Animal shelter targeted

With support from three Lincoln County Commissioners, the Humane Society of Lincoln County was granted \$12,500 for six months' use of the non-profit group's animal shelter on Gavilan Canyon Road.

But after lengthy questioning by Commission Chairman Rex Wilson Thursday, commissioners said they want to know more about the financial arrangement and yearly figures of the society's philanthropic side and the shelter it operates.

County Attorney Alan Morel said that for the past six years, the county's contractual agreement has allowed scrutiny of financial records, although last week was the first time County Treasurer Joan Park expressed an opinion that an audit was needed. Park said she had to pay an impound fee to reclaim

her dog and wondered if those fees were reflected in a budget presented by shelter manager Jim Riggins.

On Friday, Stewart also served notice to the society by letter that he intends to audit the finances of both the shelter and philanthropic volunteer group that owns the shelter.

After reading the letter, Commissioners Leo Martinez and L. Ray Nunley said Monday they're confused.

While Stewart wrote in the letter that commissioners voted to fund the shelter's operation for three months at \$2,083 per month, Nunley said his motion was to fund the society for six months at that figure. The motion passed with Martinez's and Commissioner Rick Simpson's votes. Wilson

Commission says no more 'jake brakes'

Use of noisy semi-truck engine brakes eliminated throughout the county, after complaints pile up

They're loud, disruptive and not necessary for safety, Lincoln County residents contended Thursday as commissioners discussed whether to ban "jake brakes" used by semi-trucks to reduce their speed.

Initially, commissioners targeted the ban just for U.S. 70 as it enters the county from Mescalero but before it hits the village of Ruidoso, which already prohibits the so-called Jacob's Engine Brakes.

But as resident after resident came forward to ask that the ban be extended to other highways, the final motion by Commissioner L. Ray Nunley prohibited the use of the braking system in unincorporated portions of the county. The motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Rick Simpson said residents of Hondo can't sleep because of the loud noise from trucks at night and proposed a ban from Ruidoso Downs to Riverside. Nunley then suggested adding U.S. 54 and U.S. 380.

A spokesman for Twin Spruce RV Park, whose complaints about the noise started the debate, said guests grouse all the time about the noise as truckers try to slow after leaving the Apache reservation and before entering a slower speed zone.

Artist Ann Templeton from Glencoe said she lives on the Rio Ruidoso, 50 feet from the highway, and the noise is continuous as truckers come down a hill and apply the

special braking system designed to save wear and overheating on regular brakes.

Gary Wells of Bonito Hollow RV Park on State Highway 37 asked to add that area because of the 300 people who may be spending the night as his customers. He was followed by Charles Reed of San Patricio and Lonnie Bressler of Elk Run Cabins on State Road 48, who asked about including the Angus area and Airport Road around Ranches of Sonterra.

Commissioner William Schwettmann said with all the additions, why not ban the brake throughout the county and "get it over with. Lots of counties do the same."

"It would be easier to draft," said County Attorney Alan Morel.

"And easier on the truck drivers to know it applied throughout the county," Schwettmann said.

Sheriff Tom Sullivan said the county will have to put up "lots of signs," not just at the entrances to the county.

"We get lots of complaints and we will enforce the best we can," he said. "But I don't have deputies to put in front of every RV park to write citations."

Simpson questioned if a county-wide ban was "overkill," because of the many isolated areas such as Pine Lodge Road. He said a new law won't relieve the problem. "It's the enforcement."

He voted for the motion "with reservations."

Commissioners keep their 8 a.m. starting time for regular sessions

Although they tabled a resolution setting their official monthly meeting time at 8 a.m., Lincoln County Commissioners will continue to convene at the earlier hour.

Commission Chairman Rex Wilson established the time Thursday at the end of a lengthy meeting that started an hour earlier than the usual 9 a.m., continued through the lunch hour and into the evening.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley, who commutes from Ruidoso, asked the staff if the earlier hour is hard on them to assemble information in the morning, but County Manager Tom Stewart said they do the work the night before the meeting.

Commissioner William Schwettmann said if the earlier hour is for the convenience of the commissioners, it's wrong.

"I want to find out what our con-

stituents think," he said. "If we're doing it for our convenience. I think it's wrong. It shouldn't be for five people getting overpaid in the first place. We're here to serve them."

Wilson said feedback from those in the audience might not be an accurate gauge because "they're the ones who made it."

Commissioner Leo Martinez said it doesn't matter to him, although it could pose a problem for business owners.

Schwettmann said the earlier hour also could become a safety issue in the winter after snow has fallen overnight.

In other business, commissioners passed a resolution proposed by Martinez noting the 10-year anniversary of Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso.

Jim Miller, campus director, thanked Stewart for helping him

Hail, rain, debris pounds Alto area

Ruidoso Downs and some of the Alto area were pelted Sunday and, to a lesser degree, Monday by torrential rain and hail.

"When it comes this much at one time, you're going to get debris, rocks and stuff because it comes so fast," said Albert Hernandez, Lincoln County's road superintendent. "Downhill residents are getting a lot of water."

Hernandez said the big problem Sunday was hail. He was told it accumulated at some spots to a depth of 6 inches.

"It plugged up about 50 percent of the culverts," Hernandez said of hail-pelted areas around Alto. "We'll be busy a week or two cleaning culverts."

Rock, mud and pine needles accompanied flows from the heavy rains and hail. The roads chief said the Fawn Ridge and Homestead Acres subdivisions, as well as Agua Fria, near Ruidoso Downs, seemed to be most impacted. Hernandez was observing the situation first hand as well in Lower Eagle Creek.

"There's a lot of debris in some yards," he said. "Some driveways are washed out."

Back hoes and a broom sweeper were being used to clear the messes. Hernandez said a blade truck was

used Sunday to scrape rocks and other materials off the northern stretch of Gavilan Canyon Road.

In Ruidoso Downs, Emergency Manager Tom Armstrong said the only real issue was along Parker Road, where rainwater rushed to reach the Rio Ruidoso.

"People were concerned because they haven't seen it in a year," Armstrong said. "When you have one inch of rain in about 30 minutes you can't help but have some problems."

Some debris was left on Parker Road after the waters subsided. And some rocks "rolled out" onto U.S. Highway 70, Armstrong said.

Nearby Westview Drive resident Joe Blaney said Sunday he saw Parker Road turn into a river. He said the village has been remiss in not addressing drainage problems in parts of the community.

"Had they maintained the original drainage and the drainage ditches the way they were designed, I don't think we'd have a problem," Blaney said. He said flooding during heavy rains has been a problem for several years.

"It's a situation that's getting worse and worse and worse," Blaney said.

But Armstrong said Sunday there was "no flooding" and "nothing like it has been before."

Ruidoso's street department director J.R. Baumann said Ruidoso most-

ly escaped the heavy rains.

"It rained pretty darn hard by the Swiss Chalet," Baumann said. "And there was brush in the road by College (Drive) and Canyon (Road)."

Baumann said road damage was avoided, though he had heard one home on Whitney Drive got water in the basement.

Flooding irks Downs people

Ruidoso Downs village officials were inundated with flooding complaints Tuesday.

"My feeling as a mother, for my children, is you don't know how terrifying it is when the water is rushing down there," Sabrina Lundquist said. She lives at River Lane where it meets Parker Road. "Sunday afternoon I was terrified. I was shaking. I didn't know what to do. It was just inches from coming in my front door."

Paul van Gulick, a resident who lives nearby and is an engineer studying drainage problems in Ruidoso






Sun Valley seeks 'escape route'

A director of the Sun Valley Sanitation District told Lincoln County commissioners Thursday an escape route must be created for residents of the area near Alto in case of wild fire.

Jerry Ligon said representatives of the district including chairman Tom Odle are talking with Bonito Volunteer Fire Department Chief Chris Denne about possible exit alternatives to the one main road into the development.

But while owners of private property that would be impacted by the use have indicated they would go along with an occasional emergency, some don't favor granting a permanent easement to the county, he said.

Discussion included putting up a gate with several assigned sets of keys.

"The status is that we have

taken all the steps, we've gotten the participation of the fire department and are going forward, pursuing agreements," he said. "Then we will come back to the commission."

But County Attorney Alan Morel said the county must have an easement to improve the route with county equipment. The easement could be for the narrow purpose of emergencies, he said.

Commissioner William Schwetzmann, who attended a recent meeting of the district on the fire hazard issue, advised the board to let the representatives move ahead. They're not asking the county to put a blade on it, he said.

Ligon agreed but said that could come later. "Not everyone has four-wheel drive," Commissioner L. Ray Stunley pointed out.

Ligon said about 400 yards of the proposed route is not even a trail, but that the terrain is "easy" and most cars could navigate it.

Commission Chairman Rex Wilson said if the route can't be connected to a main highway, as an alternative, a route could lead to a "safe zone" where people could congregate away from potential fuel for fires.

In an earlier letter to the sanitation district, Denne wrote that he is convinced one of the highest priorities of the subdivision's residents should be to "improve survivability" during a wild fire.

Ligon said one of the possible routes involves going through Cottonwood Canyon to tie into Fox Road and State Highway 48.

In a June 22 letter to the commission, Odle wrote that lives, not just property, are at risk.

He urged the county to apply for grant money to reduce the fire hazard in the area. "Such participation would inevitably involve the county in responsibility and authority as an active player in fire hazard reduction," Odle wrote.

voted against it. Martinez said he doesn't understand why Stewart, Park and Wilson are so intent on the finances of the humane society when they seem to ignore other contractual services that cost much more.

"As far as I can recall, we've only asked for financial information from the lodging (operators) who pay into the Lodger's Tax fund," he said.

Martinez added, "They don't provide a service. We're just checking to ensure they pay the right amount in tax. The chairman also wanted information on the Hondo Public Health Clinic before we allocated \$180,000 from the special property tax levy approved by voters. He wasn't asking for an audit of the company that manages the clinic, La Casa de Buena Salud. This seems totally out of the norm. It seems they only want this information when it's something they don't support and don't want funded."

Stewart proposed as an alternative to the humane society, that inmates from the county jail care for impounded dogs and cats at the jail annex and that a veterinarian be hired to kill the animals after 72 hours.

Another alternative would be to use the Otero County impound, he said. A spokesman for that facility

contacted last week said it is full during the summer. A 72-hour kill approach also is used there if dogs are not adopted or reclaimed, the spokesman said.

Riggins told commissioners the county could end up paying a lot more than it planned even with rapid extermination of the impounded pets, because instead of bringing them to the shelter — which would have to turn away animals from unincorporated sections of the county — they would keep the impound officer busy by claiming their unwanted litters were strays.

Wilson said the county is obligated only to provide the legal minimum — shelter for animals impounded by the sheriff's office. Public money shouldn't be expended for the mistakes of irresponsible animal owners, he has said.

Wilson said he also wants to know that public money isn't being funneled into the philanthropic side of the society. He grilled Riggins on sources of income and said it appeared that public money may be comingled with donations.

Spokeswoman Ellen Lucas said Monday that, if anything, the philanthropic side has to subsidize the shelter because the money collected from the county and the villages of Ruidoso, Capitan and Ruidoso Downs isn't enough to cover expenses.

Donations and revenue from money-raising functions are used to pay for spay and neuter procedures, to repair, enlarge and expand the shelter and for education programs, she said.

In his letter, Stewart listed the financial information he will require for the audit and asked the society to coordinate the "activity" with the other entities contributing public money.

Lucas took exception to the word "contribute." She pointed out that the shelter provides a service to the county for a fee, similar to a company managing the hospital, a contractor building a fire station or an electrician repairing equipment.

The society will listen to commission suggestions about ways to verify residency of people who bring pets and will try to satisfy questions about the finances, she said.

secure a grant from the state Highway and Transportation Department to pave the learning center's parking lot off Mechem Drive in Ruidoso.

He also announced that a building-trades program is starting at high schools in the county and thanked Martinez for attending a reception not-

ing the campus anniversary.

Commissioners deferred action on a resolution declaring an emergency in the agricultural community and referred the information for recommendation from the county Rural and Agricultural Affairs Committee and the Public Land Use Advisory Council.

The resolution directs the attorney general to investigate if anti-trust laws are being vio-

lated, specifically in the area of grain sales, and to determine if the U.S. Forest Service failed to fulfill its obligation to manage the national forests and reduce the threat of catastrophic wild fires.

Stewart also announced that the county netted \$56,560 from a recent auction of surplus equipment after deducting the auctioneer's commission and other expenses.

Downs, said he walked Parker Road on Sunday and it was flooded with about a foot of water. Lundquist said tree branches and other debris sped along on the rushing water.

"There is a lot of extra drainage off (U.S. 70)," van Gulick said. He said a drainage ditch along Parker Road is not large enough to handle the runoff during heavy rains.

"It was a decision by the (state) highway department ... that got us into this," van Gulick said. "The village is working to remediate it."

Lundquist pressed for immediate relief after she said her house was surrounded by water on three sides and "the

road surrounding my property was a raging river."

Nearby resident Joe Blaney contended flooding in the northeast part of the community has gotten worse since the village purchased acreage near the highway and Parker Road and filled in the land.

"The ditch (along Parker Road) has been there for years," Blaney said. "Up until the last couple of years it's handled it. Maintenance has been null and void."

Some other residents said runoff and mud are problems on Colorado Lane on the other side of the village.

"I see it getting a little worse with every rain," said Susan Garrett, who lives on Colorado Lane.

Van Gulick said he would

meet with Ruidoso Downs public works officials to put together some short-term relief until long-term solutions are devised.

"The ditch on Parker Road should be trenched out," van Gulick said. "Every rain it fills back in with silt. That's going to have to happen every time we get a big rain like that."

Barriers also will be recommended for some properties at Parker and River lanes. Van Gulick, who called the situation "a disaster waiting to happen," said a concrete ditch will be needed to take runoff along Parker Road to the Rio Ruidoso.

Mayor Bob Miller said drainage problems will be fixed by the village, even if he has to take care of it himself.

U.S. 70 work starts

Road construction is under way on U.S. Highway 70, involving a 16-mile segment east of Riverside.

Both the east and west bound lanes, from mile post 302 to 318, will be impacted by construction between 6:30 a.m. and 7:30 p.m., Monday through Thursday.

The speed limit in the construction zone has been reduced to 55 miles per hour.

Officials are warning motorists that the New Mexico State Police, sheriff's department and the state transportation department will be enforcing all posted speed limits and construction signing.

First comprehensive planning effort launched by Downs

A long-term planning effort toward the adoption of a first-ever village comprehensive plan, has started in Ruidoso Downs. Infrastructure issues will top the agenda. "Our number one priority is water," said Gladys Dillard, village clerk. "Number two is sewers. We want the entire utility master plan addressed," she told managers of Engineers Inc., a New Mexico consulting firm that will assist in creation of a draft plan. "You're going to have this much growth," said Jim Creek, of

Engineers Inc. of the process toward a current comprehensive plan. "You're going to need this much in water rights." Village officials pledged to provide Engineers Inc. already collected data to help the firm assemble a comprehensive plan and infrastructure plan. "We've got a pretty good idea of what our growth will be," said Dennis Riddle, the village's public works department supervisor. "We need help with water rights and wells." Mayor Bob Miller said Ruidoso Downs is looking at growth and annexations, meaning water and

sewer services will need to be expanded. "We need to do something about our water system," Miller said. "It's old. We're supplying a subdivision with a two-inch pipe and it's corroded." Miller said with a doubling of the village's population during the 1990s, infrastructure must be addressed. Drainage problems, which village officials said were being looked at, need to be a part of long range planning as well, Miller said. "Isn't the state responsible for drainage with the highway?" village Trustee Judy Miller asked

about U.S. Highway 70. Creek responded affirmatively. "Let's get with them, address that with them," she said of the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department. "Have them fix it. We have an upside and a downside in this village. It's because they made a big boo-boo here," she said, citing drainage changes caused by the new five-lane highway. A village water plan, described as 80 percent done, would be included in the comprehensive plan. Trustee Jim Bassett said that water plan needed to be finished.

"It has been 80 percent done for a year and a half now," Bassett said. Dillard said Ruidoso Downs will also have to look at the village's infrastructure capital improvements plan, which will mesh with long-range planning. ICIP prioritizes capital improvements, and is used to try to secure federal and state funding help for the projects. Engineers Inc. officials said public hearings later this year will go into much of the detail needed for the planning process. A master comprehensive plan is expected to be ready for village council adoption in early 2002, Dillard said.

Long-distance calling cut twice

Long distance phone service in and out of Ruidoso took two hits in the past week. After problems making long-distance phone calls late last week, Valor Telecom said the service was restored Friday for Ruidoso customers. But service was interrupted again Saturday night into Sunday. The first problem was detected Thursday morning and impacted both incoming and outgoing long-distance calls. Valor said technicians were working with 16 other

telecommunications companies to update codes that feed into systems that interconnect service in Ruidoso. A few of the firms did not complete the identification code updates until Friday afternoon, when service resumed, Valor said in a press release. Long-distance services were restored Friday afternoon. The second outage was pinned on a cut U.S. West fiber optic cable near Artesia. That impacted a wide area of south-eastern New Mexico.

Neighbors allege verbal assault on each other

Two neighbors on Chaparral Drive told police they were each verbally assaulted by the other late on July 18. One of the men was reportedly upset with the other for allegedly spinning a flashlight into his home. Each of the men claimed

the other's verbal assault was an effort to entice a violent episode. A police report stated no other evidence was available to determine which, if any side, may have committed a verbal assault.

Downs hires new administrator, ups ante

Carlsbad's public works chief is selected to direct a growing village.

Ruidoso Downs hired a new administrator Tuesday night, and paid more than the top advertised salary. Village trustees approved John P. Waters, Carlsbad's public works department director. Walters was recommended by a selection committee that included government managers from Lincoln County and Ruidoso. The village had advertised the position with a salary range of \$37,080 to \$55,621, depending on qualifications. In a July 20 letter to Mayor Bob Miller, Waters sought a salary of \$68,800. "He receives \$58,500 where

he's at now," said Trustee Judy Miller. "Our attorney said that should not be a problem because it would cost us more to go out and advertise again." Waters' letter to the mayor also asked a 3-percent increase in 90 days, a staff vehicle to drive to and from work and for village business trips, 100 percent village-paid health insurance coverage, a \$125 monthly clothing allowance and 10 working days' vacation that would become available upon employment. Noting \$66,816 is budgeted during the July 1, 2001 to June 30, 2002 fiscal year for the position, Trustee Jim Bassett said it would likely be a couple of months before Waters came on board. Bassett said the office's fiscal year budget would thus cover the higher salary. "In the long run, I think he's going to save us a lot," Trustee

Miller said. The mayor said Waters was experienced in management and had captured a number of grants in his municipal employment. Hiring Waters, trustees also approved the \$68,800 salary plus benefits package. Waters said in his letter that once he received an official letter of award from Ruidoso Downs he would provide the city of Carlsbad with four weeks' notice. Waters will become Ruidoso Downs' second village administrator. The position was created in late 1999 and filled in early 2000 by Bob Durrett, who had been an associate administrator with the Ysleta Independent School District in El Paso. Durrett resigned the Ruidoso Downs position less than five months later.

Double standards cut both ways

The county is traveling a slippery road

Double standards don't play well anywhere. Yet, Lincoln County Commissioner Chairman Rex Wilson, County Manager Tom Stewart and County Treasurer Joan Park appear to have embarked on a double standard of significant proportions in their handling of the contractual service of the non-profit Humane Society of Lincoln County.

An honest difference of opinion is one thing. Wilson and Stewart have stated they think the county's only obligation is to house animals picked up by the county impounding officer. Stewart proposes that jail inmates care for the dogs and cats at an old jail annex and that a veterinarian be hired to kill the animals after 72 hours.

They apparently don't see any reason to provide an additional service to their constituents by ensuring they have a place to bring pets or strays, where they will receive humane treatment and a chance to be returned to an owner or adopted.

The double standard emerged Thursday when Park called for an audit of the society, a volunteer group that has worked for two decades to improve the plight of abandoned animals. Wilson questioned shelter manager Jim Riggins not only about the operation of the shelter, which also serves Ruidoso, Capitan and Ruidoso Downs, but about the volunteer organization's money-raising efforts.

Donated money goes to

spay and neuter programs, aimed at ending the overbreeding problem, to repair, improve and enlarge the shelter and for educational programs, Riggins told commissioners. That money has nothing to do with the government service provided at the shelter.

Commissioners L. Ray Nunley and Leo Martinez seemed to understand the difference.

The question commissioners should ask is whether the service provided is worth the fee, as they would with any other contractual service — be it an electrician, an architect, a computer company or Presbyterian HealthCare Services, which operates the county-owned hospital.

Wilson set that standard in the past when Martinez called for more financial details about Presbyterian, the non-profit corporation, and was told the firm only needed to account for how the public money from a special property tax levy was spent and to show financial year-end statements to ensure the commission that the county's hospital is operating in the black.

Financial disclosure is a wonderful practice. Maybe it's time elected officials disclose to the public all of their sources of income, government subsidies and outstanding loans so that the public can evaluate their operations and alliances.

After all, they collect a tidy check for their "contractual service" to voters.

Cars and school busses will have to stop on the inside lane of the four lane highway before turning left into driveways and side roads. This will be very dangerous, and could be easily fixed with an additional turning lane. (In the current design there are only three turning lanes for the 350 exits in the 37 miles between Riverside and Ruidoso). Without additional turning lanes, we will have the same dangerous conditions we have with the present highway.

Why attack my character and my intentions, when I am only fighting for the safety of our community?

Yes... we care about our fate and will fight for the right road design to fit the needs of the valley and its people. Take in account that this same highway department designed this present dangerous highway. Why is it so wrong to be critical and object to another dangerous design? I will not lose this opportunity to mitigate the safety issues. I have never heard anyone in the valley call it "our highway" as you stated, we are not that dumb; we know that it is a federal highway, maintained with tax dollars.

I understand that the highway design through the Hondo Valley is an engineer's nightmare because of the layout of the narrow pristine Valley. So why is it so hard to take a closer look at alternative bypass routes? It is time that we start thinking of the growth in the future and build a highway that will not be outdated in 10 to 20 years. Why must we rush this project without asking for a better road design that will really save lives and enhance the commerce in the whole state?

No more coffins

To the editor:

I regret that the Ruidoso News, in defending the expansion of U.S. 70 through the Hondo Valley, had to resort to a vicious personal attack against those of who are concerned about the impact of the highway on our valley community.

We do care about the 17 people who have been killed in our valley; we care so much that some of us personally helped build the coffin for 6-year-old Cisco Aragon, the wonderful son of one of our employees, who was killed three months ago at MM 278. We care so much that we have carefully read the massive Environmental Impact Statement, from cover to cover, memorized and gone over every detail. We care so much that we have attended lengthy meetings and listened to the highway consultants promise over and over that our questions and concerns will be answered; we care so much that we have repeatedly requested the state to put in writing their "promises" and we care so much we have waited in vain for their written response.

Some of us care so much that we have memorized the bus routes of the five school buses that carry our 180 children to our homes on a daily basis, searching for a safe place for the buses to stop and turn without being slammed into by oncoming traffic or rear-ended by fast-moving trucks.

We care so much that we have repeatedly protested the fact that our school buses will be expected to

turn across moving traffic from the inside lane of a high-speed highway; we care so much that we have passed out and signed petitions begging for safe turning lanes and wider shoulders instead of concrete barriers and four-foot shoulders limiting our ability to move off the highway.

I doubt that anyone at the Ruidoso News cares one iota about our safety. Has anyone at the newspaper bothered to look at or read the EIS study? Has anyone... shown the slightest amount of skepticism about the ability of the state to design a safe four-lane highway — the same highway department who designed the "dangerous" highway that presently passes through our valley? I think not.

Before you attack our character and our intentions, reflect on the fact that the valley, unlike the section from Ruidoso to Tularosa, is extremely narrow. There is no room to build a four-lane highway with a median; there is no room to build a highway that allows school buses room for safe stops and turns; there is no room for a high-speed truck route.

And there is no room in your hearts, and no compassion, for the 180 school children who will be asked to sit in our buses and endure the risks of being killed on a daily basis.

We have a right to be skeptical about any designs the highway department puts forward. We have paid for their mistakes with our blood, we are not strangers to death. This time, we want to have some say on the question of our fate. Because we care, we have taken the time to look at what turns out to be a faulty, ill-conceived design.

Regrettably, we don't trust the highway department to correct their own errors when they have published a design that, if carried out, would lead to more carnage, more funerals and more coffins.

What about people pollution in the national forests?

A herd of 20,000 spread out across Bear Valley in the Boise National Forest of Idaho. They trampled vegetation, kicked up dust and had to be kept out of streams where salmon spawn. They weren't cattle; they were hippies.

Members of the Rainbow Family of Living Light have been staging these love-ins in national forests over the Fourth of July holiday for three decades. Not having jobs, they got a little longer holiday than most of us so the event lasted 10 days. The environmental degradation from such a large group of people is considerable, even if they are on their best behavior.

The New York Times said the Rainbows are interested in peace, love and marijuana, but not necessarily in that order. In addition to dancing and music, they like to "bliss out," a Rainbow term for wandering around and enjoying the gathering. Not all was bliss, however. Some of the members got "Rainbow runs," which meant a quick trip to the bathroom, if they could find one.

A cattleman who paid the Forest Service for a permit to turn out 375 cow/calf pairs in the same meadow deferred doing so. The rancher would

have been required to follow stringent regulations in grazing his cattle. The hippies, however, don't worry about regulations; although the Forest Service is said to have spent a half million dollars trying to keep them under control. In addition, that taxpayer bill doesn't include the money spent by local communities in dealing with theft and medical emergencies (mostly drug overdoses) as the group assembled and then left.

The Sierra Club is campaigning to end commercial logging on the national forests, but fails to acknowledge the problems caused by people on those same public lands. New York Times reporter Douglas Jehl says the people problems are getting worse over time. "By virtue of their openness to one and all, the forests are more and more the home to the unusual, the criminal and the bizarre," he says.

Farm Bureau supports a multiple use concept for public lands, but it doesn't stretch so far as to include the unusual, criminal and bizarre. What Farm Bureau and others have in mind by multiple use is protecting the natural values in the forest while allowing careful use of the resources. Environmental groups generally don't accept the concept and keep up a steady drumbeat against logging, drilling and grazing — the things

local communities need to sustain their economies. The drums were silent, however about the hippies entering what the Forest Service called one of the most sensitive watersheds in the state.

One writer to the Idaho Statesman letters to the editor column put this in perspective. He accused environmental groups of ignoring the Rainbow gathering, and said, "If you are politically correct by their thinking you get a free ticket to destroy delicate environments, but shame on a rancher if a cow goes near a creek." Now, isn't that the truth.

In the aftermath of a hot, dry spring

Two charged with starting Musketball, Homestead fires

Two Ruidoso area men have been charged for their alleged separate roles in the starts of the Musketball and Homestead fires.

An assistant district attorney filed criminal complaints against Mark W. Mobley, 37, and Lemuel M. Flanary, 82. Each is charged with misdemeanor improper handling of fire.

"I was really kind of sur-

prised," Mobley said Tuesday, not long after being served with the complaint. "I didn't think it would come down to this."

Mobley is accused of causing the April 1 Musketball Fire, which burned 125 acres immediately north of Ruidoso. An authorized slash pile burn got away from Mobley. Several neighborhoods were evacuated.

The day after the Musketball Fire started, Mobley said he felt "horrible"

about the blaze, but added he felt he did everything right. He said he even called the sheriff's department shortly before starting what was to have been a controlled burn.

Questioned by a sheriff's department investigator after the fire had moved off his property in the Alpine Village area, Mobley said he was burning brush piles allowed by a state-issued open-burning permit. Gasoline was used to start the fire, a report stat-

ed. Mobley also told Lincoln County Sheriff's Department Sergeant Jackie Raines that the only equipment he had was a shovel.

While a water source was listed on the burning permit as a method of control, the investigator said no water was at the location. The permit also prohibits the use of petroleum products.

Flanary is pointed to as the person responsible for triggering the June 1 Homestead

Fire. The blaze consumed about 200 acres of both private and national forest lands. The Homestead Acres Subdivision, east of Ruidoso, was evacuated for a time.

Flanary told investigators that he normally smoked two cigars each day, one in the morning and another shortly after lunch. He also told the investigators that he would throw the cigars in a can in his workshop or outside on the

area resident

hill next to his carport.

Several cigar butts were recovered on the hill next to Flanary's carport, according to a sheriff's department report. The investigation determined that the fire's point of origin was where the cigar butts were found at the cor-

ner of a carport.

Flanary was unavailable for comment on Tuesday.

Conviction on a petty misdemeanor could bring a maximum six-month jail term and/or a fine of up to \$500.

ARE HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE AND AMD LINKED?

According to a recent study by the University Medical Center in Stony Brook, New York, people with high blood pressure may be at an increased risk of developing age-related macular degeneration (AMD). This is a disease that results in a progressive loss of vision due to deterioration of nerve tissue in the retina. Although a few risk factors for this condition have been confirmed, the researchers did determine that high blood pressure, or hypertension, is associated with the development of AMD.

Of the two forms of AMD, non-neovascular and neovascular, it is the neovascular form which accounts for 90% of severe vision loss. The researchers determined that patients with advanced macular degeneration were more likely to have high blood pressure, compared with the subjects in the normal 'control' group. For the purposes of this study, high blood pressure was defined as a diastolic pressure greater than 95 millimeters of mercury. "Neovascular AMD cases were more than 4 times as likely to have elevated diastolic blood pressure...than controls, and the (odds ratio) was much higher among persons with these pressure levels who were also using (high blood pressure) medication," the researchers write. Non-neovascular AMD does not seem to be associated with high blood pressure.

While there is no cure for AMD, exciting surgical techniques to repair the damaged retina are in the early stages of research. The National Eye Institute of the National Institutes of Health is supporting an ongoing study on the relation between macular degeneration and certain antioxidant vitamins. The hope is that the vitamins can lessen the occurrence and severity of the disease. Amsler grid testing is used to detect early signs of AMD.





A rainy Rainbow

Top qualifier for Rainbow Futurity fastest again; last year's winner takes the derby during a wet day at the racetrack

Getting caught at the wire to come in second was Phenomenal Fantasy and jockey Roy Baldillez. Phenomenal Fantasy is trained by C. Dwayne Glibreath and owned by R. D. Hubbard and John Jones Jr.

Coming in third was First Regards with jockey Jacky Martin for owner Ramich Farms. First Regards is

trained by Jack W. Brooks.

SC Chiseled In Stone, with jockey J.R. Valenzuela aboard, was the only horse to qualify for both the Ruidoso Quarter Horse Futurity and the Rainbow Futurity this year. SC Chiseled In Stone ran fourth for owner SMS Racing and trainer Tony E. Sedillo.

Doing Magic paid \$14.20 to win, \$5.20 to place and \$3.80 to show. The 3-1 exacta returned \$49.40 and First Regards completed the \$94.50 trifecta. "When you raise a horse and begin to run him, it starts to show how insignificant the decisions we make (are). It depends on what the Lord does, and he allows us to experience this. I feel truly blessed for the experience," J.E. Jumonville Jr. said.

Coming in second was the favorite, Whosleavingwho, which went to the gates undefeated in five races. Whosleavingwho is owned by James Geiler and Kim A. Kessinger. The horse was ridden by G.R. Carter for trainer John Bassett.

Today's earnings of \$81,619 in the \$163,237 Rainbow Derby brings Feature Mr Jess's lifetime earnings to \$503,120.

Calgary Cannons sign deal to move to Albuquerque in 2003

The Triple A franchise is signed and sealed, now it waits for renovations of Albuquerque Sports Stadium to finally be delivered.

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) - The next step in bringing minor league baseball back to the Duke City has been finalized, the mayor's office announced Friday.

The owners of the Calgary Cannons Triple A franchise have completed and signed a purchase agreement with a group of Albuquerque investors who want to have the team here in time for the 2003 season.

"We are delighted that we have completed this issue and we look forward to progressing to the start of construction on the stadium," one of the team's owners, Ken Young, told Mayor Jim Baca in a letter dated July

19. Young and fellow businessmen Emmett Hammond and Mike Koldyke first announced in January they had bought the Canadian team.

Albuquerque was left without a pro baseball team when the Albuquerque Dukes franchise was sold last year to a group in Portland, Ore. The Dukes were members of the PCL and were the top farm team of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Albuquerque residents in May approved a bond issue that will provide up to \$15 million to renovate the 32-year-old Albuquerque Sports Stadium, the former home of the Dukes. They voted in favor of renovation rather than building a new stadium.

Approval of the bond issue was essential to bringing the Cannons to Albuquerque. The renovation is expected to be completed in time for the 2003 season.

The baseball stadium issue became a big topic in Albuquerque in recent months and created heated discussions among residents and politicians.

Baca favored building a stadium downtown to spur the area's economy, while

others wanted to renovate the existing stadium to save money.

City Councilor Greg Payne said before the special election on May 30 that people want to do things to improve Albuquerque's quality of life, but they don't want any more financial black holes.

Gwen Poe, spokeswoman for the Strike Three Committee, which opposes use of the bonds for the stadium, said investors should pay for bringing baseball back to Albuquerque.

On Friday, Poe filed a complaint against Baca with the city's ethics board. She accused the mayor of creating a false sense of urgency to set up the special election and of using funds earmarked for other projects.

Baca called the complaint "another sour grapes attempt at stopping baseball."

"The public has voted, and resoundingly so, that they want baseball back," the mayor told Albuquerque television station KOB-TV on Friday.

The Ethics Board is expected to consider the complaint against the mayor at its next meeting in September.

NMSU faces cutbacks

Aggies may sell naming rights to corporations

■ A regents meeting in Ruidoso brings proposed changes in funding for the athletics department that would reduce its \$3 million deficit.

New Mexico State University regents have approved a deficit reduction plan for the university's athletics department that will offer "naming rights" to corporations and cut costs within the department.

The decision was made during a board meeting held in Ruidoso.

The state Commission on Higher Education still must approve the plan. NMSU athletics director Brian Faison said he believes the commission will pass it.

The athletics department has an estimated \$3 million deficit, blamed on low ticket sales to sporting events and too much spending by the department.

The regents approved the deficit-reduction plan Friday without formal discussion.

The plan projects the department will earn \$1.3 million, after expenses, over the next eight years.

Faison said after the meeting that the "naming rights" portion of the plan is the most important. About \$15 million could be earned through individual or corporate "naming rights," such as a building being named after a person or business who donates money to NMSU.

The school has to secure \$2 million in naming rights by 2008 or 2009, Faison said.

The athletics department also is cutting costs this year through a hiring freeze on its marketing coordinator and promotion positions and reducing departmental memberships, press guide printing costs and the football charter, aircraft size and accompanying travel party.

The department also will discontinue Aggie Sports Network Español and reduce the network's self-produced television games as well as special events ushers and security personnel for athletic events; end special events cleaning service for athletics trailers; and change Sun Belt Conference travel for the men's and women's basketball teams.

Regent Larry Sheffield of Las Cruces said the plan was a creative attempt to lower the department deficit.

"We have to look at any and all ways to shore it up, and put us back in the black," Larry Sheffield, NMSU regent

plans to schedule football guarantee games on a more regional basis, which will result in more money for the program and more chances for fans to attend road games. The team will also play a minimum of five home football games a season to lower travel costs.

The school also will work with the Sun Belt Conference to increase the number of football-playing institutions to eight to further lower travel costs, work with the conference to increase divisional play in volleyball, softball and baseball to reduce travel costs, and work to cut the number of administrative and head coaches.

Fishing report for the Ruidoso area as of July 25, 2001

Ruidoso River: The low rate on the river is still very low despite the low rains in the past days. Look for New Mexico Game and Fish to decrease the quantity of fish stocked for the rest of the year. Production cannot keep up with demand. So remember to "Catch and Release" as often as you can if you want to continue to find fish. The best subsurface fly selections for Rainbows or Browns remain the Bead Head Pheasant Tail nymphs or Bead Head Prince nymphs. Green Rock worms and Bead Head Caddis Larva continue as producing patterns. A few fish were taken on Parachute Adams and Stimulators. Hopper season is here and along a few of your favorite hopper patterns. One new pattern called a 30FT nymph is catching fish. **Summit Lake:** No change here. The low rate is in danger of stopping in place. One still needs to take a walk up the stream to find fish. Once found they are healthy and hungry. The fish here are not fussy. Caddis fly flies and small nymphs of just about any pattern will work here. **Benito Lake:** As has been stated for sev-

eral weeks, Humpties, Dark Hendricksons, and Parachute Adams flies have been consistent producers before dark on the main lake body. A revised fly combination as a dropper behind your dry fly offering may bring an unexpected take. For the spin cast fishermen, try a hot pink renegade pattern propeller fly or a back with grizzly hackle propeller fly behind a bubble fly. **Eagle Lakes:** The fishing has been reported as being well. If you want to check daily activity on Eagle Lakes, call 336-4968 for the latest. The day fee has gone up to \$10.00 per day per person. Reason given is that since the fish hatchery in Mesquite in closed, costs of transporting fish from as far away as Arizona have to be covered. Damsel fly patterns have been working along with Black Humpties, Parachute Adams, and Blue Wing Olives. **Greenwood:** This lake has really slowed down the past few days. The surface water temperature has increased a degree due to the excessive sunshine. Fish here continue to do best by fishing a streamer fly and stripping a dark

wooly bugger with some flash or a streamer 8 to 10 feet deep. Damsel fly imitations have been working well. For spin casters, be on an Olive or Black fly pattern behind a bubble fly and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the bars down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water. **Lake Mesquite:** The lake level is quite low but is fishing well. Dark wooly buggers continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito, or Hendrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk. Please practice Catch and Release whenever and wherever you can. We have moved our local shop. The new address is 2501 Sudderth Drive. UNM gets 9 early renovation bids for the Pit

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) — Nine architectural groups have submitted preliminary proposals to renovate the University of New Mexico's basketball arena, commonly called the Pit.

One of the bidders is the original designer of the arena, Joe Boehning, chairman of the board for Flatfoot Moore Schaefer McCabe architects in Albuquerque.

"I sure do want to have a hand in it," Boehning said.

"There's not anyone around anymore who knows much about the Pit, all its idiosyncrasies."

Most of the preliminary proposals came from partnerships between local and national architects.

The university wants to make the Pit more modern. UNM officials would like to renovate restrooms and the concourse, upgrade concessions and bring the building up to

standards of the Americans with Disabilities Act.

UNM's senior associate athletic director Bill McGillis said the university will review the proposals over the next few weeks.

"Then there may be a second phase which would include in-person presentations by firms deemed to be finalists," he said.

The university will make its recommendation to the regents in four to six weeks, McGillis

said. The regents have the final say.

The chosen group would have to submit a feasibility study by Dec. 1, including conceptual design information and a very preliminary cost estimate, McGillis said.



Problems curtail Ruidoso's long-distance phone service

■ Unrelated problems involving access codes and fiber-optic cable twice left consumers with no way to place or receive long-distance telephone calls.

Long distance phone service in and out of Ruidoso took a couple of hits in the past week.

After some reported problems making long-distance phone calls late last week, Valor Telecom said the service was restored Friday for Ruidoso customers. But the service was interrupted again Saturday night into Sunday morning.

The first problem was detected Thursday morning and continued into early Friday, a company official said. The problem impacted both

incoming and outgoing long-distance calling.

Valor said technicians were working with 16 other telecommunications companies to update identification codes that feed into systems that interconnect service in Ruidoso.

A few of the telecommunications firms did not complete the identification code updates until Friday afternoon, Valor said in a press release. The delayed updating affected some long-distance service. The long-distance services were reported restored Friday afternoon.

The second outage was pinned on a cut Qwest fiber optic cable near Artesia.

That interruption impacted Ruidoso area Valor customers, as well as phone subscribers at six other southeast New Mexico Valor Telecom areas.

Oct. 18 — Pleadings and Legal Forms, presented by attorney Richard A. Hawthorne and Clydene Hull, trial court administrative assistant.

High school arsonists reported as missing

SANTA FE (AP) — Two teens who were on probation for their role in a fire that caused \$1 million worth of damage at Santa Fe High School last year have been missing for two months, police said.

Police identified one of them as 16-year-old Colter Gollihugh but would not release the name or age of the other teen.

Gollihugh's father, Dwight, said he is "worried to death" about his son who left home May 18.

Police believe Gollihugh may be with another teen who has been missing since May 15.

Gollihugh was one of five males accused of setting the fire that gutted the high school's administration building Oct. 25.

Gollihugh was ordered to serve two years probation after he pleaded guilty to larceny, criminal damage to property and conspiracy charges in April.

Since his sentencing, Gollihugh had been attending Santa Fe Community College, working on a general-equivalency diploma and had held a job as a cook at the Zia Diner, his father said.

Police issued a warrant July 18 for Colter Gollihugh's arrest, charging a probation violation. He has brown hair and brown eyes, is 6-foot-2-inches tall, weighs 175 pounds and has a tattoo of a dragon holding a globe on his upper back, Deputy Police Chief Beverly Lennen said.

Highlands' Rael quitting

LAS VEGAS (AP) — New Mexico Highland's University president Selimo Rael will be

paid \$175,000 and will relinquish virtually all of his power, the Las Vegas Daily Optic reported last week.

Citing a source who would speak only on the condition of anonymity, the Optic reported that Rael signed off on the agreement and will announce his retirement Aug. 17.

Rael has been on vacation since June 25.

He had been president of his alma mater since 1995. His administration has been marked by financial turmoil and a recent decline in enrollment at the main campus, but also by significant growth at the school's centers in Rio Rancho, Espanola, Farmington and Santa Fe.

Drug testing planned

DEMING (AP) — Drug testing could become a reality for student-athletes at Deming High School if officials can come up with an enforceable policy.

Assistant Principal Carey Chambers went before the school board last week in a continued push for a drug testing policy.

"We want a deterrent," Chambers said. "There's just no place for it."

Chambers, who is also the school's athletic director, said he's heard horror stories of drug-use among athletes.

The district's main concern is in finding an enforceable policy that will stand up in court.

The school had considered testing all students involved in extracurricular activities.

However, Chambers said the latest proposal is limited to student-athletes. It includes students involved in dance, cheerleading and band.

"We need this," Chambers said. "I could tell you horror stories. People are coming forward with information about what's

going on ... before games, in locker rooms."

The proposal calls for random testing of two athletes from each in-season sport, once a month. Violations could mean suspension or expulsion from participation in sports.

The district has looked at policies based on programs in Ruidoso and Portales Schools.

"I think that we need to go on real strong record (in support of this)," Superintendent Hector Madrid said.

Las Cruces' Gonzales accepts Compton post

LAS CRUCES (AP) — Las Cruces Public Schools Superintendent Jesse L. Gonzales has announced that he accepted the top post of a troubled California school district.

"It's time to go," he said during a news conference Tuesday.

The contract for Gonzales, which calls for a \$165,000 annual salary, is identical to the one he and Compton Unified School District officials signed June 20.

Gonzales, 64, had withdrawn his application June 22, citing recurring ulcer problems, high blood pressure and a lack of clarity of what his duties would be as Compton superintendent.

The Compton district has been run by the state for the last eight years. Control was only gradually going to be given to the new superintendent, and Gonzales had trouble initially getting the state to clarify his duties.

But phone calls last week from state officials and even a few Los Angeles celebrities asking him to take the job made him realize how much the state wanted him to take over the district, he said. "It's nice to be wanted," he said.

Gonzales has been with the Las Cruces district for the past 12 years.

Lincoln County nearly took a huge step back Thursday in its treatment of lost or abandoned animals.

When I report on this story on the regular news pages, I try hard to remain neutral and just list the facts of what happens.

Although 10 years ago I was active in the humane society, today, I have personal and professional commitments that prevent my participation.

During the county commission meeting Thursday, County Manager Tom Stewart proposed as one alternative to paying the humane society \$25,000 for use of its shelter, that inmates from the county jail care for animals picked up by the county animal control officer.

They would be housed in the old jail annex and killed after 72 hours by a veterinarian contractual service.

Commission Chairman Rex Wilson indicated he supports the manager's recommendation to either move in that direction, contract with Otero County's already over crowded shelter - which also has a 72-hour kill policy - or pay the humane society for just those animals brought in by the sheriff's control officer.

Last year that number was about one-fifth of the total animals taken to the shelter from the county. Ruidoso, Captain and Ruidoso Downs contract with the society for the care of animals from their areas.

As far as Stewart and Wilson are concerned that is the only obligation they must meet. Animals abandoned and allowed to breed uncontrolled are somebody else's problem as long as the sheriff isn't called.

What I don't understand is that on one hand, they want pet

owners to be responsible for their animals and not bother the county, but on the other hand, they haven't enacted licensing and neutering laws that would contribute to that happening and generate revenue to offset any expenses.

Apparently, they don't agree with Gandhi that a civilization is judged by how it treats its animals.

Fortunately, Commissioners Leo Martinez and L. Ray Nunley stood by the efforts of the society and the many volunteers who gives hours of service to benefit the animals.

Although Commissioner Rick Simpson was interested in the more limited approach of paying per dog, he voted with Nunley and Martinez to allocate \$12,500 for six months and then re-evaluate the situation. Commissioner Bill Schwettmann left early and wasn't there for the debate.

More next week, because I think it's time people in the county and seasonal residents speak out on how they want their lost pets treated.
