Disabled center gets an opening

County CDBG application leads to a possible site for disabled living center

Although an independent living center for the disabled was not picked as the county's choice for a Community Development Block Grant application, the project will benefit from the decision.

By submitting a grant application for an addition to the county substation in Ruidoso that would enlarge the public health department, space will be vacated that could be used for the disabled living center, County Manager Tom Stewart said Thursday.

Tony Elias, executive director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, said the health department expansion would make a strong application because \$490,000 allocated through Congress for the project could be used as a match.

Young black bear killed on highway

A 150-pound young male black bear was hit and killed late Thursday on State Highway 48 in the Alto area.

His death brings home the situation across the state that interaction with humans - sometimes with deadly results - is increasing, as bear habitat continues to decline.

The state Game Commission

meeting last week in Cloudcroft discussed alternatives to alleviate bear-human interaction, all tied to reducing the bear population.

Those alternatives include giving hunters a new two-week bear season in late August and early September in exchange for knocking off two weeks at the end of the fall hunting season when many bear already are in their winter dens.

A spring bear hunt and a summer pursuit training season for hunters and dogs also were mentioned.

Ben Hanson, with the state Game and Fish Department, said before commenting he will have to analyze the exact pro-

posals. "But I don't think it would solve our problems," he said. "Most problem bears are in town - they're urban bears - and people won't be hunting in towns. I don't think that's the solution."

The bears killed in an August and spring hunt - many while stranded in trees by hunting dogs - won't be the problem bears, unless someone illegally stakes out or baits around a dumpster, he said.

The current bear population estimate for the state is between 5,000 and 6,000 black bears, which Hanson characterized as a "stable" number.

Transportation plan a resolution

Saying the measure in ordinance form "clouds titles" on properties, Ruidoso village councilors have moved the community's long-range transportation plan to a resolution.

Among the ideas in the more than ten-year-old transportation plan are futuristic traffic routing plans for the Midtown area and improved intersections around the village.

"Our attorney said that the transportation plan, in its current form, puts clouds on titles," Mayor Robert Donaldson said, speaking of private properties. "The problem is its intersections, up and down Sudderth and Mechem drives, and Grindstone Drive, calls for widening."

Village Manager Alan Briley said changing the method of adopting the transportation plan, from an ordinance to a resolution, would remove the potential of acquiring private property and thus assure titles are not threatened.


"Are we making a resolution that bypasses the process?" Glen Barrow, chairman of the village's Planning and Zoning Commission, asked from the audience during the public hearing. "Will they not have the opportunity to go through due process? I'm afraid of what else we're going to change by resolution."

Amending an ordinance requires a public hearing. The village council can enact, change or eliminate a resolution without a hearing.

"You're saying that we can arbitrarily change the transportation master plan in

Collision, rollover claim lives of two men

Two separate traffic incidents in the Ruidoso area Monday claimed the lives of two men.

Jerry Seitz, 58, of Ruidoso died following a 7:55 a.m. collision on U.S. Highway 70, immediately east of the Ruidoso Downs village limit.

Seitz was on a motorcycle that had just turned left onto the highway from Griffith Drive when the 1994 Harley Davidson collided with a pick-up truck, according to a New Mexico State Police report.

Police said another turning vehicle on the highway created a blind spot where Seitz and the driver of the pick-up truck were unable to see one another.

Seitz was pronounced dead at the location.

Highway traffic was diverted into the east bound lanes, around the crash location in the west bound lanes of Highway 70.

The driver of the pick-up truck, Stephanie Kobaly, 34, of Ruidoso Downs, and two children in the vehicle

were uninjured.

Citations are pending, according to state police.



The county owns the property, which lies next to the Ruidoso Public Library on Kansas City Street.

The underlying factor that often kills a project is the need for a population survey, said Chairman Rex Wilson.

Although a senior citizens center in Ruidoso Downs was listed, problems exist because CDBG money was used 10 years ago to build the existing center.

Elias said the money can be used for the building, but not for operation. Martinez said if the county acquired the center, it would lease it out to an operator.

Stewart said while the Palo Verde-Glencoe Volunteer Fire Department would be eligible for a grant, building a new station at Agua Fria is premature.

The idea first was mentioned at last month's commission meeting. Larry Lorenzo, who serves on the council, said the group incorporates all disabilities and has no age limitations.

five centers operate in New Mexico, the closest in Roswell. Their operation is funded by the state and federal governments, he said.

The group needs help establishing a center for Otero and Lincoln counties, Lorenzo said. Operational money would come from the state Legislature and have a high priority, he said.

'We need a grass roots organization and we have that,' Lorenzo said. 'We need money to get it started.'

Lorenzo said it costs about \$25,000 to \$50,000 to start a living center program.

Debbie Raymond, of the Alamosordo Disability Council and a disability advocate for the two-county area, said she's been working out of her house.

She is permanently disabled and made it her business to find out what is available and pass that on to others.

Services officers at such centers, provided for under the 1973 Rehabilitation Act, include information and referral, peer counseling, advocacy for individuals and the community, and developing independent living skills.

Raymond estimated that including seniors and seasonal visitors, 27 percent of the local population has some type of disability.

'I don't think it's overpopulation,' he said. 'The problem is that people are moving into the country where bears are and the bears are losing their natural fear of humans.'

Unlike recent reports of bears in northern New Mexico, Hanson said problem encounters with bears are declining in the southeastern portion of the state.

'Most of the problem bears already have been taken care of - relocated,' he said. 'A big part of the problem has been answered by putting locks on the garbage dumpsters and by people actually putting their garbage in the dumpster and not leaving it sit outside next to a dumpster.'

The young bear hit by the pickup truck about 6:30 p.m. Thursday later was deemed beyond help and was shot by State Police Officer Jose Salazar, according to the report filed by the officer.

Driving the 1989 Ford pickup involved in

the encounter was Stan Bulsterbaum, 55, from Deming, who was southbound on SH 48 when the bear ran out and hit the passenger side of the vehicle, according to Salazar's report.

No one but the bear was injured, although the pickup suffered some damage.

'The bear was in good health before the accident,' said game warden Anthony Manfredi. 'What's getting them more now is their active search for food. The days are getting shorter and there's cold in the air. They know they will be denning soon and there is a biological imperative for them to put on weight to make it through the winter hibernation.'

Local bears are not true hibernators. In mild winters, they may emerge from dens several times in search of food.

Manfredi said that the carcass of the bear that died Thursday could be salvaged and was sold to a taxidermist, who will tan the pelt.

the future," Barrow said. 'That's true,' Donaldson responded. 'If you leave this in an ordinance it says we should go through with condemnations,' the mayor said of properties in the path of road changes in the plan.

Barrow said the plan, in ordinance form, can be amended through the process of public hearings. He called the switch to a less formal action a "knee-jerk reaction."

'I would like to seriously consider the rights of citizens to have a say,' Barrow said. Donaldson said in resolution form, public hearings could still be a requirement to carry out some of the ideas in the transportation plan, especially if they involved the taking of property.

Village Attorney John Underwood advised the council to eliminate the plan as an ordinance and reactivate it as a resolution.

'You don't have alternatives at this point. You have duties,' Underwood said of the legal requirements of an ordinance.

Just before a unanimous council vote to repeal the Ruidoso Transportation Master Plan as an ordinance, and readopting it as a resolution, Underwood said the change would make the plan more flexible as a "living document."

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Many streams, springs reduced to mud puddles

Hikers along many of the trails in the Lincoln National Forest around Ruidoso are reporting that streams traditionally flowing at this time of year are either dry or spotted with mud puddles. Jerry Hawkes, Smiley Bear district ranger, said the lack of stream flow may be connected to heavy growth of trees, a lack of moisture build up, or a combination of the two.

The ultimate fix may depend on a series of wet winters, he said. "In good wet winters, the water has time to percolate down and is supplemented by the rains later," he said. "It all works together and it takes so long to build up and recharge the aquifer (underground water supply)."

Although more than two inches of rain fell this month, the area has faced several years of drought. At the same time, more people have moved in and more plants and trees have taken root — all demanding water, he said.

"Of course, we've been thinning trees, but we have a lot more to do," Hawkes said.

South Fork and Three Rivers are flowing and a few other reliable sources of water can be found in the White Mountain Wilderness.

But rangers checking Argentine Trail, Turkey Canyon and some other popular hiking routes reported seeing only stagnant mud holes. Recent rain has improved the situation, but has not produced steady creek flow.

Even after a substantial rain, the ground seems to dry up quickly, Hawkes said.

"It's the accumulative effect of the dry years," he said. "The water just hasn't gotten deep enough to recharge the aquifer."

State tells Downs to trim its projected gross tax revenues

The state has called on the Village of Ruidoso Downs to trim back projected gross receipts tax revenues for fiscal year 2001-2002 by nearly \$100,000.

In village council approval of a final budget, general fund revenue expectations were cut to \$2.34 million. Before the state Department of Finance Authority review, the village had budgeted \$2.44 million in general fund revenues.

"It was the recommendation from DFA," said Carol Virden, village clerk. "The projected gross receipts tax was high."

On the other hand, some expenditure line items increased in the final budget. A new village administrator's

position will cost Ruidoso Downs \$17,546 more than had originally been budgeted. A \$14,214 higher than budgeted salary, at \$60,564, accompanied by a \$1,250 annual clothing allowance and increased social security and retirement plan costs, account for the higher office costs.

The village clerk's position will also bring a \$14,117 increase, or \$59,563 total cost. A nearly 30-percent salary hike, to \$44,000 annually, results in much of the higher clerk's office budget. The salary hike was approved by Mayor Bob Miller, who broke a deadlocked council vote during the hiring of Virden.

General fund expenditures are budgeted at just more than \$3 million for the coming year.

Reading specialist enlightens district

Ruidoso is taking reading seriously — and brought a member of a congressional panel on reading to report on the evaluation of 150,000 research projects on what works and what doesn't.

Jo Robinson, a retired Washington elementary teacher, gave an in-service Aug. 15 and 16 to 150 kindergarten through grade six staff members, including custodians, nurses, music teachers and counselors, as well as classroom teachers and instructional assistants. Robinson had brought her school to the 90-percent reading level by applying systematic phonics, and was a member of a U.S. Congress-commissioned panel to evaluate research on reading.

Robinson's message was: Teach phonics and do it early, or children will have trouble learning to read and write later in life and choose a core reading program based on research, not emotions.

Nan Wierwille, a fourth-grade teacher, praised the conference.

"It was excellent," she said, "one of the most innovative group activities that we've had in our district — and we've had the habit of historically good professional development. This is good because it gets so many people on the same page ... Administration investing in staff development: That's a huge deal. That's putting your money where your mouth is by bringing it here to teachers."

"People are listening," said first-grade teacher Kay Carter. "This has everyone's attention."

This came out of the all-day kindergarten initiative, said Roger Sowder, principal of Nob Hill Early Childhood Center. Staffs of schools receiving state funds to implement all-day kindergarten were required to attend a series of workshops developed by the State Department of Education last year, he said.

"Later in the year Danny (Flores, principal of Sierra Vista Primary School) and his staff got involved because we're a feeder to first grade."

Frank Cannella, principal of White Mountain Elementary School, began

attending the workshops with members of his staff later in the year. "We came back and talked to Mike (Gladden, school superintendent) about a 3- to 5-year plan ... and the need to get more people to those conferences, and he agreed to bring the power players here and get everybody involved," Sowder said.

The Ruidoso principals attended workshops led by Robinson and other consultants in January and April, and the district held a reading summit in January to begin planning the district-wide reading program.

Robinson explained that educators have been waging a battle over methodologies for teaching reading — "reading wars over phonics vs. whole-language approach, or using literature instead of phonics. People form camps based on philosophy and belief," she said. "It's emotionally charged."

In 1997, the U.S. Congress commissioned a panel to find out what the research says about the reading debates. The results were clearly in favor of phonics.

"Students taught systematic phonics outperformed students who were taught a variety of nonsystematic or non-phonics programs, including basal programs, whole language approaches and whole word programs," the panel concluded.

Programs merely attempting to get children reading more won't help if they can't break down words by sounds. The panel also found that it was more effective to teach phonics early, rather than introducing it after first grade. Robinson put it bluntly:

"We know that if by June of third grade, students are not reading at grade

level and are surrounded by other poor students, or have been retained one or more times, their chances of graduating from high school approach zero," she said, citing a Johns Hopkins University study.

"Here in Ruidoso, you have 60 to 70 percent of your children getting free or reduced lunches. That indicates that you have your children that live in poverty," she said. "If you don't graduate from high school, you've got a good chance of ending up in prison. Prisons are full of people who lack high school credentials."

The school district has already begun to implement some of the things they've learned from the workshops. Summer school this year began later than usual and ended just two weeks before school started, so children at Nob Hill, Sierra Vista and White Mountain Elementary would have a "jump start on the school year," Gladden said.

The district has reduced class sizes to below the state averages, White Mountain Elementary principal Frank Cannella said. "The research is pretty clear that you have to do that to improve reading scores."

The principals also will work to involve parents by having family-oriented reading activities. Also, more concentrated time each day in school will be focused on reading.

At the conference, staff members from each site began forming leadership teams. Gladden said he will draw from those site leadership teams eight or 10 people to form the district-wide Ruidoso Reading Leadership Team after Labor Day. This team will develop the three- to five-year plan to meet the goal of having 90 percent of all the students reading at grade level or above. Meanwhile, Robinson will return two or three more times during the school year to conduct more in-services for all the staff members. As Kay Carter, a first-grade teacher, pointed out, "She's networking with a larger group of experts. We're excited."

"We just want to do it right," Gladden said. "I think we can do it in three years. We will see some things at the end of this year that will validate the efforts that the district is making now."

It's a representative school board

Does that mean the public can't speak out?

Granted, we don't live in a "pure democracy" in this nation, state, county and school district. We live in a "representative democracy." The citizens elect people who make policy and they in turn appoint people to carry out that policy.

So, the Ruidoso school board was operating in the "representative" sphere when it voted to keep these rules on public comment at board meetings:

- Inform the superintendent of the topic at least three days before the meeting.
- Make comments in five minutes unless the superintendant or board extends the time.

• Don't complain about personnel or other people, although objective criticism of school operations and programs are allowed if on the agenda.

All of which, of course, means the superintendent can determine what does, or does not, formally reach the board for discussion. But that doesn't mean that people with complaints can't go directly to a school board member.

After all, board members were elected to represent the people — even people wanting to criticize the way things are.

Farming in the future

Agriculture goes back about 10,000 years, and it's a good bet food production will be around for thousands more, according to futurists who attended Futurescope 2001 in Minneapolis.

One timeline has computers surpassing the human brain in computational abilities by 2029, and asserting their computer rights, but no one seems to be forecasting the end of food or farms. Even human clones have to eat!

"The whole characteristic of agriculture is very simple. It will always be around, it's always stable, it always has to be there," says Graham T. T. Molitor, president of Public Policy Forecasting. Molitor, a distinguished futurist who once held a position at USDA, says, "Agriculture is probably the most technologically sophisticated, advanced industry in the history of all economic undertakings. It is never recognized as that, but it is."

Another prominent futurist who agrees that agriculture has an important place in the future world is Joseph Coates. His book "2025" was recently listed in the top 10 of thousands of futurist books and reports on the market. "Farming is indispensable. We have to eat and farms are still the best place for food to come from even in that remote 25-year future," says Coates.

This doesn't mean future farmers will make an easy living. Coates sees the challenge many will face to be more than economics. "I think the problem for farmers has to focus on the social and personal life on the farm and something has to be done to make that more attractive and appealing," he says.

"As for the work itself, Coates sees the farmer as manager, operator and chief executive of an increasingly electronic enterprise. To make his point, he cites precision farming, automated systems to feed and monitor animals and online marketing. "Anyone who plans to be a farmer had better be sophisticated in information technology and computers," he adds. Biotechnology also is tied closely to agriculture's future. Molitor, who is thinking ahead to the year 3000 for a book he is writing, envisions farmers being able to grow just the part of a fruit or vegetable they want. Using an orange as an example, he says, "No roots, no trunk, no limbs, no leaves, no rind, no seeds, just the juice sac."

Coates is equally excited about the prospects for biotechnology. He believes biotech is moving from increasing crop yields for the farmer to the next step, that of making foods more nutritionally balanced, tasty and healthful for the consumer. But he thinks the science has been set back 5 to 10 years because of controversy built on misunderstanding.

In the future, the world will be glad that it has biotechnology and all it can do for our food supply.

Molitor believes Earth can be home to 30-60 billion people in a thousand years; that's way more than the United Nations projection of a population stabilizing at 10 billion by 2200.

No wonder these futurists have such a high regard for agriculture. There's not a future for any of us without it.

The day before, however, I was trapped in the fenced area for my dog from about 3 a.m. until the sun came up and I could see where the bear was so that I could scoot into the house.

I have seen what a human looks like after a bear was finished with him.

Another time, I was away from my

car while unloading groceries, but had left a gallon of milk on top of the car and a bear swiped it. I yelled, made myself look even bigger than I am and waved my cane at it, as I was advised to do by the wildlife person, and it dropped to all fours and ran off with a gallon of milk in its mouth. Yes, it's a great story and I tell it often, and I would love to leave milk and cookies and dog food and watermelon out for these poor hungry bears, but this is not good for the bears.

These bears after eating our food become susceptible to our problems and diseases, not to mention we usually throw away bad food, spoiled, soured, rotten stuff that would make us really ill if we ate it. After "coexisting with humans" and getting into our dumpsters, they lose their natural fear of us and will start hurting (or killing) us, our children, the pets we keep or destroying property. The bear has come back many times and was very upset on one occasion and beat up my car. Thank heavens, I, or one of my pets, was not in the bear's way during its tantrum.

We also need to worry about bears on the roads. I saw one cross Sudderth to the Pines Inn about 9 p.m. and stopped to chase it out of the parking lot (in my car), worried that a child might come out to get a soda or ice. Four cars stopped to watch it cross back over Sudderth. If just one of those drivers hadn't been paying attention, that bear would have been killed or seriously injured. Last week, I saw a young bear up on Highway 49 right outside of town and it was the cutest, glossiest, healthiest, most adorable little black bear you would ever want to see. It was also dead. Hit by a car, acclimated to "coexisting with humans." I saw it happen, it made me sick and I cried all the way to my brother's place in Nogai.

Deplorable as it is (for the animals), some coexisting with the wildlife has become necessary. I live at the very top of a mountain, nothing behind me but more mountain, wildlife and a few neighbors beside and below me. We all need to curb our natural instincts and not feed the bears; we need to look big and scary and make lots of loud noise. We need to make them so afraid of us that they don't come down the mountain for our trash and get killed by food poisoning, cars, guns, relocation and our foolishness. And we need bear-proof locks on the dumpsters.

New Ruidoso Downs maintenance shop may cost \$227,000

A proposed new building for a Ruidoso Downs maintenance shop could carry a \$227,273 price tag.

Village trustees were told Aug. 13 by the village's on-call engineering firm that the estimated price could cover the concrete slab and metal building for the 50-by-80-foot structure, as well as engineering and other fees and gross receipts tax.

"This is a guide. It is an estimate," said Matthew R. Thompson, an engineer with Bohannon Huston Inc. "It is not a contract bid."

The village would go to a formal bid process to obtain firm costs from contractors.

Ruidoso Downs Assistant Public Works Department Supervisor Dale Graham told trustees he believed the

bid process would bring quotes lower than the engineer's estimates.

While trustees voted to solicit bids for the maintenance building, Ruidoso Downs resident Jim Burrows said the village needs to fix drainage problems in some parts of the community before constructing a new maintenance building. In other council news:

Two variances were approved by the village council.

One would allow the placement and occupancy of a recreational vehicle at 604 Harris Lane for up to one year. The placement would allow for the renovations of Christ Church in the Downs.

A setback variance was also granted

for a new sign at Ruidoso Ford on U.S. Highway 70. The ground-level sign, six inches from a property line, would be placed so as not to impair visibility of traffic entering or leaving the lot.

Both variances had been endorsed by the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission.

A bid for a heavy duty portable air compressor that will be mounted on a trailer was accepted by village trustees. Sierra Machinery, listed as the lower of two bidders, had submitted a quote of \$18,631.

Approval was granted for attendance at the 2001 New Mexico Municipal League annual conference,

scheduled for Aug. 29-31 in Gallup. The approval would allow the Ruidoso Downs village clerk, administrator and other officials to attend the conference.

The cost of the annual conference sessions is \$215 per member municipal official for registrations made by Aug. 16.

Two hirings on the Ruidoso Downs Police Department were approved by village trustees:

Shawn Sanderson and Chad Bristow were added to the ranks of patrol officers. Bristow is a Texas certified officer. Police Chief Eddie Lerma said Sanderson, who had worked for the New Mexico Children Youth and Families Department, will

require training for law enforcement certification.

Police department communications/detention officer Lori Carpenter was named supervisor of the department division. The council also approved hiring Jean Cunningham as a dispatcher with the department. The hiring of two additional communications/detention officers was delayed after the council was told the two recommended candidates could not be contacted.

The normal monthly village council meeting was rescheduled after municipal attorney Dan Bryant said he would be unable to attend the session. Trustees agreed to change the Aug. 27 meeting to Aug. 23.

Building trades class in need of more hands to construct house

Students in a new class in building trades will construct a house as their class project, if at least eight people sign up for the two-semester class scheduled to start Sept. 27 at Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso.

Through a collaboration with the Lincoln County Homebuilders Association, ENMU-Ruidoso has set up a building trades program for students to learn skills needed for residential construction.

"Home builders have trouble finding enough good help," said Jim Miller, director of the college. "The need of the industry is so bad that we've got to do something to address that labor shortage."

He added that women are encouraged to apply.

The class will meet from 8 a.m. to noon, Monday through Friday for two semesters. Initially, the class will be held at the college office for safety training and basic orientation to the building industry. Classes will move to the job site later, where a 1,400-square-foot, three-bedroom house will be built. Licensed building contractor John Kluthe and other members of the Homebuilders Association will teach the class. Kluthe has been with Eagle Creek Construction for 19 years.

"We're working on acquiring some land and we'll use local materials and suppliers," Miller said. The house is intended to be an affordable one, and will be auctioned off when it's completed.

The maximum number of students in the class is 16, and if fewer than eight sign up, the class may be scaled down or postponed, he said.

The class was set up for Ruidoso High School students, but now it's open to people who are out of school, in GED classes or enrolled in a school, with a moderate degree of physical fitness and an interest in going into the building trades industry.

Students must sign up for both semesters. Students will learn construction math, blueprint reading, proper use of hand and power construction tools, site layout, footings and foundations, framing of floors, walls and roofs and completion of exterior and interior structures.

Those who successfully complete the program will receive a skill certificate and assistance in job placement.

Tuition for students from the Ruidoso school district is \$275 plus the cost of tools, and for those outside the district, \$319 plus the cost of tools.

Tax committee says governor may need to rethink tax cut

Tax reform versus a tax cut. The chairman of a legislative committee meeting in Ruidoso Downs said the governor may want to rethink his staunch pursuit of an income tax cut.

The joint legislative Revenue Stabilization and Tax Policy Committee heard four hours of testimony Monday dealing with a study on tax reform.

"We're out of sync with other states around us," said Senator John Arthur (D-Deming), chairman of the committee. "We may want to look at tax reform and adjustments."

The panel, meeting at the Turf Club of the Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Casino, heard testimony from numerous entities and government departments, including requests from the local racetrack and the Sunland Race Track near Las Cruces. The tracks called for an expansion of casino operating hours, noting the investments involved and the revenues realized by the state.

Harold G. Field II, cabinet secre-

tary of the Department of Finance and Administration, told the panel state revenues were exceeding forecasts, in large part because of significantly higher gas and oil taxes. Additionally, state gross receipts tax revenues are running 9.8 percent ahead of projections, Field said.

"Construction spending is up significantly," Field said. "The Big I project (Albuquerque Interstate interchange) is a significant project."

Field said gaming taxes are also up a dramatic 20 percent.

The committee also heard from the president of the Jicarilla Indian Apache Nation at Dulce, seeking a tax credit for revenues the state realizes from oil and gas production on reservation lands. The committee was told the tribe advanced \$45 million to the state over the past five years and realized just \$135,000 in capital improvement project funding from the state. Smith said it is normal for his and other interim committees to hold hearings around the state during the summer.

"It's not atypical but typical," Smith said. "It gives groups an opportunity to participate."

The numbers game

Carrizozo's six-man football team fights a small roster, inexperience as season gets started

Last year at this time, Carrizozo High School football coach Pat Ventura said the biggest problem with his team was inexperience.

It's the same story again in 2001. Ventura lost some players to graduation, but the biggest hit came at the start of the summer, when several returning starters "backed out" of the team.

"They were returning lettermen who made the wrong choices," Ventura said, noting that one did seriously injure his knee in a summer camp.

"The kids we have, they work hard. But we're young — a lot of freshmen, one sophomore, one junior, a few seniors."

In total, there are 11 players on the Grizzlies roster this year, four fewer than at the start of 2000, when Ventura said he was concerned about his depth.

With five of those players freshmen, the coach said getting experience in a hurry is key. But with the lack of depth, that should be easier.

In Friday's scrimmage in Carrizozo, the Grizzlies got to stack up against Clovis Christian and Melrose. Ventura said he saw plenty of positives and negatives in the prac-

tion. "There's so much that has to be done," he said. "... We've got to get a kicking game. For two weeks we didn't play against a defense. With that being in our back pocket, we did especially well. We moved the ball and scored on them. We did well."

Another plus from the scrimmage is that Carrizozo got an early look at the team they will open the regular season against: Clovis Christian.

Between Clovis and Melrose, the Grizzlies got in 105 plays on offense and defense combined. That was with just nine players at the scrimmage.

"I'm proud of these kids for coming out," Ventura said. "They're going to be better for it in life."

The Grizzlies are coming off a disappointing 3-5 season (2-3 in six-man District 1) that came just a year after a state semifinal run. Since that 1999 season, Zoza has struggled with experience, depth and tough scheduling.

Ventura said it has been difficult to have good practices due to his thin roster. Early on, the six-man offense went against three players on defense. Two recent additions to the team have alleviated that somewhat.

The Grizzlies open the 2001 season by paying a visit to Clovis Christian at 7 p.m. Aug. 31.

All American field set for Labor Day

■ The top 10 2-year-olds were determined Thursday for the \$2 million Sept. 3 race.

It took 17 trials and over seven hours Thursday to determine the 10 finalists for the \$1.9-million estimated All American Futurity (G1) and when all was said and done, Mike Levi's Grand Coeur had proven to be leader of the pack.

Grand Coeur posted the quickest qualifying time for the 440-yard final to be held at Ruidoso Downs on Labor Day, Sept. 3. The track was listed as sloppy all day with no wind for most of the trials.

A Texas-bred gelding by Calyx, Grand Coeur won the seventh trial in a time of 21.636 with seven-time All American Futurity winner Jacky Martin in the irons for trainer John Stinebaugh. Grand Coeur had just two starts prior leading up to the trials — a third-place finish in a Rainbow Futurity (G1) trial and a victory in a July 22 maiden race at Ruidoso. He is the sixth foal out of Check It To Em Miss, a 13-year-old Showum Jet mare which earned \$48,214 in 21 career starts, including a win in the 1991 Vespero Express Stakes (G3) at Blue Ribbon Downs.

Her most successful runner to date is two-time stakes winner Check Em High.

The winning connections of 1999 All American Futurity winner A Delightful Dasher qualified the second-fastest finalist, Tres Seis. The Sixarun colt, trained by John Bassett and ridden by Joe Badilla Jr. for Gwendolyn Eaves, is out of Our Third Delight. The 20-year-old Rebb's Policy (TB) mare is the dam of Fortune Of Delight, 1999 broodmare of the year and

dam of A Delightful Dasher. The other eight finalists are:

•Ausual Suspect, winner of the fifth trial for Bassett and Badilla. The Strawly Special colt is owned by TNT Racing of Lubbock, Texas.

•Spittin and Splittin, a Kentucky-bred gelding racing for John Jones Jr. Interests Ltd., trained by Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath and ridden by Roy Baldillez.

•Rdustys Chick, winner of the Heritage Place Futurity (G1). Mark Barnes trains the filly for Bob and Deanna Williams. Gilbert Ortiz was in the saddle.

•Ms Wandas Fortune, a Louisiana-bred by Mr Jess Perry, she was second behind Rdustys Chick in the Heritage Place Futurity. G.R Carter Jr. rode for trainer Rodney Reed. Arnold Trahan is the owner.

•Phenomenal Fantasy, a close second in the Rainbow Futurity (G1), is another finalist for Gilbreath and Baldillez. She races for R.D. Hubbard and John Jones Jr. Interests Ltd.

All American Derby Trials

Trainer John Bassett and jockey Joe Badilla Jr., who together had a big afternoon during Thursday's All American Futurity trials, continued their winning ways and qualified the two fastest horses for the All American Derby (G1) at Ruidoso Downs. The \$200,900 estimated final will be contested Labor Day, Sept. 3.

The first of the 440-yard trials was contested over a good track with no wind, but an 18-mph head wind kicked in before the second trial. The wind continued for the third trial with the addition of a rain shower. The rain and wind intensified before the final heat, necessitating a delay in the start of the race; it was eventually run on a sloppy track.

Additionally, one of the early favorites did not start in his trial. Dashin Bye, making his debut for new owner Mike Levi after being purchased for a reported \$750,000 from Teddy Abrams Jr., threw jockey Jacky Martin at the gate and ran off toward the barn area. He was scratched from the trial, but uninjured. When the first trial got under way, it looked similar to the results from the day before.

John Bassett, who won seven of Thursday's All American Futurity trials, saddled Ron Hanna's Pay The Bank to win the first heat in 21.652 and set the fastest mark. Joe Badilla, who only last week came back from a month-long absence due to injury, was in the irons. Badilla was aboard for six of Bassett's futurity trial winners on Thursday. Notching his second win in his seventh career start, Pay The

Bank's only stakes experience is a fifth-place finish in the Phoenix Futurity (G3).

Five other horses qualified from the first trial - Rainbow Derby (G1) finalist Picabo Tass, Retama Futurity (G1) qualifier and recent Ruidoso allowance winner Shaken My Colors, two-time graded stakes runner-up Leaders Dash, four-time winner Front Running Speed and maiden Cash Back To Me. Bassett and Badilla visited the winner's circle again after the second trial with heavily favored Whosleavingwho. Now a winner of half his 16 career starts, the Chicks Beduino gelding won the Los Alamos Winter Derby (G1) and finished second in the July 22 Rainbow Derby (G1) to fellow qualifier Feature Mr Jess. Special Hippy Hop, the winner of the July 6 Golden Driller Stakes at Fair Meadows, also qualified out of the second trial.

The final two trials produced just one qualifier each, as the horses had to contend with rain and a strong head wind. Stoli, the winner of Sunland Park's West Texas Futurity (G1) last year, rallied to beat 6-5 favorite Heza Motor Scooter in the third heat. In the last trial, Feature Mr Jess won this third race in as many starts this year. A winner of two Grade 1 races at Ruidoso - the Rainbow Futurity and Derby - Feature Mr Jess came home a half-length in front of Dusty in the only trial contested on a sloppy track. Jacky Martin was in the saddle for Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath, who qualified three horses to the All American Futurity.

Post time for the Sept. 3 final is set for 3:30 p.m. The race will be televised on ESPN2's "GMC Americas Horse" that evening.

Glovis Classic Futurity

Trainer Blane Wood won the \$66,141 Glovis Classic Futurity with De Talker and marked his second consecutive year to win the race. De Talker is the two-year-old colt of Glynnia Merritt of Morton, Texas.

Wood won the Futurity last year with Pass The Form, with jockey James Gonzales II aboard. This year's futurity looked like a replica of last year's, as Gonzales and De Talker broke sharply from the gate and were left alone to run down the 850 yards in the time of 17.823.

"The horse ran good today. This horse usually has a little trouble and is ornery in the gates. As good as we left today, the further we went, the more I knew we had it," Gonzales said.

With a great start and nothing to stop the colt, trainer Blane Wood could give nothing but praise.

"It was a perfect race. De Talker got away good, left good and got in front. We had a rough go in the trials and got lucky to qualify. He has been a joy to train. It is a real good win. She (Merritt) just lost her husband recently and she has struck with the horses. She needed the win," Wood said.

Coming in second was Race This Rainbow, who is also trained by Wood. Race This Rainbow is owned by Raquel M. and Jackson Lee Jr. and was ridden by Larry Gamez.

The winner's earnings of \$33,076 in the \$66,169 Glovis Classic Futurity brings De Talker's lifetime earnings to \$49,056.

Correction of probationary schools to get SBE review

Public input still sought; decision time approaches

The New Mexico State Board of Education has been seeking public comment on corrective action options under consideration for probationary schools that have been in school improvement for two or more years.

Corrective action options under consideration by the SBE are included in "Intervention Processes for Schools Rated Probationary," available at the Department of Education's Web site at sde.state.nm.us. The public may respond to the options by e-mail to prael@sde.state.nm.us or to Deputy Director Patricia S. Rael, Department of Education, 300 Don Gaspar, Santa Fe, NM 87501-2788.

Corrective action, the final step in the intervention process required for schools continuing to rate probationary, has been under SBE consideration since adoption of the new accountability program last year. In addition to individual constituent comments, the SBE has received recommendations for the Educational Standards Commission, SDE staff and the State Superintendent's Blue Ribbon Panel on Accountability. The SBE intends to take action on defining corrective actions at its meeting today and Thursday at Albuquerque TVI, Smith-Brasher Hall, 717 University, SE.

The board will consider corrective action options for schools

that have been in school improvement for two or more years and a regulation on student test preparation to address testing irregularities at its regular meeting at 8 a.m. on Friday in the board room of the Albuquerque Public Schools, 725 University Blvd., SE.

Among the corrective action options under consideration by the SBE are state takeover, removal of the local school board, creating magnet and charter schools and school closure.

"The proposed regulation to prevent testing irregularities 'makes clear our intention that school districts and teachers will act ethically and in the best interest of children when administering assessment,'" State Superintendent of Public Instruction Michael J. Davis said. "We are fortunate that test infractions in New Mexico are few."

The SBE will also consider the criteria for an extension of school improvement, rather than corrective action, when a school rated as probationary for three years has shown continuous improvement.

Other items to be considered include which portions of the CTBS/Terra Nova Survey Plus to include in third grade assessments in 2001-2001 and the state's Department of Education 2002-2003 budget request.

Familiar face takes charge at Hondo

Hondo's new superintendent of schools is no stranger to Hondo, and he has a sunny outlook on the district's accomplishments and prospects.

John MacCallum lives in Roswell but has been coming to Hondo since he was 16. His wife, Joanne, has ties to the Hondo Valley that go back to the 1920s. Her aunt and uncle lived in Sheriff Brady's house in Lincoln, built before the Lincoln County War.

MacCallum, an Air Force brat, had been in and out of the Roswell schools from 1967 and graduated from Roswell High School in 1966. He received a bachelor of arts degree in 1969 from the University of New Mexico and a master's degree in psychology in counseling from Eastern New Mexico University-Portales in 1972.

After four years in Albuquerque and Sioux City, Iowa, working as assistant director of human resources for a national financial services corporation, he returned to Roswell in 1976 and taught computer information systems at ENMU-Roswell until 1983, designing and implementing a computer information systems program and putting in the first personal computer lab.

In 1983, he went back into business, and became president and CEO of computer firms in Roswell, Las Cruces and Albuquerque, designing and installing computer networks based around PCs for national labs, universities, law firms and hospitals.

In 1995, he retired and took a year off to travel, then went back to school at ENMU and received his teaching and administrative license in one year. Now he holds a level-three license — the highest a person can get in New Mexico — for administration, counseling and K-12 teaching.

MacCallum first came to the Hondo Valley Schools in 1997 and has served as high school principal, athletic director, technology coordinator and teacher of high school math and social studies. He was the district's coordinator for the Educational Plan for Student Success, professional development coordinator and grant writer for the district. He wrote the community-involvement plan, the school safety plan and was chairperson aligning curriculum with the state's curriculum and benchmarks.

"Most of (those functions) at the same time," he said, laughing. "For the last three years, I was a half-time teacher and half-time administrator."

Barbara Casey, who had served as Hondo's superintendent of schools since

July of 1996 and recently accepted the position as associate superintendent in the West Las Vegas schools, recommended MacCallum as her successor, and the school board approved him unanimously at its meeting in July.

"She left the district in really fantastic shape," MacCallum said. "She did such a good job when she was here; everything was done. She spent a lot of time with me going over things item by item and left a filing system of every day for a month and month-by-month for the rest of the school year."

MacCallum emphasizes what's been accomplished at the school during Casey's term as superintendent:

- Student test scores and reading levels improved for the last three consecutive years;
- Improved physical facility;
- Expanded health and fitness curriculum
- Systemic school reform

Improved test scores

The first objective of Hondo's Educational Plan for Student Success is to increase the reading levels of all students. Two years ago, Hondo's middle school was placed on the "Needs Improvement" list of the State Department of Education, whose requirement is that 75 percent of the students or more meet the state averages on the Terra Nova tests. Out of 10 students in the eighth grade, three didn't meet the state standards.

"Those three students who didn't meet the average were ESL (English as a Second Language) students," MacCallum said. "You have to be careful how you look at data."

Improved physical facility

One of the other main objectives of the Educational Plan for Student Success was to improve the physical facility, and Casey and the school board drew up a five-year plan. The district's elementary classrooms did not meet the state's requirements for space, and five new elementary classrooms were added, as well as two new junior high classrooms, a new high school science lab, a new multipurpose room and a waste water treatment plant.

The plan, which runs through 2002, has almost been accomplished, MacCallum pointed out. "What we still have need for is a multipurpose field for student athletics and health and fitness."

Hondo applied for Capital Outlay funds from the SDE last year, but Gov. Gary Johnson vetoed all requests. Another request has been made this year, he said.

MacCallum said the SDE and the legis-

lature look at requests from small schools like Hondo and compare them to requests for similar projects in districts the size of Albuquerque's and decide the cost per student is too high.

"But we have the same need," he said. "We don't have a track for our track kids. We have to drive students 22 miles to Capitan to practice track."

Health and fitness curriculum

Hondo's middle school students now have a life skills curriculum to address areas like self-esteem, substance awareness, decision making, peer pressure and media literacy. Within the last two years, track has been added, as well as weekly health classes.

Systemic school reform

"I've studied school reform in depth for the last five years, every school-reform movement of any size in the nation," MacCallum said.

The district is involved in several programs: Re:Learning of New Mexico, which, he said, "focuses on how we teach what we teach" — empowering teachers, teaching in thematic units and viewing the teacher as facilitator, not dispenser of information.

Another program the district is part of is Strengthening Quality Schools, a pilot project that uses the a school reform model designed by Malcolm based on a business model he designed 50 years ago called Total Quality Management.

"My personal viewpoint is the old way doesn't work," MacCallum said. "Kids are bored and don't want to go to school. Our goal is to create an environment where kids want to come to school and want to learn."

The future

MacCallum said his biggest emphasis as superintendent will be to get parents and the community more involved in what the school is doing. He will also prepare for an accreditation visit by the State Department of Education this year.

In the last three years, he's written grants for about \$170,000 for technology development at the school, and this year received funding for an Earth Station Satellite Internet system, so the district will convert its 125 computers from two dial-up lines to satellite, which is 10 times faster, he said.

"I would like to retire here," MacCallum said of his long-range goals. "Could be in six years, but I doubt I will. I'm a workaholic and enjoy what I'm doing — it's fun."

Criticism of Humane Society financial tracking gets response

A former member of the board of the Humane Society of Lincoln County criticized officials with the volunteer nonprofit group for lax financial tracking and contended they placed too much control in the hands of the paid shelter administrator.

Marlis Shehata of Ranches of Sonterra said Thursday she repeatedly asked for financial information after her election to the board, but was rebuffed by shelter administrator Sandra Ford and former president Janie Spencer.

Shehata spoke after Lincoln County Commissioner William Schwettmann, who was not at the July meeting, asked to comment on the situation with the society. For several years, the commission has contracted with the society for sheltering services.

Although Commissioners Leo Martinez and L. Ray Nunley objected to the discussion because society officials had been told the item was pulled from the agenda and were not at the meeting, Chairman Rex Wilson said he would allow Schwettmann to comment. He said the discussion of the county contract would wait until next month.

At the end of the session,

Martinez declined to respond to Schwettmann or Shehata's remarks.

"This will be on the agenda next month where both sides can have input," he said. "I've asked for an audit like I have for everyone else. That's why I asked for this to be removed from the agenda, because it wasn't ready yet."

Schwettmann said calling for an audit seemed warranted after he listened to the tapes of the July commission meeting and it appeared shelter manager Jim Riggins was unable to answer some of the questions from Wilson.

He cited the society's own bylaws that provide for an independent audit "as directed by the (society) board."

He objected to the content of several letters to the editor that appeared in the Ruidoso News, especially one from Martinez citing the commission's lack of requests for financial details from other larger entities that contract with the county and referred to the county "giving away" millions.

He also disagreed with an editorial in the newspaper stating the commission exercised a double standard because it did not try to audit other contractual service providers.

Schwettmann read three letters from Shehata and a letter from certified public accountant Ronnie Hemphill, who looked at society records in 1996 and noted in a cover letter that he couldn't express an opinion on some financial functions and that some information was not provided.

Hemphill said Tuesday that the letter is routine and he told County Treasurer Joan Park, who suggested an audit of the society, that the

language was not critical.

"They keep reading that letter like it's a bad thing and it's standard language on a compilation," Hemphill said. "We have required language that we have to put in a cover letter and that was what they were reading. It's nothing derogatory toward the humane society or any of the other 60 or 70 businesses we do that for."

In Shehata's letters read by Schwettmann, the former member pointed out that the humane society is dependent on private and public funding and therefore should expect to be audited without notice. Anyone donating to the society should be able to review its financial operation, she contended.

She claimed the society's records were "an unconscionable financial mess" and that one shelter employee was "running the show."

Shehata resigned from the board in June, writing that she couldn't be part of an organization where one employee runs the thrift shop, the shelter and the board.

When Schwettmann finished, Shehata stood up and reiterated that she was "appalled" that in her seven months on the board, she never saw a financial statement.

"I offered once to become president and I was told it

was impossible because I didn't get along with Sandy," she said.

When she asked for an audit, Shehata said she was told by Spencer that "district attorney" Alan Morel said it was not necessary. Morel is the county attorney and has since said that while it is an unusual move, the commission can call for an audit of both the society supported through projects and donations, and the shelter on Gavilan Canyon Road, operated by the society primarily with public money.

During a break in the meeting, Shehata emphasized that she intended her criticism to be constructive and not destructive to the humane effort in the county and that she supports the sheltering effort. She said she opposes proposals by Wilson and County Manager Tom Stewart to either farm out animals to the Alamogordo pound or to assign county jail inmates the job of caring for the dogs and cats.

Shehata also said the idea of paying only for animals brought to the shelter by an impound officer would be a disservice to county residents.

The commission should provide a place for residents to bring unwanted litters, strays and animals for which they can no longer care, she said.

Spencer distressed by approach of some county commissioners

Although no one from the Humane Society of Lincoln County attended the meeting Thursday, former president Janie Spencer said Friday she is distressed by the approach of some Lincoln County Commissioners.

"I don't know why they are treating us so differently than other contractual services," she said. "Someone seems bent on trying to embarrass our hardworking and dedicated volunteers. At the meeting last month, they blindsided us by asking for information they had never requested before instead of calling ahead to allow us to bring the data they wanted or to discuss any concerns."

"Then before Thursday's meeting, we were told the item scheduled about the society was pulled. We found out after the meeting that without anyone there to rebut, Chairman Rex Wilson allowed very critical remarks about this group

to be voiced, a group that has struggled for 20 years to ensure humane treatment of animals."

Spencer said that the previous week, the society sent a letter to County Manager Tom Stewart and the commission notifying them that a certified public accountant had been hired to perform a financial review in an attempt to satisfy commission concerns and produce answers to any questions.

"Apparently, that letter never came up in the meeting," she said. "Instead they listened to a former board member who during her months with the society only attended two meetings that I recall. It would be difficult for anyone to grasp the operations of a group in such a short time."

The results of CPA Ronnie Hemphill's financial review and recommendations for any changes probably will be part of a discussion at next month's commission meeting, she said.
