




ACCUWEATHER SEVEN DAY FORECAST FOR RUIDOSO



L.C. SCRAPBOOK

A glimpse into Lincoln County's past, compiled from county newspapers by Paul F. Chavez. White Oaks Eagle December 6, 1900. L.W. Smith, who is opening a marble house in El Paso in the city, and will remain here for several days during which time he will make a thorough examination of Lone Mountain, about 2 to 3 miles northeast of White Oaks.

The quarries are 5 to 8 miles from Carrizozo station on the El Paso & Northeastern and may be put aboard the cars at that place at a very reasonable expense. The marble and stone quarries of White Oaks will be worth as much to us sometime in the future as our famous gold and coal veins, and their development and exploitation should proceed without delay. White Oaks should shake off the moss and immediately get down to business.

with 499 individual domestic wells that the state must approve for an annual individual consumption of three acre feet of water or about one million gallons. Subsequently, some of those lots also may be divided, increasing the impact, he said. Under the proposal from the planning commission, any subsequent lot split requires a water system for the entire subdivision. "What we're trying to fix is that we have a situation now where people file for a type three or type five subdivision and almost immediately after approval, there are lot splits of those again," Morel said. "The idea is to let the developer know up front that if he goes over 50 lots, he will need a community water system. If he wants to retain the ability to

split lots or allow buyers to, he must provide a community water system up front."
Type three subdivisions consist of two to 24 lots with some containing fewer than 10 acres. Type five subdivisions are from two to 24 lots, but all are 10 acres or more.
The other three types of subdivisions covered in the county ordinance require planning commission review and county commission approval. Subdivisions starting with more than 24 lots require state review and most developers try to avoid that, Morel said.
"We need to make sure the infrastructure is there to serve if the lots are to be split again," he said. The smaller the lot sizes, the greater the density and the associated demand for services and water, he added.
Mark Mobley, one of several Realtors in the audience, said with tracts of five acres or

less, a more efficient approach could be to split the cost of drilling one large well to serve several homes.
Subdivisions of 25 lots or more, a size requiring a state study of available water, are the logical starting point for requiring a central water system, Mobley asked. The developer could include the expense in the cost of the lots.
The buyer will either pay then or later, if an individual well is drilled.
Harvey Foster, president of the Multiple Listing Service, suggested instead of going with 25 separate wells, the State Engineer's office should allow that amount of water usage to be dedicated to a central water system so that a developer doesn't have to go outside of the area to buy water rights.
Rose Peebles, representing the Ruidoso Board of Realtors, said the county still has no fac-

tual information on water availability in the county and when a community water system would be economically feasible.
"What's good for Ruidoso may not be sufficient for Carrizozo or Corona," she said, adding that if more costs are tacked onto the price of lots, nothing will be available for the working class, yet they provide services essential for a community.
Chris Denne, chief of the Bonito Volunteer Fire Department, reminded commissioners that when reviewing water plans for a new subdivision, access to water for fire fighting should be considered.
"One of the major subdivisions in this county doesn't have water for us to protect it," he said. "I think safety should be government's first concern so I applaud your effort for community water systems."

POLICE: Narcotics task force turns down village request for money

Ruidoso Police Department made no mention of asset sharing with the department. A separate December 1997 memorandum of asset forfeiture sharing agreement only spelled out the 12 percent cut to the 12th Judicial District Attorney's office for legal services on narcotics forfeiture cases.
The first sizable deposit in the account in recent history occurred this past summer, when a judge found an estimated \$132,000 found in a vehicle suspected of being used to traffic

narcotics would be turned over to the account. The bust happened in March. The Ruidoso Police Department withdrew from the LCNEU in May after Maddox complained his department was never given an accounting of the fund. Maddox said Ruidoso had, for six years, provided the task force with a full-time village officer at an accumulated cost of \$180,000 and only received \$15,000 in asset sharing during the period.
A new joint powers agreement, governing the LCNEU was signed on Sept. 29, involving four agencies.

Task force members are the 12th Judicial District Attorney's office, with District Attorney Scot Key chairman of the LCNEU board, the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, the Ruidoso Downs Police Department and a Mesquero agency. Ruidoso Downs Police Department and the Mesquero agency are new participants.
The agreement names Ruidoso as member, but the police department has not signed on.
In a Nov. 20 letter to the enforcement unit Maddox said there are several concerns that needed to be addressed before

his department signed the agreement. One of the issues raised by Maddox was "equitable sharing." The Ruidoso police chief said the purchase of two police vehicles for his department was requested "from the asset sharing fund acquired during our six years of 50/50 participation."
The new accord makes no mention of forfeited property disbursement, but does say such assets shall be distributed or expended only on approval by the board of directors. Maddox said his department will not return to the regional task force.

other such activities will not be curtailed by this rule."
Martinez said management efforts to reduce catastrophic fire conditions and for fire suppression will not be changed.
The Final Environmental Impact Statement was released to the public on Nov. 13. A final rule is expected by late December.
J. Zane Walley of Lincoln, an outspoken opponent of the

roadless initiative at a public hearing a year ago, said he had not yet seen the FEIS. He said he would be curious to see if any of the public input from two Lincoln National Forest hearings in December of 1999 had an impact on the earlier proposal. Walley said at the Ruidoso public hearing only one person spoke in favor of the roadless initiative, and at a Cloudercroft hearing no one backed the idea. Some opponents claimed the roadless ini-

tiative would be a precursor to more wilderness designations, further limiting access and activities.
Inventoried roadless areas comprise about 31 percent of all National Forest System lands. On the Smokey Bear District of the Lincoln National Forest, 49,848 of the district's 365,000 acres are classified as roadless.
The Preferred Alternative is identified and analyzed in the FEIS. In summary the

Prohibit road construction, road reconstruction, and timber harvesting except for stewardship purposes in roadless areas. Road construction and reconstruction needed for road safety improvements could occur in roadless areas.
Stewardship initiatives, said Jerry Hawkes, district ranger in Ruidoso, would address forest health, watershed issues and habitat needs.

## Spirit, mission help woman face challenges

Betty Edmondson faced two major challenges in her life this year.

With the help of more than 20 other members of the First Christian Church on Hull Road, she tackled the assignment of creating 200 Chrismon ornaments and of tracking down the history, meaning and patterns for the special gold and white decorations.

Not too long after starting that project, she was diagnosed with a rare form of cancer and spent seven weeks undergoing radiation therapy in Albuquerque.

She returned in time to restart the ornament-making sessions. The beaded, braided and sequined decorations now shine from a Christmas tree in the church

sanctuary.

The Chrismon Tree concept portraying Christian symbols was conceived by Frances Spencer, who gave the rights to the ornament patterns to the Lutheran Church of the Ascension in Danville, Va. in 1957.

Her only admonition was that "Chrismons" never be created for profit.

"From that beginning, the idea has spread to Christians all over the world," Edmondson said during a program at the church last week.

Chrismon is a combination of two words: Christ and monogram. Chrismons are the symbols of Christ dating back to the early church. They're found on the walls of Roman catacombs, on jewelry and utensils from excavations in Palestine. Persecuted Christians used them to identify

themselves to one another, according to assorted reference works.

Edmondson said the evergreen, symbolizing eternal life, is the background for small white lights and the white and gold Chrismons.

"The lights speak of Him who is the Light of the world," Edmondson said. "The white of the ornaments represents God's purity and the gold, His majesty and glory."

The women of the church spent more than 700 hours making the ornaments of 16 different symbols, including an angel, an anchor, the butterfly as a symbol of resurrection and eternal life, candles standing for Jesus as the light of the world, the chalice as Christ's new covenant, the Celtic cross recalling God's eternal love and the Triangle symbolizing the Christ-ian trinity.

## County postpones action on seeking proposals for clinic services

Action was postponed Thursday on a request to advertise for proposals to provide services at two Lincoln County health clinics.

County Commissioners agreed to table the request from County Manager Tom Stewart until they have clarification on the status of the Hondo Health Clinic.

Stewart was responding to an Attorney General's opinion that competitive bidding is required in awarding management contracts.

County Attorney Alan Morel for the past year worked with the general counsel for the state Department of Finance and Administration on a special arrangement for the Hondo Clinic. But last week, he received a letter from a new

attorney for that department rejecting the previous agreements.

"Maybe it's premature to go out for proposals on the other clinics, in light of this letter," Stewart said of the clinics in Carrizozo and Corona.

Commissioner Leo Martinez agreed, saying that on the agenda for the next commission meeting, he asked for a discussion of seeking proposals

for hospital management. The county should comply with an attorney general's opinion about the need for competitive bidding on management contracts and for lease of the county hospital in Ruidoso for fair market value, he said.

"I see the benefit of doing both at the same time, because the firm managing the hospital might be in a better position for the clinics," Martinez said.

## County delays speed decision

To allow residents of Gaviilan Canyon a chance to offer their opinions about speed limits on the thoroughfare, Lincoln County Commissioners Thursday postponed action on approving a 35 mph speed.

Based on a state transportation study, County Manager Tom Stewart recommended sticking with the new 35 mph signs put up without

approval by the county road department last month.

The only exception would be a 20 mph limit at the flashing speed lights stationed at the both ends of a ball field, he said.

But Commissioner Rick Simpson asked to delay a vote until the commission's regular December meeting to allow residents some input.

## Lawyering and administering

Lawyers, of course, are purveyors of argument in support of clients. Lincoln County's lawyer, Alan Morel, now finds himself undone by a new lawyer in the state Department of Finance and Administration over the issue of the recently dedicated health clinic in Hondo.

That new counsel for DFA, Morel found, has thrown out practically everything formerly approved by DFA in establishing the health clinic — joint powers agreement, lease agreement, sole source provider of services.

As Morel says, "It's an absolute reversal."

All of which reminds us of what has been happening in Florida over the past three weeks — a reversal of fortune for George W. Bush, for Al Gore ... back and forth.

A pretty good argument can be made that in Florida, lawyer judgment has replaced canvassing board judgment in determining the Presidency. But that is the price we pay for living under rule of law, not men.

And the people of the Hondo Valley, who merely have been hoping for a community health clinic, are getting an up-close, personal view of that rule right now.

May they and the nation survive.

#### Fire and water

To the editor:

When I moved to this village eight years ago everybody was talking about the possible disaster a forest fire could do. I have suffered three different city councils and all that has been done is TALK. The subject of water has also been a continuous topic. It is amazing to me that the two items have not been connected but to me they are Siamese twins.

All trees need water to grow — little water, dry trees, high fire danger. We require someone on the city council that has the intestinal fortitude to bring to fruition an act that limits the trees on all property, for all time and not some poorly conceived commercial tree coverage schedule, that was passed as a placebo, to satisfy those of us who think that YOUR trees are a danger to the entire village.

I believe an ordinance (is needed) that specifies distance for tree to tree depending upon diameter or circumference of the tree trunk, at a specific distance from the ground.

Example: Three inches or less, two foot spacing; three inches to eight inches, ten foot spacing; above eight inches, 20 foot spacing.

This example is for ponderosa pine. It allows for crown growth and preserves open spaces for deer and critters.

Spruce, poplars, aspen would require similar tables, but an intermix of trees would be governed by the spacing that affords the greatest spacing.

You may have noticed that I have not mentioned Chinese elm trees. This variety is the most prolific, self-seeding, water-thirsty, power-line destroying, sewer-invading pest that exists throughout the village.

A simple ordinance stating that this tree may not be grown within village limits would raise our water table and we would see our small streams begin flowing again, and the return of some of our wildlife that require some flowing water to survive.

Near the end of the hard-fought presidential campaign, Vice-President Al Gore accused Governor George W. Bush of not being committed to stopping the Earth's rising temperature. Of all the charges traded back and forth, this had to be the most novel. Politicians used to make more modest pledges like promising "a chicken in every pot." They didn't promise cooler temperatures.

While the election was still in dispute, a conference at The Hague was to settle on a plan to deal with global warming ended without agreement. One of the issues it faltered on was whether nations should be credited for the carbon dioxide soaked up by agricultural croplands and forests. The United States, a big country with a lot of land in farming, would benefit

from a favorable interpretation. The European Union and other countries argued against it.

American Farm Bureau Federation government relations specialist Jon Doggett attended the conference as an observer. Doggett believes the Kyoto Protocol to reduce greenhouse gas emissions is dead. It was signed by President Clinton in 1999, but was never submitted to the Senate for ratification.

Doggett doubts it could ever pass. The purpose of the meeting at The Hague was to clarify rules and guidelines in the treaty, and make it more acceptable.

The issue of climate change and what to do about it, however, is far from dead. International organizations and U.S. environmental groups are continuing the pressure to do something, and there are tentative plans for a conference next year in Bonn

to pick up the pieces from the one just ended.

U.S. agriculture's stake in all this is important. While farmers might reap some rewards from sequestering carbon in soil, Doggett points out that agriculture is a net emitter of greenhouse gases. A recent study at Michigan State University made the same point. Carbon dioxide is the most notable greenhouse gas and certain crops and no-till farming help to absorb it. But, the researchers at Michigan State found small amounts of other gases produced by farming have more "gross warming potential."

Even without a climate change agreement, progress will be made on global warming issues. For agriculture, this means better application of fertilizer to reduce the amount of nitrous oxide in the atmosphere. Many businesses and utilities also are making plans. Doggett thinks new

technology and preventive measures may accomplish what's needed, and we won't have to resort to drastic curbs on energy use and other economic activity.

The news media will make sure this issue doesn't die, simply because there are new studies and predictions almost daily. Some of the public attention may be predicated on the weather itself. A normal winter may ease some of the fears. And there is another factor, according to the British Medical Journal. Researchers who analyzed climate and death statistics for people between the ages of 65 and 74 found there are 10 times more deaths related to cold than to heat. They concluded a little global warming isn't so bad.

# Crowd packs county meeting in Ruidoso

Advocates of conducting some Lincoln County Commission monthly meetings in Ruidoso were pleased Thursday with the heavy turnout for a special meeting at the convention center.

But near the end of the session, two incidents nearly killed their point.

County Treasurer Joan Park was questioned about how she calculated interest owed by Presbyterian Healthcare Services on money the county would have retained if it had not been billed twice for the same piece of equipment several years ago.

According to documentation Park submitted to the commission last month, the interest worked out to 2.74 percent over 30 months. Based on the opinion of county auditors, because the original money was deducted from the special property tax fund established to provide support for the county-owned hospital managed by Presbyterian and three county health clinics, the interest will be returned there.

Commissioner William Schwettmann wasted no time in pointing out that because the meeting was in Ruidoso and not the county seat of Carrizozo, where all regular meetings now are conducted, Park couldn't easily access her records to answer the question.

Commissioners who disagree with scheduling regular meetings in Ruidoso often cite the lack of access to records as a major problem.

Then near the end of the meeting, Commissioner Leo Martinez, who has pushed for more meetings in Ruidoso, the

population center of the county, said he was upset to learn that the county was charged \$75 to use the convention center.

Charles Rennick, assistant village attorney, said the charge was a mistake.

Contacted Tuesday, Mayor Robert Donaldson concurred.

"The convention center belongs to the village," he said. "We set the pricing and the policies. It was a mistake that Tom (Stewart) received a bill."

He explained that a Hawthorn Suites Golf and Convention Resort sales person books events and therefore, the center may not be available at times for county meetings, but village hall would be another free option.

"It's up to us to determine if the fee should be waived, which we will do when we think a government meeting is in the best interests of the village," Donaldson said.

At the Thursday commission meeting, former Ruidoso village council member Al Junge suggested commissioners conduct two regular meetings a month. On the second Thursday, the meeting would be from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in Carrizozo and on the fourth Thursday, from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m.

That schedule would give people a chance to attend during the day or evening and bring government closer to the largest population in the county, he said. But it would require that a time limit be applied to people who speak on agenda items to ensure the sessions only last four hours each, Junge said.

"Some time, you'll do this," he told Chairman Rex Wilson. "If you do it now, it will be a feather in your cap."

## MAGISTRATE COURT

The following cases were recently adjudicated in Lincoln County Magistrate Court at Ruidoso, with Judge William R. Butts or Judge Gerald Dean presiding.

John A. Sanchez, 35, Ruidoso, entered a no contest plea and was found guilty of battery against a household member, a petty misdemeanor. Sanchez was sentenced to 30 days in jail, 30 days probation, required to make restitution to the victim for any medical expenses, and ordered to pay \$51 in court fees.

Robert T. Huston, no age provided, Austin, Texas, through a plea agreement, entered a plea of guilty to second offense driving while intoxicated and improper lane usage. A count of third offense DWI was dismissed by the prosecutor. Huston was placed on probation for 354 days, ordered to perform 48 hours of community service, and pay \$510 in fines and costs.

Tracy L. Slayten, 37, Ruidoso, pleaded no contest and was convicted of DWI - second offense, aggravated and driving with a revoked license. Slayten was sentenced to 14 days in jail, placed on probation for 714 days, ordered to

perform 48 hours of community service, and assessed fines and costs of \$1,028.

Vernon G. Wright, 33, Ruidoso Downs, pleaded guilty to counts of DWI, careless driving, driving while license suspended, possession of less than one ounce of marijuana and possession of a controlled substance. Wright was sentenced to four consecutive weekends at the Lincoln County Detention Center, 722 days probation, and required to pay \$1,039 in fines and costs.

Silverio Candelaria, 53, Ruidoso, pleaded guilty to charges of driving with a suspended license, concealing identity, a registration violation and contempt of court for failure to appear. Candelaria was placed on probation for 364 days and assessed fines and costs of \$610.

Mitchell Corn, 23, Roswell, through a plea agreement, was convicted of two counts of misdemeanor attempt to issue a worthless check over \$25. Two felony counts of worthless checks were dismissed by the prosecutor.

During sentencing Corn was credited for 64 days already spent in jail, was

placed on probation for 664 days, ordered to make restitution and assessed fees and charges of \$171.

Emilio Renden Ramirez, 38, Ruidoso, through a plea agreement, was found guilty of misdemeanor attempt to commit perjury. A charge of felony perjury was dismissed. Ramirez was sentenced to 90 days in the Lincoln County Detention Center, put on probation for 274 days, and assessed court costs of \$51.

Danny Joe Howard, 50, Ruidoso Downs, through a plea agreement, was convicted of receiving stolen property over \$100 but less than \$250 (a goat), a misdemeanor. A charge of felony larceny of livestock was dismissed by an assistant district attorney. Howard was placed on probation for 364 days and assessed court fees of \$51.

Amanda Clayton, 20, Ruidoso Downs, pleaded no contest and was found guilty of allowing a dog to run at large, a petty misdemeanor. Clayton was placed on probation for 182 days, ordered to relinquish ownership of the dog to

the Lincoln County Humane Society because of a child being bitten, required to pay any medical bills incurred as a result of the dog bite, and assessed \$101 in fines and costs.

Pauline Saenz, 18, Ruidoso Downs, pleaded guilty to a charge of being a minor consuming or possessing alcohol. Saenz received 364 days probation, required to perform 30 hours of community service and ordered to pay \$151 in fines and fees.

Paul Zinn, 25, San Patricio, pleaded guilty to counts of violating probation, possession of less than an ounce of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Zinn was sentenced to two weekends in jail, had probation extended until July 23, 2001 and assessed \$332 in fines and costs.

Richard Dale Kunze, 40, Ruidoso Downs, pleaded guilty to a charge of battery against a household member, a petty misdemeanor. Kunze was ordered incarcerated until extradited to Oklahoma on a fugitive warrant.

# Palo Verde road work aired

Seventeen years after residents say the work initially was scheduled, the Lincoln County Commission is trying to widen and improve roads in the Palo Verde Slopes subdivision east of Ruidoso Downs.

"Our road department is grading the roads now and in April will work on Mesa Loop and Arrowhead Drive as a state cooperative project, widening and chip sealing (an oil and rock surfacing application)," County Manager Tom Stewart told commissioners Thursday.

"The roads have long been in need of improvement. In one bad area, widening it will require removing culverts. What we're doing now is a stop gap measure to make sure school buses can get through."

Palo Verde resident Dewey Keller told commissioners about a school bus driver who let children out at the top of a hill on a snowy day because the bus might not have been able to navigate the road with another

vehicle coming up. The children were attacked by dogs, he said, emphasizing the need for road improvements for the safety of school children in the area.

The developer had provided 50-foot easements along the roads and the county won't have to obtain the right to work on land adjoining the road, Commissioner Leo Martinez said.

One resident said people in the community were told in the middle 1980s that the work would be paid for with a front-foot road assessment collected since 1967. The assessment was eliminated several years ago by commissioners when they found out that it was to apply to extraordinary work and that money collected in a specific area had to be expended there.

The resident said since county equipment started working in the area, more problems have surfaced and he's worried about flooding. He and several other residents also questioned why the county is widening on the east side of the road where 18-inch culverts were installed according to county specifica-

tion, instead of the west side where culverts of varying sizes were haphazardly done at angles and are ineffective.

"In any case, you have more than enough property to straighten it out," the resident said.

"We don't want to spend \$50,000 on a road and do it wrong," Martinez agreed.

Commissioner Rick Simpson said the subdivision's road problems were discussed when he previously served on the commission 10 years ago, "but we didn't get it done. Time ran out."

Drainage problems were never solved, he said.

"Any time it rains, there's a large flow and the ditches silt in. The road crew has been out there three times this season. I suggest while they're working on the roads, they look into concrete ditches in key areas to carry the water," Simpson said.

The commissioner said he will confer with county road manager Albert Hernandez to come up with some figures by the commission's Dec. 21 meeting.

# USFS, county to upgrade two roads

An agreement between the U. S. Forest Service and the Lincoln County Commission will pave the way for improvements to two roads in the Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest.

Commissioners approved the joint project Thursday during a special meeting.

FR 131 begins at New Mexico Highway 37 north of FR 488, also known as County Road 017, and runs for about 5.52 miles to the Loma Grande Ranch.

The work will include placement of a sub-base material on the first 1.52 miles because the road has a clay base that when wet, is slick and makes it difficult to control vehicles, County Manager Tom Stewart said. The material will help stabilize the roadbed.

Three culverts will be installed by the

Forest Service to drain water from the road sides.

The second road is FR 105, also known as CR 013, beginning at NM 37 at the top of Nogal Hill and running north for about 5.78 miles to the junction with U.S. 380. Because the road has the same clay-related problems, a sub-base material will be applied.

The Forest Service will buy the material for about \$4,000, will provide and install the culverts and a steel wheel grid for compaction of material, and will obtain the required biological and cultural clearances. The county will provide equipment and labor to load, haul, dump, spread and roll the material, will provide a dump truck for hauling back fill material for the culverts and will provide traffic control and signing.

## DOWN POLICE

### Officer injured in chase

A Ruidoso Downs police officer was injured, after going down a 60-foot-high cliff with a suspect he had been chasing.

Officer Kelly J. Calicoat received a minor concussion and two fractured ribs in the fall on Dec. 2. The suspect, Filbert Ramon Herrera, 36, of Ruidoso Downs, complained of aches but refused treatment.

The pursuit began after Ruidoso police attempted to locate a vehicle reportedly taken about 9 p.m. About an hour later a New Mexico State Police officer notified Ruidoso Downs officers that he had located the vehicle in the village, and it would not stop.

An effort by Calicoat and another village officer to stop the vehicle at North Parnell Drive and U.S. Highway 70 was unsuccessful, and patrol cars followed the vehicle to a Hilltop Lane residence. The driver fled on foot into an undeveloped area and Calicoat jumped on Her-

rera. The two men went down the 60-foot drop-off.

Herrera was charged with resisting a police officer and battery upon an officer.

### Aggravated assault

Police arrested a Ruidoso Downs man Dec. 1, charging him with felony aggravated assault with a deadly weapon against a household member, felony false imprisonment and misdemeanor battery against a household member.

Jerry Chavarria, 40, was ordered held in lieu of a \$25,000 cash-only bond by Magistrate Court Judge William Butts, following an initial appearance on Dec. 4.

According to police reports, Chavarria and another person had argued, followed by the victim being struck several times in the face. He is also accused of blocking the victim's exit from the residence. A knife was reportedly used to threaten the

victim, with the back end of the knife reportedly placed to the victim's back.

A Mesalero woman was arrested Dec. 2, charged by Ruidoso Downs police with first-offense driving DWI. An officer stopped Diana L. Enjady on U.S. Highway 70, after allegedly observing the driver weaving on the roadway. ## Suspect flees with ankle bracelet

Man awaiting trial on embezzlement charge vanishes with monitoring device

An arrest warrant has been issued for a Ruidoso man, accused of fleeing while on court-ordered electronic monitoring.

Arlis Scott, 20, is charged with embezzlement over \$250, according to a court file in Magistrate Court in Ruidoso. Judge William Butts issued the arrest warrant on Dec. 4.

Scott was fitted with the electronic ankle bracelet last month, while awaiting trial on a charge of conspiracy to commit burglary. He had been bound over to District Court on Nov. 21.

The electronic monitoring system has

been used in Lincoln County for about five years, said John Buffington, administrator of the Lincoln County Detention Center. He said the program, which lets detainees out of the jail, works well. Currently six people are wearing the ankle bracelets under the county program.

Buffington said the detention center was notified on Dec. 3 that Scott had left the area by the firm that operates the monitoring devices and system. A spokesman for B.I. Inc. of Boulder, Colo., the firm that operates the contracted monitoring service, said the ankle bracelet has a value of \$525.

## Crash near Hondo injures N.M. couple

A New Mexico couple was injured Sunday, when their vehicle rolled on U.S. Highway 70 near Hondo.

The couple had been eastbound on the highway and hit a patch of ice on a bridge near the road's intersection with U.S. Highway 380. The auto went out of control and hit the south side guard rail, crossed the center line, hit the guard rail on the opposite side of the highway and then rolled end-over-end one-and-a-half times,

according to a New Mexico State Police report.

# Cellular structure to be green to blend in with surroundings

Tower? What tower?

A new cellular communications tower, to be sited near Midtown Ruidoso, will be painted pine needle green, to match the environment.

While the color, height and design of the Verizon Wireless were conditions the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission signed off on Tuesday, the pending tower may not end cellular phone problems around all of Ruidoso.

"It won't make up for what we really need in Ruidoso," said Carl Kelley, the tower contractor for Verizon. "What we really need is to get back on the property near Barbara Willard's."

Kelley is also the owner of the property, at the Radio Shack store on Whitlock Street near Sudderth Drive, where the 120-foot tower would be located. The location is north of a site considered earlier this year.

The optimum location, called-Squaw Trail, is just out-

side Ruidoso's village limit. Approval to place a tower at Squaw Trail never came from the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission after opposition was voiced and zoning issues were raised.

A Verizon official said the tower by the Radio Shack store would cover the eastern part of Ruidoso to about the middle of the village.

"If we're going to put up the new tower is it going to enhance service?" quipped Bill Hirschfeld, a member of the commission.

"It's not going to except for the east part of town. Verizon answered an FCC (Federal Communications Commission) complaint and said it would take care of all the problems," he said.

Kelley said the new tower would help, but not resolve cell phone service on Ruidoso's north side. Hirschfeld said Verizon wasn't telling the FCC the full story.

"Apparently not," Kelley said. "Verizon's trying real hard. If we get one more tower

site then we'll be all right."

Kelley said most of the problems with the Verizon cell phone system locally was the result of conventional telephone line connections.

The new tower will have a round base instead of the typical angled, three or four sided framework. It could be in place and operating later this month, weather permitting, Kelley said.

The commission, seeking to restrict the number of antenna elements on the tower, backed off a restriction that would forbid Verizon to rent tower space to other companies, including other wireless phone companies.

Kelley said permitting another cellular provider to use the tower could alleviate requests for more cell tower placements.

The commission did however place another condition to the previously approved conditional use, requiring Verizon to come to the commission if additional cell phone elements were ever proposed.





The Warriors (1-1) opened the hoops season with a pair of close games: a season-opening win against AAAA Roswell Goddard Friday and a last-half loss to West Las Vegas Saturday.

**Ruidoso 57, Roswell Goddard 55**

The Warriors and Rockets (0-1) played see-saw throughout the season opener for both squads Friday, with Ruidoso holding off Goddard at the end to take the victory, 57-55.

The match was not pretty, with both teams making their share of early-season mistakes.

"A win's a win, no matter how you get it," said Warrior head coach Billy Page. "I'll take that one."

Ruidoso led 13-10 after a back-and-forth first quarter, but went into the locker room trailing the Rockets 25-21, mostly on the strength of Goddard's outside shooting.

"That's the strength of our team," said Rocket coach Hayden Hill. "Our biggest kid is 6-2, and a lot of times we're playing with five guys under six foot. We've got to offset things by doing that."

Goddard tallied seven 3-pointers overall, with four coming in the first half.

Ruidoso came back with a solid third quarter, outscoring Goddard 18-9 to retake and hold the lead.

The Rockets kept things close in the final stanza, closing the gap to two, but Sean Sebastian put Ruidoso back up by four with a pair of free throws, and Jason Britt and J.R. Floyd followed that with a pair of field goals to seal the victory.

A 3-pointer with no time left by Rocket Chad Barke made the final score as close as it was.

For the season opener, Page seemed pleased.

"We actually looked better than I thought we were going to look," he said. "It was sloppy at times, but crisp at times. We executed some plays like we wanted, some others not quite like we wanted. But all in all, the kids played great defense."

"There's a lot of things both teams can work on," Hill said. "Ruidoso deserved the victory. They made some shots when they had to. Rebounded when they had to. They deserve all the credit."

Britt was the only Warrior in double figures with 11 points, but all but one Warrior scored. Barke led all scorers with 14 points, while Jay Roach and Aaron Rodriguez tallied 10 each.

**West Las Vegas 60, Ruidoso 45**

Shooting made the difference in Saturday's match vs. West Las Vegas (2-0), as the Dons hit the bucket while the Warriors had a tougher time.

Initially, it looked like a repeat of the previous night's game.

Ruidoso jumped out to a 13-7 first-quarter lead, and stretched its edge to 25-18 at the half.

But the shorter, quicker Dons came out of the locker room looking for blood, and a 3-pointer by Geno Mathis to open the final stanza gave Las Vegas a lead it wouldn't relinquish.

"Our defense collapsed in a few spots, and that was the difference," Page said. "We weren't playing our man like we should have been. "We made some mental mistakes," Barela said. "That's what's hurting us more than anything else. Young ball players just lose a little concentration there."


Still, he was pleased that the Eagles hung in with the 15-man Grady squad.


**Teacher pay hike sought**

The New Mexico State Board of Education will recommend to the Legislature in January a 10.13 percent increase in total teacher compensation, and expanding the number of professional development days.

On Nov. 29, the SBE approved legislative policy and support proposals, including \$3 million to assist low-performing schools in developing school improvement plans, \$8 million to develop new criterion-referenced tests and \$300 million over three years to ensure safe school buildings. In all, the SBE will recommend an increase of \$249.7 million for education and \$313.7 million in capital outlay, of which \$300 million is for upgrading and correcting deficiencies in public school buildings and \$13.7 million is for maintenance.

The proposals seek funding to ensure a sufficient supply of quality teachers in New Mexico; provide the second year of funding for full-day kindergarten; support family literacy programs for Native Americans; ensure accurate and complete tests to measure student progress on New Mexico's Content Standards and Benchmarks and performance standards; and increase counseling services for high-need students.

The SBE voted to recommend to the Legislature the continuation of a public educational governance structure that includes a constitutionally-created State Board and elected local boards of education and changes to the public school code to provide additional flexibility to local school districts to increase student performance.

**Kids share reading with their parents**

*At White Mountain Elementary, 'anytime we get extra funds, we put them into books.'*

Family Reading Nights bring families together and help students meet their reading goals at the White Mountain Elementary School.

An average of 100 family members show up for the evening reading sessions and snacks are served. School librarian Linda Hamilton said she sees parents she never sees otherwise.

"They bring their moms and grandmothers and her aunt — and there are four people reading to this one girl."

White Mountain principal Frank Cannella said the Family Reading Nights are scheduled twice each nine-week period for the Accelerated Reading Program that WME initiated about three years ago.

A "Star Test" is given to each student at the beginning of the school year, which establishes a reading level. Individualized reading goals are determined by students' reading levels and the number of school days in a nine-week period, Cannella said. After read-

ing a book, students take a two-minute test on a computer in their classroom or in the library. This measures their reading comprehension.

At the end of the nine weeks, those who have met their reading goals receive a reward. For the last nine-week period, high school football players lunched with the avid readers. For the period before that, students received "Proud Reading Warrior" T-shirts donated by Wal-Mart.

The next incentive is a Kiss-a-Cow Concert with musician Dan Crow. After the concert, the principal will be seen kissing a cow in the White Mountain gymnasium.

Cannella will apparently do anything to inspire children to read more.

"Cows are cool," he said. In the past, he kissed a pig to reward his readers, but the pig became agitated around so many well-read children.

"They wanted me to kiss this thing and it was like jaws," he said. "Plus pigs don't have any lips, so you don't know where to kiss it."

The Accelerated Reading Program has grown over the last two years, Hamilton said, with a grant allowing the elementary school to have at least two computers in each classroom.

"Last year we only had computers in the library and teachers didn't have them in the classroom, so teachers didn't use them much," she said.

The school acquired 55

new computers and software for the Accelerated Reading tests, and the school library has grown to more than 6,000 books.

"We've really hit that hard and we've got one of the best libraries in the state," Cannella said. "We have so many new books we had to buy some new bookshelves. Anytime we get extra funds, we put them into books. We've really been addressing that over the past five to six years since we implemented the program."

In addition, the school has offered in-service time to teach teachers how to use the Accelerated Reader Program, with two one-day in-services and two two-day in-services over the past couple of years.

The tests are loaded onto a computer server and then networked with all the computers in the building, allowing teachers to track how well their students are doing, no matter where they take the tests. If students aren't doing well, the teacher can then suggest books more appropriate to their reading levels.

The classrooms of six teachers at White Mountain Elementary qualified as "model classrooms" by the Accelerated Reader Program, by having all students reading at or above their reading level and scoring 85 percent or above on the computerized tests, Hamilton said.

Family Reading Nights are designed to help students meet their reading goals — and they're successful: More than 10,000 books were checked out of the library during the first nine-week period of school this year, Hamilton said.

"We only have 380 students," she said. "That was just truly amazing. One kid took over 100 tests in nine weeks."

About 240 children met their reading goals this past nine-week period, Cannella said, so he can expect a fairly large audience for his cow-smooching on Jan. 19.

Alaska is our largest state. It is one-fifth the size of the entire United States. Only Wyoming has fewer people. Alaska has a population of about 500,000 people. It became a state in 1959.

Alaska is 500 miles across Canada from Washington state and the "lower 48." In 1867 the United States bought the area from Russia for \$7,200,000, or about 2 cents an acre.

The purchase proved to be a wise one. Alaska is rich in natural resources, including oil, gold, fish and wood.

For years, there were many disagreements between the U.S. government, the Alaskan state government and the native peoples about who owned what lands.

In 1971, the U.S. government gave the state's Inuits (once called Eskimos), Aleuts and Indians \$962,500,000 and millions of acres of land. Other land claims have also been settled.

Glaciers cover about 1/20th of the state and are the biggest tourist attraction. They range in size from 1 to 50 miles long and 300 to 10,000 feet thick.

**Anchorage**, the biggest city, has about 250,000 people.

About one-third of the state is north of the Arctic Circle,

where the average temperature in July is only about 47 degrees. In January the average is about minus 11 degrees.

**Barrow**, about 300 miles north of the Arctic Circle, is the farthest north of any town in America. Most of the people who live there are Inuits.

About 47,300 miles of **Coastline** stretch along the Pacific and Arctic oceans, three seas, bays, channels, inlets and the Gulf of Alaska. There are also more than 3 million lakes!


**Denali**, meaning "the high one," is what the native people call Mount McKinley. It is the tallest mountain on the continent, rising 20,320 feet above sea level. The next 15 tallest mountains are also in Alaska.

The biggest group of nesting bald eagles in North America is at Admiralty Island National Monument.

Alaska ranks first among the states in money made from the **Fishing** industry. The sport of fishing also draws in thousands of tourists.





## More About Alaska

**The Forget-me-not** is the state flower.

**Gold rushes** in 1897, 1898 and 1902 attracted thousands of settlers.

**Alaskan Heritage**, or background, comes from a wide mixture of peoples. More than one-fifth of the population is descended from native people, the Inuits, Aleuts and Indians. There are also descendants of Russian fur traders and farmers, Norwegian fishers, and gold and oil miners.

The world-famous **Iditarod** (eye-DIT-uh-rod) dog-sled race is 1,049 miles through icy wilderness. It is held in honor of dogs and people who raced to bring medicine to victims of an epidemic in 1925.

**Juneau**, the capital, has about 25,000 people. It is the second-biggest city in area in the U.S. The city of Sitka, also in Alaska, is the biggest.

**Kodiak Island**, in the Pacific Ocean, is home to a national wildlife refuge famous for its bears. It is also home port to the largest fishing fleet in the world.

The **Land of the Midnight Sun** is one of Alaska's nicknames. In the far north the sun does not set at all from May until August.

In the **Matanuska Valley**, some farmers take advantage of the long hours of sunlight to grow giant vegetables such as 100-pound cabbages.

**The Northern lights** are streams of colored light stretching thousands of miles across the Arctic skies.

**Oil and gas** bring in about 85 percent of the money needed to run the state. This income is so great that Alaskans do not pay income or sales taxes. Most citizens also receive a yearly payment as their share of the oil profits.

But oil has also caused many problems for the environment. In 1989, the tanker Exxon Valdez caused the biggest oil spill in American history. Nearly 11 million gallons of oil polluted Prince William Sound.

The **willow Ptarmigan** is the state bird.

**Quiet** beauty fills the Alaskan landscape. About one-fourth of all the land is in the National Park system. Forests cover about one-third of the state.

**Russia** lies only about 2 1/2 miles from the Alaskan island Little Diomed.

The **Sitka spruce** is the state tree.

**Auto club offers tips for safety on scooters**

They're everywhere, those sleek little two-wheeled scooters that are destined to be one of this holiday season's most popular gifts for children.

But because the Consumer Product Safety Commission has reported more than 4,000 scooter injuries this year, AAA New Mexico is offering safety tips for scooter owners.

"Scooters are like skateboards or inline skates, and similar safety rules need to be followed," said Brenda Yager, public affairs manager for AAA New Mexico. "Kids need to wear proper safety gear and be aware of safety rules."

Yager said AAA recommends the following safety measures.

- Wear a helmet, knee and elbow pads.
- Wear sturdy shoes; no flip-flops or bare feet that could get caught in the braking system. Not wearing proper shoes also could lead to injuries if the child should fall off the scooter.

- Watch scooter speeds. Going too fast on uneven pavement could cause a crash.

- Don't ride on the street. Scooters belong on approved paths or sidewalks.

- Cross streets only at stop signs, traffic lights or crosswalks.

- Don't ride scooters around parked cars. Motorists might not be able to react quickly if a rider darts out in front of them.

A serious head injury or broken bones can turn fun into disaster, Yager said, adding it's better to take a few precautions and be safe while having fun.

## New pictures suggest 'dynamic' Mars

SAN DIEGO, Calif. - Layered geologic outcrops on Mars, described in Tuesday's issue of the journal *Science*, may be composed of sedimentary rock that dates from the earliest span of martian history, between 4.3 and 3.5 billion years ago.

Images of these sedimentary rock exposures, captured by the Mars Orbiter Camera (MOC), suggest that parts of ancient Mars may have resembled a land of lakes, and that the geology of early Mars was much more dynamic than previously suspected.

If life existed on Mars during this time period, researchers believe that the fossil remnants of that past life may be sandwiched within the sedimentary rock layers, just as they are on Earth.

The martian outcrops, in some cases a few kilometers thick, appear to be made of fine-grained materials deposited in horizontal layers, the hallmark of sedimentary rock. These outcrops are found inside craters, between craters, and within chasms, said Michael C. Malin and Kenneth S. Edgett of Malin Space Science Systems in San Diego, California.

The Science researchers identified three main outcrop types from the MOC images: layered units, massive units and thin mesa units.

Layered units, as their name suggests, consist of relatively thin rock beds - some only a few meters thick - stacked on top of one another in distinct groups. Massive units appear as one bulky rock layer with no clearly defined horizontal bedding. In a few cases, these types appear together, with the massive unit always perched on top of the bedded unit like a thick, indistinct coat of frosting on a layer cake.

Thin mesa units, with surfaces ranging from smooth to pitted to ridged and grooved, are almost always found on top of eroded massive or layered sedimentary rock.

While sediments can be deposited in a variety of ways - including wind, water, volcanic activity, and even cosmic impact - the prevalence of the martian sedimentary outcrops within basin-like features suggests that they were deposited by water, perhaps in lakes that formed within the craters and chasms, said Malin and Edgett.

Under this scenario, sediments may have been transported into the lakes in regular, swift pulses, building up thin layer units. Massive units may have been deposit-

ed when the lake became stagnant or deep enough to cause sediments to sift down through the water over longer intervals.

"Some of the MOC images of these outcrops show hundreds and hundreds of identically thick layers, which is almost impossible to have without water," said Malin.

The sedimentary units show no telltale signs of wind deposition, and the researchers concluded that explosive volcanic eruptions and impact cratering probably could not have produced enough sediment to create the large-scale and geographically widespread outcrops seen on the martian surface.

Although Malin and Edgett favor water as the sedimentary suspect, they also offer an alternative model that involves changes in atmospheric pressure on early Mars. They suggest that periods of relatively high atmospheric pressure - caused by fluctuations in the amount of solid carbon dioxide on the planet's surface - could have increased the atmosphere's ability to carry dust produced by heavy cratering.

To confuse matters, the Science researchers don't know where the original sediments came from, or how they were transported to their final resting places, since there are no traces of gullies or streams or other channels associated with the outcrops. They think that erosion may have wiped out both the source of the sediments and their travel routes.

In some cases, sedimentary rock has eroded out of the crater in which it formed, also vanishing without a geologic clue.

To Malin, the history of martian geology looks like a jigsaw puzzle.

"In the center of the puzzle, we have these layered rocks, which are good evidence of an extremely dynamic environment. On either side of this well-developed puzzle piece, we have mysteries."

In any case, Mars' sedimentary rocks suggest a very active early history for the planet.

"This makes Mars more complicated and more exciting. This record is going to tell us a lot about what early Mars was like, and maybe the early Earth as well, since we don't have a lot of rocks on our own planet from this time period," said Edgett.

## Standard Web browser design feature leaves opening for privacy attacks, scientists discover

PRINCETON, N.J. - Princeton computer scientists have discovered a trait of Web browser design that allows Web sites to cull private information about the recent browsing histories of visitors.

While there is no evidence that any Web sites use such a snooping tactic, the researchers believe the method could pose serious risks to privacy. The technique is undetectable and defeats nearly all available privacy measures, although design changes in future browsers could reduce the problem.

Edward Felten, professor of computer science, and graduate student Michael Schneider described the technique in the proceedings of Association for Computing Machinery Conference on Computer and Communications Security, a major conference held Nov. 1-4 in Athens.

The researchers have dubbed the technique a "timing attack." It works by exploring the contents of the visiting browser's "cache" of recent activities, a log all browsers compile to increase their speed. In a timing attack, a Web site times how long it takes a browser to respond to queries about other sites. Company X.com, for example, could test how quickly visiting browsers are able to access information from competitor Y.com's site. A quick response indicates that the Web user recently visited Y.com. The test is very reliable, the researchers found.

Timing attacks could allow malicious Web site designers to create a more invasive form of Web "cookies," which are bits of data that Web sites store on visitors' browsers. Cookies are often used, for example, to allow a Web user to return to a password-restricted Web site without having to type in a password each time.

Felten and Schneider created a variation they call "cache cookies." Web sites could

force a browser to store cache cookies without the permission required of normal cookies. (Web users have the option of instructing their browsers to reject conventional cookies.)

Any number of unrelated Web sites could then access these cache cookies and use them as a tool for learning whether a Web user has recently visited other Web sites. The scheme presents troubling opportunities to aggregate large amounts of information about Web users who do nothing more than visit sites.

"These qualities make cache cookies very dangerous to the privacy of Web users," the authors assert.

While no countermeasures would completely protect people from such invasion, the authors propose a method for redesigning browsers to prevent the majority of timing attacks. The redesign would

employ a device called "domain tagging." It would allow information to be retrieved from the browser's cache of recently visited Web addresses only if the information pertains to the exact site the Web user is currently viewing.

Even that solution, however, is imperfect and does not prevent maliciously designed sites from inserting some forms of dummy addresses into a Web browser's cache and looking them up later.

Nonetheless, the researchers believe that domain tagging could work sufficiently well to assure Web users a reasonable level of privacy. "We think we understand what the solution is and we now are working to implement it," said Felten.

Felten said he felt compelled to publish a description of the potential problem to encourage positive discussion about resolving it.

## Belief in dangers of secondhand smoke deters teen smoking, study finds

SAN FRANCISCO — Teenage smokers are more likely to quit because they are concerned about hurting others from secondhand smoke than because they fear for their own health, according to results of a survey published in the journal Pediatrics.

The study, by researchers at the University of California, San Francisco and the University of Pennsylvania, concludes that educating young people about secondhand smoke's harmful effects and encouraging nonsmokers to speak out should be key elements of anti-tobacco programs.

The study found that among those 14 to 22 years of age in the U.S., believing that secondhand

smoke harmed nonsmokers more than doubles the chance that a smoker plans to stop or already has stopped smoking.

"Our study found for the first time that among teens, concerns about secondhand smoke's harmful effect on others are far more likely to influence smokers to quit than are worries about their own health," said Stanton Glantz, PhD, lead author on the study, a professor of medicine at UCSF and a researcher in the UCSF Institute for Health Policy Studies.

"These results show that teens behave just like grown ups," Glantz continued. "In the past, tobacco control programs have identified clean indoor air

as an 'adult' issue; our work shows that it is an equally important element of prevention programs directed at teens."

Co-author on the study is Patrick Jamieson, MS, Ed, a graduate student at the University of Pennsylvania.

The survey interviewed 300 smokers and 300 nonsmokers between the ages of 14 and 22 in the United States.

It found that nonsmokers were more likely to consider smoking risky than were smokers, and also were twice as likely to consider secondhand smoke dangerous than smokers.

Equally important, the only statistically significant predictor of smokers' planning to stop or

having actually sopped smoking was believing that secondhand smoke harmed nonsmokers.

The authors note that the results are from a one-time, cross-sectional study, and so cause and effect should be interpreted more cautiously than with longitudinal studies, which follow people over time.

Nonetheless, they conclude, the findings are consistent with results of longitudinal studies of similar questions in adults, as well as econometric studies and focus-group studies of anti-tobacco advertising in teens, which indicate that secondhand smoke is one of three highly effective messages for reaching teens.

The other two effective mes-

sages are educating people about addiction and about the anti-tobacco industry's dishonest behavior — such as the advertisements run in the California and other state tobacco control campaigns.

"Encouraging nonsmoking teens — as well as adults — to object to breathing secondhand smoke and encouraging creation of smoke-free homes is a productive tobacco control strategy for youth," the authors conclude.

The study was funded by the National Cancer Institute, the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, and the Annenberg Public Policy Center of the University of Pennsylvania.

## Drug trials show lymphoma impact

SAN FRANCISCO — IDEC Pharmaceuticals Corporation announced the final results of two pivotal trials of Zevalin (Ibritumomab Tiuxetan), an investigational radioimmunotherapy, during oral presentations at the 42nd Annual Meeting of the American Society of Hematology (ASH).

Thomas E. Witzig, M.D. of the Mayo Clinic, Rochester, Minn., Tuesday delivered an oral presentation of a Phase III randomized, controlled study of 143 patients with relapsed or refractory low grade, follicular, or CD20-positive transformed B-cell Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma (NHL).

Dr. Witzig said that 30 percent of the Zevalin patients achieved complete responses to therapy. Sixteen percent of Rituxan patients achieved complete responses. To date, duration of response estimates between Zevalin plus Rituxan and Rituxan alone are not statistically different but further analysis will be conducted as data matures.

Zevalin associated toxicity was primarily hematologic, transient and reversible. The

most common adverse events associated with Rituxan were infusion related, consisting mainly of mild to moderate flu-like symptoms, for hematologic, transient and reversible.

In a second poster presentation on Dec. 4, Dr. Witzig summarized the safety results of four clinical trials which showed that Zevalin is very well tolerated, even in a refractory population at risk for toxicity. Dr. Witzig noted that toxicity in all four trials was primarily hematologic, transient and reversible.

On Dec. 4 Gregory A. Wiseman, M.D. of the Mayo Clinic, Rochester, Minn., gave a poster presentation that showed that Zevalin treatment results in a statistically significant improvement in the NHL patient's self-assessment of quality of life.

Zevalin is a monoclonal antibody that targets the CD20 antigen and is stably linked to the radioisotope yttrium-90. This investigational agent is in late stages of development for the treatment of certain NHLs.

## Young, healthy smokers lose more time, Army study finds

BROOKS AFB, Texas — Young healthy people who smoke are likely to take more time off work than their non-smoking colleagues, finds research in Tobacco Control. Men smokers took more time off than women smokers, the study showed.

Almost 88,000 men and women on active duty in the U.S. Army were monitored for over two years. The average age of those assessed was 28, and the sample included men and women of diverse ethnicity, race and Army occupation.

The smokers took more time off work and were admitted to hospital more frequently than their nonsmoking colleagues. Among the men, smoking increased the risk of being admitted to hospital for causes other than injury by almost a third; in women the equivalent increase in risk was 25 percent. The research showed that former smokers also had higher admission rates than nonsmokers. Current smoking could be directly implicated in

7.5 per cent of hospital admissions in men and 5 percent of those in women.

The risk of taking time off work, excluding injury and pregnancy, was increased to 60 percent among men who smoked and to 15 percent among women smokers. More than 14 percent of lost workdays among men and 3 percent of those among women were directly linked to smoking. The risk of time off work as a result of injury was also higher among smokers, at 7 percent among men and 54 percent among women.

The authors point out that most employment research on smokers has focused on older populations, but that this study shows the adverse effects among young smokers, with the consequent cost implications for employers. "It is remarkable that a single risk factor could account for such a large proportion of hospitalizations and lost workdays, particularly over such a short period of observation," they conclude.
