew a hush from the enthusiastic Ruidoso crowd. Saenz stayed on the

sidelines the rest of the game, while sophomore QB Todd Schrader directed the Ruidoso offense.

After the game, Saenz said his ankle was "OK." By Monday's practice, the senior quarterback was back nearly 100 percent.

Despite the big lead, neither the Warriors nor their fans seemed to breathe easy. Credit Santa Teresa's haphazard style of play for that collective held breath.

Coach Webb described the Desert Warriors' as "hully-gully."

"We don't defend hully-gully very well. We defend orthodox very well. We defend Hobbs and Lovington very well. We don't defend Santa Teresa very well because we teach our kids reads, certain reads. In conventional football this guy does this, this is what's happening," Webb explained. "And with them, you can throw that stuff out the window. There's nothing conventional about them."

Ruidoso's next opponent is District IAAA champion, Kirtland Central. The Cougars are 7-4 overall.

"They're big. They're a good ball team. We're going to have to get after it to beat them," Carter said.

Warrior quarterback Saenz should have two weapons to fire at when he drops back to pass.

Eight of Schiele's 20 total receptions have come in Ruidoso's two day games.

"I'm having a hard time seeing the ball in the night time," Schiele admitted.

Kick off time in Kirtland is set for 1 p.m. Saturday, which means the sun should be plenty high for Schiele and the Warriors.





**Accident closes missile range hunts; commission meets here**

Early in September an airman was killed by undetonated munitions at White Sands Missile Range. It was most likely a left over from the early days of the range's existence. This unfortunate accident has had an impact on the day-to-day activities on the range - everything from missile testing to field maneuvers.

Additionally, all hunts have been canceled until more research can be done in the old impact areas. Range personnel are examining all old records and

ments to determine if any old impact areas have been over looked.

Missile range officials and the State Game and Fish officials decided in October to cancel all hunts until early next spring.

The Game and Fish does plan to honor all permits for hunts on the missile range when things get back to normal. However the bigger problem for the Game and Fish is to come up with a contingency plan to manage the rapidly growing Oryx herd and to make up for the harvest that would have taken place this winter.

The military also has asked the

Game and Fish to get the Oryx herd back down to the original numbers agreed to by the Game and Fish and the Range. The general consensus is that the herd has grown in numbers to the point that they now have become a safety hazard to themselves.

**Commission meets in Ruidoso**

The first meeting ever of the New Mexico Game and Fish Commission to convene in Ruidoso will be at 9 a.m. Thursday at the Ruidoso Convention Center.

Topics of discussion during this meeting include: approving the state's

list of threatened and endangered species and discussing changes in the regulations governing outfitters and guides.

No changes are anticipated in the state's endangered species list. Decriminalizing some infractions committed by guides and outfitters are recommended. The violations will be handled instead through a hearing process, and regulations will be amended to allow the revocation of outfitter and guide licenses.

It is unusual for the commission to meet in Ruidoso. Even though it is during business hours, local guides and hunters to should attend and speak up.



Darlene Hart is looking for some enthusiastic young people who want excitement, training, and experience rappelling off mountains, retrieving people out of mine shafts, and pulling people out of vehicles.

Darlene Hart and the 15 paid firefighters and 10 volunteers with the Ruidoso Fire Department are renewing an old junior volunteer program of the department that has lapsed for the past 10 or 15 years.

They all agreed to be sponsors, Hart said, since they're the ones who will be doing the training and working with the junior volunteers.

Robbie Hall, the assistant fire chief of the Ruidoso Fire Department started fighting fires and rescuing people as a junior volunteer at age 15 in 1980.

Hall's brother was a volunteer when Hall and his best friend, became junior volunteers.

Hall said he did that for three years and became a regular volunteer for a year at age 18. Then, in 1984, he became a paid member of the department.

Darlene Hart has been a volunteer firefighter for a little over a year, and her husband, Paul, was a volunteer for three

years and has been a paid firefighter for five years.

Harlan Vincent was a volunteer for three years and became a paid firefighter five years ago.

In fact, Vincent said, most of the paid firefighters came from the ranks of volunteers.

Hart said she was president of the Ruidoso Little League and thought her children and others might be interested in being involved with the firefighters and in learning some medical and survival skills.

"In my mind, working with kids, any excuse to find a program where you can get them off the streets and doing something productive is good," said Hart.

"The fire department has classes and meetings anyway, so it's not that big a deal to open it up to kids to try to get them doing something productive," she said.

Hart said one of the nice things about being a volunteer is that besides being a learning experience, firefighting personnel can serve as mentors to young people, giving them role models and activities to do in a small town that doesn't have that much for young people.

Their training will include structural firefighting, basic first aid, vehicle extrication, wildlife firefighting, blood-borne pathogens and handling

hazardous chemicals.

Hart said there are two scheduled meetings twice a month for training, one focusing on medical and the other on firefighting skills.

Training is a valuable aspect of the volunteer experience, and everything the paid personnel learn at the firefighting academy in Socorro, they bring back to the station and teach to everyone else, Hart said.

All firefighters are trained in first-responder or basic first aid, and some are trained in emergency medical technology (basic life support), and some others in intermediate first aid training, which includes using intravenous devices.

The fire department also gives basic CPR training to the local Boy Scouts and also trains them in how to use fire extinguishers.

The potential growth of the kids depends on themselves and what they want to put into the program, Hall said.

"There are lots of supportive things to do, helping the firefighters get the air pack off, changing out our bottles, getting equipment off the trucks that we need such as lighting and fans," she said.

Mostly, youth get the

advantage of firefighting and medical experience and can find out if they like this profession—firefighting or medical work, Hart said.

Volunteers play a major role in small-town fire departments so junior firefighters will have opportunities to do a wide variety of things.

Before they can go out on an emergency, all volunteers must have 12 hours of training with both fire stations, getting to know the trucks, the personnel, the equipment and the terminology, Hall said.

"We provide the training and they have to take it upon themselves to come down and try to learn more on their own," she said.

Students enrolled in high school or who are home schooled and are between the ages of 15 and 18 can apply to the program.

Participants must maintain a C average while they're in the program.

Applicants must be in good physical health and show proof of required immunizations, and maintain necessary immunizations.

Parental permission is required for junior volunteers, Hall said, and they will be covered under the Village of Ruidoso insurance.

The program requires a certain time commitment because junior volunteers must attend scheduled meetings and training programs, and if they can't make a meeting or training session, they must let their supervisor or a member of the adult volunteers know in advance.

Junior volunteers won't be issued fire gear nor respond to a fire or rescue situation until the mandatory training is completed, nor will they be allowed to drive fire apparatus or climb aerial ladders.

They will be issued protective clothing by the fire department when in training or at the scene of a fire, including helmet, boots, jacket and pants, hood and gloves.

Because first impressions count in cases when fire personnel go into homes, "no purple hair, no nose rings," said Hall.

"We've got to look professional. When the kids ride out with us, and somebody's got a cardiac emergency, their first image of us has a lot to do with how a call gets followed through."

ing to yank the other out of position. For example, take this deal where West leads a club against four hearts. East cashes two clubs against four hearts. East cashes two club tricks and plays a third round of clubs, hoping West will be able to ruff and force declarer to overruff with dummy's ten or jack. If East's plan succeeds, he will automatically acquire a trump trick in the process.

West cooperates by ruffing the third club with the five, and if declarer makes the mistake of overruffing in dummy, he eventually goes down one, losing both a trump trick and a diamond.

But if South is on his toes, he does not allow himself to be yanked out of position by this attack on his trumps. Instead of overruffing West's five, which seems the natural thing to do, South discards the deuce

of diamonds from dummy.

It is not difficult for declarer to diagnose East's purpose in leading a third round of clubs, especially after West ruffs with the five. Furthermore, since declarer has a sure diamond loser in any case, he realizes he is better off to concede it at once without in any way weakening dummy's trump holding.

Whatever West returns, South winds up winning the tug of war. He enters dummy with the king of diamonds, leads the jack of hearts and finesse, then repeats the finesse to trap East's king. Declarer loses the first three tricks, but wins all the rest.

## Hot air helps teach elementary science, math

Learning science and math is a lot of hot air at White Mountain Elementary—and a lot of fun.

Each class made five or six brightly colored, tissue-paper hot air balloons from rather exacting instructions, said principal Frank Cannella, and every day since late October, weather permitting, two classes have been launching balloons first thing in the morning.

This is a school-wide experiment involving not only following directions, but also predicting weather and estimating how high a balloon is, and what effects different weather conditions have on the balloon's height.

"Look at Cynthia," Cannella told Molly Long's fourth grade bilingual class. "She's about five feet tall. Closing one eye and putting your thumb at her feet and your finger at her head, you can use that to measure approximately how high the balloon is. Four Cynthias is about 20 feet."

After discussing the date, time, wind speed and temperature inside the classroom, everyone goes out to the playground with a camping stove-type burner and three coffee cans. The burn-

er is lit and the cans are placed on top to keep the flame from burning the tissue paper as the balloon fills with hot air.

Hot air rises, lifting the balloon into the sky—if weather conditions are just right.

"If it's too humid those balloons don't go anyplace," Cannella said. The best conditions are cool temperatures, low humidity and no wind.

"We want to try it when it's really cold out to see if we get more lift," he said. "A perfect day would be a cold, clear, dry December day."

Earlier they tried the experiment in the gym to avoid the wind outdoors, he said, and the balloons of the first class went straight up to the ceiling. But the burner warmed up the gym air too much for the second class.

"We had a great launch today," Cannella said on Nov. 3. "The balloons went a hundred feet in the air!"

They plan to continue launching balloons throughout the year to learn about the effects of weather on the balloon's activity. Cannella said he and seven teachers from White Mountain learned about experiments like this by attending a Region IX-sponsored workshop.



Russell Freedman served in the Army during the Korean War, then worked as a reporter. He did publicity for TV shows such as "Father Knows Best."

In 1961, he wrote his first book, "Teenagers Who Made History."

### His work

He said, "One thing about writing for kids is it allows me to explore just about any subject I'm really interested in."

"A writer for kids has the most responsive and appreciative audience." Writing a book takes him about a year, depending on the particular book. He has written books in two months, and has spent two years on other books.

He said: "I work seven days a week because I'm very much involved in what I'm doing. It's not work; it's a game. It's a pleasurable activity. It's like a sport. You can't wait to get back to it in the morning."



**Burglary on Wimbleton Road**

One of the units contained only files, the other contained collectible Barbie dolls and a production Cam Corder with accessories, which were missing.

Tools and other items were stolen out of a storage unit at The Stash, 1107 Mechem Drive, according to police reports. The case is pending further leads.

**Car burglarized**

A car was burglarized between 1:45 a.m. and 9 a.m. on Nov. 13 in the 2800 block of Sudderth Drive, according to police reports.

The owner of the 1990 Subaru, of Amarillo, Texas, reported to police that a toolbox valued at \$100, a suitcase and duffel bag valued at \$250, and a cassette tape box valued at \$50 with 18 tapes were taken from the back hatch of his car. The owner had forgotten to lock the back hatch.

**Vehicles vandalized**

A left rear window, valued at \$300, of a vehicle on Leon Farrar Drive was broken between 6 p.m. on Nov. 13 and 6 a.m. on Nov. 14. Police believe it may have been done with a BB gun or pellet gun.

Police report that a rear window was broken in a vehicle on L.L. Davis Drive between 7 p.m. on Nov. 13 and 8 a.m. on Nov. 14. There was broken glass in the driveway, and no evidence as to what caused the damage.

The passenger side window of a vehicle on Horton Circle was broken on Nov. 14, police report. Six feet from the vehicle was a spark plug that may have been used to cause the damage, police believe.

The rear window on a car was shattered around 10 p.m. on Nov. 13 on Walnut Drive. Police report that it appears as though the glass was broken with either a glass punch or a pellet gun. The window is valued at \$500.

**Commissioner to complete term on waste board**

Lincoln County Commissioner Monroy Montes will continue to serve as the county's representative on the county Solid Waste Authority board until he leaves office the first week in January.

Commissioner William Schwettmann volunteered last week to fill the county's one seat on the authority board, which has been reduced in number and reorganized since the village of Ruidoso broke away to handle its own garbage collection.

Instead of 11 members, the board will function with five voting members and one non-voting member. The municipalities of Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Carrizozo and Corona will each have one seat as before, but the county loses one of its two seats on the board. Ruidoso, which had five representatives, will have one spokesman, who will only vote on issues pertaining to the regional landfill in which the village is a partner.

"I didn't understand that

the county would lose a member," County Attorney Alan Morel said at the Nov. 6 commission meeting. "I thought we'd now have two."

"I've been to every meeting except the last one (in October) when there was no quorum and there would have been no quorum even if I had been there," Montes said, adding that he also thought the county would have two seats since it is the major player in the organization.

But an Authority official confirmed Thursday that the county now has only one member on the five-voting member board.

Commissioner Wilton Howell suggested leaving Montes on the board to provide continuity during the period of transition, but Montes said he will only

serve through December, when his term as commissioner ends. Ruidoso began collecting its own garbage and yard waste last month.

Montes has been critical of the current management of the authority and said that overflowing dumpsters continue to be a problem for the Authority, even with the responsibility for Ruidoso removed. On the other hand, the garbage transfer station is looking much cleaner since the village took it back under the asset portion of the separation agreement, he said.

The Authority, a coalition of the county and municipalities was formed in 1991 to provide collection and to build a regional landfill, which was constructed in partnership with the Otero County Solid Waste Authority.

Mexican gray wolf found dead near Arizona/New Mexico border

A yearling male Mexican gray wolf was found dead on Nov. 7 near the Arizona/New Mexico border, the victim of an apparent shooting.

The wolf, No. 532, was a member of the Hawk's Nest pack, a family group of six wolves released last spring into the Apache National Forest of eastern Arizona.

It appears to be the fourth wolf shot since the release, according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

"All of these losses are trag-

ic because the wolves were displaying all the right behaviors in the wild," said Secretary of the Interior Bruce Babbitt. "Each of them was successfully hunting elk and avoiding livestock."

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is offering a reward up to \$10,000 for information leading to the conviction of the person or persons responsible for this and other Mexican gray wolf deaths. The killing of these wolves is a criminal violation of both federal and state

laws; it carries a federal penalty of \$100,000 and one year in prison, in addition to state criminal penalties. Reward money for information leading to the conviction of persons killing wolves is authorized under the Endangered Species Act.

"We're going to hit this investigation hard," Nancy Kaufman, regional director of the services Southwest Region, said. "Our law enforcement team in the field includes agents from the U.S. Fish and

Wildlife Service, the Arizona Game and Fish Department, and the New Mexico Game and Fish. To prevent any further losses, we will need the public's support and help."

The service is offering a separate reward for information about the shooting death of the wolf found dead on Aug. 7. Wolf No. 174, born at the Binder Park Zoo in Michigan in

1994, gave birth to the first Mexican wolf born in the wild in a half-century. She survived an encounter with an elk in late spring, which left her limping for several weeks, and still cared for her pup.

Her death undoubtedly contributed to the pup's presumed death; it was last seen on Aug. 22.

New employment center opens in Ruidoso

On Oct 1, a new Employee Job Training and Placement Center opened in Lincoln County that provides services for the New Mexico Works recipients.

Located at 707 Mechem (in the Ruidoso State Bank building), the Lincoln County Works Center is the first Center in new Mexico to have a "one-stop shop," according to information from the center.

Services include Adult Basic Education and General Education Degree classes, Adult Literacy program, Eng-

lish as a second language, school to work, apprenticeship work program, and New Mexico Works program.

New federal and state laws require welfare recipients to perform a required number of hours each week of approved activities such as work, education, volunteer duties at a non-profit agency or job-related skills training, in order to receive benefits.

The Lincoln County Works Center is located in Ruidoso, but is administered by Eastern New Mexico Univer-

sity-Roswell.

Most of the clients who use the center are referred from the Income Support Division. Once clients have signed in with the program, they are assessed to establish educational needs, work experience and language skills.

This new program benefits employers as well as clients. The federal government has set up tax credits as incentives for employers.

The first week in November was National Animal Shelter Appreciation Week, but it's not too late to show you care.

"Visit your local animal shelter to learn about what it does, how you can support its programs and how you can get involved," says Martha Armstrong, vice president for companion animals at the Humane Society of the United States.

Some may need reliable volunteer help or donations of cash or goods.

"But most importantly they need community support," she said.

You also can help shelters by reporting animal cruelty and neglect, or injured and stray animals to the animal impounding officer - in Ruidoso, she works for the police department.

Teach your children how to care for pets properly and to treat them with kindness.

Support legislation to protect animals. Contact government officials about animal issues and urge them to support pro-animal legislation.

Keep current identification on pets at all times. Neuter pets and always keep them properly confined or supervised, well fed and watered, and give them lots of love.

And choose your next pet from the local shelter.

# Parker plays mystery woman in Hallmark's *Saint Maybe*

A young man puts his life on hold to make amends to his family in *Saint Maybe*, a Hallmark Hall of Fame adaptation of Anne Tyler's best-selling novel premiering Sunday, Nov. 22, on CBS.

The TV movie opens in 1965, as a shocked Ben and Doug Bedloe (Blythe Danner, Edward Herrmann) learn their grown son, Danny (Jeffrey Nordling), has found the woman of his dreams in Lucy (Mary-Louise Parker), a divorcee with two young children.

The couple quickly marry, and Lucy gives birth to a daughter, Daphne, seven months later. While Danny is deliriously in love with his quiet but charming young wife, his teen-age brother, Ian (Thomas McCarthy), harbors doubts about Lucy. Where does she go when Danny is away? How can she afford her fancy new clothes? Is Danny really Daphne's father?

One night Ian witheringly confronts Danny with his suspicions, and their encounter ends tragically. Haunted by guilt and seeking to make amends, Ian is drawn to the Church of the Second Chance, a storefront congregation whose minister (Denis O'Hare) convinces Ian he must earn the forgiveness of God and his family.

Although several scenes take place over the holidays, *Saint Maybe* seems an odd Thanksgiving presentation. Its story is unusually bleak, and McCarthy - so good in 1995's *Mary & Tim* with Candice Bergen - doesn't have enough presence to carry the film in its central role.

Yet the movie does offer a wealth of good performances, none better than Parker's dazzling turn as the lovely but unstable Lucy. While viewers subsequently learn that Ian's dark suspicions are off the mark, Parker has some pretty harsh words for her irresponsible TV character.

"Everything about her is sort of unfinished," she remarks. "I don't mean in terms of being polished. I don't think she's a person who finishes things. I think she is constantly someone who is waiting until something

else happens. That's how she deals with her kids. She'll get around to being a good mother when she has money, when she has time, when something else happens. In other words, she is putting off her life constantly."

Lucy has no strong sense of self, Parker explains, and relies on her considerable charm and deception to get through life. The actress says she finds that kind of attitude repellent.

"I myself am exactly the opposite," she says with a laugh. "I'm very plain-spoken, and I just say what I think. It gets me into trouble sometimes, and I know I need to be more subtle. But the notion of dishonesty, especially on the scale Lucy practices it, really makes me physically ill."

To be fair, apart from Danny, the Bedloes don't go out of their way to make Lucy feel a part of the family. In one Christmas party scene, Lucy is surrounded by people yet looks utterly alone.

"But did you notice what she does then?" Parker asks. "Her little daughter is with her, and she abandons the child to go stand with the rest of the family around the piano, just because it was what she wanted to do at that moment. She's just a terrible mother."

The actress agrees *Saint Maybe* is unusual holiday fare. "It's a downer," she concedes, "but I think any time a movie is this true to what human beings are like, it becomes life-affirming, in a strange way. That's what I love about Anne Tyler's books."

This week, New York Mayor Rudolph Giuliani appears as himself on *Guiding Light*.


The mayor presides over Harley and Phillip's (Beth Ehlers, Grant Aleksander) surprise wedding.


