## Property taxes to take a bigger bite next year

■ A multitude of factors — from higher property values to municipal debt service — combine to increase the tax burden on Lincoln County taxpayers in 2002.

Lincoln County property owners will be writing larger checks this year for property taxes.

The increase resulted from several sources, including a revaluation of some property, an increase in the state's debt service, a jump in Ruidoso's debt service tax rate and an increase in the amount paid in a special levy for the county-owned hospital in Ruidoso and rural health clinics.

Not much can be done about debt service or the property revaluation mandated by the state, but county

commissioners do have the authority to lower the hospital mill levy this year.

The issue may be discussed during a special meeting of the commission at 8 a.m. today in Ruidoso Downs village hall. Certification of the tax rates by the commission is listed on the agenda.

Last year, the hospital received \$878,695 from the levy. This year, it would receive \$1.1 million under a quirk in how the state applies its yield-control formula, County Assessor Rick Silva said. He had warned about the situation before last year's vote to reauthorize the levy.

Although the top limit of the special mill levy for the hospital and clinics was cut by commissioners in the 2000 election from 4.25 mills to 3 mills, a twist in how tax rules are applied resulted in an increase for the total tax levied, Silva said.

Because voters reauthorized the mill levy at the lower rate of 3 mills, the tax is considered new and not subject the first year to the state's yield control formula, Silva pointed out. That means the hospital will collect the full 2.1 mills and the clinics the full .9 mills, resulting in actual dollar increases of 26.7 percent and 93.8 percent respectively.

One mill equals \$1 for each \$1,000 of taxable property value. New Mexico taxes on one-third of market value.

Last year, because the mill levy was an existing special tax, the yield control formula restricted the amount collected to a total of 2.1 mills for the hospital and clinics combined, instead of the full 4.25 mills authorized by voters.

In 2000, 1 mill brought revenue of about \$492,400. This year, with an increase in taxable property value of \$37.8 million, 1 mill will generate \$530,137.

## School project marks milestone

Workers 'top off' Mescalero High framework

Construction workers mingled with bankers, lawyers and other invited guests Monday for a "topping off" celebration at the new Mescalero Apache tribal school complex.

People involved with the project signed their names to a white steel beam before it was draped with state and national flags, a local evergreen tree was positioned in an attached metal tube and a crane slowly lifted, then lowered the beam into place at the top of the middle/high school building.

Project director Jason Harper, who works for Centex Construction Co. of Dallas, Texas, watched near Tribal President Sara Misquez, School Superintendent Ray Swinney and school board President Michaelene Ahidley.

As workers secured the beam in place, one woman said to her companion, "I wish Mr. Chino was here to see this," a reference to the late Wendell Chino, who led the tribe for more than 40 years and pushed for construction of a new school after one burned down on the reservation 12 years ago.

The crowd moved into one of the unfinished gymnasiums for a catered meal by The Flying J Ranch.

Misquez told the audience that work on the project started in late 1999, looking at construction firms and negotiating for financing. She thanked president George Bush and U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., for their support.

The 218,000-square foot complex is a state-of-the-art design and will benefit the tribe for decades to come, she said. The school will stand as a symbol of what tribal members can accomplish when they work together, she said.

Misquez also asked for prayers for those lost in the terrorist attacks last month, as did Ahidley, who said while tribal member fight for their sovereignty, "Let us not forget we are part of this great nation."

## County calls for U.S. 70 crackdown

■ Officials are asking the State Police to step up speed patrols on the roadway between Ruidoso Downs and Riverside.

Zero tolerance for speeding and more patrol manpower could improve safety on U.S. 70 from Ruidoso Downs to Riverside, Lincoln County commissioners say.

Commissioner Rick Simpson asked representatives of the New Mexico State Police to discuss the scenic, but high-fatality highway at a commission meeting Sept. 20.

"We all notice the truck traffic zooming down here and it makes us real nervous trying to turn off or onto the road," Simpson said. He used to drive an interstate truck and noticed that many states don't have the same problem.

"In Ohio, the first thing a trucker learns is do not speed, not even by a few miles per hour," he said. "The state has built a reputation."

After a multiple fatality accident in Hondo Valley involving a truck back-ending a church van, the state stepped up patrols and traffic slowed for awhile, he said.

"Let's put our heads together and see what we can do to get that Ohio-type reputation here."

Last week, Simpson said County Manager Tom Stewart will ask for stepped up patrols on the highway, even if the zero-tolerance upsets some local residents.

"We're going to keep this dialogue open and stay on it even if we have to go to the state Legislature and get more officers," said Simpson, who represents the Glencoe and Hondo Valley area.

Stewart also is pursuing the possibility of increasing fines for speeding on the highway and of posting signs at each end warning drivers that the road is considered dangerous and that the zero tolerance policy is in effect.

## Acting waste authority manager ponders her future with agency

The news all looked good for the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority last week, but acting manager Debra Ingle still is uncertain about her future as head of the garbage collection coalition.

•Projects are moving ahead, the operation remains in the black and

employee morale is high, Ingle contends. The board's arrangement with her mirrors situations with previous managers Jerry Wright and Rick Simpson.

They moved from being representatives on the authority to acting as interim managers and then being hired as full-time managers.

But last week, Carrizozo Mayor Manny Hernandez asked for clarification

on Ingle's arrangement and what type of compensation she is receiving.

Hernandez said Tuesday he doesn't see any problem with the situation.

"I just asked for a statement," said "I just looked it over for myself and the board of trustees of Carrizozo."

Ingle currently serves as authority chairman and interim manager while collecting compensation for the second

position.

"I made a full disclosure at the last authority meeting," she said. "The board is doing nothing wrong."

The board's previous arrangement with Simpson, approved by authority attorney Don Dutton, included compensation, a vehicle and use of a credit card while he was interim manager, she said.

"In no way am I compensated what

they were and they both remained on the board as representatives until they were hired as managers," Ingle said.

The authority board authorized up to \$20,000 a year for Ingle during the interim period with no other perks, while Wright received \$35,000 and Simpson and his co-manager split \$40,000, she said.

The board will decide in November what its next move will be, she said.



home owners is the impact on their yearly property taxes, Silva said. That increase would amount to \$32 for owners of homes valued at \$104,500 for a total hospital/clinic tax of \$108.74. Those with homes valued at \$500,000 would see an increase of \$177 for a total payment of \$585.46, he said. Silva said officials with the state Department of Finance and Administration told him the commission has the option of passing a resolution recalling some of the special mill levy. Commissioner Leo Martinez, who represents a portion of Ruidoso, said he's asked that a resolution be drafted. Commissioners should cut the tax rate for the hospital and clinics this year because the money generated by the full millage will exceed what was requested, especially in view of a large reserve already accumulated, he said. Also hitting Ruidoso residents will be an average 5-percent to 6-percent increase in

property value and a big jump in the village's debt service tax. 'We saw a decrease last year because they didn't float a bond issue and we didn't change the values,' he said. That dramatic drop is what caused the big increase this year, said Village Manager Alan Briley. 'We don't have a larger debt,' he emphasized. Two years ago, when the village proposed a bond issue to build a recreation center, the decision was made to keep the debt service rate at its existing level pending the outcome of the election. The bonds to pay off the center would have replaced bonds ready to retire, he said. Voters rejected the recreation center project and the rate already in place generated much more money than was needed for the village's remaining bond payment and required reserve. Last year, the DEA reduced the debt service rate dramatically to compensate for the extra money the village collected the year before and had in reserve. But this year, the state

pay for the remaining bond payment and reserve requirement. 'It should have gone down in increments as we paid off the bonds,' Briley said. 'We were very concerned last year when it went so low. Now it is going back up probably where it should have been instead of the dramatic drop. The state is doing this, not us.' Another impact is that the state increased its own debt service tax by 26 mills to 1.765 mills, Silva said. 'Hondo property owners also saw a big increase from a bond issue they passed for school improvements,' the assessor said. 'Corona lost value because of the decline of the railroad and El Paso Natural Gas. Since its value went down, the rates went up to generate enough for the village's operation.' Increases in tax rates from last year ranged from a low of 1.15 percent for non-residential property in Ruidoso Downs to a high of 9.82 percent for residential property in Hondo. Ruidoso's residential tax rate increased by 7.67 percent.

Otero County mosquitos carry encephalitis

A sample of mosquitoes from Otero County tested positive for St. Louis encephalitis. They were collected in a light trap by personnel at Holloman Air Force Base and tested by the Scientific Laboratory Division of the New Mexico Department of Health in Albuquerque. Otero County borders Lincoln County on the south side of Ruidoso. Alamogordo and the air force base lie about 55 miles southwest. Base staff are fogging and larviciding to decrease the mosquito population in the area. The trapping of mosquitoes

was conducted after the presence of the mosquito-borne virus was discovered earlier this year in El Paso, Texas and Sunland Park, N.M. The virus is found sporadically in mosquitoes in all 48 contiguous states. St. Louis encephalitis can cause inflammation of the brain five to 15 days after being bitten. Most people infected with the disease show no symptoms at all or very mild symptoms of slight fever and headache. Severe illness is marked by headaches, high fever, neck stiffness, stupor, disorienta-

tion, coma and other central nervous system disruptions that may temporarily or permanently result in physical or mental disabilities or even death. Severe symptoms are more common in persons 50 years or older. Dr. Paul Ettestad, state veterinarian, said the chances of contracting encephalitis in New Mexico are remote. 'The last human case of St. Louis encephalitis in New Mexico occurred in Otero County in 1991,' he said. In nature, St. Louis encephalitis is maintained in a

cycle of birds and the mosquitoes that feed on them, he said. Avoiding mosquito bites and preventing mosquitoes from breeding are the most important measures for preventing the disease. People do not get the disease from other people, birds or animals, he said. Suggestions include using mosquito repellent on exposed skin, wearing light colors and covering up if you have to be outside and avoiding activities between dusk and dawn. Remove any objects that could hold standing water and keep roof gutters cleaned so that they drain properly.

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# Rescue squad wants county to maintain private vehicles

County Manager Tom Stewart has balked at the vehicle maintenance proposal, saying the county is not equipped to handle it and could face liability.

Choosing a different location for one of their special meetings, Lincoln County Commissioners will get together at 8 a.m. today in the Ruidoso Downs village hall.

Although the meeting was necessary to approve county tax rates, another item on the agenda may prompt discussion.

Members of White Mountain Search and Rescue are asking the county to per-

form maintenance on the vehicles they use in the volunteer rescue activity.

In a letter to Jim Marion of the rescue group, County Manager Tom Stewart wrote he will recommend against approval of the request.

He listed these reasons:

- The county doesn't have a maintenance garage. The road department garage is designed, staffed and equipped only to handle road equipment. No other departments maintain their vehicles at that garage.

- A liability issue could be involved with repairs performed by county personnel on non-county vehicles.

- The lone mechanic in the road department already is loaded with work.

Marion asked for maintenance on a 1984 Ford Bronco and 1984 Jeep CJ-7. He suggested either taking them to the county's garage or to whatever business services county vehicles.

"These two vehicles are very important to the work that we do, but are deteriorating

badly," he wrote.

Other items on the agenda are:

- A resolution transferring \$25,000 from the county's general fund to the reappraisal fund until the end of December to increase the Bonito Volunteer Fire Fund in response to grants received.

- Certification of the 2001 property tax rates.

- A report by Sally Canning on a recent water conference.

- Considering approval of \$2,000 from lodgers tax to advertise and promote the 20th

Open Chili Cook-Off and \$750 to cover liability insurance for three Rural Economic Development Through Tourism sponsored activities, Arts in the Orchard this year and next, and Starry Night in Lincoln.

- A review of a proposed lease of the Glencoe Rural Events Center by Sherry Barrow Strategies.

The contract provides for rent of \$100 per month the first year, increasing to \$250 a month the second year, and \$500 per month for the third and fourth years.

# Highway designation doesn't restrict billboards, county told

The designation of U.S. 70 as a national scenic byway did not require Lincoln County's approval and is not tied to restrictions against billboards.

County Manager Tom Stewart reported to county commissioners last month after questions from Commissioner Rick Simpson and Hondo Valley residents about the

apparent loss of control over property they own adjoining the highway.

Stewart explained that restrictions against billboards, one of the uses some property owners were considering, are tied to the federal Highway Beautification Act, put together in the late 1960s by the wife of the President Lyndon Baines Johnson.

"The byway has nothing to do with the signs," Stewart said.

But Simpson said he's still concerned about the property rights issue.

"I live on the highway and I don't want billboards," he said. "But it's a matter of property rights. Some people out there have lived there five and six generations and suddenly outside people are telling them they can't do something with their property."

Under the byways program,

restrictions could be imposed if the county commission agreed to a zone a 500-foot wide strip of property on both sides of the highway, Stewart said. But that hasn't happened, he said.

If someone is being told the byways designation is restricting use of that land, they should challenge it, he said.

Commission approval is not required simply to designate a road as a byway, he added.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said he's been told the designation generates money for the valley through Hondo and Glencoe.

Chairman Rex Wilson said the Billy the Kid Byway visitor center in Ruidoso Downs is heavily visited.

"But nobody owns the view," he said. The decision on how to use the land along the highway should be the owner's, he contended.

# Road crew to blast rock

Hard rock will be blasted along U.S. 70 east of Riverside for the next month as highway construction proceeds between Roswell and Ruidoso.

Drivers should expect delays of up to one hour between 6 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, state

officials said. The speed limit will be reduced to 55 mph in the construction zone and lane closures will occur from mile marker 302 to 318, east of Picacho Hill.

## Just call those Altrusans 'life-savers'

The civic club is sponsoring mammograms all month long

**A**ltrusa, 28 women strong, isn't the largest civic organization in Ruidoso, but arguably has helped save more lives than any other in the past 15 years.

Altrusa every October has shared the cost of mammograms, and again this month - Breast Cancer Awareness Month - is offering reduced-rate examinations in collaboration with Lincoln County Medical Center.

An Altrusa co-chair for the program notes that although reservations for mammograms are necessary, every woman over the age of 40 should have annual examinations.

Although the list fills up quickly for the approximately 430 women seeking examinations during the month, the

odds are good that cancellations will allow late-comers to be examined.

Appointments for mammograms at LCMC are being accepted weekdays from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. through Oct. 26.

The charge is \$55, or less than half the usual cost of \$117. That's because Altrusans do much of the scheduling and record-keeping work in the process.

So...if you have a physician in Lincoln County and live in Lincoln County, and have had no breast augmentation, a low-cost mammogram could be the best investment you ever made. It could save your life.

If you don't believe it, talk with one of the five Altrusans whose breast cancer was discovered - in time.

## Loud talk shows help nobody

**COLUMBUS, Ohio** - Political talk shows in which guests yell, scream and interrupt each other may attract more viewers - but a new study suggests it may be bad for our political system.

Viewers who watched a supposedly real talk show where two political candidates engaged in a hostile, rude debate showed more negative attitudes toward Congress, politicians - and even the American political system - than did viewers who watched a more courteous debate.

People who viewed the uncivil debates also remembered fewer of the arguments supporting the viewpoint they opposed - and were more likely to say the opposing arguments were not legitimate.

"Television depends on conflict to make politics seem less boring to the public and attract declining audiences, but that conflict comes with a price," said Diana Mutz, co-author of the study and professor of political science at Ohio State University.

"Hostile political talk shows such as Hardball, Meet the Press and the like affect not just attitudes toward candidates, but also have a negative impact on how viewers feel about politicians in general and the whole political system. Political programs that are interesting to watch may end up damaging public attitudes in a significant way," she said. Assisting were Justin Taylor, an Ohio State graduate student, and Byron Reeves, a political scientist at Stanford University.

They presented their results in

September at the annual meeting of the American Political Science Association in San Francisco.

The researchers taped a fictional political talk show called "Indiana Week in Review." In this show, the "candidates" debated several controversial issues. Two versions - civil and uncivil - of each exchange were taped. Although the candidates expressed exactly the same issue positions in each case and used exactly the same arguments, the tone of each exchange was very different.

The tapes were shown to 100 volunteers who were led to believe they were watching real candidates on a real talk show. Before the show, participants filled out questionnaires that asked them about their political background and their positions on some of the issues they would see debated.

They then watched 20 minutes of the show in both civil and uncivil versions then filled out a questionnaire about their attitudes. The results showed that people who viewed the uncivil exchanges were much more negative toward Congress than those who viewed the civil debates.

"It was surprising that people were more negative toward Congress after the uncivil exchange, even though we made clear that neither candidate was now or had ever been a member of Congress," Mutz said. "It is still more surprising that attitudes toward the American political system were influenced negatively by the civility of this one political talk show."

### Sharing the highway

To the editor:

I would just like to inform the people that are for the four lanes on U.S. 70 through the Hondo Valley, what they will probably be sharing that road with: The radioactive/hazardous waste dumps at Andrews, and Carlsbad, already in operation (and) a new hazardous waste dump that is in the process of getting its permit, 42 miles east of Roswell.

The new dump called Triassic Park will also be dumping polychlorinated biphenyls or (PCBs). PCBs are a hazardous concern of President Bush. But with the NAFTA agreement, all hazardous waste that is produced by an American company must be transported back into United States.

According to the Government Accounting Office, fewer than 1 percent of the 3.3 million trucks crossing into the U.S. each year are inspected. The statistics show that in El Paso, only one inspector (is) on duty to inspect the average 1300 trucks that pass through per day. The number actually inspected: 10 to 14 per day.

When inspected, the Mexican trucks were forced out of service at a rate of 45 to 48 percent. Overweight loads, no insurance, and faulty brakes are just a few of the serious problems.

The Department of Transportation states that "safety is paramount." It also says, "The public has the right to expect the government, shippers, and carriers to make every reasonable effort to protect the people against even the remote possibility of a hazardous material disaster."

Well if just one truckload of Radioactive or PCBs waste goes off the road (like it did at the Coe Ranch), and hits the river, who pays for every home or farm from here to Texas? If you have a major or fatal accident with a faulty truck with no insurance, where the driver just walks away, who should we talk to for you? We asked for a truck bypass back in 1999 to put us out of harm's way. But our requests are falling on deaf ears. Would you feel safe driving with them in your neighborhood?

## Quality is critical in child care

High quality child care during the preschool years is linked to improved language, academic and social skills when children later enter elementary school, according to a new study of children from across the United States.

In the study published in the September/October issue of Child Development, better classroom materials and practices - such as activities and teachers' responsiveness to preschoolers - were associated with more advanced development of children's language and academic abilities, while a closer preschool teacher-child relationship in preschool was linked to improvements in both cognitive and social skills through the early elementary years.

"Higher quality care is modestly associated with a wide variety of better cognitive and socio-emotional outcomes for children from diverse backgrounds, including differences in gender, ethnic background and level of maternal education," says lead author Ellen Peisner-Feinberg, of the Frank Porter Graham

Child Development Center at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Children attending higher quality child care during preschool have better language and math skills, are better able to think and pay attention in class, get along better with other children and exhibit fewer behavior problems into elementary school, Peisner-Feinberg says.

"Recent estimates indicate that more than half of 3- to 5-year-old children in the United States attend child-care centers prior to kindergarten, representing three quarters of the preschool-age children in out-of-home care," she says.

But few studies have examined the long-term impact of these early experiences into the school years. "These findings indicate that the need for high-quality child care is of universal importance, and that policies promoting better quality child care have benefits that last into the early school years," she says.

In some cases, the benefits of high quality care were even stronger and longer lasting for children at greater risk for having difficulty in school than the average. This was particularly true in the case of better math skills and fewer problem behaviors, says Peisner-Feinberg.

Working with a team of researchers from universities across the country, Peisner-Feinberg and her colleagues studied 733 preschoolers attending 176 child care centers located in California, Colorado, Connecticut and North Carolina and followed 345 of these children through second grade. Half of the children were boys and almost one-third were from diverse ethnic groups. About 82 percent were from two-parent homes.

"The more quality is increased, the better off children are. These findings provide support for the importance of high-quality preschool experiences as a mechanism for promoting school readiness and school success," says Peisner-Feinberg.

## Waste agency clarifies rules

Acting manager Debra Ingle outlines how residents in various locations are to dispose of trash.

An official with the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority this week clarified some of the rules governing use of dumpsters and convenience containers operated by the garbage collection agency.

Dumpsters outside municipal limits are to be used for household trash by those living in unincorporated portions of the county, said interim authority manager Debra Ingle.

Customers in towns such as Ruidoso Downs that are given poly carts for household service also can use convenience sites inside the boundaries of their towns for other trash, she said.

Convenience containers in Ruidoso Downs and Capitan can be used by county residents

and contractors. The convenience site in Capitan is located at 326 Yard Road and is open from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 8 a.m. to noon on the third Saturday of each month.

The headquarters of the authority, its recycling center and convenience dumping site is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday and from 8 a.m. to noon on the second and fourth Saturday of each month at 222 Second Street in Ruidoso Downs.

Ingle said she's working on two more convenience dumping sites in the Hondo valley and Alto.

The authority complex is the recycling center for the county, but recycling also is available at the site on Yard Road in Capitan near the Senior Citizens Center.

Corona's convenience site is next to the town compactor, Carrizozo's is at its park and one also is stationed on Cedar Creek Road.

Ingle reported at an authority meeting last week that a surprise inspection by the environment department in response to a complaint resulted in no citations and comments about the overall cleanliness of the Second Street complex. The report is available at the authority office for review.

The board also authorized the purchase of 36, 3-yard dumpsters for \$9,684 from Roll Offs USA; 14, 30-yard roll-off containers and three recycling lids for \$2,720 and \$1,395 from Roll Offs USA to improve the appearance at Carrizozo, Alto and Capitan; a transport truck budgeted at \$95,000, but purchased for \$77,000; a roll-off truck budgeted at \$105,000, but purchased for \$97,000.

Ingle complimented the authority staff, saying the employees work "real hard" to make the organization worthy of the county.

"We appreciate everyone who has been supportive of the staff," she said.

Attendees can offer oral comments that evening or submit written comments by Dec. 5.

The purpose of the public hearing by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is to gather information to be considered in making the final rule.

In particular, information is sought on the distribution and

quality of butterfly habitat, land use practices and current or future activities in areas that may be affected if designated as critical habitat.

The proposal to list the butterfly and to designate critical habitat was released Sept. 6.

The meeting will be at the Civic Center, 800 East First Street, in Alamogordo.

Capitan gets big homecoming win for large home crowd

The Capitan High School football team got a dominating homecoming win over the Escalante Lobos in front of a large and loud crowd at Tiger Stadium.

Senior back Chance Van Winkle scored four times, including a 60-yard scamper, and Stephen Silva added two more TDs, as the Tigers hammered Escalante, 50-16.

The Tigers jumped all over the Lobos, and seemed to have the game in hand early, taking a 21-0 halftime lead.

But while the offense moved the ball, it was the Orange Crush defense that stood out, holding the Lobos to just 128 yards of total offense and picking off two passes.

After the game, Capitan coach Ed Davis said the blowout was a pleasant surprise.

"The way we've struggled this year, we didn't think we'd beat them like this," he said.

The Lobos (0-6) looked out of their league most of the way, as Capitan (2-4) took charge of the game early.

Already ahead 6-0, Capitan was forced to punt the ball away. The deep man for the Lobos was hit hard though, coughing up the ball. Sophomore Tiger Jesse Underdown recovered, giving his team great field position at the Lobo 37.

Two plays later, Silva broke through for a 29-yard TD run. The two-point conversion gave Capitan a 14-0 lead late in the first quarter.

The Tiger offense then seemed to go stale, as it was unable to take advantage of another turnover.

The Lobos still couldn't move on their next possession, giving the ball up on downs at their own 44. Van Winkle gained 14 quick yards, but three straight penalties made it first and 25 at the Lobo 45. Two plays and one penalty later, it was third and 31, and it looked like the Tigers would have to punt.

But a pass to Van Winkle picked up 25 yards. A five-yard facemask penalty was added, keeping it at third down, and sophomore Andrew Armentariz got seven more on the next play to keep the drive alive.

A little trickery worked for Capitan, as Silva took a reverse 13 yards for a score, making it 21-0 at halftime.

Escalante head coach Joe Soliz said that while he had hoped for a closer game, he wasn't entirely surprised by Capitan's effectiveness.

"Ed will bring them to play," Soliz said. "He's going to have a team ready to go."

The Lobo offense got started in the second half, but the Tigers had an answer every time.

After Escalante threw a 56-yard scoring strike to open the half, Van Winkle put up seven- and 60-yard TDs to put the game out of reach at 37-8.

Sophomore quarterback Tommy Aldaz threw his only touchdown pass of the game in the fourth period, hitting freshman Shane Coleman from 17 yards out. That score made

New Mexico State faced a favorable opponent after suffering a 64-0 loss to Kansas State last week.

Enzinger completed 14-of-23 passes for 166 yards and also rushed for 71 yards on 13 carries.

Walter Taylor added 53 yards rushing for the Aggies, who racked up 288 yards on the ground.

New Mexico State out-gained Louisiana-Monroe, 454-177, and limited the Indians to just 30 yards rushing. The Aggies also had three sacks and held the ball for nearly 41 minutes.

Louisiana-Monroe (0-4, 0-2) suffered its 12th straight loss. The quarterback tandem of Andy Chance and Andre Vige combined to go 16-for-35 for 147 yards and two interceptions.

## Utah 37, New Mexico 16

Utah halfback Dameon Hunter ran for 177 yards and two touchdowns as Utah beat New Mexico 37-16 Saturday in the Mountain West Conference opener for both teams.

Hunter ran for 92 yards in the fourth quarter when Utah pulled away from the Lobos with two touchdowns.

Hunter has eclipsed the 100-yard mark in three straight games and passed New Mexico's Jarrod Baxter, who had 95 yards, as the

league's top rusher.

New Mexico (1-3 overall, 0-1 MWC) came into the game with the nation's second-best rushing defense at 27.0 yards a game, but couldn't stop the Utah ground attack. Utah (3-1, 1-0) rushed for 255 yards.

The Lobos led 16-14 midway through the third quarter, but never threatened again as Utah's stifling defense and ball-control offense took charge.

Hunter scored on a 1-yard plunge with 10:13 remaining, a play after he ran 74 yards, breaking several tackles along the way.

Blitzing linebacker Gary Davis gave the Lobos their only lead (16-14) when he sacked Lance Rice in the end zone on a third-and-5 play for a safety with 8:52 left in the

third quarter.

Sophomore Casey Kelly, in relief of UNM starting QB Rudy Caamano, completed his first touchdown pass of his career on a 47-yard bomb down the right sideline to Dwight Counter on the Lobos' first possession of the second half.

Hunter capped Utah's first drive of the game with a 11-yard run.

Four plays after Terrell Golden recovered a Ute fumble on the Utah 9-yard line, Baxter powered over the goal line from one yard.

Both starting quarterbacks struggled and were replaced in the first half. Ute back-up Ryan Breska came on for Rice and hit Cliff Russell on a short pass in the middle of the field that the speedster

turned into a 46-yard touchdown reception to give Utah a 14-7 halftime lead.

Rice returned in the second half and finished 12-of-26 for 147 yards and an interception.

Caamano completed just 3-of-11 passes and had an interception before taking a seat. Kelly didn't fare much better with 7-of-24 passing. The Lobos punted 10 times.

## Fishing report for the Ruidoso area, Oct. 5, 2001

**Ruidoso River** - The good news: The River was stocked 10 days ago. The bad news: The number of fish stocked was very small. With this being said, please practice Catch and Release. As stated the past few weeks, nymph fishing is what's happening on the River. Large Stoneflies are abundant in the river now. Brook Worms are declining in size and quantity, and Scuds are on the increase in the waters. It's Hopper season, so carry a few with you. If you see fish rising, float a hopper overhead and see what happens. Fishermen continue having success tossing a large dry fly as a lead and strike indicator and using a nymph dropper. The dry fly was tied on about 18 inches above the dropper.

**South fork** - One still needs to hike a ways up the stream to find fish. A ways is two or three miles upstream. Once found, the fish are healthy and hungry. The fish here are not fussy. Caddis dry flies and small nymphs of just about any pattern will work here. Several local fishermen have hiked 2 to 3 miles up the Southfork to be rewarded with several nice Rainbows and Brookies.

**Bonito Lake**: If driving to the Bonito area, be aware there is road construction going on, be alert and expect delays. The lake has taken on a green coloration due to a large algae bloom. The fly patterns that have been working are Humples, Dark Hendricksons, and Parachute Adam flies, which have been consistent producers before dark on the main lake body. A damsel fly nymph tied as a dropper behind your dry fly offering continues to bring an unexpected take. For the spin cast fishermen, try a hot pink renegade pattern propeller fly or a black

with grizzly hackle propeller fly behind a bubble rig.

**Eagle Lakes**: Eagle Lakes are closed for the season.

**Grindstone**: The fall evenings have helped drop the surface temperature of Grindstone Lake. That one fact will help the fishing quality pick up fast on the lake. Float tubes continue reporting doing well by tossing a sinking tip line and stripping a dark wooly bugger with some flash or a streamer 8 to 10 feet deep. Float tubing will end Oct. 31, so plan your last few trips now. Damsel fly and Dragon fly imitations continue working well. For spin casters, tie on an Olive or Black propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the barbs down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water.

**Lake Mescalero**: The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark wooly buggers continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito, or Hendrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk. Please practice Catch and Release wherever and whenever you can. We have moved our local shop - New address is 2501 Sudderth Drive - Come see us for daily fishing information. 

**Salad bars opening at Santa Fe school**

A salad bar opened at Alvord Elementary School in Santa Fe Sept. 27, part of the "Local Harvest" pilot program to incorporate locally grown fresh fruits and vegetables into school meals.

"We want the cafeteria to be a learning laboratory for developing good food habits," said Judy Jaquez, a registered dietitian and division head for student nutrition of Santa Fe Public Schools. "The purpose is to get kids to eat fruits and vegetables at the peak of freshness and goodness." Jaquez added that the pilot program is feasible to expand simply by introducing it into more schools and teaching children the connection between agricultural food products and the earth.

Other Santa Fe schools participating include Cesar Chavez Elementary School with an enrollment of 532 students and Capitol High School with 1,368 students. A component of implementing the pilot program is the ongoing training of the food service staff. A classroom nutrition component will be included in the two elementary schools.

**Wheeling books around Mescalero**

Books on wheels is the latest implementation of the 21st Century project grant in Mescalero, bringing books and magazines to people all over the reservation.

Driving a cargo van set up as a "bookmobile" 137 miles a week, and stopping for two hours at most places, library aide Christina Kaje has books and will travel.

Kaje said she stops at the playgrounds at Gallerito Flats, Peña Canyon, Mudd Canyon and Palmer Loop and spends about an hour in the less populated areas. Along Highway 70, she goes door-to-door asking if people are interested in checking out the Traveling Library.

Her Traveling Library contains about a thousand books for all age groups. Almost half of these are for children; the rest are teen paperbacks, adult paperbacks, novels, educational books, dictionaries and books on religion and human interest.

In addition, the Traveling Library carries about 725 magazines, including National Geographic (Kaje said she needs more, so if anyone wishes to donate magazines, take them to Mescalero High School, where the 21st Century project has an office).

"There are Native American books throughout, home improvement, plumbing, basic wiring, advanced woodworking. We even have floor plans for houses," Kaje said.

Gina Klinekole, director of the 21st Century Learning Centers Training Project, said improving literacy is one of the three major goals

of the project, and the Traveling Library is a way to bring reading materials to the entire community.

"We want to be able to target the ones who are not able to have access to any reading material — whether that be newspapers, magazines, books, reference books — and where transportation is not available," Klinekole said. "Our intention is to build up literacy skills in the community."

The grant includes \$4,500 to buy new books, but most of the 1,000 books on the cargo van were donated. Klinekole said some new books have been ordered from Clear Light Publishing, a tricultural publishing company in Santa Fe.

Klinekole said the books are available for people to borrow, but they may also keep them, since the purpose of the program is to build literacy skills. That's why she and Kaje appreciate donations of reading materials.

Kaje said she'd like to be able to visit the detention centers to make the materials available to inmates, as well as the care center, when it's completed.

"For now, I just go to houses of the elderly people," she said.

Last week, Kaje went around to the communities on the reservation handing out letters and schedules of her stops and

Kaje was born in Mescalero in 1973 but moved away in the early '80s.


"My father was a criminal investigator, that's why we traveled around a lot," she said. In 1997, the family moved back to Mescalero.

"I didn't know our culture or traditions. That's the flaw of moving away from here," Kaje said. "But I learned about other cultures and traditions and experienced the outside world. It opened my eyes to what different people there are."

Kaje worked in housing, Casino Apache and in law enforcement with the Bureau of Indian Affairs before accepting the position with the 21st Century project.

"This is a really good program," she said. "A long time ago there used to be a bookmobile."
