Just in time for winter Zia to slash local cost of natural gas

■ The falling price of gas on global markets could cut Lincoln County residential bills in half from last winter.

Users of natural gas in Ruidoso and surrounding areas could see their bills drop by 50 percent compared to the same usage last year.

Starting Monday, bills from Zia Natural Gas will reflect a 64 percent gas cost factor decrease.

The savings to Zia's 9,000 local customers should average about \$400 per year, according to company spokeswoman Anna Gail Grassie.

Zia attorney Mercedes Fernandez-Wells explained that the company asked the New Mexico Public Regulatory Commission to allow it to implement the reduction next week.

"Typically, Zia files its new gas cost factor ... in mid-October to become effective Nov. 1,"

Fernandez-Wells wrote in the request for exemption. "Because the new gas cost factor reflects a decrease of 64.08 percent from Zia's last gas cost factor, Zia is requesting a variance from ... (the rule) to allow the new gas cost factor to go into effect for bills rendered on and after Oct. 8."

A 15-day period of verification also will be waived.

The reduction is only the difference in gas cost. The prices of services and transportation remain stable.

The drop reflects global market conditions, Fernandez-Wells said.

Grassie said, "This puts us at less than one-third the price of propane."

Zia is the second largest natural gas distributor in the state after Public Service Company of New Mexico.

Area boosters brace for stiff competition

Aggressive tourism promotions abound in wake of terrorist attack

Concerned that Ruidoso's winter tourist season could be hurt by aggressive promotions elsewhere, a group of community leaders is putting together an action plan.

"Delta Air Lines is giving 10,000 free tickets away to people just to visit New York," said David McIntosh, a Ruidoso ski rental shop owner. He said tourism destinations have upped their advertising budgets and attractions have sliced prices to lure people.

"You can fly to Las Vegas for \$7 one way if you go on a Tuesday," McIntosh said. "I think those things can have a negative impact on us in the very near future."

McIntosh was speaking to about 20 community leaders Thursday, including Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson, the administrators of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, lodging industry representatives, business interests and others.

Noting Ruidoso is a driving destination for visitors, McIntosh said he was not preaching "doom and gloom." But he added the ski season dependent community cannot "sit back on our laurels."

He noted the markets of El Paso, Midland-Odessa, Dallas and Houston have airports.

"You put 30 or 40 major casinos together (in Las Vegas), and couple those people with the airlines, and also get their state tourism behind them to spend more dollars to get people there, and I think that we could see a fallout," McIntosh said. "I think we could see some people enticed to go to places that they've never been simply because the perception is that it's a cheap vacation."

McIntosh called on the community and its leaders to brainstorm an "action plan to generate interest in Ruidoso."

He proposed a red, white and blue Christmas from Ruidoso Downs to Alto to "paint the town in patriotic displays."

"Our goal is to be featured on Good Morning America, on some of the other major talk shows and maybe even be featured in Newsweek or some of the other national magazines," McIntosh said. "And I think it's a doable deal. I think that there's enough people in this room right here that I think it can be done."

Mary Maxson, chairman of the Ruidoso Arts Commission, said the concept should have been started in the past. She envisioned Ruidoso with a mountain holiday theme, and a day that would include choirs, Santa Claus, dancers, a living nativity scene and barrels with fires to warm downtown visitors.

Mescalero vote set for Nov. 6

The Nov. 6 general election for the Mescalero Apache Tribe will pit the incumbent president against the son of the man who led the tribe for more than 40 years.

In the primary election Tuesday, President Sara Misquez, who was assistant to the late president Wendell Chino for many years before his death in Nov. 1998, pulled 324 votes to Mark Chino's 190 votes.

In the race for vice president, former tribal administrator Ferris Palmer led the field with 286 votes and will face Arthur "Butch" Blazer in next month's election. Blazer, a Bureau of Indian Affairs employee who also serves on the tribal council, pulled 270 votes.

From a list of 18 contenders, eight earned the chance to vie for four seats on the tribal council.

They are incumbent Gregory Mendez with 335 votes, incumbent Sandra Platero with 316, former council member Raymond Kirgan with 301, incumbent Berle Kanseah with 262, school board president Michaelene Ahidley with 260, incumbent Christie La Paz Jr. with 258 and Joseph Geronimo, a forestry worker and fire fighter, with 218. Thora Walsh Padilla, tribal natural resources protection administrator tied Norbert Via with 207 votes each, but Padilla was named as the candidate to compete in November.

According to the tribal election board, 914 people voted in the election. Two ballots were declared invalid and 46 votes were cast as absentee ballots. The number of eligible voters is estimated at about 1,500.

Those who didn't make the

cut for the presidential race were Carleton Naiche-Palmer with 158 votes, Harlyn Geronimo with 83, Naomi Sainz with 75, Frederick Chino Sr. with 63 votes and Paul Brusuelas with 20.

Losing out in the primary for the post of vice president were Jackie D. Blaylock with 185 votes, Freddie Kaydahzinne with 122 and Raymond Little with 39.

Those failing to muster enough votes to stay in the council race were Albert Platta Sr. with 185 votes, Norbert Via with 207, Rufina Marie laws with 72, Mason Guydakon with 186, Charles "Buffy" Shanta Jr. with 76, Cordell Balatche Sr. with 111, Dorene E. Fernando with 127, Cornel Cervantes with 162, Curtis Williams with 96 and Samuel Cooper Sr. with 80 votes.





County in cashflow crunch

Lincoln County's cash reserves are scraping bottom because an expected source of revenue arrived late and county departments ordered some big dollar items during the first few months of the fiscal year.

What started out as a "heads-up" to let county commissioners know why the cash balance looks so anemic sparked some questions during a special meeting Wednesday.

County Treasurer Joan Park, talking to the commission as the county board of finance, said she was "alarmed" by a comparison showing that beginning cash balances for the county were about the same in 1981 as this year, although the numbers of employee and costs of services had increased.

She explained the county will have to dip into its three-month, state-mandated cash reserve to cover bills. That situation changed Thursday when a payment from the federal government to offset property taxes lost on public land within the county's borders arrived.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley Thursday said the county may need to take another look at how it pays its bills.

Under a previous "warrant" system, banks paid bills and then were reimbursed by the county. Now checks for purchases and services as each is presented. Under the warrant approach, banks are paid by Park as they are submitted.

"We need to look at this closely," he said. "I think this system is affecting the county's cash flow."

Park disagreed that the new system wouldn't impact cash flow management.

"The money is paid out of the account just as quickly with warrants," she said. "The bank pays the money and is held hostage until we transfer money from one account to another. It wouldn't alter this situation at all."

During the Wednesday meeting, Park said the county has to be more vigilant on watching cash flow.

"Just because it's budgeted, you can't spend it all at the first of the year," she said, suggesting that department heads

may need training in cash flow management.

Park explained that the county's cash balance often is so low by this time of the year, operation is dependent on the PILT received from the federal government in September or October, she said. That tides the county over until revenues from property tax bills roll in next month.

The good news is that the county saw a jump from \$472,000 last year in PILT to \$778,000 this year under a bill pushed in the U.S. Congress by U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M.

After the meeting, Chairman Rex Wilson said counties shouldn't be dependent on federal money because in a crisis, the government could say they will receive no money at all.

"No one was trying to scare anyone," Wilson said. "There's a difference between the budget and cash flow. Timing is what matters here. This was meant to be a positive, up front presentation. We are not out of money."

County Manager Tom Stewart said in the future, department heads may be prohibited from ordering vehicles and other high dollar items until the PILT money arrives - possibly holding back until October.

Nunley said the county relies on revenue estimates from Park in putting together the annual budget, but now "the picture looks bleak."

Advance planning should be used to avoid money problems when officials know that some county cars must be replaced every year, he said, adding that

the county should always live within its means.

Stewart said the annual budget is a planning document and some revenues and expenses may not occur or may come in at different levels. Even the 3/12th budget reserve required by the state may not be in the bank at all times, he said. That three month reserve is targeted to help counties in the first quarter of every fiscal year, he said.

"It's not a reserve that can't be touched," he said, a statement confirmed Thursday by the head of the local government division of the state Department of Finance and Administration.

Commissioner William Schwettmann asked why the county doesn't use a lease-to-buy approach to keep initial dollar impact low on major equipment.

"We know it will be all right by the end of the year unless we're bombed, and then no one will be," he said. "We're not unique in this situation. It's the same in every county."

Grants County is broke and Mora County is on the brink, he said. Lincoln is in better shape because it keeps its long-term debt low with plenty of collateral, he said.

Park said she didn't mean to alarm the board, but Commissioner Leo Martinez said he's alarmed to hear that the state-required reserve isn't always there.

Schwettmann asked for an update at each meeting.

"Keep us in the loop," he said. "We can freeze the commissioners' salaries. We don't need that anyway. I'm serious."

Former firefighter on standby for possible duty at terror sites

Former Ruidoso Downs fire chief Nick Herrera was placed on the active standby list for emergency workers slated to relieve weary crews already in New York and Washington, D.C.

"I was first contacted the week of the Trade Center incident and since then I've been called three times, the most recent (two weeks ago)," he said Thursday. "They were

gathering background information. Once they start rotating their teams out, I should be going in.

"I'm excited. If I do go, I'll make everyone back here proud of the job I do."

He could be leaving as early as Saturday, Herrera said.

The 28-year-old life-long Lincoln County resident said his experience includes several areas in high demand in the recovery work being performed after terrorist attacks Sept. 11

brought down the twin towers of the World Trade Center and damaged a wing of the Pentagon.

"Through the Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms Bureau, I'm an arson and bomb technician and certified in criminal interrogation," he said. "I have state credentials for emergencies involving hazardous materials and I'm FEMA certified in major disasters, disaster recovery and disaster-related grant writing."

Telephones go silent as backhoe cuts line

Workers restored power to the Ruidoso Downs Police Department about 8:30 p.m. Wednesday and made more repairs Thursday.

A backhoe cut a major telephone cable in Ruidoso Downs at 4:30 p.m. Wednesday, disrupting service to about 1,000 customers.

David Duran with Valor Telecom, said service was restored to the Ruidoso Downs Police Department by 8:30 p.m., but crews were working Thursday to go back in and repair small sections of line one at a time.

The cut, which occurred at 100 South Central Avenue, is a good example of problems plaguing the company all summer with excavation work, he said.

"In most cases, telephone service outages are caused by someone who has not contacted the New Mexico One Call Center to request that underground utilities be located

before they start digging," said Danny Brunson, acting vice president of operations for Valor Telecom's New Mexico division.

Brunson said telecommunication cables are more susceptible to damage than pipelines and usually affect more customers when damaged because of the increased use of high-capacity technologies.

"Because Valor is part of the statewide telecommunications network, damage to any inter-city fiber-optic cable in the state can affect our customers, in some cases isolating them from the rest of the state and blocking the use of the 911 system," he said. "In Valor service areas, we experience damage to our cables everyday."

Besides charging those who cause the damage the cost of repair, the perpetrators are subject to penalties from \$5,000 to \$25,000 under a state statute that took effect July 1. Federal law allows for a \$50,000 fine for major property damage and physical injury.

"Excavators can greatly reduce their liability and risks to the safety and welfare of individuals by contacting the New Mexico One Call Center

and requesting that all buried utilities be located before digging," Brunson said.

In the Ruidoso Downs cut Wednesday, a general repair was completed by working throughout the night, Duran said. Thursday, employees concentrated on going back in to cut and repair just a few lines at a time to ensure that no one was without service more than a few minutes, he said.

The cut apparently occurred in a construction yard, but the backhoe driver was gone when Valor crews arrived, he said.

Other outages across the state this year include the Truth or Consequences calling area that was isolated in early October when a rancher damaged a fiber cable while installing a gate and an area from Artesia as far north as Willard last summer when Qwest cables were damaged.







Village council to consider taking tennis reservations

Players want a return of the previous policy on public courts, mayor says

Ruidoso village councilors are scheduled Tuesday to discuss reinstating a tennis court reservation system at the White Mountain Recreation Plaza.

"We had a system, but people complained and we dropped it," Mayor Robert Donaldson said Thursday. "Now people are asking for it."

The village also provides tennis courts at School House Park, but the only time they are reserved are for large groups or special events, he said.

The council meets at 6:30

p.m. in village hall on Cree Meadows Drive and Kansas City Street.

In other business, a public hearing will be conducted on an ordinance that would increase the salary of the municipal judge effective with whoever is elected in March.

"This is based on the amount of work the municipal judge is receiving," Donaldson said. "It was requested during our budget meetings and this is the ordinance that would put an increase in effect, but not necessarily for Mike Line. It will be for whoever wins the next election."

He did not have details on

the amount of increase.

Other items on the agenda include:

- Approval of a change order to the contract with Carl Kelley Construction on the construction of filter-to-waste piping at the Alto Crest Water Treatment Plant.
- Discussion of acting as host or co-host for the New Mexico Municipal League annual conference.
- An update on planning and zoning issues.

All's well in the mountain land

Life and politics continue despite a national tragedy

All is well in the Sacramento Mountains, regardless of what happened on Sept. 11 in New York, Washington and a field in Pennsylvania.

Lincoln County commissioners are wrestling with an unlikely problem — too much tax money. (And an election is on the horizon).

Some of those commissioners also would like the State Police to crack down on vehicles speeding through the Hondo Valley on U.S. 70, in order to save lives — but they fear some valley people wouldn't like that.

Right next door, in Otero

County, they've found mosquitos carrying encephalitis, one scary disease.

And (shades of the spotted owl and silvery minnow), the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service has called a public hearing on whether something called the checkerspot butterfly, which flutters around Cloudcroft, should be classified as one of the endangered species.

Despite the fear of terrorist attacks, young people going off to war and vast national uncertainty, the fact is that here and across the land people are pursuing their own concerns, their own jobs, their own lives.

And so God blesses America.

In a time of war, the first casualty is truth — usually

Hey, kids: it's time for another lesson in Journalism 101. That's the basic college-level course in how to write a complete sentence and read a newspaper.

It's a credit course, yet, when you complete it, you should be able to get a job at the Washington Post, or at least CNN.

Just kidding, as Dave Barry

says frequently.

Actually, you need only know how to stare at the camera and smile, a la Christiane Amanpour, to work for CNN. At the Post, it might help if you look like a young Robert Redford. Just kidding.

The point we're rambling around to make here is that reporters — old, young, beautiful, ugly — are only as good as their sources, and their sources' willingness to tell them something. That's because news reporters know only what other people choose to tell them.

We aren't, therefore, particularly impressed by the breathless voices of correspondents suggesting that it's only a matter of time before Osama bin Laden, terrorist extraordinaire, is taken captive and variously shot, hung, or brought to the bar of international justice in the Hague.

We learned long ago that, in time of war, the first casualty is truth. That was a fact when Winston Churchill was trying to

report on the Boer War, when Richard Harding Davis was helping newspapers sell papers during the Spanish American War, and in every war since.

Yes, during World War II Ernie Pyle, Edward R. Murrow and many other reporters were in the war zones. To some degree, self-censorship kept the allies' secrets intact. It was a patriotic war — some say the last patriotic war, until this new anti-terrorist war.

When Vietnam came along, and war came to our livingrooms in bloody color, the military and the politicians learned that closing the door on public information was much more comfortable for them, and it stayed thoroughly closed in such places as Grenada, Panama and the Persian Gulf.

We saw only what we were permitted to see, whether by our own generals and politicians or by Saddam Hussein in Baghdad.

Now we have a "new kind of war," as the President has noted. It is a covert war; most likely the opening horrors at the World Trade Center and the Pentagon will be the only uncensored scenes from here on out.

It makes us a bit nervous that a vast majority of Americans polled recently support the idea that the government will automatically do what is right. That translates into blind faith, but anybody who has served in any war understands that the meaning of SNAFU didn't change after the Enola Gay bombed Hiroshima.

Sadly, this is a new kind of war, and "truth" wasn't the first casualty. There were nearly 6,000 of them in New York alone.

Thieves hit ATM in Capitan

■ The investigation of the Sept. 27 burglary has been turned over to the New Mexico State Police.

An undisclosed amount of money was stolen from an ATM machine at the Brewer Oil Company at 420 W. First St. in Capitan between closing time at 10 p.m. on Sept. 27 and 5:30 a.m. Sept. 28 when the first clerk arrived.

Capitan Police Chief Carol Durban said the investigation was turned over to the New Mexico State Police "because it was obvious it was not a local deal," Durban said, adding that other ATMs have been hit lately in New Mexico lately.

"We're investigating some

leads," said Lt. Bill Bowers of the New Mexico State Police office in Alamogordo. "Several pieces of evidence were picked up and sent to the crime lab. The Criminal Investigation Unit is involved and the patrol officers."

Bowers said he could not disclose the amount of money taken, but said ATM machines usually hold "several thousand dollars."

"ATMs are hit quite often," Bowers said. "They're as secure as you can make a steel box and a machine."

Assisted-living center appeal pending

Ruidoso's Planning and Zoning Commission approval of a commercial development site plan for an assisted living complex is being appealed to the Village Council.

Sue Elliott, who filed the appeal, said last month at the commission meeting the community needed an assisted living development, but not at the lot at Grindstone Canyon Road, Wingfield and Center streets.

The village council called a special meeting for 6:30 p.m. Oct. 25, to hear the appeal. The affected property is located at Lots 1-4 of the first plat of Wingfield Homestead Addition.

Project developers, Sunwest Management Inc. of Salem, Ore., already moved the two-story, 88-unit complex from its first choice, a tract off Sudderth Drive near the Comfort Inn. Objections were raised against that lot because of conflicts with the village's transportation plan.


The proposed 9.8-acre tract,

the site of a home for orphan children before the building burned down decades ago, is zoned neighborhood commercial, which allows for various business enterprises.

The number of units proposed for the assisted living/Alzheimer's complex required a conditional use permit, which the board approved.

Neighbors complained that their residential property values would be impacted negatively and they preferred to retain open green space.

Mescalero man named to state panel

■ Tribal council member Oliver Enjady, appointed by Gov. Gary Johnson, said he plans to represent the interests of all New Mexico's Indian groups.

Oliver Enjady, Mescalero Apache tribal council member and former vice president, was appointed this week to the New Mexico Commission on Indian Affairs.

A well known artist, Enjady was nominated to fill a position on the commission by unanimous vote of the council, according to a letter from Mescalero President Sara Misquez to the Office of

Indian Affairs.

Gov. Gary Johnson announced his appointment, saying he is confident Enjady will be a valuable member with integrity. His term will expire June 30, 2006.

"I'm looking forward to representing the people and the government of Mescalero," Enjady said, adding that he will speak up for the interests not only of the Mescalero, but for all Indian groups in the state.

"This is a new step for me," he said. "I want to thank the tribal council members for their confidence in me."

Denise Romero, executive assistant to the director of the Indian Affairs

office, said the 10-member commission consists of three pueblo representatives, three Navajo representatives, two Apache and two non Indians.

The commission is considered a clearinghouse for all state programs that affect Indian people in New Mexico. Members are charged with assisting in setting policy for those programs.

The commission also handles the distribution of capital outlay money designated by the state Legislature for Indian people, members discuss tribal issues and may investigate and act on subjects connected to the condition of Indians in New Mexico, including, but not limited to their health, economy and education.





When it counts

Two area teams kick off district play tonight

For two local teams, the real season starts tonight.

It's October, which means that district play is beginning around the state. Mescalero and Carrizozo are among the teams that begin their real seasons this evening, kicking off the District 1 Six Man year against different opponents.

Mescalero Chiefs

The Chiefs (2-3) are coming off a sound defeat, falling 58-6 in their final non-district game. Mescalero coach Rodney Wright said it was easier to rebound from a blowout loss than it would have been to a nail-biter.

"I told (the players) 'We can't control that. We're going to have to improve ourselves,'" Wright said.

"We have to play our best football these next three weeks. ... If you really look at it, the district is a toss-up, as far as I'm concerned."

With two teams from the district guaranteed playoff berths, Wright said his team doesn't need to worry about winning all three games. At the same time, though, he said, a district-opening win against the Gateway Christian Warriors (4-2) would be huge.

"Our goal is to win this first game," he said. "By winning this first game, that puts us in the driver's seat. ... If you lose the first, you have to win the last two."

Wright said he thinks the Chiefs will have to win two district games, and with a powerful Lake Arthur team (4-1) looming in the season finale, the first two may be the easiest.

"I think we match up well with Gateway," he said. "I think we match up well with everyone in the district. ... We have to play error-free football."

The Chiefs may also be catching the Warriors at an opportune time, as Gateway has lost its last two games. Wright said his coaching staff has scouted the Warriors, and found that they like to throw the ball.

Mescalero had problems with pass defense early in the season, but has improved in that area since.

Another thing hurting the Chiefs is the absence of go-to running back Raymond Bigmouth. Bigmouth had run for well over 100 yards in each of his first four games, but a knee injury suffered in the Pine Hill game Sept. 22 hampered his performance last week.

Bigmouth, a junior, ran for just

32 yards versus Mountainair Sept. 28 and, even worse, reinjured the knee. The injury was diagnosed as a bruise and strain, not a tear of some kind, which Wright said he feared at first.

Also, Chief junior Gerald Blake will be sidelined due to a concussion he suffered in the Mountainair game.


The maladies will keep both players out of the Gateway Christian game, which will force the Chiefs to look for other offensive threats.

"We have to have kids step up and be leaders, be players and do their jobs," the coach said.

Blake and Bigmouth will likely not be back until Oct. 20 against Lake Arthur.

Connie Behringer is fascinated by bargains, people who sell things and people who buy things — even “lookers,” whether they buy or not. That’s what makes her a happy operator at the flea market in Ruidoso Downs.

But where are the, uh, fleas?

Owning the Prime Time Flea Market seems like Christmas year-round for Connie Behringer.

Nothing brings her as much excitement as opening a box of hidden goodies she’s just bought from a homeowner packing up to move or clearing out some space. “I love to shop,” she said.

The Prime Time Flea Market opposite Ruidoso Downs Race Track has become something of an institution in the three years Connie Behringer has been buying, selling and making vendors and customers happy.

For awhile, she also collected — just about every type of object that can be gathered — but now she’s down to crockery, especially blue and white.

Most people who walk through the doors of the market on the south side of U.S. 70 across from Ruidoso Downs Race Track are struck by the rambling shop’s neatness.

Each vendor cares for his or her own space, keeping it dusted and attractive for the best display of merchandise.

Lois Darnold rents space at the market for her “Barbie’s Booth,” a color coordinated corner of dishware, matching utensils and accent pieces.

When she’s away looking for new merchandise, she’s confident that Behringer is there to handle her sales and credit her account, which is tallied weekly.

“I go to Albuquerque and El Paso to look and I’m always looking for matching items like glasses to go with a dish set I already have. It may not happen right away,” Darnold said.

Besides vendors, Behringer also buys items outright from individuals and sells them herself.

Every item sold is tagged with a

number to ensure proper credit to the vendor or Behringer.

Born near Waco, Texas on a farm, Behringer grew up in La Mesa and attended business school in Lubbock. Shortly after marrying, her husband, “Junior” Behringer, spent 18 months in the Army and she learned to keep busy by working in a department store during the day and at a drive-in theater at night.

As the couple added two daughters to the mix, they moved to Synder and then back to Waco, Texas as Junior changed jobs, from the oil fields to driving for a freight line. Behringer was busy raising her girls and running a small antique store by her home.

Daughters grown up, the couple moved to Ruidoso 25 years ago. Behringer started several antique shops, including Red Barn Antiques. She would sell one shop, then “get antsy” and start another.

Three years ago, Cowboy Scrimshire approached her about becoming partners at the building on the hill.

“Right off, I knew I wanted a flea market,” Behringer said. “Some people suggested I not use that term because it was degrading, but I thought it’s more of a fun thing where people can bring in whatever they want or find something they’re looking for. Everyone seems pleasantly surprised when they walk in.”

Forty vendors rent space for \$1 per square foot plus 10 percent of sales each month. They take great pride in keeping their areas attractive and neat, she said.

“We’ve grown since we started and have weeded out some and upgraded,” she said. “Basically, we have what I think is almost perfect now, because we have such a variety.”

To illustrate her point, Behringer points to a rack of sunglasses at the entrance, followed by a table full of decorative items made out of horse-

shoes, including a Christmas tree. One vendor sells only Southwestern and Native American items, another tack and saddles. Kitchen accessories and tools are found in one section and nearby are children’s furniture and toys.

Fur stoles, jewelry and some clothing also are sold, as are books, vases, dishware, dolls, leather bags and furniture.

“You have to love people to be in this business,” Behringer said. “A few are irritating, but you take them with a grain of salt. Most are really nice. They even donate bags and paper for me to wrap things.”

She doesn’t worry about whether a customer is a “looker” or buyer, she said. “I think everyone has to look before buying. I treat everyone the same. They may be getting ideas for Christmas and will come back later.”

The one comment she has come to expect is, “Where’s the fleas,” she said with a smile.

Normally, all vendors work from inside the building, but during some special weekends like Aspenfest this Saturday, they’ll spill out onto the parking area in front of the market.

“Saturday and Sunday are busier in summer, but you never know, because I had a terrific day Wednesday,” Behringer said. “We have a lot of dealers who come here to buy because our prices are so good.”

Most of the vendors who stay throughout the year started with her three years ago, she said.

“They go to garage and estate sales and auctions, and hunt up stuff and bring it back here.”

The flea markets hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., seven days a week, year-around.

Although Behringer usually is around too, she does take off a few days a week now — to give vendors and herself a break, she says.

Study: New Mexicans, bears are neighbors

■ The eight-year research project found that New Mexico is home to about 6,000 black bears — generally in higher elevations.

An eight-year study of black bear ecology performed for the New Mexico State Game Commission concludes that a substantial portion of the state's bear population resides within a few miles of humans.

That finding comes as no surprise to a Wichita Falls, Texas, family vacationing in a friend's cabin on Sierra Blanca Road.

Tom Malaise said Sunday was the family's third day in Ruidoso and they were enjoying a lazy afternoon around the house owned by Gary and Doris Moore.

"I was sitting on the deck at a table with an umbrella and my feet were propped up," Malaise said. "I'd been reading for about 30 minutes and I wasn't moving."

Suddenly, he noticed a large black bear walking up the steps to the porch. The bruin stopped to look in the front door and tested the glass pane with his paw. Malaise's wife, Joanne, and his daughter and son-in-law, Julie and Keith Laude, were inside napping.

"I froze," Malaise said. "It seemed like hours, but it was

only seconds and the bear came around toward me and looked into an open window, where I'm sure he could smell food cooking.

"He hadn't seen me yet and he kind of scratched at the screen, then stopped and began turning. I thought, do I scare him or sit still? I decided I better let him know I was there. He was so close, I could have reached out my foot and touched him."

Malaise said he moved his head slightly and the bear looked him straight in the eye. The animal then went back to the stairs and when Malaise lowered his legs to the ground, took off running for the yard.

The family spent the next hour taking photographs of their furry visitor, who initially retreated to the forest, but then returned to check out bird feeders and eat some grass before disappearing.

Fortunately, in the south central mountains of New Mexico most stories of black bear and humans end benignly, even as development continues to encroach on their habitat.

The study by researchers at the college of Agriculture and Home Economics of New Mexico State University was designed to help with conservation strategies of the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish.

Researchers estimate the black bear population at about 6,000 and found that the bears' range follows a historical path.

What to do if you meet a bear

Although most encounters with black bears in the Sacramento Mountain end without injury to either human or bruin, some advice offered by state experts.

A person shouldn't run if a bear is encountered unexpectedly.

"You can't outrun them," said Jon Boren with New Mexico State University's Cooperative Extension Service. "They can run up to 35 mph. Chances are they're just as afraid of you and will want to avoid you. If you have small children with you, pick them up so they don't panic and run."

The best action is to back away slowly without making eye contact.

"Slowly wave your arms, talk softly, clap your hands repeatedly, just to let the bear know you're there," he said. "Leave the area and watch out for cubs. You don't want to get between a mother and her cubs."

If the bear is aggressive, throw rocks and sticks and arm yourself with whatever you can find while speaking firmly to it, Boren said.

"Your primary goal is to convince the bear that you are the dominant one and that you are a serious threat or danger to it," he said.

If the bear attacks, fight back aggressively.

"The worst thing you can do is to lie down and play dead," he said. "You want to use any possible object as a weapon."

When hiking, many people carry whistles, walking sticks and bring along their dogs as protection.

Black bears weigh between 125 pounds and 400 pounds and their coats vary from blond to cinnamon, brown and black. Eighty-five percent of their diet is vegetable material.

Boren recommended making property less attractive to bears by not putting out garbage, positioning bird feeders away from houses and bringing in pet dishes at night. Ripe fruit should be picked immediately, he advised.

Children should be supervised when playing outside and should be brought inside before dusk, Boren said. Bears are most active before dawn and at dusk.

"We now have the first definitive research on black bears in New Mexico," said Bruce Thompson, one of the study's authors and a wildlife biologist at the university's cooperative fish and wildlife research unit in Las Cruces.

With population and habitat modeling, scientists can play out "what-if" scenarios for regulatory decisions and look at management models, he said.

Led by Cecily Costello, a wildlife specialist at the Hornocker Wildlife Institute in

Bozeman, Mont., the team of federal, state and university scientists concluded that black bears in New Mexico generally are distributed in the state's higher elevations, especially in forested regions. The predicted habitat is about 13.5 percent of

the state's surface area.

Results were based on capturing and individually marking more than 300 black bears through the state, primarily in two study areas in the Sangre de Cristo Mountains and Mogollon Mountains. The bears were equipped with radio transmitters and monitored for several years.

Data collected included birth rates, litter sizes and survival, as well as entry and emergence from dens.

A shortage of berries and other foods in the mountains has been blamed for an unusual number of bear sightings and encounters this summer, mostly in northern New Mexico.

But Thompson said given the degree of human proximity to black bears there are relatively few contracts with the state's official animal.

"It's unfortunate that in 2001, we've had some dramatic encounters, including one death," he said. "Nothing about this study is going to change the possibility of something like that occurring. It's a rare event, but something that can be expected where humans come into contact with a variety of wildlife species."

People still don't understand the importance of keeping garbage and human foods away from bears, the experts said. Once habituated, a bear will rarely break the moaching habit and inevitably becomes a nuisance requiring relocation or termination.

Authorized in a 1999 law authored by Domenici and cosponsored by Sen. Ted Kennedy, D-Mass., PRIME will provide grants for low- and very low-income entrepreneurs, as well as grants for training.

Medical facility proposed on Porr Drive near Mechem

Frank J. DiMotta, MD, asks for C2 rezoning of site

Dr. Frank J. DiMotta's plan to construct a new medical office building on Porr Drive near Mechem Drive was put on hold by the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission Tuesday during a regular meeting.

A staff report by planner Darrell L. Bremner noted that the planned 6,300-square-foot building with 40 parking spaces was too large for C1 (neighborhood commercial) zoning, and that the village council must approve C2 (community commercial) rezoning before the project can proceed.

DiMotta has applied for the rezoning, and the request will be heard at the Oct. 16 commission meeting.

As proposed in the applica-

tion, the new medical facility would be built at 206 Porr Drive - about 100 feet west of Mechem Drive - on presently unimproved property jointly owned by DiMotta and Frederick B. French.

Rezoning is required because C1 commercial buildings are limited to 2,000 square feet, Bremner told the commission.

The planned facility would provide space for four to six doctors and a clinic of about 5,227 square feet, according to the application.

The site is near Sierra Vista Mall. Another medical office, that of Jack V. Waters, DC, is next door at 206 Porr Drive.

The P&Z staff report noted that the site area is about 48,000 square and that there is space for the proposed 40 parking spaces.

Beef producers sponsor Web expansion for young people

Nodding to the relationship youngsters today have with their computers, Lincoln County's beef producers have helped fund an expanded Web site aimed at the younger generation.

Through their \$1-per-head beef checkoff program, beef producers are helping to support a site called burgertown.com, which reaches children ages eight to 12 with games, cooking tips, recipes and nutrition information about beef. Two new games recently have been added to the "arcade" section of the site, giving kids another way to learn about beef, called America's most popular meat.

"Almost half of all kids are expected to be online by 2002 - and 76 percent of U. S. schools are already there," says Dina Reitzel, executive director of the New Mexico Beef Council. "These young people play an important role in the future of the beef industry."

New kids' games include the Z.I.P. Racing Game, where kids learn about the role of zinc, iron and protein in their diets.

Grillin' and Chillin', funded by a grant from the Phillip Morris Shared Solutions program, is another game that delivers food safety messages. Here, kids learn about proper storage of perishables and how

to wash their hands, from a character called Burger Town Bob.

Other new features of the Web site are targeted directly at at young girls aged 8 to 12. "At this age, girls are forming life-long attitudes about foods. Research shows that what they eat before entering high school often is what they feed their own families when they become mothers," Reitzel noted.

In Sasha's Corner, figure skater Sasha Cohen offers nutrition tip, ways to enjoy heat-and eat beef products along with fitness and fashion advice. Cohen, 16, is a figure skating champion who is the beef checkoff's spokesperson for 8-12 year-old-girls. The page offers beef recipes and invitation ideas. Girls also can win prizes by submitting their favorite party ideas, from sleepovers to Halloween parties.

Data for 2001 shows visitors to Burger Town looked at an average of 27,500 pages each week and spent about six minutes on the site during each visit.

"We reach kids directly through this check-off funded program," says Reitzel. "Using the Internet can be an effective and economical way to pass along beef information to this audience."

GOING UP County commissioners stand pat, keep elevated property tax levy

The tax rate for residential and commercial property in Ruidoso jumped this year, along with every other part of Lincoln County.

That means home owners and business owners will be hit with bigger tax bills this November.

In a 4-1 vote Wednesday during a special meeting in Ruidoso Downs, county commissioners certified tax rates presented by County Assessor Rick Silva as approved by the state Department of Finance and Administration.

Voting against the certification was Commissioner Leo Martinez, who said the commission should reduce the amount of a special tax levy pledged to the county-owned hospital in Ruidoso and its rural health clinics.

That's about the only place commissioners have some discretion, he said.

Voters approved a reduced maximum tax levy last year, dropping the allowed cap from 4.25 mills to 3 mills. But because voters approved the new tax, the state's yield control formula - which is applied to existing taxes - won't kick in until next year.

That means home owners will be paying more than last year toward support of the Lincoln County Medical Center and the clinics. This year, they will receive the full 3 mills, which translates to \$1.1 million for the hospital, about a 27 percent increase, and \$477,123 for the clinics, a 94 percent increase. One mill equates to \$1 for each \$1,000 of taxable property value.

County Attorney Alan Morel said the commission had the authority in any year to either reduce or not levy the tax at all. But County Manager Tom Stewart said budgeted expenses for the Lincoln County Medical Center exceed the amount of money generated.

The hospital drew on its tax levy reserve last year and may have to do the same this year, he said. He asked for the full levy this year and a review of the finances next year for a possible reduction.

The other big hit for Ruidoso property owners is the tax for municipal debt service, which more than doubled from 1.256 mills to 2.7 mills.

The DFA dropped the tax for debt service significantly last year from 7.125 mills to 1.259 mills to sat up a fat cash reserve created when an anticipated

bond issue for a recreational center failed in 1999. When the required reserve dropped too low, the department came back this year and increased the tax.

Other factors impacting local property owners will be a higher state debt service tax and a massive re-evaluation of property to bring the county up to 97 percent of market value.

As Silva explained, values in Ruidoso went up by an average of 5 percent to 6 percent. On the other side of the equation, the tax rate increased by 7.67 percent for residential property owners and 4.97 percent for non-residential.

How we rate

Increases in tax rates from last year range from a low of 1.15 percent for non-residential property in Ruidoso Downs to a high of 9.82 percent for residential property in Hondo. Ruidoso's residential tax rate will increase by 7.67 percent. A Ruidoso home valued at \$104,500 next year will have property taxes of \$1,015, up from \$905.68 this year.

Otero Electric seeks major rate cut

CLOUDCROFT - Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc. will ask the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission to lower rates to its consumers by about 16 percent beginning Nov. 1.

The cooperative, with headquarters here, serves about 15,000 consumers in Otero, Lincoln, Chaves and Socorro counties.

The rate filing will affect all consumer classes and will result in an

overall rate decrease of \$2,278,418 of the operating revenue of the year prior to the merger of Plains G&T and Tri-State G&T, according to a news release.

The filing is designed to incorporate the reduction in wholesale power costs resulting from the merger between Plains and Tri-State into the base rates charged to cooperative customers, as well as redesigning the rates to offer better

choices for the consumer.

"It is extremely rewarding to be able to offer these lower rates to our members," Bill Mereshon, general manager, said.

"This is the first time in my 31-year career that we have been able to actually lower our retail rates to our consumers, and it is very gratifying," he said.

The cooperative was incorporated here in 1939.

Focus on agriculture

Fighting the terrorists in the cotton patch

On any other cloudless calm day, it's difficult to reach Rudy Holcomb, who would normally be miles from his airstrip at Flora, Miss.

"This time of year, we have some pretty days and we have to be taking advantage of these," says Holcomb. He and his two sons are normally busy now with their agricultural flying service, defoliating cotton fields for harvest, but they've watched several ideal flying days pass without so much as turning a prop.

A Federal Aviation Administration order kept ag planes grounded, causing the Holcombs and other aerial applicators to lose a few days.

On Sept. 11, America learned a horrible lesson on the expanding bounds of human cruelty. In the blissful

on the United States, there was precious little consideration given to the possibility that plane loads of innocent people would be intentionally converted to use as fuel-laden guided missiles.

Americans are gradually emerging from the dull anesthetic of shock, which is yielding to the unfolding realization of imminent change. After trying to comprehend the horrendous human casualties, the most readily apparent change is in air travel. But the hideous acts of terrorists were far-reaching enough to put agricultural aviation into the headlines.

Ag flyers were ordered grounded even after other civil aircraft were allowed back in the air.

One can hardly fault the reasoning behind the government-mandated no-fly order for ag aircraft. The FBI had collected evidence that a suspect in the terrorist hijack-

ings had taken a keen interest in crop dusters. "It's killing us," says Holcomb about the grounding. After the FAA lifted the ag flying ban, the Holcombs' flying machinery was still tied down but this time because of wind, evoking the cotton grower's equivalent of "making hay while the sun shines."

"They're losing precious days on the front end that we need to be taking advantage of," says Holcomb in reference to lost time while growers wait for defoliant to be applied to harvest-ready cotton. With every day of delay the crop becomes more vulnerable to weather. "Later on, these days get short and it's going to be hard to overcome this."

Holcomb gives every indication that he's prepared to cooperate with whatever the government asks. "I understand the situation," says Holcomb. He's also willing to do what he can to help ensure

that his idle ag planes are not commandeered for deliberate misuse, including hiring guards to watch aircraft and making them useless while they're not actually engaged in legitimate application. "There are definitely ways that you can render the aircraft un-flyable (while not in use)," he says.

President George W. Bush has asked for patience and cooperation in America's protracted war on terrorists.

The terror and the war to stop it are touching parts of everyday life that many of us never imagined. The ag flying ban in the days following the attacks is just one of the examples. Their mission to not fly made aerial applicators and farmers part of America's homeland defense.





Show me the funny: Klein at Spencer

Robert Klein, the comedian who revolutionized stand-up in the mid-60s — and never sat down — will make the audience sit up and take note during his performance at 8 p.m. Saturday at the Spencer Theater.

Bob Stein, my trusty musical director for 20 years, will be with me at the Spencer, Klein said in a telephone interview. Stein and Klein: It sounds like a law firm. And you'll be doing yourself a tremendous service legally if you come.

Famous now as a comedian who draws from what he reads in newspapers, Klein said it took him a long time to learn that everything around me is possible food for material, and it took me a long while before I started writing things down as soon as I saw them so I wouldn't forget them. But that was many years ago.

The veteran comedian said he always thought of comedy as a very high calling as well as a wonderful way of making a living, and attributes his success to his upbringing.

My father was a cut-up, he said. He was a funny and, sometimes, moody man, but comedy was his


approach to everything, and, I think, was a general rule in my house.

Klein started out as a premed student because his father wanted him to be a doctor, but he soon joined the acting company at Alfred University, and when he graduated with a degree in political science and history, he went on to Yale Drama School. After that came summer stock and clubs in New York City while substitute teaching to help pay the bills.

From there he became a member of Chicago's Second City for a year and returned to New York to be chosen by Mike Nichols for his Broadway musical, *Apple Tree*. After two more Broadway shows, he starred in *Comedy Tonight* in 1970, a CBS summer replacement for Glen Campbell's show, and both he and the show were highly acclaimed.

Klein Reunion, Klein had his audience in stitches and the critics raved at his erudite and energetic humor.

His first album, *Child of the Fifties* won him a Grammy nomination for Best Comedy Album of the Year, and two more albums followed (*Mind Over Matter* also was nominated for a Grammy). Three of his albums have been re-released because

of popular demand. Let's Not Make Love was Klein's latest album, and he also filmed a music video of the title track a Kleinian quest for love in the safe-sex 90s.

His acting career grew along with his reputation as a stand-up comedian, and in 1979, his performance in *They're Playing Our Song* won him a Tony nomination for best actor and a Los Angeles Drama Critics Circle

Award. At the same time, he hosted *The Robert Klein Radio Show*, an internationally syndicated comedy-rock show that ran for two years.

Klein made his mark in television, appearing regularly on *The Tonight Show* for more than 20 years and guest-hosting the show, as well as appearing on *David Letterman's* show, *Conan O'Brien's* show, hosting *Saturday Night Live* twice and,

more recently, guest-starring in such television shows as *Law and Order* and *Family Ties*. He's performed in too many movies to name, including *Radioland Murders*, *Mixed Nuts*, *Jeffrey* and *People I Know*.

Klein has done seven HBO specials, had his own weekly talk-variety-comedy show (nominated for seven *Ace Awards*) and hosted *Arts and*

Entertainment Review on the A&E Network, interviewing and reviewing the finest of the entertainment world.

Klein is co-starring with Jason Alexander in a new ABC sitcom this fall, *Bob Patterson* and if that's not enough variety, he's also writing a book for Simon and Schuster.

Turning to inner peace

Frank Amigo boasts that he's made addicts of a lot of people. The substance of choice seems to be wood, preferably green, and the experience is that of feeling the wood fall away easily: turning wood the way it's supposed to be done.

When it's cutting right ... It's sort of like meditation, Amigo said. In meditation, you have to be in the present, you have to be concentrating on what's there in your mind. In wood turning, you have to be right there at the tip of the tool or something bad is going to happen. So you start concentrating on that and everything else goes away.

Although he's been a self-taught woodworker since 1958, he didn't get around to turning wood until 1983. He studied gem cutting and polishing with the well-known carver Ken Boulter at the Patuxent Lapidary Guild in Fort Mead, Maryland, in 1966, and later took classes in silver-smithing and casting. By 1971, he was designing, fabricating, casting and selling gold and silver jewelry.

While in England with the U.S. Army from 1968 to 1971, he took night classes in wood carving from 1968 to 1971, and in 1983 taught himself wood turning, without ever having watched anybody do it.

I taught myself in three or four years, and I was doing some bowls, but it was taking me a long time to finish them because I didn't have the techniques, Amigo said. He got his jump start with wood turning technique from Michael O'Donnell's class in the Arrowmount School of Crafts

in Gatlinburg, Tennessee, in 1989.

O'Donnell started the class by simply observing the students at work on the 13 lathes.

He came up behind me and said, Keep doing what you're doing, and he moved my wrist a little twist and I could feel the wood cutting. Scraping gives you sawdust. Cutting gives you nice peels, Amigo said. I went from taking a day or a day and a half to an hour and a half for a bowl.

From that little twist of the wrist, Amigo's wood turning took off, and his bowls and urns became objects of great beauty. His work has been exhibited in many shows and galleries in Los Angeles, Washington, D.C., Bethesda, Maryland, and Santa Fe, and three of his ornaments went onto the White House Christmas tree when the Clintons were living there.

In 1991, he started the wood-turning program at Maryland Hall for the Creative Arts in Annapolis, Maryland, a nonprofit community arts center for visual, performing and creative arts, and taught the basic course until 1995, when he began teaching master's classes. With a \$28,000 grant he obtained in 1996, new equipment was purchased and the program expanded to include intermediate and children's courses and is considered one of the best in the country. He was a founding member and president of the Chesapeake Wood Turners of America

chapter of the American Association of Wood Turners.

I have to do wood turning, Amigo said. There's something inside of me that makes me do it. Almost everything I do has something to do with sculpting carving in one way or another. Wood turning sort of fulfills that need of sculpture more than anything else. And it is addictive.

Amigo has ideas for new work he'd like to do that will incorporate his work with gemstones and silversmithing with wood turning: spinning a silver bowl sitting in a wooden bowl with gemstones on the edge where the silver rests on the wood.

Amigo and his wife, Elizabeth, who is a wood turner and a quilter, had been visiting the West since 1976, and had bought land in Colorado for camping. When they retired from the Department of Defense, they planned to move to the Albuquerque area, but were turned off by the gangs and the desert vegetation, and traveled on toward Ruidoso.



Then we began seeing trees and mountains more like Colorado, Amigo said. They found land on Fort Stanton Road in Alto and began building their home and shop in July 2000 and the shop soon will be ready for teaching wood-turning workshops.

Health issue has artist relocating

Rudy Cot picks up his scratchboard of a tombstone, and it clatters out of his hand. Two wood kitchen chairs and a small hutch prop up sketches and scratchboard works. Eight acrylic paintings of European castles lean against the bare walls. Paper price tags adorn the pictures scattered about his sitting room.

Cot, 77, and his wife, Rosalie, are packing up their home of 13 years on Mockingbird Lane and selling what paintings they can. They are moving to Prescott, Ariz., to find a good neurologist.

Cot's muscles had started to weaken a year ago, and now he stumbles, coughs, stutters and has difficulty swallowing. A doctor said he has a nerve disease, possibly Lou Gehrig's. His physical therapy twice a week doesn't help enough. The couple decided to seek other opinions on diagnosis and treatment.

The work I did, I couldn't do again, Cot said. That's all for that.

Cot is leaving behind some of his largest works, including an oil painting of a California redwood tree finished in 1963. The five-foot-wide by 10-foot-tall piece is mounted on the living room wall and framed by his woodcarving.

Cot also carved the stair banister and railing with a wood file in a Southwestern design of dashes and dots. A nearby molding features the same handiwork, outlining the entrance to the stairway. The painstakingly crafted features are now part of the house.

The landscaping can't be transplanted either. Cot and his wife finished the work on the rocks two years ago. They placed smooth, gray stones on the slopes that surround their house and line the driveway, creating the look of a fortress, much like the detailed European castles in his paintings.

They have not yet bought a house in Prescott, but hope to find one soon. Together we can make a living, Cot said.

Cot has practiced his art since 1950, when he graduated from the Institute of Art and Sciences in Manchester, N.H. Of the years of artistry behind him, he said, I think that I'm satisfied.

Bronco Sue

Part 2

Sue and John Good immediately began a torrid affair that, coupled with another disagreement between Charlie Dawson and Good about cattle, led to the two men parting with the understanding that each man would shoot each other on sight.

After she had shot Robert Black extremely dead, Susie claimed self defense. She then proceeded to tell a rather lurid story of just how desperate a situation her relationship with Robert Black had been.

There were a number of inaccuracies in the Albuquerque Evening Democrat, most notably where they identified Robert Black as Richard Black and herself as Buckskin Sue. But Sue got to tell her version of events, which, as far as she was concerned, was the main thing:

On entering the house he (Black) began using indelicate language, and quick as a flash, picked up a goblet and threw it with brute force at his Suzie, which struck her on the shoulder. Sue attempted to make her escape, when he rushed to one corner of the room, picked up an axe and started for the woman he called his wife.

Buckskin Sue could not take the time to expostulate with him, or one minute later she would have fallen a victim to Richard Black, and as if directed by providence she thought of a .38-caliber revolver that was lying on the mantel

piece in the front room. Sue ran around the table which was near the center of the room and when nearly opposite her antagonist, she grasped the revolver, aimed and fired. The shot took effect in the left arm, passed through the heart and was extricated near the right nipple.

Richard Black lived but a few moments, Buckskin Sue was immediately arrested by Sheriff Pete Simpson, and she is now in jail awaiting a preliminary examination.

The murdered man was about six feet high, fine looking, wore a heavy black beard, and weighed about 175 pounds.

On the 25th of August, R.B. Featherstone, town marshal of Socorro, rode up to Albuquerque and gave the newspaper a few more details, in addition to correcting the misnomers. According to the marshal, the couple had only arrived the previous month from White Oaks and

very little was known about them locally.

One wonders about Featherstone's relationship to Sue, who was now a guest in his jail, as he went on to say that she had not led a dissipated life and that she was never seen in Black's saloon.

According to Featherstone, Black took his meals at Sue's house, which was a respectable (at least according to the marshal) boarding house near the railroad tracks. But a week prior to the shooting, Black had been run out of his saloon by the landlord and then began sleeping as well as eating at Sue's place. This was about the time that he deeded the Lincoln County ranch over to Sue, as up until that time, she had no interest in the property.

While it *does* sound as though Featherstone had more than a casual interest in clearing Sue, there were certain facts that he could not ignore, as they were, for the most part, common knowledge in Socorro.

Incriminating evidence

As to Bronco Sue's behavior in the time period immediately prior to the shooting of Robert Black, well, there are a lot of things that make you go hmmm.....

On Saturday night, August 23, the night before the fatal shooting, Sue had come to Marshal Featherstone and asked that Black be taken away from her house. Featherstone did so and registered Black at a hotel in another part of town. Later that night, he went, at Sue's insistence, and locked Black up in jail. The next day, two of Black's friends, according to the marshal, made bail. Uh, *what was the charge?*

The next day, the day of the killing, Featherstone was informed by a hardware dealer that afternoon that Sue had purchased a .44-caliber Bulldog pistol. Featherstone then stated that he saw Sue himself about an hour later and that she was complaining about the fact that the hardware dealer had given her the wrong cartridges. She said that she had a lot of jewelry in her home and wanted, apparently very much, to find the correct cartridges for her new pistol.

Call me silly, but it doesn't seem overly wise to inquire of the city police chief where you can acquire cartridges and then, after he tells you, to go and purchase some only to use them to shoot your boyfriend... I mean, I'm no lawyer, but that is sort of incriminating, isn't it?

Then, just to make it even more interesting, Featherstone bumped into Black himself and when he warned the doomed man about Sue, Black replied, "You bet I won't go to the house because she is a shooter from away back."

Remember, whatever it was that happened to Jack Yonkers, Black knew the details.

Marshal Featherstone then went on to say that he found an axe near the corpse, but he had no idea how it got there, which seems to indicate that he had done all he was going to do in the way of defending Bronco Sue.

While everyone was wondering, frequently aloud, as to the guilt or innocence of Bronco Sue, the topic of their conversation up and vanished without a trace. One day she was in Socorro, and the next day she was somewhere else—where, no one could say.

Tularosa

Well, some 12 decades later, we can say: Bronco Sue had high-tailed it for Tularosa, where she was right at home. As writer C.L. Sonnichsen later put it, the only things that sleep with both eyes closed in the Tularosa Basin are dead. Like I said, Sue was right at home...

Acting as though the killing in Socorro hadn't even happened, Sue once again reinvented herself at Tularosa, where she married rancher Charlie Dawson. She spent most of the year 1885 raising horses, and, according to historian Howard Bryan, working with cowboys on the open range. Clearly, in Sue's case, that phrase is open to interpretation. If nothing else, these activities permanently cemented her name in Western lore as Bronco Sue Dawson.

But Sue being Sue, it wasn't long before there was trouble between her and her husband. It seems that Sue caught the eye, and he hers, of another local rancher named John H. Good. Sue and John Good immediately began a torrid and scandalous affair that, coupled with another disagreement between Charlie Dawson and Good about cattle, led to the two men parting with the understanding that each man would shoot the other on sight.

And on December 8, 1885, that was exactly what they did. The two men met on the street in La Luz, which is a little south of Tularosa. According to eyewitnesses, both men began firing at approximately the same time, with Good proving to be the better shot. When Sue rushed onto the scene carrying a Winchester, it was all over. Good, who was unharmed,

was standing over the body of Charlie Dawson, who was definitely *not* unharmed. Shot three times, he was dead in the dust of the La Luz street.

One has to wonder to whose assistance Sue was rushing... Good was later tried and acquitted at Las Cruces on the grounds of self-defense. He would later run afoul of Oliver Lee, and, like so many others who made that mistake, he became suddenly dead.

In September of 1886, Sue herself was in court in Las Cruces concerning some land litigation. The Albuquerque Journal reporter seemed to have been quite taken with Bronco Sue and her two children. Actually, while the daughter was undoubtedly a rental, it appears that one of her real sons was with her at this time, a fact that he would come to regret.

It was while she was appearing in court that Sue was arrested once again for the killing of Robert Black nearly two years before.

Motherly love

The principal witness for the prosecution, which was something of a surprise even to Sue, was her son William, who accused his mother and brother of conspiring to murder Robert Black. Now, Sue was in trouble and she knew it. The trial began in Silver City on December 15, 1886. Knowing how grim her situation really was — her son William was prepared to testify that she and her other son, Joseph, had conspired to murder Black and that after the killing, Sue had placed the axe nearby for the self-defense plea.

Sue hired the finest attor-

neys money could buy. One of them was Albert Jennings Fountain, mercurial and brilliant, and whose own murder 10 years later would become legendary as New Mexico's most famous unsolved murder mystery. Actually, both then and now, everyone knew who did it — but that really is another story.

Fountain knew exactly how to defend Bronco Sue and it couldn't have been simpler. He may have even gotten the idea from the way the papers seemed to be handling the case. The Silver City newspaper told a story of how William, who was now accusing his own mother of murder, had been acquitted of another murder charge thanks to the fact that his mother had hired a good attorney to get him off. In fact, the same paper later commented, in the wonderfully neutral way that newspapers had back then, that William was: *So depraved a witness who would have a woman hanged who gave him birth.*


Well, Fountain simply got up in front of the jury, pointed a finger at William and announced, "Gentlemen of the jury — this man wants to hang his own mother!! The all-male jury couldn't acquit Bronco Sue quickly enough."

Bronco Sue was free. She walked out of that Silver City courtroom and into obscurity, completely vanishing from the pages of history. She had however, left her mark on them.
