State Police and businesses in the Ruidoso area are teaming up this holiday season, united behind a common objective:

Child safety

A new program started by the New Mexico State Police aims at providing car safety seats for children to financially struggling families.

Officer Sal Beltran said he and Sgt. Charles Devine began contacting area businesses last week about donating the price of one or more car seats in conjunction with Wal-Mart, which has reduced the cost for seats purchased for the New Mexico Cares program.

Tom Battin, president of Ruidoso State Bank, said after he talked to Devine and Beltran last week, the bank committed to buying five seats for the program. Battin and employees

Twila Ventiger and Darlene Bobb were on hand Friday when Beltran arrived to pick up the donations of seats.

The State Police agency was the logical group to become involved in the car seat project because officers see firsthand the tragic results of children unsecured, Beltran said.

He offered a few statistics to drive home his point:

- 66 percent of children involved in a traffic accident were not buckled.

- In 1999, 24 children, ages 12 and younger, died in New Mexico in traffic accidents. Of those, only three were buckled properly.

Beltran also reminded parents that children should never

be placed in the front seat of a vehicle with air bags. The back seat is the safest.

Never buckle two children or an adult and a child into one seat and always replace a child seat if it is involved in an accident, he said.

Families in need of a child's car seat can contact the state

police headquarters in Alamogordo at (505) 477-1313 to arrange delivery.

Business owners who sign up for the program are given letters by the state police that they can present at Wal-Mart for the purchase of the car seats for a discount at the customer service desk.

Suspect at large

Woman, 75, was beaten in robbery, police say

An elderly Ruidoso woman was beaten, robbed and kidnapped Monday in a crime police chief Lanny G. Maddox called heinous.

The 75-year-old woman was found at Philadelphia Canyon near Bonito Lake after being abducted from her home.

Police are looking for a woman, believed to be in her late 30s to early 40s, for the assault and kidnapping.

Ruidoso police detectives were dispatched to Philadelphia Canyon after the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department contacted police about a elderly woman who had been battered. The victim was found along Bonito Lake Road by a motorist.

The alleged assault originated at the woman's Ruidoso home, said Detective Robert Layher.

The resident had answered a knock on the door and permitted a request to use her telephone.

The victim told detectives she was then battered, forced at gunpoint to drive to a Ruidoso bank and using the bank's drive-up facility withdraw money from her account.

The suspect then forced the elderly woman to drive to Bonito Lake, near where the victim was left. The elderly woman was found shortly after 2 p.m.

The victim, who Maddox said had been pistol-whipped, received black eyes and a bruised arm in the attack.

"We'll find this person, you can bank on it," Maddox said. "The perpetrator of this crime is a low-life predator and it's imperative that we stop this person before they act again."

The suspect allegedly threatened to kill the woman. While police declined to say how much money was withdrawn at the bank, Maddox said the amount was substantial.


The suspect would face felony charges of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon, aggravated assault, kidnapping and armed robbery, said Det. Jim Biggs. The kidnapping charge would be a first degree felony. Biggs said two enhanced counts, that would be used to extend prison time, would include using a firearm to commit a crime and committing a crime against an elderly person.

In addition to being in her late 30s to early 40s, the suspect was described as having dishwater blond hair that was in a ponytail.

"I feel this will be solved in the next two weeks," Maddox said. "Our professional detectives working on this case will leave no stone unturned."

Lincoln County CrimeStoppers is offering a \$1,000 reward for information that leads to a District Court bind-over or grand jury indictment in the case.

"We're looking for any and all information, anything that anyone may have observed," Maddox said.

Counties push bill for more flexibility

Proposed legislation would let local officials decide how to choose hospital management companies

Proposed legislation to be introduced next month in the state Legislature would allow county commissions to determine what procedure to follow in selecting companies to manage their public hospitals.

Proponents of the legislation contend the bill would grant more local control on how to handle contracts and would allow hospitals to benefit from not being tied to state procure-

ment code restrictions, but some critics see a danger.

From their perspective, state requirements for competition ensure county commissions stay attuned to changes in hospital issues, are aware of advantages that could be offered by other companies and ensure that counties are paid adequately for the use of a hospital facility.

The issue crystallized in Lincoln County earlier this year when an attorney general's

opinion said the commission erred by not seeking competitive bids for hospital management every four years, by not receiving fair market value for the use of the hospital and by not sending its management contract with Presbyterian Healthcare Services to the state Department of Finance and Administration for approval.

Survey finds government in N.M. not so open

County, city, court and school officials routinely violate state law by failing to release public records such as budgets, public employees' salaries and reports of crimes and court cases, a statewide survey by New Mexico newspapers found.

Three of every 10 requests for access to records were unsuccessful in a check of 210 government offices in all 33 New Mexico counties.

Member newspapers of the New Mexico Press Association - including the *Ruidoso News* and The Associated Press along with the New Mexico Foundation for Open Government sponsored the "freedom of information" audit. The goal was to deter-

mine whether records are readily available to the general public.

"When requests for public records are denied about a third or more of the time, it's obvious that some public officials are either ignorant of the public's rights and their own duties — or arrogant about doing their jobs," said Bob Johnson, executive director of the Foundation for Open Government.

New Mexico's Inspection of Public Records Act casts a wide net in defining public records. The law covers written documents and letters, tapes, photographs and records stored in computers or transmitted by email.

"All persons are entitled to the greatest possible information regarding the affairs of government and the official acts of public officers and employees," state law declares as public policy.

To measure the gap between what the law says and how it is applied by public employees, newspapers made oral and written requests for records with agencies across New Mexico from mid-July through early November.

The survey found: County and city law enforcement agencies were the worst in making records available to the public. Requests failed in 13 of 31 sheriff's departments (42 percent) and 11 of 32 police departments (34 percent).

Twelve of 34 magistrate courts (35 percent) failed to provide records. Five of 27 county administrative of-

ices (19 percent) and seven of 32 city administrative offices (22 percent) didn't provide requested documents.

Twelve of 44 public school districts (27 percent) and one of 10 colleges and universities (10 percent) failed to provide records.

Even when agencies did release records, their compliance frequently was less than complete. Overall, agencies provided at least some records in 149, or 71 percent, of requests. But on average, one in five of those disclosures lacked some requested information or document.

In failing to provide the requested records, some agencies maintained that the information was confidential. In other instances, supervisors were unavailable to give permission to employees to provide documents.

Some workers said they were too busy. Agencies also failed to meet the law's timetable for turning over materials; some never responded to written requests.

Public records can serve as a tool for people to find out more about their communities as well as monitor the performance of government.

A parent can explore the finances of a local school or a would-be homeowner might search neighborhood safety using crime records.

Citizens are entitled to know how much a school superintendent or principal is paid or amounts the school district spends yearly. The public can look at misdemeanor and traffic offenses filed in magistrate courts and find out how the cases were resolved — with fines or jail time.

The New Mexico survey found that in most cases information was handed over upon written or oral requests — although it could be a test of patience and persever-

ance for the person seeking the records. State law declares, "No person requesting records shall be required to state the reason for inspecting the records." But individuals were asked for their names and why they wanted records in two of every five requests in the survey.

In one out of seven requests, people had to quote or show state law before gaining access to records.

Confronted with requests for access to documents, government workers often displayed a lack of knowledge about the law or an attitude of secrecy about records related to public business and maintained at taxpayer expense.

The survey covered basic public records. Sheriff's departments and police were asked for a daily log of crimes and an "incident report" of a crime. Counties, cities and schools were asked for financial information, such as agency budgets and salaries and expenses of administrators.

Magistrate courts were asked for a one-month listing of complaints filed by law enforcement and the disposition of the cases.

Some auditors were reporters, others were citizens asked by a newspaper to participate.

They completed standardized reports of each audit, including narratives of their experiences. The participants — to help ensure neutral treatment by agencies — were instructed not to identify their employers or describe themselves as part of a survey testing the state's open records law.

Certain records remain confidential under state law, including letters of reference for jobs or certain medical treatment records and police records revealing confidential sources or people accused but not charged with a crime.

Despite those exceptions, state law makes clear that anyone — a local resident or a total stranger — has a right to review a basic police incident report about a burglary and arrest of a suspect or a "police blotter" of recent crimes.

BILL: Legislation would add flexibility to county hospital management

Dan Weaks, head of policy and government relations for the New Mexico Hospital Association, a trade organization representing all hospitals in the state, explained that the proposed legislation would exempt counties from the state procurement code when it comes to leases with management companies to run the hospitals.

The wording will be simple, possibly one line, he said.

A lawsuit filed by Memorial Medical Center Inc. of Las Cruces brought the issue to a

head, he said. The hospital sued to be exempt from or to clarify the state procurement code, he said.

The lower court ruling went against the hospital, but on appeal, the state Supreme Court sent it back to the lower court saying the judge had not applied the correct standard of law, Weaks explained. The suit still is pending, he said.

"Hospitals in particular do a lot of activities that don't lend themselves to (following the state procurement code)," he said.

Management of jails already is exempt, he said. A state statute allows counties to

enter into long-term lease agreements with hospital management groups under terms and conditions local government boards think are necessary, Weaks said.

"Basically, we're looking at that statute as prevailing," he said. "We want to leave it up to counties to determine how to run their own hospitals. About 11 communities are affected."

"It was really never an issue before the Memorial lawsuit and the attorney general taking a hard line on this case. All we're trying to do is make it as easy as possible for the counties. Commissions still could elect to seek competitive pro-

posals. "Bottom line, it's a local issue. The hospitals are owned locally and commissioners should have a better feel than a bureaucrat at the state level."

State Rep. Dub Williams, a Republican from Glencoe who previously served as chairman of the Lincoln County Medical Center's corporately-appointed board and serves on Presbyterian's state board, said he's ready to carry the bill to the House of Representatives.

"I haven't seen the bill yet, but I understand the intent is to tweak the law so that it meets the needs of what has to be done," he said.

Fire department on road to recovery

Embattled Glencoe-Palo Verde volunteer group gets 30-day extension from state

After a couple of rough months with the Glencoe-Palo Verde Volunteer Fire Department teetering on dissolution, things are looking up for the organization and the people it protects.

Ralph Romero, who stepped into a leadership role in pulling the department together, said Monday he's confident the firefighting unit is on its way to complete recovery and he's ready to step aside.

"We received a 30-day extension from the State Fire Marshal's office to clear things up," said Romero, who lives within the district covered by the volunteer department that was criticized three months ago for lack of response to fires and failure to turn in monthly reports to the state.

"We had a couple of organizational meetings and took applications and were very successful in signing up more volunteers," he said.

"Sixty-five percent have extensive backgrounds in emergency services, some who previously were with the Ruidoso Downs volunteer unit. We have a total of 27 volunteers now.

"I feel strongly the department is stable except for a few administrative bugs that need to be ironed out."

The department continues to meet weekly and each session includes a training component, he said.

With the new roster of volunteers, response to the last few fire calls was nearly 100 percent, he said.

A grass and brush fire on the Rio Ruidoso in San Patricio Nov. 30, saw a big turnout from Glencoe, as well as from volunteer departments at Hondo and Lincoln, Romero said. Arabela units were on standby. Red Cross volunteers also showed up with food from Schlotzsky's Deli and lots of hot coffee, he said.

"Every one is employed — that's no different, but employers are cooperating about allowing the volunteers to respond and relationships are very cordial," Romero said, referring to earlier problems that prevented some previous volunteers from showing up at fire calls.

"Some have rules that don't allow their employees to respond to fires, but there are other things they can do besides shooting water," he said.

He's still looking for a few volunteers who have mechanical, office and maintenance background. They wouldn't be expected to go out on fire calls, but could pitch in at the main station in Glencoe and substation in Agua Fria, Romero said.

Since an initial reorganizational meeting headed by County Manager Tom Stewart, the volunteer department upgraded its communication equipment with new radios, borrowed bunker gear from the Fort Stanton volunteer department while going out for bid on some of its own and has gone over fire truck equipment to ensure everything is in good shape, Romero said.

"How the other departments are doing it, I don't know," he said. "But we're implementing new procedures. All of the firefighting equipment, supplies and materials are inventoried. We've satisfied the

state on the monthly reports that weren't being filed and are waiting to install a computer program that will meet state requirements for the future.

"A lot of leg work was involved, but it's been very satisfying."

The district, which stretches from Agua Fria east of Ruidoso Downs to the San Patricio Church on U.S. 70 is large geographically and growing in population, he said.

The volunteers are taking a complete inventory of every house, structure and resident in the area and are learning street names to ensure ease in finding a site and that when they arrive, they will know what to expect and who and what should be there, Romero said.

"They're driving out in the fire trucks and meeting the people," he said. "We also invite the public to come to the fire station to see what's going on and to take a look at the equipment."

Stewart concurred with Romero's optimism about the department's future.

"I'm extremely pleased with the way the fire department volunteers are pulling together and getting the job done," he said. "I'm bound and determined to give them all the help I can."

During the organizational meetings, Angel Chavez was elected fire chief, a reaffirmation of the years he devoted to organizing and keeping the department going, and Godfrey Gomez was named assistant fire chief, Romero said.

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

A taxing explanation

In tourist-courting Ruidoso, it's easy to overlook the fact that most of Lincoln County has a farm and ranch economy. But, because Ruidosians have struggled with suddenly increased property values in the past few years, it shouldn't be hard to sympathize with those crop and livestock producers now facing the possibility of a property tax increase of 367 percent.

That, on top of a potential tax valuation increase of 37 percent for cattle and 119 percent for horses.

Meetings in Las Cruces on Monday and Roswell on Tuesday will provide more information to the impacted property-owners, but the message between the lines seems to be that the state hasn't conducted a reassessment on agricultural lands for too long — so the tax collectors are in a catch-up mode.

Nobody will be happy with that exercise, but it seems to be inevitable. The question now is "how much," not "how little."

With those meetings coming up, the state's explainers might find themselves in the same position as those cowboys in the TV commercial — the ones trying to herd cats.

Global warming cooling off as an issue?

While most farmers are not scientists in the white-coat-and-test-tube sense, many possess insightful knowledge and expertise of the environs surrounding their daily labors. They observe — sometimes casually, sometimes with a more critical eye — the conditions of the natural resources on which they rely to produce food.

Much like a physician, many test their soil to gauge its fortitude. They sweat details such as leaving proper amounts of plant residue on the field's surface to halt the erosion's appetite of raindrops. There is environmental and economic reasoning behind their efforts.

But even if their observations are no more formal than digging their hands into the soil, watching a covey of game birds nest down in a buffer

strip or marveling over the clarity of a stream running through their acreage, farmers do notice change. They also understand the intricate relationship between farming practices and natural resources. Farmers accept this vigilant mission with a measure of pride.

The American Farm Bureau Federation recently kicked off a new grassroots water quality program that takes advantage of the discerning, watchful eyes of the nation's farmers. As those most familiar with the water resources they live and work near, Farm Bureau's "Proud Water Partners" program highlights and encourages positive leadership roles for farmers in protecting the nation's water resources.

Proud Water Partners is built on insights gleaned from successful state Farm Bureau water quality efforts. Proud Water Partners encourages

cooperative leadership from farmers regarding water quality issues, but also recognizes the supportive roles of other groups, government agencies and researchers who are interested in agriculture's success and water quality.

AFBF President Bob Stallman says this dynamic water quality program puts farmers in the driver's seat, and helps them reach out to neighbors and others who believe that a strong agriculture is the best way to tackle any water quality challenge.

While the program focuses on helping farmers discern the biological conditions of local water resources and be familiar with the science behind such determinations, it all starts with observation. By physically identifying any challenges, verifying them through simple scientific evaluation, and working to correct what is correctable, farmers are afforded a positive role in the

process — a role that outright regulation too often disregards. In addition, if a water quality challenge has been previously misidentified, the program provides farmers scientific facts for cooperating with state agencies to correct the matter.

True to the program's motto, America's farmers are: "Working the land. Protecting the water." Through Proud Water Partners, farmers will further meld those two concepts into a singular action. Farmers know that a healthy environment and quality natural resources are vital to the production of abundant, healthy and safe food. They know it all starts with water. This new program will help communicate the message that quality water starts with caring and observing farmers.

Gas companies' dispute soon could be settled

A long-standing rate dispute between Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Co. and Zia Natural Gas could be settled before the end of the month by the New Mexico Public Regulatory Commission.

The attorney for the two-city-owned system said his clients are under threat of losing gas service in March if they do not begin paying a distribution rate from which they claim they should be exempt.

But a spokesman for Zia, a privately owned company, said it simply is following prior 1998 ruling of the state regulatory agency that stated the municipal utility's discounted price runs out Dec. 31.

Like any other customer using Zia's transmission and distribution lines, the municipal utility has 60 days to contest the charge to the state, said Zia attorney Mercedes Fernandez-Wells.

"I hope we will have a decision before anything else happens," she said, adding that as things now stand, if the utility doesn't pay the higher rates, "it would be a violation of the stipulation."

J. Robert Beauvais, attorney for the municipal system, filed a petition asking the regulatory agency to determine whether his client is subject to that order. That is the case pending before the agency.

"They're a customer and should pay," Fernandez-Wells said. "They are not just a transmission line customer, because they go through our distribution lines."

"When CCNG signed the contract in 1992 selling its transmission line to Zia, our transportation rate was higher or the same as it will be. When we added Hobbs into the mix, the rates went down for Ruidoso. CCNG has been aware of what the rate would be since 1992."

Kay Strickland, administrative supervisor for the municipal system, said the utility is not contesting the transportation cost increase, which would go up from 15.5-cents per 1,000 cubic feet (mcf) to 46

cents. But, utility officials contend the municipally owned utility should not be subject to the distribution charge, which would bring the total charge to \$1.82 mcf, Strickland said.

She hasn't calculated the impact to the average customer, she said Tuesday. Beauvais was in court and unavailable for comment.

While the rate question is up in the air, Zia and the municipal utility are trying to hash out pressure problems on the lines feeding the communities of Capitan and Carrizozo. Timing is essential because Lincoln County's new 122-bed jail is set to open next year in Carrizozo's Industrial Park and is relying on natural gas service.

Zia officials first mentioned a potential problem with delivery of gas by the municipal utility in 1998. Again in July of this year, Zia officials urged the county commission to obtain an independent engineering evaluation of the sufficiency of the small lines serving the town and their ability to deliver adequate gas pressure.

But municipal utility officials countered that their engineer and historical data indicate the lines could carry more pressure than Zia allows. Beauvais obtained a temporary injunction against Zia in the 12th Judicial District Court compelling the gas distributor to increase pressure on the Carrizozo lines to 300 psig from 250 psig when necessary to meet demand.

"Their engineers didn't actually go out and do line inspections," Fernandez-Wells said. "Like ours, they ran a software program."

In a September letter to CCNG, Jay Suko, vice president of operations for Zia, wrote that an increase in gas pressure would require an extensive upgrade of lines costing between \$200,000 and \$300,000. He also asked that the state Department of Transportation approve the increase and that the municipal utility hold Zia harmless and name it as an additional insured on its general liability policy.

In a November letter, Zia president David Hamilton wrote Leroy Montes, chairman of the municipal utility, that Zia had determined the utility may exceed the demand volume Zia is contractually bound to supply. He suggested installing a compressor on the Carrizozo pipeline as a less expensive alternative to line replacement.

In a court hearing on the injunction, Hamilton agreed to increase the pressure if an automatic dial up alert system was installed to show when gas pressure drops beneath a minimum reading and if the municipal utility agreed to relieve Zia of any legal responsibility for damage that might occur from increasing the pressure.

"The reason for that request is that the line running north to Capitan runs 50-feet from the high school," Fernandez-Wells said. "They wanted 500-600 psig (pounds per square-inch gauge); we won't go higher than 300 pounds and then only if there really is a cold snap."

"The pressure alarm would alert us and the pressure would be increased to 300 psig just for that period of time."

Beauvais wrote Hamilton last week that an automatic dial up alarm is being installed and the utility agrees to a hold harmless indemnification for Zia, but he noted that including Zia on CCNG's insurance policy was not part of the stipulated court order.



Zoning board tables development plan

Property owner to provide more information about hillside erosion, runoff, landscaping

Hillside concerns about a planned development at a recently leveled Sudderth Drive motel have been raised by the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission.

The owner of Visions clothing store, Mark Marquez, who recently purchased the adjacent Super Saver Inn property at 2803 Sudderth Drive, has requested approval of an amendment to a commercial site development plan to build two additional business buildings.

The commission tabled the request, calling for additional information on hillside erosion, runoff and landscaping.

"I will do more landscaping because two neighbors are complaining about tree cutting," Marquez told the commission. "I promised I would plant as much screening as possible. Every tree (now) is in the way."

Marquez wants to excavate part of the hill behind the Sudderth Drive property, to construct the two buildings and provide a parking area near the street. An engineered slope would stabilize the resulting steeper slope.

"We're very concerned about the slope," said Bonnie Coe, who said her mother owns property behind the Marquez land. "It will create a 30-foot cliff. The trees now screen noise from the street."

Coe suggested the commission table action pending review of a landscaping plan.

Another letter to the planning department voiced opposition to the hillside disturbance.

Village planning and zoning department administrator Joseph Patoskie also called for drainage calculations and how runoff would be collected and distributed.

"We're talking about taking out mountains," Glen Barrow, chairman of the commission said. "I think it will take a closer look. You can go in this community and find disasters because people have excavated hillsides."

While Ruidoso has an ordinance that addresses hillside protection in residential areas, a similar ordinance for commercial lands was repealed by the village council. Village attorney Charles Rennick told the commission they could recommend the council reenact the ordinance for future development. In the meantime Rennick said the commission can use commercial landscaping requirements to hillside the hillside issue.

"Whatever it takes to do this," Marquez said. "I've gotten this far."

Marquez has proposed a cut bank, 25 to 30 feet up the hill, with a fence and replanted vegetation along the cut bank. The lower portion of part of the hillside would have a railroad-tie retaining wall.

The request is scheduled to return to the commission on Dec. 19.

Ruidoso police probe two unrelated deaths

Two separate deaths in Ruidoso, that police say appear not to involve foul play, are under investigation by the department's Criminal Investigation Division.

The first discovery of a body happened at 8:05 p.m. Dec. 7. The police department was requested to do a welfare check, after a woman called from Midland, Texas, saying she had a message on her answering machine from her husband stating she would be a widow.

Officers went to 302 Snowcap Drive and received no response at the door. A visual check through a window showed a note on a kitchen countertop listed to the "next of kin."

After entering through an

unlocked window police located the body of Timothy M. Wallace, 42, in a bathroom. A police spokesman said the death appeared to be the result of a drug overdose.

Wallace's body was sent to the state office of the medical investigator in Albuquerque for an autopsy. Formerly of Midland, Texas, Wallace was a self-employed builder.

On Dec. 10, at 11:33 a.m., officers responded to No. 14 Shaw Lane on a report of a person not breathing. The body of Cara Word, 19, was found lying on a bed. The cause of death is undetermined, but foul play is not suspected, police said.

Word's body was sent to the medical examiner's office for an autopsy.

Lumber truck overturns; driver escapes serious injury

The driver of a lumber truck that overturned Friday was able to walk to an ambulance for transport to and treatment at the Lincoln County Medical Center.

John L. Morgan, 40, of Roswell, was treated and released from the hospital's emergency room after the 8:15 a.m. accident.

According to a Ruidoso police report, Morgan was southbound on State Highway 48 approaching a construction zone and attempted to brake

but the truck failed to slow down. The driver told investigating officers that he veered the truck off the pavement to avoid a possible collision with other vehicles. The load, consisting of 660 sheets of 7/8-inch construction board and 18 pieces of 2-inch by 12-inch lumber, shifted, causing the straps securing the materials to break. The load was dumped, and the vehicle flipped nearly upside down.

The vehicle was registered to Roswell Lumber Company and was en route to the Hawthorn Suites Golf and Convention Resort hotel construction site.

An inspection by the New Mexico Department of Public Safety Motor Transportation Division revealed the truck had braking ability on the steering and front driving axles but no brakes on the rear axle.

After leaving the roadway the truck traveled for 215 feet before overturning.

Several citations were issued, including charges of having brakes out of adjustment and for being over weight. The truck had a maximum weight limit of 46,000 but was determined to be at 57,000, according to the Motor Transportation Division.

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Building A Disaster Resistant Community

Protect Your Home

- Regularly clean roof and gutters.
- Inspect chimneys at least twice a year. Clean them at least once a year. Keep the dampers in good working order.
- Chimneys and stovepipes with a spark arrester that meets the requirements of National Fire Protection Association Code 211. (Contact your local fire department for exact specifications.)
- Use 1/2-inch mesh screen beneath porches, decks, floor areas and the home itself. Also, screen openings to floors, roof and attic.
- Install a smoke detector on each level of your home, especially near bedrooms; test monthly and change the batteries two times each year.
- Teach each family member how to use the fire extinguisher (ABC type) and show them where it's kept.
- Keep a ladder that will reach the roof.
- Keep handy household items that can be used as fire tools: a rake, axe, hand saw or chainsaw, bucket and shovel.

Practice Wildfire Safety

People start most wildfires... find out how you can promote and practice wildfire safety.

- Report hazardous conditions that could cause a wildfire.
- Teach children about fire safety. Keep matches out of their reach.
- Post fire emergency telephone numbers.
- Plan several escape routes away from your home - by car and by foot.
- Talk to your neighbors about wildfire safety. Plan how the neighborhood could work together after a wildfire. Make a list of your neighbors' skills such as medical or technical. Consider how you could help neighbors who have special needs such as elderly or disabled persons. Make plans to take care of children who may be on their own if parents can't get home.

Before Wildfire Threatens

Design and landscape your home with wildfire safety in mind. Select materials and plants that can help contain fire rather than fuel it. Use fire resistant or non-combustible materials on the roof and exterior structure of the dwelling. Or treat wood or combustible material used in roofs, siding, decking or trim with UL-approved fire-retardant chemicals. Plant fire-resistant shrubs and trees. For example, hardwood trees are less flammable than pine, evergreen, eucalyptus or fir trees.

Create a 30 to 50 foot safety zone around your home.

Within this area, you can take steps to reduce potential exposure to flames and radiant heat. Homes built in pine forests should have a minimum safety zone of 100 feet. If your home sits on a steep slope, standard protective measures may not suffice. Contact your local fire department or forestry office for additional information.

- Rake leaves, dead limbs and twigs. Clear all flammable vegetation.
- Remove leaves and rubbish from under structures.
- Thin a 15-foot space between tree crowns, and remove limbs within 15 feet of the ground.
- Remove dead branches that extend over the roof.
- Prune tree branches and shrubs within 15 feet of a stovepipe or chimney outlet.
- Ask the power company to clear branches from power lines.
- Remove vines from the walls of the home.
- Mow grass regularly.
- Clear a 10-foot area around propane tanks & the barbecue. Place a screen over the grill - use non-flammable material with mesh no coarser than one-quarter inch.
- Regularly dispose of newspapers and rubbish at an approved site. Follow local burning regulations.
- Place stove, fireplace and grill ashes in a metal bucket, soak in water for two days, then bury the cold ashes in mineral soil.
- Store gasoline, oily rags and other flammable materials in approved safety cans. Place cans in a safe location away from the base of buildings.
- Stack firewood at least 100 feet away and uphill from your home. Clear combustible material within 20 feet. Use only UL-approved wood burning devices.

If advised to evacuate, do so immediately

- Wear protective clothing - sturdy shoes, cotton or woolen clothing, long pants, a long-sleeved shirt, gloves and a handkerchief to protect your face.
- Take your Disaster Supplies Kit.
- Lock your home.
- Listen for evacuation sirens. In town sirens will sound in emergencies only, except for testing every other Monday night.
- Tell someone when you left and where you are going.
- Choose a route away from fire hazards. Watch for changes in the speed and direction of fire and smoke.
- Tune radio into KWES/KBUY.
- For Emergency Alert systems, listen for evacuation in the area and where emergency shelters will be placed.

If you're warned that a wildfire is threatening your area, listen to your battery-operated radio for reports and evacuation information. Follow the instructions of local officials.

- Back your car into the garage or park it an open space facing the direction of escape. Shut doors and roll up windows. Leave the key in the ignition. Close garage windows and doors, but leave them unlocked. Disconnect automatic garage door openers.
- Confine pets to one room. Make plans to care for your pets in case you must evacuate.
- Arrange temporary housing at a friend or relative's home outside the threatened area.

If you're sure you have time, take steps to protect your home:

- Close windows, vents, doors, venetian blinds or non-combustible window coverings and heavy drapes. Remove lightweight curtains.
- Shut off gas at the meter. Turn off pilot lights.
- Open fireplace damper. Close fireplace screens.
- Move flammable furniture into the center of the home away from windows and sliding-glass doors.
- Turn on a light in each room to increase the visibility of your home in heavy smoke.
- Seal attic and ground vents with pre-cut plywood or commercial seals.
- Turn off propane tanks.
- Place combustible patio furniture inside.
- Connect the garden hose to outside taps.
- Set up the portable gasoline-powered pump.
- Place lawn sprinklers on the roof and near above-ground fuel tanks. Wet the roof.
- Wet or remove shrubs within 15 feet of the home.
- Gather fire tools.

When wildfire or any disaster threatens, you won't have time to shop or search for supplies. Assemble a Disaster Supplies Kit with items you may need if advised to evacuate. Store these supplies in sturdy, easy-to-carry containers such as backpacks, duffel bags or trash containers.

- A three-day supply of water (one gallon per person per day) and food that won't spoil.
- One change of clothing and footwear per person and one blanket or sleeping bag per person.
- A first aid kit that includes your family's prescription medications.
- Emergency tools including a battery-powered radio, flashlight and plenty of extra batteries.
- An extra set of car keys and a credit card, cash or traveler's checks.
- Sanitation supplies.
- Special items for infant, elderly or disabled family members.
- An extra pair of eyeglasses.

Keep important family documents in a waterproof container. Assemble a smaller version of your kit to keep in the trunk of your car.

The key was keeping Caveman A.J. Bluth, Carlsbad's top scorer, away from the bucket.


Page said Warrior Sean Sebastian did a good job through two quarters, then had to sit down because of foul trouble.


"These are good kids," Holland said. "They just don't know how to play basketball very well. But we're improving. We'll get better. And we'll be OK in our district."

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
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

Students at Capitan Middle School turn grades into salable products during their annual 'Mall Day'

CAPITAN - Middle School students here became merchants and consumers in the halls Friday after nine weeks of working on crafts to trade for grades.

Sherri Cox, the math teacher at the middle school, explained that students kept track of their grades during the nine-week period and recorded them as dollars. For example, a 90-percent grade became \$9. Some students, she said, earned more than \$300 this way to buy products from other students.

Students were given a balance sheet, checkbook and check register and recorded each grade made as

"money" for the nine-week period starting Oct. 9. Groups of four or five students made up a booth, and made one to three items each. Students were allowed to spend no more than \$2 on their craft materials, encouraging them to scrounge around at home for materials and to be creative.

The middle school hallways were lined with vendors from 9:30-11:30 a.m. on Friday, and colorful jewelry, Christmas ornaments, magnets and other crafted items filled the tables. Busy shoppers wrote out checks (made by the high school computer graphics department).

"We get the money from our grades, so if we have an 89, we put a decimal and it's \$8.90," said Dara Leineweber, an eighth grader. "It teaches us to be able to spend money and balance a checkbook."

Joshua Dayo Castaneda, a seventh-grade merchant, sold pet rocks and a board game he invented, "The Spec Game," which shoppers could play for free or purchase for \$20.

Brittany Adcock, a seventh-grader, sold out her merchandise before Mall Day was over. She'd made lip gloss of wax, petroleum jelly, coconut oil and candy to sell.

"The candy melts to make the color," she explained, and the mixture hardens in little paint canisters in which she sold it.

After Mall Day is over, students have to balance their checkbooks with the money they've taken in and the money they've spent and turn in their checkbooks to their teacher.

Cox said this is the third year to have Mall Day at the middle school, and that students learn life skills, such as keeping a checkbook. It's also an incentive to work for better grades and encourages creativity, she said.

"I give them two or three days during math class to work on them. They're all excited about it," Cox said.

The only people spending hard cash were teachers.


Julian Romero, a language arts teacher, bought several items for cash. Math teacher Sandra Smith said the teachers waited until toward the end to buy crafts, and that cash taken in by the students would go to the middle school fund for teaching materials, field trips and prizes.

Cox said prices were high on the vendors' items because she'd inflated the grades by multiplying them by 10. Next year, she said, she wouldn't inflate the grades. The average checkbook this year had \$200 of grades in it, with the low at \$50 and the high at \$305.

Afterward, los invitados come for cena. Every familia brings food to share.





Christmas in Mexico

On the last night of the posada celebrations, December 24, Mexicans go to a special church service at midnight called "Misa de Gallo" where the birth of Jesus is celebrated. Then they come back home to continue the celebration, which lasts all night.

On January 5, many kids from the country as well as from the cities write letters asking the three Wise Men for toys. They put the letters inside one of their shoes and place it inside or outside the door. In another variation of this tradition, some country kids put a shoebox filled with straw outside their doors or in their balconies. The straw is for the camels of the Three Wise Men who brought gifts to Baby Jesus. Although Mexican children get their gifts from their parents on Christmas Day, on January 6 they receive additional presents from the Three Wise Men.

Nacimiento

(nah-see-MYEN-toh)
A nacimiento is a group of figures that make up a manger scene. It can be very simple, with just Jesus, Mary and Joseph. Or it can include wise men, shepherds, farmers and townspeople.

These are placed on a very decorated altar in most homes. In some towns the figures are large so as to be placed outside the homes.

Pastorela

(pahs-toh-REH-LAH)
Many neighborhoods put on a Christmas play called a pastorela. Pastorelas are about the Christmas shepherds.

In a play, the Devil and his helpers try to keep the shepherds from getting to Bethlehem. Angels and a hermit help the shepherds finally reach the Christ child.

Most pastorelas have different lines and songs because they are not written down. The costumes and scenery are homemade. Audiences get involved by sheering.

Las Navidades en México

Estos nacimientos se ponen en altares muy decorados dentro de las casas. En algunos pueblos las figuras son de tamaño grande que se colocan afuera de las casas.

Pastorela

En muchos vecindarios se presenta una obra de Navidad que se llama pastorela. Las pastorelas tratan sobre los pastores en la Navidad. En la obra, el Diablo y sus ayudantes tratan de impedir que los pastores lleguen a Belén. Los ángeles y un hermitaño ayudan a los pastores a que lleguen hacia el Niño Jesús.

La mayoría de las pastorelas tienen diferentes tramas y cantos, ya que no están escritas. El vestuario y la escenografía se hacen en las casas. El público participa con aplausos.

One man pushes effort to make Fort Stanton a facility for veterans

Army veteran Leland Wittkopp is convinced the timing is right. The opportunity, the money and the perfect place exist to establish a long term nursing care center for eligible service veterans, he believes.

A significant portion of historic Fort Stanton, a former federal and then state hospital, sits empty. Several buildings were being remodeled for long-term nursing care for the general population in 1995, when Gov. Gary Johnson shut down the hospital, citing high overhead and low patient count.

Since then, the fort was used for three years as a women's minimum security prison and now houses an alcohol and drug rehabilitation center under contract with the state Corrections Department and a museum

operated by a coalition of agencies and organizations.

Officials with the state General Services Department's property control division have indicated they would like to stop pouring money into the maintenance of the fort's 88 buildings, which lie about 13 miles north-east of Ruidoso.

Public Law 106-117 signed on Nov. 30, 1999 requires the Secretary of the Veterans Administration to provide adequate hospital and medical services for a veteran who is wounded in action, Wittkopp pointed out. The law says nursing home care will be provided for any veteran with service-connected disability of 70 percent or more. The bill specifies that a revolving fund known as the Department of Veterans Affairs Extended Care Fund was

or state-operated nursing facility. "The destiny of Fort Stanton will be determined by the 2001 legislative session in Santa Fe," Wittkopp said. "The best possible use is Public Law 106-117. The money is there. The state wants to get rid of the fort and I don't know anyone in the public sector with the capital to do what has to be done."

"I've been interested in the fort since 1938. I use to go out there once or twice a year. It's filled with history. That's where Gen. J.J. 'Blackjack' Pershing learned to play blackjack. To get this done, it's got to be a public outcry and if the people here don't want it, that's fine too."

established "exclusively for the purpose of providing extended care services" and that care could be through a federally

Wittkopp said veterans and the fort create a good mix. The veterans would be dedicated to its preservation and could work with the state Veterans Affairs Commission that oversees the maintenance and operation of the Merchant Marine and Military Cemetery on fort land.

"All I want is to educate the public on what is possible," he said. "I gathered the information. It's not up to me anymore. The elected public officials in this area have to carry it."

State Rep. Dub Williams, a Republican from Glencoe, said he has spoken with Wittkopp, but sees the biggest obstacle to the project to be the isolation of the site. But Williams said that is the same quality that would make it a great place to spend the waning years of a lifetime.

Lincoln County Manager Tom Stewart commended Wittkopp as a champion of veterans issues, but

agreed that federal legislators look to population density when thinking of new facilities.

"It's a wonderful idea and the fort would be a great place, but we have run it up the chain to U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici's office and found that their focus is on the old hospital in Alamogordo," Stewart said. "They have finite resources and have to make decisions on population density and needs. In concept, the fort is a great idea, but it's a little tough from their viewpoint justifying the amount of money for the surrounding population."

After working with U.S. Rep. Sue Kelly of New York to firm up provisions in the bill, Wittkopp didn't stop his efforts. He wrote state veterans agencies and continues to try to interest members of the state's Congress-

sional delegation in Washington D.C.

"I think the Veterans Administration can be asked to take it over," he said. "There's a need."

Wittkopp compiled membership numbers for veteran organizations in the state, which include 13,000 for the Veterans of Foreign Wars, 11,000 for Disabled American Veterans and 3,500 for the Military Order of Purple Heart.

"If it would happen, the beds at the fort probably would be filled in 30 days," Wittkopp said.

Two state officials studying the need for long-term nursing beds for state veterans were out of town and could not be reached

for comment.

Only one nursing home for veterans operates in the state and that's in Truth or Consequences, Wittkopp said.

Looking to the future at the fort, Wittkopp said other benefits could tie in with a veterans nursing care facility, including:

- Training programs for nurse assistants
- Cemetery upgrades
- A historical museum with the complete history of the fort
- An acre-foot of water, about 325,800 gallons of water annually, to New Mexico State University for agricultural projects and research.

Alto Lakes sues over metal roof on house

Subdivision's architectural committee moves to enforce building covenants governing rural area

In a dispute over architectural standards in one of Lincoln County's major subdivisions, the Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club Inc. is suing for the removal of a metal roof.

The lawsuit was filed last month in Lincoln County District Court by attorney Richard Hawthorne on behalf of the corporation.

Named as defendant is Joyce Wheat Williams in her capacity as trustee of the Louise N. Wheat Trust. Williams could not be reached for comment and several attempts to get comment from her attorney, Dan Bryant, were unsuccessful.

In the suit, the corporation contends that the roof violates building design covenants within the community that prohibit roof types that reflect too much light.

Hawthorne alleged in the suit that no plans were submitted to the architectural review board and that after an initial contact by an attorney in March, the corporation has received no other communication about the problem.

The corporation contends Williams' failure to remedy the situation requires injunctive relief and a declaratory judgment from the 12th Judicial District Court affirming the covenants.

Hawthorne explained that in a county such as Lincoln, which has no zoning outside of its municipalities, developers often include covenants in their land sales contracts that spell out permitted and prohibited activities on the land. However, unlike zoning, which is enforced by designated government departments, neighbors or community watchdog groups must be willing to go to court to seek enforcement.

"If you're developing a nice neighborhood, covenants can protect that," Hawthorne said. "Otherwise, people can do anything they want without zoning laws."

"Typically, covenants give the developer and each property owner the right to seek enforcement. It could be one or two neighbors banding together, not necessarily a property owners' association."

In the Williams lawsuit, the roof was installed sometime within the last year, he said. No plans were submitted or variance granted by the architectural control committee, leaving removal as the only remedy, he said.

"The covenants say anything that reflects light is up to the architectural control committee (to deny or approve)," Hawthorne said. "They could have been advised in advance of the roof plan."

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
