



Former Heritage Trust units to open under new management

It's still a work in progress, but the former Lincoln Heritage Trust Visitors Center and Museum, now owned by the Hubbard Museum of the American West, will reopen Thursday.

The faces running the operation won't be the only things new. The center, now called the Hubbard Museum Historical Center, and Dr. Woods House will be tied into a one-price ticket with the state Monuments Division of the New Mexico State Museum.

The price for adults to see those two attractions, as well as the Lincoln State Monument Courthouse Museum and Tunstall Store Museum will be \$7, March 1 through Nov. 30.

The two entities will divide the proceeds of ticket sales equally.

"The state Board of Regents already approved the agreement and we signed our part of the documents today," said Hubbard Museum director Bruce Eldredge.

The opening Thursday, under the supervision of new curator Barbara Bertucio and her staff, will be a "soft opening," he said.

"We have things left to do and are not quite ready," Eldredge said. "But we will open to the public while we are still working on some stuff. Then no later than late April or early May, we'll have an official gala opening."

Eldredge said the grand opening will depend on "when Dede Freeman and my principals are available."

Freeman headed the Heritage Trust Board during the last months of its existence while board members decided what entity should be deeded the heritage properties.

Her late husband, along with oil man Robert O. Anderson, established the trust decades earlier to preserve the history of the Lincoln settlement, about 30 miles northeast of Ruidoso.

The Heritage group closed its properties Nov. 1 to figure out if it could continue to operate.

The organization faced an annual deficit and the original endowment was running out. The directors decided the only way to ensure the future of the museum was to dissolve while the assets were intact and all the bills paid.

Before the Hubbard group began working on the property in February, members took invento-

ry of the collection that documents the Lincoln County War and its most infamous offspring, Billy the Kid.

Eldredge said at least three more weeks of remodeling is needed before the official opening as a Hubbard property.

He has said the Lincoln museum addition is in keeping with the recent name change from the Museum of the Horse to the Hubbard Museum of the American West. The focus is now on the legends who make up the mythology of the American West, he said.

Bertucio, a Massachusetts native who joined the Hubbard operation from the Western Reserve Historical Society in Cleveland, Ohio,

Council approves water restrictions

Shortly before its passage into law Tuesday night, Ruidoso's amended water conservation ordinance met opposition for a portion of the rule that has been in effect since 1996.

Wells drilled inside the village from July 1, 1996 are required to comply with the outdoor watering restrictions in the four-phase ordinance, which becomes increasingly stringent as drought conditions worsen.

Tony Seno, a village resident and head of the local Libertarian Party, told the Ruidoso Village Council he has a well drilled before 1996 and so does not have to comply with the restrictions.

"But where is the justice if I can water my lawn and my neighbor can't?" Seno said, adding that the right to drill a well is given to property owners by the state. "Just don't mess with my rights as an individual to drill wells."

Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson responded by saying: "My comment is that if my neighbor couldn't water, I don't know that I would water."

Donaldson said the intent of the of

the state law allowing one water well for a tract of land is based on the premise that the land does not have access to a water system.

Lincoln County Commissioner Wilton Howell, who owns a local plant nursery, also questioned whether the village had the authority to place private wells under the ordinance. The State Engineer has that authority, he said, but can that authority legally be passed onto the village, Howell asked.

At the recommendation of councilors, village staff will research the opinion of the New Mexico Attorney General on whether or not the village can regulate private wells as allowed by the State Engineer.

Howell also objected to how the new ordinance's lowest phase, which is in effect even during non-drought conditions, restricts outdoor watering during the hours of 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

"I don't think we should make Phase 1 into Phase 2," Howell said.

The council reviewed three parts of the ordinance and heard public comments on it during a two-hour discussion Tuesday night. A vote on one section of the ordinance, regarding

Fort's fate still unknown

The game is wait and see for the future of Fort Stanton prison for women.

A proposal to transfer women prisoners from the fort and another prison in Grants to a center in Santa Fe died — at least temporarily — with Gov. Gary Johnson's rejection of the budget approved by the New Mexico Legislature.

State Rep. Dub Williams said legislators will be called back to the state capital in April to work on the budget again. Until that document is final, no one knows for sure if money will be included for the transfer of the prisoners from the historic fort about 12 miles northeast of Ruidoso.

The Glencoe Republican said he was surprised shortly before the end of the legislative session March 19 to find money for the transfer in the budget, signaling the closing of the fort as a minimum security women's prison. No one from the state Department of Corrections

contacted him in advance about the proposal, he said.

It's not so much that he was surprised the state might want to move the inmates, but he would have appreciated a courtesy call, Williams said.

He's aware the original idea was that the fort was only a temporary measure to alleviate crowding. Its isolation and high operating expenses for a relatively low inmate population of about 140 women was a nagging problem for Corrections Secretary Rob Perry.

While housed at the fort, the women contributed labor to the rehabilitation of the aging buildings and grounds, and manned a volunteer fire department.

Williams said he would like to see funding included in the budget for a study of a proposal to establish a state veterans' cemetery at the fort, which already has a military and merchant marine cemetery. He's also hoping that organizations working for the conversion of the fort into a living museum are ready if an opportunity materializes.

Jail continues to plague commission

Two of the biggest challenges before Lincoln County Commissioners are finding a way to build a new jail and the creation of a self-sustaining indigent medical care fund, County Manager Tom Stewart said last week.

The hot topic is the detention center, Stewart said, speaking before a crowd of about 60 people at the Community Update session in the Ruidoso Convention Center Thursday.

The old jail has been cited for numerous problems by the State Fire Marshal.

"And they have threatened to shut us down," Stewart said.

A new jail has been estimated from a starting cost of \$3.5 million, depending on the number of beds it will have. Which ever way the county decides to go, it now has the problem of trying to find funding for the new facility, he said.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said the current facility has made strides in educating inmates through a GED program in a converted classroom. And an Alcoholics Anonymous program is so successful, that the class

has a waiting list, he said.

Regarding the county's indigent medical care fund, which has been problematic in the past, a proposed solution is a 1/8-cent per dollar gross receipts tax, Stewart said. A public hearing on the proposed tax is scheduled for April 15.

Commissioner Wilton Howell said the gross receipts tax is preferable to an increase on property taxes. "I believe the people who pay property taxes have enough of a burden," he said.

Stewart said the county is moving ahead with a plan for efficient rural addressing for the 911 system. County Commissioners approved a contract March 18 with Spatial Data Research Inc. to establish a base map in which every telephone in the county is tied to a location. The system also will allow 911 operators to locate even calls from cellular telephones based on tower locations and quadrants.

Lincoln County recently has addressed two other challenges — the replacement of the courthouse generator, which went down during last week's snow storm, and work with the

village of Ruidoso for the resumption of a program to monitor DWI offenders in the county, Stewart said.

Howell said it was unfortunate that so few members of the community attended the session, in which local governmental entities addressed the challenges facing them.

"But one of the things we need to work on is how to get the public more involved," Howell said, adding that it was the responsibility of public officials to get people involved. "Until we get a group of people who spend as much time in politics as they do in church, we are not going to work things out."

Since the November elections, the county commission has had fewer "personality" problems, Howell said, and is working more and more closely with the village of Ruidoso. Some of the joint projects include the DWI program, the repair of Gavilan Canyon Road and duplication of ambulance services.

"And we are starting to talk about Bonito (Lake) and some other things," Howell said, referring to tentative discussion about acquiring the water source from the city of Alamogordo.

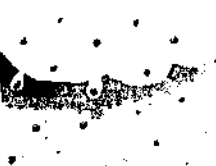

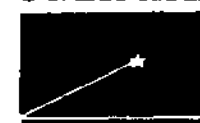

White Oaks Eagle
March 30, 1899

Andy Crawford, colored, of Three Rivers, accidentally shot himself through the heart with a 44 Winchester rifle last Saturday morning while unloading some drill steel at his copper mine on Three Rivers. Andy was well known in this county and has even borne the name of an upright

citizen. The copper prospect which he has been working is said to be one of the best properties of the kind in this country. Crawford has a family who resides at present in Tularosa.

Jose Analla died Friday evening at his home fifteen miles below Lincoln. Mr. Analla was one of the oldest settlers of Lincoln County and had amassed quite a fortune, the largest of any native in this county.

A three-week supply of water, fuel and other essentials should see the Lincoln County Medical Center through any crises tied to the world stepping into the 21st Century, a hospital spokesman says.

Patients shouldn't worry about having enough supplies, failures in electricity to run equipment or the other "scars" circulating about the change, said Dave Blackman, manager of radiology and information services for the 38-bed hospital in Ruidoso.

For equipment tied to dates, the hospital managed by Presbyterian HealthCare

Services, also is preparing for a leap year in February, Blackman said.

He anticipates both transitions to be smooth.

"We've got this enormous Y2000 Team out of Albuquerque and all of the equipment in the hospital has been checked and determined if it is Y2K compliant or not," he said. "We've got the letters from the vendors saying what they're going to do for their equipment. All of our computer system should be Y2K compliant by end of June."

"We're working with Medicare and Medicaid and the state to ensure the people we do business with are compliant. We're checking expiration dates on the supplies and that's kind of a hint. If the dates are past



2000, that's an indication they're already in compliance."

The county-owned hospital also has its own Continuous Improvement Team that meets monthly and makes sure department managers are checking their equipment.

"I think the center is in good shape," Blackman said.

The hospital already had a generator in case electricity fails, not unusual in a mountain community with seasonally strong winds and occasional severe snow storms.

The medical center has gone a step further than many other owners of generators.

"When (the committee) met (recently), the idea was to develop at least a minimum of a

three-week supply base so if something happens, we will have the ability to survive and provide for the patients," Blackman said. "Everybody's department will increase its supply level to cut out the quirks."

Departments are stockpiling water, medical supplies and fuel to run the generator, he said.

The passage from the 1900s to the year 2000 affects equipment that require dates to function or base their data on dates.

"We have a lot of equipment that's not date sensitive," Blackman said. "In X-ray, most of my machines aren't, but the CT scanner and ultrasounds machines do use dates. A lot of that can be changed manually."

New purchases depend on manufacturers proving equipment is compliant, he said. All new computer software must first be approved by Presbyterian's computer service in Albuquerque.

was busy at the Lincoln center Monday.

"We're cleaning and re-labeling, just basically getting ready," she said, adding that the long-range goal is to revamp all of the exhibits.

Bertuccio earned her master's degree in museum science from Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas.

She said she was familiar with the area before accepting the position.

She was initially named curator at the Hubbard Museum of the American West in Ruidoso Downs and now has extra duties in Lincoln.

Under the terms of the annually reviewed agreement with the state Monuments Division, the visitor's center and the Courthouse Museum will open at 8:30 a.m. seven days a week, and will close at 5 p.m.

The Tunstall Store Museum and Dr. Woods House will be closed on weekdays from December through February, and will be open on weekends.

During that period, the joint ticket price will be \$5.

The Hubbard Museum will follow discount and holiday schedules set by the New

Mexico State Museum.

The Montano Store, San Juan Church and Dr. Woods Annex will be open to the public on a regular schedule

throughout the year.

This schedule will be jointly determined by the monuments division director and Hubbard Museum director.

WATER: Councilors debated the pros and cons of standby fees for lots

the creation of an annual standby fee of \$66.96 for vacant lots, was postponed until a concurrent vote by the council on a proposal to do away with an existing impact fee on new construction could be taken.

Charles Craig, a local lodge owner, said he wanted to go on record as opposing the standby fee in favor of the impact fee.

"I believe the impact fee is much more viable in keeping the system up to where it needs to be," he said.

Donaldson responded by saying the impact fee, besides being confusing to people and an accounting nightmare, cannot be used for anything other than meeting the infrastructure needs for growth.

"But the real problem in our community is not the increase in capacity, but maintenance of the system," Donaldson said.

Councilor Ron Anderson said he was "pretty much opposed to a standby fee," say-

ing water rates should have been increased earlier by the village for infrastructure costs. "The users are the ones who should pay for it. That's the way I feel about it," Anderson said.

Councilor Bob Sterchi also voiced concerns about the proposed standby fees.

Ruidoso residents are feeling over-taxed, he said, and he did not want to pass the standby fee if it meant voters would not pass the May 18 bond issue.

The vote would continue a 1-cent gross receipts tax to pay for up to \$5 million of improvements to the village's water system.

Donaldson said lot owners, who have access to village water and possibly village sewer, should pay their fair share.

He said the revisions to the proposed standby fee would allow three exceptions. Owners of multiple contiguous substandard lots would only have to pay one fee for a total area up

to 190 percent of the minimum lot size for an area. Homeowners who have purchased an adjacent lot for green space do not have to pay a standby fee. And the original developers of a subdivision do not have to pay fees for lots that are considered not developable.

Two other components of the amended water ordinance are to go into effect, beginning with a name change. Instead of its previous title of a water contingency plan, the village's watering restriction plan will now be called the water conservation ordinance.

The "triggers" for the plan have been relaxed for the first two phases, so Phase 2 restrictions will not be enacted as quickly as before when drought conditions start.

No longer will outdoor watering be restricted on the basis of odd/even addresses.

Phase 1 restricts outdoor watering during the hours of 10 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Phase 2, moderate drought

conditions, limits outdoor watering to Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

In Phase 3, serious drought conditions, outdoor watering will be allowed only on Tuesdays.

In Phase 4, extreme drought conditions, no outdoor watering will be allowed.

Several amendments were made to the ordinance Tuesday. One change suggested by Donaldson allows the hand-watering of potted plants and flower beds during all the phases.

The third section of the 22-page ordinance for the first time returns deposits to commercial water customers after 60 months of timely payments.

Also, unpaid water bills of renters will ultimately become the responsibility of the landlord to keep a water meter from being pulled. And residential water customers who can show a good history of paying water bills will not be required to pay a deposit.

a.m. and will cover a request to approve a law enforcement protection fund grant application by Sheriff Tom Sullivan and action on a COPS Universal Hiring grant agreement.

Sullivan is applying for \$22,100 from the law enforcement fund, with \$14,100 to be used for repair and purchase of law enforcement equipment and \$8,000 for expenses associated with law enforcement planning and training.

Under the COPS program, the sheriff already received \$144,616 to hire two new entry-level deputies. The coun-

ty's contribution is an additional \$48,206 for a total of \$192,822.

Commissioners must approve the agreement for the sheriff to receive the money. Board members have complimented Sullivan on taking the initiative to apply for the grant to boost the number of deputies under his direction.

The third item of the agenda is a request for action on a proposed resolution tied to installing a fire station in White Oaks.

The resolution declares that the county intends to reimburse itself with the proceeds of a loan agreement

between the county and the New Mexico Finance Authority for capital outlay expenses. The county, with these funds, will buy and put up a metal building for use as a fire station.

Commissioners also are scheduled to discuss a property tax value averaging bill passed by the state Legislature that could affect taxes in rural areas. The commission also will hear a request from Captain for county help on a grant project.

The next regular meeting of the commission is set for April 15 here.

What's your growth philosophy?

Among the more intriguing themes of the annual Community Update meeting sponsored by this newspaper last week was the differing aspects of growth noted in presentations by a variety of speakers.

In Ruidoso Downs, Trustee Jackie Brannam wants simply and literally to "water" new businesses. That community's Highway 70 strip is blooming with construction near and far, even as reconstruction of that highway forces its way in everybody's plans.

The Downs simply needs larger water lines to carry sufficient water to those commercial sites.

Water is a factor in Capitan's almost frenetic growth, too, but so is public safety and over-crowded schools. Water is sufficient for the next 40 years for the village, said Mayor Norm Renfro, but getting it to customers in spread-out (and higher elevation) neighborhoods isn't simple. The Capitan school district's problem, too, is growth — and finding safe space to put increasing numbers of students. A turned-down school bond issue this year didn't help either, but a scaled-down bond issue will be voted upon again on May 11.

In Ruidoso, Mayor Robert Donaldson says residents have sufficient water for at least 20 years, but the problem is developing the resources.

The common theme, of course, is growth. It's taken for granted that all of Lincoln County in the new millennium will be home to hundreds and thousands more people; the implicit understanding is that such growth is desirable and we should welcome it.

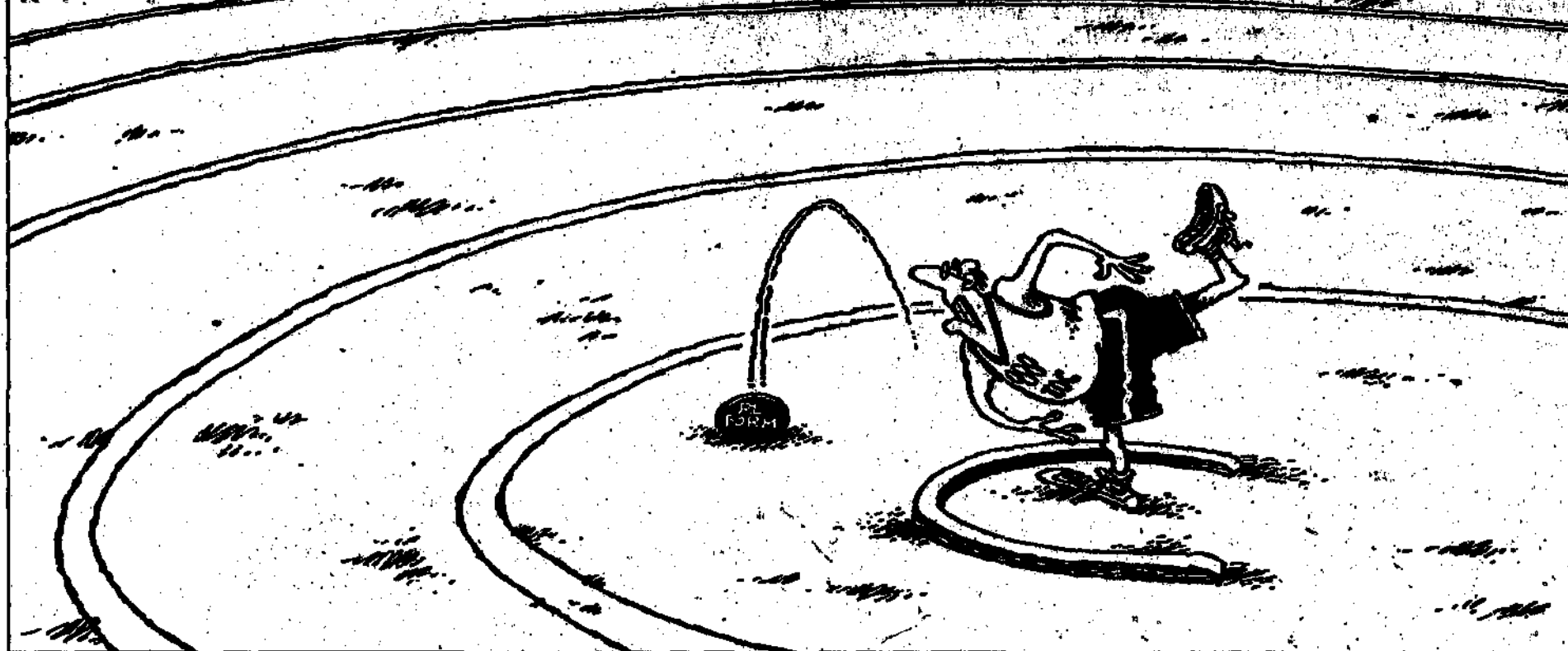
That's certainly the case in Ruidoso, where public officials and tourism promoters alike keep looking at ways to speed up the process. New residential construction, it's said, seems to be tilting more towards "permanent, full-time" occupancy instead of the kind of seasonal homes and condos we've seen for many years.

Ruidoso school officials (the district includes Ruidoso Downs) note slight glitches in enrollment, but cite the fact that the district's faculty is the most highly paid, on average, in New Mexico. Great news, but the "report card" for educational quality isn't at the top.

The Capitan district is huge, but there's been no thought of dividing it up with Ruidoso, in the name of efficiency, even if its boundary includes a large chunk of Ruidoso.

And Ruidoso Downs shows no willingness to merge with Ruidoso, in the name of efficiency.

But then, we're talking about growth here, aren't we? Not efficient government for the taxpayers.

The Ruidoso News, on March 26 covered en masse just

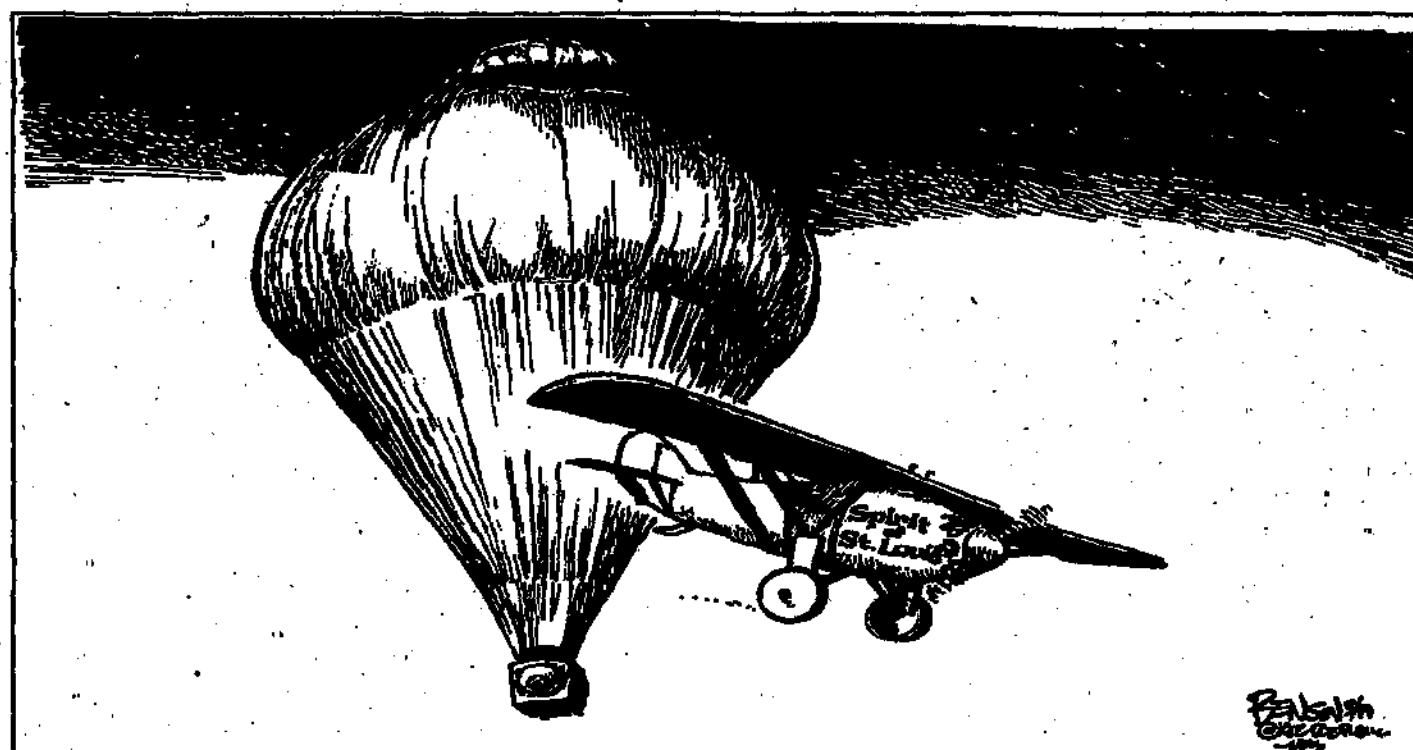

Museum at Downs about much more than horses

The Hubbard Museum of the American West, formerly known as the Museum of the Horse, is about more than the horse, Scott Wells told guests at the Community Update luncheon March 25.

Wells, director of public relations and development for the Hubbard Foundation, opened his presentation with a poem he wrote, "Pre-historic Man," illustrating how horses changed human history:

"Now they say man's brain set him apart/and altered history's course -/But if you ask me, what changed it all/was the day he rode the horse."

"The Museum of the Horse is alive and well as part of the Hubbard Museum of the American West. We'd outgrown (the

name)," Wells said, adding that the name was changed to avoid getting a reputation as the "Best Little Horse House of New Mexico."

The museum will attempt to attract more people to other parts of Lincoln County and tap into the interest in Billy the Kid represented by more than 25,000 web sites referring to the young outlaw.

"We are about to tap into that mother lode of tourism," Wells said, and to develop relationships with and promote other attractions in New Mexico.

"The more bait you put on the hook, the more people you're going to draw to the area," he said.

More than 75,000 people visited the museum in 1998, breaking the record set in 1995 with the exhibition of "Free Spirits at Noisy Water," the

more-than-life-size horses designed by Dave McGary and displayed in front of the museum.

To encourage more visits from children, those under the age of 18 will be admitted free, Wells said, and the Hubbard Foundation will be intensifying educational opportunities and updating and refurbishing the projects in Lincoln, the Billy the Kid Scenic Byways Interpretive Center, as well as all activities from racing to the Cowboy Symposium.

Wells said that April 18 through May 8, children from Lincoln and northern Otero Counties will hang their art in the museum for the Henriette Wyeth Memorial School Art Festival.

"We have a facility that serves every school child in the region," Wells said.

How to reduce your vulnerability to wildfire

Manage as much of the vegetation around a structure as possible to reduce fuel loading and make it more defensible.

Annually remove flammable, woody debris such as pine needles and twigs from the area immediately on or around your home and outbuildings.

Consider widening driveways or private access roads, or at least develop turnarounds, for access of fire equipment. U-shaped or loop drives improve accessibility. Don't block access with extra vehicles or other obstacles.

Denote hazards on your property such as septic tanks

and low spots to prevent heavy fire equipment from getting trapped in them.

Explore the potential for constructing alternate access roads into neighborhoods. Our blind canyons can be traps in a wildfire. Urge action on this and to seek grants for such construction.

Support bond issues that are intended to improve fire protection services, improve roads or strengthen access bridges for heavy fire equipment.

Ensure that your address or road is clearly marked or signed so firefighters can find you.

Develop and practice a family evacuation plan for use when the big one hits.

Ask your local fire department for assistance in this.

Maintain adequate levels for fire insurance on your prop-

erty and belongings.

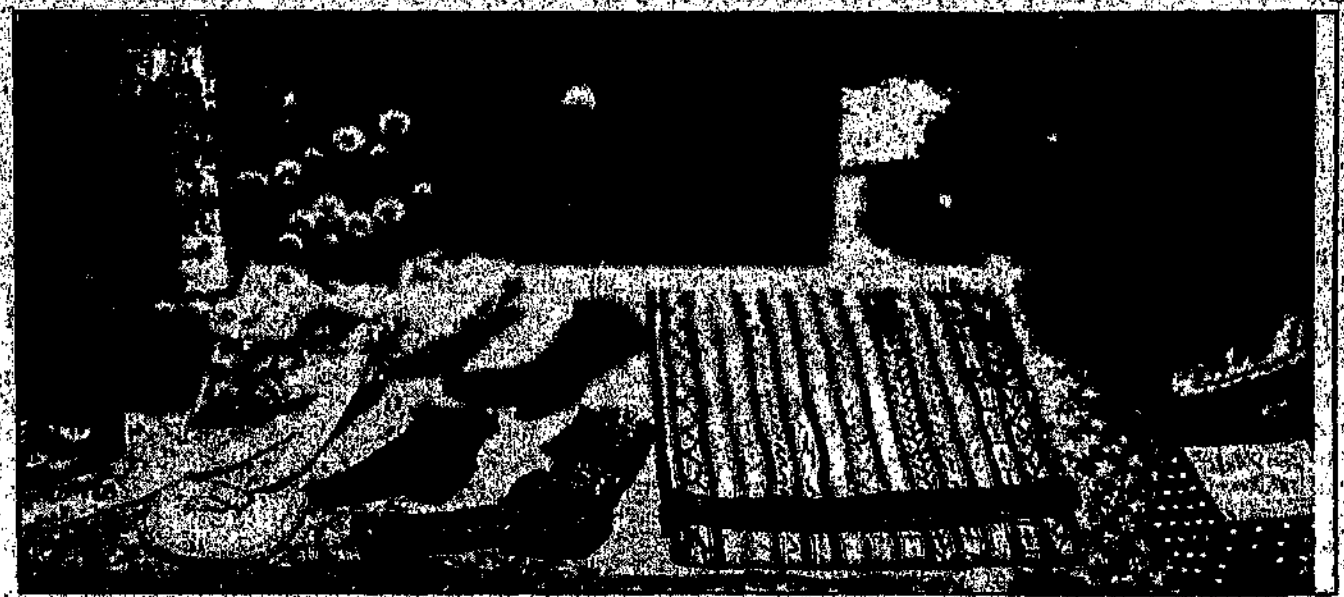

The display is on temporary loan by the couple to the state museum during the season. Lincoln residents will not be charged admission. Other New Mexico residents pay half price on Sundays.

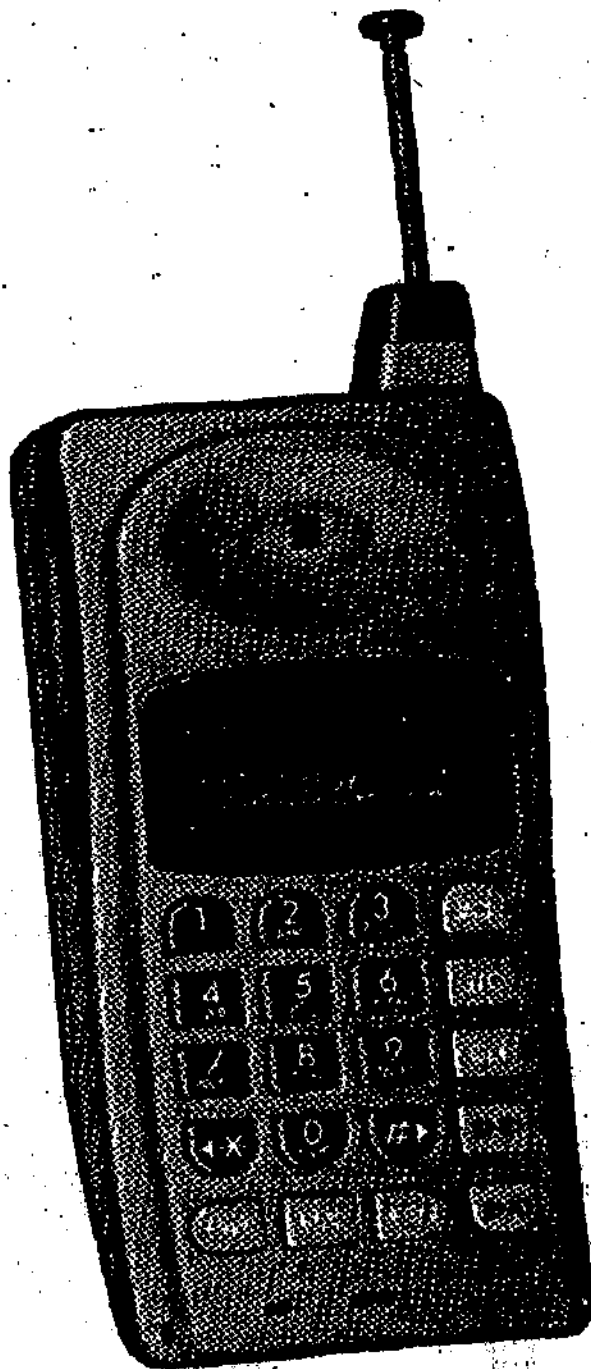
The current price to view all of the monument properties in Lincoln is \$2, but may be changed for the 1999 summer season.

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MUST BE 21 OR OVER TO ENTER

When it comes to Y2K preparations, officials say much is riding on electricity

All the preparation and expense by county government, businesses and utilities to be ready for the year 2000 won't mean much if the electricity goes out, say spokesmen for entities in Lincoln County.

After the discussion is over, power companies will be at the core of the success or failure of the country to meet the Y2K challenge, they say.

Rhonda Lenard, who heads the Y2K Team for Texas-New Mexico Power, said her company began preparing for the new millennium in May 1997, by forming the team, and adopting an implementation plan in January 1998.

They're ready, she contends.

Otero Electric Cooperative's Y2K spokesman, Ron Schultz, said two nationwide tests of power company capabilities are scheduled for April and September.

Both companies serve portions of the county, as does Zia Natural Gas.

Phil Caines, chief financial

officer with Zia in its Wyoming home office, said his company doesn't anticipate problems — unless power is cut off.

"Our only exposure seems to be in accounting or billing software," he said. "That doesn't mean service would be discontinued, only that you may not get a bill for a month or two."

Zia serves most of Ruidoso and about 8,000 customers countywide, in addition to several other communities in the state.

The company's gas distribution lines are not regulated by computers that could shut off the flow if corrupted, Caines said. Even "upstream" on the distribution pipeline, manual overrides are in place, in case computers fail, he said.

"The only other exposure we feel depends again on electricity," he said. "If the interstate pipeline compression facility is shut down (which moves the gas), it would be fairly critical."

Otero Electric's Ron Schultz said his company hasn't figured its cost for preparation yet.

"Fortunately, we just upgraded all of our computers in 1997 and were going to do that anyway," he said. "So all of our computers and software is new."

The cooperative receives its power from Plains Electric's coal-fired generating plant in Prewitt, outside of Grants.

"They get their coal from a nearby coal field and they maintain a 30-day supply," Schultz said. "At our most recent meeting, their attitude was that Y2K was like any other big storm, the only difference is they know when this one will hit."

Plains is tied into the Western Electric Grid, one of three power grids in the nation. The other two are the Eastern Grid and the Texas Grid.

"All power generators within a grid are tied together so if one loses power, the rest will power up to supplement. They watch it all the time. I think even if someone totally messes up and something goes out, they will just work around it," Schultz said.

The North American Electric Reliability Council over-

sees the grid system and has tests planned for April 8-9 and Sept. 8-9.

"The reason for the two dates is that there is some concern of embedded chips being able to deal with all of the 'nines,' Schultz said. "This gives them a chance to see what's going to happen with them. They're also testing communication readiness with all of the different utilities and distributors."

Schultz explained that many newer vehicles, VCRs and even coffee makers have "embedded chips" soldered in their mechanisms, but only functions that depend on a date will be affected by the world's entry into the Year 2000.

For power plants, the chips monitor temperatures, the flow of coal, trigger relay of commands and information, and are involved many other major operations, he said.

"Some have the attitude that if we can't verify what the chips will do, we should either replace them or bypass them, if we can't get to them," Schultz said. "If they fail in the April and September tests, they will

be replaced."

Texas-New Mexico Power, which serves Ruidoso, is spending \$10.2 million to meet the challenges of the new millennium, according to company officials.

In 1998, TNMP inventoried its entire system to pinpoint equipment needing review or revision, but after talking and listening to others in the field, the company hired an outside firm to do the same thing again, said Keith Nix, regional engineering coordinator for the utility. That firm increased the inventory by 30 percent, he said.

Each component reviewed then was ranked as high, medium or low in importance. Devices that protect and regulate the system, ensuring delivery of power, received the top ranking and things like fax machines, the lowest, Nix said.

The high ranked equipment will be tested by March 31, he said. The dates in the computers and regulating devices will be rolled forward. The company is pursuing manufacturer's disclosure statements on devices that can't be

tested that way.

"So far, it looks good," he said. "I'm involved in the west and east New Mexico testing and we've come up with nothing worthwhile to note in the transmission and distribution systems."

"We report to the NERC and have been submitting monthly updates since middle 1998, and have been filling out questionnaires from the Public Regulation Commission."

Nix is writing the power company's contingency plan for any outage that the utility may experience, or requiring interaction with other companies, he said.

Nix speaks to groups about Y2K often. A common statement he hears is from entities such as banks that they've prepared, but it all will fall apart if they don't have electricity.

"I tell them they need to plan for that contingency, because I can't ever guarantee continuity of power," Nix said. "What if a truck would knock down a line and cut off power today. What would they do?"

Local banks report Y2K compliance within their computer systems

Ruidoso banks say they would be ready for Jan. 1, 2000 if it came tomorrow.

"First Savings is right in line and in compliance," said Pat Weeks, New Mexico division operation officer for First

Savings Bank. "And if you read the papers and listen to the media, you will learn that the banks are far more prepared than anyone else is."

Unlike most other industries, banking institutions are under federal regulatory deadlines to not only be ready for the switch from 1999 to 2000,

but to have been tested by March 30, banking officials said. And local bank executives say their institutions have been preparing for the year 2000 since as far back as 1985, before the term Y2K was even coined.

Pioneer Savings Bank has been ready for Y2K since Aug.

23, said Jon Hitchcock, executive vice president in the Roswell office.

"We put our work group together in the middle of 1997 to start figuring out how to address this," Hitchcock said.

"I really think that the great majority of banking institutions are prepared," Tom Battin, president of Ruidoso State Bank, said. "So I think the concern for it is somewhat over emphasized. I think everyone is better prepared than the public may realize."

For those who have somehow escaped the extensive media focus on the problem, the entire nation and most of the world has been trying to upgrade computer systems and digital equipment to be able to process the year 2000. The systems not equipped to move out of the 1990s face possible malfunctions and failures.

Optimists say the problem has been remediated and the worst that could happen would be a few glitches. Pessimists, however, are warning of a loss

of the everyday services and functions we take for granted.

All of the executives for local banks contacted about the problem say their systems will be ready, the only hitch that could happen would be from either power or communication system failures, they said.

First National Bank of Ruidoso may have a generator in case of a power outage and tellers will be equipped with solar-powered batteries, said Nancy Scott, who in September became the part-time Y2K project coordinator at the bank.

The bank's operating system already has been tested, and separate personal computer systems that were not Y2K compliant in the bank have been replaced as well, Scott said.

"And we have updated all of our software," she said.

Like most other banks, employees there occasionally field questions from customers about Y2K and the bank's work on the problem.

"Most of the inquiries we hear is about their deposits and whether they are going to be safe," Tom Rigby, branch manager of First Federal Savings Bank of New Mexico, said. "It's in the paper every day so people always ask about it."

Rigby, whose bank began preparing for Y2K more than a year ago, said banking institutions are being brought into Y2K compliance under the oversight of both the U.S. Office of Thrift Supervision and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. Despite these measures to insure the safety of people's deposits, some banking customers are expected to pull their money out before Jan. 1, 2000.

"I don't know if that's going to happen. But we are going to be prepared for it in case it does," Battin said. "We try to discourage that because the bank is insured, and where people will put their cash otherwise is not."

Kriste Taylor, marketing director for Sierra Banks, said if there were any problems following the turn of the century, then they would be short-lived and quickly remediated.

"I know there are those people out there who have a very doomsday attitude," Taylor said from her office in Las Cruces. "I hope that doesn't become infectious because I think this can all be handled."

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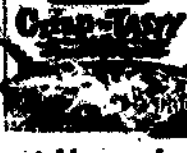
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State statistics reveal pattern of life and death in Lincoln County

White females who are not of Hispanic descent, with a life expectancy of 80 years, have every other category of New Mexico resident tracked by the state Public Health Division.

But in Lincoln County, the percentage of total deaths is higher than the state as a whole for people from the age of 45 to 84.

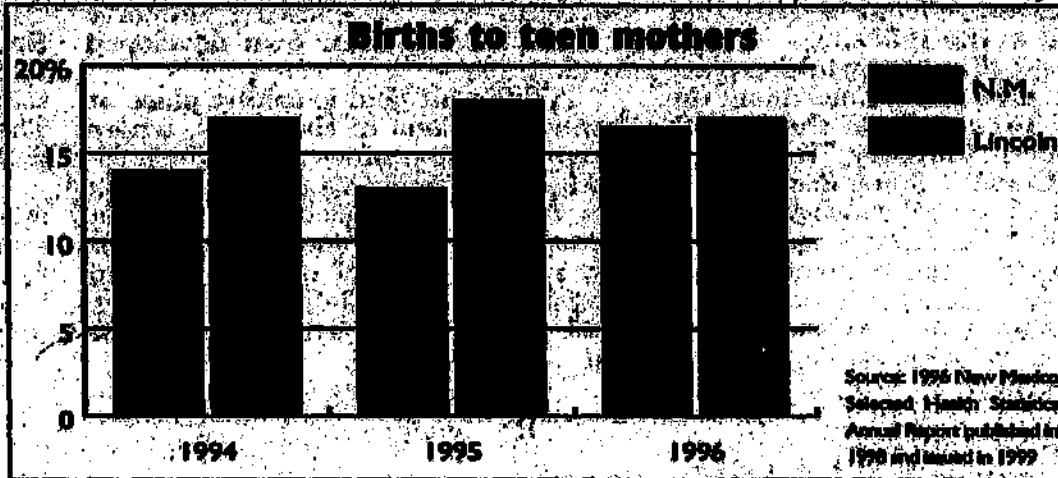
Could it be the high altitude or the high fat consumption?

The department reaches no conclusions about the meaning of the data, but Theresa Luna, who heads Lincoln County's public health program, said the county has a significant population of retirees — nearly 15 percent of the estimated 15,500 residents, according to the statistical report.

"That could influence the totals," she said. "We also have a lot of visitors — some HIV positive/AIDS patients who literally come here to die, because it is a pleasant place and there is good health care here. They may not be from our county really, but it counts against us."

The most recent edition of New Mexico Selected Health Statistics reflects data collected from 1996 and shows that in most categories of health care, the county fares better than the state as a whole.

One exception is in the per-



cent of low birth weight infants. After a 42 percent decrease in the percentage from 1994 to 1996, the number increased again in 1996 by 8 percent, bringing the county even with the state, with one out of every 13 babies born — about 7 percent — being underweight.

Luna said smoking by pregnant women continues to be a problem that often leads to low weight babies, but some women just don't understand the importance of a one-pound-a-week weight gain to help the baby.

"In this county, it's tied to smoking and a lot of teenagers, who instead of gaining weight, want to lose weight while they're pregnant. It's not exactly to hide the pregnancy; they just don't want to gain too much weight," she said.

That ill-placed vanity isn't confined to teenagers. She sees

it in grown women too.

"I think it's basically a lack

of knowledge and understanding of why they need to gain that one pound a week," Luna said, adding that the situation hasn't changed since 1996. "We try to get them to eat a well balance moderate diet. We tell them the best way to keep excessive weight off is by walking and eating a well balance diet where they gain only because of the baby, and the baby eats what it needs."

While she gave high marks for health care in the county for those with cash, health insurance or

who receive Medicaid or Medicare, the lack of a county fund to help the working poor who are medically indigent has hurt. The county commission recently voted to move ahead with a gross receipts tax to generate revenue for such a fund.

"Right now, we're not able to get those people into care, because of the lack of a medical indigent fund," she said. "Once we get this in our community, we will be able to refer people who need it to the University of

New Mexico Hospital in Albuquerque."

Some other highlights in the state study include:

- Nine of every 100 New Mexico residents are Indian, five are non-Hispanic White, four are Hispanic White and two are Black.

- No infant deaths were reported in Lincoln County in 1996.

- Cancer, heart disease and accidents are the leading killers in Lincoln County.

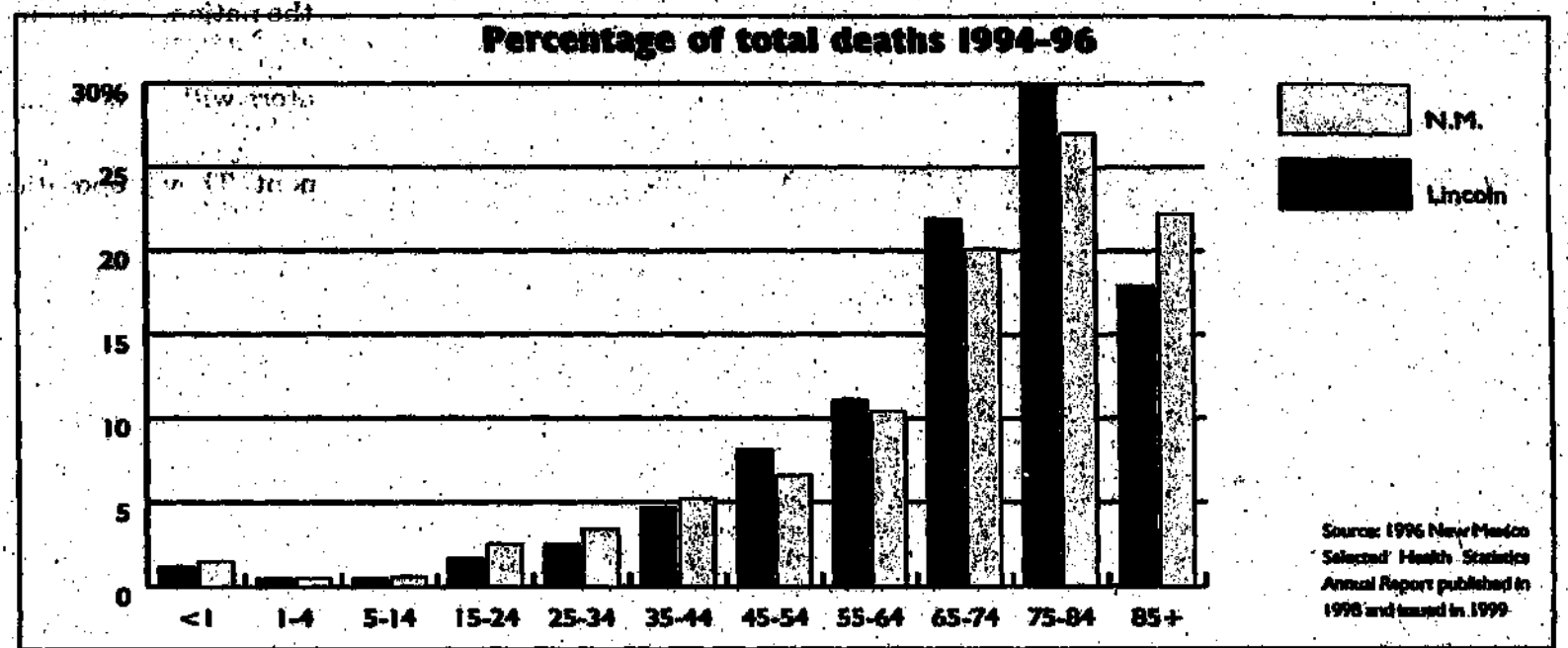
- The county trails the state in percentage of births to teen

mothers, but from 1995 to 1996, the number in the county increased by 29 percent, at the same time births to single mothers in general decreased 10 percent.

- Children 19 years old and younger account for nearly 29 percent of the county's population.

- Farming is the third most deadly occupation in the state.

- Lincoln County was among 13 out of the state's 33 counties with more than 23 patient days in a hospital per 1,000 residents for treatment of injuries.

Man arrested for drugs

Jay King, 23, of Carrizozo, was arrested in a rental car in the 400 block of Fourth Street March 25 and charged with trafficking heroin, an ounce or less of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia, according to police reports.

Sex charges filed

A Ruidoso resident was arrested March 25 and charged with criminal sexual penetration of a minor in the first degree, according to the Ruidoso Police Department.

The defendant is alleged to have had oral sex with young boy in August or September of

1998, police reports state.

At his first appearance in magistrate court, the defendant was released on a \$10,000 unsecured bond pending the disposition of the case, a spokesperson said.

District Attorney Scot Key said the defendant apparently waived the preliminary hearing, "but he did so without an attorney, so there may be an issue about that."

Key will file a criminal information "within the next day or two" on what the defendant is alleged to have done. The district court in Carrizozo will set an arraignment, usually within a week or two, Key said.

Then the defendant will be arraigned and a trial will be set.

The workshop discussion will review symptoms of the disease, how to avoid complications such as blindness, amputation, kidney and heart disease, and where to go for more information.

Also covered will be how foods affect blood sugar and how to plan blood sugar control meals.

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Forest district thins boundary, seeks watershed rescue

Think of it this way: The Smokey Bear Ranger District is doing its best to cool off the chance for wildfires, and increase the water that might be necessary to put them out.

District Ranger Gerald M. Hawkes, on the job in the Lincoln National Forest for the past 10 years, cites two challenges facing the district:

- Reduce wildfire danger at the "wildland/urban interface."

- Improve a deteriorated watershed in those forest areas where piñon and juniper have crowded out grass.

They were presented during the annual Community Update session at the Ruidoso Convention Center last

week.

He told those attending the Update luncheon that forest workers have thinned a 600-foot swath of forest along 13 miles of forest boundary since the idea was conceived about four years ago. The continuing goal in years ahead is to thin some 7,000 acres of national forest in the immediate area. A small area of forest land in the Upper Canyon area still is under study.

That thinning — for an 18-foot gap between trees — will help keep a forest fire on the ground, and reduce the chance of "crown fires" that can develop high temperatures and spread quickly over large areas. (He cited an area along Gavilan Canyon Road as an example of what such a fire can cause. The scrub-covered area still

hasn't recovered from a fire that destroyed it in the 1950s.)

The forest thinning is taking place right up to private lot lines along the interface. To continue the attack Hawkes said Forestry Technician Marianne Gould is going door to door in the area. Gould, who also presented information at the Update meeting, is urging private property owners to do their own thinning as well as alerting the owners to smoke exposure when the foresters do prescribed burns.

Hawkes gave good marks to the Forest Health Coalition of Lincoln County, a private group that has as its goal the improvement of forested private and public areas. Examples are the urban — or developed — areas of Ruidoso. He credits both the coalition and the village of Ruidoso for height-

ened interest in allowing property owners to thin their own developed land.

A different goal is taking place at lower elevations in the forest, where too many piñon pines and three varieties of juniper have taken a toll on the watershed. A good sized juniper, he said, can take some 30 gallons per day of water out of the ground and transport it. All this damages range land and prevents grass from growing.

The ranger district's objective in the area also is to thin out crowded trees; the goal is to treat 4,000 acres per year.

A demonstration of what is happening in that area is in the Carrizo watershed north of Capitan. A group known as the New Mexico Watershed

Coalition, headed by Dick Smith of Roswell, will meet in Ruidoso April 8-9, he said, and those attending will tour the Carrizo demonstration area. The ranger district's Dick Edwards will be the tour guide.

Hawkes said later that he's optimistic about future forest and watershed improvements on the Lincoln forest. As national policy the U. S. Forest Service of the Department of Agriculture has established four goals for the indefinite future.

Watershed health restoration; sustainable forest management; improved national forest roads; and recreational development.

All that applies in the Lincoln forest, he said, "And that might mean we'll get more dollars to work with in the years to come."

Curing the Rio Ruidoso is good economics, says Wisner

River Association wins support for efforts

Dick Wisner, president of the 700-member Ruidoso River Association, told the annual Community Update meeting last Thursday that the river's problems can be remedied.

He gave high marks to Ruidoso's village government for its willingness to try alternatives in achieving some of the association's stated goals. Chief among them is re-establishing the stream as a "high quality cold water fishery," a status he said has been lost.

A second goal is to improve the quality of the river, through identifying areas from which sediments and nutrients flow, and developing structures that will filter them before they enter the stream. The association also has called on volunteers to assist on Saturday,

May 8, with the annual river cleanup from 8 a.m. to noon. Volunteers will meet at Schoolhouse Park.

Wisner acknowledged that the Rio Ruidoso is a source of drinking water for village residents, but to a much lesser degree than is supposed.

"In the final analysis, the Rio Ruidoso is much more a source of income to most of us than it is a source of water."

Any threat to the river or to its health will have far more economic consequences than environmental ones, he said. The county assessor's office recently speculated those property values along the river would fall in half if the river were suddenly allowed to become an intermittent dry wash.

"We (the association)," he said, "are not ... environmental wackos. We are businessmen

and women trying to protect a goose that will lay golden eggs for us — every day forever — as we take good care of her."

Wisner said problems with the river are nobody's fault; that the decline in river quality was inevitable, because of growth of population and the conceptually "misplaced" Grindstone Dam. The dam, built 15 years ago as an addition to the village's water supply, he said, was based on the premise that the Rio Ruidoso was a perennial stream.

But it is torrential, he said, its flow depending on precipitation. The village, he said, has come to agree with the necessity to use Grindstone as a unit in a system that includes wells and surface water, and is stepping up its efforts to plug leaks in the dam and to pump leaked water back into the dam — meanwhile allowing the river

to flow at its own pace. A pump system being installed now, he said, will cut the need to divert surface water into the lake in half. More than half of what is now being diverted is leaking out, he said.

The association, in cooperation with the village and the U. S. Geological Survey, is installing a gauging station in the Upper Canyon. It will monitor the amount of water coming down river so that any necessary diversion can be managed more efficiently. It will transmit the river's flow ever 15 minutes and when tied into the village's water system will manage diversion into Grindstone "objectively and automatically," Wisner said.

He called the association's major accomplishment to date the forging of an alliance with the village to improve the efficiency of the water system.

Classes due migrant track staff

Migrant workers at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track will have a chance to get their GEDs and learn English, attendees of the Community Update March 25 learned.

The race track will have ESL and GED classes at the track starting April 30 to create future opportunities for employees there, said Jim Miller, director of Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU) at Ruidoso.

Not only is ENMU teaching classes all over the county and at the race track, but seven prisoners in the Lincoln County Detention Center also are taking GED classes Monday and Tuesday nights, and 12 inmates are on the waiting list, Miller said.

In other areas, Miller said most of the welfare-to-

work clients signing up for training through New Mexico Works/Lincoln County Works directed by ENMU-Roswell are single women with children.

Legislation limits the amount of time welfare recipients can remain on welfare, and so 150 clients from all over the county came to Ruidoso for job training this year.

"The vast majority have had to go through this facility," Miller said, adding that there are about 200 welfare clients in the county.

The main obstacle to employment, Miller said, is lack of child-care, particularly for infants, and lack of transportation.

Adult Basic Education, involved over 120 students with classes in Ruidoso and Capitan, will see the first ever GED graduation for 12 grads on May 4 at 6:30 p.m.

Fishing report

RIO RUIDOSO: The river is flowing at four cubic feet per second (CFS). Peak runoff was last week. Fish are scattered and very mobile this spring. Best patterns are pheasant tails, green rock worms, grubs. Nymphs will be best producers. Expect flows to decrease rapidly until monsoon season if it arrives.

BONITO CREEK: Above the lake flows are 2CFS. Flows below the lake are 1 CFS at best. Some spawning runs up from lake. Best patterns are same as the Ruidoso and nymphs will be top producers here. Below the lake the creek is virtually unfishable.

ALTO LAKE: Unfishable. Deemed unsuitable for trout by Game and Fish Department. No stocking planned in the future.

GRINDSTONE RESERVOIR: Some surface feeding morning and evening. Good time of year to catch large browns. Best patterns midges, pheasant tails, streamers and pistol pates. The lake level is two feet down.

BONITO LAKE: Lake level is six to eight feet low. Road construction on north side will hamper access, however allowances will be made for parking. The lake is expected to open Thursday. Best patterns will be boats, midges, golden stone, nymphs and dries both.

LAKE MESCALERO: Lake level is fine. Will be some time before boats are available. Good dry fly action mid-morning and mid-evening. Griffiths knats, hornies and caddis are best choices.

All other waters on reservation will open in early May.

A reminder for sportsmen - the license year ends today, so be sure and purchase a new license before you go fishing, or spring turkey hunting.

RHS seniors bring winning attitude to diamond

First-year Ruidoso baseball coach Mike Morris is looking to a strong nucleus of seniors to lead his Warrior club on the diamond this spring.

And so far, Morris likes what he sees.

"I've been real pleased with how the kids have been working," Morris said. "We're not having as many errors this year. We're hitting the ball better this year. They're just working better as a team."

The Warriors are off to a 5-2 start, which includes a second-place finish at the Eunice Tournament.

Morris' underclass letter winners are: Aaron Kopacka, junior, first base; Tristan Torres, junior, pitcher; Sean Sebastian, junior, utility; Chad Swanner, sophomore, shortstop; and Harley Davidson, sophomore, outfielder.

Also suiting out for the varsity are senior Joe McGill and eighth-graders David McNally and Josh Adams.

Torres is the Warriors' only full-time pitcher on the roster, so Morris has utilized a pitching-by-committee formula on the mound.

"They (the pitchers) give what they have for two innings and then I swap them out," Morris said.

It has worked so far, and the Warriors are off to their best start ever, Morris said.

Morris attributes that early success to a crop of seniors who know how to win, thanks to their triumphs on the gridiron. All seven of Ruidoso's seniors played instrumental roles on the War-

What it takes to get to state will require the Warriors to bump off either Silver or Cobre. Both battled for the top spot in the 3AAA last

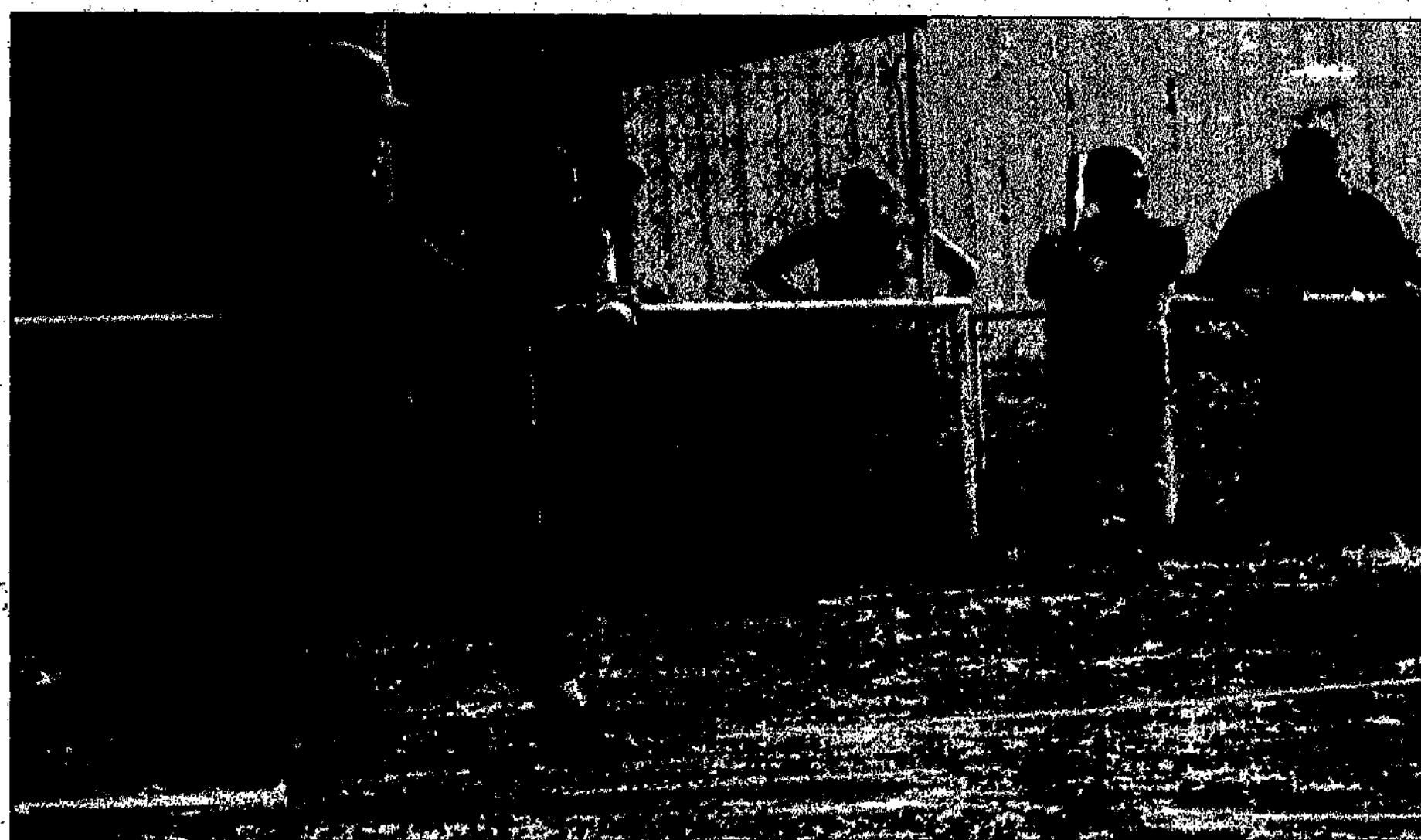
year. Santa Teresa and Hot Springs figure to be also-rans.

Warrior girls set sights on district's elite

With eight starters returning from last year's third-place district squad, the Ruidoso Warrior girls softball team seems poised to contend with perennial powers Silver and Cobre for the 3AAA's laurels.

"I feel confident we should be challenging for one of the top two spots (in districts)," said third-year coach Brian Baca.

Seven of Baca's nine returning letter winners are sophomores and juniors, including the Warriors' pitching ace, Crystal Gheer.

So if the Warriors don't break through this year, there's still next year.

Baca's five junior starters are first baseman Tiffany Brantley, shortstop Aquilina Herrera, third baseman Sarah Fromknecht, outfielder Cassie Bednorz and infielder Julie Miller. Seniors April Tegeda and Brynn Hatcher share the catching duties.

Gheer (4-4 record) has thrown every varsity inning this spring, and Baca said the sophomore has improved over last year.

"She can throw a number of pitches. She has gotten more mature and she's better able to handle pressure situations," Baca said.

Filling out the varsity roster are utility infielder Kristen Castillo, a sophomore transfer from Blanco, Texas, and senior Billy Maldonado.

Ruidoso posted a 9-13 overall mark in 1998 and finished smack dab in the middle of the District 3AAA with a 6-6 record.

Even though Baca expects to contend with three-time state champion Silver and Cobre, he's careful not to overlook the district's other two teams, Santa Teresa and Hot Springs.

"We've got to take care of those other guys, too," Baca said. "Santa Teresa is a program that has made good improvements, but it has lost some starters."

Baca has prepared his Warriors for the district campaign with a tougher pre-district schedule. Ruidoso has played the junior varsity teams from Class AAAA Alamogordo and Carlsbad this spring, along with Class AA Dexter and Hatch.

The Warriors are 4-4 thus far. All four losses have come to the Carlsbad JV. Year in and year out, the Carlsbad Cavegirls contend for Class AAAA's state title.

"We've gotten some good experience with it (the schedule)," Baca said. "We're not going to face pitchers as tough as the two from Carlsbad. It's going to help us later on down the line."

Ruidoso will rely on its defense, which has improved, Baca said.

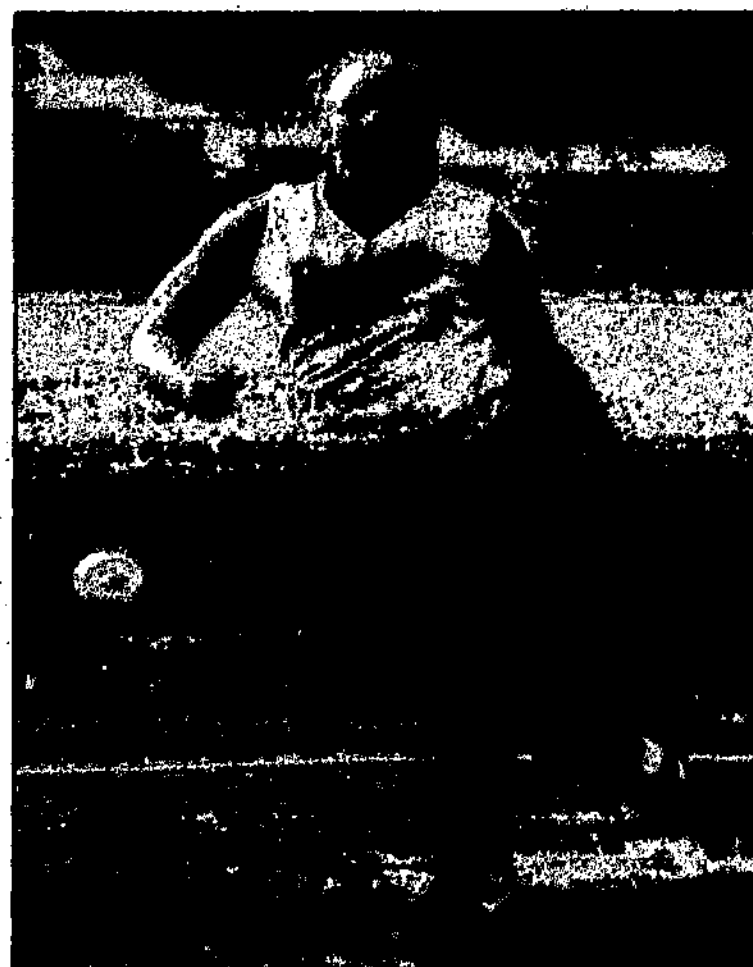
As for areas of concern, Baca said the Warriors need to be more consistent.

The Capitan cowboy ran into some tough luck right from the get go with his first steer at the national rodeo.

"When I started to jump him, he tried to go under my horse and I went plumb over the top of him," Hamilton said of his first steer.

Because the rodeo format was tournament style, Hamilton had to "catch" both of his steers to advance to the money rounds. Hamilton's failure to catch that first steer eliminated him from moving on to the next round.

There was some consolation for Hamilton, however. "Everybody who ran after him (that steer) missed," Hamilton said.

Hamilton's tough luck continued with his second steer as well, and he wasn't able to post a score.

"We didn't draw good cattle and that's part of it," said Hamilton, whose wife, Maria, hazes for him.

Still, Hamilton said, participating in the second-largest national rodeo finals was a great opportunity.

"It was special to go," he said.

Hamilton qualified for DNCFR as the Turquoise Circuit's leading money winner in steer wrestling for the 1998 season. He was one of 16 contestants representing the Turquoise Circuit at the DNCFR. 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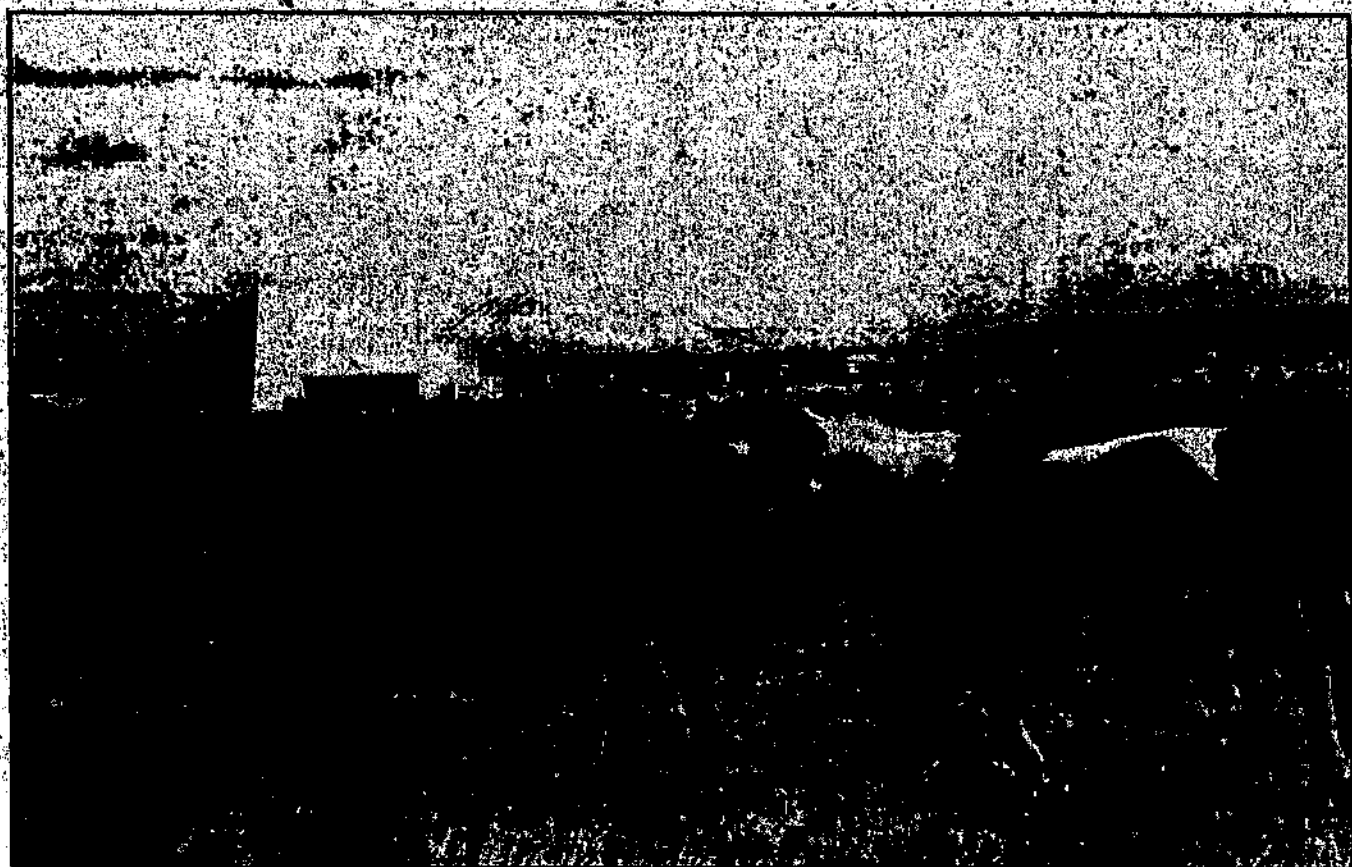

General: It is the intent of these specifications to describe a self-propelled, single steel wheel, pad foot, vibratory compactor in sufficient detail to secure bids of comparable equipment. All parts not specifically mentioned, which are necessary to provide a complete compactor shall be included in the bid and shall conform in strength and quality of material and workmanship to what is usually provided to the trade in general. The compactor shall be a new, current model under standard production by the manufacturer.

A brake interlock system helps prevent driving through the secondary brake.

Steering: A priority-demand hydraulic steering system to provide smooth, low-effort steering.

April 1, 1949

Hospital "Ground-Breaking" Ceremonies On April 5

On Tuesday, April 5, at 2:00 p.m., Ruidoso-Hondo Valley citizens and other interested persons from over Lincoln County will gather at the site of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital in Palmer Gateway Addition in lower Ruidoso for the official "ground-breaking" ceremony which will proceed the beginning of construction of the fifteen bed hospital by R.W. West, contractors.

March 27, 1959

Two Brush Fires Prove Threat

Twice in the last few days high winds have fanned brush and frass fires into possible threats, but both have been extinguished quickly to prevent their spreading. On Sunday, a brush fire near the Rio Ruidoso below the former Roy Stewart riding stable, was brought under control by volunteer fire fighters and U.S. Forest Service personnel. Shortly before noon Tuesday about 25 men within a matter of minutes stomped out another threat on vacant property west of Starlight Cabins.

April 4, 1969

Film Prosecution Stalled by Lack Of Complaints

Lack of a complaining witness has stalled possible legal action against a film company which appeared in Ruidoso in February to shoot a movie entitled "Sno-Fari."

District Attorney Ernest William said he believed there had been some misrepresentation of the film company.

The investigation was sparked by Representative Ralph Petty, Jr. following stories in the Ruidoso News casting doubts on the identity of the producer who claimed he was the Spanky McFarland of the old "Our Gang" comedy series.

Coco the parrot has a voice in family matters.

Randy Leinneweber, 8, shared a late breakfast Monday morning with another member of his family. He would eat a spoonful of cereal and then offer one to Coco.

The African Grey Parrot, moving cautiously because of a stranger in the room, gingerly took a flake from the spoon with her hooked black beak.

Coco, 4, likes cereal as well as soda pop, or basically anything sweet, said her owner and Randy's father, Mike Leinneweber.

The very intelligent bird, whose vocabulary rivals that of a 5-year-old child, is tolerant of all the Leinneweber family to the point of sharing meals, calling their names and making demands of them. But it is Mike Leinneweber to whom Coco is personally linked.

"They get attached to one person," he said, as Coco's black claws move back and forth on his shoulder. "It's almost like they think of you as their mate ... And they get very jealous."

If the parrot is perched on him, then family members think twice about approaching too close, unless, of course, they are carrying a Dr. Pepper, the penultimate bribe where Coco is concerned. Even strangers can get near with a can of soda pop, he said.

"She tries to drink out of can by herself. It's kind of fun to watch," he said.

For two years now, Coco has been a part of the Capitan family, which includes two adults, four children, two roosters, a few ducks, two rabbits, 40 chickens, 1 rat, two cats and one dog named Yogi. And though some family members may fall on the food chain for others, "nobody so far has eaten the other, yet," Mike Leinneweber's wife, Carolyn, said.

Mike Leinneweber acquired the bird two years ago from an Albuquerque friend whose new bride was not will-

ing to share him with a demanding parrot.

Coco, who took about two or three months to switch allegiance to the Leinnewebers, has become a rather mouthy member of the family.

Grey African Parrots can have vocabularies of 1,000 to 2,000 words, Mike Leinneweber said. The birds are raised in the states and sold young for prices of about \$1,000. Older parrots with an established gift for gab can go for \$1,500, he said.

Because of their intelligence, the parrots are fun pets,

but potential owners should be aware that they require a significant investment of time from owners, the couple said. When that attention isn't given, the parrots will begin screaming and can eventually go insane, Carolyn Leinneweber said.

All gray except for a swath of scarlet feathers on her tail, Coco does not own the colorful plumage most people associate with parrots.

"They are the ugliest parrots, but they are the best talkers," Carolyn Leinneweber, Mike's wife,

She should know. Though her husband often takes Coco with him in his job as an electrical contractor, most often she stays at home with Carolyn Leinneweber, and 90 percent of Coco's sayings originate with her. For example, when the telephone rings in the Capitan household, a distinctly female voice can be heard saying, "Hello? ... Ohh, Hi."

Mike Leinneweber at one time asked his wife when she was going to teach Coco a phrase for him.

"And so when he came home one night, Coco was saying, 'Kill the cat. Kill the cat,'" Carolyn Leinneweber said, laughing.

More than just repeating words, Coco understands many of phrases, especially those which make her wishes known, her owners said.

When she wants to be moved to her outdoor cage from her large indoor cage, which is filled with toys and placed in front of a large window, the parrot says, "Coco go outside."

When she wants to ride along with Mike Leinneweber to work, the phrase is, "Coco go by-by." If the desire is for attention or to be taken out of her cage, the parrot lets out a plaintive, "Heeelp me. Heeelp me."

The Leinnewebers are all accustomed to Coco's antics, which never fail to elicit laughter from visitors. Sometimes,

however, Coco can be the source of misunderstandings at the Pinon Hills RV park, where the Leinnewebers manage the park and have their house.

One day, for example, an elderly woman walking by the house received a wolf whistle that offended her. Another time a UPS delivery man became upset when the people talking inside the home refused to answer his repeated knocks on the door.

And then there's the bodily function noise that Coco saves just for when visitors are present.

"There is, with the kids, some blame going around the family as to who taught her that," Carolyn Leinneweber said.

Coco picks up new words and sounds all the time and drops others, her owners said. When an Australian friend came to visit for a couple of weeks, Coco began speaking in a deep, Aussie accent. But within a week of the man's leaving, Coco "dropped" the voice.

With Coco in the house, the Leinneweber household is seldom quiet and always interesting. She barks at neighborhood dogs, yowls at cats and talks to the human members of the family. She also does a mean imitation of the telephone answering machine, "Beep."

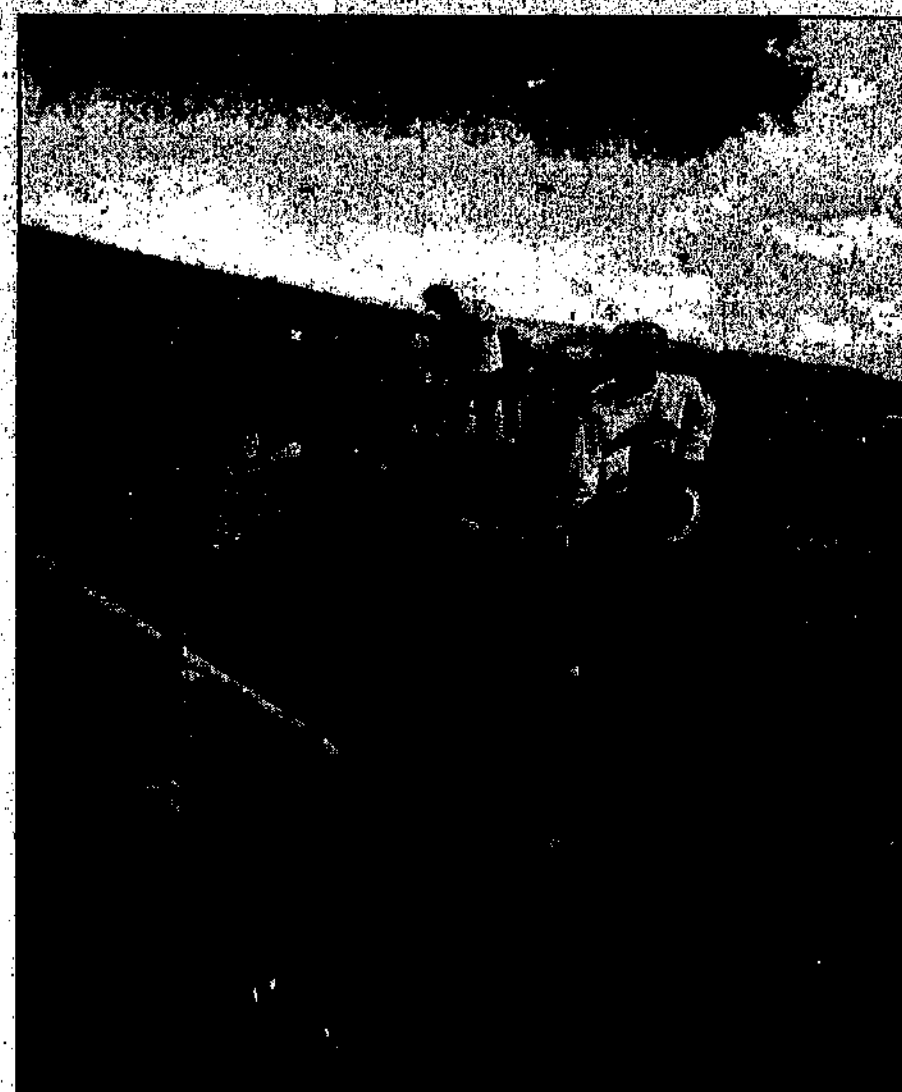
They showed up at Fort Stanton Friday night to camp out under the stars, but ended up dodging rain drops.

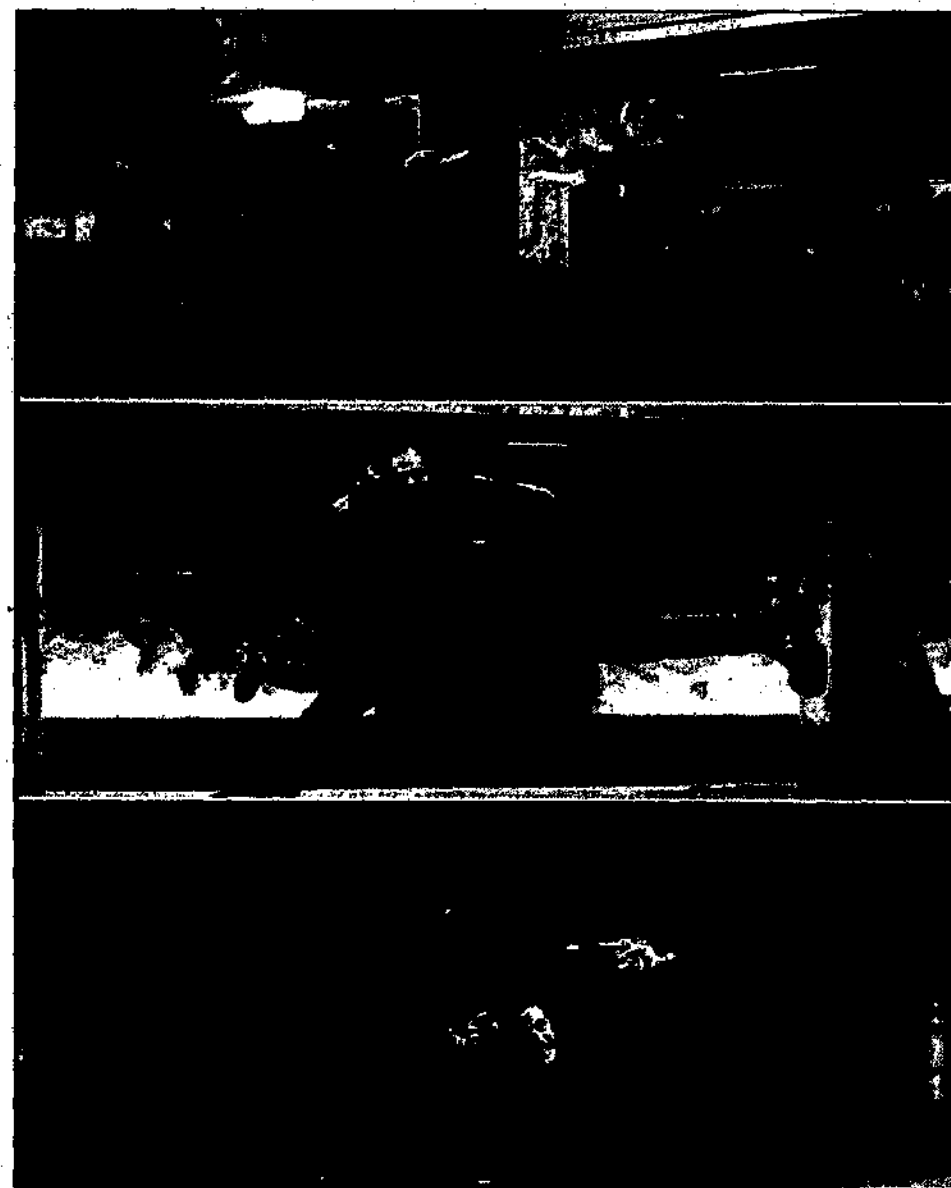

Apprenticeship program proves a plus for students and businesses

Scotty Tillman is earning while he's learning, and said he likes it just fine.

Tillman, 19, a Capitán High School graduate, is an apprentice mechanic at Ruidoso Ford through a program that gives tax credits to the business and pays for the courses Tillman will take at New Mexico Junior College in Hobbs.

Upon completion of the courses, he will earn an associates degree in applied science with a salary potential of \$40,000.

Before his apprenticeship, he had a job as "rodman," surveying property, and it wasn't really what he wanted to do.

"I like vehicles," he said. "Me and Dad always did a back-yard mechanic shop."

Why apprentice then, if he already had a lot of experience at home?

"It's so specialized now, it takes as much training (to be a mechanic) as to be an X-ray technician or any other two-year medical degree," said Ron Walker, the service manager, and Tillman's direct supervisor.

"Previous experience can hinder by developing bad habits," Walker said. "Scotty will get a crash course. It would take years to get what Scotty will do in two. I grade him on what he does here ... and that's a big portion of his grade."

Walker said the classes Tillman will take during his

second year are "very intense. He'll be doing the same course-work in two months that others will do in a whole semester." He said the year spent working with experienced mechanics before going for classes is to get the apprentice "up to par," and to better prepare him for the schooling.

Mauricio Stewart, an apprentice at Ruidoso Ford funded through a lottery scholarship, just finished his first school year, after working for Ruidoso Ford for a year. He said schooling and on-the-job training are essential because today's cars are so powerful and everything is computerized.

"I had trouble reading," he said. "I learned the hard way that reading is the most important, along with people skills and learning the electrical part of cars."

Veteran mechanic Jerry Chisum started working on cars in 1954, before air conditioning, PCV valves, pollution control and low gas mileage — when nobody offered any training.

"We had no chance (to

learn it)" Chisum said. "We had to learn it by our shirt-tails. The trainees of today will be chosen like doctors. Now a good technician can maybe make \$40,000 a year if they apply themselves."

Christopher Carusona, owner, said Tillman will be the sixth mechanic-apprentice to work at Ruidoso Ford. The first five went through a program funded through the Mescalero Tribe, while Tillman's training is funded through an apprenticeship program based at the Lincoln County Works Center.

In January Nancy Warlick became the apprenticeship supervisor for this program administered through Region IX and Eastern New Mexico University, and funded by the Department of Labor and the New Mexico State Department of Education. She interviewed Tillman and then talked to Carusona, and, after he responded favorably, she sent Tillman to apply for a job.

Tillman said he finds the apprenticeship and the camaraderie at work "a lot of fun" and essential because the job is hard.

"It takes a lot of patience," Tillman said. "Changing sur-pentine belts is hard, testing stuff is difficult. Just getting used to doing it and making it a regular routine."

Carusona said this apprenticeship program pays the \$6,000 to \$8,000 the classes will cost. Mechanics also have to buy their own tool kits, which cost upwards of \$20,000, he said.

The Division of Vocational Rehabilitation also smooths the way for students by finding and hiring tutors for those who are having trouble with their classes, Warlick said.

If this sounds great for young people, it's also good for businesses.

"We can help businesses get a tax credit for helping young people in the community to get started," Warlick said. "It's an incentive for the businesses to do this."

Walker said employers take the tax credit and apply it to the paychecks of the apprentices.

Tillman was Warlick's first "placed" client. She said she has spent her time thus far

finding apprenticeship curricula and programs so she can work with employers. And she has interviewed young people interested in construction, roofing, welding, and becoming a chef.

Warlick said prospective clients, who must have a high school diploma or a GED and be 18 to 22 years of age, take assessment tests to see if applicants need help in reading, math or language skills.

Warlick is looking for apprenticeship opportunities for jobs in transportation, child care, construction, welding, culinary arts and anything else requested by young people.

Now she has to convince businesses that having an apprentice is good for business as well as good for the apprentice.

Walker said Tillman is working out pretty well and he thinks he'll make them "a good hand." Tillman is elated to be learning on the job and feels he'll be working there long after his apprenticeship is over.

"You can't just find technicians anymore," Walker said. "You've got to grow them."

Students 'journey' to Mars

Ruidoso students and 125 students from four other school districts in south central New Mexico made a simulated blast off to Mars March 25.

The United States Air Force Research Laboratory sponsored the space camp program.

Ruidoso Municipal School district sent 25 students from White Mountain Intermediate School on the two-hour "journey" to join their colonist-counterparts for the trip to Mars.

La Luz Elementary in Alamogordo sent 24 students, Cloudcroft sent 38 students, and Mesquite Elementary sent 70 students to represent the Gadsden Independent School District.

The students were involved in five months of intensive research in preparation for the journey and began "blasting off" at Mesquite Elementary School in Mesquite.

The students met at 9 a.m. to begin their five-hour "space quest."

After registration, uniform check and weigh-in, the space travelers built eight habitats and linked them together, sharing with each other what they have learned about the red planet.

Working in five- to seven-man teams, each group designed and built a model of a life-support system that would be needed to sustain a colony on Mars, including air and water supply, waste management, temperature control, food production, transportation, communication and recreation. Habitat mock-ups consist of eight 12-foot-square inflatable shelters that are linked together through a series of tunnels.

The participants have stayed in touch via computers, phones and facsimile machines. They finally met on Link-Up Day when their journey to Mars began. Parents, teachers, school administrators and Air Force Research Laboratory officials also attended the event.

The "Marsville" program, sponsored by the Laboratory's Directed Energy and Space Vehicles Directorates, is in its fifth year. The popular educational program has doubled in size since last year and includes Link-Up Days around the state. The greater Albuquerque area Link-Up Day held recently included 39 habitats built by more than 800 students from 26 schools.

Family and Consumer News: IRAs and rental cars

Time is still available for IRA contribution

LAS CRUCES — Taxpayers still have time to contribute to their Individual Retirement Accounts before April 15 to count for the previous calendar year.

For many people IRA contributions are tax deductible, said Susan Wright, consumer education specialist with New Mexico State University's Cooperative Extension Service. A full contribution is usually \$2,000. Investors who contributed a smaller amount in 1998 can make up the difference now.

"To qualify for a full IRA deduction on their 1998 taxes, taxpayers must meet certain qualifications based on their adjusted gross income," Wright said. "Married couples can qualify for a partial deduction at certain adjusted gross income levels. Households with earners who do not have an employer retirement plan can earn any amount and obtain a full IRA deduction."

Even if IRA investors don't qualify for a tax break, an IRA is still a smart way to

save toward retirement, she said. IRAs allow money to grow without being eroded by taxes. IRA contributions and earnings compound tax deferred until retirement.

"If you save your money in a plan that is not tax-deferred, it will not be as profitable as money placed in a tax-deferred plan," Wright said. "Over time, the difference in earnings between taxable and tax deferred investments can equal thousands of dollars."

Investment counselors give this advice:

- Begin purchasing IRAs as soon as possible. People should begin when they're teenagers if they earn an income. Because the investment will compound with time, the difference between starting at age 18 or 20 compared to age 40 can be thousands of dollars.

- Purchase IRAs early in the year. Each day investors delay means less earning on investments.

- Consider long-term earnings when deciding how to invest an IRA. Over time, stocks have outperformed other investments. Between

1926 and 1996, the average return on stocks was 10.7 percent compared to 5.1 percent for U.S. Treasury bonds and 3.7 percent for U.S. Treasury bills. The inflation rate for that period averaged 3.1 percent.

Consolidate IRA accounts to avoid costly custodian fees. Investors also may want to consider a "self-directed" account with a brokerage firm where they can place a variety of assets. Today, many firms are offering on-line services and programs that allow consumers to select from among hundreds of no load funds.

The best deal on rental cars

LAS CRUCES — Travelers often need to rent cars. The Federal Trade Commission offers tips on how to choose the right rental car and save money, said a consumer education specialist with New Mexico State University.

"First, decide where you will pick up and drop off the car," said Susan Wright with NMSU's Cooperative Extension Service. "Find out if there are special fees to use these locations. Ask about expiration dates that could affect an advertised special."

Travelers who plan to rent cars for more than four days should check weekly rates. A lower rate may be available for renting for a week, she said. Always inquire about mandatory additions to the quoted price, such as taxes, mileage rates, fuel charges and airport surcharges.

"Car rental companies often have several types of insurance they may try to sell you in the rental package," Wright said. "A collision damage waiver will only cover damage to the car. Personal effects coverage takes care of damaged luggage."

Cost of insurance coverage will vary from city to city and is sometimes optional, she said. People should contact the rental agency and ask for the exact charges for the city in which they will be renting the car.

The Incredible Egg

For many centuries, the egg has been a symbol of new life. Thousands of years ago, many people believed the world had hatched from an egg.

The ancient Chinese exchanged red-colored eggs to celebrate spring. They brought red eggs to temples to thank the gods for newborn babies.

Today, Chinese parents of new babies give out red eggs to friends and family.

At one time, it was the custom in Europe to do without eggs during the 40-day period before Easter. This period is called Lent. Eggs became such a treat on Easter day, they were given as gifts.

Decorated eggs at Easter have been popular for a long time. The Germans brought the custom to this country. They colored eggs as symbols of better times to come.

Eggstraordinary artwork

Carl Fabergé was a famous goldsmith and jeweler who was born in Russia more than 100 years ago.

For many years at Easter time, Fabergé designed beautiful jeweled Easter eggs for the Russian royal family.



Fabergé decorated many of his eggs with precious gems such as diamonds and rubies. Often there was a tiny surprise inside.



Baby chicks peck their way out of the eggs with their beaks. They peck for a while, rest for a while, then peck and rest some more. Finally they make a hole big enough for them to get out.

When lizards and snakes are born, they break out of the egg with a special tooth. It falls out once they are born.

The chicken is champ

People eat eggs from many animals, including geese, ducks, pigeons, wild birds, fish, crocodiles and turtles. But most of the eggs we eat come from chickens.

A hen needs 24 to 26 hours to produce an egg. Once she lays one, the hen lets out a loud cackle. Fifteen to 30 minutes later, she starts making the next one.

Until about 25 to 30 years ago, most eggs came from family farms. The farmer collected the eggs by hand from the nests. Today most eggs are produced by big companies. The biggest companies might have 1 million to 5 million hens!

In nature, hens lay eggs only in spring or early summer when there is more light. Today, producers regulate the light so that hens lay eggs all year-round.

Egg production

In modern egg production almost everything is done by machine.

1. Hens lay eggs onto tilted floors.
2. The eggs roll into trays on moving conveyor belts.
3. Eggs are cleaned in disinfectant.
4. sprayed with oil to keep them fresh.
5. held up to a light so people can see inside. They check to make sure the eggs have no flaws. This is called "candling," because before electricity people used to hold eggs up to candles. The egg is also graded for quality.
6. Eggs are sorted by size and packed.
7. They are refrigerated and shipped to market.

The Eggstraordinary Egg

Early eggsistence

Almost every animal on Earth comes from an egg. Many of these eggs stay hidden inside the mother.

The eggs we know best are the ones we can see. All bird mothers lay eggs outside their bodies. So do most insect, fish, amphibian and reptile moms.

Only two mammals lay eggs, the platypus and spiny anteater.

Eggs laid outside the mother's body hold food for the baby. They have outer shells. Eggs inside the mother do not need the extra protection of a shell.

The eggcellent egg

An eggshell has to be easy to break and strong enough not to break. It has to be thin and open, and thick and tightly closed, all at the same time.

An egg has to be so fragile a baby animal can break its way out when it is time to be born. But the egg must be so strong it doesn't break when the parents sit on it.

The shell has to be thick enough to stop the fluids inside from leaking out. It has to be thin enough to let air come in for the baby to breathe.

The shell itself is easy to break. It is the shape of the egg that makes it strong. If pressure is put on the egg its rounded shape spreads the pressure evenly around the whole egg. This way the fragile eggshell can handle a lot more weight against it.

Eggshells are covered with thousands of tiny holes, or pores. They are too small to let the important fluids leak out. But they are big enough to let oxygen get in.

Eggsploring the egg

An egg is like a little house filled with food for a baby animal. It is made up of a yolk, the white and a shell.

After the female mates with a male a tiny speck develops on the yolk. This is the baby animal. It eats the yolk and white to help it grow. By the time an egg hatches, the baby has grown so big it fills the shell.

There are no baby animals inside the eggs you buy in the store.

- The oldest chicken, the bigger the egg.
- White eggs come from chickens with white feathers.
- Brown eggs come from chickens with red feathers.
- In nature, chickens lay eight to 10 eggs one to three times a year.
- Every year U.S. hens lay about 68 billion eggs.
- In 1997 every American ate an average of 239 eggs.
- Whites have most of an egg's protein.
- Yolks have most of an egg's vitamins and minerals.

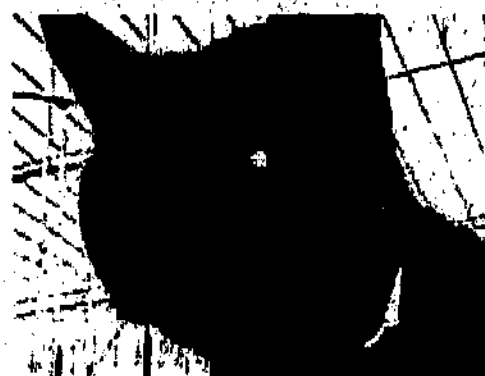

POOP SCOOP

The Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter on Gavilan canyon Road is selling pickup truck restraints for dogs at \$1 over wholesale price.

It's the best deal in town, an excellent brand and easy to install. The staff will help if you have questions. The price is \$12.

Each year, the shelter receives dogs injured from falls out of the back beds of trucks. Many are never reclaimed by their owners, who often aren't aware they have fallen out until they get to a destination much later.

The Ruidoso Village Council last year declined to approve a provision banning such travel for unrestrained dogs. Those who disagree with the council should talk to their representatives about the issue and maybe that position will change in the future.

The humane society advocates putting dogs in the cabs of trucks, not only because of the danger of the animal jumping or falling out, being injured or killed, but also because of the heat from the metal floor of the bed that can burn the ani-

mal's foot pads in the summer.

If riding in the cab is not an option in the view of the dog owner, the second preference is to restrain the animal with a safe device that will not allow them to strangled if they attempt to jump out of the truck bed while secured by a rope. The device being sold keeps the dog in the middle back of the truck bed, the safest area next to the cab.

Call the governor

Great news that the animal cruelty bill passed the state Legislature, but Gov. Gary Johnson is being lobbied hard not to sign it.

Apparently some district attorneys and ranchers (who must not realize that traditional ranching practices are excluded from the bill) are arguing against enacting the law that would elevate animal cruelty from a misdemeanor to a 4th-degree felony.

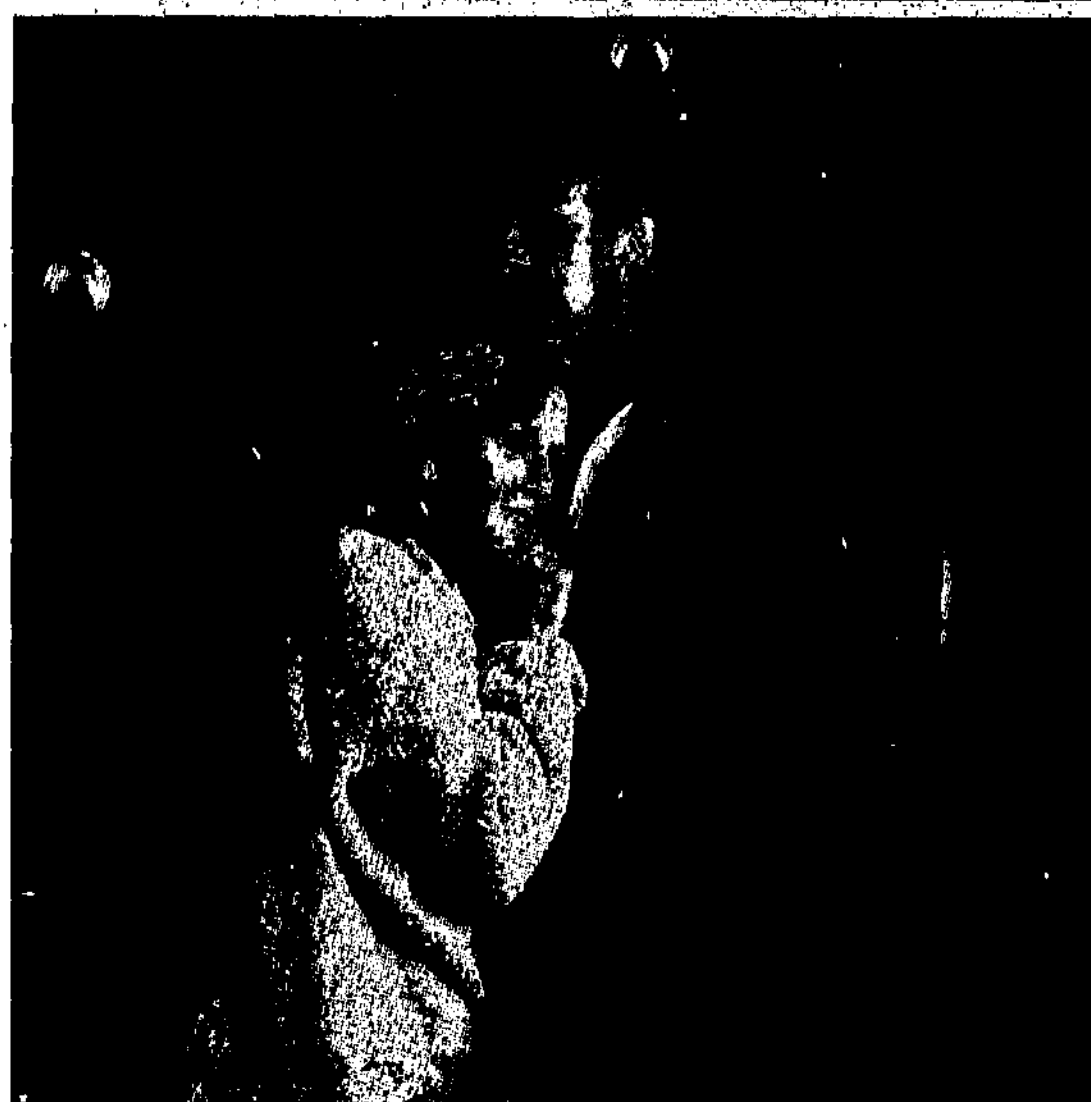

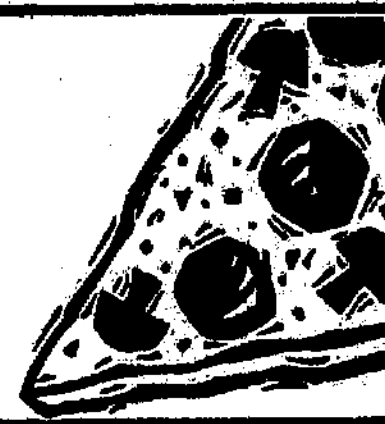

Clayburgh, Tambor head new family sitcom on NBC

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Oscar nominee Jill Clayburgh (*An Unmarried Woman*) and Jeffrey Tambor (*The Larry Sanders Show*) star with newcomer Kevin Rahm in *Everything's Relative*, a new NBC sitcom getting a four-episode test drive beginning Tuesday, April 6.

Rahm plays Leo Gorelick, a struggling young comedy writer whose pressurized career is frequently interrupted by the chronic emotional demands of his long-divorced parents

(Clayburgh, Tambor) and his self-absorbed brother, Marty (Eric Schaeffer from Fox's *Too Something*), a doctor about to get married for the third time.

Maureen Cassidy co-stars as Trina, Leo's sympathetic writing partner.

Series creator Mitchell Hurwitz says the show isn't literally autobiographical, although it certainly resonates with him.

"People ask if it's about my family, and, in a sense, everything is about my family," he says with a laugh, "and that's kind of what the show is about:

how everything in our lives is based on our families. It's a part of life that I haven't seen much of on TV, the adult family.

"This show is like *Ozzie & Harriet* exploded. The kids have grown up, the parents have been divorced for 20 years, so the family is separated and yet they're still a family. There are scars from the past, but they have healed back together. I think this will feel familiar to most adults."

NBC wasn't able to provide a copy of the pilot for preview, but Hurwitz says the show will look somewhat different from standard sitcoms.

"Instead of doing a play in front of a live audience, we're trying to do an independent film in front of an audience," he says. "It's kind of a hybrid and looks very different. We go to different locations, like Barney's department store and shot there for a night, which was wonderful."

Sight unseen, *Everything's Relative* boasts a provocative premise and an interesting cast.

With only four episodes scheduled, however, viewers should sample it while they can.

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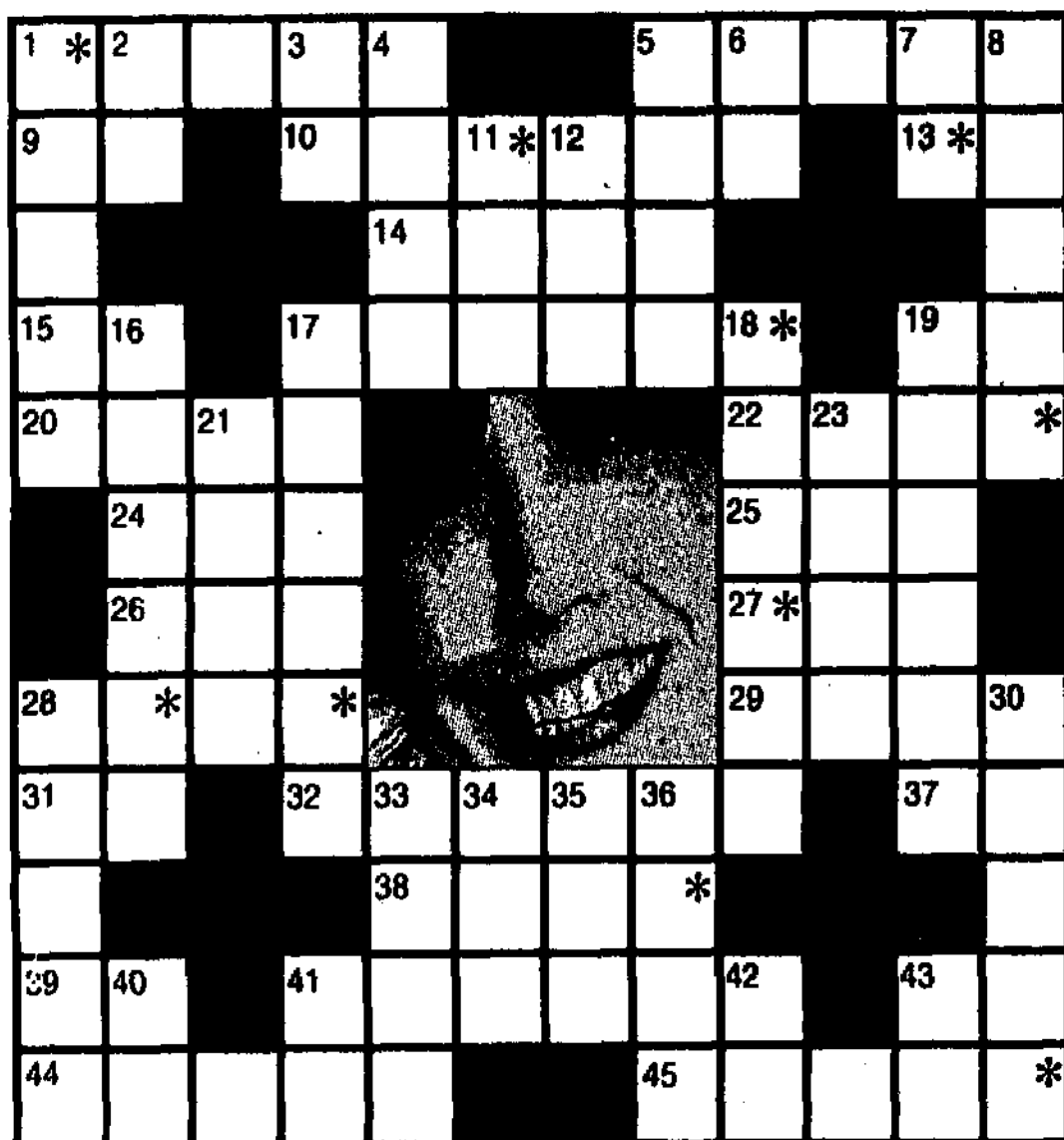

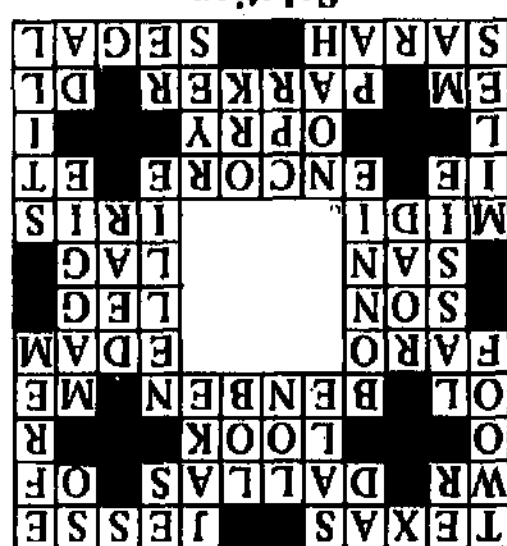

A: Hasselhoff, who played Bill "Snapper" Foster from 1975-82, was the second actor in the role, which was created in 1973 by William Gray Espy.

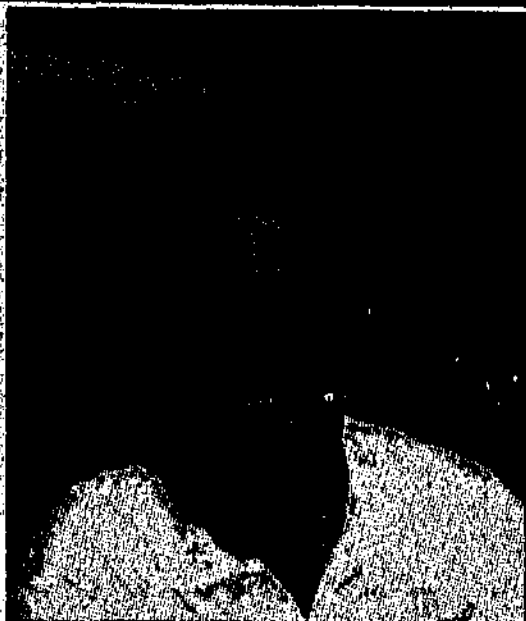
Q: Did the actress playing Yetta on *The Nanny* once play Laura's neighbor on *The Dick Van Dyke Show*? -J.T. from S.C.

ESPN's Miller predicts interesting baseball season

Jon Miller, the velvet-smooth voice of ESPN's *Sunday Night Baseball*, believes in a frank approach to calling America's national pastime. He'll surely demonstrate it when he and 10th-year partner Joe Morgan work the Colorado Rockies-San Diego Padres prime-time opener Sunday, April 4, from Monterrey, Mexico.

Yet Miller can be forgiven if he's a bit wary, considering that Tim McCarver's recent firing had to remind him of his own fate after the 1996 season. That's when he was dropped as the voice of the Baltimore Orioles after 14 years for, as he put it, "not bleeding black and orange enough."

McCarver, another sportscaster known for calling it as he sees it, was unceremoniously dumped in favor of Tom Seaver by the New York Mets after 16 years. Now he's analyzing the world champion Yankees for Fox's New York station and returns for Fox's Saturday matinee baseball lineup in June.

ESPN starts right away with Sunday's Rockies-Padres game and a tripleheader Monday, April 5, with Arizona at Los Angeles, Milwaukee at St. Louis and the Yankees at Oakland.

"We had a great 1998 season with (Mark) McGwire and Sammy Sosa in that record homer race and the Yankees being a great and dominant club,"

Miller reflects. "But there wasn't much in the way of pennant races. This year, I think we'll have some good ones."

He doesn't expect much suspense in the American League East, however. "I don't see anyone there competing with the Yankees. ... I think Baltimore, Boston and Toronto will compete with a Western team for the AL wild card."

Elsewhere in the league, "Cleveland has a virtual free pass to the Central title," Miller says. "But Texas and Anaheim should have a great race in the West, and the Seattle Mariners may join them if they get some pitching to go with Ken Griffey Jr."

The Angels are bolstered by the addition of free-agent slugger Mo Vaughn,

who bolted from Boston amid hot controversy to land an \$80 million deal.

Miller regards the National League as far more competitive.

"The Atlanta Braves are the top club in the East, but they don't have all their starters back, and Andres Galaraga hit 44 home runs. Now he's out with cancer," Miller says. "He was the best first baseman around defensively, too."

Miller sees the NL Central as a three-team race. "Houston also had a big loss with Moises Alou out, and the Cards have made a lot of improvements," he says. "And don't forget the Cubs are still there with Sosa."

The NL West is loaded.

"Arizona bought a whole pitching staff ... but I don't know if the Diamondbacks can hit enough," Miller says. "The Rockies' big addition is Jim Leyland as manager. The Dodgers have manager Davey Johnson and a starting rotation with Kevin Brown that could be better than the Braves have. ... Their problem could be an infield that has a chance for 100 errors."

While Miller and Morgan work Sunday's Rockies-Padres opener and Monday's Cards-Brewers matchup, Chris Berman and Ray Knight draw the Yanks-A's test that caps Monday's tripleheader.

Fox Sports Net launches a 27-week Thursday slate on April 8 with Sosa's Cubs playing NL Central champion Houston.

Viewers in some areas may also see AL Central winner Cleveland at Anaheim (check local listings).



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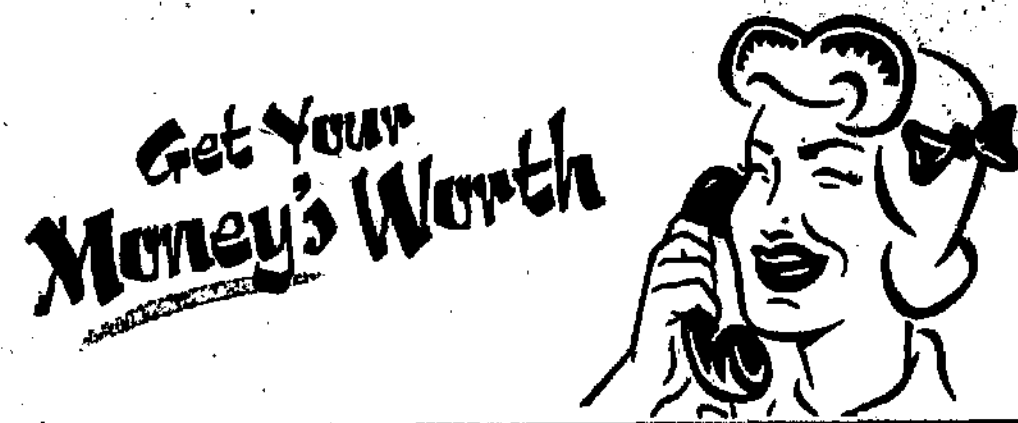
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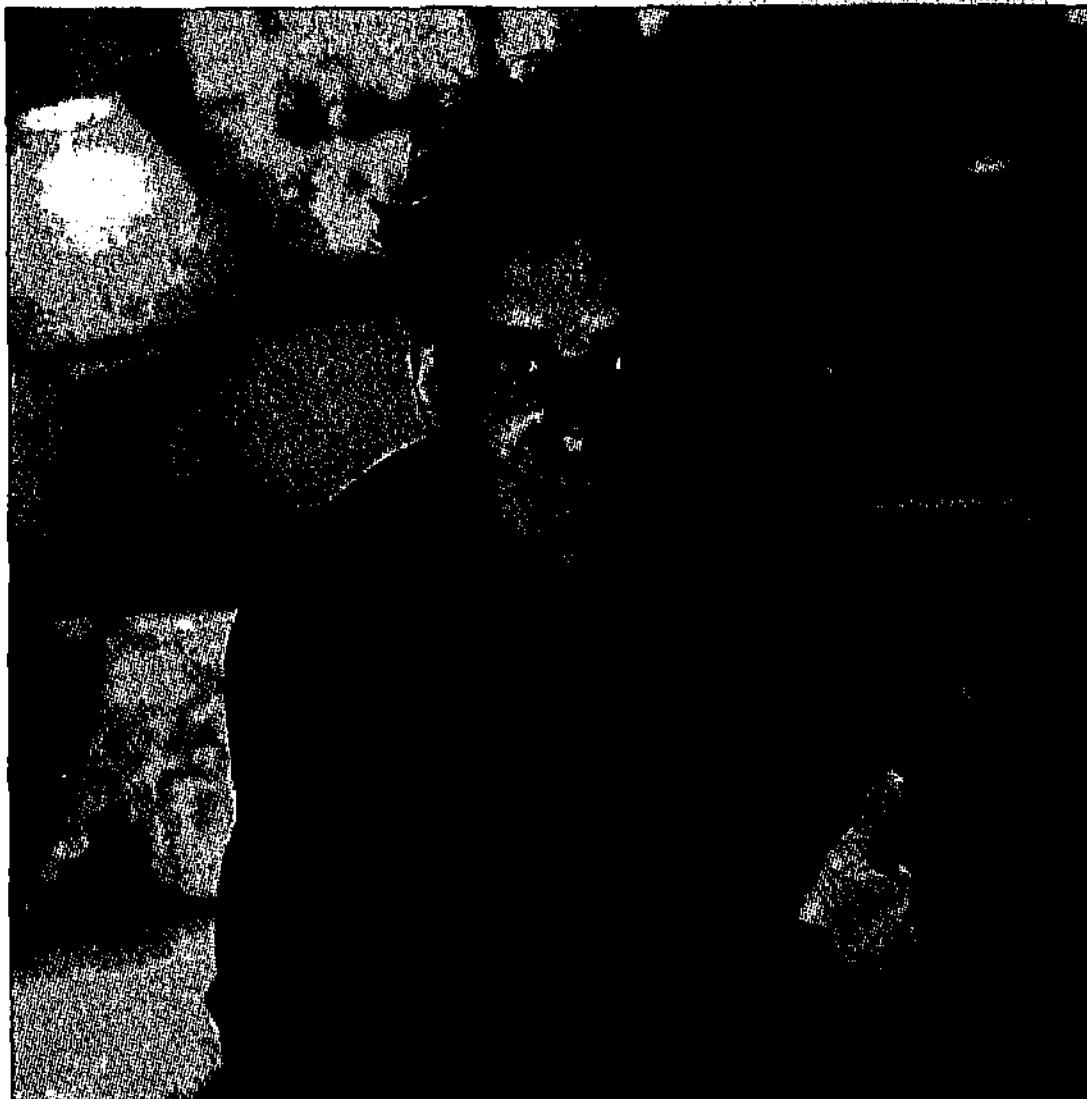
