The Kid rides again

Old Lincoln recalls its colorful, tragic past with a pageant this weekend

In the tradition of the wild Lincoln of 1878, the great escape of Billy the Kid will be reenacted this weekend for the 66th year as part of Old Lincoln Days.

Much of this year's pageant will be dedicated to the memory of the late Betty Shrecengost, who took part in the event for more than 50 years, narrowly surpassing the participation of the late Dan Storm, a well-known local columnist who died in 1999.

John Shrecengost will complete his eighth year as Billy the Kid in the pageant this weekend.

"Most of the people who participate keep coming back," said Kent McInnes, in his sixth year as

pageant president and 25th year in the role of Sheriff Peppin.

Pageant performances will span the three-day event, Friday through Sunday. Curtain time for the first two days is 8:30 p.m., with a 3 p.m. enactment on Sunday.

Also dedicated to Shrecengost will be a 2 p.m. fiddler's contest Saturday in the park across the street from the pageant grounds on U.S. 380, Lincoln's main street.

The parade that also marks the end of a multi-day trail ride sponsored by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Posse and the delivery of a mail pouch to the Lincoln

Downs clerk fired; mayor won't say why

A special village council meeting may be called for confirmation of Carol Virden as replacement

Ruidoso Downs' village clerk/treasurer, on the job for 16 months, has been suspended by Mayor Bob Miller.

Gladys Dillard received a letter Friday telling her to remove her personal items from village hall and turn in village property.

Only saying she was "shocked," Dillard declined any further comment. She said that was the advice of her attorney.

The letter, signed by Miller, stated, "I am exercising my prerogative as Mayor of the Village of Ruidoso Downs ... to suspend your employment with the village of Ruidoso Downs."

The letter dated July 29 provided no explanation for the termination.

Miller, contacted by phone, refused to comment on the reason for the suspension.

"I've given this lots and lots of consideration for months. It was strictly business," the mayor said.

Miller did comment that he had appointed Carol Virden to replace Dillard.

"She is a certified municipal clerk with 22 years of experience," Miller said. "She is real well acquainted

with all the people we deal with."

Dillard had been recommended by the mayor for village clerk in March 2000, after Miller won the mayoral post.

The night before Dillard received the suspension letter, village legal counsel Dan Bryant, during discussion of a new village administrator, said three positions in village operations serve at the pleasure of the mayor.

Those were listed as village clerk, village administrator and police chief. He said the mayor could decide "he didn't like the color of the administrator's tie," and immediately terminate him.

"The mayor may suspend an appointed employee subject to the approval or disapproval of the governing body," Bryant said Monday. "Under state statute, the mayor has the power to make a temporary appointment. And he has the power to make a nomination to the governing board for a permanent replacement."

Miller's letter stated he would either call a special meeting of trustees or present his request for ratification of the suspension at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the village council.

Local buyers seek Care Center

Group incorporates, secures financing and seeks to open negotiations

A newly formed community nonprofit corporation is seeking to purchase the Ruidoso Care Center.

The center's owner, Integrated Health Services Inc. of Owings Mills, Md., notified staff and residents of the center two weeks ago they would close the facility on Aug. 31.

"It's more than doable," said Steve Kreins, pastor of Crosspoint Christian Fellowship and a director of the new Lincoln County Care Center Inc. "That's according to our attorney, who has been involved in similar situa-

tions in New Mexico."

The nonprofit group, described as representing residents of Lincoln County, filed necessary corporation paperwork Friday. In a July 30 letter to the chief financial officer of Integrated Health Services, Kreins spelled out the corporation's interest in purchasing the care center on Resort Drive.

"Our desire is to establish communications with IHS, and remove the emotional element so that we can purchase the facility and bring stability back to our community's care center," Kreins wrote.

Kreins added that Lincoln County Care Center is willing to lease the facility during the interim between IHS's planned closure and a sale closing date.

Efforts to contact IHS for comment were unsuccessful.

Consulting Management and Education Inc., who Kreins said manages four other care facilities for nonprofit companies, would handle day-to-day operations at the facility.

"It's coming to a head," Kreins said of the month remaining before IHS's

County to collect slash as part of its fire-reduction fight

Lincoln County could begin collections of yard wastes and use a former landfill location for the temporary storage of tree limbs and other organic debris.

County manager Tom Stewart said the county is hoping to obtain a four-year grant that would provide

\$125,000 annually for slash collection and disposal.

"We don't want to burn it," Stewart said. "We have a place to stage the material."

A former landfill location on Seirra Blanca Airport Road, east of the Spencer Theater for the Performing Arts, is being considered for the storage.

"The county has the 40-acre original dump," Stewart said. "We're looking at that as one staging area. Do we open it up and let people bring their slash into the area? It dawned on me that we might get people dumping their old refrigerators, automobiles and couches."

As a result, the first year of the grant seeks to fund a grappling truck

and employee to undertake the slash collections. Stewart said the county would be divided up with collections occurring in one area a month at a time.

The remaining three years of the grant funding would be dedicated to working with private enterprise to take the collections and turn them into a products.

"The other plan - if we want to go to controlled burns - is for fire departments who want an area to practice burns," Stewart said. "It will require an Environment Department permit because of smoke. I'd rather like to turn it over to private enterprise. If the material can be used, then why







Carrizozo seeks own clinic

After emotional statements by residents who use the Carrizozo Health Clinic and back the staff's proposal to take over management, Lincoln County Commissioners postponed action to gather more information. They told representatives of the staff - who proposed the county hire them and operate the clinic in the county seat instead of contracting with a management firm - that they need better financial figures to decide a future course. During the meeting last week, Commissioner Leo Martinez said while he supports the clinic staff, he isn't interested in the county taking on more employees. A previous commission set up the independent arrangement years ago to reduce county liability for a reason, he said. He suggested either the staff form a non-profit entity and bid on management of the clinic or that a hospital district be formed to back up the clinic's operation and

make up any deficits. "People said they'd pay more to keep them (the staff) here," he pointed out. The creation of a local clinic governing board picked by the commission and the staff was discussed by Chairman Rex Wilson and physician's assistant Ernie Gonzales. They said it could be considered as an alternative to the current management firm, Presbyterian HealthCare Services, appointing a board. PHS also manages the county-owned hospital in Ruidoso. "Originally we were talking about advertising for proposals, but that's not under discussion anymore," asked Commissioner L. Ray Nunley. County Manager Tom Stewart said the employees don't have enough financial resources to respond to an RFP. Wilson added that they also don't have a history to show stability when responders are ranked. County Attorney Alan Morel said he and hospital administrator James Gibson agreed that if a contract is to be signed,

an RFP is needed. Management of the clinic is not included in the county's hospital lease with Presbyterian, he said. "I think the county has the option of taking them on as employees or going out for proposals for a four-year contract. This doesn't fall under the new exemption to the state procurement code for hospital management contracts, unless this clinic was part of the entire hospital management operation." The commission last year was criticized by the state attorney general who contended that revised leases and contracts required new bidding. A local district court ruling disagreed and in January the state Legislature changed the rule to exempt county hospitals. Gonzales said the staff doesn't like to see money funneled back to Albuquerque. PHS's home base. With local employees running the clinic, the money would stay in the county, he said. If PHS brings in another layer of management, even more money would be sucked away, he said.

'A dangerous man' arrested

Multiple counts face a man, described as homeless, following an incident near the 'Y.'

A man, described as homeless, was arrested Friday after allegedly telling a 911 dispatcher he was very dangerous and was going to "snap," and begin killing people with a gun. Stanley D. Mote, 37, was charged with two counts of assault, battery, three counts of assaults on a police officer and false imprisonment. Ruidoso police were initially called about 8:45 p.m. to a restaurant near the intersection of highways 70 and 48 on a report of a man threatening to hurt people. As officers were responding to that call, the 911 call reportedly made by Mote was received from a phone booth by the Allsup's convenience store near the intersection. As police arrived at the restaurant, two panic alarms were received by police from employees at the Fina Mini Mart, 126 U.S.

Highway 70. A clerk told police a man became violent with her, allegedly saying he had a gun and was going to kill people. Another clerk, cleaning a restroom at the store, said the man entered the bathroom and locked the door. The clerk described the man as angry, saying to him "can you take it? Are you man enough to take it?" The clerk said he was unable to leave the restroom because Mote blocked the exit. As police were interviewing the two clerks, one pointed east along the highway, telling police Mote was walking down the roadway. Mote allegedly threatened police and took a fighting stance. He was pepper sprayed by an officer, complied with a command to go to the ground, handcuffed and taken into custody without incident.

planned closure. "Hopefully we're going to prevent any more transfers. If IHS will just come out of the closet and say they were ready to talk, the attorneys could have this done in days." Meanwhile, two meetings related to the center have been scheduled. The first, today at 6 p.m., will involve the families of residents at the center. In addition, officials with Lincoln County Care Center Inc. and state care center oversight personnel are expected to be on hand. King said the state officials will explain their

receivership of the facility. That session will take place at the Cree Meadows Country Club. Thursday at 9 a.m., a meeting has been set at Ruidoso Care Center for residents. IHS initially informed residents and their families in May that two wings of the Ruidoso facility would be closed and patients transferred to other facilities, the nearest in Alamogordo. While some residents were relocated, the state Health Department stepped in and halted the transfers. "We can make this happen," said Vaunda King, who has a relative at the center and is a member of the new corpora-

tion. "It's going to be with the community involved, which is more important than anything. It's the best thing that could happen." King said state regulators are poised to take control of the Ruidoso Care Center to assure transfers of center residents do not occur again. She said that could cover the period before the hoped-for purchase happens. Kreins said interim financing for the acquisition has been assured. He said grants and specific funding for non-profit organizations, along with U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development long-term financing, is available.

post master, is set for 11 a.m. Sunday. "This pageant always was put on by local people who aren't professionals," McInnes said. "It's one of the few, if not the only one, that is an amateur folk festival in the United States. "A lot of people think these guys are in costumes, but most of them are wearing their regular attire." The historical pageant covers the period from the killing of store owner John Tunstall until Billy the Kid escapes from the Lincoln courthouse, key points in the infamous Lincoln County War. "It's neat because the courthouse he escaped from overlooks the pageant grounds," McInnes said. Some touches added this year - following recommendation of Shrecengost before her death - will be the reintroduction of a John Chisum character who during black-outs on the stage will be highlighted as he sits in a rocker and relates story details to listeners. "We're going to try for a

"It's been at least 30 years since they've done that," McInnes said. About 100 people work to put together the pageant each year, and half of them appear on stage, he said. Other activities going on over the weekend include encampments by the Texas Fourth Calvary out of Lubbock and a Fort Selden military unit. A group of young ropers will show off their skills. A plaque will be dedicated to Shrecengost during the Saturday performance, McInnes said. Food concessions will line the street and the edge of the pageant grounds, giving visitors plenty to choose from, McInnes said. He advised that pageant viewers bring umbrellas for shade and rain protection, and lawn chairs if they don't like the wood benches in the amphitheater. "We're going to try for a

burn it?" Stewart said burning at the site of the former landfill, a few miles from the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, also would require Federal Aviation Administration approval. The county manager said the old landfill is not available for residents to dispose of yard wastes. He said he did not want to have to station an employee at the fenced area. The villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs now help residents with the disposal of pine needles and other organic waste from yards. County residents have been on their own until earlier this summer when the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority began a pine needle pick-up initiative. Stewart said an expanded county program will make it easier for those treating fire-defensible space around their properties. "It's not available yet," Stewart said. "We hope to know in a month or two if we get the grant. The (first year) \$125,000 is the cost of a lightning loader and an employee. It's not a lot of money." Stewart said the county looked at the idea of purchas-

ing a chipper, but he said a chipper and employee gets expensive. Barbara Luna, with the state forestry division, said her staff is working the Sun Valley area north of Ruidoso. "There will be a lot of material out of there," she said of tree thinning initiatives. "Maybe we can work with you to stage it there." Stewart said the slash is certainly present everywhere.

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Resident suggests CDBG money go to a center for the disabled

A center for the disabled would be a good project for Lincoln County's Community Development Block Grant application, a Ruidoso resident suggested last week.

Jeanne Guadel De Canditis, who suffers from multiple sclerosis, proposed the county commission consider the new option as an alternative to a second fire station in the Palo Verde/Glenora district, improvements in the Lincoln water system, expansion of the county public health office at the Ruidoso substation or a senior citizens center in Ruidoso Downs.

"There are a tremendous number of disabled people in Ruidoso," De Canditis said, adding the closest

center for independent living is in Roswell. There are only seven centers statewide.

The centers offer peer support, home modification aid, employment and medical advice, she said.

"There are a tremendous number of seniors with disabilities without this access," she said. "I'd like a grant to start this project."

Commissioners must select a project at their August meeting to meet the November deadline, said Tony Elias, executive director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic

Development. Usually projects don't receive the maximum, but Elias said the top 10 on the selection list could receive the full amount.

The Lincoln water group also could apply for a \$25,000 planning grant that would cover engineering, he said.

The water project would need an "income and need" survey, but only in the Lincoln area, he said.

District/Council of Governments.

The maximum dollar amount for grants in 2002 will be \$400,000, but will increase by \$100,000 the following year, he said.

The substation project in Ruidoso would require a county-wide survey, which takes some time.

"Unless we focused on the health provision," Chairman Rex Wilson said, noting that health issues rank high and surveys often aren't required.

Elias said he would have to check with grant officials on the requirement.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said he needs to know that answer, because it would influence his vote.

Ralph Dunlap, who serves on the Lincoln water board, said the water system in the historic settlement is "in pretty dire straits."

Three weeks ago, the community ran out of water and could not sup-

ply residents or the tourists who visit the museums and monuments because one well was polluted.

"All the lawns are brown," he said, contending that 49 percent or more of the water is used by tourists.

County Manager Tom Stewart said \$41,000 is left over from a state Legislature allocation for a sprinkler system in a county-owned building that houses a residential program for the developmentally disabled.

But Elias said the money can't be transferred to another use until the Legislature authorizes the action and it won't meet until next January. A September special session will focus only on statewide redistricting, he said.

Trustees write off unpaid water bills

Ruidoso Downs trustees last week approved writing off \$1,505 in delinquent residential utility bills.

Trustee Bonnie Richardson asked why the village let some water and sewer customers continue with the services when their accounts were months past due.

"Previously these accounts were allowed to get out of hand," said Gladys Dillard, the village's clerk/treasurer. "We have collected \$2,000 in delinquent accounts. These are the uncollectable."

Many of the unpaid water and sewer bills are owed by those who have moved from Ruidoso Downs.

The largest single unpaid bill was for \$459.90.

Trustee Judy Miller questioned what would happen if someone with an unpaid bill returned to the village and asked for water service.

Dillard replied the village has a list of names.

"I suggest if they come back into the village and want water that they be faced with this," Miller said.

Hikers lost for the night

Ruidoso's lights help family make it out of the wilderness in morning

Three Texas hikers, lost in the shadows of Sierra Blanca, were reunited with civilization Thursday morning.

The Dilmuvat Azimov family of five were camping on Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation land about 3/4 of a mile beyond the road end of the Upper Canyon, when the five went for a hike about 11 a.m. Wednesday. An hour later, Azimov's wife and son decided to return to the campsite. Dilmuvat Azimov and his two daughters, Komola, 11, and Mamuva, 13, from Austin, Texas, hiked on.

About 9 p.m. Wednesday, New Mexico State Police were notified the three had not returned to the campsite, said Victoria Allen, with White Mountain Search and Rescue.

"They kept hiking and realized they were lost about the time it was getting dark," Troy Bolen, BIA Mescalero Agency police chief, said Azimov told him. Bolen was present Thursday morning when the three appeared near the end of the Upper Canyon. "They did a campfire and figured someone would be looking for them. He said they could see lights in Ruidoso but realized it was too far to walk at that time."

Overnight search and rescue crews from the Ruidoso area and Alamogordo moved into the area. Search dog teams from Carlsbad and Las Cruces, as well as BIA forestry workers from Mescalero and tribal members also joined the search, Allen said.

She estimated the searchers totaled more than 30 people. A Blackhawk helicopter had joined the search at daybreak.

"They were wearing shorts and T-shirts," Allen said. "They had no food, no water. They just had a camera."

The Azimovs ran across a group of mountain bikers and other hikers shortly after daybreak. They lead the trio out of the wilderness just before 9 a.m., officials said.

Allen said the three were physically fine.

"They had gotten way off the beaten path," Bolen said. "They began hiking out about 6:30 a.m. knowing what direction to go from the lights seen the night before."

Bolen said the three had said they had trekked over four ridges during the ordeal.

The police chief said Azimov's wife indicated it was time the family cut short the camping part of its vacation.

Changes in passenger security state law prompt hearing

Changes in state law governing motorcycle handle bars and passenger security in vehicles last week prompted the Ruidoso Village Council to set a hearing on parallel amendments to the municipal traffic code.

Once approved, violations can be cited in municipal court, instead of magistrate court, Police Chief Lanny Maddox said. The hearing is set for Aug. 14.

The first item deleted by the state was a height limit for cycle handle bars. Maddox said the provision seldom was enforced

and that only obvious violations were pursued.

The second item deletes wording that exempted a person from safety belt requirements if all seating positions equipped with the belts were occupied.

Mayor Robert Donaldson said that tells a driver that he/she shouldn't crowd more people into a car than there are safety belt hookups for. The new wording will eliminate any excuse for not restraining a passenger. Maddox agreed, stating the number of restraints determine the maximum number of passengers.

In an economic development issue, a resolution was approved moving economic development duties to the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce from the village. Donaldson said the chamber "readily accepted the responsibility."

The change also created a new committee called the Village Business Regulation Development Task Force to review regulations impacting businesses and the local economy and to help with the village's comprehensive plan.

Bill Chance said the switch places the development job where

it belongs, with the chamber.

"They're in constant contact with the business community, which in Ruidoso is very diverse," he said.

Donaldson said as a committee working under the government, the group previously had no ability to take action and no money to pursue opportunities. This change should keep the effort free of politics, he said.

The task force would be appointed by the council and after completing an assignment might not meet on a regular basis until there is another request for service.

Woman injures her neck in crash near Corona

A Denver, Colo., woman was injured July 27 in a two-vehicle collision immediately north of Corona.

Maria Rodriguez, 55, refused an ambulance ride to the hospital and instead received medical attention at the accident scene for what she said was a neck injury, according to a state police report.

Rodriguez was a passenger in a pick-up truck driven by Jose Carmen Rodriguez, 53,

of Denver.

A vehicle driven by Curtis Duke, 78, of Corona pulled out onto U.S. Highway 54 and was struck broadside by the Rodriguez truck. Duke told a New Mexico State Police officer that he did not see the approaching vehicle. The accident occurred at 4:12 p.m.


The police report noted that trees at the intersection created a visibility issue for traffic entering the highway.

Sometimes Ruidoso adds enchantment

An new Midtown venue sparks the weekend

Ruidoso's reputation as a visitor destination got another boost last weekend, when crowds came in droves to attend the 30th annual Ruidoso Art Festival — and the first-ever Street-Players Festival in Midtown.

Parking was hard to find at the Ruidoso Convention Center from Friday afternoon through Sunday, and the quality of the art was rated as among the best ever — maybe the very best.

Meanwhile, finding a place to park in Midtown on Saturday morning was a losing proposition — people cruised, perhaps to preview the signs informing passers-by of the schedule of performances at many locations, or just to find a place to park.

The Ruidoso Arts Commission hit a homerun with StreetPlayers. Not only did musicians find ready audiences from strategic spots along Sudderth Drive, but also actors, artists, craftsmen,

"puppeteers," face-painters and clowns made their offerings to those passing by.

It was a time when a village councilor could be seen acting and a village police chief performing, right along with the Ruidoso High School Jazz Ensemble and a belly dancer.

Whether it was an earlier-than-usual school starting date in Texas, substantial publicity, or luck — regardless, the event proved its value, and the arts commission won its spurs with a brand new event that has a future, we hope.

The Art Festival, a long-established event sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, lived up to its name as one of the state's finest, and this year's quality level reached new heights. A new exhibitor from Arizona called it a "Cadillac" event.

Essentially, the two-pronged event created for Ruidoso an "arts weekend" that should become part of the summer calendar for years to come.

'Urban farms' do matter

On the northwestern edge of Cook County, Ill., bulldozers are pushing the earth around for construction of a hypermarket — a gigantic store selling food and other items. Ironically, the hypermarket will displace one of the few cornfields left in the Chicago metro area. We'll have bigger stores and more specialized ones selling food, but where is the food going to come from?

Consumers don't appear worried yet, but many farmers are. Urban sprawl is just one more thing driving farms out of business. If there comes a time when all the food in the hypermarket is imported, ex-farmers will say, "I told you so." We may not reach that point anytime soon, but let's face it, sprawl is a more indisputable threat to the environment and U.S. agriculture than global warming. As such, it merits at least a fraction of that attention.

The Economic Research Service of USDA took a look at sprawl and came up with some interesting observations about farms in metro areas. Metropolitan areas are defined as a core area containing a large population nucleus and all the adjacent communities that are economically and socially integrated with the core. They include more farms than you might think — one-third of U.S. farms with 39 percent of farm assets.

Typically, it is all a matter of survival for farms in a metro area. According to the report by Ralph Heimlich and William Anderson, traditional farms and hobby farms had a tough time surviving over a recent 20-year period. That doesn't necessarily mean the land was developed, but that the farms ceased having sales or were sold to other farm-

ers. So-called adaptive farms were more likely to survive.

Adaptive farms survive better under increasing urbanization because they produce high value crops like fresh fruits, vegetables, herbs and dairy products. They may sell these products directly to consumers or through restaurants and gourmet grocery outlets. The report says these farmers also may become rural entrepreneurs in general and expand their activities beyond farming.

One conclusion reached is this: "Farming activities adapted to urbanizing areas can provide rural amenities that are profitable for farmers and attractive to the surrounding population." For example, nurseries do particularly well in the face of urbanization.

But the researchers admit they are not sure how long even the adaptive farms can last under the pressures of urbanization. The report briefly mentions farmland protection programs, but is only mildly optimistic. "While purchase of development rights, 'smart growth' policies and other efforts to preserve farmland may succeed, keeping the land in active farming enterprises may be more difficult," it says.

The effect of sprawl on farms is hard to overcome, as this report certainly indicates. One thing that would help keep farms in business is greater public recognition and support for agriculture. If we can't get kids as excited about saving farms as they are about rainforests, endangered species and global warming, there may be a lot fewer farms by the time they have kids of their own.

Albuquerque, C of C challenges schools' constitutionality

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) — The state public school system may face a lawsuit challenging its constitutionality and seeking to completely overhaul it rather than just tinker with it, local Chamber of Commerce officials say.

"They point to constitutional mandates that schools be uniform, sufficient and provide equal access to children of Hispanic ancestry.

"And there is a great disparity on how well you will do depending on where you will go to school," said Rick Alvidrez, past president of the

Greater Albuquerque Chamber of Commerce.

"Some schools are allowing a lot of children to fall by the wayside," said Arlene Gabaldon, a school reform activist.

The possibility of a lawsuit began to be discussed following the last legislative session, which adjourned March 17.

Alvidrez and current chamber president Terri Cole said statewide reform was made possible

"If you take it (school reform) to court, something will happen."

in other states because of lawsuits. They mentioned Texas and Kentucky in particular.

"If you take it to court, something will happen," agreed Moises Venegas, director of the Albuquerque Partnership, who says his group might join a lawsuit if filed by the chamber.

Cole said the chamber wants a full overhaul rather than incremental change.

In the coming months, chamber officials say they will meet with school district superintendents and others statewide getting material for legal arguments.

The chamber's reform package, which failed to pass in the 2001 Legislature, emphasized better pay for teachers, high academic standards and accountability if schools aren't assessed.

It also wanted, among other things, to abolish local school boards and superintendents in favor of school-based boards that hire, fire and discipline teachers.

Test drilling starts along U.S. 70 in Hondo Valley

U.S. Highway 70 in the Hondo Valley is expected to become a busier stretch of roadway beginning today.

It won't necessarily be more traffic, but rather work crews and drilling rigs, gathering subsurface data.

"They will be conducting geological borings to collect data on the underlying soil conditions, particularly on slopes," said David Pennington, of Parsons Brinckerhoff, the engineering and consulting firm designing a possible four-lane highway between Ruidoso Downs and Riverside.

Pennington said the sample-

taking, expected to take four to five weeks, will be used for slope designs if the highway improvement project goes forward. He said the data also would be used for future maintenance of the existing highway corridor should the four-lane project not happen.

In addition to drilling rigs, small dynamite charges and mapping activities are scheduled.

"The most obvious will be the boring samples," Pennington said. "The drilling rigs will be right along the highway and on slopes."

About 100 boring samples are expected to be collected. The four-inch-diameter holes, some to depths of 50 feet, will be refilled once information is collected.

The blasting, which Pennington described as small

charges, "more like a thud rather than a blast," will take place in shallow holes. The mapping will involve geologists scouring hill-sides along the highway.

"This is going to be very visible to the public," Pennington said.

"We don't want motorists slowing or stopping to watch for the safety of other motorists and workers."

Signs, road cones and flaggers will warn drivers of the work areas.

The activities will likely take place at multiple locations at the same time. The subsurface data collection is also scheduled for varying times along the entire 38 miles of highway.

"In most instances the rigs will be truck mounted," Pennington

said. "In some of the areas we will be using drilling rigs that will be dropped in by helicopter because of difficult access."

About 30 locations will see helicopters ferrying the equipment to a drilling location. Pennington said the helicopters are not allowed to fly over the highway or valley while carrying equipment. He said the uphill, north side of Highway 70 will be the flight pattern.

"There will be an archeologist, biologist and geologist on site at all times to monitor the drillings," Pennington said. "That is to make sure they're not into sensitive biology or cultural resources. We are taking precautions to avoid any environmental disruptions."

Pennington said some mem-

bers of the Valley Community Preservation Commission, a group who contends safety issues are not addressed by the four lane Highway 70 plan, were being notified of the Aug. 1 through Labor Day drilling projects. The group also charges the environment and cultural characteristics of the Hondo Valley would be damaged by the four lane highway.

Council delays U.S. 70 support resolution

Consideration of a resolution in support of proposed New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department improvements to U.S. Highway 70 was postponed at the request of the mayor.

"I recommend that we table that until we can look at it a little closer," Miller told trustees.

Foltz, as interim superintendent, cannot apply for the job permanently.


Superintendent Jesse L.

Gonzales announced his retirement last week. He said he intends to become superintendent of the Compton, Calif., schools.

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

Downs trustees approve benefits package for Waters

Told by legal council they needed to vote separately on a benefit package for a newly hired village administrator, Ruidoso Downs trustees approved the requests on July 26. Two days earlier, the council approved hiring John P. Waters, Carlsbad's public works department director, to fill the more than year-long vacant position. Trustees also approved a salary larger than what had been advertised. Trustees picked through a list of benefits Waters had spelled out in a letter to Mayor Bob Miller. "I glanced at that letter," Trustee

Jody Miller said during a special council meeting on Thursday. "I thought it was what everyone else got. I thought the salary was the only issue." Waters requests for 100 percent village payment of health insurance coverage, a retirement plan and a village vehicle to drive to and from work and for village business trips were endorsed by the council with little discussion. A requested \$125 monthly clothing allowance however brought discussion. "I do have a problem with the uniform allowance," Trustee Margie Morales said. "I think he should get the same as the office people."

Office staff is provided \$75 a month for a clothing allowance. Mayor Miller said the village administrator would be expected to be well dressed and the \$125 each month would assure that. The clothing allowance was approved by trustees on a three to one vote, with Morales disapproving. Waters' requirement of a three percent salary increase in 90 days was also opposed by Morales. But trustees Bonnie Richardson, Jim Bassett, and Judy Miller voted for the raise, which would boost Waters' initial \$58,800 salary to \$60,564 after three months. A 10-day vacation benefit, effective immediately, was also approved

by trustees. "Clarify that for me," Morales asked village attorney Dan Bryant. "Does that mean if he's hired today he can take a vacation tomorrow?" Bryant affirmed. "He's not subject to the village's personnel policy," Bryant said. "There's nothing wrong with it." The attorney said Waters, who would effectively be the village's chief executive officer, is a non-classified employee, and serves at the whim of the mayor, like the village clerk and police chief. The attorney also urged the council to enter into a contract with Waters and establish a severance package.

"He knows coming in that he's gone in a heartbeat if the mayor hands him a letter and takes the prerogative to let him go," Bryant said. Bassett said a contract is needed so there is no confusion on either side about Waters' employment. The council unanimously directed Bryant to draw up a contract for approval by the council and Waters. Waters is expected to begin his Ruidoso Downs administrators' role by Sept. 1, after providing the City of Carlsbad with a four-week notice. He would become the village's second-ever administrator. Bob Durrett had held the position for just over four months in early 2000.

Introducing Street Players




Traffic in Midtown was one measure of the impact of Saturday's Street Players festival.

"We're kind of in a rebuilding stage," Kluthe said. "We lost a lot of talented seniors last year."






The Lady Astros marched through the winner's bracket to the championship game. There they met the Rug Rats, who climbed back through the loser's bracket.

Fishing report for Ruidoso, Aug. 3, 2001

Ruidoso River: We finally got some rain, but hardly enough to make any difference on stream flow. Now the bad news: The river is nearly devoid of starker trout. The NMGF Department has reduced the total number of stocked fish to at or below a 50 percent level which will continue to fall. The production simply cannot keep up with the demands placed on this watershed. If you fish the Ruidoso River and want to continue to catch fish - please practice "Catch and Release." To add insult to injury the NMGF Department performed an in-stream shocking census this past week and confirmed my previous comments. The fish Rainbow stockers are gone. What is left are a few Browns. We just can't continue to kill fish at the rate presently taking place and still enjoy a quality cold water fishery. Come on and squeeze those bards down, use artificial lures or flies only on the River. Help protect our River from ourselves. Until we get more water and more fish in the River, we will not recommend fishing this watershed.

South fork - No change here. The flow rate is in danger of stopping in places. One still needs to hike a ways up the stream to find fish. Once found they are healthy and hungry. The fish here are not fussy. Caddis dry flies and small nymphs of just about any pattern will work here.

Boalito Lake: As has been stated for several weeks, Humples, Dark Hendricksons, and Parachute Adam flies have been consistent producers before dark on the main take body. A damselfly nymph tied as a dropper behind your dry fly offering may bring an unexpected take. For the spin cast fishermen, try a hot pink, renegade pattern propeller fly or a black with grizzly hackle propeller fly behind a bubble rig.

Eagle Lakes: The fishing has been

reported as doing well. If you want to check daily activity on Eagle Lakes call 338-4668 for the latest. The day fee has gone up to \$10.00 per day, per person. Reason given is that since the fish hatchery in Mesalero is closed, costs of transporting fish from as far away as Arizona have to be covered. Damselfly patterns have been working along with Black Humply's, Parachute Adams, and Blue Wing Olives.

Grindstone: This Lake has really slowed down the past few days. The surface water temperature has increased a lot due to the excessive sunshine. Float tubers continue to do best by tossing a sinking tip and stripping a dark wooly bugger with some flash or a streamer 8 to 10 feet deep. Damselfly and Dragon fly imitations have been working well. For spin casters, tie on an Olive or Black propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the bars down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water.

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Brooks helps more than horses

Despite all his horse racing success, Ruidoso Downs trainer Jack Brooks hasn't forgotten how important people can be, too.

RUIDOSO DOWNS (AP) - Fourteen years ago a short, skinny kid with a yearning to ride fast horses walked onto the Oklahoma ranch of quarter horse trainer Jack Brooks in search of a job.

Patrick Jackson had a high school diploma and little else in the summer of 1987.

What he did have was cystic fibrosis, a debilitating, terminal illness that had been wracking his body since birth. When he graduated that spring from high school, Jackson stood 4-foot-10 and weighed 78 pounds.

Jackson had the stature to be a jockey, but nowhere near the strength. Undeterred, he asked Brooks if he'd teach him to ride.

"He put his foot up on the gate," Brooks says, recalling their first meeting at his ranch in Jones, Okla. "I thought he was 10 or 12 years old. I said, 'Can you ride?' He said, 'Oh,

yeah. Well, he couldn't ride at all."

Jackson couldn't ride, but Brooks couldn't turn away the teen-ager. He hired him to work in his barn and Jackson is still there. He's worked his way up from stable hand and groom to now an assistant trainer to one of the country's most successful conditioners of quarter horse runners.

Jackson, 31, and Brooks, 65, share a father-son kind of bond.

"Jack is more than just a boss," said Jackson. "I've never had respect for anyone more than I have for Jack. I feed off him and he feeds off me."

Jackson worked for Brooks for nearly two years before he told him he had cystic fibrosis. Jackson had to be hospitalized several times during that period, and each time Brooks gave him the time off he needed. He says Brooks never questioned him about the nature of his illness.

"He knew something was wrong, but he didn't know what," says Jackson. "Jack's not the type to get into a person's business, but I had to tell him. He was too good to me. When I did, he told me, 'You do what you have to do and when you can, you come back to work.'"

Jackson's battle with cystic fibrosis goes on. He has lost his right lung to the disease and his left lung is damaged to the point he will soon need a transplant. A spokeswoman at Baylor Medical Center said Jackson is high on the list of potential recipients for a double lung transplant.

Still, Jackson is at work most days by 6 a.m. and works sometimes till 9 or 10 at night.

"It's unbelievable what kind of person he is," Brooks said. "He don't have to work that hard, but he does. He works like my other hands. I've seen him when he was really down and going to the hospital. You figure, well, this is it. Next thing you know, he's back. And he doesn't come back and lay around."

Jackson says working for Brooks and being around the racetrack has kept him alive.

"It's being happy in life," he says. "I was supposed to have died by the time I was 15. The doctors are overwhelmed at how healthy I am. They say I'm the healthiest CS patient they've ever seen."

Brooks has won the \$2 million All American Futurity eight times. Jackson has been with him for five of them.

Brooks has been training race horses for 42 years and has

saddled nearly 9,000 winners. Earlier this year he drew much media attention when he was placed on probation for a year by the State Racing Commission. The penalty was imposed because one of his horses, a filly named Golden Form, tested positive for a derivative of cocaine after winning a race at Sunland Park last year.

Brooks has maintained he is innocent. He was not at Sunland Park when the horse was stabled there and did not have contact with the horse for two weeks before the race.

Brooks has said the cocaine case has hurt his reputation, but he remains much in demand with horse owners and in high esteem with those who work with him.

Jack is probably one of the most honest and reputable people I know in the racing industry," said David Barrett, a horse owner from Artesia, who has been taking his horses to Brooks for nearly a decade. "He's helped a lot of people that need help and a lot of people don't know that he does."

With Jackson, Brooks can do no wrong.

"I get everything I need from Jack," he said. "I've got a job. I have a wonderful friendship."

NMAA realignment brings more trouble

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) - A state district judge has ruled that the New Mexico Activities Association violated a court order stemming from a lawsuit filed by the Moriarty school district last year.

Judge Kevin Sweazea ruled Friday that the NMAA violated the order by failing to notify Moriarty at least 10 days before moving Albuquerque Academy into

Moriarty's athletic district for the 2002-2003 school year.

In the lawsuit filed last year, District Judge Neil Mertz found that the NMAA had violated its own rules when it realigned high school athletic districts and added another class.

The changes placed Moriarty into a district with two Roswell schools and Artesia. Mertz determined that while

the NMAA violated its rules, changing the realignment would adversely affect other districts. The judge ordered a permanent injunction requiring the NMAA to notify Moriarty by certified mail at least 10 days before making any changes affecting the district.

A motion filed by Moriarty last month contended the NMAA announced changes to the district on May 16 in a memo to all member schools.

During Friday's hearing, former Moriarty superintendent Elna Stowe testified that she

called NMAA executive director Dan Salzwedel to say that violated the court order.

Salzwedel testified that he disagreed, saying the memo was essentially a draft copy of realignments that any school district could comment on.

On May 29, Salzwedel sent the school district a certified letter officially notifying it of impending changes.

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Nuevo Laredo is a scruffy gateway to employment in the U.S.

NUEVO LAREDO, Mexico (AP)—Every day of the year, drives of peasants from all over Mexico gather at a truck stop in this scruffy border town to begin their trip north.

The journey to the United States is one of stark contradictions built on desperate promises of a better life and bone-chilling fears of what could happen along the way.

Those making the trip know they have to be ready to ford rushing rivers, scale rocky mountains and brave barren deserts. They are prepared to endure a surreal mix of mind-numbing boredom and extreme physical exertion.

Nuevo Laredo is where many would-be migrants from southern Oaxaca and Chiapas states come to cross the U.S. border.

From the truck stop, most will head to a sun-baked stretch of Mexico's border with the United States, reaching American soil through a clearing in the brush beside the highway to the nearby town of Piedras Negras.

Most of those peasants arriving on buses from southern and central Mexico flock to the truck stop to meet with prearranged smugglers who they will pay between \$200 and \$1,000 to follow across the border.

After the initial crossing, prices can double or triple depending on

which state migrants want to reach.

Other would-be migrants arrive without a contact and head to the truck stop where locals say finding border-crossing guides, known as "coyotes" or "chicken keepers," is as easy as buying a soft drink.

Those meeting smugglers are told to wait. They mill around the truck stop or sit in dingy hotel rooms for hours, days, weeks or months as their smugglers wait for more clients to arrive.

Under a blistering summer sun, one of those recently waiting on his smuggler was Fidel Hernandez, a 40-year-old farmer from the nearby town of Nuevo Leon who said he has crossed the border eight times since

first heading north in 1998.

"I went to improve my life, to improve the lives of my children," said Hernandez, who said the money he has earned picking fruit in California and Texas is putting his eight children through some of Mexico's finest private schools.

Hernandez said he has made the trip north so many times that he no longer worries about dying or being capture by border guards. He said he's more worried that his children will grow up to be as desperate as he is.

Hernandez said the trip he is waiting for begins when a van arrives to carry migrants and their smuggler to the highway.

There drivers leave the smuggler and the group of migrants to hike for hours in the sun. The appointed crossing point is so close to a Mexican border checkpoint that any traffic heading there risks being searched, Hernandez said.

Smugglers usually accompany the group to the clearing, before turning back to meet up with more clients in Nuevo Laredo.

They always promise to catch up with the group hours later, at an appointed meeting point on the other side. When they don't show up, the migrants realize that they have no one to depend on but themselves, Hernandez said.

Senate bill would renew Indian housing assistance until 2006

WASHINGTON—U. S. Sen. Pete Domenici has cosponsored a bipartisan bill to renew a federal housing program specifically tailored to meet the housing needs of American Indian tribes.

Domenici is cosponsoring the Native American Housing Assistance and Self-Determination Act of 2001 (S.1210). The bill would reauthorize a federal American Indian housing program started in 1996. S.1210 would extend the program through 2006.

"This program is working well for American Indian tribes, and has proven effective. By reauthorizing the program we will continue to give tribes greater freedom in designing culturally-appropriate housing for their people. Zuni Pueblo sets a good example with their Shalako houses," Domenici said.

"This law has also proven useful in enabling tribes to leverage additional resources for housing, so their dollars

go further than they did when Indian housing was part of the general federal public housing program," he said. "It also ensures that tribal needs are not lost in the shuffle as HUD focuses on urban housing needs."

First created by Congress in 1996, the Native American Housing Assistance and Self-Determination Act (NAHASDA) removes Indian housing from the regulations of public housing, which fall under the guidelines of the 1937 Housing Act.

New Mexico tribes are benefiting from this program. Domenici announced a \$385,025 NAHASDA grant for the Nambé Pueblo, and last week reported a \$895,783 grant to the Taos Pueblo Housing Authority, and \$499,033 to the San Felipe Pueblo Housing Authority—all to help further the availability of affordable housing for their members.

The bill would continue a housing program designed to

provide federal block grant assistance for Indian tribes in a manner that recognizes the right of tribal self-governance.

Current law also gives tribes the opportunity to use different sources of financing to meet housing needs in their communities. Grant funding is distributed through a formula allocation based on need and other socio-economic factors. It is estimated that there is a need for at least \$1.2 billion for housing throughout Indian Country.

The bill, introduced by Senator Ben Nighthorse Campbell, R-Colo., is also cosponsored by Indian Affairs Committee chairman Senator Daniel Inouye, D-Hawaii, Senate Majority Leader Tom Daschle, D-S.D., and Senators Conrad Burns, R-Mont., and Tim Johnson, D-S.D.

Rep. Heather Wilson, R-N.M., is cosponsoring a companion bill (HR.1873) in the House of Representatives.

STEPPING OUT AGAINST CANCER

Participants gave the team spirit, the cause itself, and community participation top marks for the event, an all-night affair that included friendly competition, *luminarias*, live entertainment and a dance contest. Planners for next year's relay already are at work, and considering recommendations for improvements made by this year's participants.

Arts have impact on state's schools

According to the New Mexico State Department of Education, 56 percent of students enrolled in New Mexico's public schools -- nearly 180,000 school students -- participated in dance, music, theater or visual and performing arts while in school. The data was presented by the SDE in a report to the New Mexico Advisory Council on Arts Education in June.

The New Mexico State Board of Education established the New Mexico Arts Content Standards and Benchmarks for use by all public and accredited private schools to develop, deliver and assess arts curriculum. The standards were adopted for students in grades K-eight and for students in elective courses in grades nine through 12. Beginning in 2001, a curriculum tied to the arts standards is a requirement for school district accreditation.

A recent study by the MacArthur Foundation, of

Chicago, shows that arts programs can improve student standardized test scores and the Arts Education Partnership, of Washington, D.C., representing more than 100 national organizations, found that the arts engage children in learning, stimulate memory and facilitate understanding. Further, role-playing, games, poems, songs, rhyming, dramatic storytelling and other creative play arts can develop language skills and a love of learning.

The SDE's report shows that 114,911 public school students in New Mexico are engaged in music (mostly music theory), 56,201 students are engaged in the visual arts, 6,414 students are engaged in theater, 808 students are engaged in arts and humanities and 705 students are engaged in dance, for a total of 179,039 students statewide. The figures are based on data reported by local schools and school districts.

Child-care rate increase seen

SANTA FE (AP) -- The state Children Youth and Families Department is proposing to raise child-care reimbursement rates for the third straight year.

Rates are still "woefully inadequate," said David Martinez, director of prevention and intervention at the department.

The agency has raised rates by \$9.7 million over the last three years, but that's not enough, he said.

The federal government is paying for this year's increase with a \$3.8 million child-care block grant, Deputy Secretary Dorian Dodson said.

"We know it's not enough, but it's really all we had (in the budget)," Martinez said.

The department spends about \$5 million a month to subsidize child care for 23,000 children from low-income families, Dodson said.

The state proposes to increase rates for licensed center care in metropolitan areas by about \$30 for toddlers and older and by less than \$10 for infants.

In rural areas, the rates would go up by about \$30.

The recommended rates would range from \$468 a month for full-time infant care in a metro licensed center to \$337 for school-age children. For rural centers, the rates would range from \$353 to \$312.

There are lower rates for licensed group homes, family homes and registered homes.

Capitan library, schools get funding

U.S. Rep. Tom Udall, D-N.M., has announced that schools and libraries in southern New Mexico have received new federal funding to access the latest technology.

The Capitan Municipal School District and Capitan Public Library are among the recipients -- the school district for \$10,353 and the public library for \$1,101.

The funding is a result of the E-rate program, which is now in its fourth year of wiring classrooms and providing Internet access.

Udall said, "I am so pleased that many New Mexico communities have been awarded these critical funds. The E-rate has an important role to play as we work to make technology a more important part of New Mexico's future."

This funding is the first wave of year-four funding. In this wave, New Mexico will receive \$1,489,322.50 in funding. The next wave of funding will be released on Aug. 3.

The E-rate program has connected more than 1-million students across the nation, to the Internet and has helped bridge the Digital Divide, Udall said. The country has gone from three percent of classrooms being wired in 1994, to more than 60 percent currently.

Schools face lawsuit

BELEN (AP) -- A former employee has filed a lawsuit against Belen Consolidated Schools and an administrator.

The lawsuit filed in state district court by Charlene Esposito alleges Ted Padilla, director of operations, created a hostile work environment.

"Ted Padilla called Ms. Esposito a 'fat cow' and a 'slacker' in front of another employee," the complaint states.

Padilla's attorney says those claims are unfounded. "Mr. Padilla is looking forward to his day in court," the attorney said.

Belen Schools interim Superintendent Jerry Martinez said he could not comment.

The complaint says Esposito filed a sexual harassment claim that was handled internally.

Padilla allegedly retaliated by transferring Esposito to several departments around the district, the complaint states.

"He made her work place a hostile work environment by talking about her to other employees in a completely disparaging manner," the complaint states.

Esposito resigned to "preserve her physical and mental health," according to the lawsuit.

Esposito is suing to return to her job, for back pay and damages.
