



Ruidoso Convention Center hotel breaks ground

After a decade of false starts, construction will begin soon on an upscale hotel next to the Ruidoso Convention Center.

Bill Chance on Tuesday morning scooped up a handful of Hawthorn Suites hotel directories and passed them to three men peering at drawings of a proposed \$7.5-plus million hotel. "Gentlemen," the Ruidoso village councilor said. "We are already in the book."

More than a year after negotiations began for a hotel next to the Ruidoso Convention Center, a group of about 40 people gathered Tuesday to celebrate the official groundbreaking for a Hawthorn Suites Golf Resort. The hotel will complete a plan started about 10 years ago to attract convention business to Ruidoso.

Land at the 3.8-acre hotel was still undisturbed at the groundbreaking ceremonies at 11 a.m. Tuesday. Just outside a tent set up for the occasion, numerous easels displayed drawings of the finished hotel, its layout and suite designs.

Despite projections of an earlier start, executives with the hotel development company of Leisure Group Tuesday said work on the 120-room facility is to begin inside two weeks. And market-

ing for the hotel already is underway, including its placement in national hotel directories. Four convention groups already are considering booking with the as yet nonexistent hotel, according to Robin Cooper, director of sales.

Completion is scheduled for July 2000, though that date may be optimistic, one executive said.

"I think July is going to be tight, but it's doable," Ted Carter, vice president of development and construction for a subsidiary of Leisure Group, said.

Carter anticipated initial foundation work to stabilize the ground for the three-story hotel would take 30-40 days to complete. After that, work would begin on the building foundation.

"So you could easily see 90 days before it

starts to go vertical," Carter said.

Carter said the company would use as many local subcontractors for the project as possible, and would have as many as 150 people on the construction at a time.

Leisure Group President and CEO Steve Olson said he is in negotiations with two companies for a restaurant next to the hotel. Olson said he could not release the names of the firms, but said one offered an upscale steak concept restaurant. The restaurant would have to be able to provide banquet services for up to 1,500 people, he said.

Besides a restaurant, future plans for the

Murder suspect out on bond

Attorney Gary Mitchell defends Hondo Valley man

Pete Louis Noce, a suspect in the Aug. 22 murder of a Ruidoso man, was released from Ruidoso Detention Center after posting a \$10,000 bond Friday per the request of the District Attorney's Office.

Noce, a 36-year-old Hondo man, was arrested in Silver City Aug. 26 by Ruidoso police and charged with one open count of murder and one count of tampering with evidence.

Noce's attorney, Gary Mitchell, waived a first-appearance arraignment scheduled for Aug. 27.

District Attorney Scot Key said he called Magistrate Court Judge William Butts and asked him to set the bond at \$10,000.

"I asked him specifically to lower it based upon our investigation," Key said. "I don't consider him (Noce) to be a flight risk, and our investigation revealed that a \$10,000 bond would assure his presence in court and that he is not a threat to the community."

Key said a preliminary hearing will be scheduled for Butts' court within 60 days.

"We'll be continuing our investigation, and what we're looking at is the highest level of homicide we'll be able to prove in a court of law," Key said.

The criminal complaint written by Ruidoso police Lt. Wolf Born states witnesses of the murder said they and the victim left the Quarters' bar at about 1:30 a.m. Aug. 22 and went to their vehicle where Mirabal, 29, a three-week resident of Ruidoso, started a conversation with "two individuals parked next to their vehicle." According to the witnesses, Mirabal asked the two what they were looking at and then said, "If you want them (the female witnesses), you can have both of them for \$50."

Mirabal and the two witnesses left in their vehicle and drove to their condominium. In the parking lot of the Village Lodge on Mechem Drive

Tribal council member survives attempted ouster

Harlyn Geronimo will stay on the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council despite a recent challenge by interim tribal President Sara Misquez based on his attendance record.

In a letter dated Aug. 12, Misquez asked for Geronimo's reasons for missing two sequential meetings of the council, saying she could find no evidence the council excused his absences in advance. She gave him until 4:30 p.m. Aug. 18, to respond.

The tribal constitution calls for the removal of tribal council members who miss two meetings in a row without a valid excuse, Geronimo said. He explained last week that on the July 14 meeting, no session occurred because of a lack of quorum.

"If I had been present, there still would have not been a quorum because other council members were not present," he wrote in a letter that was given to the council.

Geronimo said he told tribal administrator Ferris Palmer he had an appointment out of town that day and asked him to write a memorandum to the council explaining his absence. The memo was never submitted, Geronimo wrote in his letter.

The other meeting, on July 19, coincided with a conference scheduled one month in advance sponsored by the Community Services Committee, which Geronimo chairs.

On July 18, the day before the conference, Geronimo received notice from tribal interim Vice President Frederick Chino about a meeting the next day at 9:30 p.m. When he arrived at the meeting time, no one was in the council chambers. Geronimo attached a written notice of the meeting that included the 9:30 p.m. time. The session apparently occurred at 9:30 a.m.

"It is bad precedent to remove elected representatives of the people and such action should only be undertaken for the most serious and well documented reasons," Geronimo said.

Official says spill did not damage river

A state environment official said Monday he's satisfied that the Rio Ruidoso was not damaged by a sewage spill on the north side of U.S. 70.

When first discovered more than a week ago, the sewage generated in the Ruidoso area was flowing into the river en route to the sewage treatment plant east of Ruidoso Downs. Initially, one pump was hooked up to send the sewage through an alternate line, but it couldn't handle the flow during times of peak water use.

By Thursday, three pumps were working at the site across from the Wal-Mart Super Center.

"The three pumps contain the sewage even during peak flows," said Tom Armstrong, code enforcement officer with the village of Ruidoso Downs. "Nothing has gone into the river since Thursday and was only going in at peak times before that."

Crews from Carl Kelly Construction with consultation from Drew Engineering worked 24 hours a day last week and stayed over the weekend trying to find the break in the clay sewage line and fix it,

Armstrong said. Steve Baumgarn of the surface water quality bureau of the state Environment Department inspected the site across from Wal-Mart Thursday and Friday.

He checked the river for about 14 miles downstream from the leak, Baumgarn said.

"The stream had recovered substantially and looked pretty good," he

said. "There weren't any areas that looked contaminated. Even when walking back behind the pile where the seepage occurred, it smelled like soap, not sewage."

According to an estimate from the contractor, the problem should be solved within two weeks, including replacing the clay sewage pipe with PVC, Baumgarn said.



hotel include a covered walkway to the convention center and up to 100 additional hotel rooms, Olson said.

At Tuesday's groundbreaking ceremony, Olson credited the firms and individuals instrumental in bringing about the hotel, which he described as the nicest property planned to date by the company. The hotel's list of amenities has grown since May, and the facility is now expected to cost \$7.5 million to \$8.5 million, he said.


Among those Olson listed were Tom Batten, president of Ruidoso State Bank, which is financing the project, and Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson, a key negotiator in the project for more than a year. "And I don't think you people understand how hard that man worked," Olson told those gathered at the groundbreaking ceremony.

Donaldson, in turn, credited Lloyd Davis, a former mayor, and racetrack owner R.D. Hubbard for envisioning the concept of a combined convention center, hotel and golf course more than 10 years ago.

"You need to thank them because this is their vision, it is not ours," Donaldson said.

For a decade, the village of Ruidoso has tried to entice a hotel to the convention center site. During that time, three previous developers reached initial agreements with the village only to let lease options lapse or to back out of a lease. The most recent of those, Hospitality Santa Fe, dropped its lease in late 1997 saying feasibility studies did not support the type of hotel called for in the agreement.

Last summer, following a tip from Hubbard, Donaldson began negotiating with Leisure Group, which has a trio of sub-

sidary companies that buy, construct and manage hotels. The firm currently has 13 hotels, another three under development and agreements to build two more, Olson said.

In early May, following a series of contentious public hearings, the Ruidoso Village Council unanimously approved a 56-page lease agreement with Leisure Group. The agreement sparked controversy because of the accompanying incentive package that included a 30-year property tax abatement, a pledge of marketing dollars from the village as well as some shared construction costs.

A group of residents and lodge owners opposed the agreement, saying it would give the hotel an unfair economic advantage over other lodging establishments. Donaldson said the incentive package was necessary to ensure the feasibility of an upscale hotel facility, which itself is necessary to attract the convention market now passing Ruidoso by.

On Tuesday, Donaldson said the hotel will result in an eco-


nomie benefit to the entire community, including other lodgings, and become a source of pride for the village.

Following the groundbreaking ceremony, Donaldson said the only negative comments he

has heard recently about the hotel are from people opposed to growth in the community. Steve Tally, manager at the Best Western Swiss Chalet, said lodge owners seem to be "getting used to the idea."

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AG questions hotel development

Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson this week attributed "misinformation" as the basis for a recent inquiry by the office of the New Mexico Attorney General into development aspects of a \$7.5 million hotel next to the Ruidoso Convention Center.

"We got a letter on some contractual stuff concerning the labor law and how it relates to the village projects and stuff," Donaldson said Monday. "But the opinion appears primarily to be based on some misinformation."

Late last week, the village received a three-paragraph letter from the attorney general's office regarding potential violations in the construction of the \$7.5-plus million Hawthorn Suites Golf Resort.

Sam Thompson, of the Attorney General's office, said Monday the office received a request for an investigation into the matter about a month ago.

Donaldson said he could not release a copy of the letter because it was still under attorney/client confidentiality constraints. However, he did discuss its general contents and said it will be released to the

public once it has been either "agreed to or not agreed to."

The main complaint focuses on whether the village is in violation of the Mini-Davis Bacon Law, a state requirement that municipalities pay prevailing union wages on construction projects. Another concern is whether state procurement codes need be followed.

"Of course, our view is that this is not a village project," Donaldson said. "Some people have given them information that makes them think that this is a village project, instead of a private project. If that were the case, we have to follow the Mini-Davis Bacon Law."

Earlier this year, the village signed an agreement with the hotel's Kansas-based developer, Leisure Hotels LLC, for lease of the 3.8-acre site. Under the agreement, the village is paying for work to stabilize the foundation site for the hotel, which requires pilings to be sunk as much as 15 feet into the ground.

The village has set aside \$328,000 in its 1999-2000 fiscal year budget for the work as well as other projects related to the development of the hotel and a recreational plaza proposed nearby.

A formal groundbreaking took place Tuesday. Construction is to begin in the next two weeks, Leisure Hotels President Steve Olson said.

at Innsbrook Drive, the witnesses in the victim's vehicle noticed that someone was following them. One of the witnesses got out of their vehicle and approached the vehicle that had parked behind them, a Chevrolet pickup truck. That witness said the passenger got out and said he was ready to party, and the witness told him that Mirabal had just been joking with him.

The witness said this man then approached Mirabal on the passenger side of his vehicle and "a scuffle ensued." The victim yelled, "Help me get the gun away from him," the witnesses told Born. Then they heard a shot. They drove away but stopped when they heard Mirabal say "Hey hey," running after his vehicle. Just before he reached the vehicle, he fell to the ground face down.

The women loaded him into the vehicle and drove to Lincoln County Medical Center. They saw the vehicle with the suspect

in it when they got to Sudderth Drive and Paradise Canyon. They noted the license plate and identified the passenger as the person who had scuffled with Mirabal.

The vehicle was registered to Jack J. or Neva Stepp of Las Cruces. Detectives Doug Babcock and Bob Layher located and interviewed Jack Stepp in Las Cruces.

The other side

Born's criminal complaint states that Stepp said he and his friend Pete Noce were partying in Ruidoso when they had "some conversation with the victim and the two female witnesses. ..." After this, Noce and Stepp followed the victim's vehicle. Stepp said he had a 9 mm. Baretta pistol in his truck that he had previously shown to Noce.

Stepp said Noce left the vehicle and met with Mirabal on the passenger side of his vehicle and started to struggle with Noce. Stepp said he got out of the truck when he saw the victim on top of Noce. Stepp said he took a flashlight and struck

the victim once on the head to get him off his friend, then Noce and Stepp returned to Stepp's truck.

Stepp said Noce had the gun when he got back into the truck and they headed for Noce's residence in the Hondo Valley. On their way to Hondo, the two talked and "at some point Stepp learned from Noce that he (Noce) had fired the weapon." Born wrote. Stepp had said the gun holds 10 bullets with a copper casing and said he never kept a bullet in the chamber while traveling with it in his truck.

"Stepp and Noce discussed the occurrence and Noce thought he had shot the victim," Born's complaint states. The two went to bed and the next morning drove to Las Cruces.

Born and Det. Jim Biggs arrested Noce in Silver City Aug. 27, brought him back to Ruidoso and booked him.

Born said Tuesday that he will interview Stepp again, probably Thursday. He said all of the people involved in the incident were intoxicated.

Divorce is such a messy thing

Parting isn't such sweet sorrow, for either the Village of Ruidoso or the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (SWA). The divorce should be final, for sure, in three months. Messy, but final.

So why wasn't it really final back in the fall of '98 when the village split from the SWA and decided to do its own trash hauling and slash picking?

The money, of course. Mayor Robert Donaldson said last week the council agreed to allow SWA to continue to use its transfer station before hauling its solid waste to the jointly owned disposal site south of Alamogordo — \$4.50 per cubic yard the agreed-to rate.

The mayor said the price was set using the SWA manager's figures, but a study revealed it wasn't enough by half. Compacting and hauling costs really came to \$8.97 per cubic yard, and there was no provision in the agreement to renegotiate. So the village decided to terminate and go back and discuss a different price. However, there was no wiggle room; \$8.97 per cubic yard was rock-bottom.

The SWA board balked, concluding it could buy a truck and haul the garbage directly to the land fill from the other participating communities and the rural areas of the county for something like \$7.50 per cubic yard.

The village said fine (having some doubt about the SWA estimate), go ahead. Meanwhile, the village would take over the recycling program in the village limits, reclaiming the \$55,000 annually it had agreed to pay the SWA for doing that. The SWA wasn't emptying the recycling bins on a regular basis anyway, the mayor said. That money, plus some extra, comes from a 75-cent monthly recycling charge on every residential and commercial location in the community.

So the SWA wasn't very diligent in its recycling schedule. But the village finds it probably won't be able to handle plastic, steel, glass and paper because there's no market for resale. Its crews will recycle only cardboard and aluminum, for which there is a market.

Therefore, the word seems to be that after the divorce becomes final, around November, everybody in Ruidoso has permission to dump everything except cardboard and aluminum cans in those neighborhood containers the bears love to turn over, and the village will haul it to the landfill. That will take some mental adjustment for the environmentally conscious population.

Nearly all divorces come down to compatibility and money, and this one is no different. Just trashier than most.

Jail planning in crisis

To the editor:

During the regular meeting on Aug. 19 of the Lincoln County Commission, a question was asked and answered relating to the time and cost of the proposed Lincoln County jail.

At this meeting a series of charts were shown illustrating floor plans, sizes, and costs of jail construction in several New Mexico cities. This data was furnished in a series of explanations by several consultants, including architects, engineers and finance people. The charts differed by towns showing wide variances in floor plans, accommodations and final costs. The question asked the "experts" was to the effect that since all jails have a distinct and common use, why are we starting from scratch in Lincoln County? The answer was, "we are planning according to the wishes of the Commissioners."

Since jails are now being

built on a regular basis, why can't a basic plan be devised for all jail construction? Jails contain cells, recreation areas, food service, medical, office and other areas all common to every jail. Basic construction is formed walls or tilt walls. With a pre-plan, all one would have to do is adjust for the size of the number of cells required. A minimum of 80 cells, 40, 50 cells as needed. Pre-determined jail floor plans would save time and reduce costs.

Plans for a Lincoln County jail have been in process for a long time. Now, we must listen to proposals for our jail. Why not consider the plans approved for jails in other cities; one might fit our needs. A question regarding the cost of the consultants appears to be in the neighborhood of \$250,000. We need to better manage how we spend the taxpayers' money.

My new employee, a high school student, arrived last month from Wyoming. The first thing she saw was orange barrels and three construction workers relieving themselves on the side of the road. ... I have remained silent on the road issue until now, but this is disgraceful! How much more will we put up with... Do we wait until 15 or 20 businesses close on Mechem because of poor access?

Classic Bronze Foundry opened last month in Ruidoso Downs. Their only driveway has been inaccessible over half of the time. ... Heavy equipment deliveries have been delayed. Meadow Valley promised to be finished there by July 4. If trucks cannot make it up the steep, muddy drive, how can clients in small cars? ...

My question is, "who's pocket is being padded for allowing...excuse after excuse, and how long are we going to take it? Is there no such thing as "breach of contract" anymore?"

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Almost half of us seem to dislike our Constitution

The U.S. Constitution seems to be under attack.

That may not be surprising news to some people who point out the government's perceived encroachment on civil rights.

But this attack is coming from a different direction. According to a recent survey by Rasmussen Research, just under half of Americans, 49.5 percent, would vote for the Constitution if it were on the ballot today.

The same survey also found that 23 percent of those surveyed say they would vote against the Constitution while 27 percent said they were not sure either way.

The lack of confidence in the Constitution, however, seems to stem from a general distrust of the government and how it carries out its obligations as defined by the Constitution.

That same survey showed that just 34 percent of survey

respondents believe the government currently operates under the Constitution while 50 percent say it does not and that the government violates its charter on a regular basis.

Only 54 percent of survey respondents believe that the Constitution is the best way to run our country today while 38 percent say that it needs to be updated to reflect the massive changes that have taken place in society over more than 200 years.

I think it all boils down to interpretation. The Constitution, a living, breathing document, has been amended only 26 times. The latest being July 1, 1971, that dropped the voting age to 18. When you look at other constitutions in other countries and states, this is an incredible feat of restraint.

If you went by the letter of the Constitution, for example, there would be no Air Force. As far-sighted as the country's forefathers were, they certainly could not be expected to see that development.

In related news, another survey by the First Amend-

ment Center at Vanderbilt University, a program of the Freedom Forum, looked at the public perceptions of the First Amendment.

Survey results included:

- Nearly one-third of respondents said they believe the First Amendment goes too far.

- Fifty-three percent believe the press has too much power.

- Only 63 percent (down 80 percent in 1997) said newspapers should be able to publish freely without government approval.

- Only 48 percent support the reporting of government secrets.

Other results from that same survey showed that support for high school newspapers being able to print controversial material went from 45 percent in 1997 to 37 percent.

These results are obviously the outcome of a lack of confidence in "The Media."

So the public feels a lack of confidence in the media and the government. Fine. But to take it out on the Constitution seems to be simply flawed logic.

Torres said her modern talent was sewing and creating traditional dresses. For her traditional talent, she sang an Apache song.

"I was asked to run (for the title), because people know me and know where I come from," Torres said. "They knew I had a good chance because I still speak and understand Apache. I know a lot of our traditional ways and can prepare traditional foods."

This is her first title. She was crowned July 29.

"People have told me they're real proud of me. I've already been asked to appear at many traditional functions and at the crowning of Miss Navajo Nation," Torres said.

However, Torres said she intends to break one tradition.

"Usually, Miss Mescalero runs for Miss Indian New Mexico, but that's only two months after our competition and I think that's too soon," Torres said. "What I've chosen to do is to maintain this chance to repre-

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


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President appoints Laws to chair Mescalero tribal election board

Rufina Laws chaired her first meeting Monday as head of the Mescalero Apache election

board. Tribal President Sara Misquez during a tribal council meeting nominated her for the position late last month. Laws was at the meeting to explain

her reasons for refusing as a member of the election board to sign a certificate validating the August special election and she criticized some actions she considered abuses of the election

code. Christie LaPaz, tribal council member and son of long-time election board chair Elizabeth LaPaz, removed his mother's name from consideration.

At first, Laws thought she would refuse the nomination by Misquez and she would send a letter to the council nominating Betty Smith, who was on the board for more than a decade

and is an accountant, Laws said. But she said she later decided to accept the position, and Monday conducted the first meeting of the election board in preparation for an October primary and November general election.

Although Laws has been critical of some of the actions of Misquez, part of the problem may be that the interim president relies too much on advice from non-tribal members, she said.

"The tribal attorneys are not members of the tribe and they have a vested interest in maintaining the status quo," Laws said. "They are insulating the administration from its people. The sitting president needs to use the attorneys and other advisers only as instruments to conduct the business of the tribe. It shouldn't be the other way around and, in my perception, that's how it has been."

"If we are to develop into a democratic society, the people need to be involved, to agree or object to the ordinances and resolutions placed before the tribal council. Council members need to talk to their people more to ensure these rules and regulations come from within and not from outside the tribe."

A message from Misquez that she is not commenting for articles about the tribe was relayed through tribal administrator Ferris Palmer. Misquez was elected in August to serve until the regular election. If she wants a two-year term, she must run in the October primary and win the November general election.

Smith, who no longer serves on the election board, suggested that no matter who sits in the president's chair, its time for a change in the tribal constitution.

"It was designed to give the president total control and needs to be changed before we can have a democratic government and not a dictatorship, which we are experiencing again," she said.

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All county youth invited to inaugural event at Funtrackers in Ruidoso

An evening at Funtrackers, sponsored by the DWI program, is planned Sept. 27 for Lincoln County youth.

Sixteen parents met last week and planned the first large-scale youth event since That Place teen center closed its doors July 15 because of a fall-off in attendance brought about by rumors of illicit activ-

ities, and a lack of operating money. After talking to young people, a September dance was changed to an evening at Funtrackers, said Vicki Hiesel, administrative assistant of the

Village of Ruidoso/Lincoln County DWI Prevention Program that is funding the event.

Hiesel said the event is scheduled for 6:30-9:30 p.m. Sept. 27, a Monday, because it's a "down-time for kids, when they don't have other sports going on," she said. The owner of Funtrackers, Ray Eidson, "gave us a really good rate, and the DWI program is covering all the expenses except the food," Hiesel said.

The event is open to middle and high school students in the county. Some events will be DWI-related to raise awareness of the dangers of drinking and driving.

Hiesel said the DWI program doesn't have money to feed 500-1,000 youth. Wanda Gielow de Figueroa, coordinator of the Lincoln County Maternal Child Health Council (MCH), said organizations or individuals willing to donate money or food may call her office at 878-7197.

The next meeting to address youth in the community will include youth and will be at 6:30 p.m. Sept. 13 at the Ruidoso Senior Center. Figueroa suggested that each of the original 16 parents present bring a youth and that the former managers of That Place teen center bring their "core group of kids." At the meeting, the DWI event will be planned and a name chosen for the

group of parents, community members and youth.

Although one goal of the parent council had been to put together a proposal for the Ruidoso School Board for the use of the White Mountain gymnasium, Figueroa said she thought they should get input from youth before pursuing it, because they might not be interested.

Figueroa said the group began with the MCH roundtable July 28 when village employees and community members discussed how to collaborate to take care of youth needs and build up their "developmental assets." Figueroa defined those assets as strengths that come from positive interactions between adults and youth and activities that raise the self-esteem of youth.

Figueroa said the Department of Health has awarded a \$10,000 grant to MCH to staff a group to come up with a strategic plan for building de-

velopmental assets in Lincoln County. She said New Mexico was rated as one of the worst places to raise a child in two reports in the last six months. High-risk behaviors — such as suicide, drugs, and unprotected sex — and social economic indicators, such as poverty, single parenthood, and "never-married" pregnant women, were cited as the main reasons for the poor ratings.

The grant will establish a team of youth developmental asset builders, plan training programs and offer technical assistance for youth development. The money also will be used to come up with a youth development strategic plan, and evaluate changes in Lincoln County in these developmental assets or strengths.

Figueroa said she would coordinate the group and educate other groups on asset-building activities, but a chairperson or an adult and a youth co-chair is needed to lead it.



Arts and crafts fair 'a family reunion'

Hand-made leather shoes, wooden toys, jewelry, fine art, salsa, flower arrangements, clothing and many other items will be on display at the 15th All American Arts and Crafts Fair Sept. 3-5 at the All American Park in Ruidoso Downs.

The fair will exhibit the wares of more than 80 vendors from Texas, Colorado, Oregon, Oklahoma, Arizona and other places, and draws about 12,000 adults every year, said Shirlene Roberts, one of the 85 organizers from the Ruidoso Downs Auxiliary, which sponsors the event.

The admission fee is \$1 for adults and children 10 and under accompanied by adults are free, Roberts said.

"We try to keep our admission low enough for people who bring kids," she said.

The proceeds will go back into the community — scholarships, the Easter Egg Hunt, fruit baskets for the elderly and different service projects throughout the year. Roberts said the auxiliary makes about \$10,000 every year on the arts and crafts fair.

Some of the vendors specialize in face painting and children's toys. Many of the visitors are "regulars" who come to buy their Christmas gifts every year, Roberts said. She said she thinks about 75

percent of the attendees are from out of town.

"People come from all over the country that have been coming for years," Roberts said. "It's like a family reunion."

All the visitors and the 80 vendors fit into a 100-by-200-foot tent, and there's enough room for food booths as well as places for people to sit down and rest. School organizations will sell different kinds of food, including barbecue, hamburgers, and hot dogs, and a vendor from Texas will sell a new kind of popcorn that's getting rave reviews, she said.

On Saturday and Sunday there will be a drawing for a \$250 shopping spree at Wal-Mart, and door prizes will be given away during the fair.

At 3 p.m. Saturday the annual pie contest will be judged, and prizes will be given. Roberts said prizes usually include a dinner for two or a gift certificate to a beauty salon.

Vendors will set up Friday morning and the circus-size tent will be open to the public from 1-7 p.m. At 1 p.m. the decoration and display of the booths will be judged and winners will be announced and ribbons given out.

On Saturday the tent will open at 9 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. and Sunday's hours are 9 a.m.-5 p.m.


Jody Nix, a Big Spring, Texas, Western swing group will entertain for the dance following the program featuring the qualifiers.

Trainers face a \$2 million question

Stealing a page from Churchill Downs and Kentucky Derby fanfare, Ruidoso Downs Race Track officials have changed the format for determining the post positions for the \$2 million All American Futurity.

A Thursday draw will determine the order of selection for post positions. That will happen at 1:15 p.m. followed by a 30-minute lunch when owners and trainers can plot their strategy. Beginning at 1:45 p.m., each owner will have one minute to select a post position.

"We feel that this will add great excitement and drama to this \$2 million event," track president Bruce Rimbo said. "To our knowledge, this will be the first time such a procedure is followed for quarter horse racing."

History favors post positions seven and 10. Seven has yielded eight winners while the No. 10 hole has produced seven winners. The No. 4 post position has six winners to its credit, but none since 1988.

Trainers with entries in the big race agree on this — it depends on your horse.

"Most of the trainers know their horses and they know pretty much where to run," Kenny Hart said. Hart trains and will ride the Futurity's sixth-fastest qualifier in

Familiar Faces. Hart wants something on the outside, either the eight, nine or 10 hole, because that's where his filly runs the best.

John Bassett has the fastest qualifier in A Delightful Dasher and would opt for the one or two post position.

"If my horse had a little more experience, I might go for the eight or nine. He's still a bit green. He needs to be trapped on that fence so he can't go anywhere but down that line," Bassett said.

Then there's Jack Brooks, a seven-time Futurity winner.

"We'll all be sitting there on pins and needles waiting to see which box your horse gets," Brooks said.



Ruidoso volleyball coach Fran Webb has her sights set on more than just a second consecutive trip to Class AAA State Volleyball Tournament; she wants a reprieve.

"I want to try to redeem ourselves this year," Webb said. "I was pleased that we got to state, but I was disappointed with the outcome."

The results of the first day of pool play at the 1998 State Volleyball Tournament weren't pretty for the Warriors. Ruidoso couldn't crack the goose egg in the win column, going 0-10 in pool play, and was eliminated in short and bittersweet fashion.

The Warriors (8-13 overall in '98 and 3AAA runner-up) probably didn't expect to be at the state tourney, Webb said, but this year, "we have kids that expect to be there."

Returning to lead that charge is senior middle blocker Julie Miller, the Warriors' leading hitter and an all-district selection in 1998. Five classmates join Miller and together they form the nucleus of Webb's varsity squad.

Ruidoso's Class of '00 features 5-foot, 8-inch outside hitter Sarah Fromknecht, setter Aquilina Herrera, all-district selection and defensive specialist Cassie Bednorz, outside hitter Abby Figueroa and setter Lajaun Herrera.

A pair of juniors with limited varsity experience add height to Webb's line-up at the outside hitting position. Kammi Sparks, 5-10, didn't

play volleyball as a sophomore, but she's back on the hard court this fall. Leah Miller, 5-11, moves up to varsity after spending last season on JV. Add in sophomore Carrie Line, a 5-8 middle hitter with a great vertical leap, and Webb has talent to draw from off her bench.

Her dilemma is the envy of other coaches.

"We've got a lot of hitters. It's just a matter of finding them a place to play," third-year coach Webb said.

Webb also has an unknown quantity in senior transfer student Elena Aguilar, a defensive specialist/outside hitter who missed the first two weeks of practice with the Warriors.

Ruidoso will run a 6-2 formation, which Webb said fits her complement of hitters.

Defensively, the Warriors will focus on blocking the offensive charges of their foes with strong net play. That should relieve some of the pressure on the Ruidoso back row, she said.

To make it to state, the Warriors will have to finish as either District 3AAA champ or district runner-up. It will be tough to knock off the Silver Colts from the 3AAA top spot. After all, the Colts are predicted to win the Class AAA state title this year behind the talents of senior Julie Whetton.

But Webb and her Warriors have something from their past that might help them pull off the upset.

"As freshmen, these seniors beat them," Webb said.

All eyes turn to Tiger standout

Every year for the last three years, Capitan middle blocker Lindsey Bush has improved her skills in volleyball. She is more than just tall at 6-foot, 2-inches. She was a selection to the Class AA All-State first team as a sophomore and that's not good news for Capitan foes.

"In my opinion, she's the best AA middle blocker in the state," Tiger coach Bryan Massé said of his junior standout. "She's improved a lot simply because we're going to demand more from her this year."

Indeed, Bush will be the center of attention on this year's Capitan volleyball team. With six of seven players gone from last year's starting rotation which won the District 6AA title and fashioned an 18-5 overall record, the Tigers will rely on Bush to return them to post-season and a long-awaited bid to the state tournament.

"Lindsey's footwork is improved. Her arm speed is improved. Her passing is improved. I really don't see taking her out of the back row," Massé said.

But in addition to losing five seniors, including Brazilian exchange student Adriana Scaaf, from last year's team, Capitan also lost its heir to the setting duties, Brooks Holland. Holland is a junior at Carrizozo where her father, Mel, took over head coaching duties of the Grizzly basketball program.

The loss of Holland hurts worse than losing Erin and Kevin Antrey to graduation or Scaaf, who routinely spiked the ball off opponents' foreheads.

"We absorbed it this year. The trick will be how will we absorb it down the road," Massé said.

Massé has five setters on his varsity roster, four of whom are seniors. The lone underclass setter is Jessica Tully-Mitchell, a 5-8 freshman.

Massé's varsity roster is replete with seniors, but that's deceiving. Six of the 15 on the roster are returning letter winners. Bush is the only returning starter for the Tigers.

Capitan's probable starting rotation has setters Shawna Cupit (5-7) and Holly Schlarb (5-6), outside hitters Krystal Roybal (5-7 1/2) and T.J. Maroon (5-7), and middle blockers Bush and Shawna Shrecengost (5-8).

"These kids are performing like varsity players because of who they practiced against last year," Massé said.

Shrecengost occasionally started in 1998, and has the potential to give the Tigers another punch on the front row.

"Shawna is just a good player, a smart passer and quick on her feet," Massé said.

Capitan will use a formation that Massé hasn't employed in 20 years, an international 4-2 which means a setter is always in the front row. He opted for the 4-2 when at the University of New Mexico summer team volleyball camp Massé saw the 6-2 set hurt the team.

Even though his starting line-up doesn't boast the firepower or experience of last year's Tiger team, Massé said this year's squad "can be as good as last year's with less physical ability."

"We've got the same goals that we've had," Massé said. "We want to be district champs again."

Tigers revert to old tactics

The Capitan Tiger football team scrapped plans to open up its offense, and who could blame it.

The Tigers rushed for 457 yards en route to a 32-13 season-opening victory over Hatch Valley Friday.

Capitan coach Ed Davis admitted some people might "call me a liar" because heading into the season, Davis said the Tigers would pass the ball more instead of primarily relying on a ground game.

"We kept trying our passing game," Davis said with a chuckle.

Tiger quarterbacks Joey Saiz and Justin Jones finished a combined three-for-eight passing for 70 yards.

Not all that bad, but considering that running back James Robinson dodged and darted his way for 225 yards on 15 carries, well, it was easy to see why Davis went back to his bread and butter — ramming the ball down the opponents' throats.

The Tigers scored fast and furious from the opening kickoff. Capitan sprinted to an 18-0 lead with seven minutes to go

in the first quarter. Saiz ran in two of the TDs and Robinson broke away for a 50-yard touchdown scamper on the other.

"We came out and executed real well," Davis said.

The Tigers also won the battle in turnovers, giving up one fumble and taking a fumble and two interceptions in return.

Davis, who said last year's Tiger team wasn't mentally tough, saw a sign that things might be different this season. The Tigers committed just three penalties against Hatch.

"We were a little better focused," Davis said.

Although the Tigers won the game they might have lost their first-string quarterback. Saiz twisted his knee in the second quarter while covering a punt and left the game. Backup Jones then ran the offensive show the rest of the game.

"He filled in and did a good job," Davis said of Jones. "We had a couple of bad exchanges but Joey was getting 95 percent of the snaps in practice."

Saiz was at the doctor's office Monday for an evaluation of his knee.

Capitan's defensive effort against the Hatch Bears

revealed a weakness it will have to fix before Friday when the No. 1-ranked Fort Sumner Foxes come to town.

"Basically they hurt us up the middle," Davis said. "We've got some things to fix up the middle. It will be corrected or it's going to be a long year."

Davis expects the Foxes to try to run the ball at the heart of the Capitan defense with senior running back Larry Roybal, a 6-foot 1-inch, 220-pound speed demon.

Fort Sumner lost its season-opening game to Class AA Tucumcari, 36-18.



Warriors repel first game jitters

Leave it to several seniors to provide the gumption the Ruidoso Warriors needed in their season-opening football game.

On a junior-dominated team, it was those with the most experience who led the Warriors to a 40-18 victory over Santa Fe Capital Friday at W.D. Horton Stadium.

Senior running back Frank Dorame rushed five times for 69 yards and three touchdowns behind the blocking of senior Keith Bassett and his cohorts on the offensive line. Senior Thomas Schiele caught the Warriors' first touchdown pass of 1999, a 13-yarder from junior quarterback Todd Schrader as the Warriors shrugged off the visiting Capital Jaguars.

"Frank is a leader by action," Ruidoso coach Les Carter said after the game.

"He doesn't say a whole lot but he leads by example."

Ruidoso looked like it suffered from proverbial butterflies in the stomach on its first several offensive series. Warrior receivers dropped four Schrader strikes and the offense committed three penalties during one series.

But Dorame bailed out his teammates and so did the Warrior kicking game. Twice inside the Jaguar 25-yard line, Dorame found running room around the ends for touchdowns. Ruidoso's punt returners T.J. Montoya and Frizzell Frizzell gave the Warriors field position deep inside Capital territory with healthy returns.

"Coming out we were a little nervous," Dorame said. "We're still not real sound. We'll be all right. The linemen were blocking real good. But we've got work to do."

Carter agreed with his senior back.

"We had some first game jitters. There were times we looked like a million dollars and there were times we were shaky," Carter said. "At half-time, we talked about things and settled them down. We've just got to go back and stress fundamentals — passing and catching."

The Ruidoso defense bottled up the Capital offense for most of the night. The Jaguars found brief success with counters and traps, but the Warriors made halftime adjustments to stop those plays as well.

"They'll get better at making their reads," Carter said.

In his debut as Ruidoso's No. 1 quarterback, Schrader finished 15-for-26 throwing for 187 yards and a touchdown. Schiele was the Warriors' leading receiver with five catches for 66 yards.

Ruidoso (1-0) hosts Class AAA Rio Grande (0-1) at 7:30 p.m. Friday.

FISHING REPORT

For fly fishing —

RIO RUIDOSO: The river level has dropped quite a bit from early last week, but fishing is good. The best patterns are still pheasant tails, green rock worms and prince nymphs. Late afternoons until dusk are producing scattered dry fly action along the vegetation lines of the river banks. The best dries are parachute adams and blue wing olives. Toss a small hopper if you have one. Upper Canyon on the reservation has been fishing well.

BONITO CREEK: There is good water flow below Bonito, reports of several nice brookies being caught, including a 14-inch trophy brook trout. The South Fork has fished well with numerous small native fish. The fish aren't picky and will inhale about anything you drop on the water.

BONITO LAKE: Water level is good with reports of early and late fishing good on dry flies. We have had several chances to

fish the lake early in the day and did well on light cahills, mosquitoes and adams. The spin caster will do well with a bubble rig and propeller fly tied on the business end. The hot propeller flies this week seem to be gold or silver with a hot pink running second.

GRINDSTONE LAKE: Late evening fishing will produce the better fishing here. Several evenings this past week dry flies such as light cahills, parachute adams, gray midges and griffin's gnats have provided numerous surface takes. Spin casters might try a propeller fly with a nymph dropper tied about 18 inches behind the propeller fly.

LAKE MESCALERO: The lake level is good. Shoreline and boat fishing have produced nice fish in the evening hours. Dry flies that have been working are parachute adams, hendricksons, mosquitoes and midges. Walk the shoreline at dusk and enjoy the rises.

EAGLE LAKES: The fishing has been spot-

ty. Propeller flies behind a bubble will do well for the spin casters. It's hard to beat a parachute adams or a blue wing olive during the last hour of the day. Eagle Lakes are always good for one of the county's best nature shows. Sightings of elk and deer usually help keep you entertained. Wear dark clothes because the deer flies like the the lighter colors.



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

POOP SCOOP

Many people consider bears and raccoons as the worst culprits for ravaging garbage containers and leaving behind scattered debris.

But Ruidoso's healthy population of black crows and ravens can create an unsightly mess with just a little help from humans. Leave a garbage dumpster lid ajar or set some bagged garbage next to a dumpster and you soon may have a flock of the glossy-coated birds surrounding the discards.

They're bold and strong in Ruidoso, and historically, ravens and crows are tolerant on many different habitats. They like living around humans just about as much as in the country, because we provide such ready food sources for them. The only necessity is enough trees for nesting and we certainly meet that criteria.

Generally ravens are larger than crows, 21-27 inches compared to 17-21 inches. They have shaggy throat feathers, a heavier Roman nose, wedge-shaped tails and soar with flat wings while crows soar with wings bent upward.

Although crows have gained a bad reputation in some circles, they are believed to be monogamous and mate for life, and they are highly intelligent. However, they can damage agricultural crops and occasionally bully other birds at feeders. They may feed on young birds in nests and are believed by experts to be connected to the decline of songbirds.

According to information in "Wild Neighbors: The Humane Approach to Living with Wildlife," a publication of the Humane Society of the United States, keeping crows out of trash is easy.

If you're using personal trash cans, just be sure the lids are secured with wire or a weight on top, and don't let any trash containers overflow. Trash bags next to dumpsters are an invitation for the birds to rip the plastic and pig out on the contents.

If trash already has been scattered by another wild animal, pick it up or the crows and ravens will take the mess a step further.

Visual and auditory scare devices are used by some homeowners. Pie tins hung in the garden, balloons or audiotapes with sounds frightening to crows also are popular. Even scarecrows may do the job.

ACT scores remain unchanged in New Mexico

New Mexico 1999 high school graduates' composite score on the American College Test (ACT) remained the same as last year, despite the fact that more students took the test.

They posted a composite score of 20.1 on the major college entrance exam. Last year 11,915 graduates took the ACT, compared to 11,525 the previous year.

State Department of Education Assessment and Evaluation Unit Director Patricia Rael said exam scores typically decline when more students take the test.

"We continue to grow in the number of students being tested," Rael said, noting that the success of the New Mexico

Lottery scholarship program has resulted in more students considering higher education.

The ACT is used for admissions, academic advisement, course placement and scholarship decisions, Rael said.

Test results demonstrate that students who take "core" courses including four units of English and three units each of math, science and social studies outperform students who take less than the core.

In New Mexico, students taking the core courses or more had a composite score of 21.3, while those taking less than the core courses had a composite score of 18.8.

Having all students take such a core curriculum is a shared vision of State Superintendent of Public Instruction Michael J. Davis and the State Board of Education.

Rael pointed out that New Mexico has a higher percentage of students taking the ACT whose annual family income is less than \$18,000 than is the case for the nation. "Income continues to be the highest correlate in regards to test success," she said.

Nob Hill scores high marks with national accreditation group

For the second time, Nob Hill Early Childhood Center proved up to the standards for national accreditation and received commendations for the quality of staff-child and staff-parent relationships and curriculum.

In mid-August, Nob Hill received its second three-year accreditation by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC).

Nob Hill remains the only public school in the state to be accredited by NAEYC, and only about 7 percent of all early childhood programs nationwide have received it.

There are about 12,000 programs are currently seeking accreditation.

"The heart of NAEYC accreditation focuses on the child's experience," said Sandra Hatch, Nob Hill's lead teacher for the accreditation process. The NAEYC is "part of the cutting edge of what's being practiced for young children across the United States."

"We try to make sure we are doing the very best across the board for children, and accreditation (assures us) that we have the type of program that's appropriate for their age level and is beneficial to them."

The accreditation team looks at all aspects of the early childhood programs, including staff qualifications and development, environmental factors such as health and safety, interactions between staff and children and staff and parents, and curriculum.

The national experts who grant accreditation commended Nob Hill for a curriculum that provided "opportunities to explore many developmentally appropriate activities and materials, and (for) allowing children to make decisions in accordance with their own interests."

The decision report also noted that Nob Hill "recognizes the importance of a reciprocal relationship between families and programs" and has a high-level staff who understand child

development.

Roger Sowder, Nob Hill's principal, believes the early childhood center received these commendations because the teachers realize children are in families first and parents are their primary teachers.

The overall philosophy, he said, is based on the fact that this will be the child's first experience in school.

"Our staff recognizes the individuality and uniqueness of each child," Sowder said. "Every child has a gift, is able and capable, and each family unit represents a unique environment from which a child comes."

"So we program to suit children, rather than making children suit the program ... We present an overall philosophy that children are first; we recognize how they come to us in different kinds of packages, and then try to adjust our programs to suit their needs."

Sowder said that Nob Hill chose voluntarily to go through the NAEYC-accreditation process as a kind of spin-off of a

pilot program, "Los Niños," funded through the State Department of Education to help local school districts create programs for developmentally delayed 3- to 4-year-olds and to get national accreditation.

Although Nob Hill was one of several pilot sites, it was the

only district to receive accreditation.

Why? "Because we prioritized that," Sowder answered. "We worked to achieve that. We're very proud of that accreditation."

Students get better grades when tested often

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Students may hate frequent tests in their classes, but new research suggests this teaching strategy may help them earn better grades.

Several studies in college-level education classes found that students who received a quiz on reading material every week outperformed other students on midterm and final examination grades by 4 to 24 percent.

A ten-year retrospective of studies on achievement motivation included the finding that students with low grades benefit the most from frequent testing.

According to Bruce W. Tuckman, an educational psychologist at Ohio State University, three main factors — attitude, strategy, and drive — determine students' motivation to achieve. While teachers have done much in the last decade to improve the first two, Tuckman said little has been done to boost students' drive.

"Even when students

believe they can learn material in a class, and when they know the appropriate strategies for learning, they won't do it — until we give them a reason to do it," Tuckman said.

His solution? Quiz students regularly so they can't procrastinate. Tuckman presented his motivation theory and research results Aug. 22 in Boston at the annual meeting of the American Psychological Association.

Tuckman did much of this research while at Florida State University. He is continuing this work on student motivation as head of Ohio State's new Academic Learning Lab.

In two studies, Tuckman compared the performance of two classes who were taking an educational psychology course. One class he quizzed every week on the reading assigned for that week. Those students knew when to expect the quiz, and what material would be covered. He didn't quiz the other class, but gave them comparable homework assignments on the

same reading material. In a third study, he compared the performance of these two groups with a third class who were given neither quizzes nor homework assignments.

Students who were quizzed in the first two studies outperformed the other students' grades by an average of 4 percent and 7 percent respectively. In the third study, quizzed students outperformed the students who did homework by 16 percent, and the students who did

More meaningful than the average performance of a class is the improvement in grades for individual students, Tuckman explained. Students with average or relatively high grade point averages (GPAs) earned approximately the same grade for the midterm or final exam whether they were quizzed or did homework. But the students with low GPAs improved their grades dramatically when they were forced to study for a quiz every week.
