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Mescalero president, vice president put on leave

MESCALERO - The Mescalero Apache tribal council put both President Paul Ortega and Vice President Oliver Enjady on administrative leave in connection with charges that include alleged misuse of funds.

Enjady said Monday afternoon that the move the council made to put the two on leave came as a surprise.

"We have until Thursday to answer to these charges," Enjady said, adding that the accusations also include taking tribal property.

Some tribal members said this is a push to divide the tribe between those who want

"reform" and those who want to see the tribal government run the way of former President Wendell Chino.

Ortega was reached at his home on Tuesday but said he had no comment.

According to some tribal members, the council officially heard the charges of the alleged misuse of funds at a meeting on

Tuesday.

At that meeting, the tribal council said Ortega and Enjady will not function officially until May 28 when another council meeting will be held and the situation discussed further.

Tribal members questioned the council

about the apparent misuse of funds; that apparently did not involve a "personal" misuse of funds.

There is presently no acting president and the council, when taking action, will act as a group.

Enjady said he would have a statement regarding the situation on Thursday or Friday.

Chino died in November, 1998, leaving no heir apparent and a power vacuum as far as tribal leadership was concerned.

Ortega, who was vice president at the time of Chino's death, became president and the tribal council, elected by tribal members, chose

council member Enjady to serve as vice president.

In other news, Ron Badouin is no longer the general manager of the Inn of the Mountain Gods, and a former Inn of the Mountain Gods employee has been rehired to the position.

Badouin had been at the Inn since November, 1998.

Freda Draper, a manager who left the Inn three years ago after working there for several years, was appointed by the tribal council on Tuesday after being called by council members Sarah Misquez and Arthur Blazer. Draper, at the meeting, stated she has moved back to Mescalero from Texas. Draper was to take over management of the Inn effective today.

Ruidoso 'got lucky this time'

Outcome of Warrior Drive fire could have been much worse

The fire that scorched about 10 acres of forest and came within feet of destroying homes, could have had a more devastating outcome had it happened Sunday afternoon rather than Sunday evening.

Residents from 15 homes in the McBride Drive, Snowcap and Snowcap Court were evacuated.

Matt Reidy, fire management officer for the U. S. Forest Service, said the fire, which was fought by more than 200 area fire personnel, some of whom left the fire in the Mescalero area, was "demoralizing."

"We've got a lot of resources here so we were able to jump on in,"

Reidy said. "It was a wake-up call, absolutely." Reidy said Ruidoso "got lucky" with the timing of the fire.

"If it had happened earlier in the day we would have had a real problem," Reidy said.

With the higher temperatures that occur earlier in the day and lower humidity, the fire would have moved faster and "crowned" more trees into flames.

Tomas Chavez, firefighter and emergency management officer for Ruidoso, said if it had happened earlier in the day, "we would be getting federal assistance by now."

The fire did crest some trees, and embers flew, setting off about

Ruidoso votes for bonds

Ben Mason was not surprised to find Ruidoso's water bond election had passed Tuesday. He was surprised to learn it passed by a 78-percent margin.

"Well after the last one (bond election), I guess I am surprised," said Mason, a member of the Ruidoso River Association, an organization that supported the bond election of up to \$5 million.

Last March, an attempt to sell bonds for necessary improvements to Ruidoso's water system with a 1-cent supplemental gross receipts failed to win voter approval.

On Tuesday, a second try proved successful. Though only 10 percent of Ruidoso's 5,400 registered voters participated in the

election, 422 voted for the first question on the ballot to continue the tax. Against the tax were 118 votes. On the second question, 404 votes approved the village's going out for up to \$5 million in bonded debt for water system improvements; 125 voted against it.

The vote in brief

The tax: 422-188
Bonding: 404-125

Turnout: 10%
Registered: 5,400

The penny tax is part of the village's total gross receipts tax of 6.9 cents, and was approved by voters in a 1995 bond issue. That penny would not drop off the tax until 2003, whether voters had approved the bond election or not.

Mayor Robert Donaldson Tuesday night said he believed the bond election would pass, adding, "You always have doubts, though."

"I look forward to putting not only this long-range plan into place but others," he said, referring to a \$16 million master plan of water improvements over the next 20 years.

Second largest reservation fire in the past decade

Telephone fire in mop-up phase

While fire crews mop up the last of the Telephone fire on the Mescalero Apache Reservation, a federal interagency team is at work to prevent future erosion and flooding — a potential side effect of the 3,000-acre fire.

The fire began at about 3 p.m. Thursday in Telephone Canyon, about 3.5 miles southwest of Mescalero. Its crew quickly, whipped up by southwestern winds.

"It burned extremely rapidly," said Donna Nemeth, fire information officer, said. "They had crown flames on the first day. Once it gets up there, it can move at an extremely fast pace."

It was contained Saturday. At the fire's peak, an estimated 750 firefighters from New Mexico, Arizona and Oklahoma were working round-the-clock shifts fighting the blaze. Tony Recker, forest manager with the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Mescalero, said.

The cause is still under investigation, Recker said.

Now called the Telephone fire, it was called the second largest on the

reservation in a decade. The largest, the Chino Well fire, eradicated 11,000 acres of vegetation in 1996, and rains that followed resulted in extensive flooding and erosion problems. A federal crew called Burned Area Emergency Rehabilitation (BAER) arrived in Mescalero earlier this week to prevent a repeat of the Chino Well aftermath.

"There was a lot of flooding (following the Chino Well fire)," Recker said. "And that is a concern in the community of Mescalero, and that's why the BAER team is here already."

Though the Telephone fire did not consume as large an area as the Chino Well, it was a very intense blaze, Recker said. Witnesses and fire officials reported seeing flames reach as high as 200 feet Thursday afternoon.

About 250 firefighters are still "mopping up" remaining hot spots inside the fire's perimeter, Recker said. That work could continue until the end of this week or the beginning of the next depending on winds and other conditions, he said.

Recker estimated the fire-fighting efforts would cost about \$1.5 million. "And roughly 30 percent of that was to

pay for crews," he said. "The aircraft used on Thursday evening and Friday probably took up the majority of the cost."

Fire officials said 60,000 gallons of "slurry," a fire retardant, were dropped on the fire by bombers reloading in Alamogordo.

Recker said monetary losses in timber are still being assessed.

Tribal member Christie La Paz said the closest home was 3/4 a mile from the fire, which spread to nearby Mud Canyon and South Tularosa Canyon. Initial reports said the fire was moving in a northwest direction and was parallel to the former Chino Well path.

Despite no immediate danger to homes, Ruidoso fire crews were called in Thursday afternoon to protect about 10 homes in Mud Canyon along State Highway 244.

The fire was spotted first by a Mescalero fire prevention team that had just finished a presentation for the Mescalero Head Start program.

Recker said 22 fire crews, includ-

Trial of murder suspect to start Monday

An Otero County jury is to be seated Friday in the murder trial of Charles Martinez, 39, one of two men accused of strangling a 27-year-old Ruidoso woman last March and burying her body in the desert.

Martinez's trial is to start Monday in Judge Jerry Ritter's Alamogordo state district court rather than in Carrizozo. Martinez's attorney, public defender Regina Sewell, asked for a change of venue in the case.

District Attorney Scot Key said this week he expected the trial to take five to six days. The charge is first degree murder. If found guilty, Martinez could receive a death penalty or life imprisonment.

The case is one of a twisted

love triangle, based on police affidavits. Martinez, a cross-dresser who also goes by Eva Martinez, had a long relationship with Christopher Faviell, who also had a troubled relationship with the victim, Elizabeth Ballard-Lankhorst, the beautiful single mother of a young boy.

Ballard-Lankhorst reportedly went to the Ruidoso home of the two men on the night of March 8, 1998. She was not seen again until her body was discovered by police on land northwest of Tularosa.

Faviell will be tried separately from Martinez. He is scheduled for a jury trial June 14 in Carrizozo, Key said. Assistant District Attorney Canon Stevens will be the prosecutor in both trials, he said.

Although some physical evidence has been gathered,

the prosecution's case has the testimony of two people, Faustino Collazo and his girlfriend Kathleen Luevano, who say Faviell and Martinez confessed the crime to them.

The two suspects also have been charged with tampering with evidence as well as conspiracy to commit murder, a second-degree felony with a possible sentence of nine years and a \$10,000 fine.

Collazo and Luevano said the two men killed Ballard-Lankhorst at Faviell's home on Evergreen Road in Ruidoso. Martinez reportedly struck her on the head twice with a coffee thermos and then strangled her with a scarf she was wearing while Faviell held her feet. When Martinez became tired, he reportedly asked Faviell to "finish her off."

The car Ballard-Lankhorst

had borrowed from her mother to go to the store showed up the next morning in her mother's driveway with the keys inside and the interior thoroughly cleaned.

The men are accused of wrapping the body in a blanket, plastic and duct tape and burying it in a shallow grave on property belonging to Faviell's parents.

Police arrested Martinez and Faviell in April last year after finding the body of Ballard-Lankhorst. At the time of the discovery, Ballard-Lankhorst had been missing for a month and her partially decomposed body had been disturbed by predatory animals. Police from several agencies joined Ruidoso police in the massive search for Ballard-Lankhorst after being tipped off by informants.

Budget, indigent care, hospital offers face commissioners

Lincoln County commissioners have a "full plate" of issues before them in a session expected to last most of Thursday, County Manager Tom Stewart said.

Besides trying to amend a deficit budget currently set at about \$10.6 million, commissioners are to vote on a 1/8-cent gross receipts tax to pay for indigent health care.

Besides that, they will consider two offers to switch management of both the Lincoln County Medical Center and the Carrizozo Health Clinic. The two facilities now are managed by Presbyterian Health Care Services at a cost to the county of about \$1.4 million annually, Stewart said. A Roswell-based firm has offered to provide management at no cost to the county, and another, from Iowa, is proposing a lease/purchase agreement, he said.

He anticipates the county's proposed 1999-2000 budget to be wrestled over by commis-

sioners in light of two additional increases that popped up this week. Health insurance premiums for 86 of the county's 114 employees are projected to increase by 25 percent — an additional cost to the county of \$82,650. Stewart said he was informed of the increase on Monday.

And the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration told him Tuesday the county needs \$409,000 reserved for the bonding of the county's planned new jail facility.

"It is extremely tight this year," Stewart said of the budget. "We don't have the resources to do a lot extra."

Earlier this month commissioners directed Stewart to find an extra \$30,000 to make up for a previous deficit. By state law, preliminary budgets submitted to the DFA must be balanced. He found the money and another \$45,000 as well, but with the added costs, the commission will be faced with further cuts or with finding other revenue sources.

Stewart is offering a vari-

ety of solutions, including increasing employee's contributions for health insurance or seeking bids on alternatives to the current Blue Cross/Blue Shield plan.

Other revenues sources also may be discussed, such as an additional 1/8-cent gross receipts tax for the jail construction, or a discretionary increase to the county's current property tax of \$10.50 per \$1,000 of assessed property value, Stewart said. The alternative hospital management firms may also be a consideration by commissioners, he said.

Whatever is done in terms of making cuts to the budget, they can be reinstated or changed during in interim before a final budget is approved and sent to the state, he said.

Stewart already tentatively has cut \$30,000 out of the preliminary budget by proposing the county drop its current contract with Correctional Systems Inc. for administrative services and hire its own jail administrator for \$57,000, he said.

Commissioner Wilton Howell, who represents part of Ruidoso, said Tuesday tax increases should not be considered, nor an alternate hospital management firm.

"I know there are some people out there who say they can do it cheaper," Howell said. "But when it comes to health care, I don't want something cheaper. I want the best."

He said before a tax is created to pay for the new jail, several questions should be answered — how big is the jail going to be, what will it cost and how will it be managed?

He proposed reinstating a road frontage fee for the county's 280 miles in subdivisions at 20 cents a foot. That fee, which can legally go up to 50 cents a foot, will generate \$600,000 a year and free up money for the jail's construction and operation, Howell said.

"They just haven't explored all the possibilities. All we have done here is determine where we are going to build a jail, and just quit," he said.

ing eight "hotshot," or expert fire-fighting crews, converged on Mesalero to battle the blaze. At least 10 of those came from other Indian reservations, he said.

Mescalero put to work one hotshot crew, two regular fire crews and two backup teams in the makeshift base camp established at the Mesalero rodeo grounds.

Some firefighters worked as long as 20-hour shifts on the initial fire-fighting effort, and then went to 12- and 14-hour shifts, Recker said.

A few minor injuries were reported such as blisters and bronchitis, but nothing serious.

"Seven reported injuries and illnesses — that's pretty low for the number of people and the hours that were involved," he said.

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Budget firmed up

Two and a half new employee positions are included in Ruidoso's proposed preliminary 1999-2000 fiscal year budget of about \$22.6 million, which is up for council approval on Tuesday.

Village Manager Alan Briley said a new firefighter position and a new parks and recreation position will cost the village about \$50,000. A part-time code enforcement position will be made into a full-time position.

The budget, which goes into effect beginning July 1, is based on conservative estimates of the coming year's revenues, Briley said. If those revenues go up during the year, then the council may approve more spending, Briley said.

The final budget is scheduled for consideration on July 27, after state approval.

With the \$22.6 million budget, the village has about \$1 million of unspent available money, in addition to \$6 million in restricted reserves and just under \$1 million in unrestricted reserves.

The village's 1998-1999 budget is at about \$27 million, though when it was approved this time last year, total expenditures were set at \$23.4 million.

The proposed 1999-2000 budget includes a 4-9 percent raise for village employees as well as the potential for more money. Briley said the raises will be one of three cost-of-living salary increases for non-management village employees in 10 years, though employees have received additional lump sum cost-of-living adjustments in the past decade. The pay increase is estimated to cost \$114,000.

Possible increases to employee retirement benefits and to compensate for experience, education, longevity, responsibility and certifica-

tions also are proposed at a combined cost of \$175,000.

Forest Lawn maintenance

Mayor Robert Donaldson and councilors discussed reducing village maintenance of the Forest Lawn Cemetery, where the village spent about \$18,000 this past year. In the proposed 1999-2000 fiscal year budget, revenues from the cemetery are projected at about \$15,000.

Though they talked about reducing maintenance expenditures for the coming year from \$38,000 to \$5,000, village councilors left the \$38,000 untouched, Finance Officer Lorri McKnight said. However, Donaldson said the village should not be paying for the upkeep of property that basically no longer belongs to the village, referring to cemetery plots that had been purchased.

"We never promised perpetual care," he said. Instead, the village should try to contact the descendants of those who are buried in the cemetery to see if a perpetual care fund can be established in conjunction with the village, Donaldson said.

No tax, fee hikes

No increases to property taxes, fees or utility bills are proposed. Last year, the village increased both water and garbage rates.

The budget also includes \$40,000 for a special events coordinator, a contracted position, and new money for an account designated for economic development — projects that will be determined later by the council. Another \$100,000 will be set aside for a Y2K contingency fund.

To provide expedited electrical and plumbing inspections, the planning department will have \$40,000 to contract the work with certified inspectors. Revenues from the inspections would more than cover the cost of the contracted work, it was believed.

Proposed Downs budget renews double-digit jump

Ruidoso Downs village trustees Monday will vote on a preliminary 1999-2000 fiscal budget of \$3.7 million — a 28 percent increase over the current budget. A final budget is to be approved in June or July.

This will be the second consecutive year for Ruidoso Downs' budget to increase by some 30 percent. The 1997-1998 \$2.2 million budget grew to \$2.9 million for the current year.

New expenses in the 1999-2000 budget include employee raises, construction of a community gymnasium, water system improvements, new police cars, a big jump in attorney's fees and the hiring of a village manager.

The village's increased budget is attributed to the gross receipts tax revenues coming in since a Wal-Mart store relocated to the village from Ruidoso in 1997.

Since the new store opened, revenues from gross receipt taxes have increased village coffers annually by \$600,000 to \$1 million.

Ruidoso Downs' \$3.7 million spending budget, which starts July 1, includes federal and state grants the village is to receive in the new fiscal year, Village Clerk/Treasurer Leann Weibrecht said. Last year, the village approved total spending of \$2.9 million. The current budget has been amended upwards to include some additional expenditures, but nothing sizable, she said.

Projected 1999-2000 revenues are \$2.9 million, but that is based on conservative estimates, Weibrecht said. The village will start the year with a cash balance of \$2.3 million, she said.

The 1999-2000 budget proposal includes a pay increase for employees based on their

longevity with the village as well as an expenditure of \$462,500 for the design and construction of a community gymnasium, a long-planned project.

Proposed sites for the gymnasium include one next to a proposed new fire station on 7 acres of land on the east end of the village.

Legal fees have also increased the village's budget. For this fiscal year, legal fees were budgeted at \$25,000. For 1999-2000, the budgeted amount has jumped to \$65,000, an increase of 160 percent. Weibrecht said the village's actual expenditures in legal fees to Village Attorney Dan Bryant and other attorneys are close to \$60,000. In the past 18 months, the village has been the target of several lawsuits ranging from accusations against police officers to a dispute between the mayor and council.

In the coming year, trustees also want to hire a village manager at a salary of up to \$45,000. Currently, the highest staff position is that of village clerk.

New expenditures discussed for the 1999-2000 year include the following:

- An additional truck for animal control officers at \$17,000.
- Improvements to the village kennel at \$10,500.
- A 6-inch water line replacement along part of U.S. Highway 70.
- A \$150,000 water tank (\$50,000 from a state grant).
- Two new four-wheel vehicles for the police department at \$30,000.
- Used equipment and a pickup truck at \$20,000.
- Engineering work for sewer line extensions to Ruidoso Downs Heights at \$25,000.
- A study of the village water system and resources at \$25,000.
- Street paving at \$50,000.

And then a big aircraft flew low and slow, and there was no question remaining. Forest fire, for sure.


Sightseers made their way to high points and open spots. Dozens of vehicles rolled into the White Mountain school complex parking lot, and impromptu conversations broke out. It was something of a get-together, as people stared at the smoke, watched the flashing lights, the helicopter, the slurry bomber.

And it was quickly contained, that little ten-acre fire, as the wind slowed but didn't die. Firefighters from throughout the area responded, hot shot crews were diverted from the Mescalero fire.

A Forest Service firefighter who had seen so many little fires become big ones took that "little fire" very seriously. Had the air temperature been a few degrees higher, had the fire started a few hours earlier when the wind was stronger — who knows what loss, what tragedy?

It has been said that consciousness of fire danger is the best preventive shield. Everybody in Ruidoso at the beginning of what is predicted to be a long, hot summer must above all be aware of what might happen.

And thank God that it didn't — this time.

We should all at least be concerned.

We all must remember the headaches that Roswell is going through right now because of such a transaction.



A woman's argument for an indigent fund

As a member of the Lincoln County Health and Wellness Advisory Board, I asked a person I know if they would be willing to speak to the issue of under- or uninsured persons' need for a medically indigent fund in this county. I knew that she had some difficulty paying off a hospitalization a few years ago and had to put off some medical care she needed. I also know that without doctors providing samples as often as possible she could not afford the medications she needs to stay well.

She spoke at the public hearing for this issue on March 1. It took great courage to speak in front of a public group and the county commissioners. She brought me her notes so that I could type up her brief address to that body. She wants to bring attention to the government and the voting public the need of working or disabled persons to be able to access health care in our county and through state programs as well.

A brief disclaimer: As clinical director of The Counseling Center, Inc., we do have a state contract so that we can offer a sliding scale to decrease the fees for psychiatric and psychotherapeutic and substance abuse services for uninsured per-

sons. We also take Medicaid as full payment and also Medicare and other insurance for some services. I am not requesting funds for our services, but advocating for our clients and others in the county so that they can access the fine medical care we have... Without an indigent fund we are prevented from receiving reimbursement from other indigent funds in other counties when we provide care for their eligible persons, nor can we access other medical services for our citizens outside our county.

Please (read) the words of a person who wants you to know who an indigent fund would benefit.

Kathie's story

My name is Kathie Lenore Anderson. I read a phrase a couple of months ago: "Everyone is the hero of their own story." Everyone has had misfortune. I am here to tell you mine. I had a good childhood. I was a Girl Scout. I liked school and school liked me. Even, though I was very shy, I had a lot of good friends. I wrote a weekly column for the high school newspaper. I was senior class secretary and went to the University of California at Los Angeles and UC at Santa Barbara. I graduated with honors. I went right into my career of teaching deaf children.

At age 25 I was struck down. I started having episodes of morbid depression. I

had been a person who loved life and within months of depression I hated life. At age 28 I hallucinated and ended up in my first mental hospital. The doctors finally knew I had manic depressive disease, but still found no medicine that worked. Years later I ended up in Ruidoso. I found myself at The Counseling Center, Inc. I was a shell of a person. I had no self-confidence. My spirit was broken. The...center got me on the right medications and I got a wonderful counselor.

I get disability from the school district I worked for before I became ill. I have no Medicaid or insurance for either outpatient therapy or medical care. My catastrophic health benefits have a deductible of \$2,500 for hospitalization and only paid 50 percent of my last hospital stay.

I am supposed to have a pap smear and mammogram every year now. It has been 2 1/2 years since I have had either. It was recommended that I get hormones but with my other medicines I can't afford it. Two of my three medicines cost about \$780 a month and dear Dr. Winsten at The Counseling Center, Inc. begs samples for me because the third medication is about \$70.

A friend sent a Valentine and it said, "yesterday is the past, tomorrow is the mystery, and the present is a gift."

Invasive species

To the editor:

On Feb. 3, President Clinton issued another of his people-control executive orders. This one, EO 13112, is entitled "Invasive Species."

Section 1 ... defines alien species as "any species that is not native to that ecosystem," and it includes "its seeds, eggs, spores, or other biological material capable of propagating that species."

An Invasive Species Council comprised of agency secretaries, plus the administrator of the EA\PA, is to prepare and issue some kind of management plan in 18 months.

If the recommendations of these agency people ain't legal, then the Council shall complain to the President, who will try to figure out a way for the council to have the authority to control all land use, public and private.

To add validity to this land management plan, the agency council will appoint members to an advisory committee, which will represent so-called stakeholders — local, state, tribal, private land owners, commercial interests and environmental group.

This ... committee is to recommend plans and actions for achieving the ... objectives of this expansion of federal authority, which does not distinguish between state, federal or privately owned land.

Do we not have numerous laws on the books to take care of noxious plants and dangerous insects and animals? If a choice is involved... (these) would be preferable to an invasive federal agency and its land-use plan.

five spot fires that dotted the neighborhood of McBride Drive and Snow Cap Court.

Bill Willey, of 106 Snowcap Court, on Monday could see the charred marks on the land surrounding his home where firefighters pitched battle with the blaze.

He said the first indication he got on that Sunday evening that something was wrong was when his wife said she thought she heard something fall in the basement.

What she actually heard was the blast from a power line arching as it came in contact with a tree branch down the hill from the house.

Willey said he went out of the house and started down some steps to the basement.

"And I saw a tremendous ball of fire pushed by a terrific wind with God holding his hand at my property line," Willey said.

Willey showed where the fire was stopped "by God's hand" — with some support from the Ruidoso Fire Department.

Alan Roberts, who lives with his wife on McBride Drive, was watering his plants on the deck that Sunday evening when the fire broke.

"One minute a smelt the smoke and the next minute ash was flying," Roberts said. "It was just red and smoke. We could see burst of flames."

Those ashes and embers set off a spot fire at Roberts' neighbors house — about a tenth of a mile away from the main blaze.

Firefighters were able to douse that fire before it did any damage to the home.

But the experience was enough to convince Roberts to call Tree Masters and do some yard work.


"It made me a believer out of me," Roberts said on Monday morning. "I've been raking up pine needles all morning."

Roberts said she has some misgivings about cutting down trees "but it's just so dry."

Chavez said efforts by firefighters were bolstered by volunteers.

David Keiter, a resident who lent a hand at the fire scene, was at a friend's house near the fire when the lights flickered about three times.

"We walked outside and

saw what looked like a cloud, it was that big. I grabbed two shovels and came running," Keiter said. He's not a fireman, "but it's times like these when, if everyone pitches, in you can avoid a major disaster."

Moose Fender also saw the smoke of the fire. He said he was driving home on Gavilan Canyon Road.

He drove to the scene and picked up a garden hose by the house closest to the fire.

While fighting the fire, Fender commented that "it just doesn't want to go out."

Ruidoso firefighters spent much of Monday "gridding the area of the fire to make sure it was indeed out."

Reidy said what made fighting this particular fire easier was that they had access to the flames through Snowcap Court. This is not always the case, Reidy said.

"That's why creating a defensible space is so impor-

tant," Reidy said.

Chavez said fire-fighting agencies that assisted in helping put out the blaze included: the Ruidoso Fire Department, Ruidoso Downs Fire Department, the Bonito Volunteer Fire Department, the Gila Hot Shots, the Carson Hot Shots, the Smokey Bear Hot Shots, the Silver City Hot Shots, the Payson Hot Shots, the Mescalero Type II crew, the Zuni Type II crew, three Mescalero engines, two Navajo engines, the Capitan Fire Department, the Bureau of Land Management from Roswell, the state Forestry office, and the U.S. Forest Service

Chavez said he also wanted to thank the local Red Cross, which fed some 230 firefighters Sunday night.

Fire-safe landscaping is an effective tool that creates an area of defensible space between your home and flammable vegetation that protects against devastating fires.

The United States Fire Administration (USFA) encourages you to keep fire safety at the forefront by learning how to landscape and maintain your property to minimize possible fire damage and slow fires if they start. Remember, fire safety is your personal responsibility... Fire Stops With You!

Defensible space works

During the 1998 raging Malibu fires, a number of homes were saved as a result of the owners' careful pruning and landscaping techniques that protected their homes. In a fire situation, the dead trees and shrubs surrounding your home act as fuel for fire. Removing flammable vegetation reduces the threat of fire. Follow these basic rules to create defensible space that works.

- Remove all dead plants, trees and shrubs from the site.
- Reduce excess leaves, plant parts and low-hanging branches.
- Replace dense flammable plants with fire-resistant plants.
- The choice of plants, spacing and maintenance are crucial elements in any defensible space landscaping plan.

Tips for a fire-safe landscape

Create a defensible space perimeter by thinning trees and brush within 30 feet around your home.

Beyond 30 feet, remove dead wood, debris and low tree branches.

Eliminate small trees and plants growing under trees. They allow ground fires to jump into tree crowns.

Space trees 30 feet apart and prune to a height of 8 to 10 feet.

Place shrubs at least 20 feet from any structures and prune regularly.

Plant the most drought-tolerant vegetation within three

feet of your home and adjacent to structures to prevent ignition.

Provide at least a 10 to 15 foot separation between islands of shrubs and plant groups to effectively break-up continuity of vegetation.

Landscaping your property with fire-resistant plants and vegetation to prevent fire from spreading quickly.

Choose fire resistant materials

Check your local nursery or county extension service for advice on fire resistant plants that are suited for your environment.

Create fire-safe zones with stone walls, patios, swimming pools, decks and roadways.

Use rock, mulch, flower beds and gardens as ground cover for bare spaces and as effective fire-breaks.

There are no "fire-proof" plants. Select high moisture plants that grow close to the ground and have a low sap or resin content.

Choose plant species that resist ignition such as rockrose, iceplant and aloe.

Fire-resistant shrubs include hedging roses, bush honeysuckles, currant, cotoneaster, sumac and shrub apples.

Plant hardwood, maple, poplar and cherry trees that are less flammable than pine, fir and other conifers.

Maintain your home and surrounding property

Maintain a well-pruned and watered landscape to serve as a green belt and protection against fire.

Keep plants green during the dry season and use supplemental irrigation, if necessary.

Trim grass on a regular basis up to 100 feet surrounding your home.

Stack firewood at least 30 feet from your home.

Store flammable materials, liquids and solvents in metal containers outside the home at least 30 feet away from structures and wooden fences.

No matter where you live, always install smoke alarms on every level of your home. Test them monthly and change the batteries at least once a year. Consider installing the new long-life smoke alarms.

Rural Fire Prevention Checklist

Self-reliance is the rule for fire safety for many people. If you live in an area where the local fire department is more than a few minutes away because of travel time or distance, or if you are outside the limits of the nearest town, be sure you know how to be self-reliant in a fire emergency.

The United States Fire Administration (USFA) encourages you to use this fire safety checklist to help you protect yourself, your home and its surroundings from fire.

Have a fire safety and evacuation plan

Practice fire escape and evacuation plans.

Mark the entrance to your property with signs that are clearly visible.

Make your home fire-resistant

Use fire-resistant and protective roofing and materials like stone, brick and metal to protect your home. Avoid using wood materials that offer the least fire protection.

Keep roofs and eaves clear of debris.

Cover all exterior vents, attics and eaves with metal mesh screens no larger than 6 millimeters.

Warrior boys just miss a trophy

Junior Thomas Schiele racks up 17 of team's 28 points

Three days after the Class AAA State Track and Field Meet, Ruidoso track coach Ronny Maskew was wondering still, "what if?"

What if Maskew and trainer Jerry Bourassa hadn't discovered a small tear in sophomore sprinter Solomon Barnett's hamstring?

What if junior track star Thomas Schiele had swept his three individual events as he nearly did?

Indeed, track and field, like most sports, comes down to inches and seconds. And that's about all the separated Ruidoso from receiving a team trophy at the state track meet Saturday in Albuquerque.

The Warriors tied for fifth place with Bloomfield, three points behind Grants. Team trophies are awarded for the top four teams.

Maskew had no complaints with his team's performance, and it's easy to understand why. The Warriors overcame an injury to Barnett, who could have scored points for Ruidoso in the 100-meter and 200-meter dashes and was supposed to run the anchor legs on Ruidoso's 400- and 800-meter relays.

As it turned out, Barnett ran only twice the whole weekend - in the 100-meter preliminaries and in the 400-meter relay finals.

Fifteen minutes before the Warriors' 800-meter preliminary Friday, Maskew had to pull Barnett and throw sophomore Phillip Russell into the mix. The Warriors practiced a few baton exchanges and then it was time for the gun.

Still, Ruidoso made the finals.

"The boys did well adjusting to a situation that we really didn't have control over," Maskew said.

The Warriors did so well, in fact, that Maskew thinks he's found his replacement in Phillips for the graduating Josh Varnadore in the sprint relays.

"This could be a blessing in disguise," said Maskew, noting the Warriors ran their best time of the season in the 800-meter relay finals, a 1:31.42 for fourth place.

Ruidoso's best relay finish came in the 400-meter relay. The Warriors

took third with a time of 43.84.

Schiele, meanwhile, put together a meet he's not likely to forget for some time.

The Ruidoso junior started off on the right foot Friday, winning the long jump on his last attempt of the day.

"That was my best right there," Schiele said after jumping 23 feet.

It was enough to beat Pojoaque's Lonnie Montoya and Hot Springs' Chris Lucero for the gold.

Schiele went on to place second in the pole vault and second in the triple jump.

In the pole vault, Adam Mendonca of Silver stole first place from Schiele on his last attempt at 14 feet, six inches. Mendonca cleared the bar and won first place.

Schiele missed out on defending his triple jump title when Montoya turned

the table on the Ruidoso Warrior and won the event by 3/4 of an inch. Montoya broke Schiele's state record of 44-7 with an effort of 45-1. Schiele's best jump was 45 feet, 1/4 inch.

For the weekend, Schiele tied his personal best in the pole vault and set new personal records in the long and triple jumps.

"He couldn't have had a much better weekend," Maskew said of Schiele.

The Warriors also picked up points from sophomore Dominic Gonzales who took sixth in the shot put with a throw of 50 feet, 2 inches.

Freshman Keegan Reidhead cleared 6 feet in the high jump, but didn't make the finals, finishing seventh. Ruidoso's Eric Flores was 14th in the 800-meter relay with a time of 2:08.88.

"I'm really pleased with the boys," Maskew said.

Injury cuts short Green's state meet

Despite the loss their standout teammate, the Warriors girls make strides at the Class AAA State Meet.

Last year she stole the show, accumulating more points than any other girl at the Class AAA State Track and Field Meet.

She hoped to do the same this year, but a nagging muscle pull put Ruidoso junior Amber Green on the trainer's table instead of on the oval for most of the state meet Friday and Saturday in Albuquerque.

Green reinjured her right leg during the long jump finals Friday while she battled Pojoaque's Sonrisa Garcia and Nicole Hansen of Moriarty for the state title in that event.

"It got real tight and felt like it was pulling," Green said of her right leg.

As a result, Green was done for the day in hopes of recuperating for Saturday.

But it only got worse Saturday. Green made it through two triple jumps before a screaming muscle sidelined her for the rest of the meet.

"It just got to the point where I couldn't stand the pain. It was hard because this is what you work hard for all year, then not to get to compete the way you want to..." Green said.

Ruidoso athletic trainer Jerry Bourassa described the muscle pull as a moderate to severe.

"She's been fighting it for about a month," Bourassa said. "She reinjured it in the long jump. We tried to nurse her through the triple jump. She'll be back next year."

The injury forced Green out of the 200-meter dash finals, 400-meter dash finals, the triple jump finals and the 1600-meter relay. The loss of Green in the mile relay was particularly painful for the Warriors and coach Ronny Maskew. With Green running the anchor leg, the Warriors were the sixth-fastest team heading in to the preliminaries. Without her, Ruidoso failed to make the finals Saturday.

Green's absence left heroics to her Ruidoso teammates, three of whom met the challenge: Leah Miller, Monica

Keyes and Abby Figueroa.

Miller, a sophomore, did her part with a personal best performance in the triple jump Saturday. Miller, who hadn't jumped more than 33 feet, 4 1/2 inches all season, topped that mark by 13 inches in the finals to bring home second place.

"I've always felt like Leah Miller was one of the better triple jumpers in the state and that proved it," Maskeew said.

Miller lost to Los Alamos' Christina Gonzales who jumped 35 feet. Green still owns the state record of 35-1 1/4, which was set last year.

Of her teammate's performance, Green said, "She stepped up, took the initiative and performed really well."

Keyes qualified for state in both hurdle events, but it's in the 300-meter hurdles where the junior seems to have found her race. Keyes didn't make the finals of the 100-meter hurdles, but set a school record in qualifying for the finals in the 300-meter hurdles. She ran a 48.15 in the prelims, shaving off more than a half second off her best time of the season.

In the finals, Keyes took another 6/10ths of a second off her school record time to 47.53 and finished in fourth place.

"Monica has just been improving in the 300 hurdles a good deal each week," said Maskeew, but added he would have never predicted such improvement that Keyes showed Friday and Saturday.

Sophomore Abby Figueroa turned in her best effort in the discus. Figueroa threw the disc five feet farther (108-11) than she had all spring for sixth place in that event.

"We were happy with the girls. Even though we didn't qualify for some of the finals we ran our best times of the year in the 400- and 800-meter relay by a considerable amount," Maskeew said.

Of the nine girls Maskeew took to this year's state, only two are seniors: Jessica Daniels and Jayme Paxton.

The rest are slated to return, including Green.

And Green already has her sights on 2000. At this time next May, she hopes to have five first-place medals in her possession, instead of a sore hamstring.

"I still have next year," she vowed.

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
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Board delays action on trailer park water tap once again, appears to support growth control

CAPITAN - Expected fireworks fizzled, and gave way to sighs of relief by many attending the Village of Capitan special council meeting, Monday evening.

The issue was Gary Caughron's application for a commercial water tap for a proposed 24-pad rental trailer park on 18.8 acres on Highway 380 and Main Road. The opposition stems from Capitan's inconsistent water pressure.

At a previous council meeting, members had tabled Caughron's application for 2-3 months. Mayor Norm Renfro polled the council again Monday night, asking if they recommended the matter continue to be tabled. It was unanimous that the application remain tabled. Councilors Benny Coker and Debra Ingle said Capitan has an existing fire protection problem associated with water system pressure. Ingle has recently been in Washington, D.C., lobbying for a \$360,000 fire protection grant. Her main concern, stated in the first paragraph of Ordinance 98-5,

was, "It is the Council's responsibility to regulate the health and welfare and safety of our citizens of the Village of Capitan."

She continued, "Until I'm sure that the health and welfare and safety of the citizens of this Village are secure, I would ask that the application be tabled." The mayor was in agreement.

Caughron's attorney asked for clarification of "health, welfare and safety of the citizens," and felt the board had veered off the subject of the water application, and now were proposing that their main concern was fire protection.

John Valton Hall, who owns the property the trailer park would be built on, angrily said, "But if you're concerned with, if you're concerned with fire danger, to me what you're doing is coming up with an excuse to leave this on the table. And basically what you're doing is killing my sale." "I feel that you're acting, you know, in a manner against a property owner, which is adverse."

Councilman John Whittaker replied, "What impact is it going to have, once the park is up and going? We don't know that

until we get definitive answers from somebody. I feel you are not understanding where the council is coming from." The council then passed a motion that Caughron's for a water tap measuring 3/4 inches be placed on the agenda in four months, for further consideration.

In the same vein, Councilor Ingle asked for a motion to amend Ordinance 98-5, "to limit the actual number of hook-ups to commercial meters", which was unanimously passed by the Council.

Lonny Lippmann, property and business owner here, recently formed the Capitan Neighborhood Association and has been outspoken in the attempt to manage growth in Capitan. He read to the council a draft of an ordinance he was proposing they adopt. In essence, it "was asking for a temporary moratorium on commercial and industrial growth within the corporate limits of the village of Capitan. This Ordinance "is necessary

Capitan school board seat vacant; applications sought

CAPITAN - A Capitan School Board member resigned at the board's May 13 meeting.

Jack King told the board he would be resigning as of June 10 because a new job assignment in Albuquerque would make it difficult to be at board meetings, said Superintendent of Schools Diana Billingsley.

People interested in the position may write letters to the board stating reasons they would like to be a board member. The board will make a selection before the July 8 board meeting and the new member will be sworn in on that date and continue King's term, until February, 2001.

Considerable time at the board meeting was devoted to exchanges between a Student Senate representative and the board. Trenna Stephens, a junior at Capitan High School, presented the views of the Student Senate, disagreeing with the school board's recommendation to have all students tuck in their shirts, and also with the identified time for being able to wear shorts (April 1 - Oct. 31), Billingsley said.

The board charged the Student Senate with making a written presentation using the current dress code as a pattern, and with making recommendations for enforcement of their

more liberal dress code - for which the Student Senate would be responsible.

If they cannot enforce it, the issue will go back to the board and the board will make a policy decision and staff will be charged with enforcing it.

"If they want it liberal, they have to enforce it," Billingsley said. "They're to come back at the June 10 board meeting with a code to present to the board." The discussion took about 20 minutes of the meeting and was very positive, she said.

Also at the meeting, the board approved the canvassed election results from the May 11 bond election for \$2 million for six new classrooms, an elementary library, a music room

and to relocate the bus lane and traffic to the exterior of campus. At this second attempt at passing a bond issue this year, 365 voters approved it and 207 voted against it.

The board also adopted a notice of bond sale and the bond company would advertise to potential investors that the district has \$2 million of bonds to sell June 10. At the June 10 meeting, the board will approve the winning offer, Billingsley said.

The district has already instructed the architects to work on the preliminary drawings, and ground work on the bus lane and new parking areas are to start July 1 and be completed by the middle to the end of August.

explore more in-depth.

Registration is limited to 60 campers. The camp fee is \$170 and includes all meals. "Scholarships and sponsorships are often available through local Soil and Water Conservation Districts," Cain said. Ruidoso's need for a pediatric nurse practitioner and Jeanne Monske's desire for a change coincided at just the right moment in time.

Monske has joined Family Practice Associates of Ruidoso, which is headed by Dr. Arlene Brown. Besides being in the office Tuesday and Thursday afternoons, she spends four days a week in the health clinic at Ruidoso High School.

“There's always been a group wanting pediatric coverage in this town,” Brown said. “Then (physician's assistant) Paula Arriaga took emergency leave and we had an obligation to the schools; we were able to meet that obligation with Jeanne and offer that community her talents.”

“We're really excited to have her.” Also associated with the office are Drs. James Fenimore and M.E. Nishitani and family nurse practitioner Marilyn Nishitani.

Monske was born in Hannibal, Mo., and knew by the age of five she wanted to be a nurse — an ambition possibly inspired by a friend's mother she admired.

She earned a nursing diploma in 1966 from St. Luke's Hospital School of Nursing in St. Louis, Mo., but gained much of her experience in pediatric intensive care and other specialties while traveling with her husband, Lane, who's in the military. In 1979, she graduated summa cum laude with a bachelor of science degree in nursing from Angelo State University in San Angelo, Texas.

Shortly after that, she was in Spain teaching at a school of nursing. When she returned to the United States, she joined New Mexico State University as an instructor in Alamogordo, while earning her master of science in nursing degree (in 1988) with a minor in education from the University of Texas, El Paso College of Nursing and Allied Health.

From 1988 to 1990, she taught pediatric nursing at the University of Nebraska Medical Center's College of

Nursing in Omaha.

“It got really high tech,” she said. “I was working with transplant patients.”

But both she and her husband wanted to return to New Mexico.

“I love the state with its beautiful sunsets,” Monske said. “Sitting on my porch really rejuvenates me when I'm tired.”

Again settling in Alamogordo, she resumed teaching as an assistant professor in pediatric nursing theory and clinical courses at that city's campus of NMSU.

While at the university, Monske worked at the Mescalero Indian Health hospital on a fellowship and met Dr. Nishitani and his wife. That friendship later brought her in touch with Dr. Brown, who Monske says is a wonderful mentor.

While she's building her pediatric background in Ruidoso, she still teaches one day a week in Alamogordo.

“I'm a nurse first,” she said. “But a nurse who can do a lot of teaching and guidance as far as health care goes. I also can prescribe and diagnose, but when I see a complex condition, I talk to my physician colleagues.”

She was fortunate to be able to go to college full time right after high school, Monske said. “So many of my students are older and juggling children and a job as well as classes,” she said.

Monske found her self in school about every 10 years.

“When I went for my bachelor's in nursing, my son was in third grade and we both brought home-

work to do at night,” she said.

Working in a physician's office is rewarding in a different way than her other nursing jobs, she said.

“I really enjoy this. It's fun,” Monske said. “I feel like I have a say in how kids are managed and I can make a difference.”

Her pet projects are to encourage parents to read to their children and to educate the parents about the negative effects of exposing children to second hand smoke.

In her work at the high school, she finds the problems facing teens today are more numerous and serious, including substance abuse, dealing with the divorce of parents and attempting to build self-esteem.

But Ruidoso's parents tend to be involved with their children and willing to interact, Monske said. That's a big plus.

She complimented the clinic at the high school as being more organized than others she's seen. The efficient operation makes it easier to tend to teenagers, who are at an age when

they receive less consistent medical attention than younger children.

Monske recently circulated a questionnaire asking students about their substance abuse, their sexual activity, their use of condoms and if they have ever hurt someone or have been hurt. She was surprised at their honesty and hopes to be able to avert some problems by referring some of the students to counselors and other specialists.

“Maybe I should encourage parents to ask some of those questions,” she said.

Much of Monske's previous work was in hospital intensive care. Working with a primary care physician allows her to see another side of health care.

“I see more healthy kids who have temporary problems or are here for vaccinations,” she said. “Immunizations still are every important. People get blasé and think we've conquered everything, but prevention still is the best course.”

Walter Henn a major contributor to county art, community and history

- Don't attempt to rescue cats that are climbing near utility lines. They will come home when hungry. If the pet is injured, call the TNMP office.

- Know the location of underground power lines near your home, and never dig close to them.

Spring also brings storms, and these storms, as well as some car wrecks and other accidents, can damage electric distribution systems and leave energized lines lying on the ground.

These lines are dangerous and should be avoided; contact TNMP or police in the event of a downed power line.

Millicent Little and Donald Sgambato were two of many who have taken welding classes through Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso's (ENMU) program, but few stick to it and take every class that comes along like they did, said Mike Gaines, their welding instructor. He also teaches shop and agriculture classes at Ruidoso High School.

The diploma requires 38 class hours in different areas of welding, including welding math, employability skills, drafting, blueprint-reading, stick welding, wire-feed welding, oxyacetylene and other processes to join metal together, Gaines said.

"I never thought of being a welder," Little said, "but I saw a notice at the community center for classes and I signed up and took one." Then she discovered that it came naturally to her and she liked it, so she stuck with it. Shortly after finishing her first course, she got a job as a beginning welder at Mecalero Metal Fabrication. That entity makes cattle guards, "headache" or safety racks for trucks, grill guards and other items through government contracts.

After two years she was promoted to lead welder and now she's production manager and oversees other welders and the entire operation — including making sure the products get to the customers and the welding shop is supplied.

"It's especially pleasing to the college and the program to have a female and a minority female graduate from our program," Gaines said. "She's not afraid to get her hands dirty, and she's a good role model for everyone — even makes the guys work harder."

Sgambato said he took

the first class because he was bored, and then he found he liked it and began working on projects at the high school and helping Gaines get his high school programs started at the beginning of the school year.

Both students went through the same program, but their aims are quite different. Little wants to continue working where she is, but go back to school and get her associate degree and maybe take more classes so she can teach welding. Sgambato, who works at Village Hardware, said "down the road, I'd hopefully work in these areas."

Gaines said Sgambato is shy and doesn't like talking about himself, but he actually wants to build custom motorcycles and either get a job as a machinist or have his own machine shop and welding equipment.

level of expectation for himself.

Welding is hard on the back because there's a lot of lifting and steel is heavy, he said. It's hard on the eyes and feet and welders must constantly reposition themselves around — and under — what they're welding. Concentration and physical effort are required, and Little's ability to both weld and supervise puts her in a good position, he said.

Gaines said many welders are self-employed, but there are jobs locally where some welding experience is needed, though it may not be welding full-time. In large cities, there are plenty of full-time jobs for welders.

The ENMU welding program started with a community education class to find out how much interest there was, and then it just took off. Last fall 30 students signed up for a class and Gaines had to split it up and teach two sections.

"A lot of people are interested in welding as a hobby — furniture, decks," he said. "As things went along we decided to offer the certificate, and Mecalero Metal Fabrication and the McGary Studio both do metal work, so there are some full-time employment opportunities."

Sgambato is patient "with the little things that have to be done," Gaines said. "He makes sure that it's correct and he has a high

The United States now protects more than 1,000 endangered or threatened species. More than 99 percent of the species that the U.S. has protected are surviving. Many have recovered enough so that they no longer need protection.

Here are some of the plants and animals on the road back.

Bald eagle



Bald eagles aren't really bald at all. They have white head feathers. They mate for life. They usually return to the same nest each year and add to it each time. Their nests, made of sticks, can weigh as much as a ton.

The U.S. almost lost the bald eagle, the symbol of our country. In 1776, at our country's birth, there were 25,000 to 75,000 nesting pairs. In the 1960s there were fewer than 450 pairs.

Loss of habitat and shootings hurt the population, but the pesticide DDT did the most damage. When eagles ate fish that had eaten contaminated food, they too were harmed. DDT caused eagle eggs to be so thin that few chicks survived. It is now banned for most uses.

Today there are about 4,500 nesting pairs in the lower 48 states. The eagle is now threatened, but not endangered.

Gray wolf



Wolves live in packs made up of parents, their cubs and non-breeding adults. A wolf pack's territory ranges from 50 to 1,000 square miles, depending on how hard it is for them to hunt food.


Western settlers killed so many gray, or timber, wolves that by 1930 they were nearly extinct in the lower 48 states. Wolves had killed sheep and cattle, but only after the settlers had killed most of the wolves' main prey, the buffalo and elk.

Wolves are important in the food chain. For example, animals such as ravens and foxes depend on the meat that wolves leave behind after a kill.

In 1995 the U.S. released Canadian wolves into Yellowstone National Park and Idaho. An environmental group pays farmers for their loss if wolves do kill livestock.

The gray wolf is showing signs of recovery.

Haleakala silversword




The only place in the world the Haleakala (hahl-ee-ahk-uh-LAH) silversword grows is on one dormant volcano in Hawaii.

This rare silversword is endangered. Vandals and habitat disturbance have hurt this plant. But the silversword's greatest problem is the Argentine ant, brought into the area by people.

This foreign ant kills the native insects that pollinate the silversword, allowing it to reproduce.

Thanks to efforts to control the ant, the silversword is starting to recover.

Elephants



African elephants are the largest of all land animals. They can weigh up to 6 tons. Asian elephants might weigh 4 tons.

Asian elephant

Elephants are in danger because people have destroyed their habitats and killed them for their ivory tusks.

Although elephants are found only in zoos in this part of the world, the U.S. Endangered Species Act helps protect them in their native lands.

The U.S. and many other countries are working to make the buying or selling of elephant parts illegal.

More Threatened Species

Black-footed ferret

It is hard to spot a ferret. They live underground and usually come out only at night. They used to live throughout the Great Plains, from Canada to Texas.

For a long time scientists thought the black-footed ferret was extinct. Then one day in 1981, a rancher in Wyoming discovered a strange animal his dog had killed. He took it to a taxidermist, who knew it was a black-footed ferret.

Scientists tracked down the other members of the ferret's family. They were able to capture enough ferrets to begin breeding them in safety.

In 1986 there were only 18 known black-footed ferrets. Today there are more than 500. Scientists hope they will be safely living in the wild within 10 years.

This ferret was nearly wiped out because farmers and ranchers killed its food, the prairie dog. Ferrets and other animals also need the prairie dog because they live in its burrows.

The prairie dog ate grasses livestock also ate. Farmers were afraid there wouldn't be enough grass for both.

Karner blue butterfly

Forest fires can actually be good for species such as the Karner blue butterfly.

The butterfly's food, the wild lupine, can grow only where fires have made openings in the forests. In the last 15 years, more than 90 percent of these butterflies have died due to loss of habitat.

Concerned groups are working to save the butterfly by:

- setting off controlled fires
- planting wild lupine
- raising butterflies in captivity.

Timber companies are waiting to cut trees until butterflies are safe again.

Peregrine falcon

Peregrine falcons make their nests in high places such as cliffs, skyscraper ledges and bridges. They are the fastest birds in the world, diving after prey at 200 miles per hour.

As was the case with many other birds, DDT made falcon eggshells so thin that chicks died before hatching. Falcons were harmed when they ate smaller birds that had eaten DDT-sprayed seeds or grains.

By 1970 the falcon was nearly extinct in parts of the country. The U.S. banned DDT and started breeding programs. Scientists believe the falcon can soon be taken off the endangered species list.

Manatee

Manatees keep water channels clear by eating plants that clog them. Years ago, sailors thought manatees were mermaids.

Motorboats are the worst threat to manatees off the Florida coast. Boaters run over manatees lying just below the surface of the water.

Pollution, unusually cold winters and hunters have also hurt this endangered water mammal.

Florida has had laws protecting manatees for more than 100 years.

People are trying to control boaters and rescue wounded manatees.



POOP SCOOP

Although Ruidoso isn't prone to extremely high temperatures, the intense sun can work a number on pets left outside, in cars or even at home.

The Humane Society of the United States urges pet owners to protect their companions during the warm months ahead.

"Summer is a time when we can all relax, but pet owners need to be even more vigilant about caring for their companions since summer time fun can spell disaster for dogs, cats and other companion animals," said Martha Armstrong, vice president for companion animals and equine protection for the HSUS.

She offers tips to keep pets safe this summer:

- Don't leave pets in parked cars. Every summer, animals left in parked cars suffer brain damage and die from heat stroke. Even with windows cracked, the temperature in a parked car can rise quickly to dangerous levels.

- Dogs can't sweat and can only dispel heat by panting and through the pads on their feet. If you see a dog in a parked car during the summer, alert the management of the shopping mall or grocery store, if the owner does not return promptly, call local animal control or the police.

- It's also very dangerous and in some states illegal to place dogs in the back of pickup trucks. Flying debris can injure a dog's eyes and the animal may be unintentionally thrown from the truck and into

traffic.

Dogs that are tied in the back of a car, may jump or fall and be strangled. Devices are available to secure the animal in the center back of the pickup bed, but the HSUS still urges owners to allow pets to sit in the cab with the owner while the vehicle is in motion.

- Dog bites rise during summer months when we all spend more time outside. Spaying and neutering reduce the likelihood that your dog will bite and they provide many other health benefits to the animal.

- Pets and pools can equal disaster. Prevent free access to pools and always supervise pets in a pool.

- Provide plenty of water and shade for pets to give them the opportunity to keep cool.

- Pets need exercise even when it's hot, but extra care needs to be taken with older dogs and short-nosed dogs. On very hot days, limit exercise to early morning or evening hours. Keep in mind that asphalt gets very hot and can injure your pet's feet.

- Fair-haired pets may require sunscreen on their noses and ear tips to prevent sunburn and skin cancer.

- Don't take pets to July 4th activities and other fireworks displays. The lights and loud noises that thrill people are frightening to pets. They may try to escape or may even act aggressively out of fear.

- Fleas aren't much of a problem here, but summer is the worst and steps may be needed to prevent infestations.

The year Jack Lemmon was born, a Tennessee schoolteacher, John Scopes, was tried in "the trial of the century" for the crime of teaching Darwin's theory of evolution.

About the time Lemmon won an Oscar for *Mister Roberts*, playwrights Jerome Lawrence and Robert E. Lee (*Auntie Mame*) dramatized the trial in *Inherit the Wind*.

Now Showtime brings Lemmon and

Inherit the Wind together with its newest adaptation of the story, airing Saturday, May 29. The film features a stellar cast including Piper Laurie, Beau Bridges, Lane Smith, William Sanderson and Tom Everett Scott as the defendant.

It's almost fate that Lemmon is starring in the film with veteran actor George C. Scott because when Lemmon was approached by Lawrence to do the play onstage, he said he would ... if he could do it with George C. Scott. "Then, as coincidence would

have it," Lemmon says, "George C. did it in New York. But he was playing the part I wanted to play."

The Scopes trial boasted the two most celebrated jurists of the day, William Jennings Bryan and Clarence Darrow, who inspired the two plum roles of attorneys Brady and Drummond. It was the role of defense attorney Henry Drummond that Lemmon had his eye on.

"When I called (George C. Scott) and (proposed doing the Showtime film), he said, 'Yeah, but I should play Brady and you should play Drummond.' And bang, that was it."

Lemmon is well-suited to the role, and he controls it through and through. George C. Scott gives him a wonderful grade to play against: a bombastic balloon deflated by a pinprick of ridicule. Smith's performance slips into caricature, but Bridges, as a newspaper columnist, delivers cynical clichés as if they were Hamlet's soliloquy.

The nostalgic set and costumes could be borrowed from a revival of *The Music Man*, but there is raw emotion in the script, which proves that, just as all politics is local, all ideals are personal.





Although prolonged exposure to sunlight may cause more serious problems, such as early development of cataracts, artificial lighting can cause eye strain which may result in headaches and increased irritability. Even facing oncoming headlights at night can result in discomfort, blurry vision and headaches. Eye protection such as anti-reflective coatings, photochromic lenses, polarized lenses and protection from ultraviolet radiation may be recommended. Anti-reflective coatings can improve night driving comfort by significantly reducing glare from oncoming traffic. During the daytime, anti-reflective coatings reduce glare from fluorescent lighting in the workplace and ease computer eyestrain. Photochromic and tinted lenses are available in plastic, glass and safety materials. Photochromic lenses darken in bright light and clear inside offering a dual purpose advantage. Polarized lenses, available in both gray and brown, tame harsh glare and provide added comfort even in blinding light, fog, rain or snow. Protection from harmful ultraviolet radiation is available and recommended on all lenses.

Safety lenses made of impact resistant materials are required for many professionals such as logging, welding and electrical work. Safety glasses are available with prescription or non-prescription and offer added protection from flying debris, sparks or sudden impact. These lenses are also recommended for children involved in sports like baseball, basketball and hockey. Also individuals who have already had damage to one eye should protect their only "good" eye by wearing safety lenses.

"Fly Girls"

In 1942, in the midst of World War II, the call

went out: women with some flight experience were needed to fly for the military. Across the country, young women postponed their weddings and educations, and quit their jobs. During the next two years, more than a thousand women were trained to ferry aircraft, test-pilot planes, instruct male pilots, even tow targets for anti-aircraft artillery practice. Thirty-eight women would give their lives. Despite their serving with grit and determination, women pilots often encountered disbelief and resentment.

The American Experience presents "Fly Girls," the largely unknown story of the Women Airforce Service Pilots (WASP). Former WASP recall the planes they flew, the challenges they met, and the pride they felt in playing a role in the American war effort.

Lured by the opportunity to fly for their country, 25,000 women applied to join. The 1,830 who were accepted received pilot training at Avenger Field in Sweetwater, Texas — the only all-female Air Force base in history.

But the WASP did not enjoy military status. When a WASP died, her family received no benefits, no flag, no gold star. The government made no provision for returning the bodies. The other women pilots contributed money to send the body home for burial.

In 1944, as the European war drew to a close, male pilots began returning from combat. Now subject to being drafted into the infantry, male civilian pilots launched a campaign to claim the jobs held by WASP. The American Experience "Fly Girls" will be broadcast Monday, May 24th at 8:00 p.m. It repeats Sunday, May 30th at 11:00 p.m.

Beyond Barbed Wire

When Japan bombed Pearl Harbor on December 7th, 1941, the Japanese-American community, for whom honor was a cornerstone, felt a strange sense of communal shame for the actions of their ancestral home. In the interest of "military necessity," they were removed from their homes on the West Coast and relocated to internment camps. As a display of their patriotism, thousands of young Japanese-American men volunteered for the armed forces. The all-Japanese 100th Infantry Battalion/442nd Regimental Combat Team became the most decorated unit in American military history.

Beyond Barbed Wire profiles the bravery and heroism of the men who fought for a country that had stripped them of their civil rights. The unit received worldwide attention for their courageous rescue of the "Lost Battalion" in northern France, suffering extraordinary casualties in an effort to save a unit of Texans trapped behind enemy lines.

Michael Landon Jr. offers portrait of life with father

When his name is mentioned, people start humming the *Bonanza* theme song.

Only a few performers trigger that sort of instant connection, and Michael Landon and the bouncy Western title music seem forever linked.

Born Eugene Orowitz in Forest Hills, N.Y., in 1936, Landon managed to parlay his rugged good looks and stability into one of TV's most successful careers.

He played the impulsive Little Joe Cartwright in *Bonanza*, the noble Charles Ingalls in *Little House on the Prairie* and the eternally giving angel in *Highway to Heaven*. The TV Landon was America's favorite son, then its best father, and ultimately, the angel we long to encounter on dark days.

The real Landon left behind a widow, two ex-wives and a large, blended family. Now one of his sons, Michael Landon Jr., is telling his side of the story in *Michael Landon, the Father I Knew*, airing Sunday, May 23, on CBS.

Don't expect a *Mommie Dearest* expose. There are no coat hangers in this closet. Rather, the younger Landon, a self-effacing father of three

who loved his famous dad, says he wanted to "tell the story of divorce from a child's point of view."

And that he does, in a two-hour tale that stars John Schneider (*The Dukes of Hazzard*) and Cheryl Ladd (*Charlie's Angels*) as his parents.


The earnest movie opens with Landon's death from pancreatic cancer on July 1, 1991, at age 54.

"I never would assume to tell my father's story," Landon Jr. says. "And I was very candid about it up front. Everybody wanted the Michael Landon bio, but I didn't think I was equipped or it was right." Sounds like the sort of decent stand his father's characters would have taken.

"He described certain things in articles along the way," Landon says of his research for the project. "A *Life* magazine article was very detailed about his affair and he also discussed his drinking. He drank too much. Anything he made public, I allowed to be part of the story."

Like much of America between 1959 and 1973, Landon, born in 1964, remembers watching his father in *Bonanza* on Sunday nights.

"Everybody sat down to watch Daddy on TV. One of the few main memories I have of doing it is trying to figure out how Daddy shrunk," he says of the tiny image on the TV set. "And then becoming very emotional

if something happened to him."

Landon says his sole regret about the project is its title. "It was originally titled *A Father's Son*. I'm not blaming CBS. I understand why they needed the title. But it becomes too much about one person," he explains. "There is the added part of celebrity. I hope when you sit down and see the film, that there is some part you will connect with."

Like so many modern families, the Landons' life was a complicated one. The TV star's second wife, Lynn, played by Ladd, began her relationship with Landon while he was still married.

"We all think we know Michael Landon and we love and adore his work, and everyone who worked with him loved him. But there was so much more depth to him," Ladd says. "I never knew him. I was just a fan, like everyone else."
