

Attack stalls sale of center

An offer to purchase the Ruidoso Care Center was accepted by Integrated Health Services, but terrorist attacks last week in New York temporarily halted work on the sale.

Charlie Dillard, president of the Lincoln County Care Center Inc., a non-profit group formed to keep the center on Resort Drive open, said IHS accepted the group's first offer and a letter of intent was suppose to be sent to the state Department of Health last week when the tragedy occurred.

"The offices of the lawyers is across the street from the World Trade Center, so you can imagine," Dillard said. "We talked to them Tuesday and they're set up again and ready to go. We were dead for a week."

While that process is underway, the group is searching for financing, he said.

"There's plenty out there, but we'd like to keep it local without being too costly," he said.

While things with the center are in limbo, IHS continues to manage the operation, but the state put a freeze on admitting new clients, Dillard said.

That's a shame for the people who want to stay in the Ruidoso center and for the group buying it, Dillard said.

"We're trying to get that lifted," he said. "Over the past couple of weeks, we could have added 17 clients and that would have been good for the operation and for the bankers looking at financing."

The community-based movement to acquire the center was spawned by IHS's decision several months ago to close two wings of the 80-plus bed center. After several transfer appeals were filed and the company was cited by the state for an inadequate letter of notification to residents, IHS officials announced the entire center would close.

The state filed for receivership to stop the closure. That action was put on hold pending the results of purchase negotiations of the Lincoln group.

Forester to testify before Senate panel

■ Rick Delaco, Ruidoso's urban forester, will testify next week before a U.S. Senate subcommittee on the need for changes to the U.S. Forest Service's Southwestern management plans.

Village of Ruidoso urban forester Rick Delaco will press the federal government to approve proposed amendments to the USDA Forest Service's management plans in the Southwest Region.

Delaco is scheduled to testify Tuesday in Washington, D.C. before a subcommittee of the Senate's Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

Delaco said the amendments would allow the creation of a "buffer zone" on national forest lands to protect communities from wildfires. He added the possible half-mile wide zone would likely be opposed by environmental groups.

"It's time to reprioritize the human element," Delaco said of the concern of a wildfire moving into Ruidoso from public lands. "The environmental element is still there, but the human element must be placed higher."

The urban forester is one of a handful of people invited to testify before the Senate subcommittee at 2:30 p.m., Eastern time.

Delaco said he will also testify about the effectiveness of the National Fire Plan in regard to the 2001 fire season. He said federal programs that provide funding for both the public and private sectors to reduce forest fuels must be continued.

"Especially getting the money on the ground — the money that goes to private land owners," Delaco said. The Ruidoso area recently received \$300,000 to help subsidize tree thinning projects on selected over forested private lands.

Delaco said he'll also tell Senators about the Ruidoso Wildland Urban Interface Group, a committee of area government agencies, working collaboratively to address wildfire concerns around Ruidoso.

The group includes county, village, state, federal and tribal representatives.

Delaco said the Ruidoso input before the Senate panel is being sought because of the community's listing as a top concern nationwide in respect to forest fires, and because of the village's efforts to address wildfire hazards and implementing forest fuels reduction projects.

Humane Society support wide, county financial review shows

A financial review of the records of the Humane Society of Lincoln County Thursday showed that the four government entities contracting for shelter services shoulder less than 50 percent of the actual cost of the operation.

Supporters of the non-profit group and the thrift shop it runs make up the difference, said certified public accountant Ronnie Hemphill.

The society spent \$184,150 to shelter lost, abandoned or impounded animals in fiscal year 2000-2001 and collected \$78,435 from the four government entities using the shelter on Gavilan Canyon Road, Hemphill said.

"I think your main thrust was an accountability issue," he said to commissioners who asked for an audit of the society.

Although he did not do an audit, Hemphill said he performed a financial review containing profit and loss, liability and asset totals which should help commissioners determine if the county's proposed annual appropriation of \$25,000 for the shelter is appropriate, he said.

The report shows "that operational expenses exceed significantly what the society received in support from government agencies," he said.





Event fosters hope and help

Organizers for the annual breast cancer awareness run/walk are off to a running start and prepared to take registrations from 5-7 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 26 at The Village Buttery.


Run for the BEACH, which stands for Breast Cancer Education, Awareness, Cure and Hope, is in its fifth year of raising funds for mammograms for Lincoln County residents. The 501(c)(3) tax exempt organization was founded by Cathy Krugjohann in 1997 and was honored last year with the Governor's Award for Outstanding New Mexico Women for her work with BEACH. To date, the event has paid for more than 600 mammograms.

This year's event starts in the parking lot of McGary's Studio on Sudderth Drive at 7:30 a.m. for a warm-up by Cathi McIntosh, and the actual race starts at 8 a.m. on Sudderth to Mechem Drive and back. Registration and packet-pickup is Wednesday at The Village Buttery, but people can register at 7 a.m. on Sept. 29, said Mary Weaver, one of the organizers. Registration is \$20.

The run/walk is sponsored by donations from merchants, so the cost of the BEACH T-shirts and prizes does not come out of the fund for mammograms, Weaver said.

"It's not a real athletic, competitive event. We have some runners and give prizes in seven categories, but the majority of people walk and it's OK to bring strollers and well-behaved dogs. It's a real fun community event," she said.

As much an educational event as a fund raiser, staff from the Wild Herb will be on

hand to give out healthy food, and having it in Middtown contributes to making people aware, Weaver said.

Early detection and prevention are the messages the group wants to get across with the walk/run, and breast cancer survivors are recognized and receive a special packet.

The \$14,994 in donations in excess of expenses went to a building fund aimed at expanding the crowded shelter, he said.

Chairman Rex Wilson said he applauded the efforts of volunteers who help support the shelter.

But reviewing the report, he could not determine the basis on which the society shelter manager initially asked for \$37,000 from the county or later agreed on \$25,000 for the year, he said.

Commissioner Leo Martinez, who two months ago voted for a six-month contract with the shelter along with the support of Commissioners L. Ray Nunley and Rick Simpson (Commissioner William Schwegtmann was absent from the meeting, and Wilson voted

against it) pointed out that the commission came up with the \$25,000 figure, not shelter officials.

Although Martinez Thursday pushed for approval of a full year contract, he didn't receive a second for his motion. County Manager Tom Stewart said the contract, with one clause removed, will be ready for action next month. The rest of the money for the contract can be authorized then or at mid-year budget review, he said.

"I'm pleased with this (report)," Nunley said. "It gives a picture about what's going on and what's needed."

He asked society president Cal Cowden to provide a financial report each year with the society's funding request.

That's what the group intends to do, Cowden replied, adding that Hemphill was

hired to perform a yearly review and to provide monthly bookkeeping services.

"We want to do right by you, by the animals and by our volunteers," Cowden said.

Wilson responded, "We all want to do the right thing, and from the beginning I've said I thought your organization was the right one to do the sheltering. I appreciate the decision to employ Ronnie Hemphill and your attitude in your statement."

Simpson said he recently toured the shelter, as has Martinez, and he was surprised because it was a much bigger operation than many people realize.

"It's well worth our time and money," he said.

Baptists start new church


Ruidoso's First Baptist Church has begun construction on its new church building on a 14-acre site across from the Cree Meadows Country Club.

The church held a ground-breaking ceremony for the new structure Sept. 9—more than 50 years after the last time it broke ground for a new building, according to information provided by the church.

"Attendance was well over 200, and a good cross-section of our church community was there," said Rev. Tim Gilliland, pastor.

Church members hope to occupy the first phase of the new church by next fall, the church said in its news release.

Participants arrived for the late-afternoon service at the site—dubbed, by church members as "The Promised Land"—equipped



with shovels and lawn chairs, even smaller shovels so children could take part.

"What we were struck by was the absolutely breathtaking view," said Billie Westall, who attended the event with her husband, George. "We couldn't have picked a more beautiful place for a new church."

The Westalls have been members of the church for 54 years, the church said.

Also attending were Bart Montgomery and Don Cross, Baptist officials from

Alamogordo and Albuquerque.

The celebration ended with everyone singing "Amazing Grace" as they watched the sun set behind Sierra Blanca. Then there was a pot-luck meal.

Gilliland said, "Our prayer is that for many years this property and the buildings erected here will be wonderful instruments that God will use to bring salvation, healing, restoration and joy to this community and beyond."

Welding shop gets board's OK

The shop will be located on a commercially zoned 6,000-square-foot lot in the Palmer Gateway subdivision.

A welding shop was approved Tuesday for a portion of a building on a commercial lot in the Palmer Gateway subdivision.

Applicants Elmer Hunsaker and David Chadwell asked the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission for a conditional use permit to allow a welding shop on their commercially-zoned 6,000-square-foot lot.

Planner Darrell Bremner explained that such shops are a C-4 use, but no C-4 districts exist in Ruidoso. Commission policy is to allow such "conditional" uses in C-2 districts, if

appropriate.

Approval contained the condition that all welding be done inside the building on Gavilan Canyon near U.S. 70.

The two men also were granted an amendment to a commercial development site plan to allow the change of use for the building.

In other action, the commission:

• Approved a variance for Glenda Linder on Lots 17 and 18, Block 20, Ponderosa Heights, Unit 3.

The variance allows her mobile home to remain 2.30 feet from the east side lot line. The standard setback is 10 feet. The variance is 77 percent. She also received approval to allow her carport to remain within 4.7 feet of the west side lot line, a 52 percent variance.

Linder recently replatted to

cure an encroachment of the home across the lot line, but the expansion of the lot did not remove the need for side yard variances at 169 Brady Canyon Road.

• Approved a variance for Alto Mesa Builders on Lot 3, Block 6, Holiday Acres subdivision.

The residential lot contains 10,500 square feet and the applicant wanted to allow the existing open deck within 7 feet 4 inches of the side lot line to be covered, a 27 percent variance. The builder wants to finish covering the deck to cure a water problem.

The request met the requirements for a variance because of the steep slopes. The deck already exists within the setback and the staff write it would be unreasonable to require the applicant to remove the uncovered portion at 104 Echo Drive.





If only the subway workers had gone on strike the night before...

If only, somehow, everybody on the East Coast had overslept by an hour or so...

Such are dreams of what might have been.

What brought that matter of timing to our attention this week was the (late) arrival of our subscription of New York magazine. This parochial, but very hip, weekly news and feature magazine was dated Sept. 17 — six days after the fateful Sept. 11 — and it had nary a reference to the falling towers of Lower Manhattan. (That, of course, because of the very long printing deadlines necessitated for national distribution.)

This particular issue had a cover story that couldn't have been farther from that after-the-fact reality of Sept. 11:

"You Can Afford to Live Here

(And Love It)." The article, when we got beyond the cover, was the magazine's annual report on "great, up and coming neighborhoods that won't break your budget."

One such neighborhood was St. George on Staten Island, just across the harbor from the city and next to the ferry (which didn't run for days after Sept. 11.)

There, said author Rob Turner, nest-seeking New Yorkers could find a nice two-bedroom rental apartment for from \$1,200 to \$2,000 per month. One could buy a decent house with no view for from \$220,000 to \$500,000. (With views, they're around \$350,000 to \$1 million.) Not that bad, said Turner, when you consider the easy ferry commute and surging commercial development...

All this, of course, was reported many days before the events of Sept. 11.

Many days before the mindless tools of terrorists chose to kill themselves along with thousands of innocents at the behest of some Godforsaken megalomaniac, somewhere...

Many days before the thousands of dead will receive last rites, if indeed the dead can be found...

Many days before the President began to gird the people for a war unlike any war this nation has ever seen...

But, as inveterate magazine readers, we will be curious to see a followup to New York's "cheap housing" report, when the timing's right.



Board rejects proposed paint shop

■ Jim Brown's quarter-acre lot is too small for all the different uses Jim Brown is trying to squeeze onto it, the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission decided.

Owner Jim Brown is trying to squeeze too many uses into a quarter-acre lot, a member of the Lincoln County-Ruidoso Extraterritorial Zoning Commission contends.

On a motion by member Reynaldo Valcarcel, the board rejected Brown's petition in the name of Tu Madre Corp. to use a building on Carrizo Canyon Road as a paint and body shop.

Brown and his agent, Jack Tallman, asked the board to approve an amendment to the commercial site development plan for the lot in Hutson Carrizo subdivision.

The land already contains a house, garage and deck, a 36-by-32-foot retail store and a 36-by-23-foot shop with a proposed 10-by-22-foot addition.

Brown said he signed a lease agreement with a tenant who has been waiting for three months.

"I was told tonight that a paint and body shop are not allowed," he said, adding

that he applied before a July change in the law. Under the previous ordinance, such shops were permitted in C1 commercial zones.

Charles Rennick, assistant village attorney and advisor to the commission, explained this petition is the third time the property has come before the board. Originally, Brown wanted to build storage spaces, but when that wasn't allowed under the old ordinance, he changed the use to retail.

The new law doesn't permit auto body and paint shops in C1 zones, he said. After doing some research, he discovered that the new ordinance prevails, and he was in error to advise otherwise. The site plan with the proposed shop was never submitted, he said. The only approved site plan contains the retail shop, he said.

Brown said based on conversations with village planning administrator Joseph Patoskie, he brought in state electrical inspectors, used explosion-proof glass and installed an exhaust fan.

Valcarcel said the board has tried to cooperate with Brown.

"I told you before you wanted too many

uses and that I couldn't see having three different uses on a quarter acre of land," he said. "Your attitude seems to be the administrator and the board has given you a hard time. I think we have been more than kind."

Brown said the shop area previously was used by the land owner as a paint and body operation, a claim backed up by another person in the audience not connected to the application.

"If it already was an existing use, why is it before this board?" asked Carl Kelley, the newest member of the ETZC.

Board secretary Tim Vega said the previous owner applied for a residential garage and then moved in a paint booth without a permit.

"He never opened, so the use never occurred," Vega said. "It was only a residential garage."

But Brown insisted the owner used the garage for paint and body work right up until his death.

Chairman Glen Barrows said if the previous owner was using the shop for that purpose, he was doing it without proper approval.

Inmate recounts jailhouse attack

The beating of William Moody at the hands of other prisoners came to light when a battered and bruised Moody appeared before Magistrate William Butts.

Sitting at the table in the DWI program office in Ruidoso, William Moody said he still aches from the blows he received while he was an inmate at the Lincoln County Detention Center.

The 47-year-old heavy-equipment operator said he was asleep in his bunk in a common area of the new jail in Carrizozo Sunday when he was attacked by about six inmates just a few hours after his transfer to Delta Unit.

"There was one inmate who helped me to the door," Moody said. "He was beating on the glass trying to get the attention of the guard because he was afraid they would attack me again. It took a good five to 10 minutes before they came."

The incident is under investigation by the Sheriff's Office. Moody said he was questioned by a deputy after Magistrate Judge William Butts reported the incident and his concern that the jail is understaffed to law enforcement agencies and other judges in the 12th Judicial District, and to County Manager Tom Stewart and Correctional Systems Inc., which manages the jail for the county.

Attorney Gary Mitchell, who serves as public defender for many of the inmates, said Wednesday he agrees with Butts about low staffing and potentially dangerous conditions.

Although Bill Garrison of CSI contended the actions were unrelated, jail administrator John Buffington is being moved to another project and Mike Borrego, who operated the old Lincoln County jail for CSI, will replace him temporarily.

Last month, Commissioner Leo Martinez questioned if staffing levels were adequate. Stewart said at that time, he was worried those being hired by CSI lacked backgrounds in corrections. Tuesday, he cautioned arriving at any

judgment on the incident until the investigation is completed.

Buffington wouldn't discuss specific staffing for "security reasons," at the commission meeting, but said CSI officials reviewed the numbers and were satisfied, although he was trying to hire more guards.

In a statement earlier this week, Garrison said the employee-inmate ratio is one to 25 at the jail, which has about 100 prisoners. He contended the common sleeping area is fully visible by a camera and monitor.

Moody was arrested over the weekend for failing to appear in court in 1999 for a DWI offense.

He was booked into a holding cell at the jail about 4 a.m. Sunday. He was transferred about 4 p.m. to the common room. The incident occurred about 8 p.m.

"When I walked into the (common) room, some of the men were twirling mop handles like they were karate weapons," he said. "The gash on the back of my head isn't from someone's hand."

"I was sleeping, and the first thing I remember, I felt something hit the back of my head. The next thing I know I'm on the floor and felt people kicking and hitting me. I tried to crawl toward the door."

In a memorandum to Stewart, Buffington wrote that Correctional Officer Benny Zamora was close by and responded quickly when Moody pushed the buzzer at the door.

After guards responded, he was pulled out of the room covered with blood, Moody said.

"They told me to take a shower. I tried to clean up the best I could. I held a towel to my head but it was bleeding all the way

to the hospital in Ruidoso.

"The doctor told them to give me some ice for my head and eye, and some medicine. I got the medicine, but was never given any ice."

The next morning, Monday, he appeared in Butts' court with a black eye, a gash to his head and bruises on his side.

Until he was released, Moody was kept in a holding cell for his protection. The six inmates suspected in the attack were transferred to other facilities, Garrison said.

Over the past month, some employees who left the jail complained about the lack of staff, worries about their safety, high stress, lack of firearm training and disregard for the county's non-smoking policy in public buildings by staff and prisoners. They also contended inmates were allowed to watch inappropriate television programs.


Stewart queried Buffington on inmate access to programs with nudity.

Buffington wrote back in a memorandum dated Sept. 13 that his staff was unaware of any such programming and that Dish Network reported no pornographic programming was available in the jail television package.

However, he will cut off television access two hours earlier to avoid more suggestive programs, Buffington wrote. His staff also will monitor all programs viewed by inmates.

Jail policy allows inmates to watch television until midnight on Friday and Saturday.

"I have been advised that more 'severe R rated' movies start between 11 p.m. and midnight," Buffington wrote. "Effective immediately, we will terminate all television viewing each night at 10 p.m."

U.S., Mexican police arrest local suspect

The Ruidoso Police Department, the FBI, Mexican Customs, Immigration Office and the El Paso County and Lincoln County sheriff's offices cooperated to bring a Ruidoso man wanted for custodial interference, extortion and other charges to the Lincoln County Detention Center, police said.

Shawn E. Wear, 34, of Ruidoso, is charged with one third-degree felony for extortion and two fourth-degree felonies for intimidation of a witness and custodial interference, as well as other charges of violation of restraining order through Magistrate Court Judge William Butts and violation of a court order and contempt of court through District Court Judge Karen Parsons, police said.

The maximum sentence for a third-degree felony is three years imprisonment, and for a fourth-degree felony, 18 months imprisonment, with a \$5,000 fine for both types of felonies.

Wear had visiting rights with his 2 1/2-year-old daughter, but he didn't

return her on time Sept. 12 and, instead, called his ex-wife, Angelean Wear, 27, and told her to drop all charges against him — including assault against a household member and violation of a restraining order — or not see her daughter again, police said.

On Sept. 16, Shawn Wear called Angelean Wear and told her he would allow her a five-hour visit with her daughter if she dropped all charges, and to meet him at the Mondcor Hotel in Juarez at 4:30 p.m. the next day, Monday, according to Ruidoso Police Detective Jim Biggs.

Angelean Wear, who had contacted the FBI in Roswell, told her ex-husband that she would contact the district attorney and drop all charges.

Mexican authorities arrested Shawn Wear on a charge of public intoxication, took him and his daughter to the Mexican Customs building and, after several hours, released the child to her mother.

He was turned over subsequently to the El Paso County Sheriff's Office where he waived extradition

Healing the body and spirit in Ruidoso

After a relaxing drive along Fort Stanton Road in Alto, the blue house peeks through the trees along a winding driveway. A parking area in the back leads to a serene rock garden. This is the home of the newly opened Sierra Dove Healing Center — and the surroundings befittingly suggest tranquility and well-being.

Julia Price is the coordinator of the center and a fine artist who discovered a link between the visual arts and the healing arts when family members were diagnosed with cancer almost 10 years ago.

In 1992, her sister was diagnosed with breast cancer, and later, another family member was diagnosed with brain cancer.

"I had an up-close glimpse of radiation, chemotherapy and surgery and felt the need to help them do something more to feel better," Price said. "Along the way I found out a lot of things that could have helped strengthen their bodies and their emotional resolve to go through what they needed to go through, and give them a support system not always available through a hospital."

Price and her sister looked for things that would build up her strength for the often-debilitating effects of chemotherapy. Price learned healing touch (a method of transmitting healing energy through touch, used in many hospitals), herbal medicine and Reiki (a technique for stress reduction and healing) from a nun in New Orleans, and she and her sister developed a "community of friends that was very supportive of her doing these extra nurturing things for herself."

The connection between the visual and the healing arts, for Price, is that they are both "connecting threads to the higher realms." Through literature, music and the visual arts, she said, people can find their connection to their "higher selves" similar to the way that strong faith helps them through difficult times.

"If you are listening to Mozart, if you are looking at good paintings — better yet, if you are painting or drawing yourself, if drama is your outlet, if you allow yourself that, it's a good way to restore balance," she said.

"All these can help to reestablish a stronger sense of who we are in the big sense, the fullness of our being."

The first three founders met through painting: Price, Patsy Blasdel and Dorothy Whisenhunt. All three shared not only a love of the arts but also a deep sense of commitment to helping people evolve and grow. Then they met Jozef Dominguez, who moved to the area a year ago and was a profiler for the government and police departments in the Seattle, Wash., area. Others joined them, some of whom were into other techniques of healing and preventive medicine.

"We keep meeting more and more people who shared this desire to have a healing community that would be a network for people who either wanted better prevention techniques or people who are already ill and looking for ways to expand their possibilities for getting well again," Price said.

The result of these meetings was Sierra Dove, formed about a year ago, and which began meeting Thursday evenings to discuss health, community service and spiritual growth.

Blasdel, who has been a registered nurse for 30 years, said she's always been interested in alternative methods of healing and has done acupressure for headaches "forever." She bought her first book on acupressure and reflexology 25 years ago and has practiced both with doctors and patients she's worked with since. Blasdel said she's noticed an increased interest in alternative healing methods. The healing center in Alto was formed to respond to this interest.

"I feel like I've based my whole life on service, so this was a very natural step to

take," she said.

Dominguez said Sierra Dove in Alto is affiliated with a nonprofit Sierra Dove in Seattle, which has a for-profit arm for outreach to corporate America, the military, the financial industry and mainstream business, for which he does consulting work.

The goal of Sierra Dove, he said, is education.

"We're here to expand people's awareness beyond their box and help in their education and understanding of these tools so they understand that everything is a part of them and comes from inside of them, and we can help facilitate that natural progression," Dominguez said.

The center will host a grand-opening celebration on Saturday to introduce some of the services that will be offered to the public, with about a dozen specialists on hand to demonstrate what they do. The range is wide, from conventional massage to sports massage, healing touch to color and aromatherapy, sound healing to hypnotherapy, and above all, various modalities of "energy work." Some of the more esoteric techniques include 22-Strand DNA Activation, Indian Head Massage, aural readings with Kirlian photography and Hot Stone Therapy.

The center's hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday, but it is recommended that people call for appointments; not all staff members are on the premises all the time. Dr. Larry Shearer, a chiropractor from Capitan, is available for appointments from 2-5 p.m. Thursdays through the center. Three healing rooms are available now and more will be created for individual sessions with staff members.

On Monday evenings, "Julia's Kitchen" opens to the public and features cooking classes for healthy, delicious meals. (One of the instructors is the Spanky's restaurant's Jan Kennedy, who will demonstrate her roasted garlic cream soup.)

Other weekly activities include yoga classes and guided meditations. Workshops, classes and lectures are scheduled throughout the fall with visiting/health specialists, including one on plant-based hormone therapy and Waldorf education.

Ruidoso, Carrizozo health clinics receive federal construction money

Two grants designated for Lincoln County are aimed at improving health clinics in Carrizozo and Ruidoso.

U.S. Sen. Jeff Bingaman Tuesday announced the award from the federal Department of Health and Human Services.

"Community health clinics play a key role in delivering health care services for many of our state's rural residents," the Democrat from New Mexico said. "The federal funds awarded will help these health care providers expand their capacity to meet the needs of those living in New Mexico's smaller communities."

The Carrizozo Health Center, managed by Presbyterian HealthCare Services under contract with the county commission, will

receive \$196,750 to help with construction of a 1,630-square-foot medical/dental suite.

The county health clinic in Ruidoso, operated by the state public health system, received \$491,880 to help with construction of a new 4,096-square-foot clinic that will offer four examination rooms, three offices, a laboratory and administrative services.

The county also chose the Ruidoso clinic expansion project on Kansas City Street next to the Ruidoso Public Library for a Community Development Block Grant application.

The space in the existing building vacated by the clinic then could be used for health-related services such as a center for those with disabilities.

The clinic already offers programs for pregnant women and new mothers and infants.

Free trapping course scheduled at Capitan

A free education course for trappers is set to start Saturday at the Capitan fire station. Sponsored by the state Game and Fish Department and the Cooperative Extension Service, the 8 a.m. session on the east side of U.S. 380 will focus on

Capitan, Ruidoso Angus breeders listed

John Crouch, the Angus association's director of performance programs, said the group has the most complete and comprehensive beef cattle database in the world.

"Of the sires listed in the main report, 76 percent have expected progeny differences for carcass traits, which should assist cattlemen in choosing genetics that will produce a more consistent, higher quality beef product."

The analysis for the sire evaluation report is conducted at Iowa State University.

Artesia refinery gets jet fuel contract worth \$122 million

New Cannon AFB tower construction announced

WASHINGTON - U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici, R-NM, a member of the Senate Defense Appropriations Subcommittee, Wednesday announced that Navajo Refining Company in Artesia has been awarded a \$121.8 million contract to provide JP-8 jet fuel to the Department of Defense.

The DoD Defense Logistics Agency awarded the "fixed-price with economic price adjustment type" contract to Navajo Refining Company to support the Defense Energy Support Center. The work under this one-year contract will be performed in Roswell, Moriarty and El Paso. The term of the contract is good through Sept. 30, 2002.

"This is a significant contract awarded to what the Defense Department considers a small business. Over the years, Navajo Refining Company has been a reliable source of jet fuel for the American military," Domenici said. "I'm pleased that this Artesia institution will continue to be a supplier for the Pentagon."

Domenici also noted that the Refinery Holding Co. of El Paso has been awarded a \$27.5 million "fixed-price with economic price adjustment" contract for turbine fuel and avia-

tion grade JP-8 for the Defense Energy Support Center. This contract also runs through Sept. 30, 2002.

State recovers narcotics

Southern New Mexico operations by the Department of Public Safety, Motor Transportation Division, resulted in confiscation of a variety of narcotics during the Sept. 15-18 weekend.

Capt. Jan Cary reported the following:

Sept. 15 - Inspection of a commercial vehicle at the Anthony Port of Entry, I-10 westbound, revealed six bags containing 292 pounds of marijuana. Additionally, about four ounces of cocaine and \$2,000 in cash were recovered and two persons taken into custody.

Sept. 16 - At the Lordsburg Port of Entry, I-10 eastbound, a patrolman conducting a cargo verification found concealed in a load of produce about 163 pounds of marijuana.

Sept. 17 - During a traffic stop and subsequent inspection of a commercial vehicle on U.S. Highway 54 south of Alamogordo, a patrolman discovered 118 bundles of marijuana totaling about 145 pounds in two duffel bags and a cardboard box concealed in a load of empty beer bottles. Also recovered was about \$1,600 in cash. One person was taken into custody.

Sept. 18 - At the Anthony Port of Entry, I-10 westbound, during a driver inspection, violations were noted on the driver's log book. Subsequent inspection of the commercial vehicle, and an alert by a drug-sniffing dog, revealed about 14 grams of methamphetamine concealed in the cab of the semi truck. In addition, portable scales and other items indicating possible narcotics sales, were discovered as well as \$1,100 in cash. Other violations noted included a driver using a suspended license who also was wanted as a fugitive out of Florida. The driver was arrested and extradition to Florida is pending, Cary said.

Construction in Ruidoso slips in first eight months

August construction activity in Ruidoso remained strong, however, and the average value of new residential construction grew by 32 percent.

Total construction activity in Ruidoso, as reflected in building permit values for the year through August, are trailing last year by 13.9 percent.

Figures released by the village planning department show the most significant declines in multi-family housing,

new commercial construction and miscellaneous activity.

Winners were in commercial alterations and additions, up 172.8 percent to \$1.69 million this year; residential alterations and additions, up 38 percent to \$4.94 million; and manufactured homes, up 19.7 percent to \$1.1 million.

The total permit value through August, 2001, was \$27,071,456 vs. \$31,473,474 in 2000.

August did show stepped up activity vs. 2000, with total permits issued valued at \$3,222,085, a 14.6 percent gain from the prior year. Strength paralleled the year-to-date figures: Commercial alterations and additions were at

\$388,508 vs. \$49,660 last year.

Residential construction remained strong, with single-family building up 20.2 percent at \$1.88 million and residential alterations and additions at \$666,963, up 19.6 percent.

The biggest monthly percentage declines for August were in new commercial building, down 74.6 percent and miscellaneous work, down 76.3 percent.

Based on permits issued and value, the average new single-family home going up in Ruidoso topped \$188,000 this August; in August, 2000, the average was \$142,195. That represents a 32 percent increase.

Focus on agriculture

Alaska farmers support drilling in ANWR

In recent months, newspapers have printed numerous letters to the editor opposing drilling for oil in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. The letters claim the wildlife refuge will be turned into a sprawling network of drilling rigs and pipelines.

That exaggeration appears to have originated with former Secretary of the Interior Bruce Babbitt. Environmental groups and some members of Congress who are using the issue for political purposes have perpetuated the notion.

When an American Farm Bureau video crew was in Alaska recently, it had a chance to ask Alaskan farmers what they think about the issue. The farmers have first-hand experience with the environment and wildlife,

and their opinions are formed in Alaska, not thousands of miles from the scene.

"Even if we never drill there, we definitely need to go and find out what is there in the way of a public reserve of oil," says Bob Franklin, president of the Alaska Farm Bureau. Estimates vary widely. The average guess is around 12 billion barrels, but some estimates are over 30 billion barrels.

"I think most Alaskans don't see a problem up there. We are acquainted with it. That Arctic National Wildlife Refuge and the North Slope is a mammoth area," says Paul Huppert, a vegetable farmer from Palmer, Alaska.

Huppert believes oil exploration in the ANWR would be a microscopic speck on a vast area. The refuge consists of 19 million acres in northeast Alaska. The area under consideration for exploration is

1.5 million acres. If a large find is made, the entire oil development may affect only a couple thousand acres.

The National Audubon Society opposes oil drilling in the ANWR and worries that it would be detrimental to the caribou herd. Huppert disagrees, "The biggest effect on those caribou is just the weather. It's not man," he says.

The experience around the Prudhoe Bay oil field seems to bear this out. In 1969, when oil was discovered, the Arctic caribou herd numbered a few thousand animals. Today, the herd is closer to 20,000 and its main range lies directly over the oil field.

The entire state is home to hundreds of thousands of caribou. They outnumber the human population.

"It's such a vast area. That's what people don't understand is how expansive

the terrain is up there. One little drilling rig out in the middle of a few hundred thousand acres is not going to interrupt anything as far as the wildlife that are there," says Mike Schultz, a barley grower from Delta Junction.

"Living very close to it and being very aware of the issues, I think it's going to happen, it should happen, and it should obviously be done with the greatest care," adds Ed Bostrom, a farmer from a town named North Pole.

Drilling in the ANWR is not going to solve all of the nation's energy problems, but it does give us added security with domestic oil supplies. Frankly, that's more important now than ever.

Terrorist attacks could hurt U.S. agriculture

WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. — Terrorist attacks in New York and at the Pentagon could affect United States agriculture should the economy slow further or if Congress shifts money from commodity support programs to national security, say Purdue University agricultural economists.

Philip Paarlberg, a specialist in international agriculture trade, said the financial fallout to American farmers from the Sept. 11 attacks could be substantial.

"One of the issues is that the global economy is weak. Some people feel it is in a recession," Paarlberg said. "Does this make that worse? Probably so. To what extent is a little bit premature to determine. New York was a major international finance and commerce center. These facilities are now offline for the foreseeable future.

"The other issue is redirection of U.S. federal spending. Beefed up security, air strikes or whatever military action they choose to take, is going to cost money. The federal budget now is tight, unlike a few years ago, and so they would have to find this money someplace."

Some of that money could come from farm programs, said Otto Doering, a farm policy specialist.

Doering said work on the 2002 farm bill likely will be postponed, as Congress turns its attention to protecting U.S. citizens from future terrorist acts. Until the tragic events unfolded, leaders in the U.S. House and Senate were locked in a political battle over farm bill provisions and spending. Not now, Doering said.

"This has changed the whole set of priorities about what is important and what is not

important, and the ag bill is at the bottom of the list right now," Doering said.

The House crafted a 10-year, \$75 billion farm bill heavy on subsidies. House leaders hoped to begin debate on the bill this week. The Senate has not yet drafted a bill, but leaders have said they intend to tie many support payments to conservation practices.

Both houses of Congress would have to agree on a final bill before the president could sign it into law. The deadline for passing farm legislation in order to lock in the \$75 billion set aside for commodities programs is April 15, 2002.

"I think events (of last week) take pressure off the Senate leadership to pass a bill they don't like," Doering said. "What they can say now is, 'We have a national emergency, and farm-

ers are taken care of for this year. We've got until 2002 to pass a bill, and we may have less money to spend after April 15."

As Washington considers how to retaliate against terrorist groups and the nations harboring them, lawmakers should think carefully before imposing trade embargoes, Paarlberg said.

"The success of embargoes — and we've had a number of them over the years — depends on getting the cooperation of all suppliers," Paarlberg said.

"In the case of the 1980 embargo of the Soviet Union, Argentina chose not to join with the U.S. and the other countries. And so, consequently, the Soviets were able to replace embargoed grain with Argentine grain and other products to get around the embargo."

The longest U.S. embargo — placed on Cuba more than 40 years ago when Fidel Castro rose to power — has not stopped Cuba from importing goods from other sources, including wheat from Canada, Paarlberg said.

"Other embargoes, like the ones against South Africa and Iraq, had a broader coalition of participants who were more interested in actually stopping the flow of grain, reducing smuggling and third-party suppliers," he said.

Should it be determined that the terrorist acts originated in the Middle East, a unilateral U.S. trade embargo of nations in that region might go virtually unnoticed.

American agricultural exports to Middle East nations are small compared to major U.S. trading partners, Paarlberg said. For example,

the United States exported nearly 30 million metric tons of wheat worldwide in 1999, of which only about 2 million metric tons was shipped to the Middle East.

Exports of course grains — corn, barley, oats, rye, sorghum and millet — are greater to Japan than the entire Middle East, Paarlberg said.

"We export 17 to 18 million metric tons of course grains to Japan and about 3 to 4 million metric tons to the Middle East," Paarlberg said.

Hippos closely related to whales?

ANN ARBOR — Partial skeletons of ancient whales found in Pakistan last year resolve a longstanding controversy over the origin of whales, confirming that the giant sea creatures evolved from early ancestors of sheep, deer and hippopotami and suggesting that hippos may be the closest living relatives of whales.

The new finds, reported in the Sept. 21 issue of the journal Science, are the first and only specimens known that combine sheep-like ankle bones and archaic whale skull bones in the very same skeletons.

The 47-million-year-old fossils, found by University of Michigan paleontology Prof. D. Gingerich, graduate student Iyad Zalmout, and colleagues from the Geological Survey of Pakistan and the University of New Hampshire,

also show how early whales swam.

"Whales are warmblooded animals like we are — that has been known for a long time," Gingerich explains. "Yet they're

so different from other warm-blooded, furry things that it's been a mystery, both how they came to live in the sea and what ancestors they might have come from on land."

"Tried and True Music" wraps up the 2001 Summer Concert Series at Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Casino Saturday, when Jerry Jeff Walker takes the stage.

Walker, a country-rock legend, will bring his multitude of songs, including classics like "Mr. Bojangles," "Trashy Women" and "Up Against the Wall, Redneck Mother" to town at 8 p.m. Saturday.

Despite never having a No. 1 hit, Walker packs the houses he plays, thanks to his wide and growing fan base. The singer has been drawing them in since the early 1960s, when he began drifting around the South and, eventually, Texas.

His first record came in 1967. Entitled *Circus Maximus*, the album would end up being the first in a long line of Walker records.

Perhaps the turning point in the artist's career came in 1972, when he released a self-titled album that blended country, folk, rock and other styles of music. Along with Willie Nelson and Asleep at the Wheel, Walker became considered

part of the "progressive country" movement of the mid-1970s. By 1973, his iconic status had been solidified.

After a string of major label albums, Walker, along with his wife, Susan, formed their own record label in 1986. The label, Tried and True Music, has put out 11 Walker albums, including *Cowboy Boots & Bathin' Suits*, *Night After Night* and his most recent release, *Gonzo Stew*.

Walker and his band, the Gonzo Compadres, continue to tour across the country, setting up their own equipment without roadies or a fancy bus.

The singer has remained true to the troubadour's tradition, never allowing his music or success to entrap him, despite the 32 albums he has put out over the years.

In 1999, he released an autobi-

Priceless Penny

Effervescent, bubbling over with passion and enthusiasm, leaping from one subject to another in a flash: This is Penny Dillon.

Her oil paintings hop from one theme to another as quickly as their creator does: an intimate, expressionist cafe scene; a tranquil, impressionistic landscape; an electric skyscape; a whimsical portrait. Constantly giving herself assignments accounts for some of the diversity in her work. In a series of four paintings called "Two Rivers Park," Dillon gave herself the challenge to paint a scene without a horizon line.

"This is very irritating to an artist," she said. "All there is is verticals. The challenge is to overcome no-horizon, using all the vertical lines and the faceted lighting coming through the trees to give a sense of intimacy and a room-like quality that happened as the light filtered through the trees."

"Stormy Afternoon" is an intensely colored skyscape that Dillon says is "make-believe," using colors that bring passion to her and may have little to do with what's really going on.

"I'm a colorist with landscapes," she said. "I'm very involved in a sense of design, and I like to bring the audience into the painting. I like the eye to travel through the painting."

Her high sense of design stems partly from her commercial art training, which she received at the Kansas City Art Institute after graduating from Washington University with a bachelor of fine arts degree. (She also has a liberal arts degree from Washington University and an elementary teaching degree from the University of Texas at El Paso, and has taught art in schools for many years.)

Dillon met her husband, John, when she was creating fashion illustrations for his designs for H.D. Lee. Later they opened their own creative design company in Kansas City, where he designed clothes and made computer patterns for them, and she was the illustrator.

Ten years ago, Dillon bought a condominium in Alto, and left El Paso on Thursdays to devote the weekends to painting.

"As we began to make friends, people sensed my energy and would bring their weekend guests," she said. "That's where the business comes from: I think I'm part of the entertainment. Through that, I sell most of my paintings, and they return for more and bring other people."

Dillon hires models for many of her paintings and then takes numerous photographs of them (except for those she paints with the Monday pleine-air painters). For one painting, she hired a model to hang clothes all day. If she sees a pose she likes in a magazine, she'll hire a model and snap away until she has a collection of pictures that satisfies her. With commissions for families, she'll come up with poses and take photos.

She calls herself a process painter, and finds the greatest fulfillment with landscapes, she said, although she has


great fun with her "little people" and intimate cafe scenes.

"I don't try to fight God," she said. "I don't think I should paint the blue bonnets of Texas or Sierra Blanca. But I can take that old piece of metal behind the old Apple Orchard Motel in Ruidoso Downs and bring beauty into it. I never tackle something I believe God does better than I."

Although she's won numerous Best of Show awards in national and local art shows, Dillon prefers not to work with a gallery because she loves the interaction with her clients.

"People want to know the artist, they love talking to the artist," she said. "I think I would be happy if I could supply a gallery, but I think I would truly miss the interaction."

Dillon and her husband are building a house around a studio, putting in roots, and she hopes to have an open studio on Sundays. To see her work, call 336-9131 and set up an appointment.



I like the Bear's show because it meets the single most important artistic criterion for children's TV: It is not Barney. I hate Barney, because he is a large, annoying purple wad of cuteness, and his songs are lame, and some of the "children" on the show appear to be in their mid-20s.

You will die of jealousy when I tell you who I recently saw live in concert: The Bear in the Big Blue House.

For those of you who do not have small children, let me explain that The Bear in the Big Blue House is a major morning-TV star. I'd go so far as to say that, with his talent, some day he could be as big as Elmo. We watch his show every morning while we're feeding our 17-month-old daughter, Sophie, her breakfast, by which I mean picking her food off the floor and checking to see if it's still clean enough to eat.

I like the Bear's show because it meets the single most important artistic criterion for children's TV: It is not Barney. I hate Barney, because he is a large, annoying purple wad of cuteness, and his songs are lame, and some of the "children" on the show appear to be in their mid-20s. They are definitely too old to skip, and yet they skip everywhere. They must have a mandatory skipping clause in their contracts because it is their only mode of transport. If they were in a burning building, they would skip to the exits. I suspect that when they finish taping the Barney show, they skip behind the studio and drink gin.

On "The Bear in the Big Blue House," there are no children, only animals, the main one being the bear, which I assume is a guy wearing a bear suit, although it moves in a realistic manner, so it could be an actual bear wearing a bear suit. The bear has various animal friends, which are played by people's hands inside puppets. (Discussion question: Do the hands wear the puppets when they rehearse? Or is the rehearsal just a

bunch of naked hands talking to each other?)

Anyway, one morning we were reading the newspaper and picking Sophie's food off the floor, and suddenly my wife said: "The Bear is going to give a live concert in Miami!"

"The Bear in the Big Blue House?" I said.



She'll want me to drop her off out front of the concert and then disappear, lest I embarrass her in front of her friends by the mere fact of my existence. But for now, for a little while, I'm as cool as anybody she knows. Yayyyy.

The tragedy of Dick Brewer

Part 2

The Regulators, with Dick Brewer in command, headed for Lincoln. Three days after the capture of Billy Morton and Frank Baker, two of the triggermen in the death of John Tunstall, the group stopped at a place now rather tellingly called Dead Man's Canyon, near Blackwater Draw.


One of the Regulators was a man named William McCloskey. Many of the Regulators had been employed by Murphy and Company at one time or another, but in the case of McCloskey, the employment had been much more recent and some of the Regulators considered him to be nothing more than a spy.

At some point in their journey, it had to have occurred to the Regulators that they would be turning their two prisoners over to the very same Sheriff who had deputized Morton and Baker to go after Tunstall in the first place. What to do, what to do. In retrospect, it seems that they had all of two options: they could 1) release the prisoners who they knew would immediately go back to Murphy, arm themselves and, with a

good deal more men, come back in pursuit of the Regulators themselves; or, 2) they could kill them on the spot, which is, of course, what they decided to do. McCloskey attempted to defend the two doomed men and his body was found where it lay with Morton and Baker's corpses.

Without bothering to bury the three dead men (shepherds took care of that later) the Regulators, feeling that they had struck a blow against their hated enemies, rode off in search of more Murphy men who had ridden in the posse that killed Tunstall.

Later, Jimmy Dolan, whose word should *always* be questioned, claimed that all three bodies had eleven bullets in them (one for each of the Regulators), and all in the back.

The war continues

Many of the Regulators hated Sheriff Brady. As stated earlier, the good Sheriff was a crony of Jimmy Dolan and L.G. Murphy. All three men had served in the military together and, as any veteran will tell you, that is where some of the strongest bonds of friendship are forged. Brady has gotten a bad rap over the years that he, like Billy the Kid, who is usually blamed for Brady's death, really didn't deserve. He already had a large brood of children and his wife was pregnant again. He was deep in debt to Murphy and Dolan and was not really in a position to refuse any request that they might make. Most historians focus on Brady's behavior as relating to the death of Tunstall, but prior to that he had served quite honorably as Sheriff of Lincoln County.

Regulators George Coe and Doc Scurlock had, at least in their eyes, a legitimate complaint against the Sheriff. Several years before the war, a fugitive named Frank Freeman, who had been a friend of both Coe and Scurlock, had taken refuge, at one time or another, with both men. In early 1877, Brady along with a posse and a contingent of soldiers, had run Freeman to the ground near George Coe's place and killed him. Then, Brady had taken both Coe and Scurlock into custody for harboring a fugitive. He placed both men on the same unsaddled horse and tied their legs underneath. Then they set off on the 20 or so mile ride to Lincoln. George Coe would later reminisce that while he had been shot twice and had his leg broken once, it was that particular experience that had been the most painful of his life.

April Fool's

It was then that what became known as "the hothead element" of the Regulators began to make their own plans. This was a group that included Kid Antrim, Fred Waite, Frank MacNab, Jim French, John Middleton, Henry Brown and possibly Jose Chavez y Chavez (in later years, Jose would take sole responsibility for the killing of Brady - long after any possibility of prosecution had

passed - and then there was Rob Widenmann. Widenmann was so much hot air it was a miracle he didn't simply drift away on the breeze. He had ingratiated himself to Tunstall to such an extent that Tunstall felt he was invaluable. However, when one checks the record, it *definitely* appears that Widenmann had done his best to keep Rob Widenmann safe at any and all costs. After the assassination of Brady, he claimed that yes, he was in that corral where the gunfire originated, but he had just been out there to "feed the dog." When newspapers began derisively referring to him as the "dog feeder," Rob finally shut up about it.

The point is that Dick Brewer was conspicuously absent. Out at his ranch that day, it is almost a certainty that he had no inkling of what his men were planning. Susan McSween later placed full responsibility on the "hothead element." Of course, considering Susan's relationship with the truth, that *instantly* makes one wonder whether or not it was actually ordered by Alexander McSween...

It was between nine and ten on the morning of April 1, 1878, when it happened. The "hotheads" had concealed themselves behind a gate that stood in the alley that now lies between the Tunstall Store and the Penfield house on the east side of the store. As Sheriff Brady and four deputies passed by, walking east, the Regulators rose up and opened fire. And that brings us to another question... what were Brady and his men really doing that morning? Survivors stated later that they were on their way down to the courthouse (which was then the Convento, located just east of where the San Juan Mission now stands) to "nail up a notice." Well, it was a total of five men and they were all carrying rifles. Nail up a notice? I think not...

Whatever they were doing, they never got to do it. As they drew abreast of the Regulators' position, a deadly fusillade erupted. Talk about a poorly planned ambush: two of the deputies, George Peppin and Billy Mathews, weren't even hit. A third, Jack Long, was

scratched. All three of these men hot-footed it for cover at the first gunfire. Deputy George Hindman was not so lucky. He lurched a few steps and then collapsed, calling for water. But it was Sheriff Brady himself who proved beyond a shadow of a doubt just how poorly planned this ambush really was - he went down with somewhere between nine and 16 bullets in him. Dead when he hit the ground, he never moved. Obviously ALL of the Regulators had been shooting at Sheriff Brady. No one had discussed this in advance.

After this, two of the Regulators raced out into the street. It was Jim French and Kid Antrim. What they were trying to do is still debatable. They were either attempting to retrieve some papers off the body of the Sheriff or attempting to retrieve the Kid's rifle, which Brady had confiscated earlier and had been carrying that day. The same bullet clipped both of them, one in the side and one in the thigh.

For many years there has been confusion over which of these wounded men was concealed underneath the floorboards of the Tunstall Store, with most historians being in favor of French. However, an interview with eyewitness Amelia Bolton Church indicates that it was actually the Kid, and if the rest of the story is true, it would have been right in character for him. As the story goes, the Murphy men searched all through the store for the missing man, but were unable to find him. After they left, the Kid was brought out back where a horse was brought to him. His wound was dressed by drawing a silk handkerchief soaked in alcohol through the bullet hole. The Kid then mounted up and, crossing the Rio Bonito behind the Tunstall Store, took off in an easterly direction. The Murphy men saw him and shot at him with amazingly efficient ineffectiveness. As soon as he was out of range, the Kid dismounted and made a sweeping bow back in their direction!

If Dick Brewer had been present, it goes without saying that this ambush would not have occurred. Brewer - not a

hothead - was well aware of the fact that, for whatever reason, it is *bad publicity* to kill the county sheriff in the middle of the street. The hothead element may have thought that this was a major victory, but it was actually a public relations disaster...

Blazer's Mill

Three days later, the Regulators, with Dick Brewer back in command, arrived at Blazer's Mill in Mescalero with nothing more than lunch on their minds. But a series of events was already unfolding that would have a profound effect on them, and particularly on Dick Brewer.

Just prior to the Regulators arrival at the Mill, it had been visited by Andrew L. "Buckshot" Roberts. Buckshot was on the Regulators' "dead list" and knew it. He had sold his farm and was waiting for the check to be delivered to the post office at Blazer's so that he could quit the area. But fate had other ideas...

The check had not arrived, but as Roberts rode off, he saw the mail carrier riding in and turned back. What he did not know was that the Regulators, over a dozen strong, had arrived just after he had left. Putting their horses up behind a high adobe wall - and inadvertently concealing them from Roberts - the Regulators had gone inside to eat. Roberts realized his mistake shortly after dismounting. Leaving his sidearm on his saddle horn in accordance with a rule of Blazer's, Buckshot had started toward the house with his Winchester in his hand when Regulator Frank Coe suddenly emerged and began approaching him. The two men had been friendly in the past and sat down on the porch to talk things over. Coe, of course, tried repeatedly to talk Roberts into surrendering. Roberts, in turn, kept refusing, pointing out - quite accurately - what had happened to the last two men to surrender to the Regulators: Morton and Baker.

Finally, Dick Brewer lost his patience and asked for volunteers to go and arrest Roberts. He got three: Charlie Bowdre, George Coe and Kid Antrim.

When these three bravos rounded the corner, both Frank Coe and Roberts knew that the time for talking was over. As both men leapt to their feet, Coe made a powerful effort at making himself scarce, vanishing like a magician. Charlie Bowdre called out "Throw up your hands!" The plucky Roberts replied "Not much, Maryann" (the equivalent of the modern "flip-off") and the horse apples hit the fan. Roberts proved to be extremely dangerous. In rapid succession, one of his bullets knocked the wind out of Bowdre, took off George Coe's trigger finger and creased the Kid. When Regulator John Middleton rushed onto the scene, he took one in the chest. At the first exchange, Roberts had taken a bullet in the groin that would prove to be fatal the next day.

Roberts, out of ammo, had backed into one of the Blazer buildings where he found a buffalo gun hanging over the door and some ammo for it. He saw a man raise up from behind a woodpile some 100 yards distant and fire a shot. Roberts took aim at the puff of smoke from the man's gun and when the fellow rose up again, Roberts fired.

It was Dick Brewer. The bullet hit him in the eye and took off the back of his head. As Dick fell to the ground, the other Regulators decided that they wanted no more of Buckshot Roberts and hastily departed the area. The next day, Brewer and Roberts were buried side by side in the Blazer cemetery.

Dick Brewer had come west to heal a broken heart and had become involved in one of the most legendary confrontations of the Old West. He had wanted only to be left in peace. The great grandson of the girl Dick Brewer loved still lives in Wisconsin. Dick, of course, left no one and still lies on that lonely, wind-swept hill in Mescalero. Sometimes the good really do die young.
