Business owners don't mind the lines

• Visitors filled Ruidoso area shops, hotels and restaurants — even those along the path of highway construction — over the holiday weekend.

People lined up to enter the Deck House restaurant this past holiday weekend — a refreshing change following weeks of scarce customers because of road construction in front of the restaurant.

"It was absolutely terrific," restaurant employee Cathy Chaplin said Tuesday. "The road crews were shut down, people could park out front ... We had waiting lines every day. It was great."

The Fourth of July weekend is

one of the biggest weekends, if not the biggest, of the year for local businesses to reap economic benefit from tourism dollars, said Joan Zagone, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce. A typical Fourth of July brings about 30,000 people into the Ruidoso area, she said.

This year, the numbers appeared about the same and perhaps slightly above based on reports from several business operators. However, while business was definitely good for some establishments along highway construction areas on both Mechem Drive and U.S. Highway 70, it was slightly less than typical for a Fourth of July weekend, Chaplin and other business representatives said.

For businesses outside of construction on Sudderth Drive, holiday transactions were better than normal, business operators said.

"It was fantastic. I haven't seen crowds like that in eight or nine years," said Dean Fowler, co-owner of two nightclubs in Mid-town Ruidoso. "We had lines at both bars by 9:30 p.m."

Despite the crowds, people were friendly and everything ran smoothly at both nightclubs, Win, Place and Show and Quarters across the street, Fowler said. He estimated a total of 1,800 to 2,000 customers at the nightclubs over the weekend.

Tina Barnes, who oversees personnel at the Cattle Baron Steak

Ousted VP seeks to stop election

Former Mescalero Apache tribal vice president Oliver Enjady is asking the tribal court to block the special election Friday until his name can be put on the ballot.

He filed in tribal court Tuesday for an injunction, contending that the election should not have been scheduled pending the court's handling of his petition to be reinstated as vice president. He also is contesting the tribal election board's decision to remove his name from the list of candidates for president, pointing to a 5-2 vote by the tribal council in May that he was eligible to run. When the election does take place, his name should appear on the ballot, because he signed up in time and meets all the requirements, Enjady contends.

He was removed by the tribal council in May as vice president, and Paul Ortega as president, amid accusations that they overspent the tribe's annual budget. Enjady contends the action came during a meeting when he was not present and that he was denied due process.

"I wasn't tried in a court, even a so-called tribal council court," he said Tuesday. "Hardened criminals get their day in court, even if they have to be extradited. They violated my rights by having court without me present. This special election shouldn't be called until the hearing on my reinstatement in tribal court and the date hasn't been set on that yet. What happens if the court agrees with me — where would that leave the new vice president?"

Speaking for the law firm of Fetting, Bloom and Quinlan that represents the tribe, attorney John Wheeler said he could make no comment Tuesday, because he has not received notification of the action by Enjady. A copy was to be faxed to the firm Tuesday afternoon.

Enjady is represented by attorney Marc Prelo. Named in the lawsuit as defendants are the tribal council, trib-

al election board and their members individually. The court is being asked to direct the election board to place Enjady's name on the ballot and to order the tribal council not to interfere. Tied to that request is that the election be postponed until the election board complies.

"It is abundantly clear that (Enjady) has not been convicted of any crime by the courts of the Mescalero Apache Tribe," Prelo wrote in the suit. "There is no legal ground for the election board and/or the Tribal Council to refuse to place (him) on the ballot..."

Attached to the suit is a copy of the minutes of the council's May 28 meeting in which by a vote of 5-2, council members agreed Enjady had done nothing to preclude him from running for elective office.

"The respondents by their arbitrary and capricious action and total disregard for the rights of (Enjady) and the members of the (tribe), by refusing to place (him) on the ballot, are attempting to disenfranchise the people of the (tribe)," Prelo wrote.

One of the tribal council members who voted for removal of Enjady and Ortega has changed his mind.

Harlyn Geronimo, a candidate for president who would face Enjady in the election along with four other candidates, said tribal financial officer Tom Gallagher, acting president Sara Misquez and Quinlan were the three people who fed information to the rest of the council about the financial problem they claimed was caused by Ortega and Enjady.

"After reviewing part of the facts, it's impossible for \$200,000 to have a major impact on the current financial status of the tribe," Geronimo said Tuesday. "If there was a problem, why didn't Tom provide the information earlier. We didn't start getting month-

Gardner of Ruidoso said.

The children weren't simply there auditioning because they had to be; this production was something they wanted to be a part of.

"I like acting a lot, and I like singing and dancing," said Hannah Kashmar, 8, of Ruidoso, who was a pumpkin in the "Cinderella" produc-

tion last year.

Fifty parts were filled for the production, which is a take-off of "The Wizard of Oz." All 46 children who auditioned were cast in the show.

Missoula Children's Theater productions usually assign several people to be assistant directors back stage, but because of smaller audition numbers, all were cast for on-stage parts.

"Even though there were only just enough kids, they all really deserved to be on stage," said Nicole Eirenborn, one of the Missoula Children's Theater directors, who plays Cyclone Sal in the production.

"We had a very hard time picking who to cast. They were all so expressive," said Brian Engelmeyer, the other MCT director, who plays Tinhorn in the performance.

This is Eirenborn and Engelmeyer's fifth week on the road with MCT. They've been casting and directing children in different towns to perform "The Wiz of the West."

Practice is from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. every day with performances at 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. Saturday at the Spencer Theater.



ly printouts until after the (removal) hearing. It took two weeks before I could get some of the information I requested and a complete breakdown of the financial issues.

"Because of the background and knowledge of the three people, we listened and what they said carried weight. Now I don't think Paul and Oliver are at fault. I

think they were removed without providing solid evidence."

After reviewing all the tribal departments, it appears Enjady and Ortega were about on target for the budget year, Geronimo said, but he added that he still is not convinced he has seen all of the tribal financial information.

Enjady said that after studying the financial records, the council is holding him responsible for \$2,219 spent for travel

and per diem for the tribe's education department and for the judicial branch.

"I've asked each department head if they have the money to cover that in their budgets and they said yes," Enjady said. "As of May when the people were told we were in the red, 49 percent of the budget (based on a fiscal year starting in October) had not been spent. Is that being in the red? That's lying to the people and scaring them."

Tribal council dumps proposed alcohol ban

A proposed law that would ban consumption of alcohol or use of drugs at Mescalero Apache ceremonies and dances failed to muster support among tribal council members.

Submitted by Joseph Geronimo, a licensed alcohol and drug counselor and candidate for tribal vice president, the ordinance was endorsed by abuse prevention groups before he took it to the council, Geronimo said.

"I was so sure this would pass, I had a donation to buy T-shirts with 'Apache warriors fighting back against alcohol and drugs' on them to pass out to people and had to give the check back," Geronimo said Thursday.

The proposed penalty for

violating the ordinance within a one-mile radius of a ceremony was to be a mandatory 24 hours in jail, not less than 24 hours of community service and required counseling. Road blocks would be established to enforce the law, and alcoholic beverages found would be confiscated.

Arthur "Butch" Blazer, one of the council members who voted against the ordinance with Sara Misque, Christie LaPaz and Frederick Chino, said Tuesday, the council was worried the measure might violate the civil rights of tribal members.

"Instead the council is concentrating on better enforcement of existing laws that already prohibit drinking in public places, he said.

"I'm hearing comments from members that this year

there were fewer problems at the ceremonial grounds with alcohol than in a long time," said Blazer, who is running for tribal president. "We brought in additional law enforcement this year and are cracking down on violators."

But Geronimo says more needs to be done and that too many incidents of violence connected to drinking at ceremonies and celebrations have occurred in the past.

"I was really hoping for this ordinance to be passed and I'm very sad it did not," Geronimo said. "But I'm not giving up. I will fight for this just as I

fought against the proposal to store nuclear waste on the reservation. I'm going to fight that much harder. One day we will have alcohol- and drug-free celebrations and no one will serve on the tribal council without being tested to ensure they are drug and alcohol free."

Geronimo also was critical of the tribal bar on the reservation, saying the money generated there does not

come back to the tribe, but should be used to treat those with alcohol addiction problems.

"They're killing our people with it," he said.

Letter charges that members uneasy about leadership

As tension mounts over a special election on Friday for Mescalero Apache president and vice president, a six-page unsigned letter critical of the tribal council is being circulated on the reservation that abuts Ruidoso.

The letter is addressed to Sara Misque, council member and acting president, and council members Frederick Chino Sr., Harlyn Geronimo, Arthur "Butch" Blazer, Larry Shosh, Christie La Paz Jr. and Glenda Brusuelas, as well as housing director Freddie Kaydahzinne. It poses questions to the eight

about accusations of past wrongdoing, acts of favoritism, violations of the tribal constitution, inappropriate behavior and lack of ethics.

"The letter is anonymous," Misque said Thursday. "We are not paying attention to it. If it was a serious issue, why not sign their names so we could respond to them."

A tribal member who received the letter but asked not to be identified, said council members each are too busy vying for the top spot.

"If they had the interest of the tribe in their hearts, they would try to work as a team," the member said.

Many tribal members are

disturbed that a non-elected official - Misque - seems to be in charge until the election, the tribal member added. Misque was appointed to the tribal council by council members after Oliver Enjady was elevated to vice president.

The council has been operating short-handed since Misque took over ousted president Paul Ortega's chair and council member Silas Cochise resigned.

The election Friday allows Mescalero voters to select a president and vice president to serve until the regular general election in November. Ortega and Enjady were removed by the tribal council, which

accused the two men of overspending the tribe's annual budget and of spending money without council approval.

Misque confirmed Thursday that Berle Kanseah, a former council member who is active in cultural preservation, recently failed to be approved to fill the vacancy left by Cochise.

Kanseah was nominated by Fred Chino on a motion to approve a resolution appointing him, which was seconded by Blazer. But the motion failed to pass with Shosh, Brusuelas, Harlyn Geronimo and La Paz voting against it.

Ruidoso woman killed in Highway 70 crash

A Ruidoso woman died early Monday when the car in which she was riding was hit by a Ford Explorer trying to pass a semi-truck in a no-passing zone.

Christine Sanchez, 50, died when the 1986 Chevrolet driven by Jacobo Sanchez, 52, was hit on the passenger side. She is the third fatality on U.S. 70 this year from Ruidoso east to the Chaves County line.

New Mexico State

Policeman Chris Mirabal reported that at 2 a.m. a 1998 Explorer driven by Tamara Schones, 23, of Edmund, Okla., was traveling east on U.S. 70 near Fox Cave between Ruidoso Downs and Glencoe. Schones attempted to pass a semi-truck in a no-passing zone, then swerved left trying to avoid a head-on collision with the Sanchez car, which was going west.


Charges against Schones are pending. Alcohol was involved in the accident, Mirabal reported.

Three passengers in the

Schones car received minor injuries. They are Elizabeth McCormick of Dallas, Texas, Justin Mairot of Roswell and Charles Smith of Adventura, Fla.

Jacobo Sanchez and four passengers riding in the back of his pickup sustained a variety of injuries, but none were life threatening, Mirabal reported. The passengers are Adrian Sanchez, 27, Daniel Vigil, 7, Regina Vigil, 10 and Adriana Sanchez, 3, all of Ruidoso.

and Seafood Restaurant, said the crowds entering the restaurant Saturday and Sunday were larger than in past July Fourth weekends, with wait times of up to 80 minutes on Saturday and Sunday.

Lori Robertson, co-owner of Sitzmark Chalet on Sudderth Drive, said her establishment was full from Thursday through Sunday and that she had to turn people away.

"I don't know (how many) offhand, but it was bunch," Robertson said. "I called around trying to find some people a room, and everybody was pretty full. A lot of them had to go back down to Alamogordo."

Ed Krause, general manager at Casa Blanca restaurant on Mechem Drive, said business was good perhaps even better than last year. Highway construction has not yet moved to his restaurant's side of the road. When it does, Casa Blanca will feel the effects, Krause said.

"It probably slowed business down on this end of town, but it's not detrimental yet (for Casa Blanca)," he said.

Bert Brunell, who operates the long-

time Brunell's clothing store in Midtown, said gross sales were slightly higher than the holiday average. His staff usually surveys customers' impressions of the town, and when it came to highway construction, not "a single word" was heard.

"So to me, it's just like the rest of America - people are used to seeing road construction," Brunell said. "Our tourists are unaffected by the construction, but that's not to say that our businesses aren't."

At the Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Casino, Rick Baugh, general manager, said the weekend's biggest attendance was Sunday with 6,200 people. "Between 6,000 and 7,000 is pretty much average for the Fourth of July," he said.

Michael Williams, manager at Pappy's Diner in Ruidoso Downs, said the past few days have been great for the restaurant, which until this weekend had lost almost all of its parking to the highway construction and had recorded a 40 to 50 percent drop in business.

"They didn't work on Saturday or Sunday, and on Monday they gave me plenty of room to park - and people just

piled in," Williams said.

Receipts from the weekend are little less than last year's July Fourth, he said, but the road construction company, Meadow Valley Contractors Inc., is working with his business to allow as much parking as possible. Road crews are waiting until after the restaurant closes for the day following the lunch rush to start work in front of Pappy's Diner, he said.

"They are working out there today, but they are working around so people can still come in," he said. "They are not scaring them away like they usually do."

Despite the crowds, only three DWI cases were filed in Lincoln County magistrate courts over the weekend. Magistrate Judge William Butts said three cases came into his court; and a clerk in Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean's court in Carrizozo said no DWI cases were filed there - something that she has never seen before over a Fourth of July weekend.

Fort will be maintained after inmates are moved

Official says it's a state agency's obligation

The state will take care of Fort Stanton when woman inmates from the state Corrections Department move out, Les Swindle said Friday. Head of the property management division of the state General Services Department (GSD), Swindle said he determines the level of care a property needs and receives and he won't be short-changing the historical fort, located about 12 miles northeast of Ruidoso.

"GSD is responsible for that facility regardless of what state department is in it," he said. "Whoever is on site follows my requirements. Several properties across the state share in the need for daily attention. It's a hefty responsibility but one we take seriously."

State agencies aren't held to terms of leases like in the private sector, he said. They

stay as long as they need to stay and then leave. But if Swindle says this is the level of maintenance he requires, corrections will provide it.

"Upkeep and maintenance of the facility will be done," he said. "I just don't know who that ... will be."

While the state works on providing maintenance, County Commissioner L. Ray Nunley, State Rep. Dub Williams, representatives of the Bureau of Land Management and of Fort Stanton Inc. are moving toward a longer lasting use of the fort, its grounds and the nearby Merchant Marine and military cemetery.

After decades as a state hospital, the fort was closed in March 1995 by Gov. Gary Johnson because it was too expensive to operate. Corrections Secretary Rob Perry cited the same problem in his decision to close the fort as a minimum-security prison.

Removing the slash to avoid the burn

Sometimes, believe it or not, the politicians do something right, even if the planning is a bit off. That happened in Ruidoso last fall when the village council, upon taking over community solid waste removal from the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, decided to add yard waste pickup as part of the service, for a \$2 monthly fee.

Ruidoso people seldom have been known to ignore a bargain, and that \$2 clearly was a bargain. Ruidoso went through a very dry winter and spring season, enhancing the likelihood of forest fires, and lots of people listened as the experts urged thinning of the urban forest in which we live. Others hacked away at dwarf mistletoe-infested ponderosa pines in an effort to stop its spread.

All that helped reduce the fire hazard, but didn't prevent a substantial blaze near Warrior Drive and Hull Road, you'll recall.

Village Manager Alan Briley confirms the popularity of the service; something more than 25,000 cubic yards of pine needles, tree branches and other yard waste has been collected since the operation started last fall — well beyond 3,000 cubic yards every month.


That's something like 10,000 cubic yards more than had been anticipated. Briley called it an "exponential" increase, and pointed to improvements in many neighborhoods where thickets of trees and scrub oak have been turned into yard-sized parks.

But (and there's always a but), that very popularity has sent the program into the red. A consultant who did a study before the program was implemented estimated the village would be called upon to remove about 7,000 cubic yards annually, and suggested a \$3-per-cubic-yard for the service. The council members, upon consideration, more than doubled the estimate and set the \$2 monthly rate for everybody.

That low estimate was their only goof, and they can hardly be blamed for missing the boat on a brand new project. They bought a "grapple truck" to handle the waste, then had to hire a contractor to try to keep up with demand. That contract expired as June ended, and now the yard waste pickup crew is many weeks behind schedule.

Without question the program has been a success. Without question it must continue, and — yes — there will be a rate adjustment for the service.

But that's OK; despite the effort to date, much, much more has to be done to fire-proof the fire-prone village we call home.

Lottery scholarships represent opportunity

By now, most New Mexicans know about the state's "Lottery Success Scholarship," which has opened doors for many students who otherwise might have been unable to afford a college education. However, some of this year's high school graduates might be unaware of one important aspect of this scholarship program: Students who wish to take advantage of the Lottery Success Scholarship must enroll in one of the state's public colleges or universities in the first regular semester following high school graduation.

The Lottery Success scholarship is available to recent graduates of New Mexico high schools who earn a 2.5 grade point average in their first semester at a New Mexico public college or university. As long as the students maintain that grade average, the scholarship will pay their tuition for up to eight semesters, beginning with their second semester in college.

With rare exceptions, students who put college off for just one semester will lose this remarkable opportunity that the state of New Mexico has made available. I encourage all

college-bound members of the high school class of 1999 to keep this in mind. If you expect to take advantage of the Lottery Success scholarship and have not yet enrolled in college, don't delay.

Learning what will and won't work in a democracy

As Mescalero's July 9 special election rapidly approaches, the tribe finds itself learning more and more about how a democracy can and cannot work.

When you have the same leader for more than 40 years, i.e. Wendell Chino, it speaks well of the comfort of consistency but it does little to prepare those people in an exercise of the democratic process.

With the passing of Chino and the power vacuum that followed, residents of Mescalero seemed to get that lesson in democracy in a hurry. Too quickly, it now seems.

First we saw an apparent manipulation of the ballot by the Tribal Council's move to keep former tribal Vice President Oliver Enjady and former tribal President Paul Ortega off the ballot.

Enjady, along with Ortega, were removed from office because of an alleged misuse of tribal funds. The two, however, were never convicted of a crime and the council clearly stated

that any misuse of funds was not to the benefit of either Enjady or Ortega.

The council also apparently decided that the removal from office did not equate to a complete ban from running for office. Now, apparently, some tribal members have changed their minds. Both Enjady and Ortega signed up to run for office — the presidency and vice presidency respectively — but their names did not appear on the candidates list that was issued by the tribal administration.

Three of the candidates are on the tribal council, which raises some legitimate suspicions about who would be manipulating the names on that candidates list.

"If you don't stick to your decisions, why make them?" tribal council member Harlyn Geronimo asked last week. That's a good question that may go unanswered until after the special election.

Perhaps the people of Mescalero will make that answer at the ballot box on Friday.

"It must be nice to have the power to choose who you are going to run against," Enjady has said of the situation.

And when you have someone manipulating the people's choice than they really have no choice at all. Therefore, you

have no democracy at all.

Those responsible have not only done a disservice to Enjady and Ortega but to the Mescalero people.

Such manipulation also is tantamount to pre-election ballot box stuffing.

The ballot box brings up another suspicious point in this whole democratic "experiment."

It seems that the election machines that were used to reaffirm Ortega and Enjady as president and vice president earlier this year will not be used during this election, which will be a critical election where the accuracy of the

count will no doubt be called into question no matter what method of voting is used.

An election board member said the board was "told that it would be the old system of paper ballots for the special election," which begs the questions — who is making decisions for the election board? And, if there is someone in that capacity, why have such a puppet board in existence to begin with?

Returning to pencil and paper to cast a vote has been equated to stepping back 100 years.

Maybe not 100 years. Perhaps only 40.

E. coli finding brings quick action

A final sampling of well water today will determine whether an e.coli contamination inside the Sports Theater at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track has been eradicated, a racetrack official said Tuesday.

"There shouldn't be any problem with all that we went through to make sure that there's not," Rick Baugh, racetrack general manager, said.

On Thursday, racetrack officials had a new chlorination system installed at the Sports Theater, where a restaurant and bar are located in addition to offices. Baugh said the new chlorination system was operating by Saturday.

Notices of the contamination were first

posted June 23 after fecal coliform/e. coli bacteria was found in water samples taken two days earlier, a state environmental official said last week.

The contamination is limited to the water well at the Sports Theater, which is on a separate well system from the nearby Billy the Kid Casino and main racetrack complex.

No infections from the contamination have been reported, according to hospital, track and state officials.

Becky Crown, with the Drinking Water Bureau of the New Mexico Environmental Department, last week said an inspection of the well system showed that there had been some penetration of the seal on the well. That penetration in combination with a faulty chlorination system probably led

to the contamination, she said.

Symptoms of e. coli infection include diarrhea, cramps, nausea, possible jaundice, headaches and fatigue. The bacteria is typically associated with sewage or animal waste.

Baugh said Tuesday racetrack officials have replaced some pipes and valves on the well, in addition to the chlorination system.

Despite the contamination, attendance at the Sport Theater's restaurant did not drop off, Baugh said.

"We posted immediately. And the customers knew that we were taking care of the customers," he said.

Ranch tour to demonstrate 'balanced' land restoration

A tour of Carrizo Valley Ranch, designed to show how forest areas are being managed to restore the balance of trees, grasses and other vegetation in an area watershed, is set for Saturday, July 24.

Landowner Sid Goodloe and U.S. Forest Service specialist Dick Edwards will conduct the tour at the ranch, 14 miles northwest of Capitan. Participants should meet at 10 a.m. at Smokey Bear Historical Park, 118 Smokey Bear Boulevard in Capitan, to caravan to the ranch headquarters. Participants are encouraged to wear sturdy walking shoes or boots, to put on sunscreen and to carry a sack lunch and water.

Through the use of mechanical thinning and clearing, management-ignited fire and herbicides, managers of the Carrizo Valley and Tucson Valley ranches gradually are returning their land base to conditions closely representing those of

pre-European settlement, said Bill Duemling, vice chairman of the Forest Health Coalition of Lincoln County, which is co-sponsoring the tour. The area is part of the Carrizo Demonstration Project, a joint effort of the Forest Service, the Natural Resources Conservation Service, and the South Central Mountains Resource Conservation and Development Council.

After an early brown-bag lunch, the estimated four-hour tour will begin and may include some adjacent Forest Service land management strategies will be discussed.

Forest roads to the ranches are fairly well maintained gravel roads, but can become slippery or impassable during heavy rainfall. If heavy rains preceded the tour date, check to make sure the tour still is scheduled by calling the state forestry division at (505) 354-2231.

Yes, June temperatures were hotter than average, but no record

Temperatures in Ruidoso didn't hit a record high, but longtime residents aren't delusional when they say the month of June was warmer than usual.

According to the National Weather Service Office in Albuquerque the all-time high

recorded in Ruidoso was 98 degrees on June 26, 1994.

Although some reports are circulating that the temperature hit 98 degrees on June 30, the official temperature entered by the weather service was 92 degrees. However, Tuesday through Thursday, unusually high temperatures were registered starting with 91 degrees and ending with 93

degrees. Based on a 49-year history from 1948 through 1997, both June and July have an average daytime temperature of 81 degrees.

"The figures you've seen recently are at least 10 degrees higher than normal," a service spokesman said. "We've also had more moisture in June than normal and that accounts for higher humidity. It drives

the dew point up, and now we're going into the monsoon season."

Despite complaints that evenings have been too warm, the weather service shows the low temperature for Wednesday as 51 degrees and 50 degrees for Tuesday — much cooler than neighboring towns at lower elevations.

Alamogordo construction fatality shouldn't impact Ruidoso projects

It's unlikely an investigation of a highway construction site where a worker was killed Thursday in Alamogordo will spill over into Lincoln County, a state official said Friday.

Nathan Wade, communications

director with the New Mexico Environment Department, said an inspector with the Federal Occupational Safety and Health Agency was to visit the Otero County site Tuesday where construction worker Michael Voorbach, 38, of Tularosa, was run over and killed by a water truck. According to the Alamogordo Police Department,

Voorbach was operating a water valve from the exterior of a water truck, which was moving, and while adjusting the water flow, he slipped, fell and was run over by the truck. He was taken by ambulance to Gerald Champion Memorial where he later died.

The subcontractor involved was Johnson and Danley Construction,

based in Alamogordo, Wade said.

"We don't plan an inspection in Ruidoso and at this point don't even know if Johnson and Danley are working on the highway project up there," Wade said.

"Certainly, even if an inspection took place, it would only take a day and cause no major delay. It would be

a real stretch to say it could cause a significant delay," Wade added.

Hank Schenk, project director for Meadow Valley Contractors, the company handling highway construction projects around Ruidoso/Ruidoso Downs, said he has used Johnson and Danley before, but the company is not now working on any project locally.

A 25-foot-high replica of the Smokey Bear hot air balloon, used merely for show, was set up outside the Ruidoso Convention Center.


"The Smokey Bear Balloon is on tour all the time with the message of preventing human-caused wildfire,"

Village eases up on water

Outdoor watering restrictions in Ruidoso were lifted Tuesday, putting the village back into the least restrictive phase of its water conservation ordinance, village officials said.

"It looks like we are going back to a phase where you can water seven days a week and, again that doesn't sound like a system that's out of water," Mayor Robert Donaldson said, referring to some fears in the community as to whether Ruidoso has adequate water supplies.

The only outdoor watering restriction under Phase 1 of the ordinance prohibits watering between the hours of 10 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Despite a high number of tourists this holiday weekend, water usage was unexpectedly low, Donaldson said. On holiday weekends, when the population soars by 30,000 visitors, summer water usage can reach amounts of five million gallons a day, village officials have said.

"We had everything on line in anticipation of a major demand on water," Donaldson said Tuesday. "But we actually had to shut down production ... The tanks were so full they were overflowing."

Donaldson said the village's rebound from the Phase 2 restrictions is indicative of the extent of work done to repair and expand Ruidoso's aging water system.

"One of the things we overlook is the continuous work we have done over the past four years," he said. "And this is what I've been trying to say all along ... all the improvements we have been making all along are making a difference."

Water sources dropped this spring because relatively little rain fell. A dry winter compounded the problem because of low snowpack accumulation.


Since June 4, village residents were limited to watering on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays under Phase 2 of Ruidoso's water conservation ordinance, when moderate drought conditions exist. It goes into effect based on village water resources.

With the recent rains, water levels are back up, though exact water levels in Grindstone Lake, Alto Lake, the two, five-million gallon water tanks in Alto or in the Eagle Creek basin were not available Tuesday. Richard Sanchez, director of the village water department, could not be reached for comment. His department issued a statement Tuesday that Phase 2 watering restrictions were lifted.

Though the water levels in Grindstone Lake, Alto Lake, the water storage tanks in Alto and other indicators had risen by last week, village officials at that time said the outdoor watering restrictions would not be lifted until the after Fourth of July weekend.







DRH Special Velour posted a two-lengths-plus victory and stopped the clock in a final time of 45.33.


DRH Special Velour, ridden by Bo White and trained by Fred Danley, broke second from post position six, running a head behind the leader Flash Over into the far turn.

FISHING REPORT

For fly fishing -

RIO RUIDOSO: Fishing is very spotty because of the low water. Check out the larger pockets of holding waters. The best patterns are pheasant tails, green rock worms and prince nymphs. Late afternoons until dusk are producing scattered dry fly action along the vegetation lines of the riverbanks. Sunday evening proved to have a good Mayfly hatch near dark. The best dries have been parachute adams, blue wing olives and hendricksons. Upper Canyon on the reservation has been fishing well, along with the scenic hike.

BONITO CREEK: Above the lake, scattered catches of rainbows have been steady for the hard-core fisherman. Take your camera and watch for great nature shows along the waterway. Not any change from last week, just less water. Toss what you brought, the fish above here are usually hungry. The water flow below Bonito is virtually non-existent and unfishable.

BONITO LAKE: Water level is good with reports of early and late fishing good on dry flies. Best reported patterns are blue wing olives, hendricksons and light cahills. The spin caster will do well with bubble rig and a propeller fly tied on the business end. The hot propeller fly this week seems to be one with a red body and white hackle or the double renegade.

GRINDSTONE LAKE: Late evening fishing will produce the best fishing here. Take advantage of midge and damsel fly hatches. Several evenings this past week dry flies such as light cahills, parachute adams and griffin's gnats have provided numerous sur-

face takes. Throw and strip woolly buggers, muddler minnows and rainbow trout streamers cast nearly parallel to the shoreline right at dusk in search of large cruising browns and rainbows. The spin caster will do well with a bubble rig with propeller flies or drowning a muddler minnow, woolly bugger or zonker. I did well Tuesday evening on a small (size 18) cream midge just at dark.

LAKE MESCALERO: The lake level is good. Shoreline and boat fishing have been producing nice fish in the evening hours. Dry flies that have been working are parachute adams, hendricksons, mosquitos and midges. One of our regular customers reported hooking an 18-inch cutbow last Sunday evening on a parachute adams. *Jim Shoop, Fly's Etc.*

For bait fishing -

RIO RUIDOSO: The river is very low. The only good places seem to be below Two Rivers Park. Try salmon eggs.

ALTO LAKE: Unfishable. No stocking planned in the near future.

GRINDSTONE RESERVOIR: Slow fishing but try worms in the late afternoon.

BONITO LAKE: Good on powerbait and pistol pete's.

EAGLE LAKES: Probably the best in the area on pistol pete's and super dupers. *Jim McGarvey, Western Auto*








Village Councilor Elmer Pirelli dies

Wandering the world in motorized luxury

Twelve top-of-the-line Prevost motor homes rallied at Sierra Blanca RV Park in Ruidoso for a week in June.

Mel and Ann Chapman of South Padre Island, Texas, invited friends who also own the Canadian-built touring buses to a rally in Ruidoso to see the sights, said Brenda Caldwell, visiting from Ft. Worth, Texas.

Most of the folks were from Texas, Caldwell said, but one motor home came from Palm Springs, Calif., and another from Lake Havasu, Ariz.

"It's the best way in the world to travel," Caldwell said. "Especially because of the nice people we meet."

Mel Chapman said they see more of the country traveling this way than they would flying, and they're traveling in luxury.

"We just sleep all over the world. Wal-Mart's our favorite motel. We park in Wal-Mart parking lots all over the country," said Caldwell.

Barbara Willard, owner of Sierra Blanca RV Park, said the 12 motor homes ranged in price from \$600,000 to \$1.6 million.

Guenter and Jane Miller of El Paso travel in a 45-foot Prevost with a glamorous and glittery Liberty conversion: mirrored ceiling and walls give the already large motor home a feeling of both expansiveness and luxury. It's a tour bus first, said Guenter, the shell made in Canada and the conversion by Liberty in Chicago.

Prevost puts in a different set of windows for the buses destined to become motor homes. The shell of the Millers' model H3-45 is fiberglass with a stainless steel frame and a stainless finish, Guenter said.

Jane pointed out that there are 15 remotes controlling everything from the projector television in the bedroom to the window shades.

"It's very user-friendly," she said.

They receive music and television reception from a satellite on the roof that tracks while they travel, and there's a projector and pop-down screen in the bedroom as well as in the living area. No need to stop at a laundromat while traveling, either: their Prevost has a washer and dryer, as well as a convection oven and a microwave.

Guenter is particularly proud of the 20-kilowatt diesel generator that holds 235 gallons of fuel and runs off the same system as the engine, the holding tanks for sewage and gray water, and a carrying capacity of 120 gallons of fresh water. The bus has its own power plant so they can make electricity if there's no place to plug in when it's time to park for the night.

The Millers have been motor-coaching since 1995 and have worked their way up to this size motor home, Guenter said. They traded in their last one for this year's 2000 model.

"We started off with a smaller coach," Guenter said, adding that it takes building up to it to be able to handle a 45-foot bus on the road. "You can't back up if you tow another vehicle," he said, "so if you're going the wrong way, you have to stop and unhook the vehicle, turn around, and then hitch the car back up."

The Millers said they spend about 30 percent of their time traveling in their home on wheels, as both work, and they go places they normally wouldn't visit — such as Ruidoso.

The benefits of traveling this way, said Guenter, are that they don't have


to stay in a motel. "You've got your home with you," he said, "and it's more luxurious than home."

"They're all friends," said Willard, who hosted the rally at her Sierra Blanca RV Park. "It's like Harley Davidson rallies: they meet somewhere and then go touring together."

Every day the coach-owners visit-

ed different parts of Lincoln County. Many of the vehicles towed matched the coaches. The tourists visited Lincoln, Cloudcroft, the Ruidoso Downs Race Track, the Inn of the Mountain Gods and the Museum of Horses together.

Come evening, they met in the rec room of the RV park for cocktails.

New begonias and impatiens from old

Question: I heard it was possible to save plants from the flower bed over the winter to use as houseplants and then plant outside next year. I have some beautiful impatiens and begonias. What is the best way to start new plants? What is the best time to start new houseplants?

Answer: It is a little early in most of New Mexico, but if you are thinking about it now, this is a perfect time. Starting them now will result in larger plants by the time the outdoor garden freezes. These larger plants will require more space indoors but will give you more flowers in the fall and early winter. Whether or not you have flowers later depends on the light intensity and cultural conditions inside.

These plants that you mentioned are quite easy to start

from cuttings. Just remove a three-to-four inch piece of the end of one of the stems, carefully break the leaves from the bottom two-thirds of the plant or trim them off with a sharp knife.

These prepared cuttings may be rooted in water or in good, sterile(pasteurized), potting soil. To root them in water, just place them in water up to the point just below the remaining leaves. For this you may use a vase, a drinking glass, or an old jelly jar. As the water evaporates, refill the container. Once every week or so, replace the water so that the mineral salt in the water doesn't accumulate as the water evaporates. This is especially important because of the hardness of most of our New Mexico water sources.

DO NOT use water from water softeners, which replace the hard water minerals with other minerals that may be even more toxic to the plants. Once roots

have formed and are beginning to grow you may place the rooted cuttings in a pot with good potting soil, or for fun you can leave them in the water container.

Until the roots have formed, there is no need to add fertilizer. However, once the roots form you can begin fertilizing with a diluted flowering houseplant fertilizer. This is true whether you are growing them in soil or in water. Wait a week or so for the roots to establish in the soil before fertilizing. This fertilizer is necessary for the vigorous growth of these new plants in the confined root environment.

Student exchange program offers lifetime experiences for all

Another culture, exotic foods, and first-hand knowledge of a foreign country can all be experienced in the comfort of your own home, Ron Keeler, the Southern New Mexico field manager for Youth For Understanding International Exchange, said.

Through YFU, which was started right after World War I and is the oldest of the international organizations, families can host an exchange student for either six or 11 months, Keeler said.

"It's really a cultural exchange, a living geography and social studies lesson, and it broadens the horizons of the host family," Keeler said. "This is an opportunity for people to globalize themselves. For every student we place in a school, we are exposing a different culture to hundreds of kids."

Several exchange students have come to Ruidoso through this organization, Keeler said.

Betty Wilcox, along with her husband, Ben, owners of True Value Hardware in Ruidoso, have hosted five international exchange students.

"We just love being around kids. It's a neat experience and a great chance to learn more about another country," Wilcox said.

The Wilcoxes started hosting students when they lived in Texas.

"We just saw an application and decided it was something we wanted to do," Wilcox said.

Among those they have hosted are students from Uruguay, Germany, Australia, Ecuador, and Chile, she said. They still keep in contact with

all of them and several of the students have come back to visit, Wilcox said.

"Most of the students come over speaking very good English," Wilcox said.

"We're careful about who we send," Keeler said.

The organization looks for students who will be able to adapt well to a new culture, Keeler said. He said that students involved in the program are usually better academically, have a teacher's recommendation, and go through an extensive interview process.

"We also normally require them to have at least two years of study in the language of the country to which they are going," Keeler said.

Host families must also meet several criteria, Keeler said. He said that the family must be able to provide the student with their own bed and a quiet place to study. They must show the capability of being good parents who will welcome the student into their family and will be

open to learning about the student's culture.

"We have all kinds of families, from ones with very young children to older, empty-nesters, and recently more and more single parents," Keeler said.

Host families look at pictures and write-ups about different exchange students and from that, Wilcox said, they can pick one who best fits in with their lifestyle.

Religious preference, dietary restrictions, and love of animals are a few of the things that are often taken into consideration when placing students, Keeler said.

"We support the kids well. We don't just dump them and that's it," he said.

YFU area representatives check up on the students regularly to make sure they're adapting well and having a good experience with their host families. If things aren't going well, Keeler said, they will at times move the student to a new host family.

"The first month is hard on

them as they try to adjust to the lifestyle here," Wilcox said.

But she has enjoyed being able to share American culture with students while also letting them bring their culture into family celebrations of the different holidays.

"We've had such special moments with all of them," Wilcox said. "My kids will be their brothers and sisters for the rest of their lives."

"Both we, as the host family, and the students learn from this experience," Wilcox said.

Wilcox said that the students come with spending money, but as host parents, the Wilcoxes pay their way for family activities, lunch

money, and school supplies.

"We wouldn't have to do that, but we just treat them like they're one of our kids," Wilcox said.

She said that they will definitely host again, probably after a year or two.

Keeler and his family will be welcoming their third exchange student into their home this year.

"We hope that she'll be a great big sister to our granddaughter," Keeler said.

For Keeler, their exchange students have become just like one of their own children, within a month or so.

The hardest part for both Keeler and Wilcox has been when it comes time for their

student to leave.

"We dread it because we don't know if we'll ever see them again," Wilcox said.

Though none of Wilcox's children ever went on exchange, her oldest daughter wants to host someday.

"I would only have let my kids go with YFU, it's a very good program," Wilcox said.

"We're trying to build up this area of the state. It's not traditionally strong in hosting exchange students," Keeler said.

box of stories to take back to his village.

Reforms to solve out-of-field teacher problems won't work, new study asserts

ATHENS, Ga. — National educational reforms designed to ensure that elementary and secondary school classrooms are staffed with qualified teachers will not work, according to a new study by a researcher at the University of Georgia.

The new research by sociologist Richard Ingersoll focuses on the problem of out-of-field teaching — teachers assigned to teach subjects for which they have little education or training. He found that the most common assumptions about the causes of the problem are largely untrue and that proposed solutions may, in fact, cause more harm than good.

"Even using a minimal standard for a qualified teacher — those holding a college minor in the field they teach — the numbers of out-of-field teachers are striking," said Ingersoll. "For example, a third of all secondary school teachers of mathematics have neither a major nor a minor in that field."

Ingersoll analyzed data from the Schools and Staffing Survey — the largest and most comprehensive survey of teachers every completed. This survey, conducted by the National Center for Educational Statistics, an arm of the U. S. Department of Education, included about 11,000 schools and 55,000 teachers in all 50 states.

His research has been published in the March issue of the journal Educational Researcher.

The widespread existence of under-qualified teachers has long been known but little studied because of the absence of accurate data. The situation was remedied with the release of the Staffing Survey in the early 1990s and subsequent research by Ingersoll and oth-

ers. The problem of out-of-field teaching has become a major topic in educational reform circles. But, Ingersoll asserts, the problem remains largely misunderstood, and proposed reforms may in fact have no effect on the problem.

Critics have often said the problem of out-of-field teachers can be explained as a result of inadequate training, inflexible teacher unions or shortages of qualified teachers. In his study, Ingersoll found that all three claims are largely wrong.

"There is surprisingly little consensus about how to define a qualified teacher," said Ingersoll. "In fact, there is a great deal of controversy concerning how much training and which kinds of preparation teachers must have to be considered adequately qualified."

He decided to skirt the debate by adopting a minimal definition of "qualified teacher" before he began to examine the data. So he focused on how many of those teaching core academic subjects at the secondary level do not have even a major or a minor in their teaching fields, counting both academic and education majors and minors.

"In short, I assumed that few parents would expect their teenagers to be taught, for example, 11th grade trigonometry by a teacher who did not have a college minor in math, no matter how bright the teacher," said Ingersoll. "I found, however, that to be the case for millions of students." In fact, a third of all secondary school teachers who teach math do not have either a major or a minor in the subject and a quarter of English teachers do not have such degrees.


Tourists in Outer Space

It will take time to get the moon ready for the tourists.


Recent missions using robots have found strong evidence of frozen water on the moon, which will make setting up bases easier and cheaper.





Liftoff

Just as the Federal Aviation Administration, or FAA, governs airplane travel and airports, it will also regulate space travel and spaceports.

At first, spaceports will be used only to launch satellites. In the future, humans might also launch into space from these spaceports.

The FAA has already approved spaceport licenses for California, Virginia, Florida and Alaska. Maryland might join with Virginia for its spaceport. Twelve other states have applied.

Lunar law

Getting to the moon is not the only problem. There are many legal questions. What would happen if ...

- one country kept everyone else from Earth off the moon?
- One country or company stripped the moon of all its minerals?
- Someone put advertisements on the moon, turning it into a giant billboard in the sky?

A world treaty gives the United Nations the right to regulate what happens on the moon. But no one really knows how we would solve problems if someone decides to violate the moon treaty.

After landing on Mars, astronauts might use a rover to unload cargo and supplies.

Into deep space

Many experts believe the moon would be a good spot for a launch base to Mars or beyond. Others believe that taking off from the space station might be even easier.

Today's spacecraft take about eight months to get to Mars. NASA is searching for cheaper and faster ways to power spaceships.

Once people reach Mars, it could be used as a base for journeys beyond the solar system. Missions using robots are scheduled through 2008. One of these will look at the possibility of using Martian soil to fuel return trips to Earth.


No human missions are planned to Mars now, but NASA experts believe that within the lifetime of today's kids, scientists will set up bases there.

of how he would kill his pets.

We receive puppies and kittens at the shelter through out the year that have been rescued from dumpsters.

How many more go unnoticed and die? How many children have watched an adult throw a live animal away? Or open a car door and dump one out along the highway?

A friend told me of a poodle that was rescued from a family who's children threw it from a second story balcony so many times that every bone in its body was broken. The poodle was taken to the veterinarian and enjoyed life from then on without further violence.

What about the dogs on the end of chains, many of them without shelter some without food or water... scarce affection... what about them?

Let us always listen to our children and our children's friends and teach them by doing.

Show them how to take care of and love a pet, nurture in them kindness and compassion for all living things.

The following accounts of cruelty are true. And they are local. I feel there are times when we can no longer "look away" especially if the issue is gruesome and upsetting and in our own back yard. The Humane Society of Lincoln County asks for your personal donation of compassion to put an end to these tragedies.

A young boy and some of his siblings were dropped off at the animal shelter one afternoon. His two older siblings left him alone to play with some kittens in our new feline sunroom. When I checked on the boy I found him beating the kittens with a hard wooden dog brush. This happened two weeks ago. I caught this act of cruelty in time; no kittens were seriously injured; though they have been a little fearful since.

I overheard a conversation between two nine-year-old boys. One of them was intimidating the other with detailed descriptions

TNT returns to the Civil War in 'The Hunley'

Just a few years before Capt. Nemo's fictional undersea voyage, a very real group of soldiers waged a battle beneath the waves during the Civil War.

The Hunley, airing Sunday, July 11, on TNT, tells the story of nine men who crammed into a converted boiler and changed the way naval wars are fought. Writer-director John Gray's new TV movie looks back at the crew of the first sub to sink an enemy vessel.

When a Union naval blockade threatens the survival of Charleston, S.C., and cannon assaults take their toll on the city's weary and hungry residents, Confederate Gen. Beauregard (Donald Sutherland) commissions Lt. Dixon (Armand Assante) to lead a team on a

mission to break the blockade and sink a Union ship by using a submarine armed with a torpedo.

"Armand brings a tremendous soulfulness (to the role)," Gray says. "(Dixon) has a world-weariness and a sadness. He's haunted by the loss of his wife, the woman he loved more than anything. What secretly drives Dixon is this desire to be reunited with this woman. He feels that a submarine is going to deliver him to her. He didn't lose faith that this would work."

Even though the film gives off an overwhelming feeling of fate and destiny, Gray believes the crew's strong sense of duty stands out.

"It's like what Dixon says when Beauregard asks him if he thinks they can win the war: 'No, but there's still a

battle we can win, and should win.'"

"On the surface, you think it's a story about the North vs. the South, but it's not. It's about this incredible valor that existed amongst these guys who were willing, crew after crew, to get in that sub and try to strike a blow for what they believed in," Gray says. "That, combined with this primitive technology, had an enormous impact on the history of warfare."

"I hope viewers will be amazed and inspired by the courage these guys showed, and what people are capable of when they believe in what they're fighting for, whether it's a war or something more personal. I hope they come away with the feeling, 'I think I just visited 1864.'"

Fenway provides perfect stage for All-Star Game

Baseball is a sport rooted in tradition. That tradition takes center stage Tuesday, July 13, when Fox heads to Boston's venerable Fenway Park for the Major League Baseball All-Star Game.

The All-Star Break is not only a mid-season event celebrating the achievements of today's players, but also a time to reflect on the game's history and the great moments provided by players of the past.

The first All-Star Game was held as part of the Chicago World's Fair in 1933, when more than 47,000 people packed Comiskey Park to see a game that included 24 future Hall of Famers.

One of those players was Babe Ruth, who, though in the twilight of his illustrious career, treated the crowd to the first home run in All-Star history.

Lou Gehrig, Joe Cronin, Jimmie Foxx, Lefty Grove, Frankie Frisch and Carl Hubbell were some of the future Hall of Famers who saw the American Leaguers grab a 4-2 win in what was meant to be a one-time event.

Instead, the game was such a success it became a yearly fixture.

Probably the most spectacular moment came in 1970 at Cincinnati's Riverfront Stadium, when hometown hero Pete Rose raced home with the winning run in the bottom of the 12th inning and flattened catcher Ray Fosse to give the National League a 5-4 victory.

The 1941 game at Briggs Stadium in Detroit will forever be remembered for the heroics of Boston's Ted Williams, who was in the midst of a magical season in which he would hit .406, becoming the last major leaguer to break the .400 mark.

Williams came to the plate in the ninth inning with his American League squad down 5-4 but threatening with two on and two outs. He proceeded to belt a Claude Passeau pitch out of the park, giving his team a 7-5 win.

Williams is also a big reason people recall the 1950 game. He broke his left elbow crashing into the outfield wall in the first inning but didn't leave the game for eight innings.

That classic contest ended with Red Schoendienst homering in the 14th to give the National League a 4-3 victory.

This year's spectacle is the third one at Fenway Park, which opened its doors in 1912. One of the oldest parks in major league baseball (the other is Detroit's Tiger Stadium, which also dates from 1912), Fenway is considered a landmark by baseball traditionalists. It lacks many of the amenities of today's sleek, comfortable stadiums but is unrivaled in the history department.

Ruth, Williams, Foxx, Carl Yastrzemski, Bobby Doerr and Carlton Fisk are among the greats who have played at Fenway, whose most recognizable feature is the huge wall in left field. Known as the "Green Monster," it towers 37 feet above the playing surface. A 23-foot screen atop it makes the wall even more intimidating for visiting players.

Fenway's small seating capacity and limited foul-ball territory ensure fans are close to the action - another advantage to anyone lucky enough to see a game at this historic park.

At this writing, home-run king Mark McGwire and Ken Griffey Jr. were front-runners for the National League first baseman spot and the American League outfield position, respectively.

ESPN has two All-Star events airing Monday, July 12. First up is the popular Home Run Derby. Then the All-Star Celebrity Hitting Challenge has baseball greats of the past teaming up with stars from the entertainment industry.







THE BATTLE FOR TITANIC

The world's most famous ship lies submerged two-and-a-half miles in the icy waters of the North Atlantic. For 73 years, it lay undisturbed, a grave-marker for the 1,500 lives lost and a time capsule of the treasures enclosed. Since September 1st, 1985, when the *Titanic* was located, a fierce struggle has raged in the U.S. courts over who owns the rights to the wreck and what should happen to it. **The Battle for Titanic** tells a story of greed, obsession, courtroom conflicts, and Cold War intrigue.

Titanic has been immortalized by Hollywood, celebrated on Broadway, and exploited by business. Since 1985, more than 5,000 artifacts have been removed from the wreck; their fate is a bitterly contentious issue. RMS Titanic Inc., the company that controls the wreck and has endured a costly decade of legal battles and controversy, stages exhibitions of some of these items. George Tulloch, the company's head, says "To recover, conserve and protect [the artifacts] in the courts is only a meaningful process if you are trying to share them with the public and the future." However, the exhibitions provide revenue for his company through the sale of items like an inflatable model of the ship — replete with an iceberg — t-shirts, and silk boxer shorts.

Many people decry this "debasement" of the ship's memory; some oppose the removal of any items from the wreck. Among those is Dr. Robert Ballard, the man who located *Titanic* in 1985. "This is like stripping the old lady of her jewelry in the grave," he says with regret, knowing that his discovery started the feeding frenzy. Ballard believes unequivocally that all items removed from the ship should be returned.

Ballard dedicated his life to finding the *Titanic*. Frustrated by the enormous costs of salvage operations, this naval reserve officer and friend of John Lehman, former Secretary of the Navy, took advantage of the political climate in the early 1980s and struck a deal with the U.S. Navy. America was fighting the Cold War then, building up and bolstering the reputation of its armed forces. Lehman explains in **The Battle for Titanic** why the U.S. Navy agreed to let Ballard use Navy vessels and equipment. Finding the *Titanic* — the "Mount Everest of shipwrecks," in Ballard's words — "would prove to the Russians, in a highly visible way, the superiority of American military technology."

The Battle for Titanic considers the many questions raging over the remains of the world's most famous maritime disaster. Is it too late to preserve the remaining treasures at the bottom of the Atlantic? Should they be salvaged? Should the excavated artifacts be returned? Do the relics of such a tragedy belong in a museum? Should *Titanic* be the object of commercial gain or is the ship too important to leave to the mercy of the marketplace? The controversy continues.

The Battle for Titanic will be broadcast Monday, July 12th at 9:00 p.m. on KENW-TV. It repeats Tuesday, July 20th at 11:00 p.m.


