

Holiday fills up Ruidoso lodgings

Criminals as well as tourists were on vacation in the Ruidoso area over Labor Day weekend. While the Ruidoso Police Department logged only five crime reports, owners of shops and lodging businesses said they were swamped with buyers and people looking for a place to stay.

A spokesman for Dan Dee Cabins in Upper Canyon said she was booked solid in advance, but the people kept coming.

"Friday alone, we received 20 to 30 calls from people wanting to come in that we couldn't handle," she said. "We referred them to the chamber and to other lodgings. We kind of call around up here and see if there are any vacancies."

High Country Lodge on State Road 48 also turned away dozens of people looking for rooms. Highway construction took a breather over the holiday and no one seemed put off by the orange barrels left behind, an employee said.

A worker at Misty Mountain Gourmet Shoppe said business was "exceptionally heavy" over the weekend.

Even the emergency room of the county-owned hospital in Ruidoso, the Lincoln County Medical Center, reported a higher than normal number of patients.

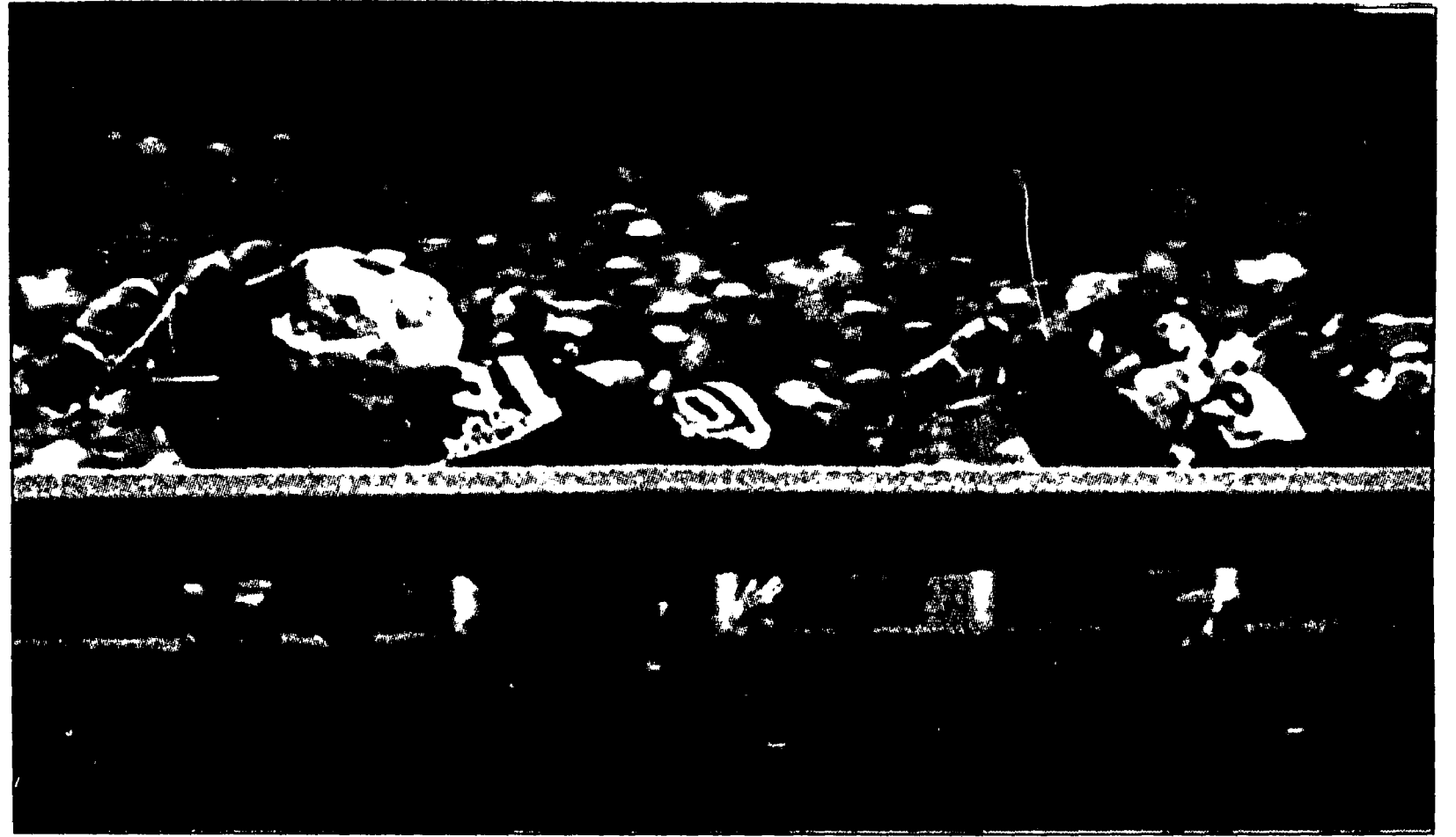
"We usually see 25 a day on a normal summer weekend, but on Saturday, we saw 36, on Sunday, 46 and on Monday, 40," said hospital administrator James Gibson. "They came in for a variety of complaints."

Ruidoso Downs Race Track notched up a record attendance on Labor Day of 15,066 spectators for the annual All American Futurity. Attendance figures for the full weekend were not available Tuesday.

Joan Zagone, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, said while the races undoubtedly played a major role in the influx of visitors, she also heard that people planning vacations in other Western

Hondo clinic could see opening on Sept. 18 with approval

If a state licensing agency meets its deadline, Hondo residents will begin receiving basic health care in their own community later this month.

"Our goal is to open on Sept. 18," said Seferino Montano, chief executive officer of La Casa de Buena Salud, Inc., "The House of Good Health," which will provide services for the Hondo Valley Health Clinic.

Located at mile marker 386 on U.S. Highway 70 at the front of Hondo Valley School, the clinic will be manned by a nurse practitioner, a registered nurse, an office manager, occasionally a physician from one of the non-profit company's other three clinics, and possibly a fourth employee, depending on patient load.

Montano said the state's deadline to inspect and issue a license is Sept. 18. The clinic will either open that Monday or shortly after that date, he said.

"We are looking forward to serving all the residents in Hondo and the surrounding area," Montano said Tuesday. "Offering the best health care services is our number one goal. Our track record in Clovis, Portales and Roswell has been outstanding and we will provide the best in health care for the residents of Hondo."

A community health board and Barbara Casey, Hondo school superintendent, have worked for the past two years to open the clinic doors. The Lincoln County Commission donated a building to the cause and \$20,000 remodeling money, but Casey churned up more money from the state Legislature and other sources to finish the work and to equip the clinic.

Last year during an interview with the *Ruidoso News*, she learned that the clinic also would be eligible for money from a special property tax levy designated by voters to benefit the county hospital in Ruidoso and health clinics in Carrizozo, Corona and Hondo.

Winning approval from the commission for \$180,000 from that levy and approval from the state to move ahead with a contract with La Casa took months more.

"We're not there yet," she said Tuesday. "We're still waiting for the tax levy money and we're fine-tuning the language on the joint powers agreement the county attorney proposed."

As soon as that is worked out, we'll jump in and open. I can hardly wait to start providing services to the people of the area. I get stopped all the time asking when the clinic will open. It's a beautiful facility. I hope people take advantage of it. It's taken a lot of work to get it to where it is now."

All the equipment stored in closets for months was unpacked and is ready for use, she said.

"We just need that license from the state, the tax levy money and the people to come," she said.

Registered nurse Beth Stilwell from Lin-

coln will head the staff. She's a graduate of the University of Southern Colorado and Eastern New Mexico University nursing degree program.

At her side will be family nurse practitioner Doug Barlow of Albuquerque, who has 23 years of experience from family practice to emergency room and nursing home duty. He will be living in the Hondo valley.

Although the company still is reviewing several applicants for the office manager's position, anyone who thinks their qualifications fit the job can contact Montano.

Clinic hours will be from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Services will span primary health care needs, family planning, immunizations for students, Well-Child checks, assistance with the school-based clinic, pharmaceutical dispensing and referrals to dental services at the Portales clinic and medical specialists in Roswell.

Cell phone service officials say there's no 'big problem'

If you've had a tough time ringing through to the cell phone you've dialed, or if you've missed calls on your wireless telephone, you're not alone. While cell phone users in the Ruidoso area are griping over what they say is poor service, the wireless communications companies contend things aren't terrible.

"Our area GM did not indicate a big problem in Ruidoso," said Macy Bodenhamer, a regional public relations specialist with Verizon Telecommunications, one of two major wireless providers in the area. "He did say he has heard from some, but it's not a big problem."

But the head of Emergency Medical Services at Lincoln Coun-

ty Medical Center labels the cell phone situation critical.

"We use it to communicate with our (ambulance) units and the hospital," said Jim Stover. "We're limited with our two-way radios sometimes because it's the same system from Socorro to Artesia. And we use the cell phones to talk directly to areas of the hospital, like directly with a doctor."

Stover said the cell phones seem to not work mostly in the Ruidoso area, but are fine if used elsewhere. He said if he is in Ruidoso, most often his incoming calls are immediately routed to his voice mail.

"That's call blocking," Bodenhamer said. "At times the cell tower was at capacity, there was too much traffic. It should only be

Proposals for Fort Stanton to be revealed

Three firms will pitch their ideas for a study on the future of Fort Stanton Friday and the public is invited to listen.

Lincoln County Manager Tom Stewart said he asked the four-member selection committee on which he serves to meet at the fort about 12 miles northeast of Ruidoso. The meeting will begin at 10 a.m.

Although people interested in the process can observe, they may not participate in the meeting, said Michael Bodelson with the property control division of the state General Services Department.

"It will be the job of the company chosen to come up with alternate uses for the fort and to investigate the possibilities and opportunities," he said. "It will be a team process that sorts out the possibilities and comes up with something that makes economic sense and is feasible."

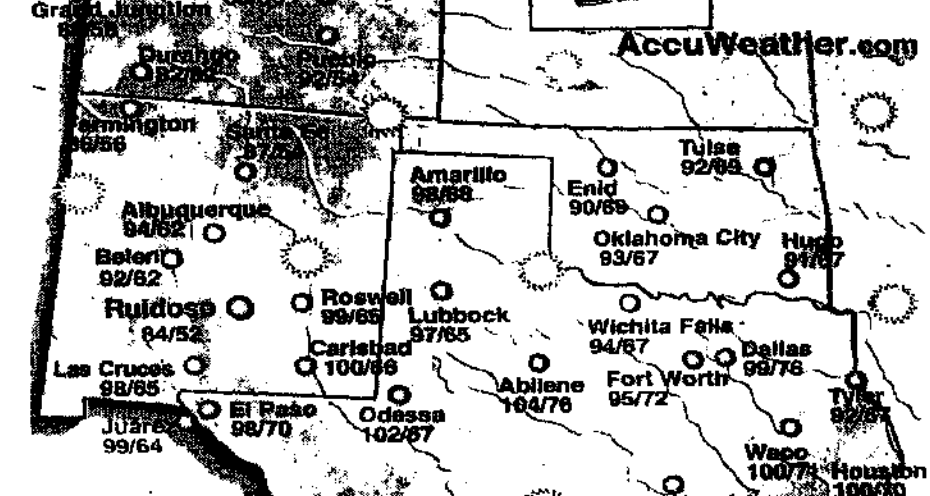
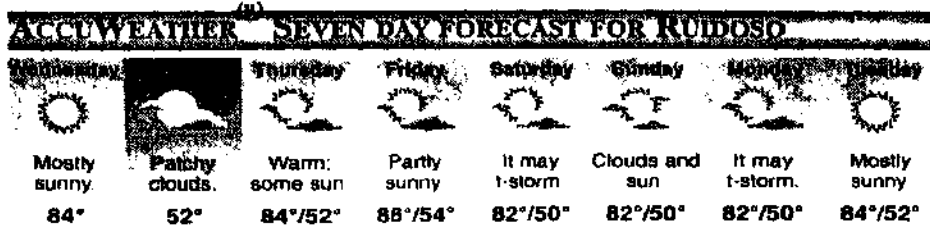

states we're discouraged by the fires there and decided to come to Lincoln County instead.

"The consensus literally was

that there was no room in town over the holiday," she said. "From appearances and the sheer number of people around, it was one of the best Labor Days we've ever had. I'm waiting on a report from retailers."

Ruidoso's mild temperatures that ranged from 82 degrees on Saturday to a high of 85 on Sunday also were a big draw for Texans who in some areas have gone more than 60 straight days without rain and with triple

digit temperatures, she said.

"We had a lot going on all over the area and the region," Zagone said. "Indicators are that the heavy crowds will continue into fall with Aspenfest and other celebrations."

Montano said he hopes to be able to establish a similar relationship with physicians in Ruidoso.

Referrals at the Roswell Clinic include internal medicine, pediatrics, family practice and a surgeon.

La Casa is part of a pharmaceutical service called Share the Care, which Montano described as a joint agreement among the National Governors Association, Pfizer and the National Association of

Community Health Centers. Under that program, Pfizer provides up to nine of its top drugs needed by indigent patients. The only cost is a \$5 dispensing fee per 30-day supply that goes to the clinic.

"We have other programs targeting the (medically) indigent and older people on fixed incomes," Montano said. After being enrolled in the programs, participants are eligible for pharmaceutical supplies free, he said.

"Between our existing three clinics, we provide in excess of \$2 million a year in free

drugs," Montano said.

Some laboratory work will be sent by courier to be analyzed, he said.

Breast and cervical screening will be offered free to women who qualify under a program funded by the state Department of Health and the Federal Center for Disease Control.

"In the future, I will attempt to find money for the expansion of the clinic to provide dental services, but for now, we will refer to our clinic in Portales," Montano said. "That's quite a distance, I know, but

our patients in Roswell also are referred there."

In addition to Medicare and Medicaid, the clinic will have a sliding fee schedule for residents of the Hondo area. Payment for services will be based on federal poverty guidelines for income and family size.

For example, a family of three earning up to \$13,650 annually would be eligible for either free or significantly reduced charges, Montano said.

La Casa De Buena Salud has operated in eastern New Mexico for nearly 25 years.

at times when there is a lot of calls on the network."

Cellular One, the other wireless provider in the region, hasn't experienced the overloaded system, said its district manager.

"We haven't received any problem calls from Ruidoso," said Robert Clinton, whose Cellular One district covers southeastern New Mexico and far west Texas. "I have not heard of any capacity problem in Ruidoso. We do have a problem in the Roswell area."

James Stephens, with Radio Shack in Ruidoso, a Verizon wireless authorized agent, said he's heard from sub-

scribers of both cellular services. He said calls are not going through. Stephens said lightning damaged radio equipment and system demand has been strong, especially during the summer months, appear to be the main culprits.

The Verizon representative said two factors in Ruidoso have contributed to the system, which at times has been overloaded. While stating the number of subscribers is proprietary, Bodenhamer said there has been an annual increase. She said the summer horse racing season brings a lot of wireless phones into Ruidoso, with a corresponding increase in calls. She promised those who have experienced trouble will see an improvement with the

end of the racing season.

"I don't agree that that's the problem," Stover said. "I've had problems at two a.m."

Stephens however said Tuesday brought an improvement.

"I have noticed that since the traffic is down the phones are working better today. It's going to get better too."

He said he met recently with a trio of Verizon officials who promised upgrades to the cellular network in the Ruidoso area.

The long-term fix, Bodenhamer said, is underway. Verizon will be installing new equipment, adding more advanced technology, which, she said, will result in greater coverage and increased call capacity.

She rejects any connection of perceived service degradation with the company's turbulent efforts to site a new cell tower near mid-town Ruidoso.

"Verizon would never compromise customer service to make a point," Bodenhamer said. "The new tower, that's a separate initiative. If and when that tower is put in place that will alleviate the problem."

Stover, interviewed on his cell phone last week, said the phone call went right through at that time because he was out of the Ruidoso area.

Verizon officials said they were in taking efforts with customers who complained about poor service to adjust bills.

On another front for the advancement of the historic 1855 fort, Stewart received news from the U.S. Department of Commerce that a \$44,000 feasibility study grant was approved.

Permission also was granted by GSD

Secretary Steven Beffort and Les Swindle of the property control division for Fort Stanton Inc. to obtain grant money for the preservation of the buildings at the fort.

Fort Stanton Inc. is a private, non-profit group formed with the ultimate goal of establishing a living museum at the complex, which includes more than 80 buildings, several that are original historic structures.

Stewart will coordinate the grant-seeking effort.

From 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, members of the New Mexico Heritage Preservation Alliance Board will tour the fort after a 10 a.m. meeting at the Ellis Store Country Inn in the settlement of Lincoln.

The organization's director and board members have expressed an interest in joining efforts to preserve and promote the fort.

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Downs yearling sales jump by 33 percent, set record

Sales at the annual Ruidoso Quarter Horse Select Yearling for 2000 auction over Labor Day weekend increased by 33 percent from last year's record.

Nearly \$10.3 million changed hands over the three-day event that ended Sunday at Ruidoso Downs Race Track & Casino.

"I've been coming to sales here for a long, long time, but I've never seen anything like this," said R.D. Hubbard, chairman of the track and casino board.

The activity reflects the grow-

ing trend of a healthy horse racing industry throughout American, and particularly in New Mexico, he said.

Seven percent of the 483 horses that passed through the auction ring sold for \$50,000 or more. The average sale price was \$21,324, about 15 percent higher than last year's \$18,469, according to Fritz Widaman, head of marketing for the track and casino.

The comparison to 1997 is even more startling, he said. The 2000 gross sales figure are more than triple the \$3.4 million in sales in 1997.

The sale that year occurred before additional forms of gaming were approved and instituted by the New Mexico Legislature and signed into law by Gov. Gary Johnson in an effort to assist the then struggling parimutuel industry, Widaman said.

Henry Brown of Mesa, Ariz., topped the sale with his winning bid of \$350,000 for HRH The Snowman, a son of Chicks Beduino out of Champion mare and Champion producer Florentine. HRH The Snowman is full brother to champion This Snow is Royal and world record holder Evening Snow. He

was put up for sale by Abigail Kawanakoa of Honolulu, Hawaii.

Last year, Brown was on the other end of the deal. He topped the sale as a consignor by selling a First Down Dash filly for \$550,000.

Jim and Marilyn Helzer of Arlington, Texas, purchased from L/J Farms the second highest seller, First Down Streak, a son of World Champion First Down Dash out of Streak Katie Streak. The sale price was \$200,000.

The Helzers campaigned former world champion and All American Futurity winner Refrigerator.

Trainer Jack Brooks, a seven-time winner of the All American Futurity, purchased First Down Texas as agent for \$150,000. The colt by First Down out of Swingin Val, dam of former Rainbow Futurity winner and \$400,000 earner Swingin Val, was consigned by Julianna Hawn Holt.

Everado Muzquiz of Eagle Pass, Texas, bought the highest selling filly when he paid \$130,000 for Roses Down, a daughter of First Down Dash and out of Rose Among Thorns, dam of Champion I Hear a Symphony. She was consigned by L/J Farms.

Tinnie firm gets historical landmark status

The Tinnie Mercantile, part of the Tinnie Silver Dollar Restaurant complex along U.S. 70 east of Hondo, will be dedicated as a historical landmark Sept. 14.

Majel Powell of the Sierra Blanca Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, said the group tried to gain recognition by the state when officials planned on dedicating four buildings last year. But Tinnie was knocked out of the running because it is privately owned, she said.

That didn't stop chapter members who were convinced the store and restaurant warranted special recognition. They contacted the DAR Historian General, who said nothing stood in the way of chapter

dedicating the mercantile as a historical landmark, Powell said.

At 1 p.m., Sept. 14, a plaque will be placed at the front entrance. Besides local chapter representatives, members of the DAR chapter in Roswell and District Director Edna Buleston of Silver City will attend the dedication, Powell said.

However, Tinnie Mercantile's owner, Salem Sager, will be out of the country that week.

The post office at Tinnie was established in 1903 in the mercantile building, when the mercantile went by the name of Analla, according to information in "A History of Lincoln County Post Offices" compiled by postmasters of the county in 1962. The settlement changed its name to Tinnie in 1909 in

honor of the daughter of the then postmaster, Mrs. Onie Ramond.

Oilman Robert O. Anderson of Roswell bought the building in 1959 and spent hundreds of thousands of dollars preserving the structure. He added a porch all around the building, a tower and a pavilion while putting in the Silver Dollar Bar and a steak house.

John Meigs, an art collector, artist and former gallery owner in San Patricio, handled the restoration. He tracked down some of the original items in the building and purchased antiques from as far away as California to decorate the interior.

Guest house can't have attached carport

A request to construct a carport attached to a guest home was denied Tuesday by Ruidoso's Planning and Zoning Commission.

The commission wrangled with the differences between a garage and a carport, and a main home and a guest house. Village ordinances prohibit two garages on a single-family residential property. The property already has a detached garage.

"I admit there is a main house and a guest house on the property," said D. T. Collins, a land planner representing the property owner. "We want to attach it to the guest house."

Village planner Darrell Bremner said the application was for a second garage, but Collins said there is a difference between a carport and a garage.

"I'm inclined to agree with Tim (Collins) on the distinction between a carport and a garage," said Charles Rennick, an attorney representing the village. "I suppose you could attach it to the house itself and call it a carport. But you want to attach it to the guest house. Guest houses are not addressed in our code."

The village council last month turned down a proposed ordinance that would have identified and regulated guest

quarters.

Rennick advised the commission their actions could set a precedent on multiple non-conforming uses. Collins said the property was a large, 1.1 acre lot with room for a carport in addition to the home, guest quarters and garage.

Commission chairman Glen Barrow wondered if the request could be sent to the village council, which has the final say without a recommendation from the planning commission. Rennick said a recommendation, yes or no, was required.

The council will receive a variance request with a rejection recommendation.

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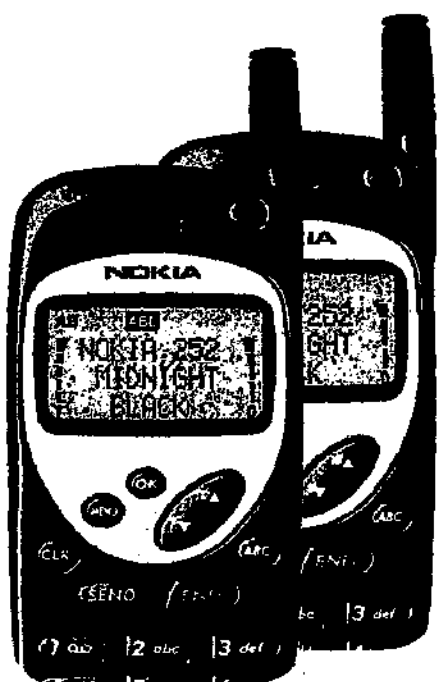

New Mexico's anomalous education system

Every parent of students in the public schools should read today's Education Page (page 4B) and think carefully about the subject—ratings of schools by the New Mexico Board of Education. Why? Because in New Mexico, public schools are governed by locally elected school boards and operated by teachers hired by those boards.

Yet most of the money is handed out by the state Department of Education through the Legislature, which—following the money—means the state calls the tune.

Now the state is rating schools and the districts are watching, and waiting for some hard information to see if those ratings make sense. A large question for teachers is "content" or "teaching to the test."

It should be the same thing, but very few teachers see it that way.

And yet, going up the educational ladder, nearly every college in the land looks to ACT or SAT scores to determine college admissions and to award scholarships.

Do we learn nothing from "teaching to the test?"

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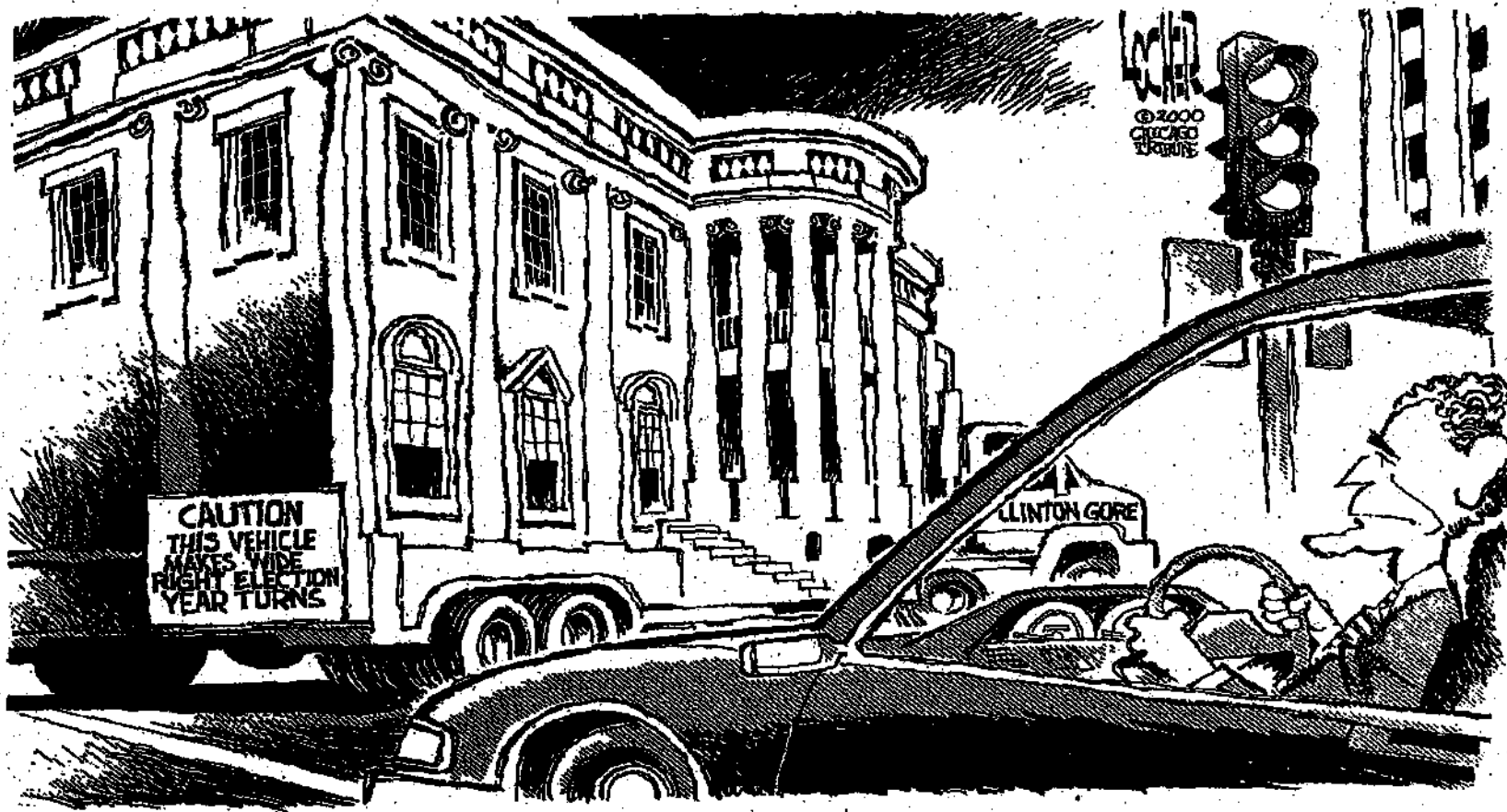

The middleman is far from dead. For years there has been much disparagingly said about that part of the marketing chain between the farmer and consumer. Often the blame for agriculture's financial ills is placed on the faceless entity that processes, packages, ships and retails farm commodities.

The truth is, in most cases the middleman is a necessary part of agricultural marketing.

There is, however, a pocket of agriculture where that is not the case. In direct marketing vernacular it's known as the farm stand. By description it is anything from sweet corn sold from a lawn chair to large permanent emporia stocked with a diverse inventory of produce and gifts.

A growing number of producer entrepreneurs are selling

directly to consumers. Many of these direct marketers are, expanding on the quaint, umbrella-shaded roadside outlets. "We first started out calling ourselves Watt Fruit Stand," said Watt Farms operator Karen Watt of Albion, N.Y., "now we've kind of raised that to a level where we're calling ourselves a country market because we have expanded with a variety of items that are not particularly agriculturally oriented." A cursory scan of the home decorations, compact discs and stuffed animals among the store's fruit, fudge and preserves makes it apparent that this is more than a roadside stand. But the fact is, a decade ago it started just that way.

It's obvious that the fruit Watt grows and sells is a cut above what is available through supermarkets. Consumers are accustomed to find-

ing direct-marketed fruit to be better. "We pride ourselves on our fruit," said Watt, president of the North American Farmers Direct Marketing Association. "We grow a very high quality fruit and that's what gets sold through our retail store." Direct marketers such as Watt, who grows 250 acres of apples, soft fruits and berries with her husband, maintain operations that are highly labor intensive.

All of the fruit is hand-picked and carefully sorted for quality. Some of the fruit is sold in local food stores at a premium, some is sold at outdoor farmers markets but the best of the best goes immediately to Watt Farms' retail store.

Direct marketing goes beyond serving the community with merchandise and fresh fruit. In Watt's case, she promotes agriculture through the

Farm Bureau and hosts tourists on a faux train that runs on a trail through their orchard while a conductor gives an educational narrative about growing fruit.

Traditional middlemen exist for a reason and are in no danger of disappearing. But, there are many reasons why some growers choose to become direct marketers. For Watt, it's economics.

She laments waiting for payment for apples sold through a middleman in 1999. "If I can garner more money directly from the consumer and cut out other people who seem to nibble away at the final amount of money that I wind up with," said Watt, "I get that money sooner and I'm able to regenerate with that."

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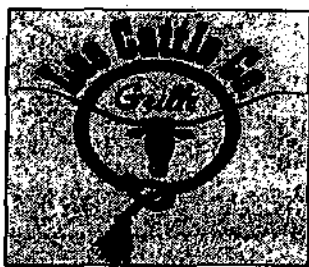
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Bridge tournament at ranch

Special projects added to budget

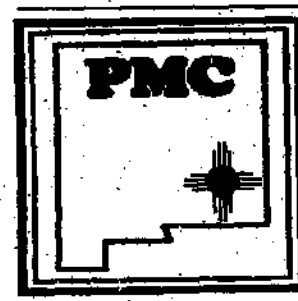

Eyesa Special cruises to All American win

A jockey and trainer who've been there many times before proved why they're so successful Monday at the 42nd annual All American Futurity.

Jockey Jacky Martin rode Eyesa Special to a two-length victory over Fashionisanattitude, posting a stakes record time of 21.097, just missing the track record set 27 years ago.

The All American win was the seventh for Martin and eighth for trainer Jack Brooks, who said he's like to add a few more wins to his streak.

"I hope I do it for several more years because I'm going to keep coming back," Brooks laughed.

But he was still pleased and excited about the victory.

"This is unbelievable," Brooks said. "I knew this horse might have a breathing problem, as hot as it was. He bled a little in his trial."

Martin said the win really was as easy as it looked.

"I didn't have to really push (Eyesa Special) because he was in front and the main thing was just let him keep his feet in front of him and don't do nothing to mess him up at that time," the jockey said. "When I did hit him, he just accelerated. Then he got so far in front he wasn't running. He wasn't really just busting a gut to stay out there, so I hit him a couple more times and boy, when I did, he really accelerated then."

Brooks wasn't surprised with the big edge his horse had, either.

"Not really. Like I say, this horse is really a great colt," he said.

Eyesa Special's win over Fashionisanattitude — with First Down N Surfin third marked the same 1-2-3 finish as in the trials. But the horses did pick up seconds on their times over the muddy, windy trial race.

Martin had a choice of which horse to ride. He also qualified No. 2 Fashionisanattitude, but said he always knew he'd ride Eyesa Special.

"I knew, before I got off of him, when he crossed the finish line in the trials that he'd probably be the one I'd ride, Martin said."

And despite the apparent ease of the win, Martin said the competition was up to the challenge.

"It was a tough field of horses. It really was," he said. Favorite Copper Buff finished fifth.

"I got a good break and he was really running good," said jockey Alex Bautista. "But about 150 yards out, he reached out and grabbed his (right front) shoe and pulled it off. He was running real good but after that he just slowed down and backed up."

Baby Runaway posted a 12-1 upset in the All American Futurity Consolation, leaving hometown favorite Stoli to finish a distant seventh.

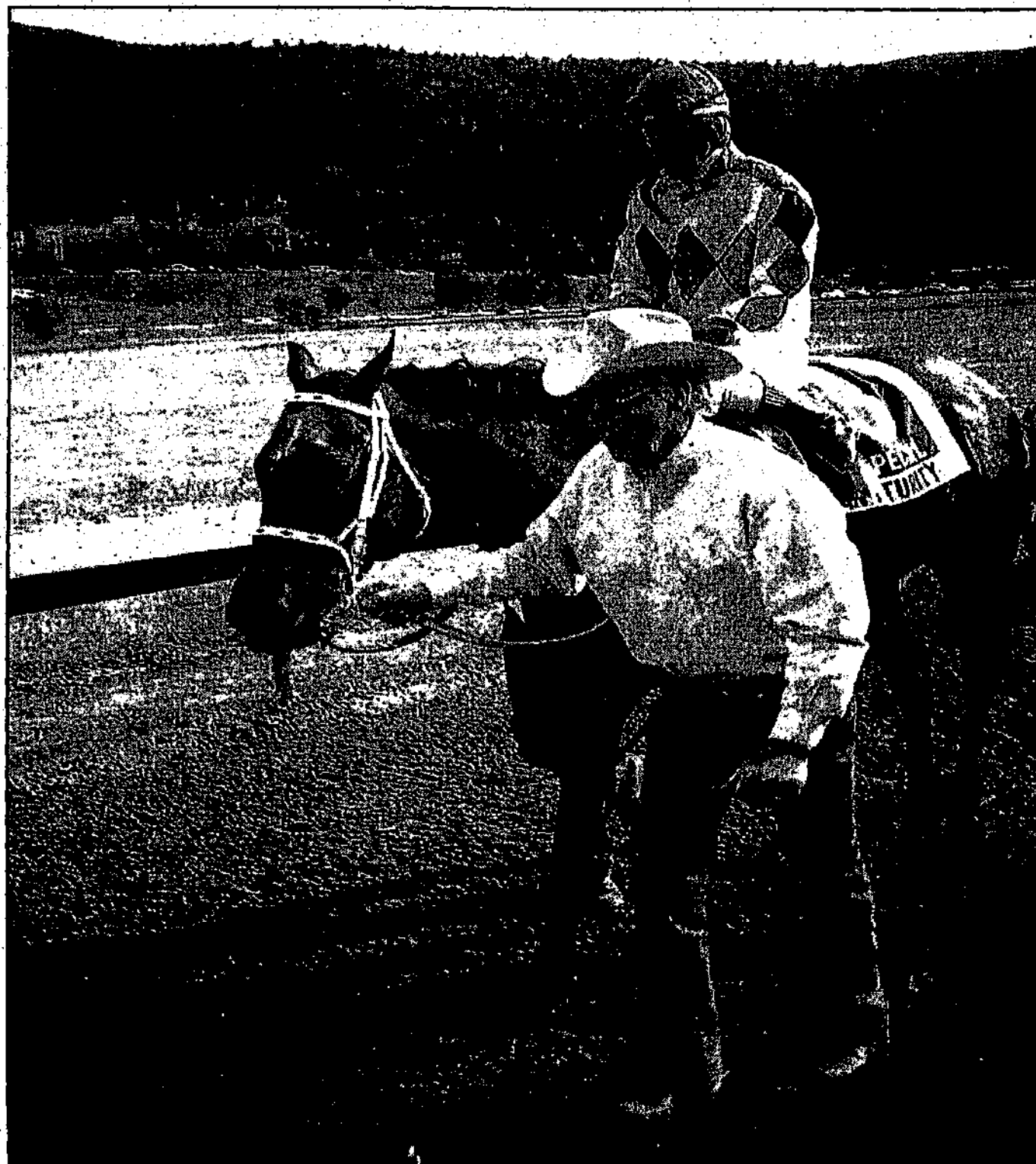
All American Derby

Rojas, Kami Sparks, and Eve Reyes all have experience, meaning the missing graduates won't be quite as missed.

Add in junior Carrie Line and freshman Erin Nutting, and you have the nucleus of a solid Warrior team.

"They do have varsity experience, they really do, and we have about four of them that got serious varsity experience. So that helps," Webb said.

The number of Warriors out for the squad isn't big — about 13 between the varsity

and junior varsity squad, with eight full-time varsity players — but quality makes up for a lack of quantity.

Webb said the team's strength is going to be its hitting.

"We're going to be very strong hitting," she said. "Our setting is coming around, and of course you've got to have that to have hitting. But when our sets are good, our hitters are very strong. So that is going to be one of the things we're going to bank on a lot."

"We want to use our strong hitters to cause the defense to not know who they're going to, because we will be well spread as far as hitting. Hopefully, that will make the defense uncertain as to where we're going with our hitters."

If there's something the team needs to work on, it's passing and serving.

"The thing is, again, if you don't have a pass, you can't have a hit. So we're really going to focus a lot on our passes," Webb said.

Despite the tough district competition, the coach is thinking positive. She really would like to see the Warriors

take the new district title.

"I really think we can," she said. "I think we've got a good bunch. These seniors are strong workers and the ones who are below them are following right along as far as following their lead. And there's some talent. The four seniors are very talented. They're just an athletic group. They really are. And I'm really excited about them."

But first, Ruidoso is going to have to get past the Rams. Webb thinks it's not an impossibility.

"Just because they're ranked No. 1 I don't think we can't beat them," she said. "I think we've got to really focus on them and we're going to have to play the top of our game, but I don't think they're undefeatable. ... We can't look at Portales as our Silver City. We've got to look at them as just Portales and that we can beat them. We got this thing with Silver City that we just can't beat them, we can't beat them. ... I think we have got to really aim high."

The Warriors will get a chance to prepare for Portales during a pre-district season that includes facing such top AAAAA and AAA squads as Roswell, Goddard, Moriarty, Deming and Artesia, as well as 16 of the state's top schools at the Roswell Tournament.

"We're going to go for death or victory, I guess," Webb laughed about the early-season schedule.

Even with the strong competition, Webb said she's excited.

"We've got a good strong bunch and I hate to set my hopes too high but I really don't think I am," she said. "I think it's very possible for these guys to do very well. They've got the work ethic. They've got the athletic ability. And they've got the killer instinct mentality, which is something we don't get very often."

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Glaucoma is an eye disease in which the passages that allow fluid in the eye to drain become clogged or blocked. This results in the amount of fluid in the eye building up and causing increased pressure inside the eye. This increased pressure damages the optic nerve which connects the eye to the brain. The optic nerve is the main carrier of vision information to the brain. Damage to it results in less information sent to the brain and a loss of vision.

Regular eye examinations are an important means of detecting glaucoma in its early stages and will include:

- Tonometry - a simple and painless measurement of the pressure in the eye.
- Ophthalmoscopy - an examination of the back of the eye to observe the health of the optic nerve.
- Visual field test - a check for the development of blind spots.

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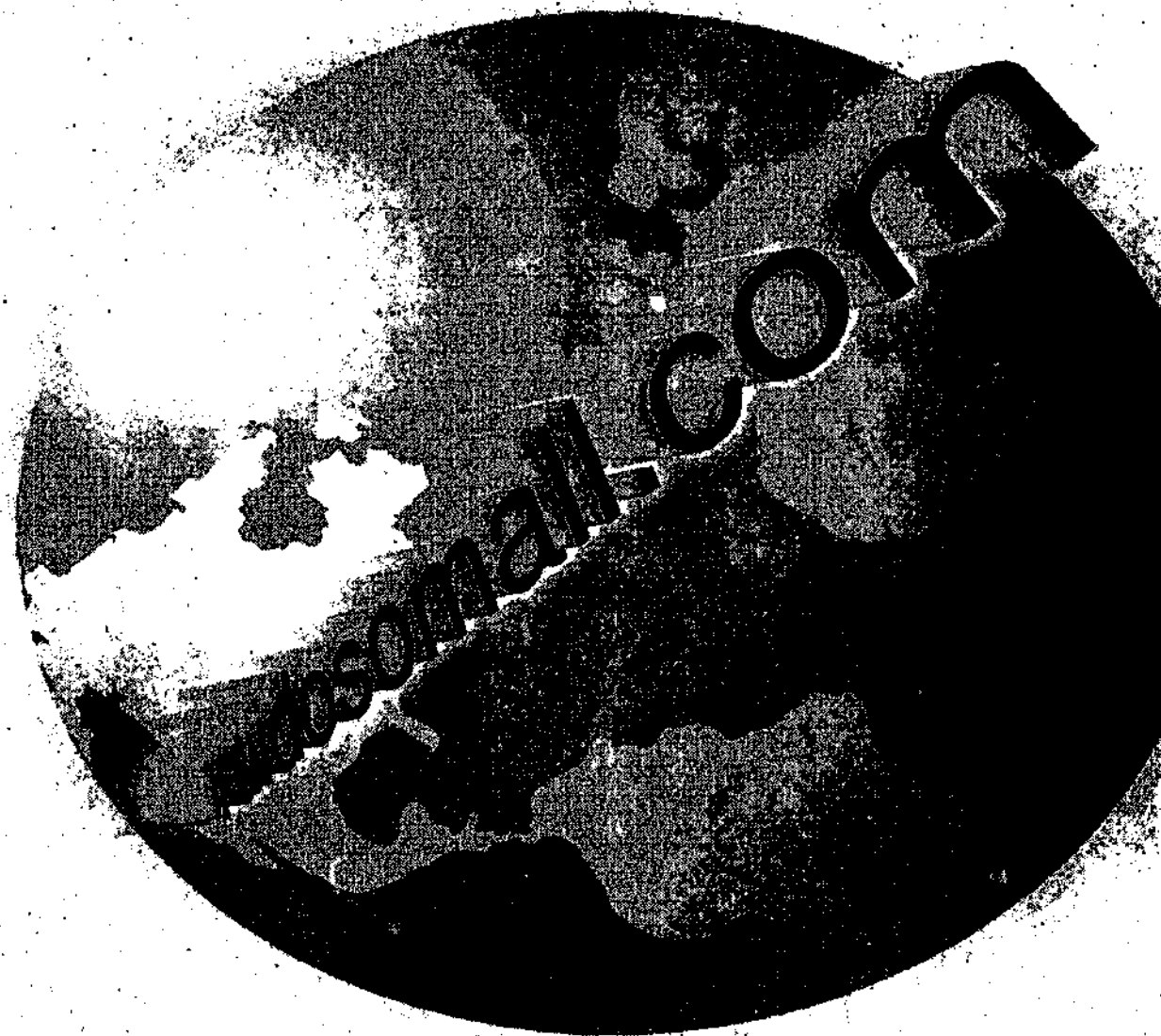
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SCHOOL 'ACCOUNTABILITY'

A State Board of Education ratings report of schools leaves many in the area questioning the methods used — even those schools with favorable status.

Ratings of schools in New Mexico are out — at least on the Internet — and Ruidoso area administrators, for the most part, question the validity of the rating system.

Administrators claim that they have requested information from the system from the State Department of Education (SDE) and not received it. They say not all districts test all students, so the districts' test results are not comparable. No definitions have been established for some of the criteria used to make the ratings, say others, such as for attendance and drop-outs.

The districts are unable to validate the data used to make the ratings, despite requests to the SDE, and their administrators mistrust the accuracy of the SDE's records. Basing a school's rating so heavily on standardized test scores is also criticized, even in those schools — such as Cloudcroft — that received good ratings from the SDE.

Many administrators consider the SDE's accountability system an attempt to get on a political band wagon, and say the result will be a loss of real education as teachers replace teaching content with "teaching to the test."

The model

"This model they devised is just a philosophical model they invented, and they've changed it several times," said Paul Wirth, director of instructional support for the Ruidoso Municipal School District. "They haven't had the opportunity to look at all aspects of the model and pilot it first to see if it makes any sense."

Wirth also pointed out that the SDE has come up with no common definitions for attendance; in some schools this can mean a student in school all day, in others it can mean a student showed up for one class. Yet attendance is one of the criteria used to rate the schools.

"For the life of me, I can't figure out the system," said Glenna

Goodwin, superintendent of Cloudcroft Schools. Her high school was one of the few in the state to receive an "exemplary" rating. "I do think there's some problems with the system they're using and there's much controversy over it. There's been a lot of questioning about how they're rated and the data."

"We'll know nothing as to the specifics (of the ratings) for another two to three weeks on what we scored where," said Dale Jackson, principal of Capitan Middle School. "We do know it can be as simple as having one area of concern that drops you from 'exceeds' to 'meets,' like your CTBS (standardized) test scores."

Jackson mentioned that some of the schools listed as "on probation" in an *Albuquerque Journal* report were not actually on probation and that the state superintendent of schools, Michael Davis, made a public apology.

"We don't know what areas we need to concentrate on because we haven't got the information back," Jackson said.

Wirth said he requested information last spring at a meeting in Las Cruces, so that he could verify that the SDE was using accurate data.

"We were told that it would be available in a couple weeks," Wirth said. "We still haven't received it."

The deputy director for accountability and information services of the State Department of Education, Patricia Rael, said she wasn't aware that Wirth had requested information, and that the SDE held forums last spring and sent preliminary ratings "as a heads-up." She said all the data used to make the ratings came from the school districts, so they already had that information.

Test participation

Rael said the test participation rate for all districts in the state was close to 100 percent, but no data on this has been provided, and many administrators doubt it.

"If she is claiming that close to 100 percent participate," said Helen Kobelnik, principal of White Mountain Intermediate School, "we have asked for them (the data) for the last several years. When are they going to publish the participation rates?"

Because I think we have a right to know."

Kobelnik said 97 percent of the Ruidoso students take the test, and she has talked with administrators from other districts and believes it's much lower, with many students who wouldn't score as well not taking the tests.

Kobelnik also said the model used by the SDE is faulty, that it uses the number of free and reduced lunches, which is not allowed by the federal government for its programs.

"The more free and reduced students you have, the lower the expectation on the score," Kobelnik said. "That's like saying poor kids are ... is refusing to accept this, so the state is still going ahead with this rating system based on a model that the federal government has told me is unacceptable."

Some district administrators and Rael disagree on whether the guidelines for the types of participation by special education students are clear enough that all districts participate uniformly, resulting in data that are actually comparable from district to district.

tribut.

Probation: what does it mean?

Hondo High School received a probationary rating, and Eddie Ward, principal, said no one has been able to explain to his satisfaction what that means. He said it appears that the "standardize tests are the main indicators."

"There are a lot of other indicators we feel should be used to fairly assess what's happening in the individual schools," Ward said.

Only 36 percent of the children entering kindergarten and first grade last fall were proficient in English, Ward said, and only 27 percent rated in the high proficiency grades. Yet 83 percent of sixth graders tested last year are proficient in English, scoring in the mid-level range in reading and writing skills.

This shows, he said, "that the school is making strides to improve the literacy, reading and writing skills, particularly when you take into consideration it's a status population, not transient."

"The students that are coming in at a low level of English proficiency are leaving elementary school at 83 percent. The reason

they are is because of all the programs we have in place, and we implement new programs all the time."

Ward cited accelerated reading programs, a high school reading program for students reading below their expected level, incentive programs, a computerized reading program as some of the things the district has done to raise the skills of students.

A computerized reading program will be installed this week and teachers are being trained to use the program, he said.

Hondo has 125 computers in four computer labs, Ward said, "more than most schools our size."

"We know we do certain things well," Ward said, "and are continuing to do those well and trying to improve on the deficit areas we see. We are certainly dealing with those on a daily basis."

Rael said probationary status "means that, using the statewide indicators, which are assessment results, dropout results and attendance results, a school is considered not to be meeting the state standards, that they are in need of some actions that will improve its status."

The first time a school is rated probationary, Rael said, the school receives a performance warning, "and they are required to do a needs assessment, to review their plan for student success, to work closely with their district to align their work with the district curriculum and, in turn, the district curriculum is aligned with state expectations in terms of standards."

The second year a school is rated probationary, the SDE will assist the school by sending staff to train personnel in how to do a thorough needs assessment and to review the progress of students. Schools will be shown how to take the data apart to determine which needs of students are not being met.

"If a school still does not improve its status," Rael said, "then it goes into requirements for school improvements that are closely monitored by the Department of Education."

In the second year of probationary status, a community meeting is required, with SDE staff present and the community involved in helping the school decide which actions the school should take.

EDUCATION BRIEFS

College-bound SAT

New Mexico's college-bound students scored higher in 2000 than their national peers on the Scholastic Assessment Test, a major college entrance examination measuring verbal and mathematical reasoning skills.

The administering College Board reports that on a 200 to 800 scale, New Mexico students averaged a score of 549 on the verbal portion of the test and 543 on the math portion, compared with national averages of 505 on the verbal and 514 on the math.

Twelve percent of the state's high school graduates, or 2,322 students (including 1,779 public school students), took the SAT, an increase of 21 students over last year, reported the College Board.

Cheryl Brown-Kovacic, the State Department of Education director of assessment and evaluation, said many college-bound students prepare by taking advanced-placement courses

and participating in concurrent enrollment programs.

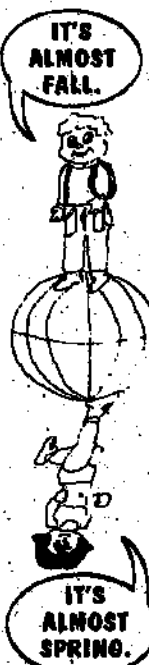

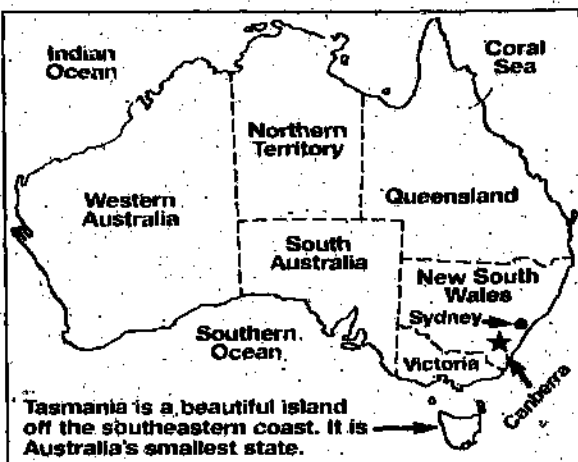

"Biscuit" is another word for cookie in Australia. This popular Australian treat was created during World War I. They were sent in food parcels to troops known as "Anzacs" (Australia and New Zealand Army Corps).

You'll need:

- 1 cup oats
- 3/4 cup coconut
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 tablespoon golden corn syrup
- 2 tablespoons boiling water
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda



What to do:

1. In a medium bowl, combine oats, coconut, flour and sugar. Mix well.
2. In a small saucepan, combine butter and syrup over low heat. Cook until butter is melted.
3. In a small bowl, combine boiling water and baking soda. Mix until smooth.
4. Add water mixture to butter mixture. Mix until smooth.
5. Add liquid mixture to dry mixture. Mix well.
6. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto a greased cookie sheet. Press with a fork.
7. Bake in a preheated 300-degree oven for 20 minutes or until golden-brown.

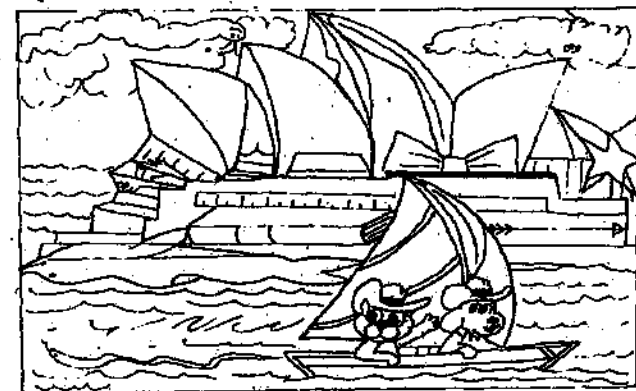

POOP SCOOP

Canine behavior considered a problem by new pet owners usually is normal behavior for the dog or cat.

Once the owner understands the pet's behavior, the actions may become less of a problem, write Suzanne Hetts and Daniel Q. Estep in the second edition of "New Parent Guide," a free publication distributed through some shelters to new adopters.

They advise that pet owners should expect at some point to lose something of value that is important to them as a result of their pet's behavior, especially if the pet enters the home as a kitten or puppy.

The best approach is preventative and working with the animal in the first few months in a new home.

Miscommunication between owner and pet often is the problem and may be rooted in the tendency of people to at-

tribute human actions and motives to their animals.

For instance, people say their dog was acting guilty after a misdeed, when it merely was showing submissive or appeasement behavior, the authors wrote.

Owners should plan ahead on how to react to specific behavior to turn situations into learning experiences, they said.

They offered four hints:

1. Find ways to encourage and reinforce acceptable behavior instead of focusing on how to stop unwanted behavior.

2. Find ways to prevent or minimize chances for unacceptable behavior.

3. Minimize punishment and use it appropriately when necessary. Ideally, punishment shouldn't be part of the problem prevention process, they wrote. If scolding is used, it should occur right after the owner sees the pet misbehave, otherwise the pet won't under-

stand why it is being punished.

4. Find ways of meeting your pet's behavior needs that don't create problems.


