Audit spotlights trouble in Downs

■ The review of village books for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2000 found significant deficiencies in internal controls.

Although the financial figures for Ruidoso Downs indicate a village in good shape, an audit finds problems with procedures for fiscal year 1999-2000.

An independent auditor's report for the year ending June 30, 2000 chided the village in nine

areas. The findings are described as "reportable conditions" relating to significant deficiencies in internal controls.

The audit report, delayed in official delivery to the village because of review by the New Mexico State Auditor, was presented to village trustees Monday by De'Aun Willoughby, the village's certified public accountant.

Five of the eight findings involved the Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department. Those findings alleged two employed members of the department also received volunteer allowances, volunteer allowances were overpaid, there were questionable expenditures in the fire department, cash collected by volunteer firemen

was not deposited immediately, and time records for the former fire chief were not always completed and approved correctly.

The report claimed in many of the five cases "management and personnel in the village allowed, supported and even promoted this type of behavior." The audit recommended legal authorities be contacted, which was done last year resulting in criminal charges against three former firefighters.

"Almost all of these findings have been made very public," Willoughby told trustees. "Anytime we have this many findings and these kinds of

Lawmakers' tour brings

new hope for the old fort

Before he was halfway through the tour Saturday, the Bernalillo Republican was mulling over different approaches that might be employed to maintain and develop the 1855 assemblage of 80 buildings used for frontier defense and as a tuberculosis sanitarium for its first 100 years.

The federal government gave the fort to the state in 1956 with the caveat that it be used as a public hospital for at least 20 years. The fort was closed in 1995 by the state because of high overhead.

Since then, members of an advocacy group called Fort Stanton Inc., one of the partners in a coalition operating a museum at the fort, have pushed for a long-term future that would include a living museum with demonstrations, combined with educational programs, the arts, recreation and possibly, the involvement of veterans.

Current lessees include the Amity Foundation, a drug and alcohol rehabilitation center for state prisoners on probation or parole, and the State Police.

Dick Weber, president of Fort Stanton Inc., and Sally Burkstaller, vice president and founder, were convinced that to gain support in the budget for the fort, legislators needed to tour the parade grounds and a few buildings to see the potential.

Fourteen visited last weekend and 10 more are scheduled to come between two rain-check

weekends, June 15-17 and Aug. 10-12. The public is invited to join the groups when they tour the fort, he said. Over the weekend, Herb Marsh, president of the Lincoln County Historical Society, artist Joe Dunlap and Ed Spurr from the Spencer Theater took advantage of the chance.

"I think everyone clearly enjoyed the visit to the fort, that was obvious from their enthusiasm and questions," Weber said Monday. "But two immediately offered assistance, State Rep. Burpo and State Rep. Dan Foley (R-Roswell, who toured separately Sunday). They jumped to the forefront and it was wonderful to see their intense desire to help the property. They also realize that they are the true owners because they represent all of us."

Each of the legislators had seen something similar across the country and remembered how much they liked them, Weber said.

"They could see that this is already much more than a ruin. They asked in-depth questions, which is a wonderful sign."

Having children along on the tour also was a plus, he said. Their parents saw how much they enjoyed being there and could imagine how much more fun it would be with living demonstrations, reenactments and other period activities, Weber said.

"This tour is one of the best things we've ever done," he said.

State halts care center transfers

Officials to determine whether notice met legal requirements

Transfers of patients from the skilled care and Alzheimer's units at the Ruidoso Care Center were halted Tuesday by the state Department of Health.

Roy Weidner, long-term care program manager for the state, said when department officials reviewed Integrated Health Services' notice of transfer and discharge, "we didn't believe it met the full intent."

The letter claiming that structural problems with the building forced the closing, was vague and didn't meet the needs of the residents, he said.

Patient transfers were ordered to stop until the state determines whether the notice was appropriate and offered appeal rights as required, he said. He estimated that agreement on a new notice or clarification of the old notice should be reached by the end of the week. Company officials are cooperating in the review, he said.

Appeals filed on behalf of individual patients will proceed to the appeals board under the state Human Services Department, Weidner said. Several families submitted appeals in an effort to delay or prevent the closure announced last week. Processing could take from 30 to 90 days, said Katrina Hotrum, associate state ombudsman with the state Long Term Care Ombudsman Program.

A meeting of Friends of the Ruidoso Care Center is scheduled for 7 p.m. Monday at Cree Meadows Country Club. Organizers said they will ask village officials, church representatives and other community leaders to attend and show their support.

On Monday evening, about 30 people showed up for a hastily called meeting to organize the group and to discuss alternatives to the closing of 56 beds in the 85-bed center.

Sheriff comes up one deputy, two cars short

■ Sheriff Tom Sullivan felt the sting of county budgetary reality when he sought money to increase staff and upgrade his fleet.

Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan was hoping for three more deputies and three more cars in next year's budget, but he may have to squeeze two deputies into one vehicle.

Sullivan listed three new deputy slots for \$101,283, four new sedans for \$104,000 and two new four-wheel Durango-type vehicles for \$56,000.

"I'm asking for three new deputies and I need something for them to

drive," Sullivan said during the county commission's first budget session last week. "I told you several years ago that to keep on top of our fleet, we would need three new vehicles a year, and that has never happened since 1997."

By the end of the meeting, Sullivan had approval for two deputies, one sedan and one four-wheel drive sport-utility vehicle. But in balancing the figures after the session, County Manager Tom Stewart cut the sedan along with \$30,000 for

findings expect the state auditor to come in."

Among the other findings in the audit, Willoughby noted there are no records listing information required on land, buildings, vehicles and equipment in use by the village. She said all purchases of assets over \$500 should be recorded in an inventory. The inventory is described as a deterrent to theft and careless misplacement of the assets.

"There is a lack of leadership in management insisting records be kept of the fixed assets and a physical inventory be taken," Willoughby wrote in the finding.

The village was also told its subsidy to the senior citizens center should be paid to the center's fiscal agent, Lincoln County, and not directly to the senior citizens' program bank account.

"Money earmarked for the Senior Citizens was not

expended for its intended purpose," Willoughby wrote. "Management and personnel in the village allowed, supported and even promoted this type of behavior."

The 1999 purchase of 7.5 acres for the purpose of building a new fire station was labeled in the audit as a waste of public money. Ruidoso Downs had borrowed \$409,267 in state money for the purchase of the land and construction of the fire station.

"Management has decided a fire station is not needed and the site will be used for something else requiring the loan to be repaid immediately," the audit finding stated. "A construction project is a big undertaking and should be entered into with adequate planning assessing the need of the project. Land should be purchased at fair market value."

Willoughby's audit stated the price paid for the 7 1/2 acres appeared to have been inflated.

The audit also warned the village some of their deposits had been unsecured in area banks because the deposits exceeded FDIC insurance levels and the balance exceeded pledges to guarantee the funds.

"Even at a time when banking is profitable, you're taking a risk," Willoughby told trustees. "I recommended you get a 100 percent pledge from the banks to get 100 percent coverage."

During fiscal year 1999-2000, the village paid its legal council a flat fee of \$7,000 monthly for services. Willoughby said legal services should be itemized and only the time billed and related costs should be paid. She said paying for professional services not received is a violation of the state's procurement act. The audit recommended the village attorney should provide itemized bills and adjust the village's legal fees accordingly.

Mayor Bob Miller said he

was somewhat surprised by the findings.

"I wasn't really involved in that," said Miller, who became mayor in March 2000. "Everything that needs to be corrected we're working on."

Previous mayor Joe Hayhurst declined comment on the audit findings.

The financial standing for the fiscal year showed Ruidoso Downs had not spent as much as had been planned, Willoughby said. And revenues, from higher gross receipts tax income, have gone up substantially since fiscal year 1997-1998, when Wal-Mart opened in Ruidoso Downs.

"But I want to talk about your debt situation," Willoughby said. "You guys have a lot of money. And you're borrowing a lot for equipment. Equipment debt is high interest. Pay those off. You're not used to having cash and paying cash for things. I recommend paying off the equipment debt."

Commission to review hydrology report

A comprehensive hydrological model of the impact to surface and groundwater from water rights transfers is essential to developing administrative criteria for approving transfers, the authors of the Lower Pecos Water Regional Study state.

Four recommendations and six conclusions are listed in a report to be reviewed by the Lincoln County Commission Thursday at the 9 a.m. monthly meeting in the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

A portion of the county's watershed falls within the Pecos area.

The study's authors concluded that the region must operate aquifer storage to serve demand relatively consistently during periods of short supply. Riparian management and water conservation pro-

grams should be continued and the administrative system of handling water rights transfers must be improved if the expected increase in demand is to be met, they stated.

Five water rights transfer applications are included in the commission packet for their review.

Also on the commission agenda, the manager of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, Commissioner Rick Simpson, is asking the board to consider creating a line item in the budget to cover the cost of picking up after people who illegally dump items.

During a meeting last week, he estimated that the authority spends 140 man-hours each week cleaning up and as much as 30 percent of the debris is the result of illegal dumping — a cost of about \$20,000 annually.

"It's getting to be a real financial drain," he said. "We

can quit picking it up or we can make some changes to take care of it. It's something that needs to be discussed on a regular commission agenda. We don't have a system to cover this in the county." Residents in unincorporated portions of the county can dump at municipal roll-off facilities in Capitan and Carrizozo for \$10 per yard of material, he said.

Wilson told Simpson to present a proposal at the next meeting.

Sullivan said his deputies have cited Ruidoso residents for dumping their debris — mostly construction material — in non-municipal containers.

Martinez said he'd hate to see the county start subsidizing a quasi-government agency.

Wilson said it would cost the road department more than \$20,000, if it was assigned to keep sites cleaned up.

Other items on the agenda

include:

- A report from the county manager that installation of wiring for video arraignment equipment is set for May 21 at the county detention center in the Carrizozo Industrial Park.
- Public hearings starting at 10 a.m. to consider three outdated ordinances dealing with salaries for elected officials, live music security and grazing of livestock in portions of White Oaks, to consider an ordinance amending the county Lodgers Tax regulations and to consider changes to the indigent hospital care ordinance that would include private physicians as eligible for reimbursement.
- Will discuss commercial timber harvesting with members of the county Public Land Use Advisory Council.
- Authorize a special meeting to consider proposed revisions to the county subdivision ordinance.

Those attending the session will have an opportunity to visit with key project representatives beginning at 6 p.m. before hearing brief project-related presentations.

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

Village readies \$26 million budget

Spending plan a near match for last year with some exceptions, mayor says

Ruidoso has a preliminary 2001-2002 budget ready for a public hearing, and village councilors will be able to make final tweaks at their May 29 council meeting.

"We'll budget the same as we did last year except for a few things," Mayor Robert Donaldson told Ruidoso village councilors at the first of two budget workshops. "One thing, gasoline prices, may affect us."

The village estimates all revenue sources will bring in nearly \$23.6 million.

Total expenditures have been preliminarily set at \$26.3 million. An estimated \$8.8 million balance on June 30, would diminish to \$6 million at the end of the 2001-2002 fiscal year.

The revenue stream includes gross receipts tax revenue expectations (estimated at \$7 million), property taxes (\$1.5 million), utility and other enterprise fund incomes, lodgers tax revenues and state and federal sources (for dozens of items ranging from the DWI grant program to state fire funds).

The soon-to-end fiscal year is expected to see \$26.7 million

in expenditures on total revenues estimated at \$32.4 million.

New Ruidoso employees which would be financed through general fund revenues for the coming year are in the budget draft, said Lorri McKnight, village finance director. A heavy equipment mechanic in the solid waste department would be the only new position, paid through the department's own revenues.

Village workers will receive a 3.5 percent cost-of-living wage adjustment based on New Mexico's inflation rate, which was pegged at 3.4 percent.

Man charged with DWI after collision with utility pole

A North Carolina man was arrested after a single-vehicle collision with a utility pole Friday. State Police officers charged Gregory Anderson, 23, with aggravated driving while intoxicated-first offense, reckless driving and evading police. Anderson's car turned onto Gavilan Canyon Road from State Highway 48, failed to negotiate the curve on Gavilan Canyon

Road and hit a power pole, police said. Anderson allegedly tried to flee the scene when police arrived.

Anderson was treated at the location for minor cuts. A passenger in the auto, Stephanie Lot, 17, was taken by ambulance to the Lincoln County Medical Center for treatment of facial and head cuts.

Pain and suffering in Lincoln County

To lose eldercare beds is to lose, period...

When something comes along like the announced 57-bed cut-back at the Ruidoso Care Center, it is impossible to measure the pain that afflicts families in our community.

Now at least 57 families must determine how to handle the disruption — and, yes, grief — that is inevitable. We don't believe the owners of the private center are evil. We do believe they're conditioned by a society that puts "economics" above a humanitarian spirit.

By all accounts, the center needs building repairs, and it's more economical to disrupt lives

than expend money for capital improvements...

Meanwhile, Lincoln County Medical Center (with few occupied beds last week) apparently can't take up any slack, because to help those Alzheimer's and critical care patients would violate licensing regulations for the hospital.

Somehow, somewhere, there ought to be a solution. We suspect it's buried in the book that also includes the line, "do unto others as you would have them do unto you."

Or are we in the wrong century for such uneconomic sentiments?

Disturbing media trends

Farmers expect two things from the news media: fair, accurate reporting and coverage of agriculture. Their chances of getting either one or both from television news are diminishing.

A media trade publication, Broadcasting & Cable, recently quoted Don Hewitt, executive producer of 60 Minutes, as suggesting ABC, CBS and NBC fold their evening news shows into one combined effort.

Pooled news reporting already exists, but Hewitt's suggestion would be a drastic alteration of the news landscape. His idea is for Dan Rather, Tom Brokaw and Peter Jennings to take turns anchoring the news.

This is not as farfetched as it sounds. Peter Johnson, writing for USA Today, says the news operations at NBC, CBS and ABC are under increasing pressure to cut costs. In the coming years they may drop news altogether and leave it to the cable networks.

However, CNN is having difficulties of its own. It cut back about 10 percent of its staff.

Meanwhile, the FCC may lift some of the restrictions still in place on media ownership, including one that bars a single company from owning TV stations that reach more than 35 percent of U.S. households.

Cost-cutting and consolidation are not good signs for television news nor are they good for agriculture. Coverage of agricultural issues is limited to begin with, but media trends are likely to make it worse.

More disturbing is who might fill in the gaps left by the departure of major news operations.

Singer Barbra Streisand is said to be interested in buying a cable news channel to further her liberal agenda. Barbra is still pointing over the election of George W. Bush. In a memo to Democratic legislators, she accused Bush of poisoning the air and water, and asks, "How can such a destructive man be so popular with the American people?" She rails about money and corporate America, but it was Barbra who charged \$350 a head for a 1994 concert tour.

When farmers talk about cov-

erage of agriculture, they are not talking about farm markets and weather. There is plenty of that information available on radio or over the Internet. What they would like to see, particularly on television, where most people get their news, is coverage of issues affecting agriculture.

These include the rural economy, environmental regulation, trade, biotechnology and urban sprawl. The same issues greatly affect consumers, which is why they deserve coverage in the first place.

Some stories about agriculture don't get reported simply because they take place in rural areas and news crews don't want to travel that far, or the station would rather carry more fluff and entertainment news. When agriculture does get coverage, it's often because of a natural disaster or disease outbreak such as foot-and-mouth in Europe.

Farmers would like to see more reporting about agriculture, and consumers need more information about their food supply and what it takes to produce it. Unfortunately, media trends could mean fewer stories and more biased reporting.

Remember the disabled vets

Why have our federal government and our state been concerned about sparing the lives of our convicted, violent felons and not about preserving the lives of our military personnel?

Some 58,230 of our nation's troops were needlessly sacrificed during the Vietnam War; 399 New Mexicans, including eight from Lincoln County, were included in the above death total. A large percentage of our war casualties were inexperienced kids who had been drafted. In addition, most of them were the sons and daughters of the "silent majority" and the "greatest generation."

During the same period, not a single criminal was executed at the federal level or in our state. Keep in mind that our nation's felons were a far greater menace to our society at large than were the North Vietnamese and the Viet Cong, who were on the other side of the world from the U.S.

Democrats aren't ready to compromise quite yet

WASHINGTON (AP) — While President Bush was able to pick off enough moderate Democrats to win approval of a budget that advances his tax cut and spending-restraint agenda, most Democrats are not ready to compromise.

Regaining control of Congress has become their immediate political goal, and that has led to a lot of no-deal rhetoric and near-party-line votes, bound to intensify as the 2002 midterm elections draw nearer.

Consider these recent comments: Bush's budget is "a farce and a fraud," charged House Minority Leader Dick Gephardt, D-Mo. "In a word: irresponsible," suggested Sen. Joseph Lieberman, D-Conn. "A dangerous U-turn on the path of fiscal discipline," said Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton, D-N.Y.

There is little political advantage to compromising too readily. Instead, Democratic leaders are seeking to draw sharp differences with Bush's proposals, to try to paint him as a friend to the wealthy and large corporations, a captive of Big Oil — and hoping a disillusioned electorate will sweep them back into control in 2002.

Democrats recognize a danger in being seen as obstructionists.

Thus, there were indications they would not wage a wholesale campaign against Bush's first round of 11 federal judicial nominations. And the two parties continue to seek common ground on education legislation.

But sentiment clearly has changed since Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle asserted in December that "bipartisanship isn't an option anymore;

it is a requirement."

Daschle is now leading the Democratic charge against Bush's programs, warning of a return to "the failed fiscal policies that led our nation to deficit, debt and economic despair." For the most part, he has been able to command impressive party discipline.

Democrats see the Senate as their best target. The chamber is evenly divided 50-50, but Republicans have 20 seats to defend, Democrats just 14.

Bush did manage to win five moderate Democrats on his budget after compromising slightly on the size of the tax cut. Two Republicans voted no, allowing the measure to pass 53-47.

"We're disappointed some members are caving in" to Bush proposals, AFL-CIO President John Sweeney said of the Democratic defections. He said reclaiming the House and Senate for Democrats in 2002 and the White House in 2004 is "our main goal."

Huge battles are ahead, including over Bush's proposals for oil exploration in Alaska wilderness areas and enhanced trade negotiating authority, as well as over details of the tax cut and spending priorities. His judicial nominations will be a critical early test.

Bush submitted 11 nominees to federal appeals court vacancies last week, including some prominent conservatives. He urged the Senate to "rise above the bitterness of his past."

While his choices appeared carefully tailored to avoid a knockdown battle, some partisan fireworks seemed likely — if not on the first round, then on subsequent choices.

Many Democrats are looking for "payback time, after what they view as a concerted effort to block Clinton judicial nominees," said Norman Ornstein,

an analyst with the American Enterprise Institute. Ornstein said the Senate battle over some Bush nominees would be "a little tuneup, a little spring training before a Supreme Court nomination."

Two GOP-appointed conservatives on the high court, Chief Justice William Rehnquist and Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, are mentioned the most frequently in speculation over retirements. The oldest member is Justice John Paul Stevens, 80. Although appointed by a Republican, Stevens often votes with the court's liberal-to-moderate minority.

On most issues, including judicial nominations, Republicans must be able to marshal 60 votes in the Senate to thwart any potential filibusters or other Democratic delaying tactics. On the budget vote, which had different ground rules, Republicans could muster only 53 votes.

Part of the Democratic distaste for compromise may be a reaction to Bush's initial decision to ram his tax cut through the House without seeking Democratic help, despite "a two-week charm offensive," said Fred Greenstein, a professor of politics at Princeton University.

Still, Greenstein cautioned against overestimating the Democratic opposition and underestimating Bush's ability to play his hands effectively.

"Bush takes strong positions for starters, then will declare victory on what he can," Greenstein said. "This is a very grown-up and very professional administration."

Alto man leads playground project

Rich Lurix has experience in the type of community-built playground project Ruidoso is undertaking this year.

An Alto man, who has been involved in community-built playground efforts in the past, has been selected to direct Ruidoso's project. Rich Lurix was named coordinator, said Bill Chance, a Ruidoso village councilor who is the council liaison on the playground plan. "He'll coordinate committees, the effort, fund-raising, the volunteers," Chance said. Lurix was present at a March 5 meeting on the community-built playground idea and said he had been involved with three other such endeavors in the Cincinnati area. He

said he was at the meeting to volunteer and share his experience and knowledge. "We're looking for creative ideas to bring involvement in the playground plan," Chance said. Speaking to fellow village council members, Chance said there are 109 official volunteers for the marketing, construction and support phases of the project. He said 500 to 600 volunteers are needed. "We'll be doing some marketing, some door-to-door fund raising. We need you to get involved," Chance said. "Whether it's labor, or pocket change or a large out-of-town check."

Prospect of rural county zoning evokes widely varied reactions

Zoning is heralded by some as a savior of the land and the result of good planning; by others as the unrelenting intrusion of government on the private rights of property owners. Ten of New Mexico's 38 counties have enacted zoning. During a meeting last month on the possibility of enacting countywide zoning or limited zoning along major roads in Lincoln County, residents offered their differing views on the subject. "Does anyone own a view?" asked Tony Seno, policy analyst for the county Libertarian Party. He added that "just compensation" is required for the use of private property and that he is more offended by a

huge billboard in German than ramshackled houses and junk yards along U.S. 70 from Tularosa to Alamogordo. Ralph Romero, who previously served on the county planning commission, said that zoning could be forced on the county if enough signatures are gathered on petitions being circulated. Commissioner Rick Simpson said U.S. 70, which is part of the Billy the Kid Scenic Byway mentioned for zoning control, encompasses a diverse group of people, some owning just five acres and others as much as 100, some new owners and others multi-generational residents who received their land from Spain. "One person may have a big adobe house, barns and white fences around irrigated fields and next to him, some-

one could have fighting chickens staked out and run-down barns," Simpson said. "They chose to live that way and so did the man in the big house. Most are very independent by nature and that's why they live there." He predicted the population along U.S. 70 will never accept zoning. "They'll get their guns," he said. Resident Gary Tawson acknowledged that "zoning is scary," but said how it is handled is up to the people who implement it. "Zoning is coming," he said. "We need to have the education to control it and know how to work with it. We can't ignore it and isolate ourselves. If you shut your eyes when you see the word, you're not looking at what it can do for everybody. It can take care of all of us, if we take it right."

He said road maintenance also is a major issue and suggested that sometimes longtime residents are resistant to ideas from newcomers. "People from the city know how to get things done and they irritate people," he said. "Everyone has a different view of life and equal rights." Carl Kelly, a general contractor from Ruidoso, said he's had firsthand experience with the village of Ruidoso rules and the extraterritorial zone around Ruidoso. "It's so messed up," he said. "It's so far out of hand and Ruidoso Downs is going to double it in size because everyone is going there." Land use is regulated within extraterritorial zones and Ruidoso Downs's board of trustees recently created one around that town.

Jerry Carroll of Oscura said he left Dallas in 1979 to escape zoning, and administrative "misuse of good intentions." He warned that zoning gives certain groups in government unfettered power and political payback can be the result. He hears that blight will occur without zoning, Carroll said. "Dallas has blight and is heavily zoned," he said. "It has \$1,000 fines, regulates the color of houses and uncut grass. Families can lose their homes." On the other hand, Houston has no zoning and no blight, he contended. This is an issue that generates anger and sometimes violence, because the rights of "the little man" can be trampled, he said.

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Impact document due on road work

The draft environmental impact statement concerning proposed improvements to U.S. Highway 70 through the Hondo Valley will be available for public inspection beginning today.

In advance of public hearings next month, a Draft Environmental Impact Statement dealing with U.S. Highway 70 improvements through the Hondo Valley will be available beginning today.

"The draft is a formal document for public review and comment," said David Pennington, a planner and engineer with the firm Parsons-Brinkerhoff, who collected data on the proposed project. "It will also go to state and federal agencies, to those reviewing agencies."

The document is based on information collected plus past public and agency comment on an initiative to improve U.S. Highway 70 for 38 miles, from

Ruidoso Downs to Riverside in eastern Lincoln County.

Two public hearings have been scheduled for next month. The first, June 5, will take place at the Ruidoso Convention Center. The other, on June 6, is set for the Hondo Valley school. Each will include an open house from 5 p.m. to 6:30 p.m., followed by the formal hearing.

Three options for the highway are under consideration. One would add passing lanes to the existing roadway. Another proposal would expand the highway to four lanes, and at some communities, include a fifth turning lane. The third option is a no-build alternative. The highway department prefers the four-lane plan.

The document was expected to have been distributed Tuesday and available for public review today. A copy of the report would be available at village halls in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, the Hondo Valley Public School in Hondo, the Ruidoso Public Library, the Roswell district office of the state highway department and at Parsons-Brinkerhoff's headquarters in Albuquerque.

MAGISTRATE COURT

The following court cases were recently adjudicated in Lincoln County Magistrate Court at Ruidoso with Judge William R. Butts presiding:

Schwarzenegger was sentenced to 90 days probation and ordered to pay \$199 in court costs.

Carlos Anchondo, 43, Ruidoso, through a plea agreement, was convicted of misdemeanor aggravated battery. Counts of battery against a

household member and resisting, evading or obstructing a police officer were dismissed.

Anchondo was credited for 60 days served at the Lincoln County Detention Center, placed on 182 days probation, required to attend counseling for anger management and assessed court fees of \$51.

Justin Long, 20, Ruidoso, was found guilty of DWI-first offense, being a minor consuming or possessing alcohol and having an open alcoholic beverage container in a motor vehicle.

Long was sentenced to 90 days probation, ordered to serve 80 hours of community service and received fines and court costs of \$594.

Mario Oripineda, 49, Encino, pleaded guilty to charges of aggravated DWI-first offense, not having a driver's license, careless driving, failing to show proof of liability insurance and having an open container of alcohol in a motor vehicle.

Oripineda was credited for three days served at the Lincoln County Detention Center, placed on probation for 370 days and ordered to pay fines and court costs adding up to \$755.

Jerry Joe Gonzales, 30, Ruidoso, was bound over for trial on felony counts of aggravated assault and aggravated assault against a household member.

Gonzales is accused of assaulting a person with a deadly weapon on Feb. 11.

Leslie Evans, 47, Ruidoso, was bound over on four felony counts of forgery.

Four bank checks totaling \$10,268.84 were allegedly cashed by Evans, according to a criminal complaint.

Agency investigates wolf deaths

The deaths of four wolves released into the national forests in Arizona and New Mexico as part of an experimental population are being investigated by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The agency is offering a reward of up to \$10,000 for information leading to the apprehension of anyone responsible for the shooting of a Francisco pack yearling found on Dec. 18.

Investigations into the deaths of three other wolves introduced into Arizona's Apache-Sitgreaves National Forest in 1998 also are continuing.

The carcass of the male yearling was found north of Highway 12 near Aragon, N. M., on the Apache National Forest's Divide wood cutting area, according to Victoria Fox, who oversees the wolf project for New Mexico.

The wolf was born May 1, 1999 at Sevilleta National Wildlife Refuge in New Mexico, she said.

He was released along with members of his pack on July 14, 2000, a few miles southeast of Hannagan Meadow in the Blue Range Primitive Area of eastern Arizona.

Just weeks prior to his death, he began making dispersal movements to the east, possibly in search of a mate, Fox said.

Still remaining in the wilderness areas are seven "active" packs consisting of about 26 members, some yearlings and an unknown number of puppies.

"They all seemed to be doing what wolves are supposed to be doing," she

said. "The last range reduction occurred in the Wildcat Pack, because the 2-year-old wolves released were too young to pair bond and are traveling independently."

No incidents of livestock predation have been reported this year, although some wolves were seen feeding on already dead cattle and one female from the Blue pack was involved in a non-fatal attack in mid-April on a calf.

On April 24, the alpha female from the Pipe Stem Pack, the lead female and the only one that bears young, also was found dead.

The cause appears to be natural, but the body has been sent for an examination to determine how she died, Fox said. Researchers will be watching the pack to see which female takes her place.

"The interactions are so interesting," Fox said of the project to reintroduce wolves into the wilderness areas of Arizona and New Mexico.

The Hawk's Nest Pack was one of most successful groups, she said. They weren't involved in predation on livestock and were successful in producing offspring. But last year, the alpha male appeared to be ill and disoriented.

He was captured and a veterinarian discovered he had a terminal brain tumor. The wolf was euthanized, Fox said.

The alpha female was left with several yearlings and a pup. She chose a yearling from the Seneca Pack as a mate and he

now is the Alpha of the Hawk's Nest Pack. "These are good things and hold promise that these animals are social and will eventually cross paths, creating a better gene pool," Fox said.

One of the Hawk's Nest young wolves is traveling with a Francisco yearling along the west fork of the Black River, she said.

The killing of a Mexican gray wolf is a violation of both federal and state laws.

Violations of the federal Endangered Species Act can involve criminal penalties up to \$100,000 and/or six months in jail, or a civil penalty of up to \$100,000.

The Fish and Wildlife Service is the principal federal agency responsible for

conserving, protecting and enhancing fish, wildlife and plants and their habitats for the continuing benefit of the American people, Fox said. It manages the 98-million acre National Wildlife Refuge System encompassing more than 535 national wildlife refuges, thousands of small wetlands and other special management areas, as well as fish hatcheries and ecological service field stations.

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

Three points short

The Warrior boys track team came close to a repeat of last year's state title, but fell to NMMI by three.

If not for a dropped baton, the Ruidoso High School boys track team would likely be celebrating a repeat State Championship.

Instead, the Warriors had to settle for second place.

Ruidoso finished just three points behind the Class AAA champ New Mexico Military Institute at the State Championship track meet in Albuquerque Saturday. That margin of victory was made possible by a bid baton exchange in an 800-meter relay heat.

"We would have probably had eight points," Warrior coach Ronny Maskew said.

The coach went on to compliment his team for their inspiring comeback effort.

"They were just determined to do everything they could to come back and win it," he said. "That shows a lot about the character of these kids."

Despite not winning the team title, the Warrior boys did bring home six individual gold medals combined. Seniors Solomon Barnett and Dominic Gonzales had five of those, as Barnett won the 100, 200 and 400 meters, and Gonzales topped the shot put field. J.R. Floyd, Tyler Lane and Jose Linares were also on the 400 relay.

"Four gold medals is hard to beat," Maskew said of Barnett's performance. It's the second straight year for a Warrior to bring home quadruple gold, as Thomas Schiele managed the feat last season. "Solomon did a great job all year long."

Phillip Darley got the other individual gold medal, winning the pole vault.

Maskew said Barnett, Gonzales and Darley all did what was expected of them, whether they had to overcome adversity or not.

Gonzales actually trailed in his event at one point, but came back for the win.

"He was pumped to do whatever he had to do to win," Maskew said. "That's what we needed him to do."

But it took the entire team to even come close to topping

NMMI, which was just able to hang on. Seven individuals and three relay teams scored for the Warriors.

"We performed about as well as we could have, in light of that (disqualification)," Maskew said.

For the Lady Warriors, Kammi Sparks and Mindy Brunell stepped up to lead Ruidoso to an eighth-place finish.

Sparks took home a gold in the 300-meter hurdles; it was the only win the girls got. Maskew said Sparks was impressive.

"She finally made up her mind that she was going to win an event at the state meet," he said. "It was the best meet of her life."

Sparks also tied for third in the high jump and got fourth in the 100 hurdles.

Ruidoso will lose Barnett, Floyd, Gonzales, Sparks and Brunell to graduation, a loss Maskew said will be missed next year.

On the girls' side, "Mindy and Kammi were the leaders on the track," Maskew said. "I could ask them to do something and they would do it."

As for the boys, Maskew said Barnett, Floyd and Gonzales "have set one of the

PGA might salvage N.M. golfing event

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) — The PGA Tour is considering saving the Buycom Tour's New Mexico Classic and staging it at Santa Ana Pueblo's new Twin Warriors Golf Club in August as planned.

A Tour spokesman said Friday a decision would likely be made in the next week to 10 days.

Tourney officials announced late Wednesday that the event was canceled for financial reasons. The following day, the PGA Tour announced it still intended to make the tourney happen.

"We've got a commitment to our players," said Dave Lancer, the PGA Tour's director of information. "It's on our schedule, and our players are planning on competing there."

Lancer said he was not at liberty to provide details concerning the PGA Tour's efforts to find sponsorship money for the New Mexico Classic, scheduled for Aug. 20-26.

Bill Archibeck, the tourney's co-chairman, said the PGA Tour's announcement came as a surprise, considering the timing.

"We told them 30 days ago that we didn't see this tournament making it," Archibeck said. "If we were going to wind up barely making ends meet and not raising any money for charity, we didn't want to do it."

Archibeck and Roger Martinez, director of golf at Twin Warriors, said they felt local organizers had done everything realistically possible to keep the tournament going.

Martinez said there were three major factors that contributed to the tournament's demise.

First, he said, was an awkward change in name from the Nike Tour to Buycom Tour. "We had to explain to everybody that it was still the Nike Tour," he said.

Second was the paltry attendance at last year's tourney — which was half that of 1999 — and finally, there was a loss of sponsorship dollars.

Though lead sponsors First State Bank and Eller Media remained solid, Martinez said, some other secondary sponsors fell through.

Fishing report for the Ruidoso area, as of May 13, 2001

Rio Grande: If you have not taken time to stroll along the River in the past few weeks, go to your favorite stretch of water and take time to look and listen. Come and enjoy the sites and sounds of the River. The River was stocked on May 12 with 1,000 hungry Rainbow trout. This stocking is very special in that it was not the NMGF Department doing the stocking. This stocking is the first of several supplemental stockings being provided by the Village of Ruidoso. This is just one more effort to keep our cold water fishery as high quality as possible. The best subsurface fly selections for Rainbows or Browns remain the Bead head Pheasant Tail nymphs or Bead head Prince Nymphs. Green Rock worms and Bead Head Cased Caddis Larva continue as producing patterns. A few fish have been taken on brown or black Stone flies.

rice 1/2 lb. Rainbows were stocked in the lake. The Rio Bonito leaving the lake has good flow, 300 Rainbows were stocked here. Several fishermen reported fish being taken on small dark colored dry flies just before dark on the main lake body. Try casting a large size 12 or 14 dark colored dry fly with a nymph pattern dropper tied about 18-20" behind the dry. For the spin cast fishermen, try a hot pink, renegade pattern propeller fly or a black with grizzly hackle propeller fly behind a bubble rig.

Eagle Lakes: These lakes are now open. The fishing has been reported as doing well. The day fee has gone up to \$10 per day, per person. Reason given is that, since the fish hatchery in Mesalero in closed, costs of transporting fish from as far away as Arizona have to be covered.

Grindstone: Water level has come up to nearly flowing over the spillway. This is a level that has never been seen — a full lake. The lake has been fishing quite well despite the off-coloration of the water. For the best fishing on Grindstone, take a float tube or other non-motorized craft on the lake. Remember if you take any type of boat or non-motorized craft onto Grindstone lake, you must first purchase a boating permit from the Ruidoso Parks and Recreation

Department. Sink a woolly bugger or a streamer 8 to 10 ft. and strip — hang on. On bright days, the fishing has been the best just before dark. For spin casters, tie on an Olive or Black propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the barbs down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water.

Lake Mesalero: The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark woolly buggers have been taking a few fish late in the day. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk.

Please practice Catch and Release wherever and whenever you can. Remember this when using the forest and water lands around the Ruidoso area: **Leave nothing but Footprints Take nothing but Pictures Kill nothing but Time** We have moved our local shop — New address is 2501 Sudderth Drive — Come see us for daily fishing information. Albuquerque native Unser Jr. earns 14th spot in Indy 500

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Two-time Indianapolis 500 winner Al Unser Jr. is back in the Indy field for the 14th time after qualifying at 221.615 mph during the weekend.

The Albuquerque native is placed inside Row 7 in 19th position in the provisional starting grid released Saturday.

Teammate Didier Andre, a native of Lyon, France, now living in Albuquerque, also made the provisional field, qualifying on the inside of the eighth row at 220.985 mph. In all, 27 drivers made the field.

Unser seems assured of a starting spot while Andre's time seems likely to make the field as there are five slower qualified cars than his.

Unser wanted to do better. "I admit we were a little

slow because we missed the setup a little bit," Unser said after his qualifying run. "But I'm very happy about being back in the field for another race."

"It (the car) didn't stick well," Unser said of the problem. "What can I say? But we're in the show and it's a long race. I'll be (starting) in the middle of the pack and I wish we were up there further."

Last year, in his first race at Indianapolis since he won in 1994, Unser finished 29th, the worst of his career.

"What wins this race is a good consistent car, good pit stops, catching the yellows right, a hell of a lot of luck, no matter if your starting 33rd or first," said Unser, who also won in 1992. "We'll just work

our way toward getting a good, consistent race car and go from there. My guys are one of the quickest teams in the pits and (car owner) Rick Galles calls a great strategy from the pits."

Andre's average speed places him in 22nd spot on the grid. "I'm happy we are in," Andre said.

Galles' third driver, Casey Mears and another Albuquerque driver, Jim Guthrie, are still trying to make the field for the May 27 race.

Mears' best lap in practice Saturday was 216.622 while Guthrie had a 218.160 in his Blueprint Racing Special.

Scott Sharp has captured the pole position for the May 27 race with a four-lap average of 226.037 mph around the 2 1/2-mile oval.





A solar wind isn't beyond reach

Young scientists at Capitan Elementary School impressed the judges at the first schoolwide, fourth- and fifth-grade science fair — and the final winner, Carly Grier, a fourth-grader, dumbfounded them with her magnetic storm detector.

About 100 science projects were entered in the competition. Only one student didn't participate, because he

was out of town, said Jason Hightower, the fourth-grade teacher responsible for organizing the fair.

Frank Walstein, head of the high school science department, chose students from his Biology II class to judge the projects and gave them a list of criteria on which to judge, including that the students came up with the idea themselves, did their own research and executed most of the project themselves, and that they could explain it. Each project had a placard with the hypothesis, procedures and conclusions of the experiment.

The first-place winners of eight categories — mechanics, astronomy, technology, agriculture, chemistry, biology, geology and electricity — were set up in the new library, and the judges interviewed the budding scientists there.

Walstein said he selected the judges because they were responsible and had a good science background, but after interviewing eventual winner Carly Grier, judge Traci Maroon, a senior, said, "I feel stupid." The other judge, Nick Jaquez, also a senior, was speechless when asked his impression of the experiment, and said, "It blew me away. She put a clip on a negative pole, which creates a circuit and turns the laser on. This is very involved and I do not fully understand it, so I'm not going to try to talk my way out of it."

Carly had less trouble explaining it, though. "A solar wind will move the magnetic field, making it

jiggle points off the laser," Carly explained. She said she worked with her father on the project for three weekends. "I wanted to do something that was involved with space and a laser. My dad works with a Mars committee," she said. "I went through some Scientific Americans (magazines) and found a bunch of cool projects. My dad has two small lasers because of his lab in Florida, and he ordered magnets."

Carly demonstrated the magnetic storm detector. The frame holding the magnets did jiggle, making the laser light up a spot on the wall.

"She was basically showing thermal winds," Hightower said, "what percentage of wind would come through the area she's testing. She was detecting thermal/solar wind through the earth's upper atmosphere. The laser would vibrate in response to the changing wind — winds we wouldn't be able to feel (because) it's more of a shift in the earth, gravitational pulls we're used to so don't detect."

Hightower said that for 10- and 11-year-olds, it's expected that parents or other family members will help out to some extent, since some of the experiments involve propane torches and drills.

"She had to build a microfiber, what holds up the actual magnet and mirror in place," he said. "Where she got help was not in the idea — she did all the research herself in class and on the Internet, and her dad helped her put bolt and screw parts together."

"It was fun making it and seeing if it would actually work and detect," Carly said. "I didn't see or feel the solar wind. It hits the magnetic field, to be pushed back and the tail will go around the moon, so the moon's protected."

Other first-place winning projects included finding out what causes earthquakes, whether a single battery can light up a flashlight bulb (it can), how to build a solar viewer and how to irrigate a field.

Hightower was pleased at this first science fair for all fourth- and fifth-grade classes, and said it would become an annual event.

"They did a lot of research in class," he said. "We had a lot of books for them to use. Teachers went over basically different procedures, techniques, a skeleton of what to do and they were to take that home and work with their research ideas, and, ideally, their family."

"Most of them did it the night before — two of our (first-place) winners did. We laugh because it's amazing. If they could come up with that in one night, what would they have come up with if they'd started two months ago?"


To find out more about these amazing animals, The Mini Page talked with an expert at the Nebraska State Museum. Here's what we learned:

Mastodons

Mastodons were only distant relatives of the elephants.

Mammoths

Mammoths are close relatives to today's elephants.




Mastodons were usually smaller than the most common mammoth. They were about 8 to 10 feet tall and weighed from 8,000 to 12,000 pounds.

The larger, more common mammoth was about 10 to 12 feet tall and weighed from 14,000 to 20,000 pounds.

Mastodons had teeth with low crowns with bumps. These teeth were for crushing trees and bushes. They lived in forests.

Mammoth teeth had high crowns that were good for grinding tough grasses. They lived in the grasslands of the Great Plains.




Once upon a time (about 45,000,000 years ago), long after the dinosaurs had died out, there appeared on Earth a family of mammals that had a feature which made them stand out from all of the others. They had trunks.

There were more than 600 kinds of these proboscideans (PROE-buh-SID-ee-uhns), or animals with long snouts. They roamed the Earth for 20 million years and lived on every continent except Antarctica and Australia.

Today, there are only two of these trunked animals still around, the Asian and African elephants.

The Mammoth Mystery


Coming to America

By studying the fossils, experts estimate that the first mastodons arrived in this part of the world more than 13 million years ago.

At that time, the climate was warm. The temperatures usually stayed in the 70s and 80s.

About 2 million years ago, the mammoths came over from Asia. At that time, the continents were not separated as they are today. Land linked Asia and North America.

The mammoths arrived at the beginning of the Ice Age. This was a period when the climate got colder. Giant sheets of ice covered most of the continent.



Extinction

One type of mastodon died out about 1 1/2 million years ago. They could not handle the cold.

The American mastodon and the mammoth, however, lasted until the end of the Ice Age. They died out about 10,000 years ago.

These large mammals were not the only ones to disappear. From about 132,000 to 10,000 years ago, something happened to wipe out 80 percent of all animals bigger than a badger.

Many animals in Europe and Asia became extinct also, but not as many as in North America.

The mammoth mystery

Experts are still puzzled about why these animals disappeared. They have ruled out a big catastrophe like the meteorite that might have killed off the dinosaurs.

Maybe there was too much competition for grazing land.

Experts don't think it was a big climate change that made mammoths extinct. They had been able to survive climate changes for millions of years.

By the time humans came to America, mammoths were already dying off. However, hunters might have given them the final push.

These two fossil skeletons show that mammoths came in many different sizes. One of the largest was nicknamed Archie. When alive, Archie weighed more than 10 tons and stood 14 feet tall. The smaller one was found in Sicily. It was only 34 inches tall.

Keeping them on ice

For many years, people have been digging mammoths from the ice. Sometimes they reported finding the meat fresh enough to eat, even after it had been dead for 20,000 years!

In 1997 a family of nomad reindeer hunters discovered a mammoth buried in the ice in Siberia, a region of Russia. Scientists airlifted it, still in its block of ice, to a cold cave where they could work on it safely.

They began melting the ice bit by bit with hair dryers. So far, only a small part has been freed of the ice. Scientists have found part of the trunk, bones and hair.

This spring scientists will start work on a second mammoth. They believe there may be thousands buried in the Siberian ice. Perhaps these finds will help explain what killed off this great animal.

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Death penalty favored in N.M., but margin slips in latest survey

■ With four on Death Row, a 'life without parole' sentence is seen as alternative to death (now by lethal injection).

CLOVIS (AP) - New Mexico's execution chamber has not been used since 1960, but polling within the past several months has indicated that many New Mexicans still favor the death penalty.

While Texas has executed 47 people since 2000 and the federal government is scheduled to execute Oklahoma City bomber Timothy McVeigh in June, support for the death penalty in New Mexico, as reflected in some newspaper polling, has shown signs of decline since 1994.

A Santa Fe New Mexican poll conducted by the Mason-Dixon Polling and Research Inc. of Washington, D.C., last September showed 65 percent of respondents favored the death penalty, down from previous Mason-Dixon survey showing 71 percent in favor in 1994.

The latest poll suggested fewer respondents supported the death penalty when a life-without-parole option is presented.

During the 2001 legislative session, lawmakers considered a measure that would have abolished the death penalty and replaced it with life-without-parole sentences.

The bill was defeated 21-20 in the Senate - a close call, said Clovis-area District Attorney Randall Harris.

"I thought we had lost the death penalty," Harris said. "And I think it's a terrible thing because of those rare cases where the death penalty is the only appropriate punishment."

Jurors have "made the choice to put these individuals on Death Row," San Juan County District Attorney Sandra Price said in urging retention of the death penalty.

The American Civil Liberties Union contends the death penalty is unequal and unfairly applied - and doesn't work anyway.

"Our point on the death penalty is that no execution is a viable punishment," said Peter Simonson, executive director of the ACLU chapter in Albuquerque. "Eighty percent of death convictions are attributed to race and economics."

Harris disputed the contention race is an issue in death-penalty cases, noting two of New Mexico's four Death Row inmates are white.

He does agree money for competent defense lawyers is essential.

For now, New Mexico juries have to choose between a life sentence, which is 30 years, or death.

"A great compromise would be to add in life without possibility of parole and leave the death penalty," Harris said.

Dick Ross, a former Clovis police and fire department chaplain, said he favors the death penalty under certain circumstances, "only if it were meted out in a fair and equal manner. We need a penalty where life without parole is an alternative."

The Rev. Tobin Hitt, a priest at St. Helens Roman Catholic Church in Portales, said he, too, once believed in the death penalty "until about four years ago."

Hitt, a former personal injury lawyer who became a priest, agrees "society has the right to defend itself, but at the same time, we as Christians see that only God has the power of life and death."

New Mexico has four men awaiting execution by lethal injection: Terry Clark of Roswell, Frank Martinez of Grants, Michael Treadway of Farwell, Texas, and Timothy Allen of Bloomfield.

Eight New Mexico prisoners have been executed since 1933, but none since 1960.

Steven Gamble of Arkansas to replace retiring Everett Frost

ENMU's new president due Aug. 1

PORTALES (AP) - Steven Gamble is leaving the presidency of Southern Arkansas University to take the helm at Eastern New Mexico University, calling it "a rare opportunity to return home."

Gamble, originally from West Texas, said a factor in his taking the job at Portales was that his son and grandson live in Midland, Texas, about 200 miles from here.

It's also the area where he always planned to retire, Gamble said.

"I've always liked the high plains of New Mexico," said Gamble. "When I looked into the university, I found that it was committed to undergraduate education. I found that it was student-centered."

"This was a rare opportunity to return home, so to speak, and I pursued it," he said.

Gamble takes over at ENMU on Aug. 1, replacing the retiring Everett Frost.

Gamble's resignation from SAU is to be effective July 31.

"I have been at SAU for over nine years as president and I truly believe that an individual can overstay his time at an institution," Gamble said Friday. "Things are going very well here and, if I was ever to leave on top, it's now."

Eastern's main campus is in Portales, with a branch campus in Roswell and an instruction center in Ruidoso.

ENMU board president Gerald Quintana said Gamble was selected from among five finalists who visited the Portales campus. About 70 people had applied for the job.

"We felt that (Gamble) had an edge in experience" after serving as president at SAU, Quintana said. "He also is an excellent fit with the culture of Eastern New Mexico University. We feel that he has the vision to lead Eastern into a great future."

Gamble said he would try to increase university enrollment.

"There's space in the residence halls, and there's space in the classrooms for more students," Gamble said.

Gamble's four-year contract at ENMU will pay him \$145,000 the first year.

During his tenure at SAU, Gamble has served as chair of the Arkansas Higher Education Council and of the council's strategic planning committee and productivity committee and as a member of the Technology Task Force and Executive Council.

Prior to joining SAU, Gamble was vice president of academic affairs at West Texas A&M University from 1987-1992. He previously served as a dean there and as an associate professor of history, and had been an administrator and assistant professor at Angelo State and at Texas Tech.

Noted cattleman Les Davis dies at 81

CIMARRON (AP) - Cattleman Les Davis, who oversaw the expansion of the sprawling CS Ranch over four decades, has died after a long illness stemming partly from World War II battle injuries. He was 81.

Davis, who died May 12, had received three purple hearts for wounds suffered with the 4th Armored Division in Europe, his son, Kirk, said at CS Ranch headquarters here. Cremation is planned, with a memorial service at 2 p.m. Friday at the ranch.

"He's an institution in northeastern New Mexico, and his family were pioneers in many different dimensions all over that part of the country," said novelist Max Evans, author of

books set in Davis' cattle country. "He and (his wife) Linda did a lot of work through the years for the National Cowboy Hall of Fame" in Oklahoma City. His wife was a daughter of another well known northeastern New Mexico cattleman, Albert K. Mitchell.

Born Oct. 24, 1919, the son of a physician in Philadelphia, Davis came west to visit the family ranch after graduating from Dartmouth College in 1941, and stayed. Survivors include his wife, Linda, sons Warren of Raton, Randy of Cimarron, Kirk of Cimarron; Bruce of Eagle Nest; daughters Julia Stafford of Raton and Kim Barmann of Springer, and seven grandchildren.
