Department heads get high-percentage raises

Ruidoso manager says salaries now 'competitive'

• Though their salaries increased by as much as 34 percent, Ruidoso's village department heads are just now making the same as counterparts in other parts of the state with the same responsibilities, a village administrator said.

Lanny Maddox was at lunch recently with another police chief when the discussion turned to salaries.

"He said, 'By the way, what are you making now?'" recalled Maddox, Ruidoso's chief of police. "And after he told me what he made (\$63,000), I was, well, hesitant to say anything. Because his department's smaller than ours."

Maddox, one of the senior police chiefs in southern New Mexico, earns \$39,223. Eight months ago, he made

12 percent less, though. He and other Ruidoso village department heads have received two raises in less than a year — some as much as 34 percent.

Ruidoso Village Manager Alan Briley said the first pay increase, effective in July, was based on a consultant's study of comparable salaries in the region. The Ruidoso Village Council enacted that pay increase.


Briley himself gave his 13 department heads a second round of raises in late August and early September.

"It was a manager's policy decision to give them increases, within their existing budgets, to account for longevity, college education, certifications and additional responsibilities," Briley said. "To promote people and get them to what they are worth."

"To me it was a shame that people had been here for 20 years and were

State appropriations could be 'disappointing'

Dub Williams outlines a long list of requests for state funds that goes beyond total budget

• A local representative cautioned that the state funding pie will have to be sliced very thin to meet demand.

have had more than \$1 billion in requests," Williams said. "So, when we submit a request, the chances of getting that fulfilled are not very great."

"Some of the folks will be happy, but more folks will be disappointed," he added.

Here is a list of some of the recent funding requests from Lincoln County:

• A request from Developmental Center in Carrizozo, a home for the elderly, for a new water sprinkler system and alarm system for a cost of \$51,000.

• A request from Ruidoso Downs for new water storage tanks at a cost of \$38,000.

• A request from the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority for land, designs and construction of a new solid waste transfer station for a cost of \$450,000.

• A request from Carrizozo for new waste water system at a cost of \$2.2 million.

• A request from Carrizozo for either a new municipal building or renovation of the old one for a cost of \$613,000.

• A request from Hondo schools to redesign the school's parking lot entrance at a cost of \$6,500.

• Several requests to expand and improve the Lincoln County Fair Grounds in Capitan at a total cost of \$450,000.

• A request from Capitan for water system improvements at a cost of \$321,000.

• A request from Eastern New Mexico University to renovate and equip the Ruidoso facility to serve as a vocational school for seven area school districts at a cost of \$1.2 million.

• A request from Corona to renovate village hall at a cost of \$202,000.

"That's a partial list of some of the capital outlay requests that I have

received and have presented to the capital outlay committee," Williams said. "And I have a long list (of requests) from Tularosa, and I have some others from the Ruidoso schools, too."

Williams, who serves on both the house transportation and education committees, said more than 1,059 bills had been introduced as of late last week from the house and senate, as well as 86 resolutions and 30 memorials.

"So, we have quite an amount of work ahead of us," he said.

He continues working on funding for the renovation of the Merchant Marine and Military Cemetery in Fort Stanton.

The renovation could include expansion of a new area for the cemetery where veterans can be buried with headstones, Williams said.

"I'm very optimistic that we will get something done for Fort Stanton (cemetery) that everybody will be very happy about," he said.

Warden resigns from Fort Stanton to take on new job

Fort Stanton Prison warden Sandra McFadin is moving into the private sector.

The sometimes controversial warden retired from her state job effective at the end of this month, to join Wackenhut, the private company that operates state prisons at Santa Rosa and Hobbs.

Michael Toms, spokesman for the state Corrections Department, said Wayne Sanchez, who was hired within the last six months to be deputy warden, will be acting warden when McFadin officially leaves. Her vacated position will be advertised and state procedures will be followed in select-

ing a replacement, he said.

McFadin first came to Ruidoso to head Camp Sierra Blanca, when it was a minimum security prison for men. She stayed on during the transition of the camp into a women's prison and then followed the inmates to nearby Fort Stanton, which closed in March, 1995, as a state hospital and was reopened two years ago as a minimum security women's prison.


Last year, about 25 minimum restrict prisoners, requiring one step higher security, were added to the minimum security inmate population of about 114.

McFadin, who is on leave for the next two weeks and could not be reached at home, has said she is proud of the rehabilitation work inmates

accomplished on the historic fort's buildings. The success of an inmate-run volunteer fire department also has elicited her praise.

However, her time as warden has been marred with accusations against guards and one conviction, of sexual misconduct with inmates. The family of a Lincoln man, Clarke Pfingsten, who was killed by a male escapee from Camp Sierra Blanca before the community was aware he was loose, sued the state Corrections Department over the incident. That suit still is pending.

She also ran into community relations problems when she unsuccessfully attempted to close the Fort



A glimpse into Lincoln County's past, compiled from local newspapers by Polly E. Chavez.

White Oaks Eagle Feb. 9, 1899

The mail from the east was late in making its arrival Tuesday morning, evidently having been frozen up on the road.

Monday night the thermometer registered the lowest point during the winter, not only hugging zero, but de-

scending 12 degrees below.

their counterparts." Briley, whose own salary of \$53,000 remained unchanged, expressed concern about a possible negative public reaction to the pay increases.

"Yes. They are making \$35,000 now. I'm sorry that that's a \$12,000 in one year raise, but that's what they should have been making in the first place," he said. "We have never compensated the department directors for what they know, what they are worth, and what would be competitive in the market." Ruidoso administrators actually saw an average salary increase of \$10,000 — from \$27,000-\$37,000 to \$31,000-\$42,000, according to the village human resources department. Those pay hikes represent increases of 8 to 34 percent.

"So, it's gone from nothing to mediocre to competitive," Briley said. "I'm proud of what I've done. And I feel comfortable with what they are making, and I expect a lot from them."

Briley's formula starts with three different base salaries as established by the consultants' study of regional compensation.

He added 1/2 percent to salaries for prior experience and 5 percent for 10 years' experience. College degrees and certifications garnered 3-8 percent.

Then to award for longevity, he put a 5-percent increase into the formula for every five years with the village.

"And I gave anywhere from 3 to 5 percent for additional responsibilities, which put them to a new base salary. And at the end of a one year's probation, they get a 4-percent increase," Briley said.

Based on a survey of salaries in Belen, Taos and Corrales, the current salaries of Ruidoso's administrators are roughly the same, though the salary ranges for Ruidoso positions were typically higher than those in Belen and Corrales, but lower than Taos.

Comparing salaries between positions at different municipalities is difficult because of the many variables involved, such as whether someone is just starting out or has 20 years' experience, Briley said.

For example, the cities chosen for Ruidoso News' survey was based on similar year-round population numbers. However, Ruidoso, like Taos, is a resort community whose population soars to as much as 50,000 at times, Briley said.



"And we have to meet those demands for service. So, when I look at my water director, I look at someone who runs a department that serves 50,000 people. I don't compare it to someone who operates a city for 4,000," he said. "I think he is comparable to a director in Santa Fe or Las Cruces."

Another factor in comparing salaries is the different responsibilities a director has. For example, Tammie Maddox, Ruidoso village clerk, also oversees the Ruidoso Convention Center.

Briley said the raises will help the village recruit capable people when the need arises. Currently, there isn't a need, and more than one administrator recently said they have refused more lucrative offers because of job satisfaction.

"I hate to be the punching bag so that they'll say, 'Well, he'll stay here, no matter what we do,' but I have no desire to leave Ruidoso," Maddox said.

"I have had offers from other municipalities for a lot more money, but I have my life's investment in Ruidoso


Maddox said the pay raises were important for factors other than just better pay.

The biggest lighted sign in Lincoln County

Glencoe Rural Events Center clearly losing its white elephant image

Recently considered a white elephant by some, the Glencoe Rural Events Center seems to be turning into more of a trophy than a liability for Lincoln County.

The future of the center (on U.S. 70 about 13 miles east of Ruidoso) is on the agenda of the County Commission session Thursday. Commissioner Rick Simpson will report on a meeting of the Glencoe Rural Events Board, a citizens supervisory group.

The commission session will begin at 9 a.m. in the county courthouse in Carrizozo. It will be the first get-together under the commission's new Thursday schedule.

Two months ago, the commission voted to negotiate a lease of the center to the Hondo School District. Last month, a promoter stepped forward with a plan for a roping hall of fame and regular calf roping and rodeo events.

The center was purchased with

\$250,000 from the state Legislature. Interior improvements and an outdoor arena were added, but as the political power shifted on the commission, support for the center weakened. A contingent of supporters of the fairgrounds in Capitan opposed the venture from the outset.

This year, no money was budgeted for a rural events center manager or to advertise and promote more events.

After the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium board decided to move that annual event from the center to the Ruidoso Downs Race Track, commissioners even discussed giving away the center, but were told because federal money was accepted in the construction of the arena, that would be difficult.

They advertised twice for management proposals, but could not reach agreement with the only viable response, which came from the Hubbard Museum of the American West.

Three months ago, Barbara Casey, superintendent of the Hondo School District, said her school system was interested in using the center to expand

some of its programs and would coordinate events such as ropings on the weekends.

As commissioners discussed details of a lease agreement, Ruidoso businessman Jimmy Millar stepped forward last month to propose that a private group could bring more money into the county by using the center for a roping hall of fame and for special roping events.

The 29-issue commission agenda for Thursday also includes two items related to the unsettled matter of raises for elected county officials. Sheriff Tom Sullivan, one of the five officials who may not see any increase in their annual salaries, has asked for a discussion of the matter.

Later in the meeting, County Attorney Alan Morel will brief commissioners on a "mutual compromise, settlement and release of all claims" agreement he has worked out with elected officials. Last week, Commissioner Wilton Howell questioned how

the county can give elected officials a one-time lump sum settlement, if no one has threatened to sue.

Following up on a letter to commissioners, Brian E. Dunn of Community Health Systems will brief commissioners on possible arrangements between the commission and that company for the Lincoln County Medical Center, the county-owned hospital in Ruidoso. Presbyterian HealthCare Systems manages the hospital for the county. A \$1.2 million expansion and renovation of the hospital is under way.

In another issue, Howell has asked for a discussion of legislative priorities for the state Legislature's session that started last month.

County Manager Tom Stewart has listed the top five priorities for legislative funding as:

- An automatic sprinkler system for New Horizons, a facility for the elderly developmentally disabled in Carrizozo, for \$46,292. A county ambulance is parked at the complex.
- Expansion of the rodeo arena at the fairgrounds in Capitan for \$125,000.

- Purchase of property adjacent to the fairgrounds, and some fencing for \$125,000.

- Improvement to livestock facilities at the fairgrounds for \$200,000, the first priority of the three related projects.

- Gavilan Canyon Road improvements for \$881,897.

The last is a reduction from the \$6 million estimated to be needed to improve and rehabilitate the road after its use as a detour for construction on State Road 48 as ended.

Other items on the agenda include:

- Final acceptance of roads in Ranches of Sonterra subdivision north of Sierra Blanca Airport Road, by Lonnie Phillips, representing Properties of the Southwest.
- Appointments to the county planning commission and the Agriculture and Rural Affairs Committee.
- A discussion of a grievance procedure by Tony Seno, head of the county Libertarian Party.

"To help preserve, enhance and interpret regional history, as well as to foster a love and respect for the fragile past."


Most movie-going Americans almost certainly have built their own image of the American West on the evolving cliché that is Billy the Kid and the Lincoln County War, but the society appropriately contends that all the county's history is worth preserving.

Indeed it is, whether it's the history of mining at White Oaks, apple-growing in the Hondo Valley, political shenanigans in Santa Fe and Washington with roots in Lincoln County, or the way thousands of women coped on a nearly untamed frontier to preserve hearth and home and raise children against tremendous odds.

It's a monumental, endless task, because tomorrow so quickly becomes today and then yesterday—and all our yesterdays are history.

Meanwhile, as the historical society settles in new quarters, archaeologists working in teams along State Road 48 near the intersections of Airport Road and State Road 37 are pushing back the history of indigenous people in our county by hundreds of years by finding and preserving the artifacts that tell of those ancient people's daily lives.

With that, a small proposal:
Wouldn't it be wonderful if those archaeologists could prepare a selected exhibit of artifacts from their current digs to display at the society's new quarters in Carrizozo?

BLACK INK**

What happens when the national media frenzy suddenly flops, when the "juicy story" suddenly folds?

And what makes a "juicy story" juicy anyway?

In the past, the journalistic saying was "If it bleeds, it leads (the newscast, newspaper, etc.)" and in many instances that rings true.

The horrendous wrecks, the incredible violence, the disasters that match par in Biblical terms—it all makes for "great" copy, video clips, etc.

Doesn't it? Actually, showing the blood

and the guts and the gore serves no real purpose.

It inspires nothing but nightmares from those who survived the incident and forces them to relive whatever the tragedy was.

By the same token, however, a great picture can, in a split second, tell what happened, a well-written story can put the reader in the midst of things without really having to, thankfully, participate.

This is unique in the human experience.

We have gotten some calls from readers asking us to reserve Page 1 for some of the more positive news instead of "always being so negative."

The point is well taken that the front page should not always be the harbinger of doom.

The newspaper, including its front page, should, however be an accurate reflection of the community it serves.

And unfortunately, it's not always a bright and sunshiny day. Not even in Ruidoso.

That's why we try to strike a balance with some good news as well as bad news.

The discussion of "positive" and "negative" news reminds me of an editorial cartoon that

showed two generic news stands - one labeled "Good News" and the other labeled "Bad News."

There were stacks and stacks of the "Good News" paper still available but the "Bad News" paper stand was sold out.

And, like it or not, morbid fascination abounds.

But, as far as "good" and "bad" goes, rarely is news really that cut and dried, that black and white. As with the rest of the real world, there usually is

some black and white and tinges of grey mixed in.

And while news may be tinged with grey, the mission of a newspaper should be black and white in its balance, fairness and objectivity.

It's an innate arrogance on the part of journalists that makes them believe readers should take time out of their busy day to peruse the paper.

That same arrogance must be tempered with integrity and an honest effort to serve the newspaper's readership.

Woman, pet dog escape towering fire on Alto mesa

Eighty-foot-high flames consumed most of an 80-year-old ranch home in Alto early Saturday, said the woman living in the house.

Sherry Vanderhyden awoke to flames in the bedroom window, she said. Her dog, Sam, was at the foot of the bed, unconscious from smoke inhalation, and she had to drag him out of the house. Her husband, Tom, returned home from El Paso to see the house in flames.

The home is on High Mesa Road, just north of the Kokopelli golf course and storage units.

The fire apparently started in the living room, where a space heater and a fireplace are located. The cause of the fire has not been determined, said Bob Palko of the Bonito Volunteer Fire Department, fire scene commander.

Flames had engulfed most of the wood house by the time the fire was called in, Palko said.

"I don't know what woke me up," said Sherry Vanderhyden. "Maybe God did. The constable said usually you go to sleep from smoke inhalation."

By the time her husband drove up to see the towering flames, she was already in an ambulance on the way to Lincoln County Medical Center.

Palko said the fire call came in at about 1:49 a.m. Saturday. The fire was brought under control by about 2:30 a.m. and was completely out by 4:30 a.m.

"It was a very intense fire," he said.

Flames from the house spread to ignite a ground fire, accelerated by pine needles and grass, Palko said. The ground fire had started by the time the first firefighter had arrived.

In all, 15 volunteer firefighters showed up at the blaze and were joined by a Ruidoso ambulance crew, he said.

Bonito Volunteer Fire Chief Chris Denne said they requested and received assistance from Capitan because they needed the water in Capitan's tanker.

Firefighter Blue Dutchover said the Vanderhydys are getting bids to have the ruins bulldozed while waiting on insurance papers. Meanwhile, he said, he lent his recreational vehicle to them to stay in temporarily.

The RV is parked next to the burned out shell that was once a home.

"I don't like looking at it," Sherry Vanderhyden said, nodding in the direction of the house.

"I guess we'll rebuild in the same place," her husband said. The house reportedly belongs to his mother.

"We'll go on," Sherry said. "We have to. And we have good friends who are helping out."

P&Z Commission rejects split of lot to create entrance to new duplexes

Adjacent landowners Tuesday called the proposed division of a residential lot a "scheme" for creating an entrance to eight planned duplexes off L. L. Davis Drive in White Mountain Estates.

"It appears to be a common lot scheme," Don Mathews, a nearby property owner, told the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission. "The real reason (for the lot division request) is to enhance the drive of a commercial development."

Planning commissioners

unanimously denied the request following a 90-minute discussion.

"The staff recommended against it and most of the neighbors were against it," said Commissioner Ross Dingman, who made the motion to deny. "And somebody had to do something."

The decision is expected to go before the Ruidoso Village Council on appeal. Cleatus Richards, head of Ruidoso's Planning Department, said the appeal could reach the council as soon as March 9 depending on when it is filed.

The issue centered on

whether lot 57 in the White Mountain Estates Unit 5 subdivision could be divided into two lots. While both of the split up lots would have frontage on L. L. Davis, most of the second would be behind the first, with a small strip extending to L. L. Davis.

That strip was to be turned into an entrance for an adjacent lot where four duplexes are being planned by HBH Investments, a firm owned in part by race track owner R.D. Hubbard. The company intends to develop the lot as the second phase of Peppertree Place, an adjacent complex of

duplexes with an entrance from Racquet Place. The new development is being called Rancho Casitas.

Commission Chair Glen Barrow abstained in voting because he is employed by Hubbard. Commissioner Bill Hirschfeld abstained because he was involved with Hubbard's purchase of the land.

Neighbors of the proposed subdivision didn't object to a request by HBH to rezone the

duplex property to R-3 from R-4, which is for a higher density zoning such as apartments. The commission passed that request quickly.

Armed with a petition containing 20 signatures and a letter from his attorney, Gary Thompson was one of six people to oppose the adjacent lot's division to allow the duplex entrance off L. L. Davis Drive.

"I do not agree with the grand entrance for this condo

complex coming through this lot," Thompson said. "Phase II (of the Peppertree Place) can easily access that from the same driveway as Phase I. There is no reason for lot 57 to be subdivided."

He said it represented a violation of the neighborhood's restrictive covenants as well as violations of village code. HBH Investments also was requesting variances for the code violations.

To which Ruidoso wrestlers and fans reacted with a loud, collective cheer that reached the rafters of the Ruidoso High School gym. The Warriors had achieved their goal: status as District 3AAA runner-up.

"We are so fired up," Ruidoso coach Jerrett Perry said of his team's finish. "We can really see these guys coming around. We're starting to see success."

Seniors Richard Gray (145 pounds) and Jason Leadingham (189 pounds) defended their individual district titles to lead the Warriors. Gray pinned Cobre's Jonathon Quimby in the first period for the 145-pound title. Leadingham then pinned Cobre's Justin Yenter in the first period for Leadingham's second district title.

But it was the performance of seven other Warriors who sealed Ruidoso's second-place finish to district power Cobre.

Cade Hall (125), Steven Schmid (135), Keegan Reidhead (152), Grant Brumlow

(160), Remy Reidhead (215) and Patrick Hodges (Hwt) finished as runners-up in their respective weight divisions.

Add that to eighth-grader Shawn Gurule's third-place finish at 103 and the Warriors posted their best finish since 1985.

"Those performances made the difference," Perry said.

The Warriors will try to ride their wave of momentum into this weekend's Class A-AAA State Wrestling Championships hosted by Kirtland Central High School.

Ruidoso leaves for the six-hour trip to Kirtland Thursday morning. First-round matches begin at Friday afternoon with medal rounds taking place Saturday.

Both Gray and Leadingham should be seeded No. 2 or 3 in their respective divisions for the state meet, Perry said. Hodges and Reidhead could also receive seeding as high as four.

Perry expects that four-some to place at the state meet.


Gray and Leadingham have the most state meet experience among the Warriors. Both were eliminated in the semifinal round last year.

Road construction pace picks up on 70, 48

Road construction on U.S. Highway 70 is to step up this week as work begins on the south lane, a project manager said.

"All the east-bound and west-bound traffic will be moved to the north side of the road," Joe Schulthess, project manager for Meadow Valley Contractors Inc., said Monday. "It should stay that way until approximately the first of May."

Then, he said, construction crews will switch to the north lane and traffic will move to the repaved south lane, he said.

Meadow Valley, hired by the state for the \$7.6 million project of repaving 6.1 miles of the highway, is awaiting final approval from the New Mexico Highway and Transportation Department before beginning work, Schulthess said.

Underground work for storm sewers and light pole electrical systems has already begun along the project, which runs from just east of Sudderth Drive in Ruidoso to where the present four-lane highway becomes two lanes.

The existing pavement will be "milled" (ground up and removed) and new pavement put down. New drainage systems will be put in and new sidewalks will replace old sidewalks for roughly half of the project.

The new sidewalks begin at the project's starting point near Sudderth Drive and continue to just past C&L Lumber, Schulthess said. The sidewalks will resume near Zia Gas Co. and will stop at Spring Street. New street lights, 135 of them, will be installed on both sides of the highway from the start of the project to Spring Street.

A temporary stop light will control traffic at the entrance to the Wal-Mart Super Center during the road work. The speed limit has been dropped to 35 mph. Motorists should expect lower speed limits and traffic delays at times during the work, Schulthess said.

People will still be able to get to businesses on the south side of the street during the work, though some delays may occur when crews are milling the old pavement or putting down the new, he said.

Those interested may attend a weekly meeting between the contractor, state highway officials and Ruidoso Downs representatives, Schulthess said. The meetings are at 2 p.m. every Tuesday at 309 Harris Lane. The project office phone number is 378-1272.

Mechem work to restart

On March 1, road work on the southern section of Mechem Drive will "get geared back up," a project official said this week.

Work on the \$9.4 million-plus project had been partially suspended for the winter but now that suspension is almost over, said Clower, also with Meadow Valley Contractors.

"We are going to be hitting the lower job pretty hard again," Clower said.

Meadow Valley, which has state contracts for a total of four area highway projects, is overseeing the project to widen three miles of Mechem from Sudderth to White Mountain Drive.

The near-in (south) Mechem project started last spring and stopped for the winter shortly before the Christmas holidays.

Blasting continues on north Mechem

Motorists may continue to expect traffic delays on north Mechem from Alto Hill to just past the Gavilan Canyon Road intersection, Clower said.

Blasting crews are working quickly to remove rock in the path of the \$7.6 million project to widen and realign Mechem Drive from White Mountain Drive to Ski Run Road.

A deadline of March 1 will prohibit blasting work along almost all of the road from the Best Western Swiss Chalet to Ski Run Road. Federal law prohibits any work

that may disturb the nesting season of the Mexican Spotted Owl, an endangered species, project officials say.

Clower said some planned blast sites, such as four areas south of Swiss Chalet, may be done after March 1 because they are out of the birds' nesting area.

West 70 project pushed back

An estimated \$8 million state project to expand U.S. 70 Highway to four lanes from Ruidoso to the exit road to the Inn of the Mountain Gods has been delayed, a state project engineer said this week.

The 5-mile project is not now expected to start until late summer at the soonest, Paul Zagone, a technical support engineer with the New Mexico Highway and Transportation Department, said.

"We are still in the process of designing the project from the Inn of the Mountain Gods to Ruidoso," Zagone said. "It is supposed to be let (out for bids) this summer. But I don't know if we are going to make that or not."

More than a mile of the project has had to be redesigned to avoid an old stone house located near the highway, he said.

Redesigns delay Mechem work

Design revisions also are delaying a \$5.8 million state improvement project for four miles of Mechem Drive, or State Road 48, from Ski Run Road to the turn-off to Bonito Lake (State Road 37).

"It's been delayed probably until the end of summer or early fall," Zagone said.

Designers of the project are including additional blasting work that had not been submitted as part of the design by consultants to the state, he said.

"Because some of those hills we are being asked to cut, you just can't cut them without blasting," Zagone said. "They are solid rock slopes."

Like most the other ongoing or pending projects, the work is expected to take two years to complete.

Evolving Mescalero schools slate first school board election

The Mescalero Apache Tribal Council probably will decide who will fill a vacancy on the tribal school board.

Dorlyn Simmons was appointed in January by school board members to fill one of two empty seats. Simmons previously left the board to fill a vacancy on the tribal council until regular elections were conducted and new members were sworn into office in January.

Harry Wheeler Sr., chairman of the school board, notified Tribal President Paul Ortega that the board picked Simmons to take her old seat. However, he asked Ortega to choose someone to take the position left vacant by the resignation of Lola Ahidley, who left in August 1998 to accept a social worker/student counselor post.

School Supt. Gerald Gray said Tuesday the tribal council probably will handle the appointment, but school board elections are scheduled the first Tuesday in June, so appointments will be temporary.

In his letter to Ortega, Wheeler recommended with the backing of his board that the tribal council amend the section of the tribal code dealing with qualifications of school board members. Board members want to add a requirement that all individuals elected to the board

must have children in the Mescalero system.

He also noted that although although the June election date was established in 1996, the late President Wendell Chino extended the terms of members without election in June 1997 and in July 1998.

"He felt they were just learning all about a school system," Wheeler wrote about the 1997 extension.

"For the same reason, President Chino extended the terms again in July 1998," Wheeler wrote.

In a related school issue, Gray said he has contacted federal program offices seeking money that would allow the schools to expand the hours of traditional counselor Joseph Geronimo.


The education committee met Dec. 4 and discussed the program, according to tribal education director John Shendo. He wrote Gray that the committee realizes the program is important and vital to the school system.

"Apparently he is hired to work with students that are exhibiting behavior problems, students that are causing serious disturbances on and at the school," Shendo wrote Gray. "Since the initiation and implementation of this program, the disturbances seem to have quieted down."


Geronimo is paid for 20 hours a week, but the committee recommended Gray try to increase the job to 40 hours.

Murder-incest evidence to determine possibility of trial for Mississippi man

A magistrate judge will decide today whether there is enough evidence to schedule a murder trial in district court for Harry Doyle Monk Jr., a Mississippi man accused of killing a friend to avoid disclosure of his own incest with a daughter.

Mississippi police say that Monk, 50, has a twisted history of incest that led to the murder of Daniel William Van Bemen in a remote area of the Capitan Mountains in November, 1996. The body wasn't discovered until January, 1997, after Monk's son drew a map for investigators.

C. M. Vincent, of the Lauderdale County, Miss. Sheriff's Office, said at the time of Monk's arrest that the accused murderer feared criminal prosecution for the pregnancy of his 15-year-old daughter and he concocted a scheme to blame the pregnancy on his friend, Van Bemen, who lived in Atlanta, Ga.

Monk, his 15-year-old son, Van Bemen, and two other friends, set up a hunting camp near Boy Scouts Mountain,

about 32 miles east of Capitan.

Police say Monk shot Van Bemen in the chest on Nov. 15, and buried him in a shallow grave in a dry stream bed near the campsite.

When he returned home, Monk reported to police that Van Bemen had been having sex with his daughter and that he left the hunting party after meeting a woman in Capitan.

But the criminal complaint filed by New Mexico State Police investigator Richard Williams and the district attorney's office, states that Monk's son, who claims he witnessed the shooting, broke down and told Lauderdale County officials a different story than his father.

On Jan. 3, 1997, Monk admitting the killing, but told police the shooting was accidental, according to the statement.

Monk also is charged with tampering with evidence in connection with the burial of Van Bemen's body, and in Mississippi, with incest against his daughter.

In September, 1997, Monk was transferred to the state hospital in Las Vegas for an evaluation, requested by his attorney, Gary Mitchell.

Corona gets temporary school head; former chief quits post

CORONA - School Superintendent Earl McKinley resigned about Feb. 1, said school secretary Kay Sultemeier.

McKinley resigned for "professional and personal reasons," according to his letter of resignation, Sultemeier said.

Sid Miller, of Ruidoso, will be serving as interim superintendent. The board hasn't met yet to officially hire him, she said.

"The other superintendent had some personal things that he needed to take care of," Miller said. "He's from Oklahoma and will be moving back there with his family."

Miller is from Alto and has been a school superintendent-consultant for some time, he said. He's gone into Animas, Farmington and Dexter school districts and served as interim superintendent, commuting week by week.

"Prior to that I was superintendent in the schools in Ruidoso for eight years," he said.

He's been retired for 10 or 11 years.

Miller will serve the schools in Corona through this school year and will conduct the search for a new superintendent.

"In Corona's case, the superintendent functions also as the principal of the school," he said.

"I had really decided not to do this anymore," Miller said. "But they needed someone and it's not too far from where I live so I decided to help them out a little bit."

SWA OKs emergency hauling plan

Preparing for crises, the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority Tuesday approved a plan to ensure garbage reaches its destination at the regional landfill south of Alamogordo.

For customers, that means their garbage won't pile up in collection bins.

If the garbage transfer station operated by the village of Ruidoso is closed down for repairs or is overburdened with the village's own garbage, the authority could drive its trucks directly to the landfill, said Authority general manager Jerry Wright.

That would cost \$30 to \$40 more than the cost of transport now, he said. Another alternative would be to create an emergency loading site for a large transport trailer.

The authority collects garbage from four of the county's municipalities and from unincorporated areas. Since Ruidoso set up its own collection system last November and took back supervision of the garbage transfer station on Gavilan Canyon Road, the Authority has delivered its garbage at that station.

The fees for using the transfer station are canceled out by the recycling program the Authority provides for Ruidoso.

But Wright said a backup system would ensure garbage collected by the Authority doesn't begin to stack up, if the transfer station is unavailable. He proposed using a site at the old Capitan debris landfill, which is closed, to create a central dumping point onto a trail-

er. The site could handle up to 120 cubic yards of material a day without requiring a special permit, he said.

The trailer to haul large loads could be borrowed from the Northwest Solid Waste Authority in Gallup, but that would entail a two-day delay to obtain it.

The amount of garbage being generated in the county is higher than the average projected by the state Environment Department, Wright said. Each customer is producing 6.5 pounds of garbage per day.

That's two pounds more than the average, he said.

The county is aggressively pursuing new commercial accounts, he said. The customer count for the authority at the end of January was 626 Ruidoso Downs residential customers and 74 commercial, 615 Capitan residential and 40 commercial, 428 Carrizozo residential and 70 commercial, and 3,438 county residential and 77 commercial.

In other business, the board:

- Approved a provision for proxy voting that allows a member to give his/her vote proxy to another Authority member or to a representative of the government entity the absent member represents. The proxy will be valid for up to 12 months after date of issue.

- Agreed with a per diem reimbursement policy that must be approved by each government member of the authority before being approved by the governing board.

Although the employee has the option of turning in actual

expenses, the regular per diem reimbursement would be \$60 per day for in-state travel, except for special areas like Taos, Santa Fe and Los Alamos, which is \$75 a day. Out-of-state travel would be reimbursed at \$75 per day except for special areas like San Francisco, Calif., anywhere in Alaska and New York City, where it's \$95. Out-of-country travel is \$95 per day. The policy also covered partial day travel, requirements for receipts and use of privately owned vehicles.

- Heard Wright report on the relocation of some of the authority's dumpsters and the drawing up of specifications for side-loading trucks that should go to bid in the next two weeks.

- Were told that a representative of the district attorney's office is meeting with Fred Bennett of the state Environment Department to discuss what can be done about illegal dumping under state law.

- Heard from Wright that the weekend roll-off container special collection project is a success. The container placed in Ruidoso Downs last Saturday filled up in 1 1/2 hours while one stationed at the Tully Ranch in Glencoe took all day to fill.

Cynthia Morales said the town of Carrizozo has a problem with the roll-off stationed permanently there, because it is not always open on the weekends.

"This has been going on for too long," Morales said. "We need another man out there to open it to the public more than once a week."

Bonita Dam Hearing Feb. 21

Bay Bell, Game Warden in Capitan, N.M., reported this week that the date of February 21 had been set for a hearing to discuss the closing of the Bonita Dam to the public. The State Game Warden, Elliott S. Barker, said the dam, between Capitan and Ruidoso, has been closed to the public by the Southern Pacific Railroad.

A number of people in Southeastern New Mexico are seeking to open this area for fishing. This entire area will anxiously be awaiting the results of the hearing.

Weird winter weather forces plants to ponder:

'To grow or not to grow ...'

Signs that Ruidoso was in for strange winter broke ground in November when spring bulbs sprouted months before they were supposed to crack the surface.

Longtime Ruidosoan Francis Williams' forsythia has thrice budded out, only to nipped back by cold temperatures.

Sandra Byars' shrubs had the same, root-chilling experience. Byars, who describes gardening as her "passion," adds, "I've got a lot of daffodils coming up."

It's only mid-February. What's going here?

Try horticultural confusion to the max.

"Stuff is trying to come out too soon," Byars says. "It kind of worries me because a lot of times it will kill the younger plants."

Gardeners can point fingers at La Niña which has blown in a mild, dry winter to the Southwest. Snowpack along a 10,280-foot ridge that separates the drainage of Rio Ruidoso and the Rio Bonito measured 10 inches less than last year. Snowpack and its moisture level dictate the flow of rivers and water availability for the area.

"With it this dry, you better be watering," warns Williams, a nursery specialist. "Just because it's cold, they still need water."

Blue spruces and evergreens need a dose of water to quench their thirsts.

Lawns should be watered every three weeks, then every two weeks as the days get warmer and the grass greens. Hold off on fertilizing the lawn until late spring.

Whatever you do, don't let the mild temperatures fool

you, warns Byars, who expects Mother Nature to deliver some more harsh freezes and snows before winter is done.

"We've had some hard freezes," Byars said. "We've been down in single digits, but we haven't had any long, cold spells."

If gardeners haven't already, Byars suggests they take time to protect their young trees, newly established shrubs and roses from the wind and the cold. They can do that by posting stakes and wrapping burlap around the plants.

"It reduces your moisture loss," Byars explains. "Part of the problem we have up here is the wind - it freeze dries plants."

"Roses get freeze-dried even when they're older," Byars says.


As long as perennials are well mulched, they should be OK. "Mulching helps hold that moisture in," says Byars, who uses pine needles instead of bark chips as mulch.

Some gardeners might use this time to turn over flower beds, or amend the soil by adding compost or manure, but Byars that could result in a Catch 22 for gardeners.

Recent articles suggest the less you turn over the soil, the less you have to worry about weeds later on, Byars says.

Whatever you decide, watering remains an important part of the gardening routine in the winter. The more moisture the plants have in the winter the better off they'll be in the spring when Ruidoso's seasonal winds kick up.

As for those daffodils and crocus bulbs that are already four inches above ground - well, they're hardy souls, confused but hardy.



A new read for New Mexico's gardeners

Judith Phillips knows all about the challenges of growing plants in the varying landscapes of the state.

She and her husband, Roland, have operated the Bernardo Beach Native Plant Farm in Veguita since 1980, and Judith has designed more than 600 residential landscapes statewide. She also designed the visitor's center habitat garden at the Bosque del Apache National Wildlife Refuge near Socorro.

The 25-year veteran of New Mexico horticulture has written her fourth book on the subject, and her most recent effort, "New Mexico Gardener's Guide," offers those with a green thumb, or

wishing for a green thumb, practical advice about which plants to choose for a particular region.

Phillips' book provides general information about which plants will thrive and where, regardless whether you live on the plains, in the high desert or in the mountains. In the 424-page book, Phillips references plants by the region in which they grow, their common names and botanical names. A full-color section includes photographs of plants featured in the guide.

Chapter subjects include: annuals and biennials; bulbs, corms and rhizomes; cacti and succulents; ground-

covers; ornamental grasses; perennials; roses; shrubs; trees; turfgrasses; and vines.

"The book offers information that is specific to the state and can aid all gardeners, whether starting a new garden or reworking their garden to be more water efficient," Phillips said.

Phillips' three other books are titled, "Southwest Landscaping with Native Plants," "Natural By Design" and "Plants for Natural Gardens."

"New Mexico Gardener's Guide" is published by Cool Springs Press and is available for \$19.95 in bookstores and garden centers.



AmeriCorps invades Hondo with goodwill and good deeds

Nine AmeriCorps volunteers are sleeping on cots in the multipurpose room of Hondo Valley School and living things up in the community.

The nine young people, ages 18-24, come from all over the country and are working on their second 8-week project with AmeriCorps-National Civilian Community Corps (NCCC), a 10-month residential national service program.

Volunteers receive \$4,725 toward their education in exchange for full-time service. The organization or community that receives the services provides team members with room and board.

In the case of Hondo, that has meant cots in the multipurpose room at the school, which the volunteers say they find cozy because there is a kitchen and a library close at hand.

Monday through Thursday the team works at the Hondo schools, and on Friday they renovate Lincoln's community church.

Rhonda Huddleston, the media representative for the group, said the team works on different projects in the schools, including tutoring, mentoring, reading projects, and school gardening.

Huddleston described a reading project in which the volunteers train high school students to work with elementary students.

"We're basically starting the program and finding point peo-

ple to take over the project after we leave," she said.

Jack Nelson, the school counselor, librarian and district test coordinator, is teaching the volunteers to do reading assessments, paired reading techniques, and phonics. The group will then teach the high school students so they can take over.

Nelson said they are making a "big difference" in the Hondo school, and students, teachers

and community members receive them well.

"They're a great bunch of kids," Nelson said. "They're very mature students that have decided to volunteer a certain part of their life to improve the welfare of other people in different communities."

Superintendent of Schools Barbara Casey said the school received money through the Department of Health's Health-

ier Kids Fund. One component provided for someone to work with the district to promote health education. Another component included a segment of volunteerism, building self-esteem and self-pride, Casey said.

The school hired Ted Allen, who has had experience working with other youth corps. He applied to NCCC, his proposal was accepted, and the team

arrived Jan. 18.

"The kids love them," Casey said. "The community loves them. I love them. They're enthusiastic... they're teaching (students) about public service, volunteerism."

These volunteers include Emily Rosenzweig, who goes to the teachers and finds projects for the team to work on.

Angel Podraza, also a volunteer, and Huddleston involve students in the "Eagle Pride Project," which helps beautify the school. In the project, each class takes control of one plot of land around the school, clears and landscapes it, adding trees and flowers.

NCCC members Jeffrey Palmer and David Purdy started an art club for elementary through high school students and hope to do a mural in the school.

Amanda Schuber and Beth McRoy work with reading and mentoring programs.

Rosenzweig's projects are tutoring and renovating the home economics room, which wasn't in use.

"We repainted it," Huddleston said. "We fixed it up so they could start a class there next quarter."

On Fridays, the team works with architect Reg Richie to renovate the Lincoln community church in order to make it usable as possibly a community center. Allen said he chose this project for them because it would make them visible and he hopes others will form a permanent youth corps in Lincoln County.

The team is half way

through the 8-week stint in Lincoln County, and will go back to Denver to prepare for other projects elsewhere. Huddleston said they won't be sent to do anything they already have experience in, although they will be trained.

Before coming to Hondo, the team worked in Wichita, Kan., restoring houses for chronically ill people, weatherizing, and fixing windows.

The team received training in first aid, disaster relief from the Red Cross, and team training. Four of the members also are schooled in forest firefighting, and two of them in family services for disaster relief.

Huddleston and another team-mate were sent to San Antonio to work in flood relief at the end of October, while the rest of the team worked on a flood in Wichita, Kan.

Casey said she and Allen plan to apply to AmeriCorps for another team to come to the school and take over where this group will leave off.

"It's having a very positive impact," she said. "They bring with them a very different perspective about the world outside of Hondo. Many of our students have not had a chance to learn about other places and cultures."

Casey said the school will have a "really tough time letting them go when it's time for the volunteers to leave."

"Especially the younger kids," she said. "They call them the 'Americans' - from 'AmeriCorps' - and they really love them."

"He enlightens not only those students around him but also me, as his math teacher," said Rosalinda Baeza.


Malcolm Comanche, the son of Josephine Guerera, "turned his life around," and got serious about his education, said his teacher Henry Roberts.

The Mini Page talked to tiger expert Dr. John Seldensticker, curator of mammals, National Zoological Park, Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D.C. Dr. Seldensticker is also chairman of the Save the Tiger Fund Council.

The Save the Tiger Fund was formed by the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation in partnership with corporate and individual donors to try to save this endangered animal.

One hundred years ago, there were about 100,000 tigers in the world. Today only 5,000 to 7,000 are left. We don't know exactly how many are still living. This beautiful animal is endangered.

This means tigers could disappear forever if things keep going the way they are. All wild cats are in trouble. Of the 36 types, or species, of cats living today, the

only type doing well is the domestic cat.

Tiger tales

Scientists have found tiger fossils from 2 million years ago. Before World War II there were eight kinds of tigers. Today, three of these are extinct because of hunters or people who destroyed tiger habitat.

The tiger is the biggest type of cat on Earth. The only other giant cat is the lion. These two great cats are four times bigger than the next class of cats, which includes cheetahs and mountain lions.

Tiger bodies

- Parts of a tiger's body that make it a great hunter include:
- stripes for camouflage in tall grasses or forests;
 - powerful front legs for grabbing large prey;
 - strong back legs for running and jumping;
 - tails to help them balance;
 - sharp teeth for biting prey;
 - eyes that see well at night.


Cubs

Only two out of every 10 tiger cubs live to be adults. Even though tigers are big and powerful as adults, they are very vulnerable when they are cubs.


They are in danger from people, fire, and animals such as hyenas, cobras or wild pigs. Even porcupines are very scary to a cub. If it is stuck in the paws or mouth with 12-inch-long porcupine quills, it will probably die a painful death.

A male tiger other than the father will kill any cubs it can.

Tiger cubs must have their mother's care until they are between 18 months to 2 years old.

Tiger Territory

Room to live

The key to saving tigers is saving their land. Today, tigers are spread through about 160 areas, or habitats. Right now there are only about 30 to 40 adult tigers in each area. This is not healthy. Experts say a group cannot survive long if there are not at least 50 reproducing females in one habitat. To be truly healthy, a group needs a total of 400 to 500 tigers. If the group is too small, it can easily be wiped out by disease and natural disasters. Few of the tiger habitats today are big enough to hold a healthy tiger population.

Wild tigers live only in Asia. The darkened areas show tiger habitat today.

Tracking tigers

It is hard to know exactly how many tigers are in an area. They are very good at hiding. In Russia, experts have succeeded in getting a good tiger count by following tracks in the snow. But most tigers do not leave tracks where they walk. They live in forested areas or in the middle of grasses as tall as 20 feet. They are hard to spot because a tiger's stripes help it blend in with the grass and trees. People are trying to keep track of tigers with radio collars or special cameras hidden in bushes or grasses.

Room to roam alone

Tigers need privacy. They need their own space. Females live alone or with their cubs. Males live alone. They do not help care for the cubs, but they do keep other male tigers away from the female and her young. The male and female might never see each other except to mate. They leave scent trails for one another, so they can recognize each other, their neighbors and strangers.

Room to hunt

Tigers are carnivores, or animals that eat only meat. On land, tigers and lions are at the top of the food chain. They need to hunt and eat large animals in order to survive. A 570-pound tiger might bring down prey weighing 2,200 pounds. Tigers not only need land for themselves, but there must also be enough land for their prey to live on. Their main prey, wild pigs and deer, are killed by hunters or die when people move in and take over their habitats. When this happens, the tigers starve.

Threats to tigers

The Save the Tiger Fund and other environmental groups are working to protect this great cat. They are:

- working to convince people to use medicines not made of tiger parts. Today a big threat to tigers is people who kill them to make traditional Chinese medicines.
- teaching people how tigers can be more valuable alive than dead.
- paying farmers for livestock that tigers have killed.

Adult tigers can go 10 days without food, but cubs need food much more often. The mother has to hunt and kill large, dangerous animals every five to six days. Tiger moms do not do well when they are bothered by people. Tiger moms and cubs need a lot of territory to survive in the wild.

People living near tiger lands might make a good profit by taking tourists to see tigers in the wild.

'That Place' is the place for youth

The new teen center located on north Mechem has been designed by teens for teens, organizers say.

Magic markers in hand, four teen-age boys were busy Saturday afternoon writing messages and drawing on a wall at a local business.

"We are just adding our little touches to the wall," Tony Clawson, 15, of Ruidoso, said.

Rather than illegal artists, Clawson and his friends were at work on the "graffiti wall" located just inside That Place, the Ruidoso teen center at 1214 Mechem Drive that officially opened Saturday afternoon.

Filled with youth-oriented amenities and activities, the 8,700-square-foot center has been several months in development at a former restaurant/nightclub location. Support as well as donations from individuals and businesses alike have been plentiful, generous and appreciated, owner Judy Stone said.


Teens and preteens entering the establishment can enjoy a snack bar where the menu items cost \$2 or less. They can play pool, check out the offerings at a small store, challenge a video game, relax in the quiet and sun-filled "Thoughtful Place" or enjoy a dance on Friday nights (for middle school students) and Saturday nights (for high school students).

Things had been "crazy, just crazy" leading up to the grand opening, Stone said. Even before the opening, That Place has been the site of several birthday parties and youth gatherings, she said.

"The other night, we had 15 kids on ladders and all at the graffiti wall," she said. "And they just love it. When it gets full, we'll just paint over it and start over."

"We had a party here the other night and had 70 kids here. They all just kept saying how good it felt and that their parents won't have to worry about where they go."

No drugs are allowed and no gang members, she said. Security will be provided for both inside and outside of the center. Because the center has a history of being a night club, Stone acknowledged that some adults may walk into the establishment by mistake.

That Place offers arcade games as well as other recreational opportunities.

"We are looking at a three-month switchover to let people know what kind of place this is," Stone said.

Sue Hooper was one of the parents checking the teen center out Saturday with her children.

"I think it's great," Hooper said, standing next to the video game played by her son Chance, 13. "They are just now getting to an age where they can appreciate something like this... We have a 19-year-old daughter and she didn't have something like this."

While the idea for a teen center has been discussed and attempted previously, "No one's ever gone this far before," Hooper said.

Stone and organizers first started by surveying 1,600 to 2,000 teens about whether they wanted a teen center. Next, the center's offerings were based on recommendations from a teen advisory group. And more amenities are planned for the center, such as a basketball court, a sand "beach" for volleyball and a skateboard area, Stone said.

Contributing more than ideas, teens have put work into the center as well.

For instance, a trio of young men made the center's

glittering sign out front announcing "That Place." Even the name of the center was the brainchild of a group of teens, Stone said.

She said teens discussing a name suggested "That Place" because it would probably end up being referred to as that name anyways — along the lines of, "Let's go to that place."

"I heard that in this one place they called the teen center The Library so they could tell their parents they were going to library," Stone said. "I think that's so funny."

Students bring new life to old building

For Jennifer Shendo, opening the doors of the new Mescalero Dry Goods Store Friday meant that nearly a year-long effort to start a new business on the Mescalero Apache Reservation finally succeeded.

Libby Williams of the Small Business Development Center of New Mexico State University credited Shendo's tenacity with ensuring that a previously unused building was remodeled, stocked and financed with the center's help.

Shendo's multiple aims include selling the type of clothing and boots required for forestry workers at a much more affordable price than typically found in catalogs, as well as to provide employment, a project for the tribe's vocational-education students, and a new business for the community, she said.

Under the direction of vocational education supervisor Frank Buchler, who grilled hot dogs during the opening ceremonies handled by tribal council member Harlyn Geronimo, students remodeled the interior of the former laundromat to showcase the jackets, sweaters, T-

shirts, hats, socks, gloves and boots bearing the Carhartt and Key brands.

"I picked out everything and they put it together," said Shendo, who will be assisted at the store by Ruby Morgan from the vocational education program.

Dwight Harp of the small business center said Williams and Shendo worked hard on the project.

"They've been working on it for a long time," he

said. "If not for them, this still would be an old broken down unused laundromat."

No tribal money was used in starting the store, Williams said. While enjoying hot dogs and cold cut sandwiches, visitors were treated to performances of the Apache War Dance by elementary students.

Store hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday.





POOP SCOOP

The New Mexico Legislature is discussing a change of law to increase the penalty for animal abuse from a misdemeanor to a felony.

Animal lovers need to get behind the effort and contact State Rep. Dub Williams or circulate petitions in favor of the move. They are available at Dot's Pets, Ruidoso Office Supply and from animal control officers.

The animal protection group in Albuquerque coordinating the push for passage sent a copy of an interview with Alan Brantley, FBI Supervisory Special Agent published by the Humane Society of the United States.

Brantley said in the mid-1980s, the National Center for the Analysis of Violent Crime was founded with the aim of identifying and tracking serial killers, but also was asked to look at any violent crime that was particularly vicious, unusual or repetitive. That's where a great deal of the research emerged that tied together cruelty and abuse of animals early in life to later violence against humans as an adult.

"A lot of what we do is threat assessment," Brantley said, which includes collecting background information about a per-

son. "Something we believe is prominently displayed in the histories of people who are habitually violent is animal abuse," he said. "We not only look for a history of animal abuse and torment or torture, but also for childhood or adolescent acts of violence toward other children, and possibly adults."

Sometimes the violence is symbolic, carving up stuffed animals or pictures of animals, but it's risk indicator, Brantley said. "You can look at cruelty to animals and cruelty to humans as a continuum," he said. "We first see people begin to fantasize about these violent actions."

Then they may act them out against inanimate objects or the thoughts may show up in drawings or writings, he said. The next phase usually is acting out against animals.

The FBI began to quantify the connection with research in the late 1970s, with 36 multiple murderers, he said.

Because juvenile police records usually are not available to help identify high risk individuals, the agency welcomes input on animal mutilations or violence from animal cruelty investigators.

During the summer of 1941, 300 young American men and women secretly trained in the jungles of Southeast Asia, preparing to face the Japanese Air Force in combat over the skies of China and Burma. "Battle Alert in the Gulf"

Nova takes a tour of duty aboard a US Navy carrier battle group on patrol in the Persian Gulf, in "Battle Alert in the Gulf." Covering operations with the *USS Independence* and the *Stennis*, their warplanes, support ships, and subs, Nova shows what it's like to enforce UN sanctions against Iraq. Nova follows around-the-clock activities on the carrier flight decks and inside the cockpits of FA-18 "Hornet" strike aircraft, and radar-jamming EA-6B "Prowlers" on patrol in the no-fly zone over Iraq. Nova also goes on sentry duty with the guided missile cruiser *McCain* to hunt down smugglers who are continually active in the area.

A carrier battle group is a flexible, formidable fighting force centered on the world's largest warship, a US Navy aircraft carrier, supported by a mix of other vessels, typically two cruisers, two destroyers, two submarines, and a combined ammunition, oiler, and supply ship. Conceived in World War II, the carrier battle group was instrumental in winning the war against Japan and has been a keystone of US naval strategy ever since. Yet in the Persian Gulf, the battle group is largely out of its element, squeezed into a body of water that is too narrow, too shallow, and too congested.

"Battle Alert in the Gulf" on Nova will air Tuesday, February 23rd at 7:00 p.m. Nova repeats Saturdays at 9:00 p.m. and Sundays at 12:00 midnight.

Lauren Bacall brings tragic heiress Duke to life

She inherited a \$100 million fortune at the age of 12, reportedly spied for the OSS during World War II, married several men (including a legendary Latin lover and a Hawaiian Olympic champion) and died in her mansion without friends and family, possibly at the hands of her butler.

What sounds like the dubious plot of a romance novel is, in fact, the true life story of tobacco heiress Doris Duke, who died under mysterious circumstances in 1993. Duke is brought to life again by Hollywood nobility - actress Lauren Bacall - in *Too Rich: The Secret Life of Doris Duke*.

The two-part TV movie airs Sunday, Feb. 21, and Tuesday, Feb. 23, on CBS.

The dramatic retelling of Duke's life is done via a deathbed flashback.

We see self-made man Buck Duke (powerfully played by Joe Don Baker) instill in his daughter a distrust of others that will haunt her to her dying day.

We also meet young Doris' uninvolved mother, Nanaline (Kathleen Quinlan), whose neglect will lead to Duke's lifelong unrequited search for acceptance and love.

It was the irony of Duke's story, in part, that led Bacall to choose the role.

"She had a very isolated and sad life," Bacall explains. "She had all this money, and she still couldn't buy what she wanted. (With too much money,) suddenly you become much more demanding."

As the story unfolds, Duke repeatedly seeks comfort, love and approval from the men least likely to provide it, including notorious Latin lover and ladies man Porfirio Rubirosa (Michael Nouri) and Hawaiian Olympian Duke Kahanamoku, with whom she had a daughter who died at birth.

"They were all interested in her money. And that obviously affected her," Bacall says. "Our backgrounds stay with us for the rest of our lives."

Duke's misfortunes make for scintillating viewing and a meaty role for the

73-year-old actress - a rarity in Hollywood these days, according to Bacall.

"It's not easy to find good material," she laments. "There are a hell of a lot of good actresses, and many of them have been looking for parts to play for many years. I find it extraordinary that they are not writing a lot of (good) parts for women."

The opportunity to work with a first-rate cast, including Emmy Award winner Richard Chamberlain, who plays butler Bernard Lafferty, and Brian Dennehy, who portrays Louis Bromfield, Duke's one true love, also served as an enticement, she adds.

While Bacall once may have crossed paths with Duke, who numbered among her friends Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, Truman Capote, Errol Flynn, Andy Warhol and Imelda Marcos, it was something entirely different for the actress to assume Duke's persona for the length of the shoot.

"It's very strange to play someone for three months," she says. "You begin to kind of take on the aura of that person. ... It's weird, but that person is very much there."

What would Bacall like viewers to take away after four hours with her heiress?

"I hope people have a sense of the life of Doris Duke," she says. "Money is what many of us want, but too much of it is destructive. I hope people understand what she went through."

That '70s Show addresses thorny issue of teen sex

Before its debut last fall, the writers of Fox's *That '70s Show* took hits from critics for allowing their characters to smoke marijuana while portraying the group to be conservative about sexual activity.

Well, that criticism doesn't apply anymore. In an episode titled "The Pill," airing Sunday, Feb. 21, the show's two young female leads face the consequences of sexual activity.

The show opens with bracing news: 15-year-old Jackie Burkhardt (Mila Kunis) is pregnant. It seems she received some bad advice from her cousin about the rhythm method of birth control.

Jackie's schoolmate Donna Pinciotti (Laura Prepon) decides a fate is not for her. While she and her boyfriend Eric (Topher Grace) remain virgins, she shares her worries about their relationship with her mother, Midge (Tanya Roberts), herself pregnant at 16.

Linda Wallem, co-executive producer and the episode's writer, describes this as a full-blown mother-daughter talk.

"The mother went through the same thing, but she didn't have the same options. She wants to help her daughter," Wallem says. "That was the point I wanted to make in the episode: Talk about it before it's too late."

Apparently, very little of their talk made it to the screen. The next thing viewers know, Donna is taking birth-control pills.

"I don't think (Donna and Eric) are going to have sex for a long time, if I have my druthers," Wallem adds, because, as she has Donna say, "sex changes everything."

Eric's father, Red (Kurtwood Smith), is the only character to advocate abstinence — and this is played strictly for laughs.

What's wrong with abstinence?

"In theory that's a good idea," Wallem says, "but I don't know if that's always gonna happen. I wish women knew that that was more of a choice."

Overall, there are too many jokes for an episode on such a serious subject. At least parents can help make one thing clear: In real life, problems like Jackie's aren't resolved in 22 minutes.

What Does Medicare Cover?

Medicare will also cover services for medical eye problems such as blurred vision, clouding, spots or flashes of light, glaucoma, cataracts, macular degeneration, eye injuries, eye pain, eye infections and other eye disease. Medicare will cover 80% of the cataract surgery and one pair only of glasses after cataract surgery. Medicare will not cover routine vision analysis, eye-glasses or contact lenses not related to cataract surgery.

At the Family Vision Center our doctors treat eye conditions as well as diagnose them. Medicare also approves these expenses. If you have any questions about what eye health expenses Medicare will cover just call us at 257-5029 and we will be happy to discuss them.
