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State turns up heat on road contractor

Threats from the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department (NMSHTD) have increased the pace of road construction on State Highway 48.

Meadow Valley Contractors, Inc., working the third summer on three highway projects in the Ruidoso area, last month was issued a notice of apparent default and notice of proposed suspension. The threatened action was rescinded Sept. 7 by the state.

The written notices had been prompted by what Pete K. Rahn, the state's transportation secretary, said was the failure of Meadow Valley (MVCI) to bring progress to the completion of the Upper 48 Project. The notices and additional correspondences were reviewed by the *Ruidoso News* after making a formal request through the state's Inspection of Public Records law.

"As of May 18, 2000, time for completion of the project expired and MVCI is now in liquidated damages for its

failure to complete the contract," the Aug. 7 notice of apparent default states.

The correspondence referred to other letters between the NMSHTD and Meadow Valley, including a June 15 pledge by MVCI for an aggressive completion schedule. The highway department later responded that a revised schedule submitted by MVCI was "unrealistic," and could not be approved.


In the letter, Rahn claimed Meadow Valley's potential default resulted from inadequate progress on the road project and a failure to assign adequate personnel to vigorously complete the work.

"Furthermore, the department's records indicate that for the last two weeks (before Aug. 7) MVCI has only assigned approximately eight field personnel to work on the subject project, up to one half of which are traffic control flag persons, not construction personnel," Rahn wrote.

Meadow Valley called the field

Public input to be sought in Fort Stanton's future

Vying to win state approval to perform a Fort Stanton study, representatives of three Albuquerque-based companies Friday pitched their approaches to mapping out the future of the historic complex.

Although they used different styles, they all agreed that public input should play a role and that preservation and economic viability are key components.

Lincoln County Manager Tom Stewart, a member of the four-person selection team, said Monday that the name of the company picked by the group was sent to the state Property Control Division, which will review the selection and announce a contract award "in the near future."

The companies were asked to answer three questions: how would they determine a viable use for the fort and its 80 buildings, how would they partner with the state for success and how do they

Using slides, Steven E. Kells methodically led committee members, who were appointed by the division under the state Department of General Services, through the process his company would use to handle the job.

Gary Miller, former designer and curator of several museums, including the Hubbard Museum of the American West, and Gregory Hicks zeroed in on existing historic sites preserved by turning them into commercially successful museums, convention centers and recreational complexes.

Architect Edie Cherry and market analyst Phyllis Taylor, who have handled several state projects requiring appearances before the state Legislature, took a more casual and personal approach.

Kells told Stewart and committee members Carl Reed of property control, John L. Jarrard, vice president of Huitt-Zelars in Albuquerque, and Don Zizic, representing GSD Secretary Steven Beffort, that adapting the 145-year-old fort to uses other than a hospital would be the focus of two-thirds of the study.

Its remote setting is an asset, he said. The company must look at each building, determine its current condition, whether it is usable or needs renovations to fit proposed uses.

New uses should be weighed on their compatibility, their economic benefit and feasibility and if the use could be sustained.

Identifying potential users and marketing the complex is another ingredient, Kells said.

"The highest and best use may not be state ownership," he said. The options are for the fort to remain in public ownership, to be sold to a private group that will ensure its preservation or a public/private partnership, such as the Toltec Railroad, which involves the states of New Mexico and Colorado that lease to a private company.

"We will look at pushing the envelope of all possible uses," he said. He listed some of them as a private college, a music school to tie in with the Spencer Theater for Performing Arts, a resort hotel, a sports camp, a wellness retreat or a riding school.

Hicks and Miller concentrated more on forts

that have been successfully transformed into facilities that have central themes, but are multi-activity centers as well, such as the Kentucky Horse Park, Fort Concho, Texas and Fort Robinson in a remote area of northwest Nebraska that attracts 388,000 visitors a year.

They said representatives of successful operations are lined up to act as consultants and could help guide the conversions from first to last step, including lining up financial support.

Miller focused on the possibility of public-private partnerships and Hicks on how to determine if a proposal was economically feasible.

Hicks listed Fort Stanton assets as being in the center of a circle of activities including the race track, casinos, campgrounds, White Sands and the settlement of Lincoln, while being close to an airport.

They would start by updating an existing assessment of the buildings and conducting brainstorming sessions, they said.

Ruidoso Downs officials propose youth recreation

Ruidoso Downs is focusing its sights on a recreational park geared largely to youth.

During village council discussion Monday on pursuit of a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) for a new senior citizens center, Trustee Ray Hayhurst questioned if the village needed another senior center.

"The current senior center would revert back to the parks (department) as a community center," said Gladys Dillard, Ruidoso Downs' village clerk. "We would build the senior center on the seven-and-a-half acres we had originally talked about for a community center," she said of the potential CDBG funding.

"If we go ahead and apply for a

CDBG grant for a bigger senior center, I'd like to see us do something for the youth," said Jim Bassett, a village trustee. "We do very little for the kids. I'd like to appropriate funds for a gym over there," referring to the All American Park, which presently is home to a baseball diamond, playground, outside basketball court, and the current senior center.

But land-use restrictions in the deed of the All American Park property prohibits buildings, said Dan Bryant, the village's legal counsel.

"The only way to build is to have other property of equal value we are willing to dedicate for open space," said Dillard.

Bryant questioned if an 80-acre property, recently purchased by the village to protect a spring that pro-

Resident gets drained from fighting city hall

Year after year gravel washed down onto Harold and Betty Powell's yard from a street cut for a development above his home on Lucille Street in Ruidoso.

He talked to successive directors of the village's street department about rerouting the drainage back to its original course that bypassed his property, but nothing was done.

When he was younger, he and his wife would dig out the accumulation by hand. A few times, he hired a backhoe to scoop up the debris and haul it out, the 72-year-old Powell said.

But Monday, he was doing a slow burn and his patience was running out.

"I'm not trying to raise the roof," he said. "But I had J.R. from the street department out here to look at the situation. He was as nice as can be, but said he'd have to talk to his superiors. Then he called and told me they couldn't take village equipment onto private land."

Although he didn't agree with that

decision, he was trying to make peace with it when he noticed a village crew working on a drainage ditch at his neighbor's lot next door at a street intersection, Powell said.

"I don't understand why they can work there and not on my land," he said, adding that his neighbor is a state representative from Clovis.

Reached at a conference out of state Monday, village street department director J.R. Baumann and Village Manager Alan Brailey said they're sympathetic with Powell's situation

and hope to find at least a partial solution. But his neighbor's case is different from his, they said.

"J.R. saw a real risk for flooding of





crew number flawed.

Also delivered to MVCI on Aug. 7 was a notice of proposed suspension, beginning proceedings for the exclusion of Meadow Valley as a highway contractor for the state highway department. "The department proposes a three month period of suspension during which time MVCI will not be permitted to bid or become a subcontractor on department highway projects," the notice states.

Responses from Meadow Valley contend the highway department and the weather are in large part responsible for the

strung out project. The June 15 letter from MVCI, for example, said the completion schedule required adjustment because of "numerous changes in the plans resulting in overruns in earth work quantities extending the completion date and production rates." A letter from the road contractor's law firm disputed the NMSHTD's allegations. And an Aug. 18 letter from Sam Grasmick, MVCI's regional manager, also vehemently denied any basis to allege a default or threaten to suspend MVCI. The correspondence also vowed to bring in additional construction crews.

"At your direction and given the threat of termination, beginning the week of Aug. 21st, MVCI will mobilize additional paving, concrete and clean up crews ..." Grasmick said. "This will accelerate the project as you have requested. For the record, we firmly believe that our existing crews were sufficient to complete the work given the additional time we are entitled to."

Grasmick said department-mandated changes and the weather have impacted the project's timeline. The Upper 48 Project, to widen and remove some sharp curves and steep hills on Mechem Drive between White Mountain Drive and Ski Run Road (State Road 532), was contracted as a 295-day project. The timeframe was increased, through a change order, to 365 working days. Meadow Valley's first working day on the 2.6-mile project was July 7, 1998. The newest progress schedule submitted by Meadow Valley calls for an October completion.

While Rahn has withdrawn his department's notice of proposed suspension and notice of apparent default, based on what is described as "MVCI's commitment to mobilize adequate forces to pursue the work to completion," the Sept. 7 letter from Rahn states his department will continue to monitor Meadow Valley's progress.

"We see Fort Stanton as a national priority," Miller said, adding that fund-raising would be a prime issue.

Hicks said he would like to see a tie-in with Gen. Colin Powell's America's Promise program to provide training and counseling for young people.

Both men said they frequently appear before or work with legislative subcommittees.

Cherry and Taylor worked together on the Escarpment project west of Albuquerque and are used to appearing before the Legislature, they said.

Architectural issues are "pretty straight forward," because historical standards must be met on qualifying buildings, Cherry said.

They first would meet with

stake holders in the fort to discuss expectations and needs, establish a line of authority and communication, then begin their research, establish a cost to bring the complex up to current standards and examine economic realities of the area and different uses. They would conduct surveys and look at other similar complexes to see what worked and what didn't work, they said.

If existing state law on leases of public property discourage development, they would work with the Legislature to modify the conditions, they said. Water rights and availability must be quantified to determine physical limits on the use of the fort, they said.

From that, they will develop a list of possible uses and do in-depth studies on a few, highlighting potential users.

a dwelling" on that land, Briley said. "The situation on Mr. Powell's lot is not endangering a home."

Briley said he doesn't have enough background on the situation to know if the extension of Mary Street is the reason for the change in the flow of the intermittent creek, which Powell contends ran on the other side of the land that was converted into a street.

Baumann has talked to people living above and below Powell about the possibility

of diverting the flow away from his property, Briley said.

"We'd prefer to keep the drainage along the street and keep it from going on private property," the manager said.

Powell said his drainage woes started when Mary Street was extended for lots to be developed above his property, which was the first home in the area and built in 1961, he said. The couple lives in Levelland, Texas, but visit about six months each year, he said.

The road was put in about 30 years ago, he said. The city put in culverts that direct

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Blaze destroys vacation home B.E.A.C.H. runners, walkers prepare



Fire on Friday destroyed a home in the Brady Canyon/Ponderosa Heights area.

The blaze at 133 S. Candlewood Drive South was reported by a neighbor who saw an orange glow and burning embers in the area about 9:30 p.m. When the first Ruidoso firefighters arrived the structure was fully afire, said Robby Hall, Ruidoso Fire Department captain.

Hall said an exact location for the fire was initially unknown but reported as possibly on North Oak Drive. As the first fire engine arrived in the hilly area the fire was seen as a structure with flames exiting through the roof. The captain called in all department personnel.

The dwelling, described as a vacation home by Fire Chief Virgil Reynolds, was unoccupied at the time of the blaze. The double-wide structure's owners have been identified as D.C. and Virginia Brock of

Brookfield, Texas. While a cause of the fire remains under investigation, the blaze was believed to have begun in a utility room that included a furnace and water heater.

Three engines and three other vehicles responded to the fire. A dozen fire personnel were also at the scene. Extinguishing the flames and mop-up took six hours in the rainy weather of Friday night and early Saturday morning.

"We had pulled out shortly

before the roof caved in," Hall said. "Someone was sure looking out for us." No one was injured in the suppression effort.

The home had an estimated value of \$150,000. Fire officials declared the structure a total loss.

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

Ruidoso's Commissioner Leo Martinez would like to examine whether the county might save money by promoting a county employee to manage the facility, even as he acknowledges a bias toward privatized operation.

We would like to see added to the mix the possibility for the elected county sheriff taking the responsibility for jail operation, as had been done in many counties around the country for generations.

Well, maybe not... Maybe too much responsibility.

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

Federal land policies: Fuel for wildfires?

The Thomas ranch near Salmon in central Idaho is nestled in a picturesque valley. The valley and uplands are typical of the western range with cattle, elk, cool mountain streams and plenty of fresh air. But that's not the way it was this summer.

"We've been inundated with smoke in our valley almost every day from late July on until this past Friday when we started to get a little rain," said Heather Smith Thomas, a rancher and well-known author of books about horses. Although the wildfires never got closer than a few miles from the ranch, Thomas said she felt like she was sitting next to a campfire because the wind carried ashes and hot air from the blazes. Work outdoors became difficult and taxing on

a person's lungs.

Heather and her husband, Lynn Thomas, did not lose any cattle but some of their neighbors in Lemhi County did, as ranges burned up. The extent of losses probably won't be known until fall. Some ranchers pulled their cattle off summer ranges early because of the fires. Now, they are faced with a shortage of fall pasture and hay because the drought caused stream levels to drop, and there is not enough water for irrigation.

More than a half million acres were still being consumed by 20 fires across Idaho at the beginning of September. The Clear Creek fire, 10 miles west of Salmon, is expected to burn until the end of September when rain and snow will likely snuff it out. Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, wants to examine whether Clinton adminis-

tration policies are partially to blame for the ferocity of this season's fires.

Craig will hold hearings in the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, which he chairs.

Many local people believe fire conditions shouldn't have been allowed to get to this point, said Thomas. They criticize the government for shutting down timber harvests. If some of these areas had been selectively logged, there would have been less fuel for the fires. This was particularly true in the wilderness areas where there was no logging or grazing, she added.

At the same time, land management agencies have been closing roads in the national forests, and the Clinton administration wants to prohibit future road building on more than 40 million acres. The question now being asked is how crit-

ical were these roads to transporting firefighters, evacuating the public or acting as firelines?

Environmental groups like to argue that tourism is more important to the economy of places like Salmon, Idaho, than logging or livestock grazing. But how many tourists want to visit charred forests, or worse yet, ones that are still burning? The air is better in heavily industrialized cities than it is around Salmon, where the Red Cross and others distributed air cleaners to residents who needed them.

The Clinton administration claims to have a vision for the western landscape. Certainly this can't be it.

Trustees OK new computer system to upgrade records, get mapping capability

Village offices in Ruidoso Downs will be getting a new computer system with seven work stations and one file server. The village council Monday approved the \$17,302 purchase, which will allow GIS (Geographic Information System) mapping and place the village's ordinances on computer.

"Now some programs we use lock up because the hardware is inadequate," said Gladys Dillard, the village

clerk. The new system would also provide access to the Internet for information Dillard said was needed by departments. The GIS system would include detailed information on streets and the location of sewer and water lines as well as the location of fire hydrants.

The Internet access for employees was questioned by Trustee Margie

Dan Bryant, the village's legal council, said rules for Internet use would have to be drafted and tracking "where employees go on the Internet" might be necessary to assure the Internet is not being used for private purposes.

In other action village trustees:

• Approved the appointment of Wayne Faircloth to the village's Planning and Zoning Com-

mission.
• Approved Emma Herrera for the position of code enforcement secretary and Mike Walters as code enforcement officer.

• Approved applying for two Community Development Block Grants, to potentially fund a new Ruidoso Downs senior citizens center and for the cost of assembling a village comprehensive plan.

• Moved to schedule a new fire department governing ordinance for a future public hearing.

• Moved to send a new parks department ordinance amendment to a public hearing.

• Approved a request to purchase firefighter handbooks and a workbook at a total cost of

\$606.95.
• Delayed action on accepting a bid for fencing part of a 7 1/2-acre village owned tract. The item was listed on the Sept. 11 agenda as a request to go out for bids, meaning accepting a bid was not an option at the meeting. The eventual fenced area would be used to store village equipment.

• Tabled a plan to contract for a general services engineer/architect until an evaluation of the five responding bidders can be completed.

• Heard from the Planning and Zoning Commission that workshops on revising the village's planning ordinance will be held every commission meeting follow the regular business agenda.

Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District members clean up with awards

Home-baked cobbler, brisket that saturates the soul and biscuits like grandma used to make should be enough to lure just about anyone to the annual meeting of the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District.

Top the great meal off with good conversation and a few awards and it's easy to see why people come back year after year.

"The purpose of this district's long-range program is to provide farmers, ranchers and small tract urban land owners a chance to take advantage of new programs, improved techniques and better land use adjustments," John Cooper, chairman of the district board, said Thursday. Cooper added that these group must always keep "the parallel goal of human welfare in mind."

Friday, the group honored participants who have chalked up outstanding accomplishments. All of those who won in the district also won on the regional level that covers nine other districts and are up for state awards.

For the second consecutive year, Elaine and Hershel Anderson were given the Conservation Farmer Award for their work at Serendip Orchard, a 14-acre tract outside the settlement of

Lincoln where they raise cherries, raspberries and blackberries, tend their bees and walk their land with their spaniel, Ranger. One of the improvements for which they were selected is the orchard watering system. The water is irrigated from the Providencia Community Ditch. It is piped to two lined irrigation regulating reservoirs and from there it is pumped through a filtering system into two drip irrigation systems.

The couple also takes their knowledge into the classroom speaking to students about their experiences in the orchard.

Winning the Conservation Rancher Award was Scott Daniel, foreman of the Brewer Ranch in Capitan. He oversees

7,496 acres with all but 1,160 owned privately.

When the ranch was purchased in 1989 it needed a lot of attention, said presenter Mary Shanks. Livestock distribution was poor because of lack of water and adequate fences. Cholla cactus and juniper infestations were heavy.

Under his supervision, fences and water structures were improved and during the growing season, cattle were kept off of pastures. The ranch practices wildlife habitat management to control hunting. Water availability enhances the deer, elk and antelope habitat.

Although some of the changes were accomplished with the help of district conservation

programs, others were completed with no cost share assistance.

"I thank you Mr. Brewer," said presenter Mary Shanks. "Because of your efforts, others are now aware of what can be done."

Rancher Rex Wilson, chairman of the Lincoln County Commission, received the Conservation Service Award, although he wasn't at the meeting to accept it.

Wayne Cunningham, who helps in both the Upper Hondo and Carrizozo districts, was

given the award for Professional Public Service.

Cunningham is a conservation specialist and has helped with his broad experience in water issues, she said. He rarely misses a meeting and has never failed to follow up on any questions or requests from district members, Shanks said. He also has helped obtain thousands of dollars in grant money and several pieces of needed equipment.

Bob Boebinger, who has served on the board for nine years, was selected for the

Supervisor Award for his years of effort to shine more light on conservation of natural resources through innovative practices.

Cooper announced that Boebinger and Fred "Peg" Pflingsten, who served as supervisor for 15 years, were resigning. Elected to replace them were Sally Canning and Stan Thomas, who won over Preston Stone by one vote.

Cooper and Pflingsten also received 15-year service awards.



The rain came down heavily through most of the game, and coach Rodney Webb took the blame for the turnovers.

MORE ACCOUNTABILITY

The state's school rating system leaves much to be desired, say many Lincoln County officials...

Does "meets" mean "mediocre"?

**This is the last of two articles on school accountability in New Mexico.*

With the nationwide push for school accountability and a resultant emphasis on standardized test scores, many question what these tests actually test and whether they are sufficient to give a picture of what students are learning. Others question if the tests rate everything districts are expected to teach.

Rick Cogdill, principal of Carrizozo Schools, said standardized testing doesn't always reflect what's being taught by teachers or learned by students. He said this kind of testing is "an easy answer for accountability."

"It's something politicians can do quickly and easily to answer the question, so it's a game that we have to play," Cogdill said. "We're going to have to learn how to play the game, and hopefully, we don't hurt kids in the process."

Ron Bennett, Ruidoso Middle School principal, said the school-rating system attempts to quantify students as if they were products on an assembly line.

"In education," he said, "we have a hard time defining exactly what our product is to be. Yet we have people saying we can quantify that product so that we can compare students. ... I cannot imagine how they can accurately quantify a 'product' they've been unable to define."

Bennett said the question that should be asked is "What should an eighth-grade student leaving the middle school be able to do? How do you quantify courtesy, common sense, desire for learning, willingness to expand your own horizons and to reach for your dreams?" he asked. "In the guise of accountability, we're making people jump through a whole lot of hoops."

Helene Kobelnyk, principal of White Mountain Intermediate School in Ruidoso, pointed out that students don't test well when they're not feeling well or are troubled by problems at home. She said she's more concerned that children survive than that they score well on a test.

The first thing parents moving to the district from Texas ask is if Ruidoso teachers stop teaching in January to prepare students for the standardized tests, Kobelnyk said.

An article in *Education Week* of Aug. 2 says research shows strong gains on tests by Texas students and low high school completion rates by minority students. The article cited research claiming that Texas' focus on testing has reduced the quality of instruction in general and that higher-level skills that can't be tested with multiple-choice questions are not being taught.

An article by the University of Wisconsin Board of Regents suggests that relying on standardized test scores "dumbs down" instruction to make it conform to multiple-choice tests, abandoning "science, history, art, field trips to prep for the math and grammar tests." (<http://whyflies.org:80/116testing/3.html>).

"I hate to see New Mexico jump on a band wagon and not have any more sense than anyone else," Kobelnyk said.

Diana Billingsley, superintendent of Capitan Municipal Schools, said the tests do not test what teachers are expected to teach, according to the benchmarks and standards set by the SDE.

"The one thing I think is unfair to districts is when they're responsible for teaching everything, but they're not tested on everything," Billingsley said. "Then maybe what was important to that

teacher in that class is not what's on the test, so the kids are discriminated against because that's not what was tested."

Also, she pointed out, maybe those students weren't ready for it.

Billingsley said the teachers' main complaint was not knowing: "I think if they want us to teach something and be tested on it," she said, "they'd better tell us."

Patricia Rael, deputy director for accountability and information services of the State Department of Education, said a distinction needs to be made between "teaching to the test" and teaching what's on the test. "If you're teaching to the test, I just hope you're teaching the content standards the state has said all schools must be using. ... If the test is measuring what you're teaching, then everybody should be teaching to the test."

A problem Billingsley sees is that multiple-choice tests don't measure the thought processes involved in problem solving. This would take longer to score — and probably couldn't be done by computer. Billingsley pointed out that in many classes, credit is given for partial answers, but current standardized tests do not allow for this.

"A student is working on the right path and got down so far, and maybe they made some minor error that got them to the wrong answer, yet the way they started at it was good," Billingsley said. "Test makers look only at things that are cut and dried, a-b-c-d, yes-and-no, because that's the only way they can score," she concluded. "And if the state is only going to look at those types of tests, then they're doing a disservice to the school district and to the student."

Dick Clevenger, principal of Capitan Elementary School (which received an "exceeds" rating from the state), said there is a danger of teaching to the test because it's the "measuring stick" the state is going to emphasize as part of the rating process.

"However, with our individualized math and reading programs, we not only meet those rating items, we meet many others that support those," Clevenger said. "We don't teach toward the test, but what we do teach is on the test."

"I don't think one of my teachers could sit here and tell you what the items for rating are. We got that rating simply because we do the job right," he said. "It takes a lot of dedication and hard work between the teacher and the student. We don't entertain kids; we educate kids."

Capitan Elementary's class size averages about 16-17 students, Clevenger said, and this may help account for the rating results. In kindergarten, the class average is 11 students, while the state recommends 20. "Most systems would have two kindergarten teachers with an aide," he said. "My board has allowed me to keep three kindergarten teachers. Our theory is that we've got to get these kids off to a good start, and class size definitely has something to do with it."

Rael said the point of the accountability program is to call attention to schools that have special needs, so students who aren't being reached can be determined, "and then to figure out how we want to go about reaching those students, because each school is unique and there's not a one-size-fits-all answer to this."

She said a high mobility factor (the Ruidoso school dis-

trict has one of the highest transiency rates in the state) or linguistic backgrounds other than English may account for a lower rating.

Darrell Stierwalt, principal of Capitan High School (which also received a rating of "exceeds" from the SDE), said he thinks school districts are judged unfairly in some instances, from talking to his colleagues across the state.

But, he said, "I'm a parent as well as an administrator. I want my children to have a good education as well as anything else. ... There's more and more accountability, and needs to be. We have not done a good job in some instances and need to do it better. Let's step up to the challenge and get it done."

David Cooper, Carrizozo's new superintendent, said he went through the accountability process in Missouri for five years.

"We all need measures to improve," Cooper said. "I'm really not opposed to accountability — it's not new to me — as long as when (schools) are identified, they're helped. ... The process ought to be to identify and then give them the resources and the training and the technical folks to improve."

But, Cooper said, he thinks much of the push toward accountability and school ratings is politics, and the school-voucher movement is driving the politics.

"Sometimes these accountability folks use accountability to force consolidation and close rural schools down. If the motive is to force consolidation, I'll fight," he said.

Rael said the State Board of Education has given direction to add two more features to the program for accountability — quantifying qualitative data regarding community involvement, and school safety. In October, regional meetings will be held with school and district personnel to discuss technical assistance and support for schools rated probationary, according to an Aug. 28 memo to district superintendents.

"Within a month, all schools will receive a detailed report of their data points and the percentage of data points in each category on the matrix — exemplary, exceeds standards, meets standards, probationary," the memo states.


Olly, Syd and Millie Australian Olympic Mascots



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Australia's Amazing Animals

The marsupials

Female marsupials carry their young in a fold or pouch. A young marsupial:

- is hairless and weighs less than an ounce at birth.
- crawls into the pouch and attaches itself to the mother's nipple, where it nurses and grows until it is able to be on its own.

The koala

While koalas spend most of their time in trees, they do move about on the ground at times. The koala baby is about the size of a bumblebee when born. It crawls out of its mother's pouch when it is about 6 months old and is carried on its mother's back until it is about a year old.

- Koalas have no eyelids or tail.
- They are often incorrectly called koala "bears," but they are not related to bears at all.
- They eat only the leaves of certain types of eucalyptus trees.

The pygmy possum

Most possums use their tail as another hand when climbing. The pygmy possum is one of the world's tiniest marsupials. It rests during the day and moves about at night to feed mainly on pollen and nectar.

At birth, a baby kangaroo might weigh less than an ounce and be only 1 inch long.

The kangaroo

- Some kangaroos can grow to be 6 feet tall and weigh about 200 pounds.
- Kangaroos usually move about in the late afternoon or at night, eating grasses and other plants.
- Kangaroos have strong hind feet and can leap up to 25 feet in one hop and travel as fast as 30 miles per hour.
- They use their strong tails for balance and support.

The wombat

Wombats move about at night, eating leaves, roots and bark.

- The wombat is well known for the long tunnels it burrows.
- It can grow to be about 3 feet long.
- The female has a pouch that faces backward so it does not fill with dirt when it is burrowing.

The emu

At 7 feet tall, the emu is Australia's largest bird. It has thick brown feathers, small wings and long legs. While it cannot fly, it can run as fast as 40 miles per hour. It can also swim.

After the female lays eggs, the male hatches them.



Because Australia is an island, animals that developed there are quite different from those found in other parts of the world.

Millions of years ago, all of the world's land was lumped together as one huge landmass. Over thousands of years, the continents drifted apart. Australia became isolated.

Australia did not have any members of the cat family, hoofed animals, monkeys or apes until they were imported.

Since most Australians live in cities, they, like tourists, often see these animals only in zoos.

Some animals, such as the koalas, live in specially protected parks or in the wild. Others, such as the red kangaroo, can be seen in the outback, the grassy plains of inland Australia.


