



Sides brace for coming round in the fierce competition for

water

• For the next month, a series of articles will look at water worries in Lincoln County, the role of the State Engineer's Office, procedural changes and studies completed or under way.

Clearing work is under way off State Highway 48 and Airport Road while hydrologists and lawyers debate the effects of a proposed golf course and irrigation wells being developed by race track owner R. D. Hubbard.

Requests to transfer water rights from downstream on the Rio Bonito further upstream to the proposed exclusive, private golf course and guest cabins generated protests from property owners in Ranches of Sonterra and in the historic settlement of Lincoln, from the federal Bureau of Land Management's Roswell office and from the village of

Capitan. A hearing on the protests is set for 9 a.m. Jan. 30, at Ruidoso Village Hall on Cree Meadows Drive. That session could be postponed if hearings examiner Fred Allen rules favorable on a motion by protesters asking for a delay.

Neil Stillinger, attorney for the Ranches group, said the motion was filed because of difficulty in obtaining answers from Hubbard

to questions posed in discovery queries. As of Tuesday, Allen had taken no action on the motion.

Gregory Oleson, head of Hubbard Enterprises based in Palm Desert, Calif., "respectfully disagreed" with Stillinger's assessment, contending that all information requested was submitted in a timely manner.

A \$50,000 war chest

County puts aside legal money for hospital contract probe

To pay for legal expenses connected to a possible grand jury investigation of Lincoln County's contractual arrangement with Presbyterian Healthcare Services, county commissioners set aside \$50,000 Tuesday.

After a half-hour closed-to-the-public executive session with County Attorney Alan Morel and County Manager Tom Stewart, commissioners emerged into a public session to approve the motion.

It passed 4-1 with Commissioner Leo Martinez voting against using the money or hiring outside counsel to represent the board in the proceedings.

Petitions calling for a grand jury were submitted to the 12th Judicial District last month with about double the required number of registered voter signatures. Chief Judge Frank Wilson said he will set a special hearing to determine whether the allegations could result in criminal charges, which would be a legitimate use of a grand jury — or are a civil issue.

Petition signers, among other questions, asked why competitive bids were not sought for the management of the county hospital in Ruidoso and why the contract was not submitted to the state Finance Board for approval as directed by the state Attorney General.

Stewart, sounding disappointed Tuesday, said he had hoped to use the \$50,000 toward building more of a reserve for the county, but three commissioners sided with Morel that a strong offense may be needed in the district court hearing and proceedings that may follow.

Commissioner William Schwettmann seemed reluctant to commit the money when Wilson hasn't ruled yet that a grand jury will be called.

Later Tuesday, Martinez said he voted against the motion for the same reason.

"We don't even know this will go anywhere and no one has been indicted," he said.

"I'm not for getting a lawyer. I don't want to cost the county anything."

Martinez has advocated for months that competitive bids be sought for hospital management, noting that commissioners still could elect to stay with Presbyterian after seeing the other offers.

Earlier Tuesday, newly elected or re-elected county officials took their oaths of office for the next four years in the courthouse in Carrizozo.

One dead, others hurt on area's icy roadways

Sport-utility vehicle rolls over near Riverside, claiming the life of unidentified Texan

One person was killed and eight accidents with injuries were tallied — some resulting in life-threatening injuries — when freezing rain halted traffic on U.S. Highway 70 between Ruidoso and Roswell Tuesday morning.

"In the course of 5:45 and 8:30 this morning we had a total of 19 accidents," said Capt. John Balderston, with the New Mexico State Police district in Roswell.

"It was mostly in Chaves County," Balderston said. "There was freezing rain and then black ice. We probably had four or five people seriously injured."

The numerous accidents resulted in the closure of U.S. Highway 70, between Ruidoso and Roswell,

from about 8 a.m. until 10 a.m. Eastbound drivers at Ruidoso were stopped and apprised of the closure.

Many of the accidents occurred east of Riverside, near the Lincoln/Chaves county line, said New Mexico State Police officials.

Police were not releasing the name of the person killed in a sport-utility vehicle rollover attributed to the iced roadway. The victim was only identified as a Texas resident.

One of the injury accidents involved a vehicle and a semi truck. Two children were reportedly hurt, one possibly paralyzed, from that crash.

Again the names of victims were not being released to allow authorities to notify relatives of those seri-

ously hurt.

The injured were transported to Eastern New Mexico Medical Center at Roswell.

Some were later flown to hospitals in Albuquerque.

"We shut the road down and got the salt trucks out," Balderston said. He said traffic was halted to avert any further collisions.

Most of those stranded for a time because of the road closure were in communities.

The two-hour highway closure was the second in one week. Late Christmas night and into Dec. 26, U.S. Highway 70 was closed between Ruidoso and Roswell because of snow and icy pavements.

Balderston urged those motor-

ing when winter conditions can interrupt travel to be prepared.

"If you're going to travel in weather that can be like this be prepared as though you're going to be stranded for three to four hours," the state police official said.

He recommended motorists have winter clothing, blankets, some food and beverages, and candles in the vehicle to help provide heat.

Balderston said a couple of candles can provide enough heat to keep vehicle occupants from freezing.

He said keeping a stranded motor vehicle's engine running for an extended time raises the potential for carbon monoxide poisoning.

Manager fires off blistering letter to postal officials

A polite, but blistering letter has been mailed by Lincoln County Manager Tom Stewart Friday to the regional postal director in Albuquerque.

Stewart said he hopes it arrives in the next two weeks. The letter was a follow-up to complaints about delivery service aired during a commission meeting last month.

County commissioners, residents and Stewart detailed problems with delivery since the postal service removed a mail distribution center from Carrizozo and set it up in Alamogordo a few months ago. Nine local jobs were lost.

Sent to regional postal director Lee Salazar in Albuquerque, Stewart's letter dated Dec. 29, thanked Salazar for sending Al Provencio and John Roark to the county to assure citizens that delivery times would improve.

"Al Provencio was a credit to your organization," he wrote.

But the problems probably will not improve if the service continues with just one full-time and two part-time employees at the Carrizozo post office, Stewart wrote.

He listed as examples of delivery problems:

- Medications mailed from Ruidoso on Dec. 13 had not been received as of Dec. 29, a resident of Nogal reported.
- A tax bill received and stamped by the county treasurer on Dec. 29 was mailed from Ruidoso on Dec. 11.
- Another resident reported that when he refused unsolicited mail at the Carrizozo Post Office, the organization that sent the packages ended up billing him because the processing date exceeded the 15-day free examination period.

"As each day goes by, we continue to see evidence of poor service," Stewart wrote. "One-day service within the county appears a myth and our concern now becomes for all those citizens who wait to send in their credit card bills and other payments assuming that five days is a sufficient delivery time to avoid finance charges."

During the Dec. 21 meeting, Provencio promised a full review of the system and said that one-day delivery within the county should be the norm. Roark said it would help if residents who experience problems report the details immediately, to allow postal officials to check the cancellation dates and envelopes for information and to trace what may have gone wrong.



WATER: Clearing work begins as water rights case heads for hearing

Several Sonterra residents met recently to discuss the hearing, their views on the golf course, to be called The Hideout, and the potential for a negative impact on area wells and the underground water supply.

Greg Switzer, who has lived in the Ranches for two years and is actively involved in the property owners association's protest, said the prime objective is to protect and preserve the water rights of the owners of the 495 lots in the Sonterra development. The subdivision is not served by a community water system and each lot owner must drill a domestic well, approved by the State Engineer's Office for three acre feet of water annually. One acre foot equates to about 325,851 gallons of water.

"If it were not for the impairment of water, the golf course would be a plus for the area," Switzer said. "Mr. Hubbard has been a steadfast supporter of the Ruidoso community. His race track, gaming operation and museums add jobs and purpose to our community. It's also no secret that

he donates significant sums of money to local organizations.

"But this appears to be different from the other activities. It seems to lack community mindedness."

By the time they learned of the requested transfers in December 1999, one for 53.7 acre feet of water already was approved despite a recommendation for denial from the Roswell field office.

Hubbard, through his Rio Bonito Llc, wants to transfer the water rights primarily from the lower Rio Bonito upstream to irrigate the golf course, which is being built on 600 acres of a 1,795.7-acre tract purchased from Lamoyne Peters.

Although the property owners in Sonterra at first were excited about the economic prospects of a top-of-the-line golf course in the area, "We also felt we need to know there would not be a long-term problem for us," Switzer said. "So, we hired one of the preeminent hydrologists in the state to conduct an initial survey."

"His initial answers indicated that the amount of water the transfers covered - 320 acre feet - would jeopardize water levels in the Bonito Val-

ley aquifer and, more importantly, for us, Sonterra."

Although he hasn't been on site recently, Oleson said the only work he's aware of is drilling of test wells. But Switzer said residents see outlines of future fairways from the mesas in Ranches of Sonterra.

"It's crazy, an 1,800-acre parcel is being bulldozed and burned and not one dollar for a building permit," Switzer said, referring to Lincoln County's lack of zoning laws and building inspections.

The bottom line for Sonterra residents is that based on the hydrological data they received, they don't believe The Hideout's wells will be adequate for the golf course's long-term water needs and that their wells will be impaired.

"Simply drilling for replenishment of our wells may not be a remedy as water levels may drop too low," Switzer said. "The Rio Bonito flow will be seriously impaired as well. The only good solution for everyone appears to be some other method of introducing water to the course from somewhere else."

Oleson said Hubbard has hired irrigation experts who

"are designing the most modern systems available for the purpose of using as little water as possible."

"We're discussing the use of recycled (waste) water with the Church of the Nazarene (campground complex on SH 48) and anything else we possibly can do to save water," he said.

While Sonterra's hydrologist warns of potential water problems, Hubbard's hydrologist is confident there's enough water to serve both the Ranches and The Hideout.

"Our hydrologist is telling us there is a sufficient amount of water for the intended use and there will be no impairment of Ranches of Sonterra wells," Oleson said. "It's interesting to note when looking at their expert's nine conclusions, they are replete with 'could,' 'possibly' and 'may be.' Our expert states there will not be impairment."

Switzer, John Hershey and others Sonterra residents at the meeting last year said they understand that two experts can come up with vastly different appraisals, but they hope the state acts with caution. They say once damaged, the resource may never recover.

P & Z panel recommends subdivision approval

Commission's blessing is contingent on extension of sewer line to serve resulting lots

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission recommended allowing a subdivision of a 2.74-acre property provided a sewer main is extended to serve the resulting three lots.

The property, on Chelsea Drive near Oak Grove Place, would be divided into a pair of 1-acre lots and a .74-acre parcel, that would be called the Carson Heights subdivision.

Commission chairman Glen Barrow said the request division would be allowed under Ruidoso's new subdivision lot size restrictions because the property currently is not part of a subdivision.

Village planner Darrell Bremner said sanitary waste disposal was an issue that needed to be addressed before approving the land split.

Gilbert Gonzales, of Eagle Land Surveying, said the resulting lots would be large enough for placement of septic systems. He said there would be a hardship in trying to connect to the somewhat distant village wastewater line.

"My understanding is the village wants people to connect to the sewers," Barrow said. "My opinion is we should

require tying to the sewer." The applicant seeking approval of the final plats, Fred Cowan, said he would take the more environmentally friendly direction.

The final decision on the subdivision, and commission's desire to have the applicant provide a sewer main to the proposed lots, will go before the Ruidoso village council.

Jail, hospital issues topped county's agenda last year

The financial strain of housing Lincoln County's growing inmate population and the future of the county-owned hospital in Ruidoso dominated County Commission meetings in the year 2000. By the end of the year, commissioners were hoping the state Legislature would solve the hospital management problem for them, but faced the possibility of a grand jury being convened to scrutinize the county's management arrangement with Presbyterian Healthcare Services.

Commissioners also attempted to focus on water - where it is and isn't, how to quantify it and how to conserve it - in its deliberations on proposed subdivisions. And they were peeved at U.S. Postal officials' decision to move a mail distribution center from Carrizozo south to Alamogordo, eliminating nine jobs in the small county seat.

But for pure dollar pain, the operation of the county jail and the expense of transporting and housing juvenile and overflow adult offenders at other detention centers delivered the most grief.

"The cost by the end of the fiscal year (June 30) will be almost \$1.3 million, about a 20 percent increase," said County

Manager Tom Stewart. "We knew what we were doing when we set up the budget, but it still is painful when you have to write the check."

The situation should improve next year with the opening of the new county jail in the Carrizozo Industrial Park. But while the expanded bed space will help with adult prisoners, juveniles still will be a major problem, he said.

"They require exceptional care," Stewart said. "The average cost per day for a juvenile offender is \$125, twice that of adults."

The old jail in the county courthouse is limited to 40 inmates, yet the roster of adult offenders runs between 80 to 85, he said, adding, "That's 200 percent of capacity. Unfortunately, they deserve incarceration."

Three to five inmates each month are placed on radio monitoring devices to allow them to live at home and work. Another four to 10 live in a jail annex because they are considered low flight risks and have no history of violence.

The number of inmates on work release also varies. Stewart said he's tough on approving that arrangement, because of the potential risk to the public.

"It's a good thing that commissioners understand we



can't put people out there who are a liability to society," Stewart said.

Other issues and actions of note during the year include:

- Sheriff Tom Sullivan in March relinquished some of his space at the county substation in Ruidoso for the health department and related programs. By year's end, the county received \$500,000 to help enlarge the building and accommodate the growing public health service needs of the county.

- County Commissioner Leo Martinez suffered a heart attack and Commissioner Rick Simpson separated his pelvis in a horseback riding accident in February. Both men recovered quickly and were back on the job.

- A bronze memorial plaque recognizing the late Wilton Howell and his contributions as a county commissioner, was unveiled at Lincoln County Medical Center in May.

- County commissioners signed on with the New Mexico Finance Authority for a loan to build a \$3.9 million jail in the Carrizozo Industrial Park. Construction started in June on the potential 122-bed jail due to open by mid-year.

- In July, Stewart applied for the top management job in Doña Ana County. To keep him here, commissioners kept his salary by \$20,000 to \$65,000, then they gave themselves and other elected county officials increases to the maximum allowed for the county's population and property valuation.

- County volunteer fire departments joined U.S. Forest Service fire fighters in battling a blaze last May primarily in the Lincoln National Forest that charred 8,500 acres.

- Discussions started in September about providing video arraignments of inmates at the new county jail in an attempt to reduce transportation costs.

- The Glencoe-Palo Verde Volunteer Fire Department in September teetered on the brink of dissolution for failure to respond to emergency calls, but by early December had reorganized and revitalized its ranks and was on its way to recovery.

- County voters in November renewed a special property

tax levy for support of the county-owned hospital in Ruidoso and three county health clinics. While the actual levy is lower than the amount authorized for the previous eight years, property owners will pay more at least for the first year of the tax. A state formula that caps the tax increase allowed each year had depressed the amount collected for the last few years.

Despite appeals from several groups, county commissioners stuck with the county seat of Carrizozo for their monthly meetings.

Just when the Hondo Health Clinic looked like it leaped every hurdle thrown in its path, the state Department of Finance and Administration in December asked for new justification of the county's arrangement with the Hondo Community Health Commit-

tee and of its contract with a Roswell health services company. An \$180,000 allocation appropriated by the commission in April from a special property tax levy remains in limbo pending the outcome.

After months of negotiation, county commissioners appeared in December to work out all but a few minor problems on a jail management contract with Correctional Systems Inc. Current county jail employees will remain under the county's employment and benefits, working with CSI-hired staff.

After a women defendant facing criminal charges allegedly threatened 12th Judicial District Judge Karen Parsons, the county remodeled the court records area in December to provide the judge with more protection and to limit public access.

El Pasoans face possible gambling charges

Two men were arrested at the Inn of the Mountain Gods for alleged illegal betting

Two El Paso men arrested last month at the Inn of the Mountain Gods face potential charges of bookmaking.

The men had initially each been charged with three counts of commercial gambling, at the advice of an assistant district attorney.

The case was dismissed in Lincoln County Magistrate Court by Judge William R. Butts because of a jurisdiction issue. The Inn of the Mountain Gods is located in Otero County. The charges had not been moved to Magistrate Court at Alamogordo as of late last week, according to a court clerk.

The two men had been taken into custody about 10:10 a.m. Dec. 17 according to a

New Mexico State Police report.

A state police officer was dispatched to the Inn of the Mountain Gods on a report of illegal gambling activity. At Casino Apache the officer was told by a security official that video surveillance had captured the two making illegal bets.

A 33-year-old suspect told the officer that he had looked at some "sheets" but did not bet on anything.

The sheets reportedly listed NFL football team names and included several numbers. The second man, 35 years old, allegedly admitted to the officer that there had been a cash transaction related to betting.

A Casino Apache video surveillance tape, that the officer said he reviewed, reportedly

showed the two men looking at bet sheets and writing in numbers. The 33-year-old was allegedly seen giving cash and gaming tokens to the 35-year-old.

The state police officer said he contacted an assistant district attorney who advised filing charges.

Commercial gambling is described in state statutes as a fourth degree felony that includes receiving, recording or forwarding bets or offers to bet or possessing facilities with the intent to receive, record or forward bets or offers to bet.

The counts originally lodged against the two included allegations of receiving, recording, or forwarding bets or offers to bet; possession of facilities with the intent to

receive bets; and conducting a lottery where both the consideration and the prize is money.

The 35-year-old told the officer that he was not a bookie, that a friend of his in El Paso was the person who gave him the sheets.

A second chance to start anew

Mathematical purists noted with considerable satisfaction this week that *this year, 2001*, really is the first year of the Third Millennium of our calendar. It has taken a while (like a year) for us to rationalize that *both 2000 and 2001* mark the start of a millennium; it just depends on when you start counting.


We like to think of this as a once-in-a-thousand-years second chance to get the new millennium off on the right foot.

In Lincoln County a goodly number of second chances seem to be in order. Among them:

• **Ruidoso Downs.** Ruidoso's nearest neighbor, having struggled for years to develop a sense of community stability, in 2000 elected a new mayor and hired a professional manager and police chief, but by year-end the manager was gone, and a former fire chief and volunteer fire department was under investigation. The second chance: Ruidoso Downs' business district continues to expand; subdivisions are on the horizon; there's no shrinking of the check-out lines at Wal-Mart. Opportunity awaits.

• **Ruidoso.** In 2000, the Cree wildfire, one wind shift and a prayer away, lent new impetus to the growing awareness that our forested village was a disaster waiting to happen. Groundwork was laid to change that picture with the hiring of an urban forest manager, and funding was on the horizon to begin to thin our forest. The will is there, but little has been done beyond the Forest Service's work on the village boundary. It's time to start cutting trees on public and private land.

• **Lincoln County.** Elections in 2000 behind them, county commissioners and other officials this year will open an expensive new detention facility and figure out how to finance its operation. A good place to start would be for somebody to step forward and do something to heal the discord between county and Ruidoso law enforcement agencies. One such step would be for commissioners to recognize that change is inevitable with redistricting, and move now to include more citizens in the information loop by holding meetings in Ruidoso.



In the predictable scuffle

Grassroots action has more than one venue

Every vote counts. We've been told this over and over since memorizing it in elementary school civics class. Somehow, nothing makes the lesson quite so real as the five-week-long, history-making presidential election.

Notoriety was afforded the supreme courts of both Florida and the United States while people in the Bush and Gore camps held out hope with the balance swaying either way. At the root of the teetering election, however, were those who chose to vote and, more importantly, those who chose not to.

In the end, the 2000 presidential race came down to an astonishingly low number of votes separating winner and loser. It's appropriate to point out the importance of every individual who had the privilege of participating in the process of choosing the country's leader.

The nation's largest general farm organization also takes its direction from the grassroots. From Jan. 7-10, the American Farm Bureau Federation will meet to consider policies that have first been proposed at the grassroots

level by individuals, acted upon by county Farm Bureaus and then by state Farm Bureaus. Those ideas that pass muster with delegates to American Farm Bureau Federation convention in Orlando, Fla. become Farm Bureau policy.

The convention is expected to draw 5,000 Farm Bureau members from across the nation. In addition to decisions made on public policy, the meeting will be keynoted by AFBF President Bob Stallman. The convention also includes the Farm Bureau Showcase, a huge trade show spotlighting the latest ideas and products in agriculture. Young Farmer and Rancher contests and programs make up a significant portion of the convention as does a full slate of commodity outlook and agricultural issue conferences.

One of these conferences in particular, "Preparing for the Next Farm Bill," should draw a large amount of attention. It's scheduled for Monday, Jan. 8, and is being chaired by AFBF President Stallman.

The theme for the 2001 annual convention is "Farm Bureau's Focus is Agriculture's Future." In keeping with that theme, the convention will also

feature Daniel Burrus, a leading futurist, speaking about how technology will affect agriculture. Those at the convention will also hear from former Chicago Bears linebacker and Pro Football Hall-of-Fame member Mike Singletary. Singletary has become one of the country's most sought-after inspirational speakers.

The base of the 82nd annual convention remains the farmer and rancher delegates from the 50 states and Puerto Rico adopting farmer-written

resolutions that set AFBF policy positions for the coming year.

The meeting is in many ways similar to the democratic process that has made the United States the greatest country on earth. It is an exercise in democracy from the grassroots, a way for each individual to be heard.

Neighbors protest

Board denies setback variance

A Midland, Texas man, seeking to build a home on a Reservoir Drive lot, was denied a needed variance after neighbor opposition was raised before Ruidoso's Planning and Zoning Commission Tuesday.

Thomas Worley wanted to construct a 2,132-square-foot dwelling on the lot in the Wingfield Homestead subdivision.

The lot size is 70 feet wide and 140 feet deep. Worley sought a variance to site a home nearly 57 feet wide. The variance was needed to allow the structure to encroach into the 10-foot side lot-line setbacks.

"I see no reason for the variance," Glendon Benham, a resident of the neighborhood, told the planning panel. "He has a deep lot. He can build back. There are some other ways to fit it in."

The commission has in the past approved variances to allow construction in setback areas when a hardship is present.

Village planner Darrell Bremner said the lot was slightly substandard, making it a candidate for a variance. The narrow width of the property and the size, just less than 10,000 square feet, qualified the lot as a candidate for a variance.

"If you want a big house buy a big lot," said neighbor Sunny Aris. "I don't want to be looking at someone's paper through a window. I don't want to hear their radio."

Aris presented the commission with a petition, reportedly with 22 signatures, in opposition to the variance request.

"I grew up in Chicago," said Bob Fisk,

another resident of the neighborhood. "There was a reason a 10-foot (setback area) was decided on. I don't think that should be changed because someone wants a house that won't fit on the lot. I don't see any reason why he can't downsize the house or buy another lot."

Worley said he also likes his space. "I'm not a rich person," Worley said. "I'm not trying to overrun anybody. It's how the plan of the house came up."

Commission chairman Glen Barrow labeled the variance application an "elective variance" and noted the property is deep enough to plan a large home that met setback requirements.

"We abide by the setback," Aris said. "We expect new neighbors to abide by the setbacks. There are not only three of us here. There are 22 on that piece of paper," she said of the petition.

Commissioner Phillis Barnett said the panel needed to take into consideration the stand of the neighbors.

In making a motion to deny the variance commission member Tim Hoyt said a 70-foot-wide lot was wide enough to build a decent home. The motion was unanimously backed by the four commissioners at the meeting.

"I'm not trying to cause any disruption with the neighbors," Worley said after the vote.

"I could build as small as 800 square feet. If anything would bring down (property) values it would be a smaller house. That may be what happens," he said.

The commission's ruling is appealable, within 15 days, to the Ruidoso village council.

Bruce W. Meyst, Ruidoso Downs, was charged with bat-

threw a plastic bag of loose change at a wall and jumped on another person at the residence.



Holiday DWI enforcement results in several area arrests

Several drivers were arrested during the New Year's weekend by Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs police for alleged drunk driving.

A Ruidoso Downs woman was arrested Jan. 1 about 3:15 a.m., charged with second offense DWI-aggravated, speeding, failing to show proof of auto insurance, driving with a suspended license and having an open alcoholic beverage in her motor vehicle.

The vehicle, operated by Elizabeth Padilla, 24, was stopped after a Ruidoso Downs officer clocked the auto going 50 mph in a 40-mph zone on U.S. Highway 70.

Padilla's vehicle finally stopped in a driveway on Center Drive where the woman allegedly was unable to pass a standard field sobriety test. After she was taken into custody Padilla's blood alcohol content was tested at .22. New Mexico's standard for intoxication is .08.

A Capitan man was arrested by Ruidoso Downs police before the New Year began.

Thomas R. Mirelez, 33, was allegedly clocked doing 55 mph in the 45 mph stretch of U.S. Highway 70. The driver reportedly disregarded efforts by a Ruidoso Downs police unit to stop until he entered the parking area of the Wal-Mart Super Center.

After allegedly failing a sobriety test,

Mirelez was arrested. He was booked for DWI after Breathalyzer tests indicated an alcohol level of .16. The arrest happened shortly before 6 p.m. Dec. 31.

In Ruidoso police charged a village woman with her third DWI accusation. Sheryl L. Patterson, 44, was involved in a single-vehicle accident at Eagle Street and Lower Terrace about 8 p.m. Dec. 31.

Patterson's blood alcohol level was determined to be just over the legal limit, at .09. In addition to third-offense DWI, Patterson was charged with driving with a revoked or suspended license, careless driving and no proof of vehicle liability insurance. No one was injured in the accident.

A Dallas man was taken into custody Dec. 30, charged with first-offense DWI-aggravated. Christopher Jay Kubin, 38, was reportedly seen by a state law enforcement official with an open container of an alcoholic beverage in his vehicle near the intersection of Sudderth and Mechem drives.

A Ruidoso police officer who questioned Kubin determined the driver had been drinking. After failing a sobriety test Kubin reportedly refused any further testing. He also refused to submit to a Breathalyzer test after he was taken into custody, telling the officer he wanted an attorney.

Waste agency gained strength during 2000

Board discovered it was intended to operate as an autonomous entity after its initial year

Although by midyear, the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority board fired its manager, the coalition emerged as the end of December a strong entity with power to regulate garbage collection rates.

Members of the authority board, composed of representatives from the county and four of its five municipalities, discovered that they should have claimed jurisdiction over rates a year after the authority was formed in 1992.

Researching early agreements, they learned that only for the first year was the board required to include elected officials from each of the then-six-member entities.

After that initial year, the authority was to operate more autonomously and was not required to go back to each entity for elected boards to approve rate increases.

Since reviewing that information, residential rates in the county were increased by the authority for the first time from \$5.25 to \$6.75 per month. Commercial rates went up throughout the service area of the authority and residential rates in villages increased in an attempt to bolster a budget that was lagging behind growing expenses.

Ruidoso, part of the initial board, broke away more than two years ago to handle garbage collection within its borders. But the village retained one representative on the board, who only votes on issues involving the regional landfill south of Alamogordo.

The authority, Ruidoso, Otero County and its municipalities are partners in the landfill that was built by the two-county coalition and is operated by the city of Alamogordo.

That was one of the major goals of the Lincoln County authority when it was formed shortly after the state changed landfill operation and closing rules.

Small landfills in the county were shut down to avoid the more stringent regulations that went into effect. For a while, the county dumped its garbage in Roswell and hauled its debris to a restricted landfill in Capitan.

Although Ruidoso officials resisted rate increases while the village was a member of the authority's garbage collection service, they apparently saw the situation differently once the village took over its own area.

Rates went up for garbage collection and later to accommodate heavy yard waste loads.

Although some people questioned the potential for conflict of interest, Rick Simpson, a county commissioner who served as a representative on the authority board, applied for and was hired in August as the new manager.

He resigned from the authority board and the county commission selected a Hondo resident to replace him.

By year's end, talk of looking at alternative garbage collection by village officials in Capitan and Carrizozo also seemed to have died out as Carrizozo Mayor Manny Hernandez was appointed to serve on the authority board.

Ruidoso then fought back to take the consolation championship, but it wasn't easy.


Capital 64, Ruidoso 55

"We've got to learn to be a little more patient," he said. "Learn to slow down."


Carrie Line led the Warrior with 11 points while Silva had 10.

Ronquillo had praise for freshman Dusti Franklin, who started all three games and just missed double figures in two. She also was strong on the boards, Ronquillo said.


While the Warrior record may not look good, and could be discouraging to the team, Ronquillo said Ruidoso's opponents are nothing to look down at.

Four violent deaths result in very different futures

Mon accused in four violent deaths ended the year 2000 looking at vastly different futures.

One awaits sentencing for first-degree murder, another probably faces a second trial for murder and three took plea agreements.

His long-time personal partner already sentenced to life by an Otero County jury for the strangulation death of Elizabeth Lankhorst-Ballard in March 1998, Christopher Faviell pleaded no contest, in February to second-degree murder and aiding and abetting.

In 1999, a Lincoln County jury found Faviell guilty of tampering with evidence in connection to the death of his former girl friend. He was sentenced to 18 months. But the



jury deadlocked 10-2 for conviction of the eater and concession operator on a murder charge. The majority favored a manslaughter conviction.

Seven years is one more year that Faviell would have received on a manslaughter conviction. He will be eligible for parole in about three years and two months.

Faviell was accused of "finishing off" Lankhorst-Ballard after his transvestite lover, Charles "Eva" Martinez knocked her to the floor of their

rented house in Ruidoso and then began strangling the woman with her scarf. He admitted to helping Martinez bury Lankhorst-Ballard's body in a shallow grave in Otero County on remote property outside of Tularosa previously owned by Faviell's mother.

It took four years to bring Mississippi-born Harry Doyle Monk Jr. to trial for the shooting death of his friend on a hunting trip in the Capitan Mountains.

But after jurors heard testimony from Monk's son that he witnessed his father shoot Daniel Van Beman without provocation, they took just 90 minutes to return a guilty verdict. It was the first time in at least 15 years a defendant in Lincoln County was convicted of first-degree murder.

Monk's wife and son testified about years of abuse by the defendant. His daughter talked about his incestuous relationship with her that resulted in a pregnancy. Prosecutors contended Monk decided to kill Van Beman to blame the pregnancy on the unsuspecting buddy, then tell authorities he ran to avoid prosecution.

The two women said Monk forced them to drive back from Mississippi to Van Beman's grave in New Mexico to check his pockets for money or drugs he may have been carrying.

Monk was set to be sentenced Dec. 15, but the hearing was postponed until 2001.

Johnny Ray Gutierrez stood trial in July for the stabbing death of Allsup's convenience store clerk John Diebler in August 1998.

But after listening to five days of testimony and deliber-

ating for nearly two days, his jury split on both the murder and robbery charges against him. He was to be retried Dec. 4, but it was delayed until 2001.

Jurors after the trial said they were bothered by the lack of fingerprints or blood evidence linking Gutierrez to the crime.

Although the prosecution produced two witnesses who placed Gutierrez at the store on U.S. 70 in Ruidoso, the jury found the woman who said she was his companion to be less than credible and pointed to conflicting description details by the other witness.

Diebler, who was working the late night/early morning shift alone and with no video camera hooked up in the store, was stabbed 27 times. His body

was found sprawled on the floor in the men's restroom.

Money and beer were missing from the store.

Last month, two men charged in the shooting death of John Mirabel in August 1999 were sentenced after pleading no contest to lesser charges.

Pete Noce of Silver City, who fired the gun during a scuffle with Mirabel in front of the dead man's condominium, was convicted on involuntary manslaughter, a fourth-degree felony.

He was sentenced to 18 months plus one year for using a firearm. He was given another 18 months for tampering with evidence. With time off for good behavior, Noce could serve less than one year in prison.

District Attorney Scot Key

said that the facts of the case did not support a murder conviction, because Mirabel was an aggressor in the situation that was fueled by a night of drinking at a local bar.

Noce's friend, Jack Stepp of Las Cruces, who owned the gun, was convicted of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon, a third-degree felony. The district judge deferred the sentence for three years and placed him on supervised probation.

Other conditions attached to their sentences included apologizing to Mirabel's family, speaking to children about the consequences of alcohol abuse and contributing their time toward the construction of a project dedicated to Mirabel's memory.

Fire department friction caused turmoil in Ruidoso Downs

The village of Ruidoso Downs saw some turmoil during 2000. Friction was especially evident between the village's administration and former members of the fire department.

First there were changes in government following the March election. Mayor Joe Hayhurst was out when voters elected retired state policeman Bob Miller. While three of four trustees remained on the village council, newcomer Jim Bassett joined the political body. And the village early in the year had its first administrator. Bob Durrett was appointed to the post. After Miller was seated long-time village clerk Leann Weisbrecht was replaced with Gladys Dillard. The new mayor said he wanted his own clerk.

The fire department friction quickly rose as some members of the department balked at the plans for what was to be a new fire station near the vil-

lage's east end. Meanwhile the village was looking into the operations of the department, especially after contentions of padded payments for volunteer responses. A special audit of the department was commissioned by the village.

On May 4, apparently believing there were serious issues, the village administrator issued a letter to fire chief Nick Herrera, placing him on paid leave. Herrera was told to leave the fire station and remain off village property and equipment. Earlier memos to the fire chief questioned him about village council unapproved mutual aid agreements, the "unsafe conditions at the fire station," and other matters. Herrera said he knew the new village administration, who he said "got rid" of the previous village clerk, was out to get him.

Two weeks later volunteer Don Smith, the department's second in command, was suspended. In a show of support for the fire brigade's leaders the remaining 14 volunteers



walk out following a meeting with Miller, Durrett, Bassett, and village attorney Dan Bryant. New volunteers stepped forward to provide fire protection.

A subpoena was issued to gather bank records of the Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department, as the special audit proceeded and the district attorney's office initiated a probe.

Village officials said they had sought the bank records from fire department officials.

"I delivered to him (Durrett) an envelope full of ashes," Smith said on May 22. "I told him he obviously couldn't get a

court order for the bank records, so here's an envelope full of ashes." Smith contended the account was the department's "private account." The audit would later show that the fire department account was opened years ago using the village's federal ID number.

Village administrators and some of the department members continued to spar, sometimes during council meetings. A threat by the village attorney to end council meeting public input segments never materialized. Miller said the public input part of the agenda had gotten unruly and personal.

On June 30, after just over five months on the job, Durrett resigned as the village administrator, citing personal circumstances. During a council workshop on Aug. 2 trustees decided not to replace Durrett. Some village employees said the village didn't need Durrett's "micro-management" approach.

Nick Herrera's paid suspension ended on Aug. 28 when the village council, following an executive session, fired the chief. Herrera appealed the decision with a post-termination hearing finally begun on Dec. 18. Bryant, using the special audit that had been kept under wraps since its June completion, painted a picture of financial and operational issues in the fire department. Herrera's attorney J. Robert

Beauvais argued politics was behind Herrera's dismissal. The hearing will continue in February.

Apparently unrelated to the administration versus former fire department members dispute, long time village trustee Ray Hayhurst, the brother of the former mayor, resigned on Oct. 19. In his resignation letter Hayhurst said he had moved from the village limits.

Kids and Corrective Lenses

Although most children between the ages of 3 and 18 receive some sort of vision screening through their school system, each child should be seen annually by a licensed Doctor of Optometry. While screening does provide an indication for corrective lenses, it does not tell about eye health, depth perception, color vision or peripheral vision. These visual conditions can only be determined by a comprehensive eye health and vision examination. Other conditions including strabismus (abnormal alignment of the two eyes or turned eye), amblyopia (poor sight in one eye) and emmetropia (good vision at distance but not at near) usually require corrective lenses. Children who have eye problems are occasionally misdiagnosed with Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD) or other conditions that don't necessarily address their vision. Vision therapy such as eye exercises or vision training may help correct certain visual disorders and thus make visual tasks, especially reading, enjoyable.

Lenses for children are often made of plastic material. However, a polycarbonate lens is recommended since it is the most impact-resistant and thus the safest lens available. Glass lenses should never be used for children. Prisms can be a helpful tool for enabling a child who experiences double vision. Aspheric lenses can reduce the effect of magnifying the eye in high plus powers and make lenses thinner and lighter.

Dub says...

Lincoln County's legislator surveys the chances for educational improvement as the 2001 Legislature nears its opening.

Substantial pay raises for teachers are in the recommendations of the Education Initiatives and Accountability Task Force and in bills to be submitted to the Legislature.

Rep. W. C. "Dub" Williams, R-Glenwood - who taught school from the mid-1950s to the mid-1980s in Ruidoso - would like to vote for a pay raise for teachers if someone could show him a permanent stream of money, he said recently. Williams is a member of the task force and the Legislative Education Study Committee that drafted education bills.

"People say we need to pay teachers more so we can compete with surrounding states. I agree, but where are we going to get the money?" Williams asked. "Show the Legislature a money stream that's permanent and I'd vote tomorrow for raises for teachers."

The Education Initiatives and Accountability Task Force was appointed by the Legislature, and one of the recommendations recently released was to "align salaries to licensure levels and shift to a professional educator salary system" (Dec. 4 draft document).

This includes increasing the salaries for teachers with 1-3 years of experience from the current minimum of \$22,000 to \$30,000; increasing level-2 teachers to a minimum of \$40,000; increasing master-level teachers (holding master's degrees, national Board Certification, etc.) to \$50,000; and increasing the average minimum salary for principals to \$72,000 "to reflect CEO responsibilities."

Williams acknowledges that there's a teacher shortage, especially in math, science, special education and bilingual education, and his committee drafted bills to introduce to the Legislature that would, it hopes, encourage more people to become teachers or to return to teaching after retiring (see box).

Williams said he also supports alternative licensure for people who have experience in a field but don't want to go back to college for teacher certification, as well as for "non-degreed Native Americans and others to teach native languages and culture, art, music and similar disciplines" (discussion draft, Dec. 7).

Speaking of legislation the education subcommittee drafted to introduce to the Legislature, Williams said the committee has identified about \$4.5 billion for "schools that are falling down around the ears of children."

Recommendations of the task force, he said, is a "Christmas wish list; we're not going to get everything we ask for." He added that he served on a committee his first session in the House in 1994 that came up with a similar list. This one differs in that costs have been put to the recommendations.

"We may be able to do the one-time things based on the \$440 million avail-

able (new revenue from extraction of oil and gas)," Williams said. "But there'll be more than a billion in requests. Last year we had less than \$100 million total to distribute and we had \$1.2 billion in requests."

The Permanent Fund

The task force recommends tapping into the permanent fund for public schools, but Williams said these funds come from nonrenewable resources - oil and gas revenues - and he's opposed to using them.

"The permanent and severance tax is there for what is considered a rainy-day situation. At this point, it's not a rainy-day situation," he said. "Some people are saying we have a rainy day because they'd like to see teachers' salaries raised, but can we go there all the time? If we took (salary increases) from interest off the permanent fund and didn't put something back in, what happens down the road when we need something?"

Parental responsibility

Williams spoke at length about improving the school environment by bringing parents into the equation to a greater degree.

"If we want the schools the way they used to be, with discipline, we've got to bring parents into the lives of children," he said. "The way I grew up, if you had trouble at school, you had trouble at home. The way it is now, the teacher's in trouble."

Williams wants to focus on the family and see discipline back in the schools, with rules and consequences for behavior. He pointed out the task force's recommendation for charters of parents' and students' responsibilities.

"I think we might see some of this coming out of some other legislation," he said. "I would certainly vote for it. I would think a majority of the people would go for that."

The task force also recommended conducting an intensive public information campaign on the importance of parental involvement in schools and the importance of student attendance at school, at an estimated cost of \$100,000, and to develop "creative ways to attract parents to participate in children's education" (draft document), at no cost.

Williams reminisced about the PTAs that were common until about the mid-1980s. He

said the meetings deteriorated until only teachers attended.

"They got so busy with their own lives, with two parents having to work, by the time she got home, she had to tend to the children and had already worked eight hours," he said.

Governance

The task force recommended doing away with the State Board of Education and replacing it with a 15-member commission on education, and establishing a secretary of education serving as a member of the governor's cabinet.

Williams doesn't think this will "fly," although having a secretary of education would mean somebody could be held accountable, he said.

Testing

The task force recommended establishing "an assessment system that includes criterion-referenced testing" and investigating alternatives to get the system running "as quickly and cheaply as possible."

A criticism of the State Department of Education's accountability system is that the standardized tests used to rate students and schools are norm-referenced, comparing students nationwide, and not criterion-referenced, which measures students' achievement based on New Mexico content standards and benchmarks.

"This change will occur," Williams said, adding that the controversy over rating the schools based on standardized tests "created a morale problem for teachers, not knowing how they're going to be measured," he said.

While this is being investigated, the task force suggests "off-the-shelf, end-of-course tests for a designated core of high school courses required for graduation."

Finding more teachers

Bills to address the teacher shortage:

- Providing for retired teachers to return to teaching without losing their retirement benefits.
- Enacting the Teacher Loan for Service Act, which would provide students with the financial means to complete their post-secondary teacher preparation education. Upon completion of one year of service (teaching), 50 percent of the principal plus accrued interest would be forgiven. Another act provides for awards that would repay the loan based on the location of the teaching site.
- Student teacher scholarship program to encourage people to enter the teaching profession and to retain teachers.
- A mentorship program to ease the transition for new teachers.
- Enacting the Teacher Cadet Act to encourage high-achieving students in grade six through 12 to become teachers.

ENMU-Roswell receives quality award for second time

ENMU-Roswell was a Roadrunner recipient in 1997. Provost Travis Kirkland, Ph.D., said "receiving the award again for the year 2000

is a real accomplishment for the college.

"The receipt of this award reflects the continued growth and improvement of the campus," Kirkland said. The Quality Council and subcommittees on campus responded to the questions in the award application and Dean of Instruction

Judy Armstrong, Ph.D., Rollah Aston, Learning Resource Center director and Peggy George, administrative secretary, compiled the final document.

Armstrong said the application fit the criteria for an annual quality review by an external agency under the college's new accrediting process.



The Mini Page Map of the U.S.A.


