## Threat of bomb closes Inn, Casino most of Tuesday

The Inn of the Mountain Gods and Casino Apache were closed for business much of Tuesday following a bomb threat.

The explosion threat was delivered to the Inn of the Mountain Gods by phone about 9:28 a.m., said Troy Bolen, Bureau of Indian Affairs police chief with the Mescalero agency.

The inn and casino were evacuated. Carrizo Canyon Road, which leads from Ruidoso to the casino and lodging complex, also was closed at the Mescalero Apache Reservation boundary.

A bomb-sniffing dog team from Holloman Air Force Base near Alamogordo was brought in Tuesday afternoon, Bolen said. In addition, his police agency, the F.B.I., Mescalero conservation officers, volunteer firefighters and security people with the inn and the casino were involved in the investigation and associated activities. An explosive ordinance team from the New Mexico State Police was also brought to the inn complex late Tuesday afternoon.

"We are working on suspects at this time," Bolen said Tuesday afternoon. "We have some leads." Bolen said while possible suspects were under suspicion, law enforcement had not yet talked to anyone. The police chief said federal charges of domestic terrorism could be a possibility if suspects are arrested.

The bomb threat is at least the third such scare at the inn or casino this year.

## Glencoe fire service solution sought; a truck won't start

An emergency alert interrupted a meeting Saturday called to reorganize and revitalize the Glencoe Pao Verde Volunteer Fire Department.

The assistant chief and one volunteer bolted for the two fire trucks. One started. The other whirled and whined, but the motor didn't turn over. After some scrambling under the hood, the vehicle took off a few minutes later.

The incident was an example of problems the department faces because of lack of volunteers, especially those who are able to leave jobs to respond to fires and accidents, and who have the time to file monthly reports with the state and to maintain equip-

ment, Tom Stewart, Lincoln County manager, said Monday.

Stewart headed the meeting at the fire station on U. S. 70 with more than 20 people attending, including County Commissioner Rick Simpson, State Rep. Duo Williams, a Republican who lives in Glencoe, and Reynaldo Valcarcel, who lost his bid in the Democratic primary to run against Williams in the November general election.

Two Glencoe volunteers, including assistant chief Godfrey Gomez, showed up. Many former Ruidoso Downs volunteer fire fighters filled out applications to work with the Glencoe department.

Eight applicants were accepted and will be notified by letter by the end of the week, Stewart said Monday.

Applications from former Ruidoso Downs fire chief Nick Herrera and volunteer Don Smith were put on hold until an investigation sparked by a village audit is completed, he said.

Stewart sent letters to Herrera and Smith Monday, telling them that his action was prompted by consultations with the county attorney and with State Fire Marshal George Chavez.

Their applications can be reconsidered once the investigation is resolved, Stewart said.

Chavez said Tuesday while he has no jurisdiction over whether the county accepts or rejects applicants, he agreed with Stewart the action probably was best under the circumstances. He told Commissioner L. Ray Nunley and Smith the same thing, Chavez

said, adding that the county is under no obligation to accept all applicants.

At the Saturday session, Stewart said, "Right now, the organization and the leadership is weak. We should have had this meeting months ago when the membership started declining."

Only five members are active, he said.

He proposed a plan to use money remaining in the department budget to beef up equipment. The money is generated by a portion of insurance premiums paid in the district and distributed by the state. Williams said rural volunteer fire departments are not getting their fair share. That's something he's working to change, he said.

"Citizens in rural areas of New

Mexico are being cheated," Williams said.

Of the \$110,303 annual Glencoe budget, \$48,000 is encumbered, Stewart said, leaving a reserve of \$61,979.

His long-range goal is to pump up a substation within the district at Agua Fria and turn it into a separate functioning entity, Stewart said.

Meanwhile, he's ready to go to the county commission for authorization to spend some of the reserve to buy extra equipment and gear for more volunteers, he said.

"I want to stave off the fire marshal," Stewart said. "He says no monthly reports have been filed all year, but they are required by state statute. He is supposed to close any

## Ruidoso now has its first urban forester, Rick Deiaco

A past president of the Lincoln County Forest Health Coalition will be Ruidoso's first urban forester.

Patrick "Rick" Deiaco was selected for the position from among the seven contenders who applied for the position. He is scheduled to begin work on Oct. 9.

"I interviewed them, and he fit the best," said Joseph Patoskie, Ruidoso's Planning and Zoning Department administrator. "He lives here and he knew everything going on here."

Deiaco listed a B.S. degree in natural resources management, from Penn State University, on his resume. He also stated he had worked for the U.S.D.A. Forest Service, in Arizona and Idaho, from 1978 to 1983. Deiaco listed

construction work, including in the Ruidoso area, as his employment since 1983.

"The big issues will be forest health and fire protection," Patoskie said of the new position for the village. "He'll work with the community on those, and a focus on village property clean-up, especially property that impacts neighborhoods."

Patoskie said those items obviously go "hand-in-hand."

The planning chief anticipated the urban forester would help assess site plans, to assure new homes are built with natural surroundings and fire hazards taken into account. Patoskie said Deiaco would be available to village residents.

"He'll play an advisory role position; he'll make recommendations," Patoskie said.

## Sheriff candidates outline stands at forum

Fielding some of the most challenging questions during a candidates forum Monday, three men vying for the position of Lincoln County sheriff stated their positions on issues ranging from drug laws to the purchase price of patrol cars.

Tony Seno, a Libertarian candidate with no law enforcement experience, told the audience he anticipates losing as many as eight of the current deputies in the department if he is elected.

"Then my budget will be where I want it to be," he said. "Elected positions call for no experience, except for judge. You don't need a career politician or bureaucrat."

Incumbent Sheriff Tom Sullivan, a Republican, told Seno, "If eight deputies walk, you're sure going to have a hard time covering 1,000 miles of county roads."

Independent candidate Ray Merritt said with his military and law enforcement background, deputies will

enjoy working for him and will respect and trust him as a leader.

That exchange set the tone for differences in approach and opinions by the candidates.

Seno said the Libertarian Party is the party of American values based on individual liberties and personal





**Kids' playground coming out swinging**

An idea proposed last spring, to develop a new Ruidoso playground near the village soccer fields south of the White Mountain Schools complex, could swing into reality by next spring.

"We got stuck in the bureaucracy," said village councilor Bill Chance, who in mid September was assigned as the catalyst to get the project moving. "The thing we want to accomplish has gotten in it. We want to buy components and bolt it together."

Chance said a recent meeting of the village's Parks and Recreation Commission began to see the idea jell. "One-and-a-half years ago I got excited over a project in Alamogordo, and other places around the country," Chance said. "It would be an interpretive style playground."

The playground, which Chance said would be designed using community involvement, especially input from kids, would be put together by parents in the village.

An engineering firm would supervise construction, making sure the nuts and bolts are assembled according to plans.

A request for proposals will seek an architectural design for a cooperatively designed playground.

"We don't want something that the kids don't necessarily get excited about," Chance said. "We want community input, support, and labor."

Chance said an interpretive playground park in Alamogordo, called Kids Kingdom, proves the concept works. He said the key to making it

happen is community involvement. Approximately \$140,000 is in the village's coffers for the playground project Chance said. It would be assembled on about an acre of Ruidoso School District land between the recreational field parking lot and White Mountain Elementary School.

Chance said a joint powers agreement between the village and school district would be needed. The village councilor hoped the municipality would separately fund a restroom facility that he said was needed because of the adjacent recreational fields.

"We will solicit information from kids on what they want. It will be based on their dreams."

**SHERIFF: Candidates differ markedly on how to wage the 'war on drugs'**

responsibility.

In his view, the perception of police has changed from respected public servants to feared public bullies, while the prison population continues to grow, he said.

"We should point the finger at ourselves because we elected politicians to do the right thing, but they haven't," he said.

He emphatically stated his opposition to drugs being illegal.

"After 60 years, you have to ask have we won, are we winning or do we have any reasonable expectation of winning," he said. "I say 'no' on all three counts."

"Drug laws are more harmful than the drugs. If drugs were controlled by the rule of law and not by criminals, we could get them out of the school parking lot."

Although he is concerned about keeping streets safe, Seno said he would not employ road blocks to check for documents and alcohol. However, he believes after a third DWI conviction, people should lose their cars and licenses.

In other statements, Seno said:

- He would prefer hiring local people to fill deputy slots and train them, saying people would prefer dealing with others they know.
- The Ruidoso Police Department should continue to provide cells for municipal prisoners.

Both Merritt and Seno contended the sheriff spends too much money on patrol cars and advocated buying less expensive models.

Merritt said he's not a politician, but he does have plenty of law enforcement background, including military police, military intelligence, civilian reserve officer for three counties in New Mexico. He also is the only candidate ready to be certified, Merritt said.

While a jail would be more convenient in Ruidoso, county commissioners picked Carrizo and the sheriff has to live with that decision, Merritt said.

Asked about the war on drugs, Merritt said, "I personally don't think we ever will win it, but I think we can make a dent."

"I don't agree with Tony that it's a victimless crime. I think every person using drugs is a victim and so are their families."

Merritt said he would use road blocks in cooperation with the state police and other agencies to be proactive.

"We arrest and the courts decide what happens to that person," Merritt said in response to criticism about sentencing.

The candidate also supported hiring locals for deputy positions, instead of bringing in people from outside the county with more experience. He said money would be saved, citing salaries of \$35,000 being paid, plus \$10,000 in benefits. Until a person was trained, he would ride with another deputy, not go out alone, Merritt said.

Sullivan pointed to his two previous terms in office in the 1980s and the four-year term he's just completing. He has a bachelor of science degree in criminal justice and is a graduate of numerous related training courses, he said. His practical ex-

perience includes eight years in narcotics, more than nine years with the state penitentiary system, being a Texas state trooper and an assistant warden.

"I agree with Tony, believe it or not," Sullivan said. "Ruidoso had 72-hour holding cells. The police department is moving into a big building with lots of room. I don't know why there are to be no holding cells there. We don't have the personnel to transport prisoners to Ruidoso (from Carrizo)."

"According to an attorney general's opinion, they're not the custody of the county until they are delivered to the county jail. If they arrest them, they need to bring them to us."

Sullivan said he's been fighting drug trafficking for many years and has no use for dealers. "I'm for a drug-free society, not for a free drug society," he said, adding that he will continue to seek funding for a narcotics unit in his department.

Sullivan also pointed to the court system as the place for stronger action against repeat drunken driving or domestic abuse offenders.

The sheriff defended his choice of patrol cars in the Dodge Durango, pointing out that most law enforcement agencies use them and that he takes the low bid when buying.

Sullivan said he chooses certified officers, which avoids having to send employees to 16 weeks of academy training. They come in at entry level salary of \$19,000, but after one year of probation can jump to the top of the pay scale, if their experience and training warrants, he said.



Chance said an interpretive playground park in Alamogordo, called Kids Kingdom, proves the concept works. He said the key to making it

happen is community involvement. Approximately \$140,000 is in the village's coffers for the playground project Chance said. It would be assembled on about an acre of Ruidoso School District land between the recreational field parking lot and White Mountain Elementary School.

Chance said a joint powers agreement between the village and school district would be needed. The village councilor hoped the municipality would separately fund a restroom facility that he said was needed because of the adjacent recreational fields.

"We will solicit information from kids on what they want. It will be based on their dreams."

responsibility.

In his view, the perception of police has changed from respected public servants to feared public bullies, while the prison population continues to grow, he said.

"We should point the finger at ourselves because we elected politicians to do the right thing, but they haven't," he said.

He emphatically stated his opposition to drugs being illegal.

"After 60 years, you have to ask have we won, are we winning or do we have any reasonable expectation of winning," he said. "I say 'no' on all three counts."

"Drug laws are more harmful than the drugs. If drugs were controlled by the rule of law and not by criminals, we could get them out of the school parking lot."

Although he is concerned about keeping streets safe, Seno said he would not employ road blocks to check for documents and alcohol. However, he believes after a third DWI conviction, people should lose their cars and licenses.

In other statements, Seno said:

- He would prefer hiring local people to fill deputy slots and train them, saying people would prefer dealing with others they know.
- The Ruidoso Police Department should continue to provide cells for municipal prisoners

Both Merritt and Seno contended the sheriff spends too much money on patrol cars and advocated buying less expensive models.

Merritt said he's not a politician, but he does have plenty of law enforcement background, including military police, military intelligence, civilian reserve officer for three counties in New Mexico. He also is the only candidate ready to be certified, Merritt said.

While a jail would be more convenient in Ruidoso, county commissioners picked Carrizo and the sheriff has to live with that decision, Merritt said.

Asked about the war on drugs, Merritt said, "I personally don't think we ever will win it, but I think we can make a dent."

"I don't agree with Tony that it's a victimless crime. I think every person using drugs is a victim and so are their families."

Merritt said he would use road blocks in cooperation with the state police and other agencies to be proactive.

"We arrest and the courts decide what happens to that person," Merritt said in response to criticism about sentencing.

The candidate also supported hiring locals for deputy positions, instead of bringing in people from outside the county with more experience. He said money would be saved, citing salaries of \$35,000 being paid, plus \$10,000 in benefits. Until a person was trained, he would ride with another deputy, not go out alone, Merritt said.

Sullivan pointed to his two previous terms in office in the 1980s and the four-year term he's just completing. He has a bachelor of science degree in criminal justice and is a graduate of numerous related training courses, he said. His practical ex-

perience includes eight years in narcotics, more than nine years with the state penitentiary system, being a Texas state trooper and an assistant warden.

"I agree with Tony, believe it or not," Sullivan said. "Ruidoso had 72-hour holding cells. The police department is moving into a big building with lots of room. I don't know why there are to be no holding cells there. We don't have the personnel to transport prisoners to Ruidoso (from Carrizo)."

"According to an attorney general's opinion, they're not the custody of the county until they are delivered to the county jail. If they arrest them, they need to bring them to us."

Sullivan said he's been fighting drug trafficking for many years and has no use for dealers. "I'm for a drug-free society, not for a free drug society," he said, adding that he will continue to seek funding for a narcotics unit in his department.

Sullivan also pointed to the court system as the place for stronger action against repeat drunken driving or domestic abuse offenders.

The sheriff defended his choice of patrol cars in the Dodge Durango, pointing out that most law enforcement agencies use them and that he takes the low bid when buying.

Sullivan said he chooses certified officers, which avoids having to send employees to 16 weeks of academy training. They come in at entry level salary of \$19,000, but after one year of probation can jump to the top of the pay scale, if their experience and training warrants, he said.

# Tribal petitioners plan to take effort to U. S. District Court

A member of a delegation that organized a petition drive for a recall election on Mescalero Tribal President Sara Misquez said the U.S. District Court in Las Cruces will be asked today to direct the administration to set a date.

Carleton Palmer, a candidate in the tribe's primary election Tuesday for a seat on the tribal council, said although the group has not received any official notice

that tribal administrators rejected the petition submitted Thursday, it isn't waiting.

The tribal constitution specifies that a recall election must be conducted within 40 days after a petition with 25 percent of the eligible voters is submitted.

The petition was submitted last week.

Misquez released a statement through tribal attorney John Wheeler Thursday saying she will uphold the constitution.

"When I and the Mescalero

Apache Tribal Council have carefully reviewed the petition, I will respond," she said. "However, I have serious doubts about the merits of the petition and more serious doubts about the motives of the group presenting the petition."

Palmer said signers of the petition have called complaining that they were contacted by administration staff members after its release to the tribal secretary. Although he was told to expect that some of the 552 signatures on the petition will

be rejected, Palmer said the submitters stand by the validity of the petition.

"We believe they have confused signatures on a petition asking for a dividend to be paid with those on the petition for the recall," he said. "We have compiled both to show they have no relationship. We will contest any removal of names from the recall petition."

Palmer said a writ calling on the tribal court to instruct the administration to set a recall election date was filed Monday. But the

group decided Tuesday to file a similar action in federal court.

Although comment on the validity of the petition was expected from Misquez and the administration Tuesday - the same day as the primary election - no news release was received by Tuesday evening.

Misquez was elected to lead the tribe last year by a large majority in a general election after the removal of Paul Ortega as president. Ortega took the top spot after the death of long-time president Wendell Chino in November, 1998.

department that is not active for 90 days. He will remove the equipment and funding. He's given 30 days for me to turn this around."

The first major requirement is to develop a list of volunteers who are able to respond to emergencies and who are not restricted by their jobs or bosses, Stewart said. A regular maintenance schedule must be set up and followed.

"The attorney has pounded into me that it's far better not to have a department at all than one not able to respond," Stewart said.

He listed priorities of the department as safety, maintenance of equipment, training of volunteers, and enough attention to detail to ensure proper documentation and that reports are submitted to the state.

Ruidoso Downs fire fighters offered to train Glencoe

members, Stewart said. But Herrera, who is at odds with that village's administration, said the department can handle its own training.

After Herrera objected, Stewart also agreed to remove a representative of Ruidoso Downs from the committee reviewing applications from volunteers.

Smith said new volunteers need to know what type of equipment is at Agua Fria and if it's operable.

Stewart said he will check Thursday, adding the substation is suppose to contain a 1977 Ford fire engine. The two engines in Glencoe are 1991 and 1993 models.

## Ruidoso woman gets prison time for operating meth lab

A former Ruidoso woman, busted in January after police said they took down a methamphetamine lab in the village, has been sentenced to 37 months in a federal prison.

Christina Martinez, 30, was handed the sentence Tuesday by Federal Judge Monti Belot in Las Cruces.

Martinez, and Dustin Bentley, 31, also from Ruidoso at the time of the drug bust, had entered guilty pleas on July 6 to charges of manufacturing more than five grams of methamphetamine.

The pair had originally been charged with conspiracy to manufacture more than 50 grams of methamphetamine, manufacture of more than five grams, and possession

with intent to distribute more than five grams of the clandestine lab-produced drug.

Martinez and Bentley were arrested in Ruidoso on Jan. 4 during a raid conducted by the Lincoln County Narcotics Enforcement Unit, Ruidoso police and state and federal law enforcement agents. Police had said the items seized in the raid were consistent with the manufacture of methamphetamine.

Items suggesting drug trafficking were also discovered during the execution of a search warrant, drug enforcers had said. The two were believed to have been making the illegal drug for two to three months, police said.

Bentley is scheduled to be sentenced in federal court on Oct. 16.

Fire, not water

## Ruidoso lists priorities for state

While Ruidoso village officials maintain water distribution as the community's top emphasis, for state eyes only it's fire, streets and recreational improvements at the top of infrastructure improvement needs.

The village's Infrastructure Capital Improvements Plan (ICIP) for 2001 was "reprioritized" during a special meeting of the village council Monday. The list will be sent to the Department of Finance and Administration and legislators who decide state funding requests from municipalities.

"We have to send this (ICIP) to Santa Fe," Mayor Robert Donaldson told the village council. "Water is our top priority, but it has a funding

source." He said finances already are in place or known for planned water delivery system improvements.

The mayor said seeking state funding for ICIP initiatives can be hindered if the target project isn't at the top of the capital improvements list. He cautioned, however, that if the legislature were to fund a water project, because it's listed as the village's top priority, the village cannot transfer those funds for another use.

"Water is our top priority," Donaldson said. "But it has a funding source. We need to move water, waste water, solid waste and the airport to the bottom because they have funding sources."

Village manager Alan Briley agreed.

"This form (TCIP-05) can help us or it can hurt us."

**'Food quality protection' or quality of life?**

Losing the use of essential pesticides because of Environmental Protection Agency regulations could well mean the end of my family's business. Thousands of other food producers will face the same fate. If the EPA maintains its present, misguided course with implementation of the Food Quality Protection Act (FQPA), many producers could not afford to stay in business. Family farms, many generations-old, would stand barren.

As a fourth-generation citrus grower, I understand the importance of healthy fruit trees and the high-quality, abundant products they yield. Unfortunately, without the availability of safe, dependable crop protectants, my trees that produce lemons, oranges, tangelos and grapefruits each year would be ravaged by insects and other pests. And for the trees that might survive, the fruits they produce wouldn't look fit to eat.

My worries concerning the fallout from FQPA implementation, however, go far beyond the

boundaries of my operation and of the fields and orchards of rural America.

The improper implementation of FQPA should be of concern to every American. When Congress passed the act in 1996, it did not intend to put America's farmers out of business. It did not intend the cost of our food supply to possibly double or triple. It did not intend to ruin the economy of this country. Nor did it intend to cause the United States to lose its position as a world economic leader.

But, if EPA has its way with FQPA, each of these scenarios could prove true.

For more than 200 years, Americans have relied on the nation's farmers for a safe, abundant, affordable food supply. No other nation in the world is capable of generating the bounty America's food producers harvest year after year. Even the EPA acknowledges that American-grown food is the safest in the world. But, if the EPA, as expected, improperly cancels the use of pesticides that have been proved safe and effective in protecting crops from pests, every American is in for a

rude awakening.

What's at stake is America's cherished quality of life. A nation unable to feed itself is a nation that can't offer the quality of life Americans enjoy today. And, because of EPA's handling of FQPA, the United States is fast approaching the crossroads of that dreaded scenario.

Americans pay 10.9 percent of their disposable income on food. That's among the lowest in the world. The efficiency of America's agriculture system is a big reason for this low percentage. But this will all change once America's food producers lose use of vital crop protectants. Farmers, in their attempt to protect crops from infestation, often have nothing else to turn to.

The United States - similar to its dependence on foreign oil - will have to rely on foreign producers using pesticides banned in this country to stock the produce bins and grocery aisles at the local supermarket. Americans could expect to pay as much as 30 percent of their disposable income on food.

The most frustrating aspect of this issue is that the applica-

tion of good data and sound science to the provisions of the FQPA would prove our crop protectants safe. But, so far, the EPA is unwilling to use either. The provisions of FQPA are not being enacted because of science. The agricultural chemicals the EPA wants to abolish pose no realistic scientific threat to human health as they are now being used. Politics - not sound science - is EPA's motivation. The EPA is being pressured by various regulatory extremists/advocates.

I challenge anyone to provide a single documented case where an individual or child has died or has fallen ill due to consuming a food item produced using a crop protectant. It just hasn't happened.

In FQPA, the EPA wields a quiet, yet powerful weapon that could impact our everyday lives. In the short term, farmers stand to lose the most. But in the long haul, each and every American will end up paying a very steep price.

# Cloudcroft area tree thinning included in fire safety effort announced by U. S. Forest Service

The Lincoln National Forest around Ruidoso isn't among the projects on a list for \$1.2 million of thinning and removal work approved by the U.S. Forest Service last week. "Nearly 6,000 acres of national

forest lands will be thinned of brush and smaller trees near communities at high risk for future forest fires in Arizona and New Mexico," said Regional Forester Eleanor Towns. However, \$100,000 is set aside for

thinning of 190 acres around Cloudcroft, south of Lincoln County. Both communities were hit by fires in May, but the damage in Otero County around Cloudcroft and Weed was more severe in acreage burned and 64

homes were lost. The Smokey Bear Ranger District has undertaken thinning around Ruidoso's boundaries in the past two years, and has requested additional funding to continue the process.

Other New Mexico communities targeted for work are Red River in the Carson National Forest, the East Mountain area of the Cibola National Forest, Little Walnut in the Gila, and Chaparral Scout in the Santa Fe.

## Highway 70 pile-up kills youth

Second fatality in a week results from three-vehicle collision; state police concerned

A Roswell youth died Sunday in a three-vehicle collision on U.S. Highway 70 east of Ruidoso Downs.

The traffic crash, the second fatal incident in less than a week on the highway between Ruidoso Downs and Hondo, involved a near head on collision, according to a New Mexico State Police report.

Mark Gilman, 16, was pronounced dead at the scene. The boy was driving a 1992 Plymouth Voyager westbound near Fox Cave when his vehicle crossed the center line. The van collided with an eastbound 1990 Winnebago motor home, causing the motor home to leave the road, travel through a guard rail and go down an embankment. The occupants of the motor home, Florence Trapp, 60, and Tommy Trapp, 64, both from Georgia, were treated for minor injuries. Both the van and the motor home were described as total losses.

The third vehicle involved was an auto that had been following the motor home and drove off the highway after seeing the collision occur. The auto hit an embankment. The driver, Nichole Richard, 23, of Texas, was uninjured, police said.

The recent fatal accidents on the road section has the district office of the state police concerned.

"We will be trying to get extra patrols out there," said Lt. William Bower of the New Mexico State Police office in Alamogordo. "We have all our resources back in the district and we will be looking at U.S. 70 and a couple of other problem spots."

The collision closed the highway for almost three hours. Bower said the roadway reopened sometime after 6 p.m.


A state police report stated all the occupants of the three vehicles were buckled in their

# County goes easy on USFS fire safety resolution

After more than an hour of discussion, Lincoln County Commissioners took a more moderate approach than neighboring Otero County in calling for immediate relief of fire hazard conditions in the Lincoln National Forest.

In a much shorter version, condensed into a resolution with five points, commissioners agreed Thursday that the state should recognize the existence of an emergency situation. They demanded immediate allocations of money to the Smokey Bear Ranger District and the national forest to alleviate dangerous conditions and "support long-term safety."

But while the board stated its support for other counties that passed emergency declarations, commissioners stopped short of threatening to take control and corrective actions in the forest if the governor or the Forest Service fails to respond.

They also eliminated language holding the Forest Service responsible for loss of homes or lives from wildfire. But Mike Nivison, Cloudfcroft village manager, said someone must be responsible if federal laws such as the Endangered Species Act shuts down timber operations and allows heavy tree growth, or a federal road closing initiative makes it impossible to fight fires, creating flooding conditions that later destroy homes.

Commissioners added a paragraph encouraging elected officials at every level of government to pursue a cooperative effort between private enterprise and governmental agencies to better manage forest resources, reduce the risk

of catastrophic wild fire and to improve the watershed.

The resolution demands that the Forest Service work with the county and keep officials updated on projects aimed at preventing the loss of life or livelihood from fire; watershed loss or forest management practices.

The final version built on a four-point resolution submitted by the county Public Lands Use Advisory Council. PLUAC representative Pete Gnatkowski contrasted the council's version with the one passed by Otero and Catron counties.

"One is a threat, the other is asking them to work with us," he said.

Commissioner William Schwettmann pushed for Otero's version, calling the alternative "watered down."

"I ask you to remove the reference to the county taking responsibility if the state fails. I couldn't recommend that," County Attorney Alan Morel said.

Commission Chairman Rex Wilson said passage of the resolution should not be construed as a reflection on the cooperation the county receives from staff at the Smokey Bear Fire District and district ranger Jerry Hawkes.

"We're trying to influence powers that be to help," he said.

Nivison told commissioners federal agencies have breached their duty to protect the water, health, safety and welfare of the citizens.

"This is a political statement as well as an action statement," he said, adding that Catron and Rio Arriba County, the McKinley Water and Soil Conservation and the village of Cloudfcroft also passed the Otero declaration.

During a fire last May, 64

homes were lost in the national forest around Weed and Cloudfcroft.

Unless the process is speeded up, it will take 200 years to do the job of thinning trees and cleaning up underbrush - and that's if nothing grows, he said.

"Don't give up our basic economy for a pipe dream" that an industry based on small diameter trees that currently are targeted on thinning projects will ever materialize, Nivison said.

Commissioner Rick Simp-

son disagreed that such an industry is not feasible.

"We're sitting on an opportunity," he said. "Carrizozo is served by a railroad and two major highways. The town's economy is depressed and it has large empty buildings right next to the tracks."

He said the situation is ripe for a particle board factory or for heating pellet manufacturing.

Hawkes said such an industry would help, because now most of the cut trees are used for fuel wood.

# Warriors take Horsemen for a ride

In four games this season, the St. Michael's football squad gave up a mere 17 points.

Friday, Ruidoso (3-2) celebrated homecoming by not only matching that figure, but adding 11 more in a 28-7 crushing of the Horsemen.

"We're just starting to kind of put things together," said coach Rodney Webb. "We didn't do a lot of new stuff, it's just coaching these kids and repetition after repetition after repetition."

That repetition apparently paid off, as the Warrior defense had what Webb called its best game of the season, giving the offense a chance to do its thing.

"That's what I'm most excited about," Webb said. "We had 45 snaps in the first half. That's phenomenal. And it's because we kept their offense off the field."

The game didn't start out looking like a blowout.

The teams spent the first quarter trading possessions, and the Warriors handed the ball back to St. Mike's after an early fumble. The full house of homecoming celebrants may have wondered if Webb's prediction of a low-scoring St. Michael's win was going to come true, as the first quarter ended in a scoreless tie.

But Ruidoso blew the game wide open in the second, scoring 21 of its 28 points in that one stanza.

Jose Linares got the scoring going with a long run at 9:12. J.R. Floyd added six more points on a 35-yard pass run with 6:10 on the clock, and tallied another six on a run with 2:59 left in

"We came out and played ball in the second half," said St. Michael's coach Tracy Stuart. "I'm proud of our kids. Ruidoso has a great football team. We knew that coming in. They executed offensively extremely well. They played great defense. They beat us. You can't take anything away from them. They just came out and beat us."

Stuart said Ruidoso's passing game had a big effect on the Horseman defense.

"We haven't seen that this year and it's a tough offense to stop," he said. "When they execute well, they're tough. That's a playoff caliber football team right there."

About the only negative anyone could find on the Ruidoso side was a few too many mistakes, especially penalties, but Webb attributed that to youth.

"Our kids are young, and you've just got to stay on them," he said. "It sounds like it's very simple, but you've got to teach the offensive line to keep your hands inside. It's just not something that comes natural. They just have to have the experience of learning."

Despite the loss, Stuart had nothing but praise for Ruidoso and its fans.

"The people down here were class," he said. "We were treated with class. We were treated great and we go away from here with a positive experience."

She said the young players did well Saturday, playing well and giving the varsity players the break they needed.



Mescalero will try to get that elusive first win Saturday when the team heads north to Pine Hill.





proves instructional for students at Carrizozo

**CARRIZOZO** - Some students hobbled to class Monday at Carrizozo High School. Wheel chairs and crutches were a part of the English class. So were some students without sight. And others that were mute.

The pupils in Sarah Ball's class had the disabilities for just six hours — enough time, Ball believed, for the 17 to realize what life is like when physically challenged.

"I can't do normal stuff," said Jasmine Boble, who was limited to one arm during the exercise. "Like trying to get my books out. I can't do it."

The class had just completed reading and watching the film "The Miracle Worker," which tells the story of Helen Keller.

"I wanted them to get, even if only a fraction of it, to understand what it would be like," Ball said. "We really don't ever consider it, what it's like to get a drink of water or go to the bathroom when you have a disability."

Ball said the exercise, educationally, is two fold. Reading and discussing the movie, and then writing a report on one of the characters, fits into the English language part of the freshman curriculum. The added learning she said, was experiencing a

physical impairment. "You'll find out how handicapped accessible the campus is," Ball told her morning students. "Wheel chair people, you're going to have to manage. Those who are blindfolded, have someone guide you between classes."

The pupil experience of a day with a disability wasn't the first for Ball's students. The instructor said ninth graders undertook a similar day last year.

"I think they really get something out of it," Ball said. "And it helps make each of them a better person."

Students with crutches and wheelchairs, blindfolded and unable to talk. Carrizozo High School freshmen Monday learned what a day is like with a handicap.



She also said that she heard Thomas Jefferson playing the violin and Andrew Jackson swearing. Both men had died many years before.


