

Ruidoso, Forest Service lifts fire ban

Lincoln County Commission will consider the same in a meeting today

Early summer rains prompted the U.S. Forest Service and the village of Ruidoso Tuesday to lift fire restrictions imposed a month ago as wild fires raged in Mescalero and around the village.

The Lincoln County Commission is expected to follow suit today and remove its ban on open flames, but Ruidoso's restrictions remain in effect, a spokesman for that town said Tuesday. The state Forestry Division will fall in line by Friday.

Jennifer Hill with the National Weather Service said the unexpected precipitation resulted from a persistent upper level disturbance that parked over southern New Mexico for four days. Although it pushed into Texas Tuesday, enough low level moisture was left hanging around to produce some heavy rain that night, because the clouds weren't moving fast, she said.

Another storm system should arrive about Thursday, but it will be

much weaker. The area may see some late afternoon showers, Hill said.

Although the village outlawed charcoal grilling, as well as smoking outside as part of the restrictions, only three citations were issued in the four-week period, said village code enforcement officer Tomas Chavez.

"I want to remind people that even with the rain, they should be thinking fire protection and keeping a defensible space around their homes," he said.

Just six weeks ago, stream flow in the county's two river basins hovered at the half-way mark. The flow for the Rio Hondo basin was 46 percent of average and ranged from 44 percent of average to 51 percent on the Pecos River basin. Fire danger was labeled as extreme both on the adjacent Mescalero Apache Reservation and in the Lincoln National Forest.

Unless our summer rains don't come, I think we'll be all right," Bill Rogge, state forestry division fire manager, said Tuesday. "We try to coordinate with the federal, forest service. When we go in and out of fire restrictions, it's in cooperation with the other agencies. We don't want to see camp fires allowed on one side of the street and banned on the other, but we had more firefighters to run down, so it will be Friday before the state forestry division can down grade its restrictions."

Ruidoso Fire Chief Virgil Reynolds said although people can return to charcoal grilling outside and can smoke, they still can be fined \$500 for discarding the cigarette or match on the ground. The ban on fireworks in the village remains in place, he said.

San Patricio boy killed in accident

Ruidoso joy ride turns tragic after juveniles allegedly sniff spray paint

A 12-year-old boy from San Patricio died after falling off the trunk of a moving vehicle early Tuesday morning, and allegedly sniffing spray paint with friends, Ruidoso police say.

Elijah Chavez and three other juveniles were in a car taken by a 14-year-old boy without his parents' knowledge or consent, according to the Ruidoso Police Department.

The juveniles went to the Camelot Drive area in Ruidoso and climbed the water tower there.

All but the driver allegedly sniffed spray paint, said Ruidoso Police Chief Lanny Maddox.

As the group left the Camelot Drive area, at about 2 a.m. Chavez and another youth decided to ride on the hood of the vehicle, which was a Chevrolet Cavalier.

The two youths moved to the trunk of the vehicle, holding on by reaching around the rear windows. Several hundred feet before reaching the Camelot castle, Chavez fell from the vehicle onto the pavement.

Ruidoso Detective Doug Babcock said Chavez died at Lincoln County Medical Center from head injuries sustained in the fall.

Maddox said police and emergency medical personnel arrived on the scene immediately after the incident and Chavez was at the hospital eight minutes after the accident happened.

"We certainly sympathize with the parents of the deceased juvenile," Maddox said, "but we also encourage all parents to make every attempt to ensure the welfare and safety of their children by communicating and knowing where their children are and what they're doing. This is very unfortunate and a totally senseless loss of a human life in Lincoln County."

The problem of paint sniffing "Huffing" inhalants is not a new problem, but has not gotten the spotlight other drugs have, said a specialist on drug abuse.

"Because of the sensationalism of the drug war, the cartels, cocaine and crack-cocaine, this has been set over in the corner and it never really went away, it's always continued to fester," said John Baldonado, executive director of Otero County Council on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, a private nonprofit community program.

Although sniffing paints, gas and

Downs officer to have grievance hearing in public

A Ruidoso Downs police officer will have his grievance hearing in public, despite an earlier motion filed by the village attorney to force a closed hearing.

Cpl. Chris "Corky" Condon had requested an open airing of three complaints against him by Police Chief David Hightower.

However, Sean Baker, an attorney for the village, filed a motion June 10 to close the hearing despite Condon's wishes, saying a public hearing would unduly influence the decision of the grievance board, which is composed of village employees.

Baker at the same time filed a motion to limit the evidence Condon would be able to present during the hearing. Baker said the two motions

were meant to give Condon a choice: either have a closed hearing or refrain from bringing up some evidence regarding the purported actions of other employees.

At a closed meeting last week between Baker, Condon, the board and an attorney appointed as hearing officer, John Hakanson, the motion to close the hearing was dropped in favor of the motion to limit evidence. The hearing, previously scheduled for Tuesday, was indefinitely postponed until a date when Condon's attorney could be present.

Both Condon and Baker said they were happy with the outcome.

"I've got nothing to hide," Condon said, adding that he was pleased about having to limit evidence in the

WWI veteran receives medal from France

Some 80 years after the fact, an Alamogordo resident was recognized for his efforts fighting in France.

Ivan F. Parrigin, born April 19, 1896, is one of seven living World War I veterans in New Mexico. They will all receive the Legion of Honor from the French government, as will the 1,200 other World War I veterans throughout the United States, Gilles J. Milinaire, consul of France for New Mexico, who presented the medal to Parrigin, said.

The ceremony took place at the Betty Dare Good Samaritan Center in Alamogordo, where Parrigin has lived for the past four years, accord-





"I want to thank the people for their patience until we got the rains," Reynolds said.

Although a few days of rain occurred before the county commission meeting Thursday, commissioners decided to continue the ban at least over the weekend to see how the weather played.

Commissioner Rick Simpson said he felt odd making the motion to retain the ban on open flames, because he spent the previous weekend surveying flood damage to roads in eastern Lincoln County.

But at that meeting Rogge told commissioners that condi-

tions in the forest were predominantly dry.

"We talk about fire danger and then we get 1 1/2 inches of rain," Rogge said.

The county has called a special meeting for 6 p.m. today to consider lifting the ban.

The U.S. Forest Service waited until after the weekend to drop its prohibition against camp fires.

"We've been getting a lot of calls from people asking," Forest Service public information officer Denise Ottaviano said from her office in Alamogordo Friday. "But we're not lifting the ban."

By Monday after two days of rain, the story was different.

other solvents is sometimes considered a "gateway" drug, leading to other drugs, it isn't always the case. Baldonado sees many who start at age 10 and sniff for life.

Parents should be on the look out for behavior changes, such as lethargy and apathy, and watch who their children's companions are and where they hang out. Baldonado said with youth huffing is often a group activity and lately gold paint has become the "paint of choice."

"Sometimes kids would have paint around their mouth and nose," he said, "because they spray it into a rag and holding it over their mouth and nose (to inhale)."

The National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) at the National Institutes of Health reports that irreversible hearing loss and brain damage or central nervous system damage result from use of paint sprays, glues and dewaxers,

whose primary intoxicating substance is toluene.

Other effects that are serious but potentially reversible are liver and kidney damage.

Baldonado said he's heard of individuals whose lungs start disintegrating as they cough up membranes, and other effects include forgetfulness, blackouts similar to those associated with alcoholism and respiratory problems.

As to treatment, Baldonado said the council has an inpatient program, and all solvents are removed so clients do not have access to inhalants. The recovery rate is not very good because they need long-term supervision and almost daily exposure to treatment, he said.

"This is kind of a lost population, because they don't have social skills, and can't maintain jobs," he said.

"If they can't get paint," he said, "they'll pop the top of gasoline tanks."

ing to Pat Greenquist, the administrator of the nursing home.

Those present at the ceremony included Billie Kissiah, Parrigin's daughter, Don Carroll, mayor of Alamogordo, representatives from Holloman Air Force Base and several VFW posts, and residents of the nursing home.

Letters of congratulations from U.S. Senators Pete Domenici and Jeff Bingaman were read.

"Our memories dim of the sacrifices made for us; few people remember World War I,"

Carroll said.

Then he added that Parrigin was an inspiration to all and to all of the younger generations.

When presenting the medal, Milinaire spoke of how President Woodrow Wilson came to France's aid in 1917 by sending more than 2 million men to France.

"The French have not forgotten the bravery of those young men. The French government wants to acknowledge their self-sacrifice," Milinaire said.

Eighty years after the armistice, France wants to honor the men who risked their lives, Milinaire said.

case. "If they can pick and choose the evidence they want to show then that's going to limit my ability to defend myself."

Baker said he was happy because now there will not be any appearance that the village was trying to hide anything.

He said the motion to close the hearing was, in part, to allow Condon to present all his evidence to the board without concerns about infringements on the confidentiality.

Condon said there are three complaints against him — stopping a motorist for running a stop sign outside of Ruidoso Downs jurisdiction, installing a program on a department computer without permission, and conducting an investigation of another officer without authorization.

He defends the first complaint by saying he tried to contact Ruidoso police before the traffic stop at Hull Road and Gavilan Canyon. In addition, Condon carries a card signed by Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan authorizing him to act on the behalf of Lincoln County, Condon said.

Condon said he did attempt to install a computer program, but said it would not perform the function he had hoped and the installation was aborted.

He told his superior about his plans to install the program, but his supe-

rior never told him not to, Condon added.

In the third charge, Condon acknowledges that he was investigating another officer's actions, but for his own complaint against the officer and not on behalf of the department.

"I discovered officers acting improperly and I reported it to my superiors. I filed a complaint against them and I'm the one being disciplined," Condon said, adding that he has never been told the disposition of his complaint against the other officers.

Condon noted a similarity between the disciplinary actions recently brought against himself and of another officer. Both received the disciplinary actions after they had brought formal complaints about one particular officer in the department, he said.

When asked about his motion to close the hearing, even though Condon wished it to be open, Baker said the decision is not entirely up to the employee.

"It's partly up to the employee, partly up to the board and partly up to the village," Baker said. "Mostly, it's up to the board. Because the reason for an open or closed grievance (hearing) is dealing with undue influence of board members. And that's the whole point of whether you have an open or closed grievance hearing."

County Commission puts another public hearing on July meeting agenda

Frustration reigns for supporters of indigent care

Another hearing on a proposal to enact a gross receipts tax to pay for a medical indigent fund will be set for next month's Lincoln County Commission meeting.

Groans of disappointments could be heard last Thursday from the audience of physicians and other health care givers and users at a commission meeting. They gave shown up for repeated hearings over the last two years.

But proponents came close to losing it all.

Commissioner Wilton Howell's motion to impose the 1/8th of a cent tax died for lack of a second. Commissioner L. Ray Nunley had excused himself from the meeting to be a guest speaker at another function in the same building in Ruidoso.

When it became obvious the other three commissioners at the meeting weren't ready to vote on the tax, Howell, letting his exasperation show, tried to tie them down to a commitment for another hearing next month, but received no support for that motion either.

When Nunley returned to the meeting later, he mentioned talking to Dr. Arlene Brown, spokesman for the county Health and Wellness Board that researched and then recommended a fund be established.

"She was pretty disappointed," he said. "She felt the process was dead for indigent care. Perhaps we need another public hearing."

When County Attorney Alan Morel said the motion could only be brought back up by someone on the prevailing side, Howell responded, "The point is to serve the public, not to find some technical way (to avoid it)."

Morel then said the issue was on

the agenda and could be reconsidered. Commissioner Rick Simpson said the only reason he didn't offer a second for Howell's motion to approve the tax is that he needs some answers on how the county would administer the fund and distribute the money.

"I agree," Howell said. That's why he was disappointed; an expert from Doña Ana who was supposed to attend the meeting Thursday didn't show up. Maybe in the next 30 days, the county manager could come back with some answers, he said, adding, "It's no secret."

"Administration is my biggest concern," Commission Chairman Rex Wilson said. "I don't want to impose a tax and then spend 80 percent on administration."

Although commissioners agreed in a 3-2 vote to set another hearing, Commissioner William Schwettmann, who voted "nay" with Wilson, said a hearing won't serve any purpose until the county has hard figures and administrative options outlined.

After the meeting, Wilson and Schwettmann said they have heard that several counties are experiencing

major problems with their funds. Lincoln County and its hospital already spend much more on the medically indigent than some other counties, based on a study by the county manager, they pointed out.

But proponents of the fund, including Brown, have said a fund would allow health care providers other than the county hospital to access for reimbursement, such as pharmacies, home health care and counseling centers, and would allow county residents to apply for medical treatment outside of the county.

They can't now because the county doesn't have an indigent fund from which those outside care providers could seek reimbursement. Commissioners have avoided the fund by using the Lincoln County Medical Center as a sole provider of health care.

However, the hospital has been hurt by the arrangement, said administrator James Gibson. Not only does it have to dip into a special tax levy to cover the cost of a payment to the state, it also cannot file in other counties to recoup medical expenses for their residents treated locally, he said.

"We keep hearing the hospital can't do the current arrangement much longer," Schwettmann told Gibson. "But we're never told 'now.' If the hospital board would say that, it might influence the decision in a positive way."

Howell pointed out that the authorization for the special property tax levy for the hospital, which generates about \$800,000 per year, ends in 2000 and voters must be asked to renew it. He asked for a commitment that the hospital would continue to write off \$1 million in charity care per year if a county indigent fund is established. Gibson said if the hospital continues to receive the special tax levy, that probably would be the case, although he must ask the hospital board.

Some of the pressure also would be taken off the hospital with a fund, because fewer people would use the emergency room as their regular doctor, Howell contended.

"But how would the county control that?" Schwettmann asked. "Instead of being an emergency, everyone would be indigent."

How other counties handle indigents

As Lincoln County Commissioners debate whether to impose a gross receipts tax to establish a fund for the medically indigent, officials in three other counties offered information about the systems they use to meet the need.

Babette Berkshire, county manager for Torrance County with a population of about 12,000, said the medically indigent fund there is about five years old and administered "less than part time" by the county's planning and zoning clerk.

The 1/8th percent gross receipt tax in that county generates \$157,000. This year, claims totaled \$161,000 and she had to draw from a \$27,000 balance in the account.

"We're holding the best we can," Berkshire said. "We're in a positive position, but not by much. I know a lot of other counties are spending a lot of other tax money on

their funds. It demands being constantly watchful."

Vicki Aguilar, who handles the medically indigent fund for Roosevelt County, said her commission sold the county hospital and invested the proceeds. The interest from that investment pays for the fund.

"The commission can control the growth of the claims with the rules and regulations they impose," she said. "Our commissioners are very restrictive."

She estimated about 10 percent of the money set aside for the fund pays for administration. The county has about 19,000 residents.

Mark Duncan, chairman of the San Juan County Commission, said his county has used a medically indigent fund for about 15 years and it's sitting at about \$1.5 million now for a county of 100,000. The fund is fed by a 1/8th of a cent gross receipts tax.

"It (the fund) has been higher than that some years," he said. "We

had a huge savings account, but a few years ago, we had to spend it down."

"We've raised and lower the wage ceiling and the amount a person can (receive in benefits) over a lifetime. The fund has done what it was intended to do, but at the same time the need is becoming greater and greater. Recently, we've been re-looking at how to handle it. We've been paying 100 percent (of the eligible medical claims) and we may be backing off to 75 percent. We don't want to bankrupt ourselves."

As the second fastest growing county in the state, commissioners can't pick who's going to moved into the area, so as the population increases, so do those who need to use the fund, Duncan said.

"We feel the people are paying the taxes and should be the beneficiaries," Duncan said. He estimated the cost of administering the fund at between 10 percent to 11 percent of the money generated.

Caged rabbits no match for hungry mother bear

A black bear, described as "huge" by a homeowner, raided some rabbit cages below the U.S. Forest Service lookout tower Thursday, killing three adults and six baby bunnies.

Ruidoso police Corporal Wade Proctor responded to Bob Tegeda's call for help at about 6 p.m.

"The owner had taken precautions and had strong wood and heavy gauge chicken wire around the cages, but he said the sow (mother bear) just pulled it apart like it was nothing," Proctor said.

Police officers first try to scare the bear away with an air horn, then a siren. If those don't work, they set off fire crackers and as a last resort, will shoot rubber bullets, he said.

When the firecrackers went off, the cub went up a tree, but the mother hung around within 20-30 feet of its base, he said.

"She was going to come back because her cub was there," Proctor said. "I was talking to dispatch, telling them I didn't intend to go any

closer to her when Sergeant Randy Spears came on and said, 'Chicken.'

"I told him, 'I saw what that bear did to those rabbits. I'm not staying around. I don't want the same thing to happen to this chicken.'"

Spears later shot at the mother bear with rubber bullets and she left the area. But once a bear, especially one with cubs, spots an easy meal, it probably will come back, Proctor said.

"We notified (state Game and Fish Department) and the only option they may have is to trap and relocate the bears," he said.

Ben Hanson with the Roswell office of the state Game and Fish Department said Friday that although bears mostly stick to a diet of vegetation and berries, they're opportunistic when they find other types of food trapped and waiting for them.

"They won't expend the energy chasing a rabbit in the wild, but rabbits in a cage, that's different," Hanson said. "Five or six years ago, we had a bear attack a goat that was tied up."



Enough is enough; go directly to jail

There's no question about it — the Lincoln County Commission is inching its way toward a new jail facility.

The commission's decision to find an architect came some three years after it became apparent that something had to be done about an old jail that failed almost every standard established for the incarceration of prisoners.

That was a necessary first step, certainly; commissioners agreed that they don't want to commit to something with an unknown price tag. They think they want a new facility that can handle from 75 to 100 prisoners, built on a tract in the Carrizozo Industrial Park.

But they stopped short of approving a 1/8th-cent gross receipts tax to pay for that jail, apparently fearful the annual return on the tax wouldn't cover the debt service. It might not, if they get too ambitious with their jail plans. The state finance Authority has approved the county for a \$3.9 million loan under what amounts to favorable terms — 3-percent interest for more than \$500,000 of it and the balance at 5.85 percent.

But too much of a delay would eliminate the 3 percent "disadvantaged" rate because other applicants might pick it up. Commissioners decided they could wait long enough to get an architect's proposal to help determine what a suitable facility would cost.

So they agreed to ask for proposals for something that would cost no more than \$2.6 million.

Hmmm...\$2.6 million, \$3.9 million...but maybe it will cost \$5 million.

So what's going on here? Sounds like it's the same old internal gridlock that has put the brakes on the commission for years. The same sort of gridlock that prevents them from doing anything about an indigent care fund although all but two counties in the state have them.

Is there a similarity here? Prisoners and indigents have something in common — they're not much fun to talk about, and they do cost taxpayers' money. And if anything can be said for certain about Lincoln County's commissioners it's that they hate taxes.

Short of going down the "private prison" garden path that has attracted — or distracted — some New Mexico counties, there appears to be no other way.

It is a sad fact of modern life that crimes against society represent a growth industry, and with every growth industry there develops vested interests that want to make a buck off other people's ills.

Better taxes than private prisons; better getting on with it than foot-dragging, when everything inevitably will cost more.



Lot numbering is the law

As you may have noticed, many of the (Ruidoso) streets have been renumbered and many new streets have been added over the last few years. Also, some streets/roads with duplicate names have been changed to avoid confusion. It is imperative that residents know what their physical address is and that it is displayed correctly, in plain view of the street, on the property.

This is very important in the event that police, fire, or medical personnel are needed, that they can locate the individual needing assistance. It is also extremely helpful to all utility companies and delivery services.

What residents of the Village of Ruidoso may not know is that there is a city ordinance (10-5-16) regarding lot numbering.

In that ordinance it states that it shall be the duty of the owners and occupants of every house, building or structure, to place figures at least 4 inches high showing the number of the house, building or structure. In the near future a code enforcement officer will begin enforcing this ordinance, which has been in effect since August, 1994. This law does apply to both businesses and

homes. Penalties can include a minimum of \$590 to a maximum of \$500 and/or up to 90 days in jail.

At this time there are some houses that have correctly posted addresses and others that do not. To give an example: Some people on the same street may have changed their address while others have not, which is causing the numbers to run in non-sequential order, or having the same number listed twice — one being the correct new address, the other being the old (and wrong) one. This will cause confusion and delay for anyone trying to locate a residence.

They have no way of knowing which of two houses listed the same as the one needing assistance. Also, personnel may think they are in the 300 block of a street when they are actually in the 200 block because of incorrect numbering.

If you are not sure of your address, or need to confirm that you are in compliance with the city addressing ordinance, contact Becky at the Ruidoso Police Department, preferably between the hours of 11:30 a.m. and 7:30 p.m., Tuesday through Friday, and Sunday. You may also contact Thomas Chaves, with Code Enforcement at City Hall (258-4343).

A senseless death calls attention to inhalants abuse

As we all know from the senseless death of a 12-year-old San Patricio boy early Thursday morning, the sun isn't always shining in the Ruidoso Valley.

This tragedy was apparently spurred on in some fashion by alleged spray paint sniffing.

Because of its availability — and it is inexpensive — the inhaling of glues and spray paints is more prevalent than most people are aware.

Even in Lincoln County. According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, inhalant abuse is deadly. Inhalant abuse can kill.

It can kill suddenly, and it can kill those who sniff for the first time.

The agency reports that every year, young people in this country die of inhalant abuse. Hundreds suffer severe consequences, including permanent brain damage, loss of muscle control, and destruction of the heart, blood, kidney, liver, and

bone marrow.

Today, according to the commission, more than 1,000 different products are commonly abused.

The National Institute on Drug Abuse reported in 1996 that one in five American teenagers have used inhalants to get high.

As innocent as a bottle of glue may seem, once hooked, these victims find it a tough habit to break.

Effects can include the following:

- Sniffing can cause sickness and death. For example, victims may become nauseated, forgetful, and unable to see things clearly. Victims may lose control of their bodies, including the use of arms and legs. These effects can last 15 to 45 minutes after sniffing.

- Sniffing also can severely damage many parts of the body, including the brain, heart, liver, and kidneys.

These affects occur over time, right?

Wrong. Victims can die suddenly, without warning. "Sudden Sniffing Death" can occur during or right after sniffing. The heart begins to overwork, beating rapidly but unevenly, which can lead to cardiac arrest.

Hotline first step in promoting communication with youth

By promoting something as simple as a smile, Ruidoso area leaders hope to reduce negative perceptions between area youth and adults.

"A smile goes a long way," says Susan Lutterman, a Ruidoso school board member and part of a local intergovernmental panel discussing school violence.

Though still in preliminary discussion, a public relations campaign was discussed as one of several tools to increase inter-generational understanding and reduce possible school violence.

The panel was formed at the request of Mayor Robert Donaldson shortly after the school killings two months ago in Littleton, Colo.

The committee consists of school board members, school administrators, youth-oriented professionals and village leaders from Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs.

The goal is to reduce feelings of alienation on the part of youth on the premise that the less alienation children feel, then the fewer chances that violence will erupt in schools.

A public relations campaign could include media advertisements that urge both adults and youth to "think twice" about preset negative perceptions.

The ads would also promote positive reactions, such as a smile and a greeting, between adults and teenagers in the community, committee members said.

So far, the meetings have resulted in a coordinated effort between Ruidoso and the school to put in a hotline, probably at Ruidoso High School.

Both youth and adults may use the hotline, which is to be up and running after Labor Day, to pass along concerns and information about potential problems.

Ruidoso Police Chief Larry Maddox, also a member of the committee, said the village will buy the hotline system, an estimated cost of \$500 to \$700, and install it at the school. The school will provide the telephone line.

Other steps include increased interaction at schools between students and community members, including village leaders, whether speaking before classes or just eating lunch with students.

he said, but it could be similar to the Community First advertisements sponsored jointly by the village of Ruidoso and the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce. Donaldson said the village contributed about \$2,500 to the Community First campaign, which promotes spending local dollars with

local merchants. Another topic at last week's meeting centered on improving the perceptions between youth and police officers.

Ruidoso Downs Village Trustee Jackie Branum, another member of the intergovernmental committee, brought up concerns about the treatment of youth by Ruidoso Downs police officers, such as when an officer stops a car full of teens for no other reason than their age.

She asked if Maddox could talk with Ruidoso Downs Police Chief David Hightower about educating his officers about their reactions when dealing with youth.

"Because it's not just the kids from Ruidoso Downs that are being harassed," Branum said, referring to youth from other municipalities being stopped.

Conditional use permit language changed by P&Z

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission, following a public hearing last week, approved a change to the wording of village planning regulations regarding votes on conditional use permits, which are required for zoning issues such as day-care facilities in residential areas.

Currently, a conditional use permit is denied unless approved by a 2/3 vote of the commission. Under the new wording, anything less than a 2/3 vote by the commission would result in an automatic denial. The commission's action goes before the Ruidoso Village Council for final approval.

The commission also:

- Approved a conditional use permit from David Chavez to put a travel trailer at 108 Santa Ana Drive for six months while a home is built on the lot.
- Approved an amended commercial site development plan from the Best Western Swiss Chalet to allow the placement of fill material at the site. The plan was approved with 16 conditions, most of which are to provide erosion control at the site, planning staff said.

- Approved an amended commercial site development plan from David Goodman for a lot on Sudderth Drive in the Palmer Gateway subdivision to allow construction of a 1,560-square-foot office building with 776 square feet of storage space and a two-car garage. The lot will be used to display five model homes.

- Approved a conditional use request from Dr. James Brown for a combination garage/shed of just less than 1,200 square feet at 311 Main Road in the Sleepy Hollow subdivision.

- Approved a variance request from Dr. James Brown to change the location of a garage at 311 Main Road in the Sleepy Hollow subdivision. A new and larger garage will be built on the lot. Brown received permission to allow pergola (open framework) construction to remain as built with zero setback from one lot line.

- Approved a variance request from Danny Calhoun to build an open deck to within 10.8 feet of the front lot line, which has a standard setback of 15 feet. The remainder of the deck would meet standard setback requirements.

- Tabled a variance request from Henry Baray for a lot in the White Fir subdivision. The variance was tabled to the July 6 commission meeting at the request of Baray.

Bat-infested house has homebuyers ready to go to court

The Bartels wake in the night and count bats in their bedroom — it's not putting them to sleep.

Nancy and David Bartels bought a house on Gavilan Canyon last August, after an appraiser gave it a clean bill of health, and the previous owners declared on the disclosure there were no infestations of anything.

The first week the new owners saw bats flying out of the house and discovered a 4-inch pile of bat excrement on a sheet of plastic in an attic area next to their daughter's bedroom.

The Bartels called Jeff Shaw, who runs an animal control business called Nuisance Animal Control.

Shaw said he counted actual bats that he saw fly out of the house — and he might have missed some. He said he's never seen a bat infestation this bad. He said these are small bats that mostly eat moths and bugs and need only a half-inch opening to get into a house.

"It's not a new problem," Shaw said. "Not with the manure that was there. I estimated at least a year that they'd been there. And that's a lot of bats. It doesn't happen all of a sudden." He said there were dead bats both outside and inside the house and empty bug-spray cans and ultrasound beepers in the attic room.

Howdy Geurin, an associate of Chuck Pankey, the appraiser from Roswell who inspected the house, said that, as appraisers, they only check for the obvious.

"We're not paid exterminators or structural engineers," Geurin said. "You don't normally climb up into an attic. We have to rely on the owners for some information. Bats aren't something you go looking for One of the problems in this business is dis-

honesty," said Geurin. "The realtor asked these questions."

Nancy Bartels said when she and her husband first saw the house, they didn't know there was a door in the attic room because there was a toy chest pushed against it. Behind that door was what Shaw believes is a two-year accumulation of guano, or bat excrement. This is in the bedroom of 4-year-old Tiffany, who refuses to sleep there.

The bats live between the inner and outer walls of the house and in the furnace, and in October 1998, they migrated to Mexico, Nancy Bartels said. Then in April they returned.

"They didn't come in the house last year," she said. "They started coming in during May and June (this year). Maybe there's another tiny hole somewhere they're getting through."

She and her husband wake up in the middle of the night when the bats fly into their bedroom downstairs and fly around the ceiling.

The realtor representing the buyer and the realtor representing the seller offered to pay to get rid of the bats, Nancy Bartels said, but the Bartels didn't feel it was their responsibility. They contacted their lawyer, Todd Holmes, in Alamogordo, who contacted the sellers in Florida.

"The Bartels are really in a bad spot," Holmes said. "They can't go out and buy a new place because they've got this mortgage on their credit, so a bank won't finance them for another house and we can't get it off their financial disclosure or statement until we have this lawsuit settled, which could be a year or two."

Holmes wrote to the previous owners on Oct. 20, 1998, with an estimate made by Shaw for \$791 to put "excluders" in the wall so that the bats could leave the house but not return. In the letter he alleged that

they had committed fraud in signing the disclosure statement. They did not respond in writing, Holmes said, and he learned after that that it would be necessary to remove the siding and sheetrock on the house to thoroughly disinfect it, costing about \$18,000.

"At this stage, we're working on a complaint against (the previous owners) for breach of contract ... and a separate count for fraud," Holmes said, referring to their negative responses on the disclosure to a question about pest infestation, to a question about any unusual noise and to another about any unusual odor.

Holmes will file the complaint at the Lincoln County District Court in Carrizozo, and the former owners of the bat-infested house will have 30 days in which to answer. From that point on, he said, it'll take a minimum of a year to get to court.

Meanwhile, the Bartels are living with more than 400 bats and run the risk of rabies, according to Public Health Veterinarian Paul Ettestad, D.V.M. He cited Centers for Disease Control data stating that of 27 cases of human rabies since 1990, 20 of these were attributed to bats.

"Occasionally here in New Mexico we do find rabid bats, and of the bats that people come into contact with, 15 percent test positive for rabies," said Ettestad. This is because those bats people can find and handle are already sick bats, he said. Only 1 percent of a normal, healthy bat population tests positive for rabies.

A fungal disease, histoplasmosis, is also associated with people that go into caves or other enclosed environments with high concentration of bat guano or some bird droppings. This

fungus can cause pneumonia, Ettestad said, but he considers rabies to be the most serious risk.

Treatment for rabies costs \$1,000 and consists of a series of five vaccinations over 28 days, he said. There have been many cases where bats were handled by a person who later decided to call Animal Control personnel. "Then the bat tested positive and so we had to give the treatment," he said.

In cases where a pet has come into contact with a rabid bat, 45 days of home observation is required for immunized pets, and six months quarantine for un-immunized pets.

"If there's some way they can be encouraged to move to a new location, that would be best for everyone, including the bats," Ettestad said.

Concentrating on having fun is a big part of the theory behind Camp Enchantment, a camp for kids with cancer, Mary Altenberg, program director with the American Cancer Society, said.

This is the 13th year that this one-week summer camp has taken place, Altenberg said. Camp Enchantment was at the New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped in Alamogordo from June 13 to 19.

"We had lots of fun activities this year. The kids got to go to White Sands and Wet 'n' Wild, have shaving cream and water balloon fights, and have a dance," Altenberg said.

The camp also had different classes that the children could attend, Altenberg said. Offered classes included a country/western dance class, a karate class, and kite making lessons. "We also had a tea party for the younger kids.

They got to make placemats and hats for it," Altenberg said.

She said that the younger children went to Holloman Air Force Base and looked at the stealth fighter planes while the teens came to the Ruidoso Downs Race Track where they had breakfast with several jockeys and got a chance to visit with them and ask questions.

The children's questions ranged from how much the jockeys weighed to how dangerous the job is, Gary Stinson, track chaplain, who was actively involved in the question and answer time, said.

Stinson asked the youth questions about horse racing and whoever got the correct answer was awarded with a set of jockey goggles.

"It went really well. The kids enjoyed asking questions and answering them," Stinson said. "The track did a great job of having the kids up here. The jockeys were really interactive and management was there,

mingling with the kids. It was really a unified effort on the part of everyone."

After their time with the jockeys, the children moved on to horseback riding, Altenberg said.

Along with having fun, the camp also was a time for participants to share cancer experiences with each other, Altenberg said. Some cancer survivors are becoming counselors in training in order to help others.

Sixty kids attended Camp Enchantment this year, Altenberg said. All children who are well enough to attend the camp can go, she said. There is no charge to these children. The camp is operated on donations and volunteers.

"We don't have a permanent site for this camp," Altenberg said. "Our advisory committee is still visiting and assessing different camp sites to see which one would be best for us."

"I'm very impressed with the giving and generous spirit of the people who volunteered for this camp in the Alamogordo and Ruidoso areas," Altenberg said. "The kids had a great time."

Hantavirus a health threat in state

A 42-year-old man from McKinley County was diagnosed earlier this month with hantavirus pulmonary syndrome and was hospitalized at University Hospital in Albuquerque in critical condition. The case was confirmed by laboratory tests done at the University of New Mexico Health Sciences Center.

"Though all six cases this year have occurred in the northwest part of the state, we know that the deer mouse that carries hantavirus occurs throughout the state and all New Mexicans should take precautions to avoid contact with deer mice," Dr. David W. Keller, director of Infectious Disease Epidemiology with the Office of Epidemiology, said. The best preventive mea-

sure people can take is to avoid contact with mice and other rodents.

There are several important steps in prevention:

- Air out closed up buildings before entering.
- Seal homes and cabins so mice don't get in.
- Trap mice until they are all gone and clean up nests and droppings using a disinfectant.
- Put hay, wood, and compost piles as far as possible from your home.
- Store hay and wood 12 to 18 inches above the ground so mice can't burrow under it.
- Get rid of trash and junk piles.
- Don't leave animal food and water where mice can get to it.

Early symptoms of hantavirus infection are fever

and muscle aches, possibly with chills, headache, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal pain and cough. Although there is no specific treatment for HPS, supportive care can help patients survive. Chances for recovery are better if the symptoms are recognized and appropriate medical care is begun early in the course of the disease.

The total number of cases in New Mexico, including retrospective cases from as early as 1975, is now 43, with 22 deaths. The total number of HPS cases in the United States confirmed by the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention is 217, with 94 deaths.

Faulty catalytic converter started 823-acre fire

A catalytic converter can reach temperatures of 1,000 degrees. When that converter is faulty and emitting sparks, the result can be the 823-acre Mescalero Reservation Whitetail fire, Gwen Shaffer, a fire information officer with the Lincoln Zone, said.

"That's why we ask people not to pull into grassy areas and leave the engine running," Shaffer said recently.

Federal fire investigators believe a defective muffler caused the fire, named after the area where it started, Shaffer said. The basis for that conclusion is not because of any witnesses or suspects, but from a chemical residue left at the origina-

tion point, she said.

The fire started at about noon June 5 about 8 miles southeast of Ruidoso. It was contained two days later. About 60 firefighters continue putting out spot fires still burning inside the fire line's circumference. The fire was completely doused about a week after it started.

About four days after the fire started, management of it was turned over to the U. S. Bureau of Indian Affairs in Mescalero. Type II fire fighting crews were moved out and Type III crews brought in for the "mopping up" phase, Shaffer said.

The fire, which burned an uninhabited area, did not result in any fatalities, injuries or the loss of any buildings, she said.

County continues to work on annual fiscal audit criticisms

With Lincoln County nearly ready to begin the audit of its 1998-99 fiscal year, some criticisms by the auditor for the previous year have not been resolved.

But most have been answered and corrected, County Manager Tom Stewart told commissioners Thursday.

Several of the audit criticisms for the 1997-98 fiscal year were tied to problems with records for the DWI pro-

gram, which now is being handled by the village of Ruidoso, Stewart pointed out.

Commission Chairman Rex Wilson asked for an update, and emphasized that the audit for the period from July 1, 1998 to June 30, 1999, should begin as soon as possible to ensure it is submitted on time.

Because the county was late last year, the state auditor sent a reminder of the need to be on time this year.

Stewart also responded to the auditor's comment about the need for better fixed asset

accounting and control.

The county manager said a new inventory program has been provided by Triadic - the company that provides and serves county computer programs - that allows the county finance department to add to the inventory when something is purchased.

"But we need to continue to harp on this," he said. "The county is scheduled

to hire a purchasing agent in October 1999, which should alleviate problems cited about purchasing, procurement and accounts payable, he said.

An audit citation for expenses in excess of budget and pay discrepancies both stem from the DWI program, which no longer will be a problem, he said.

By waiting until later in the month for cash reconciliation, the office is balancing better

and is following the auditor's recommendation, Stewart said.

The county manager added that the finance department is meeting deadlines for reports in response to past criticism.

The auditor also criticized the county because one commissioner lacks verification for employment eligibility, he said.

"I apologize," said Commission Wilton Howell. "I'm having a tough time proving I'm a U.S. citizen. It's tough to be an elected official and still can't prove it. I've sent away for a copy of my birth certificate."

The second unsettled item is criticism that federal wage rates were not paid when the county health clinic in Carrizozo was renovated and enlarged in part with federal grant money.

Anything owed will be paid out of the final reimbursement from the state, Stewart said.

Wage rate requirements for projects are receiving more attention prior to moving ahead and discussion now is an integral part of contracting procedures, Stewart said.

Commission begins community grant process

Economic development representative says that politics may have played a part in previous project denials

The earlier Lincoln County Commissioners can settle on a project for a Community Development Block Grant, the better the chances they may win approval, says Tony Elias, executive director of the Southeastern Economic Development District.

Elias was in Ruidoso Thursday to brief commissioners on the round of grant competition for the year 2000.

Part of the discussion centered on the county's past history in obtaining grants and getting money from the state Legislature.

"Is there anything we can do to be more successful with the legislature?" asked Commission Chairman Rex Wilson. He sees what appears to be a bias against the county, he said.

Elias agreed. "For some reason, Lincoln County gets picked on all

the time," Elias said. Different entities from the county submitted requests totaling \$13 million and received \$931,000 for a variety of projects, he said.

The governor vetoed \$15,000 for a study to determine the feasibility of turning the Merchant Marine and military cemetery at Fort Stanton into a national veterans burial ground. The state Department of Corrections is closing that fort as a women's prison.

"I don't know what the answer is," Elias said. "I think the communities work hard and I respect your legislators. It could be the Democratic majority in the House and the Senate and on the capital outlay committees. The Republicans sometimes take a back seat, although there is an effort to be as fair as possible."

Lincoln County's voter registration is predominantly Republican.

"Just keep plugging away,"

Elias said, encouraging big turnout of officials and residents during legislative project discussions.

"Don't wait until January (when the legislature is about to into session) to come to Santa Fe," he said. "I would start as soon as possible working these people for next year. It's much easier getting with them now. Take them to lunch to talk. It's difficult to get quality time during the session in Santa Fe. Do it while they're at home."

"We haven't been very successful with the legislature or with community development block grants," Commissioner Wilton Howell said. "We need to come up with a better project."

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said in his six years on the board, the county has received three block grants: to remodel the senior citizens kitchen at San Patricio, to renovate and improve the county medical clinic in Carrizozo and to create a seniors center in Corona.

He said he wondered if the county could apply for a grant this time to improve the medical clinic at the Hondo School that serves the entire community.

"I can't guarantee (an award), but it's easier to do senior and health care projects, because they're already considered as serving low- to moderate-income people and you don't have to survey the entire county," Elias said.

The county has shown a commitment to the project by donating a building for the clinic and \$49,000 allocated by the Legislature to finish the renovations could be used as the cash match for the grant, he said.

The state receives between

\$12 million and \$14 million annually for the grants, but most of the money goes to non-rural projects. The maximum award is \$400,000.

The commission held its first hearing on the possible projects Thursday, which will give the board a chance for two more hearings - each earns the county points toward an award - before approving a project in August or September.

The deadline to submit will be in the first week in October. Awards by the state are announced the first week in December.

Another project requested for consideration was a sprinkler system for New Horizons, a facility in Carrizozo for developmentally disabled adults. Most of the money to operate the clinic comes from Medicaid, representatives said.

The cost would be \$48,600. The average age of the 15 clients is 70 and many have been at the center since it opened. Four are in wheelchairs, two are blind and three are epileptic.

Only one person works at night. It would be less costly to install a sprinkler system than to hire extra manpower at night, they said.

Commissioners agreed to set another hearing on the grant program for its July meeting and to select a project at a third hearing in August. They acknowledged that waiting until the last minute to submit applications the past two years has hurt the county's chances.

Auctions raises money for county

Surplus and seized goods belonging to Lincoln County and five other agencies netted \$56,000 at the county's annual auction, County Manager Tom Stewart reported to county commissioners Thursday.

The auctioneers will receive 10 percent from the June 12 sale and the rest will be divided among the participating entities, he said. From the county's portion, one quarter will go to the general fund and the rest will go the sheriff's seizure fund. One machine gun brought

in \$2,100 and was bought by a collector, who donated the weapon to the New Mexico Military Institute.

Overbids received on concession stand

Seven bidders submitted offers in excess of money the Lincoln County Commission budgeted for a new concession area and restrooms at the county fairgrounds in Capitan.

But commissioners Thursday gave County Manager Tom Stewart authority to negotiate with the lowest bidder to see how much money could be knocked off with some adjustments in the project.

The county budgeted \$100,000 from money allocated by the state Legislature. The lowest bid from J. R. Brown of Sapello, N.M. near Las Vegas, N.M., was \$109,000.

"We won't do any better bidding it," Commissioner Wilton Howell said.

In most years, the yucca's giant cluster of shining pearl white blooms greets us by the wayside and out across the mesas and rolling hills, as they welcome us against a background of dun and amber colored grass which is waiting patiently for the July rains.

A gorgeous wedding cake can be priced by the slice...so \$10 slices for 200 guests makes it a \$2,000 cake. And how about a standing elk decorating the groom's cake?

Decorating is a sweet delight for Ruidoso's Lisa Bartley, who's learned her art from the pros.

Just call it 'edible art'

• Lisa Bartley doesn't just bake cakes. She creates edible art.

Lisa Bartley can invest 100 hours creating her art only to see it eaten in 30 minutes. She's OK with that.

"As long as they write the check," said Bartley, a local woman with a growing reputation for her panache with wedding and special occasion cakes.

Professional cake decoration is a serious business, as Bartley likes to point out. She doesn't just convert her own kitchen into a bakery when she has orders — Bartley has a separate, fully certified, bakery studio next to her Alto ranch home. She herself is licensed with the state and open to regular inspections.

With 20 years experience and training at the hands of some of the world's biggest names in the field, Bartley approaches her work with a dedication to detail, perfection and style. In return, she is paid as much as \$2,000 and more for her cakes.

"This is not just bakery work, these are artistic expressions," she said.

On Friday morning, Bartley was at work on two wedding cake orders in the airy and bright bakery studio built for her by her husband, Carl Bartley, who besides being a carpenter is a local bank president. Another cake, a white three-layer anniversary confection topped with red roses and decorated with a Renaissance flair, sits completed on a counter awaiting delivery.

April through August — these are the bumper months in the wedding cake business, Bartley said. "And you have to make hay while the sun shines," she said of a recent pile up of orders for her cakes.

Besides filling orders, Bartley continues to hone her craft. To hear her talk, she is far from where she wants to be in terms of being a "sugar artist."

"Sugar artists specialize in the intricate and lifelike edible flowers that adorn the fancier cakes as well as all the latest fashions, such as work with fondant and bows.

Bartley, who claims she is an average sugar artist at best, can turn a lump of gum paste into a delicately hued orchid or a magnolia or a sweet pea bud. Cake decorations have expanded from the traditional rose, though Bartley makes those as well. There is always something new to learn to stay current with the fashions.

"Wedding cakes are kinda like clothing, cars and homes — they change with the trends," Bartley said.

Bartley's mentor, Earlene Moore, is a sugar artist whose name has power in the cake decorating industry. Moore's work is featured regularly in the trade magazines. She and her business partner at the time, Carol Laird, hired Bartley to work in their bakery when the Alto woman

was a student at Lubbock Christian College. Bartley was pursuing a career in interior design when the two women pushed her into the wedding cake business.

"And after I got married, Earlene got me a scholarship with one of the best sugar artists in the world," Bartley said.

Even now, 20 years later, Moore continues to "push and push" Bartley. She recently put Moore into an exclusive class with Nicholas Lodge, who is known worldwide as a wedding cake specialist and a guru for sugar artists. Both Moore and Lodge have websites where people can view their work over the Internet.

Bartley has been approached about teaching her craft locally. But the time isn't right — she wants the opportunity to improve her own skills, first.

"And I'm just not there yet," said Bartley as she worked rolled out pieces of gum paste into tiny flowers and attached them to a wedding cake with icing.

Locally, Bartley is known for her ability to paint scenes on cakes, using fondant — a smooth layer of confection that replaces frosting — as her canvas and dusting powders rather than liquid food coloring.

"One thing that I think is really a signature for me is my Elk cake," Bartley said, indicating an example in her bakery studio's front room. On top of the cake a realistic looking elk

stands in a meadow with a few trees and a mountain as a backdrop. The cake is popular as a groom's cake for weddings. Bartley said she was gratified one time when a groom actually became teary eyed after seeing it.

More than a signed check, it is people's response to her cakes that motivates Bartley, she said.

"My main thing is I want them to walk in and say, 'Aaaaahhh. Oh, that looks beautiful,'" she said. "And then I want them to say, 'It's delicious.'"

She advises aspiring cake decorators to approach their work seriously, beginning with advance planning. One simple tip for beginning cake makers is to let the cakes cool down before removing them from the pans and then again before decorating them.

"And make sure the cakes are level," she said, adding that she has a saw specially for trimming the top of a cake.

As far as decorating goes, Bartley recommends starting off with the basic star tip for frosting decor.

"Just try to do something simple at first — don't try something in a jillion colors," she said. "And allow yourself plenty of time."

A little sleight-of-hand and comedy turns on the young in heart of all ages

A professional magician now makes his home in Capitan.

Abacadabra!

A comic-magician will pop into the Ruidoso Public Library's summer program at 10:30 a.m. June 30 to entertain and deceive youngsters of all ages.

Alan Rich has been into magic since he was 10, but became a full-time magician 17 years ago.

"I really didn't plan it at all," Rich said, "but I was talked into it twice. My older cousin did it as an amateur, and I heckled him so much he taught me some magic." When he was 15, a magic store opened near his home in Los Angeles, and a friend urged him to go.

When he was a kid, he liked to make people laugh. It wasn't acceptable at school, but when he told them he did magic, *abracadabra!* doors opened for him.

His show in Ruidoso is billed as "Magic and Comedy," and that combination may be Rich's trademark.

"All my magic is funny," he said, "and I kind of specialize in sleight-of-hand magic for kids and adults."

He also developed "Character is Cool" shows for schools: educational and motivational magic

shows to entertain youngsters while getting a message across.

Rich said the main difference between performing for adults and performing for children is that younger audiences are more willing than older audiences to volunteer to help.

"It's a kind of neat trait kids have, to be able to go up before a whole group of people," he said. With adults, "their biggest fear is getting in front of an audience. People are more afraid of that than of death."

Houdini was a major influence on Rich because he would take on any challenge and never knew what he would be doing. Comedians also exerted a strong influence on Rich, especially Emo Phillips and old comedy shows.

"I think that's why I like doing: because there was a way of doing the comedy, and it seemed a better way of making a living than a stand-up comedian where you had to travel. Plus I liked working for kids," he said.

Rich does travel rather a lot now, since he moved to Capitan to be near his three-year-old son and is developing New Mexico venues. He still travels to Los Angeles and neighboring states to perform, but is beginning to focus more on Albu-

querque and Santa Fe.

His magical hands appeared on a sitcom, "The Gregory Hines Show," where they played the hands of a woman in a close scene. The cameras did a close-up of his hands - shaved and with fake nails - doing some fancy card-cutting.

Rich also has appeared on a television show, "Eye on L.A."

"I was always happy I was able to make a living with it, affirming that you can have a career you really enjoy and that's really inspiring," he said.

Rich attended junior college and a hypnotherapy college and was a hypnotherapist for awhile, and he also ran a computer system for an insurance company.

"I've tried a few things," Rich said, "but I always come back to magic ... It's something that all ages love because it opens the child within them, it opens up walls and boundaries and touches a place people have - like when they go to Disneyland - that child-like a magical world."

Besides the magic and comedy show at the Ruidoso Public Library, Rich will be reading at the Capitan Public Library at 2:30 p.m. on July 26.

Ruidoso-based science camp provides plenty of fun and learning

The Mountain Science Camp in Ruidoso is a place where the words "fun" and "learning" are spoken by kids in the same sentence.

"The object of this camp is to hook minority students into science, math, computers, and technology," Freida Dixon, one of the camp staff, said.

The annual camp, now in its seventh year, hopes to encourage its participants to take science and math courses in high school, graduate from high school, go to college and select careers in science, math, computers and technology, she said.

There is no cost to the children to attend this camp, which is in its second week of activities, Dixon said. It is funded by a grant from NASA.

The summer camp's classes are held at Ruidoso Middle School where students attend four different subjects, biology, chemistry, math, and computers.

When not in the classroom, the kids are out on field trips, Carla Burns, another staff person for the camp, said. They have already visited the Space Hall of Fame in Alamogordo, gone out to Sunspot Observa-

ry and Apache Point Observatory near Cloudcroft, had an overnight trip to New Mexico Tech where they got a tour of the VLA radio telescope west of Socorro, and went on a tour of the Energetic Materials Research and Testing facility on the Tech campus, where explosives are tested, Burns said.

Students attending the camp range in age from several going into the sixth grade up to a few that are about to enter ninth grade, Burns said. There are kids from all over Lincoln and Otero Counties, one from Colorado and one from Texas, she said.

Each student keeps a journal, Dixon said, in which they record what they do and some of their feelings about each day.

"It's kind of like a diary," said Jocelyn Smith, who has returned as a mentor in this, her second year at the camp. Mentors, who act as teacher's aides, are returning students who have exhibited an exceptional amount of leadership skills, Dixon said.

"This (camp) is a lot of fun. I've made a bunch of new friends," Smith said. "I came here to learn chemistry because I stink at it."

"My sister, Veronica, was

really bad at science. After she came to this camp, she scored really high on the science part of her eighth grade testing," Rachael Cole, another student at the camp, said.

On Monday, the students began their day by being timed running up a set of steps. Each student then took that time and, by plugging it into a formula, determined their horsepower, Dixon said. They also studied the effects of space flight on equilibrium, made space toys, designed paper airplanes, and created a planet data base on computers, Dixon said.

Becky Austin, the computer teacher for the camp, has a background in computers and science from her 31 years of teaching in Texas.

"I think it's a very worthwhile thing to bring these computer skills here and introduce these kids to the classroom of the future, computers are going to be the thing," Austin said.

Austin is teaching her students how to put together a data base with information that they've been looking up about the planets and how to make power point presentations.

"Both of these skills are a must for the students of today to have," Austin said.

The three-week camp will end on July 2 with a graduation ceremony. The guest speaker at graduation will be Col. Ed Carr, the brother of Nancy Carr, another teacher at the camp.

The colonel, a pilot in the U.S. Marine Corps, will be

talking about what math and science courses he had to take in high school and at the Naval Academy and what math and science technology is needed in his job.

"We hope this will help to motivate the kids," his sister said.

The camp's future plans include going to White Sands Missile Range, building rockets; touring the Smokey Bear Museum, building space stations under water, and listening to guest speaker Alan Hale, co-discoverer of the Hale-Bop Comet.

County's Head start programs get funding

U. S. Sen. Jeff Bingaman, D-N.M., has announced that several communities in Lincoln County will benefit from a \$633,670 federal grant.

The grant money comes from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

The grant, awarded to Region IX Education Cooperative, will be used to fund the Lincoln County Head Start program. The program services preschool children ages 3 to 5 at four sites: Carrizozo, Capitan, Hondo and Ruidoso. Head Start is a national program that helps low-income preschool children prepare for

school.

"This grant will help provide these children with the tools they will need to do well in school and succeed later in life," Bingaman said.

The Emergency Room

Emergency rooms are special places in hospitals where people can get quick medical help. Some kids have accidents and are taken there. Others get sick and can't wait for an appointment with their doctor in his or her office. To find out what goes on in an emergency room — or "ER," as it is often called — The Mini Page visited Children's National Medical Center in Washington, D.C.

"I like working with kids," an ER doctor told us. He said that figuring what the medical problem is and deciding how to help is like being a detective.

Emergency Registration (Triage)

A visit to the Emergency Room

All emergency rooms are different, but here's what often happens in one. Since more urgent cases move ahead of others, you might have to wait. During triage, or when you register, nurses decide who is next in line. Try to answer questions as honestly as you can. The nurse will check your vital signs, including:

- your blood pressure, to tell you how hard your heart is pumping. (The nurse pumps the ball, which tightens the cuff around your arm a little.)
- your pulse, or the rate your heart is pumping.

• how much oxygen you have in your blood.

• your temperature.

You go to the waiting room and wait to see the doctor.

When your turn comes, you go to an examination room. A doctor examines you and makes a diagnosis.

You are sent home, or you are admitted to the hospital if you need further care.



In many cases, stitches are not needed to sew up cuts. A special skin glue does the job instead. It comes in a little tube.

"Triage" is a French word meaning "to sort." It's where you first sign in.

POOP SCOOP

With the return of seasonal residents, a reminder is needed to check chimneys for furry friends who may have settled in over the winter.

A bird's nest, a raccoon's family, squirrels and many other animals may have scouted out the chimney while owners were away.

Listen for sounds, check with a flashlight, carefully open the flue to take a look.

If someone is there, call the state Game and Fish Department in Roswell, the local police department or the Humane Society of Lincoln County for advice on removal.

Sometimes just waiting until night will result in the animal leaving to scout food and a protective cap can be installed to prevent its return. Just be sure no babies are left behind.

Raccoons who use attics or chimneys usually make noise at dusk and just before dawn, while squirrels are active by day and quieter at night. Even mice near chimneys can be noisy. It's important to be sure of the source of any tapping or scratching noise you hear.

Raccoons sound something like pigs when they're angry and have a loud high-pitched titter in general exchanges.

When a mother raccoon with young is present, the recommend-

ed course of action is to leave them alone for the few weeks the young are helpless, monitor them to determine when they moved on their own accord and deal with the issue of securing or preventing entry after the family leaves, according to the Humane Society of the United States News published in 1997.

Trapping and moving the family almost always leads to separation and the probable death of the young, the society states.

Invasive techniques, including the use of smoke or fire to drive the animals out of a chimney, can cause the mother to abandon the site and result in the death of the young, who are physically unable to climb out.

The society agrees that the time to take action is at night. During the day, raccoons are more easily confused and vulnerable.

The best way to deal with unwanted tenants is prevention, by capping the chimney before anyone is living there.

Exercise tolerance and enjoy your wild neighbors. Respect their habits and don't encourage contact that could hurt them in the long run.

PBS serves up "A Hot Dog Program" with the works

Whether it's referred to as a "foot long," "red hot," "wiener," "frankfurter" or just plain "dog," the equation is primarily the same: one steaming hot dog in a toasty bun. After that, the similarities end.

A *Hot Dog Program*, airing Wednesday, June 30, on PBS (check local listings), is producer-writer-narrator Rick Sebak's look at the nation's unique love affair with those minisauages on a bun and the people who sell them.

From the history of the hot dog to its processing, Sebak offers a whirlwind tour of U.S. establishments specializing in selling franks.

"I love the fact that these are family-owned businesses that are passed on from one generation to the next," Sebak says. "I just want to celebrate them and let people know they're still there."

Whether they're boiled, broiled or fried, hot-dog stands heap on everything from the standard ketchup and mustard to such eyebrow-raising choices as pimento cheese, coleslaw, jalapenos and sliced tomatoes. Of course, it depends where you order.

"Basically hot dogs are different in different parts of the country," Sebak says. "Some places hate relish. Some places hate ketchup. Even sauerkraut

isn't a constant. I love the fact they're sort of quirky, fun and distinct."

Each stand has its own sales methods. One Alaskan vendor sells reindeer dogs at the start of the Iditarod, while a California business offers free legal advice in addition to what's on the menu. A mainstay of New York's Coney Island sponsors a hot dog-eating competition every Fourth of July, and a Las Vegas casino sells half-pound foot longs.

Sebak witnessed how seriously peo-

ple take their hot dogs, especially when comparing them to a rival city's franks.

"Someone in New York is not going to admit that a Chicago dog has any positive qualities," he says. "(Regionalism) is a wonderful thing.

"If the show makes people any more appreciative of something as ordinary as a hot dog shop, I'll be happy," he says. "These places are great, and we have to cherish them."



AMC documentary series "Backstory" is a gem of an idea

The premise of *Backstory*, premiering Sunday, June 27, on American Movie Classics, is deceptively straightforward: Tell the story of the making of a special movie. The first *Backstory*, "Roman Holiday," is the pilot for a possible new series on the cable channel. Its narrator is the distinguished actor Donald Sutherland, whose participation is the first evidence of the show's quality.

A decision on the series' future will be based in part on the reaction of viewers to this initial episode - though, honestly, the only real question seems to be why someone hasn't produced a library of documentaries like this before.

Carolyn Jacobs is the writer, director and executive producer of the half-hour program, which is followed by a screening of the film in question, William Wyler's charming 1953 romantic comedy *Roman Holiday*, starring Audrey Hepburn, Gregory Peck and Eddie Albert.

Jacobs has chosen a wonderful subject for her first *Backstory*. To begin with, *Roman Holiday* was filmed on location in Rome - a rarity in film at the time. (Consider that, just 14 years earlier, *Gone With the Wind* was produced entirely on a Hollywood back lot.)

A mere eight years before Wyler and his crew arrived to film the romantic tale of a princess in love with a com-

moner, Rome was an Axis capital, and the only Americans around were enemy troops. Here was a film that veterans of that time could see with their wives. It was a vicarious honeymoon at the theater.

In addition, *Roman Holiday* marked the American screen debut of the luminous Hepburn. She won the 1954 best actress Oscar for her performance and went on to become a leading box office attraction in such films as *Sabrina*, *Funny Face*, *Breakfast at Tiffany's* and *My Fair Lady*.

But this behind-the-scenes story isn't all spun sugar.

Roman Holiday had its genesis in the period of the Hollywood blacklist and Sen. Joseph McCarthy's communist witch hunt.

The film's true author, Dalton Trumbo (*Spartacus*, *Exodus*), wrote the screenplay to support his family while in prison for refusing to cooperate when a congressional committee asked him to name friends who may have been communist sympathizers. Trumbo couldn't sell the script under his own name, so a friend, Ian McLellan Hunter, "fronted" for him. Hunter's name remains on the film to this day.

"I didn't think my father had done anything wrong," says Christopher Trumbo, who was a boy at the time.

"It's the duty of a citizen to stand up to an oppressive government. To have behaved other than he did would have been contrary to his very being," he adds.

Also interviewed are Wyler's daughter Catherine, assistant cameraman Peter Poor and several of the film's stars. Albert is sweetly eloquent in his reminiscences, summing it all up in the words, "It was a pity to take the money, really."

There's no hint of tabloid expose in *Backstory*, no impulse to "dish" on an honorable artistic achievement - though the documentary does offer an honest insight into the disintegration of Peck's marriage during the filming.

At a time when television strains and contorts itself in an effort to keep the viewer's interest, here is an idea rich in possibilities and elegant in its simplicity.


"I'm proud of my many accomplishments, including bringing the show's household ranking up to three, as well as the refined storytelling, creative casting choices and the improved production values that I've made."

There's no word yet on what Minei Behr, who took the job shortly after being removed from the same position on *All My Children*, expects to do next.


