## Meadow Valley adamantly disagrees with village on runway job

Meadow Valley Contractors, Inc. is in "total disagreement" with an engineering firm's stand that an airport runway paving job failed to meet contract specifications.

The village of Ruidoso placed Meadow Valley on notice last month that they were in default on a contract for construction of a new runway at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

Village officials have indicated the default status could force Meadow Valley to remove asphalt on the 6,500-foot-long landing strip and repave it. Litigation could be pursued, though both sides have agreed to a meeting to consider an independent review of the asphalt's quality.

In a July 28 letter to Leedshill-Herkenhoff, Inc., of Albuquerque, the

village's engineer firm, Meadow Valley argues the project is acceptable and meets the intent of technical specifications.

"We have on numerous occasions questioned the sampling and testing that Leedshill has employed on the project," Sam Grasmick, area manager for Meadow Valley, stated in the letter. "As you must confirm to the village, Leedshill did not follow the testing specification."

The contract requirement called for a specific time frame and process for testing asphalt used on the runway. The bituminous mixture was to be placed in an oven for not less than 30

minutes nor more than 60 minutes.

"All the samples were transported from Ruidoso down to Alamogordo. In fact, our information suggests that the tests were not run until the next day and in some instances after the material had set for a weekend," Grasmick claimed. He said that skewed the entire testing process.

An engineering firm hired by Meadow Valley to inspect the paved runway said the pavement is in compliance with the project specifications and nothing more is needed before putting the surface in service. Dr. Richard W. Smith, P.E., said he believed Leedshill's testing is defective.

The village's engineering firm contended the pavement conditions justify removal and replacement of the asphalt. Smith disagreed.

"In my opinion, there is no problem with the existing pavement," Smith said. "The only documented problem is the acceptance testing performed by the owner's representatives..."

Grasmick has offered to apply a seal coat to the pavement at no cost to the village. "It would be an extreme waste of money with no benefit to the village to direct us to remove and replace this pavement," he said. "This is essentially a \$1.4 million decision because we are entitled to payment for our completed pavement (approximately \$650,000), and then it will cost the village another \$850,000 to remove and replace the PMPB (asphalt) that we have placed."

Calling for a meeting with the village and the engineering firms, Grasmick said it "would be the prudent thing for the village to do before it makes a final decision that could result in litigation, a withdrawal of FAA (Federal Aviation Administration) funding and cost to the village of over \$1,400,000."

"We all hope for an amicable resolution on any issue," said Robert Donaldson, mayor of Ruidoso. "But we are not afraid of a lawsuit. Once we get to this point I think litigation is a real possibility."

But Alan Briley, the village's manager, held out hope that the village and Meadow Valley could avoid going to court. "We are going to call in a third party, a non-biased somebody, someone like a university engineering professor."

## Cree juveniles await hearing

Petition claims trio needs care and rehabilitation

Three Ruidoso juveniles have petitions in connection with the origin of the Cree Fire.

The district attorneys' office filed the petitions July 27, in the Children's Court Division of the District Court at Carrizozo. The petitions are the children's court equivalent of a criminal complaint in adult court. They label each of the juveniles as "a delinquent child and in need of care or rehabilitation."

A petition filed against William Smith, 17, accuses the teen of negligent arson. The petition alleges that Smith "did recklessly start a fire or cause an explosion on the property in the Lincoln National Forest, which caused damage in the value of \$3.6 million."

A second count against Smith claims he made a false report to po-

lice.

The petition lists Michelle Yarbrough as Smith's parent or guardian.

Another of the juveniles alleged to have been at the location of the start of the Cree Fire, Lori Brown, 17, is accused of intentionally making a false report to police. A second count accuses Brown of concealing her true name to police. Her parents or guardians are listed as Deanna Ballard and Roy Brown.

Rachel Morgan, 15, is accused of possession of less than one ounce of marijuana at the time the fire began. The teen's parents are listed on the petition as Kathy and Jeff Morgan.

Each of the delinquency petitions call on the court to have the parents or guardians make a party to the action.

## Africanized bees probably have moved into Lincoln County

Humming from from a series of boxes containing bee colonies warns visitors to Serendip Orchard that they're approaching the pollinators vital to the production of raspberries, blackberries and cherries at the Lincoln business.

Owner Hershel Anderson walks within five feet of the busy communities of European bees he brought from California. They don't seem to notice his proximity as workers fly to the rows of berry bushes and back to their hives.

But entomologists with New Mexico State University warn private and commercial beekeepers, as well as home owners, not to let down their guard.

The recent death of a Carlsbad farmer from a bee attack is a grim reminder of the relentless advance by Africanized bees and the danger they pose to other bee colonies, humans, pets, and livestock.

Lucille Kincaid died following a

bee attack in a Carlsbad backyard Thursday. Two other people were stung but survived.

"New Mexicans must be careful outdoors because aggressive, Africanized honey bees are now confirmed in 10 counties," said Carol Sutherland with the College of Agriculture and Home Economics at NMSU in Las Cruces. "The bees have been found in Hidalgo, Grant, Catron, Sierra, Luna, Doña Ana, Otero, Eddy and Lea counties. A hybrid colony was confirmed in Bernalillo County."

Just because Lincoln isn't on the list doesn't mean the "killer bees" as they've been dubbed, aren't here, she said Tuesday.

"About a year ago, a beekeeper in Alamogordo who collected unwanted colonies when people called for help, brought in some samples from an old junk car and they turned out to be Africanized," she said.

The site was about three miles from the Lincoln County line.

"So I don't think you guys are im-

mune to anything," Sutherland said. "I think they probably are up there. They may be in hollows of trees."

Bees are not deterred by the altitudes in Lincoln County, she said. She spotted a colony at 9,000 feet above sea level on a hike above Three Rivers Campground in the White Mountain Wilderness, Sutherland said.

The problem in identifying an African bee is that when people are stung, they don't wait around to collect a couple of dozen bees for testing, she said.

"We've had some beekeepers lately who have had their faces basically chewed off. They were really hurt," Sutherland said. "I've gotten samples from a couple. Some turned out to be just plain old Europeans, which means they either got them on a bad day or the situation escalated, because once they start stinging, they give out a signal and they go nuts."

# Art festival for 2000 rates best in the past 29 years

The Ruidoso Art Festival, with a smashing success and attendance up and artists selling like mad, said organizers.

"It was fantastic, the best ever," said Phyllis Barnett, chairperson for the festival. "The quality of the art was just top-of-the-line. Many of the comments we heard were that this definitely was fine art."

The organizers estimate a total attendance of 7,000, up 10 percent from last year, said Joan Zagone, executive director of the sponsoring Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Zagone said, "We opened the doors at noon on Friday and had a steady stream of heads coming through those doors all weekend."

"Co-helper" and former ArtFest chairman Denise Dean said people were "carrying stuff out the doors left and right. And then they stayed and spent money in Ruidoso; they stayed for vacations."

Each year for the past 29,

the Ruidoso have gotten better and better, Dean said, adding that artists couldn't believe the quality of the art this year, and customers were in awe of it.

"I can't think of a moment of the show when it wasn't packed," Dean said.

The planners chose a different marketing plan this year, Zagone said, deciding to market to people already here for other events. They also took on a new partner, Shuttle Ruidoso, to take people to the over-flow parking lot of the Hawthorne Suites Hotel, making 100 more parking spaces available.

The organizers made a point of making the artists happy, and this didn't go unnoticed.

"The blondes are so helpful," said wearable-art artist Deborah Armijo of Sandia Park, referring to Barnett, Zagone and Dean.

The "artist treatment" included help with setting up, explaining the shuttle and the package given to each artist,

artists' dinner, "goody bags," and a hospitality suite in the kitchen where artists could go for refreshments and to sit down and relax at a table twice day, Barnett said.

"Carol Benham had Al-trusas there to booth-sit for them ... and we booth-sat also if we happened to be walking by," Barnett said. "The thing we want to do is make sure that we let the artists know that we're glad they're here and we appreciate them."

Part of the success of the ArtFest may be this focus on the artists.

"They have chosen one of the hardest ways to make a living," Zagone said. "They know the shows, how well promoted they are, and how well they're treated, and this is one of the most popular shows among art."

Wholesalers sometimes meet Armijo at the Ruidoso ArtFest, and the "blondes" and volunteers have helped them carry out their many purchases, Armijo said.

Ronnie Wells from Salado, Texas, with his exhibit of metal sculptures and oil paintings, won Best of Show for the second year, and said he'll be back next year because award winners are automatically invited back, without having to be juried in. Also, he said, because he's appreciated.

Two Ruidoso artists placed in the Top Ten this year: Jim Mauritsen for his burl wood-work, and Maureen Quemada for her acrylic paintings.

"One of the things that makes this show very personal to us is that we had several more Lincoln County artists that were juried in," Zagone said. "We hope that next year we'll have even more Lincoln County artists that apply."

The other Top-Ten winners were: Daryl Howard's mixed media, Phillip Sonier's photography, Jim Delso's sculpture, Ray Gross' pottery, W. Chris Morel's oils, Norma Graff's watercolors, Gloria Schmidt's jewelry and Alexa and Dorothy Walker's fabric.

# JUVENILES: The only adult involved will serve 18 months' probation

The three juveniles, as well as an adult, had detailed their activities immediately before and after the fire began on federal lands east of Ruidoso to police, Lanny G. Maddox, Ruidoso police chief, had said in May. Maddox called the interviews "the four 'confessions' that indicated the fire was unintentional."

The four had gone to a cave location near the Pines of Gavilan Subdivision the afternoon of May 7, according to earlier accounts reportedly supplied by the suspects. A makeshift torch, using a burn-

ing branch, was taken into the dark cave. Smith allegedly threw the branch on the ground outside the cave and when the youth exited the cavern a fire had spread to two trees and ground cover.

The adult involved at the origin of the fire, Joseph Martin, 21, of Ruidoso, entered a no contest plea last week to one felony count of contributing to the delinquency of a minor. A second felony count was dismissed by the state as part of a plea agreement, accepted by District Court Judge Karen Parsons.

Martin was sentenced to 18 months of supervised pro-

bation and ordered to perform as much as 40 hours community service weekly, potentially on rehabilitation work associated with Cree Fire burn areas, during the probation period.


In an interview after his arrest last month Martin said he was "terribly upset about it." He said a week after the fire began he went to Ruidoso police and confessed his involvement.

Martin's conviction, on the contributing to the delinquency of a minor charge, was for failing to stop Smith's alleged negligence that triggered the fire.

The Cree Fire in two days had spread to a size of 5,700 acres, destroyed three buildings, and routed hundreds of residents from their homes. At one point an estimated 1,100 firefighters and command post officials were working to halt the flames.

The cost of a three-week effort to totally snuff out the fire has been set at \$3.6 million.

The filing of charges against the teens requires the court to reach a conclusion within 90 days, said William Cordova, head of the Juvenile Probation Office in Alamogordo.

# BEES: Be warned by a loud, persistent buzzing...and move away quickly

"On the other hand, another man took bees from below a living space on a trailer in Alamogordo that turned out to be African. They had established a colony, attacked the people in the trailer and then massed an attack against the whole outer structure."

Don't try to dislodge or destroy a hive. Call a pest control service to handle the job, Sutherland said. Homeowner should check their property periodically and screen openings like drain spouts.

People keeping domesticated bees need to work their bees routinely and be aware of any marked changes in behavior, Sutherland said.

"If they have some bees getting really cranky and difficult to handle," he may have African bees interbreeding, because the old queen has died or was killed by the intruders.

"If they want to keep the colony they will have to find that queen and eliminate her and re-queen with a queen that is considerably calmer and more European in form," Sutherland said. "The queen is the only one that can reproduce. Her prodigy will be European and the hot bees will die off within six weeks or so."

"If the colony is too hot to handle, it should be exterminated because it's not only a threat to beekeeper, but to his family, their livestock and their neighbors and their livestock."

Some domestic bees' colonies already have decimated populations across the country. Anderson said he hasn't seen any wild bees in his orchard for six years.

Although African bees pollinate, the danger outweighs the result, Sutherland said.

"I don't know how beekeepers in South America handle them," she said. "The pea-

shooter smokers beekeepers use here aren't nearly large enough to subdue a colony."

She advises beekeepers to duct tape their suits to their gloves and to put tape around their ankles, over their pockets and even over zippers. Wear another set of clothing under the suit to deflect stingers, she said.

"The bees can fly into pant legs and up into the hood and sting the face and eyes," she said. "It's amazing when bees are upset; they will find any type of crevice. An attack by these bees, or even Europeans when they are upset, is just like a freight train with a roaring sound and they press in on the face screen. It's frightening."

Colonies are difficult to spot in trees, she said. If someone hears a loud, persistent buzzing, move out of the area quickly. If bees attack, run as fast as you can to shelter and seek medical attention if stung and feeling faint or having difficulty breathing.

# P&Z rejects Ruidoso man's bid to live in trailer

Ruidoso's Planning and Zoning Commission Tuesday rejected a request to allow a home builder to place an RV trailer on a vacant residential lot while building a home.

Gerald L. Griep sought a conditional use permit to allow him to live in a fifth-wheel trailer for up to nine months on a 9 1/4 acre residential property in the Camelot Mountain Subdivision. He said living on the lot would reduce theft during construction. It is

an arraignment Griep admitted doing previously in Ruidoso.

"Three years ago I moved here," Griep told the commission. "I built a house and lived in an RV. I had no idea this was against the rules."

He said there were only three full-time residents within a mile of the property, and the size of the lot would make his temporary RV residence inconspicuous.

"Based on the direction of

the commission at our last meeting I propose we don't allow this," said Bill Hirschfeld, a member of the planning and zoning panel.

On July 18 the commission denied a petition to allow a couple to live in a trailer while building a home in the Sierra Blanca Cabin complex.

"This worries me," said Mike Reveley, a planning and zoning commissioner. "In four or five years we have had two requests to do this. And now we

have had two in two weeks."

Some on the Planning and Zoning Commission had raised concerns that neighbors would be upset if people were allowed to live in RVs while building a home. They suggested the village consider changing an ordinance that allows a conditional use permit be considered for RV living.

Griep has the right to appeal the commission's decision before the Ruidoso Village Council.

# Monsoon restores Rio Ruidoso to health, boosts storage

Directors of the Ruidoso River Association are celebrating the restoration of a healthy water flow in the stream they consider one of Ruidoso's main treasures.

They'll share the statistics and update members at the organization's fourth annual meeting from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Friday at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

After trickling at less than two cubic feet per second (cfs) since the fall, the river started gushing down its path through town in response to early monsoons that raised the flow back to normal levels of 10 to 20 cfs, said Director Dick Wisner.

"Some of the gully-washers actually took the flow over 90 cfs," he said. "This gave the village water department a chance to refill Grindstone Lake reservoir with surface water diversion from Upper Canyon."

The association urges the village to take as much as it can and "bank" the water in the reservoir for leaner times ahead in dryer seasons, he said.

A pump-back system that captures spillage from the dam and returns it to the reservoir also is operating, Wisner said, another arrangement worked on by both the village and the association.

After hitting a low volume of 470 acre-feet of water in

early June, representing an eight-month supply for the Grindstone treatment plant, the lake now is up to about 12 vertical feet and back to 720 acre-feet of water, representing a 13-month supply at the vil-

lage's 1999 production rate, Wisner said.

An acre foot equates to 325,851 gallons of water.

Village plans call for the reservoir to be filled up to 1,512 acre-feet.

# Chili cook-off moving — next year

After this fall's 19th Annual State Open Chili Cook-off in Ruidoso the event will move to Ruidoso Downs.

The food and fun fest, which drew 4,000 tasters on its first day last fall, will be held again this Aspenfest weekend at the Tall Pines RV Park on Sudderth Drive, said Paul Crown, the cook-off's promoter.

This year's cook-off is scheduled for Oct. 7 and 8. Proceeds from the event go to the Ruidoso Rotary Club's scholarship fund.

"But this will be the last year at Tall Pines," Crown said. "They couldn't guarantee it would still be an RV park next year. (Tall Pines owner Mark Clark) has been

nothing but helpful," Crown said. The RV park has been used for the chili cooking and tasting for years.

The 20th Annual State Open Chili Cook-off, in 2001, is planned for the Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Casino, Crown said. A hot-rod show is also planned for the same time at the track, which would help the two events "feed off each other," he said.

"Next year it won't be a stand-alone event. The thing I like about the cook-off is some groups come in for a week. It's a big deal to the chili world." Last year chili chefs from Washington state to Vermont stirred their pots, hoping to take home culinary honors.

## The wheels of justice have done their turn

Now that Joseph Martin, the only adult involved in starting the 6,500-acre Cree Fire on the edge of Ruidoso in May, has stood up in court and entered a no-contest plea and been sentenced, no doubt the criticism will begin.

That seems inevitable. Nobody was hurt in that fire on national forest land, but three structures were destroyed, a firefighting vehicle was destroyed, whole subdivisions were evacuated, lots of taxpayers' money was spent. And the 21-year-old was sentenced to 18 months of supervised probation, with the condition that he perform 40 hours of community service weekly during the probation period. The judge allowed him to reduce the 40-hour requirement by two hours for every hour he was gainfully employed. At any rate, a minimum of 10 hours' service must be performed every week.


People who lost property, and the community, will have input on what service Martin will perform. His no-contest plea was to one count of contributing to the delinquency of a minor and for failure to act to stop a juvenile from triggering the fire. The district attorney's office had dropped a second count of contributing and of providing marijuana to a juvenile. (Another involving Martin, his theft of a bicycle, will delay things a bit.)

A boy and two girls involved in the incident are now in the hands of juvenile justice authorities.

Much of Ruidoso felt under siege during the Cree Fire; many had bags packed and an evacuation route in mind in case of a wind shift. Such a shift is all it would have taken to turn the whole village into a torch.

That's serious business, but the feds, occupied with a whole state, seemingly, on fire, left it to the state to handle prosecution, and it has—under the laws of the state. The judge heard the plea, the evidence, the prosecution's report, and issued a well-reasoned sentence. Some might disagree, but the system has worked.

And, on due consideration, the fact is that Joseph Martin will have no control over his own life for the next year and a half. And that's the next thing to a prison term.

A recent issue of "People" magazine contained a picture of three people, one of them was Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman. It seemed like a public relations accomplishment for the secretary to be in a popular magazine and not a farm publication, except "People" identified the wrong person as Glickman.

There was a time when there were many more farmers, and the secretary of agriculture was well known. That was in the 1930s and the secretary of agriculture was Henry A. Wallace.

Wallace also served a term as vice president under Franklin Roosevelt and he ran for president against Harry S. Truman on the Progressive ticket. The Wallace name is still on the farm magazine his family started, and for which he was editor.

His remarkable influence on agriculture in the 20th century is being recognized anew because of a biography. Former Iowa senator John C. Culver and John Hyde have written "American Dreamer, a Life of Henry A. Wallace."

Dreamer was not exactly a complimentary term applied to

Wallace. His critics thought he dreamed too much. He was attracted to mysticism and utopian ideals. Wallace became exceedingly liberal in politics, but he was plain and practical too.

Culver and Hyde's biography credits him with many things. He was a corn scientist and responsible for the commercialization of hybrid corn. He and his father, Henry C., helped get the Farm Bureau started. As secretary of agriculture, Wallace worked closely with the American Farm Bureau to draft the nation's first major government farm act. Roosevelt, Wallace and the Farm Bureau were instrumental in turning around a farm depression that nearly toppled the family farm system.

"Under H.A. Wallace, the Department of Agriculture had become a powerful engine for progressive action. The department had broken new ground on every front — economic, social, scientific — and permanently changed the relationship between government and agriculture, the nation's largest and most important enterprise," said Culver and Hyde.

One example of Wallace's foresight was after a trip he

made to Mexico in 1940. Appalled by conditions there and the low level of farm output, he pressed for something to be done even as he was about to be sworn in as vice president. The result was an agricultural experiment station and the work of a young Iowan, Norman Borlaug.

Wallace was always concerned that people have enough to eat. Culver and Hyde report he once remarked to the wife of the Soviet ambassador that the object of World War II was "to make sure everybody in the world has the privilege of drinking a quart of milk a day." The comment was only mildly in jest.

For all his accomplishments, Wallace's reputation became quite tarnished. As Roosevelt's New Deal faded, the Democratic Party considered him too liberal and soft on communism.

His economic ideas also lost luster with farmers. More government was not necessarily the answer to perplexing farm problems.

"American Dreamer" is like restoring an old painting, so it can be admired more as it should.

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

**Downs to write specs for an administrator**

Ruidoso Downs trustees will meet this evening in a workshop session to consider what the village needs in a village administrator.

Bob Durrett, Ruidoso Downs' first village administrator, resigned June 30, after 4 1/2 months on the job. In his resignation letter Durrett said unavoidable personal circumstances would force him to be out of town on a frequent basis.

In a posting of the workshop session, Gladys Dillard, the village clerk/treasurer, stated that the session, beginning at 5:30 p.m. in the council room of village hall, will be a discussion on hiring a village administrator.

"We kind of like the idea of an engineer," said Mayor Bob Miller. "We kind of talked about a manager or administrative assistant. We need

someone to satisfy the needs of the village."

Miller said those needs primarily are sewer, water and street paving.

"We need someone that can get out and coordinate all of these efforts," the mayor said. "It's not firm that he be an engineer, it's just what we've been talking about."

Village residents will have a chance to input both verbally or in written form on the qualifications for a village administrator, according to the workshop notice.

"We're not in that big a hurry to hire someone," Miller said. "Things are getting done, but a manager or administrator helps make things happen."

The workshop will likely be limited to a one-hour discussion. The village council is scheduled to move into a closed meeting beginning at 6:30 p.m. The executive session was called to discuss personnel matters.

**Second trial scheduled in Diebler murder case**

Johnny Ray Gutierrez is scheduled to be retried Dec. 4 for first-degree murder in the stabbing death of Allsup's clerk John Diebler.

A jury in early July failed to reach an unanimous verdict on a murder and robbery charge against Gutierrez, who was arrested in Capitan months after the crime in

August 1998.

After listening to five days of testimony and deliberating for nearly two full days, the jury deadlocked 10 for acquittal and two for conviction on the murder charge and eight for acquittal and four for conviction on the robbery charge.

District Attorney Scot Key said last month he was looking forward to having a second opportunity to prosecute Gutierrez.

Diebler was stabbed 27 times. Seven wounds were potentially fatal, according to experts who testified in the first trial. His body was found in the men's restroom of the convenience store on U.S. 70 near the eastern edge of Ruidoso.

Jurors interviewed after the trial ended said they were bothered by the lack of fingerprints or blood linking Gutierrez to the crime.

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# Huge jail expense for Mescalero

The lack of a jail at Mescalero for six months proved to be an expensive time for police on the reservation.

Prisoners from December 1999 to May 2000 were housed at other lock-ups, including one facility hundreds of miles away. The cost to house and transport inmates neared \$670,000 during the period, said Mescalero's top law enforcement official.

For housing detainees at the Ruidoso police department lock-up, from December through May, the Mescalero Law Enforcement Agency spent \$26,250. Ruidoso's nine-bed jail limited the number of Mescalero inmates to a handful at a time at best. Other Mescalero prisoners were housed at Southern Ute, a detention facility in southwestern Colorado. The cost to house inmates at Southern Ute was \$306,000 during the seven months. In addition, the law enforcement agency spent \$4,461.40 to transport detainees to Southern Ute.

"We averaged, at one time, 30 people a day," Bolen said. "That's \$45,000 a month to house and feed them."

The expenses came out of the agency's \$1 million annual budget, Bolen said.

Last December Ruidoso entered into an agreement with

the Bureau of Indian Affairs at Mescalero to provide jail services on a space-available basis. The housing of tribal inmates ended in May when the renovated jail at Mescalero reopened. Ruidoso received \$50 per day per inmate interned. Short-term detainees, specifically those awaiting court appearances in tribal court, were held in the Ruidoso police lockup. Long-term prisoners were sent to Southern Ute.

While the Mescalero jail has reopened, with many past problems corrected, the facility has been unable to contract food services, said Bolen. Presently meals are picked up three times daily from McDonald's in Ruidoso. The jail is also in need of additional detention officers, the BIA police chief said. Three of six positions were filled as of July 28.

The renovations at the jail totaled \$50,000.

# Boxer, local face petty misdemeanor hearings

Professional boxer Johnny Tapia and Lincoln County resident Allan Korzan will face Ruidoso Magistrate Judge William Butts in connection with an incident on June 27.

Korzan is charged with negligent use of a deadly weapon, a petty misdemeanor, punishable by up to six months in jail and a \$500 fine, according to information from the office of District Attorney Scot Key. Tapia is charged with assault, also a petty misdemeanor.

No date is set for the hearing, but attorneys representing both men were notified of the

charges, according to the magistrate court clerk. Tapia is scheduled for another hearing at 1 p.m., Sept. 19, in magistrate court in Carrizozo to answer a misdemeanor charge of dogs running at large. Otero County Magistrate Judge Ted McCutcheon will hear the case.

Tapia's two Neapolitan mastiffs are accused of killing 17 show milk goats last May. The goats were owned by the Robbie Hall family and were 4-H projects of his 13-year-old son. The Halls have sued Tapia to recover the cost of the goats and for punitive damages.

Tapia is a part-time resident of the Ranches of Ruidoso area off Sierra Blanca Airport Road.

Soccer teen is a real kick in the grass

When Torrey Bosson, 14, has no one  
else to play soccer with her, she plays  
with her two border collies, Skii and  
Kit. Skii plays offense and Kit plays  
defense. But Torrey can't play with the  
dogs forever.

Torrey and her mother, Jeannie,  
will be commuting from Carrizozo, their  
home of two years to Ruidoso, so Torrey  
can join Ruidoso High School's brand-  
new girls soccer team. While a move to  
the new city is possible in the future,  
the move to the new school system is  
definite.

"Carrizozo has a great school sys-  
tem; it's so small that it feels like a fam-  
ily," Torrey said. "But it doesn't have a  
girls' soccer program."

Torrey and her mother moved to  
Carrizozo from Mesa, Ariz., where she  
played soccer most of her life.

Torrey's love of soccer started when  
she was 5 years old when she played on  
a YMCA league in Arizona.

"When I scored my first goal and I  
heard the cheers," said Torrey. "I was  
hooked."

Torrey has come a long way since  
her YMCA days. She started to play on  
select teams when she was eight and  
now plays the mid field position. A mid  
fielder gets to handle the ball a lot,  
and Torrey has scored more than four  
goals in a single game. The average  
number of goals in a youth game is five.

"I used to be afraid that the ball  
would hit me in the face," Torrey  
remembered. "But then I had a soccer  
coach in Arizona and he made me get  
over the fear. He would throw balls at  
my head."

It has been worth it though, said  
Torrey.

"(Through soccer) I have learned  
discipline and I learned how to be a  
team player and work together with  
people."

Torrey has been to countless soccer  
camps and has recently been under the  
instruction of Gilbert Montez, a soccer  
coach from Texas. Unable to make a  
camp in Arizona, Torrey was able to  
coach Torrey one-on-one.

The youngest of three children, Tor-  
rey said she would not call herself a  
prodigy or even a natural, but her soccer  
ability came with "a lot of practice."

Torrey practices at least 11 hours a  
week. Torrey commented that after she  
plays with her dogs, she conditions her-  
self through running. At present, the  
road to Torrey's house is one mile long,  
so she runs up and down to keep her-  
self in shape.

Entering Ruidoso High School as a  
freshman, Torrey will have her work cut  
out for her. Soccer practice starts  
August 7 and Torrey will start her new  
high school career on August 21.

It's OK though, said Torrey, because  
so far she's carried a 4.0 grade point  
average and has still been able to keep  
up her soccer game.

Hoping that someday she will join  
the WUSA, a professional women's soc-

cer league that will be  
official in  
2001, Torrey  
wants to  
attend a col-  
lege or univer-  
sity on an ac-  
ademic or sports  
scholarship.

Among her  
many awards  
and trophies  
from tourna-  
ments, Torrey  
was one of 50  
girls selected  
for the Olym-  
pic Develop-  
ment Pro-  
gram. Al-  
though she  
was selected,  
the program  
required play-  
ers to come to  
Albuquerque  
and practice  
once a week. But  
Torrey said  
that she and  
her mother  
lacked the time  
and the money  
to participate.

"The (biggest) thing my mom  
contributes is her time. She takes a lot  
of time out of her life to help me or take  
me places," Torrey said. "She drives me  
all over the place just so she can be on a  
team."

Jeannie also drives lot just to get to  
work. She works in Capitan at Elgin  
Breeding Services, and will continue to  
commute to work even while driving  
Torrey to Ruidoso.

Torrey estimates that they have put

## The Great Storyteller

# Hans Christian Andersen

Have you read "The Ugly Duckling," "The Little Mermaid" or "The Emperor's New Clothes"? They were written by Hans Christian Andersen.



His fairy tales are some of the most popular stories in the world. Even today, 125 years after his death, his stories are being told again and again, in many different ways. They have been translated

into more languages than any other fiction. He wrote 156 stories in all.

Although we think of his fairy tales as being children's stories, he wrote them for adults as well. Much of his humor and moral messages were intended for grown-ups.



Hans Christian Andersen considered himself ugly all his life. He was tall and skinny and had a long nose.

### Early life

Andersen's life was much like a fairy tale. He was born in Odense, Denmark, in 1805. The family was very poor. His mother was a washwoman, his father a shoemaker.

When Hans was 11, his father died. To help support the family, Hans worked in a tailor's shop and later in a tobacco factory.

He left home at the age of 14 to seek his fortune in Copenhagen. He tried to make a living as an artist, an actor, a dancer and a singer. He failed at them all. He was so poor he nearly starved to death.


Andersen became friends with a theater director who helped him get a scholarship that enabled him to go back to school.

### His writing

Andersen began to write plays, novels, poems and travel books. During his life he wrote three different books about his own life.

Many of his plays were big hits in Denmark. Some of his poems were turned into songs that Danish kids still sing today.

Much to his surprise, it was his fairy tales that made him famous at home and in other countries as well.




"The Ugly Duckling" was inspired by Andersen's own life. This version, illustrated by Jerry Pinkney, was a 2000 Caldecott Honor Book.

### His loves

Andersen proposed to several women but was rejected by all of them. When he died in 1875, he was carrying a letter from his first love, a woman he had met more than 40 years before. As he wished, the letter was burned unread.

Andersen reminds us of one of his most famous characters, the Ugly Duckling. In spite of his lonely life, he was able to write some of the most magical stories of all time.



This version of "The Little Mermaid," illustrated by Charles Santore, tells Andersen's story of a mermaid who longs for legs so she can be human. One of today's best-known versions of this tale is the Walt Disney movie.

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# Hans Christian Andersen

### His personality

Andersen loved the attention given him by royalty, artists and other authors.

He was very ambitious and enjoyed his success. He was sensitive and became upset when someone wrote anything bad about his books.

Andersen was sickly and a worrier. Although he traveled a great deal, he often arrived at the station hours before the train was to leave. He carried a rope with him so he could escape out the window if a hotel caught on fire.

Andersen was a deeply religious man. Because of his very humble beginnings, he was a thrifty man all of his life.

### The fairy tales

When his first fairy tales were published, they were printed one at a time in little pamphlets. Later, collections were put into books.

### An early translation

Here's how Andersen began his tale "The Emperor's New Suit."

"Many, many years ago lived an emperor, who thought so much of new clothes that he spent all his money in order to obtain them; his only ambition was to be always well dressed. He did not care for his soldiers, and the theater did not amuse him; the only thing, in fact, he thought anything of was to drive out and show a new suit of clothes. He had a coat for every hour of the day ..."

The many versions of Hans Christian Andersen's fairy tales include these twists on the story we call "The Emperor's New Clothes."



The United States has had one illustrator winner, Maurice Sendak, and five author winners: Meindert Do Jong, Scott O'Dell, Paula Fox, Virginia Hamilton and Katherine Paterson.
