

Mescalero president, vice president removed by council

Mescalero Apache tribal council members contended Tuesday President Paul Ortega and Vice President Oliver Enjady were removed from office because the tribe was teetering on bankruptcy. But angry tribal members complained after a general assembly called by the council, that their questions remain unanswered. Holly Yazzi, who lives on the reservation, said she wants to know if, as Ortega claimed at the meeting, the tribe's finance director told him everything was under control up until days before he was put on administrative leave. A move is underway to recall the entire council, several tribal members said.

Marc Prelo, an attorney representing Enjady, said his client will file today in tribal court, asking that the council's "unconstitutional action" be overturned. "We're extremely disgusted the tribal council chose by the arbitrary action they took to disenfranchise the people who elected all of these folks," Prelo said. "This clearly contradicts the tribal constitution, which states that (officers) can only be removed after being found guilty. That indicates a court of law and they took over that function. Since the council also serves as the appeals court, my client is left without a forum." Allowing the council to take such unilateral action would set a bad precedent and leave any future president in a precarious position, he said. Prelo said Enjady and Ortega attempted to

resolve the situation internally and were willing to resign and run for office in a special election. But after initially agreeing, the council refused to accept the resignations. Enjady said he intends to run for tribal president in the special election, which the council said will be announced. Ortega could not be reached for comment. Ortega and Enjady were removed from their positions Friday, said Sara Misque, a council member who served for years as administrative assistant to the late tribal president Wendell Chino. Enjady said later that he never was notified about the action of the council. He did not attend the Friday meeting. About 400 Mescalero Apaches piled into the tribal auditorium for the assembly. Non-tribal

members were told by Council Member Harlyn Geronimo to leave 20 minutes into the meeting. By that time, Misque, who was appointed to her position on the council, told the assembly that Ortega and Enjady disregarded the tribal constitution and spent money without council approval. "We were headed for bankruptcy," she said. "I know some of you are upset, but this was for the benefit of the tribe. We did this for financial, not political reasons." Misque apparently will serve as interim president until the special election. A regular election will follow in November, said council member Art Blazer. "It's been a terrible time the last couple of

Martinez found guilty of murder

Charles Martinez, 40, faces a maximum term of another 40 years behind bars when he is sentenced for first-degree murder, conspiracy to commit murder and tampering with evidence in the death of Elizabeth Lankhorst-Ballard. But Public Defender Regina Sewell said she will appeal his conviction Friday on the three counts. A six-man, six-woman jury came back with a guilty verdict on all three charges after a week-long trial and three hours of deliberation. Twelfth Judicial District Judge Karen Parsons ordered a pre-sentence investigation that should take about 30 days. Jurors contacted after the verdict declined to comment on factors leading to their decision in the case. A sobbing Martinez, one of two men charged with strangling Lankhorst-Ballard in March 1998 and then burying her body in a shallow grave in Tularosa, was comforted after the verdict by his mother. But one of his brothers was ordered to leave the courtroom when he

screamed at jurors, "There was no evidence, you idiots." Sewell maintained in her closing argument that friends who testified about Martinez and his long-time lover, Christine Faviell, confessed the crime to them had reasons to lie. She proposed that Faviell conspired with one of the mutual friends to kill Lankhorst-Ballard and then framed Martinez. Faviell dated Lankhorst-Ballard during a brief separation from Martinez in late 1997. When he reunited with Martinez, a transvestite who went by the name of Eva, Lankhorst-Ballard found the union hard to accept. Friends of Faviell testified that she caused scenes in restaurants and tormented the two men. They said Faviell talked about having the 27-year-old woman beaten up or killed. In the early morning hours of March 9, she apparently went to a home on Evergreen Street, where she once had lived with Faviell, to talk to her former lover. Instead, friends tes-

Hotel suit in district court

Within the next 20 days, Lincoln County District Judge Karen Parsons will decide if the village of Ruidoso should be blocked from moving ahead with the lease of public land for a convention hotel. However, Parsons denied a request for a temporary restraining order Friday, part of a suit filed by a group of Ruidoso motel and cabin owners. Attorney Dave Thomsen failed to convince her that significant "irreparable" damage would be caused to his clients if the restraining order was not granted, she said. However, Jay D. Hertz, an attorney representing the developers of Hotel Ruidoso, and Village Attorney H. John Underwood listed more than \$1 million in financial damages that could occur with any delay on the project. Parsons said she wants to hear firsthand at the next session how

plaintiffs Jacqueline Craig, Sandra Davis, Bruce Kernodle, Lester Mazourek, Vaughn McDougal and Clifford Vaughn will be impacted. They did not attend the hearing Friday. In their suit filed March 26 in Lincoln County's district court, the lodgers contended the lease and bond sale agreement between the village and hotel developers violates a state constitutional prohibition against donations to private businesses, and denied the public a chance to vote down the proposal. They stated that tax money will be used to advertise and promote the hotel, that impact fees required of other developers will be waived and the hotel will be allowed to use a governmental liquor license. Hertz and Underwood argued Friday that the village met the requirements of state statutes by charging an annual lease price equal to 5 percent of the value of the land situated between The Links public golf course and the Ruidoso Convention Center.

Roadwork slows down race traffic

All things considered, Ruidoso Downs Police Chief David Hightower said Tuesday this past weekend's traffic went "as good as could be expected." Even so, cars on U.S. Highway 70 - kept to two lanes instead of four because of road construction - were backed up as far as the turn-off to the Inn of the Mountain Gods at times this weekend, Hightower said. On the first weekend of the Ruidoso Downs Race Track season, thousands of racetrack goers joined the traffic funneling through the two-lane highway, with the result being reported drive times of up to an hour, Hightower and other officials said. Lines of slow-moving motorists were reported backed onto Sudderth Drive to the west of the Lincoln County Medical Center and far to the east of Ruidoso Downs on the highway. On the upside, only two minor accidents were reported in the traffic

area during the weekend, and emergency vehicles were able to get through, Hightower said. "It went as smooth as it could go I think. I know we had a lot of agitated people because of the length of time it took to get through," he said. A problem with the asphalt mix prevented the road construction contractor, Meadow Valley Contractors Inc., from paving the south lanes of U.S. 70 before the scheduled race day as previously tracked. The ensuing traffic problem that started Friday morning was significant enough to attract the attention of the state's top highway official. Pete Rahn, secretary of the New Mexico Highway and Transportation Department, said two of his administrators sent here to monitor the situation reported "major problems" with the first wave of traffic Friday morning. By Friday night, 20 state highway maintenance employees from the region had joined Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs police officers as well

as local volunteers trying to control the traffic, Rahn and Hightower said. "It did get better once we were able to bring people in," Rahn said Tuesday. "We were trying to make the best of a bad situation." "We also apologize for the inconvenience to the community," he said. "We felt that we had dealt with the critical deadlines with our schedule." He said state highway officials did not know about the pending problem until the last few days. "It was earlier in the week that we were informed by Meadow Valley that they were not going to be able to meet the deadline," Rahn said. Rahn was not certain whether the road would be paved in time to avoid a repeat of the traffic congestion this weekend. Hightower said he thought it would be extremely unlikely. Besides the highway personnel, volunteers from Meadow Valley, the Ruidoso Downs Fire Department and the New Mexico Mounted Police helped the village with traffic control, Hightower said.



White Oaks Eagle June 1, 1899

Decoration Day was observed here Tuesday. The G.A.R. veterans met at the Congregational church and marched to the cemetery where a commemorative service was held in honor of the sixteen veterans who have gone to their final rest in this place.

A couple of eye fixers and speck peddlers took up considerable room here for a day or two this week. One of them, Dr. Blank was extremely handy with three aces and the cutter in the games at Monte Carlo, and pulled most of the velvet off the green cloth.

Juan L. Reyes, the foreman of the Eagle's composing rooms has been a victim of tonsillitis for several days, and William Tompkins has been typo in chief during his illness.

Enjady says he will run for presidency if faced with elections

Oliver Enjady Tuesday called either for a reconciliation or for the entire Mescalero Apache tribal council to resign and let voters decide in a special election whose approach to governing the tribe is right for them.

Speaking after a general assembly on the council's decision to remove him as vice president and Paul Ortega as president, Enjady said, "I'm confident in what I'm doing."

"If there is a special election,

I will run for president. But the council still could take back the charges and let us move on until the general election in November. I told them we can work together if they keep the people in focus, take care of the people before their own personal interests. They need to let the sun shine in."

The process used by the council was unlawful, he contends.

"They praise the constitution, but have ignored it," he said. "Within their interpre-

tation of the constitution, they have given themselves lots of power."

Sara Miquez, interim president, could not be reached for comment late Tuesday.

He's admitted at times he and Ortega pushed ahead without the council to get things done, but that didn't warrant the council action.

"It seems we never got anything done because of the November syndrome. Everybody wants to be presi-

dent," he said. "The ones who are involved in this effort will come to light when the candidates names are called for."

He's not trying to defend himself or Ortega, Enjady said, "only to defend the presidency and vice presidency and the tribal council through the constitution."

That 34-year-old constitution needs to be redefined to better serve the people, he said, adding that will be one of his first projects, if elected.

weeks, sitting on the council and having to deal with something we've never faced before," he said.

Council member Frederick Chino said the tribe could not cover the salaries of tribal police May 14, but after Ortega and Enjady were removed Friday, the tribe obtained an \$8.5 million loan from banks.

"What happened is very sad," Chino said. "Let me make it clear the president and vice president did not steal any money."

The two men were talked into spending more money by department heads and supervisors than the annual budget

allowed, Chino said.

"Out of a kindness of heart, they're getting the blame and the others are getting off scot-free. I don't like it," he said. Chino later left while the assembly still was in progress.

Ortega, as president, and Enjady, selected from the council to serve in Ortega's vacated vice president's post, took office in November after the death of tribal President Wendell Chino. They were put on administrative leave May 20.

Frederick Chino contended the two men were spending more than twice as much to operate the tribe and its enterprises as was budgeted at the beginning of the fiscal year Oct. 1, 1998.

But Yazzi said, "Anyone

can make up a graph. They had no answers when I asked where is the proof that Oliver and Paul are to blame. They didn't have answers for many of our questions."

However, Enjady acknowledged Tuesday, he and Ortega moved ahead on some projects without council approval. He contended they were forced to take action, because they were dealing with a council that tried to block every move and was working against them.

Council member Silas Cochise has already resigned from the council and member Glenda Brusuelas told tribal members Tuesday that she stood alone in opposing the action of the council.

Although Miquez said

council members were there to answer questions, Yazzi said when pressed for answers, they ended the meeting and left.

"I stood up and said they're not for the people, but (Miquez, Blazer and member Christie La Paz) didn't want to hear what we had to say," Yazzi said. "We told (Ortega) he should go in and take back his office, but he said he couldn't because the locks had been changed and (the council) has (police) officers there."

"The council members need to resign. This really disgusts me. They're not thinking about us."

Miquez did not return calls to her office.

tified the two men told them they strangled her and buried her on property owned by Faviell's mother. Her body was found about a month later, but scavengers had consumed much of the chest and throat area, as well as vital organs. That left the prosecution with no hard evidence on how she was killed.

Faviell will stand trial on the same three charges in November and is represented by local attorney Gary Mitchell.

With a chart, Sewell emphasized the lack of evidence directly connecting her client to the murder. No fingerprints, no carpet fibers, no evidence of how the woman died, no blood, and no traces of bodily fluids in the car trunk supposedly used to transport the body were found. There also was not enough dog hair to indicate the woman was prone on the living room floor as

friends described the murder scene that Faviell and Martinez related to them.

"What is the state asking you to do?" she said. "They're asking you to find the evidence from what you've been told. For (the district attorney) to prove her case, you must be satisfied she has proof beyond a reasonable doubt and this case is riddled with doubt."

But District Attorney Canon Stevens said jurors should take their common sense with them into the jury room.

Martinez knew how to eliminate blood traces, because he was employed as a blood technician, she said. Two bottles of hydrogen peroxide, effective in removing blood, were found in the bathroom. Friends also testified that Martinez told them he cut away a section of carpet that may have contained a stain he couldn't eliminate.

Steven also pointed out the friends saw a fan in the living room in early March and that

fan was used not to cool the room, but to dry the carpet.

A crime scene expert testified to finding evidence of intense cleaning efforts on selected areas of the floor.

Stevens also honed in on the trunk of Martinez' car, which the friends said was used to transport the body wrapped in a blanket and plastic. The trunk recently had been washed when police examined it. Martinez claimed he was cleaning up spilled caramel sauce, but a woman who worked with Faviell said she saw the car before the search and there was no caramel stain. She also testified that Faviell said she no longer had to worry about Lankhorst-Ballard, with whom she previously argued.

But Sewell said Faviell was prone to lies. He told Martinez Lankhorst-Ballard was pregnant, but neither her mother nor an autopsy indicated that was true. He talked about getting back together with Martinez in December 1997

when he was still seeing Lankhorst-Ballard. He told friends he and Martinez were getting married, but instead just drove to a scenic parking spot and talked about their love. His stories framed Martinez, she insisted.

But Stevens said the friends who testified had nothing to gain by repeating Martinez' and Faviell's remarks.

Martinez showed premeditation in murdering Lankhorst-Ballard, because he hit her twice in the head with a coffee carafe, then strangled her to unconsciousness with her own scarf, before telling Faviell "to finish her off."

"That's calculation, that's deliberation and that's first-degree murder," she said.

Aided in her prosecution by Assistant District Attorney Michael Kwaskniewski, Stevens contended Martinez wanted Faviell involved in the death.

"He wanted Faviell tied to him for life," she said.

Violators pay a price

ALAMOGORDO - Forest visitors who violated current fire and smoking restrictions in the Lincoln National Forest (LNF) were made to pay the price over the Memorial Day weekend.

Forest Service law enforcement officers issued 15 citations and arrested seven individuals for violations of the restrictions.

Law Enforcement Officer Hoot Murray added that "Most of the violations occurred at night when campers probably thought they could get away with it. Except they didn't anticipate that we would have officers patrolling the forest day and night."

The consequences for violating the restrictions may include a \$1,000 fine and/or a year in jail.

Thanks to cooperation of the public and patrols by law enforcement officers from the Forest Service and the Lincoln, Otero and Eddy County sheriff's departments, there were no human-caused fires over the long weekend. Forest

Supervisor Jose Martinez expressed appreciation: "We certainly would like to thank those who did adhere to the fire and smoking restrictions while visiting the forest. I hope that they will continue to be cautious throughout the summer."

As a reminder, current fire and smoking restrictions are in effect forest-wide, except in developed recreation areas where grills or metal-constructed fire rings are provided. Rock fire rings are not included. Smoking should be confined to vehicles or buildings. Fireworks are strictly prohibited on national forest land at all times.

Fire danger on the Lincoln National Forest remains extreme, and the Forest Service still needs the public's help in preventing wildfires. Fire restrictions will continue to be enforced.

Firm's goal: finish Mechem by October

Road construction on Mechem Drive is about 40 percent complete and should be finished by October, a construction project manager estimates.

Hank Schenk, with Meadow Valley Contractors Inc., last week told a group of concerned business owners and village officials that his crews and subcontractors were trying "to go as fast as possible" to complete the \$9-plus million highway project.

The job is one of three ongoing state road construction projects in the area, all of which are being completed by Meadow Valley, a Phoenix-based

firm. The lower Mechem project stretches almost 4 miles, from Sudderth to White Mountain Drive. It was started in spring 1998.

Under the company's contract with the state, the project currently has a November completion date. However, that deadline technically can be pushed back into December or even January if rains cause delays, Schenk and state officials said.

Even if the project could go until January, Schenk said it was not in the company's interest to do so. "Right now, I am hoping to finish both jobs (upper Mechem as well) by October," he said.

Business owners along

Mechem met with Schenk and state highway officials last week with questions about the project and its duration. Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson, who also has a mortgage business on Mechem Drive, asked the contractor to expedite the work once the summer monsoon season is over.

Schenk responded by saying it was his intention to do so. He could not put extra shifts on the project now because subcontractors were still finishing parts of the job and because of the "piecemeal" nature of the current phase of work.

Schenk at times defended Meadow Valleys' work and the company's responsiveness to the community while he has

been project manager. Schenk is the third project manager on the construction job since it was started. He responded to complaints that his crews have "laughed at" the concerns of local business owners and residents by saying none of his people would do that. If they did, then he would want to know about it.

Currently, the project is awaiting state approval for a new asphalt mix before paving in areas can begin. The asphalt mix that had been approved earlier has had to be redesigned because of a change in the type of gravel being extracted from a local gravel pit.

A variety of safety training classes have been scheduled throughout the remainder of the year in Ruidoso, according to Dorothea Ernest, manager of the Red Cross Service Center located in the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce office.

The community first aid and safety course is an 8.5 hour course designed to teach participants what to do in an emergency before medical help arrives. The intent is to help people feel more confident of their ability to act appropriately in the event of an emergency. It consists of cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) for adults, infants and children, and first aid.

Either of the classes may be taken separately. The CPR portion began Tuesday and will continue on June 28, Aug. 2, Aug. 30, Oct. 4, Nov. 1 and Nov. 30 from 5:30 to 10 p.m.

The first aid portion will begin on June 7 and will be conducted on July 1, Aug. 5, Sept. 2, Oct. 7, Nov. 4 and Dec. 2, from 5:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. "Preventing Disease Transmission" is a course designed so

that participants will become familiar with the intent of the regulations issued by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA); how disease transmission occurs; diseases of greatest concern; precautions to prevent disease transmissions; and what to do if an exposure occurs. The course meets OSHA requirements.

Classes will start June 22 from 5:30-8:30 p.m., and will continue on July 5, Aug. 9, Oct. 11, Nov. 8 and Dec. 6 at the same time.

Presentations about HIV/Aids are designed to inform teens and adults about the cause, prevention and treatment of HIV/Aids. Presentations will be the second Thursday of each month (except in July) from 6-8 p.m. It is a free program, but pre-registration is required.

CPR for the professional rescuer is for anyone with a duty to perform, such as lifeguards, law enforcement off-

cers, medical personnel, firefighters, or anyone who wants more information than the community class offers. The class includes CPR for adult, infant, child, two-man CPR, use of pocket masks, bag valve masks and other devices. The class will be scheduled on an as-needed basis when a class can be filled; those interested may call the Red Cross office to schedule.

Disaster classes are to prepare people to help when a disaster action team is activated - whether to man a shelter, feed fire personnel or go to national or international disaster sites.

These classes will be from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. on June 5, June 19 and July 10.

All classes will be in the board room at the chamber office. Interested people may register by calling 257-7579; the office is open Tuesday-Friday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Registration for all classes will close five days prior to the class, to enable the assigning of an instructor and obtaining class materials.

Manager gets more assignments

Dorothea Ernest, manager of the Red Cross Service Center in Ruidoso, has been appointed as a state health and safety service specialist and assigned to the training cadre for the state. She will be asked to assist other units with instructor/trainer training.


Mrs. Ernest also will travel to the Red Cross Training Center in Falls Church, Va., to be trained in a new workplace first aid and safety program, to

Growth tug-of-war continues unabated

When a new administration took over at Ruidoso's Village Hall last year, long-time village-watchers began speculating about the direction in which village government would move — especially where growth was concerned. After all, most of them had business ties to tourism and real estate, areas of the economy that thrive on growth.

Ruidoso's infrastructure, its water and sewer lines, were in bad shape. Water resources appeared exceedingly limited. The Ruidoso Convention Center had no support hotel. Organizations such as the Ruidoso River Association were putting on the heat to do something about the leaky Grindstone Dam. Fire hazards were everybody's concern, despite a relatively good winter, weatherwise.

Mayor Robert Donaldson and his council made major moves about solving problems early on. They reached accommodation with the River Association by revising the way Grindstone is used to provide water. They began developing new wells in the Alto area. They quietly began looking for a viable convention hotel operator.

And they approved so-called "impact fees" over the objection of a blue-ribbon committee's majority recommendation. The idea was to use those \$4,400 fees on new home construction to cover the added infrastructure cost. It was touted as a forward-looking, dynamic solution to a problem.

One result — perhaps anticipated, perhaps not — was a huge influx of requests for building permits before year-end. It was acknowledged at the time that all those builders were getting under the wire before the impact fees took effect.

Soon after the new year, as the administration began to implement the fee program (that included an optional 15-year time payment provision) it became obvious that it had created a collection nightmare. In fact, to date only about \$550 has been collected in impact fees.

And last week the council during a study session gave every indication that the fees would be formally killed in the near future. It's still gathering information on so-called "standby fees" that would require owners of undeveloped lots to pay a share of the costs.

But Ruidoso's water demands continue to grow and new construction continues in some sort of limbo.

Meanwhile, Cleatus Richards, the sometimes criticized planning officer, credited by the council with "cleaning up" the village, has been promoted sideways into a "special projects" job, and a new one is to be hired.

So what is the village's policy on growth, anyway?

Education reform 'beyond political trends,' says senator

For those of us who have always considered public education and its evolution among government's top priorities, its resurgence as a prominent topic in public debate is stimulating. New Mexicans have made it clear they want their elected officials to recognize that a quality education system is key to the success of the state as a whole.

Recognizing that education should come first in the disbursement of state funds, the Legislature continues to put more new dollars into the public schools and the state colleges than in any other area. Over the last several years many important initiatives have won support, including new literacy and early childhood programs, expansion of student testing, a revamping of the school funding formula to accommodate the special needs of drop-outs and other troubled students, and more equitable pay for teachers.

The Legislature also recognizes our school facilities are in substantial disrepair. A legislatively funded study places the cost of necessary new school construction and improvements at \$1.5 billion and state lawmakers are in the process of finding funds to meet this

need and fairly distribute the money to the school districts.

The governor also has joined this education debate with his request for publicly founded vouchers that could be used at private schools. Now that vouchers have received an extensive and fair public hearing before state lawmakers, the Legislature is ready to seize the opportunity to expand deliberation of reform to the multitude of other options available to us.

Unquestionably, many measures of the performance of our schools indicate a need for change. We have high drop-out rates and poor scores on national tests. But we should pay equal attention to our successes: Our students routinely do well in national science competitions. We have among the highest rates of teachers with national certification. Most of our students and our schools are high performers. I suspect if we disregarded the statistics from our lowest performing students and schools, we would find that New Mexico is among the top competitors in public education. New Mexico education programs that are working include the under-rated equalization guarantee that ensures all schools... get a fair share of education funding, teacher professional development programs, special needs programming,

and counseling programs.

The development of individual student education plans is also among the things we do right. However, while we already gather the information necessary to comprehensively assess a student's weaknesses and strengths, we do not always take the time to use those assessments to continually modify our approach to helping the student grow. I suggest school boards and administrators consider altering the school calendar to allow teachers and support staff the opportunity several times a year to review student performance and tailor the education program to meet the individual student needs. A more global review of these same assessments would give us the opportunity to devise strategies... for students with the same problems and needs.

Another void in our education system is our failure to effectively act on the obvious reality that educational success begins with a good home environment. Most parents are involved and committed to their children's progress but too many of our young people leave school for homes where the parents, because of poverty or upbringing or a lack of skills, cannot or will not help their children succeed. This is perhaps the greatest weakness of our current educational

system and vouchers, which are dependent on parent involvement, cannot address this weakness.

We cannot wait for those parents to come to the schools to talk about their children. We cannot wait for them to seek adult basic education and other help to make them more successful adults, and better parents. We must reach into those homes and equip those parents with the tools, training and tenacity to be a part of their children's education. We must find the resources that will allow teachers to visit the homes of their students, especially when the parents have failed to attend parent-teacher conferences or we have seen other indications the parents are not as involved as they need to be for their children to reach their potential.

Whether you call it education reform, revolution or evolution, the call for change in the public schools should not depend on trends or fashion. We must always seek to improve our schools, in ways large and small. And we must find solutions that address the real needs of our students and communities.

County's fire-safety 'requests' now have teeth

Like last year, Lincoln County commissioners are asking people to avoid igniting firecrackers such as bottle rockets in the county, because of fire dangers.

Unlike last year, those who ignore the request now can be fined up to \$1,000, or jailed for up to a year.

At their recent meeting, commissioners approved Lincoln County's first ordinance to prohibit improper fire handling and certain firecrackers during times of extreme fire danger. The ordinance puts "teeth" into the restrictions, which previously were merely requests in the form of commission resolutions, County Attorney Alan Morel said.

"We had resolutions, and resolutions are like a wish ... there is no enforcement provision for a resolution," Morel said Tuesday.

Until this spring, state law prevented the county from declaring an extreme fire danger status. Instead, it was up to the state fire marshal to declare extreme fire dan-

ger that would then apply to all 33 New Mexico counties.

Morel said the problem was that some areas of the state would be drier than others and therefore under greater threat of fire.

A recently enacted state law, pushed through as emergency legislation, allows counties to declare fire dangers individually. With that state legislation, Lincoln County drafted its own fire restriction ordinance. The county, according to the ordinance, will defer to state and national fire officials in determining when extreme fire conditions exist.

"It basically combines two different elements: the safe handling of fires and the restriction of certain fireworks under certain conditions," Morel said of the ordinance.

Under the ordinance, improper handling of fires in the county is punishable with a fine of up to \$300 and up to 90 days in jail. Violation of fireworks restrictions can result in a penalty of up to \$1,000 or a year in jail.

National, state and local fire officials endorsed the county's new ordi-

nance prior to the commission's vote.

"This will greatly assist us," Matthew Reidy, with the Lincoln National Forest, told commissioners. Reidy said the county's ordinance will help reduce the number of people using firecrackers in the national forest. Also, to emphasize current fire danger, Reidy told the commission the weather forecast for June projects higher than normal temperatures and less than normal rainfall.

Barbara Luna, a state forestry official, had several questions about the ordinance, especially regarding use of controlled fires by property owners. At her recommendation, the commission changed a section of the ordinance that prohibited anyone but fire officials from setting a "backfire," used to stop fires. Now, the ordinance allows anyone with the proper qualifications to start a backfire in order to stop a fire that is out of control.

To put fire restrictions into effect, Lincoln County commissioners had to act before June 1, which is 20 days before fireworks vendors may start selling in New Mexico. The provision is to protect fireworks vendors who

might otherwise make investments, Morel said.

The ordinance's fire restrictions automatically end after 30 days if the commission does not renew them. For the restrictions to remain in place through the Fourth of July weekend, commissioners would have to renew them at their June 17 meeting.

The ordinance also prohibits any public or private fireworks displays during extreme fire danger conditions, Morel said. Public fireworks displays may be held when those conditions are not in place by obtaining permission from the county, according to the ordinance.

"If this is in place, then the Spencer Theater would not be able to hold its annual (Fourth of July fireworks display)," Morel said of the restrictions.

Even with fire restrictions in place, landowners may gain permission for controlled fires, and certain fireworks can still be sold and used in the county, according to the ordinance.

Some of the ground and hand-held fireworks, such as sparklers and toy

smoke devices, are allowed in areas where the ground is either paved or barren and that has a "readily accessible source of water for use by the homeowner or the general public," the ordinance states.

Morel said the county cannot enact an outright ban of all fireworks. Outright bans in the past, he said, have been questioned in regard to the rights of fireworks vendors.

Regarding proper fire handling, landowners planning a controlled burn on their property during extreme fire danger must have written approval from the fire chief of the fire district, the emergency services coordinator or the county manager, according to the ordinance.

Bonita Fire Chief Chris Denne also asked commissioners to require anyone planning a controlled burn to first notify the sheriff's office, which would then notify fire agencies. That notification will allow fire officials to know whether a fire call stems from a controlled burn or not, he said.

Rare case of cat plague reported in Lincoln County; cat's doing fine

A pet cat from northern Lincoln County contracted plague, but is under treatment and recovering.

Although cat plague - caused by a bacteria - is considered rare in this section of the state, Dr. Paul Ettestad, state health veterinarian, said this is not the first case ever reported in Lincoln County.

However, it is the first this year and one of about a dozen cases statewide, he said. Most occur in north-central New Mexico around Santa Fe, Bernalillo and Sandoval counties, he said.

Dr. Mary Jane Cooper, who practices with Dr. Lynn Willard at the Ruidoso Animal Clinic, said the owner of the cat, who lives in an isolated area north of Carrizozo, brought the animal to their office.

"We are always aware that in New Mexico we can have plague, so if we see symptoms, we are cautious," Cooper said. "But this is the first case I've seen in the six years I've been here."

Plague is not fatal unless it is left untreated, she said. The state Health Department will test cats for plague free, she said.

The best prevention is flea control.

"Ground squirrels and other rodents are two of the main groups that spread

plague," Cooper said. "If your cat is a hunter, either keep it inside the house or use an effective flea control."

Because of the elevation and climate, Ruidoso tends to have fewer fleas, but any ground animal may carry them, she said.

Also watch for symptoms such as high fever, lack of appetite, swelling of lymph nodes or abscesses. Be careful not to come in contact with an abscess, she said.

Ettestad said he wasn't surprised about the case in Lincoln County because a wood rat with plague was found in southeastern Socorro County, which is a little unusual. Thirty-eight cases were reported last year in New Mexico, because of heavier rain, which improves flea survival, he said. However, only 18 cases of human plague were reported from 1987 to 1999. Ninety percent of all plague cases occur during May through September, the warmer months of the year.

Plague can be contracted when a cat eats an infected rodent, or comes in contact with its fleas. A rodent bone can poke a mucous membrane, causing an abscess, which may burst and drain. If mouth ulcers are produced, a cat's saliva will be infectious, he said.

Human symptoms of plague include sudden onset of high fever, headache, chills,

muscle pain and weakness, and tender and swollen lymph nodes called "buboes," the origin for the name bubonic plague. Incubation usually takes two to six days but can be faster if contracted through the lungs. Called pneumonic plague and much more deadly, the disease can be contracted from a cat coughing near someone's face.

Treatment must be obtained within 18 hours, or the mortality rates soar higher than 90 percent, Ettestad said.

Bubonic plague is treated with antibiotics. Nine cases of human plague were reported last year and all survived, Ettestad said.

The epidemiology department of the state health department offers this advice:

- Avoid sick or dead animals
- Teach children to avoid dead animals and rodent nests or borrows
- Do not place tents or sleeping bags near rodent nests or borrows
- Use insect repellent on skin and clothes
- Do not allow dogs and

cats to roam free in suspected areas.

• Dust dogs or cats with insecticide powder to prevent transportation of fleas into homes or vehicles.

Dogs are very resistant to the plague as a species, she said. Cats are more susceptible. Other possible carriers are chipmunks, gophers, rabbits, coyotes and bobcats.

"Folks wanted us to do a benefit dance," said Slick Graham, "but we saw we could make more money if we raffled it off."

Jill Candelaria of Ruidoso Downs had a stroke Feb. 5 and was in the trauma unit of University of New Mexico Hospital in Albuquerque for three weeks. This followed three months of rehabilitation in Health South Rehabilitation Center in Albuquerque, with "lots more of that to do," said her husband,

Eddie, a self-employed building contractor who was with her in the hospital much of the time.

The Remington 300 Winchester Magnum rifle was shown at C&L Lumber Company in Ruidoso Downs, and Brent Scott, an employee, took charge of handling the \$10 raffle tickets.

Albert Richardson Sr. won the rifle, Graham said.

The Graham Brothers, a well-known Hondo Valley Western music group, have done benefits for many other community members in time of need.

"We deeply appreciate everything everyone has done," Candelaria said.

Propane, gas cooking grills catch fire

The Ruidoso Fire Department was called to put out fires caused by a propane gas grill and a butane grill over the weekend.

Ruidoso Fire Chief Thomas Chavez said the propane grill fire occurred at a house on Ridgecrest Drive. The brass coupling on the grill wasn't screwed all the way into the propane cylinder and propane escaped and caught fire.

The fire at a house on High Loop Drive was caused after a rubber line running from a butane tank to the grill's regulator melted and spewed gas and fire, Chavez said.

No property was damaged in either case beyond both grills.

Chavez said people need to check the o-rings around brass fittings on grills every year as well as the knobs and other parts to make sure they work correctly.

Chavez said these types of cooking grills are still safer than charcoal or wood grills because these grills don't emit ash.

"So there's no way that propane can fly off and emit ash to nearby pine needles (and cause a fire)," Chavez said.

Besides that, propane is contained in one area, Chavez said, and when the grill is turned off the fuel supply is cut and it no longer burns. Chavez said unlike propane, charcoal can burn for many hours.

Fire Department issues warnings for fires

The fire department told revelers at a party on Brady Canyon and others at Two Rivers Park on Sudderth Drive to put out their fires.

In the case of a charcoal grill fire at Brady Canyon, "we just asked them to finish up their dinner and put (the fire) out the right way, instead of ruining their whole dinner," said spokesperson Loretta Kirk.

Chavez said there are flyers in most of the stores informing the public about the fire level and regulations, as well as in the newspaper. In the morning and afternoon, KWES radio station gives a fire prevention report sponsored by Zia Natural Gas.

"We're going to put billboards out this week explaining the restrictions," Chavez said. "The level we're in now, you can't have charcoal. The

next level prohibits propane and any other smoking thing."

Torres case headed for jury today

The embezzlement and aggravated burglary case against former Ruidoso police officer Luis Torres is expected to go to the jury today.

Judge Robert Doughty of the 12th Judicial District is presiding over the case in Carrizozo. District Attorney Scot Key called seven witnesses Tuesday.

Ruidoso attorney J. Robert Beauvais represents Torres, a former Belen police chief. The veteran police officer with more than 20 years of experience is accused of stealing

\$280 from a purse turned in to him in July 1998, as part of a sting operation.

According to testimony at his preliminary hearing in Ruidoso, Torres never told the police dispatcher that he was given the purse. Nearly two weeks later, he had not turned it into the department.

He also is accused of entering a local business through a back window. When confronted by the owner, he told her that burglars could gain entrance that way and retreated through the window without identifying himself as a police officer, the owner said.

During the earlier hearing, Beauvais questioned the

methods used by police officials, referring to entrapment. He especially wondered aloud why a "civilian" was used in the sting instead of a trained officer from some other jurisdiction.

Lieutenant Wolfgang Born testified at that hearing that he became worried about Torres' integrity after speaking to the business owner. He received approval for the operation from Police Chief Lanny Maddox. Born said normal procedure for an officer would be to report both of the incidents when they occurred. But Torres was on the graveyard shift and was largely unsupervised each time.

'You are not forgotten'

Memorial Day services held at Fort Stanton and Forest Lawn Cemetery

On a mesa overlooking the Capitan Mountains, veterans, their families and those who honor their sacrifices gathered Saturday for the Tenth Annual Veterans Memorial Service at Fort Stanton Merchant Marines and Military Cemetery.

In one of the more moving moments of the hour-long ceremony, Lincoln County Manager Tom Stewart, a retired colonel, read the names of county residents who died in wars and conflicts in defense of the United States and the values for which its flag stands.

While some visitors wandered among the neat rows of small headstones and white crosses, Victor Schaerer, a retired merchant marine skipper, introduced guest speakers, including state Rep. Dub Williams (R-Glencoe), who is

working to establish the cemetery at the historic fort as a national military burial site.

Bob Ashman of the U.S. Merchant Marines conducted a flower laying ceremony in memory of veteran mariners, each name marked by the tolling of a bell.

Punctuating different points of the overall memorial, Syle Feldman formerly of the Royal Air Force, played "Highland Cathedral" and "Amazing Grace" on bagpipes. As the ceremony wound down, members of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars raised their rifles skyward and presented a 21-gun salute.

In the Memorial Day Services Monday at the Forest Lawn Cemetery, New Mexico Williams told the small crowd assembled that now is time to recognize World War II participants because of the increasing age of those veterans.

All veterans, he said, need to know the country appreciates them and their service. "You are not forgotten - please don't let that happen," Williams said.

The Rev. Jeamsie Price, with three brothers who served in both World War II and the Korean Conflict, offered a benediction at the ceremony, preceded by a short speech recognizing the sacrifices made by veterans.

"I still cannot imagine the courage it takes to leave home and family to fight in a foreign land ... with no real promise of when or even if they are coming home," Price said.

Those men and women, including two Ruidoso young women currently serving in the conflict in Kosovo, keep the dream of freedom a reality for Americans and the world at large by "putting themselves in harm's way," Price said.

Game commission settles on plan to reduce elk herd

A state game and fish department official has called a plan to reduce New Mexico's elk herd "a compromise."
The state Game Commission approved the plan to increase the number of elk hunting permits for the upcoming elk season at a special meeting May 22 in Albuquerque. Another 3,252 elk hunt permits will be awarded statewide to hunters beginning June 10, when the game and fish department draws for elk permits.
Darrel Weybright, big game grant coordinator for the state Game and Fish Department, said, "We have to be responsible and responsive to both the agency and the landowners. I think this is a compromise."
Initially, complaints from private landowners fueled a proposal to reduce the elk herd by more than 5,200. But the commission, after hearing from several hundred sportsmen attending the meeting, decided to increase the num-

ber of permits by 3,252.
State Game Commissioner Gail Cramer of Farmington said the commission listened to what the public wanted.
"I'm pleased that we did not go for the full-scale reduction that was proposed. I'm pleased the sportsmen spoke up," Cramer said.
Commissioner Bud Hettings, who lives in Las Cruces, has a home and ranch near Ruidoso and represents this area on the game commission, was not available for comment.
The majority of the additional 3,252 permits - about 2,000 - will be awarded for units in the northeast quadrant of the state.
For the area units, the commission decided the following:
• Unit 34 (the Sacramento Mountains south of Mescalero), increased the number of permits by 180 from 1,090 to 1,270. The increased number of permits breaks down as 120 more permits for

antlerless elk on public lands and 60 more permits for antlerless elk on private lands. Grand total of elk hunting permits to be issued is now 1,270 for Unit 34.
• Unit 36 (Ruidoso, Mayhill and Cloudcroft) - The commission did not increase permits for Unit 36.
• Unit 37 (the Capitan Mountains) - The commission did not increase permits for Unit 37.
Weybright said Unit 34 has from 1,400 to 1,500 elk. "We're targeting to bring that down to about 1,000 or a little lower," he said.
Despite the increased number of permits, Weybright predicted that hunters "won't see much change."
As far as economic impact, that shouldn't change much either, Weybright added.
"Because there is some increase in permits, you'll have more hunters there at least for the short term," Weybright

said. "In the long term, if we do not allow the elk to increase, it will remain at that level, so I don't think they'll see a significant change from the past."
Since its reintroduction to New Mexico, the state's elk herd has thrived and now numbers between 70,000 and 80,000.
"I think we have a pretty good handle on what's going on with the herd," Weybright said.
"It's not a biological problem. We have a viable elk herd in the southeast area. It's a matter of meeting the social concerns. We're at that place where we always are - trying to make a variety of people happy."
Because it's a "social" issue as Weybright describes, commissioner Cramer doesn't expect this one-year increase to be a long-term solution.
"I foresee that it will come up quite often in the future," said Cramer, describing it as "totally a social issue" - not a game management issue.



'Bigs'

They may be surrogate big brothers and sisters, but the joy they find is very, very real.

"Bigs" and "littles" agree that sharing fun is the main reason for Big Brothers Big Sisters (BBBS).

Never mind that the national organization has helped more than a million at-risk children feel better about themselves and their futures in the 90 years of its existence. Never mind that it has been shown statistically to prevent youth drug use and violent behavior, days missed from school and lying to parents.

"I just love being with her," said volunteer Mary Allen about her "little," Kristy, age 10. "It's really rewarding getting to know her as a person, hearing her thoughts. And we do fun things together."

Kirk Corbin said he became a "big" to Dakota, age 8 1/2, for selfish reasons: "It makes me feel good helping out someone like that," he said. "I know it's for a good cause. And he's a real nice kid."

"It's neat to see the world through her eyes," said Stephanie Quinn of her "little," Zowie, age 6. "Everything is so exciting to a 6-year-old, whether you're out hiking or going to a movie. Everything she sees, she goes 'Wow! Wow! Wow!'"

About 60 percent of the children in Lincoln County live in single-parent families, said Lynn Willard, a Ruidoso veterinarian and president of the Advisory Board of Directors of Big Brothers Big Sisters of Lincoln County.

"Those kids have nobody to respond to and build some rapport with that is not an authority figure," Willard said. The most important reason (to get involved) is to try to get these kids to have somebody that cares about them and they can relate to who isn't an authority figure, but is a role model—someone they can look up to."

Throughout the nation BBBS has an excellent track record of keeping juveniles out of the juvenile justice system because it involves them in a one-on-one mentoring program, Willard said.

Tory Fritz, case manager for the local chapter, said she gets referrals from school counselors and nurses, and single parents also call her. Not all the children are from single-parent homes, though, and not all children from single-parent homes need a big brother or sister.

"Some have a lot of support through family friends or grandparents, or have extended families," Fritz said. "We're mostly looking at the kids who would fall through the cracks if it weren't for us."

The most important part of the process of connecting volunteers to children age 6-17 is matching their interests, Fritz said. To do this, she conducts in-depth interviews with the children and the volunteers to find out their interests, hobbies and personalities.

Adults go through a more intensive screening process that involves background and references checks and it takes six to eight weeks. It's quicker for the child, she said, because she doesn't have to do a police check. She sits down with the children and asks them what they think a big brother or a big sister might be like and what they like to do.

The most important part of preparing the child for a big brother or sister is empowering them: making sure they know their phone number and address, that they know about "good touch-bad touch," and know they can call her if anything happens that they feel uncomfortable about. This is why children must be six years old to participate in the program, Fritz said.

"I just make sure they know they're in charge of their own body and can say 'no' even to family members if there's any sort of improper touching going on," she said. This is the last thing she does before she matches children with volunteers. Before this she conducts a home visit

with them and all their family members present so that everyone can discuss how they feel about this.

The last meeting is the matching where the child and the adult meet and exchange phone numbers and make plans for their first outing together. Fritz and the child's parent are present at this meeting, and both "big" and "little" have already been told about the interests and likes and dislikes of the brother or sister they're about to meet.

Willard, who was one of the charter members of BBBS in Albuquerque in 1965, said at that time he didn't realize how important it was to match the child and adult with their interests.

"I had a terrible match," he said. "The most important thing in the selection is the matching that Tory does in making sure they get two compatible people. She has to get to know the kids and the adult and find the best match available." Sometimes Fritz has to wait until the right child or adult comes along, he said.

Willard got a good match in Ruidoso, he said, and has been a big brother for three years with his "little," who's now 16 years old.

Mary Allen and Kristy said they think Fritz did a "really good job" of matching their interests. They've been a big-little pair for two years and have a large range of activities and interests they share.

"We have the same color hair and eyes," said Kristy. "We like computers. We like nature. We like to hike a lot. We like to cook together—especially to bake. We like swimming."

"We both enjoy music," added Allen.

Kirk Corbin and Dakota get together about once a week to go out

they also do designs on a computer, and go to the library and museums.

"I especially like to do the athletic things with her because her great-grandparents aren't able to do them with her to the extent that I can—the hiking and skiing," Quinn said.

to dinner or play golf or watch a movie. Corbin feels they were well in a t c h e d because they're both outgoing, and Dakota named various sports they have in common.

Stephanie Quinn was at first hoping for someone older, but appreciates seeing the world through the eyes of Zowie. Both enjoy hiking along the Rio Ruidoso outside Quinn's apartment, but

There are seven children in the process of becoming "littles" who need a big brother or sister, and there may be many more children in the community who could benefit from the program. Willard emphasizes that being a big brother or sister is fun, not a hassle. The toughest thing, he said, for people who have been parents, is to be a friend and advocate to the child, not an authority figure.

"An hour a week is a minor commitment to a child to try to influence their life positively," Willard said, "and it's really fun. It's not a hassle."

"I'd really encourage more people to get involved," Quinn said. "It's a neat program. You feel good about what you're doing and that you're making a difference."

"I would encourage anyone who wants to to become a big," said Allen. "It doesn't take any special skills."

Kristy said the little sister or brother does need some skills, though. "They have to be able to have fun and to laugh easy," she said. And then both she and Allen laughed.

State's travelers can expect a 9 percent cost increase

Summer travelers in New Mexico will find an increase of more than 9 percent in meal and lodging costs in 1999, or \$19 per day, bringing the average daily costs for a family of four to \$211, according to the American Automobile Association of New Mexico.

The statewide average cost of lodging for a family of two adults and two children rose significantly to \$100 per night, from \$84 per night in 1998, according to AAA's survey. Meal costs rose just slightly from \$108 to \$111 per day for the same size family.

By comparison, the national average cost for meal and lodging rose only one percent in 1999 for a family of two adults and two children to \$213.

North Dakota remains the least expensive state in which to travel, with family meal and lodging costs averaging \$158 per day. Other low-cost vacation states include South Dakota, \$161 per day; Nebraska, \$163; Kansas, \$169; and Oklahoma, \$178. The most expensive state for vacation costs is Hawaii, where lodging and meals average \$419 per day.

AAA recommends that vacationers traveling by car should budget \$5.50 for gasoline every 100 miles, based on a national average gas price of \$1.15 per gallon and a vehicle traveling 21 miles per gallon. It is also important for families to budget money for entertainment, souvenirs and unexpected expenses.

AAA offers these tips for saving money on a vacation:

- Book accommodations in advance to ensure availability and selection to guarantee the best rate. A travel agent can help find lodging that meets individual needs and budget.
- Overnight in outlying areas, away from popular tourist and business destinations.
- Pack a picnic, or eat your large meal at lunch to take advantage of lower menu prices.
- Make sure your car is in top condition to avoid inefficient fuel use and unexpected breakdowns.

Gas prices won't hurt tourism

ALBUQUERQUE — with gas prices soaring this spring, travelers as well as those in the travel industry may be wondering what impact the sudden fluctuation in price will have on the coming vacation season, says AAA New Mexico.

"In general, a change in price at the pump should not have a significant effect on the number of people who plan to travel," said Brenda Yager, manager of public and government affairs for AAA New Mexico. "What often occurs when gas prices rise sharply is that travelers take shorter vacations closer to home."

AAA's May fuel gauge report shows the average price

for a gallon of regular unleaded gas nationwide is \$1.16, up 19 cents over the previous month. Gas prices have risen 16.5 percent since February, when they hit a 20-year low of 96 cents.

Gas prices in New Mexico this month average \$1.17 for regular unleaded, up 9 cents or just over 8 percent from last year.

Summer auto travel has increased each year since 1994, including during years when gas prices averaged more than \$1.20 per gallon. Travel is more likely tied to a strong overall economy, rather than one factor, according to AAA.


About 23 students got a chance to tinker with a burnt out car - for credit - and get it ready for street stock racing at Sertoma Motorplex in Tularosa May 21.

"It ran on six cylinders the other night (at the race) and finished 10th - and passed five cars," said Mike Gaines, ag-mechanics instructor at Ruidoso High School. "It might be scary on eight (cylinders)."

Texas New Mexico Power Company (TNMP) employee Charlie Moore, who builds and drives race cars, saw an article about California high schools competing with their school-built race cars and brought the article to Jim Bassett, operations manager for TNMP.

"We got together and gave presentations to five high schools in the area and offered them Charlie's technical support and money TNMP could come up with to fund that program," Bassett said. "High schools have all kinds of things for athletes, but the gear-heads that are kind of on the fringe don't have a whole lot that touches them."

Some of the schools didn't have the facilities to take off with the program, but Ruidoso did. Through TNMP's "customer-connection," customers who donated "a buck or two a month" furnished the \$2,500 TNMP available to Gaines' classes to rebuild the 1982 Buick Regal and get it ready for racing. Moore and other employees mentored the project, volunteering their time, and

Moore drove it in its first race May 21.

"If only you could have seen it before we started working on it," said Ben Lindquist, a junior.

Students had to pull out everything inside the car, including glass, as well as tail lights and head lights. The car had no wheels and was just dropped off from a truck, he said. Gaines described it as "a low-

ridger, dead on the road that we brought in and made into a tremendous vehicle."

Lindquist said he liked being able to take a different kind of elective class and felt everyone had learned a lot that could be used on their own cars.

David Wheel, a senior, said it was a good class and would be good for anyone thinking of going into auto mechanics as a career.

The class work involved a lot of welding and metal work, painting, suspension work, front-end work, electrical wiring and race set-up, which requires different springs, Gaines said.

"We wanted to build this car and have other high schools do the same thing and have them to race with," Gaines said. "We planned on taking the car to other high schools - Las Cruces and

Santa Teresa - to get their interest up."

He said Tularosa offered to set up a class for them so students from different schools could race against each other, but for insurance reasons, adults probably would have to drive the cars in the races.

Lindquist said the whole class wanted to race the car and some of them will - as soon as they're 18 years old.

"Even if we have adults driving and kids building them, it'd still be okay," Gaines said. "Though maybe there are more high school kids in accidents from pole-vaulting or throwing javelins."

Thirty people have already signed up for the class for next year.

Line plans to pursue a master's degree while working for the public schools teaching family and consumer science.





Colonial Crafts

Suppose someone had to hand-make everything you needed: a loaf of bread, a drinking cup, a piece of cloth, your bed, your clothes. Colonial craftspeople did just that. They made things that early settlers depended upon. Young boys, or apprentices, learned their craft by working for someone who was really good at his chosen trade. After several years, these apprentices would hope to gain enough skills to open up a shop of their own. Young women usually learned their homemaking crafts at home. Craftspeople built things, and also helped build our country. Towns grew up where they opened their shops.

Women spun thread from wool, cotton and flax. Linen is made from flax. Flax was an important plant used in making clothing until cotton took its place.

Professional weavers were usually men. They sat at looms and turned thread into cloth.

Quilters made quilts. Women also did embroidery and made beautiful lace.

Farriers were blacksmiths who specialized in making horseshoes and shoeing horses. They also often doctored the animals.

Silversmiths made teapots, coffeepots, bowls and serving pieces for the tables.

Milliners made women's hats and clothes.

Printers used letters made of lead to set type. They had to carefully set each letter.

Wigmakers made wigs for adults and even some children. Wigs were very popular.

Bootmakers made shoes and saddles. Both shoes were made alike. There was no difference between the left and right foot.

Potters made jugs and dishes of clay.

Gunsmiths made and repaired guns.

Look through your newspaper and see if you see the modern-day versions of the items these craftspeople made.

POOP SCOOP

An article in Animal Sheltering Magazine's March-April issue focuses on how training dogs at animal shelters can enhance their chance for adoption and make the shelter staff's job a little easier.

Author Nancy Lawson wrote that first impressions can turn off a potential adopter, if a dog jumps all over the person, won't stop barking or gets so excited they wet.

"But aside from professional trainers, who has time to take dogs aside for a half hour twice a day and run through a traditional obedience drill," she writes. "Not shelter workers, that's for sure."

Trainer Sue Sternberg in Accord, NY, says she's found a better way, a method that takes little effort and teaches dogs to transfer their good behavior from kennel worker to volunteer and eventually to potential adopter.

"There are ways to train dogs so they enjoy themselves so much that they'll go up to the next person, just walk right up to them and say, 'Hey, look at me. I can sit,'" Sternberg said.

With a tasty treat and a little time, a volunteer can make a dog more adoptable, she said.

Steinberg calls it environmentally cued training, or training that teaches dogs to respond to

common movements by people when they interact with animals, Lawson writes.

She cites an example of teaching a dog to sit at the sight of a person putting down a food bowl or placing a hand on a doorknob. Instead of receiving treats or praise as a lure to sit, the dog learns that the opening of the door is his reward.

"The shelter worker calmly tells the dog to sit and when the dog responds appropriately, he is immediately met with an open doorway and a bout of play outside," she told Lawson.

The exercise is repeated a few times and the dog learns to sit at all closed doorways.

Because the training mimics what shelter workers have to do on a daily basis, shelters of all sizes are finding ways to fit training programs into their daily routines, Lawson said.

Studies by the Humane Society of the United States have shown that many dogs are left at shelters and returned there not because they're unattractive, but because of behavior problems.

Knowing a fancy trick or two can help a dog display his training potential, according to Kay Guyette, shelter manager at Monadnock Humane Society in New Hampshire.

Will Tony Awards play better in Peoria than NYC?

The 53rd Annual Tony Awards, airing Sunday, June 6, on CBS, is anticipated with yawns by those who miss the knockout musicals of years past, such as *The Lion King* and *Ragtime*. Indeed, the most-nominated show of the year, the musical *Parade*, closed in February, three months before being showered with nine Tony nominations. The annual telecast of Broadway's

Tony Awards has always been a hard sell. After all, most Americans never have attended a live theater production on the island of Manhattan. Yet Broadway shows do eventually reach the masses through movie adaptations, touring companies and rare TV broadcasts. Thus, the Tony telecast is to the general public what a Paris fashion show is to a style-conscious Midwesterner: a peek at things to come. One of the year's most high-profile

productions, the 40th anniversary revival of *Death of a Salesman*, with Brian Dennehy, has six Tony nods. The revival of *You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown* has four nominations.

Insiders may be bored, but such familiarity may breed viewer interest. Other well-known titles include *The Iceman Cometh*, *Twelfth Night*, *Fosse*, *Swan Lake* and *Annie Get Your Gun*. *Annie* stars Bernadette Peters and Tom Wopat both are nominated. "I'm not trying to handicap this race, believe me," Wopat says. "I'm glad to be part of it all. I truly don't expect to win anything." The former *Dukes of Hazzard* star says he derives plenty of satisfaction from his work without winning awards. "I've always wanted to open a show on Broadway, and now I've had a chance to do it," he says. Wopat acknowledges few of his TV fans have seen his stage work, and the ones who do often are surprised he can sing. He accepts it with a shrug. "Once you're on TV, people think you don't do anything else," he says. "But I've done musicals for 35 years." Wopat may underestimate the small screen's power. Come Sunday, his six years on TV may spell a Tony-win for CBS - in the ratings.



Forbidden City Turandot subject of PBS documentary

Even for an opera, it was a really big show.

The piece in question was *Turandot*, Giacomo Puccini's opera about a heartless Chinese princess who finds love only after putting dozens of suitors to death.

The venue was Beijing's Forbidden City, the walled compound of Chinese imperial families for more than 500 years.

The conductor who envisioned the Peking Puccini was Zubin Mehta, who wanted to see *Turandot* performed in the very place where its events unfold.

The cost was \$15 million.

Fortunately, watching *The Making of Turandot at the Forbidden City* is free of charge. The hourlong *Great Performances* special precedes an airing of the complete opera Wednesday, June 9, on PBS (check local listings).

Executive producer Margaret Smilow followed the production from its beginning at the Maggio Musicale Fiorentino in Italy, where Mehta invited Chinese filmmaker Yimou Zhang (*Raise the Red Lantern*) to be his creative partner.

"During the Florence production," Smilow recalls, "(Zhang) was with all

these Italians and sort of nodding 'yes.' By the time he was in China, he was much more clear about what he wanted to do and much more comfortable working there, because it was, for him, another big film set."

Big it was, requiring a custom audio system to help stars Sharon Sweet, Giuseppe Giacomini, Barbara Frittoli, Giovanna Casolla and Cristina Gallardo-Domas and company be heard in the enormous outdoor court. By the time Zhang added traditional Chinese drummers as an opening act and a select group of 300 Chinese soldiers to portray the emperor's forces, the cast numbered more than 1,000, Smilow says. Their costumes, authentic reproductions of Ming dynasty styles with meticulous detailing and beadwork, required months to construct.

Swarms of workers built the set with unusual limitations: They couldn't leave one permanent mark or nail hole behind.

"All of that construction, believe it or

not, was done by sort of basic work crews with hammers and handsaws," Smilow says, still marveling. "It wasn't like they had a power saw there. It was all kind of hammered together the way you would put together a wooden crate."

There was a certain United Nations as-

pect to the preparations, Smilow adds. "Between the Italians and the Germans and the Chinese and the Austrians and the Americans, there was a lot of communication and lack of communication going on."

And then there were the idiosyncrasies of the place itself. The Forbidden City, built in the 1400s of wood, has no electricity or running water. For the producers, that meant bringing in generators to run the lights and sound. And while jet-setting opera lovers paid \$1,000 a ticket to see the once-in-a-lifetime event, they had to make do with portable toilets.

When it came to having thousands of people walking all over a national shrine, there were political headaches as well.

"In terms of government approvals,"

Smilow says, "we never knew if it was going to happen or not. It was an ongoing question mark. So the fact that it finally did happen was amazing to everyone. It was one of those against-all-odds productions, really."

In all, *Turandot* was performed nine times at the Forbidden City. Smilow's crew for the behind-the-scenes project left early for home. "We didn't see the (set) breakdown at all," she says. "(But) I'm sure someone said, 'Hallelujah.'"

Tired of sitcom similarity? Tune in to *The Chimp Channel*

Every so often, it's reassuring to have your suspicions confirmed: Politicians lie, miracle diet drugs have ugly side effects — and television is run by a bunch of monkeys.

And that's a good thing, at least as far as the simians are concerned. *The Chimp Channel*, a half-hour comedy starring, yes, chimpanzees, premieres Thursday, June 10, on the TBS Superstation.

This isn't a cheesy effort with kids in monkey suits; these are real chimpanzees — except for one orangutan. The show is an expansion of the popular *Monkey-ed Movies*, which TBS uses as filler, or as co-creator Tim Burns puts it, "televized grout."

The shorts that gave birth to *The Chimp Channel* are spoofs of films with chimps in costumes and wigs "acting" the lead roles, with the aid of human voice-overs. The minimovies often feature sharper writing than most of today's TV ensemble comedies.

In the simian version of *Forrest Gump*, for instance, the chimp playing Forrest has one of the film's trademark flashbacks. This time, however, Mahatma Gandhi is the chimp's nanny, and Forrest the chimp says he was the "first fellow to streak on the moon" as grainy black-and-white footage shows bare chimps romping across the lunar surface.

The Chimp Channel will be along the same zany lines.

Why chimpanzees? "They're a little cheaper than actors," Burns deadpans.

From his Studio City office, where he is in the midst of writing the show's first 13 episodes, Burns calls his chimp compatriots "God's funniest creatures. They are a comedy writer's dream. You're al-

ways trying to idiot-proof it for actors. Even if it isn't the funniest joke I could write, the chimps add a whole new dimension."

And they do ad-lib, though Burns says it's surprising how close to the script they keep. Let's remember, we are talking about chimps, albeit chimps in cascading blond tresses and stuffed bras.

Each of the eight chimpanzees has a trainer, as does the orangutan. But many of their special scenes are the result of fancy jobs in the editing room.

For instance, in Burns' version of *The Full Monty*, all the chimps tear off their shirts at once, aping the movie's famous final strip scene. That required coordination from a chorus line of blokes, never mind chimps. But special effects do the trick in this case, Burns says.

"You have to shoot so much footage to get what we are looking for," he explains. The crew often shoots eight or nine hours for each one minute that airs.

Each episode of *The Chimp Channel* features several skits satirizing mainstream TV and celebrities.

The premiere includes "Touched by an Anvil," in which a chimp angel tries to rid a mobster of vices; "Treewatch," which has chimps in red swimsuits — with all the proper accouterments — rescuing victims trapped in trees; and "Xenon: Warrior Princess," which favors love songs over fighting.

The chimps take on a lot of popular personalities and shows, but Burns says he has yet to hear of anyone taking umbrage. "I think people will enjoy seeing themselves played by chimps," he says. "They are so darn cute."

Regardless, there is a legal department on the prowl for libel. An upcoming spoof centers on an ad campaign for breath mints. Instead of the mint's freshness forcing consumers to forget what-

ever pitfalls they encounter, it makes the chimps demented; the lawyers worried about that one, Burns says.

As with most true comedy, nothing is sacred. Burns plans one skit called "Time Heckler" in which chimps travel into the past and tease historical figures. In a not-so-subtle reference to his assassination at Ford's Theatre, for instance, the Time Heckler asks President Abraham Lincoln if he wants to know the ending of the play.

Burns, 37, clearly has about as much fun as anyone can.

"When you come to work and there's an orangutan with a Cyclops mask and a Medusa head, you know you are working in a really special place," says the *Chimp Channel* co-creator, who as a boy wanted to grow up to be a bull, because he "didn't know you had to stay in the same species."

Burns would, however, like to stay with the same show for a while. "Monkeys willing," he says, adding only half-jokingly, "The monkeys are our bosses."


