

Rains dampen fire threat

Heavy rains and sleet showered some parts of the Ruidoso area over the past several days while other locations tallied little precipitation.

Rain fell hard Monday on Ruidoso's southeast side, putting 2 to 4 inches of water on some streets. On U.S. Highway 70 near the entrance to Camelot Mountain, debris washed across the roadway.

Across town, at the Ruidoso Police Department complex on Mechem Drive, just 0.17 of an inch was recorded Monday. In Ruidoso Downs, just less than 0.1 inch was registered, said Tom Armstrong,

village emergency manager.

"We've not gotten much more than to raise the dust," Armstrong said.

"We can tell from radar some areas have certainly gotten a lot more," said Charlie Liles, chief meteorologist with the National Weather Service at Albuquerque. "We're at that stage where we see a pretty good into tropical moisture and the Mexican monsoons."

Liles said the chance for rain is expected to diminish the rest of

this week and return next week.

What some are calling a two-week jump on the monsoon season has helped the Lincoln National Forest around Ruidoso.

"Fuel moistures are going up,"

"Fuel moistures are going up," said Steve Bumgarner, assistant fire management officer for the forest's Smokey Bear Ranger District. "There has been some significant moisture throughout the district, though some areas are still dry."

Bumgarner said less precipitation has fallen in the Capitan to White Oaks region. And even as close as the Bonito area, rainfall

has been less than immediately around Ruidoso.

The rains prompted the Smokey Bear Ranger District to move the fire danger down a notch from extreme to very high.

"But we're not lifting any restrictions," Bumgarner said. "We'll get through the Fourth of July and look then," he said of the severe fire restrictions that remain in place.

Ruidoso street department director J.R. Baumann is urging residents to keep their raked-up pine needle piles out of roadside ditches.

"Put them by the dumpsters but not in the ditches," he said.

Downs executive sessions violate law, watchdog says

Village council agendas do not comply with the state Open Meetings Law, according to the head of the state Foundation for Open Government.

The village of Ruidoso Downs is violating state law dealing with its posting of council meeting executive sessions, charged the head of a New Mexico government watchdog organization.

Robert Johnson, executive director of the Foundation for Open Government, called the method of listing an executive session on meeting agendas improper.

"Those agendas do not comply with the New Mexico Open Meetings Act," Johnson said. "The law says the agenda has to identify a specific item."

For months, the village council meeting agendas have included a line titled "Executive Session (If Necessary)." And three areas, personnel matters, acquisition of property and threat of litigation, have been included as subheadings under the Executive Session line.

As an example, Johnson said to go into a closed session for a personnel issue, the agenda must include a

vague detail of the subject matter. He said including words that state "for disciplinary reasons" or to "review a new hire" would be acceptable and necessary language.

Johnson was also at odds with Ruidoso Downs adding, in parentheses on the executive session agenda line, "if necessary."

"That's just a cover-your-(self) kind of thing in case someone wants to talk about something away from the public," Johnson said.

Village of Ruidoso Downs Attorney Dan Bryant said if it is necessary, the agenda dealing with executive sessions will be changed.

"I think I can certainly see that," Bryant said of Johnson's stand on the "if-necessary" qualifier of executive sessions.

Bryant however defended not providing detail beyond what has been listed as session sub-

headings. "The attorney general's office and appellate courts have made it perfectly clear that attorney-client privilege gives to public entities the same rights that private citizens have," Bryant said. He added that most governmental panels list areas for executive sessions right out of state statutes, as does Ruidoso Downs.

"And these (the three subheading issues) would be the things that come up most often," Bryant said.

Meeting spotlights area fires

Domenici to be in town Monday to talk fire plan

Fire dangers and fuel reduction efforts on public lands will take center stage next week in Ruidoso.

An oversight field meeting, to discuss the implementation of the National Fire Plan in New Mexico, will be held by U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., at 1 p.m. Monday at the Ruidoso Convention Center.

The plan seeks to prevent a repeat of last year's devastating fire season.

Domenici said in an announcement of the meeting that a vital part of the National Fire Plan is the reduction of dangerous fuel loads where communities abut forest lands.

He said the Ruidoso meeting's goal is to encourage a broad discussion of the financial, legal and regulatory challenges faced by agencies and local communities in reducing hazardous fuel loads through a combination of fuel breaks, logging and prescribed burns.

The meeting will include three panels made up of local, county, state and national officials and will focus on fire dangers on public lands.

State ends school board impasse at Hondo, appoints Jimenez

Hondo's turbulent search for a school board member ended Friday, when the State Board of Education selected Hondo sculptor Luis Jimenez, who will be sworn in at the 6 p.m., July 17 regular board meeting.

The state's Accreditation, Intervention and Management Support Unit chose an ad hoc committee to review applications and interview applicants June 7 and made unanimous recommendations to the SBE to select Jimenez.

Rita Dickinson and Corinne Prudencio, both parents, also applied for the position, which has been vacant since the school board election in February. The school board tied in a vote between Jimenez and Dickinson at the April 20 board meet-

ing, and the matter was turned over to the state.

Jimenez said he was pleased about the outcome, but knows a lot of work is involved in serving on the school board.

"We've got to change the way some of the things have been done historically here, because what has been done historically isn't working," he said. "It's not going to make any of us on the school board very popular, because nobody likes change. If all of us grew when we wanted, we'd all be 3 feet tall. We grow kicking and screaming."

Jimenez, whose children attend the Ruidoso Municipal School District, said Hondo students are not equipped to compete in the world.

"They are coming out of there and in the last few years have been graduating with a fifth- or sixth-grade reading level. It doesn't equip them to go on to college and continue to develop."

Jimenez worked in education when he was younger, working with the New York City school board as city coordinator in Harlem, South Bronx and the Lower East Side during times of civil unrest. He also taught for three years at a junior high school in a high-risk area of El Paso, and was on the board of the American Civil Liberties Union.

"I'm coming full circle," he said of his return to education through the school board appointment. Superintendent of Schools Barbara Casey said Jimenez is very qualified for the position because he is "well educated and has no personal agendas; he's here to work strictly in the best interests of the students."

Casey said he brings a new perspective to the board as a professional artist, and that he is the only educator on the board.



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

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ANSWER TO PREVIOUS PUZZLE

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MAGISTRATE COURT

The following cases were recently adjudicated in Lincoln County Magistrate Court with Judge William R. Butts presiding.

Edgar Leroy Smith, 63, Highland Villa, Texas, through a plea agreement, was convicted of first offense driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or drugs. A charge of speeding was dismissed. Smith was placed on 90 days probation and required to pay a fine and court costs totaling \$399.

Ronald Dale Harris, 50, Nogal, pleaded guilty to first offense DWI-aggravated. Harris was sentenced to two days in the Lincoln County Detention Center, put on 88 days probation and assessed a fine and court costs of \$499.

Ray Boeglin, 21, Ruidoso Downs, through a plea agreement, was found guilty of second offense DWI and misdemeanor criminal damage to property. A count of third offense DWI and driving with a revoked driver's license was dismissed. Boeglin was sentenced to three days incarceration, placed on probation for 543 days, required to perform 48 hours of community service and assessed fines and court fees of \$799.

John D. Egbert, 42, Ruidoso, through a plea agreement, was found guilty of resisting, evading or obstructing a police officer and driving with a revoked license for a DWI conviction.

An additional charge of driving with a revoked license was dismissed. Egbert was credited for 22 days already served in jail, put on probation for 706 days and required to pay \$390 in fines and court fees.

Ronald Nelson, 38, Ruidoso, pleaded guilty to a charge of battery against a household member. Nelson was credited with two days served in jail, put on 180 days probation, assessed a fine and costs of \$101 and ordered to have no contact with the victim.

Catherine C. Chaplin, 41, Ruidoso, through a plea agreement, was convicted of second offense DWI-aggravated and not having vehicle liability insurance. Charges of aggravated DWI-third offense, a lane violation and having a suspended or revoked driver's license were dismissed. Chaplin was sentenced to seven days at the Lincoln County Detention Center, put on probation for 357 days, required to perform 48 hours of community service, told to attend three Alcoholics Anonymous meetings weekly and assessed \$788 in fines and costs.

Delton Treas, 28, Mesalero, pleaded guilty to charges of first offense DWI-aggravated and driving without a valid driver's license. Treas was sentenced to five days in jail, put on 175 days probation and ordered to pay \$788 in fines and court fees.

Lorenzo Bocanegro, 38, El Paso, was found guilty of first offense DWI and a passing violation. Bocanegro was sentenced to 90 days probation and assessed \$438 in fines and court costs.

Dennis L. Porter, 41, Capitan, was convicted of first offense DWI and possession of less than one ounce of marijuana. Porter was placed on probation for 105 days and ordered to pay \$555 in fines and court fees.

Kevin King, 27, Littleton, Colo., through a plea agreement, was found guilty of second offense DWI and a lane violation. A charge of aggravated DWI-second offense was dismissed. King was sentenced to three days in jail, put on probation for 361 days, ordered to perform 48 hours of community service and assessed a fine and court costs totaling \$699.

'Good Samaritan' finishes taking lost deposit to bank

A business bank deposit, found along U.S. Highway 70 near the Furr's store, was picked up by a "good Samaritan" and delivered to the bank identified on the bag.

"She has really changed my view of people here," Connie Armstrong, manager of the Burger King restaurant said of Lisa Willard.

Willard, a court clerk at Magistrate Court in Ruidoso, spotted the large bank bag Thursday about 4 p.m. on her way home.

"It was in the (highway) lane to turn into Furr's," Willard said. "I went down to the other Furr's entrance and turned around and went out there and got it."

Willard said she was nearly shaking when she realized the large bag contained two pouches, one of which she opened and saw a large amount of money. On the larger bag was the name Wells Fargo, the bank she drove to.

"They were closed and I knocked on the door," Willard said. "A woman came to the door and I told her I found the bank bag on the side of the road."

That woman was Wells Fargo-Ruidoso branch customer service representative Dawn Swearingin.

"She was knocking franti-

cally," Swearingin said. "She looked like she was terrified. When she told me about finding the money bag I said please come in."

Swearingin said she and Willard counted the money together to assure two people knew the amount in the bag.

"I called Burger King before Lisa left to let them know their money had been found and brought to the bank," Swearingin said. "It's good to know there are honest people out there."

Armstrong said as she was heading to make the fast-food restaurant's deposit she realized she had left the bag on top of her car.

"We looked in the parking lot," Armstrong said. "My heart just sank. It's the first time I've ever done that. It wasn't long before the bank called and said our deposit was here."

Willard said there was never any other thought except making sure the right person got their money back.

Swearingin said the Burger King deposit return isn't the only "good neighbor" deed involving money in the past month.

On May 26, Carlton Davies, vice-president of the Ruidoso Valley Noon Lion's Club and fellow club member Jim Matsler were setting up a raffle ticket booth at the Furr's on Mechem Drive

when a \$20 bill drifted by. Then a piece of paper, which turned out to be a receipt from a Wells Fargo automatic teller machine, was retrieved from the parking lot near the store's east entrance. Davies said another man soon came up and said he had just found a \$20 bill.

"We walked over to the (newspaper) vending machines outside Furr's and found three more twenties," Davies said.

Word was left in the store in the event someone came back to ask if \$100 had been turned in. That never happened, but two days later, on Monday, Davies went to Wells Fargo with the money and receipt.

Swearingin said the bank tracked down the ATM transaction and credited the funds back to the customer.

"Right is right," Davies said of working to reconnect the lost money with its owner.

PLANNING ZONING

A request to divide a property in the Young Heights Subdivision into two lots was endorsed Tuesday by the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission.

The endorsement came despite a recommendation by department staff that the mea-

sure be tabled on a contention of an incomplete application.

Rick Horckendoff wants to split a lot on Embury Road near Rainbow Drive into two lots.

The commission went through a number of provisions that would be required to allow the split, which Horckendoff

said was a replat and village planning department staff labeled a subdivision. A key provision in the pending approval was a plat map that showed the location of underground utilities and a guarantee that water and sewer would be available to each lot.

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Gary King carries the political torch

Gary King, son of former New Mexico Gov. Bruce King, announced in Ruidoso last week he's a Democratic candidate for the state's chief executive.


Gary King told members of the Democratic Party of Lincoln County that one of the reasons he'll seek the party's nomination is "we've had a governor about that smart," referring to President George W. Bush.

"There's no good reason we should be embarrassed about our governor," King said. "I think we miss a lot of opportunities in New Mexico. Instead of talking about making families, better and economic development, we've been talking the last few years about drugs and (school) vouchers."

King said New Mexico continues to see its high school and college graduates move to other states because of a lack of good jobs.

The 47-year-old, who previously served 12 years in the state legislature, also said New Mexico is losing doctors because of better opportunities in other states. He said the governor and legislature need to work together to keep doctors in New Mexico.

While King made official his desire to become governor at locations around the state last week, he unofficially declared his

intention last month in a radio interview in Roswell. A number of additional Democrats are expected to challenge King.

King made the announcement Thursday at the Lincoln County Democratic's annual dinner in Ruidoso,

which honored Mrs. Alice King, the wife of former Governor Bruce King and mother of Gary King.

Bruce King was New Mexico's governor from 1971-1974, 1979-1982, and 1991-1994.

Committee to propose lodgers funding criteria

In the wake of a denial of special events promotional funding for the Hubbard Museum of the American West, Ruidoso's Lodgers Tax Committee will propose criteria for funding requests.

The pending language would be included in the village policy dealing with lodgers tax expenditures for special events. A workshop last Thursday, bringing the committee and village council together, hashed over the issue.

"What are special events?" asked committee member Steve Tally. "We need to better define special events."

Committee chairman Riker Davis cautioned however that funding long running events with special events funds would "danger-

ously open a bag of worms." "Is it a new event or reoccurring?" Davis questioned about criteria. "And the length of the event. Is it one or two days? Three, four, five days?"

Mayor Robert Donaldson said he saw special events as activities that bring visitors to town rather than events that attract those already in the Ruidoso area.

Village Councilor Bob Sterchi said his concern is annual events that continually receive funding from the lodgers tax.


But Steve Tally, a committee member, said reoccurring special events need continued support.

Davis said the committee for years has weighed things like the time of year, the length of the event and anticipated economic impact of the event.

The 200-year-old argument resumes

School board to consider public comment, again

Democracy is such a messy thing, and naturally everybody who's elected to office has an urge to clean up the mess.

Public bodies like school boards and county commissions and village councils use "the agenda" to control what might be said in public meetings.

Last week, a delegation came to the Ruidoso School Board to present a petition urging a public comment period at board meetings.

The board waved "the agenda" flag. It's easy; just let us know what's wanted three days in advance and you'll be on the agenda.

But of course that controls

what might become public at a public meeting. It gives the board and the administration the ability to head off problems, or public embarrassment.

It's an issue that preoccupied revolutionaries John Adams and Thomas Jefferson as they struggled to create American democracy more than two centuries ago. Adams favored firm executive control. Jefferson thought public dissent was healthy, and necessary.

The Ruidoso School Board will renew that messy argument in public — as an agenda item — at 7 p.m. on June 12 at the Administration Building.

Which view will win in Ruidoso? Adams, of course.

Going for catfish

Farmers often consider what they can do to increase cash flow from their land. Some Western Kentucky farmers have found their answer at the water's edge. The extreme western point of the Bluegrass State known as the Purchase Area is the agricultural home to row crops, grain, chickens and dark fired tobacco — so-called smokeless, or chewing tobacco. But there's a growing agricultural enterprise new to the Purchase Area. Catfish ponds are becoming commonplace, and there are more under construction.

Aquaculture is certainly nothing new, but Purchase Area farmers are just beginning to feel their way around this business, which is an infant to them. They're trying it because it makes sense to them. "We felt that we had the natural resource base and certainly we have a need because farm income needs to be increased," says John Murdock, a farmer who is relatively new to aquaculture and catfish production. "We feel that catfish is one of the ways to do that."

Murdock, who came back to Kentucky after a 40-year absence teaching at the University of Wisconsin, raises 1,500 acres of row crops and uses precision agriculture to determine which soils on his farm are the most conducive to row crop agriculture. "This is a low-lying area in the field," says Murdock, spreading his arms over a pond's calm surface that conceals 80,000 pounds of catfish. "They're poorly drained soils, so what we've done is to look at it and say we could do something better with this."

"Before we could do very much in terms of making catfish production profitable, we decided we needed to get involved in processing and marketing," adds Murdock, who is also president of the Purchase Area Aquaculture Cooperative. The cooperative recently finished their plant, which, at this early stage, processes catfish two to three days a week.

Grants from the Kentucky

Department of Agriculture and consultation from a county extension agent helped to start production and processing, but it all began with producers' need for additional farm income. "Their dream was to develop a product in this area that would support growers so they could produce (catfish), process the product and also market the product," says Jessie Lopez, the manager of the cooperative. The co-op also produces economic benefits to the community as an employer and as a supplier of catfish. The catfish on area restaurant menus in the evening will have been netted that day.

Farmers are hoping to see a good return from aquaculture. "We believe that we can get between a \$1,000 and \$1,500 net income from ponds," says Murdock. "With the sale of the live fish to the cooperative and then the value-added income from having our product processed and marketed, all of the returns go back to the producers because we own the co-op."

Murdock's recollection of a state slogan underscores the pride that farmers take in producing a locally grown product. "After all," says Murdock, "Kentucky is where quality grows."

OUR RIGHT TO KNOW

Open Meetings

In recognition of the fact that a representative government is dependent upon an informed electorate, it is declared to be public policy of this state that all persons are entitled to the greatest possible information regarding the affairs of government and the official acts of those officers and employees who represent them. The formation of public policy or the conduct of business by vote shall not be conducted in closed meetings. All meetings of any public body except the legislature and the courts shall be public meetings, and all persons so desiring shall be permitted to attend and listen to the deliberations and proceedings.

The mayor's role as a CEO isn't easy

To the editor:

I take great exception to the flippant editorial on June 22. No one was told to take a flying leap or none of their business. I am sure this will be justified by poetic editorial license. While I understand the Economic Development Committee's frustration with lack of quorums and ability to make things happen quickly, the author of the editorial shows total lack of knowledge into the issue of the new comprehensive plan. One of the jobs I have from the council is to meet with every board and commission to help provide them with information on their role and relationship to the council.

With the exception of P&Z and Lodgers Tax, all committees are purely advisory and operate at the direction and discretion of the Village Council.

While it may not be the exact role the ED committee wants to play, they were asked to research through our whole Village Code to see how the code impacts economic development either positively or negatively. That information would then be provided to the person doing the first draft of the new comprehensive plan.

We have received information from the chamber, from public hearings and a survey of the public. We helped pay for the survey the chamber did of businesses in Ruidoso and Lincoln County. All this information will be used to create a first draft. This draft would then go to P&Z, the Economic Development Committee and any other board the council felt could provide insight to the document for public hearings.

Each board's recommendations are then sent for incorporation into the next draft. This could happen several times before a final draft is sent to P&Z for a public hearing for adoption. Finally, it is sent to the council for adoption. P&Z

and the council would then begin the task of modifying the Village Code to foster the directions the comprehensive plan has laid out. The last time the comprehensive plan was done, it took over six years to come to full adoption.

Maybe I should have thicker skin, but to be criticized, not for a particular position, but for actually doing the job of the CEO of this village is disconcerting. While the mayor can present ideas and possible directions to the council, the council makes the final decision. It is then the mayor's job to make sure the council's decisions and desires are followed. The mayor accomplishes this at Village Hall through direction of the manager and through the council's various boards and commissions through direct interaction.

The citizens of Ruidoso hold many different and unreconcilable views as to what they want Ruidoso to be in the future. Some want economic development, some don't. Some want growth, some don't. They are all valid views. The council and I have always made our positions on issues well known. Ultimately decisions must be made; some people will agree, some will disagree, but we always try to do the best we can for all.

Political reality and the 'faith-based initiative'

WASHINGTON (AP) — It is close to a truism that a program designed to improve the lives of the less fortunate and highlight the good work of religious groups should have near-universal support.

The Pennsylvanians who are leading the effort to implement President Bush's faith-based initiative are getting a dose of political reality, however. They are also learning that truisms can be false.

The plan has been attacked by liberals for threatening what Thomas Jefferson spoke of as the "wall of separation" between church and state. Some conservatives are leery because they fear government control will hinder religious freedom.

Sen. Joseph Lieberman, D-Conn., the most prominent member of his party who supports the idea, has refused to endorse the bill because of concerns about its constitutionality.

The program's supporters in the White House and on Capitol Hill are working to modify the plan to address the concerns and broaden its support.

John J. DiIulio, the University of Pennsylvania professor who is Bush's point person on this issue, has been working closely with Sen. Rick Santorum, R-Pa., on strategies to obtain congressional approval.

In separate interviews last week, DiIulio and Santorum both said they were frustrated, but not surprised that their plan has had a difficult reception.

"When you talk about religion and politics you will invariably generate heat, but out of that heat will come light," DiIulio said. "All of Senator Lieberman's concerns are legitimate and will be addressed. I would not want any bill that Senator Lieberman does not support."

Santorum, who has worked on the issue since helping to manage the wel-

fare reform bill in 1996, agreed that some of the criticisms raised by opponents are legitimate, but said some are "red herrings."

He added that the concerns raised about religious groups discriminating in hiring practices were misdirected because the majority of groups that provide social services are staffed mainly by volunteers.

"People have used discrimination as a lightning-rod term. We all discriminate every day. The question is, is the discrimination based on something that is related to the job the person is being hired to do," he said.

"Charitable choice," which opens government programs to churches, synagogues and other religious groups, is already used in welfare, drug treatment and community service programs.

The Bush plan would expand it to 10 new social service programs, including juvenile justice, housing, domestic violence and hunger relief.


"This is one of those first steps that is necessary to cre-

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


Slew In The Face is trained by Ramon O Gonzalez and owned by Jose Rivera.

The Crew Brew has had much success with Brew and the future looks even brighter.

"I don't think there is anything he can't do anymore," Jan Clute, Crew Brew member, said.

Brew will probably take time off before coming back into training where he will be pointed to the Ruidoso Mile, which will be run Aug. 11.

Brew returned \$2.40 for the win. He has won 16 races of his 30 starts and has placed in the top three 26 times out of the 30 starts. Today's earnings of \$13,560 brings his lifetime earnings to \$304,021.

FAST isn't just the name of a local archery organization, it's also their attitude.

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NCAA puts NMSU men's basketball on probation

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) — New Mexico State's basketball program is sporting a new black eye and Lou Henson's elitist coaching record also has taken a hit — both courtesy of former coach Neil McCarthy.

McCarthy's era of triumph and turmoil with the Aggies returned to haunt the school Wednesday when the NCAA placed the men's basketball program on four years of probation and imposed other sanctions for violations that occurred when McCarthy was the head coach.

"It's a black-eye and it's something we'll have to work hard to change," athletics director Brian Faison said. "These were serious violations and

that's not good for any institution."

The sanctions also affect the career record of Henson, a probable Hall of Famer who is one of 18 Division I coaches with more than 700 career wins. Henson took over the program at his alma mater after McCarthy was removed just before the start of the 1997-1998 season. McCarthy led the Aggies to five consecutive NCAA tournament bids.

One of the sanctions requires NMSU to vacate the team's records for the 1996-1997 and 1997-1998 seasons, when the Aggies finished 19-9 and 18-12 respectively. The 18-12 record came under Henson and those wins and losses will be removed from his overall record, the school said.

The change drops Henson from No. 10 to No. 12 in all-time career coaching wins in Division I — his record revised to 722-386 from the mark of 740-377 at the end of last season.

"There are so many things more important than that," the 69-year-old Henson said Wednesday. "The status of the university for me, if that's the way it is, it's OK."

The NCAA found McCarthy, former assistant coach Fletcher Cockrell and another assistant whom the school and NCAA would not identify, were involved in a series of violations

that included academic fraud and unethical conduct during NMSU's recruitment of junior college players — Louis Richardson and Antoine Hubbard prior to the 1996-1997 season.

The violations surfaced during a deposition filed to a lawsuit that McCarthy filed against the school after his ouster. The school last year self-imposed sanctions that included two years of probation, a ban on post-season tournament play after the 2000-2001 season; the loss of four scholarships during each of the next three seasons;

a reduction in official contacts during the next two seasons; and no recruitment of junior college players for the 2002-2003 season.

The NCAA accepted the school's sanctions, but increased the probation period to four years.

"We felt a longer period of time would help the institution make sure it was getting its act together," said Jack C. Friedenthal, chairman of the NCAA's Committee of Infractions.

The NCAA did not ban the Aggies from post-season play in the future, and Friedenthal said that was due to the school's aggressive approach in reporting the violations and because of the changes that have taken place at NMSU.

The committee was impressed that the institution had taken full charge of its shortcomings. It had cleaned house, from the (school) president to the athletic director and the entire basketball staff," Friedenthal said.

Former school president J. Michael Orenduff resigned at the request of the board of regents in May 1997 and former athletics director Al Gonzalez was removed in July 1997.

Henson, who has three years remaining on his contract, said he has no plans to leave early. He too sounded an optimistic note.

"Our present players will not be affected by all this, and that's what I feel good about," he said.



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



Tetanus vaccine

In response to the nationwide shortage of tetanus and diphtheria vaccines, the New Mexico Department of Health is temporarily suspending the school requirement for a booster dose of this vaccine for the upcoming school year. The suspension will affect children ages 11 to 15 for the 2001-2002 school year.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention anticipates that this shortage will last until at least the end of this year.

"We do not anticipate that suspending this year's school requirement for the tetanus immunization will have a negative effect on children's health," said Dr. Suzanne Westman of the New Mexico Department of Health. "We do believe there is enough of the vaccine for wound prophylaxis and anyone who needs it urgently."

Health care providers in New Mexico have been asked to use their available stock of tetanus and diphtheria toxoid-containing vaccine only for people traveling to a country where the risk for diphtheria is high; people needing tetanus vaccination for wound management; people who have received less than three doses of vaccine containing tetanus and diphtheria; pregnant women and people at occupational risk for tetanus-prone injuries who have not been vaccinated with Td within the last 10 years.

Facilities that need Td vaccine for such indications should contact the DOH pharmacy in Santa Fe at (505) 827-1781.

Challenge grant

Ruidoso Municipal School District was among 52 grantees by the New Mexico State Department of Education, receiving a \$60,000 grant for the upcoming school year.

The recipients will get a total of \$3,688,040, with larger school districts receiving up to \$180,000 and single districts with fewer than 10,000 students up to \$60,000.

The purpose of the federal project, launched in 1997, is to enhance student learning through technology, especially districts with high rates of poverty and those demonstrating the greatest need for technology.

The project is administered by the SDE with advice from the New Mexico Council on Technology in Education and concludes in 2001-2002. A team of technology and education experts chose grantees from 74 applicants. The fund's focus for 2001-2002 is on professional development for teachers, computer hardware and infrastructure, connecting to the Internet and expanding curriculum resources for students and teachers.

Ruidoso schools to emphasize the first 'R'...

All Ruidoso students will be reading at grade level by the fourth grade, if the district's plan to focus on effective reading programs and communication between staffs at the different schools is successful.

Principals and staffs of Nob Hill Early Childhood Center, Sierra Vista Primary and White Mountain Elementary have been meeting and brainstorming this past year and the principals have been attending training sessions given by the State Department of Education in preparation for a concerted push to teach children to read well at an early age.

"Early Education Reading Initiative" is the name of the program. Federal and state government demands for school accountability and community demands for students to achieve better in school gave the impetus for the plan, said Paul Wirth, associate superintendent for the district.

"The key to success is the ability to read, and the key to that is to be reading by the fourth grade at grade level. If they're not reading at grade level by then, it's difficult to catch up, and that's why we set that goal," Wirth said.

The primary focus of the program is communication between the staffs of the three schools and coordination of their training.

"The biggest thrust is to ensure that the staffs have the same philosophy and strategies for supporting students for reading. We will have staff go through trainings together," he said.

The district is in the process of hiring a consultant, selected from among several who gave a series of four workshops through the SDE for principals this past school year. The consultant will maintain a three-year relationship with the districts and the principals, presenting workshops and offering technical assistance in selecting a research-based reading/language arts program, and will help the district come up with objectives and strategies for the 2002-2003 school year.

This year, all three schools will pilot several language arts programs, and,

with the assistance of the consultant and pre- and post-tests of students, evaluate them for effectiveness. One program will be chosen by the end of the next school year for grades kindergarten through four, and will be used for the next five to seven years.

"There are dozens of programs," Wirth said. "It's easy to be distracted by what's the prettiest with the nicest pictures. We want to look at ones that have been proven to work with students like we have in Ruidoso."

Wirth said that by the beginning of the second semester next year, the programs will be chosen and will be used immediately for a newly scheduled summer-school program. Called "Jump Start," the classes will be held just before school starts rather than shortly after the end of the school year. With the old system, Wirth said, students had forgotten what they'd learned by the time school started; with Jump Start, they'll only have a couple of weeks before school starts.

In addition, the summer-school program will expand to include children from Nob Hill, putting an emphasis on early intervention.

Another thrust of the reading initiative is to have 90 minutes of uninterrupted instruction in reading and math in the mornings when students are fresh and learn best. All three schools will focus on 90-minute blocks of time without any interruptions for assemblies or other distractions, which will be scheduled for afternoons. Sierra Vista and White Mountain will ring the bell five minutes earlier in the morning — to give "15 more hours per year for instruction," stated the plan presented to the school board last week.

Every staff member at all three schools will be an active part of the reading team — including computer lab and library staff — and two additional instructional assistants have been hired to help lower the pupil-to-teacher ratio. Those who haven't been involved in reading instruction in the past will be trained, Wirth said.

Other elements of the reading pro-

gram include:

- Implementing family reading nights at Nob Hill and Sierra Vista (and continuing the tradition at White Mountain), to encourage parents to read with their children.

- Enhancing and expanding reading incentive programs at all three schools (e.g., WME Principal Frank Cannella's "Kiss the Cow Concert" for students meeting Accelerated Reading goals).

- Increasing parent involvement with weekly classroom newsletters and monthly newsletters from the principals; using parents to help with testing in the computer lab at Sierra Vista.

- Developing an early intervention program under the direction of the building speech/language pathologist and providing instruction for students identified as being at risk.

- Using Volunteers in the Public Schools (parent volunteers) as reading tutors.
- Teacher-training by reading specialists and by consultants from an SDE consortium for full-day kindergarten programs, in general language development and phonemic awareness.

- Increasing the number of books in classrooms to a minimum of 300, as well as making books available for a home-lending library program at Nob Hill, and increasing the number of library books in all schools.

The district also plans to initiate a public relations campaign to encourage 20 minutes of reading time at home each night, with reading strategies to be given to all parents of young children and "book swaps" with hot dogs, chips and drinks to encourage families to attend.

"Once we adopt the (reading) materials — and we're going to take our time — and develop testing processes, we're committed to that system for the next five to seven years, minimum," Wirth said. "We will spend a significant amount of time and resources and will train staff and take data. After that, we'll be fine-tuning the program, but we won't be looking at the latest, greatest materials, which is often the stumbling block of administrators."

Superintendents oppose Albuquerque-NMAA split

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) — More than half of the state's 85 superintendents on Friday asked Albuquerque Public Schools to delay possible withdrawal from the New Mexico Activities Association.

The Albuquerque school district has threatened to pull out of the association unless certain demands are met.

Some superintendents criticized the Albuquerque district for issuing the ultimatum. "The idea of threatening

and being the big bully of the state is immature and unprofessional," Artesia Superintendent Mike Phipps said. Phipps sits on the NMAA board of directors.

Las Vegas schools Superintendent Hank Dominguez said his district doesn't support Albuquerque's approach.

"We don't feel it's right for all kids in New Mexico," Dominguez said.

Among the proposals supported by APS are a division

of the NMAA board by student enrollment instead of regions, a return to four classifications for athletic competition and the elimination of regional tournaments.

The NMAA revamped its high school athletics alignment last year, forcing numerous schools to travel across the state for district games.

Parents have complained about missed classes and lack of family time.

The issue was discussed

during a special meeting of superintendents Friday in conjunction with a New Mexico School Boards Association conference.

NMAA board members have said changes for regional tournaments and the makeup of the NMAA board are being discussed. However, they say district realignment could take some time. NMAA has also proposed a meeting with Albuquerque school officials before the NMAA board meeting July 10.
