Fires subdued

Two human-caused fires adjacent to Ruidoso no longer pose an immediate threat to the village

A weekend fire that threatened a neighborhood on the south side of Ruidoso and forced as many as 800 evacuations was declared 80 percent contained by Tuesday night.

The so-called Trap and Skeet Fire and the earlier but smaller Homestead Fire — now 100 percent contained — brought nearly 1,000 firefighters and support personnel to the Ruidoso area.

The Homestead Fire, was reported at 3:21 p.m. Friday, initially as a fire in a residential yard. It burned within 300 feet of some residences in the Homestead Acres Subdivision east of the village, but no dwellings were damaged.

The blaze went on to consume an estimated 200 acres, said Rich Kvale, incident commander.

Lincoln County Sheriff's Detective Jackie Raines said a property owner discarded a cigar in his yard.

"The guy didn't intentionally try to start the fire," Raines said. "When he first noticed it he called 911 and then got a hose and tried to put it out."

Raines said an investigative report on the cause of the fire has not been completed because of activity with the ongoing fire south of Ruidoso. He said once the report is finished it will go to the district attorney's office where a misdemeanor charge could be considered.

It was about 2:30 p.m. Saturday the "all-call" alarm went out on a new fire south of Ruidoso, bringing in an initial response from fire departments in a 30-mile radius.

The Trap and Skeet Fire started about 1/2 mile from the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

As fire crews were working a second day to contain the Homestead Fire, manpower and resources were shifted to the new fire on Mescalero Apache Reservation lands.

With crews moved onto the reservation, residents potentially in the path of the fire were told to leave their homes. As many as 800 homes and condo units were evacuated Saturday on Camelot Mountain, other locations near U.S. Highway 70 both on the reservation and Ruidoso's southeast edge, and along Carrizo Canyon. Those evacuated were allowed to return home at 10 p.m. Saturday, with a caveat they might be forced out again Sunday.

For residents on Camelot Mountain, the exodus notice was delivered again Sunday morning. At 6 p.m. Monday evac-

Arson suspected in Mescalero fire, others

The Trap and Skeet Fire just outside Ruidoso is under investigation as a possible arson.

A fire suppression official Monday confirmed the arson suspicion, but declined any further comment about how the fire started.

"It's been suspected," Larry Humphrey, the incident commander of the fire suppression team responded when asked whether the blaze was believed to have been intentionally set.

"The investigation is still ongoing and that's not my side of the whole thing. My side is suppression."

A Ruidoso police detective, assisting in the probe, said the origin of the Trap and Skeet Fire was human-caused and suspicious.

Bureau of Indian Affairs-Mescalero Agency Police Chief Troy Bolen said there is a lead in the investigation.

"Good things are coming together for us," Bolen said. "It's looking real positive. I feel very confident about solving this case."

The fire that went on to burn more than 450 acres was one of three detected on Mescalero Apache Tribal lands Saturday, Bolen said. Two other fires were quickly extinguished by tribal firefighters before they were able to consume any acreage.

Bolen said he could not talk about any evidence collected at the origin of the Trap and Skeet Fire.

The State Fire Marshal and an accelerant-sniffing dog from the Roswell Fire Department had been brought in to assist in the investiga-

tion. Agencies working the case are both police and conservation wardens on the reservation, the FBI, New Mexico Fire Marshal's office, Village of Ruidoso police, the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department and investigators from the USDA Forest Service.

Bolen said there have been at least a dozen suspicious fires on reservation lands so far this year.

In addition, five other fires the past 2 1/2 months in the Ruidoso to Bonito Lake region, are being investigated as arson, said Thomas Chavez, Ruidoso emergency manager.

In April a local, multi-agency Arson Task Force was established following a quickly extinguished blaze along Homestead Drive that was labeled as intentionally set.

Cuts in care bring trauma for patients

■ For residents of Ruidoso Care Center who face the prospect of having to move, corporate financial problems mean little.

Corporate financial problems don't mean much to LaDell Barber, except that they may be impacting her 86-year-old mother at a time in her life when she is the most vulnerable.

Eula Geiger is one of the human potential casualties in a decision by Integrated Health Services Inc., which manages the Ruidoso Care Center for The Lyrick Corp., to close the skilled nursing and Alzheimer wings of the center on Resort Drive.

The state Licensing Bureau of the Health Department cited the nursing home late last week, saying its initial letter claiming structural problems as the reason to close down more than 50 beds, was insufficient to meet state requirements. But before those citations, several transfers were completed or attempted, in part because family members were worried space might not be available if they waited.

Barber said she called and completed arrangements for her mother's transfer, but ended up bringing her back to the Ruidoso center, the place her mother has considered "home" for seven years.

She called the experience "very traumatic." "I made arrangements to move her to a nursing home out of town," Barber said. "I was told it was not a lock-down unit, but I didn't think that would be a major problem because she's in a wheelchair. I was told it was an Alzheimer's unit."

The Ruidoso Care Center, whose staff and local administration were very cooperative

Families protest center's decision

Health Department says facility deficient in notifying patients

A peaceful protest is planned by relatives of patients at the Ruidoso Care Center Saturday to illustrate their distress at the management company's decision to close the skilled nursing care and Alzheimer's units.

The licensing division of the New Mexico Department of Health late last week cited the center on Resort Drive for two deficiencies related to notification given to patients and their families about the closing and their options. The center is operated by Integrated Health Services Inc. for The Lyrick Corp.

Roy Weidner, director of health facilities compliance, said the state received complaints from the outset and cited the company for lack of proper notice on the discharges. The company has 10 days to respond and present a correction plan, he said. The plan should identify the time frame to comply, which typically is no more than 30 days, Weidner said.

After proper notification, center residents then have 30 days to appeal, a process that can take another 30 to 90 days to complete.

Elliott Topper, district licensing and certification manager in the state's Roswell office, said Monday if the correction plan is not




both in the transfer and accepting Geiger back, provided a van, Barber said.

That didn't help. Her mother "threw up all the way over and became unresponsive," Barber said. "When we got there, they debated about calling 911."

The nursing home had reserved a bed positioned at the last door before an exit.

"I thought that was inappropriate," Barber said. "On a good day, she might just wheel herself right out the back door. I didn't think I could take that chance."

After arriving, Barber said she also was told her mother didn't meet the home's criteria for living in the Alzheimer's Unit because she couldn't get around on her own or participate in activities.

"I guess communications between me and the nursing home got messed up," she said. "After some other things happened, I called and asked if I could bring her back to Ruidoso. They said sure. They were very cooperative in trying to make the move and in getting her back."

After the two arrived at the Ruidoso Care Center, the staff bathed Geiger, fed her and put her down for a nap.

"Thank God, there were no long-time ill effects," Barber said. "I kept thinking, 'Oh, my God. I've killed my mother.'"

She won't be quick to move her mother in the future, Barber said.

When she receives the second letter the corporation is to send out under the direction of the state with more complete information, she plans to file an appeal to delay any move.

Before she takes a chance with her mother's well-being again, the corporation will have to tell her face-to-face she must go, Barber said.

"I think we ought to be looking at a long-term fix to ensure we have a nursing home in our community," she said. "But I need a short-term solution. I don't know how long my mother will need this type of care."

Agapito "Gap" J. Silva, state ombudsman, told relatives of patients at the Ruidoso Care Center last week that transfer trauma is a very real problem for elderly nursing home patients.

Defined in state statutes as "the combination of medical and psychological reactions to abrupt physical transfer that may increase the risk of grave illness or death," the phenomenon in 1992 was given a formal nursing diagnosis called "relocation stress syndrome."

In literature provided by Silva, transfer trauma is described as "a wave of disorientation and despair so intense that it can kill."

Stability of familiar people, surroundings and routine are important elements for sustaining life for people of advanced age, according to the written information, adding that as advocates for residents in nursing homes, ombudsmen are the ideal people to educate individuals on the life-threatening issue.

The response to the stress caused by relocation may include depression, manifesting as agitation, increase in withdrawal behavior, self-care deficits, falls and weight loss. The symptoms are more exaggerated in Alzheimer's patients.

leaves, Chavez said.

Humphrey said he ordered structural fire department crews off Camelot Mountain.

"It is not safe for the firefighters, let alone residents," Humphrey said. "That is an accident waiting to happen."

He also said if a spot fire were to have occurred on Camelot Mountain he would not have sent firefighters up. Air attacks with helicopters and slurry tankers would have been the only suppression actions Humphrey called safe.

Officials from Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs kept constant tabs on the fire with a bird's eye view from the High Sierra Condominium Complex on Camelot Mountain.

Ruidoso Fire Chief Virgil Reynolds labeled the fire directly south of the village the scariest in a long time for his community.

"In the area that it's at and the way the winds blow it's in a lot worse area than last year," Reynolds said from a lookout point near the southwestern edge of Camelot Mountain. "Last year (the Cree Fire) was in the county and on the other end of town."

Gov. Gary Johnson, who surveyed the Trap and Skeet Fire location by air on Sunday, equated the conflagration to last year's Cerro Grande Fire in and around Los Alamos.

"At any minute this fire could pick itself up and move about a mile-and-a-half, and

wees were permitted back into an estimated 200 residences. The fire also forced the closure of Casino Apache and the Inn of the Mountain Gods from Saturday afternoon until 6 a.m. Sunday.

Ruidoso Emergency Manager Thomas Chavez Monday defended the two evacuations of Camelot Mountain. He said high winds predicted for Monday prompted the re-evacuation of residents Sunday.

Trap and Skeet Fire incident commander Larry Humphrey agreed with Chavez' decision to evacuate again.

"Sunday morning I went up there and took a first-hand look at that area and when I looked at that it absolutely scared me to death," Humphrey said.

He said the fire downwind and down hill from the subdivision, narrow roads and heavily wooded lots would have resulted in "dead people" if the fire had moved onto Camelot Mountain's Dude Mesa. Humphrey estimated that if the fire had reached the bottom of the mountain it could be burning homes and property at the top half-an-hour later. Humphrey said given the right conditions the blaze could have advanced into downtown Ruidoso in 1 1/2 hours.

Two residents in the subdivision "absolutely" refused to

then we may be in some trouble," he said Sunday. "That was a contained fire that jumped a mile-and-a-half, and then all hell broke loose."

Johnson said the state immediately responded with assistance. The governor signed an emergency declaration, allowing state resources, including additional police and Army National Guard troops to move in quickly.

Evacuations just hours after the fire began Saturday reached beyond Camelot Mountain, and touched the east side U.S. Highway 70, including the Pine Cliff Subdivision.

Saturday evening's concern over the blaze even touched as far away as a western section of Ruidoso Downs, said that village's emergency manager.

"We did a pre-evacuation procedure on Wood Lane," said Tom Armstrong. "We weren't sure where it (fire) was going to go. But it laid down."

On Monday an estimated 700 firefighters, including 10 hot-shot crews, and more than 100 management personnel were involved in the Trap and Skeet Fire. Those numbers began to fall on Tuesday as two days of gusty winds diminished.

Humphrey lauded the Mescalero Apache Forestry Branch for previously controlling forest fuels and creating defensible space along U.S. Highway 70. He said that

helped move the forest fire out of trees and onto the ground.

Tony Recker, Mescalero BIA Forestry Branch chief, said fuels treatment projects on the reservation began two years ago.

"On the reservation a lot of the stands are thinner than what you see on the adjacent national forest," Recker said. "And we've continued to log over the past 10 years while the national Forest Service does little or no logging."

Rehabilitation work is already beginning in some areas of both fires, officials said.

"Even though the fire is contained, we still have the possibility of flooding," said Sara Misquez, Mescalero Apache tribal president. "They will start the rehabilitation work in the areas that will be affected, which will be the Inn of the Mountain Gods casino area and probably some of the houses along Highway 70."

Misquez called all the firefighters "heroes" to reservation residents.

Flooding was a significant problem in Mescalero after the 1996 Chino Well Fire which burned 9,000 acres, officials said.

In addition to no structure losses in either fire, only two firefighters were injured. The most serious was a severe ankle sprain, officials said.

acceptable, he will work with center officials to come up with a correct notice.

At a meeting last week, relatives of patients at the center pointed out that employees no longer attend the sessions because they fear for their jobs. The center originally offered more than 87 beds, but IHS announced about 50 will be eliminated with the closing. In the letter of notification, structural problems with the building were cited as the reason for the action.

State Ombudsman Agapito J. Silva, associate ombudsman Katrina Hotrum and local ombudsman volunteer Steve Torres complimented the group of relatives and other interested individuals last week for mobilizing quickly and stopping the transfer process, even if the action only delays the

company's plan to close the wings.

"Some (transfers) have slipped through because the facility is not informing us," Hotrum said. "The census is going down. I was told 45 are there today. A lot are transferring to Alamogordo, but our representatives are following up" to see if they are there because of coercion. If your relatives don't want to be moved, contact Steve."

Families aren't being told about all of the choices in facilities available to them, Hotrum said, adding, "They're really pushing Alamogordo" where IHS operates a newly renovated and expanded center. "I'm told many family members have not seen in advance the new facilities where their relatives are going. That's an inappropriate discharge."

The process should cover about three days with a plan of

care that ensures a smooth transition, she said.

"I'm told by families that's not been happening," Hotrum said.

Several relatives have claimed their loved ones suffered transfer trauma as a result of the sudden moves, she said.

"Transfer trauma is real," she said. "I think we may be able to fight it through that line. Employees must promote the health and highest function of patients. They're dealing with a vulnerable population."

The families of patients could seek a temporary injunction against the transfers in district court if they can prove irreparable harm to patients,

Silva said.

Hotrum advised family members to keep a daily journal of events that could be used if a case goes to court.

Several at the meeting talked about each kicking in a few hundred dollars to retain an attorney.

Although no Ruidoso village or Lincoln County representatives attended the meeting last week as they did in mid-May, Lincoln County Commissioner L. Ray Nunley previously said he invited top officials with IHS to be there. No one showed.

The care givers at the center are trying to help and are very concerned about the impact on patients, said Dorothy Olson, who has a relative at the center.

From Homestead Acres to the Inn of the Mountain Gods, it was a weekend not soon forgotten.


The Trap and Skeet fire that started on Saturday brought precautionary evacuation of whole subdivisions on the fringe of Ruidoso adjacent to the Mescalero Apache Reservation. Some 460 acres of trees and brush were burned in the area between Carrizo Canyon and U.S. Highway 70, but no structures were damaged. The day before, a fire in Homestead Acres off Gavilan Canyon Road — not far from 2000s huge Cree Fire — burned 200 acres. Again, homes were evacuated, but there was no structural damage.

In both instances, damage was limited because of massive fire suppression efforts by firefighters from Mescalero, U.S. Forest Service slurry bombers, helicopters, and many neighboring municipal fire units.

The cause of the Trap and Skeet fire remains under investigation.

Power outage, fire teach lessons to village

For a time Saturday the Trap and Skeet Fire became a learning experience for most of the Ruidoso area.

With no electricity for nearly five hours, little in the way of official information came out during the first few hours.

Electricity to Ruidoso and a large surrounding area was cut at 2:58 p.m. Saturday, said Charlie Moore, with Texas-New Mexico Power Company. It was requested by people fighting the fire, Moore said. "It was for the safety of those at the fire and to protect the line."

"From a fire standpoint, everything worked well," said Robert Donaldson, Ruidoso mayor, but other aspects, showed flaws — especially after Saturday's electrical out-

age. "We're working on all that," Donaldson said. Generators will be added a critical sites.

The outage impacted the Ruidoso Police Department communications center briefly Saturday afternoon. Chief Lanny Maddox said dispatchers used hand-held radios to communicate with officers and firefighting officials until two generators were tied to the power system. A back-up generator, previously ordered for the new Mechem Drive police complex, was expected to arrive this week.

Generators are needed for the water treatment plant, Donaldson said. A generator also is needed at the gas station village vehicles use, he said. With much of Lincoln County and the Mescalero Apache Reservation without

electric service, the nearest fueling location was Tularosa.

Power was interrupted for about five minutes on Sunday, after warnings for hours that the electricity could be out.

Getting information to the public, tuned in by battery-powered radios, was also limited for a time. KBUY-KWES radio news director Harry Oakes said by the time a temporary studio and a loaned electric generator was put together at their transmitter site the electricity had come back on.

Radio station KRUI was delivering information no more than 90 minutes after the cut-off, said Tim Keithley, general manager. Borrowed, portable generators at the studios and at the transmission site made KRUI the only local station on the air during the outage.

Ruidoso radio personality Mike Vann dies

Mike Vann, KBUY-AM-KWES-FM radio personality, died Monday, of an apparent heart attack.

The 67-year-old morning radio show host had been with the Ruidoso country-and-Western station KWES for 18 months, said Harry Oakes, news director/sales manager for the station. He said Vann, whose real name was Mike Lubbes, was found dead Tuesday at his Ruidoso home.

Vann was known for his radio characters Furley and Randy that often accompanied him

on the air.

He took control of the station's morning show in January after a year as the 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. slot personality.

Lubbes, who grew up in Fresno, Calif., began his radio career in the mid 1970s after serving in the U.S. Army and a stint in Vietnam, Oakes said. He had also worked in radio in Gallup before coming to Ruidoso.



When electricity quits, information dies

The Trap & Skeet fire delivers a message to Ruidoso

When - suddenly and without warning - Lincoln County lost its electric power on Saturday afternoon, stores and restaurants closed, traffic signals failed, gasoline and water pumps were inoperable, radio stations went off the air. Private telephones worked; many other phones didn't.

Hundreds of people were evacuated in the uncertainty of wind-blown fire on the mountain to the south. Everybody else tried to prepare, in the blind, for

whatever might happen. Information suddenly became the most valuable commodity of all, and the hardest to come by.

Kudos, then, to KRUI-AM 1490 for managing to get on the air with a hastily rigged generator. It made a difference as darkness approached.

Then the power came back on, and information flowed.

But the warning was clear - Ruidoso needs emergency power sufficient to keep people informed.

No NRDC breaks for Bush

President Bush made it clear from the beginning that his administration is willing to meet its critics halfway, but in the case of actor Robert Redford, a board member of the National Resources Defense Council, that's not good enough. Redford was invited by Interior Secretary Gale Norton to witness the planned release of California condors into the wild, but he refused the invitation.

Redford has no intention of meeting the Bush administration halfway or any part of the way because it would interfere with fund raising by the NRDC and other groups. They have now made the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge their "poster child," replacing the wolf, spotted owl and South American rainforests.

An NRDC mass mailing asks for \$10 a person and includes an appeal letter from Redford. "This is an extremely important fight. If we let the President and Congress plunder our premier wildlife refuge for the sake of oil company profits, then no piece of our natural heritage is safe from wholesale destruction," he says.

Needless to say, an appearance of Redford with Secretary Norton and the California condors would give the wrong impression to people who received the mailing. Why should they send in \$10 for a fight if it appears the NRDC and Bush administration can work together on an issue vitally important to all Americans - solving the nation's energy crisis in a manner that also protects the environment?

For his part, President Bush has taken the high road. During a speech in Minneapolis, he called for harmony between our energy needs and environmental con-

cerns. "Too often, Americans are asked to take sides between energy production and environmental protection, as if people who revere the Alaska wilderness do not also care about America's energy future; as if people who produce America's energy do not care about the planet their children will inherit," he said.

Farmers and ranchers understand best what President Bush is saying because they have to produce from the land while taking care of it for future generations. Farmers also have a huge stake in the current energy debate. They can't produce food and other products without adequate and affordable supplies of diesel, natural gas and electricity.

They also want to be a big part of the solution through ethanol, vegetable oil-based biodiesel and other energy from farms and forests.

The American Farm Bureau Federation supports increased domestic production of oil and gas while encouraging research into all types of alternative energy and fuel development. Farm Bureau also supports nuclear energy. Solar energy, wind power and conservation alone, as favored by environmental groups, cannot meet America's near term needs.

One reason these groups are not giving President Bush a chance with an energy plan is to divert attention from their own role in the crisis. They and their lawyers have blocked domestic production of oil, gas, hydro, coal and nuclear power for years. A comprehensive energy policy would unite the nation against those actions.

Probability high of severe climate change

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. — In the wake of mounting evidence of global warming, decision-makers are wrestling with related policy issues.

Now, researchers at the University of Illinois have shown that the probability of severe climate change is much greater than many scientists or policy-makers had thought. "The size and impacts of anthropogenically induced climate change strongly depend on the climate sensitivity — the change in equilibrium surface warming due to a doubling of the concentration of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere," said Michael Schlesinger, a UI atmospheric scientist. "According to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, the climate sensitivity lies between 1.5 and 4.5 degrees Centigrade."

If the climate sensitivity is less than 1.5 degrees Centigrade, then climate change may not be a serious problem, Schlesinger said. If, however, the climate sensitivity is greater than the IPCC's upper bound, then climate

change may be one of humanity's most severe problems of the 21st century. By judging the likelihood of the climate sensitivity having any particular value — that is, by its probability density function — the crafting of robust adaptive climate-change policy could be greatly facilitated.

Schlesinger and UI atmospheric scientist Natalia Andronova used a simple climate/ocean model and the near-surface temperature record to estimate the probability density function for climate sensitivity. They considered 16 radiative-forcing models, which included such factors as greenhouse gases, anthropogenic sulfate aerosol, solar irradiance and volcanoes. For each model, the changes in global-mean near-surface temperature were calculated for the years 1765 through 1997.

The researchers found that, as a result of natural variability and uncertainty in the radiative forcing, the climate sensitivity could lie between 1 and 10 degrees Centigrade.

"Consequently, there is a 54 percent likelihood that the climate sensitivity lies outside the IPCC range," Schlesinger said. "Our results show that the probability density function very strongly depends on which radiative forcing factors have actually been at work during the period of the temperature measurements," he said. "At present, the most likely scenario is one that includes anthropogenic sulfate aerosol forcing but not solar variation. Although the value of the climate sensitivity in that case is most uncertain, there is a 70 percent chance that it exceeds the maximum IPCC value. This is not good news."

One way to reduce the uncertainty of which probability distribution is the appropriate one to use in impact and policy studies is "to determine whether the sun's irradiance has actually changed during the past 150 years," Andronova said. "Another way would be to consider the net radiative forcing of all the anthropogenic aerosols, not just the sulfate aerosol."

Water rights hearing to wrap up in late June

After five days of listening to expert witnesses testify about the effects of proposed water rights transfers to serve an exclusive golf development off State Highway 48 near Angus, state officials continued the session until June 26.

"I was there May 24 and 25, then again the 29th through the 31st," said Greg Oleson, with Hubbard Enterprises in Palm Desert, Calif., and the point man for the Hideout of Lincoln County golf project. "I think we were able to explain to the hearing officer and let him know there would be no impairment (to the local water supply). Of course, the other sides, both the state and the protestors put on their cases, and attempted to do the same, conversely saying there is going to be impairment."

"So it went as to be expected with all three sides putting on their versions of what they expect to happen if the applications are approved."

He doesn't expect the last day of the Roswell hearing in June to go for more than four or five hours, Oleson said.

The hearing officer, Fred Allen, has up to 90 days to ren-

der an opinion, which then goes to the State Engineer's Office where Tom Turney can either approve or disagree. After that, the losing side can appeal to district court.

"Win, lose or draw, it's to the benefit of all sides to get on with this," Oleson said. "I think all parties are best served by a quick resolution to this thing and if there's going to be an appeal, let's have it in district court and move on."

"We're obviously hopeful we are successful in the hearings process itself and we can begin work on our project. If it happens, that's great. If it doesn't, then we'll address all our options."

The hearing centers on five applications, three of which are upstream transfers. The applicants must show that no adverse effect will result on existing water rights holders, that the transfers are not contrary to public welfare nor contrary to the conservation of water in the state.

The Hideout is represented by A. J. Olsen of Henninghausen and Olsen of Roswell. The high-dollar development - to include a golf course, vacation lodges and other amenities - is being developed by Ruidoso Downs

Property owners seek to stop Hondo Basin transfer

An injunction is being sought by the Ranches of Sonterra Property Owners Association and the Rio Bonito Preserve to block the transfer of water rights by Elevarito and Veronica Gutierrez.

According to the suit filed in Lincoln County District Court in Carrizozo last month, the Gutierrezes claim to own water rights downstream from Sonterra in the Hondo Basin. The rights would be used to irrigate 23.9 acres.

On Jan. 4, 2000, the couple filed an application to change the location of a well and to change the purpose for the use of underground water, the suit states. They sought to sever 58.50 acre feet of the rights from 18 acres of prop-

erty and to move them to three wells in the Hondo Basin for golf course irrigation. The irrigation would occur upstream from all points of diversion for the water rights of Sonterra and Preserve members.

Both groups filed protests with the State Engineer on the proposed transfer, along with other transfers to the same wells for golf course irrigation, the suit states.

The applications and protests were consolidated in a proceeding before the hearings unit of the State Engineer's Office. That proceeding is pending, but the two filers contend the Gutierrezes' water rights already are abandoned.

"A concrete pipeline was constructed during the 1950s to irrigate the 23.0

acres to which the defendant's water rights are (tied)," the suit states. But the two groups contend the water rights haven't been applied to beneficial use on the acreage since the early 1980s.

The land "bears no evidence of cultivation or irrigation," they state in the lawsuit.

The two groups are asking for a declaratory judgment that the water rights are abandoned and for an injunction blocking the transfer of rights to a new point of diversion.

Outlining their legal basis to demand the action, the filers stated that the Sonterra subdivision has no water system.

The Gutierrezes could not be reached for comment.

racetrack owner R.D. Hubbard, who, with his wife, founded the Hubbard Museum of the American West.

Protesters include the federal Bureau of Land Management, the village of Capitan, a group from the historic settlement of Lincoln and residents of the Ranches of Sonterra subdivision.

A sixth application initially denied by the Roswell field

office later was approved by State Engineer Turney, based in Santa Fe.

The applicants are three individuals, one corporation and one limited liability entity. The transfers would go to Rio Bonito LLC, the Hideout development company.

Greg Switzer, one of the key players in the Sonterra property owners group, said he's optimistic about the outcome of the hearing from the

viewpoint of a protester.

"We feel that our science is proving our concerns and that there would be impairment for Sonterra if the golf course went in under their current plan," Switzer said.

"They have to prove there is enough water in these hills so the transfers won't hurt the Bonito (river) or our wells. I think our evidence coupled with the testimony of the State Engineer's representa-

tives says otherwise. Even if they succeed in transferring the rights, they still will have a problem pumping enough for a golf course."

The argument comes down to which experts to believe, he said.

"The State Engineer's experts evaluated the data separately," Switzer said. "It just happens they tend to agree with most of our assessments on this issue."

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Mitchell to stay on in defense of murder suspect

■ The lawyer for Johnny Ray Gutierrez, who is accused in the 1998 slaying of a convenience store clerk, has withdrawn his motion to be removed from the case.

The trial of Johnny Ray Gutierrez remains set for June 28 in Alamogordo now that his attorney, Gary C. Mitchell, is staying on as his legal counsel. Mitchell Friday withdrew a motion to be removed as the accused killer's lawyer. Gutierrez is charged with stabbing to death Ruidoso Allsup's clerk, John Diebler, in August 1998. A court spokesman said that Mitchell and Gutierrez apparently resolved any disagreement. In his motion filed May 29 in the 12th Judicial District Court, Mitchell noted

that he received a copy of a complaint Gutierrez apparently filed against him on May 10 with the state disciplinary board and the state public defender department. Gutierrez alleged in the complaint that Mitchell failed to adequately represent him by failing to obtain Gutierrez' release from jail, failing to answer telephone calls and written inquiries, by neglecting the case, by failing to prevent a change of venue, by failing to stop the state from refiling charges or retrying his case. "Once a complaint is filed against an attorney, the attorney cannot ethically

continue to represent the defendant," Mitchell wrote in the motion. He contended that despite Gutierrez' dissatisfaction, he had fought against the change of venue, continued to gather exculpatory evidence, and was preparing for trial. He filed the motion to withdraw only after receiving the written complaint. He pointed out that he represented

Gutierrez in a jury trial where jurors split 10 for acquittal and two for conviction. Gutierrez has been in jail since Nov. 24, 1998 when he was arrested. The Gutierrez trial will be held in Alamogordo in Otero County with District Judge Karen Parsons presiding. The prosecution was granted a change of venue based on extensive publicity when Gutierrez was arrested and during the first trial. Lawyer Gary Mitchell in a May 29 motion withdrawn Friday.

Downs approves final budget

Trustees give nod to \$33,000 budgeted deficit in utilities

After seven council workshop sessions, Ruidoso Downs trustees last week approved a preliminary fiscal year budget for the year beginning July 1. General fund revenues are estimated to reach \$8.1 million, with gross receipts tax collections making up nearly \$2 million of the projected revenues. Another \$700,000 for the coming fiscal year would be carried over from the prior fiscal year, according to a budget workshop. While budgeted expenditures for village services -

ranging from police and fire protection to streets, village governance and administration, parks and recreation and other non-utility departments - would tap \$2.7 million of the general fund, another \$390,000 to address loan payments or special projects would balance the ledger. Included in the loan repayments is a pay-off of \$88,506 in street paving revenue bonds and the \$20,546 pay-off of a fire truck. Village trustees decided to retire the two loans after an auditor recommended paying off higher interest debt because of increased revenues.

The village's water utility is anticipated to bring in \$280,900, mostly from water charges. Expenditures in the department are listed at \$451,958. Similarly the sewer utility anticipates \$114,600 in revenues. The utility's expenditures are pegged at \$147,752. The two utilities had been mentioned in the 1999-2000 fiscal year audit as enterprise operations that have been operating in the red. The proposed village budget now will be sent to the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration for review.

June 30 will mark Tapia's first bout under promoter King since re-signing

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) — Albuquerque's boxing sons, Johnny Tapia and Danny Romero, are expected to be on a June 30 fight card in Las Vegas, Nev.

The card is being planned, said Bob Goodman, director of boxing for event promoter Don King.

It will be the first event for both Tapia and Romero since they signed with Don King Productions.

Tapia earlier used King as his promoter, winning one of his world championships with King. He then fought for Frank Warren and Top Rank. His last fight, a sixth-round TKO over Guantemoo Gomez in

Albuquerque on March 17, was with Don Chargin Productions.

Tapia (49-2-2), a four-time world champion, is to fight a nontitle bout against two-time world champion Antonio Cermeno (39-3) of Venezuela at Mandalay Bay Resort and Casino. The 10-round fight will be carried by the cable subscription channel Showtime.

Cermeno is a former WBA junior featherweight and former WBA featherweight world champion who has an 11-2 record in title bouts. He was the second opponent listed for Tapia, who originally was to fight Jose Rojas of Venezuela. Romero (41-3-1), a two-time

world champion, is to face Ratanachai Vorapin (40-5) of Thailand in a 10-round nontitle bout. Vorapin has had one title shot, losing to Mark Johnson in 12 rounds in April 1999.

"We're pretty happy," said Danny Romero Sr., Romero's father and trainer. "We were at a make-or-break time in Danny's career. With King promoting Danny, we'll be OK."

"Everything is signed except for a bout agreement," the elder Romero said.

Romero has been tied up in a contract dispute with Frank Warren and never fought for Warren. He is just concluding his contract with King.

Voters want baseball back in Albuquerque

The bond issue was approved by the city, but its new team will play at a familiar site.

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) — Albuquerque voters want professional baseball back in the city and at a familiar site.

The city's residents approved a bond issue last week that will provide up to \$15 million to renovate the 32-year-old Albuquerque Sports Stadium.

Approval of the bond issue was essential to a deal that would bring the Calgary Cannons Triple A franchise to Albuquerque. The renovation of the Sports Stadium is expected to be completed in time for the 2003 season.

Mike Koldyke, principal investor buying the Calgary team, said he was pleased with the outcome of the special election.

"I'm sorry it's not a new sta-

dium, but the important thing is that Albuquerque is getting baseball back," he told the Albuquerque Journal in a phone interview from his Chicago home.

Koldyke plans to move the Cannons to Albuquerque provided the renovated stadium meets the standards of the Pacific Coast League.

Albuquerque was left without a pro baseball team this summer when the Albuquerque Dukes franchise was sold last year to a group in Portland, Ore. The Dukes were members of the PCL and were the top farm team of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

"I think it says that we're ready to be as much as we can be," Mayor Jim Baca said of the vote. "It's a very positive thing. I think this shows we're a can-do city. That we're going to progress, that we're going to become a first tier city."

Unofficial results from Wednesday's special election

showed voters approving the bond issue and voting overwhelmingly in favor of renovating the Albuquerque Sports Stadium rather than building a new stadium.

With votes from all 119 precincts counted, the bond issue was approved by a margin of 56 percent to 43 percent.

The vote totals were 23,888 in favor to 18,457 against the bond issue.

On the second question on the ballot — to renovate the Sports Stadium or to build a new stadium — the voters opted for renovation by a margin of 66 percent to 33 percent. Vote totals there were 27,254 in favor of renovation, with 13,862 voting for a new stadium.

The baseball stadium issue became the biggest topic in New Mexico's largest city in recent months and created heated discussions among residents and politicians.

Baca a favored building a stadium downtown to spur the area's economy, while City Council

Greg Payne was among those who wanted to renovate the existing Sports Stadium at the University of New Mexico sports complex a couple of miles east of downtown.

Payne said people "want to

do things to improve Albuquerque's quality of life, but they don't want any more financial black holes."

"I also like to think there is a sentimental attachment to the old ballpark," he said.

Baca said he was not surprised the voters opted for renovation.

"I didn't harbor much hope that it (a new stadium) would be approved," Baca said. "But this is a victory because we got baseball back."

Gwen Poe, spokeswoman for the Strike Three Committee, which opposed use of the bonds, said renovation is a better choice than a new stadium.

"People support baseball. That's probably the reason for the special election's out-



The campus at Ruidoso High School was a mobile town this week as the U.S. Forest Service's Incident Command Post set up dozens of trailers and tents to provide logistics for fighting the Homestead fire, communications systems and supplies for firefighters — and three healthy meals a day for fire crews.

The Eastern Arizona Incident Management Team of the U.S. Forest Service arrived at the high school about 1 a.m. on Saturday, having had a two-hour call-out time and then a four- to six-hour drive, said Bob Dyson, information officer for the 35-member team. Usually a similar team from New Mexico would be called, but it was occupied in the Guadalupe, so the U.S. Forest Service called the next nearest team.

In addition, between 100 and 200 people are based at the high school, many sleeping in tents dotting the adjacent athletic field.

Between 15 to 18 "professional gypsies" from all over the country prepare and serve the meals for firefighters and

support crews through OK's Cascade, said Willard Watts of Reno, Nev., who works about five fires a year.

One trailer hauls dried foods. A refrigerator trailer hauls frozen food — including rib eye steaks and chicken breast filets, for high-calorie meals for the firefighters. Another trailer has triple sinks, four grills, two ovens and a steam table. In a tent that doubles as the salad bar for the evening meal, crew members fix lunches to take to the fire fighters, and two other tents (three for bigger fires) are set up as dining halls.

"We set up a town," Watts said. "We can serve 5,000 to 6,000 meals a day with this setup."

Firefighters come for breakfast at 5 a.m. and for a high-calorie evening meal between 7 and 9 p.m. and crews pack in lunches for them when necessary.

Laura Escalanti, from Santa Fe and Mescalero, and Velda Garcia, from Mescalero are crew bosses of two of the three Mescalero camp crews that hand out supplies (brought from the U.S. Forest Service in Silver City) to firefighters on the fire line — tools, clothing, hoses. They travel to New Mexico fires, bringing their own 10-member crews with them.

Garcia said the state is divided into regions, and her company and the other seven Mescalero camp crews work the Lincoln zone, which includes Otero and Lincoln counties.

"This is kind of a plush Incident Command Post," Dyson said. "The other team on the Trap and Skeet Fire, they're out in the middle of a meadow and it gets very dusty when the wind kicks up."

Team members sized up that fire, he said, then the Mescalero crews called for a Type 1 or Hotshot team — where property or life is threatened. These are paid, professional firefighters, "in the best shape, the best trained. We had six or eight crews here and basically sent them over to the Skeet (fire).

Most of the crews working at the high

school are Type 2, Dyson said.

"Everybody on the team has had many years experience in and around forest fires," he said. "When you get old enough that you can't walk through the fire, you train to lead the younger guys. We provide the overall leadership for the fire incident."

"There are people specialized in operations — a military term related to how are we going to put this fire out. Other people are simply skilled in firefighting but they're like me, over the hill. We put them in charge of logistics, getting supplies, people, shower trailers and food caterers here on a timely basis to set up the Incident Command Post. Others specialize in communications, work on radio and phone communications."

Dyson said the maximum number of people at the camp at the high school was 460, most of them working on the fire itself and about a fourth of them working to support the firefighters' needs.

The Ruidoso school district's business manager, Caren Snow, said school board policy requires charging a minimal fee of \$300 for the high school facilities, and the Incident Management Team will be charged separately for supplies and phone calls. The team brings along a finance officer to deal with the contract.

"We're glad for them to be here and appreciate their services, but the district is ... not allowed to donate anything ... We need to recoup our expenses," she said.

"The fire has been contained," Dyson said. "It's not out; they're putting out the last of the smoke today (Monday) and tomorrow and maybe on to the future. We call it controlled when it's absolutely out. It's not controlled yet. There are still embers and coals and we have fire engines, a lot of hoses and a 20-person crew now is going from wisp of smoke to wisp of smoke to make sure the fire is out."

By today, the "town" had moved.

Prairie Solution

Home, Sweet Sod Home

Are flowers and grass growing from your roof and walls this summer? If you were a pioneer in the 1850s and 1860s, seeing plants grow from your house would have been normal. Many settlers in Kansas, Nebraska and the Dakotas built their houses out of sod, or dirt with grass growing in it. The strong grass roots held the dirt together, even after it was dug up.

Because plant roots were left in the sod, new growth sprouted each spring and summer. Women even sent away for new flower seeds to plant on their roofs.

Why build with dirt?

There was little else to build with in that part of the world. There were almost no stones close to the surface.

There were few trees, and what trees did grow were usually not good for building.

Settlers might have to travel as far as 40 miles to find wood usable for construction.

The special clay needed for bricks was scarce there. Even when settlers could find clay, there would not be enough wood for fires to make bricks.

Even schools and churches were made of sod.



Many settlers began with a dugout, a kind of cave dug out of a hill. Often they used the hillside as the back wall when they built their sod house.

This cow is not really standing on the roof, but on the hill making up the back wall.

Building a sod house

Tall prairie grasses made it possible to build with sod. The very long roots held the soil together.


Settlers, or "sodbusters," cut only as much sod as they could build with in a day. Sod left over dried out too much for building.

To build a sod house, or "soddie," settlers had to:

- Mow the grass.
- Cut pieces of sod, or "bricks," with a special horse-drawn plow called a grasshopper.
- Lay two layers of bricks lengthwise.
- Lay a third layer crosswise. This crosswise brick pattern made the houses more stable.

- Leave openings for doors and windows in the sod bricks.
- Put a ridgepole and rafters across the top to keep the ceiling up.
- Lay mounds of sod on top.
- Cover windows with paper greased with animal fat. This let some light in, but kept out bugs.
- Hang a blanket in the doorway. Settlers would donate a day of their time to help new people build their house. Without neighbors' help, it could take a week to build a one-room soddie.

One acre of sod was needed to make a one-room house. (An acre is about the size of 1/4 football fields.)

Life in a Soddie

What was good

Sod houses were cozy in the winter. Heat from the fireplace stayed in the house and the thick walls kept out the wind. In very bad winters, many settlers in wooden houses did not survive. People inside soddies stayed warm.

Although the heat from the cooking fires kept the houses warm in the summer too, the dirt walls helped keep the houses cooler than wooden homes.

Soddies were also much safer than wooden houses during tornadoes. Sometimes a tornado would tear off a roof, but the walls stayed up.

In the 1800s there were few trees or buildings to act as windbreaks. The danger from high winds and tornadoes was even greater than today.

Soddies were lifesaving protection against fires. Fire from the cooking stoves was not a big threat, because dirt didn't burn.

However, prairie fires were very dangerous to anyone caught outside. If it was windy, they spread quickly and were almost impossible to put out. One fire could sweep through hundreds of miles of grasslands, often moving faster than a running horse.

What was not so good

Snakes, bugs and globs of mud often dropped into people's beds or food. In some places rattlesnakes made their dens in the walls.

People slept, cooked and lived in one room. All their possessions would be crowded into that one room. In dry weather, settlers got more living space by moving their belongings outside. The outdoors became an extension of the house.

Sod houses leaked in the rain. People complained that the house would continue leaking for days after the rain stopped. Sometimes the only dry spots in the house were the window wells.

Housekeeping

To keep the dust down, women needed to pour water over the floor about once a week. They would then smooth it out and have a new floor.

If they weren't lucky enough to live close to water, they might have to make several mile-long trips back and forth from a neighbor's well.

Making it better bit by bit

At first settlers might cover the dirt walls with newspapers. Many whitewashed the walls to help control the dirt and make the dark house brighter.

They hung a big piece of cloth under the ceiling to catch dirt sprinkling down. Sometimes they used the canvas from the tops of their covered wagons.

When they had more time and money, they plastered over the walls and ceiling to keep dirt from falling off. They bought lumber and put in wooden floors and roofs.

Most settlers wanted to live in a wooden house. They bought lumber and built new houses as soon as they could. The sod house became a toolshed, outhouse or chicken coop.


Although soddies were most popular in the mid-1800s, people built them as late as the 1930s, during the Depression, when many people were too poor to buy housing materials.

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) — Sophomore Zeke Johnson, who sat out three basketball games last season because of NCAA rules and four more for disciplinary reasons, is expected to leave New Mexico an athletic department official said.

Senior associate athletic director Bill McGillis said Friday that Johnson, 21, has

been released from his scholarship.

"It's my understanding he plans to transfer," said McGillis, adding that Johnson cannot transfer anywhere else in the Mountain West Conference or to New Mexico State.

The Baltimore native had to sit out last season's first three

games under NCAA rules because a nonfamily member paid his prep school tuition to Maine Central Institute.

Johnson was suspended for four other games, including the

final two of the season, in disciplinary actions by coach Fran Fraschilla.

The 6-foot-7 small forward averaged 4 points and 2.1 rebounds last season.

"come," she said. "Maybe they're not opposed to corporate welfare."

"Baseball is a business and it should be supported by investors, but we are going to become corporate welfare subsidizers," Poe said.

Baca said renovation of the Sports Stadium will begin as soon as possible.

"It's crucial that we be in the ground by November or December," the mayor said. "It's going to require some fast action by the City Council because the team will be here in April of 2003."

The total cost of renovating the Sports Stadium is expected

to be between \$28.3 and \$30 million. The cost of a new stadium had been placed at between \$30 million and \$33 million.

Lawrence Rael, the city's chief administrative officer, said the city must choose an architect and construction companies within six months.

A detailed structural analysis of the Sports Stadium must be finished. Construction could start by December, Rael said.

Until this summer, Albuquerque had had a pro baseball team almost continuously since 1937. The exceptions were during World War II and in 1959, the year after the Western League folded.
