

# Hotel agreement could be signed in January

An agreement may be reached as soon as early January for the construction of a \$4.9 million hotel next to the Ruidoso Convention Center, Mayor Robert Donaldson said this week.

"We are basically drafting an agreement right now," Donaldson said regarding the proposed lease of village land to the hotel firm of Leisure Hotels, L.L.C.

"I believe we should have an agreement that we will be able to bring before the council for a public hearing (and vote) in January."

Village attorneys and hotel officials will "take a look at it one more time" before the contract is brought before the Ruidoso Village Council, Donaldson said.

Terms of the agreement will be made public

when the language of the contract is agreed upon by both parties, he said.

Negotiations between the village and Leisure Hotels began in August. The village has unsuccessfully tried to land an upscale hotel next to the convention center for several years. Leisure Hotels, a company based in the Midwest, would be the third to enter into a lease agreement with the village for the potential hotel site.

Last month, the village and the Ruidoso school district agreed to jointly buy about 12 acres of land in the White Mountain subdivision in between the Links at Sierra Blanca golf course, the school complex and the convention center.

Part of that land will be used for additional parking at the hotel and convention center, Donaldson has said. The village will spend about \$134,000 for the purchase.

Based on information from the company, Leisure Hotels has tentative plans to build a \$4.9 million Hawthorn Suites on 3.8 acres next to the convention center.

The hotel would have 100 rooms and a restaurant, according to information from village officials.

In October, Donaldson said that he assumed the hotel would be "three stories, maybe even four."

"They want to make sure when they are done with the first 100 rooms that there is space available for an additional 100 rooms if the market calls for it as well as for additional room for expansion of the convention center," Donaldson has said.

The company owns 10 hotels in Kansas and Missouri. The hotels range from economy to high-end service, including Quality Inns, Holiday Inns and Days Inns.

Earlier this year, Leisure Hotels announced plans to build another 10 hotels in the next three years. Five will be Microtel hotels and another five will be Hawthorne Suites, which are full-service hotels, according to information provided by the company.

A full- and limited-service hotel management company, Leisure Hotels employs 300 people and manages 15 hotels, such as Ramada Inn, Hampton Inn and Holiday Inn Express Hotels and Suites.

"Hotel Business," an industry publication, listed Leisure Hotels in its September issue as 85th of the top 100 hotel developers.

The firm includes three subsidiary companies - Leisure Hotel Management, Leisure Real Estate Advisors and Leisure Development and Construction Management.

## Commission votes for pay increase

After a series of motions confusing enough to daze even the most dedicated parliamentarian, the Lincoln County Commission approved 10 percent raises Tuesday for half of the elected officials in the county.

The other five may never see raises before they leave office. In any event, they will have to wait two years before their positions can be considered for increases to the same levels as their counterparts.

The action means commissioners William Schwettmann and L. Ray Nunley - re-elected in November - and newly elected Rick Simpson will receive 76 percent of the maximum salary allowed under the county's classification based on population and property tax value. County Clerk Martha Proctor and County Treasurer Joan Park will receive the same percentage, because they were re-elected.

For the four officials returning to office, the salary figure isn't new. They were receiving that amount before the state Supreme Court ruled in October that the increase was illegal, because it was granted in July 1997, when the county jumped into a new salary category. That meant the raises took effect during the terms of all the elected county officials.

The problem is that the state constitution prohibits county commissioners from approving raises for themselves, meaning they can vote on increases, but only for county elected officials who take office the following January. Incumbents in mid-term can't benefit, because the constitution says their salaries cannot be raised or lowered while they're in office. County commissioners are the only elected bodies prevented from such action, County Attorney Alan Morel said.

Commissioners in July 1997 decided in a 3-2 vote to approve raises based on a district court decision and on a state law that requires equity in pay for elected officials. Commissioners Monroy Montes and Wilton Howell voted against the raise then, following the advice of Morel, who cautioned

## '... let's quit talking about things and let's make things happen' Mayor envisions community rec center

An indoor swimming pool, expanded hiking and biking paths and a large preteen playground are some of the components for a planned community recreation plaza, Mayor Robert Donaldson said this week.

"It's a concept right now," Donaldson said of the proposed community center. "It's a concept about how we can bring this community closer together."

Donaldson said he intends to announce a formalized proposal for the recreational plaza sometime next week. The center would be located next to the existing White Mountain Recreation Complex and the Ruidoso Convention Center.

Last month, the village and the Ruidoso school district agreed to joint-

ly buy about 12 acres of land in the White Mountain subdivision near the Links at Sierra Blanca golf course, the school complex and the convention center. The village will spend about \$134,000 for its share of the land purchase.

Part of the land will be used for additional parking at the hotel and convention center, Donaldson has said. Other portions of the land may be developed for additional recreational uses, he said.

"The land has given us new opportunities to do things out there and has opened our eyes ... It's a very exciting

concept," Donaldson said. "Alan (Briley, Ruidoso village manager) and I have sat down and said, 'What the people of this town need is a central focus.'"

Members of the community have talked for several years about creating more recreational facilities in town, and Donaldson said it's now time to start taking action.

"The key is, let's quit talking about things and let's make things happen - and that's what this is about ... if we don't start now we won't get it done."

Plans for a recreational center won't negate or impact the ongoing effort to build a teen center at School House Park, Donaldson said. The teen center would still be needed because the community's youth need a place of their own, he said.

"Just as seniors need their own place, the teens need their place, too," Donaldson said.

## Hondo schools eye Glencoe center

Commission to consider the issue at its next meeting

After months of trying to give away, lease to a private group or sell the Glencoe Rural Events Center, Lincoln County Commissioners were pleased to hear Tuesday that the Hondo School District would like to take over the building and grounds on U.S. 70.

Hondo Superintendent Barbara Casey said the center could be the answer for expansion of school facilities by the landlocked district and could provide a staging area for community and teen events as well as school functions and agricultural activities.

"I propose you allow the Hondo Valley Public Schools to take it over," said Casey, a former state legislator. "We would ask for the same amount of money as you give the (Lincoln County) Fair Board (which manages the county fairgrounds in Capitan)."

"Now that the (Lincoln County) Cowboy Symposium has chosen to relocate to Ruidoso Downs because it's outgrown the center and since that was the main reason (to keep the center) and Hondo valley has nothing that resembles a community center, this sounds good," said Commissioner Monroy Montes, who represents that section of the county.

"(Commissioner) Rex Wilson said at our last meeting that he wanted to see someone from the community step forward and I think this is our best offer."

"I don't know if (Casey is) ready for this, but what if the county deeded it over to Hondo and made it an extension of the school district?"

"Part of the deal would have to be that the center was used to promote rural activities and economic development," Chairman L. Ray Nunley said, because economic development grant money had been used to improve the property.

County Attorney Alan Morel said a lease would be easier. If the county deeded over the property, the commission would have to repay some money, even if the center 12 miles east of Ruidoso was given to another government entity, he said.

On a motion by Montes, the board voted to put the issue on the next meet-



# State legislators hear countywide 'wish list'

County, village and non-profit groups went through something of a dress rehearsal Friday as they presented their capital improvement wish lists to the area's legislative delegation.

More than \$18 million in requests were detailed by representatives of the Lincoln County Fair Board, the villages of Carrizozo, Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan and the Hondo School district.

But before the legislative Taxation and Revenue Committee sees the figures in black and white, that total will be outdated.

By then, more requests should be in pocket from the Ruidoso, Capitan and Carrizozo school districts, and the village of Ruidoso will have some firm figures to put next to projects dealing with water, senior citizens, recreation and economic development.

As state representative for all of Lincoln County and portions of Otero County, Republican Dub Williams from Glencoe conducted the session in the commission room of the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

State Sen. Pete Campos, a Democrat from Santa Rosa, also attended, saying how much he appreciated the first-ever collective session where he and Williams could advise representatives on how to improve their chances in front of the legislative committee.

Both men warned that the legislature will be swamped

with requests - possibly as high as \$1.5 billion - but will have only \$220 million to spend. Last year, \$1 billion in projects were submitted for funding, but the legislature was working with just \$160 million, said Tony Elias, executive director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, who arranged the session Friday. He wanted to give communities first-hand access to their delegates.

Williams cautioned submit- ters to come up with firm figures for their requests, because if they have to be amended later, it will slow the process. While he will try to meet with local town and county boards to talk over issues before the start of the legislative session next month, Williams said his calendar already is full.

Campos' senate district covers 10,500 miles and a population of 37,500, he said. It includes Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, all the way up to Las Vegas and San Miguel County. The district joins together northern and southern New Mexico, compared to some senate districts that are only four square miles in Albuquerque, Campos said.

Ruidoso Village Manager Alan Briley didn't submit exact figures, but talked to Campos and Williams about coming projects. The village's first priority is "water, water, water," he said.

He also talked about the village's parks and recreation programs and its senior citizens, as well as about the state possibly helping with site

preparations for a new convention hotel, currently under negotiation, Briley said.

"I didn't present figures, but we do know we have \$460,000 worth of needs in the water plan," he said. "We'll probably ask for that. We also have a water master plan just about ready to submit, which may tell us a whole lot more about what we need."

Some specific requests submitted by other communities include:

- Replacement of a 14,000 gallon water storage tank at Agua Fria subdivision and a 50,000 gallon Denton Well tank with two 100,000-gallon tanks for an estimated cost of \$338,000.

- Improvements to the county fairgrounds in Capitan for \$450,000 (for a total of \$650,000, adding an allocation approved by the legislature last year) to include replacing and modifying livestock pens and covering the old show ring, buying adjacent property for parking and future expansion, putting up chain link fencing and gates to separate parking from pedestrians, and renovating and expanding the rodeo arena.

- Reconstruction of the town of Carrizozo's waste water treatment plant for \$2,263,000 and construction of a new city hall for \$612,992, the number one priority.

- About \$321,000 in water system improvements in the village of Capitan, including two 100,000-gallon storage tanks; \$255,000 for heavy equipment for the street department; and \$230,000 for

an addition to village hall.

The largest request came from Barbara Casey, superintendent of the Hondo School District and a former state legislator. She asked for \$1.6 million spread across 10 projects, and for one of two proposals to add land to the school complex - the first for \$200,000 and the other for \$6 million.

Some of the projects were tied to the district's accreditation by the state and others to safety. They included installing computer wiring to increase student access, construction of a running track and football field with sprinkler system, remodeling the weight room, installing a security system for the school system that has been burglarized eight times in the past year, buying two school nine-passenger vans, remodeling gym locker rooms and building some new ones, redesigning the entrance to the school campus to improve safety, remodeling existing kindergarten through third grade classrooms, installing an intercom system for safety, and upgrading the playground for K-3 children.

The district now is land-locked and sits on a 12-acre tract near the intersection of U.S. 380 and U.S. 70.

If the Hondo Ranch could be purchased, Casey said, it would provide land, barns, stables and workshops to house the school's agricultural and FFA programs and buildings to house school personnel, who find it difficult to rent places in the areas.

that the district court ruling might be overturned, as it was.

The first action of the commission Tuesday was to rescind the 10 percent raises enacted in July 1997, on a motion by Commissioner Rex Wilson, who made it clear he was following the recommendation of County Attorney Alan Morel. That dropped commissioners down from \$11,005 to their previous annual salaries of \$10,005. The county assessor, treasurer and clerk moved back from \$33,143 to \$30,130, the sheriff back to \$31,510 and the probate judge back to \$7,015.

Sheriff Tom Sullivan protested that the action was unfair because he did not receive a raise when he took office in January 1997.

"I think we were entitled to that (July 1997) raise, because (Tax Assessor) Patsy Serna and I were newly elected to our terms," he said. He said the prohibition against lowering or raising salaries during a term would be violated if the raises were rescinded. But Morel

pointed out the raises were illegal to begin with under the supreme court ruling.

Then the bickering started about raises for those officials going into office.

Wilson offered a motion to consider raises that would amount to 88 percent of the maximum allowed under the county's new classification - which would translate to a 41 percent raise for commissioners from \$10,005 to \$14,143, and about 27 percent for other elected officials from \$30,130 to \$38,222.

But Chairman Montes voted with Howell and Nunley against the motion, saying the difference in annual salary would be too great between Howell and Wilson at \$10,005 and what he, Simpson and Schwettmann would receive. An attempt to amend the motion to 76 percent of the maximum allowed failed.

Wilson next made a motion for 80 percent of the maximum allowed, but Howell and Montes continued to balk. Howell pointed out that "Robert's Rules of Order," a book widely accepted as the

authority on parliamentary procedures, don't allow successive motions on the same issue. He was backed by Lincoln resident John McGrath who read from a book on parliamentary procedures. But Howell then joked that the commission operates on an amended version of "Robert's Rules of Order," "whoever is the biggest thug."

"Are the numbers the issue or is the issue the issue?" Wilson asked, adding that he lowered the amount of the proposed increase in an attempt to reach a compromise.

"It's the principal," Howell said.

Howell and Montes argued that the situation should be corrected by the state Legislature by allowing voters to decide if the state constitution should be changed. Howell also questioned if the intent of the constitution wasn't being subverted by allowing incumbents Schwettmann and Nunley to vote on a raise from which they will benefit in January when they start new terms.

But Proctor pointed out if


raises aren't approved this month, those officials elected in November will go another four years without an increase. It's time to break the cycle and start with these officials, then increase the other five in two years, she said.

Park reminded commissioners that a previous attempt by the board to raise the salaries of elected officials in April 1994 also was rescinded when an attorney general's opinion stated it was illegal.

Wilson decided to amend his own motion and go back to the 88 percent level. Montes voted for the amendment, apparently realizing that Nunley would not vote for the higher amount and the motion would be defeated 3-2.

But Nunley didn't let go. After that motion went down, he proposed one of his own.

He offered a 76 percent of maximum raise - the 10 percent amount that all of the elected officials were receiving before the supreme court decision - and the motion passed 3-2 with Howell and Montes voting against it.

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## Jicarillas expected to be left out of arbitration

The New Mexico Gaming Control Board has joined the Mescalero tribe in objecting to the Jicarilla Apache tribe entering an arbitration process between the state and Mescalero.

The arbitration centers on the Mescalero's refusal to pay the state 16 percent of slot machine profits from Casino Apache.

The revenue share is mandated by the gaming bill approved by the Legislature in 1997, but the tribe and others have said the state's cut is too high to be legal under federal guidelines for gambling compacts. About two weeks ago, Gregory Quinlan, an attorney for the Mescalero tribe, wrote a letter to the American Arbitration Association objecting to a

request from the Jicarilla tribe to join the arbitration process.

The Jicarilla tribe is the only other gaming tribe in the state to have not made any revenue share payments from casino profits.

Two gaming pueblo tribes also have asked to join the arbitration.

In a Dec. 4 letter to a representative of the AAA, Madonna Bixby with the Gaming Control Board said the board also objected to the inclusion of the Jicarilla because the tribe intended to bring new issues into the case.

"Therefore, the board does not consent to the Jicarilla Apache Tribe's request for permission to intervene," Bixby wrote.

The three arbitrators in the case are expected to decide against the Jicarilla's inclusion in the process because of the objections by the state and Mescalero.

In related news, the New Mexico Gaming Control Board recently named George McGeorge as the acting state gaming representative.

The previous acting representative, Scott Spencer, resigned to take a position with another state agency, according to a release from the gaming control board.

McGeorge was employed by the state as the director of Audit Services. He is a certified public accountant and has experience in financial and information system audits.

ing agenda to give Casey time to go back to her board and discuss options. Meanwhile Morel will draft a lease agreement. He also proposed that \$25,000 approved by the state Legislature for improvements to the center be conveyed with the building for Hondo to decide how to use it.

Casey said if the center was owned by the district, it would be easier to pursue grants for it, "but we would be willing to go either way."

The center would provide a good place for a National Civilian Community Corps organization, which will be working with the Bureau of

Land Management on repair of land along the streams in the valley. The group plans to set up a greenhouse, work with students on employment skills and to encourage the establishment of a volunteer youth corps, Casey said.

Howell asked if the cowboy symposium still could use the center for roping events and if other things could be staged there. Casey said they could, because the school district wants activities that would raise money to help support the rural events center. She also would look for new grants to continue to improve the property, she said.

"It's our intent to try to generate money," Casey said.

"A lot of cyclists come through for (the Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally) and we could rent out space to Harley Davidson," which has tried previously to use the district's school gymnasium.

If the property is conveyed to the district, the deed would have to include a reverter clause that the land and building would come back to the county if it is no longer used for a public purpose, Nunley said.

Casey said her board is eager to work with the community committee already appointed by the commission to oversee the operation of the center, which was purchased with \$250,000 from the state Legislature five years ago.

**What high school football is all about**

Some hundreds — maybe thousands — of Ruidosoans had no seat for Saturday's high school AAA state football championship at Horton Stadium between the Ruidoso Warriors and the Artesia Bulldogs.

They crowded the south stands, stood at the rail overlooking the south sidelines, on the slopes next to the stands, on the stadium steps (despite pleas from announcer Dub Williams to keep the steps clear), all in the face of a cold west wind that would have sent less supportive fans home at halftime.

The thousands of Artesia supporters who came to Ruidoso obviously had more practice at big games; after all, their Bulldogs already had 20 state championship trophies behind them and were going for a 21st. They provided a background of orange in the north stands, complementing the solid orange of the Bulldog team—so many players in uniform that the very sight might have been a factor. It seemed, true or not, that whole platoons of Bulldog substitutes were available.

In retrospect, the Bulldogs seemed twice as numerous and twice as big. But, no; the Warriors of Ruidoso High came through like that Marine Corps recruiting poster: "The few, the proud..." And the Warriors played as if possessed, to the cheers of friends and families, and even some applause from the heart of the sea of orange.

Those young men of Ruidoso did not win the game; Artesia got another trophy. Many fans will recall that at mid-season Artesia was considered by the cognoscenti to be the best high school team in the state, regardless of class.

They may have ended the season the same way. But the Ruidoso Warriors demonstrated that a much smaller school, with heart and pride, could hold its own.

At one point in the fourth quarter, the fans crowding the stadium rail could look down on the Ruidoso sidelines and see the young man wearing No. 20 — quarterback Corey Saenz — flat on his back, all alone, stretching cramped legs. And then, when the call came, he was racing across the field, arms waving to the crowd, seeking support.

And that is how the 1998 season — almost a championship season — will be remembered by some lucky fans who didn't have stadium seats at Horton Stadium on Saturday, Dec. 5, 1998.

**In search of a longer view**

It's sometimes hard to see beyond your own backyard when a forest-covered mountain blocks the view.

But state law providing for an extra-territorial planning zone around a municipality, by definition, should mean careful consideration of such things as roads and utilities in nearby subdivisions that might be annexed in the not-too-distant future.

We hope Ruidoso will examine the whole thing carefully, in a workshop proposed by the Planning and Zoning Commission. As Planner Cleatus Richards says, Ruidoso should not take a short-sighted view of such developments.

Many of our communities have chosen simply to add "an" to their towns' names. People from Albuquerque are called Albuquerqueans and residents of Santa Fe are

Santa Feans. There are also Alamedans, Artesians, Cubans, Las Cruceans and Texicans.

Some towns with Spanish names use the regular Spanish endings. People from my home town of Estancia are called Estancieros, and you can find people who refer to themselves as Abiqueños, Chilileños, Pojoaqueños, Tajiqueños, Toseos and Tesuqueños (from Abiquiu, Chile, Pojoaque, Tajique, Taos and Tesuque).

There's a Spanish ending for our largest city as well, although it's not used as much as Albuquerqueans. If you put

back the "r" that was dropped a century or so ago, you can wrap your teeth around the formidable word Albuquerqueños.

People from Madrid, Spain, are called Madrileños, but residents of Madrid, New Mexico, don't pronounce the name of the town the same way. (If there were people from Waldo, that is. The last time I was there it was totally uninhabited. There were no Waldoids, only Walnuts.)

I guess you could take that a bit further and call Monticello natives Monticelluloids, but I don't know if they'd like that.

Datil is a little town not far from the satellite dishes of the Very Large Array, so perhaps its residents should be called Datillites.

People from Bayard, especially if they like spaghetti, might be known as Bayardees. Roswell residents have been known as Roswellians for years, but some have capitalized on that city's reputation as a UFO capital by calling themselves Roswalliens.

# White Mountain Search and Rescue needs some rescuers

A call goes out for volunteers to search for a lost hiker, and within minutes, Ruben Amezcua and his unit to the Ruidoso Police Station, where he will meet other members of White Mountain Search and Rescue.

"I couldn't do this if my boss lady didn't allow me the time off," said Amezcua, who works on a llama ranch in Glenoco.

Vice president Trudy Alexander shuts down her computer at the mortgage company she owns with her husband, and on her drive to the police station, passes president Sandy Davidson, who's left her real estate office to join the searchers.

Members of the White Mountain group come in a variety of ages, professions, temperaments and physical condition, but there's a job for everyone and they all share one major motivation — they want to help.

"I just think if it was our children or friends, I'd want people out there looking," member Blue Dutchover said.

During the past year, members have participated in 15 searches for lost children, missing hunters and hikers, in the wilderness and around the town. It doesn't matter who is lost or where. They'll drive to Carlsbad or into Texas, if they're able, to lend some extra eyes and legs to searches headed by other short-handed search and rescue groups.

Less dangerous, but only slightly less important than the searches they mount for individuals in distress, is the search members have to pursue each year to find financial support for their volunteer work and to find more members to ensure the continuation of the service.

Although a portion of money the Lincoln County Commission collects each year from the Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILT), sent by agencies to offset the tax-free status of federal land within the county, is intended to help such volunteer rescue groups, that hasn't been the case locally.

This year, the group received no money from the county. But some businesses and individuals who believe in what the volunteers are doing, donate each year. In addition, the group sponsors events to raise money, such

as a golf tournament planned for 1999 and in previous years, dinners at Flying J Ranch.

The rescue group started with a bunch of Jeep enthusiasts who formed a club in the early 1960s, said member John Lieftinck.

"It wasn't until about 1978 that it became White Mountain Search and Rescue, and only in recent years have we got our tax-free organization status as a charitable organization," he said.

Across the state, hundreds of organizations specialize in different aspects of search and rescue, from horses to dogs, helicopters

to hovercraft, he said. White Mountain focuses primary on foot searches, but counts among its members a professional tracker, communications experts and emergency medical technicians.

"There's no minimum requirement," said Wes Burk. "But this type of volunteer work attracts people who also like the outdoors; the kind of person who wants to give something back to the community."

"You join and attend our meetings, then we have training schedule on more or less a monthly basis within the group,

in addition to state-sponsored training we can attend with other groups around the state," Burk said.

Once a year, search and rescue people from across the state converge for a multi-day training session at the Bonito Nazarene Campground for a multi-day training session. The event is called ESCAPE, or Emergency Services Council Annual Preparation Event, Lieftinck said.

"We have plans next year to have some training sessions for kids, hiking safety, survival and first aid," Davidson said. "We plan to allot one day and invite everybody."

Working with the children is one of the best aspects of the volunteer work, Burk said. "Finding a lost kid is about the most rewarding thing you can do."

Although the group has about 20 members, the central working core is about 10. More active volunteers are needed, Burk said.

"That's not to say we expect people to respond every time," he said. "The state has said a good volunteer will respond one out of every three times. That's taking into consideration that most of us have jobs, families and schedules we have to work around."

Besides formal training, Dutchover said members hike frequently just to stay familiar

with their home terrain. That can cut time in searches, Goodrich said.

"We've got to thank the employers of the volunteers, because they're the ones who give us the time," Dutchover said.

"And the merchants who have donated items to benefit the group and money," Lieftinck added. What they need now are more volunteers and more money. "About eight years ago we started going to the commission," Lieftinck said.

At one time, the county earmarked as much as \$6,500 for the group, but over the years that amount was cut and cut again until last year when the organization received nothing.

The Village of Ruidoso has donated one vehicle and the county two, but one of those has 140,000 miles on it and recently needed a new engine, Lieftinck said.

Occasionally, someone who has been rescued by the group donates money, but the money usually is distributed by the state council among all the search groups that participated. Last week, a check came in from Ruidoso's Altrusa organization.

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# Carrizozo prepares for annual luminaria display

**CARRIZOZO**—The magic glow of the holiday season again will be evident on Christmas Eve in Carrizozo with the tradition of the tiny flames of luminarias.

The glitter of the Carrizozo luminarias have delighted viewers since the tradition began back in 1938. The count reached 12,000 in 1994. By 1995, volunteers created almost 13,000 luminarias, but in 1996 town officials determined that 10,000 was sufficient to cover the town.

Luminarias, known as "farolitos" in northern New Mexico, are a traditional New Mexican custom borrowed from the Spanish. During the holidays, the candle-in-a-sack often can be seen adorning public buildings, churches, homes, walkways and street curbs.

Early New Mexican colonists piled wood along religious processions on Christmas Eve (La Noche Buena). The bonfires illuminated the way for walking worshippers. Later the idea of farolitos was borrowed from Chinese lanterns.

The sacks, candles and sand are ready for the celebration in Carrizozo. A mock parking meter was set up at Nor-

west Bank to help bring in money donations to pay for the supplies. Other businesses collected money in tin cans to ensure the success of the luminaria project.

The town government of Carrizozo also contributed \$1,500 through the lodgers tax, and many other check and cash donations have been received.

On Dec. 12 at 9 a.m. the day-long assembly line work will begin at the fire station. A noon meal is provided. Adults fold down the top edge of each sack while children put sand in the sacks and other volunteers put candles in the sand. The luminarias are stacked on flat-bed trailers and stored away in any available building. Organizers say there is always room for more volunteers to help build the 10,000 luminarias.

On Christmas Eve at 9 a.m. groups of people head to designated areas to meet the trailers and place the luminarias. Town police officers provide traffic control to protect the volunteers and their holiday decorations. The crews make sure that luminarias lead to all churches in the community.

Between 3 p.m. and 4 p.m., volunteers begin the process of lighting the luminarias so by the time it is dark Carrizozo is washed in the soft candle light of a memorable Christmas tradition.



If it's December in Carrizozo, it's time to plan the community's annual luminaria display. # Survey seeks to determine community childcare needs, and help fill them

Affordable childcare, information on how to get used to a new baby, or teaching children to get along with others—these are problems many parents face.

Help may be on the way—and also \$50 for some lucky parent who fills out the survey form printed below and returns it by Dec. 16.

Parents as Teachers and the First Christian Church want to know what Lincoln County families need in the way of parenting information and childcare.

Cathy Overdorf of Parents as Teachers, and Howard Aycock of the First Christian Church, collaborated on the survey printed on this page,

hoping to document the community's needs for information and childcare and to try to meet those needs.

"There's a two-fold purpose for the survey," Overdorf said. "Would they like parenting information and help? If so, what type of parenting information would be most helpful, and for what age groups?"

"The second part has to do with childcare in Lincoln County," she said. "We hear a lot of people saying they have trouble finding childcare, especially for infants and toddlers."

Aycock said the First Christian Church, located at Hull Road and Gavilan Canyon Road, has been moving toward establishing a licensed childcare facility most of this year and has gotten the educational part of the building inspected.

"We identified affordable day care as a need in the community and something the church would like to try to address," Aycock said.

Then he talked with Jim Miller at Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso, who said many students in the Welfare-to-Work and G.E.D. programs needed childcare so they could attend classes and work on those programs. Miller brought Overdorf and Aycock together.

"We haven't totally committed to it yet," Aycock said, "but we're hoping (with this survey), jointly to see how much need there is and if we can move to address that need."

The key is to see if it can be made affordable, he said, so it won't be a financial drain on the church.

"If things fall into place, we'd like to get it under way early next year," Aycock said.

Overdorf wants as many people as possible to complete the survey so they have a representative group from the community — anybody who has children living at home in Lincoln County, even if they're adolescents.

"If we can document that there is a real need, there are grants statewide to help people that are interested in putting in licensed, quality childcare," she said. "There are resources that are available and we can help people hook up with those resources."

Parents as Teachers provides parenting information to anybody in the county, concentrating on the birth to age 5 age range, but Overdorf wants

to document the parenting needs for everyone with children at home, and she'd like to use the surveys to design group training and to send out information and newsletters to families.

Parents as Teachers now serves about 150 families through monthly personal visits, play groups, group training, developmental screenings and referrals to and from other agencies.

Parents as Teachers is funded through a grant from the Office of Child Development and administered through the Ruidoso Municipal Schools, she said, and there's a possibility that parenting information could be broadcast on he school district's Channel 56.

"We also can do training in early childhood education,"

Overdorf said, "and we have access to several programs; Roswell Resource and Referral, which services Lincoln County, do training for us, CPR, first aid. We need to know what parents need and want so we can provide it."

The deadline to return the surveys is Dec. 16, and on Dec. 18 one of the returned surveys will be drawn to win \$50 prize money put up by the First Christian Church.

The surveys may be mailed or dropped off at any one of the four locations listed at the bottom of the survey.

"We would really like parents to take a few minutes and fill out this survey," Overdorf said. "Our job is to serve them and we'd like to do the best job we can, but we need the information from them."

• After losing to powerhouse Artesia in the Class AAA State Championship, 35-22, the Ruidoso coaches look back on the 1998 season and realize the Warriors took their game to the next level.

The 1998 Ruidoso football season was filled with many of accomplishments, but the biggest achievement has more to do with the Warriors' psyches than wins and losses.

"I think we finally played a game that we could have won against Artesia," offensive coordinator John Roberts said Tuesday. "It might be the end of this season, but it's beginning of a time where we're going to be able to compete for some time at that level."

"We got to that level and we were able to compete at it."

In the nine previous times Ruidoso played the Bulldogs in the '90s, the Warriors haven't been close going into the fourth quarter of each of those games. Usually, the game was decided by halftime.

But not so in Saturday's final, Roberts said.

"We were in position with two minutes and 10 seconds to go, to possibly win the game," Roberts said.

Indeed, the Warriors rallied to pull within 29-22 at that juncture. A successful on side kick and who knows what might have happened.

But the Bulldogs retained possession of the ball after the kick off at the 45-yard line.

Then running back J.P. Barta broke through the middle of the Artesia offensive line and squirted past the Warriors for a 55-yard TD run and a 35-22 Bulldog lead. Game over.


Ruidoso defensive coordinator Rodney Webb said the Artesia coaches knew — if their orange mob of fans didn't — that they were in for a fight.

"They didn't overlook us or underestimate us, and as close as the game was, I think they're glad they didn't," Webb said.

After the disappointment of Saturday's game wore off, the overall accomplishments came into focus for the Warriors.

"We were all kind of hurt after the game, but it didn't last very long. The mood wasn't nearly as somber back at the high school as it was at the



**The Christmas Spirit in the Mountain Land**

This is being sent to you one hour after high noon on Dec. 6, with the west wind singing down the valley from the snowy white mountain, carrying a breath of snow and bringing the temperature to 42 degrees at the yard gate.

The sky is pure December Blue and the gold sun shines down up this mountain world rejoicing in the spirit of the approaching Christmas season.

Last time, we had a few words about the early New Mexico days, including "tuminarias" or lighters of the way.

Today let us go back again to early Spanish times in New Mexico and remember another traditional Christmas custom.

**"El Nacimiento" (The Manger Scene)**

Dear to the heart of the New Mexico Spanish pioneers were the several forms of "El Nacimiento" (The Manger Scene).

One style was made up of human figures representing the infant Christ child, the virgin Mary, and Joseph in an outdoor shelter along a roadway close to a village, lighted by a small fire or home-made lanterns.

Another version was human figures and stable animals carved out of wood and placed in a cave dug in a clay bank along a trail or roadway, lighted by pitch-pine torches placed near the entrance.

Or often the sacred little assemblage could be seen in a small cave high on a rocky cliff, lighted by a candle.

**The Cedar Shelter**

Today I am remembering a special Nativity Scene. Forty-eight years ago our mother and I were placing some small figures of the infant Christ, Mary and Joseph in Saint Anne's chapel, Glencoe, in preparation for Christmas Day.

Our friend, Elfego Polaco, who was helping us prepare the church, promised to bring a special Christmas home for the three sacred little figures.

A few days later he brought a small shelter about three feet high made of cedar limbs, ingeniously fashioned together.

This little cedar home with its rounded roof was placed in the church with the figures inside along with a few stable animals, with a small electric bulb serving as a star.

Every year since that day, the same type of cedar shelter has been placed in the church and I send up a prayer of thanks to Elfego. And the spirit of our mother is present with me as the first day of our Infant Savior draws ever near.

**Santa Cops continues fulfilling Christmas wishes**

Whether it's a Barbie doll or a bus ticket home, fulfilling Christmas wishes are what Santa Cops is about.

Besides providing food, clothing and toys to more than 350 indigent Lincoln County families, coordinators of the non-profit organization are trying to meet a special request this year, longtime coordinator Freda McSwane said.

A man wrote Santa Cops that his four children would be spending Christmas without their mother, who is in California. He asked if a bus ticket home could be arranged through the organization.

"This request is a little bit different than anything else we have ever received," McSwane said. "And because we are a little bit low on contributions this year, it's not really something Santa Cops can manage. In other words, we just flat don't have the money to do it ourselves."

However, she has shown the request to others in the community who have expressed an interest in providing the bus ticket, said McSwane, whose paying job is with the district attorney's office in Carrizozo.

"Santa Cops is a program that tries to provide things for the children of Lincoln County," she said.

**A history of giving**

For more than a decade, Santa Cops has acted as Lincoln County's primary clearinghouse for benevolence during the holiday season. This year, however, the organization's efforts have been hampered by a significant drop in available donations, McSwane said.

"We do better when the (tourism) season is doing better," she said. "But, in the same breath, when the times are tough for businesses, it's usually tough for the people who are applying (to Santa Cops). Usually, we have more people asking for help."

Santa Cops has grown considerably over the years, collecting donors and recipients, alike. What started off as an effort staffed by local law enforcement personnel and their families has grown into a full-fledged community project.

Bill Allen, with the Ruidoso Noon Lions Club, said

his civic club once had a separate program to bring Christmas to indigent children, but decided to merge its efforts with Santa Cops. The club gave the organization \$1,000 this year and one member, Bob Bohannon, donated 200 hand-crafted wooden toys, an estimated value of \$1,400. Bohannon spent about 300 hours making the wooden cars, trucks, cows and more.

"I started in January and I celebrated Labor Day by taping these boxes shut," he said, indicating the five cardboard boxes used to bring the toys into the Santa Cops workshop. "Then I started on things for the grandkids."

"This lets people know that we are doing something," Allen said of the club's contributions. "So, when they see us out with some kind of fund raiser, they know what we're doing it for."

Many other groups give to Santa Cops, such as the Lincoln County Sheriff's Posse, as well as local businesses, McSwane said.

School children also support the organization through canned food drives. And local judges hand down community service sentences to juveniles requiring them to put in time wrapping gifts

at the workshop, she said. About 20 youth help out at the workshop each season.

"And I don't know how we would manage without them," McSwane said.

**Angels on trees and in Wal-Mart**

Though assistance comes from many sources, the program's mainstay has been and continues to be the fund raising efforts of Wal-Mart and its employees, McSwane said.

In past years, those employees have raised \$6,000-\$12,000 at a time for Santa Cops. Last year, however, the store's fund raiser netted much less than usual and Santa Cops still hasn't recovered, she said.

"As far as the rest of the contributions, I have been making lots of phone calls. People never say 'No,' to us. It's just having the manpower to make the phone calls," McSwane said. "So, we are counting on people coming in with donations without our having to ask them."

Because of the donation shortfall, Santa Cops this year has headed for the trees. For the first time, the organization is soliciting community donations by using angel trees — a project

headed up by volunteers Ginny and Ross Dingman.

The trees, set up in several places about the village, are decorated with paper angels, each labeled with a particular child's Christmas wish. People pick the angels off the trees, buy the requested gift, wrap it, tape the angel back on and deliver the package back to the establishment with the angel tree.

The packages also may be taken to the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce on Sudderth Drive. Angel tree locations include the Ruidoso State Bank, Sierra Bank, Dr. Steve's Kitchen, Reed's Market and the Title Company, Ginny Dingman said. If a business would like to have an angel tree, contact her at 257-4624.

The paper angels have been disappearing from the trees almost as fast as she and her husband can put them out, Ginny Dingman said.

"We have 750 kids (on the list for gifts) and we have 180 angels out. So we have a ways to go," she said. "But the spirit in the village is just wonderful. People's response has just been glorious."

"It helps a lot that we don't have to purchase the

big gift for 800 kids," McSwane said. "We're talking about \$12,000 — that's what it would cost us to buy those gifts."

**Giving children Christmas**

The families who benefit from the program fill out applications, which can be obtained at public schools, Wal-Mart or the Santa Cops workshop inside Sierra Mall. McSwane said each application is screened for need, usually by checking with governmental entities that provide assistance programs.

A list of each family includes all the children, their ages, sex and clothing sizes as well as each child's specific Christmas wish.

Boxes of food, clothing and about three to four smaller toys per child are assembled for the family. The boxes will be delivered to the families by volunteers on Dec. 19. McSwane has said the boxes will take up the entire mall's floor space on the morning of the delivery day. In addition, about 100 Christmas baskets will be taken to elderly people in the county, she said.

"It's just grown and grown and grown, and as the population of the county continues to increase so does our program," McSwane said.

Volunteers at the workshop are still needed, she said. Besides herself and the Dingmans, the other primary volunteer is Eva Zepeda, who mans the workshop every day from morning till night through Christmas. Donations will be accepted until noon on Christmas Eve because requests for help continue to come in even after the Christmas baskets are delivered, McSwane said.

This is Zepeda's fourth year as a Santa Cops volunteer, a role she enjoys because she remembers her own struggles to provide Christmas.

"I raised 11 children," Zepeda said, adding that all of them are now grown. "When my kids were small, there was nothing like this for them. So, it was very rough ... I don't have a lot of money but I have time and I feel like this is my way to give a gift to somebody — by helping."

**Sylvia plays duplicate**

West dealer.

Both sides vulnerable.

The night Sylvia played in her first duplicate tournament was a night to remember. She had been a member of the club only two or three weeks, but even in that short period of time the membership had heard of

her extraordinary exploits.

We had never previously seen such a player. It wasn't that Sylvia was a poor player — we had lots of them at the club — it was just that her thinking processes were so different from those of any player we had ever met. The mistakes she made were so far removed from any ordinary human error that we quickly realized her mental quirks were totally unique.

Nevertheless, Sylvia's bizarre approach to the game brought her many a sensational triumph, and it was these victories that made her the most talked-about member of the club.

A few of the members were opposed to allowing Sylvia to play in the duplicate, for fear she would spoil the game, but on the whole, most were in favor of the idea. They were curious to see what would happen, and they didn't have long to wait. On the very first board, Sylvia became declarer at six spades on

the hand shown, and West led the jack of spades.

It is hard to explain what happened now. I don't know whether it was the tension of the moment, or the excitement of playing in her first duplicate, or what the reason was that caused her to do what she did, but the fact is that Sylvia played the two from dummy!

This astonishing play was greeted by a strange and eerie silence on all sides. West then shifted to a club. Sylvia took the ace, cashed the ace of diamonds, played a spade to the queen, ruffed a diamond, played a spade to the king, ruffed a diamond, played a spade to the ace, and then discarded three clubs on the 10-7-6 of diamonds to make the contract.

Of course, if she had won the opening lead in dummy, she would have gone down one!

## Trip teaches students about giving and receiving

Ruidoso Middle School children get a lesson of a lifetime in Palomas, Chihuahua, Mexico

Some Ruidoso Middle School students overcame obstacles at the border and language barriers to make the Christmas season a little brighter for their counterparts at a little border town in Mexico.

The 26 students, who are members of the Ruidoso Middle School student council and the library club, along with some parents, trip sponsors and school principal Sergio Castañon, loaded up on two buses and left for Palomas, Chihuahua, Mexico at 7 a.m. Dec. 2.


They brought with them about \$400 worth of gifts, \$300 in groceries, and an old copier for 50 needy children at the elementary school in Palomas, which is about 35 miles south of Deming, N.M. But, because of constraints at the border, the students could not bring everything into Mexico.

Castañon said Mexican immigration officers were being evaluated by their government and couldn't bend the rules and let them drive their buses across the border. A special permit is required to take large vehicles across, he said, and they wouldn't let them bring the clothes and copier, so the group had to carry the gifts and food across, leaving the clothes and the copier in storage for the Palomas school to pick up later.

"We had to walk five feet apart in the rain, carrying 'big old sacks of food,'" said T.J. Turner, a member of the library club.

The reason they had to walk five feet apart, he said, was so the immigration cameras could view them as they walked through the border check.

Daniel Duncan, vice president of the student council, said Mexican Immigration officers asked the students their citizenship. To prove they were from America, the guards also asked the

students to name the president.

"They all said 'Jaclynn' (Castañon, president of Student Council)," Duncan said. "We didn't know they meant the president of the United States! They were going to handcuff me!"

But parents and Sergio Castañon straightened the matter out and the students were allowed to continue their journey with their gifts.

It was only two blocks to the school, and they made it without further incident, although it rained and some of them had to make two trips from the border with presents and heavy bags of cans.

Palomas itself left a grim impression on the students.

"(It's) not a happy sight," Turner said. "It's asphalt and dirt ... There were people passed out on the sidewalk."

What surprised Jaclynn Castañon was the poverty of the school itself.

Sergio Castañon said they met the Palomas students in the gym, which has been under construction for four years because they only work on it as funds become available.

"The children's eyes just grew as we got there," he said. "They looked at us and tried to figure out what was

going on because it was a surprise to them.

"We had fellowship with them and danced and the (Ruidoso) girls sang some songs. The teachers and principal down there are just so grateful that we do that."

Jaclynn Castañon said at first the Mexican children were shy and quiet, scared of the students from Ruidoso.

"Then we started dancing and talking and they started loosening up," she said.

Susana Anchondo, secretary of the library club, acted as translator since she speaks Spanish.

"They were shy to talk to me," she said. "I tried to talk to these little boys, and they ignored me."

Jaclynn Castañon said she did talk with the students in "simple Spanish when she danced with them, asking them their names and telling them her own."

Anchondo said one teacher who had been teaching in Palomas for many years spoke English with them.

Turner said the mayor walked up to him, shook his hand and said, "My name's Pete. I'm the mayor."

Student Council sponsor Michelle Perry emphasized the importance of the trip not

only in terms of giving gifts but receiving the experience as well.

"I think it's really important that our students see life for these other children in Palomas," Perry said. "They don't have nearly the luxury or quality of facilities or opportunities that our kids have here."

"It's important to learn to enjoy giving, raising food and money so they can give things to these people, to learn to volunteer their time and effort towards selfless acts," she said.

Anchondo said the trip would have been better if they'd collected more cans of food. Jaclynn Castañon said future trips ought to be opened up to the whole school, not just the student council and the library club.

"I think everybody deserves to see that - to see how other people live ... and how lucky we are," she said.

"It was a good trip the way it was," Turner said. "Seeing those kids' faces when they saw us."

The founder of the program, Ellie Keeton, the high school librarian, said the trips started 10 years ago.

While Ruidoso students give gifts to Palomas students, those Mexican students "gave us many gifts too in the years that we went down there: their attitude, gratefulness, their generosity with their hugs and smiles," Keeton said.

She said when the program started the school had a dirt floor, windows without glass, no bulletin board materials, and very few desks - and about 600 students.


Besides being a learning experience, Keeton said her own personal philosophy was behind initiating the trips.

"We're so close in miles, yet we're worlds apart," she said. "We don't have to be worlds apart and this hopefully opens up a few eyes and lets people see what life is like in the Third World."

If your company does well, the value of each share of stock will go up. If it does not, the value will go down.

You go to an investment banker, a special type of banker who might loan you some of the money and also help you go out and raise even more.

You would develop a "road show," a special presentation that you and other members of your staff would present to people who might buy your stock.

After you raise enough money and have sold enough stock in the company, and after you have met some very strict rules, you can trade your stock on the New York Stock Exchange.

### The New York Stock Exchange

The trading area of the New York Stock Exchange is a very busy place, where people who represent the buyers and sellers meet.

The New York Stock Exchange is a place where investors can buy and sell stocks, or shares of companies.

The New York Stock Exchange is the trading place for the biggest companies in the world.

Below are some of the special words that people use when talking about their stocks:

**I WILL CALL MY BROKER AND TELL HER TO BUY ROOKIE COOKIE CANDIES.**

A broker is someone who handles people's orders to buy and sell stocks. Brokers are paid a commission, or a certain fee that is based on how much stock is bought or sold.

**I OWN LOTS OF STOCK IN ROOKIE COOKIE CANDIES.**

Stocks are shares of a company that the company sells and stockholders buy. The value of your stock can go up or down.

**I LIKE TO INVEST IN BONDS.**

Bonds are different from stocks. They are loans to a company. When you buy a bond, you lend the company money and the company agrees to pay you back, and also pays you for the use of your money.

**I GOT MY DIVIDEND CHECK FROM ROOKIE COOKIE CANDIES TODAY!**

Dividends are money paid to the stockholders as their share of the profits, or money the company makes. If business is bad, dividends might not be paid at all.

Conscientious objecting can be effective at any age and in any setting.

The Humane Society of the United States has created a packet that will help students express their ethical positions in their middle or high school biology class.

"Animal Dissection: A Student's Choice," includes the Society's videotape on dissection, a brochure about how to promote change at local schools, a list of more than 100 alternative learning materials available for loan from the Society at no expense, sample state and county choice-in-dissection laws, and a long list of ideas for humane science projects.

Published studies show that animal dissection is a less effective learning tool than its more humane alternatives, according to the Society. But every year, six million vertebrate animals are killed for use in high schools in the United States alone.

Not only does this impact animal populations and habitats — such as frogs who are currently in decline across the planet — it also sends the message that animal life is expendable.

## Domingo plays the tragic clown in PBS' *Pagliacci*

When the Washington Opera and Placido Domingo talk - or rather, sing - people listen. When *The Kennedy Center Presents: The Washington Opera Production of Pagliacci* comes to TV, its producer wants people to watch.

The production airs Wednesday, Dec. 16, on PBS (check local listings for air-dates and times of all PBS programs).

"*Pagliacci* is one of a genre of opera of high emotion - passion, sex, greed, murder," executive producer Samuel J. Paul says. "This is opera straight from the tabloids. In fact, this plot was taken from the pages of a newspaper - that this guy had killed his wife in a troupe of players."

"The best opera is the opera that's accessible, and this is wonderful entertainment."

In addition to the opera itself, which is sung in Italian with English subtitles, the program features interviews with director Franco Zeffirelli and star Domingo, as well as a capsule overview of the opera's history.

Ruggiero Leoncavallo's drama of tragic love is accompanied by "terrific tunes and lush, great orchestration," Paul says. Domingo plays the main character, Canio, and the action is set in the present.

The traveling actors arrive in an Italian town and hang out beneath a highway, between the freesties. Skateboarders glide by, and the audience can see tenements in the background with TV sets flickering.

But Paul says, "The reason this stuff has lasted 100 years is that it doesn't matter when it happened. It could have happened yesterday, because these emotions are universal and timeless."

The coalescence of Domingo, Zeffirelli and the Kennedy Center took years. Domingo, who is one of the world's most renowned tenors, met with Zeffirelli, director of the Mel Gibson version of *Hamlet*, through Paul and decided to stage *Pagliacci*, which means "the clowns" or "the strolling players," in Los Angeles in 1996. A year later, funding was acquired for an-

other production, which is the one being shown on PBS.

"You have one of the premier opera directors of our century, with one of the greatest pieces of music that's lasted - and an actor ... of incomparable talent," Paul says. "I got my dream."

Another musical highlight Wednesday on PBS is *New World Symphony: Beethoven Alive!* It features conductor Michael Tilson Thomas at the Lincoln Theater in Miami Beach, Fla., and uses interviews and rehearsal footage to illustrate the lives of young musicians taking part in the symphony.

On the lighter side, the *Mark Russell Comedy Special* also airs Wednesday. The Washington-based political comic performs his sharp-witted song parodies and aims his one-liners at newsmakers.

Continuing a Christmas tradition, *Cincinnati Pops Holiday* airs Thursday, Dec. 17. Erich Kunzel conducts, and the orchestra is accompanied by Mel Torme, the Indiana University Singing Hoosiers and the Studio for Creative Arts Children's Chorus.

On a dramatic note, *Echoes From the Ancients*, also airing Thursday, has Oscar winner Anne Bancroft narrating the story of the 47-day battle between the Roman army and the Jewish forces led by Flavius Josephus. The battle resulted in the destruction of the Galilean city of Yodfat. Josephus was one of the few rebels left alive, and he recorded a history of the events that is the basis for this unique documentary.

## TNT sentences viewers to *Hard Time* with Reynolds

Golden Globe winner Burt Reynolds follows his career-resurrecting performance in *Boogie Nights* with a role a bit closer to home.

In *Hard Time*, which airs Sunday, Dec. 13, on TNT, Reynolds plays Logan McQueen, a Miami police officer who has been decorated five times for bravery. Reynolds says the character is modeled after his father, a former sheriff and chief of police.

As the film opens, Logan and his partner, Charlie Duffy (Charles Durning), are on graffiti patrol. Their routine assignment takes a turn for the worse when Logan stumbles into a robbery in progress.

The officers give pursuit, and by the end of the chase, one of the crooks is murdered. Logan is the prime suspect. To prove his innocence, he embarks on a dogged pursuit of the criminal who escaped.

Logan soon learns that the seemingly run-of-the-mill robbery has far-reaching criminal implications, involving not only a mob boss (Robert Loggia),

but someone on the police force as well.

If this plot sounds a little familiar, that's because it is. Borrowing from several other police films, *Hard Time* is no *L.A. Confidential*. But then again, it's no *Cop and a Half*, either.

The screenplay, by David S. Cass Sr. and Steve Wesley, is very uneven and mars the actors' work. Why make Loggia's character a goofy goon who acts like a *Dick Tracy* villain? Too often the scenes are played for laughs. The spurts of humor work in *L.A. Confidential*, but here they're groan-worthy.

The relationship between Logan and Charlie, however, is nicely done and serves as the heart of the film.

Reynolds, who also directed, does a decent acting job, but his character needs more development. And the romantic subplot with a young defense attorney (Mia Sara) is implausible.

*Hard Time* is the first in a planned trilogy of Logan McQueen films. Reynolds says the script for the second one is better. If that's the case, the next film might be worth watching. Meanwhile, *Hard Time* gives viewers just that.

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### FOREIGN OBJECTS IN THE EYE

**First aid basics:** Any material (solid, liquid, gas or laser beam) not naturally found in the eye is considered a foreign body. This includes any caustic liquids, compressed gases, wood, metal, even contact lenses. Another hazard comes from any laser light source. The body has a natural defense against any foreign object in the eye; it produces tears to wash the object out. However, sometimes the body needs a little help. Here's what you can do, or have a friend do, to help remove something in the eye.

**FIRST, call your eye doctor.** Your eye doctor's office can give you valuable information and help determine your best course of action. **Never rub or press on the eye.** Unless the foreign object is from a high speed power source, try to flush it out with water in order to minimize further damage. If the object is embedded in any portion of the eye, you will need to see your eye doctor as soon as possible, this would be considered an emergency and requires an eye specialist.

If someone is available who will assist you, have them look thoroughly for any object that cannot be seen easily. They should gently pull the lower lid down. Then, carefully examine its inner surface while you look up. Next, check the inside of the upper lid. If the foreign object still has not been found, have the person place a swab across your upper lid. They should gently fold the upper lid up over the swab and search. If the object is found, flush it out with water or sterile eye wash. If the foreign object still cannot be located, loosely cover the eye with a soft pad and call your eye doctor immediately.


Also, can you tell me what has happened to Amelia Heinle (Steffi, *The City*). —April Gates, Visalia, Calif.
