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Flood insurance rate cut doesn't impress commission

CARRIZOZO — The prospect of the federal government dictating construction standards in exchange for offering residents a chance for lower flood insurance premiums doesn't sell well to Lincoln County commissioners.

"Without (federal flood insurance), it's very expensive for property owners to buy private flood insurance," said Don Armstrong, emergency area coordinator for the National Flood Insurance Program. "And if the presi-

dent declares a disaster and an area has no designation (by the Federal Emergency Management Agency-FEMA) no federal assistance can be provided."

Although they listened to Armstrong's presentation last Thursday, commissioners took no action.

Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs already participate in the program, but other areas of the county are not covered. Armstrong said participation is based on an agreement between a local government entity and the federal government that states the community will adopt and enforce flood plain

management ordinances. "The federal government will then insure."

The program was enacted in 1968 with the intent of reducing individual losses from floods, he said. It is administered by the Federal Insurance Administration and FEMA.

To qualify, the county would have to designate special flooding hazard areas. Being in a drought doesn't mean a flood won't come, he said, recalling the mud slides that occurred in Mescalero a few years ago after wild fires wiped out vegetation on hillsides and destroyed about 10,000 acres.

One of the scenarios being exam-

ined by his agency is the possible failure of the Mescalero Dam on the Apache Reservation that abuts Carrizo Canyon and its stream system. The federal Bureau of Reclamation in Denver is joining with Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Otero County for an exercise in November on emergency responses for such a dam failure.

Armstrong said the weather service in El Paso is predicting a heavier than normal monsoon season this June. (A spokesman for the National Weather Service said Friday that he

Public hotel discussion Thursday

Lease language revisions come out of closed sessions

Exact language in the 56-page proposal for a luxury hotel next to the Ruidoso Convention Center will be aired publicly for the first time at 6:30 p.m. Thursday.

Residents will have four opportunities to learn about the agreement and voice their opinions before the Ruidoso Village Council votes on May 4. Copies of the lease agreement are available at no cost at Ruidoso Village Hall, 313 Cree Meadow Drive.

Last week, the Ruidoso Village Council met behind closed doors for five hours to review the contract with Leisure Hotels L.L.C., the Kansas-based company proposing to build a 100-room Hawthorne Suites on 3.8 acres of village land. Mayor Robert Donaldson said Monday the council made several changes to the lease in the marathon closed session. The council met again in closed session Tuesday afternoon for a final review

Track casino cleared

• An Albuquerque company, owned in part by R.D. Hubbard's son, was approved last week as a distributor of slot machines in New Mexico.

Ruidoso Downs Race Track last Friday became the second track in the state to hold a license for a casino.

Bruce Rimbo, president of Ruidoso Downs Racing Inc., said Monday with the license the \$5.5 million Billy the Kid Casino next to the track is on schedule to open the first week of May.

"We got a lot done this weekend," Rimbo said. "And we'll start laying carpet the middle of this week. It's coming along just fine."

The track's license with the New Mexico Gaming Control Board is contingent on the successful completion of background checks of top track and casino employees, Rimbo said. Company executives have submitted information regarding their income tax returns to the board. Verification of that information is pending, as well as FBI background checks of top employees.

Under the 1997 gaming bill, racetracks as well as fraternal and non-profit organizations may operate a limited number of slot machines. Racetracks may have up to 300 machines, the amount intended for the Ruidoso Downs track.

Rimbo said the track is buying some of its machines from International Gaming Technology (IGT), a Nevada-based company and the largest manufacturer of slot machines.

Besides the racetrack's license, the New Mexico Gaming Control Board last week also approved the first slot machine distributorship license to New Mexico Gaming L.L.C. Racetrack owner R.D. Hubbard was instrumental in starting the Albuquerque-based business, but sold his 40-percent interest to his son Derrol D. Hubbard about four months ago, Lauralyn Lovell McCarthy, president of New Mexico Gaming L.L.C., said Monday.

Under state guidelines by the

A judge's assistant wins accolades

The legal profession and court system confuse and intimidate most laymen, but Clydene Hull tries to ensure the process goes as smoothly as the situation will allow.

Administrative assistant and all-around right-hand-woman to 12th Judicial District Judge Karen Parsons, Hull is a friendly face for those caught up in a legal battle. Her boss says she's the perfect example of why Professional Secretaries Day today should be celebrated.

"My secretary and administrative assistant is extremely important to me," Parsons said. "She is the first person the public deals with when they call or come to my office. She is friendly, cheerful, energetic and committed to helping others."

"I'm fortunate. I feel at ease when I'm away from my office know-

ing that she is extremely competent to handle emergencies and maintain the office in my absence."

Hull keeps the office well organized and running efficiently, the judge said.

"I'm always prepared for each day, because she has my files ready for my docket," Parsons said. She ensures things run smoothly even on days when the judge sees 35 criminal defendants or juveniles.

"She also performs legal research, drafts orders and correspondence, creates computer forms and any other duty I may ask of her," Parsons said. "She's not only my secretary, but my friend, and I depend tremendously on her many talents."

Hull calls Parsons her best friend. They live just 1 mile apart outside Ruidoso and often car pool to work.

Hull grew up in Odessa, Texas,

Expensive trip south of border

Two men stopped for speeding on U.S. 54 Thursday continued on their way to Mexico the next day lighter by about \$55,000 and without their sports utility vehicle.

Neither man was charged, but when State Policeman Sal Beltran received permission to search the car, he found money stuffed in a grocery bag under the front seat, said Lt. William Bower.

"They couldn't explain where they got the money," Bower said. "The driver said it wasn't his or his buddy's. They were taking it to Mexico."

The stop occurred at 11:35 a.m. about 17 miles north of Carrizozo. The money and 1997 Ford Expedition were seized by the state police, but the two men will have a chance to contest the forfeiture action in court, if they choose, he said.

"If they can explain where the money came from, they can get it back," Bower said.



White Oaks Eagle April 20, 1899

before the document's public presentation Thursday.

Under New Mexico law, disposal or acquisition of real property may be closed to the public. The purpose of the exclusion is to prevent price manipulation of the property to the detriment of governmental entities.

Speculation about what incentives the village will offer Leisure Hotels has generated criticism, especially from the lodging industry. Opponents object to the use of tax dollars to assist the hotel, they say.


Proponents say the facility is a necessary component if the village wants to attract larger conventions. Additionally, the hotel would tap a different market segment, they say.

Village staff said Tuesday 80 copies of the lease agreement are available for the public. About five individuals have

collected copies as of Tuesday afternoon, though Donaldson has picked up a number of copies to hand out personally.

Previously released points of the lease agreement, include the following:

- Leisure Hotels would not have to pay property taxes during the length of its financing, possibly 30 years.
- The company would pay an annual lease amount based on the undeveloped value of the 3.8-acre site.
- The company would pay the village a percentage of profits once a set break-even point is reached.
- The company would use the village's liquor license rather than acquire one at an estimated cost of \$150,000 to \$200,000.
- Bookings for the Ruidoso Convention Center will be made through hotel personnel.
- The village will pay for initial upgrades to the common area at the convention center, including the creation of a spill-over parking lot off of Hull Road, and a connecting road through the golf course. Donaldson has said the village intends to make those improvements whether or not the lease agreement is signed.

Surprise donation highlights opening of Red Cross office

When Perry Hendricks walked through the door of the new American Red Cross office in Ruidoso, the volunteers asked if they could help him.

The Ruidoso resident of 10 years answered, "No, but I think maybe I can help you."

Hendricks handed over a \$200 check to be used toward relief for ethnic Albanian refugees, fleeing persecution in Yugoslavia. It was the first local donation to that cause.

A retired distribution center manager for Reliance Electric Co. in Dallas, Hendricks said he and his wife, Marie, have sympathy for the displaced people.

"I hope readers and other Lincoln County residents will participate and donate too," Hendricks said, pointing out that students in El Paso have started a project to aid the refugees.

The massive displacement of people requires an extensive, well-organized humanitarian response, according to Red Cross volunteer Betty Faircloth. To help meet the refugees immedi-

ate needs for food, shelter, clothing and medical attention, the American Red Cross is cooperating with the International Committee of the Red Cross, the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies as well as the National Red Cross Societies in Yugoslavia, Macedonia, Albania and Bosnia-Herzegovina. All assistance is provided along the organization's principles of neutrality and impartiality, she said.

As one volunteer put it, what would Lincoln County residents do if the entire population of Albuquerque moved into the area overnight?

Red Cross disaster assistance is free, through donations of time and money. was not aware of any prediction, adding that June is too far away for any accurate projections).

When Armstrong said the only cost the county would be additional work for a county employee, Oscura resident Jerry Carroll said that's only the beginning and that "strings" will be attached.

"Most people in this county don't need this insurance," Carroll said. "The parts that do either already have it or could acquire it."

When Carroll asked Armstrong to show commissioners the regulations attached to the program, Armstrong said the book is thick.

"Exactly," Carroll responded, adding that there is an implied threat that if an area doesn't participate, it will lose "all kinds of carrots from the federal government."

County Attorney Alan Morel related a case where it cost a landowners thousands of dollars trying to get a permit to

build an addition to his building on the river. While existing buildings are "grandfathered" as non-conforming when the law is adopted, any changes must go through the permit process, he said.

One of the reasons the county explored the possibility of entering the FEMA program was to give some way to keep people from building close to the rivers or from dumping trees and shrubs into waterways, said county planner Patsy Sanchez. When she receives reports of such abuses, she can't find any agency willing to intervene, she said.

"At some point people have to be responsible for their actions," Commissioner Wilton Howell said. "I'd rather leave it up to the people in the county. If that cabin on the river washes away, it's the owner who suffers the loss. This looks like it could be a nightmare to me."

Gaming Control Board, Hubbard may not hold both a gaming operator and distributor license. His son's two partners in the company are Harold Robertson of Louisiana and Mark Wilson of Colorado, McCarthy said.

New Mexico Gaming L.L.C.

eventually will be the state's distributor of slot and video machines from IGT — to sell, lease or operate the machines, McCarthy said. The company will not sell the machines to gaming tribes in the state; they instead will deal directly with IGT, she said. The company will provide assistance to fraternal and non-profit organiza-

tions, such as the Elks club in Alamogordo, in acquiring their gaming operators licenses as well as machines, she said.

The company will probably provide the Billy the Kid Casino with parts, new machines and technical support in the future, McCarthy said.

She and Rimbo both emphasized that Hubbard no

longer has any ownership in the distributorship company, and hasn't for some time.

"It's really a non-issue to tell the truth," Rimbo said. "He started a company and several months ago sold it, and has nothing to do with it anymore. We have nothing to do with them, or they with us. It's two separate entities."

graduating from high school in 1975 and then becoming a night manager for a Furr's grocery store until she moved with her husband in 1982 to Ruidoso to be near his family.

For the next four years, she kept busy with their two sons, Caleb and Dathan, now 20 and 23, and gave birth to their daughter, Charity, 15.

In 1986, one of Hull's friends, who was a receptionist in Parson's law office, needed a replacement while she went on vacation.

"While I was there, the bookkeeper and paralegal quit," Hull said. "What started as a temporary thing lasted 13 years. I was the bookkeeper and office manager until 1989, then (Parson's) legal assistant moved and I took her position."

The big difference between working for Parsons when she was an attorney and now as a judge is that people are nicer, Hull said. They don't yell at the assistant to a judge. She also doesn't take the problems of clients home with her at night.

But for Hull, the best part of the job is serving the public — and that's no pat cliché.

Hull's private life reflects true commitment to helping oth-

ers. She's a volunteer counselor for boys at Camp Sierra Blanca juvenile rehabilitation center and conducts Sunday Bible classes there. She helps organize the annual People's Law School seminars for Eastern New Mexico University and she's youth director at Cornerstone Church.

"I enjoy meeting people and making life easier for them, because the legal system is pretty intimidating and complicated," Hull said. "Some of those people trying to handle their own cases will call in tears. I can't give legal advice, but I can tell them the procedures."

She credits her efficiency to the help she's received from others and a good support staff from the beginning of her job in Parsons' law office.

"On-the-job training is the best thing for a legal assistant," she said, adding that she also took a paralegal course.

Parsons averages three jury trials a month. The rest of her time involves other criminal and civil matters, such as hearings on motions and divorces.

Unfortunately, Hull also sees the juvenile case load growing — now about 20 to 30 per month. She sees a need for alternate home situations for young offenders who have

served their sentences.

"The good news is that the state is recognizing the problem with half-way houses, rehabilitation and intervention," she said. She's known many boys from Camp Sierra Blanca who

should not return to their family situation and old friends. She thinks the state needs to develop more girls and boys ranches to meet that need, because the two existing (private) ranches have long waiting lists.

How the event began

Professional Secretaries Week was launched in 1952 to recognize secretaries for their professional contributions and to attract more people to secretarial careers.

Mary Barrett, president from 1951-53 of the National Secretaries Association, and C. King Woodbridge, president of Dictaphone Corporation, were serving on a council charged with addressing a national shortage of skilled office workers. With Harry Klemfuss, public relations account executive at Young & Rubicam, they developed the idea for a national secretaries week campaign.

In 1952, U.S. Secretary of Commerce Charles Sawyer proclaimed the first National Secretaries Week in June and designated June 4 as National Secretaries Day.

The dates were changed in 1955, when the association shifted the celebration to the last full week in April and the day to April 21.

In 1981, the name was switched to Professional Secretaries Week, reflecting the expanding role of office staff in line with the association's new name, Professional Secretaries International. The name changed again last year to the International Association of Administrative Professionals.

Over the years, observances of the special week not only focused on acknowledging the key role of administrative professionals, but also on professional development. The association, headquartered in Kansas City, Mo., remains the sole sponsor of the event.

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Big 'Continental Harmony' celebration makes progress

Potentially the biggest theatrical production in the area ever took another step forward on April 14 when a council was formed to oversee the Continental Harmony project.

It will be hosted by the Spencer Theater to celebrate the millennium.

A dozen people met in the Spencer Theater auditorium last Wednesday and listened to ideas about a community theatrical production that will document the region's history, cultures and hopes for the future — and possibly be broadcast nationwide on July 4, 2000.

Initiated by the American Composers Forum and the National

Endowment for the Arts, the Continental Harmony project provides composers for musical projects in all 50 states.

Margaret Lahey, education and community outreach coordinator and Pam Cromwell, publicist for the Spencer Theater, wrote a proposal for a musical drama envisioned by Patricia Brimberry, a local musician and music teacher.

"It blew them out of the water," said Brimberry, after she and Lahey heard in December that their proposal had been accepted.

Descriptions of the projects then were sent to composers nationwide, and ten composers applied to work with the Spencer project.

The crunch is on now to choose among them. Thus the brand-new

council birthed its first committee at its first meeting — the Composer Selection Committee. The five members will listen to tapes of previous works of the composers, and meet and discuss what they've heard, said Brimberry.

The composer chosen will be in the community teaching and lecturing as part of his or her residency, so the committee will consider that in their choice, as well as ability to produce original music for this project. A decision will be made by June, said Lahey.

The council is composed of representatives from the arts, the village and the business community and will

meet in May to establish the other committees necessary to accomplish the project. Community participation is a major part of the production, so the first hour will be for the council to nominate and elect chairmen for the committees, and the second hour will be open to the public, Lahey said.

At the end of the meeting, the council voted to send a letter of intent to the Roswell Symphony Orchestra, although this is contingent on getting the money to pay them, Brimberry said.

The American Composers Forum pays the composer, but the entire pro-

ject could cost from \$54,000 to \$200,000, depending on fundraising activities. Lahey has applied for a \$25,000 grant from American Express and some volunteers are researching other grant possibilities.

Brimberry has a copyrighted first draft and a production schedule and expects to have a workable draft of the drama of the three cultures making up the Southeastern part of New Mexico by July.

"This is one of the most harmonious projects that I have ever had pitched to me," said Chamber of Commerce Director Joan Zagone. "My instincts told me from the very beginning we could do this."

Getting down to highway cases

Progress, as with many other things in life like beauty and grandeur, is in the eye of the beholder.

Back in the distant past, when they first started ripping up the Sudderth-Mechem intersection, most people in Ruidoso promptly got - what? - a warm glow of municipal pride. At long last, we were going to have a wide, smooth street going north along with our wide, smooth street going east.

But that was then; this is now.

Now, a goodly number of business people are voicing concerns about that ongoing construction on Mechem, and Meadow Valley Contractors Inc., doing the work, and the New Mexico Highway and Transportation Department, which designed the work, are taking pains to respond.

One man at a meeting last week noted that the project "took away" last summer's season, and "now you are going to take away this summer." That without question is a concern for people in business in a tourist economy. Had Ruidoso been blessed with lots of snowfall in the winter just past, no doubt complaints would have been loud about losing the winter season, too. But Mother Nature, generally, got the blame for that.

Without doubt, the two-phase improvement of Mechem from Sudderth to Ski Run Road will be admired again, once it is complete. Without doubt, the contractor has bent over backward to keep the public informed about the state of the job. The state has spent lots of taxpayer-provided money to make those improvements.

And many Ruidoso business entrepreneurs - past, present and future - are maneuvering to get themselves appropriate frontage on that highway, recognizing that, despite all the pains of the present, in the future it will give them a window of opportunity.

A photograph on today's front page emphasizes another aspect, the stepped-up construction, again by Meadow Valley, of more than four miles of U. S. Highway 70 between the Highway 48 intersection and the east side of Ruidoso Downs.

Meadow Valley has millions of dollars in contracts in progress or pending in the Ruidoso area, and we believe that company is as interested as we are in getting the job done right and expeditiously. If we have a bone to pick, it is with the state planners who (no doubt recognizing the economies of size in the bidding process) apparently concluded that a whole lot of pain all at once was better than spreading it out over many years.

Like ordering a whole leg amputation rather than doing it a bone at a time, maybe.

Forest Service gets a prod from Senator Domenici

WASHINGTON - U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici has emphatically stressed that the Forest Service must accelerate its drought and fire suppression activities in the drought-prone Southwest, saying weather trends indicate this could be a disastrous drought year in parts of New Mexico.

Domenici, as a member of the Senate Interior Appropriations Subcommittee, last Friday asked Forest Service Chief Mike Dombeck to provide him with an assessment of the impending drought season in New Mexico, a review of Forest Service plans to mitigate the impact of the dry conditions, and an indication of the assistance Congress may be called on to supply due to these conditions.

"The Forest Service is behind in its forest management activities, such as prescribed burns, that could help mitigate the fire danger in our national forests, particularly when we're looking down the barrel of what could be one of the worst drought years ever," Domenici said. "I want the Forest Service to tell me exactly what it is doing to correct the situation in the Southwest and what help it will expect from Congress to get this job done."

"Quite frankly, there is a growing concern in Congress about the overall forest management practices of the Forest Service. We'll thoroughly debate this situation this year, but we need to know now what we can be done in advance of any drought-related disasters this summer," Domenici said.

The proposed Forest Service funding in 2000 was the topic of a Interior Appropriations Subcommittee hearing last week.

Domenici also asked for a review of how the Forest Service is working with the Federal Emergency Management Administration (FEMA) and the National Resources Conservation Service to plan for possible drought problems this year.

Domenici is author of the National Drought Policy Act of 1998, which calls for the creation of a commission to make recommendations on improving government management of drought emergencies. As a Senate Appropriations Committee member, Domenici is seeking \$1 million to fund the commission in 2000.

The drought commission, which is still being formed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, will consist of repre-

sentatives of those federal, state, local and tribal agencies and organizations most involved with drought issues. It will be responsible for providing recommendations on a permanent and systematic federal process to address drought situations.

Domenici is also requesting \$200,000 for the National Drought Mitigation Center which serves as an information clearinghouse for local, state, tribal and federal governments, providing timely and reliable information to

these entities on drought conditions, monitoring tools, and appropriate mitigation and planning actions through direct contact and its Internet web site. The president zeroed out funding for this center in his budget requests for 2000.

Neighbors object to planned town home development

Four neighbors of a proposed town home development near White Mountain Drive expressed concern Tuesday about whether the area could handle increased traffic from this and future developments.

Keith Hatfield, one of the neighbors, told the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission he and others did not oppose the nine town homes planned by developer Tim Hoyt off Racquet and Granite drives.

"What we are objecting to is the ingress and egress off Racquet Drive," Hatfield told the commission.

The street, where a total of about 100 condominium units and homes are located, is already too congested, he said. Additionally, the dead-end road has only one entrance, which could represent a danger to residents during a wildfire, he said.

The town home development and future development of nearby properties would "be putting people and children in a precarious situation," he

said. The village should put in another access to the area. He suggested an extension of Racquet Drive through a private lot to White Mountain Meadows Drive.

Tim Vega, a village planner, pointed out that only three of the proposed town homes, to be called Vista Grande, would have access from Racquet Drive; the remaining six would have entrances off Granite.

Commissioners Bill Hirschfeld and Glen Barrow expressed sympathy for the neighbors' concerns regarding traffic and for previous poor planning of the area. But, Barrow pointed out, the commission could not prohibit landowners from developing their lots on the basis of preventing congestion.

Hirschfeld, who said the area has the highest density in Ruidoso, said the commission could recommend the village's street department create an additional access to the area. Barrow, however, cautioned that the process is "not easy."

The commission unanimously granted Hoyt's application for a preliminary plat approval for the project.

Academic Awards, Principal's List and Distinguished Warrior awards were presented, and 26 new members were inducted into the National Honor Society.



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Completion in sight for new crosswind runway at Sierra Blanca

• About 30 percent of planes landing at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport will benefit from the crosswind runway, the airport director says.

By late July or early August, planes should be landing on the new \$5 million crosswind runway at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, Tim Morris, airport director, said this week.


The new runway, which bisects the existing runway, will allow lighter planes to take off and land without fighting so much crosswind on Fort Stanton mesa, where the airport is located.

"I think it's going to increase our traffic," Morris said, adding that 30 percent of the private planes that use the Alto airport can be affected by crosswinds. Until the new runway is ready, lighter planes are being diverted to Roswell when a strong crosswind is blowing, Morris said.


No commercial flights now use the airport.

Construction on the 6,500-foot runway started in September of 1998, Morris said. Previously estimated at \$8 million, runway project plans were modified to lower the cost.

Ninety-percent of the new runway is paid with Federal Aviation Administration grants. Morris said federal money is from revenues collected from the travel

industry, such as taxes on airline tickets and fuel purchases. The village of Ruidoso, which owns the airport, chipped in another 5 percent of the cost, and the state, the remaining 5 percent.

Ruidoso's share of the funds comes out of the revenues generated by a 1/4-cent gross receipts tax in the village. That tax, established in 1988, is dedicated to the airport.

Crosswinds typically do not affect the larger planes and jets that come into the airport, Morris said. However, the new runway will benefit all traffic when one runway needs to be closed for maintenance or snow removal, Morris said.

The Ruidoso Village Council last week approved bids to complete work on the runway. Mead-

ow Valley Contractors Inc., the Phoenix-based firm now contracted by the state for three area highway projects, submitted the lowest of three bids to pave the new runway at a total cost of \$2.4 million. Bixby Electric, with a bid of \$148,000, was the lowest of four bidders to put in lights for the runway.

Morris said the crosswind runway will not be paved until the temperature reaches 55 degrees or more, the ideal temperature for laying asphalt. Most work on the new runway so far consists of excavation and fills to make a level surface.

Sierra Blanca Regional Airport also has benefited recently from other FAA grants, including \$300,000 for a special fire truck with a capacity of 1,500 gallons of

water, and a \$320,000 building to house the truck. Morris said the firefighting capabilities were needed at the airport because of its distance from other agencies.

State and federal legislation that would allow the resumption of commercial flights to Ruidoso is at the half-way point to becoming law, Morris also said Monday.

Last week, Gov. Gary Johnson signed legislation on the state's side, but federal legislation still is pending in Congress, Morris said.

The state's legislation allows government subsidies for commercial flights as well as a state and local match. Three previous providers of commercial flights to Ruidoso have pulled the service, concluding it was not feasible at the time.

Study of 1869 Mescalero Apache-U. S. cavalry battle site slated

MESCALERO — Two grants will finance an archaeological study of the site of a battle between the Mescalero Apache and U. S. Cavalry in

1869. The National Park Service's American Battlefield Protection Program awarded grants totaling \$35,400 to the

Lincoln National Forest and the Mescalero Apache Tribe, Ruidoso's closest neighbor, for a study in the Guadalupe Mountains near Carlsbad.

The study will help identify boundaries and key aspects of the battle.

"We were very impressed with this proposal," said Bryan Mitchell, chief of the battlefield protection program.

"Many of this nation's significant battlefields are at risk and will be lost or badly compromised without the continuing good work of agencies

like the Forest Service and the Mescalero Apache Tribe."

The program was established by federal law to protect significant battle sites associated with all wars fought on American soil.

The program provide assistance to state, local and tribal governments, as well as private organizations to protect and manage the battlefields at the community level,

without resorting to costly federal intervention to acquire and maintain them.

If you want a July 4th fireworks display, pray for a wet June

If the Fourth of July isn't a holiday without fireworks, pray for a wet June.

To prepare for the possibility of imposing an emergency ban on fireworks if current drought conditions continue, the Lincoln County Commission will consider approving a fireworks ordinance next month.

Commissioners directed County Manager Tom Stewart to set a hearing on an ordinance drafted by County Attorney Alan Morel, modeled after provisions already laid out in new state law.

The proposed county law gives the commission the authority to declare an extreme or severe drought in unincorporated portions of the county, based on information from the National Weather Service and relevant data from the U.S. Forest Service.

The penalty for violating the ban would be up to one year in jail and \$1,000 fine.

Once the county is declared a severe drought area, the law would ban the sale and use of missile-type rockets, helicopters, aerial spinners, stick-type rockets and ground and audible devices.

Other permissible fireworks would be limited to areas that are paved or barren and have a readily accessible source of water for use by homeowners and the general public.

All fireworks would be banned in the wild lands and all sales would be banned or restricted.

The proclamation must be issued no less than 20 days before July 4, and will remain in effect for 30 days, unless modified or rescinded by the commission, because of improved weather conditions.

Traditionally, fireworks displays are conducted in Carrizozo by the local fire department. The only other major display was staged for two years at the Spencer Theater for the Performing Arts, but last year the foundation put on a ground display only for contributors.

Paul Baca, of the Carrizozo Fire Department, said his group plans a big show again this year, but emphasized that

precautions always are taken if the county is experiencing a drought.

The proposed county ordinance also sets up a \$25 fee covering a one-year permit for selling fireworks and one section deals with improper handling of fire, including allowing it to escape prescribed boundaries, setting a fire without permission, leaving a campfire or starting a fire with a lighted and discarded cigar, cigarette or match. Violations of that provision would be punishable by a fine of up to \$400 and jail sentence of up to 90 days.

Volunteer examiners were Joe, Rick and Dusty Rhodes, AA5BJ, Sohl said. Dusty Rhodes is the president of the Sierra Blanca ARC and the volunteer examiner coordinator.

Most of these new amateurs (called hams) and many of the older hams will be receiving further training in emergency-disaster communications, as a part of the newly formed Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) and Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service (RACES) in Lincoln County.

This training will be Sunday, April 25, in Ruidoso at the Texas New Mexico Power Company class room.

ARES and RACES were formed to provide a supply of volunteer Amateur Radio operators and stations to provide or supplement radio communications in the event of emergency or disaster events in the area. Team members check into a state ARES / RACES radio network twice each month.

Some members of the ARES / RACES are affiliated with Military Affiliate Radio Service (MARS), Civil Air Patrol (CAP) New Mexico State Guard 39th Signal Battalion and Shared Resources (SHARES) High Frequency (HF) Radio Program, run by the Federal Government National Communications Network; SHARES networks reach directly to FEMA in Washington, D.C.

Fishing report

RIO RUIDOSO: The river is flowing at 7 CFS. Fish are scattered and very mobile this spring. Best patterns are pheasant tails, green rock worms, princeps. Nymphs will be best producers. Expect flows to decrease rapidly until monsoon season - if it arrives.

BONITO CREEK: Above the lake, flows are 2-CFS. Flows below the lake are 1 CFS at 2. Some spawning runs up from lake. Best patterns are same as the Ruidoso, and nymphs will be top producers here. Below the lake the creek is virtually unfishable.

ALTO LAKE: Unfishable. Deemed unsuitable for trout by Game and Fish Department. No stocking planned in the future.

GRINDSTONE RESERVOIR: Some surface feeding morning and evening. Good time of year to catch large browns. Best patterns are midges, pheasant tails, streamers and pistol pates. The lake level is now full.

BONITO LAKE: Lake level is almost full. Road construction on north side will hamper access, however allowances will be made for parking. The lake opened for fishing April 1st. Best patterns are beats, midges, golden stone, nymphs and dries both.

LAKE MESCALERO: Lake level is steady. Will be May 1st before boats are available. Good dry fly action mid-morning and late evening. Griffiths gnats, hornbergs and caddis are best choices.

Silver Lake opened April 1st and has been fairly productive. All other waters on the reservation will open on May 1st.

Home track meet tough, but Warriors get 3rd

Those Warrior tracksters faced some tough competition at their home meet Saturday, but rose to the challenge.

The Ruidoso Invitational included four AAAA (soon to be AAAAA) teams, two strong AAA visitors and an El Paso school. The boys finished third, behind AAAA Carlsbad and AAA Artesia.

Individually, Thomas Schiele again took the spotlight, breaking his own state record in the triple jump with a distance of 44 8-1/2. He finished second in the pole vault, tying with Clovis' Will Laing at 12 feet and finished second in the long jump, just 3 inches behind John Nance of Carlsbad.

"I just finally got my steps down," Schiele said, admitting he was surprised at how far he jumped. But he said he plans to beat that distance at state, improving on his state record.

Coach Ronny Maskew had words of praise for several Warrior runners and teams.

"Solomon Barnett ran well in the 200-meter (dash)," the coach said. "We had some of our younger distance runners runs run extremely well. Two of our short relays qualified for state, and had the best times we've had in a long time. We're really excited about those relays."

The relays were consistent in their finishes, with the 400-, 800- and medley teams finishing third. The 1,600-meter team came in sixth.

Ruidoso's other first-place finisher was Keegan Reidhead, who cleared the high jump bar at 6 feet.

The girls finished in sixth, but early in the day suffered a big loss.

Amber Green injured her hamstring the last part of the 200-meter dash preliminaries, causing her to pull out of the rest of the competition. Neither she nor Coach Maskew think the injury is serious, but both would have liked to have seen her compete Saturday.

"I was kinda disappointed that in front of all my friends and family I couldn't perform the way I should be able to," Green said.

"She's one of our top performers, and when we don't have her that cuts out some on our relay and on some individual events. She wasn't in three individual events, so that hurts. That hurt us some, but we'll come back and get after it."

Ruidoso's highest individual finisher was Abby Figueroa, who took third in the shotput. The girls also did well in both hurdle events, with Monica Keyes and Tammi Sparks finishing three and four in the 300-meter hurdles, and Brooke Bogle

taking fourth in the 100-meter hurdles and Keyes seventh.

Kammi Sparks and Keyes both medaled in the high jump, with Sparks finishing third and Keyes fifth.

The 1,600-meter relay team gave the Warrior girls their best finish of the day, finishing just behind Las Cruces. The 800-meter team finished third and the 400-meter fourth.

Overall, Maskew was pleased with the effort.

"There were some good schools here and I think it made for a real competitive meet," he said. "They all did a very good job. We thought it was a great meet."

The Warriors will get back on the road Thursday, traveling to Artesia for the Artesia Invitational.

April 22, 1949

April 25, 1969

Funeral services for Lloyd P. Bloodworth, 78, founder of the Ruidoso News, were held Tuesday at the Sonora, Tex. Methodist Church.

Bloodworth established the Ruidoso News and was its editor and publisher until he sold it to Vic Lamb in 1951. He was also active in the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce, serving as secretary and officer.

Cindy Martinez makes the 'Big Day' even bigger with a millennium celebration

CAPITAN — She's planned for weddings on horseback and is putting together a millennium ceremony and reception for 100 couples at the Roswell International UFO Museum & Research Center.

But Cindy Martinez says she's basically an old-fashioned girl who likes tradition.

In the business for 16 years while living in several locations across the state, Martinez recently settled in Capitan as a base for Weddings by Cindy, because she prefers cooler weather than Las Cruces, where she lived right before her move.

"Originally, I was a florist in Lordsburg. In a small town, you do everything you can," she said. "We always pitched in and helped clients with their weddings. While I was raising my children, the wedding end of the business was easier to handle. I spent more time as a wedding consultant, because my two daughters could be with me. They both have the talent, but neither chose it as a career. One is a court reporter and the other is a musician."

Martinez boasts that she's never put on a wedding that flopped, despite flower and cake-wilting temperatures; and even when she had to "ship" an entire wedding north to Denver.

"I've never had a cake that didn't arrive or flowers that died," she said. "That's why I could advertise weddings without a hitch."

Receptions present a bigger challenge and are more expensive than the actual ceremony, she said.

"You're dealing with so many different people with different tastes, and you have to find a place and food that will appeal to the grandmother of the bride as well as the younger people attending," she said.

Weddings outside and receptions inside continue to be the most popular arrangement, Martinez said, adding she always has backup in case of bad weather.

Favorite months have shifted to late May — right after school lets out — and late August — right before school reconvenes, she said. Roses and lilies still are popular for bouquets, and sit-down dinners and live music are in demand.

She dispelled a misperception that brides on their second and third marriages shouldn't wear white.

"White is the color of happiness or purity, but it's the blusher veil (the veil over the face) and the dress train that are signs of a first marriage and virginity, so a white dress is not out for a second marriage," she said. "Just wear a hat or hair piece."

One of Martinez' most popular packages is the elopement or informal wedding for visitors to Lincoln County. She prepares the ceremony,

the cake, the bouquets and arranges a dinner after the wedding, or any variations agreed on, often all by telephone. The family arrives and everything is ready.

Other packages can be much more involved, including shopping with the bride for the wedding dress — "I can be the surrogate mom, if necessary," — or a simple \$50 consultation for a "do it yourself" wedding.

She prefers wedding packages to hourly charges for consulting, because she wants her clients to feel free

to call with any worries or changes, without hearing the meter running.

The idea for the millennium wedding struck Martinez while she was in London and saw the Millennium Dome being built there.

"People are looking for a place to go that night. There are celebrations at the pyramids of Egypt. Others are planning the birth of their child for the turn of the millennium," she said. "You can't be sure about a child, but you can predict a wedding date and I knew this would be a

big date and I thought a midnight ceremony at the museum in Roswell would be unique. They can choose if they were married in 1999 or 2000."

The surroundings will be unique, but the ceremony won't be a circus with little "aliens," she said.

It will be "appropriately classy," using ministers and a Roswell judge.

Her daughter Amy, a classical guitarist who lives in London, wrote the music and will perform at the wedding. A reception will precede the wedding with retro music from 1947, the year of the reported UFO landing north of Roswell in Lincoln County, as well as techno music.

Security guards will be dressed in the style of the science fiction movie, "Men in Black." A special millennium cake has been designed by Rita Gomez to serve 500 people.

Besides the millennium wedding, one of the most unusual settings she's worked with was a ceremony on the construction site.

"The groom was building a 9,000-square-foot house for his bride, but it wasn't finished," Martinez said. "But it had a great hall and I had a large reception catered there. I decorated paint cans and anything associated with the construction with balloons. I tried to get her to wear a hard hat with a veil, but she drew the line at that."

Girls still like the traditional wedding, but not necessarily in a church, she said. They like the long trains and fairy tale dresses. She recently received an inquiry about a Victorian wedding.

Whenever a royal marries, Martinez prepares for a run of "look-alike" requests in bouquets, dresses, veils and other aspects.

Between weddings, Martinez keeps busy doing workshops on floral arranging through New Mexico State University and has a Victorian flower workshop planned to benefit the Lincoln County Historical Society. Martinez may be contacted at (505) 354-3368, or write HC71-1034, Capitan, NM 88316.

Financial planning helps newlyweds avoid conflicts

LAS CRUCES — Reviewing financial situations can help couples avoid potential conflicts as they plan for marriage, said a New Mexico State University consumer education specialist.

Because some of the first conflicts in a new marriage are often related to money problems, couples should talk about finances before the wedding, said Susan Wright with NMSU's Cooperative Extension Service.

"If a newlywed couple has not talked about handling their money, they should schedule a time to do some financial planning," she said. "Each person's financial goals and expectations should be determined. Try to resolve conflicting goals and agree on some spending and saving priorities."

Each person should list all liabilities and assets and reveal any financial

secrets. Decide whether current debts will become joint obligations, or remain the responsibility of the individual.

Experts recommend that couples decide how to treat income before they get married — or shortly after the wedding, Wright said.

If both work, a decision needs to be made about whether to pool income into a common fund, and whether each person will make equal or proportionate contributions to the fund.

"Consider the record-keeping implications of the system you choose and decide who will handle the day-to-day money management chores," Wright recommended.

"Schedule time early in the marriage to set up a budget and commit to follow it."

Tax and credit decisions also are important considerations. Joint income

needs to be estimated, and W-4 forms filed with employers should be adjusted, she said. Not having enough withheld may mean the couple will have to pay the Internal Revenue Service in April.

Couples should discuss their philosophy about using credit cards, Wright said.

They may want to cut down on the number of cards they have to reduce annual fees and the easy availability of credit cards.

The new bride may decide to keep at least one charge card in her own name to maintain a separate credit history.

Couples also should evaluate insurance and employee benefits.

Compare existing policies for life, disability, homeowner and auto insur-

ance, Wright advised. Eliminate gaps or overlapping coverage and make appropriate changes in beneficiaries.

If both are employed and receive medical benefits, evaluate the policies to determine whether one plan should cover both, or if each person should add the other.

Finally, brides who change their last name should make changes on all important papers and make address corrections as soon as possible after the wedding, she said.

Names should be changed on bank accounts, savings accounts and other banking services. The social security office also should be notified of name changes.

USDA gets 'nudge' on small farm issues

LAS CRUCES - A national commission appointed to look at the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) policies and practices for small farm operators and poor farmers has gone a step further. Some commission members, including New Mexico State University's Edmund Gomez, have formed a "Time to Act" campaign to help small farms stay in business.

In 1997, Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman appointed the National Commission on Small Farms to review USDA's current policies for small farms and to determine a course of action to respond to their needs.

"We identified eight different policy goals taken from public input from across the country that affect the small farming industry," Gomez said.

"From these eight policy goals, 146 recommendations were submitted for USDA's consideration in policy

changes last year."

Twenty four of the 29 commission members felt that not enough effort was being made to comply with the recommendations. After giving USDA three more months to take action, they formed a committee on their own and issued a report this year.

The report, "A Time to Act," was an attempt to nudge USDA into doing something about small farm issues, said Gomez, director of the Rural Agricultural Improvement and Public Affairs Project (RAIPAP) with NMSU's Cooperative Extension Service.

The report gave the USDA the following grades: a D for market access; B+, market development; C, research and Extension; C+, conservation; C, credit; B, support for beginning farmers; D, farm workers; C, civil rights; B, risk management; and C+, outreach and organization.

Leave wild baby animals where you find them

ROSWELL - People who pick up wild baby animals may think they're helping, but in most cases, they are separating the young from their mothers unnecessarily and with harmful results, says Ben Hanson with the New Mexico Game and Fish Department in Roswell.

Some separations are unavoidable.

"Last Friday, the first baby animals of this spring were picked up by a conservation officer," he said. "A mother raccoon decided that spring was here and managed to sneak into someone's home in Ruidoso. She built a nice nest on their bed and had her babies. The raccoons were discovered and when our officer tried to remove them, the mother escaped leaving behind her babies."

Until the end of summer, many young animals will show up at the doorstep of game officers all over the state, he said. Wind storms will knock young birds out of nests. Cats and kids will gather up an amazing assortment of young wildlife.

"Many folks will play good Samaritan, picking up supposedly abandoned or orphaned young critters," Hanson said. "There also will be reports of people keeping wild young an-

imals for pets. Before anyone picks up one of these wild critters, I would like to point out a few things.

"Nature has a way of taking care of our animal populations by having parents produce many more offspring than are needed to keep the species viable. Lots of these young one are not going to survive and that's the way it is meant to be. It's part of the cycle and it's impossible to save every young bird that falls out of the nest."

Although many people want a young wild animal for a pet, because they are cuddly and cute, Hanson pointed out it's against the law to possess wild animals without a special permit, and then only for a good reason.

"Few people have the knowledge and skill, along with the time, to properly care for a wild animal," he said. "A good example of this occurred in Roswell last year when two deer fawns were picked up in the same area within a week's time. The person thought they were abandoned, but the mother probably was nearby. Conservation officers were called and the fawns were taken to the Roswell Zoo for professional care. Both died. It's extremely difficult to raise wild animals. They're often better off where they

are, out in the wild."

Some animals are not meant to be domesticated and can become aggressive, unmanageable or mean, Hanson said.

"If you turn it loose, it has little chance to survive since it has never learned how to live in the wild," he said. "If you take it to the Game Department, you have violated the law by possessing the animal and will receive a citation. The best thing would have been not to have picked up the critter in the first place."

The prognosis isn't much better for animals raised under a permit. Most can't be released back into the wild, because it's difficult to teach them how to survive. They probably will spend the rest of their lives in a zoo, he said.

The best course is to contact the Game Department and let professionals decide.

"Often the mother has left her baby in what she thinks is a safe place while she feeds and will return later to claim it," Hanson said. "Even if you know for certain the mother is dead or gone, let a conservation officer take care of the young animal. This will eliminate any problems."

State's public schools, governor, battle the dropout problem, top to bottom

HONDO — Hondo Valley Schools' "Anglo" dropout rate is the highest in the state, with a whopping 25 percent — but the superintendent of schools here isn't worried.

"Hondo had three dropouts last year out of 165 students — one Anglo and two Hispanic," said Barbara Casey. "Out of four Anglo students, one dropped out ... Dropouts has never been a problem in Hondo."

While it may not be a problem for Hondo, it is for New Mexico: almost 30,000 young people dropped out of high school in the state between 1993 and 1997, according to the State Department of Education's (SDE) "Dropout Study."

It is these numbers that the governor is using to bash the state's educational system, said his press secretary Diane Kinderwater.

"Dropouts are rising," said Kinderwater, comparing the number of dropouts in 1996-97 to the number in 1993-94. As far as the total number dropping out goes, she's right; but the dropout rate actually has fallen. In 1993-94 it was 8.2 percent, while it was 7.8 percent in 1996-97 (or, as in a chart in "The Accountability Report" put out by the SDE, 7.7 percent).

Still, that's a lot of dropouts. Only Louisiana and Nevada show higher dropout rates than New Mexico for the 1995-96 school year, the last year for which data is available on state comparisons by the U.S. Department of Education. But only 31 states submitted data for this study, so New Mexico might look better compared with those states not reporting.

The West, in general, has the highest dropout rates of all four regions of the country, at 12.5 percent, compared with the Midwest's 8.8 percent.

In Lincoln County, the dropout rates are lower than the state's average, although Ruidoso Municipal School's 7.5 percent is pretty close — but that's an improvement over the 12.4 percent dropout rate for the 1993-94 school year.

Mike Gladden, Ruidoso superintendent of schools, said Gavilan Canyon School has helped to reduce the number of students who drop out, as it serves 20 students who are not coping well in the regular school environment.

The school-to-work transition program may also bring the dropout rate down, Gladden said, giving students options for staying in school.

Most of the students who drop out at Ruidoso High School tell counselor Linda Hawthorne they're going to get their GED (Graduate Equivalency Diploma) to "move on with their lives faster." Some tell her they need to work, or that it takes too long to get their high school diploma.

Hawthorne warns them the GED is no longer considered an equivalent to a high school diploma, and the military no longer accepts it unless there is some successful college experience as well.

"A lot of students think they've messed up, that they've gotten behind and can't catch up," said Hawthorne. She tries to work with them, telling them they can get back on track and still graduate with their class.

Ruidoso also has many job opportunities in the tourist industry that tempt young peo-

ple out of school, she said. Hawthorne helps them make a budget based on service wages and rent, utilities, food, car expenses and they see they're not going to have the money to live the way they want to live.

Other students, many of whom work from their freshman year on, lose connection with the school and then become discouraged and just quit.

Capitan's dropout rate is only 1.5 percent, and the high school counselor, Gerald Montes, said that is because it's a small school, with most class sizes averaging 15 to 16 students.

"Probably kids are getting more individualized attention," Montes said. "They're not just numbers... Our teachers do a pretty good job of motivating them, keeping them in school, and most of the kids in this school have good parental support."

Montes said the majority who drop out are "age-conscious," older than their classmates and so far behind in credits that they get frustrated and drop out. Others, he said, have no self-motivation and don't see the value in finishing high school.

"The other problem you get," he said, "is they work summers or after school and they make a lot of money and don't have to pay expenses themselves."

Both Hawthorne and Casey raised questions about the accuracy of dropout statistics, Hawthorne saying there are different ways of reporting dropouts and Casey saying the reports that come out of the State Department of Education are never correct. Montes said the only way Capitan has to follow up on students who leave school is if transfers are received from other schools.

NMSU expands web access for New Mexico kids

LAS CRUCES — New Mexico kids can learn about pizza, chocolate and potatoes in an electronic history class, starting this week.

They can spend time digging up plants, either outdoors or indoors, on their computers. They also can become electronic pen pals with Virginia students.

These connections are being made on the World Wide Web through a partnership with the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of Natural History, New Mexico State University and the Las Cruces Public Schools. The two-year project is funded by the National Science Foundation and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"This project is an exciting way to combine the dirt-under-your-fingernails exploration that kids love with the computers they also enjoy," said Jeanne Gleason, a profes-

sor with NMSU's agricultural communications department in the College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

NMSU first worked with the Smithsonian in 1992 on a "Seeds of Change" educational video called "Green Gold." It was part of a larger exhibit that marked the 500th anniversary of Columbus' arrival in the New World.

"We felt there was more of the story to be told," said Carmen Gonzalez, an associate professor with NMSU's College of Education. "We wanted to enhance the exhibit by adding more of the richness of cultures here in the Southwest — our people, plants, animals and environment."

Through the web, the project will put information from world-class museums at the fingertips of students in rural New Mexico, said Cissy Anklam, director of the Smithsonian's Natural Part-

ners project.

As part of the project, NMSU is designing and maintaining several web pages. The first is packed with information about plants, foods and their origins.

"This particular web site is designed to make learning fun for the kids," Gleason said. "For example, can you imagine pizza without tomatoes? Well, there were no tomatoes in Italy before the Old and New Worlds collided."

As web explorers also will learn, the Dutch had no chocolate, and the Irish had no potatoes until they received them from the Americas.

Students will be able to take their history lessons outdoors for some hands-on science. Maybe they'll start a pizza garden with tomatoes and herbs. Or they may choose to plant flowers that will attract butterflies or a "touching" garden with inter-

esting textures.

"It gives students an opportunity to experience science as a hands-on activity," said Norm Lownds, associate professor of agronomy and horticulture at NMSU. "It can be generated by their own questions, things they have seen in their garden or wonder about. Really, that's where science starts — by asking questions."

Lownds has used the gardening approach successfully with groups ranging from preschoolers to teachers.

Although the materials will be used initially with cooperating classes in Las Cruces and Arlington, Virginia, the web site will be accessible for use internationally, starting Nov. 12, Gleason said.

RHS student honored

Joe Hixon is recognized among the top 25 freshmen students at Ruidoso High School with his grade point average of 3.857. Honors were received at the April 12, 1999 Academic Awards Banquet.

Hixon is a member of the class of 2002. After graduation he plans to continue his education at a university yet to be determined. He is the son of Don Hixon and Susan Hixon of Ruidoso.

Graduated licenses OK'd

Gov. Gary E. Johnson signed the Graduated Driver's License Bill April 6, convinced it can save lives.

The governor said statistics from states which have implemented similar bills convinced him to sign the legislation — at least a 5 percent reduction in traffic accidents when a more restrictive

licensing plan for teenagers is adopted.

A 5 percent reduction in accidents involving teens in New Mexico would be about 1,200 a year, Johnson said.

In 1998, there were 24,000 traffic accidents in New Mexico involving teenage drivers, 56 of them involved fatalities between the ages of 15 and 19, with more than 2,600 serious injuries in that age group.

The law will require 15-year-olds to receive an instruction permit first, then at 15 1/2 years of age, a provisional license is needed, and a 16 1/2-year-old can receive a full license. To graduate to the next level, students must complete a driver education program, have parents certify that the teen has completed a minimum of 50 hours of driving, and hold an instruction permit for six months while remaining violation-free for three months.



He added hundreds of words and phrases to the English language.



Shakespeare was born in this house in Stratford-upon-Avon, a small town near London. The house is still standing.

Shakespeare was born and died on the same day of the month, April 23. He was born in 1564 and died in 1616 at the age of 52.

His mother's family were well-to-do farmers. His father was a glovemaker.

He went to a local grammar school, where his studies included Latin and Greek. Boys went to school from 6 o'clock in the morning until 5 o'clock in the afternoon, six days a week.

He married Anne Hathaway at the age of 18. She was 26. They had three children.

By the time he was 30, Shakespeare was working in London as an actor. When he was 35, the Globe Theatre opened. He was one of the owners.

This famous theater made him wealthy. He did not make much money from writing his plays. Playwrights were not very respected. Poets were.



POOP SCOOP

First, a really heart-warming story about a spayed female Labrador named Bacon.

The blonde dog, a resident at the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter on Gavilan Canyon Road, appeared in the newspaper several times on the monthly Adopt-A-Pet sponsorship page.

A couple, who split their time between Ruidoso and a home in Minnesota, noticed her repeat appearances and began talking about the possibility of adopting her. They couldn't get her sweet face out of their minds.

They recently returned to Minnesota, but called shelter staff to tell them to get Bacon ready for a new home. The couple returned to Ruidoso last weekend and made it official.

National Dog Bite Week

The national campaign of the Humane Society of the United States aimed at reducing the number of dog bite injuries that occur each year is set for May 16-22.

Ten to 20 people die every year from dog bites, most are children. Nearly 2 percent of the United States' population is bitten by a dog each year, more than 4.7 million - again most are children.

The HSUS believes that high a statistics is preventable.

In most cases, dog bites are not

caused by "bad dogs," but by irresponsible dog owners, according to the national group and the Lincoln County Humane Society.

Dogs who are not properly socialized to people, not supervised or safety confined, not sterilized or who receive little attention and handling, are those who often bite humans.

Although particular breeds of dogs are accused if being most likely to bite, other characteristics are better predictors of canine biting behavior: Dogs who have not been spayed or neutered are three times more likely to bite. For that reason, the society suggests that the first step to prevent biting is to sterilize the pet.

Proper socialization, supervision, humane training and safe confinement also are important components of responsible dog ownership and bite prevention.

Dogs bite for several reasons, including fear, protection of territory and to establish their dominance.

Some owners mistakenly teach their dogs that biting is an acceptable form of play behavior. The society advises owners not to play aggressive games with a dog, such as wrestling, tug of war or "slicing" a dog on another person.

Society officials also say the most effective dangerous dog laws place legal responsibility for a dog's actions on the dog's owner instead of the dog.

PBS' *Battlefield: Vietnam* mainly for history buffs

Sgt. Joe Friday of *Dragnet* would have loved *Battlefield: Vietnam*, a 12-hour PBS series premiering Friday, April 30 (check local listings).

Even by public television standards, this presentation, which incorporates recently collected international footage, seems so doggedly determined not to talk down to its audience that what emerges is dry, just-the-facts-ma'am history, presumably

aimed directly at serious students of the era.

That's not a bad thing in and of itself, of course, but with Gavin MacFadyen's somnolent narration and David Galbraith's elegiac music, casual viewers are not likely to find themselves on the edges of their seats.

Still, as the saying goes, for those who like this sort of thing, this is the sort of thing they will like, so here is a quick overview of the six two-hour installments, for those reluctant to commit to the entire series:

• "Dien Bien Phu - The Legacy/The Undeclared War" (Friday) traces the roots of the war from the conflict between Vietnamese and French colonists.

• "Search and Destroy/Showdown on the Iron Triangle" (May 7) shows how shifting Viet Cong tactics frustrate U.S. attempts to wipe out guerrilla units.

• "Countdown to Tet/The Tet Offensive" (May 14) chronicles North Vietnam's launching of a major offensive that catches the Americans by surprise.

• "War on the DMZ/Siege at Khe Sahn" (May 21) examines the 77-day siege of a U.S. Marine base, the most violent single battle of the war.

• "Air War Vietnam/Rolling Thunder" (May 28) relates how U.S. military leaders counter North Vietnamese ground troop superiority with strikes from above.

• "Peace With Honor/The Fall of Saigon" (June 4) focuses on the anguished final days of the war, as U.S. forces prepare to withdraw, to the horror of their South Vietnamese allies.





Scientific American Frontiers introduces host Alan Alda to a few of the more exotic among the 39,000 known species of spider, including the largest spiders on Earth and those whose native habitat is a computer.

In "Spiders!," Alda meets one of the world's leading arachnologists, Fritz Vollrath, who introduces the basics of how and when spiders build webs, and tells how webs might have evolved.

Next, Alda travels to Binghamton University, State University of New York, where he meets Stim Wilcox, who studies a species of jumping spider called *Portia*, that tricks its enemies by disguising the vibratory signals it sends.

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

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In United Paramount Network's new cartoon series *Home Movies*, premiering after *Dilbert* on Monday, April 26, comic Paula Poundstone lends her voice to a single mom — which she is in real life — named Paula. Comic and actor Brendon Small, 24, provides the voice of Paula's moviemaking 8-year-old son, named (surprise) Brendon Small.

The show blurs the lines between the actors' lives and the characters they create. The episodes take form, Poundstone explains, in a taped conversation via digital telephone with executive producer Loren Bouchard in Boston.

"I just start obsessive-compulsive talking about my kids and my day, and he just starts taping it," Poundstone says from her Los Angeles home, where she lives with her three adopted and foster children and nine cats. "And he's letting me do this for pay!"

Small, who gives voice to Brendon, says he played with moviemaking as a child in Monterey, Calif. "I did have a video camera and forced my friends to act in my movies," he admits. The series' home movie motif was his idea, he says, and the character Brendon displays "exaggerations of how I think or feel. I wouldn't react that way in real life, but I would love to."

Executive producer Bouchard discovered Small while he was still a student at Berklee College of Music, doing stand-up at a comedy club in Harvard Square. Small recalls that Bouchard put him in front of the microphone his first time in the studio and said, "Fool around. Act like a kid, and go."

Bouchard encourages this kind of improvisation. "They're all chosen specifically for their ability to do this," he says. Poundstone, Small and the other actors improvise their parts, then their voices are synced with the animation. In a reverse of normal cartoon procedure, the animation process begins after the soundtrack is finished.

The technique, called retroscripting, is Bouchard's brainchild and shows an unusual trust in the talent of his cast. The producer perfected retroscripting on *Dr. Katz, Professional Therapist*, the Emmy Award-winning Comedy Central cartoon series.

The debut episode of *Home Movies*,

"Get Away From My Mom," gives a taste of each character's activities and idiosyncrasies.

Precocious and socially awkward Brendon reveals his passion for making home movies with his friends and his video camera, Paula obsesses about her upcoming date with Brendon's soccer coach, McGuirk (voice of H. Jon Benjamin), and McGuirk tells his players he's disappointed they're not performing as well as the professional soccer team he saw on television, even though the pro team is "a lot older."

The humor is offbeat and quirky, complementing the childlike "SquiggleVision" animation also seen in *Dr. Katz*.

Poundstone calls Paula "a little odd," but says female viewers especially will relate to her. On the phone, Paula insists to a friend she's going on her date with McGuirk in her trademark sweat pants — otherwise "it might seem like false advertising."

The comments Poundstone intends for Paula can become confused with her own opinions during her taped calls to Boston, the comic says. She sometimes finds herself saying to Bouchard, "Wait, wait, this is me talking now."

That doesn't matter to Bouchard; he'll use it all. "A 22-minute episode can have five hours of tape on the computer, and the (sound) editing takes longer than the animation — four or five weeks per episode compared to three or four weeks," he says.

Bouchard insists he wouldn't do it any differently. "What you get by improvisation is better than what you could get any other way," he explains. "People's voices are different when they're talking than when they're reading. The characters emerge from hours and hours and hours of goofing around."

Poundstone agrees. "We struggle here and there, and we fly here and there," she says, acknowledging that "they do a lot of editing."

It helps that most of the crew has worked together since 1995 on *Dr. Katz*, including Benjamin, who lends his voice to Katz's son, Ben.

"We love developing relationships with actors that go across shows," Bouchard says.

"We couldn't do this if we didn't have the troupe mentality. Now that we've been doing this for a while, we can take even more chances."

CBS' *Durango* has sweetest of charms: innocence

The friendly, teasing humor starts with the title *Durango*.

The Hallmark Hall of Fame presentation airing Sunday, April 25, on CBS isn't a dusty Western as its name implies, but an adaptation of novelist John B. Keane's tale of a wee cattle drive across the Irish countryside. Keane, considered an Irish national treasure, wrote *Durango* about an adventure he undertook decades ago with friends.

In addition to Keane's Irish humor, *Durango* offers a disarmingly sweet story.

It has an idealistic hero, a delightful romance, snarling bullies and sniveling cowards, false leprechauns, a few good women, and the kind of daring that might be bravery or foolishness; only time will tell. And then there's the green Irish countryside where the

film was shot.

Matt Keeslar (*Thanks of a Grateful Nation*) plays Mark Doran, the young visionary brash enough to ask his neighbors to let him drive their cattle to another market where they'll command a higher price, but not quite courageous enough to ask Fergus Mullaney (Patrick Bergin, *Sleeping With the Enemy*) for his daughter's hand in marriage.

Keeslar calls the movie "a terrific, old-fashioned film based on a terrific, old-fashioned book." In today's electronic, intellectual world, he says, "it's rare that anybody builds a car or makes a shoe by themselves. And that's the thing about *Durango*. You're seeing the actual process of the cattle drive."

"Today, Mark would just hire a truck and load all the cattle up and go. It wouldn't be the same type of journey."

During five weeks of filming, Keeslar says he and his fellow cast members had their chance to drive cattle for real, since there were about

75 head in the herd and just four hired wranglers.

"When time was short, we all had to pitch in," he recalls, "including the director and the cinematographer and the grip supervisor. Everybody was out there waving at the cows, trying to get them in line."

Because the cows needed to be appropriate for the time period, Keeslar explains, they had to have horns, which are illegal in today's Ireland. "So (the producers) had to go to the west of Ireland to get these sort of inbred cows," he says, laughing. "They weren't the most domesticated of beasts."

Everything else about the production is thoroughly civilized, however, from the lush score by Mark McKenzie to the talent-filled supporting cast, headed by Oscar winner Brenda Fricker (*My Left Foot*) as Maeve, Mark's self-reliant aunt.

Nancy St. Alban offers a gentle touch as Mark's sweetheart, Annie, and Bergin brings plenty of bluster to the less-rewarding role of her father.


Also in the cast are Tony Award winner George Hearn (*Sunset Boulevard*) as a practical Protestant rector and character actor Mark Lambert as Algie Clawhammer, a well-intentioned military deserter who receives aid and comfort from the cattle drivers.

Keeslar says the loyalty, honesty and bravery of *Durango* make for just the type of movie today's audience is seeking.

"It's the type of movie that seldom gets made nowadays," he concludes. "In an increasingly complicated world, this story reminds us that some qualities are eternal."
