Fire restrictions that include limited outside smoking and no campfires, except in developed campground, take effect at 8 a.m. Saturday, in the national fores around Ruidoso.
"This is the time of year historically when we don't get too many
fires started by lightning," Reidy said. "Most are started by humans.

## Ruidoso enacts fire restrictions

Village follows actions of other municipalities

Fire restrictions will be enforced
throughout most of the Ruidoso ared
beginning this weekend.
The village of Ruidoso is the latest jurisdiction to take action because of a
lack of moisture this season, said Virgil Reynolds, the village's fire chief.

Beginning April 1 open flames will be prohibited, Reynolds said. The ban includes campfires and outdoor burning stoves or grills that use charcoal briquettes. The prohibition includes all outdoor locations, both puble in the village. Gas grills are a

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## OUR OPINION Tribe still marches to its own drum

## Now we know.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe isn't about to join any united Indian front over a gaming compact with the state of New Mexico. The tribe doesn't like the idea of reducing its take, paying the millions in back payments held in an escrow ac-
count-or (and this is a new twist) encouraging competition . count-or (and this is a new twist) encourgging

Although the new compact narrowly received a "do-passs" recommendation from a special Committee on Compacts on
Monday, and has the support of the New Mexico Indian Gaming Association and Gov. Gary Johnson, the Mescalero Apaches steadfastly hold out for doing it their way:

The Alamogordo lawyer, Gregory M. Quinlan, who often is the tribe's spokesman, cites a statewide poll that he said shows a majority against the expansion of off-reservation gaming. Further, an increase in gaming would have a drastic impact "on the ability of Casino Apache and Ruidoso Downs (racetrack and the Billy the Kid Casino) to draw guests from other areas," it was stated in a.tribal position paper released on Tuesday. In other words, let's not spread the wealth.

Compact language at the legislative opening called for 7.75 (instead of 16) percent of gaming revenue going to the state over 20 years, secrecy for most revenue information, and continued arbitration that would keep gambling issues out of state courts. The concurring tribes also would pony up all arrears unpaid under the 16 percent rule.

The Mescalero Apaches won't pay the state anything until a court or arbitration determines the tax to be legally imposed. The tribe doesn't believe the new compact would resolve ongoing disputes, litigation and arbittration between the state and the tribes. Acceptable would have been com-
pact provision that would hand 25 percent of the states pact provision that would hand 25 percent of the suates duced.

Quinlan, the lawyer, said Mescaléro-state arbitration would resume if an acceptable compact isn't approved.

From here, the odds appear to be good that nothing ac-
ptable to the tribe will be approved in Santa Fe this time around.

INCOLN - It was almost 25 years ago and Lincoln was pret-
$4 y$ much a ghost town. Some newcomers to the area had been invited to the shrecengost home for a fried chicken dinner. They arrived on time with no apparent reception, no

number of other apple growers built
the White Mountain Apples packing plant at Hondo as a co-op. That didn't work out too
"The railroad after World war II converted to diesel engines. Aud they didn't need the water anymore, at least not the same quantity. So, the railroad made it possible for my father to buy their lands in the Bonito Valley. And thanks to apple, goon cops, coys and, they paid for it ahead of time."

ndean music comes to Ruidoso Monday with "Alborada," the last of the Ruidoso Community Concerts for the season.

Alborada, which means "dawn" or "first light," is dents. a traveling musical family from Ciudad Obregon, Sonora, Mexico dedicated to keeping alive the music of the Andean cultures - and adding their own punch to it, as well as original compositions of their director, Milo Batista.

Batista toured the U.S. for 14 years as musical director of Khenany, which has performed at the Lincoln Center and Carnegie Hall. Before that he was band director in schools in Ciudad Obregon and directed a band called "Generations" that changed each year with different groups of stu-

Two years ago, Batista left Khenany and started Alborada with his family. Since then, the five musicians have been putting in close to 20,000 miles a year touring in the United States.

His children have been listening to music all their lives. Jhoanna, 8, plays six instruments, and has been playing music since she was 4. Paul, 12 , plays strings, wind, and percussion and has been playing since he was 3 . Batista's wife, Lourdes, plays strings and percussions, and his nephew, Jose Serrano, plays percussion, wind, and strings. All of
them sing and dance.
The concert will include world music and some original compositions of Batista, and audiences will watch the versa: tile family members trade instruments around, sometimes in the middle of a song.
The five performers will also play percussions indigenous to pre-Colombian America such as the cha cha, which is made from the toenail of the llama, and a rainstick from Mexico made from a long bamboo shoot. The highland music from Peru, Bolivia and Ecuador forms the basis of Andean folk music, and through it the ince people recounted events and stories.

Alborada will also play the cuatro which is the national guitar of Venezuela, and many different Aztec flutes including the kena, a cane flute, the charango, a small guitar made of armadillo shell, the bombo, a big drum from Argentina, and sikus, which are traditional flutes from the Andes.
"We add a little more rhythm (to the traditional music)," Batisa
said. "We kind of dance, and ours is a little more up-tempo. We yell, we just enjoy the music. We put our own accent to it and try to develop the rich musical language ... to show that culture can permeate every sensibility.
"I'm trying to do timeless and contemporary music and rhythm," he said. "We choose to let our soul go; it's really important to do quality work that fills our feelings ... and to try to make others feel good and keep alive the music of the Andean cultures."

Alborada released their first album in 1998, consciously taking part in a revival of Andean music
${ }^{\text {"We }}$ feel responsible for sharing our culture with all the world because we are part of the world, and at the same time we are leaming from all the cultures and have a great opportunity to meet people and places," Batista said.

They visit two or three cities daily, and at the same time, are homeschooling the children.

When Burnett finally collapsed on the side Af Allen Street in front of thafford's Saloon (the exact same place where, 16 years earlier, the Earps and Doc Holliday had massed prior to their legendary march into history), Greene quite calmly stoedrever him and fired one more shot, which finished the job.

Mention the OK Corral and images of the Earps and Doc Holliday marching down Fremont
i. Street in Tombstone, A.T., come to mind. Now, most
vat students of that bloody confiontation will be quick
store to tell you that the gunfight did not actually happen
in the confines of the corral itself, but rather took
place in an alley some 90 feet away. Which is not to say that no gunfight ever happened inside the OK Corral. Of course, the word "gunfight" implies that there were at least two men shooting at each other, so the word "shooting" may be more appropriate here.

## Metcical Im

There were some similarities between the earlier, more famous shooting and the one that took place 16 years later, in 1897. Actually, the only real similarity was the fact that both shootings were the result of a long-standing feud that had finally reached flashipoint.
The second OK Corral shooting took place on July 1, 1897 and it invoived a rancher by the name of Williani Comell Greene and a justice of the peace by the namie of james C . Bumett. Jiin Burnett, occasionally known as "Bad" Jim, was not what one would expect after hearing the words "justice of the peace." Bearded, and with shoulder-length hair, this justice of the peace preferred a sawed-off shotgun to a gavel. His bailiwick was the small, now non-existent mill town of Charleston, not far from

Tombstone, and he ruled it in a fashion that was not unlike Nor: iega's approach in Panama.

Burnett's method of fining miscreants was interesting, to say the least. For example, if a drunk was attempting to "hurrah" a saloon, Burnett and one of his constables would atrive on the scene aind immediately declare court in session, then and there. Sometimes the troublemaker's fine would consist of delivering $x$-amount of steers to the Burnett ranch on the San Pedro River and on other occasions the miscreant would be ordered to deliver aload of wood to the Corbin Mill.

You guessed it. Jim Burnett held a firewood contract at the 'Corbin Mill. More often than not, however, the fines were cash and they went immediately into the justice of the peace's pockets. In moré modem parlance, it was a "pretty good racket.".

Bumett, when pressured to make an accounting of his finançes, simply refused to do so. And with that shotgun customarily draped across his arms, no one was inclined to push the matter. Burnett's most infamous outrage was probably the time that he ordered a cononer's jury to rule that "it served the Mexican right for getting in front of the gun." (lsntit interesting how the Hispanic people, who were for the most part industrious, law-abiding and friendly, to say nothing of being the first nonNative Americans to settle the area, were almost always treated as being second-class citizens by the Johnny-come-lately Ang los\%).

In the late 1880s, when Charleston began to slowly but inexorably fade into a ghost town, Burnett relocated to the town of Pearce (now also a ghost town), where he maintained his status as justice of the peace. He did keep his ranch on the Sar Pedro, though, and that was where he and William Greene fell afoul of each other: As is frequently the case in the southwest, both then and now, the dispute was over water.

## The trin and tiog gits

Creene, whose ranch was a short distance up the San Pedro from the Bumett place, built a dam that significantly slowed the flow of water that Bumett needed to irrigate his own land, which, as you can imagine, did not sit well with the so-called jus* tice of the peace.

It was on the sweltering afternoon of june 25, 1897, that Greene's two young daughters, Eva, who was 7, and her big sister Ella, who was 9 , decided to go swimming with their friend Katie Corcoran. As the three girls headed down to their favorite swimming hole, they were unaware that the night before, someone had dynamited the dam that their father had built.

It was lititle Katie Corcoran who was unludidy enough to be first at the water's edge The swimming hole, which had been quite shalJow was now quite deep, but the children, its their haste, did not notice Poor little KKatie couldn't even swim, and when she began foundéring about, Ella, who was aware that her friend couldn't swith, leapt in after her: As Eva began to follow, Ella tumed to her and screamed at her to "go back!" She did, and indoing so, became the only survivor of the tragedy. Both Katie Corcoran and Ella Greene drowned.

William Cornell Greene, like any loving father, was beside liimself with grief. And beneath that grief was a deep, abiding thirst for vengenace that, in the end, could only be assuaged by the blood of jim Burnett, And even though Greene was aware of just who it was that had blown out his dam, he placed an ad in the Tombstofie Prospector offering a $\$ 1,000$ reward for proof of who it was that actually did the deed.

One of Burnett's Chinese farmhands came to Greene and told him that, according to Greene, "if they needed any water to (go ahead and) blow my dam out, and ifI did anything, he (Burnett) would kill me.". And that seems. to have been all the proof that Greene needed, if he ever needed any in the first place.

## The shooting

The confrontation came about quite by accident. Ironically, Burnett had stopped in town when he was on the way to investigate thie "mysterious" destruction of his own dam, which had also been dynamited. It didn't exactly take a rocket scientist to figure out who had done this, but Burnett had no proof. (Later, Greene was charged with the destruction of the dam, but the charge was ultimately dropped, Greene. coincidentally had come to Tombstone to have the grip on his revolver repaired. Leaving both his pistol and his buggy with "Honest" John Montgomery, proprietor of the OK Corral, Greene left to attend to other business.
When he returned a few hours later, about one oclock in the afternoon, Greene noticed that Montgomery seemed to be behaving rather strangely, seemingly attempting to stall Greene just outside his office. The reason for this was Jim Burnett sat just inside the door, and Montgomery, just like everyone else in the area, was aware of the recent events that had sparked the feud between the two men.

Montgomery rather nervously attempted to make conversation
with Greene for about 10 minutes. Aboit that time, Burnett decided to leave by the side door and probably would have gone about his business without ever encountering Greene if he had not bumped into some friends in the alley and stayed to chat with them for a few minutes. As it turned outt, it was a decision that would cost him his life.

At about the same that Burnett exited through the side door, Greene, who frad gotten tired of talking about nothing with John Montgomery excused himself as politely as he could and went inside to get his pistol to take to the gunsmith's. When he did, he saw Bumett in the alley. Stepping outside, Greene unhesitatingly walked up to his foe, who was seated in a chair, and without further ado, opened fire.

Even though Buitriett was hit three timies in the chest at close range, he still managed to get to his feet and began staggering up Allen Street, with Greene right behind him. When Burnett finally collapsed on the side of Allen Street in fiont of Hafford's Saloon (the exact same place where, 16 years earlier, the Earps and Doc Holliday had massed prior to their legendary march into history). Greene quite calmly stoód over him and fired one more shot, which finished the job.

City Marshal Charlie Wiser, who was familiar with both men and knew that, if not for this feud, William Greene was known as an upstanding citizeni put his hand on Greene's shoulder and pointed out the obvious. "You've done old Jim up." he said. Greene's reply was to the point. "I had to do it," he responded. Then, Greene raised his right hand to the heavens and melodramatically declared that "Vengeance is mine!"

## Aftermath

Well, he did it all rotht. When a passerby rolled the body of jim Burnett over, according to the Tombstone Prospector, "the last heaving of the lungs caused gouts of blood to spout fromi a ghastly wound to the breast."

Virtually everyone seemed to think that Greene had done the community a service. Fatned inebriated prosecutor Allen English even took the extraordinary step of withdrawing as prosecutor and switching over to defend the accused. A writer for a newspaper called the Border Vidette said it for everybody when he wrote that "There is not much doubt that Greene will be cleared, as what he did was what any man under the circumstances would have done. and the man he killed was a
mighty good one to be dead."
The kiss of death for the prosecution was when one of Greene's friends testified that he had heard Burnett threaten Greene's life. On the frontier, there was an abiding idea that if a man threatened your life, you were quite justified in shooting him on sight.

Acquitted, Greene went to Cananea; Mexico, where he pur-
chased a copper mine three years later. With electricity becoming more and more common, and the demand for copper rising with it, Greene became a rich man.
Greene, who was not even able to raise money for his own defense during Tombstone ordeal, was eventually worth somewhere in the vicinity of $\$ 50$ million. And while it is doubtful that he ever
regretted killing Burnett, Greene never again carried a pistol.
"If you carry a gun, you might use it." - William Cornell Greene
