

## Census 2000 trying to get it right this time

In an attempt to double check work performed to date, census-takers may knock on your door this month.

A small number of residents called the Census Bureau earlier in the year to report they were not counted. In response, about 27 census workers, called listers, will visit 1,300 households where addresses are not in the bureau's list of known addresses within a 12-county region of southern New Mexico, according to Benjamin Jacquez, head of field operations for the region.

"If no one came to your door and you called the bureau's toll-free hot line, a lister will verify your address and that you have been counted," Jacquez said.

During the initial response phase, the bureau accepted telephone calls to its toll-free hot line from residents who didn't receive a census questionnaire and an operator may have taken the information, he said.

"The bureau also received filled-out questionnaires that residents picked up at a 'Be Counted' site. If

the address from those two sources of questionnaires doesn't match the bureau's address list, it must be verified," he said.

"This is a quality assurance operation," Jacquez said.

Listers will verify the address and that the resident contacted the bureau and was counted, he said. If not, the lister will help the resident fill out a questionnaire. If an address can't be verified, the bureau will assume it's false, he said.

Listers will carry red, white and blue badges featuring the Depart-

ment of Commerce seal and the lister's signature for identification. People may ask for a photo identification or they may call the office in Las Cruces at (505) 541-6920 to verify employment.

"We'd like to thank everyone for supporting and supporting the census," Jacquez said. "With everyone's help, we'll have an accurate census."

Quality assurance will continue until the end of August, Jacquez said, adding that Census 2000 results will be on President Bill Clinton's desk on or before Dec. 31.

## Septic issues ahead

Proposed state changes could raise cost of building, living in Ruidoso

Proposed changes in septic tank regulations will impact Ruidoso and other communities where septic homes and undersize lots are common.

Extra expense will be tacked on in permit fees for buyers of homes with septic tanks, required inspections and pumping. On the other hand, larger acres may be permitted on three-quarter acre lots with technologically advanced and state-approved septic systems.

The first of four hearings on the changes was conducted Tuesday in Roswell and members of the Lincoln County Planning Commission discussed potential impacts with Carl Stubbs of the state Environment Department in Ruidoso last week. The county would pass rules to mirror changes at the state level, he said.

The regulations are aimed at better protection of surface and ground water from contamination originating with poorly operating septic tanks or leach fields, state officials said.

The proposed changes would impact septic system contractors, county officials, realtors, mobile home dealers, land developers and homeowners using septic systems.

Items that aren't touched in the proposed rewrite include:

- Construction requirements for septic tanks, leaching trenches, seepage beds and seepage pits
- Set-back requirements
- Clearance requirement to bedrock and ground water

## Jury finds state negligent in death

Finding for damages involves murder of Lincoln resident by escaped Camp Sierra Blanca inmate in 1994

A Lincoln County advisory jury Monday found the New Mexico Department of Corrections, former Corrections Secretary Eloy Mondragon, and former Camp Sierra Blanca warden Sandra McFadin negligent in connection with the death in 1994 of Lincoln resident Clarke Pfingsten.

After listening to four days of testimony and deliberating three hours Friday and five hours Monday, the six-woman jury recommended an award of \$60,000 to the Clarke Pfingsten Memorial Public Safety Trust.

Judge Karen Parsons of the 12th Judicial District can elect to accept or alter the recommendation. She told attorneys for both sides Tuesday during a telephone conference that she will issue a decision during the week of Aug. 21.

The 84-year-old Pfingsten was killed in August, 1994, when an escaped inmate from the camp, which was then a men's minimum security prison, hitched a ride with the elderly

man. David Crawford admitted he ran over the victim about 15 miles east of Bottomless Lake State Park and then drove the dead man's 1979 Ford pickup to Roswell. He was arrested there three days later and is now in a federal prison for the murder.

The jury recommended a \$60,000 award, the dividing responsibility as follows:

- 65 percent to Crawford
- 20 percent to the Department of Corrections
- 14 percent to Mondragon
- 1 percent to McFadin

Jack Johnson, a Capitan municipal judge who is one of two directors of the trust, said he and co-director Ralph Dunlap of Lincoln were disappointed about the amount of the award, only because they hoped to do something to help the community.

"We wanted to set up an emergency procedure for the whole county

## LCMC details services, need for mill levy support in election

Voters in November will decide whether to continue a special property tax levy for capital outlay and Medicaid support at the county hospital and for the operation of three rural health clinics.

Officials with Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) are reminding residents and advising newcomers of the services offered by the county-owned hospital in Ruidoso, managed by Albuquerque-based Presbyterian Healthcare Services.

For those walking through the new front entrance of the hospital on Sudderth Drive, the dollars spent on improving access for patients and visitors become evident, with admissions to the right and hospital auxiliary members to the left to help answer questions.

Gail Martinez, development officer for LCMC, said she was impressed from the outset that a town of an estimated 10,000 year-around residents could boast of a 38-bed hospital with as much state-of-the-art equipment and consulting specialists as LCMC.

As a tourist center, the population swells to more than 35,000 during the summer; in winter, skiers manage to keep many of the beds filled, she said.

"We do medical and surgical care, we do outpatient chemotherapy," Martinez said. "We have a very well supplied radiology department with an excellent radiologist."

"One of the things I think is very important for people to know is that we have a very large emergency medical services (ambulance) program covering 4,500 square miles at five different stations. So they have access to emergency victims right away. They will either transport to LCMC or to another hospital of their choice. If it's an emergency and they need to get to a hospital right away, they go to the closest trauma center."

A hospital with a good reputation and access to specialties ranging from cancer treatment to cardiac care is a must in order to attract and hold a retiree base, chamber of commerce officials point out.

Although Presbyterian took over the helm of the hospital nearly 30 years ago and with the tax levy restored its financial health, the ques-

tion of what firm will manage LCMC in the future is separate from the passage of the levy, Martinez emphasized.

That levy, which would drop by nearly one-third under wording approved for the ballot this year, is the community's commitment to support the hospital so it can keep pace with the latest technology, and to its less fortunate residents, who may need to use the hospital's medical services, she said.

The majority of the money would go for state-mandated payments toward indigent and Medicaid-patient care, Martinez pointed out.

"The amount of money that comes out of the property owner's pocket is minimal compared to the services provided," she said. "Most of the funding comes from other sources, such as Medicare, Medicaid, managed care, regular insurance plans, cash customers, and from Presbyterian."

Ticking off some of the high points residents and visitors need to know about LCMC, Martinez said the hos-

• Minimum lot size at three-quarters of an acre.

"The lot size requirement goes up as the number of bedrooms increased from three," said Robert Gallegos, environmental specialist with the Roswell ED office. However under proposed changes, if a person wants to build a four-bedroom house on a three-bedroom-size lot, an application could be approved with the installation of a more efficient and technologically advanced septic system, he said.

Septic experts at the commission meeting Thursday said the cost of some of the new septic systems that would be needed to satisfy requirements of smaller lots could be as much as \$4,800 for a one-bedroom and \$6,500 for a three-bedroom home.

Every three to five years, disposal regulations are reconsidered and rewritten by an ED task force, Gallegos said Tuesday. After public input is collected, the rules will be revisited and then a date will be submitted for proposed acceptance.

"This is going to impact a lot of people, but the intent is to preserve what they love the most when they live in these communities — the environment, including the streams and quality of life," Gallegos said.

In communities like Ruidoso and Angel Fire with heavy reliance on ground and surface water, those sources must be protected from contamination, he said.

Among the changes is a new requirement for applications, construction permits, and operating permits to prevent installation of septic systems not authorized through the permit process.

Small lots would no longer be "grandfathered." Instead, better treatment systems would be required such as an aerobic type. Part of the approval would include a maintenance contract for twice a year maintenance at about \$200 per call.

Gallegos defined an aerobic system as not operating on gravity. It is run by electric power and is composed of three compartments that are aerated with oxygen pumped into the chambers — essentially a miniaturized municipal treatment plant for the home.

Another big hit would come from new operation and maintenance requirements for gravity-operated septic systems that include pumping them every three years.

"A lot of (policing) would come with the resale of houses," Gallegos said. "The industry also would keep track."

"In your area, there are a lot of vacation homes selling constantly," he explained. "When a house on a septic system is purchased, the new buyers would need a permit in their names and an inspection would be required to be sure the system wasn't failing."

Other changes include that holding tanks would only be allowed for temporary use; leech field designs would be based on soil classification and not percolation tests because those tests often are not conducted properly.

ly, homeowners would not be allowed to build their own septic tanks because of a high incidence of leakage; and monitoring requirements would be set for alternative treatment systems.

At the Thursday commission meeting, Chairman Charles Rennick clarified with Stubbs that density is not an issue in the state's view for septic use as long as the minimum lot size is met.

Rennick said to satisfy the proposed requirements, owners in existing small-lot subdivisions that were formed years ago but are only recently developing — and would not qualify for septic tanks — could assess themselves and install a community sewer system.

The drawback is that a treatment plant requires a licensed operator to maintain it.

Three other meetings are set for Las Cruces on Aug. 9, Santa Fe on Aug. 15 and Albuquerque Aug. 17. Copies of the proposed changes are available from the ED District IV office by calling (505) 624-6046 or at www.nmenv.state.nm.us.

with the money," he said. "We saw a computer system, which divides an area into zones and when there's an emergency like a fire, flood or an escaped inmate, you just push one number and all of the telephones in that zone are called with an alert."

"But the cost of that system is more than \$100,000."

Realistically, because Crawford has no money or assets, the estate probably will collect only \$20,000 and half will go to Pfingsten's two sons, Joe Pfingsten of Albuquerque and Pete Pfingsten of Columbus, Mont., and to Albuquerque attorney David Proffit.

"The jury was never allowed to know why we were there," Johnson said. "We had hoped they knew the purpose of the lawsuit."

The two sons initially put \$5,000 into the trust to pay for legal expenses and Proffit accepted the case "because he's civic minded," Johnson said. "All of that money was spent long ago with witnesses and an arbitration hearing."

"I'm sure the state would like to write a check and forget about it."

State officials declined comment until Parsons issued her decision.

The trust was formed in July 1996 with the express

purpose of ensuring a better system of emergency notification. The suit was filed later that year.

The suit accused the state agency and prison officials of negligence resulting in the death of Pfingsten. It claimed that McFadin failed to notify citizens after Crawford's escape and said she was unaware Crawford was assaulted the night before he walked away from the prison. She failed to heed a telephone warning that an inmate was planning to escape, the suit claimed.

Crawford and one or more of the inmates who beat him up were improperly classified and assigned to the camp in violation of department policies and

procedures, the suit contended.

Crawford was only a few months away from release on a non-violent crime and had no reason to escape and commit murder unless he feared for his life, Proffit contended in an October, 1996, interview.

The camp, which was converted to a juvenile rehabilitation center, lacked restraints for adult prisoners in 1994.

From the time it opened in 1978, at least 33 escapes occurred and multiple violent crimes were committed by the inmates on citizens and residents of the county, according to the suit.

The trustees asked for general, special and punitive damages.

of patients.

"We are by law and by contract required to treat anyone who comes through the emergency room door," Martinez said.

The number of outpatient visits at the hospital hit 39,748 last year; 263 babies were born there and 1,792 surgeries were performed.

Physical and occupational therapy are offered on an outpatient basis, Martinez noted. Inpatient and outpatient cardiopulmonary services include EKG, cardiac stress tests, pulmonary function tests and routine respiratory treatments.

Patients receiving chemotherapy for cancer conditions at the hospital earlier this week said they're thankful LCMC can handle their treatment. Having to travel several hours to a larger city would only add stress and strain, they said.

Some statistics supplied by Martinez include:

- The hospital provided \$729,874 in charity care in 1999.
- The hospital absorbed nearly \$1.8 million in bad debts in 1999.

• The hospital auxiliary donated \$851,680 from 1992 to 1999.

• Auxiliary volunteers contributed 233,287 hours toward the operation of the hospital during those years.

• In 1999, the Carrizozo/Corona health clinics logged 4,949 medical visits and 6,611 dental visits. Without the tax levy support, the clinics may close.

• LCMC rates are reviewed annually and are maintained at or below the median for New Mexico hospitals.

• The hospital employs 216 people with a payroll of \$7.6 million.

Martinez listed collaborative community efforts in which the hospital is involved as annual low-cost mammography services with Altrusa, Run for the BEACH, and the state Health Department in the county; working with the county Health and Wellness Board to determine health care needs and provide services; and working with the Maternal Child Health Council, to coordinate home visits for Medicaid and private pay new mothers and their infants.

# Tradition renewed at Old Lincoln Days

Lincoln Days activities were a sensation last weekend, with a bigger-than-ever Sheriff's Posse riding the mail between White Oaks and Lincoln, and more entries in the parade on Sunday.

Twenty posse members and 16 affiant White Oaks at 7 a.m. Friday, taking turns carrying the mail bags, and rode for eight hours to their camp outside Capitan.

"It was kind of rough," said Jane Bussey, from Pomona, Calif., who found out about the trail ride from her parents, who live in Alto.

"Makes it kind of challenging. Makes me think maybe I could survive in the old days," Bussey said.

A highlight of the first night camping out was when four of the horses rented from Cowboy Stables bolted at 4 a.m. Many of the posse members took off after them, perhaps complicating the process of rounding them up, said Jim Tharp, chairman of the Pony Express Trail Ride.

Clarence Leslie, vice president of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Posse, oversaw shuttling the cars of the riders from one encampment to another and hauling water for the horses and people.

"This is the nicest group ever," Leslie said. "Every one of them is happy-go-lucky and having a lot of fun."

Susan Seligman of Albuquerque said she expected the ride

to be rougher. Seligman was the only one of the group that didn't smell Saturday morning, though, because she brought along a solar shower.

Saturday's ride was about five hours and ended with a campfire supper and a no-talent contest, and Sunday's ride was just three hours, with half a dozen members of the posse delivering the mail to Postmaster Cherie Hobbs at 10 a.m.

Meanwhile, Billy the Kid made his last escape three times — Friday and Saturday nights and Sunday afternoon.

The Lincoln Parade started a little late but there were 28 entries in it, which is "pretty good for us," said one of the judges, Stan Thomas.

"We were really glad to have the Ruidoso High School (14 Karat Gold) Band here," Hobbs said. "We haven't had a band in the parade ever since I've been here, and the Museum of New Mexico made a donation so they would come and play."

Hobbs said she thought there were more people watching the parade and more people in the parade than in past years.

The San Patricio Over the Hill Gang won the Sweepstakes Award after more than 100 men, women and children made the 2 1/2-hour horseback ride to Lincoln.

## Used car sale rules tightened with revised village ordinance

A proposed Ruidoso ordinance that would regulate used vehicle sales outside of car dealer lots has been overhauled. The code will be given a public hearing on Sept. 12.

The ordinance language, replacing a Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission draft, was made by a council subcommittee made up of Mayor Robert Donaldson, manager Alan Briley and attorney Charles Rennick.

With three exceptions, the new proposed code would make it unlawful to display for sale any vehicle on a property not specifically permitted for sales of vehicles.

The exceptions would allow a vehicle with a for-sale sign on a designated parking area of property owned or leased by the seller. Those driving a for-sale vehicle to work would be allowed to display the vehicle in an employee parking area. A car or truck posted for sale could be temporarily parked at a location when the driver is conducting business, visiting or engaging in other lawful use of

the property.

The Planning and Zoning Commission in June had proposed wording that would have created a permit system.

Explaining the adjustments to P&Z last week, Donaldson recommended the planning group make sure ordinance revisions are ready for a hearing before sending it to the council.

"One of the philosophies of the council is to go after the five percent doing it wrong rather than the 95 percent doing it right," the mayor said.

Donaldson said the ordinance would be part of the village's traffic codes, with enforcement by the police department.

"This is not aimed at the property owner trying to sell an auto," the mayor told the village council Tuesday.

The ordinance would require those who qualify to post a notice visible on the vehicle stating the owner's name, phone number, whether that person is the owner or lessee of the location where the vehicle is displayed, or whether the owner is an employee of the business.

#### Neglect alleged

The parents of a Carrizozo girl are suing the town for failure to maintain playground equipment at a public park where they say their daughter injured her foot.

Barney and Jeanette Baca state in the lawsuit filed July 27 in Lincoln County District Court that their 14-year-old daughter Bernadette lost her balance on a seesaw and when she fell, her foot lodged between two metal bars.

Town attorney David Stevens said he had no comment on the legal action.

The suit alleges the incident occurred May 31, 1999, as their daughter, son and a three-year-old cousin were visiting a playground on U.S. 380 operated by the town.

They are asking the court for compensatory and punitive damages, interest, attorney's fees and the cost of the court action.

#### Chase nabs alien

An alien was nabbed by police, following a high speed chase that began during the early morning hours.

Jose Manuel Flores-Rigoza, hometown and age unavailable, was charged with possession of a stolen vehicle, felony possession of a controlled substance, eluding and evading police, and reckless driving.

A Carrizozo police officer was tipped by a semi-truck driver of a vehicle being driven erratically on U.S. Highway 54, said Police Chief A. I. Vega.

The vehicle reportedly avoided a police stop and the chase, which brought speeds of up to 85 miles per hour, was underway southbound.

Rigoza was apprehended north of Tularosa when State Police disabled the vehicle through the placement of spike sticks on the roadway.

#### To be fair, Gore can take some credit

## Mexican election good on both sides of border

Changes are in store for Mexico. The recent presidential election of Vicente Fox in Mexico brings with it a big change for the Latin American nation. Not that the change in the Mexican presidency is a surprise; they elect presidents every six years and limit them to one term.

This election is different because the previously undefeated PRI party has fallen to the will of the Mexican electorate for the first time in seven decades.

Fox's election victory bodes well for the Mexican and U.S. economies, according to American Farm Bureau Federation Senior Economist John Skorburg. "What Vicente Fox has said is that, for his six years in office, he wants their economy to grow, in real terms, by 7 percent per year," said Skorburg. The former Coca-Cola

executive "has the background to make sure that Mexico stays on a more even keel in the future," said Skorburg, "and certainly when that happens it's better for our farmers and ranchers here in the United States as well as the farmers and ranchers in Mexico."

Skorburg feels Fox has what is needed to run Mexico. "On one side he'll be strong working with the United States in that he knows how business operates," explained Skorburg, "and on the second side, he knows what it's going to take to do those social reforms that are being mandated now by the citizens of Mexico." Fox's election could mean less corruption in Mexico as well as less illicit drug dealing, according to Skorburg. The change in leadership also will bring privatization of more industries in Mexico, said Skorburg. "You're going to see the things that

have been government owned going more toward private ownership and that includes their energy sector, which means big changes for electricity, big changes for oil. So this is going to be a major change for Mexico."

Some of Skorburg's insight into the improving Mexican economy comes from recent data.

Mexico's first quarter gross domestic product is up almost 8 percent, industrial production is up 5 percent over the past 12 months and the peso seems stable in the past year. Mexico's crushing inflation is slowing with consumer prices up less than an annual rate of 10 percent compared to rates of 50 percent during the peso crisis of the mid-1990s. Skorburg is quick to point out where that credit should go. "Mexico's current president, Ernesto Zedillo, is partly responsible for their improved

economy," said Skorburg. "And he didn't over-heat (artificially over-improve) the economy, so it's likely that their usual boom and bust can be avoided." Even Zedillo acknowledged that Fox is the new person in control and has promised a smooth transition into power. Fox will be inaugurated Dec. 1.

Greater trade with Mexico is a two-way street and means a bigger cache of commodities going both ways, according to Skorburg. "Once you put on the hat of an economist, you find out that these should be positive changes for Mexico," said Skorburg. "And the better neighbor Mexico becomes, the better trading partner they're going to be for the United States."

In the last century, man began to become aware of his past mistakes and there are many who have become concerned about waste and recycling, but it is still something that should concern ALL people. In the end, we must all live here, and common sense dictates that it is better to live on a planet that is clean than one that can only be compared to some sort of huge cosmic garbage dump.

Most people in Lincoln County — and everywhere else, for that matter — are unaware of the process that their waste must go through once it leaves their possession. And that is where Sierra Contracting, Inc., comes in...

Sierra Contracting knows how important it is to keep things out of a landfill if they can be re-used. And, since Sierra has acquired White Mountain Compost Co. The incinerator is no longer in use. In fact, Sierra has acquired a 12-foot tub grinder that is capable of grinding up to 100 tons per hour! Sierra has gone 100% recycling with all organic waste.

Given the fire conditions in recent months and

the wildfires that have plagued New Mexico, to say nothing of the rest of the West, Sierra's existence becomes even more crucial to the well-being of the community.



She married Gordon W. Racher on March 26, 1946, in Detroit, Mich.; he preceded her in death in 1985.



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# Bingaman's visit focuses on forest, Fort Stanton's historical potential

Greeted by about 30 supporters of Fort Stanton Sunday, U.S. Sen. Jeff Bingaman promised a serious look at what can be done to preserve the historic 1855 fort.

The Democrat from Silver City was in Lincoln County to meet constituents at a dinner in Capitan that evening, but spent the afternoon on a quick drive through the fort, a tour of areas burned in the Cree Fire last May, and a meeting with county and municipal officials and forestry and natural resource conservationists at the Smokey Bear Ranger District office in Ruidoso.

Bingaman arrived at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport about 1:30 p.m., then headed by van toward the fort, where supporters of a plan to convert the complex into a living museum waited to pitch their proposal.

Bingaman posed for photographs with Sally Burkstaller, Dick Weber and other members of Fort Stanton Inc., next to a life-size image of the late actor John Wayne uttering the printed plea to "Save our fort, Pilgrim."

The stop was a follow up to a previous visit in Washington, D.C., by County Commissioner L. Ray Nunley to report the plight of the fort.

Meeting later at the Lincoln National Forest district office, Bingaman talked about the status of legislation he hopes will funnel money for small projects between the U.S. Forest Service and private or community entities to thin and clear urban/wild land interface areas.

Those areas exist when development is backed up to and intermingled with large forests.

"A bill I introduced more than a year ago passed the Senate in November authorizing \$5 million for small joint projects," he told the group of about 20, including Commission Chairman Rex Wilson and Commissioner William Schwettmann, forest rangers Jerry Hawkes and Matt Reidy, Howard Shanks of the South Central Resource Conservation and Development Council, and Keith Kessler, chairman of that council and manager of the Bonito Reservoir and associated campground owned by the city of Alamogordo.

"It's an effort to bring people together," he said. "An effort to get agreement among all groups to take

an interest in the health of the forest."

The bill, called the Community Forest Restoration Act, passed the Senate and also the House Resources Committee. If passed by the House and signed into law, it would authorize grants of up to \$450,000 to community organizations to work with the forest service to reduce the number of small-diameter trees in Mexico's forests.

But Kessler told Bingaman to ensure the continuation of proper thinning, the government should par-

ticipate in finding or creating a market for those smaller harvested trees. "Logging is not interested in small diameter trees," he said. "There's no market. Yet that's what we have to do to reduce the risk. We need to develop a market for smaller diameter trees. We won't get anywhere unless people make money."

Sid Goodloe, a rancher whose clearing and grazing rotation practices have restored natural grasses to his land, urged more research on how the product could be used. He pointed to co-generation plants, which use junipers to generate electricity.

Shanks said if White Sands Forest Products, Inc. could find financial help to convert its equipment to handle small diameter trees, 200 jobs in the Alamogordo area would be saved. As it stands, the company is running out of large trees in areas open for harvest and the company may close its operations, he said.

Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson said the village anticipates picking up nearly twice as many cubic yards of yard waste this year as last year.

"We expect that in perpetuity," he said. "If a market was developed, there would be some money coming in. It's too important a resource to be destroyed. It could bring money back in to be used to clean up more of the

forest."

Schwettmann said if Lincoln and Otero, the three could collect substantially more money to attack the problem in portions of the forest within their boundaries.

The money for first-year funding of Bingaman's bill is part of \$240.8 million he and U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici, R-NM, are trying to secure for a nationwide effort to remove overgrowth on federal lands. Bingaman co-sponsored Domenici's amendment to the fiscal year 2001 Interior Appropriations Bill, which passed the Senate last month. Domenici co-sponsored Bingaman's bill.

Reidy told the senator that Smokey Bear District asked for \$2.1 million "to accelerate our program. We need to shorten the time frame."

Donaldson said the federal government also should come up with a program to help private land owners who want to thin the trees on their land, but find the cost prohibitive.

"We have areas where people own 50 to 60 acres they've inherited," he said. "They're not wealthy and the cost to bring down one tree can be \$1,000. We need grants for people on private land to clear and get their land into shape or we will end up not solving the problem."

## Fort Stanton cemetery improvement sought by vets' commission

The New Mexico Veterans' Service Commission has applied for a \$1.5 million grant aimed at improving and expanding the Fort Stanton Merchant Marine and Military Cemetery.

Commission Director Michael C. D'Arco said the money would establish a new section at the cemetery.

The announcement was funneled Monday through State Rep. W. C. "Dub" Williams, R-Glencos. D'Arco submitted the application after meetings conducted July 10 with Bill Jayne, director of the U.S. Department of Veterans' Affairs State Cemetery Grants Service, and with Hershel Gober, acting Secretary of the U.S. Department of Veterans' Affairs.

Gober was named to the post by President Bill Clinton after the resignation of Secre-

tary Togo West.

The state took over management of the historic fort's cemetery in 1955, but only recently was it placed under the oversight of the state veterans agency by agreement with Steve Bessert, New Mexico Secretary of General Services.

In a news release on the application, D'Arco expressed his optimism that it would be approved and that the cemetery in the future will become New Mexico's only state - as opposed to federal - veteran's cemetery.

The fort, established in 1855, is about 12 miles northeast of Ruidoso and efforts are under way to convert it into a living museum. About seven buildings are used for a substance abuse program operated by the state Corrections Department.

Sue Stearns, department chairman on conservation and natural resources, showed a video, "Soil — Who Needs It?" The film is available for civic clubs or schools.

Materials were distributed to club presidents on safety in the forests, "The Watershed, the Life Blood of New Mexico" and Keep America Beautiful.

Margret Perez, Silver City, chairman of the home life department, presented material on women's social security.

# Essie turns 99 with a smile and a philosophy

Ninety-nine years ago, the average worker made \$12.98 a week for 59 hours, Theodore Roosevelt became the youngest President, following the assassination of President William McKinley, and Essie Griffin was born. The "average worker" has passed on, Teddy has long since left the White House, but on Aug. 9, Essie will reach the age of 99.

"I've been through three depressions," Essie remarked.

Married in 1924, Essie took on the last name Bradford as well as her maiden name of Griffin. Now Essie Griffin Bradford, Essie remarked, "The next man I marry is only gonna have three letters in his name."

Essie's husband of 30 years died in July, 1954. The two had one child, Carlene, and "that was enough," said Essie. That was enough because Essie has also taken care of her countless grandchildren, great grandchildren and great-great grandchildren.

In honor of Essie's birthday,

flyers were posted, boasting "she looked great at 98 and she looks mighty fine at 99!" The bulletin invited the public to attend a lunch at First Baptist Church of Ruidoso Downs on Aug. 5. Essie was asked to make the beans for her own party because "no one else makes them like she does," relatives said.

Living in Brownwood, Texas, all of her life where she solely maintained a ranch until she retired at 88, Essie joined five generations of her family in Ruidoso, who lovingly refer to her as "Momo."

Essie didn't think she'd stay, but once she got into her new lifestyle, she didn't have time to "look back toward Texas."

Essie is the last of eight children. Her mother died at 85 and her father at 74.

Essie remembered how she used to study the Bible with her father. "Sometimes when I hear the preacher preach, dad's words come back to me."


Essie makes the transaction from 98 to 99 years old saying, "I am old, but I won't admit it."

**Riders complete endurance challenges**

**CAPITAN** — The American Endurance Ride Conference national championships wrapped up Friday with a 50-mile ride through tough terrain surrounding Capitan.

Although Friday's weather conditions seemed less harsh than during Tuesday's 100-mile ride from a spectator's perspective, riders indeed competed more like racers in the shorter, 50-mile ride, said Randy Eiland, AERC vice president.

"Yeah, it's cooler, but they're going a lot faster," he said.

Eiland estimated a 10 percent pull rate (horses and riders ending the ride early) from the 70 total entries at the second checkpoint. However, the outlook remained sporting and optimistic, as Eiland added, "So far it's doing great."

From a veteran rider's perspective, "50 mile racing is totally different than 100 mile racing," said the winner of Tuesday's 100-mile ride, Jerry Fruth of Evansville, Ind. "In 100 miles, there's a lot of strategy to it — you really have to be thinking all day long about every aspect of what you're doing. Fifty miles of course take half the time, so it's a lot faster, it's more of a speed race, there's not much strategy to it."

Fruth not only won first place in the heavyweight division, he took the overall title as well as the award for best conditioned horse.

"I've been doing endurance riding for 25 years," Fruth said.

Nicknamed Irene, Fruth's stallion Jabask Knight shared in Tuesday's victory.

"He just pulled out all the stops and ran extremely well all day," Fruth said. "It was really his day to shine. I'm debating now as to whether we're

gonna continue to race him or if we're just gonna put him out to stud. We'll probably make that decision next year sometime," he added, "Because after winning this, there's not much else you can ride."

However, Fruth and Irene may continue to compete in endurance rides and "just do some fun things" until the time comes.

"Because," Fruth added, "he's an extraordinary horse — I'm very blessed to have him."

Fruth won the 50-mile heavyweight title last year, but this year

didn't compete in the shorter contest. He did attend the 50-mile ride to give his comrades a few pointers on the trail they were about to embark on.

Lightweight competitor Cici Butler of the central region came out on top of Friday's 50-mile race, finishing in 5:50 while also winning the award for best condition.

Butler began her trek at 6:58 a.m., passed all her vet checks in fair time, and emerged victorious at the end of the trail at 1:35 p.m.

Featherweight champion Jody Welch, hailing from the northwestern

region, rode into Fort Stanton alongside Butler, but finished with a second overall placing, because she had started three minutes earlier.

Middleweight champ Kevin Waters began at 7:12 a.m. and finished at 2:30 p.m., putting him first place in his division. Central region's David Kaden arrived at the finish first in the heavyweight division and placed sixth in the overall running; he entered the race at 7:01 a.m. and completed the trail at 2:18 p.m.

Following close on his heels was junior first-place finisher Tessa McAfee, who started at 6:58 a.m. and finished at 2:18 p.m. as well. With the same exact time as McAfee, from beginning to end, was Lois McAfee of the featherweight division.

As for the heavy pull rate mentioned earlier, veterinarian Barney Fleming of Deming attributed the cause of most of the pulls to lameness.

"But," he added, "that's just from riding fast. It's a lot more competitive for the entire (50-mile) ride as compared to parts of the ride on Tuesday because of the distance they had to go."

A few of the horses that had competed in the previous ride and went out again Friday were among some of the entries that had been pulled. Other horses were drawn from the race as a result of "bad luck," according to Fleming.

On the other hand, Fleming, along with the rest of the riders, vets, and organizers, was pleased with the overall experience.

"We had good riders (Friday), good horses," he said. "I think it was extremely successful this year. I was pleased with the turnout, very pleased with the trail, very pleased with the camp, the geography, the area where

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

The Rules Committee decides how the convention is to be run and the order of business.


The Credentials Committee checks to see if the delegates have the right qualifications, or credentials, to be seated at the convention.





Some interesting facts were reported in "Pet Life" magazine's recent special issue. According to the editors, the Veterinary Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania put out the following information about cancer and your pets:
• Twenty-five percent of pets will develop cancer in their lifetime.
• For pets, most are 10 years old, cancer accounts for nearly half of the deaths.
• Dogs get cancer at about the same rate as humans, while cats get fewer cancers.
• Surgery, radiation therapy, chemotherapy and immunotherapy are the types of treatment currently available in veterinary medicine for dogs and cats.
• Cancer is the most curable of chronic diseases.
• Some common types of cancer in pets include skin, breast, head and neck, lymphoma, testicles, abdominal, bone and feline leukemia complex.

• Spaying pets between six months and 12 months of age greatly reduces the risk of breast cancer.
• Most cancers in pets are diagnosed via biopsy.
• The cause of most cancers diagnosed in companion animals - as well as in humans - is unknown.

The suggestions come allergists and were assembled by Brian Darrow, an Iowa veterinarian.
They are:
• Don't keep your pet in carpeted areas of the home.
• Keep your pet out of the bedroom and off your furniture.
• Eliminate carpeting and upholstered furniture as much as possible.

• Provide good ventilation in the house.
• Use a high-efficiency air cleaner.
• Operate your furnace fan continuously or for at least two hours after vacuuming.
• Have a non- allergic family member do the vacuuming.
• Leave combing, grooming and litter box clean up to non-allergic family members. The pet should be brushed - preferable outside - once a day.
