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Promise shrivels

Eastern N.M. expected windfall less than thought

Business owners who volunteered to serve on the Work Force Development Council thought their participation could bring millions of dollars to their counties in job training programs.

But they found out last month that federal promises of \$300 million for New Mexico - \$50 million of that for the eastern fifth of the state - have shrunk to \$6.7 million for this area.

Tony Elias, executive director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, and Lincoln County Commissioner William Schwettmann delivered the bad news at a commission meeting late last month.

But they still urged commissioners to sign a participation agreement, noting that they could exit with 90-days notice.

"I recommend we sign and maybe Commissioner (Leo) Martinez, who sits on the board can get some money for this area," Schwettmann said.

Martinez said he's irritated at the government misleading small communities where business owners took time away from their operations and drove to Roswell for meetings in the hope of benefiting their areas.

"There are going to be 51 very upset people," he said, referring to

Highway work still not done

Halloween deadline comes and goes; maybe Nov. 30 if good weather holds

Tuesday's goal for completing Ruidoso-area road construction came and went, and construction workers plan to stay on the job at least another month.

"We're not done," said Scott Adair, the Meadow Valley Contractors Inc. project manager on the N.M. Highway 48 project. "Our intent is to work, if productive, until the end of November to be done."

"Productive" was described as weather permitting.

The Halloween completion goal came last summer during a turbulent period between the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department and Meadow Valley, the Arizona-based firm awarded contracts in 1998 to widen U.S. Highway 70 in Ruidoso Downs and State Highway 48 in Ruidoso and a part of Alto.

Although crews could be working along sections of the project through November, Adair said much of the work will be behind the curb.

Paved ditches to carry storm water on parts of the upper State Highway 48 project, which is defined as from Ski Run Road south to White Mountain Drive, yet needs to be completed, Adair said. He said some 5,000 tons of

asphalt needed to be applied for the completion of ditching.

"We have all the friction course done on all the highway," Adair said. "We still have striping to finish."

The striping work was scheduled to be completed this week, with crews working into the weekend if necessary.

Weather - especially temperature - would play a role in completing the striping.

The striping work on Highway 48 includes painting areas like intersections with stop lines and crosswalks.

"One place that will need paving is at Sudderth and Mechem drives," Adair said. "We have some pavement to take out and put new asphalt in."

Two small sections of roadway on Sudderth Drive, immediately east and west of Mechem Drive, need to be replaced. Adair said when that work is undertaken traffic will be reduced to one lane in each direction.

The U.S. Highway 70 project in Ruidoso Downs was deemed complete but for a couple of minor details and the repositioning of traffic signals at the entrance to the Wal-Mart Supercenter.

The moving of the signals

County property value grew by \$25 million during 2000

At the rate houses and new developments are going up between Alto and Capitan, Ruidoso may soon be the second most populated spot in Lincoln County, Commissioner Bill Schwettmann said.

"People better look again if they think the growth is confined to Ruidoso," he said, noting some of the statistics contained in a tax rate certification report submitted last month by Coun-

ty Assessor Patsy Serna. "The town is landlocked."

Within the last two years, a 500-plus lot subdivision sold out on Sierra Blanca Airport Road and plans are under way for another community of more than 700 homes and multiple unit residences in the same area, along with a 27-hole golf course and commercial tracts.

An exclusive golf course in the Angas area east of State Highway 48 was announced by R.D. Hubbard, owner of Ruidoso Downs Race Track, who also bought a large tract of land

around the course for possible future development.

County Tax Assessor Patsy Serna said Schwettmann's on the mark as far as future growth is concerned.

For the current tax year, which was not a county reappraisal year and reflects primarily new construction, property values in the county leaped \$25 million to \$492.4 million from 1999. Ruidoso gained \$6.27 million in property value while Alto and the surrounding area picked up \$6.67 million.

"Another area growing fast is Ruidoso Downs," she said. "We picked up more than \$1 million there."

Ruidoso officials are aware of the growth constraints on the village and have talked about annexation to the north to control the entrance to the village. The thrust also would sweep into the village limits a sports complex on Ski Run

Village council considers initiative to boost fishing

Improved quality fishing water in Ruidoso is a vision that could be a reality, a village fishing guide contends.

After hearing from Jim Shoop of Fly's Ect, village council members nibbled on a need for the village to extend quality fishing waters in Ruidoso and perhaps help plant more trout.

The initiative would be twofold, Shoop told councilors Tuesday. He asked the village to sign onto a request heading to the New Mexico Game and Fish Commission in January seeking to extend the Special Trout Waters designation on the Rio Ruidoso. And funding has been requested of the village to finance sup-

plemental rainbow trout stocking.

"What we're asking is for the village of Ruidoso to set aside money for the stocking of rainbow trout to supplement the state's stocking," Shoop said.

The request seeks \$2,000 in village funding quarterly for the increased stocking, which would be in addition to rainbows planted in the river by the state.

"Please take this under advisement and find a way to fund this," Shoop said.

Shoop said the economic impact of assuring anglers come to Ruidoso is enormous. Claiming that more than half of the fishing licenses sold in Ruidoso

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

the large board that oversees the area. "They had to leave their jobs to attend and had to meet a June 1 deadline to submit their bylaws. Its really a shame. It's hard to get business people involved for free and then they find out it's for naught."

He added that only Bernalillo County failed to meet the deadline. "They probably knew something we didn't," he said.

But Martinez still voted for participation with the rest of the commission.

"There's not much we can do except try to make it work," Elias said.

He explained that the majority of work force development board members are from the private sector, as is the

chairman, but local elected officials constitute a board charged with oversight, planning, budgeting and allocation of the money.

He noted that Ruidoso led the state by already developing a One-Stop Shop that offers several different work-related services such as job hunting, temporary help while finding a job, unemployment compensation filing and referrals to vocational training programs.

Schwettmann said he was told this may be the last year the federal government will help financially.

Elias said with a new President coming into office, the new Secretary of Labor may scrap funding, "but job training and development will continue. And it will be managed in a question now that none of us can answer."

New editor named by Ruidoso News

Longtime New Mexico newspaper journalist Michael Scanlon has been named editor of the Ruidoso News, Publisher Brad Treptow announced.

Road, allowing the village to collect gross receipts tax on money spent at the complex.

Schwettmann pointed out that according to a breakdown from the treasurer's office, 46.4 percent of the property taxes paid in the county come from unincorporated areas, 45.6 percent from Ruidoso, 4.3 percent

from Ruidoso Downs, 2.2 percent from Capitan 1.2 percent from the county seat of Carrizozo and .3 percent from Corona.

During a report to county commissioners last month, appraiser Paul Baca with Serna's office said 27,764 notices of value were sent out in March compared to 27,495 last year, representing the formation of 209 new pieces of property.

Looking ahead to next year, Baca said appraisers reviewing the county already picked up \$1 million in additional property value since June, mostly in the nonresidential category.

Some of the other items on Serna's summary include that:

- 2,684 square miles of the county lies in private ownership and 1,434 in federal ownership — 811 under the federal Bureau of Land Management

and 623 under the U.S. Forest Service.

- As of May 5, 441 subdivisions existed in the county
- The county contains 11,466 homes and 2,554 manufactured homes and 799 commercial buildings.
- Declared livestock in the county was listed as 29,129 cattle, 197 dairy cattle, 45,060 sheep, 1,135 goats and 984 horses.

was expected to be complete today. "There still will be some barrels this week and some occasionally during November," Adair said.

"We're still working," said Ernest Sanchez, the state highway department's manager for the project. "The Oct. 31 date is

just an anticipated project completion."

He said the highway department has not received a request from Meadow Valley for a full or partial winter suspension. The past two winters partial suspensions were in order because mild weather allowed the contractor to undertake work that was not temperature sensitive.

The road reconstruction projects originally were due for completion this past summer. Meadow Valley has contended poor planning by the state highway department contributed to the delays.

And the Highway Department has criticized Meadow Valley, threatening during the summer to place the contractor in default.

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
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FISHING: Money well spent, says mayor

dosos are purchased by non-residents, who as visitors spend an average of \$132 per day and spend two and a half days in Ruidoso, Shoop pegged visiting anglers as a \$2.31 million boost to the tourism industry.

"I agree it's money well spent," Mayor Robert Donaldson said of the proposed funding. "We'd make the money back."

Receptive councilors agreed to further consider the funding request.

The request to New Mexico Department of Game and Fish for an extension of the Special Trout Waters designation will see Ruidoso as an endorser of the proposal.

Currently 8 of a mile of the Rio Ruidoso, near the Wal-Mart Super Center has the title and stricter fishing regulations. Shoop, along with the Ruidoso River Association, the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, and now the village, are calling for several more miles of the river added as Special Trout Waters.

The upstream boundary for the designation would be at the confluence of Carrizo Creek at the chamber of commerce building to Frieden-

bloom Drive, near Ruidoso's east boundary.

"That particular piece of water represents a golden opportunity for the village to enhance tourism," Shoop said. "Ruidoso is a destination community. One of the reasons tourists come to Ruidoso is for fishing."

The classification would set a bag limit of two trout per day. In addition, anglers would be restricted to using a lure with a single barbless hook and forbidden to use natural bait.

"It would be an absolute travesty to stand here and say all the naturally producing brown trout are all gone," Shoop said. "We're trying to preserve some really pristine waters."

Rio Ruidoso waters upstream and downstream from the Special Trout Waters designation would continue to see anglers allowed five fish per day.

"The number of fishermen has increased substantially," Shoop said. "An extension of the Special Trout Waters and increased stocking would help keep the naturally reproducing brown trout from wiping out."

Council approves \$25,000 boost in tourism promotion

Lodgers tax revenues up substantially, thanks to increase in summer visitors

An increase in summer tourism means Ruidoso has more money to spend on promoting itself to the outside world, village councilors decided Tuesday.

Lodgers tax collections in Ruidoso, though down compared to the year before in January, February and March because of a poor ski season, have rebounded in subsequent months.

"Our lodgers tax receipts are up

fairly substantially" Mayor Robert Donaldson said of August and September.

For the first three months of fiscal year 2000-2001 the rooming tax revenues have brought in nearly \$210,000, nearly 5 percent more than the same period last year.

Through increased revenues from the hotel room tax, Grindstone Graphics and Marketing Services Inc. of Ruidoso, which has the village's current promotional contract, will get the increased funding to do more promotional work.

Ruidoso village councilors Tuesday approved a recommendation from the Ruidoso Lodgers Tax Committee and amended the current contract with Grindstone Graphics to reflect the increased spending.

Grindstone Graphics, in a proposal to the village, detailed how the added funding would be spent.

The \$25,000 boost would break down to \$8,000 in contingency funding, to be earmarked for marketing opportunities that present themselves on a last-minute basis.

As an example, in the event of a

large snowfall, the contingency funds could be used to immediately place radio ads touting the great skiing in Ruidoso.

An Albuquerque Journal Winterfest tab ad would attempt lure skiers that traditionally go north to instead come to Ruidoso. The cost of the ad would be \$1,310.

Three trade or travel shows would capture \$6,000 of the additional budgeting. The shows are the Mexico Travel/Trade Show, Expo Vacaciones, the Texas Consumer Travel Show, and the Tourism Industry of America Mar-

keting Forum.

Additional advertising for group tours would expend another \$5,000. According to a recommendation from Grindstone Graphics, the opportunities found within the group tour market continue to grow.

The funding would be used to expand Ruidoso's presence in a variety of publications targeted at the group tour industry.

The firm stated that efforts at group tours have been very successful and Ruidoso is beginning to see more tour buses.

Children now under government control

To the editor:

Some parents of school children seem to feel they are unable to ask questions of the Region 9 Health Clinics in the schools. They express thoughts of being out of control of what happens to their children in school, especially at the high school level. So I asked questions.

I wish to thank the Ruidoso school administration and Region 9 Health Services for providing me with the following information. Anyone may ask questions of the school administrators, health clinics at the high school and middle school, and the Region 9 offices at 1400 Sudderth Drive, Ruidoso.

In my opinion the following federal and state laws do take away the rights of parents, and give those rights to federal and state government departments of health, educa-

tion and welfare.

New Mexico state laws are posted outside each of the school health clinics: "Parental consent is not required for, and lack thereof shall not bar children from receiving, the following services:

- Pregnancy testing.
- Diagnosis and treatment for sexually transmitted diseases.
- Family planning services.
- Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) testing.

I was told that parents cannot be informed of any of the above health matters pertaining to the children except if the child chooses to inform the parents. Further expansion and explanation of these state laws can be obtained from the Region 9 office.

New Mexico state Law 32A-6-14 also permits students their own consent to consent to mental health counseling.

One part of such expansion of 32A-6-14 follows:
"Any child shall have the right, with or without parental


consent, to consent to and receive individual psychotherapy, group psychotherapy, guidance, counseling or other forms of verbal therapy that do not include any adverse stimuli or substantial deprivations."

Your District 9 health officers and nurses do the best they can to care for the children. They are parents too, and do the best they can with the federal and state laws. The explanation given for this responsibility is that the parents don't take the responsibility, so the government does.

Medicaid funds from the state and federal government have established control of the health and education of your children. Do we really want to give more of our hard-earned taxes to Big Government?

'Relationships' key to mill levy election issue

When you think about healthcare in Lincoln County, think partnerships. These partnerships are the relationships between Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) and Lincoln County residents, county government, physicians, other healthcare professionals and local volunteers. Since opening in 1960, Lincoln County Medical Center's building and scope of services have certainly changed, but our dedication to the people who live here has not changed. Because of these healthy partnerships, everyone in Lincoln County has access to high quality health care at the lowest possible cost.

One of the most important partnerships for the hospital is

with the residents of Lincoln County. Your support is imperative as LCMC continues to grow to meet the communities' needs. Approval of the mill levy is one way you can support LCMC. Funds from the mill levy are used for facility maintenance and capital equipment purchases following approval by the County Commissioners. The mill levy is responsible for enabling the county to have a modern, fully equipped primary care hospital and for insuring that everyone has access to the health care delivery system.

Because of the support of Lincoln County residents and the County Commission, Lincoln County Medical Center has remained county owned and not-for-profit. A local Board of Trustees makes the business decisions that affect local hospital-based health care. As a

not-for-profit hospital, Lincoln County Medical Center is able to keep prices low. The average adjusted charge, per admission, of \$3,768 at LCMC, is well below the New Mexico average of \$5,692.

Maintaining low operating costs keeps high quality health care available to everyone in Lincoln County regardless of their ability to pay. In 1999 alone, LCMC provided over \$1,895,000 of uncompensated care. We are able to provide this charity care thanks to the support of the Sole Community Provider program and the New Mexico Medicaid program; both programs are supported by the Mill Levy.

LCMC is able to provide many medical services that are not found in other communities of our size. Some of the services that are available to our community include:

- General and Plastic Surgery
- Intensive Care
- Chemotherapy
- Medical Imaging (MRI and CAT scans)
- Physical and Occupational Therapy
- Cardiology (pediatric and adult)
- 24-Hour Emergency Care
- OB/GYN
- Orthopedics
- Senior Adult Psychiatric Program

The hospital auxiliary is a key partner. This more than 100-member strong volunteer group has contributed over 230,000 hours of volunteer time and thousands of dollars to LCMC since 1992. They

Probation sentence for two Cree Fire juveniles

Two of three Ruidoso juveniles who admitted being present at the origin of the Cree Fire, have been sentenced to two years probation. Lori Brown, 17, and Rachel Morgan, 16, are also obligated to perform community service, said David Ceballes, the assistant district attorney handling the cases. The two appeared at an Oct. 24 children's court disposition hearing before Judge Karen Parsons. In September, Brown admitted to two allegations of intentionally making a false report to police and concealing her true identity in connection with a call to 911 about the start of the fire last May. Morgan

also had admitted to possession of less than one ounce of marijuana. A third juvenile, William Smith, 17, is accused of negligent arson and making a false report to police. Smith is tentatively scheduled for a juvenile court trial in early 2001, Ceballes said. A fourth person, convicted this past summer of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, had been placed on 18 months of supervised probation and ordered to perform community service. Joseph Martin, 21, had entered a no contest plea to failing to stop Smith's alleged negligence that triggered the fire. A second count of contributing to the delinquency, for supplying marijuana to one of the teens, was dismissed.

Smith last week asked the district court for a transfer of probation from New Mexico to another state. Judge Karen Parsons denied the request, saying she wanted to see proof of substantial compliance with the terms of Smith's probation, Ceballes said. Police interviews of the suspects in late May indicated the four young people had gone to a cave on Lincoln National Forest land immediately east of Ruidoso on May 7. Marijuana was reported to have been used by two of the four, Smith allegedly admitted setting a branch on fire for illumination inside the cavern. He was accused of later tossing the branch on the ground outside the cave. When the

group later left the cave, flames had spread to two trees and to ground cover. The four told police they fled, and later called 911 to report the fire. By that time firefighting crews were already at the location. The Cree Fire went on to burn more than 8,000 acres of federal, state, and private lands. The blaze destroyed three buildings, routed hundreds of residents from their homes for as long as four days, and brought as many as 1,100 firefighting crew members and supervisors into the suppression effort that lasted three weeks. The final cost of extinguishing the fire and post-fire rehabilitation work has been estimated at \$6 million, according to a federal report.

Byway gets more funding

Federal funding is on the way to improve and promote the Billy the Kid National Scenic Byway in Lincoln County. "We've been really lucky," said Bill Hirschfeld, chairman of the Billy the Kid National Scenic Byway committee. "But we're not done. As long as there's money out there we'll go for it."

Hirschfeld estimated that grant funding for the Billy the Kid byway is approaching the \$1.5 million level.

The newest funding will provide \$50,000 for historic restorations in Lincoln, interpretative kiosks and restroom facilities for the Capitan Trailhead near Fort Stanton. Another \$25,000 will be used to update and implement a corridor management plan, Hirschfeld said.

U.S. Senator Jeff Bingaman, D-N.M., said the grant awards will allow communities to promote scenic byway resources.

"Tourism is the economic bedrock of many New Mexico communities," Bingaman said in a news release.

In addition, \$252,000 has been awarded to fund a statewide promotional campaign for national scenic byways. The Billy the Kid National Scenic Byway is one of four so designated in New Mexico. The others are El Camino Real, Jemez Mountain Trail, and the Santa Fe Trail.

Hirschfeld returned from a state tourism convention in Santa Fe Tuesday with the word on the latest funding. He said a state-national scenic byways group and the New Mexico Department of Tourism will meet in January to review plans for the promotional efforts.


A \$96,120 New Mexico scenic byways economic impact study was also funded. The study will provide information to local decision-makers about the economic impact of byways.

Release possible for Vicente Montes as early as next year, attorney believes

Concurrent sentences open the possibility for imprisoned county man

Vicente Montes, sentenced to two concurrent 10-year prison terms for armed robbery and manslaughter in different incidents, could be released late next year, his attorney said Monday.

Montes, son of former Lincoln County commissioner Monroy Montes, asked the 12th Judicial District Court to grant him credit for 25 months and 26 days covering the time between his arrest Nov. 26, 1996 and his sentencing on armed robbery, Feb. 20, 1998.

Judge Karen Parsons granted 14 months and 24 days, according to information from

the district attorney's office in Carrizozo.

Montes, then 20, was sentenced in 1998 after pleading no contest to armed robbery and conspiracy. The sentence carried a mandatory two years of parole.

Montes was charged with robbing Ruidoso's First Savings Bank on Nov. 4, 1996.

The sentencing resulted from a plea bargain. Parsons gave Montes nine years for second-degree felony armed robbery, enhanced by one year for the use of a firearm, to run consecutively. He was sentenced to three years for conspiracy, a third-degree felony, that was to

run concurrently with his other sentence.

At the same time, Montes was facing a murder charge in connection with a traffic confrontation shooting in Albuquerque on Nov. 19, 1996.

A 19-year-old kick-boxing champion, Brian Salazar, died in that incident.

Montes pleaded no contest to manslaughter and was given another concurrent sentence. With time off for good behavior and credit for time served while waiting for sentencing, most prisoners in New Mexico serve less than half of their actual sentences.

Property division OKd

CARRIZOZO — Two minor property divisions have been approved by the Lincoln County Commission.

Bruce Jeffers of Glendale, Ariz., requested that 15 acres of his land be divided into five lots.

The property, near the top of Angus Hill, is a half mile off the main road and is accessed by an existing 50-foot private road, said surveyor Tim Collins.

Covenants attached to the land

specify the lots are not to be redivided and that the lot owners are responsible for the maintenance of the road, he said.

Each tract is served by a 50-foot-wide easement.

County attorney Alan Morel said the county does not enforce land covenants.

If no restrictions are placed by the county on future division of the land, it will be up to neighbors to sue in court, if someone tries to vio-

late the covenants.

Barbara Burrell of Ruidoso asked to divide six acres along Sierra Blanca Airport Road into three lots, the smallest about one acre.

Approval was contingent on a 50-foot easement being granted to match county standards.

Collins had proposed 25 feet.

Collins, representing Burrell, pointed out that land covenant restrictions prohibit the property from being divided again.

Firefighters a concern

Commissioner Leo Martinez says he's worried about the potential harm to volunteer firefighters who may be first to respond to an accident involving hazardous material.

Martinez said firefighters without gear shouldn't be the first on scene. He suggested county emergency management officials meet with the state police to set up a protocol on handling incidents similar to a truck that overturned off U.S. 70 recently.

The truck was carrying nonhazardous waste water, but emergency service representatives weren't sure at first.

He said better communication also is needed.

Drivers in Tularosa were routed through Carrizozo and into Ruidoso, because of incorrect information about the site of the accident. Once they arrived in Ruidoso, they were stopped for hours at the Wal-Mart parking lot, he said.

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Glencoe VFD gets more radio gear

The Agua Fria substation of the department was cleaned up and the older engine

stored there now is operational, Stewart said.

Fifteen new members have joined, more equipment has been ordered and a report has been sent to the Fire Marshal, he said.

More bunker gear is needed, but Stewart said he would check first with the Fort Stanton volunteer fire department, which has extra gear since the women's prison there shut down.

Commissioners approved buying 12 more radios for \$6,690 under emergency purchasing provisions that require telephone quotes, but not advertising for written bids.


Mail box damaged



CAPITAN - Fourth- and fifth-grade students here Friday voted in a presidential election on an official voting booth set up in a hallway.

Martha Proctor, Lincoln County clerk, said she was "very much impressed with the conversation" she'd had with the children about election issues.

"They're very opinionated," Proctor said. "They knew who they were voting for. They're very much aware."

Sydney Tregimbo, the teacher of the combined fourth- and fifth-grade class, said the students had been working on a big unit on the Nov. 7 presidential election. They also had a presidential scavenger hunt, searching newspaper articles and polls so they would know who to vote for, she said.

"On the issues, they think a lot deeper at this age than we did way back when," Tregimbo said.

Fifth-grader Aleah Topper politely discussed the two main candidates.

"I don't want to be mean or anything, but George Bush ... shouldn't be president because he's against women's rights and he's just weird," she said. Aleah said she would vote for Gore "because he's for women's rights and he likes tax cuts and keeps on the subject and wants to take guns away from kids."

Jayna Johns, also fifth grade, said she's voting for Bush although she hasn't heard much about him.

"But I've heard that Gore wants to rely on third-class countries ... to get our food through," she said. "And my brother and sister are hunters and Gore wants to take the hunting age to 18 and I don't think that's right."

Dylan Jasinsky voted for Bush

because "Gore is a Democrat and Bush is a Republican and I trust him."

Paul Bailey, fifth grade, said he'd vote for Bush "because Gore said on TV that he invented the Internet. That's it."

Ralph Nader received a few votes from this class, despite being locked out of public debates.

"I just think we should start with something new," said Samantha Sparks, a fourth-grade student who voted for Nader. "I've heard in history we start new things and I think we should start more new things."

Beyond the novelty, though, Samantha backed up her vote by saying she's "heard stories about how (Nader's) thinking about doing things we might like ... Not going against

women's rights like Bush has been (doing)."

Jessica Shaver, fifth grade, said she's voting for Nader "because Bush and Gore are using those dirty tricks at each other."

Ryan Jackson, fifth grade, said he believes Bush is the best candidate. Why?

"Some of his ideas," Ryan said. "I forgot most of them."

A few students expressed their opinions on local and state issues.

Kennan Brophy, fifth grade, said he'd vote for Raymond Merritt for sheriff because he met him "and he seems like a really nice person and I also think people who have already been sheriff should be elected."

Samantha Sparks had an opinion on the hospital mill levy, saying she thinks it's "really important. We should be able to have those things."

Aleah Topper spoke up another issue on the ballot this year: "I'm voting that Bernalillo and Albuquerque don't become the same city," she said. "Too many people and over-population" was her reason.

"I have a very opinionated class and they're not afraid to speak up," Tregimbo said. "Something happens when you allow them the freedom and the respect. They take it. It's a give and take thing."

Of nine students polled in the classroom while others were in line at the voting booth in the hall, five said they were voting differently from their parents and four said they were voting the same way their parents intended to vote.



On Nov. 7, voters will vote for the president and vice president of the United States.


The candidates for president and vice president from each party run as a team. They are on the same "ticket."


The winning ticket in each state wins all of that state's electoral votes. This is called "winner takes all."

The Electoral College

The Electoral College method of electing our president was set up by the Constitution more than 200 years ago. The writers had a hard time deciding just how our president and vice president were to be chosen.

Voting is the most important thing a citizen can do to help elect our president.

But there is another step after citizens vote. It is called the Electoral College.

This is not a college with a campus and students. Another meaning for "college" is a group that meets and has special duties.

The Electoral College has the duty to elect the president of the United States. The vote is based on how the people in each state voted.

Electoral votes

We elect our president and vice president by what we call "electoral votes." There are a total of 538 of these votes. This number is based on the total number of members of Congress.

Senators 100
Representatives 435
From the District of Columbia ... 3

Each state is allotted a number of electoral votes equal to the number of members it has in the U.S. Congress. For example: South Dakota has two senators and one representative, so it will have a total of three electoral votes.

The political party in each state nominates a set of electors equal to the state's number of members of Congress.

IF A STATE HAS THREE PEOPLE IN CONGRESS, IT WOULD HAVE:

- three Republican electors, who would be expected to vote for the Republican ticket.
- three Democratic electors, who would be expected to vote for the Democratic ticket.

South Dakota

WE LOST THE STATE ... WE HAD ONLY 200,000 VOTES.

WE WON THE STATE ... WE HAD 800,000 VOTES.

We will all know who the winner is on the night of Nov. 7 by counting the electoral votes. However, there are other steps to make it official.

In December, the winning electors, or special voters from each state, meet in their state capitals and cast their votes.

These electoral votes are put into sealed envelopes and sent to the president of the U.S. Senate. On Jan. 6, he opens the envelopes. He reads the results before a meeting of the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives.

If there is a tie, or no one gets as many as 270 votes, the House of Representatives must decide who will be president. Each state has only one vote.

This has happened only twice in our country's history.

All proceeds go to the spay and neuter fund that benefits owners of animals, even if the pets were not adopted from the shelter. Making it easy to spay and neuter pets is a commitment of the society goal of ending the cycle of unwanted lit-

Beginning Nov. 15, free spay and neuter vouchers will be issued at the shelter office during business hours.


Last year, the society spayed and neutered 341 animals. This year, the number of vouchers is limited and will be available on a first-come, first-serve basis.

To give a taste of what the new after-school program might be about, a local blues band, The Main Street Moan, entertained for two hours in the Ruidoso Middle School parking lot on Monday.

The after-school program offers seventh- and eighth-grade students a chance to participate in athletics, arts and crafts, drama, dance, music and other activities while learning valuable life skills, said one of the organizers, Wanda Gielow de Figueroa, PMS-Community Health Services administrator.

The pilot program, funded by the

Department of Health through PMS-Community Health Services, the DWI Council, and the Counseling Center, provides services for 60 fifth- and sixth-graders and 60 seventh- and eighth-graders. As of yesterday afternoon, there were only 20 vacancies in the younger group and 45 in the older group.

Enrollment is open until the slots are filled.

Youth supervisors for each age group and six others were hired to teach various skills to the youth, and mentors are sought from the community to teach their own skills — such as arts and sports — one afternoon a week, said Gielow de Figueroa. Parents must sign up their children

and make a commitment to attend a monthly parent forum or alternative activity to reinforce the life-skills training provided to children after school.

Greg Kolpacka, youth supervisor for grades seven and eight, said the band members who entertained on Monday are friends of his who wanted to help encourage the students to sign up for the program.

"We had about a three-fold increase (in enrollment) after yesterday's performance," Kolpacka said on Tuesday.

'Chocaholics' have something in common with other '-holics'; it's in the compounds

MADRID - A Spanish researcher has a new clue to what motivates "chocoholic" - a group of chemicals that might contribute to the good feelings associated with binging on the tasty treat. The finding is reported in the current (Oct. 16) issue of the Journal of Agricultural and Food Chemistry, a monthly peer-reviewed journal of the American Chemical Society, the world's largest scientific society.

The researchers are the first to find that ordinary cocoa and chocolate bars contain a group of alkaloids known as tetrahydro-beta-carbolines, according to Tomas Herraiz, a researcher at the Spanish Council for Scientific Research in Madrid, Spain.

In previous research, the same chemicals were linked to alcoholism, he said. The family of compounds, which are also known as neuroactive alkaloids, continues to be investigated for possible influences on mood and behavior.

The same chemicals discovered in chocolate are found in wine, beer and liquor, though no connection has been established between compulsive drinking and food addiction, Herraiz said. The combination of the newfound compounds and other chemicals in choco-

late could help explain chocolate cravings, he said.

Unique properties of chocolate - including its combination of sugar, fat and flavors - are believed to contribute to its appeal. Some go so far as to call chocolate an addictive food. Scientists cannot explain cravings for the so-called "food of the Gods," nor determine whether it exists.

"Finding these active substances, combined with the known pleasurable effects of eating chocolate, may complete the whole picture of chocolate craving," Herraiz said.

Up to seven micrograms of the compounds were found per gram of chocolate, Herraiz

said. The compounds are found in low concentrations in chocolate and are also found in foods that are not addictive. This suggests that they alone may not be responsible for chocolate cravings, he noted.

"Other active substances in chocolate, like caffeine and magnesium, are often suggested as potential contributors to craving," Herraiz said. "Now we can enlarge this list to include [these compounds]."

Higher levels of the compounds seem to correlate with the amount of cocoa in a sample, he reported. The darker the chocolate, the more of the compounds it contains, the researchers found.
