## Officials ponder care center issue

Village, county find there is little they can do

Representatives of Lincoln County and village of Ruidoso said Monday they will support efforts to ensure a stable residential program for victims of Alzheimer's disease and patients needing skilled nursing care.

But other than calling some state and federal government and elected figures, they may not be able to help in seeking a short-term solution to the closing of at least two wings at the Ruidoso Care Center, they said.

During the second meeting of Friends of the Ruidoso Care Center, Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson and Commissioner L. Ray Nunley offered encouragement mixed with realism. The mayor said the county and village may need "a sit-down" to discuss future options, because the area needs a nursing home.

The care center is owned by Integrated Health Services Inc., or IHS.

One possibility would be to bring in another company willing to build a new facility by using industrial con-

struction bonds, which would exempt the entity from property taxes, Donaldson said.

Or village officials could facilitate a sale of the structure on Resort Drive to a different entity, he said.

"But all of that doesn't solve the problem of where you put your loved ones today," Donaldson said.

When someone suggested hiring a lawyer to seek an injunction against the closing of the skilled care and Alzheimer's units, Connie Russell, whose mother is in another section at the center, said, "Going to a lawyer doesn't give my mother a secure place and good care."

"If they would just tell me that ultimately they are getting rid of the facility I could move forward. I just need a honest answer from an IHS person."

Ruth Wade, center administrator, at the direction of IHS sent letters to the relatives and guardians of patients citing structural problems with the building as the reason for the closing of the two units.

## County should pay to clean illegal dumping, agency says

■ The Solid Waste Authority estimates it spends \$25,000 from its own budget to clean up indiscriminate trash disposal.

Members of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority contend the county should pay for manpower and equipment required to pick up illegally dumped trash in unincorporated areas of the county.

They estimate the cost of the service at about \$25,000 per year, said Commissioner Rick Simpson, who resigned earlier this month as manager of the authority and previously served as the county's representation on the five-member coalition.

Faced with a "no-wiggle-room" budget until they see end-of-year cash balances from various county departments, commissioners took no action on the request Thursday. Chairman Rex Wilson directed County Manager Tom Stewart to bring it up again later.

"If we quit picking it up, you'll know it," Simpson said, reminding the board that the authority is not required to offer that service, only to collect household garbage.

In response to a question from Commissioner Leo Martinez, who opposed the move, Simpson said the authority has collected the illegal

trash for nine years and the current board can't be blamed that prior representatives didn't ask earlier for help.

Even when the authority catches a violator, the \$300 to \$1,000 fine levied by the municipal court goes to the state, not back to the collection coalition, which has to clean up the mess, he said.

Martinez said that work should be part of the service provided by the authority and if necessary, rates should be raised to cover it, just as Ruidoso charges its residents for picking up yard debris.

Simpson said the cost of cleaning up is only part of the expense; gasoline and hauling time and truck wear to the landfill south of Alamogordo also is involved.

Municipalities served by the authority have 40-yard roll-off containers that can be used by their residents or residents outside their boundaries for a fee of \$10 per yard or \$2 per piece of white goods such as refrigerators and stoves.

Resident Duane Williams said county people would pay to dump if containers were in accessible places and the fee was reasonable. The authority and county might save money in the long run by paying people to bring the trash, he suggested.

Resident Sally Canning said the county should spend the \$25,000 to encourage people to bring "illegal" garbage to the right place.

## THEIR NEW HOME

The move by Ruidoso police into a new building is complete.

The department's dispatch center earlier this month was the last division to move out of the old police station on Wingfield Street to the new facility at 1085 Mechem Drive.

"It's great," said Lanny G. Maddox, police chief. "Our communications center and enhanced 911 was switched over May 9. Everything is digitized now."

The department's patrol, detective, records and administrative divisions moved into the new building last year. The dispatch center remained at the old station until logistics with communications links could be worked out. Earlier plans for a radio tower at the new building were scrapped after some neighborhood objections surfaced.

Maddox said radio communications are now microwaved from the station to a location at the Ruidoso Public Library and then microwave linked to the old tower behind the former police station.

The village purchased the former Moncor Bank building in May 2000. The bank had vacated the facilities 15 years ago.

The 14,151-square-foot facility was

bought for \$1.15 million. A \$1.5 million state loan provided additional funding to convert the two-building complex into a police station. Administrative services and detective offices are in one part of the complex. Patrol quarters and offices rented to the New Mexico State Police and New Mexico Gaming Control Board are in the adjacent building.

The previous police station was an approximately 6,000 square foot building.

An additional delay in moving all

components of the police department into the new facility was construction of a sally port for the secure transfer of detainees from squad cars to a temporary holding cell.

Several arrested people in the past week have been transported to the Lincoln County Detention Center with the closure of the jail at the former police station. Maddox said the cost of transporting detainees to the county jail at Carrizozo would be offset by no further need for a 24-hour jail in the new police station.

## U.S. 70 upgrade heads for public hearings

■ The recommended option of expanding the highway to four lanes — plus others — will be discussed June 5 and 6.

Hearings on plans to widen U.S. 70 from east of Ruidoso Downs through the Hondo Valley are scheduled for June 5 and June 6.

The design staff is recommending a continuous four-lane highway from milepost 264.5 east of Ruidoso Downs to MP 302, about 1 1/2 miles east of Riverside.

However, a "no action" option and two reconstruction alternatives that would widen the existing highway by adding travel lanes, passing lanes, turning lanes and

consistent-width shoulders, will be reviewed at the meetings in Ruidoso and Hondo.

The "build" alternatives would impact a higher percentage of Hispanics and people with a median income below poverty level than would occur to other ethnic and economic groups. But other options that would avoid the Hondo Valley were determined not to be reasonable and feasible, the designers wrote.

"Implementation of either build alterna-

But Elliott Topper, regional director of licensing and certification for the state Department of Health, said if the building posed a danger, the state would have closed it and helped the people move out.

"We're not doing that," he said. "The building is not an immediate threat point-blank in our opinion."

Because letters sent to residents and their relatives or guardians did not contain required information, a new notice must be sent, which will start a new 30-day period to file appeals, Topper said.

IHS was told to stop transfers of patients to other facilities, but several employees said patients continue to leave, spurred by telephone calls warning them if they wait, they may not find beds in other facilities. Several transferred to IHS's expanded center in

Alamogordo. The company also manages three centers in Roswell.

IHS officials were invited, but did not attend, the Monday meeting, organizers said. Employees in the audience emphasized they were there on their own time as concerned citizens.

Wade said she has been told the two wings at the center accounting for more than 50 beds will close and the remaining area with 30 beds — for assisted living and the disabled — is up for sale.

Company officials plan to decertify the rehabilitation or skilled beds, she said, which will decrease the licensure. No paperwork has started on that action, she said.

"Then it's less of a product to sell," said Lee Woodard, an employee who accepted the position of chair of the group.

Topper said IHS, which manages the center for the Lyrick Corp., cannot be

stopped from closing if regulations are followed, because it's a private company.

Registered nurse Kathleen Shober, regional ombudsman coordinator, said IHS must give 30-day notice of an intended closing and the notice must meet criteria including — mentioning the reason for the closing, the names of the facility to which they are being moved and offering a chance to visit first, putting together a care plan meeting at least three days before the move and giving telephone numbers and addresses for the Fair Hearing Bureau, the ombudsman program through the Area Agency on Aging and for the licensing and certification division of the state Health Department. The letter must also make it clear that residents have 30 days to appeal.

Wade said to ensure transfers are handled correctly, all discharges are suppose to go through her. But one coordina-

tor said a requirement for a "care plan" meeting on patients is not being met.

Several appeals have been filed on behalf of patients, Shober said. A patient cannot be moved until an appeal is finished.

Meanwhile families can contact a lawyer referral service for the elderly and might explore a class action suit, she said.

Wade said appeals will buy time and that at least two companies are seriously looking at the center.

The care center has been sold four times in the six years she has worked there, she said.

Vaunda King said she found information on the Internet about the two companies and a bankruptcy may be involved. Wayne King warned that if families move patients to other IHS facilities, they may face the same situation there next year.

# HIGHWAY: Public hearings to gather input on U.S. Highway 70

...tive would have adverse environmental and community impacts," they stated. "However, the adverse impacts are localized and do not outweigh the overall benefit that would result to the users, communities, state and region, served by this highway."

An open house from 5 p.m. to 6:30 p.m., when visitors can view plans, will precede a one-hour presentation and then a question and comment period. The first meeting Tuesday, June 5, will be at the Ruidoso Convention Center and the second, Wednesday, June 6, at the Hondo Valley School Gymnasium.

Alternative 1 proposes no construction. Alternative 2 covers reconstruction of the highway as an enhanced two-lane road requiring the acquisition of about 50 acres of farmland, adjacent to the existing highway right-of-way.

The changes would include the addition of passing lanes to reduce the number of accidents related to passing maneuvers, and the addition of acceleration and deceleration lanes at major driveways to enable right-turning vehicles safer egress to and from the highway, the designers wrote. Center turn lanes

would be provided at state and county roads. Shoulders would vary from 4-feet to 10-feet in width.

Alternative 3, recommended in the executive summary, covers a continuous four-lane highway. A center left-turn lane would be provided at the intersections of U.S. 70 with U.S. 380, state highways 395 and 366, County Road 028 and at the driveway entrance to the Hondo Valley School site. The alternative would require acquisition of 99 acres of additional right-of-way, including 3.8 acres of farmland.

"Most of the locations where property would be acquired for right of way involve narrow strips of land," the design team wrote. "Locations where substantial curve flattening is proposed will involve the acquisition of larger acreages."

Typical sections described in the EIS for the third alternative, all with four lanes, are:

- Two driving lanes in each direction 24-foot wide, a 6-foot center median to separate opposing traffic streams and continuous outside 8-foot shoulders in areas without constraints.

- In areas where difficult terrain and environmental constraints exist adjacent to the highway, the center median would not be provided and the shoulders would be narrowed

to 4 feet.

"Through the communities of Hondo and Tinnie, 2-foot curb and gutter would be installed. A left-turn lane would be provided at the school entrance.

To increase the right of way for Alternative 2, 12 structures would be acquired, including three occupied houses, two vacant houses, one business, one fruit stand and five other buildings such as sheds and barns, the design team wrote.

Alternative 3 would add three more structures, including two occupied houses.

Visual impacts in the Hondo Valley would be similar for both "build" alternatives and would result in the loss of vegetation on both sides of the highway, especially along irrigation ditches where as many as 142 mature deciduous trees such as poplars and Siberian elms, cottonwood, boxelder and walnut would be removed at six sites. That could be offset by planting replacement trees and revegetating disturbed areas, the design team wrote.

Designers estimated that from 200 to 300 acres of vegetation could be disturbed temporarily. An estimated 77 acres

of habitat would be lost to pavement for Alternative 2, and up to 123 acres for Alternative 3.


Other significant points include:

- The build alternatives would directly affect two wetlands, where the highway crosses the Rio Ruidoso and Rio Bonito. About a quarter acre of wetland habitat would be temporarily affected and less than one tenth of one acre of wetland would be lost to construction. Some of that loss would be offset by the creation of new wetlands along the Rio Hondo and Rio Ruidoso.

- Temporary impacts to water quality may occur during construction of two bridges over the Rio Ruidoso at Mile Post 266.6 and the Rio Bonito at MP 284.7 and from drainage structures. Roadway run-off also would be increased.

- Six archaeological sites and portions of two historic ditch systems would be impacted.

**IDENTIFYING VISUAL IMPAIRMENT

### Capitan schools to hire superintendent

A special Capitan School Board meeting is scheduled for 6 p.m. Thursday to approve a superintendent replacing Diana Billingsley, who will retire at the end of June. The 2001-2002 school budget also is up for a vote.

The board will vote on the candidacy of Larry Miller, Ph.D., currently the superintendent of Grady schools, Billingsley said. Grady is a rural school district north of Clovis.

Miller and three other candidates were interviewed May 10 and 11 (two out-of-state applicants canceled). The school board evaluated the candidates in executive session on May 11 and has conducted background checks for the past three weeks. If Miller is approved and accepts the position, he will become superintendent on July 1.

The school board also will vote on the bus transportation contract for 2001-2002

and on personnel issues, including resignations of Dale Jackson, the middle school principal, and his wife, Cindy Jackson, an elementary school teacher, and possibly on employment recommendations for about seven new teachers.

Billingsley said she plans to work as a part-time educational diagnostician for area schools.

"And I'm going fishing," she said. "I can't tell you which one has priority, but I think it has to do with fishing."

Billingsley said she wants to spend time with her grandson, who starts school next year in Hobbs. Both of her daughters graduated from college on May 12.

"I don't care if I don't catch a fish all day long; I just enjoy the peace and relaxation of it," she said.

The next regular meeting of the board of education is scheduled for 6 p.m. on Thursday, June 14 in the administration building.

#### Grant projects sought

Lincoln County officials are looking for good projects to consider for the county's annual Community Development Block Grant application.

No application was submitted last year.

Hearings on proposals will be scheduled during commission meetings in June, July and August.

Two years ago, the county received money for the expansion of the Carrizozo Public Health Clinic. Several years before that, the county was awarded a housing rehabilitation grant for low-income residents, a project championed by former commissioner Manroy Montes.

Commission meeting to review proposed ordinances on camping in rights of way, broadening the definition of contraband under a law establishing a penalty for smuggling illegal contraband into the county jail and imposing a \$25 fine for bad checks issued to the county.

#### Truck gets new home

Lincoln County will donate a 1989 Chevrolet S-10 pickup truck to the Carrizozo School District.

County officials considered it a junker and were going to put it up for auction, but district representative Rick Cogdill is delighted with the government-to-government donation. County Manager Tom Stewart told county commissioners Thursday after they approved the action. The state Department of Finance and Administration also must approve the transfer.

Sheriff Tim Sullivan said the law was passed during his previous term as sheriff, in 1984.

## Biotech confidence builds

Since biotechnology has been in use, it has met with opposition on grounds ranging from ethics to economics. But, through research, another argument is coming down on the side of biotechnology.

"I think these products are very well documented to be safe, and people should not be concerned about the inclusion of these products in their diets," says food scientist Dr. Steve Taylor of the University of Nebraska. "The consuming public needs to understand there's been a great deal of research done, a lot of documentation. It's been reviewed by governmental authorities in many different countries, and these products are viewed to be safe before they go to market, or they don't go to market."

Research indicates that the food industry is embracing biotechnology. Dr. Tom Hoban, a food science professor at North Carolina State University, conducted in-depth interviews of food processors, food retailers and restaurateurs. "They really do support the use of biotechnology," says Hoban. "It's almost overwhelming support."

Perhaps it's not surprising that biotechnology is getting support from that sector. "The food industry has some advantages now (from biotechnology)," says Taylor. "They're going to have even more advantages in the future as some of these products with better keeping quality, more attractiveness, healthier components and better nutrition come to the market. They'll be able to put products on the market that we can barely conceive of today."

The amount of research conducted on biotechnology has naturally created volumes of data. It's data that doesn't exist for the conventional counterparts to biotech foods. That volume of data, says Taylor, should be reassuring to consumers. "Foods produced through agricultural biotechnology are at least as safe, if not safer than the products they currently consume in their diets," says Taylor.

Taylor says that biotechnology could help fulfill a fundamental global need. "I think the biggest

advantage is that (biotechnology) has the greatest potential to provide everybody in the world with enough food to eat at an affordable price," says Taylor. "I don't see another technology that can increase food production on the limited amount of arable land that we have in world today. Genetically enhanced foods are the only solution to that problem that I can foresee."

In spite of some of the opposition to biotechnology, consumers are seeing the benefits that the science can bring to them. "Certainly some of the ideas like reducing the use of chemical pesticides, we've found through research, is a very, very highly supported application of biotechnology," says Hoban. "If consumers realize that much of what the farm community's able to do is to reduce some of their inputs, that becomes a very strong drawing card for biotech."

"I think it would be a shame," says Hoban, "if, somehow, a small fringe group of activists was able to cut that benefit off and deprive society and deprive the farm community of what is truly going to be an important tool for the future."

It is obvious that a lot of money was spent fixing up this care center and more obvious that there are many empty rooms. Now why would a corporation, which has sunk obviously thousands upon thousands of dollars on a care center in Alamogordo, want to transfer patients from the Ruidoso Care Center? It's all a matter of profit.

I'll tell you my thoughts. It seems they are forcing residents to a place where they obviously are having trouble filling the rooms.

Their ridiculous excuse is that the "foundation problems" are forcing them to relocate two units of the Care Center. Give me a break; if that was the case, they would close the whole building down. And, as Dr. Robinson said, they would make arrangements for repairs.

Residence burglarized

A Ruidoso woman told police on May 7 an estimated \$35,000 in custom-made diamond and sapphire jewelry was missing from her residence. The jewelry as well as some home electronic devices were believed to have been taken from the Mechem Drive residence between March 31 and May 7.

Bad check reported

A Ruidoso business reported to police that a customer's check in the amount of \$1,181.50 had been returned because of insufficient funds. Linco Medical and Supply, 116 Nob Hill Drive, told officers the check had been written on the account of an Albuquerque woman. The case has been classified as a felony issuance of a worthless check.

Residence burglarized

A May 17 grass fire, in the 100 block of Aspen Circle, has police looking for a 14-year-old boy. Several people in the area of the fire provided officers with a description of a teen who they said had been in the area where the fire started. The fire was limited to a small

area of a lot on Aspen Circle.

Girl held in drug case

A 15-year-old Ruidoso Downs girl has been referred to juvenile authorities after she reportedly admitted providing a drug to two other students at Ruidoso High School. Ruidoso police were called to the school on May 17 after the prescription Zolof was found in a washroom. The girl told officers she took five of the pills from a relative and gave three of the pills away at school. The alleged action has been filed as a felony possession of dangerous drugs case.

Domestic violence

Police arrested a man just before midnight May 17 after receiving a call of a domestic violence incident in progress at a Camelot Drive apartment.

Brandon D. Hicks, 28, no address listed, was charged with assault on a household member and criminal damage to property. A woman claimed Hicks kicked in a front door and told officers she feared he would harm her. Police apprehended the man at a neighboring residence.

Hicks was ordered held without bond by a judge

because of a previous domestic violence incident.

Battery complaints

Criminal complaints alleging battery on a household member and assault on a household member were prepared by police against a 20-year-old Ruidoso man. A woman told police her boyfriend grabbed her right arm and hit her in the face on May 12. She said he also threatened he would slit her throat when she went to sleep. The alleged incident occurred at a residence in the 300 block of Mechem Drive.

Suspect sought

Ruidoso police are looking for a man who allegedly threw a woman to the ground in the 100 block of Park Avenue. A witness to the incident said the woman had been on the hood of a stopped vehicle when the driver got out and took the woman by the waist and threw her to the pavement. The victim refused to provide officers with any information about the man. The woman received medical attention at the Lincoln County Medical Center for a swollen and bruised cheek, cuts to her fore-

head, bruises on a shoulder and for leg and back pains.

The incident has been classified as a misdemeanor aggravated battery.

Lawn sculptures taken

A misdemeanor larceny incident involving the theft of two lawn sculptures from a yard in the 200 block of Barcus Road was reported to Ruidoso police on May 16. The sculptures of a doe and a fawn were believed to have been taken between May 14-18. The statues were valued at \$175.

Residence burglarized

A felony larceny case involving a reportedly stolen laptop computer is being looked into by Ruidoso police. A teacher at Ruidoso High School said the \$1,500 computer was taken from a room on May 21. The computer had reportedly been left in the room for about half an hour.

Vehicles vandalized

Several Ruidoso village vehicles were vandalized over the weekend in a village yard on Close Drive. Rocks thrown off a cliff north of the parking area resulted in heavy damage

to five motor vehicles and a tractor. A dollar value in the felony criminal damage to property incident had not been determined on a police report.

Cruelty investigated

Ruidoso police are investigating a cruelty to an animal case that reportedly occurred between May 8 and 10. The village's animal control officer was called to a residence in the 900 block of Mary Drive about a possible rabid dog. Examined by the officer, the animal was described as lethargic and wobbling while trying to walk. The owner of the dog was told medical attention was necessary.

The owner reportedly left the animal at home while leaving for vacation. A caretaker called police on May 10 to say the dog had died. A test for rabies, brought negative results, leading police to believe the dog may have been poisoned.

Worthless checks

A felony worthless checks case has been turned over to

the Ruidoso Police Department's Criminal Investigation Division. The three checks, written to Thriftway Supermarket, 804 Mechem Drive, were returned because of a closed account. The check amounts were \$44.15, \$10.55 and \$32.25. The checks were written to the store between April 18 and 24. The case was reported to police on May 9.

Girl in custody

A 17-year-old Ruidoso girl was taken into custody about 2:30 a.m. May 15 on charges of being a minor allowing oneself to be served alcohol, unlawful carrying of a weapon and for a curfew violation. A patrol officer saw the girl walking on Sudderth Drive near Country Club Drive. Questioning the teen, the officer detected a smell of alcohol. The girl reportedly admitted drinking at a friend's house. After she was taken into custody, police found a single set of brass knuckles. The teen, whose case has been turned over to the juvenile probation office, was released to her father.

## Air Force to repair pipeline

■ A proposed project would repair or replace a water pipeline along its 38-mile route from La Luz to Oscura.

An environmental impact draft review of a proposal to repair 38 miles of the Bonito water pipeline from La Luz to Oscura was released this week by the U.S. Air Force.

Feeding from Bonito Lake Reservoir in Lincoln County, which is owned by the city of Alamogordo, the pipeline starts at Nogal and ends at La Luz in Otero County.

Although most of the line is located within highway and railroad rights of way, some portions pass through private land, according to a summary.

The proposed action would replace about 38 miles and would cover spot repairs and protection from deterioration caused by electric currents from Oscura to Nogal, both in Lincoln County.

Optional alignments are proposed to bypass about

6.4 miles of existing pipeline that crosses private property in favor of a new alignment within county and state highway rights of way.

Two alternatives are covered in the environmental assessment draft; no action and repair of the pipeline.

The draft can be viewed at the Lincoln County Clerk's office, in the county courthouse in Carrizozo, the Ruidoso Public Library on Kansas City Street and Cree Meadows Drive and at the Alamogordo Public Library, 920 Oregon.

The public comment period ends June 19.



# Event to be Saturday

## Memorial Day observance set for Fort Stanton cemetery

Family and friends of those buried in the historic Merchant Marine and Military Cemetery will gather there for the 12th year.

Spectacular vistas, a historical setting and rows of white crosses bring home the message of Memorial Day at Fort Stanton Merchant Marine and Military Cemetery.

For the 12th year, visitors and family members of those buried at the site will gather at 1:30 p.m. Saturday to honor veterans whose sacrifices are memorialized there.

Following in the tradition established by Merchant Marine Skipper E. Victor Schaerer and his wife Jean, who adopted the then neglected cemetery, the program Saturday will bring together representatives of many different segments of the community.

Larry Holt, who retired from the Army, was recruited to the assignment of assembling the program by Schaerer and carried on after his death in January 2000.

However, the starting time for the ceremony is different

this year, scheduled at 1:30 p.m. at the cemetery on State Highway 214 between Sierra Blanca Airport Road and U.S. 380.

Cub Scout Pack 57, the American Legion and YFW will present colors, followed by an invocation by Father David Bergs, USAF, and the National Anthem performed by Katie Armstrong.

Michael D'Arco, state director of veterans affairs will give opening remarks and John Donnellon, USAF, USMM, will review the history of the Merchant Marines.

Visitors also will be offered written summaries of that history, Holt said.

Others participating in the ceremony are Syc Feldman, RAF, Dick Mound, U.S. Army, Hyman Pitkofsky, Pat Brinkley and Bob Ashman, all USMM.

Holt said Nick Skogland, grounds keeper for the state, and Danny Sisson, head of LaGrone Funeral Chapel in Ruidoso, both worked hard to prepare for the event.

The funeral home donated row markers.

Boy Scout Troop 98 in Ruidoso placed small flags by each grave before the ceremony.

Participants in the Amity Foundation drug and alcohol

rehabilitation program at Fort Stanton helped with the grounds clean-up, Holt said.

The names of those buried at Fort Stanton, in the main cemetery and at a smaller burial ground, are published in "A Gravesite Directory of Cemeteries in Lincoln County" compiled by Alice Blakestad for the Lincoln County Historical Society.

Fort Stanton's list spans 40 pages, many more than any other cemetery in the county.

From the opening of the U.S. Merchant Marine Tuberculosis Hospital in 1899 until it closed in 1953, the cemetery was operated by the hospital, Holt said.

During that period, the majority of burials, 1,554, occurred. The total today is 1,642 graves within the main cemetery.

An old military cemetery is situated a short distance from the one now used and contains about 24 graves dating from 1879 to 1970. In 1896, the bodies of 68 military men and their dependents were disinterred and reburied in Santa Fe, Holt said.

A trio of Lovington youths took honors, as Miles Thompson


and Raelyn Gardner were senior All-Around and runner-up winners and Cimarron Thompson was the junior runner-up.

## Ruidoso doctor speeds into automobile racing

Dr. Ray 'Psycho' Seidel not only takes care of the people of Lincoln County. He is also a licensed professional race car driver.

He started racing in 1993, after following the local drag racing scene, where he gained experience and sponsors. In 1996, one of his sponsors, Crane Cams, asked if he would like to try his hand at pro road racing. The National Auto Sport Association (NASA), a professional drivers' circuit, hosts these events.

Seidel races a 1993 Mustang Cobra, which he made all the changes to in

order to meet the safety and official requirements, as a part of the Seidel Speed Team (SST). It is a family effort. His father and son help to make sure things run smoothly.

Learning as they go, Seidel and family do all of their own pit work. Blowing engines is part of the process, and when this happens at a race, one has to be prepared.

They trailer a full garage in order to make sure they are ready for any breakdown. If Seidel blows an engine at a race, he and his family have learned to remove, rebuild and replace an engine in as little as six hours. And these are not your everyday engines, putting

out 600 horsepower-plus. His sponsors include Paxton Supercharger forced induction, Aeromotive fuel systems, VP Fuels and Big O Tires. BeCool Radiators custom-built Seidel a radiator to fix his overheating problems. Seidel's come from Sunset Racecraft Racing Engines, which also supplies engines for NASCAR teams.

More sponsors allowed him to go faster and move up to the unlimited open road races. He has one of the fastest Mustangs in the country. Seidel's top speed in practice is 216 mph and his fastest clocked time in a race was 192 mph. ## Ruidoso fishing report, May 21, 2001

**Rio Ruidoso:** The diversion of river water into Grindstone Lake should cease this week. When that happens you will note a dramatic increase in water flow in the river. Come and enjoy the sights and sounds of the River. The River was stocked on May 12 with 1,000 hungry Rainbow trout. This stocking is very special in that it was not the NMGF Department doing the stocking. This stocking is the first of several supplemental stockings being provided by the Village of Ruidoso. This is just one more effort to keep our coldwater fishery as high quality as possible. The best sub-surface fly selections remain for Rainbows or Browns remain the Bead head Pheasant Tail nymphs or Bead head Prince Nymphs. Green Rock worms and Bead Head Cased Caddis Larva continue as producing patterns. A few fish have been taken on brown or black Stone flies. South fork — Spring run-off on the South Fork is still flowing but has dropped significantly. One still needs to hike a ways up the stream to find fish. Once found they are healthy and hungry. The fish here are not fussy, just toss what you have and have fun. Several nice Brookies have been reported already this spring.

**Bonito Lake:** On May 8 nearly 1,800 nice 1/2-pound Rainbows were stocked in the lake. The Rio Bonito leaving the lake has good flow, 300 Rainbows were stocked here. Several fishermen reported fish being taken on small dark colored dry flies just before dark on the main lake body. Try casting a large size 12 or 14 dark colored dry fly with a nymph pattern dropper tied about 18-20 inches behind the dry. For the spin cast fishermen, try a hot pink, renegade pattern propeller fly or a black with grizzly hackle propeller fly behind a bubble rig.

**Eagle Lakes:** These lakes are now open. The fishing has been reported as doing well. The day fee has gone up to \$10.00 per day, per person. Reason given is that,

since the fish hatchery in Mesalero is closed, costs of transporting fish from as far away as Arizona have to be covered. Grindstone: Grindstone Lake is full. The water level is at an all time high. Go take a look at our full lake. The lake has been fishing quite well despite the off coloration of the water. On May 17 the lake was stocked with 1,500 hungry Rainbow trout. For the best fishing on Grindstone, take a float tube or other non-motorized craft on the lake. Remember if you take any type of boat or non-motorized craft onto Grindstone lake, you must first purchase a boating permit from the Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Department. Slip a woolly bugger or a streamer 8 to 10 feet and strip — hang on. The fly patterns have not changed much in three weeks. On bright days, the fishing has been the best just before dark. For spin casters, tie on an Olive or Black propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the barbs down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to fish caught and returned to the water.

**Lake Mesalero:** The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark woolly buggers have been taking a few fish late in the day. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk.

Please practice Catch and Release whenever and whenever you can. Remember this when using the forest and water lands around the Ruidoso area:



### ENMU receives grant for minority students

Eastern New Mexico University has received a \$100,000 grant for Native American and Hispanic high school graduates wanting to pursue a major in family and consumer sciences.

To qualify for the Multicultural Scholars Grant Program, applicants must be spring 2001 graduates from an accredited state high school, have a cumulative high school GPA of at least 3.0 and an ACT score of 17. Their cultural heritage must be Hispanic or Native American, and they must be residents of New Mexico.

Recipients will be first-generation college students and must maintain a 2.5 GPA while majoring in business, communications, human services, vocational education or general studies. Scholarship recipients receive \$2,250 per semester for eight semesters.

## IT'S TOSS-UP TIME

133 Ruidoso High School seniors throw those caps and get on with life

A short thunder storm held back its congratulations until after 133 Ruidoso High School seniors received their diplomas Saturday morning at W.D. Horton Stadium.

The 24 Karat Gold Band played "Regal March" as the procession for administration and faculty, "Pomp and Circumstance" for the graduates' procession and the National Anthem before high school principal Bill Green welcomed the seniors and their guests, and closed the ceremony with "Fanfare and Recessional."

Megan Lamb gave the opening reading, Leah Miller addressed the student body, Jacob Ornelas gave the valedictory address, Kristi Ensor gave the senior farewell address, and Erick Kimbrell gave the closing reading.

Lamb told graduates that success isn't measured in how much money one makes or in status, it's measured in success in oneself. "As long as you're happy with what you're doing, nothing else matters," she said.

Miller drew laughter from the graduating seniors

by observing that they all were sitting there in identical gowns — even though they'd been taught in high school to be individuals. She ended her address saying, "When we were born, we cried. Live your life so when you die, the world cries."

Ornelas emphasized the close bonds members of the class had developed, the encouragement and social and moral support received from friends and family and exhorted his classmates to go out and "invent the future through our hard work, diligence and passion."

U.S. history teacher Gerald Ames was the commencement speaker. He said the graduates of the 1950s through the 1990s produced the biggest economic boom the country has ever seen — despite testing behind the Soviet Union in math and science.

"You're a lot like them," Ames told the graduating class. "I have no fear for the future because this class of 2001 is a lot like their parents and grandparents. This country is in very, very good hands."

More than \$1,106,000 in scholarships were awarded to the graduating seniors, said Superintendent of Schools Mike Gladden, not including the Drama Club scholarships.

## Nebraska From A to Z



Nebraska, a beautiful part of the Great Plains, depends on agriculture. Farms and ranches cover more of Nebraska than any other state, more than 95 percent of the land.

Businesses based on agriculture, such as meat-packing, cereal making, and the manufacturing of farm machinery, are important. Nebraska is also a leading state for insurance and banking.

In 1854, Congress offered settlers land that it had earlier promised to Native Americans. Pioneers poured into the area. It became a state in 1867.

Today Nebraska is 36th in population, with about 1,600,000 people.

Arbor Day was started in Nebraska City to encourage tree planting.



Hay such as this is grown and dried on millions of acres in Nebraska. It is used to feed cattle in Nebraska and elsewhere. Beef is the top farm product. The top crop is corn, giving Nebraska the nickname "The Cornhusker State." Hogs, eggs and soybeans are also top farm products.

**Buffalo Bill** started his famous Wild West Show near his ranch in North Platte.



**Chimney Rock**, near Bayard, was the landmark weary travelers watched for on the Oregon and Mormon Trails. When they sighted this sandstone hill, they knew they were about halfway through their 2,000-mile journey.

The **Cottonwood** is the state tree.



The area, mistakenly called the "Great American Desert" by European explorers, is one of the top farming areas in the world.

**Elephant Hall**, in a museum in Lincoln, has the biggest collection of elephant skeletons in the world. The biggest mammoth fossils ever discovered were found in Nebraska.




**College Football** is a big interest. Nebraskans joke that on home game days, the stadium in Lincoln, packed with 77,000 fans, becomes the third-biggest city in the state.

The **Great Platte River Road Archway Monument** grabs travelers' attention near Kearney. Inside are exhibits about this area as the gateway to the West.

**Hay bales** were used to build the only church in the U.S. made of this unusual building material.

## More About Nebraska

Many Indian tribes native to the area were forced out by the U.S. government. At the same time, others were pushed onto Nebraska reservations from other areas.

The westward **Journey of Meriwether Lewis and William Clark** in 1804 took these explorers up the Missouri River.

**Kool-Aid** was invented by Edwin Perkins in 1927 in Hastings. He changed his soft drink syrup, Fruit Smack, into a powder to make it easier to ship.

**Lincoln** is the state capital and second-largest city, with about 225,000 people.

The **Western Meadowlark** is the state bird.

The **Missouri River** makes up the eastern border.

The **Niobrara** is one of the top canoeing rivers in the country. It has more than 90 waterfalls.

**Omaha** is the biggest city, with about 340,000 people. It is one of the top railroad, meat-packing and telemarketing centers of the country.

The **Oregon, Mormon and California trails** followed the Platte River on their way west.

The **Great Plains** is a large, mostly flat area of grassland prairie in the center of the continent. Nebraska is a Great Plains state.

This **Platte River** was called the "Nebraska," meaning "flat water," by Native Americans. Its depth rises and falls depending on the amount of recent rain or snow. It is usually too shallow for boats.

The **High Plains Aquifer** is a big underground layer of rocks and other materials that are filled with water. Most of this aquifer is beneath Nebraska, giving it more underground water than any other state.

Many **Ranches** are giant-sized, covering more than 100,000 acres.

The **Sandhills** are the biggest grass-covered sand dunes in the Western Hemisphere. They cover about one-fourth of the state. Only the Sahara and the Arabian deserts have bigger areas of sand.

**Tornadoes, hailstorms and blizzards** often threaten Nebraska.

The **Unicameral** is the name of the only state legislature with only one branch. All other states have two branches, usually a senate and a house of representatives. The Unicameral is also different in that when candidates run for office, they do not run on a certain party's ticket.

**Valentine**, a small town of about 3,000 people, gets many requests for cards postmarked from the town on Feb. 14.

**Second Wind Ranch** near Comstock has more water-pumping windmills (about 125) gathered together than any other place on Earth.

**Sioux, Pawnee, Cheyenne, Missouri, Omaha and Ponca** Indians were some of the first people to live in the area.

**Twice-Yearly** migrations of millions of cranes, ducks and geese turn the Platte River area into an amazing sight.

The **Henry Doorly Zoo** in Omaha has the world's biggest indoor rain forest exhibit.
