

Whitetail Fire on reservation '100 percent contained'

• The forest fire southeast of Mescalero is contained and should be completely doused by June 12, a fire official said.

A faulty car muffler is believed the cause of an 823-acre forest fire now contained on the Mescalero Reservation, a fire official said Tuesday.

"That's how dry it is," Dick Fleishman, fire information officer with the Lincoln Zone, said.

Located about 8 miles southeast of Ruidoso in the uninhabited Whitetail canyon area, the fire started Saturday and was 100 percent con-

tained as of Monday afternoon, Fleishman said.

Called the Whitetail Fire, it is the second in less than a month on the reservation.

For more than a week in mid-May, local and regional firefighters worked the Telephone Fire, named for the canyon where it originated, which burned 2,200 acres.

Neither of the fires destroyed any buildings or caused serious injuries, fire officials said.

This second forest fire should be a message to people, Fleishman said. The fact that both

fires were on the reservation is coincidence — with the current dry conditions, a fire could start anywhere, he said.

"Definitely what we need to stress is how dry it is. These two fires show that anything that gets started can spread really fast," Fleishman said.

Currently, fire restrictions are in effect for area national forests, state, county and reservation lands.

Fire restrictions are being enforced in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs as well. To learn about the restrictions for national and state lands, call (877) 864-6985.

As of Tuesday, many of the 350 Whitetail firefighters were being moved to a new fire on the Grand Canyon's south rim, Fleishman said. Before they were brought to the reservation, many of the 350 firefighters came directly off other fires.

"They wanted to hit it hard, get it lined (contained), and mopped up as soon as possible," Fleishman said. "We expect control (of the fire) by the 12th."

The cost of dousing the Whitetail Fire is currently just over \$1 million — the same as the Telephone Fire, roughly three times in

Lodge owners drop hotel suit

• A court date had been set, and the village had hinted at a possible counter-suit.

Ruidoso Lodging Association members, plaintiffs in a lawsuit against the Village of Ruidoso over construction of a luxury hotel at the Ruidoso Convention Center, late Tuesday announced that they would drop the legal action.

Attorney Dave Thomsen, speaking for the association, said the suit was dropped primarily on the cost in time, money, and effort that would be required regardless of the outcome.

Thomsen said the association and its members still strongly believe that the project violates the anti-donation clause of the state constitution, and "certainly violates its spirit against government paying tax dollars to private enterprise."

The group had sought a restraining order against the development of

a 117-room Hawthorn Suites and Golf Resort, contending that Ruidoso village leaders went too far with incentive package offered to the Kansas-based hotel development firm of Leisure Hotels L.L.C.

In a prepared statement on behalf of the lodging group, Thomsen said that "even a victory in this litigation would take a greater toll than the plaintiffs feel able to bear, given the possibility of appeals and other matters that would have to follow the trial."

Thomsen also stated: "This suit has told the village...that its citizens will not back off easily from what they see as misuse of their funds and violations of their rights. As voters, they will have further chances to express their views in the ballot box as well."

Ruidoso Village Attorney John Underwood said Tuesday that if the lawsuit had cost the hotel development money, there would have been a counter-suit against the lodge.

"It is unfortunate that someone

Mescalero election set

To qualify to run for president and vice president of the Mescalero Apache Tribe in a special election July 9, candidates must sign up by Wednesday, June 23.

The tribal council removed Ortega and Enjady nearly two weeks ago from their posts as president and vice president, respectively. Council members contend they overspent the tribe's annual budget and that they violated the tribal constitution by authorizing expenses not approved by the council.

Ortega and Enjady have responded that the council obstructed their ability to move the tribe forward on projects. Ortega said he checked frequently with the tribe's finance director and was told there was no financial problem.

Both men contend the council violated the tribal constitution by assuming control over all three branches of tribal government — the legislative, executive and judicial. They say the council usurped the judicial powers of the court when it ousted Ortega and Enjady without them being found guilty in a trial.

Ortega, former vice president of the tribe, ascended to the presidency when long-time leader Wendell Chino died in 1997. Enjady, elected to the council, was selected by council members to take the vice president's seat.

The notice about the special election is posted in the Mescalero administrative offices. During a general assembly meeting last week, council members announced the special election, saying the regular general election will follow in November.

A petition demanding that the entire council be recalled is being circulated on the reservation that abuts Ruidoso.

Campfire starters cited and arrested

When the sun goes down, campers enjoy gathering around a fire to trade stories and reflect on their day in the forest.

But unless that campfire is started in a developed campground in Lincoln County, such as South Fork or West Lake, the people enjoying those flames can be arrested or at least fined, under county, state or federal law.

All of the Lincoln National Forest, Carlsbad, is under an extreme fire danger designation. Policing the forest for illegal camp fires is part of the job of U.S. Forest Service law enforcement officers Hoot Murray and Barry Majjala, who also act as agents for the state Forestry Division.

Over the Memorial Day weekend, the two men worked long hours, citing 16 people for illegal camp fires. While most were cited and paid fines through the magistrate court of Judge Gerald Dean Jr. in Carrizozo, six were arrested, booked in county jail and then released after paying a bond and court

costs, Murray said. Those six were from out of state. It was necessary to handle their cases differently, because it's too time consuming and costly to try to track them down in other states, he said.

"It's a petty misdemeanor and we can't extradite," Murray said Monday, adding that two more people were cited over the past weekend, one by a sheriff's deputy.

"Most were in the Bonito Lake area," he said. "I have to think they all knew about the restrictions, because they drove past at least two signs and several were where there was a sign within their line of vision."

The campers used their propane camp stoves to cook and abided by the regulations during the day. But about 10 p.m. to 11 p.m., they gave in to the urge to light that cozy fire, Murray said.

"The last one we spotted was at 2:30 a.m.," he said. "By that time, they think no one is out there. But we're patrolling and so are the security people from South Fork and West Lake and they call us."

"I can understand what they (campers) are feeling. A lot of them live

in Texas and 60 percent of camping is to sit around the fire and swap lies. But it's not the fire they're watching we worry so much about. It's what they leave behind in the morning. A couple of fires in the Gila (Wilderness) started like that."

Although some people criticize the arrest policy, Murray said it sends the message that the infraction is serious.

"We don't want to see a fire wipe out thousands of acres of forest and some homes," he said. In the past six years since he's been assigned to the area, only two manmade fires have been confirmed and those were in Cloudcroft, he said.

When an extreme fire danger has been declared, Murray and Majjala could prosecute under federal law, which carries a maximum six months in jail and \$5,000 fine or under the county ordinance, with a \$1,000 fine and one year in jail. But they usually opt for the state law, which carries a maximum \$1,000 fine, he said. That's another reason those who live out of state are arrested.

"Many come from Mexico and we can't go after them," Murray said.

Letter to tribe reveals reasons behind presidential ouster

Although Sara Misquez, as spokesman for the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council, refuses to comment to newspapers on the removal of the tribe's top two leaders, she shared the council's position in a letter to tribal members.

Removing Paul Ortega as tribal president and Oliver Enjady as vice president May 28, was a hard choice, she wrote.

"Although the Tribal Council would have liked to wait for the November elections to make a change in the Administration, the Tribe could not afford to wait," she stated in a June 2 letter.

Tribal member calls for the removal of a council member

A complaint was filed Monday in Mescalero Tribal Court asking for a panel of judges to direct the Tribal Council to remove Art "Butch" Blazer from his council seat.

Joseph Geronimo, a youth counselor, a tribal court legal counsel and a community activist, filed the complaint in the form of an affidavit. He stated Blazer is in a policy making position with the Mescalero Indian Agency, Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) under the Department of the Interior and that agency does business with the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

"This is in violation of the Mescalero Apache Tribe's Revised Constitution (which states)... No person shall serve

Circumstances required the Tribal Council to take action. Those circumstances were forced upon the Tribal Council by an administration that could not discipline itself to live within a budget."

Misquez wrote that no council member "actually voted against removal" even though tribal members who attended a general assembly on the issue last week reported that Council Member Glenda Brusuelas said she stood alone against the decision to remove the two men.

Council Member Fred Chino stated during the assembly that the Ortega administration spent more than \$2 million per month, while only \$900,000 to \$1.3 million was budgeted.

as a member of the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council while holding any other elective office, or policy making position with the tribe or any organization doing business on the Mescalero Reservation," Geronimo wrote in the affidavit. "I am asking the Tribal Court to convene a three-judge panel to make a ruling on the violation of the constitution and thereafter to inform the Tribal Council to remove (Blazer) from serving on the Tribal Council."

As vice president of the Mescalero Cattle Growers Association, Geronimo said he is concerned about the possible usurping of the board's authority and duties by Blazer, who heads natural resources for the BIA.

Blazer could not be reached for comment Tuesday.

"That is a total of \$7 million more than what was anticipated and what the Tribe can afford," Misquez wrote.

At the assembly, Chino said the Tribe was forced to seek an \$8.5 million bank loan or, it would not have enough to cover short-term obligations. However, he emphasized that neither Ortega nor Enjady are accused of stealing any money.

"The administration's actions have created a \$2 million check overdraft," Misquez wrote. "The administration continued to spend money even as the Tribal Council specifically voted against it. Further, the administration directed that this information be hidden from the (council) and the general membership of the (tribe)."

If Ortega had not been removed, the Tribe could not have paid its employees, given members dividends or met current financial obligations, she stated.

Ortega and Enjady claim the council overstepped its power in removing them by assuming control of the executive and judicial branches of tribal government as well as the legislative. A trial should have been scheduled before any action, they have said.

But Misquez wrote that Article X of the Tribal Constitution doesn't allow the council to delegate the power to any other entity.

"The Tribal Constitution places the entire burden of entering a finding of guilt and removing elected tribal officers... on the tribal council," she wrote. In taking the action against the two men, the council must answer to the people, she stated.

She claimed Ortega and Enjady were given written statements of the charges against them 10 days before

the council meeting where they were to appear. The council gave the two men access to all tribal financial records to prepare their defense, offered them experienced legal counsel to prepare and a chance to respond to the charges. She claimed they didn't examine the documents against them, obtained their own legal council and failed to answer the charges or appear at the meeting.

"It was Mr. Ortega and Mr. Enjady's own decision to start a political fight, where they could misrepresent the truth, rather than appear before the tribal council..." Misquez wrote.

Ortega and Enjady offered to resign, but only if the Tribe would pay for all of the "illegal" contracts they signed, Misquez stated.

"There is no way to know for sure how many contracts this could be," she wrote. "Only the passage of time will tell us if those contracts would cost the Tribe millions of dollars more."

Suing the two men to recover some of the money would be futile, because it's "unlikely they have the money to pay such a debt," Misquez wrote.

She accused Ortega and Enjady of trying to influence tribal matters by misrepresenting the facts to non-Indian news media.

"The Tribal Council has chosen not to discuss this matter with outsiders," she wrote. "This is a matter for the Tribe to deal with, not for Ruidoso to discuss."

Tribal members who decided to make the Misquez letter public said they believe true democracy requires an open government, no matter which side they favor.

PLANNING AND ZONING

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission took the following actions June 1:

Approved requests for preliminary and final plats from HBH Investments L.L.C. for a replat of a planned condominium project. Final approval of the Pepper Tree Place, Phase 2 replat went before the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday. The project, former called the Rancho Vista Casitas, is now being called the All American Townhomes. The replat no longer includes a previous plan to build a home on land adjoining the condominium project.

Approved an amendment to the site development plan for the Pepper Tree Place, Phase 2. The plan allows eight townhomes to be built on the 2.29-acre lot at 105 Racquet Place. A portion of an adjoining lot zoned only for single-family homes will be used by the project for an emergency turnaround. The plan requested zero setbacks for lots 1A-4B from all lot lines, which is typical for townhome interiors, according to planning staff. The entire lot, by village ordinance, could be developed with more townhomes than are planned, staff said.

size. Fleishman said the Whitetail Fire cost more proportionately because initial fire fighting efforts were largely from the air.

When the Whitetail Fire started at about noon on Saturday, regional fire fighting crews were tied up on other fires.

Until late Sunday, about 150 firefighters battled the reservation fire while as many as six air tankers at a time dropped fire retardant, called slurry, fire officials said.

By Monday, the number of firefighters trying to contain the fire increased to 350, Fleishman said.

Federal fire investigators were at the fire by Sunday to

determine its origin. Gwen Shaffer, another fire information officer for the Lincoln Zone, said this week.

Like the Telephone Fire, the Whitetail Fire has been determined as human caused, Shaffer said.

No exact cause for the Telephone Fire could be determined because of the intensity of the fire in the area where it originated, Tony Recker, forest manager with U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs in Mescalero, said last week.

The Whitetail differs from the Telephone Fire in that the terrain is more level, and loggers had thinned much of the forest about two years ago for Mescalero's timber industry.

"While the fire is spreading rapidly on the ground ... the

fire has only crowned in the mixed conifers stands where there was no logging," Recker said in a press release.

In the Telephone Fire, flames spread erratically through the crown of trees. Shaffer said the Whitetail's more level terrain promotes a fire that is "slow and creeping."

Shaffer said the fire did not threaten a turn-of-the-century settlement of the Chiricahuas, now abandoned, in the Whitetail valley.

Fire fighting efforts are based at the settlement, she said.

The Lincoln Zone oversees large fire fighting efforts in southern New Mexico through the use of interagency resources.

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Village council reviews law that could end unions

Collectively bargaining may end June 30 between the village of Ruidoso and its two unions, but that doesn't mean it won't come back if the village proves to be a bad boss.

The ordinance councilors unanimously approved basically mirrors state actions regarding collective bargaining. Gov. Gary Johnson vetoed a legislative move to continue a law for mandatory collective bargaining by governmental entities past its June 30 sunset clause.

However, a lawsuit protesting Johnson's action may result in the state continuing the law. If that happens, the village's new ordinance will, too, Donaldson said.

Two representatives of the village's unions Tuesday told Donaldson and the council that while they felt good about the current administration's concern for employees, they still did not want to see bargaining end.

Chet Southard, a long-time Ruidoso firefighter and member of the International Firefighters of

America Local 3545, reminded councilors that before his union formed, firefighters went years without pay increases or improved benefits.

"It was the village's attitude at the time that caused us to go to collective bargaining," Southard said.

He asked councilors to consider the long-term effects of their actions on employees in the light of changing councils and village administrations.

Henry Diaz, president of the United Steel Workers of America Local 9412, also urged councilors to vote against the ordinance. He also recognized the village administration effort, largely through the work of Village Manager Alan Briley, to address employee concerns with new personnel policies. Many of the new policies, such as how employee grievances are addressed, come from the terms agreed on previously between the village and union members.

"But what about when you are gone? Will things change for us?" Diaz said.

The council is to vote on the new personnel policies at its June 29 session.

Keeping priorities straight during a bomb threat

Informed of a possible bomb in the building, one of Burger King's seven customers Monday morning headed for the coffee urn.

"I said, 'Sir, we have to evacuate the building. There's a bomb,'" recalled Burger King employee Lynn Salas. "And he said, 'Well, I need my last cup of coffee.'"

For about 30 minutes Monday morning, police stopped or diverted traffic away from the fast food restaurant on U.S. Highway 70 while officers investigated what turned out to be a false bomb threat.

Ruidoso Police Cpl. Eric Woods, one of the first officers on the scene, said the restaurant was closed for about 45 minutes while police searched the Burger King inside and out for a possible bomb.

Burger King received the bomb threat by telephone at 9:45 a.m. Monday, assistant manager Leisa Ellis said. Salas took the call, which she said was from a man who sounded as if he were in his 20s.

"It didn't sound like a kid,"

she said. "He said, 'There's a bomb in the building, and it's going to go off in 3 minutes.' Then the phone started beeping."

The beeping, she said, sounded as if it were from a clock or a timer.

She immediately hung up and called the Ruidoso Police Department, where a dispatcher told her to evacuate the building "calmly." At the time, there were about six employees and seven customers in the restaurant with two cars at the drive-through window, Ellis said.

"When we got there, they had already cleared the building," Woods said. "And I had them (dispatchers) call the buildings nearby."

People also were evacuated from the Super 8 Motel behind the restaurant as well as the nearby New Mexico Magistrate Court building, he said.

"We checked it out pretty thoroughly, and had fire trucks and ambulances there just in case anything happened," Woods added.

False bomb threats are fourth-degree felony offenses, Woods said.

would take an action that could cost the hotel financing a half-million dollars," Underwood said.

District Court Judge Karen Parsons had scheduled a June 18 hearing on the merits of the lawsuit filed May 26. The goal of the suit, said one plaintiff, was to push for a public vote on the lease agreement.

Underwood said the village's actions regarding the hotel lease agreement are "clearly legal" under state statutes. "The law does not provide for (a public referendum) under an Industrial Revenue Bond issue."

Industrial Revenue Bonds allow property taxes to be waived on projects with an economic benefit during the length of their financing. By approving the bond issue, the village does not incur any financial liability for the project.

After hearing about the intent to drop the lawsuit, Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson said "obviously, we are very happy."

Though the lawsuit is a thing of the past now, Donaldson said he would like to talk with the plaintiffs about their concerns.

Donaldson said he believes the hotel will be a benefit to the village as well as to local lodgers, including those whose names were on the lawsuit.

Ruidoso village councilors approved the bond issue June 3 but hotel financing had been on hold until the lawsuit is resolved, Underwood said.

A groundbreaking on the \$7-plus million hotel was to take place the first of this month, he said.

On June 1, Parsons made an initial ruling against a temporary restraining order. The plaintiffs wanted the order to "hold things in place while the trial is pending," Thomsen said.

Thomsen's Tuesday statement indicated that the association had hoped that the village would cooperate more at earlier steps in the process, beyond "changing a few of the most egregious provisions of the lease."

There's wonder-working power in the ETZ

Of course it's an important thing. Ruidoso is going to grow and it does need to grow in a proper way, to paraphrase a member of the Extra-Territorial Zoning (ETZ) Commission, the appointed group set up to advise the ETZ Authority.

There should be no argument about the idea of zoning in a mile-wide strip around the village boundary. But the devil, it's been said, is in the details. And the Authority, made up of two county commissioners and a village councilor, will look hard at the details as the village's ETZ regulations are revised.

County Commission Chairman Rex Wilson, a member of the Authority, says he's getting input from people living in the zone who don't want to come under Ruidoso's jurisdiction — "for obvious reasons." They don't like the idea that Ruidoso's planning department might define — and enforce — what they do with their property.

On Monday, June 21, the ETZ Commission and Authority will conduct a public hearing on whether the village should be given enforcement of zoning/regulations in the zone. It has the potential to be either a doozy of a knock-down, drag-out political brouhaha...or a reasoned discourse on the long-term impact of growth in the whole area.

The potential for reasoned discourse is there, since a tough-minded planning director for the village named Cleatus Richards has been shifted to new duties. The village is recruiting now, but it's doubtful that the position will be filled by June 21. So perhaps light will prevail over heat when that meeting convenes. We hope so.

Mayor Robert Donaldson supports enforcement of amended ETZ regulations. "It benefits Ruidoso to manage the growth that is occurring on our outskirts," he says. "The county is not willing to commit the dollars ... and we have the staff to make this work effectively." Ruidoso also pays attorney Chay Rennick to advise both the Commission and the Authority.

There appears to be agreement in one area: ETZ regs must be revised. Alan Morel, the county's attorney, says they're unworkable as presently written, and just about everybody agrees.

Given the importance of the subject, residents of the village, the ETZ, and the beyond-ETZ areas should give their input at that June 21 public meeting.

It will be at 6:30 p.m. in Ruidoso's Village Hall. Now if everybody will just wear their thinking caps and leave their tempers at home, it will be a most valuable meeting.

Now, hear this

To the editor:
"Excuse me?" "I beg your pardon?"

How many times have you heard what someone said to you, but could not understand the words? Over 24 million people in the United States are hard of hearing. Most of these people have jobs, drive cars, and participate in the same leisure activities as people with good hearing do.

Though they like movies, watching TV, talking on the telephone and social activities, these avenues of communication present stressful problems. A hearing loss is a serious threat to a person's ability to communicate with the world around them. Daily they endure the strain and challenge of coping in surroundings where others do not understand what it is like to have an invisible disability.

Members of Self Help for Hard of Hearing People Inc. (SHHH), an international organization founded in 1979, are doing something about this pervasive and misunderstood condition. SHHH believes that education about the causes, complications and possible remedies of hearing loss is necessary to combat the stigma and ignorance often associated with hearing impaired people. Almost 300 nationwide chapters of the organization meet monthly to provide education and support for each other. Meetings of the Smokey

Bear group in Lincoln County meet at 7 p.m. on the fourth Thursday of the month at Texas-New Mexico Power Company, 12100 Mechem, Ruidoso.

Hard of hearing people, family members and others interested in the problems of hearing loss may attend; there is no charge.

A Walter Gray follow-up

To the editor:
In the Looking Back column item by Dan Storm in the May 26 issue...the item dated 5/27/49 was about my father, Walter E. Gray, accidentally shot in the head by a neighbor while Dad fished the Ruidoso River near his Glencoe home.

As the race track traffic was leaving the Downs the afternoon of the shooting, a neighbor summoned the first station wagon that drove east on Highway 70, to transport my father to Fort Stanton Clinic. My father was a Spanish-American War veteran, having served in Cuba in 1898, and was entitled to military care. So he was transferred to Fort Logan, Colo., for brain surgery. The bullet was not removed from his brain for fear of causing further damage to surrounding tissue.

After two months of recuperation therapy at Fort Logan, Dad was returned to

his Glencoe home. He and my mother lived there in good health for 15 years, with their caring Glencoe neighbors.

My brother, Gordon Gray, was Ruidoso U. S. Forest Ranger, 1936-1942. My husband, Ed Guck, was Ruidoso Forest Ranger there, 1948-1954, then he transferred to the Captain Ranger Station until he retired from the Forest Service in 1961. We moved to a home in Nogal. Our three children, Tom, Mick, and Mary (Crenshaw) graduated from Captain High School.

Lincoln County has been a vital part of my family's life, and I will always cherish my many county friends.

Forest field day emphasis fire defense

Residents shouldn't wait until the flames approach their houses to discover if their property is correctly prepared to decrease the possibility of it burning down.

A forest health and fire hazard reduction field day 10 a.m. to noon Saturday will include presentations on chain saw safety, maintenance for landowners who plan to reduce the wildfire hazard on their property, and a tour of the May 16 Gavilan Fire site.

"Everyone needs to pitch in and do their part to make our forest safe," Thomas Chavez, emergency management coordinator for Ruidoso, said.

The how-to advice on using a chain saw will aid homeowners who wish to create

defensible space zones around their homes.

"Defensible space zones are a must," Chavez said. Creating a defensible space zone includes cutting trees within 20 feet of a home, getting rid of low tree limbs, and stacking firewood away from the house.

"Fires can happen any place, any time, any where," Mary Ann Gould, fire prevention supervisor in charge of wild land urban interface, said.

"Ruidoso is fortunate to have the Forest Health Coalition and all of the other agencies that help in fire prevention. As a result there are lots of experts that provide a wealth of information," Dick Fleishman, a fire prevention and soil conservation specialist with the U.S. Forest Service, said.

At the workshop Fleishman will discuss and demon-

strate the rehabilitation efforts used to reduce damage in burned areas.

Methods of cutting down burnt trees and securing them to a slope to break off any water flow that may occur, and spreading grass seed throughout the burnt area, both help to stabilize soil and reduce potential erosion.

"A property owner, right above where the Gavilan Fire stopped, did a good job thinning his property. As a result, the fire lost its momentum because it had nothing to feed on," Fleishman said.

Chavez said the tour of the fire site, which stretches from Warrior Drive to Snowcap Court, will allow participants to get a firsthand look at the damage a fire can have on their property and the importance of defensible space zones around their homes.

The workshop will begin at the parking lot of the White Mountain school complex on White Mountain Drive near Hull Road.

Depending on the number of people in the group, the tour will either hike or caravan in cars to the nearby fire area. Participants should wear sturdy hiking shoes or boots, carry plenty of drinking water, and wear sunscreen.

The Ruidoso Fire Department, the Forest Health Coalition of Lincoln County, the Local Emergency Planning Committee, the U.S. Forest Service, and the New Mexico Forestry Division is sponsoring the event.

Program focuses on addicts

With the Billy the Kid Casino in full swing, Ruidoso Downs Race Track is forming a group that will help gambling addicts cope with their problems, the marketing director of the facility said Tuesday.

Fritz Widaman, marketing director, said the Responsible Gaming Program is a requirement in the state legislation that allows the racetrack to have 300 slot machines in its casino. Widaman said the program must be in place by July.

The Responsible Gaming Program kicked-off on Tuesday with sessions for Ruidoso Downs Race Track employees, led by Curtis Barrett, founder of the Kentucky Council on Compulsive Gambling who is actively involved in treating people addicted to gambling.

"Bringing slot machines into this community provides more opportunities for compulsive gamblers to surface," Barrett said. "I'm not saying this will create compulsive gamblers; it won't."

Barrett is an "expert in the field," Widaman said. The racetrack hired him as a consul-

tant to help the track put together a "solid program."

Barrett began training racetrack employees to observe when a gambler's behavior appears addictive, and then inform racetrack supervisors about it.

If the gambler is looking for help, they can then be directed to some form of treatment.

"We're not training our staff to diagnose people. We just want to have the proper steps in place to help people who feel they have a problem," Widaman said.

Barrett said the Responsible Gaming Program is built around three main ideas: awareness, alliances, and action.

Signs and other forms of information will be available to help the community, the employees of the racetrack, and its patrons to become more aware of the problem of compulsive gambling.

"This is a recognized addiction that afflicts about one percent of the general population," Barrett said.

"That's a huge number of people. Nationwide there is anywhere from 3 million to 8 million people that are compulsive gamblers," Barrett said.

Child bitten by dog

A Labrador pit bull dog, Bella, will be "humanely euthanized" after her quarantine period at the Ruidoso Humane Society is over because she bit a child for the second time, according to reports by the Ruidoso Police Department.

A child living in the 300 block of Third Street on Monday was playing in his yard when Bella, who broke free of her chain, attacked him. Other children playing in the area intervened, but the child received two deep puncture wounds to his right leg above the knee, and numerous scrapes and bruises to his hands and forearms when he was trying to get away from the attacking animal.

The report states that because this is Bella's second attack on a child, the owners requested she be humanely euthanized after her 10-day quarantine period is over. The quarantine is a safety precaution to ensure that she does not have rabies, said Ruidoso Animal Control Officer Peggy Williams.

Yellow barrels damaged

An engineer with Meadow Valley Construction Company reported to Ruidoso police that three yellow construction barrels valued at \$1,200 total were damaged at 9:20 a.m. June 3. A large mobile home was observed striking the barrels lining the roadway, the report states, but the observers didn't

get a license plate number or a full description of the vehicle.

Weed eaters stolen

Janitorial staff of Sierra Vista Elementary School told police that someone took two gas-powered, green Homelite weed eaters, valued at \$150 each, from a book locker sometime between 4 p.m. May 14 and 7 a.m. May 17. Many staff and faculty members have access to the locker, the report states.

Two arrested for violence

Lynda Ann Lopez, 28, of Ruidoso, and John L. Kernodle, 32, of Ruidoso, were arrested and charged with aggravated battery against a household member and battery against a household member Sunday. The report states that both had visible injuries and Kernodle was taken to Lincoln County Medical Center and treated.

Residence burglarized

Someone broke into a residence in the 100 block of Horton Circle between 10 a.m. June 3 and 9:15 a.m. June 4 and took a chrome 380-caliber automatic pistol valued at \$150 and \$150 in currency from a bedroom, according to police reports. Police noted that there were no signs of forced entry.

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
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New RHS principal is from Quemado in Catron County; RMS principal hails from Truth or Consequences

Board chooses high school, middle school principals

The principal in a Catron County school district Tuesday night was chosen by the Ruidoso Municipal School Board to lead Ruidoso High School. It also picked a new principal for Ruidoso Middle School.

The board officially chose Bill F. Green, the principal of Quemado Independent School District No. 2, from more than 50 applicants to fill the high school vacancy that occurred after the school board decided not to renew the contract of former principal Ron Hodges.

Ronald K. Bennett, chosen for the Ruidoso Middle School principal position, was principal of Truth or Consequences Middle School from January through May of 1998. He fills

the position left vacant by Sergio Castanon, who resigned earlier this year.

Green has a master of arts degree in education administration from Western New Mexico University, a bachelor of science degree in elementary education, and New Mexico licensure in elementary education, secondary education in physical education, industrial education and special education.

Bennett was principal of Truth or Consequences Elementary School from 1993 to 1996. He has held other positions, such as principal with Dexter Consolidated Schools and Floyd Municipal Schools. He has a masters degree in education administration from Eastern New Mexico University and a bachelor's degree in music education from Morehead State

University.

Paul Lutterman, director of instructional services, said the reason the two were selected was because of their integrity, honesty, and communication skills.

Superintendent Mike Gladden and William Snyder interviewed with Green but did not meet with Bennett. Member Frank Sawyer said he was disappointed not to have the opportunity to look him (Bennett) in the eye.

Lutterman seconded that sentiment but felt the board approved the hirings.

There were 10 finalists for the two principal positions, Wirth said. He delivered the recommendations to the board. Gladden was on vacation.

Three of the finalists are

already employed by the school district and included:

- Ron Wall, who was considered for both positions, has taught mathematics in Ruidoso since 1990 at both the middle school and high school levels. Wall has a master of education degree in educational administration from McGill University in Montreal and a bachelor of science degree in business education from Ferris University in Big Rapids, Mich.
- Ruidoso High School special education teacher and coach Edward M. Hedin applied for the middle school position. He has been with the district since 1992, received his master of education in education administration from Eastern New Mexico University, as well as his bachelor of science degree in special

education with a minor in physical education.

- William D. Hood who has taught and coached at White Mountain Middle and Ruidoso Middle Schools since 1977. He received a master of arts degree in educational management and a bachelor of science degree in secondary education from New Mexico State University.

Other finalists considered for the job included:

- Jimmy Burkett was considered for both principal positions. He has been director of technology and grant writing with Lovington Schools since 1997. Before that he was director of operations and curriculum for four years. He was also high school principal of Lovington Schools from 1986-1993. Burkett received his masters degree in agricultural and extension education from New Mexico State University and his bachelor of science degree in agricultural education at Texas Tech in Lubbock, Texas.
- Randy J. Hestand, assistant middle school principal at Mountain View School in Roswell applied for both positions. He has a masters of education degree with a minor in

school administration from Eastern New Mexico University in Portales and a bachelor of science degree in agriculture education and extension from New Mexico State University in Las Cruces.

- M. Terry Greer, assistant principal of Las Cruces High School since 1996, was a finalist for the high school principal position. Greer received a doctoral degree in education in curriculum and instruction from New Mexico State University, as well as a master of arts degree in educational administration.
- Pat McMurray, principal of Mills Elementary School in Hobbs from 1994 to 1999, was also a finalist for the middle school position, but opted out of the selection process at the last minute, Wirth said.
- Ricardo Sanchez was a finalist for the middle school position, Wirth said, but he did not submit a resume. He is currently a middle school principal with Pecos Schools.

Wirth said that he helped Gladden with the interviews of the finalists.

State to fund paving of Yard Road in Capitan

CAPITAN - The superintendent of schools here got word Tuesday that the state Highway and Transportation Department will fund the paving of Yard Road, which lies behind the school complex and poses safety issues to students and staff.

Superintendent Diana Billingsley said having Yard Road paved will allow the school district to install speed bumps and cut down on dust and divert drainage off the mountain.

The district will add \$21,495 to \$64,485 that the state will provide, Billingsley said. This project was slashed from the May 11 bond issue after a larger bond issue failed in February.

The Capitan school board is expected to approve the funding at its regular meeting Thursday.

Also at the meeting, the school board will be asked to vote on a 6-percent pay raise for teachers with 10 years or more of experience and a 5.25-percent raise for all other employees of the district.

"That's where our salary schedule is hurting us," Billingsley said. "From 10 years on, we fall behind the average so we're trying to build it up to keep our experienced teachers here."

The meeting will begin at 6 p.m. in the administration building.

The board also will be asked to vote on recommendations to hire two new teachers. One position is for a middle school physical education teacher and the other is to fill a high school computer-technology teacher position.

The school board also is seeking to fill a seat vacated by Jack King who resigned June 10. Billingsley said only a few applications have been received to fill that position.

Those interested can submit a letter to the board by 4 p.m. Thursday stating reasons they would like to be a board member, Billingsley said.


The board will make a selection before the July 8 board meeting and the new member will be sworn in on that date.

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About 70 homes without water for 10 hours

Downs residents get water cut off as adjunct to highway work

A main water line in Ruidoso Downs burst twice over the weekend, leaving at least two subdivisions without water most of Saturday and parts of Sunday and Monday, a village official said.

The long water outages follow about at least a month of shorter, intermittent outages because of water line replacements along U.S. Highway 70, Village Clerk/Treasurer Leann Weibrecht said.

It was while road construction crews were digging up a main water line at the bottom of Heights Drive Saturday that it sprang a leak, she said.

Repairs took much of the day to complete, leaving about 70 homes without water for roughly 10 hours, Weibrecht said. The affected area includes homes in the Heights subdivision and Ruidoso Gardens subdivision, previously known as Spaghetti Flats.

When water pressure was put back on the line Saturday, it blew out again, Weibrecht said. A second attempt to repair the line, which had to be sealed in concrete to withstand pressure, was completed partially on Sunday and Mon-

day. Water was turned off for about four hours each day during the repairs.

Previous water outages throughout the village have lasted an average of two hours, Weibrecht said. Water lines in the village, primarily those running alongside the highway, are being replaced with larger lines to provide increased capacity.

Water pressure is turned off during the work, which has been going on for "a good four weeks," Weibrecht said.

Another main water line break at the end of May caused a water outage that lasted for about eight hours, she said.

During water line replacements, the village has contacted businesses that will be affected by water outages, but doesn't have the manpower to call each home, Weibrecht said.

Nick Herrera, Ruidoso Downs fire chief, was out on a Mescalero Reservation fire Monday and Tuesday and could not be reached for comment on what the water outages mean to the village's fire-fighting capabilities.

Terry Osterberg, a Ruidoso Downs resident, has several concerns about village's water service, or as he sees it, lack of service. Osterberg owns a home at the end of a water line in an elevated neighborhood — a combination that usually results in low water pressure during peak water use times in the summer.

"And it's like that almost every day — where we don't have water pressure," he said.

At least 10 times in the past two weeks, Osterberg said his home has been completely without water. When he would call Ruidoso Downs Village Hall for information, "I could never get a straight answer" why his water was off, Osterberg said.

"I could never talk to anybody who knew what was happening," he said. "The neighbors have complained as well, but its like talking to the wall."

"The thing is, when Ruidoso or Alamogordo are going to turn off the water, they let you know weeks in advance. Here, they just do it," Osterberg said.

Ruidoso litter clean-up effort wins affiliation

With sanctioning by Keep America Beautiful, the local group can expand its efforts with more grants

Ruidoso's litter clean-up campaign recently gained national affiliation.

The Keep Ruidoso Beautiful effort received official certification last week as a member of the Keep America Beautiful organization. Ruidoso is now one of 19 communities in the state with the certification, coordinators said.

Formed in 1997 by the Ruidoso Village Council, the Keep Ruidoso Beautiful committee has been waiting ever since for the national affiliation to come through.

"We have been working on this since December of 1997," Susan Lutterman, committee chair, said Monday.

Ellen "Buzz" Bizzell is executive director of the Keep Ruidoso Beautiful committee as well as a staff member of Ruidoso's Parks and Recreation Department. Bizzell said the affiliation status benefits the group in funding, programs and expertise.

The village now has a \$9,000 grant from New Mexico Clean and Beautiful to

operate the beautification committee, Bizzell said. Annual funding varies based on the number of funding requests to the state, but "by being an affiliate, you do get an extra \$2,500," she said.

Part of this year's grant will pay for a summertime youth employee. Cassie Bednorz, a Ruidoso High School student, will focus her efforts on planting and tending flowers around town, Bizzell said.

Along extra funding, the national affiliation ties Ruidoso's efforts to those around the world, Bizzell said, who added there are chapters even in Japan.

"It's become that big," she said. "And there is 50 years' experience out there."

Keep Ruidoso Beautiful, which coordinates two large litter clean-up efforts in the spring, wants to expand educational programs on litter control starting with school children, Lutterman and Bizzell said.

Other programs, such as Graffiti Hurts, target the adult community, Bizzell said.

Following a certification ceremony Fri-

day, the committee held a three-hour workshop Saturday morning to outline its goals, Lutterman said. One of those goals is to better educate the public about littering concerns, she said.

"And another of our goals is to clean up the neighborhoods," Lutterman said. That objective will require the creation of neighborhood subcommittees and the recruitment of additional volunteers, which could take some time, she said.

Besides Lutterman, who is with First National Bank, members of the committee are Carl Bartley, president of Sierra Bank; Jacques Craig, owner of Shadow Mountain Lodge; Diana Harris, a travel agent; Bart Young, a member Ruidoso River Association, and Ruidoso Councilor Bill Chance, who is with Otero County Electric Cooperative Inc.

Leonard Corona, the head of Ruidoso's Solid Waste Department, acts in an advisory capacity as well as Rafael "Rifle" Salas, head of the parks and recreation department.



Domenici backs mental health initiative

WASHINGTON — Senator Pete Domenici, a long-time advocate for the mentally ill, has praised action by the White House to expand mental health care parity for federal workers and their families, saying it could help pave the way for equal health care for the mentally ill throughout American society.

Domenici this week participated with Tipper Gore and other figures in the first-ever White House Conference on Mental Health, where the administration outlined new efforts to provide parity, improve treatment, expand research and improve public awareness of mental illnesses.

Domenici, author of the ground-breaking 1996 Mental Health Parity Act, said the president's proposal to ensure that the Federal Employees Health Benefits Plan (FEHBP) implements full mental health and substance abuse parity should help foster congressional support for his proposal to provide full parity for certain severe biologically-based mental illnesses. The Mental Health Equitable Treatment Act of 1999 (S.796) was introduced by Domenici and Sena-

tor Paul Wellstone (D-Minn.) in April.

The efficacy of treatment for severe mental illnesses is increasing as research unlocks more of the secrets of the brain and its functions. Treatment for bipolar disorders, for example, has an 80 percent success rate, while there is a 60 percent success rate for properly treated schizophrenia cases and 65 percent rate for depression. By comparison, there is a 41 percent success rate for angioplasty and 52 percent for atherectomy—both procedures that have full healthcare coverage.

"With this evidence, there is really no reason not to cover these individuals and treat their illnesses like any other disease," Domenici said. There are about nine mil-

lion beneficiaries enrolled in FEHBP plans. The Mental Health Equitable Treatment Act of 1999, which is pending before the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions Committee, would:

1. Provide full parity for severe biologically-based mental illnesses (schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, major depression, obsessive compulsive and severe panic disorders, post-traumatic stress disorder, autism, and other severe and disabling mental disorders like anorexia nervosa and attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder);
2. Prohibit limits on the number of covered hospital days and outpatient visits; and,
3. Eliminate the 1996 Mental Health Parity Act's sunset provision.

'Safe Night' at Mescalero offers youth an alternative

Offering an alternative to unsupervised summer partying or street cruising for their children, the Mescalero Recreation Department joined with the Boys and Girls Club and the Otero County DWI prevention program Saturday to create a "Safe Night."

More than 200 children participated at the Mescalero Community Center from 6 p.m. to midnight in coordination with Safe Nights all over the country, said Robyn Simmons, who helped organize the local event.

"It's a national youth, violence and substance abuse prevention project that includes a nationally televised celebration on PBS (Public Broadcasting System) and (BET) Black Entertainment Television," she said. "Recognized by the National Crime Prevention Council as a model prevention program, a

Safe Night is a party that includes time to learn how to resolve conflict peacefully. Three rules are enforced: no weapons, no alcohol or drugs and no arguments."

Former police officer and youth-at-risk counselor Ojusegun Sijuwade established the model and initiated the Safe Night program in 1994 through the city of Milwaukee Health Department, Simmons said. Safe Night is credited as a key factor in a 60 percent drop in Milwaukee's youth homicides, she said.

Sijuwade applauded the efforts of the Mescalero organization in a news release provided by Simmons.

"We're not going to change the world in one night, but we can make a difference one night at a time," he said in the release. "Safe Nights give kids positive alternatives and send a clear message that they can have fun without drugs or alcohol."

The fun in Mescalero included three-on-three basketball, swimming, bowling and a dance, said Nate Raynor with the Boys and Girls Club. Children from Mescalero and neighboring Tularosa attended.

A little less active, but just as much fun for others was face painting and arts and crafts booths.

Guest speakers were Agency Manager Lee Simmons, Tribal Investigator Mark Chino and Anita Raynor, director of adult basic education at New Mexico State University in Alamogordo.

A disk jockey handled the music for the dance and door prizes were a bonus.

Participants watched portions of a nationally televised celebration from the Milwaukee Auditorium, the BET studios in Washington D.C. and Church of the Harvest in Los Angeles. Several sites across the country were featured as drop-in scenes with celebrities and sports figures. Some children and adults told their stories to bring home the message on how to avoid the most common factors preceding acts of violence.

Children participated in three age categories for boys and for girls; 6 and under, 7 through 9 and 10 to 12 years old.



Two qualify for national HS rodeo finals

Ruidoso's Mitch Wharton and Capitan's Justin Joiner win their respective year-end titles to make it to nationals in Wyoming

Consistency has paid off for two Lincoln County high school cowboys, bull rider Justin Joiner of Capitan and bareback rider Mitch Wharton of Ruidoso.

Both led their respective events for most of the 1998-99 high school rodeo season and both finished as year-end winners at the New Mexico High School Rodeo Association Finals, last Friday, Saturday and Sunday in Farmington.

The payoff is the right to attend the National High School Finals Rodeo in Gillette, Wyo., July 19-25. The high school finals will have more than 1,500 contestants from 38 states and four Canadian provinces.

Wharton is making his second trip to the finals in as many years as a bareback rider. Wharton started his rodeo career riding steers, but switched to bareback just two years ago.

The styles of riding steers and bareback are "a whole lot different," Wharton said.

"You kind of lay back a little bit more in bareback," said the senior home school student. "It's just a whole lot harder on your arm."

Bareback riders also use a different rig to hang on to their bucking bronco. The rig is like a suitcase handle, rather than the rope-like rig used in event riding.

The event requires upper body strength to hang on and fast feet to spur.

"You're supposed to spur up as the horse goes up and set your feet in his neck before his feet hit the ground," Wharton said.

"It's a rough event. I've heard it described as the most physical event in rodeo as far as being tough on your body," said Wharton, whose calloused and cracked hands support his assertion.


Wharton said he'll stay in top form by competing in amateur rodeos across the state, in Oklahoma and Texas from now until the finals in mid-July.

Capitan's Justin Joiner is making his first trip to the high school national rodeo finals, but he's no stranger to big competitions. Joiner won the Super Bull bull riding competition at Tingley Coliseum in Albuquerque last September and pocketed a cool \$2,900 as the top rider of 60 entrants.

He hopes to ride consistently, which won him the year-end state title, to a place finish at nationals.

"The first half of the rodeo season in the fall I rode 100 percent of my bulls," said Joiner, explaining the key to his year-end title victory. "You've got to ride everything you get on and it all works out some how or another."

Bull riders get two rides the first day of competition at nationals. The top 15 qualify

for the "short go," which is one ride and determines the final standings.

"Last year there wasn't anybody that rode all of their bulls and no one covered the short go, so I'm just going up there trying to ride all three of my bulls and we'll just see where I end up. I just see I ride three I should place pretty high," Joiner said.

Joiner, who will attend Odessa College in Texas in the fall on a rodeo scholarship, graduated from Capitan High School May 29. He was the recipient of the \$500 Bobby Lane Memorial Scholarship.

Lane was a bull rider who died in an accident.

"I've been talking to the rodeo coach up there for awhile," said Joiner who also looked at Panhandle State (Okla.) and West Texas Junior College. He chose a junior college because, "I didn't want to jump into something I couldn't handle."

To attend the national finals will cost each of the boys about \$2,500. They'll be in Gillette for eight days. A bull-riding and barrel racing benefit fund-raiser is set for 11 a.m. Saturday, June 19, at the Salazar Arena in Mesalero.

Old Habits returns to old form

The weekend in racing at Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Casino was highlighted by the return Old Habits.

Old Habits, last year's All American Futurity fastest qualifier and runner-up in the finals, made his way back to Ruidoso to run in the AQHA Sooner Derby Challenge trials Thursday.

He qualified to the finals with the fastest time of 20.046 seconds for the 400 yards, on a fast track and into a strong head wind. Old Habits was ridden by Dusty Stimpson and is trained by Danny Cardoza.

AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF A VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO INDUSTRIAL REVENUE BOND (HOTEL RUIDOSO, L.L.C. PROJECT) SERIES 1999 IN THE MAXIMUM PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$8,770,000 TO PROVIDE FUNDS TO FINANCE THE ACQUISITION, CONSTRUCTION AND EQUIPPING OF AN INDUSTRIAL REVENUE PROJECT; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF AN INDENTURE, SUBLEASE AGREEMENT, SUB-SUBLEASE AGREEMENT, BOND PURCHASE AGREEMENT, THE BOND AND OTHER DOCUMENTS IN CONNECTION WITH THE ISSUANCE OF THE BOND AND THE PROJECT; MAKING CERTAIN DETERMINATIONS AND FINDINGS RELATING TO THE BOND AND THE PROJECT; RATIFYING CERTAIN ACTIONS TAKEN PREVIOUSLY; AND REPEALING ALL ACTIONS INCONSISTENT WITH THIS ORDINANCE.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Sections 3-32-1 through 3-32-16, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1978 Compilation, as amended (the "Act"), the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico (the "Village") is authorized to acquire, own, lease or sell industrial revenue projects to be located within, or within a 15-mile radius of, the municipality for the purpose of promoting industry and trade by inducing manufacturing, industrial and commercial enterprises to locate or expand in the State of New Mexico and by promoting a sound and proper balance in the State of New Mexico between agriculture, commerce and industry; and

WHEREAS, Hotel Ruidoso, L.L.C., a limited liability company organized under the laws of the State of Kansas (the "Company"), has leased-certain real property adjacent to the Village of Ruidoso Convention Center (the "Project Site") from the Village pursuant to a Hotel Lease Agreement dated as of May 10, 1999; and

WHEREAS, the Company has presented to the Village Council (the "Council") of the Village a proposal whereby the Company shall sublease the Project Site to the Village pursuant to a Sublease Agreement (the "Sublease") between the Company and the Village and the Village shall, pursuant to the Act, acquire, construct and equip upon the Project Site buildings, improvements and equipment to be used as a hotel facility to be operated by or on behalf of the Company (together with the Project Site, the "Project Property"); and

WHEREAS, the Company has agreed to enter into a Sub-Sublease Agreement (the "Agreement") between the Village and the Company, pursuant to which the Company will sub-lease the Project Property from the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Company has requested that the Village issue its Industrial Revenue Bond (Hotel Ruidoso, L.L.C. Project) Series 1999 (the "Bond") to provide funds to be used to finance the acquisition, construction and equipping of the Project Property; and

WHEREAS, the Village has authority to issue the Bond under the Act; and the Council determines it is desirable and necessary at this time to authorize the issuance of the Bond; and

WHEREAS, Hotel RF, L.L.C., a limited liability company organized under the laws of the State of Kansas (the "Purchaser"), has offered to purchase the Bond at a private sale pursuant to the terms of a proposed Bond Purchase Agreement to be entered into among the Purchaser, the Village and the Company (the "Bond Purchase Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the Village has caused to be published in the Ruidoso News, a newspaper of general circulation in the Village, public notice of the Commission's intention to adopt this Ordinance, which notice contained certain information concerning the ownership, purpose, location and size of the Project Property and the amount of the Bond to be issued to finance the acquisition, construction and equipping of the Project Property, which notice was published at least 14 days prior to final action upon this Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the proposed forms of the following documents have been filed with the Village Clerk before this meeting: (1) the Indenture (the "Indenture") among the Village, the Purchaser and an association or a corporation organized and doing business under the laws of the United States of America or of any state, subject to supervision or examination by federal or state banking authorities, acting as Depository (the "Depository"); (2) the Sublease; (3) the Agreement; and (4) the Bond Purchase Agreement (collectively, the "Bond Documents").

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE VILLAGE COUNCIL, THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. All actions not inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance previously taken by the Council and the officials of the Village directed toward leasing, subleasing and sub-subleasing the Project Property and the sale and issuance of the Bond, including, without limitation, the publication of notices as set forth above, are approved and ratified.

Section 2. The Project Property shall be leased to the Company for use as a hotel facility. The Project Property is to be located at all times within or within a 15-mile radius of the corporate limits of the Village.

Section 3. To finance the cost of the acquisition, construction and equipping of the Project Property, the Village authorizes and creates a revenue bond to be designated "Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico Industrial Revenue Bond (Hotel Ruidoso, L.L.C. Project) Series 1999" in the maximum principal amount of \$8,770,000. The Village shall finance the acquisition, construction and equipping of the Project Property by depositing or causing the deposit of the proceeds of the sale of the Bond with the Depository in accordance with the Indenture.

Section 4. Amounts advanced with respect to the Bond shall bear interest from the dates such advances are made at the rate of 8% per annum, calculated on the basis of a 360-day year of twelve 30-day months, and shall be subject to such terms and conditions as set forth in the Bond Purchase Agreement and the Indenture. Interest on principal amounts outstanding under the Bond shall be payable semiannually on June 1 and December 1, beginning December 1, 1999. The Bond shall mature on June 1, 2029. The Bond shall be subject to redemption at the option of the Company at any time prior to maturity without premium or penalty. The Bond shall be substantially the form provided in the Indenture and shall be dated the date of delivery to the Purchaser. It's a flower fantasy this Spring in San Patricio

SAN PATRICIO — Although John Meigs spent much of his life collecting or creating art, he considers his masterpiece a gift he reserves for the public to enjoy.

While building a home-studio-gallery complex in San Patricio 30 years ago, Meigs decided to use a two-acre area along the Rio Ruidoso to plant a garden where friends could stage special events or just stop by to eat lunch, enjoy the blooms and sounds of the stream.

More recently with the completion of his spectacular new home which looks out from a 52-foot bank of windows over the garden area, he added more landscaping that stretches up to his terrace.

No "shaping" or topiary work here. Meigs enjoys the natural wanderings of floral foliage that thrives in the fertile valley 15 miles east of Ruidoso. With his "eye" and the able hands and muscle of Alberto Marquez, Meigs designed and maintains a place that treats the soul.

Now 83, Meigs has ensured through legal agreements that

the garden will remain accessible to the public no matter what happens to the rest of the complex. He has donated the most of the buildings and land to the Pecos Benedictine Order based in Santa Fe, with legal assurances he can live out his life and then be buried there. Special events may require some supervision, the order charges a small fee for activities in the garden such

as weddings.

"We had one last week with enough mariachis to blow the roof off Mexico," Meigs chuckled.

But when the garden is not being used for those types of activities, individuals, families and small groups can stop by to enjoy the sweet scents and vibrant colors. The central area of the garden is kept mowed and benches are situated along its perimeter.

"We're now cutting along the river to clear out limbs or trees that fell during the winter," Meigs said. "We've created a walking path more than 800 feet long."

When Meigs first moved to the area to be near a long-time friend, the late Peter Hurd, he began construction of a rambling adobe structure that kept growing over the years. He also built a house for an old newspaper buddy named Roy Cummings, who bought the land by the river. When Cummings and his wife decided they wanted to travel, they sold the land to Meigs.

"Whatever came along and looked good, we planted or left there," Meigs said. "There was no plan. The roses are never cut back. We just let them spread out. But the main thrust of the garden is the irises. When they're in bloom, it's really impressive."

The garden is a cross section of almost any type of flower that grows in this part of the country, he said. They're all hardy and the garden blooms all summer with different varieties.

"I want this for the community and have made legal arrangements that the public always will have access," Meigs said. "That's solid in my agreement (with the Benedictines)."

Just down the road from Meigs' garden, and on property previously owned by the former newspaper man, fabric designer and artist, is another visual floral wonder at the Benson

Fine Art Gallery.

Judy and Peter Benson moved into the house last August and adapted a second structure as a guest house.

"We always loved this old house and we hated driving to work," Judy said. "This lends itself to a gallery and we're confident this whole area is going to continue to develop as an art center."

The Hurd La Rinconada Gallery is across a dirt road from Meigs' house, artist Linda Miller lives nearby, as does sculptor Luis Jimenez.

Although their choice of location was well thought out, when it came to the garden, their approach was less than scientific.

"It was almost accidental," Judy said. "They made a mound of dirt when working on the driveway. I bought seeds by the pound and just scattered them."

"I didn't know if they would come up, but here they are. People call it a garden."

Flowers are everywhere in a profusion of color framed by the foothills called the Lincoln folds, featured so often in Hurd paintings.

While some of the plants appear random as Judy insists, other sections of the garden follow a theme with tall larkspur in the back and blue flags and blanket flowers in the front.

As she walks from one garden area to another, Judy is followed by A.G., a golden-color fat and sassy rooster, who shares the couple's affection with Hannibal, their new dog.

"A.G. thinks he's a dog too," Judy Benson said. "He stops by in the morning to watch us eat breakfast and when Peter climbed up a ladder recently, he looked back and A.G. was coming up after him."

Early warning signs of violence often overlooked, study finds

ATHENS, Ohio — Many teachers and counselors often overreact to one-time, physical confrontations between kids and overlook nonviolent behaviors that can cause even more damaging, long-term emotional and social problems.

There's a natural and logical tendency to react strongly to a schoolyard fight, but such an incident may not signal the sort of emotional distress experts believe triggered many of the recent school shootings across the country, says Richard Hazler, professor of counseling education at Ohio University and author of a new study on bullying behaviors.

"When are children just playing and when should an adult intervene?" Hazler says. "It's difficult for even the most experienced professionals to fig-

ure out for any individual situation whether to take strong action or to let the kids settle it themselves."

Labeling all playground clashes as bullying behavior is a common mistake, Hazler says. But in fact, bullying is defined as repeated harmful acts of physical, verbal or social abuse and confrontations that involve unfair matches between children.

Hazler surveyed 251 teachers and counselors in Ohio to assess their understanding of bullying and non-bullying behaviors. Participants were given 21 scenarios of different emotional and physical confrontations between kids and asked to identify which were bullying situations. The study was presented at the American Counseling Association World Conference in April.

Most participants — between 50

percent and 80 percent, depending on the individual scenario — labeled non-bullying situations as bullying, suggesting that professionals are not clear about which situations they should react to and how they should react.

One resulting complication is that people are "less likely to show concern, attempt to prevent or act to intervene in situations involving potential social or verbal harm while they are more likely to overreact in situations involving potential physical harm," Hazler says.

"This appears to be just the type of mistake that allowed the young gunmen in recent school shootings or many youth who attempt suicide who have their own struggles with peer harassment to go under-attended to for months or years."

"Overall, adults are spending a lot

of time and energy on one-time physical confrontations when much more damage often results for the children involved in abuse that goes on over time," Hazler says. "Parents and teachers need to spend more time with children — go to their ball games and observe them in school hallways — and when a confrontation occurs, adults should watch for repeated physical, emotional or social scenarios."

Adults also should pay close attention to children on the receiving end of name-calling and teasing and be more aware of signs such as a withdrawal from friends and a regular lack of eye contact with peers and adults — all of which experts believe preceded recent school violence in Colorado, Arkansas, Kentucky and elsewhere. These indicators of emotional distress are harder to

detect and easier to dismiss than more outward displays of violent behavior, says Hazler, who has studied child bullying and victimization for 12 years.

"If people aren't recognizing emotional abuse as bullying, these things build up within children and can lead to an explosion of violence as a means of being heard or retaliation in what feels to them like a hopeless situation," he says.

Hazler compares adults' lack of intervention in bullying situations to students who become frustrated when they don't understand class material: They become disheartened and give up. Once that happens, Hazler says, troubled children are likely to take life-threatening actions either toward others or themselves.

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'Roadrunner storyteller' to perform at Capitan's public library

CAPITAN - Children of all ages will growl and bark and yap and yap in a participatory story hour at the Capitan Public Library at 2 p.m. June 22 when professional storyteller Leticia Pizzino visits as part of the summer library program, in conjunction with New Mexico State Library's "Roadrunner Reading Club."

This special event is open to adults, too, it's free and doesn't require registration, said Linda Fox, librarian.

At Capitan Public Library, Pizzino will present a program called "Animal Tales," incorporating traditional songs and stories and handkerchief-folding that she learned from her grandmother.

Leticia Pizzino is a performing singer, an accomplished musician, and an elementary school orchestra teacher who found herself spending more and more time traveling around to entertain with stories until she and her husband, Jeffery, realized she was a professional storyteller.

"I fold a handkerchief into a mouse as I tell a story," she said. "It's like a magic trick. My grandmother, who used to tell me stories, taught me the handkerchief folding and quite a few other things that I do. It's something passed on in the oral tradition of my

family."

Indeed, Pizzino's "training" in storytelling comes from an extended family of natural storytellers, and even her introduction to music comes from improvisational play she and her five siblings used to do with their mother.

"It's all part of play," she said, "and the tradition of having fun with family."

For Pizzino, it's been a gradual process of realizing that she's a storyteller. Nine or ten years ago, she and several others who attended a storytelling festival decided they ought to get involved in it more than once a year. So they founded the Utah Storytelling Guild, which now has six chapters and a newsletter.

Then more and more requests started coming in for Pizzino to entertain - at a bookstore, in a library, for PTA meetings, and festivals - and she and her husband decided that this "hobby gone wild" had become a career.

"I've been asked often enough, 'How long have you been telling stories,' and I wasn't sure, so I asked my dad and he said, with a twinkle in his eye, 'Since you could talk.' It's not something I set out to become," she said.

Pizzino has a bachelor's degree from Brigham Young University in vocal pedagogy, plays the chordez zither, fiddle, piano and recorder, and has performed in musicals and operas. She incorporates

her many talents and skills to enhance her storytelling and gets her audiences actively participating.

For the performance in Capitan, she'll be playing an auto harp, but she may bring along rhythm instruments and have the children come up and help her play with them. Although she plans a repertoire for each performance, she brings a grab-bag so she can adjust to the different settings she visits and the ages of the participants.

Pizzino and her husband have been working on a book called "Fold and Tell," which explains and illustrates - with photos - how to fold handkerchiefs and towels into animated objects while telling stories. It includes the mouse in the story she'll be telling at the Capitan Public Library, as well as "Dancing Girl," "Babies in a Cradle" - that many adults may remember from their childhoods - "The Chicken and the Pig" or "Tough Chuck." The books will be available for purchase.

Pizzino will perform at more than 40 libraries and retirement centers throughout New Mexico this summer. In January she completed her first storytelling tour of the state. She lives in West Jordan, Utah, with her husband, Jeffery, who is her business manager.

County schools receive 'Technology Literacy Challenge Fund' grants of about \$60,000 each

SANTIA FE - State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Michael J. Davis, has announced 43 individual awards to New Mexico schools totaling \$3.38 million dollars through the Technology Literacy Challenge Fund grant program.

In Lincoln County, Ruidoso and Corona each were awarded \$60,000 and the Hondo Valley

Schools will receive \$59,711.

The New Mexico Technology Literacy Challenge Fund (TLCF) provides funds to schools to help them meet their most important education technology needs, especially targeted at districts with high rates of poverty and those demonstrating the greatest need for technology. The program includes partnerships with

institutions of higher education and private schools.

Funds for the program were first allocated in 1997 under the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) to advance state and federal education technology goals.

David C. Bowman, State Department of Education Technology Literacy Challenge

Fund coordinator, said the TLCF "has provided over \$8 million dollars to New Mexico public schools. Thanks to highly competent technology coordinators and project directors, New Mexico students are entering schools that can provide them with essential learning tools."


"TLCF provides funding for students to learn in a technolo-


The TLCF program is administered by the State Department of Education



Let's pretend that Margaret might tell her own story.





"My father is the most important man in the colony. All of the laws passed there have to be approved by the king. My father is the king's man."



New Bern

"One of the many things he did was to select the site for the North Carolina capital. He chose New Bern, a town near the coast."



The palace as it looks today. The Tryons lived here only a little over a year, but since Governor Tryon built it, most people call it Tryon's Palace. After the Tryons moved out, other North Carolina governors lived there. After the capital was moved to Raleigh, rooms were rented out. The palace burned in 1798. More than 100 years later it was rebuilt on the original site. Thousands of tourists visit there each year.

"We needed a place for my family to live. The building is also a meeting place for the lawmakers who govern the colony. 'Some people think the big building cost too much of the taxpayers' money."



"It is perhaps the finest house in all the Colonies. While most other families in the Colonies live in one room, my palace has 18 rooms, plus a kitchen wing and stable wing."



A coat of arms is a symbol for families or even countries. The lion represents England, the unicorn Scotland.

COATS OF ARMS BEGAN WHEN KNIGHTS IN ARMOR PUT DESIGNS ON THEIR SHIELDS SO THEY COULD BE IDENTIFIED.

"The coat of arms of the King of England hangs over the entrance door. It shows that the governor represents the king in North Carolina."

"My father keeps his 400 books in this library. He often looks up information. My mother also likes to read."

"The council chamber is the biggest room in the palace. This is where the group that governs the colony meets."

WE ALWAYS HAVE A LOT OF GUESTS.

"We eat our main meal in the middle of the day in this big dining room. Servants have to carry the food into the house from a nearby kitchen, which is in a separate building."

SERVING TEA IS A REAL ART. WOMEN LEARN TO DO IT JUST SO!

"My mother often serves tea in the parlor. When we have guests, she might entertain by playing the harpsichord." (The harpsichord has a softer sound than our modern piano. It sounds similar to plucking the strings on a guitar.)

LIKE MANY GIRLS, I LOVE TO PLAY HOUSE AND TO PLAY WITH DOLLS.

"My room is upstairs. I go there to study, play and sleep. Unlike most girls my age, I am being taught to read and write. I am also learning to keep house."

I'M LEARNING TO BE A GOOD HOUSEWIFE, TOO.

"While a lot of the cooking is done by boiling food in pots over the flames, some of it is done on the hearth, using hot coals raked from the fire and set under pots."

A new publication from AAA called "Traveling With Your Pet," contains some interesting hints, including information on national parks that allow pets.

That's important. I was very disappointed one year traveling around the Grand Tetons and Yellowstone National Park to discover the limitations on hiking with pets. I ended up sitting in a car with my two dogs while my daughter did some of the trails.

The book covers how many hours in advance a pet should be fed before airline travel and what to do after checking into a hotel room with a pet.

"We know that traveling with your pet is great fun, but we also know it requires careful planning and attention to detail," said Brenda Yager, public and governmental affairs manager for AAA New Mexico. "We want the vacation to be enjoyable, even for the non-human family members."

The book has more than 10,000 listings of accommodations in North American that accept pets as well as tips on traveling by car or air, preparing for the trip, selecting a travel kennel and taking an outdoor or ac-

tive vacation.

New to the 1999 edition are listings of animal clinics in North American, listings of U.S. and Canadian national parks and other public lands that allow pets, information for people with disabilities who travel with companion animals, and border crossing information for transporting pets between the United States and Canada.

"In addition to leisure travel, this book also is an important resource for people who are moving to a new city or state with their pets," said Yager. "This guide takes the guesswork out of planning a trip with an animal."

The pet-friendly properties listing notes amenities and services available for pets such as treats, a pet menu or pet sitting, pet-specific policies regarding fees, deposits, pet size and housekeeping services, discount information and amenities for people such as pools and in-room coffee makers.

"Traveling With Your Pet - The AAA PetBook," is available in book stores for \$12, or from an AAA office in person or by phone for \$8.95. Members of the not-for-profit auto club receive a discounted price of \$5.95.

That '70s Show: not for baby boomers only

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That '70s Show, a quirky sitcom about the decade so many folks loved to hate, is, like the period it portrays, making a comeback - as part of Fox's summer programming.

Five new episodes are scheduled to air on Mondays beginning June 14, and Fox has ordered 25 more for the 1999/2000 season. The producers hope to see it scheduled this fall as the gold-lead-in to *Ally McBeal*.

With the 1998 debut of *That '70s Show*, viewers saw the agonies and ecstasies of teens on the verge of adulthood in the era of leisure suits and smiley-face buttons.

The new episodes bring the further exploits of Eric Forman (Topher Grace) and the friends hanging out in his basement: girlfriend Donna (Laura Prepon); dumb hunk Kelso (Ashton Kutcher) and his girlfriend, Jackie (Mila Kunis); pseudorevolutionary Hyde (Danny Masterson); and exchange student Fez (Wilmer Valderrama).

Viewers who lived through the '70s are likely to smile and shudder simultaneously at the lava lamps, bell bottoms and references to the Establishment; the verisimilitude makes them say, perhaps with a groan, "Oh yeah, I remember that" - the part of the "Me Decade" after the Vietnam War and Richard Nixon. Today's adolescents may feel just as much at home, if not with the decor, then with the classic theme of teen rebellion.


"When I was growing up, I completely identified with *American Graffiti*, which was about the '50s," says co-executive producer Mark Brazill, 37, who developed the show with fellow *3rd Rock From the Sun* creators Bonnie and Terry Turner.

Brazill says the upcoming season will deal, among other things, with Red (Kurtwood Smith) losing his job at the plant, "because that happened to my father." Also, viewers will finally see the inside of Hyde's house.

"Who knew the '70s would be looked back on with nostalgia?" Brazill marvels.

Somehow, he and his cohorts manage to make the characters in this version of the '70s both funny and interesting enough to care about.

IF YOU LOSE A SCREW...DON'T SUPERGLUE

Frames can suffer from numerous damaging mishaps. Checking your glasses daily can alert you to needed care and maintenance. In some cases, the frame may even meet the manufacturer's criteria for warranty replacement. Screws can become loose or fall out. Temples (sometimes called bows or arms) can become bent. Nosepads wear and crack or simply fall off. Regular cleaning and adjustment can make your frame more comfortable to wear as well as extend the life of your frame and lenses.

Routine care and maintenance of your frame and lenses takes only a few minutes and can save untold inconvenience or permanent damage to your glasses. Keeping lenses clean and screws snug is most important. Use of commercial eyeglass cleaner and a soft cloth is best for keeping lenses clean. NEVER, NEVER use glass cleaner on plastic or lightstyle lenses. Warm water and mild liquid soap can be used to clean extremely dirty lenses. Always use a soft cloth to wipe lenses. NEVER, NEVER use paper products like Kleenex or paper towels to wipe lenses.

It is also important to check each screw. There may be a total of six screws on your frame, one for each nose pad, two eyewire screws and two temple screws. Eyeglass screwdrivers are available with slotted and Phillips tips. If one of the screws should fall out or become lost, there are good substitutes available. Dental floss or sewing thread, a paperclip or straight pin, even a toothpick can substitute for your screw until it can be replaced. NEVER, NEVER use superglue. A simple repair that could take five minutes with the proper tools can become impossible when glue or other adhesives are used to hold frame and lenses together. Superglue is extremely difficult to remove, can permanently damage the finish on your frame, will cloud lenses and void all warranties.

Engaging drama *Power Play* brings hockey to UPN

There's no doubting the national identity of the latest effort from producers Glenn Davis and Bill Laurin.

Power Play, which comes to United Paramount Network on Monday, June 14, is the story of a fictitious NHL franchise. The first-rate drama, which earned excellent reviews in its rookie season north of the border, is as Canadian as, well, hockey.

Power Play isn't so much a TV series for Davis and Laurin as it is an act of faith in the country the writing team once abandoned to pursue successful — if spiritually unrewarding — careers in Hollywood.

"It's what we would call a tombstone show," Laurin says, meaning it would make a great epitaph for their partnership.

"It would be really great if people would say, 'Oh, yeah, they created *Power Play*.'" he says. "It's the kind of show you spend a long time in the business hoping that one day you'll get to do."

While in the States, the Montreal-born duo once penned a series pilot for CBS about a women's professional hockey league. Later, they wrote a feature film script about a broken-down minor-

league hockey team.

There were other concepts, too, but none seemed to click, perhaps because all were missing an essential ingredient: Canada.

Power Play, Laurin says, is "a purely Canadian product," informed by the fact that he and Davis recently returned to their native land after a self-imposed exile in the United States.

"We had been away from the country for a long time and had come back to it. That shaped some of the (show's) tone and themes," he explains.

Davis says he and Laurin find the difference between their very Hollywood trips to Los Angeles and their returns to Canada amusing.

"We're in L.A. all the time for business still, and when we come back to the airport in Toronto, we're like the pope. We get down and kiss the Tarmac," he says jokingly.

Brett Parker, the expatriate Canadian character in *Power Play* (played engagingly by familiar stage and film actor Michael Riley), feels a similar tug.

The character has not merely left Canada but denounced it, erasing any hint of his former ties to the country.

He has become a bloodsucking, ratings-hungry U.S. sports agent whose mission in life is to streamline, repack-age and market Canada's national sport

to maximize his own profits.

Through a series of remarkably contrived events, Parker finds himself sucked back into Canada as the general manager of an expansion team in his hometown of Hamilton, Ontario.

Above him are the team's strong-willed president (Kari Matchett) and its eccentric millionaire owner (Gordon Pinsent).

Laurin and Davis have taken pains to get the hockey right, hiring former NHL and Junior A league players to take to the ice.

But *Power Play* is not really a hockey series, Laurin says. In any given hour-long episode, no more than about six minutes take place on the ice.

The show is about something bigger than hockey, he explains.

"It's about the lives of the people around the team and, by implication, it's

about what it is to be Canadian and to live in Canada."

Add to that some solid drama and humor, and even at the height of summer, UPN viewers may start thinking of a trip to the Great White North, eh?
