

Debate erupts: Planning and development in Midtown

While the Ruidoso Village Council last week took what was described as the first step to amending the village's Transportation Plan, debate erupted over long-range planning.

Earlier it was opined that the Transportation Plan created uncertainty for some properties near or in the path of possible road improvements.

"If we throw this out, will it be forgotten?" Ruidoso business owner Deborah Byars asked of the Transportation Plan. "In six to 10 years it's going to be so congested down there," she said of Midtown.

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Joan Zagone raised a similar question and moved the debate into other long-range planning documents.

"We are growing and we'd better start planning for it," Zagone told the mayor and village council. "We want to preserve this community and support Midtown as an enhanced pedestrian shopping attraction."

Zagone said a recent resident survey rated Midtown enhancement 10 times higher than bringing commuter

U. S. 70 project 'good for state,' says road chief

Highway Commission Chairman Holm Bursum III also warns funding for the widening project might never come around again; 'it's safety, economy'

The chairman of the New Mexico Highway Commission said Monday if opposition halts the \$70 million project to four-lane U.S. 70 from Riverside to Ruidoso Downs, the region may never see the highway improved.

Opponents earlier this month won Lincoln County Commission support to halt the project until environmental studies are completed for the entire stretch of four-lane construction, including the portion from Roswell. They also want to see impacts to acequias and historical buildings minimized.

But Commission Chairman Holm O. Bursum III said this is a case of highway safety and economic development for more people than just those in the Hondo Valley.

"This money is hard to come by,"

said the bank president, whose home is Socorro.

Governors before Gary Johnson talked a lot of about connecting various parts of the state to the Rio Grande corridor, but when it came time to set aside money each year, it didn't end up in the southeast or northwest portions of the state, he said. Yet each of those sections contributes about half of the severance tax collected annually in New Mexico, he said.

"This highway commission - I have been chairman for six years - and this governor have taken a different approach," Bursum said. "We've tried to do the work where the roads were most needed and would be the most economically beneficial."

"In six years, we have built more than 500 miles of new four-lane

Rewarding good service

Debra Ingle is a volunteer, but has made progress toward putting the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority on a sound basis

Board members Tuesday showed their appreciation to Debra Ingle for stepping in as interim manager of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

They included \$20,000 in the 2001-2002 budget to pay her for expenses incurred in the non-salaried post.

Ingle, who represents Capitan on the board and serves as chairman of the authority, took over when Rick Simpson, a Lincoln County commissioner, resigned in May as manager. Members of the authority, a coalition of the county and its five municipalities, decided to try operating without a paid manager to reduce expenses.

Ingle is expected to exit her role

after six months, although at the board meeting she said while employees are fully capable of doing their individual jobs, someone needs to coordinate, go after grants, make decisions and evaluate the work of the staff.

"It's an everyday job," she said, pointing to 24-hour access by telephone and visits to sites across the county.

Ingle reported that in the past two months, by working with authority county representative Modesto Chavez and finance officer Beverly Foote, she was able to reduce a projected budget deficit at the end of the 2000-2001 fiscal year from \$392,000 to \$44,000, cutting more than \$95,000 in expenses and putting \$135,000 in

the bank.

The board approved a budget resolution for the 2001-2002 fiscal year showing estimated revenues of \$1,618,713 and expenses of \$1,560,066, including a required reserve of \$113,964, and leaving the authority a projected \$80,069 in the black.

"For the first time, the authority is budgeting money to pay for capital outlay," Ingle said. The items include more polycarts, roll-off containers and a combination backhoe, front-end loader and fork lift, and a replacement for a transporter with 700,000 miles of service.

Ingle also reported that the authority nearly lost money set aside by the

Don't sit on the pistol

■ A shooting incident in Carrizozo results in an injury in a location not anticipated.

A Carrizozo man, who police said ended up shooting himself in the buttocks, was expected to be charged with six criminal counts following an incident in which shots were fired at another person Monday in Carrizozo.

An assistant district attorney concluded Tuesday that Carlos Garcia, 19, should be charged with being a felon in possession of a firearm, assault with intent to commit a violent felony, aggravated assault, battery, false imprisonment and possession of less than one ounce of marijuana.

Carrizozo Police Chief A. I. Vega said Garcia reportedly saw his girlfriend in a car with another man and forced the car to stop on C Avenue. He allegedly then asked the woman to exit the car.

Garcia is accused of then taking a shot at the man in the car.

Vega said the woman was forced into Garcia's vehicle, and a block later she attempted to get a handgun away from Garcia. Garcia reportedly sat on the pistol and it discharged.

He was transported to the Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso for treatment of the bullet wound.

Vega said witnesses to the events have been interviewed and evidence collected. Neither of the two other people were injured, though the police chief said a bullet did come close to hitting one of the victims.

You'll have to get up early for Thursday's commission meeting

Lincoln County Manager Tom Stewart will serve big cups of coffee to his five commissioners Thursday as they try meeting an hour earlier.

After a discussion last month about moving monthly meetings in Carrizozo to 8 a.m. instead 9 a.m., Stewart decided to plunge into the new schedule, which means some commissioners will be on the road at 7 a.m. to arrive in time.

They may need the extra hour, with 40 items on the agenda.

Assembling his preliminary schedule, which may change by Thursday, an optimistic Stewart listed 14 items before the beginning of public hearings at 10 a.m. The items include:

- A declaration of an agricultural economic emergency
- Discussion of an alternate escape route for the Sun Valley subdivision in case of fire
- Expansion of the Alto Country Club sign
- The possibility of charging a fee for appraisal information.

A continuing discussion of the U.S. 70 highway design and of the future of

18 acequias on that road is set at 9 a.m., as requested by Commissioners Leo Martinez and L. Ray Nunley.

The hearings, scheduled to begin at 10 a.m., are to discuss projects for a 2002 New Mexico Small Cities Community Development Block Grant and to consider a proposed law prohibiting noise from "jake brakes" used to slow down semitrucks.

Other major items on the schedule are a discussion of water and forest health, a hearing to approve final changes to the county's subdivision ordinance and a discussion of the

operation and management of the Carrizozo Health Clinic.

All that before noon, at which time commissioners will conduct a semi-annual inspection of the new county detention center in the Carrizozo Industrial Park.

The afternoon looks about as busy, with an update on the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority by Modesto Chaves, hearings on the county budget, bid awards for the operation of a county animal control facility and the purchase of vehicles for the county assessor's office.

Commissioners also will look at a

lease/purchase request for proposals on the Glencoe Rural Events Center and agreements connected to the operation of the Hondo Health Clinic.

Road name recommendations from the Enhanced 911 committee will be submitted for approval and final road acceptance in Agua Fria Estates subdivision is requested by V.R. "Smokey" Davis.

A memorandum of understanding regarding transportation of village prisoners to the county jail in Carrizozo and setting up a transport scheduled also will be discussed.





Library's burned bears on Crimestoppers list

The July 4 vandalism of a pair of carved bear cubs near the entrance to the Ruidoso Public Library has been designated as a Ruidoso/Lincoln County Crimestoppers case. The designation provides a reward of up to \$500 for information that leads to the arrest and magistrate court bindover or grand jury indictment of those responsible for the crime. About 1 a.m. someone set the carved bears statue on fire. The incident, deemed a felony arson, resulted in more than \$800 worth of damage. How much for garbage disposal?

A Roswell couple, who spend a few weeks a year at their second home in Lincoln County, Tuesday protested paying more than \$9 per month to drop their garbage in Solid Waste Authority dumpsters. Interim authority manager Debra Ingle said quarterly bills mailed earlier this month contained about a 50 percent rate hike approved by the board, increasing the cost of service for three months from \$21.26 to \$31.50, and included a fuel surcharge of \$1.50. She received about 50 protest calls, but after talking to each customer, only 10 still are unhappy, Ingle said. Anita Smith asked the board to consider a "vacation

home rate or some other arrangement for property owners who come to second homes seasonally or for occasional weekends. "I'm not using \$31.50 worth of service in three months," Smith said. "I think you should consider a sliding scale or a vacation rate for those who aren't full-time residents, since your stated concept is that each household should pay for the trash it generates." Nine dollars for one sack a month is ridiculous, she contended, adding the service should be optional. Her husband also questioned the fuel surcharge, but authority finance officer Beverly Foote said the cost per gallon for diesel fuel increased by more than 50 cents per gal-

lon. The Smiths said they don't pay for or use a collection service in Roswell. They drive their trash to the landfill and are not charged for dumping, they said. Ingle said the board will review possible alternatives. But the landfill Lincoln County shares with Otero County is south of Alamogordo and therefore is inaccessible to county residents. Collection service is mandatory in all of the county's municipalities, Ingle pointed out. The authority may even have to rethink the one exemption it allows for property owners with 300 or more contiguous acres, because new state environmental rules may eliminate that option, she said.

air service into the village's airport. She noted the village had just spent \$150,000 to subsidize such service. "One thing that concerns many of us regarding the comprehensive master plan is we have people that should have a copy of it. Not only don't they have a copy, they don't know about it." Zagone charged the village has left long-range planning tools "on the shelf." After Mayor Robert Donaldson responded he and the council have looked at the master plan, Zagone chided Donaldson. "Some of you have not," Zagone said. "Don't say 'we.'" "OK. I have looked at it," Donaldson responded. "A lot of it has been accomplished. Much of it can't be accomplished word-for-word." The mayor said the master plan was being revised based on resident input over the past number of years. "It takes a lot of time," Donaldson told Zagone. "Cleatus (Richards, the village's special projects manager) is doing it." Zagone responded that if the mayor failed to involve the

community in redrafting the master plan it would become a document that failed to match resident visions. Both Zagone and Donaldson traded quips that they were offended by the other's comments. Turning to Village Manager Alan Briley, the mayor said a draft of a revised master plan needed to be completed. "Cleatus needs to get his butt to work," Donaldson said. "This council shouldn't have to take this because it's not done." Briley said Richards has a deadline of late August to present a draft revision. "Starting today we need to work on a plan," Zagone said. "I will volunteer the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, all 600 of us, to review it. But I'm afraid we'll do it and never look at it again." Councilor Linda Flack said she liked Zagone's idea of a citizens committee to review the plan. Donaldson called it important for panels such as the Ruidoso Arts Commission, the village's Economic Development Ad-Hoc Committee and the Planning

and Zoning Commission to hold hearings on the plan. Bill Chance, another member of the village council, said the council needed to set a direction. "Everyone's tired of spending money on surveys and putting them on the shelf," Chance said. "It's incumbent on us to make sure we have a plan and act on it." Chance said if the special projects manager cannot complete a new plan then the village should bring in someone to finish the work. "I think we've let it be known tonight on what we want done," Donaldson said. Contacted later, Richards said an update of the master plan was in progress. "It's not a simple matter," Richards said. "The process is under way." He said many issues, such as what's happened with development, population numbers and a number of resident surveys have to be factored in. Richards also said village committees will need to have input before a final draft is prepared. "I think there will be numerous drafts before we get to something satisfactory."

state Environment Department to cover costs associated with the closing of the debris landfill in Capitan. State officials called June 26 asking for justification to extend the grant period. "They said it's been seven years and we've done nothing and we don't get the grant back," she said. "We begged for three days and they gave us one last chance. The grant is effective until July 1, 2002. I have the topography maps and locat-

ed two existing wells so we don't have to drill new ones" for monitoring purposes. Seeds for revegetating the area were donated by the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District, she said. The landfill hasn't been used for more than five years, but all of the required closure procedures have not been completed. In other operational changes,

Ingle said she's establish polycart service in Palo Verde subdivision east of Ruidoso Downs, adding about 150 more carts at individual homes instead of larger dumpsters. She's also finding sites for large roll-off convenience collection bins that would be manned by staff five days a week in the Hondo and Sun Valley areas of the county.

highway. As a result, every city in the state of New Mexico with a population of 12,000 or more is within two miles or 10 minutes of a four-lane highway. Those numbers are important, because new businesses and industries want that type of access before moving into an area, he said. Bursum won't be at the county commission meeting at 9 a.m. Thursday when Commissioners Leo Martinez and L. Ray Nunley have asked for another discussion of the commission's stance on the highway project. Martinez voted for the

resolution, but only after pointing out the risk that the project could be scrapped and because the vote would allow him to call the issue back on the table, he said previously. Bursum said several state highway department representatives will show up to talk to commissioners. Bursum said the U. S. 70 project is an integral part of economic development. By not building highways to access other parts of the state, cities in northwest New Mexico were forced to do business in Colorado and those in the southeast went to Texas, Bursum said.

Correcting that situation is what the highway work, including U.S. 70, is all about, he said. The total project would tie Las Cruces with Ruidoso and Roswell by four-lane highway. The 37-mile stretch in Lincoln County is estimated to cost \$70 million, he said. Fourteen fatalities occurred there within the last 18 months. "The road through Hondo is one of the deadliest in the state, because it's two lane, and there is too much traffic for that design," Bursum said. "Four-lane highways have been shown to reduce fatalities by 70 percent."

Although many more entities than the Lincoln County Commission, such as the Ruidoso Village Council, have input into the project, the opinion of the commissioners does count, he said. "If this happened to kill it, I don't think we'd get the money back again," Bursum said. "No one wanted to do it before. It's such a shame that a few people are fighting it and that really does a disservice to the majority of people who want a good highway. "But this county commission kind of has a reputation that if Ruidoso and Roswell are for something, they're against it."

Exports critical for farmers

United States trade negotiators are working with a handicap and the nation's farmers are worse off because of it.

Until 1994 the president of the United States had the authority to negotiate trade agreements with foreign trading partners. A trade agreement could then be approved, but not amended, by Congress. Countries bargaining with the United States could do so with the confidence that, while a deal might not hold up under congressional scrutiny, at least it would not come back with changes from the lawmaking body.

Congress is now considering legislation that would give the president the authority needed to negotiate these agreements. What used to be called fast-track authority is referred to now as trade promotion authority, or TPA. It is especially important for farmers. "Agriculture is more reliant on exports than almost any other sector of our economy," says Bob Stallman, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation. "Significant barriers to global agricultural trade are in place throughout the world and must be eliminated."

Considering that TPA would give U.S. negotiators needed credibility, some say that it could not be coming at a more important time for agriculture. "It's extremely timely," says John Skorburg, a senior economist with the American Farm Bureau Federation. "We're looking at the WTO talks kick-starting in November. Trade promotion authority would send a signal that we're serious about WTO negotiations."

"Nothing is more important to the future of agricultural trade this year than the launch of a new (WTO) round," says Stallman. "An important step to launching a

new round is to secure Trade Promotion Authority for the president."

The Trade Promotion Authority Act grants negotiating authority to the president without restricting trade because of environmental or labor standards. "We object to using trade agreements as a weapon to make our trading partners comply with certain labor and environmental standards, or to use sanctions and other trade-restrictive measures as enforcement tools," says Stallman. "Other avenues exist to achieve these important societal goals."

"Farm Bureau believes that the best way to bring about changes in labor and environment in these other countries is to give them the economic wherewithal to do so," says Audrae Erickson, a trade specialist with the American Farm Bureau Federation. "No country in the history of recorded time has ever been able to make substantial gains in environment and labor without having a sufficient standard of living. Trade is far and away the best means for these countries to raise their standard of living."

The primary point of TPA is to give U.S. negotiators credibility at the bargaining table, helping to ensure progress in the WTO negotiations. Stallman believes that granting trade promotion authority to the president would go a long way in re-establishing the United States as the leader in world trade.

"World Trade Organization negotiations are our best opportunity to eliminate the unfair trading practices that prevent U.S. agriculture from reaching its full potential in world markets."

Plans vs. development (continued)

To the editor:

The letter from ... Joan Zagone, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, in the July 11 edition ... was certainly entertaining, though also deeply troubling.

I quote ... from Ms. Zagone's letter: "One of the weak links in our democratic process is that we do not allow elected officials to serve forever." It is clear that she is against term limits, a core issue that has been decided by the voters of Lincoln County in the affirmative. Ms. Zagone is apparently out of step with the voters on that matter.

But the question remains: What is her issue? Is she also out of step with what she terms "The Plan"? Ms. Zagone acknowledges that "much community input" went into the 1988 Ruidoso Master Plan. Apparently "professionals" (using her term) failed to sufficiently research the Master Plan in an effort to develop a proposed assisted living facility. Now, she seems to join their unhappiness because their proposal runs afoul of the will of the people.

Ms. Zagone proposes that the Ruidoso Master Plan be overseen by a group of "community players" (again, using her term), who would "suggest appropriate adjustment" to the plan. Obviously, this would be a step toward keeping community planning out of the hands of elected officials; and, it would place the future of the village in the hands of — well, whom? A reasonable person would assume that under Ms.

Zagone's stated philosophy these "community players" would be permanently installed, forever making judgments about the future of the village.

So, is anyone opposed to the private development of an assisted living facility? Perhaps such a facility is needed and wanted, and can be financially justified in the community. All anyone has said, so far, is that the village adopted a plan for future development, and it is appropriate to use the plan when considering the location and construction of such a facility. Community input is a wonderful thing.

Is everyone in the County of Lincoln watching what is happening in the Village of Ruidoso? I hope so.

ICBM intercept debate turning political

WASHINGTON (AP) — Regardless of the outcome, the military's attempt to shoot down an intercontinental missile high over the Pacific this weekend is sure to intensify the fierce political debate over President Bush's missile-shield plans.

The test comes at a sensitive time as Bush heads for Europe and meetings with allies who oppose the program.

Trying to lower expectations, Pentagon officials suggested that a miss in Saturday night's test would still yield useful information. The administration plans to proceed no matter how the test turns out.

It will be the fourth attempt to shoot down a long-range missile with a prototype interceptor. Two previous tests failed and one was successful.

Missile defense advocates say individual tests at this stage are not that significant, given the technological complexities of a concept likened to stopping a bullet with another bullet.

But the administration and its congressional allies can be expected to seize on a successful interception to press for an accelerated testing schedule and to step up criticism of the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty.

Likewise, detractors will depict a failure as one more reason to scrap the

project. A miss would complicate the administration's efforts to persuade Congress to spend \$8.3 billion for missile defense research and testing in 2002, a nearly 60 percent increase over this year.

Bush leaves for Europe on Wednesday. In Italy, he will join leaders of Japan, France, Germany, Britain, Canada, Italy and Russia for an annual summit of industrial democracies.

On a visit to Europe last month, Bush found allies wary of his plan.

Russian President Vladimir Putin suggested American defiance of the ABM treaty could prompt Russia to put more nuclear warheads on its missiles.

The treaty bars both the United States and Russia from deploying a national missile-defense system. Bush has said the treaty is a relic of the Cold War and should be left behind.

Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld cautioned against reading too much into this latest test flight. Sen. John Warner of Virginia, senior Republican on the Senate Armed Services Committee, called it "just another building block. Each set of results stand on their own."

The committee's new chairman, Sen. Carl Levin, D-Mich., said, "Each test is not in and of itself determinative of where this program goes." But Levin said his main concern is that the ABM

treaty might soon be violated. "It could unleash an arms race and a very negative response from either Russia or China," he suggested.

The Pentagon will begin ground-breaking for a new missile defense test range in Alaska as early as August. Defense officials say some segments could be deployed as an interim defense if necessary even before they are fully tested.

Democratic leaders argue against spending billions more on a system that may not work and would violate a landmark treaty. But Condoleezza Rice, Bush's national security adviser, suggests they're trying to "have it both ways."

Democratic pollster Mark Mellman, who has done work for missile-shield opponents, said several recent surveys show missile defense to be "an extraordinarily low priority for people." But this lack of interest "turns to opposition" when the subject of failed tests and treaty violations is raised, he said.

Republican politicians have long argued that many Americans believe — incorrectly — that the nation's cities are protected already by some vague sort of missile defense system.

Mellman said his polling, too, has found such erroneous assumptions to be widespread.

That being the case, he quipped, "Why pay for it again?"

Ruidoso Downs trustees defend structured meetings

'Open meetings' doesn't mean 'of the public,' says attorney

Crumbling by some residents attending last week's Ruidoso Downs village council meeting brought defense of a more structured meeting format.

"This is not a town-hall form of government," Village Attorney Dan Bryant responded to a query as to why a resident wasn't allowed to comment on an issue about to be voted on by trustees.

"This is a representative governmental body," Bryant added. "I'm sorry, but go back to your second-grade history book to learn about representative forms of government."

Minutes earlier on Tuesday, Mayor Bob Miller had waved off a resident's question, saying a motion had been seconded, precluding further discussion. The questioning of audience participation came during the meeting's public input segment, near the end of the agenda.

"This body did not have control of its meetings and it was mob control," Bryant said of

meetings before mid-year 2000. "I'm sorry that you folks are upset."

Council member Jim Bassett agreed, stating former meetings had been contentious. "If you wanted to go to the Friday night fights, you came to Ruidoso Downs," Bassett said.

Bryant noted there were public comments allowed during Tuesday's meeting. But he added that New Mexico's Open Meetings Act does not mean the sessions are "an open meeting of the citizens."

He urged residents to obtain a copy of the council's twice-monthly meeting agenda, and if there are questions or comments, call trustees to "talk, plead and politic them."

Trustee Margie Morales said all four trustees and the mayor are listed in the phone book and are ready to listen to residents.

Bonnie Richardson, another trustee, said even with fewer free-form meetings than had been the case in the past, the council sessions don't hold down public comment that much.

"This is still the wildest show in town," Bryant said.

Memorial to honor those who walked and died in the Bataan Death March

WASHINGTON — U.S. Senator Pete Domenici has reported that the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has released the \$150,000 he secured to begin developing a memorial in Las Cruces, to honor veterans involved in the World War II Bataan Death March.

Domenici, a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, secured the funding in the FY2001 Veterans Affairs, Housing and Urban Development and Independent Agencies Appropriations Bill.

The funding was released to the city of Las Cruces for the memorial.

The funding will provide resources for a sculpture to honor Bataan veterans.

The proposal includes placing the memorial at the Las Cruces Veterans' Park, which has been developed through a property donation from the city of Las Cruces, as well as mate-

rial and labor contributed by the Las Cruces Home Builders Association.

"It is great that we can finally begin to show our appreciation for these men whose bravery is truly indescribable. Many of the men in the Bataan Death March were New Mexicans from the southern part of the state, so it seems appropriate that the memorial would be located there. I am honored to be a part of this very worthy cause," Domenici said. "The federal funds will be spent to ensure that there is a lasting and monumental memorial to their honor."

The Bataan Death March involved members of the 200 Coast Anti-Aircraft Artillery

and 515th Coast Anti-Aircraft Aircraft, New Mexico National Guard Units. They were among the more than 70,000 American and Filipino prisoners of war who were captured in April 1942 and force-marched to a Japanese work camp.

Suffering from starvation and physical abuse, more than 7,000 died and only about 56,000 reached the camp. Thousands later died from malnutrition and disease. Survivors were liberated in 1945.

Of the 1,800 men in the New Mexico Brigade, fewer than 900 returned home and a third of those died within the first year of returning.

The build effort, dubbed Kidz Konnection, will come to a culmination Sept. 12-16, when the five-day volunteer construction project will take place. ALBUQUERQUE (AP) — State Racing Commissioner Susan Vescovo calls it a case of a pinhead on a football field. Veterinarian Bob Storey's analogy is a drop of sand in the ocean.

But in New Mexico horse racing, it's a big deal.

Jack Brooks, one of the country's most successful and respected quarter horse trainers, is on probation for a year because one of his horses tested positive for benzoylcegonine, a derivative of cocaine.

Brooks' 3-year-old filly Golden Form tested positive after winning a race at Sunland Park on Feb. 11, 2000. A sample of the filly's urine sent to a lab in Maryland showed the filly had less than 10 nanograms — a minuscule amount — of benzoylcegonine in her system.

"I'm innocent as can be and it really hurts to hear Jack Brooks and cocaine," said Brooks, who has saddled nearly 9,000 winners in 42 years of training. "In my business, you really do care what people think."

Brooks has won the All American Futurity — the world's

richest quarter horse race eight times and last year had the world champion 2-year-old colt Eyesa Special.

Brooks remains much in demand among horse owners, but says his reputation has been damaged.

A nanogram is one billionth part of a gram, but because New Mexico has a zero-tolerance policy for banned drugs in race horses, any amount can produce a positive test.

When it comes to positive tests for cocaine in New Mexico, humans have it better than horses.

In humans, it takes a minimum of 300 nanograms per billion in screening tests and 150 (ppb) in confirmation tests to produce a positive for cocaine.

Vescovo, who cast the only dissenting vote in the State Racing Commission's decision last February to place Brooks on probation, says New Mexico should have a cutoff level for benzoylcegonine in horses.

"I think you can be zero tolerance and have a cutoff level," Vescovo said.

Cutoff levels for benzoylcegonine are in place in Canada and Ohio. Ohio's cutoff is 150, the same as in humans, and in Canada it's 50 nanograms.

"My vote was based on the degree that we are testing to," Vescovo said. "A horse weighs 1,500 pounds and we're going to end up calling a 10 (nanograms) a positive?"

Vescovo said she considered the amount of benzoylcegonine found in Brooks' horse "a pinhead on a football field."

Storey, a private veterinarian who cares for horses at Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs, agreed with Vescovo.

"It's like a drop of sand in the ocean," Storey said. "At the level we're talking about, it's minuscule and has no affect on a

horses performance.

Vescovo is in the minority on the State Racing Commission in her advocacy for change.

Commission Chairman Greg Drake said the zero tolerance policy won't change.

"It's to protect the betting public," Drake said. "I don't think there's been enough tests run or evidence that shows how it affects a horse. We'd open up a huge can of worms."

Also part of the issue is the status of cocaine as a major environmental contaminant.

A study conducted by Dr. Thomas Tobin, a professor of veteri-

nary science at the University of Kentucky, noted that paper money is often contaminated with cocaine. The study said in one study covering 136 dollar bills, 79 percent of the bills yielded readily detectable cocaine.

Tobin's report also said 50 nanograms or less of benzoylcegonine wouldn't affect the performance of a race horse.

"The further down you go, the easier it is to find a trace and the less it means," Tobin said.

The New Mexico Racing Commission earlier this year

had one of its investigators count large amounts of money for nearly half an hour and then handle two horses much like a trainer would — plating his hands inside the mouths and noses of horses.

Cotton balls that were used to swab the investigator's hands contained a significant level of cocaine, but the two horses tested negative for cocaine.

"While currency may be a source of cocaine as an environmental contaminant, it probably is not the source of positive cocaine tests in race horses," the commission said in a report on the experiment.

The hearing officer in Brooks' case said the source of cocaine found in Golden Form could not be determined, "but could have come from incidental contact with ... a person who uses cocaine." A groom, who was not employed by Brooks but who would have had access to the filly and her feed before the race, tested positive for cocaine and morphine several days after the race.

Brooks, 65, of Jones, Okla., was not at Sunland Park when the horse was stabled there and had not had contact with the horse for two weeks before the race.

Anglers angry over fishing ban at Mesilla

MESILLA (AP) — Anglers are angry over an irrigation district's ban on fishing near the Mesilla Diversion Dam and say they will take the issue to federal court.

"We're serious fishermen, and we feel that we have the right to continue fishing at the dam," Anglers Club attorney Felix Jaramillo warned members of the Elephant Butte Irrigation District at a meeting last week. "We would like to go

through an administrative process to find a remedy without a fight. But if needed, we plan to pursue the issue with legal remedies in court."

A road that crosses Mesilla Dam is only open to emergency workers. Gates on both ends have been locked.

"It's our responsibility to protect the Mesilla Dam as a historical structure," district secretary-manager Gary Esslinger said. "That dam was

built in 1914, and we have to protect it from unnecessary traffic that is taking a toll on it."

Jaramillo said the community has fished around the dam for generations and it is a tradition.

He said club members are willing to become a nonprofit organization which would allow only permitted responsible individuals to fish on the bridge.

Local fishing report for the Ruidoso area, as of July 18, 2001

Ruidoso River: The flow rate on the River is still quite low. We should be around 4 to 6 CFS and are running at 2 CFS. Guess it is time to start washing the old truck and praying for rain. The NMGF Department stocked 1,250 fish on July 10. The best subsurface fly selections for Rainbows or Browns remain the Bead head Pheasant Tail nymphs or Bead head Prince Nymphs. Green Rock worms and Bead Head Cased Caddis Larva continue as producing patterns. A few sporadic caddis hatches continue to come off near evening, so be sure to pocket a few Elk Hair Caddis dry flies. A few fish were taken on Parachute Adams and Stimulators. Hopper season is here. One new pattern called a 3DPT nymph is catching fish.

South fork — No change here. The flow rate is still way down. One still needs to hike a ways up the stream to find fish. Once found, they are healthy and hungry. The fish here are not fussy. Caddis dry flies and small nymphs of just about any pattern will work here.

Bonito Lake: Humpies, Dark Hendricks, and Parachute Adams flies have been consistent producers before dark on the main lake body. A damselfly nymph tied as a dropper behind your dry fly offering may bring an unexpected take. For the spin cast fishermen, try a hot pink renegade pattern propeller fly or a black with grizzly hackle propeller fly behind a bubble rig.

Eagle Lakes: The fishing has been reported as doing well. Fish slated for Mescalero Lake have been put in Eagle due to the fire mitigations around Mescalero Lake. The day fee has gone up to \$10.00 per day, per person. Reason given is, since the fish hatchery in Mescalero is closed, costs of transporting fish from as far away as Arizona have to be covered. Damselfly patterns have been working along with Black Humpy's, Parachute Adams, and Blue Wing Olives. **Grindstone:** This Lake has really slowed down the past few days. The surface water temperature has increased a bunch due to the excessive sunshine. Float tubers continue to do best by tossing a

sinking tip line and stripping a dark wooly bugger with some flash or a streamer 8 to 10 feet deep. Damselfly and Dragon fly imitations have been working well. For spin casters, tie on an Olive or Black propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the barbs down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water.

Lake Mescalero: The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark wooly buggers continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito, or Hendrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk. The "Trap and Skeet" fire is out, now the real work begins — how to mitigate the damage? Remember

the ash and debris will run downhill. Downhill in this case may be a disaster in the making. Carrizo Creek and the Ruidoso River may stand in the path. If help is needed to repair the damages, let all volunteer to help save these cold-water fisheries.

Thursday and Friday, ENMU-Ruidoso is offering an open-house and on Friday a parking lot party, where all three campuses - Portales, Roswell and Ruidoso - will be represented.

Lincoln County and Mescalero Apache Reservation people are invited to see their college and have refreshments. Drawings for items ranging from T-shirts to community education classes also are planned.

Also, Friday night it will be "ENMU night" at the Flying J Ranch in Alto.

ENMU-Ruidoso started, 10 years ago, sharing space with Region IX Education Cooperative at 300 Sudderth Drive.



ENMU-Ruidoso has room for expansion at its facility on Mechem Drive - but not the money.

ENMU-Ruidoso then moved to 1440 Sudderth and remained there until December 1995, when the activities were moved to the current location in Sierra Mall at 709 Mechem Drive.

With the help of volunteers, Dr. Jim Miller, director of ENMU, recruited 300 students in 1991 and teachers were hired. ENMU-Ruidoso's first two graduates earned associate degrees in May 1993. Now, ENMU-Ruidoso is graduating about 30 people per semester and students can earn associate, bachelor's and master's degrees.

ENMU-Ruidoso has developed financial aid services, a library facility and community education services. In 1997, an adult literacy program was developed, followed by a GED program in 1998.

"It's been a lot of hard work, but it's been very enjoyable," Miller said.

Miller said changes are in store for ENMU. "We are at a point where we can't serve many more people without expanding our facilities, and so to make the next jump forward in the next decade, we've got to expand the facility and stay on top of the

changes that are happening in technology," Miller said.

Miller said they have been working on a plan since 1997 for expansion. The challenge has been finding funds for it, Miller said that has meant a lot of grant writing, and he still has not come up with funds sufficient for the needed expansion.

Miller said continuing to be responsive to the needs of the people of this region has been ENMU's biggest challenge, because needs change and universities are typically not known for changing quickly.

The most rewarding experience for Miller has been seeing individuals that he started working with nine or 10 years ago have finally finished their degrees.

"There is a group of six women that I met 10 years ago this July down in the Hondo Valley and all of them have either finished or are finishing their degrees, or have been promoted in local businesses," Miller said. With a lot of hard work behind him, and a lot more in store, Miller is looking ahead.

"We're just looking forward to the next 10 years," Miller said.

A hot UNM football recruit, Dontrell Moore is keeping education in mind

■ Lots of big-name schools recruited him, but he chose to become a Lobo because of UNM's pre-med program.

ROSWELL (AP) - In a town enamored with UFOs and extraterrestrial life, Roswell native and future New Mexico running back Dontrell Moore has managed to keep his feet and future on solid ground.

Moore is a Parade Magazine prep All-American with the same big-time potential that took Bobby Newcombe from Highland High to Nebraska and Brian Urlacher from Lovington to the National Football League.

But there's a lot more than that to this teen-ager.

For starters, getting a degree in sports medicine or some other medical field is on par with a pro football career on Moore's priority list. So

committed is he to that end that he turned down Nebraska and Notre Dame because he felt New Mexico's pre-med program was much better.

"I have aspirations of playing pro football. I have since I was a young child," Moore said. "But I also know the statistics. I know if I don't go to pro, I can still be a doctor and have a great life if it (football) stops after college."

At Roswell High, the 5-foot-11, 196-pound Moore was one of those can't-stop-him, can-only-hope-to-contain-him kind of running backs. He ran for more than 6,000 yards in three years - nearly 5,000 of them in his final two seasons and last fall scored 33 touchdowns in leading the Coyotes to the Class 4A state championship.

Roswell trailed Piedra Vista 31-7 with three minutes left in the third quarter and the favored Coyotes appeared destined for an embarrassing loss.

"Not a lot of time left, not in high school football," Moore said, recalling the Coyotes' predicament.

But Roswell staged one of the greatest comebacks in the state's prep football history, scoring 28 straight points for a 35-31 win. The Coyotes' winning touchdown drive started after Moore, also an All-State selection on defense, intercepted a Piedra Vista pass in the Roswell end zone with two minutes left in the game. It was Moore's second interception of the game to go along with 160 yards rushing and a 47-yard touchdown catch in the first half.

Roswell scored the game-winning TD on a short pass from quarterback Manny Fuentes to Abel Espinoza with 43 seconds left. Moore expected to get the call on the play, but Roswell head coach Jack Cisco decided to use him as a decoy.

"It worked out fine," Moore said. "My friend Abel was wide open in the end zone."

Roswell is pretty much an outpost on the college recruiting trail. This southeast New Mexico town is better known for its annual UFO Festival, which marks a purported nearby crash of a UFO in 1947 known as the Roswell Incident. But by the end of his junior

year, recruiters from Notre Dame, Colorado State, Nebraska, and Texas-El Paso, New Mexico and New Mexico State knew Moore was the real thing.

While Moore said he chose UNM because of its pre-med program, Cisco said Moore's sense of loyalty to his native state also was a factor. "He wants New Mexico to win," Cisco said.

"He's a very aware young man and he thinks he may be able to get other in-state recruits to look at New Mexico as a legitimate college (football) opportunity. Not many athletes of Dontrell's caliber have chosen to go to the Lobos. It's a testament to Dontrell's attitude and to the Lobos commitment to achieve success."

"Notre Dame and Nebraska wanted me, but they didn't need me," Moore said. "At UNM, I felt they needed me and I could be an asset within a year or maybe even this fall."

In sports and the classroom, Moore has been a constant success story. He averaged close to 20 points a game on the Coyote basketball team last season and played on the golf team.

Moore graduated this spring with a 3.9 grade point average while taking honors courses. He was named to the National Honor Society and was a member of a student group that mediates disputes among other students.

Moore credits mom Angela Moore, an English and special education teacher at Roswell High, with keeping him focused on academics.

"It's always been me and her. She raised me on her own," Moore said. "She instilled in me to do right and taught me academics are more important than athletics. That's why my college is paid for."

"Dontrell is not a hero," Cisco said. "He's just a good guy with a whole lot of ability."

How soon Moore will be able to show off some of that ability to Lobo fans remains a question. New Mexico coach Rocky Long said Moore might play some this coming season. The Lobos recruited three freshmen running backs and Long said if one of the trio plays well in fall camp, that one won't redshirt.
