



Christmas windfall

Federal appropriation provides \$700,000 for area health clinics

The Santa Claus who lives in Washington, D.C. handed a big Christmas gift to Lincoln County Friday.

A \$700,000 allocation to the county commission survived the annual Congressional budget war and will provide money for renovations at the county public health offices in Carrizozo and Ruidoso.

The bulk, \$500,000, goes to Ruidoso, where commissioners say they would like to expand the county substation next to the Ruidoso Public Library to accommodate more public health programs and related services.

County Manager Tom Stewart said Monday by adding space for health programs, some offices may be freed up in the existing section of the building to offer more county government services.

"I need to talk to my commissioners about the strategy to spend the money wisely," he said. "I need to get an architect on board."

"I would like to make the office the hub for public health care," Stewart said.

The award started with a simple telephone call months ago from the office of U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., asking if the county could use some money for projects.

Stewart leaped at the offer because state health officials have complained for several years about the lack of space at the Ruidoso substation.

That restriction hampers the staff's ability to offer services the county needs and limits privacy, they told commissioners.

Petitioners seek probe of contract

Signers want grand jury investigation of matters related to hospital deal

Petitions calling for a grand jury investigation of actions connected to Lincoln County's hospital management contract with Presbyterian Healthcare Services were submitted Tuesday to County Clerk Martha Proctor.

They contained more than 450 signatures, twice the required number to trigger a grand jury. But Proctor must certify the number of valid signatures by registered voters before the petition can be filed in the 12th Judicial District Court in Carrizozo.

"It's filed just like a civil case in district court," a spokesman for the office of District Judge Karen Parsons said.

State law reads that a grand jury "shall be ordered to convene" by a judge when petitions signed by not less than the greater of 200 registered voters or 2 percent of the registered voters of a county are submitted.

With 13,028 voters in the county, that greater requirement would be 261 signatures.

The petition calls for a grand jury and a special prosecutor to investigate "any illegal conduct" or "acts of misconduct regarding county resources, facilities and equipment, including, but not limited to, misappropriation, illegal solicitation and acceptance of contracts for services from Presbyterian...for the management and operation of the (county hospital)."

Downs village audit key evidence as Herrera appeals his firing

A special village of Ruidoso Downs audit that looked into the community's volunteer fire department is a key piece of evidence used as village justification for the dismissal of long time fire chief Nick Herrera.

The audit and dozens of other pieces of evidence were presented Monday during the first day of a post-termination appeal sought by Herrera.

Dan Bryant, legal counsel for the village, attempted to paint a picture of a fire chief who violated village code and possibly state law. Exhibits presented by Bryant claimed the fire station property

was filled with debris, that Herrera failed to inspect for fire hazards, usurped a requirement for village council approval of mutual aid agreements, used fire vehicles to go to lunch, missed a deadline for applying for annual state funding, falsified an annual report form, padded the number of emergency calls, and fudged in submitting reimbursement requests for responses to fire or injury accident incidents.

But the main evidence, when testimony resumes in February, will be the special audit. It will delve into monthly village checks written to the Ruidoso Downs Fire Department to pay volunteers for attending weekly meetings and responding to structure fires and injury accidents. It

also questions if the account isn't public money.

During fiscal year 1998-1999 the payments added up to \$14,650, said De'Aun Willoughby, the CPA who conducted the special audit at the request of village officials. The next fiscal year the payments jumped to \$47,875, Willoughby said.

"Red flags go up, alarms go off," the CPA said of the jump.

In an opening statement, J. Robert Beauvais, legal counsel for Herrera, labeled Herrera's firing "a political termination."

"Prior village trustees made it a clas-

Judge swears in dad for stint on bench

Richard A. Parsons, who lives in Lincoln County, will be reappointed month-by-month until a permanent replacement is selected for Judge Neil Mertz, who died earlier this month. Mertz presided over Division III in the 7th Judicial District in Socorro.

The elder Parsons retired in 1997

after 12 years in office and had the special pleasure of swearing in his daughter to the Division III post he vacated. Last week, she had the rare chance of returning the favor.

Standing next to Judge Edmund H. Kase III, who presides over Division I in Socorro, Parsons temporarily ended her father's retirement.

"Judge Kase asked him to fill in, but this certainly doesn't mean he's bored with his retirement," Parsons said of her father.

PETITION: Documents seek grand jury investigation of hospital contract

The signers of the petition state they believe the actions of the county commission and the hospital board violate specific language in state statutes that set forth competitive bidding procedures.

In late October when the petition first appeared, Reynaldo Valcarcel, a Glencoe resident who advocates competitive bidding for hospital management, said it was the culmination of many county actions and inactions. But specifically, the petition was sparked by the resistance of the commission to comply with an attorney general's opinion on existing law, he said.

Instead of trying to comply with the opinion, the majority on the county commission fight it and try to get around the requirements, he said. Those requirements include receiving fair market value for use of the county-owned Lincoln County Medical Center, obtaining competitive management offers and submitting the management contract for approval to the state Board of Finance, based on advisory letters from attorney general's office.

"There have been people concerned about signing the petition even though they agreed with what it said, because they were concerned about personal repercussions," said Valcarcel, who took the petition to Proctor for signature verification. "But since the article on the (special property tax levy for to benefit the hospital and county health clinics) that indicated people may see that they pay increase by 30 percent, we've gotten a lot more response. People have signed with an anger. Nothing could have done more to galvanize public opinion."

"I was concerned before the election that we didn't see that. I want people to learn and to get involved and not just let things happen to them."

Although the petition will be filed in Parson's jurisdiction, the judge may be asked to recuse herself from the proceedings, he said. Parsons is married to the son of State Rep. Dub Williams. The Republican representative from Glencoe formerly served as chairman of the Lincoln County Medical Center hospital board and is on Presbyterian's state board, Val-

carcel said.

Dr. Walter "Ray" Seidel, an outspoken critic of the long-term lease arrangement between the county and Presbyterian, said the petition may "throw a wrench" in the plan to introduce a bill during the January to February session of the state Legislature. If passed, the law would exempt counties from a state procurement code requirement to seek competitive bids for hospital management.

"That bill is being fostered by a hospital association that represents Presbyterian and other groups in the state," Seidel said.

Officials from Presbyterian contend the company's contract with the county is legal and binding. The proposed exemption would clarify possibly conflicting state laws, they say.

When commissioners found out about the petition, Chairman Rex Wilson said while he hoped nothing irregular would be found, but if something is wrong, the commission and public need to know about it.

Commissioner Leo Martinez, who has urged the board to seek competitive bids for

management and placed the item on the agenda for Thursday's meeting, said he was encouraged to see people concerned enough to become involved.

The commissioner said his primary emphasis is to protect county taxpayers and to ensure they are getting the best deal.

"And that usually means going out for competitive bids," he said. "That will ensure the best deal out there. The county commission has yet to promote even discussions with other non-profit corporations, not for the selling of the hospital, but for the leasing of it."

"We have a beautiful facility here bringing the county \$1 a year for the last 20 years."

Martinez said he's aware that hospital employees are worried about being uprooted if another company took over management.

"In any (request for proposals), my first consideration would be to protect their rights and benefits," he said. "Presbyterian says the health clinics are losing money, so that's a reason to see if maybe some other entity could make money without taxpayer support."

sified, tenured position," Beauvais told the hearing officer. "He got good evaluations. When the new administration took over he was suspended."

Herrera testified he knew of voters who were told to vote for a specific candidate who would terminate the fire chief.

Herrera was placed on paid leave at the beginning of May, two months after a new administration was seated. On August 28, at the recommendation of Mayor Bob Miller, the village council fired Herrera.

Beauvais told the hearing officer that his client has little chance of becoming Ruidoso Downs' paid fire chief again because the position has since been abolished.

"There is no position for him to return to," Beauvais said. "It shows the intent of the village, to have Herrera not be an employee of this village."

Questioned during direct examination about purchase requisitions, for paying volunteers who received \$20 for each call and \$5 for each fire department meeting they attended,

Herrera said the former village clerk filled out the vouchers.

"I signed it," Herrera said. "Is it accurate?" Bryant questioned.

"I don't know," Herrera responded.

"Is this the way it look when you signed it?" Bryant questioned, holding up a requisition from February-March 1999.

Herrera responded affirmatively.

The fire chief said he included himself on vouchers for some of the payments to volunteers because he was told by a now former village official that outside his 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. work shift he was a volunteer. Herrera said that meant including his name and the name of the department's other former full-time employee on a state retirement fund report, which also raised a flag during the audit.

Bryant probed Herrera whether some fire response reports were padded to increase monthly checks to pay the volunteers. Herrera said not all fire department responses agreed with Ruidoso Downs po-

lice dispatch center records. He said sometimes other agencies would contact the fire department directly or someone would come to the fire department building to report a fire or accident.

Bryant said the village council had approved a \$20 payment per volunteer when responding to a structure fire or injury accident.

"Does it say anything about \$5 per meeting?" Bryant questioned.

"No it doesn't," Herrera said, reading from the village council resolution. "My supervisor never said to stop doing it. And the (village) trustees approved it each month."

The village attorney questioned Herrera on the fire department bank account that used the village's federal ID number. Herrera said the volunteers, not him, had control of the account. A Feb. 1, 2000 check written by the village to pay volunteers totaled \$10,280. Only \$480 of the check was deposited in the fire department account. The remainder, Herrera confirmed, was taken in cash and divided among the de-

partment members. Herrera said the large payment was in part for New Year's Eve, when former mayor Joe Hayhurst vowed all village crews would work the Y2K concern period.

"We had a very busy night," Herrera said. "You name it we had it. Everything but a structure fire."

Herrera said he did not know how the \$10,280 figure was arrived at for the January 2000 payment, adding he was not the one who filled out the payment requisition form.

Herrera's testimony took much of the first day of the hearing. Willoughby, who was questioned for a half-hour, will continue on February 19. Several other witnesses, current and former village officials, are also scheduled to be sworn in Feb. 19-20. Herrera's attorney said the extended hearing is part of Bryant's effort to taint the appeal.

"This is their rodeo," Beauvais told the hearing officer. "They recognized this for a one day hearing. He says he won't finish direct examination in one day. He's attempting to interfere with the process."

Convention Center fees and dimpled chads

Having come off weeks of observing intelligent people trying to count dimpled chads in Florida — it's the "intent of the voter," stupid — we shouldn't be surprised that the Ruidoso Village Council has opted for a dimpled chad loophole in establishing new rates for use of the municipal Convention Center.

It appears there are rates for locals, for established events, for sanctioned events. Then there are negotiated rates — the ones you dangle out there to get new business, like dickering to buy a pickup truck at a used-car lot, only more so.

Apparently that's the way the business of attracting conventions works; you do whatever it takes to get them here, then try to make up for that loss-leader through increased gross receipts taxes.

It may be common practice in the hospitality industry, this business of rubber-band rates, but it would be well if somebodies were assigned to make sure that the intent of the taxpayers is divined, too. After all, they own the joint.

We are new residents to Alto and The Ranches of Sonterra. We purchased this property convinced this is where we would spend our years after leaving the daily grind of corporate life.

The construction process has just now come to conclusion and we are finally able to move in and realize our "dream." The abundance of wildlife roaming the property coupled with the sunrises and sunsets reaffirms, on a daily basis, we made the correct decision moving here.

But all that "feel good" stuff took a sharp turn the other day when a neighbor informed us of a golf course being planned/constructed near Angus. We were not overly concerned about the construction of this golf course until my neighbor suggested that some reports indicate this golf course may well draw down enough water in the next few years as to render wells in the area useless — that's right, wells may dry up. Not only that, it could dry up the Rio Bonito changing the ecosystem of the valley forever, and forever is a very long time.

Obviously, I am deeply concerned not only for the future of my family but the future of the area as well as my friends and neighbors. We all have made substantive investments to live here. I am not anti-golf! What I am against is development of an enterprise that seems to serve the interest of the few at the expense of the many without seeking an equitable solution so all sides win. Each of us should let our voices be heard so we become part of the solution and not a victim of the results.

Contradiction in democracy

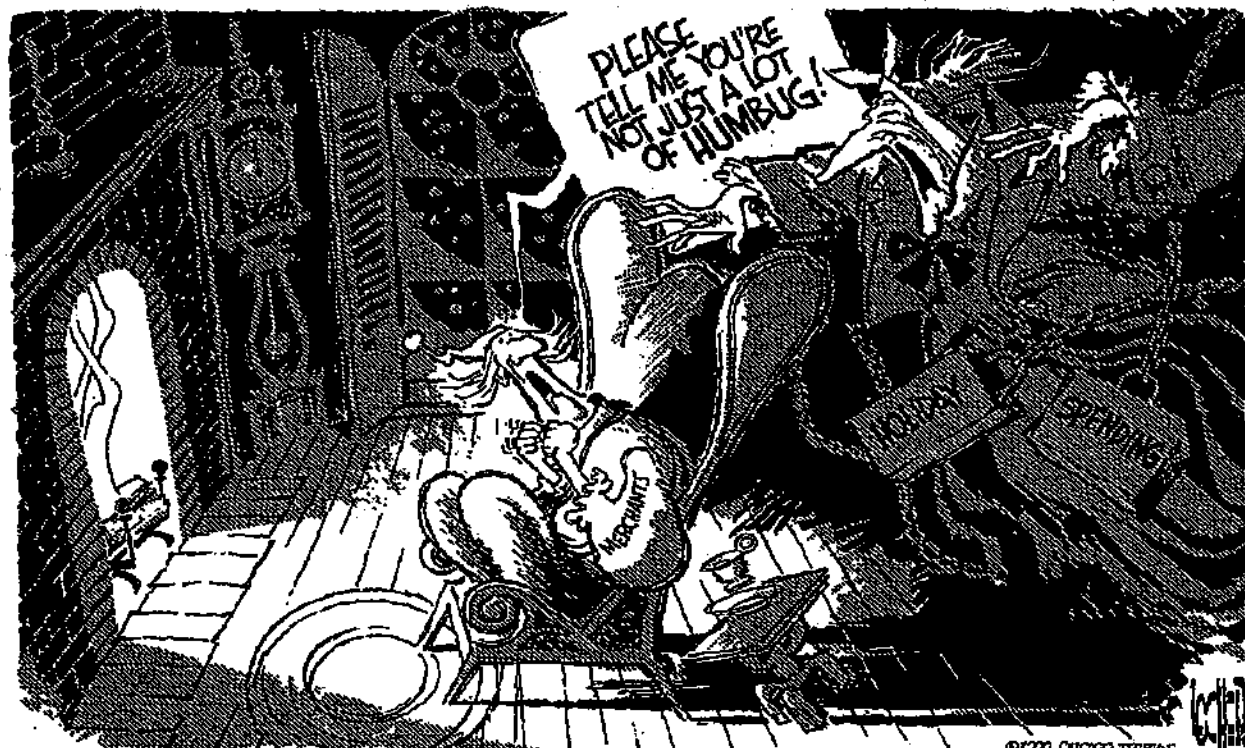
To the editor:

Help California — eat more raisins

California farmers who dry grapes to make raisins have a simple request. Eat more raisins. Add raisins to the list of so-called minor crops like apples and cranberries that are suffering from over-supply and bad prices. As more and more specialty crop farmers are finding out, you don't have to grow a major crop like wheat, corn or soybeans to have a major price-headache.

Raisins of course are sun-dried grapes, and USDA's forecast for grape production in 2000 is 20 percent higher than for 1999, surpassing a record set in 1997. Growers in California, where 90 percent of the country's grapes are grown, and Washington, which is second in production, planted more land in grapes in recent

years. Favorable weather also has been a big factor.

Jerald Rebensdorf, president and plant manager of Fresno Co-operative Raisin Growers, said cash returns to growers will be the lowest in 10 or 15 years. Under the marketing order for raisins, growers receive the best price for tonnage that goes into the domestic or export market. Excess raisins go into a pool or reserve and bring a lot lower price.

Rebensdorf said growers last year were paid about \$1,400 a ton on 85 percent of their production. This year, he estimated the price will be closer to \$800 or \$900 a ton, and because of the large crop, growers will receive that on only about 50 percent of their crop.

It takes about 4 to 5 weeks to dry raisins under ideal weather conditions. Everyone

recognizes raisins by their wrinkles but too many wrinkles aren't necessarily good. "Larger raisins that have a lot of meat in them and smaller wrinkles are the B-grade or better raisins, and smaller, skinnier raisins that have big wrinkles are C-grade raisins," said Rebensdorf.

There are plenty of high quality raisins to go around this year, and low prices have at least some upside for growers, according to Rebensdorf. "We are hoping by lowering the price that we are going to keep imports out and encourage more people to buy raisins and encourage the large industrial users to put more raisins in their products," he said. Large users include bakeries and cereal companies.

The raisin grower's hope that you will eat more raisins is

not a selfish request. Raisins fit very well with food pyramid programs that suggest a person eat 2-4 servings a day of fresh and dried fruit. Raisins are a great source of natural energy. Raisins are even a fun food thanks in part to advertising and promotions. There is a raisin chat room on one of the Web sites, and raisin poetry and raisin rumors can be found there, like the message that said a major fast food chain would be introducing a raisin burger.

Now that's something that would smooth the wrinkles right out of a raisin and make the growers smile, if it were true.

Mescalero students to address conference in Alaska

Earlier gathering in Arizona was good training when youths met with other tribal representatives

Two Mescalero Apache high school seniors sufficiently impressed officials with the Native American Youth Leadership Conference in Phoenix, Ariz., last month to receive an invitation to speak at a similar conference next April in Alaska.

Joaquin McCurdy, 19, and Kerinda Valdez, 18, went to the conference with fellow students Tony Shimal and Jonita Geronimo to meet with other representatives from tribal groups.

The conference organizers saw something in the two that clicked with their peers.

Both are interested in public speaking and psychology. They said Monday that the conference was good training.

"I took one class in communication skills and I think I'm going to take a big step into the field in the future, possibly motivational speaking, social work or being a counselor," McCurdy said. "It took us a while to become comfortable (speaking to the

group in Phoenix), but once we were in the flow, it was mellow and relaxed."

The Phoenix conference consisted of two consecutive sessions, they said. The first dealt with public speaking, group dynamics and peer leadership, Valdez said. "That two-day conference was to prepare us for the second one, which dealt with Native American Health and Wellness," McCurdy said.

The second covered teen issues such as drugs, peer pressure, suicide and dropping out of schools, they said. McCurdy and Valdez were part of a panel whose members talked to other teens at the session about staying on the right path and making the right decisions.

"They hope we can train others as well as deal with our peers one-on-

one," McCurdy said. "Four of us were on the panel and we had to explain how things were on the reservation and touch base on culture and its importance to our identity."

Reflecting on problems that face the Mescalero school system, Valdez said dropping out of school is the number one problem. McCurdy said parental neglect ranks high - not in the physical sense, but in being involved in the lives of their children and providing a structured home life with discipline and a sense of responsibility.

Valdez said one-on-one peer counseling has more of an impact than adult intervention. McCurdy said he prefers a small group, because students can see firsthand that they're not alone and everyone has problems.

While Valdez characterized her school performance as above average, McCurdy said he considers himself average, but that he has special gifts just like everyone else.

"Some people just don't realize that," he said.

ETZ Commission OKs Gavilan commercial project, opposes rezoning in subdivision

A commercial site development permit was approved Monday for construction of a storage building in Pines of Gavilan subdivision.

In a 3-0 vote with member Al Junge abstaining, the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission told Rick Osborne of Windson Construction he has permission to build a storage and shop building on lot seven, block three in the subdivision on Gavilan Canyon Road. The property, about .41 acres, is zoned gen-

eral commercial and already is served by a gravel drive.

ETZ rules allow commercial garages in the district and a construction company shop seems to be a similar use, said planner Darrell Bremner. The proposal meets standards for site development and is outside the 100-year flood plain. No parking spaces were designated on the plan, but the rules call for two, Bremner said. Staff also recommended that holding ponds be constructed for runoff and that the plans show an exterior refuse collection area before a building permit is issued.

The staff also recommended that a permit be issued detailed landscaping plans be developed and that the applicant provide letters from the state Environment Department and Department of Labor that no water or sewer are required to the building.

In other action, the board voted 3-0, with Junge abstaining again, to recommend denial of an application for rezoning on three blocks in the Pines of Gavilan subdivision by Randy Bailey. The recommendation will go to the Extraterritorial Zoning Authority for a final decision.

Bailey is asking that seven lots containing 2.03 acres be rezoned from commercial-residential mobile home subdivision to general commercial to match adjoining lots fronting on Gavilan Canyon Road. He would then replat the seven lots into two lots and build two structures, according to the staff summary.

Junge said Tuesday that he abstained from voting on both petitions because he doesn't receive the agenda and staff review in time to check the requests.

"I brought this up at last month's

meeting and asked that they mail the material to the board that they mail a week before so that we have time to see for ourselves," Junge said. "When I saw the minutes of the meeting Monday, my remarks were not in there. I pointed that out and asked again that something be done."

"I am not going to vote on something I know nothing about. If this doesn't get changed, I'm gone. I get a call on Friday asking me to pick up the file for the Monday meeting. That's no way to handle important decisions for the future of this area."







Contract revised to fix audit problem

A recurring finding in the Village of Ruidoso audit should go away in the future, said Ronnie Hemphill, the village's auditor.

Addressing the village council Tuesday, Hemphill said the infraction has occurred in recent past years involving a contract with International Consulting and Associates Ltd., an engineering firm used by the village.

The village earlier this month reworded its contract for on-call services with ICA, a revision Hemphill and the vil-

lage's legal counsel had said should clear up the problem.

Hemphill said any project that exceeds a \$20,000 cost must be obtained through a request for proposals. He noted the village awarded an approximately \$80,000 project contract to ICA.

The auditor told councilors and the mayor that he believed

they have now gotten the problem corrected.

Hemphill said the ICA issue was the only finding discovered in the audit, which is currently awaiting the state auditor's approval.

"That's incredible for a village with as much going on as Ruidoso," Hemphill said of the one problem.

Hemphill said the village's general fund decreased, as had been budgeted.

"Overall the village is very sound fiscally," Hemphill said. "You had zero funds that had expenditures in excess of their budgets."

Downs finds software supplier

Ruidoso Downs village hall will be purchasing \$42,210 in new software without going out for bids.

The software, made up of 10 modules said village clerk Gladys Dillard, will be used on the village's recently purchased computer system.

Dillard told trustees last week — in advance of a unanimous vote to buy the package — that the software company, Caselle, of Utah, was the only firm that offered an entire program for the village's needs.

The programs would handle general ledger, payroll, accounts payable, purchase orders, checks on demand, utility billing, work orders, animal licenses, business licenses, cash receipting and asset management.

Dillard said she has spoken to Cibola County officials who spoke highly of the software.

Trustee Jim Bassett questioned why the purchase was being considered without issuing a request for proposals.

"I recommend we go with

sole source because they (Caselle) meet the criteria as is necessary," Dillard said. "They have a complete package."

The village clerk also said there had been audit findings in recent years because of problems with the current software.


"What concerns me isn't so much the cost, although it's a lot of money up front," Bassett said. "All this stuff is a living thing," he said of the software. "It needs to be tweaked all the time."

Dillard said the purchase will include installation, training, testing and data transferring. A \$595 per month support program will provide future technical needs.

Dillard said the village's fiscal year budget has \$8,000 earmarked for software upgrades.

She added the state Department of Finance and Administration told her there would be no problem with the village making a mid-year budget adjustment to cover the remainder of the the software cost.

Fraud, breach of contract, foreclosure at issue

Land swap deal with BLM ends up in District Court

Two principals in a land swap with the federal Bureau of Land Management seven years ago have sued in Lincoln County District Court for fraud, breach of contract and foreclosure on a mortgage.

John P. Cauhape filed suit in Carrizozo on Nov. 17, against AS&B Investments Inc., the Lincoln Valley Land Co., Bonito Land and Livestock Inc., Ron Green and Max Kiehne. He asked the court to return \$92,549 paid to the defendants in 1994, to award real and punitive damages, to foreclose a mortgage on Tract 14 in Los Chosas subdivision, to quiet the title and sell the land.

In 1991, the BLM started the process of acquiring about 1,115 acres of land near historic Lincoln along the Bonito River in Lincoln County. The procedure was based on a swap of about 36,000 acres in isolated tracts of public land in other parts of the state for the land owned by the Green/Kiehne group.

Initially, the agency was talking about 5,000 acres, but subsequent exchanges didn't occur.

Kiehne, who lives in Los Lunas, declined to comment on the lawsuit Monday.

An attorney for Green said Tuesday that his client filed a lawsuit against the BLM that is

set for trial in April in the U.S. Court of Federal Claims in Washington D.C.

"We contend the BLM breached an expressed or implied contract by not going through with the trades," he said. "We're trying to litigate the issue, not each proposed trade. Mr. Cauhape's was one of several trades pending."

In the lawsuit filed on his behalf by Roswell attorney Marion J. Craig, Cauhape stated that AS&B was formed in Roswell and that the Lincoln Valley Land Co. merged into Bonito Land and Livestock Inc. based in Los Lunas.

He claimed that Green approached him on behalf of AS&B and the Lincoln Valley outfit in November 1994, proposing that Cauhape purchase land owned by the BLM within his ranch that was scheduled to be part of an exchange.

Two agreements for the exchange and purchase of real estate were signed and Cauhape paid \$92,549 to AS&B for both, with the stipulation that the closing occur before Jan. 1, 1997 under one contract and before March 15, 1995 on the other, he stated in the lawsuit.

The agreements provided that in case of default, Cauhape's money would be refunded after 15 days written notice, if the default wasn't cured.

He claims in the suit that notice of default was given on Oct. 19, 2000, for both agreements, but no money has been refunded.

A mortgage was issued on the tract of land to secure Cauhape's down payment and his continuing cooperation in allowing Green and Kiehne to work on a state and federal exchange, according to the suit.

But at this time, Cauhape state in the suit, he believes, "there was never any agreement by the state of New Mexico to exchange land" and that the BLM never agreed that Cauhape's land would be subject to an exchange.

"The defendants breached their agreement to purchase and exchange property and are justly indebted" to (Cauhape) for the refund of the down payment, the suit states.

The men knew or should have known that the BLM was not interested and that Cauhape's property was not designated by the BLM as a potential exchange land, according to the suit. The two men knowingly misrepresented the situation to Cauhape, took his money and converted it to their own uses, he contends in the suit.

The attorney reserved the right to file additional counts regarding the possible conversion of the money, if it was not deposited into a real estate account and if other misrepresentations are discovered.

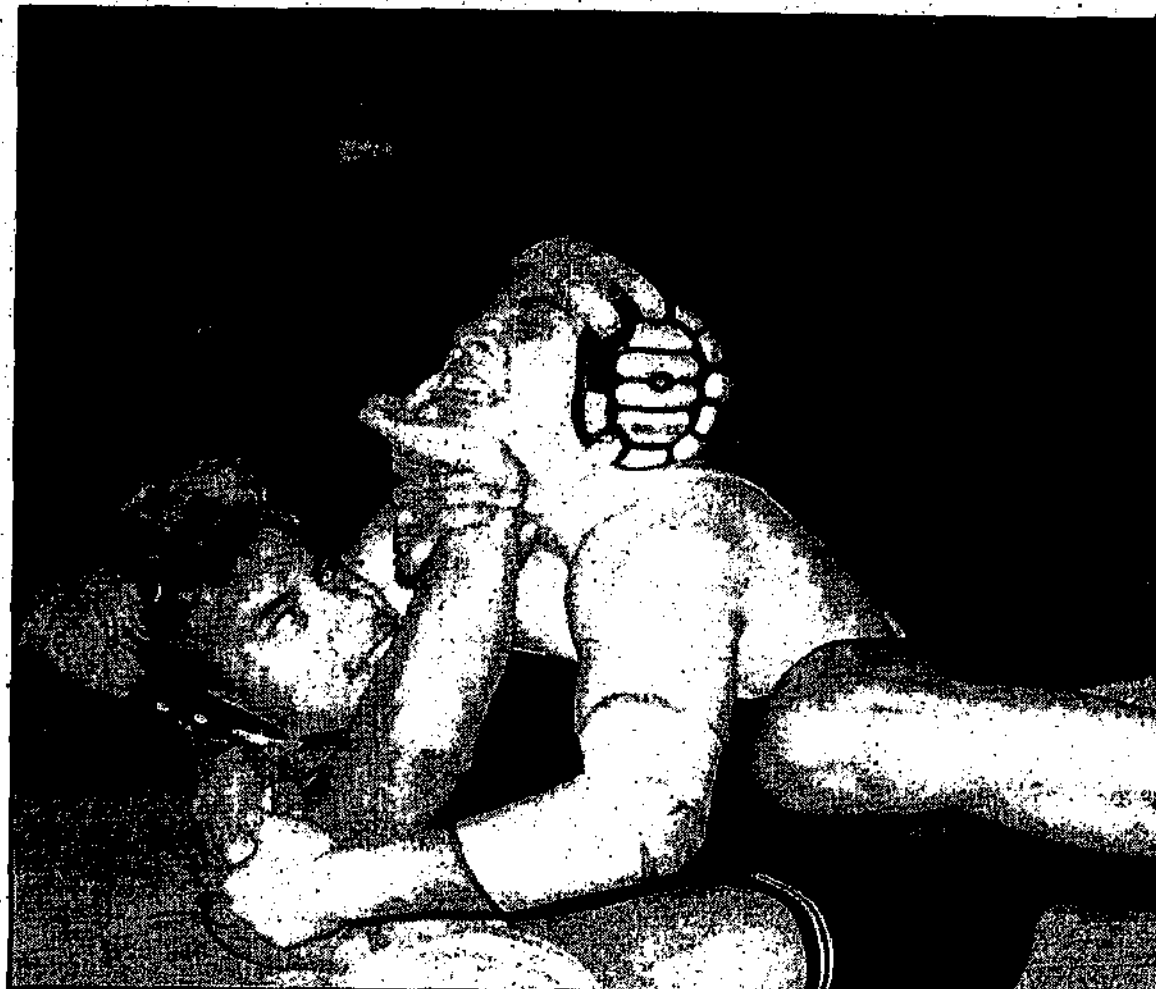
Besides being young, Deming also was low on numbers, forfeiting four weight classes.

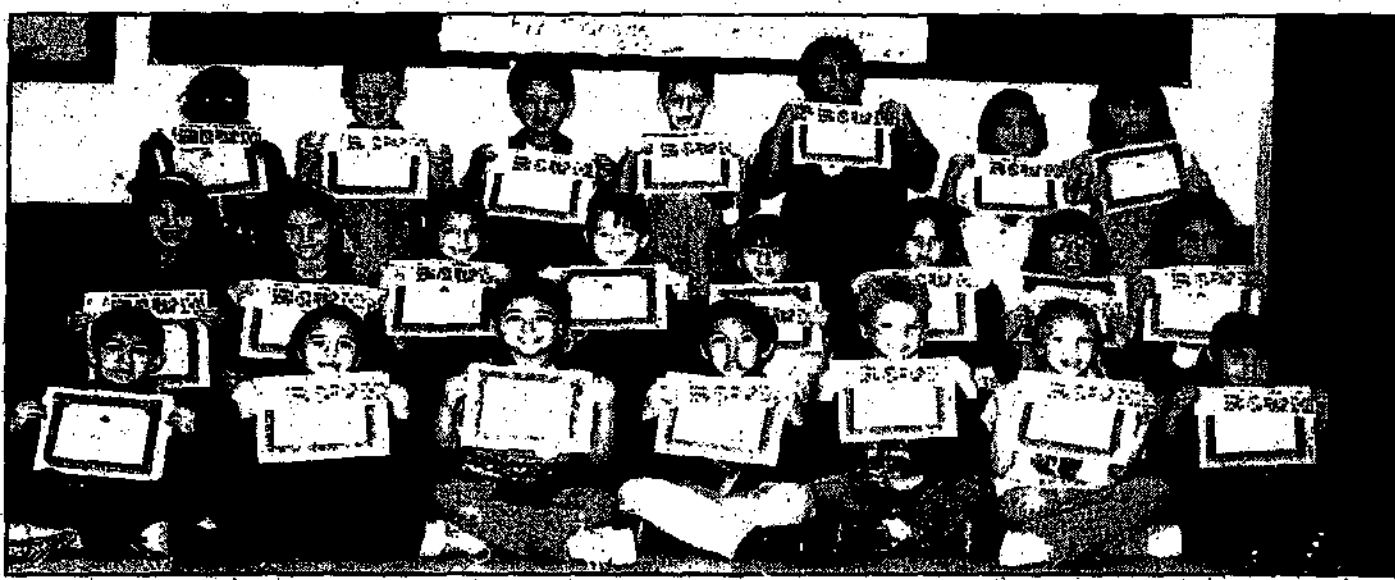

One fellowship, carrying a \$25,000 award, will be awarded in New Mexico. Last year's fellow is Nancy Jaramillo, a teacher at Magdalena Elementary in Magdalena.

The mission of the Christa McAuliffe Fellowship Program is to provide an opportunity for outstanding and experienced teachers to assist in the development and implementation of education improvement initia-

tives to enhance their own professional skills and improve classroom instruction. The program was created in 1987 in memory of Christa McAuliffe, who served as an astronaut on the space shuttle Challenger in 1986.

"The Christa McAuliffe Fellowship Program is special in that it honors experienced classroom teachers who love to teach and who are innovators and mentors," said State Superintendent of Public Instruction Michael J. Davis.

The fellowship may be used for action research projects, professional development, consultation on curriculum development or assistance, sabbaticals, to apply learning tech-

nologies in the classroom or to develop innovative programs. The fellowship must focus on reading and literacy.

"This infusion of funds is both timely and important," said Ralph P. Paiz, director of the SDE's School Improvement and Support Unit. "Increased funding for schools in need of improvement is essential if we are to see improved performance and opportunities for children. These dollars will support 47 schools across the state in implementing strate-

gies for change in student achievement, attendance, dropout, parent involvement and school safety."

Also receiving funding are: 18 schools in the Gallup-McKinley County Public School District, eight schools in the Albuquerque Public School District, five schools in the Central Consolidated School District, four schools in the Santa Fe Public School District, two each in the Bernalillo Public School District, Jemez Mountain Public School District, Las Cruces Public School District and Roswell Independent School District; and one each in the Cuba Independent School District and Jemez Valley Municipal Schools.

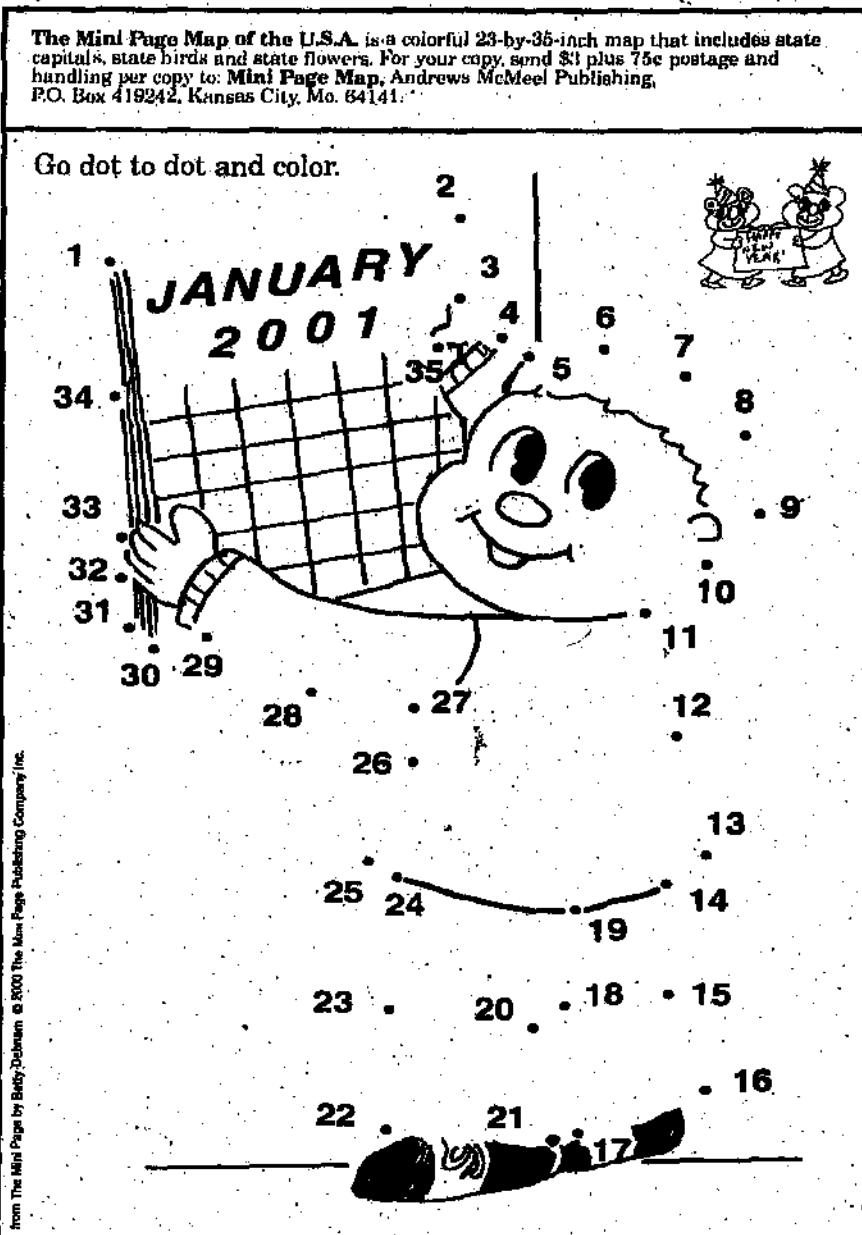

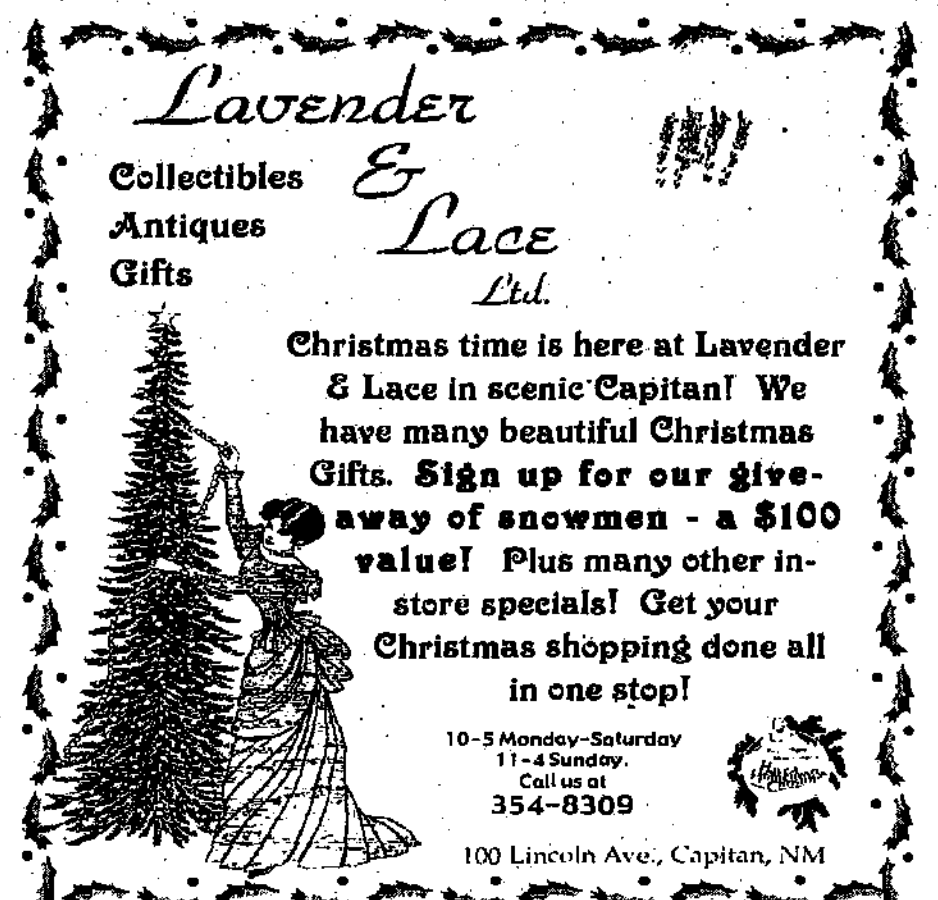

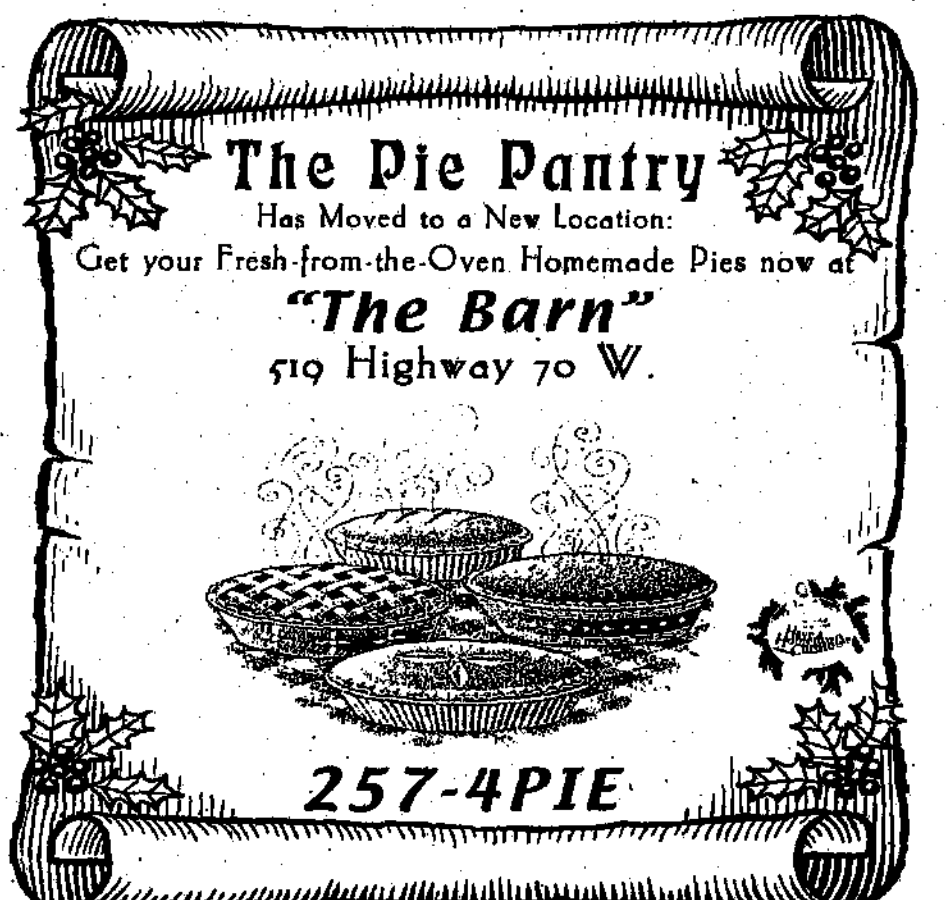

County's growth means new commission district boundaries

Total precinct, commission, legislative redistricting coming up following decennial federal census

Preparing for the release of Census 2000 data April 1, Lincoln County Commissioners will be briefed Thursday on the process of creating balanced legislative and county commission districts.

One bit of information they'll hear is that Lincoln County experienced the fourth-largest population increase from 1990 to 1999 in the state, based on figures put together by Research & Polling Inc., the Albuquerque firm hired to pull the statewide redistricting plan together.

Based on the firm's data, the county's population last year was 16,778, a 37.3 percent increase from 12,219 in 1990. Torrance County led the pack with a 59.5 percent increase in population, followed by Valencia County with 43.9 percent and Sandoval County with 42.5 percent.

The commission meeting will begin at 9 a.m. in the commission

room of the county courthouse in Carrizozo. State Sen. Rod Adair, a Democrat from Roswell and a demographer, will go over the procedure with commissioners.

Brian Sanderoff, president of Research & Polling Inc., discussed some of the problems and details this week.

Under state statutes, each county with a population larger than 13,000 must create districts for each of its commissioners with as equal population as possible. Five commissioners are elected from their separate districts in Lincoln County.

"Common to both the state legislative and county commission redistricting is that every 10 years, along with city councils and school boards throughout the state, they must adjust their election district boundaries so that there is substantially equal population in each," Sanderoff explained.

Precincts are the building blocks of redistricting and may be split or

realigned in putting together the new districts.

"Typically, there are winners and losers," he said. "If your county hasn't kept pace with the state's growth rate, (boundaries) must grow to pick up additional population. If you've grown

at a much greater rate, your boundaries will shrink."

Because Lincoln County grew substantially in the last decade while some of its neighboring counties didn't, those neighbors may start looking at Lincoln to slice away some population for legislative districts, he said.

"They need to be watching," Sanderoff said. If a portion of the

county is acquired by a district dominated by a particular political party, the section's political representation in the state Legislature could change.

The county doesn't have a large enough population to warrant a state legislator of its own, something that requires 41,000 people, he said. It now shares State Rep. Dub Williams, a Republican from Glencoe, with Otero County and one community in Chaves County.

"All 112 legislators think about starting (redistricting) at their district and drawing the lines, but somehow we must get all the pieces of the puzzle together," Sanderoff said. "You can't look at it in vacuum. You must look at the entire region and the state."

The same approach holds true in determining county commission districts within a county, Sanderoff said. Low population rural districts often must cut into densely settled areas to maintain balance with other districts. This is Sanderoff's third round of

redistricting and he's worked with about 50 different government entities over the last 20 years, he said.

The toughest thing to confront in the process is the political survival of elected officials, he said.

"Redistricting can become more intense than actual elections," Sanderoff said. "Some are not always willing to work together for what is best for the community."

Legal prohibitions in redistricting include that it cannot dilute the voting strength of ethnic or language minority groups, he said. But no requirement exists to maximize them either, he said.

"You can even take into account political interests," Sanderoff said.

The state Supreme Court has realized that voters have the right to return two incumbents, but if they are both put in same district through redistricting, only one can survive.

Mayor urges second engineer on payroll 'to save money'

Ruidoso may consider adding an in-house engineer to the payroll.

Mayor Robert Donaldson last week floated the idea before the village council.

In the wake of a couple of police station renovation bids that exceeded budget, Donaldson said engineering firms seem to be responsible for pushing costs high.

"I think it's time to look at an in-house engineer," the mayor said. "We have computers that have CAD (computer-

aided drafting). Having an on-staff engineer to review plans and see that they're not over-engineered, I think would save money."

The mayor said the engineer could work with the village's special-projects coordinator creating a quasi engineering oversight department.

Donaldson said a number of project areas, such as streets, could be engineered in house.

Councilor Bill Chance questioned whether the position would be a general engineer or someone specialized, such as for the projects planned at the village's Sierra Blanca Regional

Airport.

"If you get too specialized, it's too expensive," Alan Briley, village manager, said. Briley is also an engineer, but Donaldson said the village manager has a full workload.

"We can have our extra engineer review their stuff," Donaldson said of engineering firms hired to address specialized projects. "We have enough smaller stuff that I think it's a good idea to have an in-house engineer."

While the council took no action on the proposal, member Bob Sterchi said a village engineer sounded like a good idea.

County protests slower mail delivery

Jobs lost by PO move compounded by decline in service

Still smarting from a decision to pull a distribution center and nine jobs from the U.S. Post Office in Carrizozo, Lincoln County Manager Tom Stewart is ready for another jab at postal officials in Albuquerque.

He is scheduled to present a letter to the County Commission for approval Thursday detailing complaints about slow-downs in mail delivery service.

Addressed to Lee Salazar, district manager, Stewart wrote that "Thanks to your efficient bureaucracy, the small town of Carrizozo has lost nine postal employees, a 75 percent loss of paid postal positions in a small economically deprived town."

"We recall with much disappointment the visit of your staff to our community meeting of July 20. John Roark's promise of no effect in delivery service dwells in our minds when, in fact, the opposite is true."

He commended the efficiency of the new postmaster, but wrote she "is at the mercy of your new distribution scheme."

Stewart told Salazar that the commission hopes the move of the mail distribution

center was greeted enthusiastically in Alamogordo, "because your organization's decision to move employment opportunities to that larger community will never be looked upon with anything but disfavor in this community."

In April, Roark, manager of post office operation, acknowledged during an interview that transferring the distribution center from the county seat of Carrizozo to the larger town of Alamogordo in Otero County was recommended and he expected a decision by September.

Alamogordo's larger building that could accommodate automated equipment and being a population center were two of the reasons given for the move

during a heated discussion of the decision at the July commission meeting. By that time, the decision already was final, Roark said.

Employees losing their jobs were to be offered positions elsewhere, if possible, but they would not be reimbursed for the additional travel to the new jobs, he said.

At the meeting, postal employees warned that new transportation routes and schedules would be more costly and that service would suffer.

Sometimes, it's unavoidable."

Other guidelines include keeping districts as compact as possible without "islands" and considering common interests such as neighborhoods, cultural traditions, geographical features, high growth areas and urban versus rural areas.

After the firm comes up with a plan, it will go to state Legislature to hassle, but the process is scheduled to wind down in December 2001.

- Honor 30 years of government service by County Assessor Patsy Serna, who besides serving in elected office, spent years as a county employee.

But she added, "Because of their wonderful temperament, they are used in almost every job a dog can have."

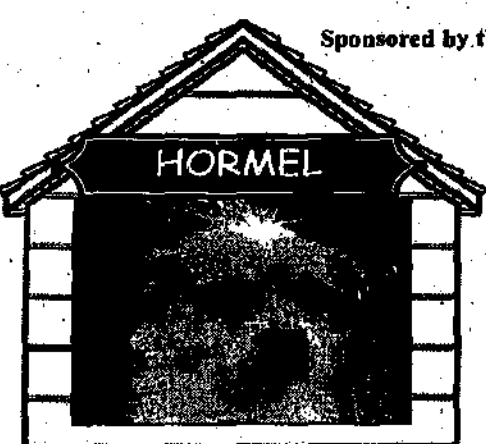
- Chow Chow – "One of the few dogs that I recommend as a latchkey dog (eight to 10 hours maximum alone).
