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# Budget could close Fort Stanton prison

If New Mexico's state budget passes as amended by the House of Representatives, it would force Fort Stanton to close as a women's prison, says State Sen. Pete Campos.

The Santa Rosa Democrat, who represents Lincoln County, said Tuesday he thought residents should know about the provisions in the budget that would move women prisoners from the minimum security prison 12 miles northeast of Ruidoso and from a prison in Grants, to a penitentiary in Santa Fe.

The fort served as a state hospital for decades before Gov. Gary Johnson closed it in March 1995. The closure four years ago was an economic blow to the Capitan area, but the town

and school district continued to thrive, and more than two years ago, the fort reopened — this time as a minimum security prison for women.

The proposal, which Campos said could become a reality unless Johnson rejects the budget, caught local officials by surprise.

Van Shamblin, who heads Fort Stanton Inc., a group promoting the transition of the historic fort into a living museum, said Tuesday, "I don't know why they can't see the possibilities of what the fort could become as far as tourism and cultural heritage is concerned."

"All they can think about (there) is prisons," Capitan School Supt. Diana Billingsley said she hadn't heard a word about a second closing of the fort.

"My first thought is how many families do we have working out there with children in our

school system," Billingsley said. "I'm going to have to evaluate that."

Sheriff Tom Sullivan said he has an appointment today with the new acting warden at the fort, Lupe Martinez Marshall, previously associate warden for the minimum restrict unit at the state prison in Las Cruces.

"She's only to be there for a couple of months," he said. "But I've heard nothing about the fort closing."

County Commission Chairman Rex Wilson said he also didn't know anything about the possible closing, although he said he was under the impression it could be shut down by the Department of Corrections at any time.

Initially the use of the fort as a prison was to last two years with the inmates contributing their labor to the restoration of buildings.

During that period, the museum advocates hoped to line up support for their proposal.

Speaking through Mike Toms, public information officer for the state Department of Corrections, Secretary Rob Perry said he's in a "wait and see" mode.

Although Fort Stanton has its economic drawbacks — too far from population centers and too few inmates to be cost-effective — he would like the prison to continue there.

"He said nothing is really solid at this point," Toms said. "The budget is up in the air. He'd like to continue things the way they are, but he doesn't know if that will happen. There are a lot of proposals out there and everything is pretty frantic trying to finish up (the state Legislative

## Bill proposal could raise property tax

What voters thought they were approving in passing a state constitutional amendment on property taxes last November may not be what they get, says the chairman of the Lincoln County Commission.

What has emerged in legislation submitted by State Rep. Ben Lujan, a Democrat from Santa Fe, is not what was proposed in local hearings or suggested in the amendment, says Rex Wilson.

If passed, the law would not allow counties to vote on whether to change their approaches to setting property tax values, although a county option was mentioned in the amendment language, he pointed out Tuesday.

The bill would establish a statewide averaging of property values for tax purposes with annual increases by index and it would require anyone who bought property to disclose the purchase price.

"I don't feel good about a statewide index at all," Wilson said. "And when I say this, I'm thinking of the more rural, less urban residential properties. I think their taxes have the potential to go up dramatically while the more exclusive Santa Fe-type properties will come down at the expense of those smaller rural properties."

"I think it flies in the face of what the whole constitutional amendment was sold on and that was that lower income families who hold properties shouldn't have to pay higher taxes to keep up with escalating property values."

The bill passed the Senate Ways and Means Committee Tuesday and Wilson expected it to hit the Senate floor today.

In an analysis submitted by the state Taxation and Revenue Department, Secretary John J. Chavez said the bill titled "Limiting Increases in Residential Property Values" would change the method by which residential properties are assessed for tax purposes in the state.

"All residential property values would be increased annually by a fixed percentage change approximating the statewide average change in existing home prices," he wrote. The percentage of change would be determined by a federal housing price index reflecting

## Forest Service, Ruidoso, T-N.M. Power Co. team up Osprey nest installed at Grindstone

Although osprey often visit Lincoln County, local foresters say they migrate toward large bodies of water when it's time to mate and raise their offspring.

Larry Cordova with the U.S. Forest Service's Smokey Bear Ranger District in Ruidoso wants to change that scenario with the help of a crew from Texas-New Mexico Power Co. and the cooperation of the village of Ruidoso.

An artificial 4.5x3.5-foot nesting platform was attached to the top of a pine tree Tuesday within view of Grindstone Lake, the village's reservoir, in an effort to entice a mating couple of osprey to settled down and raise their young when they fly in next month.

"I started putting these up in Washington State and they worked great," Cordova said. "The first one was occupied a year after it was installed."

"I've wanted to do this for the last

few years, but you need certified climbers. Someone suggested why not get a person all ready qualified and do a cooperative project, so I called Charlie Moore (from the power company) and he said it was a great idea."

Cordova, a wildlife biologist, picked a tree that would be a good for a mating pair. But when lineman Troy Parker was raised near its top in a bucket at the end of a hydraulic lift, he could barely see the lake. Another sturdy tree was picked out, but instead of being on Forest Service land, it was about 10 feet inside the village limits.

No problem, said Rafael "Rifle" Salas, village parks and recreation director. The village wants to encourage the successful survival of area wildlife and already has created a bird sanctuary at Wingfield Park.

"This would fit in well with that effort," he said, after checking the tree chosen as the best candidate for the nesting platform.

With Salas's approval, Parker took

a chain saw and topped the tree, then bolted the screen and wood platform in place, as well as securing it with guy wires. After a bit of limb trimming to give the birds a good view of the lake where they will fish for their meals — still leaving lateral branches for perching and landing — the job was finished.

If the experiment is successful, signs probably will be posted to alert hikers not to disturb the birds, Cordova said.

"Osprey normally don't nest in southern New Mexico, because they need large bodies of water to feed on fish," he said. "They actually dive for the fish. They're considered a sensitive species of concern and we're trying to make sure they are not listed down the road as threatened or endangered."

Osprey are spotted nesting along the Rio Grande and visit Grindstone and Bonito lakes, so Cordova doesn't think it's necessarily a stretch that a pair might stay to nest in Ruidoso. One year, some younger birds built a practice nest at Grindstone, but only stayed a few weeks, then continued on their mi-

## Girl dies in accident at Ski Apache

A 16-year-old girl, who was just learning to ski, died Sunday after running off a trail and hitting a tree at Ski Apache.

Ashley Fendley was skiing with her father and a younger sister on Sierra Blanca Trail, which is not designed for beginning skiers, when the accident occurred at 3:05 p.m., said New Mexico State Police Officer Steve Standridge.

She died at the scene from massive head injuries, according to Danny Sisson, the local representative of the Office of the State Medical Examiner.

Roy Parker, who manages the ski resort, said ski patrol members were at the girl's side within minutes of the incident.

"She was a first-time beginner and she was on a green trail, which is not for beginners," Parker said. "The upper mountain has no first-time beginner trails. She started on skis at 1 p.m. and the accident occurred at 3 p.m."

"I don't understand why they do this. We offer the first-time beginner a lesson in the price of the ski lift ticket. Why they don't take advantage of that, I have no idea, but they think they're going to teach them themselves and we have this happen. Fortunately, most (incidents) don't end in tragedy, but (they can end) in unhappiness for the skier, and sometimes injury."

The girl belonged in the lower area where the resort has two beginner lifts, Parker said.

A ski patrol member on a ski lift passed over the girl right after the accident, Parker said.

"It took another minute or two until he got to the top, then he skied down and radioed the patrol for the necessary equipment and started working on her," Parker said. "There are patrols spread out all over the mountain and they all have radios. They were there right away. It appears it was extremely serious right from the beginning. They worked on her for a long time, but it was fruitless. The injury was very severe."

A local doctor, Ron Annala, and a physician from Las Cruces who was skiing, were at the patrol office when the girl was brought down, he said.

"She couldn't control it," Parker said of the girl's inability to stay on the trail. "She didn't know how to ski. It's as simple as that. There are no secrets here. There's nothing the (ski) area or anybody else could do, if they insist on doing this as beginners. It's like going out to the middle of a lake to learn how to swim."


### March phases of the moon

# Ruidoso gears up for the 'unknown' of Y2K

This first of a series on Y2K takes a look at how the village of Ruidoso is preparing its computers for the year 2000.

When budget time rolls around this year, the village of Ruidoso will probably stash about \$50,000 for Y2K contingencies, Village Manager Alan Briley said.

"And we are going to be budgeting a substantial amount, about \$5,000, for each department," Briley said.

Preparing for the unknown is just one aspect of being ready for Jan. 1, 2000, when computer systems and digital equipment that cannot process the number 2000 as a year date may malfunction. Across the nation, millions of dollars are being spent to upgrade systems and equipment for everything from a fast food restaurant cash register to regional electrical power grids.

As a municipality, Ruidoso has been "just inundated with a tremendous amount of paperwork," from municipal leagues and other entities on what to do to ensure Jan. 1, 2000 is no different than Dec. 31, 1999, Briley said.

Personally, he doesn't expect any huge problems for the village or its residents to result on Jan. 1, 2000.

Even so, the village is preparing for the day as if it were an emergency situation, Briley said.

Since January, he has scheduled bimonthly meetings with his department heads on the Y2K problem.

"I have empowered every department director as my Y2K committee, and I am the chairman of it," Briley said. "I have assigned each one of them various aspects of village life, such as utilities and computers, that they need to be responsible for and check for the village overall."

Within their departments, they are responsible for contacting each of the vendors they use to make sure the vendors are Y2K ready as well, he said.

"To make sure all their equipment will work, all their pumps will work, all their lights will work — to get verification from all the vendors that

they are going to be working."

Companies that do business with the village are being asked to provide letters of guarantee that they have upgraded for Y2K, Briley added.

"And I have the finance (department) checking with all of the banks and all of our investments to make sure they are Y2K compatible," Briley said. "The water department; they are checking on all the pumps, and all the things related to water, to make sure water is going to be running."

Ruidoso itself has in recent months completed an upgrade of its main computer software system to be Y2K compatible, Lorri McKnight, finance director, said. That computer handles most village operations such as billing functions, taxes and payroll.

"Oh we'll have everything done in time," Briley said. "The biggest concern is the utilities ... The second big thing is our finances. We will need to make sure all our deposits are up to date."

Concern from residents about the village's Y2K compatibility has been minimal, so far, Briley said. "But I have received numerous questionnaires from vendors saying what are you doing (to be prepared.)"

Thomas Chavez, Ruidoso's emergency coordinator, said the village has two generators now that can be used at emergency shelters in case electrical power is lost. If it is, the village will go into the updated emergency plan approved by the Ruidoso Village Council in December.

"We also have a power company (Texas-New Mexico Power Company) that could help us out with (extra generators) if needed, too," Chavez said.

Because of Ruidoso's various elevations, the water system relies on electricity to keep pump stations operating. A loss of power would mean a loss of water for most residents.

"But if it comes to that we can just call in the National Guard," Chavez said. "But this is not to scare the public. This is to get the public aware of what could happen."

by Saturday." Campos said he's surprised and concerned with the proposed budget action.

"State and local officials have worked hard to put the Fort Stanton facility to good use and, as a legislator, I've worked to keep Fort Stanton open," he said. "It's difficult, however, for members of the Senate to keep track of everything that occurs in the House."

State Sen. Joseph A. Fidel (D-Grants) who joined Campos in the announcement of the House action, said, "All of us favor saving taxpayers' money, but we must also be concerned with whether short-term savings will result in longer-term economic harm."

State Rep. Dub Williams, the Republican from Glencoe who represents the county in the House, could not be reached for comment Tuesday.

According to Campos and Fidel, House members envision the prison in Grants housing male inmates.

Campos said he will begin to explore other options for Fort Stanton that would benefit the state and the local area. He suggested expansion of the juvenile offender rehabilitation center at nearby Camp Sierra Blanca or expansion of state programs for nonviolent offenders including substance abuse treatment, counseling and rehabilitation.

If the governor, who says he has problems with parts of the budget, rejects the entire budget document, he would force the process to start over and erase the fort's closing, Campos said.

movements in the New Mexico housing market.

Property sold would be assessed at the sale price and would be subject to the indexed value changes in future years, Chavez wrote.

Property transferred to spouses or children of owners would continue on the tax rolls as if they had not been transferred. The system

would become effective July 1. Disclosure requirements wouldn't kick in until Jan. 1, 2000.

Chavez concluded that the bill wouldn't significantly impact state funding sources, because statewide assessed values would change in essentially the same manner they would under the existing system.

He speculated that administrative costs borne by

counties could go down and that impacts on other property tax recipients such as schools and municipalities, would vary, but generally would be minimal.

In his opinion, property owners would experience gradual, but continuous, changes in assessed values, instead of the large sporadic changes that have characterized the current system.

gration north. Osprey aren't sexually mature until they reach four years of age, Cordova said.

Both Mescalero and Grindstone lakes are stocked by the state with rainbow trout and should provide a good food source for an osprey family, Cordova said. Osprey feed primarily on fish, but will take frogs, crustaceans, turtles, small mammals and even small birds as prey.

The birds forage mainly over deep water where immature trout typically gather, according to literature on the bird provided by Cordova.

Osprey normally are monogamous, at least through one breeding season, and they tend to return to the same nesting site in successive years.

Perched ospreys appear dark brown above and white below, with a blackish stripe passing back through the eye and extending to a dark back of the neck.

The wing spread can hit 5.5 feet. The last estimate in the early 1980s put the osprey population at about 8,000 pairs in the contiguous United States.

**Toughening up Megan's Law**

Gov. Gary Johnson signed off on New Mexico's revised version of Megan's Law last Friday; and, while it may not be as tough as some of the other states in the country, it is a step in the right direction.

Since 1995, sex offenders in New Mexico have been required to register with the law enforcement agency in the communities where they live. (That's the essence of the so-called Megan's Law, named after a nationally noted case that brought it about).

The new law, which was sponsored by state Sen. RL Stockard, R-San Juan, takes it a step further by providing families in those communities with full access to information about those registered sex offenders.

Clearly, with public access to crucial information, the new law gives greater reassurances to the residents of the state, though it does depend on the convicted sex offender registering with the law enforcement agency.

Under the legislation, public disclosure is retroactive and will affect some 1,385 convicted sex offenders.

The law becomes effective July 1, after which a convicted sex offender who is a resident of New Mexico, or who claims residency in another state but works or goes to school in New Mexico, must register with his or her respective law enforcement agency. Stockard's measure requires police, sheriffs, and district attorneys to maintain the registry and make it accessible to the public.


Convicted sex offenders must register within 10 days of establishing residency. Nonresidents attending school or working in New Mexico have 30 days to register after beginning work or school. The sex offender must provide his or her name and all aliases used, date of birth, social security number, current address, place of employment or name of school, the sex offense for which he or she was convicted, and the date and place of the offense. The offender must renew his or her registration every year.

Before the law was signed into law by Johnson, New Mexico was the only state in the country that did not include the public notification element of Megan's Law.

But even with the newly added provision, it still falls short of similar laws in the United States. Kidnapping convictions are included in other versions of Megan's Law around the country, but not in the New Mexico law.

In their infinite wisdom, our state legislators chose to remove the crime from the New Mexico bill before it was passed on to the governor. This slight omission will cost the state about \$400,000 in federal funds.

So, while Megan's Law has seen some improvement this legislative session, there is still room for more.

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**The whys and wherefores of the Open Meetings Act**

It's known as the New Mexico Open Meetings Act and, like its counterpart, the the New Mexico Inspection of Public Records Act, is called a "sunshine law."

"Sunshine laws generally require that public business be conducted in full public view, that the actions of public bodies be taken openly, and that the deliberations of public bodies be open to the public.

Unfortunately, some elected officials don't take the time to bone up on the law, or become so familiar with it that they develop ways to technically comply while skirting its intentions.

What is considered a "public meeting"? Under the law, "all meet-

ings of a quorum of members of any board, commission, administrative adjudicatory body or other policy making body of any state agency, any agency or authority of any county, municipality, district or any political subdivision, held for the purpose of formulating public policy, including the development of personnel policy, rules, regulations, or ordinances, discussing public business or for the purpose of taking any action within the authority of or delegated authority of any board, commission or other policymaking body are declared to be public meeting open to the public at all times, except as otherwise provided in the constitution of New Mexico or the Open Meetings Act."

Some of these exceptions include the discussion of litigation, which should include the public body's attorney, real property and water rights, collective bargaining, and limited personnel matters.

It is common practice for public bodies to adopt Roberts Rules of Order or a similar code of parliamentary procedure to govern the process for calling and conducting meetings and taking action. The public body, according to the Attorney General's office, must

not violate the Open Meetings Act in its attempt to comply with its own parliamentary rules.

A violation of the Open Meetings Act will void the action taken by that public body and could result in a fine of up to \$500 per offense.

In small communities, such as Ruidoso, it is often common that members of boards and councils interact in business and social settings. The law is not intended to disrupt this but, when the majority of a board meets at a business or social event, they cannot dis-

cuss public matters—or those members are violating the law.

The Lincoln County Commission has been scolded a few times by the District Attorney for apparent violations of the New Mexico Open Meeting Act.

Most of the times, violations are by members who are ignorant of the law. They simply have their wrist slapped as a reminder.

But, as the old saying goes, ignorance is no excuse for violating the law. Perhaps if there was better enforcement of the sunshine laws there would be fewer violations.

# Murder suspect waives hearing

Johnny Ray Gutierrez, 39, accused in the stabbing death of a convenience store clerk last August, will stand trial in the 12th Judicial District Court in Carrizozo.

His attorney, Gary Mitchell, waived the former Allsup employee's right to a preliminary hearing Thursday in Ruidoso Magistrate Court. Mitchell could not be reached for comment on his reason for moving directly to Lincoln County's district court.

A preliminary hearing allows a magistrate judge to determine if enough evidence exists to believe the crime occurred and that the person accused may have committed the crime.

Gutierrez was arrested Nov. 25, 1998, at his mother's home in Capitan. He is accused

of murdering John Diebler, 48, another Allsup clerk, who was working at a convenience store on U.S. 70 in Ruidoso Downs the night of Aug. 29. Money and beer apparently were stolen from the store during the incident, police reported.

Ruidoso police investigated Gutierrez after a Crimestoppers tip was received.

Although he was arrested in Capitan, Gutierrez reportedly claims his home is in Albuquerque.

At the time of the murder a witness reported seeing two people leaving the store.

Police say an unidentified woman who may have been involved in the murder still is under investigation, but no charges have been filed against her.

# Ruidoso to ask recreational help from county commission

Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson wants the Lincoln County Commission to repeat its generosity of a year ago and set aside about \$150,000 for communities to use for recreation.

But that proposal is just part of his presentation to commissioners set for their 9 a.m. Thursday meeting at the Ruidoso Convention Center.

He'd also like to see the county kick in some support for the Ruidoso Municipal Library, and for the county to compensate the village for fire coverage in non-municipal pockets such as Cedar Creek and Carrizo Canyon, the mayor said.

"We're first responders in those areas and I think it would be fair to our taxpayers to find a way to reimburse the village," Donaldson said, pointing out that the county has a similar arrangement with the Ruidoso Downs Fire Department.

The timing of the request is meant to give commissioners a chance to incorporate the money into the county's 1999-2000 budget.

"The mayor hasn't discussed that with me," Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said Monday. "I'm in the dark about this. If the money is there, it would be great to do. It went for some good purposes this year, but we have a lot of obligations that are new. I don't want to break the bank." Nunley's district includes

portions of Ruidoso. Commissioner Wilton Howell, who represents the other areas of the village, was out of town Monday.

The recreation reimbursement was an alternative proposed last year during budget talks instead of a tax cut as a means of returning money to the villages.

But this year, the commission also is looking at building a new jail and providing money for the care of medically indigent residents.

Other items on the agenda include:

- A proposed policy and procedures for the jail staff regarding self-commitment of inmates, and standards of employee conduct at the jail.

- A presentation by Steve Lohman of Garland and Lohman Inc., about a design, build and finance approach for the county's new detention center in Carrizozo.

- A 1 p.m. hearing to consider indigent health care funding.

- Approval of expenditures requested by the Lincoln County Lodgers Tax Committee.

# Dolls help disfigured children smile once again

Women gathered to cut up and sew dolls for children with facial disabilities Tuesday at the Ruidoso Federated Women's Club.

The dolls will go to young patients after reconstructive surgery and other health care in developing nations and in underprivileged areas of the United States.

The club has also been collecting donations to send along with the dolls to Operation Smile International, the non-profit volunteer medical services organization that provides reconstructive surgery to indigent children and young adults.

"American doctors offer their services for free overseas or here in underprivileged areas," said Genevieve Duncan, president of the Women's Club.

"In some countries, parents just put (the children) out because they're deformed," she said.

More than 10,000 children suffering from cleft lip and palate deformities, facial tumors, burn scar contracture and club feet have received surgery in 18 developing countries, said Duncan.

General members support Operation Smile as mission volunteers and by providing supplies for missions and

funds for medical supplies and equipment.

Local members have been collecting donations since November and making dolls in February and March, said Bobbie DeBolt, chairman of the local Operation Smile.

DeBolt said the club would finish the dolls next week but would continue collecting donations until they go to the national convention in mid-April.

Dolls and donations from the Ruidoso club will join dolls and donations from other women's clubs across the country, Duncan said. She said 30 to 40 local women had participated in the project.

Volunteers in the medical field include plastic surgeons, ear/nose/throat and orthopedic surgeons, anesthesiologists, pediatric internists, emergency room and family practice physicians, dentists, nurses, physical therapists and speech therapists.

Up to 500 children with deformities and other medical complications are screened on typical missions, Duncan said, and over a five-day period the team provides surgery for an average of 150 children.

# THE FOREST THROUGH THE TREES

## Removal of pine needles and other ladder fuels

Forest fire prevention begins with the removal of pine needles, slash and debris from the forest floor. The ladder of brush, tall grass, small trees and low limbs that carry flames to higher limbs must be removed. Trim limbs to a height of 10 feet.

A clean forest, free of a connecting ladder of fuels, prevents fire from climbing to the tops of trees, creating a devastating crown fire. A healthier forest results from this cleaning. Tree-damaging insects find a forest floor loaded with such fuels an ideal environment. Larger trees become tar-

gets for these insects and their damage. The damaged tree will die or become a weakened hazard tree.

Nature, along with nature-wise, pre-European Americans, used fire as a tool to clean the forest floor and grasslands, creating a natural forest. This was the healthy forest of big trees existing 100 years ago. This was the forest of abundant water. Abuse and neglect have created the unnatural forest of today. Precious water resources have been adversely affected. (See the next article on forest water restoration.)

To reduce the fire danger and reverse the loss of our forest we must work to do what nature once did. The new grap-

pler truck for picking up pine needles and slash is a positive step to help citizens make our forest safer and healthier.

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# Texas man dies in rollover

A Texas resident died Saturday on U.S. 70 when a 1999 Pontiac sedan rolled about 10 miles west of Lincoln County's eastern border with Chaves County.

Lawrence Green, 40, of Brownfield, Texas, who died from injuries received in the accident, was a passenger in the car driven by Candy Cottrell, 25, according to a report by New Mexico State Police Officer Chris Mirabal.

The car was headed west on the highway between Ruidoso and Roswell and approaching a curve when the driver lost control.

The vehicle skidded, the driver over-corrected and the car rolled, the officer wrote in his report.

Liquor was involved in the incident, Mirabal said, but he did not know if Cottrell, Lawrence or two other passengers in the car were wearing seat belts.

Cottrell, Shea Green, 17, and Lacy Rogers, 15, all from Brownfield, received minor injuries.

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# Consolidated dispatch system for law enforcement raises its head again

*A positive attitude and willingness would ensure that a consolidated law enforcement dispatch system would succeed, state and county officials say. This, the first of two reports on consolidation, summarizes viewpoints on the issue. The second, on Friday, will focus on some operating systems in New Mexico.*

Consolidation of emergency radio dispatch services seems successful in a handful of New Mexico counties that have chosen that approach.

But to achieve the best type of operation could be a more expensive option than separate city and county departments, public officials say.

"I think it's real good for the public," said San Juan County Sheriff Michael L. Davidson. "It minimizes the complexity and expedites calls. There has been some struggle on political issues, but for the number of agencies and people we consolidated, it's worked real well."

A proposal to consolidate Lincoln County's dispatch with that of the villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs was discussed two years ago and dropped after a joint meeting last year. Commissioner Wilton Howell last week asked for a breakdown of calls through the county dispatch center, bringing the subject into the public spotlight again.

But Lincoln County dispatch supervisor Johnnie Johnson said he hears from the "rank and file" in counties with consolidated operations that they end up understaffed and underfunded.

"It causes more problems than it fixes," Johnson said. "Most don't realize how much specific training is required to be a dispatcher, and when you consolidate, you add a director and shift supervisors. You usually don't cut the budget or personnel; you end up hiring more, if you do it right. It would cost more than they're paying now."

Counties can approach consolidation in different ways —

putting everything under the sheriff's office, the police department or setting up an independent unit supervised by a board. The last seems to work the best, said Bill Harris, state coordinator of Enhanced 911 for the Local Government Division of the Department of Finance and Administration.

"I don't see them becoming really successful unless they are independent," he said. "Otherwise, you'll hear accusations that the dispatchers who work for the entity in charge (such as the sheriff or police chief) show favoritism to those calls."

Under consolidation, law enforcement officers lose a personal relationship with dispatchers that they have come to trust, said McKinley County Sheriff Frank Gonzales.

Although Gonzales called McKinley County's consolidation a success, he said the loss of personal interaction among deputies and dispatchers is one of the biggest negatives to the system in his county.

The supervisory board spends much time reviewing complaints from officers against dispatchers — most unfounded, but indicative of a reduction of the trust that once was in place, he said.

Harris, Gonzales and others said political battles over turf are the biggest stumbling blocks to consolidation.

"No one wants to lose their little kingdom," Gonzales said. "But once you go into it, you find out that it's not as bad as you think."

"It's a real tap dance through a mine field," Harris agreed. "If you can get them to sit down and talk, you're half way there."

Even with cooperation, the process can take two to four years to complete, Harris said.

Generally, the state favors consolidation to reduce duplication of equipment, which is expensive, he said.

"We're supportive of consolidation," Harris said. "Usually, we fund the equipment and their cost is the building and personnel, which can't be paid from the surcharge (placed on telephone customers in New

Mexico). Consolidation gives them a higher priority for equipment."

Counties that have completed the transition are San Juan, McKinley, Grant, Socorro, Rio Arriba and Roosevelt, as well as Mesilla Valley, Cibola, Otero, Valencia and Chaves counties are looking at consolidation, some for the second time, Harris said. Chaves almost made the change to put all dispatch services under the Roswell Police Department a few years ago before things fell apart, he said.

The main reasons for consolidation are to save overhead, telephone and equipment costs — not necessarily to cut personnel, he said. Several counties said the number of employees increased under consolidation. As the Enhanced 911 systems become more sophisticated, the cost of running lines to more than one center in any county could become prohibitive, Harris said.

Consolidation also eliminates worries about calling the right agency when an incident occurs near a city limit, he said.

Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan said if the county was willing to bring in the same type of technologically sophisticated equipment as he's seen in Dallas, he might go for consolidation. But short of gaining that type of technology he's not interested.

"In Dallas, when a call comes in, they have a big computer screen that shows the location of each patrol car and the location of the caller," he said. "But that's pretty far away" from the county's level of technology.

"I don't think it would save money," he said. "To consolidate the county with Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, we'd have to absorb all of the employees and cross train them to learn all of the small dirt roads. I think it would be real confusing. Dispatch is the heartbeat of the sheriff's office."

Although dispatch is housed in the sheriff's complex in Carrizozo, it falls under the supervision of the county man-

ager, as does the jail. Now employed are two part-time and five full-time dispatchers for an annual budget of \$143,579 including benefits. Overhead such as utilities and supplies come out of the general fund and are not broken out for dispatch, according to the county finance office.

To build a new independent complex for dispatch would cost big money, Sullivan said. Neither the sheriff's office nor the police department is large enough to absorb the additional equipment needed to take over the entire operation, he contended.

Ruidoso Police Chief Lanny Maddox said consolidation can't work unless everyone agrees on the plan.

"I'm still open to suggestions that would benefit the city and the county, but I respected Tom's wishes on this and thought it was a moot point," Maddox said.

His department received approval for new equipment that has capability similar to the Dallas system, but components would have to be added to achieve that level, he said. He uses 10 dispatchers, who are

cross trained as jail staff, and one "Emergency 911" specialist.

"I told Tom at the time this was first discussed, we could shift the whole thing to the city's. One of the new things being talked about is privatization," Maddox said.

# The wait is over for 'Cinderella' Ruidoso

The first two rounds of the Men's NCAA Basketball Tournament have belonged to the "Cinderellas" - Southwest Missouri State, Gonzaga and Miami (OH).

Will the same hold true for the first round of the Class AAA State Boys Basketball Tournament?

So hopes interim Ruidoso coach Billy Page, who described his Warriors as the "Cinderella" of the state tourney.

"They think we got lucky," Page said of his team's nay-sayers. "Even last week's poll had Hot Springs ahead of us."

Indeed, Hot Springs, the team the Warriors defeated to earn their state bid, was ranked in the latest Associated Press Class AAA Top 10 Poll.

Ruidoso, however, was nowhere to be found.

While the Warriors might not get any respect from the state's sports media, St. Pius coach Todd Resch knows different.

"They're definitely a team that belongs (at the state tournament)," said Resch, whose No. 2-ranked Sartans (18-5) play Ruidoso (14-12) at 3:30 p.m. today at Cibola High School. "Once you get to the state tournament, you have to throw out records."

The Sartans and Warriors are remarkably similar. It's been 14 years since St. Pius last played in the state tourney; 18 years since Ruidoso was there. Seniors lead both squads. Ben Ferguson, Enrico Quintana and Tim Shields for the Sartans, Corey Saenz, Aaron Gillespie and Josh Varnadore pace the Warriors.

St. Pius has posted only two winning seasons in the '90s - this season and in 1992-93. The Sartans were 6-17 last year. This is Ruidoso's first winning campaign in the decade, although coach Gary Grahm, who was fired at the start season, directed the Warriors to a 12-12 mark last year. Both teams are their respective district runners-up - St. Pius in 5AAA and Ruidoso in 3AAA.

And a delayed state tournament has challenged both coaches to finding ways to keep their teams eager and ready. The boys state tournament for the state's four classes was pushed back a week because the University of New Mexico women's basketball team hosted two National Invitational Tournament games last week.

"This is our second game in 19 days," Resch said. "You've got to work hard to stay competitive and keep people's interest level high. It's definitely a burden."

Ruidoso's last outing was March 6. The Warriors are in the midst of spring break this week, so Page has limited workouts, keeping them "short and sweet."

"We're just trying to make it so we're hungry to play ball when we get there," Page said.

## Both teams boast balance and depth

Ruidoso senior Aaron Gillespie has drawn the Warriors' most important defensive assignment of today's first round game in the Class AAA Boys State Basketball Tournament. And at 6-foot, 5-inches, you could say Gillespie is "up" to the task.

Gillespie will try to put the clamps on St. Pius senior post player, Enrico Quintana, who also stands at 6-5.

"I heard he's really big. I have to try to muscle him and not let him get the position he wants," said Gillespie as he boarded one of the team's two Suburbans headed for Albuquerque Tuesday morning.

Quintana is one of five St. Pius players to average nine points a game. He also pulls down six rebounds a contest for the 18-5 Sartans, and coach Todd Resch considers Quintana one of his team leaders.

But less offensive statistics aside, Resch said, a good defensive effort will determine the outcome of today's game.

"We've got to do a good job on their outside shooting and on their post players. We've got to have an outstanding defensive effort by all five players."

Ruidoso's offense balances on the perimeter with senior

guard Corey Saenz (20 points a game) and in the post with Gillespie (9 ppg, 6.2 rpg) and Josh Varnadore (7 ppg, 4.2 rpg) - has caught Resch's attention. "I've heard so many good things about Corey Saenz. He's a phenomenal player who has great range," Resch said. "They've got an overall package."

Interim Ruidoso coach Billy Page said St. Pius plays a physical, pressure-filled man-to-man defense. The Sartans remind Page of another, more familiar Ruidoso foe, the Artesia Bulldogs. Twice the Bulldogs have defeated the Warriors this season, by two points each time. And the winner of today's game, plays Artesia at 7 p.m. Thursday in a quarterfinal game at Valley High School in Albuquerque.

Resch wouldn't reveal his probable starting line-up for today's game, but count on Quintana and senior classmate Ben Ferguson (6-3; wing) and Tim Shields (6-0; wing) to see the most minutes for the Sartans.

No Sartan averages in double figures. Opponents have tried to take a player out of the game, Resch said, but have had little success doing so.

"We bring a lot of balance and a lot of depth," said Resch who has turned around St. Pius in just his second year.

The Sartans were 6-17 last year with many of the same players on this year's 18-5 squad.

The difference, Resch said, has been commitment to an off-season program and determination.

"A second-to-none work effort from all the players in the program," Resch added. "And, we were fired of hearing about the St. Pius teams of the 1980s."

Ruidoso's Page will counter the Sartans with Saenz, Gillespie, Varnadore, sophomore Solomon Barnett and senior James Adams.

Page has elected to make senior Garvin Grant, a 6-3 forward, his sixth man.

"Garvin just does such a better job coming off the bench than starting," Page said.

As the Warriors pulled out of the Ruidoso High School parking lot on their way to the Duke City after Tuesday's light practice, sophomore starter Barnett couldn't help but answer a question that wasn't directed at him.

"The key is to work hard and play defense," Barnett said. "Defense wins championships."



# Driving Mechem's construction zone to get a bit trickier with Spring

Split lanes of traffic — road crews working in the center lane while cars travel on either side — are several weeks away for motorists on Mechem Drive.

The state project to widen 4 miles of Mechem now has crews cutting slopes on the west side of the road, excavation, utility work and the installation of a storm drainage system, said Kevin Clower, with Meadow Valley Contractors, Inc.

At some point this spring or summer, 6,600 to 6,800 feet of Mechem will be diverted to either side of the right-of-way while crews work in the center, Clower said. The split road will run from the Thriftway Store to Buckner Drive.

"There are going to be some areas with one-lane traffic," Clower said. "But we will be opened back up (to two lanes) at night."

Meadow Valley is developing a plan for the split road work to be submitted for state approval.

Work on the south portion of Mechem, from Sudderth to White Mountain drives, is back to full tilt after a winter hiatus. The road is being expanded to include a center turn lane for most of the distance. Four lanes of traffic and a turn lane will front the Ruidoso Convention Center and the intersection with Sudderth. Five-foot-wide sidewalks and streets lights also are part of the project.

The project, one of three in the Ruidoso-Ruidoso Downs area, started last spring and has a completion date of September. Because of weather and other delays, 40 days have been added to the completion date, officials said.

Immediately north of the Mechem (or State Road 48) project, a second job is near a start, with blasting planned in

three areas on the south side of Alto Hill, Clower said. However, that is contingent upon completion of a new water line from the Alto water tanks to the village.

The water line will be moved away from the blasting sites. The sites are outside of the Mexican Spotted Owl nesting areas, where blasting is prohibited from March 1 until September under the federal Endangered Species Act.

On the south Mechem project, slope stakes on the west side of the road mark where crews will excavate, Clower said. Old asphalt on most of the former west lane of Mechem has been ground up and removed.

"The primary thing is to get the storm drains ... and the water line ties," Clower said. Utilities along the

south part of the road must be moved before road work can proceed.

Meadow Valley, which has contracts for all the current highway projects in the area, is some time away from lime-treating soil on the west side of the road. Some roads and driveway accesses will be temporarily blocked during the treatment to stabilize the soil's clay-like composition. Clower said Meadow Valley will notify businesses and homes that may be affected during the treatment process.

At the request of state highway officials, weekly meetings about the highway work will be closed to the public, but a monthly meeting will be open.

Ernest Sanchez, local project manager for the New Mexico Highway and Transportation Department, said people with specific problems regarding the construction project still may attend the weekly meetings. Most comments and concerns, though, should be directed to the liaison committee established by the Ruidoso Village Council for that purpose.

"We want to use the task force meetings for what they were intended for," Sanchez said.

**March 18, 1949**

**Bloodworth Sells Ruidoso News To Louis R. Spain**

Lloyd P. Bloodworth, editor and publisher of the *Ruidoso News*, announced this week the sale of the paper to Louis R. Spain of Carlsbad, New Mexico and El Paso, Texas. Mr. Spain has been editor of the *Eddy County News* in Carlsbad for the past year.

The *Ruidoso News* was started three years ago by Lloyd and Ida Bloodworth to fill the need of a paper in the Ruidoso and Hondo Valleys.

**March 20, 1959**

**Real Estate Sales at All-Time High in Ruidoso Area**

Interviewing real estate sales personnel in Ruidoso the last ten days by the *Ruidoso News* staff has confirmed a fact suspected early this year that this area is undergoing a real estate boom. Nearly half a million dollars in real estate transactions has occurred in this region in the last 90 days — a conservative estimate arrived at from talking with almost every dealer for property here.

**March 21, 1969**

**Sewers Called 'Must' for Ruidoso Downs**

Sewers for Ruidoso Downs were called "a must" by Mayor Jack Di Paolo and Village Engineer Quentin Daniels Monday night. And in a show of hands, sewers won 20 favorable votes from among the 28 persons who showed up for a special meeting on sewage disposal problems and proposals at the Ruidoso Downs Village Hall.

**March 19, 1979**

**Red Flag Alert set**

The Committee For Insuring Ruidoso's Safety (COMFIRE) has received 150 large red flags and a substantial amount of small flags from the New Mexico State Forestry office. At a committee meeting Thursday, the group decided to begin distribution to cooperators to display the red flags.

The flags were sewn by inmates at the state prison and donated to the committee to be used during a Red Flag Fire Alert.

**March 20, 1989**

## An ounce of prevention could save a life

One-fifth of the reported poisonings to New Mexico's poison control center in 1998 involved preschoolers and toxins.

Because children are the most likely victim of an unintentional poisoning, the New Mexico Poison Center has designated, not just a week, but a month (March) as Poison Prevention Month in New Mexico.

"During this time, we are challenging New Mexicans to poison proof their homes," said Lorraine Murray, public education coordinator for the New Mexico Poison Center.

New Mexicans made more than 50,000 calls into the state's poison control hotline. Of that 50,000, about 20,000 sought advice about how to deal with a suspected poisoning, and half of those 20,000 calls involved the potential poisoning of a preschooler.

In Lincoln County in 1998, the Lincoln County Medical Center emergency room staff treated nine children (under 10 years of age) for poisoning, said Jule Sterchi, assistant administrator at LCMC.

Murray said that the good news is that most, if not all, poisonings can be prevented.

"If we could just make people aware of all of the poisons in their home, that's the first step," Murray said. "The second step is to get them to put it (the poisons) away."

Poison proofing your home could take only minutes, or a several hours. (See poison prevention checklist at right). It just depends on how many potential hazards you have and where they are stored. For example, if you store cleaning products on open shelves, and cosmetics and mouth washes within the reach of preschoolers, it could take some time to safeguard your home.

Some people are real good about keeping potential toxins locked up and out of the reach of children, Murray said, while others live in "real toxic waste sites."

The poison prevention home checklist

takes the homeowner room by room and points out the most common hazards, Murray said.

And there are many hazards out there.

The top three potential home toxins are medications, cleaning products and plants.

"We want them to take their medications back to their pharmacy and they'll take care of them. Leftover paints can be recycled. Don't pour them down the drain," Murray said. "Most people don't even think of their plants as being toxic, but many are and they're usually placed within a child's reach."

Preschoolers are susceptible because of their innate curiosity, Murray added. "That's their nature. They'll climb. They'll reach. What we want to do is provide a safe environment. Out of sight and out of reach is preferable."

Homeowners can take a quick and easy step to poison proofing their home by posting the New Mexico Poison Center's

emergency number on all phones. The poison emergency phone number is 1-800-432-6866, and it is answered 24 hours a day.

The New Mexico Poison Center serves as the state's clearing house for responding to poison emergencies and for educating the public about poison prevention.

Located at the University of New Mexico Health Sciences Center, the poison center also has a toll-free, automated education line (1-877-432-0002).

Of the 50,000 calls the center received last year, 20,000 were poison emergencies. Sixty-two percent of those emergencies ended up being treated at home while the remaining victims were advised to go to the hospital, to call an ambulance or to see their personal doctor.

"We don't want people to wait and see what happens," Murray said. "If they think there is a possible poisoning we want them to call us right away."

### How to prevent a poisoning

**POISON-PROOF YOUR HOME**

- Keep all substances in their original labeled containers
- Store all poisonous substances out of reach and out of sight of children
- Install safety latches on all cabinets and drawers containing harmful products
- Buy only nonpoisonous plants while children are small, or keep your plants out of a child's reach
- Don't leave a purse where a child can reach it. Handbags often contain perfume, cigarettes or medicine
- Check furnace panels on forced air furnaces to see that they are securely in place. Loose or missing panels are the No. 1 source of carbon monoxide poisoning in the home.
- Post the telephone number to New Mexico Poison Center on all phones in the house.

**SAFETY BEHAVIORS**

- Children should be taught to "ask first" before eating or drinking anything that has not been given to them by their caregiver.
- Never assume a child understands the words "danger," "poison," "no" or any warning even if they parrot it back.
- Always ask for child-resistant caps on prescriptions and "faster" caps securely after using. These containers are not child-proof so safe storage is still essential
- Always read a product's label before using.
- Never call medicine "candy" and don't take medicine in front of children. Children like to mimic adults.
- Don't leave a child and a poison alone for even a minute.
- To avoid overdosing children on medicine, have one person responsible for administering the medicine or keep a log to track when doses are given.
- Properly dispose of unused products and empty containers.

## Capitan schools urge parents to 'get involved'

**CAPITAN** — Action for Children and Teachers (ACT) and the Capitan School District administration invite parents of elementary, middle school and high school students, and other interested community members to meet at 6 p.m. Thursday.

The purpose of the meeting is to develop a parent/community school involvement plan.

The district is interested in the concerns of all parents and community members and will host a meeting to develop a school-level parent and

community involvement plan, said Superintendent of Schools Diana Billingsley.

Some ideas already given for involvement are in fundraising, academic offerings, unifying parent advisory committees at each building and facilitating communication between school and home.

Parents are invited to try to come to this initial meeting when they are here for their parent-teacher conference. Minutes will be available in each building office for those unable to attend.

## Capitan schools allocate extra \$56,000 in funding

**CAPITAN**—Municipal Schools here will spend an extra \$56,165 made available by the state superintendent of schools on land improvements.

The money was available because projected student enrollments in the state have decreased, while Capitan's enrollments increased over the projection made last May.

Diana Billingsley, superintendent of the Capitan Schools, said the special budget increase amounted to \$56,165, and the board approved spending \$22,000 on land improvement, "some of the things that didn't pass with the last bond election and we didn't put into the new one," she said.

The board also budgeted \$16,000 for additional costs of water and supply items for maintenance and repairs, and \$10,000 for architectural services needed to prepare for the new bond election May 11 asking for \$2 million (voters said no at a bond election in February asking for \$5.7 million).

The district had to hire an additional instruction assistant, Billingsley said, and \$6,708 was budgeted for this; the final \$1,500 was allocated for the costs of the February election.

### Input on 1999-2000 budget

Members of the community and the Capitan Association asked the board to look at teacher salaries and to increase the salaries budget, Billingsley said. She studied state averages for teacher salaries depending on length of service and found Capitan's salaries lower than average after 10 years of teaching.

"On average our salary schedule does well for the first nine years of employment," Billingsley said. "Then we fall below average through 20 years of employment. I'd like to look at increasing salary for the last 10 years of employment to bring it up more to the (state) average. It would help with teacher tenure."

### Curriculum changes

The board discussed preliminary information on curricular changes and possibilities for the next school year. More will be discussed at the next board meeting April 8 and the board will vote on them.

Billingsley said the district will look at adding drivers education/health as a semester-to-semester class so students won't have to come after school and on weekends as they do now and changing athletics from regular grading to a satisfactory-unsatisfactory grade.

The board also will vote on adding:

- an applied math 2 course since the district put in applied math 1 last fall
- a third-year computer class

- a career awareness class as a requirement

- an advanced placement pre-calculus class and increase the weighting of grades to that of an honors class, so an A is worth five points, a B is worth four points

- honors classes which would work with ENMU-Ruidoso's concurrent enrollment classes; students would get both high school grades and college credits for these classes

### Honor students show 'Parents Night Out'

Students from the middle school honor society showed a video they made about "Parents Night Out," a babysitting fundraiser to help pay for a trip they've planned to Lubbock, Texas in April.

"They put it on the computer and showed the board where they were going, what they're doing and how they're going to raise money," said Billingsley.

The students will go for an overnight trip to visit science museums and the university, and they plan to babysit in the gym a Friday night in April to pay for it.

### Preparation under way for May 11 bond election

Those present discussed getting the community and the school board more involved in publicizing the bond election.

Billingsley said it will be discussed at the March 25 Community Update. She also said that the weekend or two before the election people will be at post offices in Nogal, Fort Stanton and Capitan to answer questions and encourage people to vote.

### School safety plan given board approval

The board gave final approval to the school safety plan developed by staff and parents, which is 77 pages plus a 70-page appendix, Billingsley said.

The fire chief, chief of police, EMS personnel, administrators, parents and a student formed the 15-person committee.

The plan includes prevention, listing programs available to prevent accidents from happening, counseling available and places to sign in. The intervention section includes discipline policies, dress code and attendance.

The response section covers bomb threats, chemical spills, drive-bys, earthquakes, floods, snowfall, gas leaks or explosion, loss of power or water, suicide threats, tear gas pranks and windstorms.

There is an evacuation plan for all emergencies and fire drill procedures and shelter procedures.

The plan will be distributed to all teachers and to police, EMS and the village, Billingsley said.

## DECA students head for national competition

Three Ruidoso High School students asked for \$7.5 million got it, and put Ruidoso on the map.

Espin is an exchange student from Ecuador staying with Hoyt's family, and Goes is an exchange student from Brazil staying with the family of Henry Sutton, high school marketing teacher.

"This is the first time to ever win first at state and to go on to nationals," Hoyt said.

They competed against 850 other students from the around the state, Sutton said. Only 160 of those won first, second, third or finalist places.

"All of the Ruidoso DECA delegates — ten students — were part of the 160 winners," Sutton said.

Now they must revise the plan, come up with some graphs, and refine their presentation to compete against 160 winners

Hoyt said it's helped his personal skills a lot.



## Heavens Above Help Us Below A Kid's Guide to Navigation

**I TURN HERE!**

When we navigate, we move from one place to another. We can navigate in our home or in our neighborhood using the mental maps in our mind. People back in history did not have to know much about navigation because they did not travel very far.

When folks began to trade with people in faraway lands, they had to figure out how to get there ... and back!

At first, sailors traveled along the shoreline, using landmarks they could see. But when they started to travel across wide oceans, they had problems. There were no landmarks.

**BUT A COMPASS CANNOT TELL US WHERE WE ARE!**

This issue of The Mini Page is based on the planetarium show "And a Star to Steer Her By" at the National Air and Space Museum, Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D.C. It will be on view until October 2001.

**DEAD RECKONING**

Sailors used another method called "dead reckoning." After they marked where they thought they were on a chart, they used a compass to decide what direction they were to go in.

Then they estimated their speed by tossing a log overboard. The log was attached to a line that was on a reel. The knots on the line were evenly spaced. A sailor counted the knots as they unwound and timed it to an hourglass.

**WE ARE MAKING 5 KNOTS.**

Then the ship's speed was written down in "knots." Today we still label a ship's speed in knots. The speeds were recorded in a book called the "log" book. The record book ships keep today is still called a log book. When they knew their speed and direction, they could estimate, or "dead-reckon," their position. Dead reckoning did not always work. Because of winds, storms and currents, ships did not travel in the direction or speed that the navigator charted.



**Looking up**

For thousands of years, people had known that the stars and other heavenly bodies could help them find their way. The positions of the stars were known with great accuracy. People mapped the stars before they mapped the Earth.

For any time of day, the stars and other heavenly bodies are in a certain, known position. It's a navigator's job to take the position of stars and other bodies in the sky and use this information to locate the position of a ship at sea.

While there are thousands of stars in the sky, navigators use only 57 of them.

**THE STAR IS THERE, SO WE ARE HERE.**

**Navigators also use:**

- the sun
- the moon
- and the planets: Venus, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn

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## Time Helps Navigators Navigate

**Background**

We use imaginary lines called "parallels" to measure where we are from north to south. They are numbered from each side of the equator from 0 to 90 degrees.

**WE ARE AT 30 DEGREES NORTH, BUT WHERE?**

Since we can be anywhere on a parallel, we must also measure from east to west to get our exact spot.

North to south  
East to west

The point where these lines cross tells us where we are!

We use imaginary lines called "meridians" of longitude to measure east and west. They are measured in degrees from 0 to 180 degrees east to west. Meridians come together at the North and South poles. We can think of the meridians as the Earth's clock. The Earth spins, or rotates, 360 degrees each day as it circles the sun. If you were to stand in space far above the Earth's North Pole, you would see the Earth turn beneath you counterclockwise. It spins at the rate of 15 degrees each hour. These meridians are separated by 15 degrees and divide the Earth into 24 zones. The time zones start at what is called the prime meridian, an imaginary line that runs through Greenwich, England. One hour separates each time zone's meridian.

Here's an example of how time helps us know where we are.

1. You are a navigator and in your home port. You notice when the sun is highest in the sky (local noon). You set your watch. You do not reset it.
2. You travel. The next day you check your watch at the new local noon. The difference in the hours between your watch and noon will roughly give you the new longitude. If your home port was at 0 degrees longitude and your watch says 2 o'clock, you would be at 30 degrees west (multiply 2 times 15). If your home port was at 0 degrees and your watch says 10 o'clock, you would be at 30 degrees east.

**What navigators need**

- A sextant to "shoot" or measure to get the altitude or height of the sun, moon and stars. This information will help a navigator know exactly where these bodies in the sky are in relation to where the ship is. A sextant has two mirrors. The navigator looks through a filter so that he can look at the sun and not hurt his eyes.
- A clock that is very accurate so they can figure out the longitude. The Earth is rotating, the stars appear to be moving, and their ship is moving. When navigators know where the heavenly bodies are, and also know exactly what time it is, they can tell where the ship is. A clock that is used at sea is called a chronometer.
- Good weather so they can see the sky. Navigators usually take these sightings at these times of day to measure things in the sky:
  1. 30 minutes before sunrise, while the stars are still out and while they can see the horizon.
  2. at noon to take a sighting of the sun.
  3. 30 minutes after sunset so they can still see the horizon and the stars. It gets too dark after that.

A chart or map to figure out where they are, based on the information they got by using their sextant and their clock. Astronauts in space and many navigators on the sea still plot their position using the sun, moon, stars and planets.

**Navigation satellites**

Today most navigators use the Global Positioning System, which makes navigating much easier. Satellites circle the Earth. These 24 artificial "stars" carry clocks and computers. These satellites send time signals to GPS receivers.



## POOP SCOOP

A problem that probably most dog owners have faced at one time or another is a canine who barks inappropriately.

It's a natural behavior -- a way for dogs to express joy, fear and loneliness.

But incessant barking can generate ill feeling among neighbors and if not corrected, could result in an animal being removed from the home, if your town has nuisance laws.

In some extreme cases, owners have elected to have their pets' vocal cords rendered inoperative -- a drastic alternative that robs the dog of an important part of its life experience and the owner of a safety alert.

Before the problem can be solved, an owner must try to understand why the dog is barking.

For many dogs, chronic barking or howling is a cry for help. A dog who doesn't receive enough care or attention from an owner often becomes a barker.

Dogs are social animals, and they need exercise and interaction with their human companions -- and sometimes with other dogs.

Some dogs are simply bored when left alone in the home or the yard while the owner is away, and will bark at passersby or neighbor-

hood noises.

The first step is to eliminate the cause. If he's barking at passersby, try closing him out of rooms or outside areas that border streets and sidewalks.

Consider putting up a solid fence to limit his view. The best approach may be to leave the dog inside.

For some dogs, barking is simply an entertaining way to spend a long and boring day. Safe chew toys, an approved digging spot or a child's wading pool may provide entertainment. Special toys stuffed with food that releases slowly as the dog plays with the toy may keep him occupied for hours.

A mid-day visit and a game of fetch with a professional pet sitter or trusted neighbor also helps pass the time.

Electronic training aids attached to collars are available and allow barking to be corrected in the owner's absence when most unwanted barking occurs. They use static shock, high frequency sounds or a spray of a citrus fruit extraction as reminders to the dog.

Look for safety features such as an automatic shut off after a limited number of corrections. You may want to remove the regular collar so that the tags don't trigger a correction, but substitute something that will identify your animal in case he gets loose while you're gone.



## ABC, Like, hopes two new series connect with audience

ABC is tugging a couple of new players into its comedy lineup on Wednesday, March 24.

Joining the rotation after *Dharma & Greg* is *It's Like, You Know ...* and following *Drew Carey* is *The Norm Show*. To make room, *Two Guys, a Girl and a Pizza Place* is sitting out the next six weeks, and *Whose Line Is It Anyway?* has been benched for the rest of the season.

Both newcomers represent risks for the network. But if you're ever going to score, you have to be willing to take a shot.

Viewers who have come to rely on the white-bread softness of *Two Guys* may get a jolt from *It's Like*. The series mines its laughs in Los Angeles, the world's most self-absorbed city. Where comedy is concerned, this is very fertile ground; an entire episode is based on how Angelenos will drop everything to watch a car chase on TV.

Steven Eckholdt (*Message in a Bottle*) stars as Robbie Graham, who struck it rich in pay-per-view cable TV. Evan Handler plays his slacker landlord, Shrug, who lives on a trust fund.

Next door is actress Jennifer Grey, played by ... Jennifer Grey (*Dirty Dancing*). The show gets much mileage out of Grey's change in appearance since her nose job.

Grey does look startlingly different. In real life, she says, her new looks have fooled everyone from salesclerks ("Is that weird for you, having her name?" they ask) to old boyfriends.

Chris Eigeman plays New Yorker Arthur Garment, a fish out of water who represents the point of view of

Earth's other 5 billion people. A.J. Langer co-stars as Lauren Woods, Arthur's ideal woman, who works as a masseuse and process server.

*It's Like, You Know ...* has the whininess of *thirtysomething*, the purposelessness of *Seinfeld* and the conspicuous comforts of *Dallas*. The satire gets a boost from visual jokes (ubiquitous bottled water) and unbilled cameos (Kato Kaelin appears in one episode).

The pilot episode is not the series' best. A long scene on an airplane establishes Arthur's character but feels like lead. And a running gag involving comments made by two women is utterly pointless.

But, like wet cement in front of a certain Hollywood Chinese restaurant, *It's Like* sets quickly and leaves a distinct impression.

*The Norm Show* is a darker horse. Star Norm Macdonald is the former stand-up comic and *Roseanne* writer who took his snide, sarcastic wit to the "Weekend Update" desk at *Saturday Night Live*, only to be removed by



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

Josie Bissett and Rob Estes (Jane and Kyle, *MP*) are married. They are expecting their first child in July.


