A SIMPLER TIME

Thousands of people put aside worries of terrorism over the weekend and settled into the down-home comfort of the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium.

They chowed down on chuckwagon grub, listened to 80 fiddlers, cowboy poets and other entertainers, watched trick ropers and enjoyed listening to reenactors tell tales of how a mounted army won the West.

About 125 vendors set up displays inside the Ruidoso Downs race track building, showing off sculptures, leather work, tack, clothing, jewelry and rustic furniture.

Although plenty of snack food and sandwiches were available from concessionaires, many

people opted for the cobbles, beans, potatoes, meat and breads whipped up and cooked up over the embers of campfires at the 25-wagon cook-off competition.

Don Creacy and his Wild Cow Ranch chuckwagon won \$1,250 as best overall, followed by The Stirrup Ranch, the Adamah Ranch and a tie for fourth between the Slatons Cowboy Way and the Cocklebur Camp.

Top winners in each of the separate cate-

gories were Wild Cow for meat, Cocklebur Camp for beans, Robertson Wagon for potatoes and for coming the farthest distance, Stirrup Ranch for bread and Adamah Ranch for dessert.

The Mule Creek wagon won authenticity for a trail chuckwagon and the CC Wagon for authenticity in ranch wagons.

Symposium organizers still were tallying admission tickets Tuesday and said a final attendance number will be released later.

Subdivision plan spans 1,000 acres

County officials to tour proposed 700-lot project

After announcing plans more than a year ago, developers of the Rainmaker subdivision have delivered the proposed layout to the Lincoln County planning office.

County planner Patsy Sanchez and others on Friday will tour the proposed 700-lot community on 1,000 acres south of the Spencer Theater for the Performing Arts.

A public hearing on the development along Sierra Blanca Airport Road north of Ruidoso is set for 9 a.m., Nov. 6, in front of the county planning commission in Carrizozo.

The development by the Utah-based CDS Investments will include golf courses, a shopping center, restaurants and multiple, and single-family residences.

The company was formed in 1997 by Dan Stranger and Chris Young with an emphasis on development of apartment complexes.

Their plans locally have stirred up attention, especially at the theater, in two nearby subdivisions and from Fire Chief Chris Denne, who heads the Bonito Volunteer Fire Department and its associated Ranches of Sonterra substation.

Denne said he thinks the water situation for firefighting would improve under the Rainmaker proposal because hydrants and two, 500,000 gallon water storage tanks are planned.

Others worry that water resources in the area won't be adequate to support such a large development, even if the company has enough water rights.

Denne said plumbing and pumping failures have hindered firefighting in adjacent areas in the past.

"There's an extremely heavy demand generally, not only by people in the subdivisions but to provide the appropriate watering for the theater," he said. "But that's changing now. They're tearing out the high maintenance grass and replacing it in places with a lower water demand type and are xeriscaping in other areas. That should provide some immediate relief."

The water storage and hydrants planned by CDS should meet the needs of the fire department, he said, adding, "I was favorably impressed," after hearing a discussion by the project attorney.

Sanchez said the master plan contains four golf course tracts in phases.

Unit One shows 268 single-family lots, includes a golf course and 31 patio homes, with five tracts marked as reserved for future development. A retention pond, two parks, two recreation tracts and a maintenance facility tract are indicated, Sanchez said.

Future development calls for 286 single family, 38 patio homes, one tract reserved for later development, an equestrian tract, 50 ranch tracts and three golf course tracts.

Residences shown between the two phases total 673.

Two other tracts are marked for sewage treatment and as "town center," Sanchez said.

Pine bark beetles advance unchallenged

Last year, the village told lot owners along Starlite Drive to cut trees dead or dying from a bark beetle infestation.

But that didn't stop the beetles from moving on to other trees.

Eugene Hughes was alarmed several months ago to see trees on a neighbor's lot start turning brown. He called Ruidoso's urban forester, Rick Delaco. Although Delaco looked at the situation, nothing seemed to happen and Hughes worried that his trees would be targeted as the next stop by the hungry boring beetle.

"It's been six months, and now four or five are dying across from mine and one large tree on my property is affected," he said.

Delaco said last week that while some lag time passed, he didn't for-

get Hughes' complaint. He turned it over to code enforcement.

Officer Justin Shaw said he talked to Hughes in mid September and then sent a letter notifying the Texas-based owner of the lot next door that he had 15 days to cut down the offending trees at the end of a driveway.

"I haven't checked yet to see if he took action, but if he hasn't, the next step is to send a certified letter giving him 10 days," Shaw said last week.

Failure to correct the situation then could take an owner into municipal court where he could be fined and pay for the removal of the trees by the village.

"That area has lots of problems," Delaco said of Starlite Road. "There's a heavy dwarf mistletoe infestation and the bark beetles."

"Before I was hired, the owners of six lots were sent letters to

remove the dead and dying trees based on the village's nuisance ordinance."

But Delaco said because of limited manpower and the problems with dead and dying trees all over the village, his primary thrust is trees that pose a danger.

"Almost everyone in town would be in violation if I cited each dead or dying tree. Besides, in some cases a dead tree may be important wildlife habitat for acorn woodpeckers or other animals," he said.

"If a neighbor has a tree that is dead and may fall on someone's roof or electrical wires, that's my first concern."

"In this case last year, all six owners responded to the letters,"

Delaco said. "These are long and narrow lots. Someone cut a lot of trees, but stacked the wood, which is a perfect breeding ground for bark beetles."

Situations are easier to correct when a complaint involves an adjacent neighbor, but is tougher when the tree grows on a tract several lots away.

To follow up may require ordering a survey to determine who owns the land.

The village doesn't have the resources for that type of case, he said, but if the complainant is willing to pay for the survey, it could be pursued.

"The big problem is that by the time you see a dead tree, the beetles are gone," Delaco said.



Four honored for tourism work

Three notables who left their marks on Lincoln County, are among the four to be inducted into the New Mexico Tourism Hall of Fame Oct. 25 in Farmington.

Robert O. Anderson, a New Mexico oil man who created in 1962 the ski area that became Ski Apache, help found the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium in 1989 and the Lincoln Heritage Trust in 1976, will be honored.

Anderson also expanded the Santa Fe Ski Basin and in

1964, built a family of Tinnie Mercantile Company restaurants that included the Silver Dollar at Tinnie, Legal Tender at Lamy and others.

Another local inductee is Smokey Bear, the cub rescued in 1950 from a fire in the Capitan Mountains, who became the living symbol for wildfire prevention by the U.S. Forest Service. While he spent most of his adult life in a zoo in Washington D.C., his body was brought back to Capitan in 1976 for burial at a park named after the bruin.

The man credited with

donating Smokey to the Forest Service on behalf of the State Game and Fish Department, Elliott Speer Barker, also will be honored. Before his death in 1988, he was a forest ranger and rancher in northern New Mexico, and served as state game warden from 1931 to 1953. He published five books on his experiences and two volumes of cowboy poetry.

The other inductee is Becky Walling of Farmington, who has participated in a number of tourist and recreation-related activities and boards since 1988.

Mescalero prays for peace, unity

A peace and unity gathering called Apaches Unite for America was staged last weekend at the Mescalero Apache Ceremonial Grounds.

Prayers were offered for the victims of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks and their families. Prayers and blessings also were given for the men and women who may be involved in an armed conflict.

The Apache people, especially the children, and the land were blessed against terrorism and war, and participants prayed for world peace and unity.

The event was scheduled after tribal elders brought their concerns to the Tribal Council after they witnessed the attacks.

The significance of the attacks to the future of their children, grandchildren and great grandchildren was the focus.

The elders expressed fear that many tribal social and educational programs that are federally funded may be cut.

One elder speaking the Apache language expressed fear that many of the poor on the reservation may be overwhelmed by the financial impact of the attacks and possible outbreak of war.

Elynn Bigrope, a tribal elder and curator of the Mescalero Apache Museum, conveyed in Apache her distress at the possibility of war on American and Apache soil, especially the potential devastation of land, air and water by biological and chemical warfare.

Ceda Shanta, a tribal elder and traditional leader, told the council, "Tribal traditions call for gatherings during times of war and devastation. These gatherings bring the Apache people together."

The private event for tribal

members only was social and spiritual.

Freddie Kaydahzinne, tribal administrator who spoke as a concerned tribal member, said, "Apache religious traditions are powerful forms of prayer and comfort to the Apache people."

Elaine Valdez, another elder and traditional leader, said in times of danger, the Apache people especially need to return to tribal traditions.

In voicing the council's support, President Sara Misquez said, "These elders are our traditional leaders. The political leaders of this tribe fully support them. This is not a political event. These elders have coordinated the event, the tribe has merely offered financial and other support. Ultimately, this event is the result of the concerns made by the community and is of and for the community."

Agency affirms policy on votes

Research shows acting waste authority manager never carried two proxies

A policy on the use of proxy votes was reaffirmed Tuesday by members of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

Acting manager and board chairman Debra Ingle, who represents Capitan on the coalition, said a Capitan trustee passed along questions about her use of proxy votes from Manny Hernandez, the mayor of Carrizozo, and an unidentified county commissioner.

She and authority finance officer Beverly Foote researched every proxy vote since 1992 and only two people ever carried two proxy votes, they said. They were Robert Donaldson, when he represented Ruidoso on the board, and Angelo Vega, when he represented Carrizozo.

"I never carried two proxies as was indicated," Ingle said.

Carrying two proxies would give a member three votes on an issue, one short of a majority. Originally, the organization didn't have a policy on proxy votes, but when the authority entered into a partnership with a similar body in Otero County to create a landfill, a proxy system was adopted to ensure a quorum at joint meetings, she said.

The system restricted casting proxy votes

only to appointed members of the authority board. But in February 1999, it was expanded to allow a non-member from the designated government entity to carry the proxy vote. Each signed proxy is good for 12 months.

"The mayor in Corona has the right to give his proxy to anyone on the board from his community," Ingle said.

She asked if anyone on the board wanted to change the policy, but the vote was unanimous to stay with the current version.

"This all came about (the proxy criticism) because some other municipality doesn't like our way of doing things?" asked county representative Modesto Chavez.

"The mayor of Carrizozo was concerned that I carried two proxies at the August meeting, but it was a misunderstanding," she said. "I carried Corona. In the 3 1/2 years I've sat here, I've never carried two proxies."

Hernandez previously questioned the legitimacy of Ingle serving as a community representative, authority chairman and as acting manager, collecting reimbursement for expenses.

The authority is a coalition of the county and its five municipalities formed to collect garbage and operate a regional landfill. Ruidoso now handles its own garbage.

Cheerleaders aid disaster relief

Ruidoso High School cheerleaders are selling bumper stickers for \$2 to raise money for the Red Cross disaster relief fund, and kicked off their enterprise by giving bumper stickers to the Ruidoso chief of police and several firefighters.

"We're selling bumper stickers that have the date of the hijacking and half of the money will go to the Red Cross," said Stephanie Leland, a junior. "We're also writing a letter to President Bush expressing our appreciation for everything he's doing."

The bumper stickers read "9-11: We never forget," and have a map of the

United States and a U.S. flag. The public can purchase them by contacting the high school at 258-4910 and asking to speak to a cheerleader. The 12 cheerleaders will also sell them at athletic events.

A.D. Powers, father of cheerleader Ashlee Powers, said he ordered the bumper stickers because he thought it was important to show support.

"Right after this happened, I got to thinking about Americanism and that we take all our freedoms for granted and feel secure because of our freedoms, and this tragedy occurred and it should wake a lot of people who take it for granted," Powers said.

He and his daughter designed the bumper stickers because of the coinci-

dence of the date of the tragedy and the number to call for help.

"We'll never forget this emergency number or what happened on this day," he said.

In addition to money from sales of the bumper stickers, cheerleaders and their sponsors are donating a dollar each to the Red Cross, said Rebecca Durham, a teacher at the high school and a sponsor.

The other half of the money from the bumper stickers will go toward transportation for the cheerleaders and their sponsors to the national finals in Florida in February to compete for the national title.

The Ruidoso cheerleaders placed second in the state competitions.

Commissioner wants brakes on spending

Moratorium proposed to rebuild financial reserve

Calling for a moratorium on non-essential spending, Lincoln County Commissioner L. Ray Nunley wants to see a healthy reserve back in county coffers.

His request is part of the 45-item agenda facing the commission at its 8 a.m. meeting Thursday in the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

Nunley's proposal follows a report earlier this month from County Treasurer Joan Park on low cash flow because of a delay in some income at the same time big dollar capital outlay items were ordered. Since then, the county received more than \$700,000 in federal payments in lieu of taxes for public land within county borders.

County Manager Tom Stewart is scheduled to report on positive financial news about the operation of the county jail managed by Correctional Systems Inc. in the Carrizozo Industrial Park.

Although Stewart has expressed concerns about staffing levels at the jail, and last month an inmate confined on a DWI claimed he was beaten by others in a group sleeping area, the manager wrote in a memorandum that the county is saving money.

A review of the last 11 months of Fiscal Year 2000-2001 showed that the average cost of detention operations before the current contract with CSI was signed was

\$100,945 per month.

After the contract, which started March 1, 2003, the cost dropped to \$89,531, an average savings of \$11,413 per month or \$136,965 per year, he wrote.

Detention center monthly costs dropped significantly in September with the placement of 10 federal prisoners in empty beds, he wrote.

Mike Borrego, reinstated as jail administrator after the transfer of John Buffington, will be at the meeting to answer questions.

Other items on the agenda include:

- Public hearings to consider a proposed animal control ordinance and an ordinance to mute noise caused by jake brakes either through mufflers or slower speeds.

- Issues concerning U.S. 70 such as speed, the design-build concept and cultural resources.

- A discussion of flooding on Janet Drive and Pines of Clavien subdivision requested by Commissioner Leo Martinez.

- An update on the redistricting situation in the state and the county.

- A discussion about companies excavating in rights of way.

- A request for road maintenance on Loma Grande Estates subdivision by Pat Hume.

- Awarding of bids for bathroom remodeling at the Lincoln County Medical Center and for an annual contract on base course.

- A discussion about the need for a terrorist preparedness plan requested by Martinez.

- A request for a public hearing to reconsider the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning ordinance and subsequent amendments.

- A report on the operation of the Lincoln County Medical Center by administrator James Gibson.

- Updates on the Hondo Clinic contract and the Carrizozo Health Center.

- Make road names recommendations under the county's emergency 911 readdressing program.



Fixing the failure that occurred

Ruidoso ready to draft a new ETZ ordinance

Mayor Robert Donaldson summed it up well last week:

"If the ETZ had really worked and things were done properly, annexation of those areas would have been easy."

But Ruidoso's Extraterritorial Zone ordinance, modeled after one for flatland Roswell in the 1980s, wasn't adequate, wasn't enforced and was essentially ignored until the village took over its administration from the county two years ago.

Since then, the ETZ Authority, with some county commissioner members, has struggled to somehow administer the one-mile usage strip around the village and to control the three-mile subdivision review area.

Also, as Councilor Linda Flack, also on the ETZ

Authority, said, "We're having a lot of opposition outside the city."

It's a classic case of rural freedom vs. urban growth, of course; few out there really want to have some bureaucrats tell them what they can and can't do with their property.

But Ruidoso does continue to grow, the pressure on its borders does increase and even some county commissioners are beginning to recognize the impact on property values.

So when Ruidoso's village councilors last week reaffirmed the need of maintaining that zone, they took the step, finally, of ordering preparation of an entirely new ETZ ordinance.

We have no doubt it will be fought, long and hard.

But it's clearly time to fix what the mayor called "the failure that occurred."

Assessing biotechnology

A thorough scientific examination of benefits of plant-altering is under way.

BLACKSBURG, Va.

Agricultural biotechnology holds the promise of harder, healthier, and more abundant sources of food for people around the world as well as new sources for pharmaceuticals.

Biotechnology is also likely to produce winners and losers as a result of social and economic impacts, says George Norton. The professor of agricultural and applied economics at Virginia Tech says sorting out these social and economic effects may be critical to public acceptance of biotechnology. Without that acceptance, he fears, many potential benefits may be lost.

Norton heads an effort centered at Virginia Tech and including scientists worldwide that will investigate the social and economic effects of biotechnologies. The project is funded by a \$1.1 million grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The scientific achievements of biotechnology have been occurring at such an astounding pace that social and economic assessments have lagged behind, Norton says.

"There are major benefits that can be expected from agricultural biotechnology, but we expect to see distributional effects as well," Norton says. "For example, early adopters of the technology may be in a stronger position than those who adopt it later."

The four-year project will investigate the impacts of biotechnology

from a social science perspective. Faculty members will be able to draw on the expertise of Virginia Tech researchers who have pioneered key biotechnology procedures, especially in the area of generating human pharmaceuticals from plants and animals.

"We can't look into economics or social issues in a vacuum," Norton says. "We'll have to inform ourselves (about the scientific aspects of biotechnology) as we go ahead, but we also want to keep our perspective. We don't want to be an advocate for any side of this."

Other faculty members involved in the project at Virginia Tech include Brad Mills, Dixie Reaves, and Mike Ellerbrock in agricultural and applied economics; Laura Parisi in the Center for Interdisciplinary Studies; and Colette Harris in the Office of International Research and Development. Scientists at Virginia State University, North Carolina State University, the University of Tennessee, and at the International Rice Research Institute in the Philippines are also participating.

"The complexity of the issues requires a team approach," says Norton.

"Our group brings expertise in environmental mediation, the economics of tobacco and rice production, evaluation of agricultural research, gender issues, international political economy, and the study of the politics and economics of technology transfer and diffusion."

He says the research is expected to generate information for policymakers as well as the general public in the United States and abroad.

A Constitutional issue

To the editor:

Your paper reports that the Ruidoso School Board sent a letter to the U.S. Supreme Court and to Congressional leaders requesting that they reconsider prayer in school, a request that Superintendent (Mike) Gladden sup-

ports. You say the argument was made that since our political leaders are able to pray publicly, school children should also be able to.

It has been a firmly settled principle of U.S. constitutional law for 40 years that the First Amendment prohibits prayer in public schools. The court has also held that although the amendment is compatible with national traditions, which permit some official references to religion, children are unique: They are particularly impressionable and likely to be influenced when government puts its power behind religion in school.

It is understandable that in our time, national travel people should want to reaffirm our basic commitments. Our school officials could best do so by emphasizing the freedoms that make our country a beacon to the world.

The First Amendment states that government may not establish religion or prohibit its free exercise. Some people, of course, argue that parents should be free to exercise their religion by having public schools encourage these religious beliefs in children. Persons holding this position often assume that because their religion is in the majority, the prayers will reflect their beliefs.

Such persons might have second thoughts if they were to imagine that they adhered to a minority religion or that they were not religions.

Rather than seeking to introduce controversial religious issues into public education, the school board should concentrate on achieving the best public schools possible.

County reconsiders bill-paying policies

The Lincoln County commission a few months ago authorized County Treasurer Joan Park to write checks to pay county government bills instead of issuing warrants.

The subject surfaced again during a special meeting earlier this month after Park reported that the county dipped into state-mandated reserves when expected federal money ran late and county departments ordered big dollar capital outlay items a the first of the fiscal year.

Commissioner Leo Martinez asked that the two different approaches to bill-paying be scheduled for discussion at the commission's regular monthly meeting Thursday in Carrizozo. He and Commissioner L. Ray Nunley want to know if the warrant system provides more control in handling county finances.

"I think any time you're handling county money, that two signatures, one not related to finances, is better than one," Martinez said Tuesday.

During an interview after that earlier meeting, Park said the time difference is slight between writing a check or issuing a warrant that is held by a bank and redeemed later.

The change to checks, a system she recommended to the commission, had no effect on the county's situation with low cash flow earlier this month, Park said.

Officials with two state

agencies differ in their assessment of the check system.

Darlene Mares, assistant division director for the state Department of Finance and Administration, wrote Park Tuesday that reviewing the benefits of the two approaches, the check-writing system outweighs warrants.

She noted that under the check system, the treasurer can hold checks until she determines that sufficient money is available and can prepare a report of committed funds that reflects a truer cash balance. Both the warrant and cash approaches establish controls that might catch misappropriations. The warrant system may detect warrants that were not properly approved and expenditures not properly authorized and approved, she wrote, but the same ability exists with checks.

Carl Baldwin, deputy state auditor, said the State Auditor's office opposed the bill sponsored by State Rep. Rob Burpo (R-Albuquerque) and passed this year. In an analysis, Baldwin listed the reasons as:

- If a county uses both checks and warrants, the bill requires reconciliation of a second set of disbursements during an audit.
- It eliminates a level of internal control that is inherent in the warrant system of payment.
- Eliminating warrants invited the possibility of fraud or misappropriation of funds.

Although counties are now exempted, state agencies still are required statutorily to use warrants, he said.



Wildcats too much; RHS falls in district

A strong start for the Ruidoso High School football team couldn't hold up, as the Warriors (4-3, 0-1 District 4AAA) fell in Lovington to the Wildcats 44-20 Friday night.

Both teams played through cold and rain, but in the end, a handful of plays pulled No. 1 Lovington (7-0, 1-0) through, according to Warrior coach Les Carter.

"They got some good breaks," Carter said Monday. "It was a kind of a deal where you could eliminate four or five plays and you don't know what kind of game it could have been."

One of those plays came just before the half, when the Wildcats ran a reverse on a return back for a touchdown, putting them up by 14 at the half, instead of just seven.

Both teams made mistakes in the first half, as rain poured down. The Warriors actually got the first break, recovering a botched punt in the end zone for a TD.

But the Wildcats quickly

responded, using tough inside defense to force the Ruidoso offense outside. Carter began employing more end-arounds and sweeps by the slot backs, as well as having quarterback Josh Adams pass the ball.

The Warriors did not commit a fumble in the sloppy conditions, but did throw three interceptions.


The Ruidoso defense looked good early, holding the quick Lovington backs, but made too many mistakes to stay with the Wildcats.

Time was running out for the Grizzlies. Senior Lane Dixon was at quarterback for Carrizozo. A toss to Grizzly Levi Boble kept the drive alive, and then another throw from Dixon to Abel Avila for a score put the Grizzlies up 26-23 after the failed extra point.

The onside kick by the Grizzlies was recovered by Mescalero with 1:04 left on the game clock. But the Chiefs were unable to move the ball. A hail-Mary pass with 12 seconds left was unsuccessful, allowing the Grizzlies to hold on for the 26-23 victory.

"I wish we had played like that all year. We finally played as a team," said Carrizozo coach Pat Ventura. "The kids came out ready to play and focused. Mentally, this is the first time we played as a team on the same page."

"I don't think Mescalero thought we could win. People in this town didn't think we could win. These kids knew it but they didn't let it

Zamora listed as critical

Capitan High School football player Raymond Zamora, hospitalized since Oct. 5 when he had a blood clot removed from his brain, was still listed in critical condition Tuesday.

Tiger coach Ed Davis said Zamora had been upgraded to stable condition over the weekend, but officials of Thomason Hospital in El Paso, Texas, where Zamora is recovering, said he was critical Tuesday afternoon.

The hospital's media relations department could not confirm when his condition had changed.

Zamora has been in the intensive care unit of Thomason since Oct. 5 when he was injured during Capitan's game against El Paso-Anthony. He had a blood clot taken from his brain that night and had emergency surgery Oct. 8 to relieve brain swelling.

Davis, who had last visited Zamora Saturday, called him "semi-conscious," saying that while Zamora was awake, he was able to respond to physical stimuli. Davis also said that Zamora had opened at least one eye at some point, and that he had been taken off of medications.

Thomason officials could not say whether that was still the case Tuesday.

Fishing report for Ruidoso area, Oct. 17, 2001

Ruidoso River - The river was stocked this past week with over 900 hungry Rainbows. The water flow is about normal for this time of year. The water is gin clear so wear clothes that blend in with the background. Large Stoneflies are abundant in the river now, Rock Worms are declining in size and quantity, and Scuds are on the increase in the waters. **South Fork** - One still needs to hike a ways up the stream to find fish. A ways is two or three miles upstream. Once found the fish are healthy and hungry. The fish here are not fussy. Caddis dry flies and small nymphs of just about any pattern will work here. Several local fishermen have hiked 2 to 3 miles up the Southfork to be rewarded with several nice Rainbows and Brookies. **Bonito Lake**: If driving to the Bonito area, be aware there is road construction going on, be alert and expect delays. The lake has taken on a green coloration due to a large algae bloom. The fly patterns that have been working are Humpties, Dark Hendricksons and Parachute Adam flies have been consistent producers before dark on the main lake body. A damselfly nymph tied as a dropper behind your dry fly offering continues to bring an unexpected take. For the spin cast fishermen, try a hot pink, renegade pattern propeller fly or a black with grizzly hackle propeller fly behind a bubble rig. **Eagle Lakes**: Eagle Lakes are closed for the season. **Grindstone**: Grindstone was stocked this past week with over 2,000 Rainbows that

averaged 9 inches in length. The fall evenings have helped drop the surface temperature of Grindstone Lake. That one fact will help the fishing quality pick up fast on the lake. Float tubers continue reporting doing well by tossing a sinking tip line and stripping a dark wooly bugger with some flash or a streamer 8 to 10 feet deep. Float tubing will end Oct. 31, so plan your last few trips now. Damselfly and Dragon fly imitations continue working well. For spin casters, tie on an Olive or Black propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the bars down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water. **Lake Mescalero**: The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark wooly buggers continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito, or Hendrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk. Please practice Catch and Release whenever and whenever you can.

Emergency funds sought by state board

The New Mexico State Board of Education will seek an emergency appropriation from the 2002 Legislature to assist rapidly growing school districts, among the fastest growing of which is the Rio Rancho Public Schools.

The SBE voted at its October meeting in Santa Fe to seek a "deficiency appropriation" from the Legislature and, as an alter-

native, to request funding from the State Board of Finance.

The SBE's 2002 legislative priorities include a proposal for an adjustment in the funding formula to account for the additional costs incurred by rapidly growing districts.

The SBE also voted to approve a policy on teacher quality calling for adoption of a statewide plan to increase the supply of teachers in New Mexico, develop a process for evaluating the effectiveness of New Mexico teacher preparation programs, establish ongoing professional development requirements and establish a three-level multiple career path system within the teacher licensure framework.

The policy calls for salary ranges to include the short-term goal of reaching regional parity and the long-term goal of reaching national parity.

The SBE also approved research and development of a program of study allowing students to exit high school earlier than the 12th grade.

The New Mexico State Department of Education staff will be directed to prepare a regulation on the state's accountability program distinguishing requirements for schools, school districts and the SDE.

The regulation will encompass the SBE's accountability program that provides for ratings and interventions. The SBE approved an additional year of school improvement for schools demonstrating that they can meet certain criteria related to student achievement.

The next SBE meeting will be Nov. 26-28. The SBE will consider its 2002 legislative package at the meeting.

Parents who wonder if their children showed up at high school today, can find out in an instant, if they live in the Ruidoso school district and have Internet access or a touch-tone phone — or happen to be at Wal-Mart.

Letters went out Oct. 8 to the parents of Ruidoso High School students explaining a new communication and record-keeping system called PowerSchool, which is up and running.

"We average about 100 hits a day by parents who either access the Internet or dial up, and that's incredible, considering that letters were only mailed on Monday," said Paul Wirth, high school principal and district assistant superintendent, four days after the letters were mailed.


Parents can access their children's attendance records, grades and homework assignments, and can request daily, weekly or monthly e-mails with these records. The PowerSchool Web site also is connected to other Web sites, including college sites, homework hot lines and other information of interest to high school students and their parents.

Wirth said Ruidoso is the first school district in the state to offer this service to parents.

Telephone access does not give as much information as the Internet access, Wirth said, and the computerized voices require careful listening. But parents will still be able to get the vital information by telephone.

Another option for those without computers, is a Ruidoso High School Apple iBook computer station set up in Wal-Mart near the entrances.

All parents need do to view their child's records is punch in the student's confidential ID and password, and select from a menu of choices, including current grades, attendance, end-of-term grades and

teachers' comments. A printer will be installed at the booth so parents can do print-outs of the records if they wish, Wirth said.

Dave and Deb Berry have accessed the records of their three high-school-age children three or four times since receiving the letter last week. Dave Berry said he doesn't think his son, a junior, likes the program.

"We saw his grades slipping and got onto him and he studied and got a better grade," Dave Berry said. "We can look at attendance, grades, we can e-mail the teacher, we can click on each subject and it gives assignments, test scores and homework scores, day by day," Deb Berry said.

Communications with teachers received a high score from the Berrys.

"When we were in school," Deb Berry said, "one parent stayed home. Now with both parents having to work this (PowerSchool) it makes it easier for teachers and parents to communicate. This way, if I have a question, I can just e-mail the teacher, because when you're working full-time you can't always call the school during school hours."

Although the Berrys have a computer to use at home, they agreed to use the com-

puter in Wal-Mart to demonstrate how the program works. They entered their junior's ID and password and his name popped up on a screen, along with the options of grades, attendance and others. But when they clicked on one of the items, the computer got stuck at "contacting host" for a long time.

Wirth said the system reboots ever day and the school district is still "working out the bugs." He said a sign will go up informing people to go to the Vision Center in case they have problems with computer access.

"This is another way of trying to be universal," Wirth said. "Part of the risk of putting it in a public place is there are folks that might misuse the computer. We can't put a full-time staff member there but have set up where Vision Center is willing to help solve problems, and sometime during the day we'll send somebody out."

Wirth said he thinks only a small percentage of people will use Wal-Mart booth, though. That location was chosen because it's open seven days a week and many hours a day, he said.

"Eventually we will have access from PowerSchool to our Web site at the high school and school links, and people will have access to what's happening at our schools," he said.
