## Our 39 percent isn't a solution

Bottom of the heap ... last on the list ... uncounted or undercounted? We hardly know.

The 2000 decennial census is complete, and the ques tion for Lincoln County is, where is everybody? According to the Bureau of Busies and Economic Research at the University of New Mexico, only 39 percent of census forms distributed here were filled out and returned.

That's not unusual for a tourist destination like Ridoso; apparently the important number isn't the number of forms returned but the number of housing units report ed...the "denominator" instead of the "numerator"

It is doubtful, regardless of what the Census Bureau finally says about our population at the beginning of a new millennium, that it will be believed by more than 5 percent of the resident population.

Nevertheless, well be stuck with that number for 10 long years when it comes time to hand out federal grants of us in the 39 percent who did their duty
