## Residents alarmed by odor of gas

Company gets 400 calls  
stemming from additive

Weary Zia Natural Gas servicemen spent the weekend responding to calls from worried residents who reported the strong odor of gas in their homes.

The calls continued Monday but slowed down on Tuesday, said Mercedes Fernandez-Wells, Zia attorney.

The culprit was a sulfur-based odorant added to natural gas to help people detect leaks. But in most of the more than 400 telephone calls received by Zia, leaks were not the problem, she said.

The odor-producing chemical was moving through the distribution system in a sudden surge, causing the unusually heavy results from pilot lights or gas appliances being turned on, Fernandez-Wells said.

"Since November, we've been increasing the odorant because people need to be able to smell the gas for safety reasons," she said, adding that regulating systems monitor the feed of the chemical from El Paso Natural Gas lines to Zia.

ing in more odorant than normal, she said.

"Of all the phone calls we got, most of them were when they turned on their stoves; before it lights, you can smell it," she said. "A small percentage were loose fittings on meters outside the house and another percentage was that people have leaks in their homes and they need to get those fixed."

Although the servicemen checked for leaks this time, the company's responsibility ends at the meter, Fernandez-Wells said.

"The policy has always been if someone calls and says they smell gas in their house, we go over and shut off the gas line, but tell them to call a plumber for repairs," she said.

The company estimates more than 400 calls were received, she said.

"Out of 10,000 customers, that's not bad," she said. "In the normal industry, you'll have 20 to 30 calls a week anyway because pipes crack and things get broken."

Although the calls have slowed down, servicemen still are checking reports.

"If someone still is smelling a heavy odor after opening the windows and airing out, we want them to call again and we will send a serviceman back to take another look," she said. "It takes a few days for the odorant to get all the way through the system."

## Care center eliminates beds

Nearly two-thirds of the beds at the Ruidoso Care Center will be eliminated this month.

A public relations official confirmed Monday that the 85-bed care facility will see 57 beds closing. The closure will affect two wings at the Resort Drive complex, said Bruce S. Rubin with the public relations firm Weber Shandwick Worldwide in Coral Gables, Fla.

The impacted services will be the Alzheimer's and skilled nursing units.

A letter going to family members of

some of the care center's residents stated the facility deeply regrets the decision.

"The facility has determined that the unit where your loved one resides at the facility will be closed within the next 30 days. All of the residents on this unit will be relocated to another long-term care facility," the letter begins.

"Of course they can go anywhere they want," Rubin said. "Many are going to facilities in Albuquerque, El Paso and to Alamogordo."

Integrated Health Services, Inc., the parent company of Ruidoso Care Center, also operates a care center in

Alamogordo.

"I just think it's absolutely wrong to close it," said Dr. Christopher Robinson, who has an internal medicine practice in Ruidoso and has been the medical director at the care center for 10 years.

"The service that this care center provides for this community is invaluable," Robinson said. "To close it is incomprehensible."

Robinson said family members of some of those that will be displaced said it will be a hardship to spend time with a loved one at a distant

## CLEAN the RIVER

Wearing a T-shirt to promote the 8th Annual Ruidoso River Cleanup Saturday, Dick Wisner navigated a path next to the stream, knelt down and scooped up the remains of a discarded paper cup.

In less than a minute, he illustrated the reason why the Ruidoso River Association, which he heads, puts together a massive rally of muscle each year to gather all sorts of debris and leave behind a clean river.

Last year, 50 cubic yards of paper, plastic, metal and other trash were pulled from the river and its shoreline by hundreds of volunteers. This year, Wisner expects between 400 and 500 people will show up to help.

The rewards are aesthetic and physical. More than \$4,000 in prizes and \$3,500 in food were donated by 116 sponsors. That means everyone who shows up at 8 a.m. at Schoolhouse Park on Sudderth Drive will walk away with a full stomach before picking up trash bags distributed for the clean-up.

With more than 150 prizes, one of every four or five people also will receive a gift, Wisner pointed out. They include 40 dinners for two from restaurants all over town, 10 saving certificates, tickets for Funtrackers, tickets for Sierra Cinema, golf outings, oil changes and gift certificates.

"They're all worth \$20 or more," he said.

## Fired coach says district puts athletics first

A Capitan Municipal School District teacher and coach, fired for inadequate basketball coaching skills, charged the district places athletics before academics.

Cindy Terry, who was hired at Capitan in 1999, received a termination letter last month.

"It started after the basketball season was over," Terry said. "Nothing was said until two to three weeks after the season was over."

Terry, who the past two years has been a middle school physical education instructor at Capitan, was named the high school girls varsity basketball coach for the 2000-2001 school year. In a March 27

letter to Terry, Capitan High School Principal Darrel Stierwalt stated he could not recommend Terry's return as the head basketball coach. The letter recommended Terry resign and seek employment elsewhere or, in the alternative, not be recommended to the school board for rehire.

Terry was terminated on April 12, effective after

the 2000-2001 school year.

Stierwalt listed six concerns in the letter. The concerns were "your lack of knowledge for the game, inability to make changes during the game that benefits our team chances of winning, your lack of head basketball coaching experience, the lack of fundamental drills during practice time, lack of confidence by your players and their parents, (and your) inability to motivate players to play their best."

Defending her coaching abilities, Terry also questioned priorities at Capitan.

"If you're not willing to coach, you're not going

location. The letter, dated April 26, includes a signature space for Ruth A. Wade, RNC, the administrator of Ruidoso Care Center.

The letter claims the center's building experienced some foundation settling two years ago. After being corrected at the time the settling problems have recurred, the correspondence stated.

"Because we pride ourselves in providing the best care possible in a safe and clean environment, the decision was made to close the unit," the form letter stated. "This will allow us to assess the situation further and come up with a plan to address the problem."

Settling of the foundation was detected in 1999, when eight pillars, going to depths of 150 feet below ground level, were constructed to support the structure, Rubin said. He added cracks and separation had returned.

Robinson said if the building has settling problems then integrated Health Services should make repairs. The facility presently has 88 residents. One of the residents in the mother of Brenda Walters of Ruidoso, who said having to travel to possibly Alamogordo to visit her mother would be a hardship.

"If I'm not there (to visit) she'll go crazy," Walters said. "It will be a forced move if they move her there. I'll be kicking and screaming all the way."

Walters said she moved her mother to the Ruidoso Care Center from Hobbs so a family member could be close. In addition to the form letter, Walters also received a notice of transfer or discharge for her mother. The Ruidoso Care Center also employs 82 people. Rubin said about 20 jobs would be eliminated.

"Some have been offered and accepted jobs in Alamogordo," Rubin said. "Other said they would retire. I don't know about the others."

The facility, at 200 Resort Drive, opened in 1975.

# COACH: Capitan school district puts athletics first, ex-coach says

to get a job," Terry said of the Capitan school district. "I didn't go to college for four years to be a coach. I went to be a teacher. Don't get me wrong. I do love coaching."

Capitan Municipal Schools Superintendent Diana Billingsley said the contention that teachers in the district must coach is inaccurate. Billingsley said the district last year hired an English teacher to replace a language arts instructor who had coached three sports. She said the new English teacher does not coach.

"My science teacher doesn't coach," Billingsley said. "My math teachers don't coach. But with a PE teacher, they will coach - that's correct."

The schools superintendent said many teachers at Capitan do coach, however, because of the small size of the district.

"But academics rate higher than sports do," Billingsley said.

Terry's termination has prompted some parents in the district to form the Committee to Make Our School Board Accountable for the Actions. The group's spokeswoman, parent Jana Townsend, said the committee will be present at tonight's school board meeting.

"Our goal is to help our children, to make education the priority for our children and make it better for them," Townsend said. "Sports now is the priority."

Townsend said the Terry termination, based on the performance of the girls basketball team, confirmed that athletics takes precedence.

"She's a great teacher," Townsend said of Terry. "Her (classroom) evaluations were great."

Townsend surmised that Terry was fired because the basketball team only won two games, a disappointing finish for the administration.

Terry called Stierwalt's six reasons for recommending not to rehire her "highly subjective."

She said the girls varsity team was comprised of mostly inexperienced freshmen and sophomores and was the youngest team in the district. She added it was a struggle to win because of competition with teams of experienced juniors and seniors.

"Why would anyone move to a new community, buy a home, make good friends and lose it over 12 weeks as a coach?"

Terry asked. "In essence, I lost my teaching job because I didn't meet the athletic director's secret agenda."

Stierwalt, the high school principal and district athletic director, was unavailable Tuesday.

Townsend said the committee will likely press for a recall of the Capitan Municipal School Board.

Capitan is not alone in hiring instructors that will also be involved in coaching.

"It's not uncommon to hire a teacher to also do athletics or to be a coach," Ruth Williams, with the New Mexico State Department of Education, said of a review of hiring data. "Basically it's a common occurrence in the state."

Williams said the connection of sports and teaching is a matter of district needs.

# Downs trustees look at cutting fire chief

Budgeting for the coming fiscal year in Ruidoso Downs will likely eliminate the post of village fire chief.

The \$26,368 position, which was listed as "new" in an initial budget outline, was tentatively cut by trustees who have been looking to make \$1.5 million in expenditure request cuts.

While Trustee Jim Bassett said during one budget workshop that he believed Ruidoso Downs needed a fire chief, Trustee Judy Miller said she preferred hiring a training person rather than a chief.

"Wonderful stuff has happened here since they're gone," Miller said of last year's dismissal of the fire chief and others on the department.

A village audit and criminal charges filed by the district attorney's office have alleged payments for services by the largely volunteer department were padded in 1999 and the beginning of 2000.

Village Clerk Gladys Dillard said drastic cuts were being made during workshops to match non-enterprise fund expenditures with general fund revenues. The general fund revenues are pegged at slightly more than \$2.3 million for 2001-2002, much of it from gross receipts tax collections.

"They've looked at cutting out some things," Dillard said of the council. "They still have the enterprise (funds like village-provided utilities) accounts to go through."

The council is expected to meet for their sixth budget workshop tonight.

One area the village will likely have to wait to make changes is in employee health insurance coverage. After increasing 20 percent a year ago, the premiums will go up 14 percent this year, Dillard told trustees last week.

"I agree, we need to look into the insurance," Bassett told fellow trustees. "It will be a good task for our new village manager when he comes on board. Are we handcuffed on this because we gave it to them (employees) in lieu of a raise?"

Dillard told trustees a previous council had agreed to have the village pay 100 percent of the preferred provider organization (insurance plan) premiums in lieu of a pay increase that year. Trustee Miller was appalled that village employees don't pay part of the premiums.

# Villages to boost water plant capacity

The board that governs the jointly owned water treatment plant is looking at expansion.

The jointly owned Ruidoso-Ruidoso Downs wastewater treatment plant might see a doubling of its capacity.

Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson said the Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant Joint Use Board has begun to look at the idea of increasing the size of the the plant. The engineer-

ing firm of Wilson and Company will begin a study about ways to finance the expansion.

"Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs continue to have growth," Donaldson said. "We felt it was important to look at doubling the capacity over the next four to five years."

The mayor said Ruidoso Downs is looking at some substantial annexations to the village and Ruidoso has been pushing to get more residents on the sewer system.

Ruidoso has hired a suburban

Washington, D.C. firm to lobby for federal funding for several projects, including sewer line and treatment expansions. The village is seeking \$2.5 million from Congress.

Donaldson also said new wastewater technologies may make a plant upgrade cost effective.

"It's something we need to begin now so we don't run up against a wall in four to five years," Donaldson said.

The regional wastewater treatment facility is east of Ruidoso Downs, along the Rio Ruidoso.

**FOREIGN OBJECTS IN THE EYE**

First Aid Basics: Any material (solid, liquid, gas or laser) beam not naturally found in the eye is considered a foreign body. This includes any caustic liquids, compressed gases, wood, metal, even contact lenses. Another hazard comes from any laser light source. The body has a natural defense against any foreign object in the eye; it produces tears to wash the object out, however, sometimes the body needs a little help.

If this happens to you, call your eye doctor. Your eye doctor's office can give you valuable information and help determine your best course of action. Never rub or press on the eye. Unless the foreign object is from a high speed power source, try to flush it out with water in order to minimize further damage. If the object is embedded in any portion of the eye, you will need to see your eye doctor as soon as possible, this would be considered an emergency and requires an eye specialist.

If someone is with you to assist, have them look thoroughly for any object that cannot easily be seen. They should gently pull the lower lid down and carefully examine its inner surface while you look up, then, the inside of the upper lid. If the foreign object still has not been found, have the person place a Q-Tip across your upper lid, gently fold the upper lid over the Q-Tip and search. If the object is found, flush it out with water or sterile eye wash. If the foreign object still cannot be located, loosely cover the eye with a soft pad and call your eye doctor immediately.

A foreign body usually causes irritation or abrasion which may require further treatment to prevent infection. If irritations or other symptoms continue after an object has been removed, consult an eye doctor promptly.

Power transformers shot up

Crimestoppers offers reward for information on major damage

Lincoln County Crimestoppers, Inc. is offering a reward of up to a \$1,000 in connection with a Thursday shooting of electrical transmission equipment in the Eagle Creek area.

Two of three Otero County Electric Cooperative voltage regulators were shot about 8:30 a.m., Thursday, said Ricky Virden, Lincoln County undersheriff.

"They were shot five times," Virden said. "It was with a high-powered rifle." Investigating officers picked up some bullet fragments, he said.

The vandalism knocked

out electricity in the Alto area for more than 1 1/2 hours, said Jamie Shepperd, office manager for the electric cooperative headquartered in Cloudercroft. Leaking mineral oil from one of the voltage regulators helped fuel a small grass fire at the location on Eagle Creek Canyon Road, a little more than a mile east of Gavilan Canyon Road.

"It happened in front of James Spurgeon's house," said Chris Denne, Bonito Volunteer Fire Department chief. "He said he heard a pop-pop-pop-pop and then a boom," when one of the regulators exploded. Denne said by the time he arrived at the location Spurgeon had already extin-

guished a small grass fire with a fire extinguisher.

"They got shot up pretty good," Denne said of the two voltage regulators. "It was obvious they were shot."

An Otero County Electric Cooperative crew restored power shortly after 5 a.m.

"We bypassed the voltage regulators to restore power," Shepperd said. "They will be replacing them when our load increases."

Shepperd said each of the two pieces of equipment will cost about \$10,000 to replace. She said it has been a long time since someone damaged a transformer or regulating equipment on the electric distribution circuit.

Tools of undetermined value were reported stolen from a pick-up truck that had been parked on Big Bear Road, just outside Ruidoso. The larceny was reported on April 22.

School bus, truck collide; no injuries

The bus driver's effort to avoid knocking off a truck door brings contact with another vehicle.

Ruidoso, told police he was westbound in the outside lane of Sudderth Drive when a person getting into a parked vehicle on the side of the roadway opened the driver's door.

The bus driver said he swerved to the right to get around the opened door and then noticed a white pick-up truck in the westbound inside lane.

A metal step on the driver's side of the bus struck the truck's right rear fender tire well, according to an accident report. Damage to the school bus was undetectable.

The pick-up truck received damage to the fender well.

The driver of the pick-up truck told officers a similar account of the accident.

Garcia was not cited in the incident, though an officer with the New Mexico Department of Public Safety-Motor Transportation Division did provide a verbal warning on maintaining traffic lanes.

## Heating up the cool pines

Forest fire abatement on private property isn't easy

Maybe the insurance companies will provide an incentive.

## Why not a renewable feast?

U.S. farmers excel at producing an abundance of healthy food to fill America's dinner plates. If those plates are plastic, in the not-too-distant future, farmers could be responsible for producing them as well.

The American Farm Bureau Federation and other farm groups are backing an effort spearheaded by the Department of Energy that could reduce U.S. reliance on imported oil by more fully harnessing the energy and industrial potential of renewable crops like corn, wheat, soybeans and trees.

Farm crops already claim a small spot in the nation's energy policy through the production of ethanol and biodiesel, but even that role could and should be increased. In addition, the U.S. agricultural community and the Department of Energy's Office of Industrial Technology are focusing on a strategy to earn a 10 percent market share by 2020 for renewable crops and plants in the manufacture of everyday consumer goods, such as plastics, paints, adhesives and fibers.

The Energy Department's overall bioproducts strategy, called Ag Vision, aims to show that renewable farm crops and plants can become viable "chemical feedstocks." In addition to decreasing the need for foreign oil, using more renewable farm crops for energy and as basic chemical building blocks could reduce greenhouse gas emissions, increase recycling opportunities and create new, world-class industries in rural America.

In today's terms, the 2020 goal of the Ag Vision initiative - using America's renewable crops for 10 percent of the chemical feedstock market - would mean an increase in U.S. farm income of approximately \$5 billion per year. That's hardly small potatoes considering the financial distress that has boiled through the U.S. ag economy in recent years.

The key to reaching the 10-percent goal, and a subsequent goal of 50 percent by 2050, is securing a substantial investment in research and development. The Energy Department's Ag Vision initiative is the only federal program that concentrates on increasing the use of renewable resources

for chemicals and supporting the research and development agenda needed for success. Coupled with another program that also focuses on energy, the Bioproducts/Bioenergy Initiative, this integrated strategy makes sense.

However, funding for the programs is needed above the amount outlined in the Bush administration budget. Two appropriations bills ultimately could decide the future of farm crops and plants as renewable resources in the non-food marketplace. In the Interior appropriations bill, Farm Bureau and other ag groups are requesting an appropriation of \$15 million for the Energy Department's Ag Vision program, and in the Energy and Water appropriations bill they are asking for \$18 million for the Bioproducts/Bioenergy Initiative.

Without that level of support, the plate that holds the research and development funding for farm-grown renewables would be about two-thirds empty. Few dividends would be expected. Meanwhile, a full and deserving investment in this comprehensive initiative would help set future tables with a renewable feast to be shared by all Americans.

#### A small gesture

To the editor:

I recently received an e-mail with an idea I would like to share. It seems clear that the federal government is not going to place sanctions against the Chinese government for its handling of the Navy crew and plane involved in the mid-air collision over the China Sea.

However, there is no proscription against individual citizens choosing to boycott Chinese-made goods and products. This includes products marked as "Made in China," "Made in the PRC," and goods made in Hong Kong. This boycott would not include goods made in Taiwan.

Granted that China manufactures component parts for vast numbers of consumer products sold in this country and it may not be possible to identify many of these products.

However, if 100 million people boycotted \$100 worth of Chinese-made goods each month, that equals our \$1 billion trade deficit and could send a message to China about the acceptability of their behavior. The e-mail recommended that the boycott last only a month, from May 1 to June 1, so as to minimize the impact on U.S. businesses.

One can make their own choice about duration. The idea is that we each can make a small gesture that may add up to a serious statement to the government of China.

## Nurses see deteriorating quality of patient care

PHILADELPHIA - In one of the most ambitious studies of hospital nurses ever undertaken, researchers at the University of Pennsylvania have found widespread concern about quality of patient care and discontent in the ranks of hospital nurses and have identified trends that bode ill for a quick resolution to the current nurse shortage.

The study documented widespread nurse dissatisfaction and growing concern for patient well-being in the survey of 43,329 registered nurses in 711 hospitals in five countries. Fundamental problems with management of care in hospitals and working conditions for nurses are international in scope and may contribute to medical errors and other undesirable consequences for patients, concluded the investigators in the May-June issue of the influential healthcare journal Health Affairs.

"Nurses report they are unable to provide quality of care consistent with professional standards in today's hospitals," said Linda Aiken, Penn professor of nursing and sociology. "Hospital executives should take a hard look at management practices and move away from quick fixes."

Specifically, the researchers found across the U.S., Canada, the United Kingdom and Germany: As many as half of the registered nurses reported a decline in the quality of patient care provided in their hospital within the previous year and no more than one-third judged the care provided on their units as excellent.

Two-thirds of nurses say there are insufficient nurses in their hospitals to provide adequate quality of care to

patients. In the U.S. and Canada, where length of stay is shortest and home-based services are weakest, only about one-third of nurses feel confident that their patients can take care of themselves after being discharged.

In four of the five countries, including the U.S., approximately 40 percent of the hospital nurses reported being dissatisfied with their current jobs, the comparable statistic for professional workers in the U.S. at large is 10 percent.

Consumer and provider frustration appears high, with over half of the nurses in the U.S. and Canada reporting being verbally abused on a regular basis.

Burnout levels are high and significant numbers - at least one in five of all nurses and one in three nurses under 30 - indicated they intended to leave their

jobs within the next year.

The team of researchers conducted surveys of 13,471 acute care hospital nurses in the U.S., 17,450 in Canada, 5,006 in England, 4,721 in Scotland, and 2,681 in Germany in 1998 and 1999, with grants from the National Institutes of Health, National Institute of Nursing Research and other sources.

"Hospital nurses working in very different healthcare systems are experiencing similar strains and have concerns about their patients' welfare that are very much alike. With an aging nursing workforce in western countries and younger nurses reporting greater intentions to leave their jobs than more senior ones, hospitals will face worsening shortages unless working conditions are improved," Aiken said.

"There's clearly a pressing need to rethink the way nurses work in hospitals designed."

Sentencing today for convicted drug trafficker

A Ruidoso man, arrested for selling heroin from his home near Ruidoso Middle School, was convicted by a Lincoln County jury Wednesday after just 15 minutes of deliberation.

Donald Ray Bishop, 48, who lived on Bishop Road off Sudderth Drive, will be

sentenced today in district court in Carrizozo on trafficking a controlled substance, heroin, a first-degree felony, his second such offense, and on conspiracy to traffic a controlled substance, a second-degree felony, a district attorney's office spokesman said.

He faces a maximum sentence of 18 years on the first count and 16 years on the second count.

Bishop was accused of selling the illegal drug as a result of an undercover operation on Feb. 9, 1998, the spokesman said. He was arrested a short time after that on a warrant and booked by the Ruidoso Police Department.

Assistant District Attorney Pam Dobbs handled the prosecution during the two-day trial in the 12th Judicial District Court of Judge Karen Parsons.

Four wanted people arrested at Ruidoso Downs hotel

Police had gone to a room at the Ramada Limited at 1:30

self as the person officers said they were looking for. Arrested were Thomas Jefferson Good III, 49, Nogal; Thomas Jefferson Good IV, 28, Nogal; Christin Ann Crouch, 31, Albuquerque; and Melody

Lynn Farris, 42, Ruidoso Downs. The Goods and Crouch were wanted on District Court warrants issued in Santa Fe. Farris was wanted on a warrant from Lincoln County Magistrate Court.

# Relief possible for property owners in ET zone around Ruidoso

Relief may be closer than anticipated for owners of property in the extraterritorial zone around Ruidoso.

Applications for projects submitted by several owners in recent months were rejected or delayed because the rules governing the 1-mile zone around the village are outdated, ill-fitting and contain gaps, village and county officials say.

On a motion by Lincoln County Commissioner L. Ray Nunley last month, County Attorney Alan Morel was directed to work with ETZ Attorney Charles Rennick and Village Attorney John Underwood to revamp the ordinance and fill-in gaps by submitting amendments. Where appropriate, the team could excerpt wording from the

Ruidoso zoning code and comprehensive plan, commissioners said. But Nunley said he was reluctant to simply broad-brush apply Ruidoso's zoning laws in those gaps based on Morel's advice.

The three attorneys have worked fast and hard on the project, Nunley said Tuesday.

The result may be a much quicker fix than originally anticipated, he said.

"We met last night to go over some revisions in the ordinance," he said. "I think we made significant progress. I think we'll have something in a short time — a lot better than the year we were talking about before. But this is not the end of the process. It's the beginning. This has to be a living document."

Nunley previously said he won't approve any changes to

the ordinance until they have been reviewed by both the village council and the county commission.

Nunley serves on the ETZ Authority with Commissioner William Schwettmann as the two county representatives.

Ruidoso Councilor Linda Flack is the village official. The authority is the board of appeal for cases before the ETZ Commission, which consists of seven county and village appointees.

Phillis Barnett, an ETZ Commission member, explained at the April 19 county commission meeting that without guidelines, the board can't set standards of development for land uses.

Without such guidance, the board has no way to measure if plans are good or bad for an area, said Joseph Patoskie, director of planning and zoning for the village, which also administers the ETZ.

"With no guidelines in the ordinance, we have no legal basis to require anything, such as pad size or water hookups," he said. "The applicant can say he will do a quality development, but someone may come along who doesn't."

The guidelines are needed for consistency, he said.

"I know this is an enormous job," Nunley said at the commission meeting. "They've got to make all of this work together."

People who are turned down by the ETZ Commission can appeal only to the ETZ Authority, not the county commission, Morel said. If still not satisfied, petitioners can file in district court.

County Manager Tom Stewart mentioned he'd received several letters of complaint about the ETZ. Schwettmann said the county should either get out of the ETZ altogether or insist on a less "arrogant and pushy" approach. Morel said the county could "face serious ramifications" if they try to terminate the ETZ.

"Property decisions are being made under that (ETZ)," Wilson said. "That's why we have to be so careful."

Morel pointed out that while the ETZ extends 1 mile around the village, that jurisdiction

grows to three miles for planning and legal platting of land.

Ron Andrews, a former village councilor trying to develop a small RV Park as part of a motel complex on U.S. 70 in the ETZ, said he found a section in the existing ordinance that provide for variances and special use permits.

"Chay (Rennick) says that's spot zoning, but if that's true, every variance in Ruidoso is spot zoning," Andrews said. "I'm curious. Why can a municipality grant them and these folks (on the ETZ Commission) are told they can't? Why is this section here if it's not to be used?"

At Andrews' request, the ETZ Commission met in special session last week. The board denied his petition and he appealed his case to the ETZ Authority.

After getting permission from the driver to search the vehicle, a wallet and drivers license identified the passenger as Michael I. Franks, 32, Albuquerque.

Franks was charged with having an open container of alcohol in a vehicle and concealing identity.

Preliminary session Thursday

County to tackle budget

Lincoln County's departments are facing a tight line on budget requests for fiscal year 2001-2002. County Manager Tom Stewart said Tuesday.

But the line is thinner when looking at capital outlay and external groups. Requests total \$715,127 with only \$859,072 available over basic operation and required reserves.

County commissioners will tackle the job of paring down those requests and possibly even stripping more off department expenses during a preliminary budget session at 9 a.m. Thursday in the commission chambers of the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

"The preliminary work on budget thus far has been unconstrained, so department and external agencies have just stated their requirements," Stewart said.

In a budget summary, the county lists \$11.6 million in budgeted revenues, \$12 million in requests and a beginning cash balance of \$2.8 million.

"The thing helping us with our ending cash balance is the new detention center," Stewart said. "It's operating far more efficiently than last year (at the old center in the courthouse complex) to the tune of almost \$300,000. I attribute that to being able to move all inmates

back to the county except two hard-core cases. There's been a significant decrease in money there."

The old jail could accommodate only 40 prisoners by order of the state Fire Marshal. At one time as many as 25 county inmates were housed in other jails at more than twice the cost of keeping them in Carrizozo.

Stewart also checked the rules and was able to shift some mental and physical health care costs to the county's indigent fund, which reduced the direct financial impact, he said.

"I see that the commission has about \$353,000 above required reserves, but at the same time, \$582,781 of internal requests (capital outlay or new staff) and \$132,346 of external requests, so naturally, they have decisions to make," Stewart said. "It's much better than in previous years. I think we're getting to the point of addressing things systematically and living within our means."

After learning from the census that the county grew 58.9 percent over the past 10 years, he was pleased to see that county expenses increased only 25 percent during that time period.

"I was just analyzing the department increases. I'd say the budgets have pretty much remained level from last year," he said. "We had to build in some inflationary factor, but increases are pretty much limited to that. There are no salary increases programmed, but we are in the process of collective bargaining with deputy sheriffs."

Under capital outlay requests, the sheriff's department is asking for four new sedans at \$104,000 and two new Durango-type vehicles at \$56,000; emergency medical ser-

vices wants an advance life support vehicle for \$40,000 and the manager asked for a replacement emergency services vehicle at \$25,000.

"Vehicles this year are significant," Stewart said. "I don't think we can afford all that have been requested. I will bring up recommendations at the meeting that stay within budget."

The sheriff also wants three new deputies at \$102,283, the county clerk would like a historical records manager for \$35,000 and the manager asked for a new 911 technician/information specialist position at \$30,000.

## Burr-ning up the track

Zozo sisters Ariel and Madalyn Burr combine for five golds while leading the Lady Grizzlies to glory

Ariel Burr is the fastest girl in Class A New Mexico High School athletics. And while that title is usually given to the winner of the 100-meter dash, Burr left no doubt, winning the 200 and 400, as well as the 100 at the University of New Mexico Sports Complex.

Burr and her older sister Madalyn stole the show Saturday at the New Mexico State Championship for Class 1A and 2A high school track teams, as the two combined for five individual victories while leading the Lady Grizzlies to their first team title. Ariel, a freshman, won the three sprints as well as the triple jump and ran a leg on the victorious 1,600-meter relay team, while Madalyn, a senior, won the 300-meter hurdles.

It was truly a team effort though, as the Zozo girls scored 71 points, 15 more than second-place Logan. Six different girls scored for the Grizzlies, and three relay teams placed as well. Carrizozo's first girls track state championship comes in head coach Pat Ventura's third year at the reins, a tenure that has seen an about-face in the program.

"These girls have busted their rear ends for three years," Ventura said. "They brought this program from four girls total to this."

While the Burr sisters took the limelight, perhaps the most impressive performance came from freshman Ariel Vallejos, who fought through injuries to take second in the 300 hurdles and third in the

100 dash. Vallejos partially tore a calf muscle almost a month ago and had not run in competition since the Rattlesnakes on April 17.

The competition did not begin sharply for the girls, as their 400-meter relay team was disqualified in its preliminary heat when one of the girls dropped the baton. Ventura said that while the runners were disappointed with the DQ, they showed their resiliency.

"We never lost focus of what we had to do," he said. "Other teams let their guard down. ... (The girls) never panicked; they got scared at first, but they pulled it together. They realized it was going to take the team (to win), not just individuals."

Ariel Burr said it was "awesome" to win five events, but that her favorite was the 400.

"It really showed me that I am strong enough to handle it," she said, noting that it had been her most grueling event for most of the year.

"It's cool, because it's the first time the girls have ever won," she continued. "We achieved our goal." She added that it was special for her to get a championship for Carrizozo's three seniors.

## Warrior softball team falls one run short to Shiprock

A nearly miraculous late-season comeback and one of the best-played games of the year went all for not as the Ruidoso High School softball team fell 2-1 to the Shiprock Chieftains in Albuquerque Saturday.

The Lady Warriors showed the confidence they gained by winning their last five games of the regular season, including a one-game playoff victory over Portales to get to Albuquerque, as they held the Chieftains scoreless through five innings and took a 1-0 lead in the top of the fifth.

But errors cost the Warriors again, as two miscues in the bottom of the sixth led to two Shiprock runs.

The Chieftains threatened to push more across, but a Shiprock baserunner was called out for interference when she ran into Ruidoso shortstop Erin Nutting, who was attempting to field the batted ball. If not for that call, two more runs would have scored.

Ruidoso threatened in the top of the seventh, but Tamea Eckardt's one-out single went for no, as she was stranded on first. Shiprock advanced on to State with the 2-1 victory.

"We had a couple mental mistakes on the bases at costly times," said Warrior head coach Brian Baca. "In a tough game like this, one or two errors can make the difference." The Lady Warriors did

have a few opportunities to take a lead early on. In the fourth inning, Ruidoso loaded the bases, but could not get a run against tough Shiprock pitching. Chieftain head coach Kevin Werth said the fourth inning was the turning point of the game and said the Warriors easily could have won the contest.

"I hope Ruidoso rallies around their girls," Werth said. "Crystal (Gheer) is an excellent pitcher. That was some of the best pitching we've seen all year."

The game was a defensive battle most of the way. Shiprock also had their chances to get on the board. In the bottom of the fourth, a Shiprock baserunner stole second and attempted to advance to third on a bad throw to second base. But Warrior center fielder Eckerdt made a strong throw to third to cut the runner down.

The loss ended an otherwise terrific season for the young Ruidoso squad. The Warriors do lose six seniors this year, but have several underclassmen ready to take over. It will be difficult for Baca to replace Gheer at pitcher, though. She struck out six Saturday and showed the ability more than once this year to take over a game with her hurling.

"Crystal's a great pitcher," Baca said. "We're going to have to make a commitment to build another pitcher."

Two Ruidoso High School tennis players extended their season Friday at the District 4A-AAA tournament in Lovington.

Junior Paul Brown and eighth-grader Christine Brown are headed to the State Championship in Albuquerque today, thanks to their outstanding play against some of the toughest competition in southern New Mexico.

Christine, the district's No. 2 seed, easily worked her way to the district championship match, where she met Lovington's Heather Maker for the third time since April 27. The two had split the first pair of matches, with Maker winning the most recently. But Brown fought past her rival, taking the district girls singles title and earning a first-round bye at State.

"Christine was just her same old, methodical self," said Warrior tennis coach Celeste Franklin. "I thought Christine should have been the one seed, but I knew nobody could touch her."

Brown's brother, Paul, came one match shy of sweeping the singles titles for Ruidoso. Paul struggled through his first-round match, according to Franklin, but cruised past the tournament's No. 2 seed to earn a berth in the State Championships.

"Paul was intense and really determined," Franklin said. "He just disposed of him. He was relentless." As for the pair's chances at State, Franklin said she thinks Paul Brown can advance at least to the quarterfinals, while Christine could win it all. The coach said she hopes the success of the Brown siblings will encourage other Ruidoso High School students to join the team next season. As well as both Brown kids, all but two tennis players, one boy and one girl, will return for the 2002 season. Those returning include the majority of the girls who finished second as a group at a tournament in early April at the New Mexico Military Institute.

Madalyn Burr, Brooke Holland, who placed second in the discus, and distance runner Stella Brewer to graduation this year, and Ventura said those will be some big shoes to fill in order for 'Zozo to repeat next year.

While the Grizzly boys did not taste nearly as much success at Albuquerque, Ventura said he was equally proud of them.

"I think they performed real well, ... I hope it made them hungry for next year," Ventura said. "They showed a lot of heart, especially at district."

Lane Dixon was the lone 'Zozo boy to score at State, taking sixth in the 400.

The boys did win their third straight district title April 28, despite having the "least amount of talent" of any of the three teams, according to Ventura. The coach said what they lacked in experience and raw talent, they made up for with heart and attitude.

## Capitan

The Capitan boys did find out that they won a team title in Albuquerque, just not the state title. It was learned over the weekend that Lordsburg, who had been believed to have won the District 5AA meet the week before, had run an ineligible boy in the competition. After re-tabulation, Capitan had earned the most points, thus giving them their 10th straight district championship.

While neither of the Tiger teams got an individual state champion, both squads did finish in the top 10.

Ryan Kimbrell was the high scorer for the boys, as he took two second places, one in the pole vault and one in the javelin, as well as a fifth in the long jump. He scored 12 of the Tigers' 18 points.

For the girls, Jessica Becker and Lindsey Bush placed twice each for Capitan, while Jessica Neal and Kaycee Gilson took third place finishes in the 100-meter hurdles

and pole vault, respectively. "We could have done better," said Capitan girls coach Zale Woodward. "But it was a great season for us."

Woodward said he felt that Neal should have won the 100 hurdles, noting that she had the fastest time coming into State and the fastest time in the preliminary heats. Unfortunately, Woodward said, Neal took an extra stride before the first hurdle in the final, taking her out of contention for the victory.

Still, Woodward said he was thrilled with the season the girls had. Capitan won four meets this year, including the District 5AA meet. At the district meet, the girls finished ahead of Lordsburg, who ended up fourth at State, just 14 points out of first.

The coach attributed Capitan's success this year to depth; something the Lady Tigers have been without in the past. He said they still need more talented girls before they will be able to

truly compete for a state title, though. He said he tries to sell track as a chance for the girls to develop their athleticism, as well as both their physical and mental strength.

"We made a lot of progress," he said. "Shoot, I didn't think we'd win a track meet. I was amazed with the progress they made."



## Carrizozo's young readers vote for their favorite books

Two elementary schools in the region take part in a statewide program that has a positive impact on accelerated reading.

Carrizozo students voted for their favorite book (which turned out to be New Mexico's favorite) in the Land of Enchantment Book Award for 2000-2001: *A Spoon for Every Bite*, by Joe Hay for the younger children, and *Holes* by Louis Sachar for the older children.

Students across the state in grades three through nine voted April 30 on their favorite books from a list compiled by a committee of school librarians and teachers. The list is divided into two age groups: 14 books for grades three through six and 12 books for grades six through nine. Carrizozo's school librarian, Rosemary Shafer, is on the committee and said members meet several times a year to compare notes on recent children's books.

"These are selected to be outstanding books, award-winning books, Newbery winners," Shafer said. "Students have to read at least three books from the list in order to vote," said Rosemary Shafer, librarian. "If they've read three books from each age group, they can vote twice."

When all the votes are tallied from across the state, the winning authors are invited to speak at the New Mexico Library Association Convention in Albuquerque.

Shafer said this is Carrizozo's second year to participate. She didn't know about the book award until two years ago, she said.

Charlie Cooper of Cloudercroft is the chairman of the selection committee and said the Land of Enchantment Book Award is New Mexico's "children's choice award," sponsored by the International Reading Association and New Mexico Library Association. The selection committee is composed of six members from each of these organizations; Shafer comes to it from the New Mexico Library Association. About 37 states have such awards, and New Mexico's is getting more clout as time passes, and is mentioned in publishers' catalogs.

Anyone can nominate a book — students, teachers, parents or librarians, Cooper said. "Then we as a committee read the books and have a final selection that we publish in the summer. Next year's list has already been selected, and we'll select the 2002-2003 book list in June so that libraries can buy the books a year in advance."

To participate, school libraries do not have to buy all the books, but those that participate are in the running for three sets of the books that are given away each year. Carrizozo and Cloudercroft are the only area schools that participate, according to Shafer's list of participating school libraries.

"Every school knows this," Cooper said. "We do a massive mailing in the spring and fall, giving them the suggested buying list for the coming year, the current list and ideas on how they might promote it. Then if they send in their vote, they might (have) a chance of (winning) a library."

The books selected dovetail well with the Accelerated Reading Program, Cooper said, because there are AR tests with each of them.

Marc LeBlanc, a Carrizozo fourth-grader, voted with the rest of the state for Hayes' book, *A Spoon for Every Bite*. He gave a synopsis of the book for the *Ruidoso News*:

"There's this really rich, rich guy and he wants to be the baby's godfather and buy a spoon for the baby," Marc said. "He starts laughing because this (other) guy, his spoon is a tortilla."

Jessica Ward, a fifth-grader, after reading five books on the list, had trouble choosing just one book as her favorite. She voted for *The Ghost of Fossil Glen* by Cynthia Defelice, "because it had a bunch of mystery in it and was thrilling," she said. "I like more of ghosts and she's on this cliff

and a ghost is helping her down because she almost fell off the cliff."

But she also liked *Joey Pigza Swallowed a Key* by Jack Gantos, "because it had a point to it," she said. "It was kind of touching because he was really a hyperactive kind of boy and had to take medicine because of the being hyperactive and his mom and dad left him when he was 4 years old."

Although she's a discerning reader, Jessica said she's leaning more toward being a horse trainer than a book writer or critic.

"I love to read," she said. "I'll do good on the test if the book is interesting to me. If a book is not interesting, I get bored and don't finish the book."

Bailey Shivers voted for *Gib Rides Home* by Zilpha Keatley Snyder, a story about a boy who had lost his parents and was living in an orphanage.

"I liked it because it showed me someone else's life," she said. "He was almost like a slave but they were nice to him. He was the narrator."

Part of the attraction seemed to be that there was a horse in the story and Bailey likes horses and her family has horses, she said. Bailey earned 110.5 points in Accelerated Reading, which is exceptional, the librarian said. In a month, she reads two books of about 200 pages each.

Jennifer Shafer, another avid reader, voted for *Return to Hawk's Hill* by Allan W. Eckert.

"The writer did a good job," she said. "It was hard to put it down. The author made things so interesting that I couldn't put it down. It was very descriptive."

"She's a fourth-grader reading on a 6.5-grade level, so she has to read these really in-depth books," said her teacher, Rima Davis.

"This is a good way to encourage them to read the award-winning books," Shafer said, "and Land of Enchantment Books sometimes have a slant toward New Mexico."

## Alto teacher, others, to see the rain forest 'Brazilnuts' get ready to go

Douglas O. Fuqua, an Alto resident and teacher at Tularosa High School, was recently informed that he has been selected to be a member in a group of 12 New Mexico educators on a five-week trip to Brazil this summer. The trip is part of the United States Department of Education Fulbright-Hays Group Projects Abroad Program. This summer's trip is being funded by a grant to New Mexico Tech in Socorro. Students will receive six hours of class credit toward the Master of Science Teaching Degree offered by New Mexico Tech.

The project is "Brazilian Area Studies in Air Quality and Ecology: An Intercultural Perspective of Urban Airsheds, Sensitive Ecosystems and Remote Region Atmosphere/Biosphere Exchange." The students and New Mexico Tech instructors in the group will be taking and analyzing air samples in both large cities and remote areas. The group will visit diverse regions of Brazil including the cities of Sao Paulo, Rio De Janeiro, Manaus, Recife, and Corumba. They will also spend time in the Amazon rain forest in the north and the Pantanal wetlands in the south. The "Brazilnuts," as they now call their group, met for the first time last week in Socorro for planning and organizing.

Fuqua is a 30-year veteran of New Mexico education. He has taught in Tucumcari, Fort Sumner, Gallup, Santa Fe and Silver City.

The last 18 years have been spent in Tularosa where he has taught band, choir, guitar, aerospace education and, currently, mathematics. He currently plays piano at the Dan Li Ka Dining Room at the Inn of the Mountain Gods on weekends.

"I am, of course, very excited about the trip, but also a little apprehensive. I have lived all my life in New Mexico and I find the whole concept of a rain forest jungle a bit intimidating. I can't even imagine a river like the Amazon that has tributaries larger than the Mississippi," Fuqua said. "After careful consideration, I decided that this was such a great opportunity that I had to apply. My wife had planned on me working around our new house this summer, but it can wait another year..."



## Sea Mammal Moms

### Harbor seals

A harbor seal rests with its mom at Sea World California.

On land, seals move by humping along in a caterpillar-like motion. In the water, they often rest by floating straight up and down. Harbor seal pups are born on shore. They can swim right away, with their front flippers at their side and by moving their back flippers from side to side.

### Bottle-nosed dolphins

Like all bottle-nosed dolphins, the mom (cow) and her calf look as if they are smiling.

Bottle-nosed dolphins are smart and are the type that we usually see in shows in amusement parks and zoos. They are known to be friendly toward people. In the wild, they live in groups called pods. Some can jump as high as 16 feet.

### Manatees

In the wild, a calf remains close to its mother for at least two years.

Manatees eat grasses and plants. They have molar teeth for grinding. The only enemy to these plant eaters is man. Many manatees are killed in boating accidents or trapped in nets.

### Walrus

A walrus and her calf take time to bond.

Both males and females have tusks that keep growing all their lives. They spend about 75 percent of their lives in the water. They like the cold and prefer sea ice or snow-covered ice packs to land. Walruses use their whiskers to feel for food.

### Sea lions

A mom gives her baby pup attention.

Sea lions are a type of seal; they get their name from their loud roar. They spend most of their time in the water but also gather in large groups called colonies on land. Pups are born with their eyes open. If a mother leaves her pup, she can find it by its call and smell.

### Killer whales

A female killer whale has a calf every three to five years. A calf can swim by itself soon after birth.

It makes it easier for the calves if they swim in their mother's wake.

Killer whales are really the largest of the dolphin family.
