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Gas dispute puts a cold squeeze on Carrizozo

The only thing standing in the way of ensuring an adequate supply of natural gas for the town of Carrizozo and the Lincoln County jail is the gas distributor's decision to reduce pressure in the line, says an attorney representing the town's municipal gas company.

J. Robert Beauvais told county commissioners Thursday that if Zia Natural Gas doesn't increase the pressure in the line, the supply to the town and the new jail could be jeopardized. Town officials guaranteed utilities to the commission as part of a package for the new jail that was to be built in Carrizozo.

Mercedes Fernando-Wells, attorney for Zia,

said her company received the letter from the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas company Monday and it was forwarded to the home office in Wyoming.

"We have a major concern that the two-inch line serving Carrizozo, which I believe was installed in the 1960s, may not be capable of taking higher pressure. At this time, I just can't tell you what our response will be," Fernandez-Wells said Tuesday.

Town officials previously were told that the pressure was being turned down on the entire line because it is a residential distribution line, she said.

Beauvais said Tuesday Zia's position previously expressed in a letter to the commission

that the town's line may not be adequate to serve the jail and calling for an independent engineer's assessment is a "squeeze play." The company previously tried to buy CCNG.

"Beware of the false prophet. Zia created the problem. Our engineer says there is no legal or mechanical reason they can't turn up the pressure," he said. "We've asked them to set it up to its historical range."

"We're putting them on notice that (the company president) is liable if the community loses its gas supply."

A letter was sent last week to Zia following a meeting of the CCNG board, Beauvais said. The village of Capitan and Carrizozo each own 50 percent of CCNG.

During his presentation to commissioners, who are nervous about the possibility their new jail may open without gas to operate, Beauvais said that during or after 1994, Zia unilaterally reduced the delivery pressure to CCNG from 550 psig (pounds per square inch gauge) to a range of 100 to 250 psig in a 4-inch line serving Carrizozo.

"This transmission line was owned and operated by CCNG at the 500-550 pressure prior to the 1992 sale of this asset to Zia," he said. "On Oct. 27, 1997, CCNG requested that Zia increase the delivery pressure to 270 psig. This letter fol-

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Glencoe fire department needs 'fix'

County manager doesn't tie problems to fatal wreck

A problem with a lack of response to emergency calls by Glencoe-Palo Verde volunteer firefighters needs to be "fixed" and Lincoln County Manager Tom Stewart has 30 days to see if he can straighten things out.

One of the first steps was a meeting of the department late Tuesday.

Earlier that day, Stewart said he didn't intend to discuss at the meeting the particulars of a fatal accident Monday on U.S. 70 near the Glencoe fire station.

"This meeting is to discuss the future of the department and how we can serve the community," he said. "But the activities of yesterday may be an example of the kind of things we're trying to deal with."

The driver of a tank truck burned to death in the crushed cab after he lost control and ran off the highway.

Driver killed as big rig burns

Witness driver believes a life could have been saved

The driver of a tractor rig pulling a chemical tanker trailer was killed Monday when the rig left U.S. Highway 70 between Glencoe and San Patricio. The cause of the wreck is as yet unknown.

The accident closed the highway between Ruidoso Downs and U.S. Highway 380 for nearly six hours as officials worked to determine if the tanker had created a hazardous materials condition.

"A haz-mat situation was not breached," said Lt. William Bower, with the New Mexico State Police. "The tanker was carrying waste water and no haz-mat team was called in."

Two people in a nearby home were evacuated for a time as a precaution that smoke could contain toxic chemicals.

The tanker truck was traveling eastbound at mile marker 275.6 when the rig left the pavement, went down an embankment and burst into flames. The driver, Den-

nis Fry, 36, of El Paso, burned to death.

Another semi driver, Jory Shores, said he ran to the burning wreckage and talked with trapped driver, who pleaded for help in getting unpinned from the crumpled cab of the truck. Shores said a group of nearby ranch workers refused to help, insisting the driver was already dead in the burning wreckage. Shores said there was nothing he could do alone.

"I yelled at them 'He's still alive, he's still alive,'" Shores said. "They just stood there. I could still hear him screaming."

Shores, a driver with Double G Trucking of Las Cruces, said he also was eastbound on U.S. 70, immediately ahead of the ill-fated tanker truck. Shores said he was talking with the other driver on his C.B. radio.

"He was right behind me," Shores said at the scene. "He said 'oh s---t' just before going off the

Crowded field in Apache primary

Twenty-three candidates seek four seats on the tribal council, with just a week to campaign

Three incumbents are among the 23 candidates who signed up to run for four seats on the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council.

It's one of the biggest turnouts for a council election in recent memory, according to a few long-time Mescalero politicians.

The aspirants have just one week to campaign after waiting a week for tribal election board officials to verify their backgrounds and that they are eligible to run.

The tribe's primary election on Oct. 3 will narrow the field to the top eight, who will face each other in the general election Nov. 7. The Otero County Clerk's office will supply the voting machines, but will not oversee the election, a spokesman for that office said.

Some familiar names appear on the list. They include incumbents Arthur "Butch" Blazer, who works for

the Bureau of Indian Affairs and previously ran for president, Harlyn Geronimo, who has served on the board several times and was censured when he spoke out about problems at the tribe's casino, and Glenda Brusuelas, who is seeking her second term on the board.

Dorlyn Simmons, whose husband is agency manager for the tribe, did not run for a new term.

Former tribal vice presidents Frederick Peso and Oliver Enjady (who also is a well-known artist) are candidates.

Larry Shosh Pebeashy, who previously served on the council, is running again, as are Carlton Palmer, former tribal grant writer and a candidate for president two years ago, and Dorene Fernando, who ran unsuccessfully for the council in 1998 on a platform of opening up jobs and housing assignments for tribal members.

Alfred La Paz, former BIA police

officer and now with security at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, and Donalyn Torres, who was active with the Chino administration in support of the nuclear waste storage initiative, also are on the ballot.

Other candidates are Arden Comanche, a medicine man and with the housing authority field crew; Sharon Botella Taazah, Terrell J. Chino and Christopher Little, foresters; Samuel Cooper Sr., a former tribal official; Gilbert Choneska, a community counselor; John A. Montoya, with the forestry division; Joy L. Kanesevah Wyatt, Mason Gudelkon, with the archaeology division of the tribe's Natural Resource Protection; James Peralto, who works at the tribal rehabilitation center; Charles "Buffy" Shanta, in the housing authority; Eldon D. Spitty, who has served in various capacities with the tribe, lately with the casino; and Charles Zeb Smith, in facilities management.

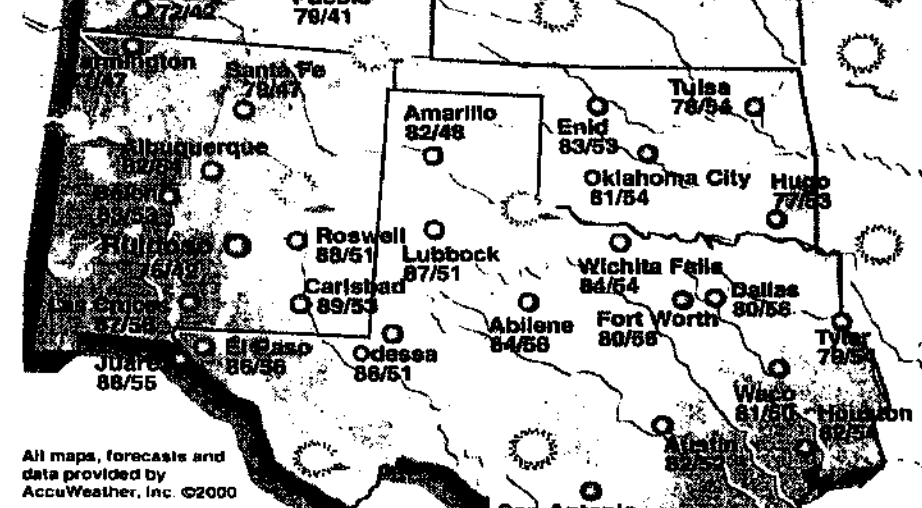
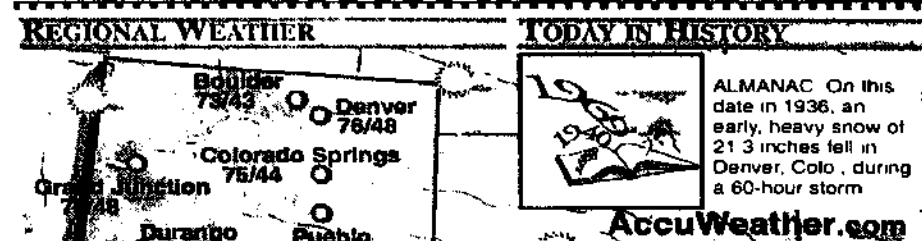

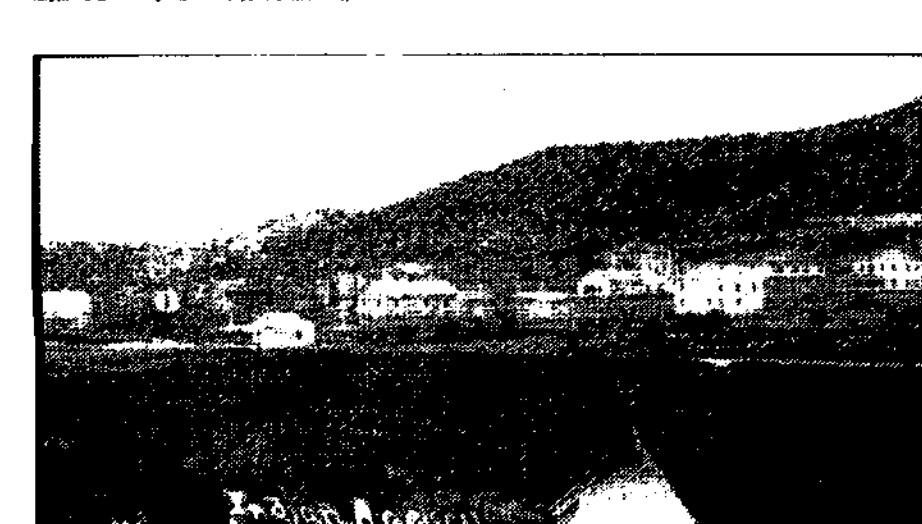

White Oaks Eagle
September 27, 1900

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Highway chief apologizes to Ruidoso for slow road construction

New Mexico's transportation chief has apologized to Ruidoso for drawn-out road construction and promised the state would assure "responsible" contractors are awarded road bids in the future.

Pete Rahn, secretary of the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation De-

partment, said for just the second time in the past five years, his department placed a contractor on notice of apparent default for the behind-schedule upper Highway 48 project in Ruidoso. The notice prompted Meadow Valley Contractors, Inc. to bring in additional manpower and equipment in August to speed up the work. Meadow Valley was awarded three contracts in 1998 for highway improvements on State High-

way 48 in Ruidoso and U.S. Highway 70 in Ruidoso Downs.

"I want to apologize to all of you for what you've gone through," Rahn said Friday during a breakfast in Alamogordo with community leaders from Otero and Lincoln Counties. "Out of 179 projects in New Mexico we are having problems with five projects. All five are with the same contractor."

lowed CCNG's experience of a 16 psig pressure in their system."

He said the two-inch Carrizozo mainline historically operated during the winter at a pressure in the range of 450-600 psig from the time of construction in 1966 until Zia lowered the pressure. The Carrizozo system needs a minimum of

360 psig from Zia to meet its estimated winter peak load, he said. CCNG routinely lowered the pressure to 300 psig during the summer months when demand wasn't as great, he said.

"The original 1966 construction specifications required a test pressure of 990 psig," he said. Both the two-inch and four-inch lines are steel and are classified as being able to carry as much as 1,556

psig and 1,462, respectively.

County Attorney Alan Morel said, "We negotiated with the town of Carrizozo and what I'm hearing today is that we still are not guaranteed (service) if Zia refuses."

"How long would it take to go through the state Public Regulatory Commission" to force Zia to react?

Under an emergency procedure, the town could petition

the PRC if the health and safety of its citizens is threatened, Beauvais said.

"The town needs more gas long before the jail opens," he said.

The town already is running 3,200 feet of additional lines, which also will serve other subdivisions, Beauvais said, adding, "The gas will be at the spigot by the time the (jail) doors open."

According to records, a state Highway Department employee reported the accident as both with and without injuries. The first unit to arrive was an ambulance from Ruidoso at 12:15 p.m. Fire fighting units from Ruidoso Downs and Hondo were there by 12:21 p.m. and Glencoe arrived at 12:32 p.m., Stewart said.

During the commission meeting last Thursday, Stewart said one of the options is to put the Glencoe department under the umbrella of the Hondo Volunteer Fire Department.

Stewart said he's willing to work with Glencoe volunteers, but the potential liability for the county if they fail to show up to fight fires is something he can't ignore.

Glencoe Fire Chief Angel Chavez, one of the founders of the Glencoe-Palo Verde Volunteer Fire Department 12 years ago, said during an interview last week that for the last three years, it's been tough to

find volunteers who are not working or have jobs that allow them to leave to fight fires.

County officials need to help recruit more volunteers or work on some other solution, he said.

In a letter to Chavez dated Sept. 14, Stewart wrote that he has received "numerous" complaints that the volunteer department isn't responding to calls and that he suspects regular meetings are not being conducted and equipment is not being maintained.

He noted that he is considering recommending the department be dissolved or reorganized.

"Unfortunately, over time we've fallen into a situation where it's tough for the poor guys with the Glencoe Fire Department to maintain their staffing," Stewart said. "They've gotten into a situation where everybody works and they rarely respond."

"I owe it to everybody to try to fix it."

Chavez pointed out when Glencoe volunteers can't re-

spond, they have a mutual aid agreement with Ruidoso Downs and Hondo departments.

Chavez said he talked to Commissioner Rick Simpson a few weeks ago about Hondo using Glencoe equipment to respond to fires within that district and he told the commissioner that idea was fine.

The Glencoe department has eight or nine active members, but some aren't allowed by their employers to carry a radio or to leave for a fire, he said.

"We're volunteers and we all work during the day," Chavez said. "They need to realize we can't just drop what we're doing. We have families to support."

Past efforts to rally more volunteers, especially those who are retired and could be available on a regular basis, haven't been successful, he said.

Stewart said he's talked to the state Fire Marshal and was told Glencoe hasn't filed a monthly incident report since the beginning of the year.

"State statute requires the reports, but the Fire Marshal won't make them go back if they can submit a summary report," Stewart said.

Chavez acknowledged that since the department lost its secretary, monthly reports haven't been filed.

However, he insisted that the fire district's equipment is being maintained properly.

Glencoe resident Ralph Romero had a different view Thursday. He told county commissioners that some of the equipment is inoperable.

Fourteen members left the department in the last few years for different reasons, but he thinks he can activate them again "with the right language," Romero said.

"Thirty new dwellings have been built in the area" and dependable fire protection is needed, he said.

"I have nothing against Hondo taking over except the response time," he said.

"They'd have to get a separate crew for Glencoe," Commission Chairman Rex Wilson said.

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Commercial garbage service users in SWA areas will pay more

Commercial polycart users receiving service from the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority will be paying more next quarter.

New authority manager Rick Simpson, also a county commissioner, Tuesday proposed to the LCSWA board that it increase the monthly charge to \$15. Currently, the charge is inconsistent, he said. Some commercial users in Capitan pay \$9.25 per month and others \$12.

A split also exists in Ruidoso Downs. All accounts in Carrizozo pay \$12, as does the one polycart

account in the county, he said.

A motion by Manny Hernandez, mayor of Carrizozo, to approve the increase passed unanimously.

"It may not be popular, but everything else is going up and this will help us stay afloat," he said.

The board welcomed its newest member, Modesto Chavez, appointed to fill Simpson's position now that he is manager.

Simpson last month asked Commissioner Leo Martinez to take that slot, but said at a commission meeting Thursday Hondo Valley lacked representation now that he's the manager.

Martinez said he didn't oppose Chavez personally as an appointee, but he urged other commissioners to choose one of their peers instead.

When public money is involved, a public official who is answerable to voters should be on the board, Martinez said.

Simpson pointed out that monthly rates for service are paid by individuals and businesses, not by the county.

But the authority also receives an environmental gross receipt tax and the board recently approved a rate increase that impacted customers in the four villages and

unincorporated portions of the county.

"It doesn't have to be me, but I think when public money is involved, an elected official should serve," Martinez said.

In other action Tuesday, the authority approved the emergency purchase of a \$106,032 side loading garbage truck because the motor was "blown" on the authority's second of two collection trucks, a 1991 model with 300,000 miles.

Board members left up to Simpson to choose the best financing arrangement and get back to them. Bids were unnecessary because of

the emergency situation, Simpson said, but he has records of the telephone calls made to round up different prices and truck options to present to the board. The new truck will be delivered today, he said.

Debra Ingle, a Capitan trustee, was elected as the new authority chairman. Chavez was named vice chairman and Jake Harris, representing Ruidoso Downs, is secretary-treasurer.

Members also changed the time and day of their monthly meetings to 4 p.m. the third Tuesday. They meet in authority headquarters on Second Street in Ruidoso Downs.

LCSWA would like to hear ideas for a new name

Members of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority are looking for a new name for their organization.

Meeting Tuesday, they agreed that people are confused when they see the name and assume that the group is part of Lincoln County government. It's even listed under county government in the telephone book.

But the entity is a separate and independent authority formed about 10 years ago and composed of representatives from the county and four of its five villages to provide garbage collection and recycling services.

Ruidoso is connected only in the operation of a regional landfill south of Alamogordo.

road. I looked in my mirror and I saw a cloud of dust as he went off the road and down the hill. He hit the trees and there was a big explosion."

Shores said it seemed like 45 minutes before the first fire truck arrived. He estimated there were 10 to 15 minutes of opportunity to save the pinned driver before flames overtook the cab of the truck, which he said detached from the chassis in the wreck.

"They need to get that fire department fixed," Shores said. He believed there was a long delay in responding to the accident scene. "If I'm going to drive down this highway, I think they need to fire the current fire department and get

certified people. He would have been still alive because we could have gotten him out."

Tom Stewart, Lincoln County's manager, said dispatch records showed a first call reporting the accident was placed at 12 noon by a truck from the state highway department. Initially it was a report of an accident without injuries, which was quickly changed to an injury accident. The first fire department paged, Glencoe/Palo Verde, has the fire station closest to the accident location, about a mile away. The department was called at 12:02 p.m. That page was followed by notification to the Hondo Fire Department at 12:05 p.m., and then Ruidoso Downs at 12:08 p.m., Stewart said. Both those departments are 10 or more miles away. The

first emergency responder on the scene was the ambulance service out of Ruidoso at 12:15 p.m. Both the Hondo and Ruidoso Downs fire departments arrived at 12:21 p.m., followed by the Glencoe/Palo Verde Fire Department at 12:32 p.m.

Shores said a notation he placed in his log book showed he called 911 at 11:45 a.m.

Shores said the driver, who never identified himself to him on the C.B. radio or at a truck stop north of Alamogordo earlier, was with a company from El Paso, Texas.

A police accident report showed the tanker rig was registered to Custom Transportation Services of Oklahoma. Fry was buckled up and alcohol was not a factor in the accident, Bower said.

School bus, van collide

No one was injured Thursday (Sept. 21) in a collision between a school bus, used to transport Capitan School students, and a van.

The collision, at about noon on Juniper Springs Road in the Loma Grande community off State Highway 37, caused moderate damage to the bus, according to the New Mexico State Police. The van received substantial damage.


A 4-year-old and the driver of the school bus were the only occupants, said Diana Billingsley, superintendent of the Capitan School District.

The child was on his way home in the subdivision.

The driver of the van, Corina Montoya, 47, of Ruidoso, was ticketed for the equivalent of driving left of center, said investigating Officer Sal Beltran of the state police. The location was described as a curve where Juniper Springs Road becomes Pinon Street.

The state, as well as the insurer of the bus, will investigate, Billingsley said.

Our 39 percent isn't a solution

Bottom of the heap ... last on the list ... uncounted or undercounted? We hardly know.

The 2000 decennial census is complete, and the question for Lincoln County is, where is everybody? According to the Bureau of Business and Economic Research at the University of New Mexico, only 39 percent of census forms distributed here were filled out and returned.

That's not unusual for a tourist destination like Ruidoso; apparently the important number isn't the number of forms returned but the number of housing units reported...the "denominator" instead of the "numerator."

It is doubtful, regardless of what the Census Bureau finally says about our population at the beginning of a new millennium, that it will be believed by more than 5 percent of the resident population.

Nevertheless, we'll be stuck with that number for 10 long years when it comes time to hand out federal grants and realign legislative districts. And that's too bad for all of us in the 39 percent who did their duty.

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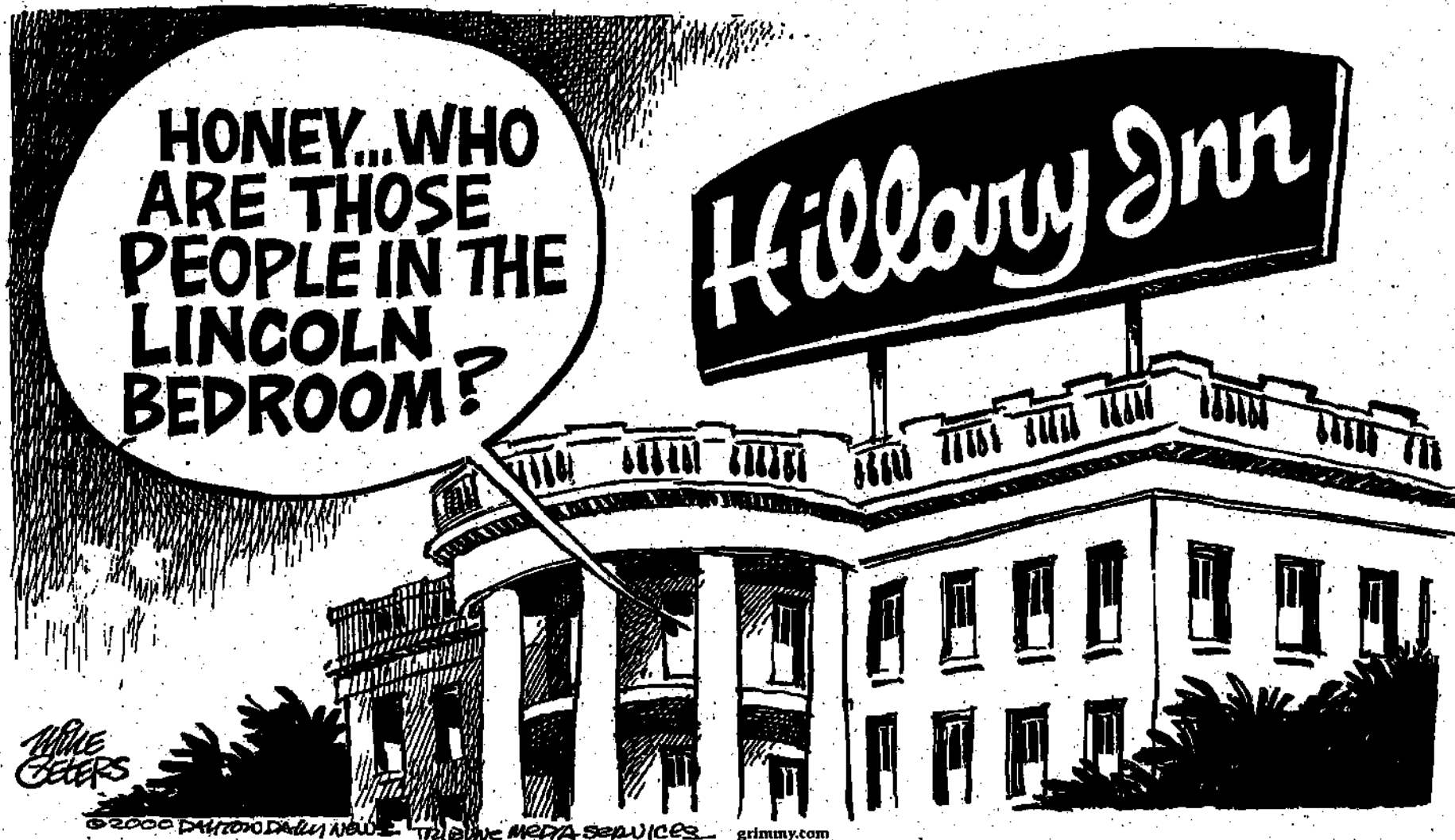

If your readers think the money is going only one way, I should say SmithKline Beecham is forking out no less than \$400 million in cash to Roche for exclusive rights for "Coreg," a medicine for congestive heart failure.

It's been mighty dry in Texas, even for cotton

Cotton is best grown in a hot, arid climate. It's common to see vast fields of it where little else would survive from a lack of water. This year, however, Texas cotton growers are getting less cotton, if any, because of the drought. It's been too hot and too dry. "It's cut our yields probably in half of what we normally make," said Ellis County, Texas cotton grower Steve Patman.

Many areas in the parched Lone Star State are officially only a few inches behind normal precipitation because of an unusually wet spring. Before the rain ended, it affected root development in the young plants. "The cotton plant really suffered because it had all the roots up close to the top of the ground and the

tap root that goes down to moisture can't keep up with the moisture as fast as it's drying down," said Patman, explaining that the young plants' root systems were too shallow to accommodate the greater availability of early season precipitation.

The rain all but ended. "The last measurable precipitation was four hundredths of an inch July 29," said Micky Woodard with the Crosby County (Texas) Farm Service Agency. For all of July that area recorded only a trace of rain. That didn't get the West Texas cotton crop very far. "Producers are assessing the crop now to determine what's worth harvesting" said Woodard, pointing out that any per acre yield less than 50 pounds would not be enough to pay the cost of ginning. At that rate, it takes at least 10

acres to produce a 500-pound bale of cotton. Normally, a non-irrigated acre in Crosby County yields closer to a half bale of cotton according to Woodard.

It's not only cotton that suffers from the drought. The dry weather has left little for cattle to graze. "We started about the middle of July feeding our hay that we put up for the wintertime because there's no grass for them to eat," said Patman who has 350 cow/calf pairs.

He hopes to get some precipitation in time to promote hay growth for one more cutting. "I think we got enough water to keep up through the winter but it's going to be tight this year."

Drought makes it more difficult to maintain livestock. "We're probably going to have to start hauling water to the

cattle," said Patman, standing in a dry water hole usually kept full by a natural spring. "Seems like the cattle can drink twice as much when you're giving them water than they do whenever it's out in the tanks." He remembers the last time the water holes went dry in the drought of 1996 when he hauled 4,000 gallons of water to his cattle every day.

Patman's way of coping with Texas' record dry spell and the extra time he'll spend watering his cattle mirrors an attitude common to farmers and ranchers who face weather extremes in any part of the country. "If we have to do it, we do it."

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Cycle pile-ups plentiful during rally weekend; some injuries serious

The influx of motorcyclists into the Ruidoso area last weekend for a rally resulted in an upswing in cycling accidents, including several that resulted in serious injuries.

A speeding motorcyclist was seriously injured Thursday at one of the exits from the Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Casino. A Ruidoso Downs police report stated that the driver's life was saved because he wore a full-faced helmet.

Edgar Allen Bolt, 54, of Bakersfield, Calif., lost control of his bike, rolling it several times about 10 a.m. It hit a cement parking block and bounced about 4 feet into the air, the report stated. Bolt told an investigating officer he was traveling about 45 miles per hour at the time. The speed limit on the private road is posted at 15 miles per hour.

A Friday accident between Lincoln and Hondo seriously injured a passenger on a 1989 Harley Davidson motorcycle. Laverne Beck, from Mescalero, was airlifted to an Albuquerque hospital after the cycle hit a deer on U.S. Highway 380. The driver of the cycle, Charles Beck, 37, was treated at the Lincoln County Medical Center. The accident happened just after 6 p.m.

A curve on State Highway 244, about halfway between Cloudercroft and U.S. Highway 70, proved too much twice Saturday for motorcyclists. About 5:42 p.m., Nancy Keeling, 49, whose only home identification was listed by state police as New Mexico, lost control of her 2000 Harley Davidson bike. Police said Keeling was traveling too fast.

About 40 minutes later another Harley Davidson, operated by Paul Russell, 55, of Texas, lost control at the same location.

Russell was transported to the Lincoln County Medical Center at Ruidoso for treatment of injuries. The section of highway is known as "dead man's curve."

An Alto man was injured when his bike went out of control on Sierra Blanca Airport Road, near the Ranches of Sonterra Subdivision. John Hershey, 67, told officers he lost control when braking, after a dog entered the road. Hershey was eastbound about 3:23 p.m. Sunday. He was treated at the hospital in Ruidoso.

Sunday, about 4:06 p.m., a 1997 Honda went out of control on State Highway 246, about 26 miles out of Capitan. The rider, Owen Nichols, 55, whose hometown was unavailable, escaped serious injury.

A 2:38 p.m. incident Sunday on State Highway 448, north of Alto, injured a Lubbock, Texas woman. According to state police reports, Melody Tarwater, 45, suffered broken ribs and a cracked elbow after her 1997 Harley Davidson went off the road and crashed. Tarwater was taken to the Lincoln County Medical Center by ambulance.

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
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Ruidoso Downs ends its extended clean-up program

Ruidoso Downs will re-examine its village-supported clean up program after public works department officials said the pick-up project was ended.

"We're not doing that anymore," said Dale Graham, assistant public works supervisor with the department. "We've worked out a deal with Rick Simpson (manager of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.) Anything not burnable people can take to solid waste."

Burnable materials, such as yard waste and pine needles, can be hauled to Sierra Contracting.

"The village had a clean-up program that was supposed to be ongoing," said Ruidoso Downs resident Bonnie Richardson. "I asked the previous administration. They said it

would go on for as long as possible."

Graham said the program, that allowed residents to place items beyond normal garbage, such as old appliances and yard waste at the curb, overwhelmed the six employees in the public works department.

"I know this council talked about picking up that trash and doing it for the people," said Margie Morales, a village trustee. "The problem was will the roll-off containers. They were always full."

The village pays for a container at the solid waste yard where residents can dispose of items beyond normal trash that is collected from poly-carts. Yard wastes can be hauled to Sierra Contracting.

"But some people cannot haul the stuff," Ron Smith, a village resident said of the departure from a village collection.

Fourth quarter fireworks give Warriors win

For three quarters, Cobre's football team gave the Warriors fits. But the Indians couldn't hold on, and when he smoke cleared, Ruidoso had won 33-23.

"They played a ball control offense the whole game, and it was pretty effective," said Ruidoso coach Rodney Webb. "They held onto (the ball) and kept getting first downs. The quarterback was a very good scrambler and we knew that

and we just had trouble tackling him." The Warriors (2-2) took an early lead on a 90-yard kickoff return by J.R. Floyd, but that was all the Warriors could muster until the final stanza. The Indians held Ruidoso to four plays in the first quarter and three in the third. In the meantime, Cobre's offense scored on a field goal early in the first quarter, and on touchdowns on the first and last possessions of the third.

The Indians led 16-7 going into the fourth quarter. "I was a little worried at that point,"

Webb said. "Offensively, we had moved the ball, but penalties (and) two first half interceptions stopped our drive."

But Webb needn't have worried. Ruidoso tallied 26 points in the fourth quarter, scoring on a 65-yard pass from Todd Schrader to Floyd, a 2-yard run by Cade Hall, a 26-yard pass from Schrader to Floyd following a Cobre turnover and a 23-yard pass from Schrader to Darryl Bagley.

Cobre also scored once in the final stanza — "It got kind of wild there in the fourth quarter," Webb said — but it

wasn't enough.

Still, the Ruidoso coach gave credit to Cobre for its effort.

"We knew going in they were talented and for three quarters, they played as good of a game as they could play," he said.

Cardinals fall to Christian Lions

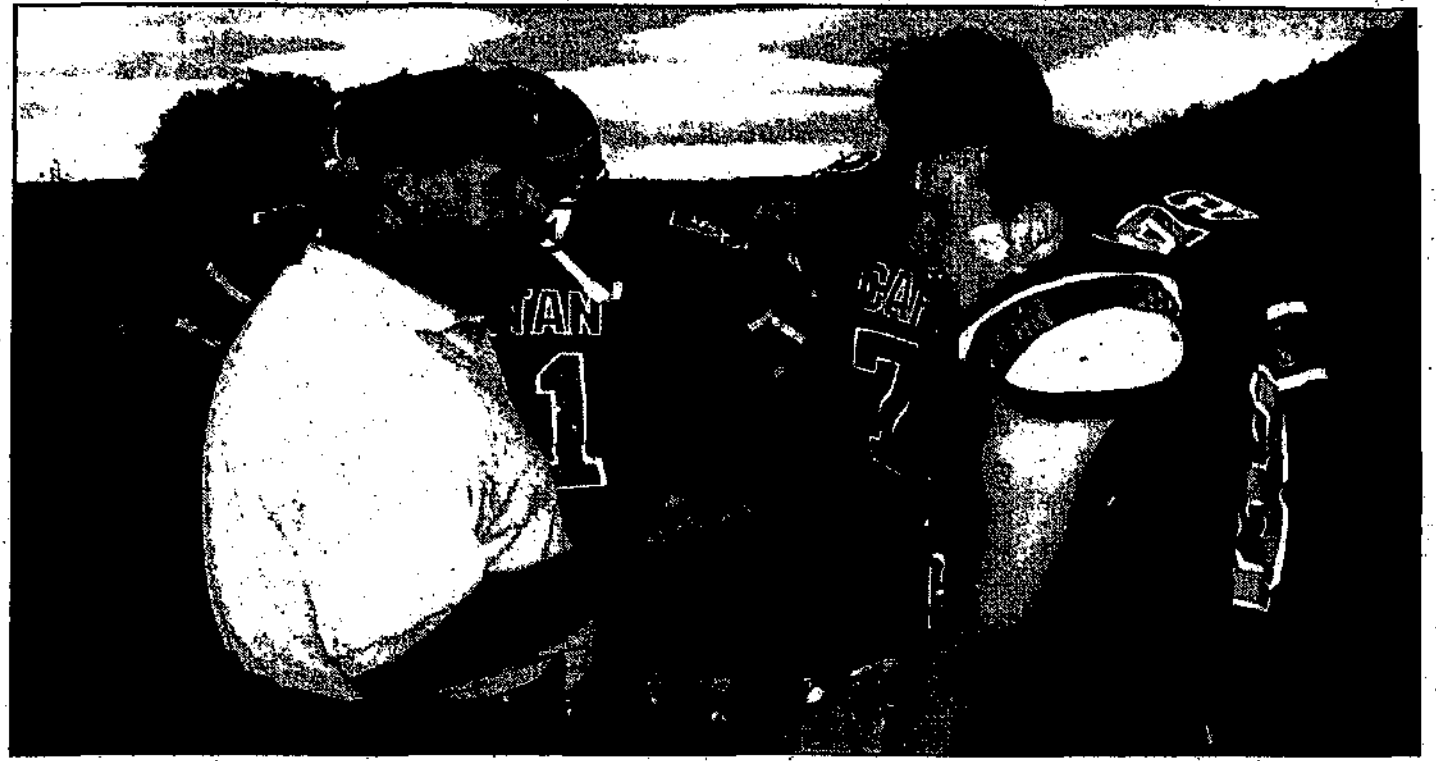

Mescalero fielded a team in JV, finishing third on the strength of the third place individual finish of Warren Sago.

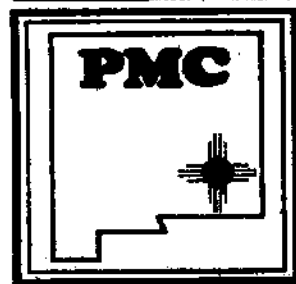

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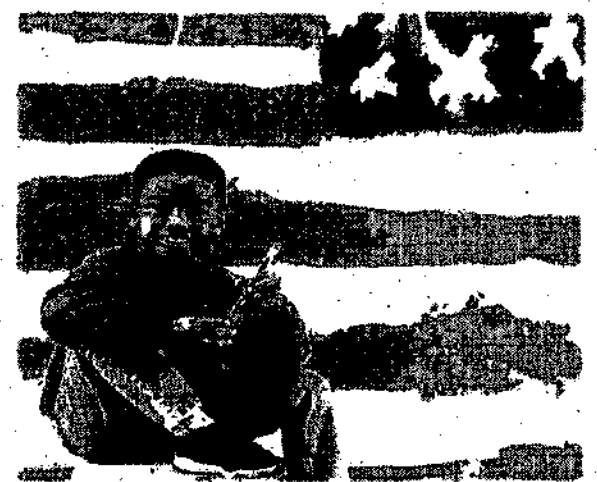


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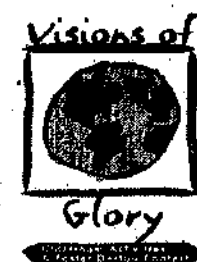
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'Invitational education' is more than a catch phrase at Nob Hill

Some dedicated teachers and six years of effort has won Ruidoso's pre-primary center national recognition for its focus on using the total school environment to enhance education.

Nob Hill Early Childhood Center was one of 14 schools nationwide to receive the Inviting School Award by the International Alliance for Invitational Education.

Principal Roger Sowder explained that "invitational education" is a theory of practice that maintains that every person and every thing in and around the school either adds to or detracts from the process of being a beneficial presence in the lives of the people that come into the school.

Examples of the practice include signs around the school, reception of callers on the telephone, greetings in the hallway, and policies and programs that either add to or detract from the beneficence of the school.

It took Nob Hill six years of staff training, commitment and preparation to make changes in the way the school presented itself, Sowder said, but he was convinced after hearing William Perkey, Ph.D., of the University of North Carolina, speak 10 years ago at the New Mexico Coalition of School Administrators in Portales.

"Three years later, I got to meet and visit with him," Sowder said. "I got the buzz from him, but we had staff at our school who approached me the fall after I'd heard Dr. Perkey, say 'Hey, we've got an idea here and would like to run it by you.' It had to do with invitational learning. I said, 'Get after it.' I was so impressed."

Sowder told the Ruidoso School Board about the award and explained the philosophy of invitational education as based on four qualities: respect, trust, optimism and intentionality. Intentionality, he said, stipulates that development of human potential can be "invited" by designing and maintaining places, policies, processes and programs for that purpose — and by people who are themselves personally and professionally inviting.

Kate Asbill, who presented the award to Nob Hill, wrote in her nomination letter that she has worked with the Nob Hill staff since 1990. She commended the school for sending representatives to two Southwest regional conferences on invitational education, at least seven weekend retreats on invitational learning and intentional invitational living.

"Through the tireless efforts of Kathy Jones and Eva Clark and other key educators," Asbill wrote, "this school staff has evolved from awareness of the idea of Invitational Education, to understanding of the concept, to application of the philosophy, and to adoption of intentional invitational living."

Lane Anderson III, chair of the awards committee, said awards were based on a subjective evaluation of programs, policies and procedures.

"Their attitude toward children is good. The things they do to encourage children to succeed are good," Lane said, adding that not many schools applied for the award because it is difficult to achieve.

Sowder said Nob Hill submitted a portfolio with pictures of the school and descriptions of the philosophies. He and teachers Eva Clark, Cathy Jones, Sandra Hatch, Melina Atencio and Terri Hardeman

will go to Greensboro, N.C., Oct. 12-14 to receive the award for the school.

He described the relationships at Nob Hill as like those of a family, in which people are supportive of one another and celebrate together. The school has a "sunshine committee" that seeks out situations worthy of recognition and commemoration.

"We believe it and we preach it," Sowder said. "Therefore we try to be very supportive of one another, give value to every person that comes into our school — parents, children, teachers, aides, cooks, custodians, secretary ... whoever walks into our building."

He explained how a sign saying "Stay off the grass" could be made invitational by restating it as, "Please use the sidewalk." This kind of seemingly insignificant situation can either send an inviting message or a "disinviting" message, he said.

Policies, processes and programs are all examined in the light of whether they are invitation or disininvitation.

"We recognize that process is as important as the product," Sowder said. "If I've got a committee working on language arts adoption, process is equally as important as the product at the end. We evaluate our programs, and if they're not fitting the needs of students, or if our schedule has got students standing in line, that's not an inviting thing."

This is an ongoing process that has become internalized by staff members over time, he said, and the result is a different culture at Nob Hill now from that six years ago when staff members began educating themselves on invitational learning.

"It's not a Band Aid," Sowder said. "It's a matter of adopting a philosophy that's practiced over time."

What do you know about taekwondo? Many kids are getting a kick out of it in gyms across the country. Taekwondo is based on a sport developed in Korea 1,000 years ago. Today, as many as 50 million people practice it in nearly 160 countries. Like karate and judo, taekwondo is a form of martial arts. A martial art is a system of fighting that teaches discipline, respect and concentration. It teaches a way of thinking as well as a way of fighting.



For two Olympics, in 1988 and in 1992, taekwondo was only a demonstration sport. While medals were awarded, taekwondo competition was not a full medal or official Olympic event.

Hodori, the tiger, was the mascot for the 1988 Summer Olympics in South Korea.



Cobie, the mascot of the 1992 Olympics in Spain, shows us his kicking style.

In the Sydney 2000 Olympics, taekwondo will be an official Olympic event for the first time.



The athletes wear pajama-like jackets and pants. Helmets and padding help prevent injuries. The woman on the left, facing the camera, is Kay Poe. She is expected to do well in the Women's flyweight division.

Taekwondo is a combat sport in which athletes try to score points by using their hands and feet. Competitors use graceful movements to attack and defend.

Judges who sit near the ring award the points. A referee stands in the ring to make certain the rules are obeyed.

Competitors wear either red or blue chest protectors over their uniforms. Techniques have to show accuracy and speed. The object is to score points, not to injure your opponent.

- Never grab, twist or push.

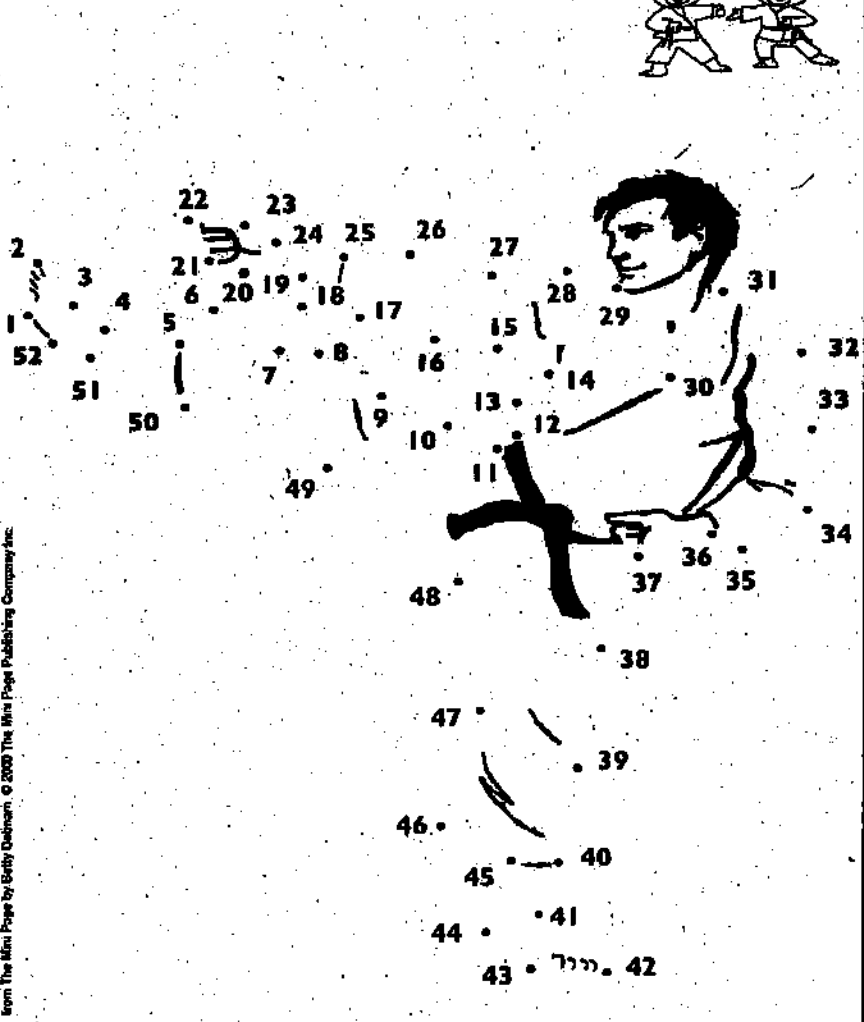
(Junior competitors have to follow additional safety rules.)

• Forms: Kids at the left are shown practicing their forms. In competition, they demonstrate a special series of moves in front of a panel of judges. Competitors compete against people in their same age group, weight and abilities.

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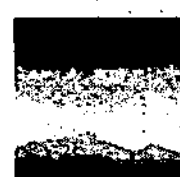

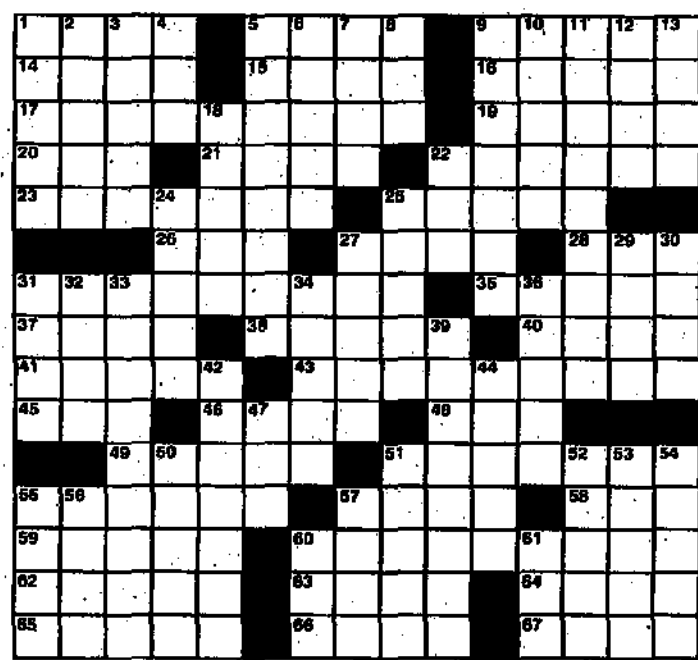

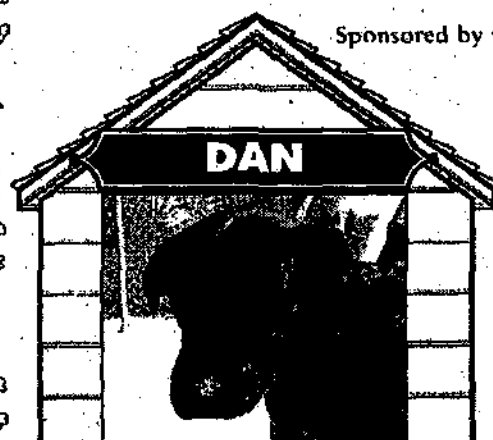
