

Family, friends celebrate Farnsworth's life

The strains of "Amazing Grace" rose to the rafters of historic San Juan Church in old Lincoln Monday afternoon as friends and family of actor Richard Farnsworth gathered to celebrate his life.

Many who stood to tell stories about the 80-year-old actor who died Friday resembled the Western characters Farnsworth portrayed so realistically on screen.

Describing her father as a wonderful and humble man, Farnsworth's daughter, Melissa "Missy" Farnsworth, said he attended school "through the sixth or ninth grades, we never were sure. I guess it was kind of scattered attendance. He didn't like school, but he was an educated man. He ed-

ucated himself. He knew everything about the Civil War, the first and second World Wars and about every Indian tribe. He loved history very much."

Growing up, other children would ask her what her father was really like, she said. "He was exactly who you saw on screen," she said. "He was the gentle, humble, gracious and quiet-spoken gentleman he portrayed."

"He wasn't always able to speak his emotions, but he conveyed them in his eyes and his face."

Changing tears to laughter, especially among the ranchers in the pews, she told about a visit to her father's ranch during which her own child began to misbehave.

"I was kind of swatting him my dad said, 'Mouse, never hit a kid in the head.

It will make him head shy and he'll go to ducking on you," she said.

Missy recalled the night earlier this year her father lost the Academy Award for best actor to Kevin Spacey.

"When his name wasn't called, we immediately worked our way down to him thinking, will he be all right," she said. "We asked if he was doing O.K. He said, 'Well Mouse, the best horse doesn't always win.'"

She talked about his fondness for beans and his exuberant cooking style, which left the kitchen a mess for her and her brother, Diamond, to clean up. That's a trait that continued all of his life, testified another friend,

Tribal council rules Misquez petition invalid

Statement that many signatures were found invalid brings allegations of 'intimidation' from dissident Apaches

A petition demanding an election to recall Mescalero Apache President Sara Misquez was declared invalid Friday.

In a prepared statement, Dorlynn Simmons, tribal council secretary, said the petition bore fewer valid signatures than the purported 552 submitted.

Organizers of the petition drive countered this week that signatures were intimidated to remove their signatures. They have filed in tribal court and U.S. District Court asking that the administration be directed to set a date for the election.

"With the assistance of a list (of the 1,949 eligible tribal voters) generated by the tribal election board, I have reviewed the petition to determine the validity and sufficiency of the signatures," Simmons said in the statement released Friday.

The council validated her conclusions, she said. Because the petition doesn't meet the requirements necessary to call a special recall election, the petitioners "failed to meet even the simplest requirements of fairness and due process," she stated. The constitution requires that 25 percent of eligible voters sign.

Simmons claimed that organizers Ben Martinez and Carleton Palmer, both former candidates for president, signed the petition "multiple times."

"Many other signatures represented individuals who are not eligible to vote in tribal elections and a few more signatures could not be verified as they were illegible," she stated.

In addition, the sign-up sheets were not attached to the text of the petition to indicate the purpose of the signatures and at least two petitions were being circulated on different issues, she stated.

"I have received dozen of telephone calls and more than 65 written statements from tribal members indicating that they did not sign a recall petition or authorize the use of their signatures in conjunction with a recall petition," Simmons stated. "They have indicated that their signatures were provided in connection with

The cold weather over the weekend may have dampened some spirits, but attendance was good at all the Aspenfest events, said Joan Zagone, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

"It was 32 degrees," Zagone said. "I've been working the parade off and on for 20 years and this was the first Aspenfest that I can remember that we have had this damp, cold fall weather all weekend."

Not as many bystanders as usual stood by as the parade passed, and those that did jumped around to keep warm. There was some confusion about the start time for the parade, which was 10 a.m., not 9:30 a.m., the time for paraders to gather at Mechem and Sudderth Drives.

Zagone said on Sunday, she drove by the Ruidoso Gymnastics

Golden Aspen rally plans move to race track next fall

First the good news, then the bad news - but maybe not so bad after all. Ron Andrews, organizer of the annual Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally reported to Ruidoso village councilors Tuesday that more than 6,000 people registered for the five-day event last month and 25,000 more people were in town in connection to the activities.

But those numbers and the space needed for events being added and existing activities being expanded mean the rally will move in 2001 to Ruidoso Downs Race Track, Andrews said.

"I've outgrown that part of town, the space at the convention center and the parking area, unless you want to pave over the golf

course," he said.

But he plans to keep at the center a smaller May rally, expected to draw 7,500 people to town next year, and will retain use of the building and parking lot during the larger September rally, possibly for free motorcycle training classes and a motorcycle auction.

"I started doing this because I was in the lodging business and wanted to fill our motel," Andrews said. "I know some people are afraid the move will negatively impact Ruidoso. I don't see that."

"They've got to eat, they've got to sleep and some will want to drink. Ruidoso Downs can't handle us, the restaurants can't handle us. Everyone benefits."



Bob Graham, who had replaced the kitchen floor in Farnsworth's house in Lincoln. "We wanted him back in California so badly, but this is where he wanted to be," Missy said.

Diamond, who followed his father by becoming a stunt man - most recently in the television series "Jag" - stayed outside until the memorial service began, greeting people with hugs and a big smile and joking with pastor Ron Thomson.

"Dad had no regrets," he said, adding that the family intends to keep the ranch in Lincoln.

"It's the least we can do," he said. Thomson and pastor Floyd Goodloe shared the service with prayers and more stories about Farnsworth. Cindy Smith sang "Cool Water."

Capitan resident Lonnie Lippmann said he asked Farnsworth why he lived in Lincoln and the actor replied, "It's the people. It's the place. It's all that remains of the frontier."

Lippmann said Farnsworth was "the most humble man I know. That was the most touching thing about him."

When the veteran performer in 300 films earlier this year received his second Academy Award nomination for his performance in "The Straight Story," he said, "This is the icing on the cake to get this at my age."

He attended the ceremony with fiancé Jewel Van Valin. The oldest leading actor to be nominated, he said he considered his portrayal of Alvin Straight as his best.

He picked up other awards and nominations for his performance in his last movie. Over the years, he also was nominated for supporting actor in "Comes a

Horseman," in 1977, won a Canadian best actor film award for the starring role in "The Grey Fox," in 1981, and for the television mini-series "Anne of Green Gables" in 1984.

Farnsworth started as a stunt man for \$7 a day and a box lunch - a big raise from his job as a stable boy. He switched to acting at the age of 57, and became a favorite of actor/director Robert Redford. He was married to the same woman for 38 years until her death. He had three grandchildren.

He moved to Lincoln more than a decade ago, seeking the privacy and "normal" life that he found elusive in southern California.

"He came out here to be himself," said Fred "Peg" Pfingsten, a neighbor who took care of Farnsworth's cattle when the actor was away.

"I told him if he wanted something, come on over here, but if you don't, I won't bother you," Pfingsten said before the service. "He's been a real good friend and neighbor. I'll really miss him. He was generous and very thoughtful. But he was a person who wanted to be his own boss."

Pfingsten recalled musical sessions that lasted late into the night when Pfingsten and Farnsworth would play guitar, Leota Pfingsten would play piano and Wes and Cindy Smith or other neighbors and friends would strum along and sing.

During the memorial service, Smith said one night while he and Farnsworth were playing guitars together, he noticed Farnsworth's instrument was covered with autographs of the famous. He decided to ask his friend for his signature.

"He signed it upside down and when I turned it over and looked, he'd written 'Keep trying.'"

Last rites for Farnsworth will be in Los Angeles later following cremation, according to a spokesman for LaGrone Funeral Chapel.

A death at Lincoln

Suffering from bone cancer, actor Richard Farnsworth lived in pain that medication only dulled slightly. He bore that pain with silent dignity until last Friday.

Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan said at about 5:15 p.m., Farnsworth was found in the bedroom of his home in Lincoln, dead from a .38 caliber gunshot wound to the head.

"He'd been sick for a long time," Sullivan said. "His terminal cancer was kind of kept under wraps, but he was in tremendous pain. "Ironically, when I re-

ceived the call, I just had gotten home, picked up the paper and was reading the article about his (Excellence in Arts) award from the governor."

Farnsworth left no note. Friends said he had given no indication that he was thinking of suicide, but they knew his pain made it difficult to eat or sleep and he used a wheelchair to get around, Sullivan said.

"He was a good friend and fine man," the sheriff said. "He was very approachable, very cordial to his fans and he loved Lincoln County."

Arts and Craft Fair at Schoolhouse Park and although she saw people going in with ear muffs and winter wear, she saw them coming out with purchases.

There was some concern about moving the Rod Run to the Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Casino because the event

has traditionally been in Schoolhouse Park, Zagone said, but she didn't think it hurt attendance.

"What we're trying to address is to research some venues to keep the events in both ends of town," she said. The organizers of the Rod Run indicated they wanted a more outdoor environment than the parking lot at the Convention Center would offer, she said.

The Ruidoso Fire Department puts on the Aspenfest Parade every year and deserves praise and accolades, Zagone said. The Chamber of Commerce coordinates the events and takes applications, but the Ruidoso Police Department and Fire Department put it on.

"That's a huge gift they give the community every year. We couldn't do it without them," she said. "They also make it safe for everyone."

Zagone said the Chamber of Commerce had received a few telephone calls about "the appropriateness of some of the music, as well as some graphic portrayals of some very serious business. ..."

"It had enough of an impact that it caused people to call the Chamber to tell us they were very uncomfortable about it."

She will suggest to the Aspenfest Committee that next year's applications ask applicants to be mindful that Aspen-

fest is a family event and therefore "regards should be paid to music and graphic design of entries," she said.

The New Mexico State Chili Cook-Off, sponsored as a Ruidoso Rotary Club scholarship benefit, attracted the most contestants ever, 106, but director Paul Crown told Rotarians the weather had an impact - "we might have broken even." He did say he will plan the cook-off one more year.

Aside from small admission fees to the arts and crafts show and the chili cook-off, all of Aspenfest was put together by volunteers.

"What really meant a lot to me at the beginning had to do with saluting the firefighters," Zagone said. "Seeing all the fire trucks and law enforcement agencies kind of brought back all the memories and personal stories (of the Cree Fire in May)."

petitions completely unrelated to this purpose."

Nettie Fossum, one of the tribal members who collected signatures for the recall, said she was careful in making it clear to people what they were signing, but many have changed their stories because of intimidation by the administration.

"People had faith in the tribal constitution when they signed and now their signatures are like a phone book; copies are in every home," Fossum said. "Why have a constitution if our own president will not uphold it?"

"They targeted the people who are easily intimidated to remove their names. We have three people who will testify in court that people tried to intimidate them, but they refused. The people need to stand up to this administration. They've been doing this too long."

Palmer, who in a primary earlier this month won a place on the November ballot among eight candidates running for four seats on the tribal council, said Misquez may say the petition is dead, "but before she can say that, remember we filed a writ of mandamus in both tribal and U.S. District Court."

The action in tribal court is set to be heard at 3 p.m. Oct.

24. Magistrate Judge Joe H. Galvan was assigned to hear the filing in federal court, according to documents supplied by Palmer.

Council member Harlyn Geronimo said last week that the council in a 7-1 vote on a motion by Christie LaPaz decided to ask the U.S. Attorney to review the petition.

"I feel it's a good move," he said. "No one should have anything to fear on either side of the issue if they have been honest in their dealings."

Simmons, wife of the Mescalero Agency manager, voted against the motion, Geronimo said. The president and vice president do not vote on issues before the council.

Everyone benefits."

One of the benefits will be less traffic on Mechem Drive, which runs in front of the convention center, he said.

"Other than that, you probably won't notice the difference except people will be able to get to the post office on Saturday," he said. The post office is situated at the turn-off to the convention center. During the event, the road is either jammed with traffic or closed to keep more people from trying to park in the overflow lot by the center.

"We filled everything up this year in Ruidoso, in Capitan, and Lincoln," Andrews said. "We are beginning to fill Alamogordo and people on Saturday afternoon were coming in asking for Roswell telephone books."

Financial impact estimates in 1996 were that the rally generated as much as \$7 million in

local expenditures over the five days, he said.

Mayor Robert Donaldson said he agreed with Andrews' move.

"One of the benefits is that this will spread things out," he said. "It won't be as crowded. If Mechem isn't totally locked up, it's much better cruising on the motorcycles and that's one of the main reasons people ride motorcycles. They like to cruise."

"You can't think that just because something moves over the line, it goes away. The event itself doesn't generate that much gross receipts tax, but all the auxiliary expenditures do."

Donaldson said he expects to see the new Hawthorne Suites resort filled with motorcycle patrons next year. Anyone who can afford a \$20,000 motorcycle can afford to stay at the new convention hotel, he said.

Donaldson said the village should be looking at developing other land it owns for outdoor

events, possibly 15 acres below Grindstone Dam and 400 acres at the Eagle Creek ball fields.

While the chili cook-off will stay one more year in town at the Tall Pine RV Park and the gymnastic association's arts and crafts show did well at Schoolhouse Park during Aspenfest, the time will come when they also will outgrow that space, he said.

He'd like to create an outdoor civic events park for large functions such as weddings, family reunions, volleyball competitions and other activities, Donaldson said.

"By the next meeting, I'd like to have an action item on the agenda to look at what it would take," he said. "It won't be created overnight."

Village-owned land near the airport is more suitable for high-noise events, he said.

Felony charged after fight at high school

An altercation between two Ruidoso High School students Friday has brought felony charges against one of the pupils.

Jeffery R. Palmer, 18, of Mescalero had a criminal complaint filed, accusing him of aggravated battery that could cause great bodily harm or death and with battery upon a school employee. Palmer turned himself into Ruidoso police Tuesday.

According to a police report, the two students met between the school's vocational studies building and the high school gymnasium late Friday morning, and began to fight.

High school vocational instructor Michael Gaines was leaving for lunch when he saw the fight in progress. The 16-year-old was on the ground with Palmer allegedly "stomping and kicking" the downed teen's head and neck, according to Gaines' discussion with an investigating officer. The teacher told police he saw Palmer stomp and kick the younger boy seven or eight times before he could intercede. Gaines said the 16-year-old was either unconscious or stunned from the blows and was not attempting to protect himself.

Gaines said he tried to pull Palmer

away, at which time the teacher was reportedly struck by Palmer, and that was followed by a resumption of the attack on the 16-year-old. Gaines said another man in the crowd of students was coaching Palmer, yelling "do it the way I told you. Hit him in the head."

Palmer, apparently realizing other school staff were arriving, departed the location and fled the school property in a pickup truck at a high rate of speed.

Gaines told police he had never seen a student altercation so violent. He said he believed Palmer was "absolutely intent on killing" the boy.

Police were called to the high school about 11:42 a.m., on a call reporting battery. The victim, before being transported for a medical examination, told police that he and Palmer had had a disagreement on Thursday. Apparently the 16-year-old had stared at Palmer's girlfriend, according to the police report. High school principal Bill F. Green had intervened between the two on Thursday and both had assured him that the matter was forgotten. A preliminary hearing date had not yet been established in Lincoln County Magistrate Court. Palmer was released Tuesday after a \$100,000 bond was reduced to \$10,000, and Palmer's father posted the required 10 percent, or \$1,000.

Winter takes early swing at Lincoln County

The Ruidoso area's brush with winter this past weekend brought down some ice-glazed trees and a handful of individual power interruptions, but the region escaped with just minor inconveniences.

Low clouds, fog, and temperatures that often hugged the freezing point, coupled with occasional precipitation, coated trees with an ice layer.

"I'm not aware of any damage to private property," Tom Sullivan, Lincoln County sheriff said of trees that gave way to the weight of ice. "If there's no damage we don't get involved."

The sheriff said a couple of trees did fall across roads,

requiring removal. Sullivan said Friday night seemed to be the worst for trees laden with heavy ice.

The Bonito Fire Department was called out twice to a Ski Run Road location, where icy branches caused power lines to arc and spark.

Celebrating a celebrity's life

Those attending the memorial service at Lincoln on Monday afternoon for long-time film actor Richard Farnsworth called it a "celebration."

It was an appropriate label to mark the passing of a gentleman who ten years ago adopted Lincoln County as home after purchasing a small ranch near a historic village. There, he played a natural role, as good neighbor, thoughtful friend, supporter of the land he had come to love.

When he went away, it was to pursue the career he had adopted almost a lifetime ago — a maker of fantasy to entertain motion picture fans over many decades.

He was a stunt man for 30 years, and then (in the fashion that Hollywood success is made of) got to speak a few lines. Richard Farnsworth was discovered and added his own signature to roles that brought him, as he said one time, "something to live on" along with two nominations for Academy Awards and many other honors. His last Academy Award nomination came earlier this year.

But the role he liked best, according to his neighbors, was as a good friend and a good neighbor.

A very important election for farmers is coming

The late George Wallace, governor of Alabama and presidential candidate, said there wasn't "a dime's worth of difference" between Democrats and Republicans. Critics of the so-called "business-as-usual" atmosphere in Washington, D.C. are echoing that charge this year. But for farmers, there could be a lot of differences depending on who wins the White House and controls Congress.

When the GOP swept to congressional power in 1994, they promised changes to federal agriculture policy. The 1996 Farm Bill, or Freedom to Farm, was the result. Republicans touted decision-making freedom for farmers that would allow them to produce for the market. Many Democrats criticized the 1996 Farm Bill calling it "freedom to fail."

Sen. Blanche Lincoln, D-

Ark., says there has been no substantive agriculture policy since the Republicans have controlled Congress. "We've been flying by the seat of our pants for the past five or six years," Lincoln says. "We haven't dealt with the crisis agriculture is going through in the global economy."

Lincoln says one of the factors in the current farm economic crisis is that farmers don't have enough markets for the surplus they are producing. She says U.S. agriculture has to be a player in the global economy and that Republicans have not done enough to open up new foreign markets. She says Democrats will make new markets one of their priorities.

Sen. Pat Roberts, R-Kan., disagrees with Lincoln's assertions concerning Republican farm policy.

Roberts helped write the 1996 Farm Bill when he was in the House of Representative and

chairman of the Agriculture Committee. He insists farmers have benefited from increased planting flexibility given them by the act. The failure to open enough new markets for U.S. farm products, Roberts says that was a bipartisan one. "We didn't get fast-track authority for the president, the WTO talks basically fell apart," he says. "We still have a lot of sanctions on countries, we haven't used all of the export programs that we need to use."

Roberts and Lincoln see government's responsibilities to farmers in different ways. Lincoln says Democrats will strengthen the safety net for farmers, which means increased government efforts that keep farmers from going under during hard times and that help all farmers do well during good times.

But Roberts says a return to Democratic congressional control will mean a return to acreage

controls, more bureaucracy and paperwork and more regulations.

Both parties insist that farmers' prosperity depends on their party's maintenance of power. But permanent normal trade relations for China, one of agriculture's biggest legislative priorities, passed Congress with bipartisan support against bipartisan opposition. It was less a battle between Democrats and Republicans than between those advocating free trade and more markets and those concerned with human rights and domestic employment.

There are real ideological differences between Democrats and Republicans on farm issues. Both want to fix the farm economy, but they have different philosophies on what is best for American agriculture.

Offer to village could mean more parks

Tracts on White Mountain Drive and Gavilan Canyon Drive suggested by developer

Ruidoso could be in store for two new village parks.

White Mountain Development, Inc. has offered to donate property to the village for the development of the parks.

One of the parcels is about one-third of an acre at White Mountain Meadows Drive and Sunny Slope Drive. The other is a larger property along Gavilan Canyon Road south of Warrior Drive.

"He's had offers to buy that property for a rock quarry," Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson said, quoting Bill McCarty, general manager of White Mountain Development. "I can't think of anything worse."

The mayor said adding parks at the locations for residents to use would be a "really exciting" prospect for the village.

"He (McCarty) called and wanted to meet with me," Donaldson said. "He said

let's take a ride. He said he had been really excited about my idea about green space areas in Ruidoso. He and his dad were major land developers here. He's been very giving to Ruidoso in terms of land."

White Mountain Development, whose major stockholders are McCarty and Douglas L. McBride, has provided property to the village for several previous parks and helped some churches on the village's east end acquire property.

Donaldson said if the village takes up the offer, which includes requirements that the village turn the properties into public parks in perpetuity, the lands would be deeded to the Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Department.

The mayor said the lot at 202 Sunny Slope Drive would be easy to develop as a green space, with a picnic area. The property along Gavilan Canyon Road will take some investigating, Donaldson said.

"It's a bigger deal," Donaldson said, both

in size — more than five acres — and in scope. "It would be an upscale type of park. An opening, and entrance, to the north part of town."

The land, on the west side of Gavilan Canyon Road includes a small meadow and creek ditch, with cliffs as a backdrop. A waterfall could be an added feature.

"It would save a unique formation and create a place for picnics or a place to just go and read," Donaldson. "It would have to be developed into something special. Is it possible? We would need to determine the (development) costs."

A small parking area would be possible on a section of land on the road's east side, which could also be a part of the donation.

Donaldson said McCarty told him he has had a purchase offer that would have turned the property into a rock quarry.

He said McCarty told him he didn't want to ever see that happen.

The mayor said the Gavilan Canyon property would be more a "visual" park while the White Mountain area parcel, in a subdivision, would be a neighborhood park.

Hondo VFD 'on track'

The Glencoe-Palo Verde Volunteer Fire Department reorganization seems to be "on track," Lincoln County Manager Tom Stewart said Tuesday.

Three more volunteers signed up at the second meeting in the effort to revitalize the department, which had seen a dwindling of participants able to respond to emergencies during work hours.

In the wake of complaints about lack of response and failure to file monthly reports, the state Fire Marshal threatened to close the department if significant changes weren't accomplished quickly.

Stewart called a meeting late last month, where eight vol-

unteers were recruited. But residents of the valley area and volunteers asked for a chance to finish the process on their own.

"I won't be inserting myself," Stewart said. "But I'm watching."

Glencoe resident Ralph Romero, County Commissioner Rick Simpson, who lives in the district, and Commissioners Leo Martinez and L. Ray Numley attended the public meeting.

Stewart said the group appears to be moving toward a reorganization plan and submitted an equipment request he is researching.

"They will be meeting every week for the next month to iron out the kinks," Stewart said.

Adequate supply not likely until late November Flu vaccine delayed this season

Flu vaccine is expected to be in tight supply this fall, especially for people not at high risk because of chronic illnesses. Millie Aproda, a registered nurse with the state health department in Ruidoso and Carrizozo, said she doesn't expect to receive any vaccine until the middle or end of November.

"That's still plenty of time for people at risk," she said. "The flu season really doesn't begin until January and if they get their shots too early, it won't see them through."

"We will target the high risk people first, those 65 or older, adults and children with chronic disorders, and pregnant women in the first or second trimester."

Because supplies may be limited, she encouraged other people to check with their physicians and sign up early to receive shots.

"They're not telling us if we will be getting extra," Aproda said. "We will let the public know the minute we receive the vaccine and schedule a clinic."

According to information from the New Mexico Department of Health in Santa Fe, officials expect enough vaccine to be available for everyone, but it will arrive later than usual.

The federal government indicates there will be as many flu shots produced this year as last year, but later, said Jackie Campo, department spokesman. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has notified states a problem in culturing one of the strains in this year's vaccine may result in delay in delivering the vaccines."

Urban interface tree thinning to continue in area

ALAMOGORDO — Work is under way in the Lincoln National Forest to reduce the build up of fuels on 374 acres of National Forest lands near Cloudercroft and Ruidoso. These areas will be thinned of brush and smaller trees to reduce the accumulation of woody material on the forest floor.

The work is a continuation of a program that the Lincoln National Forest has been doing for the last five years to reduce the risk of fires to communities within forest boundaries. Last year, more than 2,250 acres of wildland urban interface projects were completed on the forest.

For the past three years, the Southwestern Region has focused on creating defensible space on national forest lands adjacent to communities as a

way to protect private property. "About 40,000 acres of the over 580,000 acres of overly dense forested lands near communities and subdivisions, in what is called the wildland-urban interface, have been treated so far," Regional Forester Eleanor Towns said.

The importance of doing this type of tree cutting and removing fuels potentially dangerous to nearby communities is now widely recognized following the severe fire season this summer. Homeowners, elected officials, and many organized groups are now more anxious to support this work on national forest lands and to be sure it is done on private lands too.

A national workshop, called Firewise, sponsored by the National Fire Protection

Association (NFPA) in cooperation with National Association of State Foresters, Federal agencies and others will be held Dec. 4-6 in Prescott, Ariz.

The Firewise program teaches techniques in community planning, homebuilding, and landscaping so people know how to better protect themselves and their property from wildfire. "We encourage groups of county and city officials, builders, developers, homeowners and others to sign up for this session," said Towns.

Towns said, "Most people like having lots of trees on their land and also on the national forest lands, but in

many cases there are more trees than is natural or can be sustained over time." In drought years, these forests are prime for hot, intense fires than burn through the tree-tops called crown fires.

These crown fires are generally wind-driven and certainly don't stop according to property boundaries. Everyone likes trees and there is a way to reduce the number of trees and reduce their potential in the spread of fire and still have an aesthetically pleasing environment.

It will take an estimated 15 years for the Forest Service to complete the first cycle of thinning work needed in the interface.

Projects will be in cooperation with state forestry officials and adjacent land owners.

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Water Defense Association resurrected to fight new battle

An old name was resurrected last week to fight a new battle. The Water Defense Association originally was created more than a decade ago to block attempts by the Mescalero Apache Tribe to claim more water rights. The association was successful in defending water rights of owners downstream from the reservation in Otero County and abutting Ruidoso. Now the group is organizing to fight for a healthier watershed.

"This time, it's not a matter of someone trying to take our water rights," said Sally Canning, who owns the Laughing Sheep Ranch between Capitan and Lincoln. "Instead, upstream users and the unhealthy watershed are just taking the water."

Canning said she's sold off about half her herd because water availability on her ranch has dropped significantly. "Water wells are drying up and what agriculture is left in the drainage system is severely threatened," she said. "The river (Rio Bonito) is drying up and our property values are going down."

The first meeting of the association is set for 6 p.m., Oct. 19, in the Old Lincoln Community Center. Officers will be elected to guide the effort. Some of the options to be examined are watershed restoration, water conservation, upstream water/well limitations, monitor wells and a large community well that could supplement irrigation ditches and keep fish alive in the stream, Canning said.

She took the issue to the Lin-

coln County Commission last month, gently chiding them for not tackling water problems head-on. She recently attended a water meeting in Roswell with dozens of elected officials and representatives of state agencies. "It seems as though many local governments are really getting active about taking care of its citizens, their property and their agriculture," she said. "It was at this point I realized that I was the only one in the room from Lincoln County."

"Here I am running a dozer and clearing brush as a full-time job while trying to run my own little sheep ranch with no water, live in a house with barely any water, bathing from water out of the river, but I can take a day off to go to a state water meeting - a meet-

ing on the hottest issue in the country right now. Yet no one from my county's government was there."

While people in the county moan about lack of water, new subdivisions are being approved, she said. Nothing is being done about the water supply. "Well, actually something is being done about my supply," she said. "I don't know where my water is, but I do know that it's not getting to me. Either the watershed with all its over-vegetation is sucking up the water or it's the hundreds and hundreds of wells upstream from my property."

"I hope when these people drilling wells build their homes and put in lawns and come home from work hot and tired, they enjoy their shower and have

enough water in the tap to make ice for their scotch and water. Apparently, the tap is on me."

Wouldn't it make more sense to spend money up front improving the watershed by thinning trees and cleaning up underbrush instead of pouring millions into repair after a catastrophic fire and worrying about lawsuits being filed, she asked.

"This county needs to demand performance on the part of the forest service, demand participation from its landowners and all watershed inhabitants and demand performance from yourselves," she told commissioners. "This county has talked and talked and talked about brush and overgrowth control, restoring the watershed and reducing fire. I just cleared 800 acres. How much have you gotten done?"

MAGISTRATE COURT

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

Charges are pending against the drivers in both mishaps, according to the New Mexico State Police.

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
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
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
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
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

The Warriors scored on three Vegas mistakes.


After Chad Swanner picked off a Don pass early in the match, the Warriors drove down the field, scoring on a pass from Todd Schrader to J.R. Floyd.


CAPITAN — The Capitan Tigers showed the Anthony, Texas, Wildcats how to play football Friday, as the Tigers took a 28-20 victory.

'Cottage community' development on Reese tabled by P&Z

After raising questions of their own, and hearing opposition from two neighbors, Ruidoso's Planning and Zoning Commission tabled a review of a "cottage community" development on two lots along Reese Drive.

The development proposes a five-unit housing development at 105 Reese Drive, a property zoned single family residential.

Bart and Deborah Byars, who have an option to buy the two-acre property that currently has a home on it, said the land is perfect for a planned cottage community.

In a letter to the commission, the Byars state that, with housing a challenge for Ruidoso, a cottage community at the location would be a buffer between commercial zoning to the west and a residential area to the east. They also said the housing, with a "territorial or river cabin" architectural style, would

perpetuate the mountain village image of Ruidoso.

Village attorney Charles Rennick told the commission that two homes could be allowed on the two-acre property, not five. He said the Byars' idea would require a zoning change. Village planning staff said multi-family or commercial district zoning with a condition-use permit would be required.

"If the site were zoned commercial, it (Reese Drive) would become a commercial street," Darrell Bremner, a village planner, said. Commercial lots, which span from Sudberth Drive to Reese Drive, already flank the south side of Reese Drive.

Bart Byars said the cottage community would create a "transitional zone" between the commercial area and residential lots to the east.

"I think we can do this with a minimum impact and it would not harm the neighborhood," Deborah Byars said.

But neighbors on each side of

the property objected to the proposed development.

"I'm really against it," said Weaver Ballard. "I don't think it would work in our neighborhood."

Dale Naron, who owns adjacent property to the west, told commissioners he wouldn't like the development next to him.

The village attorney recommended the Byars initially submit a request for zoning before the commission undertakes a sketch plan review. Rennick also said there are conflicting messages on housing development from the village council dealing with density and affordable housing.

Bill Hirschfeld, a member of the commission, said he believed the cottage-housing plan would be good for the neighborhood given the existing commercial development, including a gas station across Reese Drive.

The River Cottage Community would include five two-story cottages of under 975 square feet each,

covered parking, flagstone walkways, gardens and other landscaping on the property that runs from Reese Drive to the Rio Ruidoso.

The Byars are presently completing construction of an apartment complex on Nob Hill.

Small variance OKd

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission Tuesday approved a variance to allow the construction of a 57-square-foot addition to the rear of a home at 110 Hart Avenue. The variance would allow the addition to be built 6.5 feet from a property side lot line.

Right-of-way use approved

The commission backed issuing a license to use a public right-of-way at the end of Sutton Drive and Gavilan Canyon Road. The use would allow for the possible erection of a business sign for the

R & R RV Park. The six-by-10-foot piece of land in the right of way would be leased to the RV park for up to five years at an annual cost of \$53.

The right-of-way lease must be approved by the Ruidoso village council.

Variance tabled

Tabled by the commission was a variance request to allow construction of a garage within a side setback area at 207 Coal Drive.

In tabling the request, the commission said more information, including a survey of the property, was needed.

Amendment tabled

Also tabled was a request for an amendment to a commercial site development plan for a previously proposed medical building development near the Lincoln County Medical Center.

Commissioners and the present jail management firm are in a virtual stalemate

Negotiations with CSI on operation of new detention center continue

Weeks after top officials with Corrections Systems Inc. told Lincoln County commissioners they could resolve issues standing in the way of a management contract on the new jail in Carrizozo, negotiations continue.

CSI, which manages the old jail in the county courthouse, was selected for negotiations after commissioners picked the company as their top choice from submitted proposals.

Cost comparisons by County Manager Tom Stewart between the county running the new jail in the Carrizozo Industrial Park or CSI are only estimates, said Bill Garrison, chief executive officer of CSI and John Foran, company president.

Figures supplied by the

company are based on years of actual experience operating jails and prisons, they told commissioners at the meeting.

"We need to sit down and see where you're getting the numbers," Foran said. "The first thing that hits me is that the operating costs are too low."

If CSI misjudges a budget, it has to make up the difference, but if the county does, commissioners will have to find more money somewhere, he said.

"It's a business," he said. "We're trained to look for ways to keep costs down and revenues up."

But bottom line, "If you want to run it yourselves, we wish you luck," Foran said.

The president said company officials also would work with local judges to keep the inmate population down.

"We've tried that," said Commission Chairman Rex Wilson. "Why could you, if we can't?"

"Experience," Foran responded.

If the county built an annex to house up to 30 non-violent inmates, minimum-security risks, that would require a separate bid and is not included in CSI's offer, Commissioner Leo Martinez said. But an annex helps keep beds open in the jail and is less expensive to run, he said.

"I think you think you've got it in the bag, so you're not willing to negotiate," Martinez told Garrison and Foran. "Where have you come down to meet us and make it beneficial to Lincoln County taxpayers? All the terms in the contract appear to benefit CSI and not county taxpayers."

But Garrison said management firms can't allow someone else to dictate the numbers they offer.

"We give you a fair and honest deal," he said. "I can't have anyone set a number and tell us we have to do it for that. If you can do it, O.K., do it."

But Foran took a more conciliatory tone.

"It's my belief our numbers aren't substantially dif-

ferent," he said. "I need to sit down with Tom and Alan (Morel, county attorney) and see."

J. Robert Beauvais, a Ruidoso attorney who previously was deputy secretary of state corrections, warned commissioners that if they build 100 bed or 122 beds in the jail, the courts will fill them.

"You're not projecting the worst-case scenario," he said, adding that with bed limitations at the old jail, he uses the argument of no space to keep some of his clients out.

Under Stewart's analysis, the total cost to the county to operate the jail under the

existing system with CSI would be \$1,357,193, with \$85,572 going to CSI for administration and consultation. The cost per day for each prisoner is \$39.81.

He estimated without CSI the county could operate the new jail for \$1,245,366, offset by \$377,700 in revenue for a cost-per-prisoner per day of \$20.67. With an annex, the cost could be lowered to \$12.29 per day.

Under CSI's proposal, the cost would be about \$1.3 million, minus \$335,446 in revenues, for a per-prisoner cost of \$23.37 per day. With an annex, that might drop to \$15.69 per day.

SBE awards and reproves

The New Mexico State Board of Education placed 26 public schools in "school improvement" under the state's new accountability program, approving the recommendation of the SBE's Accountability Committee and the Educational Standards Commission.

The schools, among 57 Title-I schools identified in 1997 as needing improvement, were rated as "probationary" by the SBE in August.

The 26 schools will be directed to immediately begin addressing performance issues by developing and implementing an improvement plan and meeting with members of their communities.

The State Board of Educa-

tion has set a high bar for school performance," said SBE President Flora M. Sánchez. "We can, and must, over the next two years, improve the outcomes of these schools."


To be removed from school improvement, schools must move from "probationary" to "meets standards" for two consecutive years. After three years of being rated as "probationary" on statewide indicators (student assessment, dropout and attendance), a school will be recommended for corrective action.

The SBE designated 94 schools as "high improving" schools, pending verification that 90 percent of the students in each school participated in the state assessment program. The schools, recognized for showing the most improvement in test scores from 1998-99 and 1999-2000, were awarded with \$1.9 million in state incentive funding.

The SBE also recognized 37 "high performing" schools (schools rated as "exemplary" under the state's accountability program). Included in the listing of such schools are five schools rated as "exceeds standards," 48 rated as "meets standards" and 25 rated as "probationary" in August. The "high improving" schools represent 10 percent of New Mexico's public school enrollment.

The listing and dollars awarded is available on the SDE Web site, www.sde.state.nm.us.

By action of the SBE, each "high improving" school will receive a minimum award of \$4,000 (schools are prohibited from using funds for staff salaries or bonuses). The distribution of funds above that minimum is based on the number of students in the school.

Going Cisco

Twenty RHS students have signed up for a high-tech course in computer networking, and their efforts can earn many college credits and high-paying jobs.

Twenty juniors and seniors at Ruidoso High School are building computer networks and helping to document the high school network — and they receive both high school and college credit for it.

These students applied last spring for the Cisco Networking Academy, a two-year program to prepare them for the Cisco Certified Network Associate examination. This is one of the most prized certifications in the networking industry today, according to Chad Smith, the ENMU instructor, teaching the course.

Cisco Systems sold the curriculum to Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso, and Smith teaches the daytime class to high school students, and an evening class for adults, both at a computer lab in the high school. The program is divided into four modules of 70 hours each. The evening class is an accelerated version that allows students to finish the program in one year.

This ENMU class is offered second period, and students receive high school credit and five college credits for each semester completed.

Renrose Licerale, a junior, said she plans to take the class the full two years to learn more about computers, and said she wants to work in computer networking and go on to college to further her education.

Cole Nielsen is a senior and plans to complete the rest of the course after he graduates from high school.

"I'm going to get an electronics/engineering degree and this'll help out, plus allow me to 'kleep out' of introductory computer (classes) in college. Plus it gives me a lot of computer college credits," he said.

Nielson said he likes the program and especially that he can access the curriculum from home and study any time he wants — "no limits," he said.

Not all students have computers at home but the ENMU computer lab is open seven days a week to students, and there is also a book for use by those without computers at home.

"He backs up the information we're supposed to read, he gives us examples and explains," Nielsen said. "And we do lab. We designed a network, built some patch cords and linked two networks together, and a lot of computer troubleshooting."

Homework, he said, varies from chapter to chapter, and he spends from four to 18 hours a week on it.

Jacob Ornelas, also a senior, said he likes the class because it's self-paced. He said it's possible that he could get a technical job on computers while he's still in college.

The curriculum is provided on

the 20 computers, and students then apply what they've learned with the lab computers. Six Pentium 166mhz (about 1996 model) computers are still needed for the lab, and anyone interested in donating one may call ENMU-Ruidoso at 157-2120.

"When we built networks," Smith said, "we spent three weeks reading, and then a week building them. I divided the class into four teams. That's a major component — hands-on."

Later, Smith will divide the class in half, with half the students working in the lab and half on curriculum. In the lab, students will tear apart computers and put them back together again, change cables, and work with other networking equipment (which, he said, is on the way) such as routers and hub switches.

This program is not a substitute for college, Smith said, and all of the students interviewed mentioned plans to attend college. In fact, it may make college more feasible for some students, because internships are available for those who complete the program.

"Cisco will put universities or businesses together with students to get them real-world experience," he said. "If you're a college student, you can earn enough in the summer to pay for a year of college."

Smith, who's been in the area since 1991, has been teaching computer classes at ENMU for three semesters. He has an associate's degree in civil engineering, a bachelor's degree in computer science and has been working as a systems analyst for seven years for Exxon and as a certified computer repair technician. He's working on an MBA now, and is a Cisco-certified academy instructor.

This class differs from other computer classes he's taught at ENMU in that it's more technical, more theoretical, more demanding and requires more time outside of class.

"This is cutting-edge technology; that's what's interesting," Smith said.

While students who don't have computers at home are at a slight disadvantage, Smith said he hasn't observed any real difference in the learning curve between high school students and adult college students.

"Younger students have less fear of technology, but the older students can relate it to life experiences, so it really balances out," he said. High school students have more energy and Smith has to work to keep it focused, but students at the night class are worn out from a day of work, so he has to find ways to energize them.

To do well in the course, students need to be math proficient because the curriculum deals with mathematics unique to the computing world, Smith said. They also have to be able to grasp abstract ideas, such as the binary numbering system, which is hexadecimal (base-16 numbering).

"Nerds seem to pick it up quicker," he said, "but it wouldn't be a requirement. Non-nerds are doing fine."

One difference Smith has noticed between the Cisco classes and regular ENMU computer classes is that no one has dropped out of either the daytime or the evening class, and there's a waiting list for the next session of the evening class.

"That's extremely unusual," he said about no dropouts. "Man, I don't know. They want to learn it so badly because the rewards are great — networking professionals are in huge demand."

The lowest-paid high school graduate he knows of is in Artesia and is earning \$27,000 a year. The highest-paid high school graduate went to work for a stock brokerage in Phoenix and earns \$45,000.

"I think it's great," Smith said. "I'm helping to provide them with a tool to pay their way through college. Also, if something happens and they don't finish college, they've got a real good way of making a living."

Some of the students in the evening class are professionals with degrees who are making a career change, he said.

All the students have some computer background, Smith said, and this was one of the criteria used to select the 20 students for the program. Students also had to have a minimum grade-point average of 2.5, regular attendance, and answer several essay questions about their future plans and computer knowledge. High school counselors and staff reviewed the applications.

"They seem to love it," Smith said of the students in his high school class. Some of their other teachers are taking the Tuesday- and Thursday-evening class, and a sense of camaraderie is developing among them all.

Smith himself loves it — teaching, that is, and computer networks. This job, for him, is a union of his technical background and his love of people.

"Computers are stupid," he said. "People are interesting."

Smith said he plans an open house in January so parents can see what their children are doing in the program and so other teachers can look at the network.

The judicial (ju-DISH-uhl) branch, headed by the Supreme Court, decides if the laws are lawful according to the Constitution.

The U.S. Constitution gives the power of making national laws to the U.S. Congress. Congress is made up of two "houses," or groups, the Senate and the House of Representatives.

Elections to Congress

The 435 members of the House of Representatives serve two-year terms. They are chosen from 435 different districts across the country. Every two years they all must run for re-election if they want to stay in office.

The 100 senators serve six-year terms. They do not all run for re-election at the same time. One-third of the members run every two years. This year, there are elections for senators in 33 states. Senators from the same state do not run at the same time.

Election Day is Nov. 7, 2000



For 200 years, since Nov. 22, 1800, Congress has been meeting in the Capitol in Washington, D.C. The Capitol does not have a front and back door. We say that it has an east front and a west front. This is the view from the east front. Most visitors enter on this side. Only a few members of Congress have an office in the Capitol. Most members' offices are in nearby buildings.



The House of Representatives meets in the chamber on the south side of the Capitol. This big room is the largest room in the building. The representatives sit on benches and do not have assigned seats.

Qualifications


A representative must be 25 years old and must have been a U.S. citizen for seven years. The number of representatives is based on the number of people in each state.

A senator must be 30 years old and must have been a U.S. citizen for nine years. There are two senators from each state.



The Senate meets in a chamber on the north side of the Capitol. Each of the 100 senators has a special assigned seat. The Republicans sit on one side of the aisle and the Democrats on the other.



Building the Capitol




Carpenter's Hall in Philadelphia was the site of the first meeting place of the Continental Congress in 1776. Congress met in 13 different buildings in eight different cities before it moved to Washington, D.C.

IN THE NORTH ... IN THE SOUTH ...

When our country was just beginning, the U.S. Congress had many arguments about where the government's new "Federal City" should be.

Finally, in 1790, the Congress decided on a site right in the middle of the 13 states, between Maryland and Virginia, near George Washington's home, Mount Vernon. Some described the site as a wilderness in the woods on the Potomac River.




A contest was held to see who would design the Capitol Building. William Thornton, who was a doctor and an amateur architect, won. His winning design is pictured in the drawing above. He received \$500 and a city lot.




George Washington was very interested in the Capitol's progress. He helped select the architect and the site, and laid the cornerstone. This ceremony often celebrates the start of a new building.

The Senate and the House of Representatives met in this wing in 1800. The Supreme Court met there in 1801. The congressmen had trouble finding places to stay in the new city of Washington that was being built around the Capitol. Most stayed in boarding houses.




John Adams, our second president, spoke at the first meeting of both houses of Congress in the new Capitol on Nov. 22, 1800. Congress was composed of 32 members of the Senate and 106 members of the House of Representatives.
