## Demolition stirs memories

Workers find artifacts as they reduce the old skating rink in Midtown to history

Gliding around the Bonal Skating Rink on summer nights formed the basis for many brief flirtations and long-lasting romances in Ruidoso in the 1950s.

When demolition work started earlier this month on the old wooden building at the corner of Sudderth and Eagle drives, a few mementos were salvaged and lots of memories were stirred.

Herb and Ann Brunell both skated there before they were married.

"The skating rink covered the entire building," Brunell said. "You could rent skates. I would come up with my family from Alamogordo in the summer. There were a lot of activities. They would play music and have

skating for girls only and then for boys only and then the music would change to signal skaters to change direction."

A second rink, covered by canvas and only used in the summer, also operated during the 1950s behind the Thunderbird Curio Shop, which was the Pack Drugstore back then. But the wooden building was the big meeting place for teenagers.

"I remember seeing a sign in the rink that was suppose to read 'For health's sake, skate,' but someone had written in 'For George's health sake, skate,' referring to the owner George Bonal," Brunell said.

Bonal and his wife also owned a motel where Village Plaza now sits.

Joanne Hall ran around with Ann Brunell in her single days.

"I skated many miles at that rink," she said. "I skated all of the time. A lot of couples got together there. Ann and I were buddies. She had a open Jeep and I had a red convertible. We were glad to see summer come because all of the Texas boys arrived."

During those years, Sudderth was a narrow dirt road, the sidewalks were board and hitching posts were stationed in front of the buildings, she said.

The town was protected by one marshal and his assistant, and about 200 children attended the local schools.

Former Ruidoso mayor Lloyd Davis said the rink was built by a Judge Sealey, a justice of the peace, about 1940.

## Police bust suspected meth lab

Drug-making chemicals found in hotel room

A suspected methamphetamine lab, discovered Monday in a room at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, was raided by local, state and federal police.

Arrested and charged with manufacturing methamphetamine was Randy L. Baca, 39, of Albuquerque.

According to a New Mexico State Police report, the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency was brought into the case as well.

"Room cleaning ladies had gone into a room to do daily cleaning," said Officer Weston Hacker with the state police. "They noticed suspicious items and notified security. Security realized that there was something there and called BIA (Bureau of Indian Affairs) police."

Hacker said BIA-Mescalero Agency Police Chief Troy Bolen, who he described as knowledgeable about methamphetamine lab operations, realized the room contained more than just drug paraphernalia. Bolen notified state police, Hacker said.

"There were chemicals present," Hacker said. "When I got out there and saw some of these items it was apparent there was a meth lab."

Baca, who returned to the room, was taken into custody. He was taken to the Otero County Detention Center with the felony drug manufacturing charge filed in Magistrate Court at Alamogordo.

Narcotics agents from the state police were also called in to work the investigation. The DEA had obtained a search warrant for the room.

The inn was not evacuated, but Hacker said adjoining rooms and the nearby area were cleared out for safety and security reasons.

Methamphetamine manufacturing can be an explosive process, though Hacker said he was told the process Baca is accused of using involved "cold cooking," and the situation was stable. He said nothing was "cooking" when police arrived.

## Village code snags Rotary fund-raiser

A sign of the times

A sign announcing the Rotary Club of Ruidoso's scholarship fund-raising enchilada dinner had to be moved after village code enforcers confiscated it.

"We went out there and took it," said Joseph Patoskie, director of the village's planning department. "The sign is not allowed in the right-of-way. We did call the Rotary president and let him know we took the sign. They got the sign back."

The sign was posted along Hull Road near the White Mountain Recreational Fields, a location that has seen the same sign twice a year in the past.

But the village invoked the Ruidoso sign ordinance.

"We enforce it among everyone," Patoskie said. "I don't want people to think we selectively enforce it. We had contacted a number of businesses in town to take down their pancake signs."

Ruidoso Rotary Club president-elect Sam Swearingin said a "common sense" exemption would be to allow civic clubs to place signs such as the twice-a-year enchilada dinner sign.

Swearingin said the placard has been placed at the same location along Hull Road for the past 10 to 15 years just before the scholarship fund-raising dinner.

The sign was relocated late last week to Gavilan Canyon Road, just outside the village limits.

In addition to the sign, a banner

announcing the dinner was threatened with removal from the tennis courts area of Schoolhouse Park because it was larger than a 32-square-foot limit. He said instead of taking the sign down, the village "red-tagged" it, meaning it must be brought into compliance within seven days. He said that will be after the enchilada dinner, which was held last night.

Mayor Robert Donaldson, a Rotarian, said the matter was a "non issue."

"They have to come before the council and they can get a permit," the mayor said. "It was just an issue of the Rotary not knowing the rules."

Donaldson said the council can allow civic organizations to place a short-term sign on village right-of-way.

## Commission to discuss hospital's market value

The question of how much Presbyterian Healthcare Services should pay the county to lease the Lincoln County Medical Center has the potential to generate some lively discussion during the County Commission meeting Thursday.

The state Attorney General's office issued an opinion last April that a fair-market price must be paid by the Albuquerque-based firm,

something never required as part of the contract between the two entities for the more than 20 years it has managed the hospital.

The meeting begins at 9 a.m. in the commission chambers of the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

James Gibson, administrator of the hospital in Ruidoso, is No. 11 on the agenda, just before a presentation by employees of the Carrizozo Health Clinic about allowing them to operate the clinic in

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# Capitan school board dismisses coach

Despite pleas from some parents to the contrary, the Capitan Municipal School Board Thursday voted to dismiss the high school varsity girl's basketball coach.

The dismissal also means Cindy Terry will not have a teaching position at Capitan in the fall.

"The board approved my recommendation for the termination of Ms. Terry," said Diana Billingsley, superintendent of the school district. "In our district, termination means nonrenewal. It doesn't mean she's fired immediately."

Billingsley said Terry will continue as a Capitan School

employee until the end of the current school year.

"Why are they firing her as a teacher when the issue was with coaching?" asked Jana Townsend, a parent who has been an outspoken supporter of Terry. "We're furious with our school board," she said of the group that has argued to retain Terry as a teacher and basketball coach.

Townsend estimated more than 100 people attended the April 12 meeting that resulted in Terry's nonrenewal.

Earlier this month, nearly 60 students and parents confronted the school's athletic director and high school principal about his recommendation not to rehire Terry.

Principal Darrel Stierwalt called it an agonizing decision.

The comments delivered to Stierwalt at April 2 meeting called Terry a caring teacher.

Billingsley said the board action, discussed in executive session, provides for no further appeal process.

The superintendent said confidentiality required her and the board not discuss the reasons for Terry's dismissal.

"She (Terry) can request the letter," Billingsley said.

A letter of non-renewal was mailed to Terry on Friday, the superintendent said.

Townsend said the group, called the Committee to Make

Our School Accountable for Their Actions, will hold a rally in the near future at the Capitan schools complex in support of Terry.

"She has done nothing wrong in the school," Townsend said. "We're continuing. We're not stopping here. She may not get her job back, but we're going as far as we can go with this. If their main goal is sports then there's something wrong."

Terry has been a middle school physical education instructor the past two years in Capitan.

At the start of the 2000-2001 school year she became the high school varsity basketball coach.

The Bonals operated it in the 1950s, and George and Mary Ann Gardenhire from Dallas bought it in 1958. They left in 1964 and a man named Biza from El Paso either leased or owned it after that, he said.

Hall remembers her mother sewing curtains for the new wooden booths built at Pee Wee Taylor's sawmill down the street and installed by the Gardenhires around the rim of the floor of the rink. She helped hang the curtains, Hall said.

The skating floor of the building was built right on top of the original floor, Davis said. "I don't think the building ever

had a foundation worth talking about. They probably did it to keep it from sagging."

He remembers skating there as recently as about 15 years ago for a birthday party thrown by Georgia and Lee Griffin, a local attorney.

When the the demolition crew started pulling off pieces of the roof and side slats this week, Frank Potter, former village and county manager and now owner of a restaurant and shop next to the old building, stopped by to see if anything was worth preserving.

He was given two posters, one advertising Chesterfield cigarettes with two young peo-

ple skating and the other a U.S. Forest Service's poster urging fire prevention.

The poster shows a red wolf symbolizing fire and admonishes people not to turn the outlaw loose in the forest.

Retired Forest Service employee Paul Jones said he remembers the poster as being from the World War II era, but he didn't have any background on its origins. Neither did the Forest Service office in Alamogordo. The agency's historian in Washington D.C. could not be reached Tuesday.

Jones said Walt Disney drew some of the fire prevention characters that preceded

Smokey Bear in the 1950s, but he wasn't sure if the red wolf was one of them.

The new owner of the building, who asked not to be identified, said her original plan was to preserve the old structure.

"But when we got into the structural aspects, it was better to go ahead with a new building," she said. "I plan on 4,600 square feet on the top floor and 3,600 on the bottom."

She envisions retail sales in the building, she said. The shell of the new structure should be up by Aug. 1, but she'll wait to finish the interior until she has businesses signed up, she said.

the county seat without a management company in charge, Presbyterian now manages the clinics in Carrizozo and Corona.

Prior to Gibson's item, County Commissioner Leo Martinez asked for a discussion of House Bill 322, a bill providing for an exemption to the state procurement code for counties arranging contracts for firms to manage their public hospitals.

The bill was aimed at removing a legal requirement under the procurement code for

counties to seek competitive bids for management services every four years.

Another health-related item focuses on Senate Bill 82, which expanded the definition of health care providers eligible to be reimbursed for care of the medically indigent in the county. Before, private physicians were excluded.

Other items include:

- A review of options available for improvements to the Lincoln Mutual Domestic Water Consumer's Association

system.

- Public hearings starting at 10 a.m. to consider the rescinding of outdated ordinances. The first three up are the 1975 county ordinance on control of dogs and cats, a 1975 ordinance granting certain rights to the Continental Telephone Company of the West and an ordinance providing for speed limits on county roads.
- Summary review plat approvals for Coyote Ridge subdivision by James and Carol Brophy and Alamo Canyon Estates subdivision by

surveyor D.T. Collins.

- Setting a day for commissioners to visit every community in the county.

- A discussion of new water rights transfers and alternatives for people to dispose of yard waste.

- An update on the first few weeks of operation for the new county detention center in Carrizozo.

- A petition calling for county zoning and a discussion of revisions to the Extraterritorial Zoning ordinance dealing with a one-mile area around Ruidoso.

**CATARACTS AND VISUAL IMPAIRMENT**

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# Mom allegedly partied, left kids at home alone

## Ruidoso woman faces felony abuse charge

A Ruidoso woman has been charged with felony child abuse for allegedly leaving two children home alone while she went out drinking.

Alvanessa Rodriguez, 37, was taken into custody April 14 after police were called to remove an unwanted person from the lobby of the Comfort Inn at 2709 Sudderth Drive.

The case actually began about an hour earlier, just before 2 a.m., when officers were called to The Quarters nightclub at 2535 Sudderth Drive.

There police saw a man standing in the middle of Sudderth Drive, yelling profanities at a nightclub bouncer, according to a police report.

The bouncer had reportedly intervened when the man, Joshua B. Johnson, 20, allegedly tried to pull Rodriguez from a van.

Johnson and Rodriguez reportedly had been drinking in the bar and were described as domestic partners.

Johnson was arrested

for disorderly conduct, being a minor and allowing himself to be served alcoholic beverages and being a minor in a licensed liquor establishment.

When police talked with Rodriguez, she asked to have a friend drive her home because her two children were there alone. An officer complied with the request.

But at 3 a.m. police encountered Rodriguez at the Comfort Inn, where she was taken into custody for detoxification. An officer went to the woman's Mechem Drive apartment where a 7- and 10-year-old were found asleep in the unlocked, single-room cabin.

Rodriguez had weekend custody of the children.

One of the children said his mother was at home when they went to bed about 7 p.m.

The child-abuse charge approved by an assistant district attorney is a third-degree felony.

The children were initially turned over to the state's Children, Youth and Families Department.

# Six months later, man's plan approved

Six months and two redesigns later, Jim Brown walked out of the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission meeting Monday with approval on a commercial site plan for his lot on the east side of Carrizo Canyon Road.

But Brown said at the end of the meeting he's not bitter, just thankful that the Ruidoso village planning staff that provides administration in the zone continued to work with him to come up with a plan that would meet requirements.

The problem occurred because his first proposals centered on storage units, a use

not recognized in the one-mile zone around Ruidoso because of "holes" in the ordinance passed decades ago.

But this time, Brown proposed building a second retail store on the quarter-acre lot, which would mesh well with an existing 828-square-foot shop building and 1,400-square-foot home and garage. The new 36-foot by 32-foot store would be situated between the home and existing shop. The plan contains six parking spaces, one for handicap.

Brown said the driveway would be built with, base course and although he preferred using a dumpster farther down the street for trash, he agreed to provide an en-

closure for trash collection on the property because it is required for businesses.

Phillis Barnett, acting as chairman in Glen Barrow's absence, said she would prefer that Brown narrow down the possible uses of the shops because some of the broad categories could lead to less desirable activities. She noted that a proposed large garage door could accommodate an automobile service center, which would not be compatible in the area.

Brown said he could remove the door, but thought it would be appropriate for a business that must unload merchandise or to display goods during the day. He said he has no idea who may want to rent the space and

he would like to leave his options open. He will build it to the preference of a business owner, Brown said in response to a query by member Reynaldo Valcarcel about restrooms and electrical requirements.

Member Teri Sodd, who cast the only vote against approval, said she's concerned that without a specified use for the building, something undesirable could move in if Brown sold the property.

Joseph Patoskie, director of planning and zoning for Ruidoso, said his code enforcement officers will respond if neighbors complain or they detect something happening at the site that does not conform to the code.

# Convenience store site gets commission OK

Plans for a convenience store, car wash, gas pumps and a fast-food drive-through window were approved Monday for the southwest corner of the intersection of Ski Run Road and State Highway 48.

Members of the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission approved the application of Don and Stanley Brewer with conditions that the sign for the Shell Oil business not be higher than 20 feet and that all other ET code requirements are met and building permits obtained.

Member Teri Sodd voted against the motion by Frank Higgins. Earlier in the meeting, she questioned the legitimacy of

a drive-up window within the store, because it was not included in plans presented last month.

"I wanted a full explanation and felt it needed further discussion," Sodd said.

Higgins also wanted provisions to ensure that people don't park in front of the convenience store.

Representatives for the project said signs would be installed prohibiting parking in front of the store.

They said the fast food operation would be similar to the Santa Fe Grill the Brewers incorporated into their operation on Sudderth Drive near the Ruidoso Senior Citizens Center.

Joseph Patoskie, director of planning and zoning for the village, which provides

administration for the ET zone, said restaurants are permitted within the 1-mile zone around the village, as are retail sales and service stations. The staff interprets serving food items as part of retail sales. If tables were added, standards for a restaurant would be imposed and the Brewers would have to apply for a change in their site plan, he said.

Engineer John Shaw said a state highway official is working with him on designing the access from the highway and a turn lane into the business off Ski Run Road.

The application includes that the site plan covers the entire lot, but the Brewers own the adjoining land, handicapped access parking was provided and a water runoff detention pond constructed.

# Manager gets new contract

A new one-year contract for Ruidoso Village Manager Alan Briley was approved unanimously Tuesday by the Ruidoso Village Council.

All conditions and terms remained unchanged, including the \$62,000 annual base salary.

Briley was hired in

September 1992 as deputy manager and was promoted to manager in 1998.

Last year, he received a one-time merit increase of 5 percent.

Councilors Bill Chance and Linda Flack said they appreciated his work and guidance to the board.

### El Paso teens arrested

Two El Paso teens were arrested April 14 for shooting paint balls at vehicles on Mechem Drive.

Police were notified by two motorists who said their vehicles had been hit by paint balls. A search for a Mercury Mountaineer with the teens turned up the SUV. The two 16-year-old boys admitted shooting paint balls with the permission of the driver of the vehicle they were in.

Ruidoso police also cited the driver, Laura Perches, 37, El Paso, for careless driving. The Perches vehicle had allegedly passed other vehicles by using the inside left-turn-only lane. The teens were referred to juvenile authorities.

### Shoplifting alleged

Two 13-year-old boys were taken into custody by Ruidoso police April 11 for shoplifting. Officers were called to the Family Dollar store at 123 Sudderth Drive after a security person detained the teens. The juveniles were alleged to have placed several pencil lead containers inside their pants.

The value of the recovered merchandise was \$10.50. The boys were released to their mothers. The case has been referred to the Juvenile Probation Office.

### Church burglarized

Ruidoso police are investi-

gating a burglary at the Gateway Church of Christ, 415 Sudderth Drive. According to a police report the break-in happened overnight April 8-9.

After entry was made to the church, someone broke a door to a food storage area and took two boxes of canned and dry food items.

Damage to the door was estimated at \$100. The case is being investigated as a felony burglary, misdemeanor criminal damage to property and misdemeanor larceny.

## Consider our growing menagerie

No bars worth mentioning for ETZ projects

Linda Flack, a Ruidoso village council member, has a point.

"There has to be some guidance somewhere," she said last week during a debate about the Extraterritorial Zone girding Ruidoso. "If we don't grow healthy, we'll begin to have more and more of a menagerie."

Hers was a voice of reason during a philosophical stand-off between Ruidoso and Lincoln County.

The fact is, property owners in the ETZ don't know what they can do with their land — and in some instances it appears nobody has the authority to tell them. Ruidoso's ETZ Commission presumably can control the mile-wide strip outside the village limits, but questions remain about projects not specifically covered by the village's master plan.

The commission would like to fall back on Ruidoso's rules as a guide in resolving such questions. Alan Morel, the county attorney, doesn't think that's

legal.

The county's ETZ Authority, chaired by Commissioner L. Ray Nunley, wants totally updated ETZ regulations; Nunley and Commissioner William Shwetmann, a member, argue that residents of the ETZ shouldn't be governed by laws made in Ruidoso.

Attorney Charles Rennick, who advises both the village and county ETZ groups, thinks it's OK for the village to use its own zoning rules in the ETZ; Ruidoso's Comprehensive Plan governs development in the ETZ.

And so lawyers argue, the village and county finds no common ground, property owners have no direction to do things legally...

So — it appears now that property owners in the rapidly filling-up strip north of Ruidoso with a yen to do something outrageous with their property (junk yard? pig farm?) have a clear path.

It's sort of like a zoo — or a menagerie — with no bars to separate the tigers from the sheep.

## Young adults now 'snackaholics'

Like children, young U. S. adults are snacking more now than they did two decades ago.

CHAPEL HILL, N. C.— Today, young adults in the United States eat more snacks than they did in the 1970s, a new University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill study concludes. A large increase in total energy from snacks, coupled with increased energy contained in those foods, undoubtedly contributes to the nation's obesity epidemic, researchers say.

The study, which involved responses to detailed surveys of 8,493 U. S. residents, appears in the April issue of the journal Preventive Medicine. Authors of the paper, all at the UNC schools of public health and medicine, are dietitian Claire Zizza, a doctoral student in nutrition; Dr. Anna Maria Siega-Riz, assistant professor of nutrition and of maternal and child health; and Dr. Barry M. Popkin, professor of nutrition.

The two professors, also fellows at the UNC Carolina Population Center, released a different study in the Journal of Pediatrics April 6 showing U.S. adolescents also are eating between meals more often than in the past.

Information analyzed for the investigation came from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's 1977-78 Nationwide Food Consumption Survey and both the 1989-91 and 1994-96 Continuing Survey of Food Intake by Individuals. "In this study, we looked at 19- to 29-year-olds because people in that age group are going through transition — leaving their parents' homes and becoming much more independent in choosing what and how they eat," Zizza said. "Studies of children and adolescents suggest a large increase in the role of snacking, but little was known before now about this behavior in young adults."

Researchers found that snacking prevalence — the percentage of people who ate snacks during the survey — increased in the young adult age group from 77 percent to 84 percent between 1977-78 and 1994. The nutritional contribution of that food to total daily energy intake climbed from 20 percent to 28 percent, chiefly because energy consumed per snacking occasion increased by 26 percent, and the number of snacks per day rose 14 percent overall.

"Snacks going from a fifth of people's total daily caloric intake to almost a quarter might not sound like a lot, but when you look at how many calories that is and how they accumulate over weeks and months, it really is quite a bit," Zizza said. "You only need 3,500 extra calories to gain a pound."

The energy contribution of high-fat desserts to total calories from snacking decreased from 22 percent to 14 percent, but those foods remained the largest single source of energy, she said. The energy contribution of salty, high-fat foods doubled, and both sweetened drinks and alcohol — mainly beer — remained important contributors of empty calories.

"It's clear that the nation is in the midst of an obesity epidemic, but why is not so evident," said Zizza, who worked for the U.S. Department of Agriculture as a dietician for seven years before returning to school. "Some people say Americans eat too much, while others say lack of exercise is the problem. Even genetics might play an important role."

Obesity is increasing in all age groups, she said. Being overweight chiefly results from an imbalance between the amount of energy taken in as food and the amount of energy expended in daily life activities.

## Planning needed to stop blight

The following is a slightly edited version of a letter sent last week to directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

It is my honor to serve as chair of the Lincoln County Planning Commission. That commission has the same responsibility and authority as any other local public planning body.

Lincoln County, however, has no zoning or other similar land use standards in place. The result is random development without any kind of planned growth policy. You can see the results of the lack of standards in Gavilan Canyon and, increasingly, north of Highway 48 (i.e., Mechem north of town). These areas increasingly are developing uses that are incompatible with their surrounding community and that detract from the Billy the Kid National Scenic Byway.

With a 60 percent growth rate in Lincoln County, further haphazard development is likely. An even starker example is on Highway 70 north or Alamogordo. That area has seen a proliferation of junk yards, heavy equipment yards, and even a used mobile home dealership for damaged or burned-out mobile homes, all of which create an atmosphere of sprawl and blight that is not conducive to an attrac-

tive tourist destination. Yet there is currently no regulation or standard which would prevent this type of development anywhere in Lincoln County. Imagine, if you will, such uses adjacent to the Spencer Theater, outside of Old Lincoln, or anywhere on the Billy the Kid Scenic Byway loop.

The planning commission is currently considering the formulation and adoption of a plan to protect and beautify that byway. Such a plan would by no means discourage development or impact the existing, historically significant uses such as roadside fruit and vegetable stands. On the contrary, it would probably encourage smart growth with uses that would enhance the already existing subdivision growth, scenic beauty, and the recreational opportunities for which we are known. For example, businesses that would serve the people living near airport road or off of Highway 48 would be compatible in those areas; industrial enterprises would be designated for industrial or heavy commercial areas, such as already exist in Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and adjacent areas. Tourist-oriented businesses such as hotels, restaurants, shops and recreation facilities would not have to worry about the light, noise, traffic and other intrusive features and industrial and semi-industrial uses nearby. Homeowners would enjoy the same benefits.

This is the essence of zoning the

corridors for planned growth and uses that are compatible with their surroundings. Absent any such standards, the random placing of incompatible uses will continue. Recent industrial development on Airport Road exemplifies that type of growth.

The planning commission has held several fruitful public hearings on this matter. Its efforts have been supported by the Billy the Kid National Scenic Byway Committee, as well as by numerous community and business leaders. We would like to continue these hearings, but first must receive approval from the Lincoln County Commission.

The County Commission, historically, has not favored zoning. It will be meeting in Carrizozo on Thursday, April 19, at 9 a.m. in the county courthouse to consider the matter. There are those in the county who do not view tourism, planned growth and Byway protection as priorities. In our absence, these interests will prevail to the detriment of planned growth.

With a 60 percent growth rate in Lincoln County, much of it centered along these corridors, we must act responsibly to ensure that our beautiful community continues to flourish and prosper, and does not suffer the detrimental and blighting effects of random, incompatible development.

#### Fort Stanton's demise

In March of 1995, no one in state government cared one whit about closing Fort Stanton and turning 214 employees and their families into refugees. The Republican governor (who some in Lincoln County voted for) couldn't wait to close the fort. This sent the staff to the four corners of the state for other jobs, some living here and driving to Roswell or Alamogordo every day for a job.

Some had to go out of state and many chose to just fight the unemployment/underemployment battle so common in Lincoln County. They did this because they had roots here; this was their home.

I am one of those refugees, and my family and I have never fully recovered from it.

I have never spoken publicly about this, but reading the recent articles about the efforts to save the fort and the continued inoptness of the state and the results of the legislative session (or should I say

no results) compel me to write.

I don't know why anyone who was living in Lincoln at the time of the initial closing in March 1995 is surprised that the state Legislature did not vote money to run it next year. It is also not surprising that the GSA would love to dump the fort on some other department.

No one in state government gave one whit about closing the Fort in 1995. No one in Santa Fe gave a whit about leaving the fort sitting empty when the elderly of this part of the state were begging for the long-term care that the fort was transitioning to provide and the staff was ready to implement at the fort in 1995.

# Pow-Wow colorful, dramatic

Mark the first weekend in May as a chance to photograph dramatic and colorful traditional wear sported by dancers participating in the annual Southern Eagle Contest Pow-Wow.

The brilliance of the feathers and beadwork can be dazzling for first-time viewers as dancers twirl to the beat of drum groups from across the country.

Sponsored by the Mescalero Apache Tribe, the powwow May 4-6 in the Mescalero gymnasium about 20 miles southwest of Ruidoso on U.S. 70 will pay more than \$28,000 to winning contestants.

Drummers will include the Cozad Singers from Anadarko, Okla., and Mystic River Singers from Mashantucket, Conn., as host drums, and the Yellow Jackets from Ignacio, Colo., and Oklahoma

Poorboys as invited drums.

Delvin Bennet of the Comanche, Lakota and Dakota in Cache, Okla., will be head gourd dancer. Tommy Spottedbird, a Kiowa from Mescalero will be head man dancer, Delores "Dee Dee" Goodagle, of the Osage, Sac and Fox Nation from Anadarko, Okla., will be head woman dancer, and Wallace Coffey, a Comanche from Lawton, Okla., will act as master of ceremonies. Jackie Blaylock, a Mescalero and Chiricahua from Mescalero, will handle the duties of arena director.

Contest categories include Men's Southern Straight, Men's Northern Traditional, Men's Fancy, Men's Grass, Men's Golden Age, Women's Traditional Buckskin, Women's Cloth, Women's Fancy Shawl, Women's Golden Age, Women's Jingle, Junior Boys and Girls and Tiny Tots Boys and Girls.

Winners in 10 categories will take home \$1,000 each under sponsorship of the tribe, Ruidoso Ford and Casino Apache.

Arts and craft booth space may be rented for \$50, but individuals must provide their tables and chairs.

The three-day schedule starts at 2 p.m. Friday, May 4, with registration and the gourd dance, followed by the grand entry and contest pow-wow at 7 p.m.

Activities start at noon May 5 with the gourd dance, followed by the grand entry and contest pow-wow at 1 p.m., a supper break from 5 p.m. to 6 p.m., and the grand entry and contest at 7 p.m. On Sunday, the gourd dance leads off at noon with the grand entry and contest pow-wow at 1 p.m.

# Residents to see some changes on new property value notices

## Discussing the valuation before mailing could prevent a protest

■ Among other changes this year, property values in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs went up 6 percent.

Property owners in Lincoln County will receive a new and improved valuation form later this month, says County Assessor Rick Silva.

Some also will see some less pleasant surprises because residential values in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs went up by 6 percent and llama, alpaca, emu and ostrich are being assessed as livestock.

"The state says if the animal is useful to man, it is classified as livestock," Silva said. "We have to put them on the tax rolls, but I'd like the owners to come in and discuss the situation with me before the forms are mailed."

That should occur late this week or early next week.

Discussion ahead of time often can eliminate the need for a formal protest, he said.

Silva said the county consists of 48,442 parcels of taxable land and notices will be mailed to the 27,931 owners of that property.

Other changes approved by the Legislature include that privately owned museums in the state will be subject to property tax.

"If they are private and charge a fee for admission, some state officials don't think

they should receive a break, but they are still clarifying that. They have to show they are benefiting the public," Silva said.

Homes and commercial property in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs - the Ruidoso school district - were reevaluated this year because the state ruled the values were too low. Silva increased most residences by 6 percent, but some were higher because of past valuation errors, he said. However, property owners still may pay less than two years ago because of the expiration of a bond issue that affected last year's totals.

Commercial property also was reevaluated, but the increase was not limited to 6 percent, he said. Agricultural land, scheduled to be reviewed this year, won't be changed pending the outcome of a study in connection with a one-year reprieve by the state Legislature. The issue may go to voters to decide, he said.

On the more consumer-positive side, the tax valuation notices now are envelope-size and don't contain the messy carbon copy with sides that had to be torn to open the form, pointed out Doug Whittaker, deputy assessor.

The print is larger, exemp-

tions are highlighted and some of the small print was eliminated, he said. The form also contains a section that can be filled out and mailed in to protest a new value.

"This year, property owners should sit down and take the time to read through the notice and make sure they understand," Silva said. "If they don't agree with the values we've set, they can call the office, tell us why, and we can come out again and take a look. In a formal protest, they have to be able to prove the values they contend are correct."

The protest period runs for 30 days after the notice is mailed and the date will be marked in a box on the form, Whittaker said.

A new exemption can be claimed this year that will freeze residential values for those 65 or older, whose household income is \$18,000 or less, Silva said.

"That doesn't mean their property taxes are frozen," he explained. "The budgets for the cities, county and other taxing entities determine that. This only freezes the value, but they must apply every year for the exemption."

The veteran's exemption - a \$2,000 reduction from taxable value - this year was extended to military serving in Desert Storm and Granada.

# Orthopaedic help available Friday

Children in Lincoln County with orthopaedic problems can schedule an appointment with an outreach clinic this Friday in Alamogordo.

Physicians from Carrie Tingley Hospital at the University of New Mexico Health Services Center will examine patients in a partnership with communities around the state.

The goal is to provide children and their families expert orthopaedic treatment within their own communities.

The session at the New Mexico School for the Visual Handicapped on White Sands Boulevard will be the closest to Ruidoso, according to spokesman Veronica Valencia. Carrie Tingley Hospital conducts 48 community outreach clinics in 16 sites statewide.

Children and young adults up to the age of 21, with chronic physical problems or difficulty with bones, joints and/or muscles, can schedule appointments. Doctors, rehabilitation therapists and orthotists spe-

cializing in support braces, will evaluate and treat patients.

Medicaid and insurance are accepted for payment.

Written pre-authorizations and referrals from the patient's primary care physician are required. For appointment or more information, call 1-800-437-3235, ext. 5270. Advanced scheduling is requested.

Carrie Tingley Hospital originally opened in Hot Springs (now Truth or Consequences) in 1937 to care for children with polio.

**William R. McKinsey**

He was born on Dec. 18, 1919.

His entire professional career was spent in radio and television. For 10 years, he was

He was stockholder, president and general manager of WJRJ-TV of Atlanta, Ga. He built the station in 1965 and sold the station to Ted Turner in 1971 (now WTBS-TV).

In 1971, he became stockholder, vice president and general manager of KCBD-TV, Lubbock, Texas, and KSWB-TV, Roswell, which position he held until his retirement to Ruidoso in 1986. He was also on the board of directors of Texas Commerce Bank during that period.

He was active in Lubbock volunteer organizations as a board member and treasurer of the United Way, president of the Red Cross, vice president of the Lubbock Symphony, board member of First United Methodist Church and many other activities.

He also volunteered his talents as an organizer at many civic functions.

He married the former Muriel Forrest in 1969.

A brother, Howard, preceded him in death.

Survivors include his wife; daughters Anne of Minneapolis, Minn., and Laura Tifts of San Antonio, Texas; a son, Bob Jr. of Minneapolis; a sister, Hester Yeats of Shawnee, Kan.; two nephews and a niece.

**New program to check compliance with ban on tobacco sales to teens**

A program to combat the sale of tobacco products to minors is being launched locally by The Counseling Center, under a contract with the New Mexico Department of Health.

Federal law requires all states, as a condition of receiving substance abuse prevention and treatment funding, to comply with the Public Health Service Act, also called the Synar Amendment.

To do that, states must demonstrate a measurable reduction in tobacco sales to underage young people over the next few years, said Manish Gaur, Synar project manager.

In New Mexico, one in five children age 14 is addicted to tobacco and smokes regularly, according to information from the center.

Daily, tobacco companies spend an estimated \$83,000 on

advertising in the state.

That's more than the health department spends in counter advertising in a year, he said.

Nationally, each year 470,000 people die as a result of using tobacco or being exposed to second-hand smoke, Gaur said.

That's more than AIDS, car crashes, alcohol, homicides, other drugs, suicides and fires combined.

Nicotine addiction was labeled a pediatric disease because most who smoke start as children.

The earlier a person starts smoking, the harder to quit, he contended.

In the next few months, unannounced tobacco compliance checks will occur.

Local tobacco merchants already were contacted to determine whether they need employee training materials,

"We Card" signs or copies of the law on tobacco sales, he said.

Merchants are required to ask for photo identification of anyone trying to buy tobacco products who appear to be under 27 years old.

Failure to comply with the state law could result in merchants being fined up to \$1,000 per incident.

Working through the Behavioral Health Services Division, staff of the counseling center, as prevention providers, want to work with the community to provide a safe environment, Gaur said.

"We will continue to work with our local merchants to ensure they are well informed and have all the necessary training material for their employees," he said.

**Lincoln County capital projects die in Santa Fe political crossfire**

Gov. Gary Johnson's veto of capital outlay bills reportedly was in response to the Legislature's failure to pass his tax cut initiative.

Capital outlay requests approved by the state Legislature during its recent session for counties, municipalities and other entities across the state were vetoed by Gov. Gary Johnson.

Johnson was upset for not receiving the tax cut he wanted from legislators.

Lincoln County Manager Tom Stewart said while the veto hurts the county, "We can operate without it (capital outlay allocations). That may not be the case for some municipalities."

The county was asking for a reallocation of money approved last year for county fairground expansion and improvement.

The village of Capitan was in line for \$315,000 to update its wetlands waste water treatment system and Corona was looking for \$150,000 to improve its water systems. Ruidoso asked for money to build a new fire station at Schoolhouse

Park on Sudderth Drive.

"Part of that money was from the severance tax and part from the general fund," Capitan Mayor Norm Renfro said. "I'm told by Tony Elias (executive director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District) that the state just won't sell the bonds secured by severance taxes and the general fund money will be held in reserve."

"I hope during a special session, they come to agreement. I hear there may be one in September with the redistricting issue. It certainly doesn't look good for everybody in New Mexico."

His village is growing so fast, the waste water treatment system will be obsolete within the next few years, Renfro said. "We'll probably apply for a \$350,000 Community Development Block Grant."

Cathy Muniz, Corona village clerk, said her village desperately needs the water tank that would have been installed with the money from the legislature.

"There's not a lot we can do now; we just just have to decide where to look elsewhere for the money to fund the project," she said. "I don't think any community can afford to sit and wait when we have such desperate

need. The governor may or may give us the money in September and by then, we would have wasted another four months. I was very disappointed."

Mayor Manny Hernandez of Carrizozo said his village was in line for money to renovate city hall, for street improvements and sidewalks.

"This is going to hurt us, but we also received money from a Community Development Block Grant to pave five streets starting this May and \$585,000 from the CDBG colonias program for the sewer system, so we're moving ahead," he said.

Ruidoso Downs didn't receive any allocations from the legislature.

Alan Briley, Ruidoso village manager, said if Johnson doesn't relent, "We'll have to stay with the status quo and put the project in our next year's capital improvement list."

The existing fire station in Schoolhouse Park is "very antiquated," he said.

Village attorney and lobbyist John Underwood was more optimistic:

"I feel relatively certain by September, we'll receive the money," he said. "The project might be somewhat phased. The House gave us \$100,000 and the Senate \$263,000, that's about 75 percent of the \$495,000 we requested."

Timber salvage sales draw no bidders

Forest Service surprised by lack of response that followed initial high level of interest

No bids were received by the U.S. Forest Service for the harvest of a potential 800,000 board feet of timber from trees damaged during the May 2000 Cree Fire.

Jose Martinez, Lincoln National Forest supervisor, notified New Mexico contractors that bids could be placed to remove the burned timber, but received no response despite previous requests from individuals and communities.

The longer the timber sits in open areas, the more susceptible the wood is to pest infestation, he pointed out.

"No one bid on the large timber sales we had to offer," said Matt Reidy, fire management officer for the Smokey Bear Ranger District covering the forest around Ruidoso.

"We contacted Mescalero Forestry Products and others around Cloudcroft, and Rio Grande Products out of

Espanola. I sure didn't anticipate this situation. We were hoping for a good response, because when we first asked, there was a lot of interest.

"The problem may be that the wood market is so soft right now, because housing starts have dropped. A tremendous amount of soft wood is coming from Canada. They are undercutting the local market because for what they sell for, we can't log and sell and have people make a profit on it."

If the agency can't find a company willing to handle the large project, it probably will be broken down into a series of smaller sales, he said.

On top of that, agency officials plan to offer two to five more restoration projects for which contractors may bid.

"These will be smaller jobs for people who contacted us over the last several months interested in house logs, poles and who have portable wood mills," Reidy said. "We call them ranger sales. People come

to the office and we try to meet what their needs are. We go out and negotiate a price in areas we've marked out."

Forest Service officials anticipate salvage operations authorized on the Cree Fire site that burned 8,265 acres should net a total of about one million board feet of timber. An environmental assessment on the fire site was completed as a prerequisite for the sales.

Martinez last week signed a decision notice about a salvage effort on the Scott Able Fire, which burned about 16,000 acres near Cloudcroft and Weed in Otero County during the same month in 2000.

Under the title of the Scott Able Forest Health Project, Martinez selected an alternative that allows salvage harvest of dead standing trees on 2,000 acres, reforestation on about 410 acres and personal

use firewood harvesting.

No new roads will be built, although several miles of closed roads will be open for harvesting activities. The roads will be closed at the conclusion of the project, set to start June 15.

The decision is subject to appeal within 45 days of the date of publication of the legal notice. The decision notice and finding of no significant impact and environmental assessment are available at the supervisor's office in Alamogordo and the Sacramento Ranger District office in Cloudcroft.





## Home sweet home?

RHS track squads face tough teams at their first home meet of the year; Capitan gets a look at some big schools

Spring winds blew throughout the Ruidoso Invitational Thursday, but the biggest obstacle for the Warriors and Capitan Tigers were Class 5A Alamogordo and Carlsbad.

The Ruidoso boys finished second as a team with 83 points, well behind a tough Alamogordo squad that scored 124. But the Warriors did beat some bigger schools, including Carlsbad and Artesia, and finished well ahead of district rival New Mexico Military Institute.

"Any time you have Carlsbad and Alamogordo,

that's top-notch competition," said Warrior coach Ronny Maskew. "Alamogordo got us a lot on their depth. If you're the right kind of person, that competition makes you better and better."

Standing out for Ruidoso at its home meet were Solomon Barnett, Jose Linares, Dominic Gonzales and Cody Small. Barnett snagged three gold medals, while Linares finished second in the 100-meter dash, and Gonzales got first and third in the shot put and discus, respectively. Small also won the high jump.

As the season winds down, Maskew said he is looking to get a few more events qualified for state. The boys already have seven athletes in for 10

events, as well as the 400- and 800-meter relays, but would like to get the other two relays in before the district meet, May 4.

The girls also ran strong at the home meet, but Maskew said there is still a lot of room for improvement.

The Lady Warriors were fifth overall with 42 points, well behind Carlsbad and Alamogordo who had a 124 and 128 points, respectively.

Kammi Sparks led the way for the girls, winning the high jump and taking second in the 300-meter hurdles and fifth in the 100-meter hurdles. Carrie Line and Mindy Brunell also stood out for Ruidoso, each scoring multiple times.

But the girls only have three athletes qualified for state, a number Maskew

would like to increase.

"We still have a lot of work to do," Maskew said. "They can only do what they can do," he added, noting a general lack of experience on the team.

The Warriors head next to Artesia, Friday. The meet starts at 3 p.m.

### Capitan

The Tiger boys and girls came into the Ruidoso Invitational knowing they would likely take home more experience than medals from the meet, but both teams performed exceptionally.

The Lady Tigers finished sixth in the eight-team field, just three points behind fourth-place Robertson and one behind Ruidoso. Jessica

## Golfers on top after first day at Leroy Gooch

Brown defeated opponents from Goddard, NMMI, Roswell, Artesia, and Los Alamos on her way to the singles championship. Her closest match was an abbreviated 5-3 one-setter. Nobody else won more than one game from her.

The rest of the Lady Warriors played well also. Sarah Breecher and Carol Springfels combined for eight more singles victories and Codi

Angermiller played superbly in two exhibition matches.

Ruidoso picked up six more wins on the doubles side as the teams of Haley Valiant and Monica Martinez and Jacque Rankin and Kristan Bewley took three matches each. The Warriors held winning records against all five of the opposing schools except Goddard and went undefeated against the Artesia "B" team.

The boys didn't fare quite as well at NMMI, but did put forth a tremendous effort. Tim Morrison picked up two wins against Roswell and Goddard, Matt Johnston defeated his opponent from Goddard, and Bronson Riser was two games from defeating his opponent from Lovington.

"Bronson and Matt played exceptionally well," Franklin said, "especially against tough competition from Lovington in round two. Both matches could have gone either way. Great hustle from Matt the entire tourney."

The wins and effort are even more commendable considering that the Warriors played 12 straight hours of tennis in the heat of Roswell.

After the NMMI tournament, the Warriors came home to face district rival Portales, where the great play continued. Although the boys could not pull out a victory against the talented Rams, the effort was there.

## Screening: Kindergarten-plus

Kindergarten registration and preschool screenings are coming up this Friday for children from birth through preschool age and for children who will be 5 by Sept. 1. Head Start children will be screened from 9 to 11 a.m., and all other children from 11 a.m. until 3 p.m. at Nob Hill Early Childhood Center.

This is the time to register children for kindergarten and to bring younger ones in for developmental screenings, said Dahn Freed, Child Find coordinator with Region IX Education Cooperative, which works with public school districts. Registration takes about 15 minutes and the screenings about an hour, so snacks will be available, she said.

"People get mixed up and think it's only for children going into kindergarten," Freed said, "but the developmental screening is for all from birth to age 5."

The screenings are important, she said, because "if kids have developmental delays, we can catch them and hopefully treat their delays before school starts, or get them enrolled in a program."

The purpose of the early-intervention program is to identify possible delays in preschoolers, infants and toddlers so there is no interference with their education when they start school.

"For kids going into kindergarten, we can get them set up in a program," Freed

said. "If they have vision, hearing or dental problems, the summer allows families time to get those issues taken care of. There's a lot of follow-up work to do for the beginning of the next school year."

School districts also get their base numbers for next year's staff requirements and funding from the program, she said.

Volunteers do the screenings, including audiologist Yuki Ebara from Roswell, dentists Dylan Midkiff and Randy Barron, speech and language therapists from the school, Lions Club volunteers, who will give vision tests and the Public Health Office, which will give immunizations.

Parents should bring immunization records of their children, and - if they're registering them for Head Start or kindergarten - birth certificates.

Last year, 180 children were screened, about half of them kindergarten-bound.

"We would like to get all of them," Freed said.

Information will be available for parents about early childhood programs, child care centers and hours, Medicaid, Head Start, Children's Medical Services (through the Department of Health, which provides medical expenses and case management for chronic illnesses) and the Lincoln County Literacy Council. The developmental areas to be screened include:

- Motor skills: sensory motor, how a child's system reacts to sensory input; gross motor, large muscles used in running and jumping; fine motor, small muscles used in hand-eye coordination or tying shoes;
- Speech and language
- Hearing impedance and pure tone
- Vision
- Dental
- Nutrition
- Immunizations
- Classroom readiness for kindergarten-age children.

Freed follows up referrals for speech/language and motor, and the appropriate medical professionals follow up referrals in the areas of hearing, vision, nutrition, dental and immunizations.

The award is presented to seniors outstanding in both academics and extracurricular activities.


The faculty determined the recipients by voting.

Our planet Earth has basins, too. One of the Earth's largest basins is the Amazon River Basin in South America. Rain falls into rivers that flow through this huge basin. Mountains, hills and plateaus form the rims.

**Size**  
The Amazon River Basin covers:  
• more than 2 1/2 million acres.  
This river system flows in seven countries, including about half of Brazil.  
• an area about the size of the continental United States.


**Dr. Brazil** is a make-believe field biologist created by the Smithsonian Institution's National Zoo. (A field biologist goes into an area and studies the plants and animals firsthand.)

### The Amazon River Basin

The river and only a few of its tributaries (branches that flow into it) are shown on the map.

The Amazon begins high in the Andes Mountains and flows about 4,000 miles across the continent. Only the Nile River in Africa is longer.

The Amazon River has 1,500 tributaries. Seventeen of these are more than 900 miles long. The Amazon carries one-fifth of all the river water flowing into the oceans of the Earth. The mouth of the river is 200 miles wide where it enters into the Atlantic Ocean.



A boat cruises down a river in Peru. Notice the tropical rain forest that lines the banks.


### The flooded forest



The Amazon furnishes food and transportation for the people who live along it. Houses along the riverbank are built on stilts. Sometimes the waters rise so much that people must move to their roofs.

Each year, for a six-month period, the banks along the Amazon flood. It's amazing how people, plants and animals adjust to these changes. Waters rise from 20 feet to 50 feet and flood an area as far away as 50 miles from the river.

**People**  
Today, about 17 million people live in the Amazon Basin. Of that number, about 250,000 are descendants of the native people who have lived there for 20,000 years.



## The Amazon's Tropical Rain Forest



The rain forests of the world are shaded on this world map.

The Amazon River Basin has the largest tropical rain forest in the world. Temperatures stay in the same range (the 70s and 80s) all year long. Rain falls at the rate of from 80 to 120 inches a year. As plants "transpire" (kind of like breathing), they release water from leaf surfaces. The water rises into the atmosphere, forms clouds and then falls as rain. Moisture also blows in from the ocean.

**Plants**  
Many trees have special trunks with supports that stick out and keep them from falling over. The rain forest is very dense. As many as 280 different types of trees might be found in an area the size of two football fields. Some trees, such as the kapok tree, grow to nearly 200 feet high. The kapok grows as fast as 12 feet per year. Many plants of the rain forest are valuable. They produce rubber, cacao beans (used in making chocolate), vanilla, figs and Brazil nuts. Many plants are used for medicines.



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### The soil

The falling rain washes nutrients, or plant food, out of the soil. Roots of plants don't go down far but rather spread out along the shallow topsoil. Many plants live on other plants. Vines cling to trees. The whole forest area is supported by a web of shallow roots and vines, mosses, ferns and algae. Whenever anything falls to the ground, it is eaten or quickly decomposes.

**Biodiversity**  
"Bio" means life, and "diversity" means variety. The biodiversity is probably greater in rain forest areas than anywhere else. Thousands of different animals, including mammals, fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds and insects, thrive in the warm, damp climate.

The jaguar is one of the 800 or more species of mammals that live in the rain forest. It is the largest cat in the Western Hemisphere.



The emerald tree boa is a constrictor. It coils around prey and squeezes it to death.



This photo will give you an idea of what a flooded area of the rain forest looks like. Plants adjust to being underwater for six months of the year. Animals, including humans, have to make adjustments, too.

More types of freshwater fish live in the Amazon River than in any other river on Earth. One fish, the arapaima, might grow to be 9 feet long. Its diet includes some fruit and a wide variety of insects, fish and birds found on the water's surface.

### The threatened rain forest

Mining for oil and other minerals and clearing the land for farms and homes have threatened the rain forests of the world. There is great concern about the future of the rain forest and other wilderness areas.
