A peaceful protest

While relatives of patients at the Ruidoso Care Center protested peacefully outside the center Saturday, the state Department of Health was preparing to conduct a review of recent transfers prompted by a letter from the management company

As of Monday, 16 appeals of the transfer notices from Integrated Health Services Inc. were filed with the hearings bureau of the state Department of Human Services, according to a spokesman for that office. One appeal previously was withdrawn.

In a series of community meetings on the issue, relatives repeatedly claimed they were not told of all of the options and appeal procedures open to patients and that discharges did not include a three-day process that included a visit to a potential new destination.

"We have surveyors on site," Roy Weidner, who heads the compliance

'This is her home'

Although Annie Keith, 88, couldn't walk the street outside the Ruidoso Care Center Saturday carrying a protest sign, she joined her son, Clifford in her wheelchair at the protest of patient transfers.

A 44-year resident of Ruidoso who drove until she was 83, Keith has lived at the center on Resort Drive for two years and doesn't want to leave her home community, her son said.

"She's spent so much of her life here. I cared for her for several years and then when she needed it, the care center was there for her," he said. "The staff has really been helpful."

After checking out facilities in Roswell and Alamogordo, "We have appealed her notice of discharge because the reasons IHS

gave were not valid," he said. "This is her home. We would prefer someone else take over management and get Integrated Health Services out of the picture."

Area officials brace for post-fire floods

County, villages, tribe look ahead to effects of rains on Trap and Skeet burn area

The potential flooding resulting from summer rainfall on the area denuded by this month's Trap and Skeet Fire has area officials making contingency plans.

The Lincoln County Commission will be asked today to declare the county a disaster area, allowing state and federal resources and to receive reimbursement for some expenses.

Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson also is likely to issue an emergency declaration because of flooding potential.

The fire started June 2 on the reservation and charred a wide swath between U.S. Highway 70 and Carrizo Canyon Road.

The county's declaration states that "unless immediate remedial action is taken by federal, state and local agencies, it is anticipated that significant damage will occur to roads, power stations, the Inn of the Mountain Gods, the Mescalero Dam, a water treatment facility, businesses and homes in Carrizo Canyon, the habitat of the Rio Ruidoso and the village of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs."

County Manager Tom Stewart met Monday with representatives from the U.S. Forest Service, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the village of Ruidoso and Mescalero Apache Tribal President Sara Misquez and Vice President Fred Chino.

"The thrust with the tribe is what to do with 220 acres of terrain, shaped like a bowl and totally burned and crusted over that lie at the mouth of a canyon that empties into the tunnel at the Inn of the Mountain Gods," Stewart said.

Donaldson said there is potential for Carrizo Canyon to flood.

"Our biggest concern as far as the village of Ruidoso is large debris blocking bridges along Carrizo Creek," Donaldson said. "The tribe will be far more impacted than we are," the mayor said of a major rain over the burn area.

The tribe's Inn of the Mountain Gods and Casino Apache have been identified as in the path of runoff from a 220-acre section of the burn

area. Mescalero public affairs spokesman Ed Moreno said the tribe has determined it would be geographically impossible to directly point potential runoff into Carrizo Creek.

"They would put it into the parking lot of the Inn of the Mountain Gods and then into the lake (Mescalero Lake)," Moreno said. "They had the lake checked out by the Bureau of Reclamation. It's in good shape as far as the dam goes."

An official with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers was expected to be in Mescalero today to deliver a quickly prepared mitigation plan, said corps spokeswoman Joan Mier.

The Bureau of Indian Affairs came to us for a flood fight plan to present solutions," Mier said. "The Inn of the Mountain Gods is in danger of being flooded when the monsoons arrive because it's between the watershed and the lake."

Moreno said efforts to minimize a worst-case rain event will seek to protect both tribal resources and the downstream villages.

The possibility of runoff from the burn area of the Trap and Skeet Fire prompted Mescalero Apache Indian officials to meet with village leaders in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs.

"They presented the worst-case scenario that we should be prepared for," said Bob Miller, mayor of Ruidoso Downs. A map on the wall at village hall highlights Carrizo Creek north of Mescalero Lake to the Rio Ruidoso, and then east along the river through Ruidoso Downs.

"We're prepping for everything," Miller said. "We're preparing people that would be affected in the lower parts of Ruidoso Downs."

Village spokeswoman Karen Jones said the preparations include designating the Ruidoso Downs Senior Center as an evacuation location.

Group seeks AG's investigation of Hondo school board

A statewide group that advocates openness in government has asked for an attorney general's investigation of the Hondo School Board.

In a letter last week to school board president Braulio Alvarado, Robert Johnson, executive director of the New Mexico Foundation for Open Government, wrote that "deficiencies in the agenda and minutes of the Hondo Valley school board's meetings" of March 20 and May 15 resulted in non-compliance with the Open Meetings Act.

"The outstanding example at hand is an unscheduled, improper, and therefore invalid vote on March 20 to extend the contracts of

Principal Ward and Superintendent Casey for a year," the letter states.

Alvarado called the problem an "oversight." Johnson said he received calls from Dennis Nosker, the newest member of the school board, his wife, Beth Nosker, a teacher in the school district, and Rita Dickinson, a candidate for the vacant position on the school board. Johnson asked them to send documentation and they did, he said.

The Open Meetings Act requires, among other things, that agendas state specific items to be discussed or acted upon at a meeting, and the "minutes of the open meeting following the closed session must state that the matters discussed in the closed meeting were limited to those specified

in the motion to close," Johnson wrote.

"Consistently listing general subjects and convening executive sessions for non-specific reasons suggests at best that the board simply wants to go into seclusion to discuss whatever it likes," the letter concluded.

Superintendent Barbara Casey said Clay Burton, a former sixth-grade teacher at the Hondo schools, was appointed principal and is working on his administrative certification.

Johnson said if the attorney general investigates the Hondo School Board and finds that it has violated the Open Meetings Act, it "usually winds up with a reprimand, and usually with instructions to turn over the records promptly."

Alvarado said the agenda problem "was an

oversight, so really, there was not a mistake. We rectified the problem, we fixed it, we had it on the agenda, and we voted on everything that we had done that meeting."

Lawyer John Kennedy, who represents the Hondo Valley Schools, said a school district failing to put an item on the agenda can ratify it subsequently, "can go back and say 'We correct that by ratifying it retroactively.'"

"Bob Johnson gets paid to bird-dog these open meetings issues and he sends them to everybody in the world," Kennedy said.

"And yes, the school board ought to do it right the first time, but it's a very technical issue and it doesn't invalidate any of the actions of the Hondo schools," he said.

# Village to consider subsidy for airline

Ruidoso village councilors are scheduled to discuss and possibly take action on a joint powers agreement that would in part subsidize commuter air service to the area.

The agreement would allocate \$150,000 locally for the air service subsidy, establish joint powers with the Town of Taos and the Village of Taos Ski Valley, and seek a grant from the state to assist in funding the expected July 1 beginning service by Rio Grande Air.

Today's council meeting will be at 6:30 p.m. at village hall.

A state program for the development of air service to rural areas requires matching funds from two or more local entities, Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson wrote to council members. Ruidoso would ante \$150,000 for the subsidy. Donaldson said the federal government Rural Service Air Bill would open a new funding source to reduce the local subsidy matches next year.

Both the Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Casino and Mescalero Apache Enterprises have been approached to par-

ticipate in the subsidy, Donaldson said. Each have been asked to provide \$25,000 toward Ruidoso's share of the program. The mayor's memo to councilors noted Rio Grande Air will allow up to \$50,000 of the \$150,000 to be in the form of pre-purchased air fares.

"I find this proposal to be very credible and cost effective for our citizens," Donaldson said. "The funds would come out of the airport's economic development fund. This fund was established specifically for this purpose some years ago."

The \$200,000 total funding by the Taos and Ruidoso areas would be matched by the State Aviation Division of the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department.

Rio Grande Air CEO Tim Wooldridge said last week that his airline was committed to beginning commuter flights between Sierra Blanca Regional Airport and Albuquerque's Sunport.

Wooldridge is expected to make a presentation on his airline, proposed service levels to Sierra Blanca Regional Airport and time schedules at tonight's council meeting.

division of the licensing and compliance section of the state Department of Health, said Tuesday. "They are looking at the discharges and we have expanded the survey for an in-depth look at the facility."

"This wasn't scheduled. It's a follow up to the discharges."

Typical surveys for compliance are conducted every nine to 15 months and are not announced in advance, he said. This survey is not typical.

Relatives and others concerned about the future of the center in the community were scheduled to meet late Tuesday to continue their fight to keep long-time residents of the Alzheimer and skilled nursing wings in place.

Lending some ammunition to that effort, village Planning Director Joseph Patoskie concluded in a June 8 letter to Mayor Robert Donaldson that

the center was well-maintained and in excellent condition.

That's significant because in IHS's initial letter to relatives about the intended closing of the two wings, the decision was attributed to building structural problems. That reason was echoed by a public relations firm representing the management company, but officials with IHS could not be reached for comment Tuesday.

In his letter, Patoskie wrote that he sent three inspectors to the center on Resort Drive after receiving a request from Village Manager Alan Briley May 28.

A building inspector, electrical inspector and fire code inspector and enforcement officer performed their review June 1.

"While this visit does not constitute an official inspection, it does provide an overview of the condition of the

facility at the present time," Patoskie stated.

The building inspector viewed the kitchen, the mechanical room, sprinkler system, boiler room and dryer room. Settling cracks were found in a few spots, but were deemed not to be of any structural significance, he wrote.

"Concrete pilings were apparently installed in 1999 to stop any further settling," Patoskie stated. "Window and door replacements have not been necessary since then, indicating that the problem has been corrected. The facility was found to have no violations."

The electrical inspector reviewed the generator room, mechanical room and the facility at large, concluding that all were clean, with no safety issues observed. Maintenance logs were current and easy to understand. No violations were found and the same was

reported by the fire code inspector.

"In short, the facility was found to be well-maintained and in excellent condition," Patoskie wrote.

The center was cited for violating the discharge procedures and IHS was directed to prepare a second notification letter with details on appeals. Relatives have 30 days from receipt of that notice to appeal and the process of handling the appeal can take from 30 days to 90 days.

At previous meetings, relatives have acknowledged that being a private company IHS can close whenever it chooses and may be in the midst of a reorganization. The building apparently is owned by The Lyrick Corp.

Center supporters hope to interest another company to take over the center, possibly with some incentives from the village.

# Proposed subdivision gets panel's OK

Planned 24-lot development forwarded to village council with Planning and Zoning Commission's blessing

A proposed subdivision in Eagle Creek Canyon received recommendations for approval Tuesday.

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission and the Lincoln County Planning Commission, in separate meetings, recommended approval to their respective governing bodies.

The Eagle Ridge Subdivision, between Alto's High Mesa Subdivision and Eagle Creek Canyon Road, would create 24 lots on a 124-acre site. The lots would vary

in size from 2.6 acres to 7.5 acres, according to information supplied to the county and village.

"I think we've gone past what is required on this," said D.T. Collins, agent for Eagle Ridge LLC. "There are technical differences between what is required between the county and village," he told Ruidoso's Planning and Zoning Commission.

Because of the review process at the county level, the village commission removed several village ordinance requirements.

"You can apply strict village standards within the three

miles," Ruidoso said of the village's authority in a three-mile buffer zone outside the village limits. "But there are no village services that will be needed so will apply."

Roads would be gravel surfaced, which the developer stated would comply with county standards.

Collins said the subdivision would provide a second way into and out of Alto by way of Eagle Creek Canyon Road.

The subdivision lots would

be served by domestic wells and septic systems.

Final approval of plats could be before the Ruidoso Village Council on June 18. The Lincoln County Commission may make its decision on June 21.

The village review is required because the subdivision in the county is within Ruidoso's three-mile planning and platting jurisdiction.

The commission's recommendation will be considered by the village council today.

# Military exercises to get under way Thursday

■ Roving Sands, the world's largest joint-theater air and missile-defense exercise, will include operations near Bingham, Carrizozo and Capitan.

American military forces, playing opposition roles, will stage a major exercise near Bingham, Carrizozo and Capitan June 14-24.

About 40 Air Force members from four states will join thousands of troops at White Sands Missile Range for Roving Sands, a joint military exercise conducted in parts of New Mexico and southwest Texas.

Roving Sands, the world's largest joint-theater air and missile-defense training

exercise, will include about 15,000 soldiers from all services, including 400 troops from Canada, Germany, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom as well as observers from Israel and Turkey.

Led by members of the Joint Theater Attack Analysis Center from Kirtland Air Force Base, they will "disappear" into the countryside north of White Sands with a Scud missile launcher, which was the main offensive weapon used by Iraq against American and Allied forces during Desert Storm in 1991.

The "enemy" forces will simulate theater ballistic missile launch operations, while "friendly" forces will try to locate them.

A Scud mobile ballistic missile will be mounted on an eight-wheeled transporter erector launcher for the exercise.

Missiles will have no fuel or explosives and only simulated launches will be accomplished in off-base areas, according to the office of public affairs at Kirtland in Albuquerque.

Taking part in the exercise as enemy forces will be National Guardsmen and Reservists from New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado and Nevada. Included will be augmentees from the 150th Fighter Wing at Kirtland.

Major command centers will be at four locations throughout the United States including White Sands Missile Range.

The exercise is designed to train U.S. forces on the tactics, techniques and procedures needed to detect, identify and attack an enemy mobile missile force like the one in Iraq used against coalition forces during Desert Storm.

# ETZ property owners get new guidelines to ponder

Property owners in the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zone have some new guidelines to use in developing plans for their land.

Emphasizing that more changes may be needed, the three-member ETZ Authority Monday approved revisions and additions proposed by board attorney Charles Rennick and County Attorney Alan Morel with a few revisions. Last year, the board approved a first phase of changes that switch enforcement responsibility for the 1-mile zone around Ruidoso from the county to the village.

Chairman L. Ray Nunley, a county commissioner, pledged that for the next six months the authority will meet on a regular basis to complete the revamping of the ordinance.

The move this time was sparked by several applications for recreational vehicle parks, which, while defined in the ordinance, were not covered under development standards or as allowable uses.

Instead of falling back on Ruidoso's zoning ordinance, the ETZ Authority instructed the attorneys to draft rules specifically for the zone, a chore they completed in less than two months.

While the village ordinance design-

ates four different types of commercial districts, ETZ rules contain one broad commercial label. The new rules delineate between absolutely acceptable uses in the district, called primary uses that are neighborhood commercial activity, and provides for "conditional" uses of a more intense commercial nature with specific additional requirements, Rennick explained.

The new provisions were tailored to the major corridors in the zone, Gavilan Canyon, Carrizo Canyon and State Highway 48, he said.

The section on industrial districts was changed to allow uses overlooked elsewhere to be accepted there

as conditional.

Definitions in the ordinance now include convenience stores and car washes. Size of retail businesses was restricted to 5,000 square feet to ensure that larger retail operations would need conditional approval with special additional requirements. Real estate agent Barbara Willard said more people should have attended the public hearing to ensure their property plans aren't impacted by the changes. But after being assured the meeting was properly advertised, she said, "I guess that's their fault" for not coming.

Carolyn Henson urged the board not to encourage the paving of land

along the corridor and to maintain some of the more rural atmosphere. She specifically referred to RV Parks and storage, saying gravel roads would serve those businesses sufficiently.

Rennick said drainage requirements are covered in the rules and that, while landscaping is mandatory for erosion prevention and eye appeal, specifics of how that is accomplished are not dictated.

The board dropped requirements for pad sizes, for a recreational center and for a certain percentage of green space.

Screening for junkyards and similar businesses will be required.

# No 'hidden agenda,' insist volunteer members as they defend the ETZ Commission

Two members of the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Commission objected Monday to a characterization of their board as having a politically motivated "hidden agenda."

County Commissioner William Schwettmann made the remarks while criticizing the way two cases were handled by the ETZ Commission. Schwettmann serves as one of two county commissioners on the ETZ Authority, which handles appeals and adopts changes in the ordinance. The

third member is Ruidoso Village Councilor Linda Flack, who also took exception to Schwettmann's comments.

Schwettmann did not respond at the meeting, but Tuesday said he spoke based on his perception that the ETZ Commission is insensitive to property owners along corridors that some members want to see developed with big money.

The meeting Monday focused on changes to the ETZ rules to fill gaps in its coverage, a lapse that blocked the ETZ Commission from approving some applications.

"Quit criticizing a volunteer board," Flack told

Schwettmann. "Unlike you, they aren't paid."

ETZ Commissioner Phillis Barnett told the authority she is an unpaid volunteer who has no hidden agenda or political ambitions.

"I do this because I love to help," she said. "I thank you so much for the passage of these changes ... we have been struggling because we didn't know what we could or couldn't do."

Frank Higgins objected to the board being "maligned." "We tried to do what we could," he said. "We turned down applications based on legal advice. I have no political ax to grind and I'm not getting paid."

He said that if someone doesn't like how the ETZ commission operates, they should come to meetings and offer input.

Speaking Tuesday, Schwettmann said, "All they do is criticize people. I felt they were being pompous about everything and ignoring the people's feelings in the corridor (along Gavilan Canyon and State Highway 48)."

"It's a selfish thing as far as I'm concerned."

Schwettmann said he's heard comments about how some less attractive businesses could be eliminated along the corridor.

"They can say anything they

want and trash people like they were second-class citizens," he said. "And there is politics in it. It's the golden rule. Those who have the gold, rule. As the property becomes more valuable, junkyards will disappear.

"They don't even think of the people they're hurting. I guess I've been too long in politics. I'm getting soft. I have a short fuse."

**ARE HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE AND AMD LINKED?**

According to a recent study by the University Medical Center in Stony Brook, New York, people with high blood pressure may be at an increased risk of developing age-related macular degeneration (AMD). This is a disease that results in a progressive loss of vision due to deterioration of nerve tissue in the retina. Although a few risk factors for this condition have been confirmed, the researchers did determine that high blood pressure, or hypertension, is associated with the development of AMD.

Of the two forms of AMD, non-neovascular and neovascular, it is the neovascular form which accounts for 90% of severe vision loss. The researchers determined that patients with advanced macular degeneration were more likely to have high blood pressure, compared with the subjects in the normal 'control' group. For the purposes of this study, high blood pressure was defined as a diastolic pressure greater than 95 millimeters of mercury. "Neovascular AMD cases were more than 4 times as likely to have elevated diastolic blood pressure...than controls, and the (odds ratio) was much higher among persons with these pressure levels who were also using (high blood pressure) medication," the researchers write. Non-neovascular AMD does not seem to be associated with high blood pressure.

While there is no cure for AMD, exciting surgical techniques to repair the damaged retina are in the early stages of research. The National Eye Institute of the National Institutes of Health is supporting an ongoing study on the relation between macular degeneration and certain antioxidant vitamins. The hope is that the vitamins can lessen the occurrence and severity of the disease. Anster grid testing is used to detect early signs of AMD.

## When highways aren't happy ways

Ruidoso and the valley split on U. S. 70 widening

**M**ore public hearings about the widening of U. S. 70 between Ruidoso Downs and Riverside last week brought predictable outpourings:

Ruidoso people want it. Valley people don't. And they're organizing to try to bring the 37-mile project to a halt before it starts, in the name of safety and preservation of a rural lifestyle.

It isn't hard to sympathize with the 200 who protested at the meeting in Hondo; they'll

feel the impact from years of work, not to mention likely condemnation of property.

But...\$82 million is being spent to upgrade 12 miles of U.S. 70 east of Las Cruces, and millions more for 70 miles of U.S. 54 north of El Paso. Lincoln County is in the path of the most direct highway route from between the upper Midwest, El Paso and Mexico.

It seems to us that economic imperatives simply will not allow a Lincoln County bottleneck on U. S. 70.

## Now it's 'entremanuanship'

At the American Farm Bureau Watershed Heroes Conference in Amana, Iowa, new technologies like near infrared diffuse reflective spectroscopy or NIRS shared the spotlight with old technologies like composting manure and planting trees. NIRS is a tool for precision nitrogen fertilizer management.

The National Soil Tilth Lab at Iowa State University is working with it as a real time, on-the-go soil analysis for farmers.

"If something is smelling, it needs to be changed," is Stacie Johnson's advice in caring for babies or composting manure. Johnson's company, Organic Matters, promotes vermicomposting or composting with red worms. She is trying to get more farmers interested in what she calls "entremanuanship," adding value to manure through composting. Her methods save time in composting and yield a product that's in demand by gardeners, landscapers and construction contractors.

Richard Hartman of Portland, Ore., spent 15 years developing a patented process to take the odor out of manure. His Stable-N lime nitrogen is used in small amounts to speed composting of wet manure.

Tom Menke of Greenville, Ohio, has built a thousand head hog high-rise as a research facility. Hogs live on the top floor of the two-story building. The ground floor is a system for collecting solid manure. Menke believes it is superior to liquid manure systems.

These are just a few examples of the nearly 40 presentations that were made at the three-day conference which included field

exercises and stream bank demonstrations. The participants were farmers and professionals from government, universities and agribusiness. With farm commodity prices generally low and energy prices rising, farmers are feeling a tremendous squeeze, but they maintain their enthusiasm for solving environmental problems and conserving resources. In fact, farmers are innovative enough to seize opportunity from adversity whenever they can.

Lou Licht, president of Ecotree, studied trees for biomass energy production years ago, and now interest has come around again. Licht says trees can play a role in producing energy but will not replace a cheap fuel like coal. Instead, he encourages farmers to plant hybrid poplars in buffer strips for their environmental benefits, particularly in reducing storm runoff.

When the fast-growing trees reach a circumference of 12 inches they can be harvested for furniture-quality poplar. The branches and what's left of the log can be chipped and used for fuel.

"Thanks to the work of the last 20 years, there is very good technology. Gassifiers are what I like. You can take a wood chip harvested this morning, burn it in a gassifier this afternoon and generate very high-quality, clean heat," says Licht.

Five years of Watershed Heroes conferences sponsored by the American Farm Bureau have prepared farmers for improving the health of watersheds, monitoring water quality for themselves, and working with other stakeholders in the watershed. The success stories shared here almost always include voluntary action, production efficiency and farmer profitability.

## Bush promises help to Steelworkers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United Steelworkers of America found an unlikely ally in the Oval Office last week. Along with steel executives and legislators from steel-producing states, the union had been lobbying for an investigation of low-priced foreign steel. President Bush announced Tuesday that he would request the inquiry. The next day, Commerce Secretary Donald Evans was treated as a hero by the union at a midday rally here. Bush also promised to negotiate a worldwide cut in steel production.

The Pittsburgh-based union, which represents 700,000 workers, including 180,000 who work in steel and iron-producing facilities, rarely has close ties to the GOP. In 1999-2000, for example, 98 percent of the \$1.2 million it gave to candidates went to Democrats, accord-

ing to records filed with the Federal Election Commission.

The union's allies, though, have supported Republicans. Steel companies gave \$2.7 million to federal candidates during the same period, \$2.1 million of it to Republicans.

Industry executives also opened their wallets. USX Corp. Chairman Thomas J. Usher gave \$19,500 to GOP candidates and political action committees that contribute mostly to Republicans. AK Steel Corp. Chairman Richard Wardrop donated \$10,500 to Republican candidates and political action committees that give mostly to GOP candidates.

Unions and steel companies have been pleading for help since the American steel industry started its decline in the mid-'70s. The recent problems started in the late '90s when the collapse of the Asian economy caused a flood of exports to the United States.

American companies claimed that the imported steel was sold at artificially low prices.

The Clinton administration rejected the request for help. Former Clinton adviser Gene Sperling said they found insufficient evidence to win the case before the International Trade Commission.

"Nobody wants to bring a case and lose because that could be interpreted as a green light for bad practices by our steel importers," said Sperling.

Bush sees it differently. "The U.S. steel industry has been affected by a 50-year legacy of foreign government intervention in the market and direct financial support of their steel industries," he said Tuesday. "Absent strict disciplines barring government support for inefficient steel-making capacity, the problems confronting the U.S. steel industry and the steel industry worldwide will only recur."

### Lost hiker rescued; no GPS

A lost hiker, who stopped in the area while on his way to a Global Positioning System seminar, was retrieved Monday from the White Mountain Wilderness area.

The hiker, Daniel Moulin, 51, of Boston, Mass., notified police by cellular phone about 2 p.m. Sunday that he was lost.

"Nobody knew where he had gone," said Victoria Allen, New Mexico State Police coordinator with White Mountain Search and Rescue. "He didn't tell anyone where he was going. If not for that cell phone, nobody would have known he was gone."

Allen said Moulin, who was reportedly on his way from Arizona to Albuquerque, decided to stop at Ski Apache for a hike.

He walked up Trail 15 from Ski Apache about 7:10:30 a.m. Sunday. By early afternoon he had lost the trail and couldn't find his way back, Allen said.

Moulin spent the night in estimated 40-degree temperatures. Monday, searchers called in a New Mexico State Police helicopter.

"I was talking to the subject on the cell phone at the same time," Allen said. "I told him to tell me when the helicopter was directly overhead. I told him the helicopter couldn't see him in the trees."

Allen said a set of coordinates was derived from the helicopter location and a search team hiked in late Monday afternoon.

Moulin, who rested Monday, departed Ruidoso Tuesday for the scheduled seminar in Albuquerque.

### Subdivision regulations up for review in special meeting

Revisions to Lincoln County's subdivision regulations that would impose stricter requirements for community water and sewer systems will be considered during a special county commission meeting today in Carrizozo.

County Attorney Alan Morel submitted 10 pages of proposed changes at the direction of commissioners and the request of the county planning board.

The effect of the changes would be to require all private roads to be built to county standards no matter how many lots are contained in a development, and to require performance bonds on any subdivision with private roads without regard to the total number of lots.

The county planning unit also has recommended that a section dealing with required improvements be changed to reflect that all subdivisions with 100 or more parcels must install community water systems. Members also would like to see subdivisions with lots smaller than one acre be required to have a community sewer system, Morel wrote.

The current requirement for

a sewer system is placed on subdivisions with lots smaller than three-quarters of an acre. Water systems are tied to lot size in relationship to the total number of lots.

The commission meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. in the courthouse.

Other items on the agenda include:

- A discussion of Senate Bill 1 by Chairman Rex Wilson. The rancher attended a meeting in Clondroft on the bill that would give counties a controlling hand in how, when and who thin the forests around their towns. The county has set aside \$5,000 for a study in coordination with Otero County.

- A request to approve implementation of provisions in House Bill 565 by County Treasurer Joan Park, which will allow her to obtain commission approval of issuing checks instead of warrants, using the treasurer's signature instead of the county clerk's signature and to use direct deposit.

- Action on a bid to install a water softener system in the new county detention center. County Manager Tom Stewart continues to recommend awarding the contract to the low bidder, Culligan of Las Cruces for \$11,645. Last month, another bidder suggested that the size of pipe proposed by that company would impede the water flow in sections of the new county detention center.

- Action on submitted expenditures from the Lincoln County Lodgers Tax Committee. The requests include \$1,000 by Laura Doh to use for advertising the Pinestock Music, Wine and Beer Event.

- A departure from past practices is outlined in a letter to county lodgers

tax chairman Jeremy Jordan from Stewart, who wrote that the tax fund started with a cash balance this year of \$72,887 and the estimated income is \$66,700.

In a review of state statutes, he found that the law allows money from the tax to be used for purchasing, operating and maintaining the county fairgrounds and exposition buildings that are tourist related structures.

He proposed that from the committee's \$137,887 balance, the coun-

ty spend \$19,600 to operate the county fairgrounds through a contract with the fair association, \$19,500 to operate the Glencoe Rural Events Center through a contract with the Honda School District, \$28,500 to buy six lots to expand parking at the fairgrounds in Capitán and \$8,000 as a one-time expenditure to buy two water systems to water the arenas at Glencoe and the fairgrounds.

The purchases would leave the committee with \$62,387 for the 2001-2002 fiscal year, he wrote.

### Meeting scheduled tonight

### Village council to consider public intoxication section

Meeting tonight, the Ruidoso village council is scheduled to discuss a possible addition to the village's disorderly conduct ordinance. The council could schedule a public hearing on the ordinance change. The amendment would add a subsection dealing with public intoxication.

Ruidoso Police Chief Larry G. Maddox, in a memorandum, wrote that the village does not have provisions dealing with those under the influence of alcohol or other substances. The addition, he said, would allow officers to transport individuals to their residences or to the care of friends or family members instead of costly incarceration. Criminal citations could be issued to those intoxicated in public.

In other agenda items, the council may take action dealing with penalties for starting a fire in the village limits. Council member Bob Storch requested the discussion regarding accidental or arson fires. Discussion might include outdoor smoking.

The village may partner with the New Mexico State Forestry Division and Bureau of Indian Affairs to keep a sin-

gle engine air tanker stationed at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport. The tanker would cost each entity \$16,000 and would be available in the event of a wildfire through the end of July. Action could be taken by the council at the meeting.

- A renaming of a portion of Kansas City Road to honor former council member Ovella Estes will be considered.

- An additional \$15,000 in funding from the village's lodgers tax for advertising in the wake of the Trap and Sleet Fire will be determined by councilors. The money would be used to counteract the negative publicity of the fire, an agenda item stated.

- A one-year renewal of the village's marketing and advertising program is proposed for Grindstone Graphics and Marketing Services Inc.

This meeting is scheduled to begin at 6:30 p.m. at village hall, 518 Cree Meadows Drive. The meeting was rescheduled to today from Tuesday to avoid conflict with last night's Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce awards banquet.

# More water bonds, not taxes

The village of Ruidoso is set to issue about \$2.86 million in water bonds, but residents won't see any new tax.

The bonds are to be paid off by a supplemental 1 percent gross receipt tax already in place through a 1999 authorization by voters to issue up to \$5 million in water bonds for capital improvements. Two existing bond issues are due to be paid off in 2002 and 2003, Mayor Robert Donaldson said during a council meeting late last month.

The bulk of the new issue will be used to pay for removing, upgrading and relocating utilities that occurred as the village's portion of the State Highway 48 expansion and reconstruction project, Village Manager Alan Briley said.

A hearing on the ordinance allowing the village to move ahead is set for the council's meeting June 26.

The village's expenses connected to the highway project came to about \$2 million, Briley said. The remaining portion of the bond revenue will be funneled to water-related capital improvements, leaving about \$1.8 million for future needs, he said.

He anticipates a major water plant renovation in 2004 because of changes in the

regulations of the Environmental Protection Agency.

The villages of Raton and Ruidoso are the only two in the state with the authorization for the special 1 percent gross receipt tax. The village chose a 30-year payback period because that coincides with the life of the water lines, Briley said.

If the village tried to pay for the improvements through monthly rates, the base would increase steeply, Donaldson said.

The village insures the bonds, which means if the gross receipts tax revenues ever dip too low to cover the debt, the insurer will make up the difference.

## Budget sent to state

In other financial business, the council approved the village's preliminary \$20.3 million budget for 2001-2002 to be sent to the state Department of Finance and Administration. A final budget isn't put together until end-of-year cash balances are available after June 30.

According to a schedule submitted by Finance Officer Lorri McKnight, the final budget will be reviewed by the council July 24 and must be sent back to the state by July 30.

Pointing out that revenues are esti-

mated at \$23.8 million, about \$2.5 million less than expenses, Briley explained the difference primarily reflects capital improvement money carried over from fiscal year to fiscal year.

That situation occurs because the fiscal year ends June 30, which falls in the middle of the weather cycle suitable for construction, he said.

Donaldson noted that this year's budget was about \$30 million. The proposed budget represents a significant reduction and he expects to see another drop in the 2002-2003 budget.

McKnight's breakdown shows general government management consuming about \$1.5 million and public safety accounting for \$4 million. The biggest chunk goes to public works such as the airport, utilities, streets and solid waste at \$8.34 million. Capital improvements are budgeted at \$5.7 million and debt service will hit \$2.79 million.

Community welfare, covering recreation, the public library, the convention center and cemetery is at the low end with \$2.1 million and village services such as vehicle maintenance, purchasing and engineering are budgeted for \$685,970.

The village is projecting an ending cash balance in June of \$6 million.

# Ruidoso, Capitan libraries receive grants

The Ruidoso Public Library will receive a \$4,128 grant and the Capitan Public Library a \$3,866 grant through the state to buy books and for continuing education.

The state Legislature appropriates the money, which is administered by the New Mexico State Library through its annual Grants-in-Aid to Public Libraries program.

The purpose of the grants program is to provide money to help encourage and support public library service. State aid is based on the amount of funding available, which will be \$350,000 for 2002, the per capita size of population the library serves and operations and services information.

To receive state aid, a public library must meet a set of basic requirements. This year, 64 libraries are eligible for the aid grants and seven libraries could receive state help based on their status as developing libraries.

Sixty-two public libraries exceeded the \$1.50 local spending per capita eligibility criterion, resulting in \$56,575 of matching collection grants going to them.

Each qualifying library received \$1,823 to buy books for its collection and another \$1,000 for continuing education. After distribution of other grant categories, \$90,309 remained for per capita grants, which also were awarded to 64 public libraries, including Ruidoso and Capitan.

# Very Large Array facility to undergo expansion

SOCORRO — The Very Large Array radio astronomy observatory on the San Agustin Plains about 50 miles west of Socorro is designated to be upgraded and expanded by the National Science Foundation.

U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici announced the foundation's intent last week. Domenici, a Republican from New Mexico, gained the information from Dr. Rita Colwell, NSF director, who testified about foundation budget priorities in FY2002 before the Senate Veterans

Affairs, Housing and Urban Development, and Independent Agencies Appropriations Subcommittee.

Domenici secured \$5 million last year and the Bush administration's budget requests this year include a recommendation that Congress provide another \$5 million for 2002 to continue improvements.

"The VLA continues to make new discoveries about our universe and the work to expand its capabilities will only add to its record of accomplishments,"

Domenici said in a news release from his office. "I will work to see that this funding is included in the FY2002 VA-HUD appropriations spending bill this year. We have the technology now to increase the power of the VLA by 10 times its present capacity."

The array, composed of 27 antennas arranged in a Y-shaped pattern, is used primarily by astronomers from around the world. It also is used in atmospheric and weather studies, satellite tracking and other scientific endeavors.

The array is one of the

National Radio Astronomy Observatories, and is operated by a consortium of universities.

Domenici also indicated he has asked for \$3.5 million to fully fund Phase 2 of the Atacama Large Millimeter Array, an astronomical telescope being developed in part at the VLA in South America to provide clear and detailed images of the formation of galaxies, stars and planets.

The Bush budget included \$9 million of the \$12.5 million needed for the second phase of the project.

## Local ex-golf pro affected by crippling disease

Stephen Fey, a former golf pro at Alto Lakes, was struck with viral encephalitis in 1987.

In early 1987, Stephen Fey was married with two young children and had believed his life-long dream by becoming the head golf pro and owner of

the golf shop at Alto Lakes.

Less than a year later, he was in a coma fighting for his life.

Fey, now 43, had contracted viral encephalitis, an inflammation of the brain, although none of the doctors working with him knew it.

Care Center, the younger Fey's current residence.

He owned the pro shop, had it made, on top of the world, everybody loved him," said Fey's father, Stephen Fey Sr. in an interview at Ruidoso.

But the world turned upside down for Fey. In 1987, he became seriously ill and had to be taken to Presbyterian Hospital in Albuquerque. He went into a coma there and did not wake up until January 1988, after he had been transferred to Healthcare Rehabilitation Center in Austin, Texas for a coma treatment program.


Fey's wife divorced him and

moved with their children to Oldahoma while Fey was still in his coma in Austin. Their daughter, Natalie, is now 18 and son, Stephen Richard, is 14. They get to see him about once a year, Fey's parents said.

While in his coma, Fey contracted meningitis, double pneumonia and blood poisoning. But he pulled through.

## Fishing report for Ruidoso area as of June 11, 2001

**Ruidoso River:** The river was stocked this past week and should provide some fun fishing in your favorite streamside spots. The best subsurface fly selections for caddisflies are Brown's Tendon, the Dead Head Phasmatid Tail nymphs or Dead Head Prince Nymphs, Green Rock Worms and

Dead Head Case! Caddis Larva continue as producing patterns. A few sporadic caddis hatches continue to come off near evening, so be sure to pocket a few 26 Hair Caddis dry flies.

**South Fork:** Not any change from last week. The flow rate is high and the fish are just waiting for the Monsoons to hit. One still needs to hike a ways up the stream to find fish. Once found they are healthy and hungry. The fish here are too fussy. Caddis dry flies and small nymphs

of just about any pattern will work here. **Benito Lake:** The Lake was stocked this past week and should offer some fun fishing. Small dark colored dry flies continue to produce just before dark on the main lake body. A damselfly nymph tied as a dropper behind your dry fly offering may bring an unexpected take. For the spin cast fisherman, try a hot pink, renegade pattern propeller fly or a black with grizzly hackle propeller fly behind a bubble rig.

**Eagle Lakes:** These lakes are now open. The fishing has reported doing well. The day fee has gone up to \$10.00 per day per person. Reason given is since the fish hatchery in Mesalero is closed, costs of transporting fish from as far away as Arizona have to be covered.

Damselfly patterns have been working along with Black Hummer dry flies. **Grindstone Lake:** Grindstone Lake is full. The water level is at an all time high. Since a good number of anglers are 8 to 10 feet and still have on, Damselfly and Dragon fly imitations have been working well. For spin casters, fly or an Olive or Black propeller behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the larvae down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water.

**Weka Reservoir:** The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark wacky bugs continue to take fish here in the deep. Remember to get your dry flies off the front desk. The Trap and Sweet Fly is out. Now the real work begins: how to mitigate the damage? Remember the fish and debris will run down hill. Downhill in this case may be a disaster in the making. Canyons Creek and the Ruidoso River may stand in the path. If help is needed to repair the damage, let's all volunteer to help save these cold water fisheries.

seemed normal. His speech and muscle control were fine, he remembered everything from the time before his illness. It did not last though, as his eyesight, hearing, sense of balance and speech worsened considerably, all effects of the disease. The elder Feys, both in their 70s now, brought him home in 1989 and took care of him in their house for 10 years before putting him in Ruidoso Care Center.

"We checked everywhere in central Texas, New Mexico, all over, and we finally decided this the best one around here," Stephen Feys Sr. said.

Feys can walk, but needs people on each side to support him because of his loss of balance. As a result, he spends most of his time in a wheelchair.

While nobody knows how he got the illness, his mother,

Lucille, said she has an idea.

"He had some golf buddies and they said, 'We went to a tournament in El Paso with him, and mosquitoes were all over the place,' so we're all assuming he was bitten by a mosquito," she said.

While the care center is currently the hub of controversy with its upcoming partial closure, Feys' parents have been assured that he will not have to be moved.

Although Feys can not physically function, his parents say that his mind is fit. He recognizes people he knew before and those he has met since the disease, and enjoys it whenever his old friends come to see him, the Feys said.


