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First hearing on Highway 70 construction today

Work may prevent him, but Leo Martinez, owner of Chileo's restaurant, wants to attend the public meeting at 1:30 p.m. today about U.S. Highway 70 road construction.

"I hope so. But we have been busy trying to make ends meet," said Martinez, whose business suffered losses in May because of road work.

The meeting will be the first open to the public since the start of the project to repave 6 miles of U.S. Highway 70. A separate public hearing on the roadwork to widen Mechem Drive will

be at 10 a.m. today in the Ruidoso Convention Center.

Business owners and managers up and down the path of both construction projects have reported losses because of road work. Some, such as Martinez, expressed frustration with Meadow Valley Contractors Inc., the company hired by the state for the road work.

"I'm keeping my eyes on the crews," Martinez said. "It seems like they start some work, then leave it and start work somewhere else ... you would think they would finish something first."

"If we have to have hardships -

that's OK, we'll endure them, but for how long?" Martinez said.

Cathy Chaplin, an employee at the Deck House Restaurant in the Adobe Plaza on Mechem Drive, said Tuesday business was down at least 40 percent.

The main reason for those losses is because road crews are constantly closing off the entrance to the Adobe Plaza, she said.

Martinez was critical of the timing for the public meetings, saying that few business owners or managers can break away from work in the middle of the day to attend.

"It's as if they are hoping people

won't show up," he said.

Pappy and Marlene Bell, owners of Pappy's Diner in Ruidoso Downs, said they would like to attend the 1:30 p.m. meeting, if possible.

Their business is down by at least 50 percent because of torn up roads in front of their restaurant; and though road crews have been working with him, that cooperation has been "up to a point," he said.

"For instance, the job that they

County ready to go Fourth

A weekend of rip-roaring fun, from rodeos, music and down home barbecue to fireworks and a parade should keep everyone in Lincoln County busy over the July 4th holiday.

Most of the action is centered at the Lincoln County fairgrounds in Capitan, about 20 miles north of Ruidoso on State Road 48. One general admission of \$5 is charged, except for children, six and under, who are admitted free.

But if the Fourth of July just isn't the same without fireworks, the only display in the county is put together by the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce and the Volunteer Fire Department. The event starts at 5 p.m. with a barbecue at the town golf course on U.S. 380. Tickets are \$5 in advance (from those organizations) or \$6 at the door. The fireworks begin when it's dark.

Parades are set for 10 a.m. in both Capitan and at Mescalero, about 15 miles southwest of Ruidoso. Rodeos also are scheduled from Friday through Sunday at 1 p.m. at the reservation rodeo grounds. Mescalero Apache maidens will be participating in their puberty ceremonies from Thursday through Sunday. The gates to the ceremonial center will be opened at 10 a.m. each day.

The Third Annual Capitan Music Festival will start toes tapping at 10 a.m. Friday, with entertainment until noon at the county fairgrounds. The music will pick up again from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. and then from 11 a.m. to noon, and from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m., Saturday.

The 2nd annual sanctioned Senior Steer Tiedown Roping is set for noon at the fairgrounds Friday and at 8 a.m. Saturday.

The 44th Annual Smokey Bear Stampede, a big event that draws competitors from other states, and the Smokey Bear Scramble are set for 7 p.m. Friday through Sunday, followed by a dance with "Nashville Back to Back" playing at 9 p.m. in the fair building for a \$5 admission fee.

On Monday, the times change to 1 p.m. for the stampede, the major fund-raising event for the county fair in August, and the

Microsoft co-founder buys Cablevision

• Paul Allen, a co-founder of Microsoft and the soon-to-be owner of Cablevision, intends to provide Internet and telephone access through his newly acquired cable systems.

Paul Allen, the third richest man in the country, is buying up 5.5 million cable customers — and chances are you're one of them.

The sale of Cablevision, with more than 7,000 customers in the Ruidoso area, is to be final in September to Allen's company of Charter Communications, cable executives said this week.

Allen, co-founder of Microsoft, is in the process of spending more than \$14 billion acquiring cable systems across the country, Anita Lamont, a spokesperson for Charter Communications, said. With the purchases, Charter will become the fourth largest owner of cable systems in the country.

Allen's goal is to provide "wired to the

world" services such as Internet access and possibly even telephone services.

"I couldn't give you a time frame, but doing this is a priority for Paul Allen," Lamont said. "It's an interesting concept of how someone would be able to have all of these communication services and have just one bill."

Allen, with assets listed by Forbes Magazine of \$30 billion, has the resources to make the technological advances happen, though when they may reach Ruidoso is hard to say, Lamont said.

In the near future, however, no changes are planned — not to the local cable company's name, staff, price for services or even the address where bills are sent, Dale Wagner, an executive with Cablevision's parent company, Rifkin & Associates, said this week.

Lamont said customer service has and will continue to be a high priority for Charter Communications. So far, the company has kept increases for cable services at 3-5 percent for systems that are not undergoing technological im-

provements, she said.

Paul Crown, who has been with the local cable service for 30 years, said he has not heard from Charter Communications, yet, and does not know when changes are to be expected.

"It's hard to tell right now," Crown said. "What this really means for Ruidoso — and I hate to say it will happen anytime soon or a long way off — is high speed data and high speed Internet access."

"We're in a rural area, so maybe the investment for change will not be as quick as in major metropolitan cities. Then again, it may be quicker," Crown said, adding that there may be a perceived need for higher speed data transfer services.

Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson said he and other village leaders are excited about the new ownership, especially in light of Allen's resources and background.

"So, we see this as being owned by a company that will really have a technological edge," Donaldson said.

Tribal elections already clouded in controversy

The names of 11 candidates for president and vice president of the Mescalero Apache Tribe in the July 9 special election were released Tuesday afternoon, five days after tribal members signed up to run for the two positions.

Although Oliver Enjady and Paul Ortega, who contend they were removed wrongfully by the tribal council as vice president and president last month, signed up, their names weren't on the posted list, according to a tribal spokesman.

Enjady, who was vice president, signed up to run for president, and Ortega, who was president, signed for vice president. No one from the election board or the



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Lincoln County through the eyes of PBS

At the age of 14, Jeffrey Lehmann explored Western Europe by rail. That was just the beginning.

"My daily postcards home of adventures chasing reindeer in the Arctic Circle or crawling through catacombs in Rome became so popular my mother resorted to creating and distributing a weekly newsletter," Lehmann said Tuesday during a four-day tour of Lincoln County for his Public Broadcasting System (PBS) show "Weekend Explorer."

When he was 17, he spent a year combing New Zealand as an exchange student, with side trips to Australia and Hawaii. He kayaked over waterfalls, scaled glaciers and drove off sharks while swimming off the Great Barrier Reef.

By the time Lehmann was in college, he owned a six-agent travel agency based in San Diego. But after graduation, his career veered slightly. He worked as a nuclear core engineer, something that he contends called on his adventuresome spirit, but in another way. While in that job, he also worked in television production

and decided that's what he enjoyed the most. The producer/host of "Weekend Explorer" was involved in productions for ESPN, ESPN2, Prime Sports and The Learning Channel.

"I pitched the idea of the weekend explorer to PBS and they bought it," he said. "After traveling the world, I learned that there was precious little information and intense interest in those places I knew best. By leading bicyclists through the Sierra Nevadas, rock climbing in the Rocky Mountains, guiding whitewater rafts through the rapids in California's Gold Country, searching for whales off Cape Cod and studying ancient Indians of New Mexico, I gained valuable experience."

Initially, the show was confined to a local California test market, but from the first day earned the highest ratings of any non-prime-time show. When Lehmann geared up to convince PBS executives to expand throughout California, they already had decided to try the program nationwide.

"That meant I had to go to locations across the nation," he said. "I knew this area, but I didn't have much information on it. I was at a travel conven-

tion and Nancy Mitchell came over to talk to me and said I had to come out here."

Laura and Mark Doth of Grindstone Graphics handled the local arrangements.

While some of Lehmann's adventures may sound a little too risky for the average traveler, his show is geared specifically to focus on what everyone can do.

"Sometimes, we may go rock climbing (planned for the Capitan Gap area Tuesday afternoon), and I guess a 70-year-old woman may not do that, but she'll get an idea of what a place is like and other things to do there like museums, shopping and just hanging out."

The activities on the series are geared to what most physically fit adults could accomplish during a weekend, which is the length of 85 percent of all vacations, Lehmann said. An associated Club Explorer web site and newsletter provide any needed backup information.

During his four days in Lincoln County, Lehmann has or will mountain bike in Perk Canyon, visit local museums and galleries, dine at the Ellis Store in historic Lincoln, take a motorcycle tour from Fort

Stanton to Lincoln, stop for lunch at the Wortley Hotel, visit Smokey Bear Park, and horseback ride from the Runnels Stables in Bonito.

He also will enjoy White Sands National Monument under moonlight, tour Sid Goodloe's progressive ranch, stop at the Spencer Theater, eat at the Flying J Ranch, pan gold in Nogal, visit historic White Oaks, lunch at The Outpost in Carrizozo, stop at Valley of Fires Lava Flow and hike Three River Petroglyphs site and trail.

Although the 4-member crew has enjoyed all the stops, Lehmann said they were fascinated with the motorcycle tour to Lincoln.

"That's a kick in the pants," he said. "It's so scenic. I think it will really show up great on the show."

The series will be offered to national markets in November and begin showing in January. Lincoln County is eighth in the series and probably will air in late February, but check early next year with the local PBS station for an exact date, Lehmann said.

The company expended an additional \$500,000 recently to open the highway to four lanes from Sudderth Drive to the Ruidoso Downs Race Track, Oulman said earlier.

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Ruidoso council drops impact fees

Two years ago, Ruidoso village leaders first started talking about an impact fee on new development.

Since then it's been studied at length, debated in public, approved unanimously, implemented laboriously and, as of Tuesday night, killed off.

"I believe that this is of little use to us," Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson said of the fee during a short discussion before council unanimously voted to rescind it.

The council approved the fee, which came to \$4,400 per standard new home, last summer, though it did not become effective until Jan. 1, 1999. Discussion about rescinding the fee started three months later in March.

All the money collected by

the village for the fee will be returned. Ruidoso Village Manager Alan Briley said after Tuesday's council session that \$550 had been collected from the monthly installments on impact fees as of May.

Donaldson on Tuesday gave several reasons why the impact fee on new development wasn't working, beginning with its effect on projects to provide much-needed affordable housing in the village.

"It's very difficult with an impact fee to make those types of projects work," he said. "And I think that itself is reason enough to get rid of the fee," he said.

Additionally, he said the problem facing the village is not so much paying for expansion of infrastructure based on growth, but the repair and upkeep of its existing infrastructure.

And with the recent pas-

sage of a one-cent gross receipts tax referendum, improvements to the village's water system will be covered for the next 18-20 years, he added.

A monthly charge on vacant lots has been discussed as an alternative to pay for expansion of the infrastructure.

The charge, called a standby fee, is being researched by village staff and is not yet ready to come before the council for public hearings and a vote.

Councilor Bob Sterchi at Tuesday night's meeting referred to the standby fee, which Donaldson proposed earlier at an annual amount of \$66.96.

"But for those people who are concerned about it, speaking for myself... that is going to be a hard sell," Sterchi said of the fee.

tribal council contacted either man to tell him his name was removed, they said.

"I already have filed an action in tribal court asking to be reinstated as vice president," Enjady said. "That petition has not been heard. Now my attorney and I will be looking at legal action to put my name back on the ballot."

Enjady, an artist by trade, ascended to the vice presidency from a tribal council position after the death of long-time Mescalero leader Wendell Chino in November.

He was removed from office last month by the tribal council along with Ortega amid accusations the two leaders overspent the tribe's annual budget and did not seek approval on some expenses. The council did not accuse the two men of any personal gain.

"The council already said that I could run for president," he said. "Their promises are misleading: It comes to this point and then they let this happen. When are they going to stop? Obviously, I'm a political hurdle for them. They are ignoring the wishes of the people I represent from the tribe. This will continue until the people speak out."

Council member Harlyn Geronimo, one of the candidates for president, agreed with Enjady. Reading from the minutes of the council meeting concerning removal of the two men, Harlyn Geronimo said the council voted 5-2 that Enjady and Ortega had committed no offense serious enough under Article VI of the tribal Constitution to be prohibited from running for office.

"Fair is fair," Harlyn Geronimo said. "If you don't stick to your decisions, why

make them? He (Enjady) has constitutional and civil rights. Let him have his chance." The same goes for Ortega, he said.

As he understands what happened, Harlyn Geronimo said the election board chairman worked with acting tribal president and council member Sara Misquez, also a candidate for president, in reviewing the sign-up list.

The council did not learn until Tuesday that Enjady and Ortega were removed.

"I told the council that I am not satisfied with that decision," Harlyn Geronimo said. Taking the same position were council members Glenda Brusuelas and Larry Shosh, he said.

Named on the list of candidates for president are Misquez, former administrative secretary to Wendell Chino; Harlyn Geronimo, a council member who previously spent a decade on the council in the 1980s and was active nationally in opposing a plan to store nuclear waste on the reservation; Arthur "Butch" Blazer, who serves on the council and works for the Mescalero Indian Agency; Pete Kazhe, who owned the Big Chief tribal store and is husband of former Inn of the Mountain Gods official Jo Kazhe; and Ben Martinez, who apparently recently returned to the reservation.

Martinez may have been removed from the list briefly possibly over a residency issue until he complained to council member and presidential candidate Frederick Chino Sr., Harlyn Geronimo said.

Candidates for vice president are listed as Freddie

Kaydahzinne, director of tribal housing; Joseph Geronimo, a community activist, court representative and council member; Frederick Chino Sr.; Donalyn Torres, who was active with the administration during its

exploration of the nuclear waste storage project that later was dropped; and Dorene E. Fernando, daughter of Bunch Enjady, who for years lived on the Laguna Pueblo where her husband was governor.

"It must be nice to have the power to choose who you are going to run against," Oliver Enjady said.

The tribal constitution states that any tribal member who is at least 25 years of age, is a quarter Mescalero and has lived on the reservation for the preceding six months may sign up to run for office.

The only disqualification is tied to Article VI of the constitution, which prohibits candidates who have been convicted of any felony or serious offense including adultery, bribery, embezzlement, extortion, fraud, forgery, misbranding, perjury, theft, habitual drunkenness or felonious assault or battery.

"They removed me without a trial," Enjady said. "Nothing in that constitution (ineligibility clause) applies to me. At least let me take it to the people for them to decide in the election."

Time and the council influence on the election process is working against him, Enjady said.

The election is only nine days away. Misquez and Blazer could not be reached for comment.

**May this highway
be a happy way**

Target January, 2002, as potentially the earliest start date for major reconstruction of U. S. Highway 70 in the Ruidoso-Hondo valleys.

At least, that's the date that popped up tangentially in the first "information session" about the project called by the State Highway and Transportation Department. The five-stage project time line goes something like this:

- August, 1999: An initial study of the highway.
- November, 1999: A detailed evaluation of alternatives, looking at environmental and community impacts and engineering problems.
- June, 2000: Environmental documentation complete.
- January, 2002: Design and engineering.
- Date unstated: Start of construction.

That first public input session at the Rural Events Center in Glencoe last week attracted some 200 people who have more than a passing interest in the project.

The road under immediate investigation is the 37.5-mile stretch from Ruidoso Downs to Riverside (that's the point where the highway leaves the Hondo Valley and climbs atop the mesa before zipping arrow-like to Roswell).

Along that stretch of highway (and the Ruidoso and Hondo rivers) are the hamlets, farms, orchards and ranches that together create some of the most delightful vistas in the Land of Enchantment.


Artist Peter Hurd made the valley monumental in many, many paintings over almost a half-century. His artist wife, Henriette Wyeth Hurd, captured the flora of the valley in glorious canvases.

Singer Louise Massey's own "Adobe Hacienda" was in the valley, and became a symbol of the joy of Southwestern living for a generation.

More significantly, these valleys cradled the first European settlers who found life-sustaining water there in the early years of the 19th Century. Many, many descendants of those founding families still make their homes in the valley.

Expect a close and abiding interest from the people of the valley as that highway project moves through its multiple stages. (There is no hint that it will be eliminated; not with 12 highway deaths and almost 300 accidents along the stretch in a five-year period; not with major federal highway funding at stake.)

We hope the state's highway engineers will fully realize what may be destroyed even as they build, and preserve all they can, along this most enchanting highway.

Selling cigarettes to juveniles remains a crime

On Wednesday, June 9, the Counseling Center of Ruidoso was assisted by the Special Investigations Division of the New Mexico Department of Public Safety in conducting a tobacco sale compliance check as part of the youth tobacco prevention program of the New Mexico Department of Health.

The operation netted three clerks who sold cigarettes to juveniles. Juvenile volunteers entered 12 stores and businesses in Lincoln County where cigarettes are sold. At six locations, the juveniles were able to purchase cigarettes.

At three locations store clerks sold cigarettes to the juveniles, even though the

clerks asked for and looked at the juveniles' identification cards. Each clerk caught in this operation was issued a criminal citation for selling tobacco product to a juvenile, a misdemeanor.

At three locations the juveniles purchased packs of cigarettes from cigarette vending machines, and the owner of the cigarette vending machines is under investigation. Under the New Mexico Tobacco Products Act, cigarette vending machines are not permitted in establishments open to the public, but only in non-public places or age-controlled locations where juveniles are not permitted or where juveniles must be accompanied by a parent.

The following statistics will indicate the need for preventing teen smoking. According to

the American Lung Association:

- An estimated 430,700 Americans die each year from the effects of cigarette smoking.
- Each year, more Americans die from smoking-related diseases than from AIDS, illicit drug abuse, car accidents, and murder combined.
- Smoking causes 19.5 percent (or 1 in 5) deaths in the United States each year.
- Smoking costs the nation over \$97.2 billion per year in health-care costs and lost productivity, about \$276 per American each year.
- Lung cancer has now surpassed breast cancer as the leading cause of cancer deaths among women.
- At least 3.1 million adolescents smoke; nation-wide, 24.6 percent of high school seniors are current smokers, a 32 percent increase above that reported in 1957. (In the Benson Assets Survey taken in April, 1997, 41 percent of Lincoln County seniors smoked cigarettes in the 30 days prior to the survey.)

However, a recent study by John K. Wiencke, a genetics expert at the University of California, San Francisco School of Medicine gives an even greater reason to discourage teen smoking. The results of his research show that the younger children start to smoke, the less likely they are to break the habit, that how young a person starts is a greater factor in lifetime lung damage than how much or how long one smokes; and that in children under 18 smoking causes dramatic and enduring DNA damage.

As a society, we have an obligation to see that our young people grow up as healthy and strong as possible. We can partly fulfill that obligation by helping them avoid life-threatening drugs.

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With summer activities going on and people on vacation, the last thing on anybody's mind is donating blood.

But, with more people on the highways and participating in those activities, accidents are more probable. That means blood donations are needed more than ever.

New Mexico's blood provider is United Blood Services. The organization serves

46 hospitals in New Mexico and Colorado. Every day in New Mexico, 240 pints of blood are needed to serve the hospitals.

Each donation can help save up to four different lives because it can be separated into different components including plasma, platelets, red blood cells and cryoprecipitate.


Donors should be 17 to 79 years old, weigh at least 110 pounds, and feel well and healthy. They should be off antibiotics for at least three days.

Donors must show identification containing the donor's legal name and one of the following: date of birth, Social Security number, United Blood Services assigned donor number or photo identification.

The frequency of donations is at least eight weeks between whole blood donations and at least three days between platelet, apheresis donations. People should not donate blood if they:

- Have a cold or flu symptoms on the day of donation or do not feel well.
- Have taken oral antibiotics in the last three days.
- Have had hepatitis after the age of 11.
- Have hepatitis or close contact with a person who has had clinical hepatitis within the past 12 months.
- Have a history of cancer in the past 10 years (except some skin or in situ cancers).
- Have had a tattoo, ear or skin piercing, acupuncture, accidental needlestick or come in contact with someone's else's blood in the past 12 months. Ear or skin piercing and acupuncture procedures performed using single use, sterile or properly heat-sterilized equipment are acceptable.
- Have received a blood transfusion in the last 12 months.

Have had malaria within the last three years or traveled to a malaria risk area within last 12 months.

Are or have been pregnant in the past six weeks.

Have been treated for syphilis or gonorrhea in the past 12 months.

Are at risk for HIV exposure, the virus which causes AIDS.

A lady's way with words opens new horizons in radio vignettes

Sherry Barrow made a travel tape last year and now has become a radio star, or at least one in the making.

While people may not recognize Sherry Barrow in person, chances are getting better each day they have heard her voice.

Her radio program, "Listen in with Sherry Barrow," now airs on four radio stations throughout eastern New Mexico and west Texas. Additional stations are in the process of picking up Barrow's short vignettes about life in the southwest, and plans for syndication are in the works — but Barrow doesn't want to rush things just yet.

"I'm trying to go slow with this, even though people seem to be receptive," Barrow said recently.

So receptive, in fact, her name has been passed along to the Washington, D.C. offices of NPR, or National Public Radio.

"I do think that her style would fit in quite nicely with some of the NPR commentaries," Virginia McReynolds, development director at KENW/KMTH, an NPR affiliate station in Portales, said.

"It's about local color that is of interest to people on a wider scale," said McReynolds, who last year encouraged Barrow to start the radio segments. "Certain things about our little piece of the country probably are interesting to people who are in Washington or anywhere in the world."

Each of Barrow's four-minute radio segments offer up a slice of heritage as well as glimpses at the interesting people of the region. She has interviewed more than 100 people — an entire spectrum of characters that she feels are indicative of regional culture.

She interviewed Ray Reed shortly

before his death last year. Reed, locally known as the embodiment of a cowboy, discussed the early days of horse racing in the area. She talked with Michael Hurd, a local artist and member of the Wyeths, America's most prominent family of artists, about his life, his mother Henriette Wyeth, and his reputation.

"I just looked him in the eye, and said: 'OK, are you really a jet-setting playboy?' And he answered it more fully than I was prepared for," Barrow said.

Hurd's introspective comments about his late mother comprised Barrow's most heart-rending interview to date, she said. The most fun interviews were with Capitan second-grade students who recounted the story of

Smokey Bear.

In terms of her strangest interview, Barrow refers to her talk with Heather Joy, of Glenpool, Okla. Joy has a thriving business of making purses from bull scrotums. Since her interview with Barrow, Joy has been on national television talk shows and in newspapers with international circulation.

"That was a fascinating interview. She is a hoot," Barrow said.

McReynolds said Barrow, who has no background or training in radio or television, has the ability to pull interesting information from the people. "She has that sort of personality that makes people feel comfortable and not threatened by sharing a piece of themselves," McReynolds said.

"My husband said I have this sign that goes across my forehead that says 'Tell me your life story,'" Barrow said.

Her radio segments spun out of a previous endeavor, to provide a touring tape for people traveling the Billy the Kid Scenic Byway through Lincoln County's historic, scenic and cultural attractions. Barrow, a former museum director in Texas, started the tape because she thought there wasn't enough readily available information about the area's background.

She began talking with the people along the route who are connected to the local attractions and history. For example, her tape, "Let's Tour: You Drive - I'll Talk," starts with an interview at the Old Mill, Ruidoso's birthplace, with co-owner Delana Michaels.

Barrow's radio pieces began airing last fall. In the seven months since, her production quality has changed, McReynolds said.

"I am fully aware of how much her life, time and energy is going into this, and you can hear it in her broadcasts," McReynolds said. "She has gained a professionalism that has surpassed her earlier work ... Her skill seems to have developed very naturally and quickly; it's like something that she has always done."

Locally, Barrow's radio pieces can be heard on either KENW, found at 91.3, and on the Ruidoso stations of KBUY at 1360 AM and KWES at 93.5 FM. Tracy Walton, general manager

at KBUY/KWES said the station will air Barrow's radio segments on Sundays at about 3 p.m. "As long as we can keep them, as long as she keeps giving them to us. And, of course, as long as the public keeps liking them," Walton said.

Ted Durham, one of Barrow's local sponsors of the radio segments, said "Listen in with Sherry Barrow" has a long-term benefit for the area.

"She's just a good promoter," said Durham, general manager of Sierra Blanca Motors. "There's just a lot of things that she's bringing out that people aren't aware of or have forgotten."

Barrow doesn't just capture voices, she also puts all the interviews on videotape. "It just seems prudent to me to get it on two different mediums," Barrow said. "What's happening is, I'm amassing a pretty good oral history of our area ... there's just no telling what this could be used for."

One use has already been found. Barrow's videotaped interviews are now shown at 1 p.m. Fridays on the public access channel, Channel 11, on Cablevision in Ruidoso.

Barrow is obviously enthusiastic about the work, which she says has only been possible because of the significant support she receives from her husband, Glen Barrow. In addition, she has some philosophies about how life should be lived, and passing an opportunity is not among them.

"I am very adaptable," Barrow said. "I don't limit myself, and I pay attention and take advantage of opportunities when they float my way."

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

Senior housing project near half-way mark

Construction is about 40 percent complete on a \$3.9 million, 60-unit senior housing project on Jack Little Drive, a construction superintendent said recently.
 Ron Reynolds, with CDR Construction of Alamogordo, said Oct. 31 is the target completion date for La Tierra Senior Apartment Homes. The apartments, which are being built with government assistance, will be available to seniors on limited incomes.

As of last week, the project's construction was on schedule, Reynolds said. He has about 35 people are at work on the 6-acre site, though he expected the number of crews to increase shortly.
 Stephen G. Crozier, with Tierra Realty Trust, is the developer of the apartments. His company also has built subsidized housing in Albuquerque and Taos. Crozier did not return telephone calls to his offices requesting information about the project and about the applicant list.

A year ago, the proposed development sparked considerable controversy and was opposed by many neighbors. At the time, the project was proposed as a housing development for low-income families and individuals. Crozier met with representatives of an opposing neighborhood association. The result was a change in the project's design as well as purpose.
 Under the revised plan, residents in the apartments have to be 55 years old or more and have a relatively low income. For example, a qualify-

ing couple could have a combined income of as much as \$14,760, a state official with the New Mexico Mortgage Finance Authority has said.
 According to the new plans submitted to the Ruidoso Planning Department, the complex will consist of 10 one- and two-story buildings including a clubhouse with a kitchen, laundry room, exercise room and a library. The architecture style will use stucco and wood trim. Half of the apartments will have one bedroom and the other half two bedrooms.

Bingaman's legislation seeks to restore crowded forests

WASHINGTON, D. C. — U.S. Senator Jeff Bingaman, D-NM, Monday introduced legislation that is designed to restore New Mexico's state, federal and tribal forests.

Bingaman introduced the legislation, he said, because New Mexico's forests are densely stocked with small-diameter trees that increase the risk of forest fires and reduce the quality and quantity of water in streams flowing from forested watershed.

Dense stands of small-diameter trees also provide very limited habitat for wildlife and produce few timber products. Bingaman said reducing the number of these trees would cut down on the risk of wildfire and increase the availability of wildlife habitat. It also would improve the quality and quantity of water flowing from forested watersheds by reducing the number of trees competing for that water.

"The goal of this bill is to promote healthy watersheds, reduce the risk of wildfire, and restore the forest ecosystem by reducing the number of small-diameter trees in overstocked forests. We also need to improve the use of these small trees once they've been removed," Bingaman said.

Bingaman's legislation calls on community organizations and tribal government representatives to team up with state and federal land management agencies to design and implement forest restoration projects. The legislation, called the "Community Forest Restoration Act," would provide grants of up to \$450,000 over four years to fund each collaborative effort. The bill is designed to encourage communication and joint problem-solving among federal, state and tribal natural resources managers and other groups interested in restoring the diversity and productivity of forests in New Mexico.

"One of the key points of this legislation is that it encourages community and conservation groups to work with land management agencies to come up with creative ideas to restore New Mexico's forests," Bingaman said.

Bingaman's legislation is an experimental approach in collaborative forest restoration and, if successful, would provide a model for use across the country. The idea for his legislation stems from the tours and roundtable discussions he had last summer concerning forest restoration.

Downs seeks emergency broadcast equipment

Soon, Ruidoso Downs village officials will not need to contact local radio stations about a pending flood, leaking gas or other emergency situation.

On Monday, the Ruidoso Downs Village Council approved spending about \$2,200 for equipment to allow village personnel to directly interrupt local radio stations with emergency broadcasts.

Mike Warren, with KRUI radio station, pitched the equipment's purchase to the council, saying it would reduce delays in

getting emergency messages to the public. The encoder/decoder to be purchased will allow the village to bypass the radio operator when emergencies arise, he said.

"It immediately goes on ... there's no messing around," Warren said, adding that the Federal Communication Commission would like all municipalities to have this capability.

Gas leak shuts down Highway 70

Road crews on U.S. Highway 70 inadvertently cut into a natural gas main line Monday

afternoon, prompting officials to stop traffic for about 10 minutes for repairs, Ruidoso Downs Fire Chief Nick Herrera said.

"We were just lucky no one was smoking when it happened," Herrera said Monday.

Herrera said line break occurred at the intersection of Ruidoso Downs Drive and the highway. Gas in the 6-inch main line was turned off in less than 10 minutes after the break, he said. Ruidoso Downs Fire Department staff and equipment stayed at the site until the line was securely covered, Herrera said.

Trailer, contents destroyed by fire in Downs

A plastic tricycle in the yard is all that's left of the family belongings in a mobile home that burned Saturday in Ruidoso Downs.

The fire melted the aluminum front of the home, at 201 S. Parnell Drive in the Ellis Trailer Park and burned much of the contents.

The call came in to the Ruidoso Downs Fire Department at 9:30 p.m. and 15 firefighters and five fire units were at the scene within five minutes, said Fire Chief Nick Herrera.

"It was fully engulfed when we got here. We had the initial flames down in five minutes but we stayed here mopping up and checking until about 2:30 a.m.," Herrera said.

The renters of the 16-by-80 mobile home were not in it when the firefighters arrived but they arrived after the fire department responded.

Herrera said he hasn't seen them since the night of the fire, and "yes, it's unusual" that family members haven't appeared since.

Herrera and Rudy Padilla, an investigator from the New Mexico State Fire Marshall's

Office are investigating the burned out mobile home in search of the cause of the fire.

Herrera said the renters did have renters' insurance.

The owner of this mobile home and one other at the Ellis Trailer Park, Nick Skogland, heard about the fire on his radio scanner.

Skogland happens to be assistant fire chief for Fort Stanton and lives in Capitan.

"I just got through remodeling," Skogland said. "This is the second set of people to live in it since I spent \$8,000 to \$9,000 remodeling last year," he said.

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Hospice, Home Health merges with Presbyterian unit

It's too soon to say if anything will change now that Hospice and Home Health Services of Lincoln County has merged with Presbyterian Medical Services.

"We'll be going through a period of assessment," Jeffrey D. Morgan, executive director of the Presbyterian Medical Services Foundation, said Friday. "The whole staff met on that subject this morning. Too early to say we will expand. Attaining financial stability is the first goal. We want the community to realize we're a partner. We're very community based. We have a local board and need local volunteers."

Morgan's job is to raise money to ensure the home health and hospice services never have to refuse service to anyone.

"When you're providing services in a rural community, fund raising often is a necessity," he said.

Maureen Coleman and Jennifer Chadwick, co-administrators, will continue to direct both programs.

The two not-for-profit entities celebrated the merger Thursday with an ice cream social in the back yard of the home health office on El Paso Road.

Home Health Services of Lincoln County was founded in 1976 by Verna Adams. Facing negative impacts from Medicare changes resulting from the 1997 Balanced Budget Act, Adams decided to look at a merger with another organization to ensure continued survival and delivery of services.

"Twenty three home health agencies closed in the state and probably everyone called us," Morgan said. "We looked at a lot of things. We're not very competitive. We're truly a not-for-profit agency."

Dick Weber, president of the home health board, said his group knew there is strength

in numbers. "In this community, it is the only way to survive," he said. "We knew a merger was inevitable."

While home health investigated a merger, so did Hospice of Lincoln County.

"We no longer have to struggle by ourselves to make a go of it," said Peggy McClellan, president of the Hospice Board of Director. "We are fortunate to join with PMS to continue to bring hospice services to the community."

Founded in 1969 and headquartered in Santa Fe, PMS has clinics and operations in 17 New Mexico counties, said Chrissy Salazar, company information officer. Chief avenues of revenue are Medicare and Medicaid reimbursements, with community support. No one is turned away, Salazar said. The agency uses

a sliding fee scale to serve all segments of the population.

PMS, which is not an affiliate of Presbyterian Health Care, the Albuquerque entity that manages the county hospital in Ruidoso, provides medical, dental and human service programs to under-served populations in mostly rural communities in the state, Morgan said. The programs include health centers, home health care and hospice, developmental disabilities programs for children and adults, comprehensive behavioral health programs, substance abuse treatment, Head Start programs, AIDS and other health education and counseling, and a pharmacy consulting service.

The company employees 1,100 people, most of whom live and work in the more than 30 communities where services are provided, Salazar said.

To survive collaboration with other agencies - such as the local hospital - is imperative, Morgan said.

PMS president James Riebsomer, who was enjoying a sundae with others Thursday, said the company will continue on track with the mission and view of how home care and hospice needs will be developed within the community.

Hospice helps patients diagnosed with terminal illness. The aim is to provide physical, emotional and spiritual comfort for the patient as well as the family or care givers, Salazar said.

Patients are admitted for service according to their needs.

Home health services provides in-home care including skilled nursing visits, home health aides and medical social workers, as well as physical, speech and occupational therapies.

Highway 70 right-of-way/comes under criticism

County Commissioner Rick Simpson says he's been busy with phone calls from residents worried about right-of-way acquisition and safety issues surrounding access to U.S. 70.

Speaking last week during the first information session on possible improvements to the highway, Simpson said, the valley is so narrow in spots, that if more right-of-way is purchased, homes would have to be moved closer to the river, and that area is designated as a flood plain.

Hubert Quintana, a trustee for the estate of the late Peter Hurd, a renowned artist and valley resident, questioned the impact on irrigation ditches, established decades ago. Many lie on the highway right-of-way.

District engineer Mohammad Moabed said the state doesn't want irrigation ditches on its rights-of-way and would either move them or put in culverts to run underground.

In response to a question from a resident about the basis to be used to acquire private land needed for the highway construction, state highway official Luis Alba said the process is set in state statutes and is paid by the acre based on the going rate for larger parcels.

"That's very unfair," the resident said. A small area in front of a house would be more valuable than an acre on a ranch and many houses are built close to the highway.

Valley resident and artist Michael Hurd said the state might see a significant decrease in accidents if it would simply redo some guardrails, redesign off-on ramps and create more highway shoulder, instead of a massive reconstruction project.

"It's like Ruidoso that allowed houses to encroach on the old airport property until it became unsafe and a new airport was needed," he said. "It's a self-fulfilling prophecy. A solution is not always a solution, simply the beginning point for a new technological problem."

Artist Linda Miller said deer were involved in a quarter of the accidents on the highway with two lanes and speculated that the number would be higher if they had to cross four lanes of traffic to reach the river on the other side.

"This project would destroy commuting to Roswell for years," one man said. He suggested an alternate route be built to handle military convoys and semi-trucks and get them off the existing highway. Currently, semis account for between 20 and 22 percent of the 5,000 cars that travel U.S. 70 daily, Moabed said.

"Once you go to four lanes, you'll have a whole new set of problems," a resident said. With four lanes and frontage roads, most of the narrow valley will be under concrete, he contended.

Frontage roads may play a key role in the construction plan in an effort to provide school buses an alternative to stopping on the highway and children the option of not having to walk along the road shoulder, said project consultant David Pennington.



are the Zia Derby Final for 3-year-olds and the Master Salls Handicap. Post time each day is 1 p.m.


Yulla Yulla wins wins

Lincoln County senior citizens were honored Thursday night for staying in shape and having fun while doing it.

The Senior Olympics Awards Banquet at the Ruidoso Senior Center honored those seniors who qualified for the state tournament. The state meet will be the last week of July and the middle of August in Roswell and Las Vegas, N.M., Bart Young, coordinator of the Lincoln County Senior Olympics, said.

Forty-five senior citizens from Lincoln County will be going to the 21st state competition this year, while seven individuals are headed for the national meet, Young said. Seventeen other people qualified for nationals, but because of the expense and previous plans, are unable to attend.

"The seven people going to nationals qualified last year. The national meet is every two years, so every other year we're competing for nationals," Young said.

C.E. Chavez, Martha Chavez, Mary N. Conley, Lester Lanelli, Yvonne Lanelli, Robert W. McCann, and Cindy A. Sanchez, will be con-

tending against 10,000 other seniors from around the United States at the national meet in Orlando, Florida in October, Young said.

Mr. and Mrs. Chavez compete in bowling, as do McCann and Sanchez. Conley is a swimmer, and Mr. and Mrs. Lanelli play table tennis.

Statewide the Senior Olympics consist of 26 different sports. Locally, however, Young said, they competed in about 12 of those sports, including cycling, horse shoes, table tennis, tennis, swimming, track and field, golf, eight-ball pool, the race-walk, basketball free throw, bowling, and shuffleboard.

Young said that the competitions took place at different sites, including Capitan, Carrizozo, Ruidoso, and Ruidoso Downs, depending on the particular event.

Delivering bad news by e-mail is more accurate, less painful, study suggests

LINTHICUM, MD — Delivering bad news by e-mail rather than personally or by phone insures a more accurate message and less discomfort for the messenger, according to a study in a journal of the Institute for Operations Research and the Management Sciences (INFORMS).

The study, "Straight Talk: Delivering Bad News Through Electronic Communication," appears in the current issue of Information Systems Research, an INFORMS publication.

The authors are Stephanie Watts Sussman, Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, and Lee Sproull, Boston University School of Management.

The authors note that businesses and other organizations are affected by what earlier studies describe as "The Mum Effect." Because communicating bad news is hard not only for the recipient but also the messenger, people are reluctant to deliver bad news and often distort or delay news to avoid the unpleasant task.

"Your project has been cancelled ... you didn't get the promotion ... you have to rewrite the report. No one likes to hear bad news; few people like to deliver

it either," write the authors. "However, in organizations, receiving bad news or negative information can be a first step toward improvement."

Implications for organizations

Their conclusion that "computer-mediated communication" (CMC) can increase honesty and accuracy in delivering negative information challenges current norms.

Nowadays, the authors note, personal delivery of bad news is a signal that the news is important and that the deliverer cares about the recipient.

Delivering bad news electronically flies in the face of these norms and might cause the recipient to discount the news or take offense at the choice of delivery media.

This may change, the authors believe.

"The increasingly widespread use of electronic media for organizational communication may alter these norms over time, especially in instances where face-to-face interaction is not possible due to geographical separation," the authors write.

The researchers also suggest that management may find

staff more forthcoming when they can deliver an unpopular message using e-mail.

"Subordinates are frequently the first to learn of bad news, but are often loathe to convey it to their superiors," they write. "Electronic information delivery might be particularly useful in upward communication situations, where negative information is often distorted."

A new take on flaming

The authors believe their research may also help explain the phenomenon of "flaming."

"Flaming has been cited as evidence that computer-mediated communication may cause hostile communication behavior," they write. "This study suggests an alternative explanation. People seem to do less 'cushioning the blow' of negative information when they use computer-mediated communication."

The study

Building on previous research in this area, the authors conducted an experiment with 117 subjects, all Boston University undergraduates.

The participants delivered positive or negative information

to fellow students in one of three ways: (1) in person; (2) by phone; or (3) by e-mail.

The task entailed delivering feedback to a "student" about his or her résumé, which the student had submitted to the campus career counseling center for comments and recommendations.

For purposes of the experiment, the résumé belonged to a surrogate student whom the participant believed was a real student.

Participants were given a description of the task, the annotated résumé, and a list of feedback items to be delivered.

After completing the experimental task, participants filled out a questionnaire that included the measures of satisfaction and relationship.

The authors analyzed responses taking into account how the message was delivered.

Pointing out students' mistakes caused considerable discomfort for the communicators, the researchers found.

Their research shows that participants distorted negative information less when using computer-mediated communication than in the face-to-face condition.

There was essentially no negative distortion of positive information in any of the communications.

There was no significant difference in frequency of distortion of negative information between participants communicating face-to-face and participants communicating via telephone.

However, those using telephone distort negative information significantly more than do those using computer-mediated communication.

Teaching the art of the crafts

The Hubbard
Museum of the American West
brings children and instructors
together to share in creation

Pride shining out of young eyes and hands busily shaping artistic creations are the images that can be seen at the Fine Arts in Historic Lincoln workshop for kids.

"Art has been my favorite thing since I was like three years old," Tommy Malone, 12, a Ruidoso summer resident, said.

The workshop's week long classes, hosted by the Hubbard Museum of the American West, begin at 9:30 a.m. and end at 3:30 p.m. in the historic town of Lincoln. They are limited to the first 25 student, grades 5 through 10, who register, Ray Barela, curator of education for the Hubbard Museum of the American West and Historic Lincoln, said. There is a \$6 weekly fee per session.

Twenty-three kids from Hondo, Carrizozo, Capitan, Nogal, Lincoln, and Ruidoso attended the first of their four week long sessions, Barela said.

The first session, June 21 through 25, was teaching arts and crafts. This involved stone art carving, weaving, clay pottery, and painting.

"We're not only teaching them arts and crafts, but also how they tie into history and the area we're in," Jane Terrel of Capitan, who taught the stone art carving class, said.

Franci Bergener, of Carlsbad, was the two-dimensional art, drawing and painting teacher. Throughout the week the students worked on

perspective, using different mediums, while creating likenesses of some of the surrounding scenery and historic buildings, Bergener said.

"They have been doing so much. They really get into it. It's just fantastic," Bergener said.

"I've liked all of it. We've done a bunch of fun stuff that I've never done before," Audrey Thomas, 12, of Hondo, said. Her sister, Morgan Thomas, 10, said she liked the rock carving and making clay plates the best.

Ronda Dougherty, who instructed the students in clay pottery at her Earthly Greens and Pottery shop in Lincoln, not only allowed the children to make their own creations, but also taught them about the feelings colors can evoke when decorating their pieces.

"Pottery is fun, but you get sort of messy," Teresa Woodard, 10, of Capitan, said.

"I like the rock carving because it's kind of a challenge, but fun too," Robert Hammett, 12, of Capitan, said. "It's really easy once you learn how to do it, though, and you can make cool stuff."

"Give them the materials and the opportunity and it's amazing what they can do," Pam Topper, of Nogal, who taught the weaving class, said.

"I like it because we're always doing something with our hands," Woodard said.

"We're reaching kids who have limited fine arts in their public schools because of bud-

get restraints," Barela said. "These kids are having so much fun, they don't even want to take the time for a break during the day."

The students' art work will be displayed for a month at the Historic Lincoln Museum, Barela said.

All instructors are Lincoln County artists who are receiving a small stipend for their services. Though, according to Barela, the instructors aren't receiving even close to the amount they deserve for the time they have poured into these sessions.

"These artists are passing on their skills and talent to the young people," Barela said.

Transportation to the workshop is available from Hondo, Carrizozo, and Capitan. Sierra Blanca Motors leased the necessary vans to the program at a very good rate, Barela said, and all of the van drivers are volunteers. A food wagon was also loaned to the group for their use.

The \$10,000 cost of the program, which includes materials, food, the instructors' stipends, and transportation, was paid for in part by an individual donor who wishes to remain anonymous, Barela said. This donor is a supporter of the fine arts for children and wants to help make a difference, he said. The Billy the Kid Casino underwrote the cost for food, which includes lunch and snacks. The museum filled in with the rest of the expense.

"There are so many willing and gracious people who stepped forward to help these children," Barela said.

The next session of the fine arts workshop, July 5 through 9, will be covering music, which will include violin, fiddle, reading music, percussion, guitar, dulcimer, baglads, storytelling and poetry. July 12 through 16 will cover dance as an art form. The children will learn folk dancing, basic ballet, modern jazz and tap. Students attending the dance classes are encouraged to attend the final session, July 19 through 23, which will focus on theater, speech and drama, Barela said. These classes will cover the basic concepts in stage positions, stage management, set-building, lighting, acting, voice projection, enunciation, costuming and make-up. Students from weeks three and four will come together and perform a short melodrama on July 23 at the Lincoln Pageant Grounds from 6 p.m. to 7:45 p.m.

Barela said children can sign up for sessions separately, though many of the children already have signed up for all four weeks.


Saving Our Nation's Treasure The Star-Spangled Banner



O, say can you see the Star-Spangled Banner? Yes, you can still see it, but the flag that inspired our national anthem is no longer hanging at the Smithsonian Institution, where it has been on display since 1907.

For the next three years the flag will be undergoing preservation work in a lab specially designed so the public can watch. Visitors can see the work going on at the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History in Washington, D.C. The Mini Page celebrates Independence Day with a story about this great symbol of American freedom.

For about 10 years the Star-Spangled Banner was protected with a linen curtain. The curtain was lifted about seven times a day for 5 minutes so the public could see the flag.




In 1914, the Smithsonian tried to preserve the flag. Seamstresses hand-sewed a linen backing onto it using about 2 million stitches.

The linen backing

The linen backing is beginning to wear out. Someday it might not support the flag. The weight of the backing could actually damage it.

The backing cannot be yanked out as you would rip out a seam. It will take experts at least two snips to take out each of the 2 million stitches! Just removing the backing will take about a year.

The flag is made mostly of wool, with cotton stars. Air, sunlight, dust and pollution have harmed these natural fibers.



In 1982, the flag was cleaned while remaining on display.


Giant-sized rescue

Preserving the Star-Spangled Banner is the largest single textile, or cloth, conservation project ever done by the museum.


The cost of making the flag was \$405.90. The cost of today's preservation is expected to total about \$18 million.

Before the preservation work was started, a NASA scientist took special pictures of the flag. He was able to tell what spots needed extra care. Once the linen backing is removed, 10 experts will gently clean the flag using a specially adapted vacuum and dry-cleaning chemicals.

In 2002, the restored flag will be placed in a new climate-controlled viewing case.



The flag's damaged areas show up here.




While the flag is being cleaned, most of it will be rolled up on a huge tube. The portion being repaired will be laid out on a large table.

Respecting the flag

The U.S. Congress has set up guidelines on how our flag should be treated. Here are a few of them:

- When the flag is displayed flat against the wall, the stars should be at the top and to the flag's own right.
- Do not lower the flag to any person or thing.
- Do not display the flag upside down unless as a signal of distress.




- Do not place any other flag above our flag, except at the United Nations. There, the U.N. flag flies above all others, and the flags of all the countries are flown in alphabetical order.

When a flag is flown outside, it is usually flown during the day and taken down at night. In public places, flags flying at night are often lighted.

A flag should be taken down if the weather is so bad it could be badly damaged.

A flag flying at half-staff, or halfway up the pole, stands for mourning.

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The making of the flag

The Star-Spangled Banner was made by Mary Pickersgill and her 13-year-old daughter, Caroline, in Baltimore in 1813. It had been ordered by Lt. Col. George Armistead to fly over Fort McHenry in Baltimore during the War of 1812.

It was about three stories (30 feet) high and 42 feet long. At that time, flags flying over forts were giant-sized so they would be visible for a long way.

The flag was so huge there were no rooms in the Pickersgill house big enough to lay out the pieces so it could be sewn together. They had to take it to a local brewery where they could stretch it all out.

The War of 1812



One of the reasons America went to war in 1812 was that the British had been attacking American ships. The British wanted to stop America from trading with their enemy, France. The British also captured American sailors and forced them to serve in the British navy.

Star-Spangled History

In 1814 the British invaded Washington, D.C. After burning the Capitol and the White House, drunken British troops went into Maryland. A doctor, William Beanes, organized a posse to lock up these troublemakers.

The British captured Dr. Beanes and took him onto their ship anchored in Baltimore Harbor. A Washington lawyer, Francis Scott Key, went on board to try to negotiate Dr. Beanes' release.

Bombs bursting in air


Francis Scott Key was held prisoner on the British ship for 10 days. The admiral refused to let him leave until the British had finished bombing Fort McHenry.

On the morning of Sept. 13, the British began shelling the fort. On board the British ship, Francis Scott Key watched the British fire about 1,800 bombs.

At night, he could see the bombs bursting in the air, but could not tell if the fort had surrendered or not. About 2:00 in the morning, the British stopped firing. Francis Scott Key thought this meant the Americans had lost.

The British had actually stopped bombing so they could secretly land troops. When this failed, they started bombing again about 4 a.m.

Finally, in the dawn's early light, Francis Scott Key could see the flag was still flying. The Americans had not lost after all!



After catching sight of the flag in the middle of the bombing of Fort McHenry, Francis Scott Key took a letter from his pocket and jotted down the famous words on the back of it.

The Song

Francis Scott Key called his song "The Defense of Fort McHenry." He wrote it to a popular British tune.

He had written other words to this tune before. His earlier song was about the American victory against the Barbary pirates in 1805.

"The Star-Spangled Banner" was a big hit right away. Congress made it our national anthem in 1931.



Francis Scott Key (1779-1843) wrote the words to several hymns. One of his hymns is still sung in the Episcopal Church.

The anthem

O, say can you see, by the dawn's early light,
What so proudly we
hailed at the twilight's last gleaming?
Whose broad stripes and bright stars,
through the perilous fight
O'er the ramparts we watched were so
gallantly streaming?
And the rockets' red glare, the bombs
bursting in air,
Gave proof through the night that our
flag was still there,
O, say, does that star-spangled banner yet
wave
O'er the land of the free and the home of
the brave?

POOP SCOOP

Wildlife is on the move around Ruidoso. If you weren't aware of the foraging and territorial changes, by now I'm sure your dogs have alerted you.

Mine regularly announced the arrival of deer in our backyard or a bear walking down the road.

Although I used to enjoy the antics of raccoons who frequented my upstairs balcony to snack on bird seed and try to drink from the hummingbird feeder, I've had to discourage those visits, because my dogs enjoy sleeping on the porch. One encounter between a cornered raccoon and a dog is upsetting enough to watch - you don't want a repeat.

Fortunately neither was injured, but the possible exposure to disease for the dog and to wounds for the raccoon is just too high a risk.

You've heard it before, but state Game and Fish officials say I can't repeat the warning too many times - don't feed the bears. Don't leave anything outside at night that could become a meal for them, such as dog or cat food.

While the sight of bear cubs is engaging, if you feed them, when they grow up they will have little fear of humans and may come to depend upon non-natural food sources. That's bad from a nutritional standpoint and for the bear's ultimate survival.

Nuisance bears often end up being shot or trapped and trans-

ferred to another area, where they may not last long trying to challenge resident bears for territory.

When they no longer fear humans, bears also can try to enter homes through screen doors or windows, presenting a danger to the residents or just generally making a mess in the kitchen.

Just as added incentive, if you're caught feeding the bear, you can be fined by a game warden.

About this time of the year, gardeners may start seeing their lettuce and other vegetables being munched down by rabbits, skunks, deer and assorted nocturnal ground traveling creatures.

My philosophy is pretty tolerant. If the plants help the animals, I don't mind losing some of them. But there's also a health consideration when you don't know what's been eating the plant you're about to harvest. Fencing off a garden may become a necessity.

Skunks can carry rabies and other diseases, field rodents carry bubonic plague, salmonella, hantavirus. Rabbits and deer host ticks.

So enjoy the wildlife, but from a distance and don't deliberately try to lure them into your space. Be satisfied with the wonderful assortment of birds Lincoln County attracts either on migration or year-around. On a good day, you might see a blue heron, a sand crane, hummingbirds, woodpeckers and the gorgeous stellar jay.

"As soon as they asked (me) to do this, my only request was, 'Please, please, please let me sing "America the Beautiful." With a symphony, the orchestration is going to be beautiful."

Messina continues, "These were some of my goals in life: to perform in Washington on the Fourth of July and to perform with an orchestra. And here I am doing both."

The performers also pay homage to Duke Ellington and Hoagy Carmichael. While the younger generation may not

recognize the names, the tunes they introduced to the world will strike a familiar chord.

Of course, every July Fourth needs a light show. Just blocks from the Capitol, fireworks illuminate the night sky.

"I'm always very moved when the fireworks start up over the Washington Monument," Bostwick says. "No matter where I am on that stage, I try to grab a view of that. Tears always come to my eyes when the music starts up and the fireworks explode. You can't help but feel proud to be an American."

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

Disney offers preteen dreams in *Backstreet Boys in Concert*

Girls who skipped school and begged parents to take them to Times Square are standing five deep behind barricades while New York police and an army of private security officers patrol. So what if they don't have tickets to the concert? Or if all they can do is stand in front of the exquisitely appointed New Amsterdam Theatre and scream for several hours? Maybe they can catch a glimpse of their idols, the Backstreet Boys.

The Boys, as those who adore them call the group of five Southerners, are taping a show, *Backstreet Boys in Concert*, which airs Saturday, July 10, on the Disney Channel.

Just in case you're over 18 and somehow missed them, the Backstreet Boys are hot. They've sold more than 27 million records in 48 countries, and their latest CD, *Millennium*, was released in May.

Mention their names — A.J. McLean, Howie Dorough, Nick Carter, Kevin Richardson and Brian Littrell — and the uniform response from fans is a shriek.

In an exclusive interview after the concert, Littrell, 24, admits the adoration has been difficult to adjust to.

"In the beginning, it was very overwhelming," he says, slouching in a

folding chair. "It's what you make of it. ... We are just real people. I give a lot of time to CDs and videos, and then I try to relax, play golf, basketball. Sometimes I just like to sit on my patio and drink coffee."

In his soft Kentucky drawl, he adds that it's disconcerting to have to buy groceries in the middle of the night. Like the others, though, he is gracious with his fans, which seems easy when large, armed men keep them at arm's length. Still, obsessed fans have managed to hide in the storage space of the Boys' tour bus and climb over barbed wire to get into their dressing rooms.

Some mothers, including Wendy Blosser of Norwalk, Conn., remember being so smitten. In her case, it was 1960s teen idol Bobby Sherman. And because of that erstwhile love and her devotion to her daughter Samantha,

10, Blosser says, "We tried and tried and tried to get tickets. I kept calling radio stations until 2 a.m."

Inside, scrunchies on arms, braces on teeth and wraparound smiles on their faces, the girls shriek as one. A stagehand adjusts a microphone, and the screaming begins.

It's contagious. The moment one girl hits that note, the others join in until the decibel level ratchets the spine of anyone over age 30.

The girls likewise scream the lyrics to each song. A casual survey of adults finds no one heard actual words.

Starting with "Quit Playing Games (With My Heart)," the group works its magic. When Carter holds an audience member's hand while singing "All I Have to Give," the girl clutches her heart with her other hand.

As Carter releases the anonymous fan's hand and returns to center stage, her girlfriends collapse into her arms to touch the hand that held Nick's. The set also includes "As Long as You Love Me," "Everybody (Backstreet's Back)" and "I Want It That Way."

Few are as lucky as the young lady onstage. Most are like Katie Petrikoni, 14, of South Brunswick, N.J., who knew every word to each song and found it impossible to sit at all.

Most of the kids will be exhausted the next day, a school day, and will likely skip classes again.

"I don't have to go to school. But I'm going to so I can brag to my friends," Petrikoni says proudly.



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


