

# Memorial Day services scheduled at Fort Stanton

Lincoln County residents and military veterans will gather this weekend to remember and to honor those who died serving the country.

Two Memorial Day services are scheduled and open to the public.

They are:  
• 10:30 a.m., Saturday, New Mexico Merchant Marine and Military Memorial Cemetery, Fort Stanton;  
• 10 a.m., Monday, Forest Lawn Cemetery, Ruidoso

In Ruidoso, veterans will place more than 200 American flags over local veterans' graves at the Forest Lawn Cemetery. Sponsoring the

Memorial Day program are the American Legion Post 79, the Disabled American Veterans Chapter 23 and the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 7072 and its auxiliary.

Skipper Victor Schaerer, who served as a captain in the Merchant Marine, said more than 200 attended last year's service at the New Mexico Merchant Marine and Military Memorial Cemetery at Fort Stanton, which marks its centennial year.

Established in May 1899, the Merchant

Marine and Military Memorial Cemetery is not only the final resting place for United States Merchant Mariners, but also for members of the other military branches.

Schaerer said the memorial program offers something for everyone.

State Rep. W.C. "Dub" Williams is scheduled to speak at the Ruidoso and Fort Stanton programs.

In other Memorial Day weekend events around the county, Bessie Leslie of White Oaks

will decorate 58 graves of war veterans in the White Oaks Cemetery on Sunday.

Afterward at noon, Leslie and others will gather for a bring-your-own sack lunch at the White Oaks School House.

The Jerome Don Klein Veterans of Foreign War Post 7072 and its Ladies Auxiliary will distribute "buddy poppies" around Ruidoso Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

The poppies serve as a symbol of the sacrifice that veterans have made to keep the country strong and free, organizers said.

The local VFW is named after Lincoln County resident Jerome Don "Donnie" Klein who was killed in Vietnam in March, 1971.

# Ballard-Lankhorst murder trial begins in Alamogordo

• Friends of Charles Martinez testified Monday in his murder trial that he and his lover told them details about how they strangled a Ruidoso woman with her scarf and buried her in the desert.

Elizabeth Ballard-Lankhorst was looking for revenge.

The 27-year-old Ruidoso woman had been scorned by her boyfriend for a transvestite lover. She did not take it well.

She followed the two men around town from nightclub to nightclub. She mocked them publicly and told people the woman known as Eva was actually named Charles Martinez.

And on one night in March 1998, a drunken Ballard-Lankhorst went to the Ruidoso home of former boyfriend Chris Faviell. A month later, police found her partial skeletonized body buried in a shallow grave near Tularosa.

On Monday, prosecutors opened the first-degree murder trial of Martinez in the strangulation death of Ballard-Lankhorst. Key among the five-day Alamogordo trial are friends of Faviell and Martinez. The defendants, who are being tried separately, reportedly confessed in at least three people about how they strangled Ballard-Lankhorst with her scarf.

If found guilty, Martinez could receive a death penalty or life imprisonment. Faviell faces the same possible punishment; his trial is scheduled for June 14 in Carrizozo. The two men also have been charged with tampering with evidence as well as conspiracy to commit murder, a second-degree felony with a possible sentence of nine years and a \$10,000 fine.

Martinez's defense attorneys told jurors Monday that evidence in the trial will show their client was not the force behind Ballard-Lankhorst's

# Tribe could call for June elections

The Mescalero Apache Tribe could see a special election in mid-June in order to elect a new president and vice president, the attorney for the tribal vice president said Tuesday.

Marc Prelo, attorney for Oliver Enjady, said a memo sent out by the tribal council to tribal members calling for a general meeting on June 1 indicates the council may call for a special election.

Enjady and tribal President A. Paul Ortega were put on administrative leave by the council pending the outcome of a hearing scheduled for Friday.

The council says it has found "credible evidence that the President and Vice President have violated the Tribal Constitution by disregarding the tribal budget and authorizing the spending and disbursement of tribal funds in a manner that seriously conflicts with the priorities, purposes and intents of the tribal budget, and in doing so have jeopardized the financial wellbeing of the Mescalero Apache

Tribe and the Tribe's ability to meet its existing financial obligations."

Enjady has denied the allegations since the outset. Ortega has made no comment on the matter.

Sara Misquez, the tribal council secretary and acting president of the tribe, did not return phone calls Tuesday.

Prelo and Enjady say such a memo and the actions taken by the council have already convicted the vice president.

"I've already been found guilty," Enjady said. "There is no due process here. This letter (memo) has convicted me already."

The memo, signed by all the tribal council members except for Silas Cochise, who apparently has resigned from the council, further states that the actions against the two officials "were necessary to preserve and protect tribal assets and to safeguard the financial strength and future of the tribe."

Enjady said he did not want to comment on what he thought were the council's motivations against him. According to the memo, the tribal

council's action was "in strict accordance with the provision of the Mescalero Constitution."

But Prelo said the council has violated Article X of the Constitution, which deals with vacancies and removal from office.

The council has "actually removed me already, you have stripped me of my powers," Enjady said.

Enjady said the council is acting as prosecutor, judge and jury in the case, which is a violation of due process.

What's more, Enjady said, the council acts as the appellate court as well as the Tribal Supreme Court.

"So, I have no place to appeal but back to them," he said.

Last week on Thursday, when the council began taking action against him, Enjady said he and Ortega tried to take their seats at the council but the council called the Bureau of Indian Affairs Police Department.

Enjady said when the police arrived he left peacefully.

Enjady's hearing is set for 10 a.m. Thursday at the Tribal Council Chambers.



# TRIAL: Witness tells of an escalating argument that led to the death of a woman named Ballard-Lankhorst

death, and that it was Faviell who talked about killing Ballard-Lankhorst even before Martinez moved to Ruidoso in early 1998.

"And what you will hear is how Charles and Chris' stories of what happened contradict each other," Public Defender Rachel Newton told the jury. The defense is scheduled to present 10 witnesses during the trial.

Kathy Luevano, the first prosecution witness in the trial, said she and her boyfriend at the time, Faustino Collazo, had been told by the defendants about the murder. The two couples were close and had lived for awhile in the same apartment building, she said.

Under questioning by prosecutor Canon Stevens, Luevano said both Martinez and Faviell had been at her home the night Ballard-Lankhorst disappeared. The following night,

she had already gone to bed when Collazo came home early "in a panicked state" from his night shift job at the Wal-Mart Super Center, Luevano said. He told her to get dressed — that they had to go over to their friends' home at 127 Evergreen.

Luevano said Ballard-Lankhorst kept up a persistent knocking until they answered the door. She was leaning on the door jam "like she was high on something," Luevano recounted Martinez saying.

Other witnesses later testified that Ballard-Lankhorst had drunk four to six beers that night at the Elkhorn Pub, a restaurant and bar on Sudderth Drive that has since closed.

"They kept asking her why she was there ... She finally said she was there to see a friend," Luevano said. "She reached up a hand to touch Chris and Charles slapped it away and said, 'You don't have any friends here, bitch!'"

Martinez and Ballard-Lankhorst began fighting. He picked up a coffee carafe and struck the woman's head, Luevano said. The second time he hit her, Ballard-Lankhorst fell. She also had a cut on her temple that bled on a carpet runner at the house, Luevano said.

"The coffee pot broke and there was glass all over the place," she continued. "There was coffee all over the walls and the blinds."

The men continued to question the woman about why she was there. She responded by biting and scratching at Martinez, Luevano said. When Martinez told her the story, he appeared very angry, she recalled.

"And at one time she looked up at Chris and said if they would let her go, she wouldn't tell anyone," Luevano said. Faviell told her that if Ballard-Lankhorst had just told them why she was there, "then she would still be alive ...

But Chris said that she was there for revenge."

Martinez wrapped the black and white scarf Ballard-Lankhorst was wearing around her neck twice, Luevano said. "And he got behind her and started pulling." He pulled until his nails were biting into his hands, she said. After he got tired, he told Faviell to "finish her off."

When Ballard-Lankhorst was no longer breathing, the two men put on black clothes, wrapped the body in an old blanket and took it by back roads to a desert area northwest of Tularosa, Luevano said.

Based on other testimony, the grave was on land near property once owned by Faviell's parents. They dug the grave three times, because the first was too shallow and the second too short.

Luevano said Faviell, wearing gloves, returned the car Ballard-Lankhorst had borrowed from her mother

back to her mother's driveway with the keys inside.

Lt. Wolf Born of the Ruidoso Police Department testified that Luevano's brother told him about the possible murder. With information from Luevano and Collazo, multiple law enforcement agencies for three days searched an area between Mescalero and Tularosa for the woman's body.

Several weeks later, District Attorney Scot Key contacted Born with information that Faviell's family had owned property northwest of Tularosa, Born arranged to have "Opie," a dog trained to sniff out bodies, brought to the site. Within 30 minutes,

they had found the remains of Ballard-Lankhorst.

Dr. Ross Zumwalt, a forensic pathologist, testified on videotape that animals had mauled the upper half of the very decomposed body and that the tissue surrounding the body's neck as well as other areas was gone.

Public Defender Regina Sewell asked Zumwalt if Ballard-Lankhorst could have been killed in an other way than reported, such as by a slit throat. Zumwalt said that based on his experience and the evidence from the autopsy, it was his opinion she died by asphyxiation.

The defense portion of the trial is to start Thursday.

## Behind a woman's murder apparently was an unusual love triangle

*The murder trial of Charles Martinez focuses on a reported love triangle in which the victim vied with Martinez.*

While witnesses answered questions Monday, a masculine appearing Charles Martinez listened impassively and sometimes wrote on the legal pad before him.

Defendant in a first-degree murder trial, the 40-year-old Martinez bore little resemblance to "Eva," the feminine persona he went by in early 1998 before his arrest in the murder of Elizabeth "Liz" Ballard-Lankhorst.

Dressed in a dark pin-stripe suit, Martinez had short, dark hair and a dark mustache instead of a smooth face and shoulder-length light brown hair. In addition, his formerly slender face has become

round because of an apparent weight gain.

Kathy Luevano, the first prosecution witness in the trial, said she felt uncomfortable testifying against Martinez, whom she had known both before and after his 1998 transformation into Eva.

Luevano said Faviell and Martinez had lived together in 1995 and 1996, but seemed to be much happier, much more affectionate after Martinez returned in 1998 from Albuquerque. As Eva, Martinez had long hair, was always very femininely attired and spoke in a soft voice, Luevano said.

The couple, who went through a wedding ceremony on Feb. 14, 1998, had turned their lives to God, Luevano said.

Martinez, witnesses said, accompanied Faviell everywhere and always came to work with Faviell at the Ruidoso Bowling Center. One coworker testified that Martinez always

was attired as if for "an attorney's office," wearing dresses and skirts.

"Eva seemed to have control of him, basically. She had him under thumb," co-worker Lisa Machado said of Faviell.

The couple was bothered by Ballard-Lankhorst, an attractive woman with a 7-year-old son. She had dated and occasionally lived with Faviell while Martinez was in Albuquerque from 1996 to late 1997. Ballard-Lankhorst had cared for Faviell, Luevano said, but had trouble showing it.

For a short period in 1997, Faviell dated both Ballard-Lankhorst and Martinez before committing himself to Martinez, witnesses said. But Ballard-Lankhorst then followed the couple. She reportedly told people that Martinez was not a woman. She even got into a fight with a friend of theirs at a nightclub, witnesses said.

She became a constant topic

of conversation among the couple and their friends.

Christi Dunnahoo, who worked with Faviell at the bowling center and in his part-time catering business, testified that Martinez and Faviell talked about having a relative "take care" of Ballard-Lankhorst.

"They said they had told Chris Martinez (Charles Martinez's brother) where Liz lived and all they had to do was say the word and it would be taken care of," Dunnahoo said.

At one time, Faviell was heard to say he would kill Ballard-Lankhorst if he could get away with it, witnesses said.

During questioning by defense attorneys, Dunnahoo and others said that Martinez rarely spoke when the subject of dealing with his competitor came up, but that he seemed to be in agreement.

**A steady course often is the best course**

About the only thing in common between hospitals and jails is that the inmates of both would prefer to be someplace else.

Put simply, both are critical in their own way to keep our society (that's all of us) in good order.

Everybody needs a medical facility available when the need arises — and the need does arise.

Society as a whole needs a detention facility available to house those who stray into anti-social behavior until society is satisfied that justice has been served.

Lincoln County Commission members last week chose a firm and steady course in dealing with both of those social necessities. The county jail in Carrizozo has been a festering problem for years; at one time or another it has been overcrowded, out of compliance with state regulations, a fire hazard...and a new facility of some sort, somewhere, has become a necessity.

The "somewhere" no longer is an issue, since the commission already has bowed to the politics of reality and agreed it will be built in Carrizozo's industrial park.

Everything else is up for grabs, but a course was set across that troubled pond with a unanimous decision to continue a contract with Corrections Systems Inc. (CSI) to operate the present jail. County Manager Tom Stewart pointed out that the county (in a tight budget year) could save something like a third of the annual cost of operation by hiring its own administrator; that is, save about \$28,000.


The commission listened to CSI's president talk about the transition to a new, bigger facility and all that would entail, and decided to forego the savings.

At the same meeting, the commission considered another option suggested by Stewart — selling the Lincoln County Medical Center facility in Ruidoso to raise funds to build a new jail. A representative of Community Health Systems Inc., a for-profit operator of hospitals around the country (including Roswell and Deming), made his pitch.

That got short shrift; it might even be said that the commission gave Presbyterian HealthCare Services, the not-for-profit operator of LCMC, a vote of confidence.

Nor did the commission castigate its county manager for proposing two losing propositions. After all, it's the job of a hired manager to do the homework and propose options to solve problems as they occur. It's up to the elected commissioners to resolve them, and stand by the results.

We think last week's decisions were right and proper.

I'm writing to let the *Ruidoso News* and its readers know what Ruidoso's radio stations are doing in the event of an emergency. Broadcasters have a tool called E. A. S. (the Emergency Alert System) and long before the fire at Warrior and Hull, KBUY and KWES as well as the Village of Ruidoso had purchased and started installing specialized alert equipment.

This equipment ... will enable our stations to immediately go live from the Ruidoso Police Department. A public information officer would then inform our listeners as to the nature of the emergency as well as how those in the affected areas are to proceed... The fact that this addition...was not completed for the recent emergency is unfortunate, but such elaborate systems aren't easily or inexpensively constructed.

I...became aware of the fire, as most did, by seeing the smoke and various emergency vehicles rushing to the scene. ... Local law enforcement was evacuating some people and blocking others. The electricity was out and because of this the radio station was off the air — a problem we are seeking to fix, by obtaining back-up generators. By the time the radio was back up and ready to broadcast...the police department was reporting that the fire was under control... Had there been any continued danger, KWES

and KBUY would have announced it.

...Rather than blaming each other and pointing out each other's faults, what we should be doing is working together to ensure fire safety throughout our community. I... know the frustration of thinking that everything that could have been done wasn't done. Let me...assure you again that, at present, we are doing everything we can to make your lives as safe and well-informed as possible...

**Social Security roadblock**

I am writing to inform you of some important developments in the debate about Social Security reform and to suggest that this is a good time for anyone interested in the subject to communicate their views to New Mexico's senators, Pete Domenici and Jeff Bingaman, and to your U. S. congressman, Rep. Joe Skeen.

Last week, several key Congressional leaders expressed doubts that Social Security legislation would move forward in this Congress. Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott went so far as to say, "I don't see it happening this year." In the aftermath of these comments, leaders of both major parties are blaming each other for lack of action. It is apparent that partisan political bickering is threatening to derail reform efforts that are

currently under way.

Americans Discuss Social Security (ADSS), a non-partisan project funded by the Pew Charitable Trusts, is concerned about these ... developments. We believe that Congress should act now to open debate on Social Security reform — that this is an ideal time to address this crucial issue. If we wait, the current budget surplus may not last; the demographic pressures will only grow; and the political climate will be less predictable.

Fortunately, many members of Congress are still working to put together a bi-partisan effort to propel reform forward this year. If enough people around the country demand action, this issue may yet take center stage before the end of the year. But it will take each of us writing, calling, and meeting with our members of Congress to make this happen...

After a great Sunday of fun and a little work on the Rio Bonito, my family started home. From the airport road we saw a huge plume of smoke on the horizon... As we got closer and closer, we realized something was terribly wrong.

As we turned up Snow Crest, emergency personnel were swarming the neighborhood. We made a dash for our house. My wife...only a couple

of months ago placed all our family photos and a few ... keepsakes in a big wicker basket. With the dog and cat loaded, we frantically scrambled for anything else that really mattered. Thank God for the EMTs that showed up... We left behind everything else that we owned.

...this fire could and probably would have taken my house and a lot more except we were blessed with...firefighters. Lots and lots of them. The organization, response time and sheer determination of all these men and women was inspirational...

These people "just did their jobs." I was really proud to have them all working for my family that night.

...I heard from more than one firefighter that had the lots not been cleared around a couple of houses right below ours, they would have lost them.

The village has stepped up the pickup of slash and brush around town, bought a mechanized loader, hired extra contract people in an effort to help with wildfire mitigation and defensible space around our homes... Since October over 16,000 cubic yards of material has shown up at our site (Sierra Contracting Disposal Company) and since June, 1993 we have disposed of upward of 100,000 yards of slash, stumps, pine needles and dead diseased trees...

This fire didn't start in the wild land, it started in my neighborhood.

**A time to reflect on those who have fallen**

Memorial Day sometimes is more thought of as that day which makes up a three-day holiday and a break from the day-to-day grind.

We need to take some time to reflect on the reason why have Memorial Day and what it actually stands for.

According to history, back in 1865, Henry G. Welles, a druggist in Waterloo, N.Y., mentioned at a social gathering that honor should be shown to those killed in the Civil War. This honor would be made by decorating the graves of those fallen soldiers.

In the Spring of 1866, he again mentioned this subject to General John B. Murray, Seneca County Clerk.

Murray embraced the idea and a committee was formulated to plan a day devoted to honoring the dead.

Wreaths, crosses and bouquets were made for each veteran's grave.

The village was decorated with flags at half mast and draped with evergreen boughs and black streamers.

On May 5, 1866, civic societies joined the procession to the three existing cemeteries and were led by veterans marching to martial music.

At each cemetery there were impressive and lengthy services including speeches by General Murray and a local clergyman. The ceremonies were repeated on May 5, 1867.

The first official recognition of Memorial Day was actually called "Decoration Day."

The date was May 5, 1868, exactly two years after Waterloo's first observance. That year Waterloo joined other communities in the nation by having their ceremony on May 30.

While we gather around the picnic tables, around the grills and the coolers, or the television for that Memorial Day Twilight Zone marathon, we should take some time to remember why we really have that day off.

The more than 50 names listed with the story on Memorial Day services are stark reminders of why we have this day off.

The fact that Memorial Day stems from the Civil War — a war in which more American lives were lost than in any other conflict — seems fitting.

Even before the village of Waterloo enacted the holiday that we recognize today, President Abraham Lincoln, in his famous Gettysburg Address, indicated we should remember those who had passed on.

"We have come to dedicate a portion of that field as a final resting place for those who gave their lives that this Nation might live," Lincoln

said. "It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this."

So, in the county named after that very president we pay homage to those who have fallen in war time.

We have volunteers, such as the cub scouts, who dutifully plant flags at the graves of Fort Stanton.

We remember, we reflect, we honor the fathers, husbands, sons, brothers, and friends who have never really left us but who will never return home.

# Legal dispute impacts Downs budget as court considers contempt charge

Attorneys wrangle over whether judge's order was followed in the first place

Ruidoso Downs village trustees and their attorney will defend themselves June 15 against possible contempt of court charges.

A motion filed in state district court by Mayor Joe Hayhurst's attorney questions whether Village Attorney Dan Bryant went against a judge's order in continuing to work on a lawsuit. Hayhurst filed the lawsuit last year against his council with the contention that trustees had acted improperly in the firing of an administrative clerk.

On June 10, 1998, District Court Judge Jerry Ritter, in Alamogordo, disqualified Bryant as an attorney for the council in the lawsuit. At the time, Bryant was representing the council in a first court appearance in the case.

Bryant, as village attorney, has a contract with both the council and the mayor, and so cannot act on behalf of one against the other. Prior to the court appearance, Bryant said he would not be representing the village council because of a conflict of interest.

Bryant this week described the contempt of court motion, filed by Hayhurst's attorney Robert Beauvais last month, as a "juvenile" ploy by Beauvais.

"We have not billed Ruidoso Downs for any substantive work since the judge disqualified our firm," Bryant said. However, his firm has done work when it has been asked by either the court or parties in the lawsuit, Bryant said.

Beauvais said the matter is one of whether a judge's order was followed or not. "This is not directed at the trustees," he said Tuesday. The question is why do Bryant and his associates continue to bill the village for work done in connection with the lawsuit.

Prior to being disqualified from representing the council, Bryant's law firm billed the village more than \$3,200 for work done on or in connection with the lawsuit, according to copies of his billing invoices.

After being disqualified, the firm billed the village another \$2,500 in 1998 alone for work in connection with the lawsuit and a related case. Bryant's legal bills are in addition to those from Jeff Rhodes, whom Bryant selected to represent the council.

Last fall, Beauvais filed another lawsuit against the village, naming Bryant as well, when trustees refused to pay his legal bills in the first lawsuit. Beauvais said the issue is one of fairness — if the council's attorneys are paid, then the mayor's legal bills should be paid.

"They not only had their attorney (Jeff Rhodes), but they had Bryant working on this thing," Beauvais said.

Thomas Sandenaw, a Las Cruces attorney representing the village in Beauvais's lawsuit, said in his response that Bryant had the contractual authority to select Hayhurst's attorney for the first lawsuit.

If that had happened, then that attorney would have been paid by the village council. As it was, the council refused to endorse Hayhurst's contract with Beauvais.

Beauvais at one time had \$13,000 in unpaid legal bills for the village. He has done additional legal work since then, but declined this week to say what the current total is. He did say interest charges are accruing on the balance.

Ritter has not yet made a final decision on Hayhurst's lawsuit regarding the dismissal of an administrative clerk. He did make a preliminary decision last fall in favor of the council, but then allowed attorneys in the case to enter a final round of written arguments.

The second lawsuit brought in four more attorneys (two for the village and two for Bryant) and many more legal bills to the village.

Village Clerk Leann Weibrecht said this week the village's current legal bill expenditures were about \$60,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30. The village had budgeted \$25,000 for the year.

# Suspect in Sierra Cinema robbery held; witnesses identify photographs

A suspect in the Jan. 9 Sierra Cinema robbery is cooling his heels in jail in Carrizozo, said a spokesperson for the Ruidoso Police Department.

Police arrested Wade Willis, 45, of Ruidoso at 9:26 p.m. May 20 at 105 Whitney Drive in Ruidoso, said Detective Doug Babcock.

Willis was identified through an informant contact, the report states, and by witnesses to the robbery who picked him out of a photo lineup. He is unemployed and has no known permanent address.

The suspect was originally identified as being medium to tall in height and of medium build, with brown hair and a mid-chest length beard. Willis is 5 feet 8 inches and weighs 150 pounds. Witnesses told police the suspect with the beard pulled on a ski mask after he was already inside the theater. The two robbers held three employees at gunpoint at about 10:30 p.m. and then fled with the cash receipts.

About midnight, a single suspect with a revolver robbed the Hollywood Bar, 2239 W. Highway 70 in Ruidoso Downs, taking both cash registers. On April 10, a clean-up crew found two bank bags belonging to Sierra Cinema beneath some lumber in the lot behind the Hollywood Bar, apparently linking the two

robberies. Ruidoso Downs police officers investigated and then notified the Ruidoso Police Department. Willis is charged only in connection with the robbery of the Sierra Cinema, Babcock said.

The police report includes records from the Catana County Sheriff's Office in North Carolina of previous arrests of Willis on drug charges for possession and delivery between 1975 with parole by the North Carolina Department of Corrections in November of 1989.

The investigation is continuing regarding the other person involved in the Sierra Cinema robbery, who was described as having salt-and-pepper graying hair and being in his late 30s or early 40s.

On Jan. 25, two men wearing brown paper grocery bags over their heads robbed the Super 8 Motel at 100 Cliff Drive, armed with a blue steel semi-automatic handgun. The robbers fled in a late-model dark-colored sports-car type vehicle. Babcock said this gun was of a different type from the one or ones used in the previous robberies.

### Carrizozo schools honor their own star performers





Ruidoso, Capitan work delayed by governor's veto

**With state funding approved, schools start budget process**

Gov. Gary Johnson signed a budget allocating more money for public education, so there will be more money for each district.

Mike Gladden, superintendent of Ruidoso Municipal Schools, returned from meeting with the State Board of Educational Finance (BEF) in Albuquerque Monday with the "final, final information on the budget process," he said.

Gladden announced an informational budget meeting at 3:30 p.m. Thursday in the administration building, to go over the priorities each district school has developed, as well as detailing for board members, representatives from each school and the public how the district gets its money and figures the budget.

Board President James Paxton said these meetings are generally informal and people present can ask questions and make suggestions for next year's budget.

"Caren Snow is the person recognized around the state as being knowledgeable about complicated things on the bud-

get," Paxton said. "She answers questions anybody has, and the public is welcomed to that too."

Snow and Gladden will give statistical information on this past year's budget. "It's informal but informational," Paxton said. "No specific action is taken. It's a question-and-answer time — just a matter of where are we allocating the money that we're getting."

All school districts are behind in their budget-making processes because the governor's vetoes of the original state budget meant districts didn't know what funds would be available for public education.

"After the governor signed the bill," Gladden said, "then the BEF went back and did all the fine-tuning and that's what the meeting with the department of education (Monday) was," Gladden said. The governor's veto delayed the budget-making process, he said, "but we'll get it done."

Capitan busy, too

"We should have already been finished and approved and had the contracts ready

for our teachers (today)," said Capitan Superintendent of Schools Diana Billingsley. "We've been delayed a good four weeks."

Billingsley said Capitan is in the process now of designing the budget for next year based on input received from parents at board meetings and from principals meeting with their staffs.

The tentative budget will go to the board for approval June 10 and then to the State Board of Education in Santa Fe on June 15, she said.

If you can drop an egg without breaking it, with dad's help, you're one creative young scientist

White Mountain Elementary students broke some yolks Monday in the parking lot, with the approval and encouragement of their principal and teachers.

The newly revived annual Egg Drop Contest gets parents working with their children to

design a container for an egg so the egg won't break when dropped from a Texas New Mexico Power Company aerial truck at 50 feet in the air, said Principal Frank Cannella.

This is a science-engineering project that "gives the kids a chance to be creative," Cannella said. "What I like about it is they get their answer real fast as to whether or not it

works. It's not a subjective sort of thing; it either works or it doesn't."

The container must be less than a square foot in size, and must land within a 10-foot circle below the egg-dropper. Many eggs dropped without breaking, but the lightest container in each class won the contest.

Jeremy Robinson won a T-shirt in the third grade category with a container weighing about 40 grams.

Colen Brodsky won a T-shirt for the fourth grade class, with a container weighing 67 grams, Cannella said.

Karl Werner, another parent volunteer, helped the students measure and weigh their containers.

Robert Priddy, a father, said the contest encourages more interaction between parents and children. "My daughter (Brittany) chased me all day yesterday getting together her invention." This year it was a parachute, he said, because last year's Styrofoam box broke.

Shandon Parker was there as a "volunteer mom" (to Cody Parker) for the event, but she's also the wife of the egg-dropper, Troy Parker, who enjoyed his first year in this role and said it wasn't hard work at all dropping eggs from 50 feet up.

Students had different ideas about designing the package: some packed them in bubble wrap, some put them in home-made Styrofoam boxes, one protected hers in an Easter basket, one packed hers in a bag of gift bows. Judging by their shrieks, the students enjoyed the "splats" of the failures as much as the successes.

In Men's Class D action, Lincoln County's only entry, Extreme, was eliminated after two games.


Local teams in the Women's Open Class had their troubles as well. The Flamin-

**Taking aim at a new game**

The shooter steadies himself in a station built from wood. He loads two shells into his 12-gauge shotgun and calls out, "Trapper ready?"

"Yes," comes the reply from beyond.

"Pull," the shooter instructs.

From his left, two neon orange disc-clay targets - skim low and fast across the horizon, one trailing the other.

In a matter of seconds, the shooter must mount his gun, aim and pull the trigger in hopes of hitting the two targets.

The shooter does this over a course that has 12 stations and 50 total targets. This isn't skeet shooting or target practice. Rather, it is sporting clays - a recreational sport some tout as the fastest growing shooting sport in America.

Shooters can take aim at sporting clays right from the back yard of the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

This spring, the resort's skeet shooting and trap shooting field was transformed into a sporting clays course. The Inn's course has been open since May 1, and director of sports activities and business is steady and good. Shooters from Albuquerque to Las Cruces, Deming to Midland have expressed interest in joining the resort's club.

"I think there will be a lot of shooters daily," Adams said of the approaching summer season. "We're going to draw a lot of attention. This is more like hunting."

Adams said the inn's management decided to put the skeet and trap shooting field, which was dormant for a several years, to use. Enter John Muir, manager of Gateway Gun Club in Land O' Lakes, Wis., and designer of sporting clays courses.

Muir describes sporting clays as "golfing with a gun." It's a preferred sport for hunters because it attempts to simulate the flying patterns of game birds.

"It's a clay target sport that allows a hunter to practice his hunting shots without actually being in a hunting envi-

ronment," said Muir, who has designed 14 sporting clays courses nationwide.

The sport is popular among families because moms, dads and children can "learn how to shoot a shotgun and learn how to shoot responsibly," Muir added.

Muir spent a month designing and supervising the construction of the course at the Inn of the Mountain Gods. He laid out the 12 stations according to the lay of the approximate six acres. For example, at one of two quail stations, the clay targets emerge from a gully, much like when real quails are flushed out.

Shooters rotate counterclockwise to each station which lay in a rough, half-mile circle. Each station simulates the flight of a game animal. Eleven of the 12 stations at the Inn course feature game birds. Station three is a rabbit station, and the clay targets bound along the ground.

The clay targets are biodegradable, Muir said. They range in diameter from that of a silver dollar to

2 1/2 inches to 4 inches.

Trappers "throw" the targets from a trap machine for the shooters. Seated behind a blind, the trapper loads two target clays that are flung in either a simultaneous pair or following pair, depending on the required shot.

The targets can come through trees, straight down, over the shooter's head, going away, going left to right or right to left - any way a real bird might choose.

It makes for an unpredictable target, which makes for a more real hunting situation, Muir said.

The course is open every day. Adams said those interested in "shooting" the course should call the big game lodge at 257-9770 for more information.

Based on its promising start, including a May 15 "fun shoot" which drew 27 participants, Adams has high expectations for the new attraction.

"We're planning on having the best sporting clays in the country," he said.

**Different targets, different games**

Target shooting is a competitive sport in which contestants fire guns at fixed or moving targets. Shooting also has a practical purpose - hunters use moving targets that simulate the movement of game.

Three types of firearms are commonly used in target shooting - rifle, pistol, and shotgun.

The shotgun events are trapshooting and skeet. A total of 25 shots is taken in each category at saucer-shaped ceramic targets known as clay pigeons.

In trapshooting, targets are released in a direction heading away from the shooters from a trap house (a spring-loaded device that launches the clay pigeon) 16 yd (14.6 m) in front of the shooters, who are arrayed in a semicircle at five adjacent stations. Five shots are taken from each station.

For skeet, high- and low-flying targets are launched from trap houses at either end of a semicircle across that has eight designated shooting stations. One target from each house is shot at from every station by each contestant. These are followed by simultaneous launches of targets from both houses requiring two rapid-fire shots, from four of the stations. The 25th shot is either a repeat of the first miss or an optional shot.

The most prestigious clay-pigeon events are the Grand American Trapshooting Tournament, conducted every August at Vandalia, Ohio, by the Amateur Trapshooting Association, and the World Skeet Shooting Championships, held each summer at San Antonio, Tex., or Savannah, Ga., by the National Skeet Shooting Association.

Gaining in popularity is sporting clays, in which targets are set up to simulate hunting conditions, with annual championships held in San Antonio, Tex., by the National Sporting Clays Association.





Experienced Elderhostelers rate their Ruidoso week as one of the best they've ever had — and they have had plenty of them.

One couple has been on 30 Elderhostel trips and many other participants have been on 10. Twenty-two people from Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina, Nebraska, Illinois, Oregon, California, Arizona and Texas came together to learn about the cultural and natural history of Lincoln County last week and were very happy with their treatment by local residents.

"From History to the Heavens" was the week's theme. The visitors traveled by van to visit the National Solar Observatory, the Hurd Gallery, McGary Studio, Hubbard Museum of the American West, the Spencer Theater for the Performing Arts and to historic old Lincoln.

Guest lecturers spoke to the visitors on the history of the Apaches, the Lincoln County War, Smokey Bear and flora and fauna of the Lincoln National Forest, cowboy poetry and classical guitar.

### Dropout rate continues decline

SANTA FE — Statistics compiled by the State Department of Education (SDE) show a continuation of the declining trend of students dropping out of school. A compilation of school districts' dropout num-

bers in 1997-98 shows New Mexico's dropout rate at 7.2 percent, down 0.7 percent from 1996-97, the lowest in 13 years and the second consecutive year New Mexico has seen a 0.7 percent decline in dropouts.

The recent spotlight on New Mexico's dropout problem is showing results. Diego Gallegos, SDE assistant superintendent for learning services, said, "People are focusing on the issue, and they know it's being looked at. The at-risk factor has provided additional resources for schools and many have put them into dropout-prevention programs and have hired attendance officers."

The at-risk factor of the New Mexico school funding formula provides additional funding for schools with higher numbers of dropouts and has prompted New Mexico school districts to pay closer attention to dropout reporting. Kurt Steinhaus, SDE assistant superintendent for accountability and information services, said, "When you start focusing on doing a better job of reporting, you end up focusing on those kids too, finding out where they are and keeping track of them."

Steinhaus is encouraged that the dropout decline has occurred despite an increase in total grade 9 through 12 enrollment. Enrollment in New Mexico public schools in those grades in the 1997-98 school year was 95,558. Of that total, 6,808 dropped out. In 1996-97, enrollment was 93,237 and 7,230 students dropped out.

Michael J. Davis, state superintendent of public instruction, said "I'm confident that the continued decline in the dropout rate is the result of schools and communities developing an Educational Plan for Student Success (EPSS) that focuses on children and improving their learning. I'm very pleased to see that the data for communities with the most severe dropout problem is improving."

The State Board of Education had established as one of its goals for the 1999 New Mexico Legislative session reducing the dropout rate by one thousand students per year.

## Day of parental anguish: When a child gets a driver's license

As a parent, it's the day you've both anticipated and dreaded — your child's sixteenth birthday. Armed with a driver's license, your child is about to experience a newfound freedom that can free you up as well, but your excitement is tainted by the knowledge that, statistically, teenage drivers are at a greater risk for motor vehicle crashes.

Indeed, the statistics are alarming. Every year, more than 5,000 teenagers of driving age die in crashes; slightly

more than half are drivers. Two-thirds of teen passenger deaths occur in vehicles driven by other teens. According to the National Safety Council, drivers between 16 and 17 are three times more likely to be killed in a traffic crash than people between the ages of 25 and 64.

You can improve your child's odds of staying safe on the road with these tips:

- Make sure your child has plenty of supervised practice before driving solo. Many

states issue driving permits that require a minimum of six months of supervised driving before a teen can obtain a driver's license.

- Seat belt use should be mandatory. Actually, the earlier you instill this habit in your children, the better. As soon as they are old enough to ride without a car seat, your children should learn to buckle up every time they ride in a vehicle.

- Whenever possible, have your children drive cars

equipped with air bags and anti-lock brakes. Generally, larger cars are also safer than compacts.

- Don't hesitate to enforce strict driving rules that address issues such as speeding and drinking and driving.

There's no escaping an increase in car insurance costs when your teenager takes the wheel, but you can limit the increase by adding your teen to your own policy. Purchasing a separate policy for him/her will cost you more. (ARA)

In "By the Shores of Silver Lake" the Ingalls move to the unsettled Dakota wilderness.


### Dr. Seuss

### Beverly Cleary




Beverly Cleary (1916 - ) studied to be a librarian in college. Besides writing, she loves to read and do needlework.

She has also won the Laura Ingalls Wilder Award.



Alan Alexander Milne wrote plays and funny articles for magazines.



## POOP SCOOP

An article in Animal Sheltering Magazine's March-April issue focuses on how training dogs at animal shelters can enhance their chance for adoption and make the shelter staff's job a little easier.

Author Nancy Lawson wrote that first impressions can turn off a potential adopter, if a dog jumps all over the person, won't stop barking or gets so excited they wet.

"But aside from professional trainers, who has time to take dogs aside for a half hour twice a day and run through a traditional obedience drill," she writes. "Not shelter workers, that's for sure."

Trainer Sue Sternberg in Accord, N.Y., says she's found a better way, a method that takes little effort and teaches dogs to transfer their good behavior from kennel worker to volunteer and eventually to potential adopter.

"There are ways to train dogs so they enjoy themselves so much that they'll go up to the next person, just walk right up to them and say, 'Hey, look at me. I can sit,'" Sternberg said.

With a tasty treat and a little time, a volunteer can make a dog more adoptable, she said.

Steinberg calls it environmentally cued training, or training that teaches dogs to respond to

common movements by people when they interact with animals, Lawson writes.

She cites an example of teaching a dog to sit at the sight of a person putting down a food bowl or placing a hand on a doorknob. Instead of receiving treats or praise as a lure to sit, the dog learns that the opening of the door is his reward.

"The shelter worker calmly tells the dog to sit and when the dog responds appropriately, he is immediately met with an open doorway and a bout of play outside," she told Lawson.

The exercise is repeated a few times and the dog learns to sit at all closed doorways.

Because the training mimics what shelter workers have to do on a daily basis, shelters of all sizes are finding ways to fit training programs into their daily routines, Lawson said.

Studies by the Humane Society of the United States have shown that many dogs are left at shelters and returned there not because they're unattractive, but because of behavior problems.

Knowing a fancy trick or two can help a dog display his training potential, according to Kay Guyette, shelter manager at Monadnock Humane Society in New Hampshire.

## ABC gears up for the 83rd Indianapolis 500

It's a lot like a long-running soap opera. There are familiar faces, drama, excitement and plenty of plot twists. Throw in the scent of burning rubber and the whine of souped-up engines, and there's the Indianapolis 500.

Coverage of the 83rd Indy airs Sunday, May 30, on ABC. Al Michaels joins play-by-play announcer Bob Ienkins and race analyst Tom Sneva

from Indianapolis Motor Speedway. Sneva knows all about the pressures of competing in such a high-profile event. He took the checkered flag in the 1983 Indy.

"From a driver's standpoint, (there's) a big buildup of adrenaline on the day of the race," Sneva says. "It's a long race. You can't win on the first lap or two. It's the team that adapts the quickest to ever-changing situations that'll be in front."

Trying to protect an early lead during

the 200-lap race can lead to wandering thoughts that divert a driver's focus.

"The ideal situation is if you're just battling hard for the lead, and you get it late in the race," he says. "You don't have a lot of time to think about the fact the only thing to keep (you) from winning is the car breaking down."

"It's a demanding test of men and machines. The tradition around it and the fact it draws half a million people make it a pretty big happening."

Speedway spokesman Fred Nation sees even nonfans enjoying the "greatest spectacle in auto racing."

"The Indy 500 has always transcended just race fans," Nation says. "It's an event much like the Kentucky Derby or the World Series. It attracts people who don't follow that particular sport the rest of the year."

The only thing more exciting than the finish might be the beginning.

"The start of the Indy 500-mile race is generally regarded as one of the most thrilling moments in sports," Nation says. "Thirty-three cars closely packed come down a flying start with literally hundreds of thousands of fans standing and applauding. It's something that raises the hair on the back of your neck. The combination of sound, feeling and general atmosphere is without parallel in motor sports."





## PROTECTING YOUR SIGHT

Whether you wear glasses, contact lenses or simply have satisfactory vision without any corrective eyewear, you may want to consider the many new developments in eye protection. Although your eyebrows, eyelids, and the iris, or colored part of your eye, offer some protection, added protection now available in both prescription and non-prescription lenses can save your sight when engaging in high risk activities such as recreating outdoors in bright sunlight or operating power equipment, like chainsaws or weed eaters. Other activities including prolonged periods of driving, working at a computer monitor and other tedious close work tasks can cause severe eyestrain resulting in headaches and eye pain.

Although prolonged exposure to sunlight may cause more serious problems, such as early development of cataracts, artificial lighting can cause eye strain which may result in headaches and increased irritability. Even facing oncoming headlights at night can result in discomfort, blurry vision and headaches. Eye protection such as anti-reflective coatings, photochromic lenses, polarized lenses and protection from ultraviolet radiation may be recommended. Anti-reflective coatings can improve night driving comfort by significantly reducing glare from oncoming traffic. During the daytime, anti-reflective coatings reduce glare from fluorescent lighting in the workplace and ease computer eyestrain. Photochromic and tinted lenses are available in plastic, glass and safety materials. Photochromic lenses darken in bright light and clear inside offering a dual purpose advantage. Polarized lenses, available in both gray and brown, tame harsh glare and provide added comfort even in blinding light, fog, rain or snow. Protection from harmful ultraviolet radiation is available and recommended on all lenses.

Safety lenses made of impact resistant materials are required for many professionals such as logging, welding and electrical work. Safety glasses are available with prescription or non-prescription and offer added protection from flying debris, sparks or sudden impact. These lenses are also recommended for children involved in sports like baseball, basketball and hockey. Also individuals who have already had damage to one eye should protect their only "good" eye by wearing safety lenses.

**National Memorial Day Concert**

From the jungles of Vietnam to the island of Okinawa, millions of Americans put their lives on the line for the United States. On the eve of America's Memorial Day holiday, viewers across the nation have a special opportunity to remember these brave men and women.

The National Memorial Day Concert (1999), celebrating its 10th anniversary with this broadcast, salutes valiant veterans with a special program featuring General Colin Powell, Charles Durning, Rita Moreno, and other distinguished guest artists performing with the National Symphony Orchestra. Broadcast live from the west lawn of the U.S. Capitol, the 90-minute event is hosted by actor and World War II veteran Ossie Davis.

**The Berlin Crisis**

In June 1948, the Soviets surrounded Berlin, cutting off supplies of food and fuel. Already devastated by World War II, Berlin was starving. In the first major confrontation of the Cold War, the Allied Powers faced an agonizing dilemma: give the Soviets Berlin, or resist and risk World War III. **The Berlin Crisis**, a 90-minute documentary, outlines the history of the Berlin Airlift — the deliveries of food, medical supplies, and fuel to the besieged city every day and night for nearly a year.

In 1945, when World War II was over, the Allied Powers were concentrating on rebuilding a nearly ruined Western Europe. Newsreel footage captures scenes of a decimated Berlin, a city gripped by fear and deprivation. Because Joseph Stalin wanted to insure that Russia maintained a primary presence in Berlin, the Allies' isolated western outpost in East Germany, the British, French, and Americans walked softly, knowing only too well what a confrontation with Russia could mean.

When the Soviets encircled Berlin, the city became a prison. British and American forces held their ground, but there was no way to get supplies. Since the Russians had little control over what happened in the skies, an air bridge seemed the perfect plan. England and America viewed the operation as a stopgap, expected to last only a week or so. The Berlin Airlift lasted 10 months and 23 days.

In the spring of 1949, when Stalin halted all negotiations regarding the Berlin blockade, President Truman ordered American B-52 bombers to England. The Russians learned of this through Donald Maclean, a spy. The Russians knew the West was serious and that the United States would use an atomic bomb if necessary. The Russians had no such bomb.

Stalin finally lifted the blockade — an act hailed by the West as their first victory in the Cold War.

## Future uncertain after Deep Space Nine wraps

It's the end of an era this week as Paramount's *Star Trek: Deep Space Nine*, the most popular program in syndication, comes to a close. Depending on your local station's preference, the final episode, "What You Leave Behind," will air either in two parts or as a two-hour special (check local listings).

Why would the creators of the popular space station and its multigalactic inhabitants choose to jettison the series at the height of its popularity?

"When I agreed to do *Deep Space Nine*, they said it would run for seven years, and nothing has changed," executive producer Ira Steven Behr says. The expense of new contracts for the show's internationally known stars wasn't likely to be attractive to the studio, given what such a popular show can make - without any salaries or production costs - in reruns, he adds.

Unlike previous *Star Trek* projects, in which spaceships explore far-flung galaxies, the series takes place on *Deep Space Nine*, a space station anchored at a coveted "wormhole" - a critical shortcut to another galaxy. The station's mission, to help keep peace in the region and ensure the wormhole remains open to all travelers, is complicated by the inhabitants of the nearby planet Bajor, who believe the wormhole contains their gods, "the prophets."

Another complication was added when the captain of the station, Benjamin Sisko (Avery Brooks), was contacted by the prophets to be their human emissary to the Bajorans, putting the career officer in an uncomfortable tactical and spiritual position.

The concept of a space station allowed the show's writers to depart from *Star Trek* convention and create several lead characters who were not directly involved with Starfleet.

These interplanetary leads include Odo (Iral (Rene Auberjonois, *Benson*), the station's chief of security, and the profit-obsessed Ferengi bar owner, Quark (Armin Shimerman).

Both Behr and Auberjonois call the series the "darker, grittier" *Star Trek* spinoff, the middle child between *Star Trek: The Next Generation*, which left the air in 1994, and *Star Trek: Voyager*, currently airing on United Paramount Network.

In "What You Leave Behind," the war with the Dominion is resolved, according to Behr, though he won't offer many specifics.

"Those wanting a sense of closure will get that. It wraps up the major plot threads, and the major character arcs will be completed," he says. "The Dominion war will reach a conclusion; Sisko's story - as the Emissary and the captain - will reach a conclusion."

Behr adds that there even will be a song from Vic Fontaine (James Darren), the popular computer-generated holograph of a Rat Pack-era Las Vegas

lounge singer.

Auberjonois says he "can see the characters staying alive in some form," but hints that the final episode doesn't lend itself to a sequel.

Shimerman, who, like Auberjonois, spent at least two hours daily in the makeup chair to have his plastic prosthetics applied (including his trademark oversize Ferengi lobes), says he would welcome any film offers.

"I'm pretty sure I'd pull my ears out of mothballs if somebody asked me," says the actor, whose Quark was the first character cast for the series. "I've always compared myself to lottery winners. It's the fulfillment of my fantasy."
