Mayor breaks ties to fire clerk, hire a new one

Breaking a tied council vote Monday, Ruidoso Downs Mayor Bob Miller followed through on his decision to fire Village Clerk Gladys Dillard.

In a similar council voting pattern, new Clerk Carol Virden was named to replace Dillard at an annual salary nearly 30 percent higher than had been previ-

ously budgeted for fiscal year 2001-2002.

Village trustees Judy Miller and Bonnie Richardson voted to suspend Dillard following a 45-minute closed session of the council. Trustees Jim Bassett and Margie Morales disapproved of the mayor's desire to end Dillard's employment. The tie vote was determined by the mayor.

Following the termination,

Richardson and Judy Miller voted to hire Virden and increase the village clerk's annual salary from \$33,949 to \$44,000. With fringe benefits and other expenses the cost of the office will rise \$14,117 to \$59,563. Bassett and Morales opposed Virden's hiring and salary. Mayor Bob Miller again broke the tie vote.

"I was very surprised,"

State prepared to take legal action to purchase Ruidoso Care Center

While a group of residents takes steps to purchase the Ruidoso Care Center, the state Department of Health monitors the situation for possible legal action.

Jerry Dickinson, an attorney with the general counsel's office of the health department, said Tuesday the department was prepared to file for receivership of the center in Lincoln County District Court in Carrizozo, if necessary.

"That hasn't happened yet," Dickinson said. "As of today, nothing has been filed, but we have been monitoring very closely the situation there. What happens there will form our decision about what to do. We have that option."

Integrated Health Services of Owings Mills, Md., which manages the center on Resort Drive, last month sent letters to residents of the nursing home notifying them that the center would close Aug. 31.

The letter followed two months of protests by families about the handling of transfers from the center's Alzheimer and skilled care nursing wings that IHS officials said they intended

Eldredge family leaving Ruidoso

Bruce Eldredge, director of the Hubbard Museum of the American West in Ruidoso Downs, is leaving this month to accept a position in Spokane, Wash.

His decision to become the chief executive officer of the Museum of Arts and Culture means Ruidoso will lose two local leaders. His wife, Jan Eldredge, heads the Ruidoso Board of Realtors.

Eldredge's resignation is effective Aug. 24 and he will start Aug. 31 overseeing the new \$30 million museum of the Eastern Washington State Historical Society set to open in December.

"It was an opportunity that professionally I just couldn't pass up," Eldredge said Tuesday. "It's about three times larger than the Hubbard. It focuses on both historical and contemporary art, regional history and Native American cultures of the Northwest, so it's similar in scope to the Hubbard, only much larger."

"It was one of those things that as a family we

Grand Jury next for Ruidoso Downs firefighters

Charges that had alleged the siphoning of village funds by three former Ruidoso Downs firefighters have been dismissed by the district attorney's office on a decision to present the case to a grand jury.

The motion to dismiss the charges was filed in Lincoln County Magistrate Court at Ruidoso on Aug. 6. The notice of dismissal was without prejudice, meaning charges

could be refiled against Nick Herrera, Don Smith and Jimmy Smith.

The three were charged in an April 17 criminal complaint of multiple felony counts. Herrera had been accused of 11 counts of making or permitting a false public voucher and 11 counts of paying or receiving public money for services not rendered. The two Smiths each had been charged with 11 counts of receiving village funds for services not rendered.

The dismissal notice, filed by an assistant district attorney, stated the dismissal was in "preparation for (the) Grand Jury and to obtain and view additional information at the specific request of the attorney for the defendants."

The lawyer representing the three said he needs to be assured that questions indicating evidence of innocence are a part of

Water pressure regulator fails, causing surge of pressure to some homes

Last month, home owners on a section of Paradise Canyon Road watched as pressure guards on their water heaters popped, some with fatal results for the appliances.

Larry Grasmick, who heads the

Ruidoso Water Department, said Tuesday a water pressure regulating mechanism at one of the more than 20 stations positioned around town failed.

That allowed a sudden surge of pressure to hit homes that were not protected by regulators on their lines, he said. A regulator, which sells for about \$50 at busi-

nesses such as Alamo Pipe and Supply Co. in Ruidoso, protects against sudden surges or prolonged bouts of high pressure, but it's up to owners to pay for the installation on their lines.

Newly constructed homes probably are outfitted with regulators, but older homes may be vulnerable, he said. Home owners who

suspect they're receiving too much pressure on their water lines, can contact the water department, which will send out an employee to check the line, Grasmick said.

"In this case, we had a malfunction in one of the pressure reduction valves," he said. "The copper





Trustee Morales said of the hefty salary increase. "This is over for now, but will come back later."

Bassett declined comment on his reasons for voting against terminating Dillard and hiring Virden. Richardson also had no comment on her votes to fire Dillard and hire Virden.

"I just want to back the mayor," Judy Miller said of her votes. "He's here every day. He knows what's going on."

As when Dillard was presented with a July 27 letter

from the mayor suspending Dillard, Bob Miller refused again to state why he wanted to fire the village clerk, he brought into village hall 16 months earlier when he won his first term as mayor.

Village attorney Dan Bryant said a reason for the termination will "never be expressed." He said the village clerk is an at-will employee and the mayor can remove the clerk for any reason.

On March 9, 2001, Bob Miller appointed Dillard to the post, saying he wanted his "own village clerk." Dillard

replaced Leann Wehbrecht. Meanwhile, the mayor defended the salary increase for the new clerk.

"It's not that big once you consider she's a certified municipal clerk with 22 years of experience," Bob Miller said.

Trustee Judy Miller agreed. "We're paying for expertise," she said. "We did the same for the village manager."

Dillard, who previously said she was shocked by the termination letter, did not return calls for comment Monday and Tuesday.

the grand jury presentation.

"I needed to have access to the hearing transcript from Herrera's administrative appeal," Beauvais said. "And they've indicated they're going to give that to me."

Beauvais said the transcripts will show that firefighter payments were proper and in the case of a more than \$10,000 payment in January 2000, authorized by former Mayor Joe Hayhurst.

Beauvais said the transcript will allow him to submit questions to witnesses through the prosecutor during the grand jury process.

"This is a very complex case with an extreme amount of documents," said Ken Wilson, assistant district attorney. "We feel a grand jury will be the proper venue. And we see advantages to

taking this to a grand jury."

The prosecutor said if a grand jury determined the case is insufficient the proceedings would remain private and testimony could not be revealed.

A preliminary hearing, where a judge would decide if the case should proceed to trial, would be open to the public and media. Should a grand jury return with an indictment the defendants would be bound over for trial.

Wilson said a tentative date for the secret testimony has not been set because a currently seated grand jury has a number of cases on its docket. He anticipated the firefighters' case would take place within the next 30 days.

Herrera and Don Smith had been terminated from the Ruidoso Downs Fire Department last year.

to close about 50 beds because of structural problems.

When state and village officials disagreed with that structural evaluation, IHS was ordered to issue a new letter outlining for residents their transfer and appeal options.

Instead, the company served the closing notice.

State ombudsmen counseled families on their rights of appeal and pushed for action by the health department.

They pointed to cases where the health of residents apparently pushed to transfer to other nursing homes suffered and said the situation posed a danger to the well-being of the center's clients.

Repeated attempts to

reach officials with IHS for comment have been unsuccessful.

Steve Kreins, pastor of Crosspoint Christian Fellowship and a member of the board of the newly incorporated Lincoln County Care Center Inc., said the nonprofit group of local citizens want to buy the center and keep it open for residents.

"IHS has made some favorable movement and provided the disclosures we needed for lenders so that we can make a reasonable offer," Kreins said Monday.

"We have our financing in place from several sources. I hope we can take a step forward this week."

He is meeting with Paul Parker from Consulting Management and Education, the company that would manager the center, Kreins

said.

Also on the board of the nonprofit group are Charles Dillard as president, Vaunda King as secretary, Brenda Walters as vice president and Camille Mansell Johnson as treasurer.

"I've been talking to several family members and their spirits really are lifted up compared to four weeks ago," Kreins said. "I hope this goes through. I'm confident it will as long as IHS is willing to bargain in good faith."

At a meeting in early August, officials from several state agencies said they would try to expedite needed certifications if Lincoln County Care Center Inc. is successful. Kreins said at the time that if the organization buys the center, clients would never face a closure letter again.

tubing eroded. We have a routine maintenance schedule, but they can pop at any time from normal wear and tear."

The erratic terrain around Ruidoso causes some of the problems, with homes built on varying elevations that require pumping to keep up pressure for some, while others on the same line may experience too much pressure, he said.

"Two of the worst cases shows the water going in at 260 pounds per square inch (psi), but coming out on the other side of our valves at 85, and another at 245 psi and coming out at

The Republican from Picacho and Roswell, and Joan Dale Hubbard, who founded the museum with her husband, R.D. Hubbard, also presented the 2001 Joe Skeen Southeast New Mexico grant awards to 20 organizations. The R.D. and Joan Dale Foundation funded \$100,000 in grants.

"I am deeply touched and honored to have received the Hubbard Museum's award," Skeen said Tuesday. "The tribute was such a wonderful event and I am truly grateful for the distinction of receiving this prestigious award."

"The Hubbard Museum of the American West is an excellent facility that serves to protect and illustrate our proud heritage and history. R.D. and Joan Dale Hubbard have made a great contribution to this community by dedicating their resources to helping charitable organizations' programs."

Bruce Rimbo, president of Ruidoso Downs Racing Inc., introduced Skeen Saturday and presented him with the Hubbard award and a plaque with all of the names of recipients receiving money from the

foundation in his name.

The distinguished New Mexican award is given periodically to individuals who serve the people of the state and nation in areas of the arts, public service and economic development. Past recipients include rancher Fern Sawyer, oilman R.O. Anderson, award-winning actor Richard Farnsworth and artist Henriette Wyeth Hurd.

The committee selecting the 20 recipients out of 70 applicants this year consisted of State Rep. Dub Williams (R-Glencoe), Joan Dale Hubbard, Rimbo, Ruidoso News publisher Brad Treptow and Jim Stoddard of The Hubbard Foundation, who also participated in the program.

Local groups receiving awards included:

- Fort Stanton Inc., \$2,000, accepted by president Tony Hoffman to help in the group's effort to preserve, restore and reopen the 1855 fort to the public.
- Lincoln County Children's Theater, \$4,000, accepted by director Sandy Kashmar and Ed Spur of the Spencer Theater for Performing Arts. The group works with children from ages six to 16 to produce three performances annually at the the-

ater.

• Lincoln County Literacy Council, \$1,500, accepted by director Mary Cook Allen as an extension of Eastern New Mexico University Ruidoso, fulfilling the goal of adult basic education by teaching non-readers to read.

• Presbyterian Medical Services, \$5,000, accepted by director Jean Vinson for the "transitions program" for those in a pre-hospice stage.

• Run for the Beach Inc., accepted \$5,000, by vice president Barbara Crane for the breast cancer awareness program. Since 1997, more than 475 mammograms were provided by the volunteer group.

• CASA - The Otero & Lincoln County Court Appointed Special Advocate Program, \$2,500, accepted by director Alyce Gabel, for the citizens advocate volunteer program for children. The money will provide a three-day summer camp for some of the children in abuse/neglect situations in the 12th Judicial District Court system.

The foundation nationwide gave out more than \$1.5 million in projects and scholarships this year, and more than \$9.5 million in New Mexico since 1990 with an emphasis on the arts, humanities and education. More than 30 scholarships went to local students.

The Hubbards also own the Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Billy the Kid Casino.

Lincoln commission ready to be heard

Another mammoth 44-item agenda awaits Lincoln County Commissioners for their meeting Thursday in Carrizozo.

But at least the audience will be better able to hear what the commissioners are saying.

County Manager Tom Stewart wrote in his monthly report to commissioners that Sound and Signal Systems of El Paso completed installing a new amplifier in the commission chambers, along with nine speakers, two lapel microphones and three desks, mikes and a new amplifier system in district court.

For the second month, the commission meeting will begin at 8 a.m., an hour earlier than the schedule for the past decade.

The commission meets in the county courthouse complex.

In his report, Stewart also noted that the Hondo school superintendent agreed to the county advertising a request for proposals for the lease of the Glencoe Rural Events Center.

However, the superintendent asked that a member of the Hondo administration serve on the evaluation committee because the district now manages the center for the county.

The RFP was released July 31 and responses are due Sept. 5, with the commission to take action Sept. 20.

The county, which purchased the sprawling center and associated arena on U.S. 70 with money from the state Legislature several years ago, never found the right formula for developing the center into a facility that could attract large equine events and other major attractions.

Although roping competitions, a few other events and the school district use the center, county officials have looked for a more permanent utilization that also could cover the center's expenses and possibly generate some money.

Several issues connected to the county's indigent health care program are on the agenda, including a request for funding from the county ambulance management entity, an appeal of a denied application for payment and approval of an individual health care provider to be added to the list of eligible recipients.

Commissioner Leo Martinez requested a discussion of the operation of the county's new detention center in Carrizozo because of his concern over staffing levels.

Commissioners also will be asked to offer their comments on a proposed new animal control ordinance that includes sections for licensing of animals and laws against cruelty.

County Attorney Alan Morel wrote in a memorandum to commissioners that he drafted an all-inclusive ordinance and commissioners will handle the cuts and schedule a public hearing.

Also on the agenda are:
• A 10 a.m. hearing on selection of a project for a Community Development Block Grant

• Requests for approval of three summary plat subdivision plans and the replat of a lot in Magado Creek Estates.

• A discussion of redistricting of commission districts by the county clerk. Commissioners are elected by voters within the districts they represent and must live within those boundaries to run.

• A discussion of the history and ramifications of the Scenic By-Ways designation by Commissioner Rick Simpson.

• Road name recommendations submitted by the Enhanced 911 Rural Addressing Committee.

• Updates on the county's agreements and relationship with the Hondo Health Clinic and the Carrizozo Health Clinic.



Dumpsters afford breakfast for bears

Dumpster-diving is in vogue right now for our shaggy bear population. A drive almost anywhere around the village last weekend would have shown the messy aftereffects of a bear's breakfast.

Ruidoso's bears, rather like the community's mule deer and elk, have learned to coexist with the people who have invaded their native habitat over the past century. That's worked well, generally.

We leave the animals alone; they leave us alone. But the creatures do get hungry. Deer

do graze on people's gardens. Elk have a taste for apples off the tree.

Bears, before the berries are ripe in the forest, have learned that sweet snacks can be found among the leavings of the human population. Hence, the overturned or neatly opened trash containers.

But a mess isn't an invitation to shoot the invader. That's illegal under village, state and federal law.

Nobody, whether angry or ignorant, should shoot the bears or any other creature that isn't in season.

Another endangered variety

Forest fires are destructive. No one understands this better than the people who fight these blazes across the country. Last month, four firefighters gave their lives in the effort to thwart the Thirty Mile fire in Washington that ultimately engulfed more than 9,000 acres before being contained on July 23.

Tom Craven, 30; Karen Fitzpatrick, 18; Devin Weaver, 21; and Jessica Johnson, 19; died on July 10, when they, along with 10 other firefighters, were trapped and overrun by the fire in a canyon along the Chewuch River in the Okanogan National Forest. In addition, according to a U.S. Forest Service news release, four other firefighters and two civilians were injured in the incident.

What the news release does not address, however, are reports that lifesaving efforts were delayed in assisting those trapped. According to several news outlets, Forest Service helicopters may have held off bringing water to the fire site for at least two hours. The reason for the delay? Personnel thought they needed approval to take water from the Chewuch River. Why? Because the river contains species protected under the Endangered Species Act. Apparently, personnel, attempting to follow what they felt was proper procedure, delayed the water drop as they sought authorization to take the river's water.

To its credit, the Forest Service is conducting an investigation into the incident. While it is not certain that an earlier water drop would have saved the lives of the firefighters, this tragedy does point to the regulatory confusion caused by the Endangered Species Act. In May, the American Farm Bureau Federation testified before a Senate committee urging a re-evaluation of the act in hopes of incorporating more balance and common sense in its implementation. At that time, the main concern was the harm the act has imposed on farm and ranch families who tend the land where so many species live.

For example, on the West Coast, an estimated 1,400 farm families in the Klamath Basin have faced total economic devastation due to lack of water since April 6, when the U.S. Bureau of

Reclamation announced that no water would be made available from Upper Klamath Lake. The decision was based on a new biological opinion released by U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service that indicated irrigation water be set aside for endangered Coho salmon and sucker fish.

This is but another example of the negative impact and confusion surrounding the Endangered Species Act. The deaths that occurred during the Thirty Mile fire in Washington are an extreme example of the act's possible repercussions.

A message on the Forest Service's web site reads, "Staff extend sincere condolences to the families, friends and crew members of those who died fighting the Thirty Mile fire. We all share your sorrow." Ken Weaver, father of deceased firefighter Devin Weaver, probably finds little comfort in those words and no doubt would prefer a return to common sense as well. He seemed to sum up the situation best when, in an MSNBC news story, he said, "Whenever you put a couple of fish ahead of a trapped crewline...what's the point?"



Culpability and the Ruidoso Care Center

To the editor:

When I first heard of what was going on at Ruidoso Care Center I was in disbelief and then horrified, as I have been a long-term care advocate for about 12 years and have been led to believe that there were safeguards to keep something such as this from happening. I was an ombudsman for five years and have been a member of New Mexicans for Quality Long-Term Care since it started in 1994, also have been chair of NMQLTC for three years.

In all this time I have never known of a nursing home trying to evict so many residents. On July 24, 2001, I attended the Legislative Interim Health and Human Services Committee at the State Capital. I brought this injustice to the attention of the committee and they were just as horrified and angry as myself. They questioned the representative from the Department of Health but never got a decent response. I have met with the family members and friends of residents at RCC. I have written to the Federal Health Care Financing Administration, Gov. (Gary) Johnson, New Mexico Department of Health and the attorney general, but have not had any response from any of them.

Senator Michael Sanchez of Valencia County, chair of the Senate Judicial Committee, has been heavily involved in trying to find a solution in the best interests for the residents.

This is an outright case of abuse and intimidation against the residents of RCC and the guilty should be prosecuted, the Department of Health should demand the attorney general proceed with prosecution of all people involved. Also it should not have taken four months for the Health Department to seek receivership and I truly believe they only acted on it after the Legislature's health committee found out about what was going on.

The people of Ruidoso owe a heartfelt thank-you to Vaunda King for all her time and hard work, and I know how much work goes into trying to right a wrong as great as this.

I will be involved with this issue until the final outcome, and pray that it will be to the benefit of the helpless.

As far as why I left the meeting, my daughter had had a serious accident and had gone through six hours of surgery to repair her arm just several days before. My wife and daughter had just arrived back in town from that surgery, and yet I still came to this meeting. My family is as important to me as yours is to you. I may be the Mayor of Ruidoso but I am first a husband and a father. Instead of casting public aspersions, you could have just called to ask why.

I have always made myself available to the public. I generally take anywhere from 10 to 30 calls a week from the public on a variety of issues. I would venture to guess that I attend more public meetings than most of our previous mayors. I will continue to do so but there are times when I may not be able to attend a meeting or I may have several important places to be in a given evening as well.

Dog bites woman

Citations are expected to be lodged against a 15-year-old whose dog reportedly bit a 69-year-old woman on Aug. 5. The woman had been walking her dog when a female Heeler/Labrador mix attempted to grab hold of the woman's small dog. The woman, who then held her dog in her arms, was jumped on by the large dog and knocked to the ground. The Heeler/Lab mix reportedly was biting and clawing at the woman to get to the small dog. Charges anticipated against the owner of the Heeler/Lab mix are an animal at large, vicious animal and animal bite.

Water gun used

A Ruidoso man was charged Aug. 5 in connection with a motoring water gun incident and a resulting confrontation. Morgan B. Baker, 24, admitted to police that he shot a water gun from his vehicle at another vehicle, spraying the driver in the chest and face. The driver of the other vehicle followed Baker's vehicle into a parking lot in the 2800 block of Sudderth Drive where an argument ensued. Baker reportedly hit the other driver in the mouth. He was charged with misdemeanor propulsion of missiles and battery.

Man taken into custody

Ruidoso police arrested a man Aug. 7 who allegedly ran into another vehicle. Morgan B. Baker, 24, Ruidoso, was charged with felony abuse of a child, battery on a household member and reckless driving for the incident near the intersection of



Charter cuts its local staff

Although more technical staff was hired within the last week by Charter Communications in Lincoln County, some customers complain they have a hard time contacting the office for help.

The number of staff at the local office was cut significantly a few months ago, but Paul Crown, who heads the county operation, said Tuesday two customer service representatives are there to help if people come to the building at 117 Vision Drive.

"You can't reach this office by telephone," he said. "Charter opened a call center in the Alamogordo office. I think part of the problem is a training issue."

"It couldn't have happened at a worse time, mid-summer, with all the construction and trying to consolidate," Crown added.

Questions about bills can be handled in Alamogordo because employees there are connected to the same computer information, he said. Service-related calls are posted on the Ruidoso's office's e-mail by computer, Crown said.

"We're enlarging the number of technicians in the field," he said. "I hired one last week and am bringing another one on this week."

If callers receive a busy signal, hang up and call again, Crown said.

It may take awhile, but they will get

through. The local number rings into Alamogordo and is not off the hook, as some customers insist, he said.

"They have nine lines into Alamogordo, which includes the local number, the (800) 388-7988 number and the long distance numbers to Alamogordo — they all go to the same phone bank," Crown said.

One of the questions he's been hearing from customers is why the price for the Summer Sizzle package of digital programming — which was supposed to be good at a special price of about \$50 per month for one year — jumped by nearly \$20 on this month's bills.

"That happened because of a billing mistake," Crown said.

"On an average, it was about \$17.30 too high," he added. "Anyone who brings it to our attention will receive a credit, but we couldn't do a blanket credit because it was a special package. If they don't get a credit now, it will show up on the next month's bills."

Customers should keep track and notify Charter if the credit doesn't show up on the bill.



The goal of the camp was to promote soccer, learn to play the game and have a good time doing it.


"We have tried other camps. This one, by far, promotes having fun and learning," said camp director and LCYSL vice-president John Quesada.

Fishing report for Ruidoso, as of Aug. 15, 2001

Ruidoso River: The rains this past week have helped a bit, but the River flow is still quite low. As of Aug. 13, we are flowing at just 2 cfs. Hope for more rains. The River was last stocked on Aug. 1 with 150 Rainbow Trout. As stated last week, the NWRD Department will be stocking fewer fish for the remainder of this year due to the fact that three hatcheries are out of commission. If there ever was a reason to practice Catch and Release it is this. If folks supply just cannot keep up with demand if you want fish in the stream, we must Catch and Release. Nymph fishing is what's happening on the River. Stone flies, Rock Worms, and Scuds are in abundance in the waters. Several fishermen were successful tossing a Humpty as a lead and strike indicator and using a pheasant tail nymph dropper. The Humpty was tied on about 18 inches above the dropper.

South fork: No change here. The flow rate is in danger of stopping in places. One still needs to hike a ways up the stream to find fish. Once found they are healthy and hungry. The fish here are not fussy. Caddis dry flies and small nymphs of just about any pattern will work here.

Bonita Lake: As has been stated for several weeks, Dark Hedges, Humpies, Dark Hedges, Humps, and Parachute Adam flies have been consistent producers before dark on the main lake body. A damselfly nymph tied as a dropper behind your dry fly offering may bring an unexpected take for the spin-cast fishermen, try a hot pink rem-gate pattern propeller fly or a black with grizzly hackle propeller fly behind a bubble rig.

Eagle Lakes: The fishing has been reported as doing well. If you want to check daily activity on Eagle Lakes, call 336-4668 for the latest. The day fee has gone up to \$10.00 per day, per person. Reason

given is that, since the fish hatchery in Mesalero is closed, costs of transporting fish from as far away as Arizona have to be covered. Damselfly patterns have been working along with Black Humpies, Parachute Adams, and Blue Wing Olives. It is Deer fly season at this altitude, so wear long sleeve shirts and long pants, use a good insect repellent. The Deer flies can bite hard.

Grindstone: This Lake has really slowed down the past few weeks. The surface water temperature has increased a bunch due to the excessive sunshine. Float tubes continue to do best by tossing a sinking tip line and stripping a dark wooly bugger with some flash or a streamer 8 to 10 feet deep. Damselfly and Dragon fly imitations have been working well. For spin casters, tie on an Olive or Black propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the bars down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water.

Lake Mesalero: The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark wooly buggers continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito or Handrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk. Please practice Catch and Release whenever and wherever you can. We have moved our local shop. The new address is 2501 Sudderth Drive. Come see us for daily fishing information. 

Ruidoso schools start Friday

Some 63 added students are expected; meanwhile, Paul Wirth takes over at RHS.

School bells in Ruidoso begin ringing this week.

Orientation for most students will take place tomorrow or Friday (see below). The first full day of classes for grades 7-12 is Friday.

"General staff orientation was this morning," Mike Gladden, superintendent, said Tuesday. "Then they were meeting at their sites."

Goals for the 2001-2002 school year focus on a safe and respectful school environment with an emphasis on appropriate language, dress and behavior, according to a newly drafted Education Plan for Student Success.

Among the goals is the implementation of an early reading literacy initiative for kindergarten through the fourth grade. Development of a K-12 math initiative, with all students reaching grade level by the fourth grade is spelled out. Planning and implementation of a career pathways program will also be the goals were adopted Tuesday, Aug. 7, during a board and administrators' retreat, Gladden said.

Six areas of emphasis were also adopted by the Ruidoso school board. They include expanding business partnerships, strategies for adding professional days, pursuit of technological development and facility planning for the future and efforts to seek "appropriate state funding for salaries, professional development, facilities, equipment and supplies."

The school year begins with 20 new employees, some new positions and others replacing employees who did not return from last year, Gladden said. New staff orientation was last Friday.

Among staff transfers, associate superintendent Paul Wirth will take the position of Ruidoso High School principal. He replaces Bill Green, who moved to Quemado to take the superintendent post there.

Gladden said the district is fully staffed going into the new school year. Student enrollments are projected to reach 2,544, an increase of 63 from the 40th day attendance report from Oct. 24, 2000, a 2.5 percent increase.

High school pupils, which numbered 709 last October, are expected to total 717 this year.

"The numbers projected are pretty much what we had

"We got off to a good start," he said Tuesday. "Enrollment is down a little, but we expect to improve on that as the days go by because some families still are involved in feasts and other activities."

Swinney said an enrollment figure was not available Tuesday.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe led local school districts in starting the new school year. Many students will start Friday or later.

The exception is Capitan, where teachers went through orientation Monday. Students from kindergarten through 12th grade were to start classes at 8 a.m. today. Elementary grades will leave at noon today and Thursday, but will join the middle and high school students dismissal time of 3:15 p.m. on Friday. Enrollment is projected at 612 students, slightly up from 606 at the end of the last school year in May.

"It's hard to tell," said new Supt. Larry Miller. "It seems as many leave as decide to enroll. I'm new this year... Right now, the first grade is the fullest of the campus and that tends to mean a surge moving throughout the grades each year. But I've been told that doesn't always hold true here."

Four new classrooms were added, mostly at the lower elementary levels, including kindergarten. A computer lab was created and the high school was remodeled, repainted and received new carpeting, he said. Landscaping also was part of the project, Miller said. Rerouting of buses makes for safety.

A back-to-school open house is at 6 p.m. Tuesday, when a ribbon will be cut for the improvement project. Parents then will go with their children on a mock school day to meet teachers, followed by a watermelon social. The event is sponsored by the Capitan PTA.

One of the new faces in the district, besides Miller, who replaced Diana Billingsley, is Regina Lane, the new middle school principal.

At Hondo, new Supt. John MacCallum, who took over from Barbara Casey, said district students will report Monday, with the first class at 8 a.m. and dismissal at 3:55 p.m.

The district operates Monday through Thursday. MacCallum projected an enrollment of about 140, on a par with last school year.

In Carrizozo, Supt. Rick Cogdill said his high school students will be on campus Monday, Aug. 20, at 8 a.m. Classes will dismiss at 3:18 p.m.

Elementary students don't report until Monday, Aug. 27. Their class hours will follow the same schedule.

Cogdill said he expects about the same enrollment as last year, which finished up at 242 students. Major remodeling at the high school and middle school continues.

The Ruidoso Municipal Schools could see a police officer attached to the schools full-time.

If there was a particular area when a law enforcement presence was needed, we would coordinate with the schools."

Maddox said the officer would be a major enhancement to the learning environment and would provide a sense of peace for the parents of students.

The three-year grant would cover 100 percent of the approximately \$39,000 salary and benefit package for a certified police officer. During the three-month summer break, the officer would return to the police department as a patrol officer.

'Second-career' teachers gain in Albuquerque

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) - Some of Albuquerque's 100 new public school teachers have been out of school longer than their students.

Most of the new teachers in New Mexico's largest school district will be recent graduates from New Mexico universities, but others will be older professionals who are trying a second career.

Former banker Betsy Douglas, 46, said she was surprised at the number of older men and women who were new teachers.

"I was right in the middle," she said. "I'd say

about one-third of us were second-career people."

Douglas will teach fifth-graders at Double Eagle Elementary School in northeast Albuquerque.

To make the transition easier for rookie teachers, the school district and the University of New Mexico invited all new Albuquerque Public School teachers to a Jump Start program.

Today is the first day of school for most of Albuquerque's school children.

The rookie teachers received free copies of "The First Days of School" by Harry Wong and lots of free advice.

FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT

High Sierra Estates Water System Improvement Project

In accordance with the EPA procedures for complying with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 40 CFR Part 6 implementing the Drinking Water Revolving Loan Fund (DWRF), an environmental review has been performed by the New Mexico Finance Authority (NMFA) on the proposed project:

Project: High Sierra Estates Water System Improvement Project

Location: High Sierra Estates, Lincoln County, New Mexico

Estimated Project Cost: \$216,840

1.0 PURPOSE AND NEED

Currently, the High Sierra Estates subdivision is served by two water wells (Well #1 and Well #2), a 27,500-gallon storage tank, 2-inch diameter PVC piping, and 32 residential water connections. The current water system is considered deficient for the following reasons: piping is close to 25 years old; the system has dead ends in which contaminants may reside.

The proposed water system improvements include: a new supply well (Well #3) with disinfection facilities to be installed in the western portion of the subdivision; a new 30,000-gallon steel water storage tank to be installed next to the existing tank; replacement of a portion of the existing 2-inch line with 6-inch line to allow fire flow to hydrants; replacement of the remaining existing 2-inch line with new 2-inch line; installation of flush hydrants to allow contaminant clearing of dead-end piping; installation of fire hydrants; backflow prevention and metering at each well, and new service piping to existing residential meters.

Alternatives considered included the No-Action Alternative, purchasing supplemental water from a tanker service or adjacent

community, or the reuse of wastewater. Under the No-Action Alternative, the system would remain as is. Eventually, reduced water supply and decreasing efficiency in distribution and storage capacity would cause the community to obtain individual water supplies. This could cause environmental impacts such as increased heavy equipment traffic, the addition of private storage tanks, and a general decrease in infrastructure capacity. The water purchase alternative would involve either the individual purchase of water by the property owners, or the purchase of water by the community. Under the wastewater reuse alternative, additional wastewater treatment and transmission piping. These alternatives would likely have a greater environmental impact than the proposed action.

3.0 POTENTIAL ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACTS MITIGATIVE MEASURES

The proposed project will provide water production capacity adequate for peak demand, system growth, and fire loading. Storage will be adequate for peak demands or a 2-hour fire flow. The dead end piping in the system will be flushed, preventing residual contamination at the head of the proposed action could cause potential minor environmental impacts as a result of construction activities. The piping will be installed in areas previously disturbed. The new storage tank will be installed next to the existing tank, which will have existing surface impact due to the need to remove several trees to place the 15-foot diameter by 30-foot tall tank. The tank will have a small permanent footprint and will have limited surface impact due to the placement of the drill rig. The proposed project will likely result in localized and temporary impacts to traffic, air quality, visual quality, and noise levels. Mitigation measures such as dust control, erosion control, traffic control, and land restoration may be utilized to limit impacts during construction. The proposed water system improvements would result in beneficial impacts to all the water service users in High Sierra Estates by providing a reliable and safe public water supply, and would enhance fire-fighting capabilities.

4.0 CONCLUSIONS

The conclusions presented here are based on the findings of the Preliminary Engineering Report, Environmental Information Document, and communications with Federal, State, and local agencies and affected residents. The proposed action would not cause any significant impacts to human health or the natural environment. Therefore, a Finding of No Significant Impact is warranted.
