Care center gets panel OK; neighbors vow appeal

A proposed 83-unit assisted-living facility received initial approvals Tuesday from Ruidoso's Planning and Zoning Commission, though some neighbors vowed to appeal the commission's decisions.

Sunwest Management Inc. of Salem, Ore., moved the facility site to a 9.3-acre property bordered by Wingfield, Center and Grindstone Canyon roads after another nearby property ran into unexpected problems with Ruidoso's transportation plan.

The new location Tuesday, however, ran into problems with permanent and seasonal residents close to the site.

Sunny Aris, who lives on nearby Spring Road, presented the commission with a petition she said called on "city hall to fight for us."

"Homeowners and residents are asking you to protect the water," Aris said. "To add over 70 and apparently 90 (residents) in a semi hospital ... will be a drain on resources."

Aris added that residential values in the neighborhood will be impacted, traffic will increase and wildlife will be disturbed. She called on the commission to require an environ-

mental impact study.

"That's private property," said commission Chairman Glen Barrow. "I'd like to see that and other properties kept as green spaces. But that's not the issue," Barrow said of the development's request for conditional use and commercial site development approvals.

Aris also claimed the timing of neighborhood notifications of the permit requests were suspect. She said property owners in the area received notices last Thursday or Friday, just before a holiday weekend.

Bob Fisk and some other nearby residents said the surrounding Wingfield Subdivision cur-

rently has poor water pressure making the development unacceptable.

"Greenspace isn't your job," Fisk told Barrow. "Your job is to take into account the entire best interest of the village. This is not in the best interest."

Barrow responded the commission was not to decide the best use of a piece of land but rather to follow the village's zoning ordinance and comprehensive plan.

Village Attorney Charles Rennick said the acreage is zoned neighborhood commercial, allowing for various business enterprises. He

Downs administrator: 'I will not be bashful'

Hired this summer, John P. Waters says he wants to make some changes in the way the village operates.

Ruidoso Downs' new village administrator, who began his job Tuesday, said he's not afraid to push for changes in the way business is done in government.

John P. Waters, who had been the deputy director of the City of Carlsbad Public Works Department, was hired by the village council in July.

"I am not going to micro-manage unless it's necessary," Waters said Tuesday during a break from a review of the village's ordinances. "I think the department heads can do their jobs. But I will be driving around checking. If I see things that need to be changed, I will not be bashful."

Noting the village's problems in recent years, from the legal battles with former employees to allegations of improper activities during governmental meetings, Waters said he wants to see changes.

"I intend to correct some of that," Waters said. "Some of the things are because people are unfamiliar with state regulations. Training is a big thing. I want some training, not only for staff but for everybody in the vil-

lage administration and the council. That would be advice I would give to the mayor and council."

Waters, who said he had extensive training while with the City of Carlsbad, stated even he desires to receive ongoing training.

"I feel that a lot of the problems with state regulations may be do to (a lack of) training," the village administrator said.

Waters, who said he is "learning" the municipality's employees, said he believes Ruidoso Downs has a good staff.


"I think they have the necessary tools here to provide the services to the community," Waters said. "If there is anything that I find that's not being done properly, I will make changes." Waters said becoming familiar with Ruidoso Downs' ordinances will be a priority. He said he was reviewing the codes with an eye toward ordinances the village needs.

"Coming from where I came from, in the Pecos Valley, water rights is an issue," he said. "I want to make sure the village has adequate water rights, and safe water rights, safe from pollution."

Waters becomes the second village administrator in Ruidoso Downs history. The village council created the position in late 1999 and hired Bob Durrett in January 2000. Durrett resigned in June 2000, citing personal and business matters.

Ruidoso will become a village with all its garbage dumpsters bear-proofed.

Mayor Robert Donaldson said the bear problem has become, and 100 new dumpsters will be purchased to make every trash receptacle bear-proof.

"We have been bear-proofing dumpsters in some areas," Donaldson said at Tuesday's vil-

lage council meeting. "The bears just go to other areas looking for food. We do have a commitment that we are going to bear-proof all dumpsters."

The mayor said 10 years ago Ruidoso had little problem with bears.

"Now they're everywhere," Donaldson said. "Animals are moving into urban areas because there is a food source and no natural predator. Ultimately people are going to have to be part of the solu-

tion."

He urged residents not to place food by the dumpsters in order to attract the bruins.

"In the end, the problem that's developing means the bears are going to pay the price," Donaldson said. "I know people that have had to go into their houses while eating their grilled hamburgers outside. It's going to take cooperation."

The mayor said there is not a part of town that hasn't seen bears searching for food.

Mayor laments loss of grocery tax money

The closing of one Furr's Supermarket in Ruidoso, and reduced sales at a second likely had an impact on Village of Ruidoso gross receipts tax revenues, said Mayor Robert Donaldson.

Speaking to village councilors, the mayor said despite the probable reduced sales tax revenues to the village, gross receipts tax collections for May and June were 1 percent higher than a year earlier.

"I don't know the effect of Furr's," Donaldson said. "Some went to Thriftway A lot probably went to the Downs."

The Wal-Mart Supercenter, with a grocery section, is in Ruidoso Downs.

"The Furr's on Mechem has been our largest gross receipts tax source," Donaldson said. "It is critical not only from a service aspect to the citizens of Ruidoso but also for gross receipts taxes."

Two months ago, a federal bankruptcy court approved the sale of 66 Furr's stores in New Mexico and West Texas to Fleming Companies Inc. Fleming has sold some of the stores, including the Mechem Drive facility. More than two dozen of the Furr's stores have been closed.

Donaldson and the council expressed relief that Lawrence Brothers IGA of Sweetwater, Texas, is stepping in to purchase the Sierra Mall Furr's store on Mechem Drive.



said the number of units planned for the assisted care and Alzheimer's unit would require a conditional-use permit.

"Me putting an urgent care center with a helipad and ambulances is out of the question," said Dr. Michael Nishitani, a proponent of assisted living center. "I see a lot of people that need this help. If we discourage this, then I think they're going to leave," he said of Sunwest's desire to be in Ruidoso.

Another nearby resident agreed that Ruidoso needed such a facility.

"I believe Ruidoso is entitled to an assisted living facility," said Sue Elliot. "I believe this is

not the proper place," she said of the Wingfield and Center streets location.

Michael Deines, with Sunwest, said the development would be large, but "not real imposing."

He labeled the planned 60,000-square-foot two-story building as fitting with the neighborhood with "gracious, park-like" surroundings.

Kathleen Kennedy, who said she lives in Ruidoso but not near the planned facility, said there is a need for assisted care living.

"There are many, many things that could be built there that would be adverse," Kennedy said.

"We're not against a senior home," Aris said. "We want you to have the infrastructure. You

cannot address these issues definitely today. We're asking you to make sure ... to take some time and figure this out."

Commissioners did call on the village to make sure water pressure would not become more of an issue. They also made some adjustments to the plans to take into account some concerns. The adjustments included a location for dumpsters inside the property and the possibility of providing property to widen intersections.

"I think it's pretty obvious we want to work with the village," Deines said. "Ruidoso absolutely has a need for it."

The commission's approval of a conditional use for the property can be appealed to the Ruidoso Village Council.

County to consider grant application

Lincoln County may be selected to administer a \$600,000 grant aimed at helping private property owners reduce the threat of wild fire on their land.

A special meeting is set for 9 a.m. Friday in the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

County Manager Tom Stewart will be asking for approval to electronically submit an application by Sept. 10 to the Forestry Division of the New Mexico Energy, Minerals and National Resources Department.

The application will request that the state designate the county as fiscal agent and coordinator of the Homeowner and Community Action Fuels Reduction program in Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Alto and of all residential locations in the surrounding areas.

In his memorandum to commissioners, Stewart wrote that the risk of catastrophic forest fire is probably the highest in the nation around the three population centers in the county and areas to the southwest because predominant wind patterns blow from that direction.

"The county is the logical governmental choice for (fiscal agent) and administering a cohesive strategy using the

existing Ruidoso Wildland Urban Interface group's expertise and recommendations for the elimination of the hazard from private lands," Stewart wrote.

The group discussed shifting the program's administration and from the South Central Mountain Resource Conservation and Development Council Inc. to an existing governmental agency last month, he wrote.

Because the area involved covers multi-jurisdictions, the county was the logical choice and was requested by the State Forestry, he wrote.

As now envisioned, the program could operate an estimated \$600,000 with the necessary match being provided by landowners.

A concept under consideration, but that may be refined includes:

- The county would hire an administrator to coordinate, and arrange necessary office support under contract and not to exceed 10 percent of the funding.

- State Forestry staff and the Ruidoso urban forester would inspect and provide recommendations for private landowners/associates who apply under the program. Only projects contributing to fire hazard reduction would be approved, not simply for aes-

thetics.

- Projects would be reviewed and endorsed by the interface group to ensure cohesion of strategy and after looking at the total picture of projects underway by all agencies.

- Landowners would complete the projects with help from a contractor.

- The state or the urban forester would inspect the job and authorized payment of 50 percent of the cost/effort by sending documentation through the county.

- The county administrator would process payment and apply for reimbursement.

In a related issue, Stewart at a commission meeting last month reported that the Peter Maggiore, Secretary of the Environment Department, lifted the ban on burning in Lincoln County, although permits still are required locally through the Ruidoso field office at 1216 East Mechem Drive.

However, the state is asking for the concurrence of local fire departments before permits are issued.

County Attorney Alan Morel told commissioners that having fire chiefs "sign off" on burn permits could shift potential liability to the county.

"Contacting the fire chief may be good, but actually signing off and authorizing, I wouldn't recommend," Morel said.

Rare butterfly may be endangered

A rare butterfly found only in the Sacramento Mountains outside Cloudcroft may be listed as an endangered species.

The high mountain meadows of native flowering plants outside that village in neighboring Otero County are home to Sacramento Mountains checkerspot butterflies. Their limited range is one reason the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is asking that the butterfly with its unique dark brown, red, orange and white checked wings be protected under the Endangered Species Act, according to Elizabeth Slown of the service's Albuquerque office.

The proposal will be published in the Federal Register

early this month and the public will have 60 days from the date of the publication to comment on any aspect of the proposal and submit additional scientific information.

A key element to the proposal would set aside 5,000 acres or 54 square miles, of critical habitat. About half (2,645 acres) of the proposed critical habitat is federally owned and the rest, 2,553 acres, is private land. The area lies primarily south of U.S. 82, and surrounds Cloudcroft, which is about 40 miles south of Ruidoso.

The decision announced Thursday was in response to a petition filed by the Center for Biodiversity in January 1999. The service was required under the act to respond to the petition and decide if listing the butterfly is warranted.

The Sacramento Mountains checkerspot butterfly has a wingspan of about two inches. Its larvae and caterpillars use three types of native plants, the New Mexico penstemon, sneezeweed and valerian. The butterfly inhabits mountain meadows, grasslands or

drainages within the mixed-conifer forest between an elevation of 8,000 feet above sea level and 9,000 feet, Slown said.

Other specific components in a successful habitat include less than 5 percent of canopy cover.

Other plants used for egg laying are the arrowleaf groundsel, curly-cup gumplant, sigworts, skyrocket, milkweed, Arizona rose and Wheeler's wallflower, Slown said.

Extensive surveys for larvae and the adult butterflies were conducted between 1997 and 2000, she said.

The service used the information, along with published and unpublished reports of butterfly surveys throughout the Sacramento Mountains, to determine that the butterfly is found only within a 33-square-mile area.

Within that small area, the butterfly's distribution is patchy and unconnected, she said. Currently, the Service's best information shows that many areas of suitable habitat may be small, supporting few numbers of butterflies.

Man arrested in cow death

A Picacho man was arrested Aug. 28, accused of shooting a neighbor's cow.

Walter Gass was described as upset with a neighbor's cows grazing on his property, according to a Lincoln County Sheriff's Department report. The animal was shot to death. The cow was owned by Ramon Prudenico.

Gass, who was taken by deputies to the Lincoln County Detention Center, was charged with injury to livestock.

A sheriff's department official said while disputes sometimes arise over ranch animals that wander beyond fence lines, the killing of livestock is a rare occurrence in Lincoln County.

Glaucoma

The exact cause of glaucoma is not known and cannot currently be prevented. It is one of the leading causes of blindness in the U.S. today but if detected early and treated promptly, it can be controlled and vision loss can be minimized. Most frequently, glaucoma occurs in people over 40, those who have a family history of glaucoma, persons who are extremely nearsighted, or who are diabetic. Glaucoma is more common among blacks than whites.

- Tonometry - a simple and painless measurement of the pressure in the eye.
- Ophthalmoscopy - an examination of the back of the eye to observe the health of the optic nerve.
- Visual field test - a check for the development of blind spots.

Glaucoma can usually be treated effectively by using eye drops or other medicines. Unfortunately, any loss of vision from glaucoma usually cannot be restored.

ENMU-Ruidoso 'bursting at seams' as term begins

The Ruidoso Instruction Center is bursting at the seams, with 114 more students taking classes now than last fall.

On Aug. 31, the fifth day of classes, 708 students had enrolled for classes at Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso. A year ago, 594 students had enrolled by the fifth day, said Jim Miller, director of the center.

Miller attributes the near-16 percent increase in enrollment to more students receiving financial aid and taking more classes; a "sharp increase" in young Mescalero and Hispanic students from Lincoln and Otero counties; more professional development classes taken by teaching staffs in Ruidoso and Capitan, and new classes.

"We had three online classes a year ago; now we have nine," Miller said. "Every one topped out in enrollment and we had to turn away students. I capped those classes at 15 students, and in several of them, the faculty said they would take another person or two and we still turned people away."

Some of the new classes this semester include a watercolor painting class, two new Microsoft applications certificate classes and a new criminal justice class for a degree in police science.

"We are bursting at the

seams," Miller said.

The facility itself is taxed to accommodate the classes and Ruidoso High School has run out of daytime space for ENMU classes for high school students, Miller said. The mostly part-time staff has received more teaching assignments and the classes are larger.

"We've shifted a number of those classes to online, so (that) relieves some of the pressure for space," Miller said.

"Online classes are popular because students like the convenience," he said, "but they're not for everybody and lots of people would benefit much more from having live instruction in the classrooms. It's one way to get some temporary relief."

Miller said an architect has prepared a plan for developing more classrooms, labs, a larger library, more computer labs, vocational classrooms and faculty offices, and the instruction center has been seeking funding to implement the plan. Room for growth is available in the center's building.

"We've got several applications in the pipeline now and we'll see later this fall if we're going to be successful or not," he said. "This rise in the enrollment simply underscores the need to do that pretty quickly."

ENMU-Portales reported a 1.84 percent increase in its preliminary enrollment over last year. The final census day for enrollment is Sept. 14.

Failed attempt

A Ruidoso man was arrested Sunday on a felony charge of burglary. Michael A. Conner, 30, is accused of trying to steal liquor from a Midtown Ruidoso bar and battering a bartender, according to a Ruidoso police report.

Conner had reportedly been bounced from Win, Place and Show and returned to the building. A bartender went into an office area near the back bar and discovered a man taking some miniature liquor bottles from a shelf. When the bartender went to stop the man he allegedly began hitting and pushing the bartender. Conner was also accused of dragging the woman bartender by her head before breaking away and fleeing the office area. The bartender followed Conner onto the street, where police officers saw the pursuit. Conner is also charged with misdemeanor counts of battery, criminal trespass and disorderly conduct. He was ordered by a judge to be detained on a \$12,000 bond.

Four people charged

Four people were charged

with crimes after Ruidoso police tracked down a vehicle reported as stolen from Oklahoma.

Officers were notified on Aug. 27 that a stolen vehicle and a runaway juvenile from Oklahoma were possibly in Ruidoso, reportedly on their way to Mexico. The vehicle, with three men inside, was spotted and followed to a motel parking lot on Sudderth Drive about 11:30 p.m.

Arrested were a 17-year-old boy from Sand Springs, Okla., described as the driver, Joseph David Paterson, 19, Manford, Okla.; and Joshua B. Johnson, 20, Ruidoso. The youth and Patterson were charged with felony possession of a stolen vehicle and being a minor in possession of alcohol. Johnson, who police said first met the 17- and 19-year-olds that day, was charged only with being a minor in possession of alcohol.

At the motel, police rounded up a 16-year-old girl from Manford, Okla. The girl's father, who had reported his vehicle stolen, was notified of the recovery of the automobile and his daughter.

A Ruidoso woman, in the motel room with the girl, was

arrested after police said they saw her place something on a window sill and close a curtain. The item later tested positive for marijuana, according to police reports.

Alvessa Rodriguez, 38, was charged with misdemeanor possession of less than one ounce of marijuana and felony tampering with evidence.

Party 'too loud'

Police cited four people, including three minors, after responding just before 11 p.m. Aug. 27 to a call of a loud party at a Sudderth Drive motel/apartment complex.

Sean A. Davis, 19, Ruidoso, James H. Brandburn, 19, Mescalero and a 16-year-old boy were cited with being minors in possession of alcohol.

Melody I. Haskin, 42, Ruidoso, was cited for providing alcohol to minors.

Linsey David Brown, 19, Ruidoso, was arrested on charges of misdemeanor possession of less than one ounce of marijuana and felony tampering with evidence. A police report stated officers witnessed Brown attempt to hide a bag of marijuana. Officers said they

found small quantities of marijuana in Brown's pocket and in his vehicle.

Items believed stolen

Ruidoso police are awaiting an inventory of items believed stolen from a seasonal residence in the 400 block of Paradise Canyon Drive.

A neighbor called police on Aug. 23, reporting a broken window on a porch of the home. An unknown number of items were believed missing. The felony burglary and felony larceny incident was thought to have occurred between July 8 and Aug. 23.

Vehicle burglarized

A felony burglary from a motor vehicle as well as larceny and criminal damage to property cases are under investigation by Ruidoso police.

The operator of a car parked at Taco Bell, 654 Sudderth Drive, told officers that she found a dented fender when she went to her vehicle shortly after 10 p.m. Aug. 26. Later, after driving home, she noticed a radar detector and portable CD player were missing from

the car.

The items were valued at \$150. Police voided an initial hit-and-run accident report on the fender damage, determining the damage was an intentional act.

Trying to play fair with part-time residents

Users of garbage pickup services provided by the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority — those who live in the county only part of the year — have a point: why pay for garbage services when they are not used?

It's a tough problem being tackled by Debra Ingle, the LCSWA acting manager, and the board. Good luck to them, because defining a scheme that separates full-time residents, seasonal home-owners and sometime renters seems well nigh impossible.

Then there's a question about

large-tract owners who might handle their own disposal, presumably on their own property at their own cost.

It's a problem worthy of Solomon, compounded by state and federal laws mandating regulated disposal of solid waste.

Here, for what it's worth, is one possibility: Let the county, Carrizozo, Capitan and Corona add gross receipts taxes to cover the cost of solid waste disposal. That would then make it universal, with the extra benefit to LCSWA that *nobody* could really tell how much it costs to dump their garbage.

Finding a fresh viewpoint

Where would we be today without progress? Despite imprisonment, Galileo pursued his radical thinking about astronomy and physics. Christopher Columbus braved the unknown to discover a New World filled with opportunity and promise. If the Wright brothers had listened to their critics, man might not be traveling through space, let alone the friendly skies.

History is littered with countless examples of how nay-sayers have tried to thwart change. No doubt fear of the unknown is a powerful persuader, and there are always plenty of people just waiting to point out the risks inherent in life.

The use of biotechnology is one of the most hotly debated issues of our day. Biotech opponents dressed in plastic suits and carrying signs warning of impending doom show up at events around the world. Acts such as destroying research fields are viewed as righteous in the fight against this new science. Governments buckle under pressure from protestors to slap excessive rules and regulations on research and tolerance levels.

However, missing from the headlines is the question: What good can biotechnology bring to the world?

The Council for Biotechnology is one source trying to weed through the rhetoric to find the answer to that question. In trying to balance the constant messages that the sky is always falling, the Council has made a commitment to provide information to help consumers better understand the

benefits of biotechnology and encourage informed debate.

Tying in with National Inventors' Month, the Council is seeking input from a new source by asking children, ages 8-12, to imagine that they are scientists on a quest to create a food that can help the world. To participate, young inventors will draw a picture of their proposed food and describe it in 50 to 100 words. The nationwide contest called "Food of the Future" is open until Sept. 30, with details featured on the Council's web site at www.why-biotech.com.

To help children planning to enter the contest, the Council's Web site offers a variety of questions to spark their creativity. "If you could grow a food that would help the environment, what would it do?"

"If you could grow a food that would cure a disease, what would it be?" "Is there a food you wish would stay fresh longer?" "If you could change a food so it would grow anywhere, what would it be and where could it grow?"

Intriguing questions, and with a little imagination, children just may be able to come up with some interesting answers that adults haven't even considered. Maybe it's time for adults to be more like children and look at new discoveries and change as exciting. The possibilities for biotechnology are endless. Common sense, creativity and the courage to explore will be needed as the food of the future is discovered.

Education: Better, but not different

WHITIE PLAINS, N.Y. — With children back for another school year and elected officials debating the fate of "failing schools," a newly released national survey by Teachers' Insurance Plan reveals that public school parents have their own set of answers that runs counter to some of the solutions currently on the table. And the parents are prepared to put their money where their mouths are to pay for their priorities.

Given the choice, 65 percent of public school parents would rather see more money go to public education than toward a tax cut. That preference had wide support within virtually all demographics of Americans surveyed, including the parents of children in private schools, of whom 55 percent agreed.

Asked to set priorities for schools, Americans surveyed overall ranked class size and teacher salaries at the top of their list; 29 percent said reducing class size was their number one priority. Paying teachers a "fair wage" came in a close second, with 26 percent of those surveyed ranking it number one. Those two items beat out all other education priorities by substantial margins, which included tutors for failing students (16 percent), providing classroom computers (11 percent), school building repair (7 percent), voucher pro-

grams (5 percent) and additional pre-K classes (3 percent).

The survey also revealed that some of the other high-profile solutions currently being considered by legislators around the country lack public support. Public school parents believe using standardized tests as a measure of a school's success has a downside; 53 percent saying that standardized testing forces teachers to "focus too much attention on subjects to be tested," to the detriment of a broader education.

However, when faced with a school that is failing on standardized tests, 54 percent believe education funding should be increased to "bring up the quality of the education" being provid-

ed, rather than developing alternative programs.

One such program, school vouchers, which is often cited as an answer to failing schools, proved highly unpopular in the survey.

Just 35 percent of Americans surveyed support the creation of a voucher program to improve the education system, with 56 percent believing the program would ultimately reduce the money available to local public schools.

The only category of adults polled who favor vouchers are parents of children already in private schools. Some 66 percent of private school parents support the creation of voucher programs.

'Someday' comes for cafe dreamer

Christine Ponce dreamed for the past five years of someday operating the Apache Summit Cafe.

That "someday" arrived over the weekend, as Ponce reopened the cafe on U.S. 70, about nine miles south of Ruidoso with the help of family and her ex-husband and best friend, Thadd Ponce.

Ponce said Friday she knows it will take time to build the business, but she's hoping that keeping dependable hours and offering good home cooking — topped by her father Alvino Saenz famous chile — will bring customers in for the first time and back again.

"For the last three years, we've always talked about when we get the Summit Cafe and now it's here," Thadd Ponce said Friday. "We will take things slowly and one step at a time."

Plans include incorporating a mini-mart, where people on the road can stop for items such as chips, coffee, soft drinks, car oil, fish bait, napkins and candy bars.

"I've always wanted to open my own restaurant," Christine Ponce said. "It's been a long wait. It took a long time to convince them to let me lease it."

Over the years, she's worked concession stands and snack bars, but this is her first restaurant. She credited the staff of New Mexico Works with giving her the right mixture of encouragement and a

chance to develop practical skills.

"New Mexico Works is a great program. They helped with transportation and child care and offered me a lot of training sessions," Ponce said. "They say you can do what you put your mind to. Set goals and you can accomplish them if you work hard. Anyone who has the opportunity should take advantage of the program."

The admiration is mutual, said New Mexico Works placement specialist Maurice Gudgel.

"We're very proud of her," Gudgel said of Ponce Tuesday.

"Our program deals with those on food stamps and public assistance," she said. "The first thing we do is test them to

see what they need, GED (high school equivalency diploma) classes, life skills, English as a second language. Christine was able to come in from Mescalero because I use Zia Transportation out of Alamogordo. We put her in life skills, a six-week module program. She learned to do a resume, use the computer somewhat, and many other skills."

During that class, Ponce also heard about child development from a specialist and the Small Business Administration went over skills such as developing own data base for inventory, Gudgel said.

"After she finished life skills, I put her into keyboarding and she earned three college credits and an A at

Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso," Gudgel said. "She went right on into a customized service training class where she learned about dealing with the public."

Next, Ponce attended a computer class where she mastered different applications and how to do presentations.

"I put a lot of time into it, but I got a lot out of it," Ponce said.

She knows the months ahead will require a great deal of hard work, but she's ready.

"We'll be open from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. everyday including weekends," she said. "We're doing it for our kids."

The menu will feature enchiladas, tacos, Indian tacos and fry bread as well as menudo, a chile soup perfected by her father.

She's encouraged by people who stopped and said they wished the cafe was opened while the couple was preparing the new business. They've also noticed the number of cars with problems pulled off on the side of the road and are considering a future expansion to help those stranded drivers.

Truckers already frequently pull off at the summit just to take a breather after the long climb and the couple hope it won't take long for word to get around that the cafe is up and running.

Leaving nothing to chance, they plan on putting up several signs along the highway and in the restaurant parking lot letting everyone know the coffee's hot and the food's tasty.

MAGISTRATE COURT

Vasquez was credited for 56 days served in jail, put on probation until March 25, 2003, ordered to make restitution to a victim and pay \$51 in court fees.

Keith Hendrickson, 32, Ruidoso Downs, through a plea agreement, was found guilty of misdemeanor aggravated battery and resisting a police officer. Charges of felony aggravated battery on a household member and assault on a household member were dismissed.

Hendrickson was sentenced to 20 days at the Lincoln County Detention Center with credit for 10 days already spent in jail, put on probation until July 24, 2003, and assessed court fees of \$82.

Justin Singletary, 20, Ruidoso Downs, through a plea agreement, was convicted of misdemeanor aggravated battery.

A charge of felony aggravated battery was dismissed. Singletary was credited for three days spent at the Ruidoso

Downs police lock-up, placed on probation until Aug. 12, 2002, ordered to pay restitution to a victim, told to remain employed or in school and assessed \$51 in court courts.

Darryl Matthews, 39, Ruidoso, was convicted of violating probation, driving with a suspended license and speeding.

Matthews was sentenced to 30 days at the Lincoln County Detention Center, put on probation through Jan. 24, 2003 and assessed fines and court fees totaling \$308.

Albert L. Beckwith, 58, Albuquerque, through a plea agreement, was convicted of third offense driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or drugs and driving without a valid driver's license. Charges of fourth offense DWI and driving with a revoked license were dismissed.

Beckwith was sentenced to 30 days in jail, given credit for 23 days already served at the Lincoln County Detention Center, put on probation for 424 days and required to pay fines and court costs of \$988.

Matthew Morgenstern, 21, Ruidoso Downs, pleaded guilty to a charge of disorderly conduct.

Morgenstern was credited for one day spent in jail, placed on probation for 181 days, required to attend Alcoholics Anonymous meetings twice weekly and assessed a fine and court costs totaling \$151.

Enrique Vazquez, 43, Capitan, pleaded guilty to a charge of second offense DWI. Vazquez was sentenced to three days in jail, credited for one day already served, put on probation for 361 days, assessed \$699 in a fine and court costs and required to perform 48 hours of community service.

"It's basically from Maine to Louisiana. It's a huge area but there are fewer tribes than in the West," Recker said.

Recker noted there are a couple of large Native American tribes in Florida, a state that has been plagued in recent years by large wildfires. He called the fire problem in Florida significant.

Recker will begin his new position on Sept. 17.

In addition to being the forest manager at Mescalero the past four years, Recker also served a time as the acting BIA supervisor for the local Apache Tribe.

'Suspect' Futurity

Ausual Suspect overtakes favorites; gets victory in 43rd All American

Ausual Suspect proved the morning odds-makers wrong, as he won the 43rd All American Futurity Monday at Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Casino.

Trainer John Bassett qualified three horses for the \$2 million race, but most bettors thought Tres Seis had the best shot at giving him the win.

Ausual Suspect broke from the 10th post position and stayed on the outside, barely edging out Tres Seis and Ms Wandas Fortune at the wire.

The Strawly Special colt's victory on Monday was his first stakes win, and gave owners Charlie and Deborah Therwanger and trainer Bassett their second victories in the futurity.

"I'll be dancing in the streets of Dewey, Ariz., tonight," said Bassett, a native of Dewey.

Bassett became the first trainer to have horses finish 1-2 in the futurity since Jack Brooks did it in 1982 with Mr. Master, Bug and Miss Squaw Hand.

As the first-ever All American Futurity mount for 24-year-old jockey Dennis Means, Ausual Suspect drifted toward the outside rail early before straightening out and focusing on the finish line. The colt covered 440 yards on a fast track in :21.542.

"My horse broke good, but about the second jump he cupped out (missed the ground) just a little," said Means. "I wasn't concerned about being on the far outside - not with this horse. He's a professional. He doesn't

look at anything, even when you lope him. He just goes out and does his job.

"I was hitting him left-handed early, and I didn't care if he drifted out just a little bit," he added. "But when he started getting too far out, I switched back and started hitting him right-handed. After that, he ran as straight as a string."

Ridden by Joe Badilla in his trial, Ausual Suspect defeated Love That Chapelle by a half of a length and recorded the third-fastest qualifying time. Means picked up the mount when Badilla elected to ride second-fastest qualifier Tres Seis for owner Gwendolyn Eaves. Eaves, Bassett and Badilla teamed to win the 1999 All American with A Delightful Dasher.

Chiefs score 89 in victory over Reserve

A week after turnovers cost the Mescalero High School football team its season opener, the Chiefs used Reserve's mistakes on their way to an 89-53 blowout of the Mountaineers.

Raymond Bigmouth led the charge with nine touchdowns on 246 yards rushing and 92 yards receiving from two catches. Bigmouth also scored a TD on a kickoff return.

Everyone contributed, though, as quarterback Randy Fulson threw for three scores and the Mescalero defense scored on a fumble recovery.

"If you could figure out a way to score, we did it," said first-year Chief coach Rodney Wright.

That included a touchdown by the kickoff team. After a 60-yard kick return for a score by Gerald Blake, the Chiefs fell on a fumbled Reserve return attempt in the end zone to make the score 89-46 late in the fourth quarter.

The game was never in doubt, as the Mountaineers didn't get within 17 points after the first quarter.

"For this early in the season - and you can always get better - we played close to mistake-free football on Friday," Wright said.

While six-man football is often high-scoring, what the Chiefs accomplished Friday impressed their coach.

"We really executed well," he said. "This says a lot about our kids' focus. This win was big, period. It was huge."

The victory was the second in Mescalero's last three games, dating back to 2000. The Chiefs beat Reserve 60-40 at home in their last game of the season. Friday's win was the second in the program's four-year history, and its first road victory, although Wright was just glad for the win.

"Being at home or on the road is just geography," Wright said. "We determine how we play. We can't let these things control us."

Mescalero travels to Dell City, Texas, Friday for a 7 p.m. match-up.

"When Joe called me and asked me which one was doing best, I told him we had a little trouble getting Suspect to make that turn," said Bassett.

"We started to win this race the day after the trials, and Suspect didn't make that turn real well," added Bassett. "He went off his feed tub, and it

looked like his trial really knocked him out. He was in the one hole in his trial - he was the only one to qualify from the rail - and I think it took a lot out of him."

Ausual Suspect's win, witnessed by a record crowd of 16,749, was the colt's third in four races. The winner's share of the \$1,996,368 purse boosted

his earnings to \$1,003,564 and placed him 32nd on the sport's all-time earnings list. He broke his maiden in a Rainbow Futurity (G1) trial on July 6 and posted the 11th-fastest qualifying time, but he was scratched from the consolation and saved for the All American trials.

"These horses are fresh and they're sound," said Bassett, who also qualified Doc Colby, which ran seventh in the final. "I truly believe that's the only way you can win this race. You've got to wait for this dance, and when you find a partner, you've got to ride him to the finish line."

Ms Wandas Fortune, the runner-up in the June 9 Heritage Place Futurity (G1) at Remington Park, ran third, and was followed by fastest qualifier Grand Coeur, Spittin And Splittin, Love That Chapelle, Doc Colby, Phenomenal Fantasy, Rudustys Chick and Almost Flyin.

The Therwangers, who live in Lubbock, Texas, won their first All American in 1992 with

champion Dash Thru Traffic. They acquired Ausual Suspect for \$82,000 at last year's Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Yearling and Mixed Stock Sale.

"This was better than the first time," said Charlie Therwanger, an ex-drag racing driver. "With Dash Thru Traffic, we really felt we had a lock if he broke well, and he did. But in this race, there were other horses you could have made a case for."

Bred by Alan and Denise Tyler of Bangor, Calif., Ausual Suspect is the first starter produced by Tylers First Down, a stakes-winning daughter of leading active sire First Down Dash. A winner of four of 18 races, including the 1996 QHBC Juvenile Classic (G3) at Los Alamitos, Tylers First Down earned \$83,047.

Bassett said that Ausual Suspect will be shipped to California to prepare for the Golden State Futurity (G1) at Los Alamitos in the fall. Bassett pulled off the All American-Golden State parlay in 1999 with A Delightful Dasher.

Vocational education gets federal grant

Vocational students in seven school districts as well as the Mescalero and Alamo Navajo schools are expected to benefit by a federal grant that creates new vocational education programs or upgrades current programs, according to Gary Cozzens, career education coordinator with the Region IX Education Cooperative in Ruidoso.

Cozzens announced that the Carl Perkins Grant funds are federal flow-through monies through the New Mexico Department of Education. The current fiscal year grant is for \$89,187 and is the second year of a four-year funding cycle grant.

The focus areas of the REC consortium that includes the school districts of Capitan, Carrizozo, Cloudercroft, Corona, Hondo Valley and Ruidoso are agriculture and natural resources, information technology and business. The eligible participants are vocational students ages 14 to 21.

"The grant will establish new programs or upgrade the existing programs and also align with career goals as identified by the new department of education," said Cozzens, who is also the Carl Perkins program manager.

Region IX adds staff

New employees have joined the Region IX Education Cooperative for the July 1 contract year: Holly Dooley, a family service coordinator in the Developmental Services Program, was with the Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School 10 years, and moves from the Medicaid Assistant position. She has a bachelor's degree in sociology and criminal justice and a master's degree in guidance and counseling from Western New Mexico University.

Rosita Saenz is a developmental specialist in the Developmental Services Program and recently completed her field experience as an occupational therapy assistant with the REC IX school districts. She holds an associate degree in occupational therapy from Eastern New Mexico University-Roswell.

Evelyn Sanchez is the new Medicaid assistant/data entry clerk in the offices of Medicaid in the Schools and School Based Health Clinics in the Ruidoso and Hondo schools.

Beverly Smith and Cynthia Trujillo have been employed as Head Start teachers at the Lincoln County Head Start, Ruidoso site. Smith has been a Youth Program supervisor for

Presbyterian Medical Services and has been associated with the Mescalero Head Start program. She has an associate's degree in general studies from Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso. Trujillo is a former mentor at Casa Allegra in Ruidoso.

Advanced Placement programs increase

New Mexico experienced a 17.9 percent increase in the number of public schools with an Advanced Placement Program in 2001, according to a state summary report issued from the College Board. The number of public school AP candidates grew in all ethnic groups in 2001.

Of the state's AP test takers, 87 percent were from public schools. AP candidates grew in all ethnic groups, including a 25.9 percent increase in Hispanic candidates, a 22.2 percent increase in American Indian candidates, a 10.3 percent increase in black AP candidates and a 0.9 percent increase in Asian candidates. The number of white AP candidates grew by 22.3 percent.

New Mexico led a four-state region, including Arizona, Colorado and Utah, in the percentage increase in the number of AP exams taken in 2001.

SAT scores improve

On a scale of 200 to 800, New Mexico students averaged a score of 551 on the verbal and 542 on the math portion of the college entrance examination, compared with national averages of 506 on the verbal and 514 on the math.


Thirteen percent of the state's high school graduates, or 2,379 students, including 73 percent from public schools, took the SAT an increase of 57 students over last year.

Parents satisfied

For the fourth year in a row, a strong majority of public school parents responding to the New Mexico State Department of Education's "Quality of Education survey" believes their children are safe in school and that schools hold high expectations for their children's academic achievement.

A majority also agrees that school staffs maintain consistent discipline and employ various instructional methods and strategies to meet children's needs. Results show that 91 percent of elementary school parents responding believe teachers provide sufficient and appropriate information regarding their children's academic progress.

Win a promotion: learn to read

Martha Vaca owes her promotion at the Ruidoso Care Center to her volunteer tutor who helped her improve her reading skills.

The first time she met her tutor, Norma Hendon, she thought she wasn't going to learn anything because she hadn't learned when she was young. Coming to the United States early in life, her limited English abilities made school here extremely difficult, so she dropped out in fifth grade.

Before working with Hendon, she said, "I didn't know how to make sentences. I couldn't do it. Now I can do it."

"We picked out certain words she had to know to fill out her charts in the Alzheimer's Unit," Hendon said.

Vaca's supervisor called Mary Allen, coordinator of the Lincoln County Literacy Council, saying he had an employee with a lot of potential who needed help reading and writing patient reports, and asked if Allen could get a tutor. He brought her to the office at the Lincoln County Works Center and they talked about Vaca's goals. After a brief evaluation of her literacy abilities, she hooked her up with Hendon.

After three months of weekly meetings with her tutor, Vaca was able to take a class and successfully complete the examination afterward, landing herself a raise and a promotion.

And it doesn't stop there. Her next goal is to take the GED exam and then enter a nursing program.

"I have a 13-year-old and I help her with her homework now," Vaca said. She also spends two to three hours every day working on her own studies: doing exercises, making up stories from pictures.

"I want to learn. I really want to do it," she said. "I wanted to learn to read and write to do better on my paperwork (at the care center). I'm able to do my paperwork now; I have to write how the residents behaved. Before, my co-workers did it for me."

Her advice to others who might be fearful of working with a tutor on reading: "You're never too old to do it."

Allen said the tutors receive between 12 and 15 hours of training and then she matches them with people who want to learn to read or improve their reading skills. Hendon had been a literacy tutor for 10 years in Texas, and has been a volunteer in Lincoln County for four years.

"This is one of the most rewarding

things I have done," Hendon said.

About 35 students receive tutoring. The majority of them are English as a Second Language (or ESL) students, Allen said. Some of them work in small groups and some take classes in the evening through Adult Basic Education, directed by Sandy Kashmar.

"The core program is to teach people to read and to speak and write in English," Allen said. "There are two kinds of students: native English-speakers who have difficulty reading and the student whose native tongue is other than English."

Allen said that, according to the last census, about 17 percent of Lincoln County residents read at the lowest level. The New Mexico Coalition for Literacy defines people at this level as having "difficulty locating simple information in a news article or applying basic math to determine the total on a sales receipt."

Because of the high number of retirees in Lincoln County, Allen has plenty of tutors available, but many of those who could benefit from the program don't call.

"There's still a stigma attached to learning to read and telling someone you don't know how to read," Allen said. "It's particularly difficult in a small community where everyone knows everyone else."

The successes of those who do participate are gratifying, though. Allen said several students who started out at about second-grade level in ESL are now working on math, reading and grammar to eventually attend college classes.

Student-tutor pairs meet in many different places. Vaca and Hendon meet in a vacant office at the care center. One pair meets at the Ruidoso Senior Center. Others meet at churches, Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso and other places.

Allen, who's been working with the literacy program for 2 1/2 years, has some wishes: She wishes the program had more of a center for students and tutors to meet in, and a computer dedicated to literacy and ESL. She wishes she could reach more people who need help with reading.

As it is, some students are referred to her

from the One-Stop Career Center in the Work Center, which includes the Department of Labor and New Mexico Works and ENMU-Ruidoso's Adult Basic Education, of which the literacy program is a part.

"I wish more employers would encourage their employees, when they recognize someone, especially those who have potential and desire to learn," Allen said. "I've talked with major employers and they say they have people who might take advantage of the tutoring, but none have."

The Lincoln County Literacy Council is a part of the New Mexico Coalition for Literacy, a nonprofit organization funded by a grant through the New Mexico State Library. Basic funding comes from the coalition and the rest is from private grants from Wal-Mart, Texas-New Mexico Power Company, Presbyterian Health Foundation, Rotary and Altruus.

"My goal is to see the program continue to grow," Allen said. "I'd like to reach more of the basic reading students out there who can benefit from the program."

She also wants to put tutors in work situations to reach basic reading and ESL students and has applied for a grant to fund it. The literacy council received a grant to give hospital personnel an in-service period, teaching them how to recognize people with literacy problems and to refer them to the literacy program.

The program, which started in September of 1997, has improved the reading skills of 140 students, Allen said. It has also put out a brochure in English and Spanish that is given to mothers of newborn babies at the hospital encouraging them to read to their babies.

"The numbers don't tell the whole story. Reading is just so fundamental to success in everything in life. When you teach one person to read, you touch the lives of their children and (provide) a role model that shows them that education is important and can help improve life for generations to come," Allen said.

"With better reading skills, people can improve their economic levels, there are more opportunities for jobs and for advancement in jobs, which, in turn, improves their quality of life and their ability to provide for their family."
