## School auditorium gets state funding

Board moves to vote on construction contract at meeting set for Thursday

The Ruidoso school district was awarded \$1.2 million in school capital outlay funds on Monday, and the Ruidoso School Board promptly added an action item to the agenda of a meeting Thursday to vote on bids for construction of an auditorium for the high school.

The district found itself \$700,000 short of funds to build the 380-seat fine arts theater when bids came in higher than the \$1.2 million expected. Gentry Construction bid \$1.6 million in August.

To make up for the difference and to complete several other needed projects, the district requested \$2.7 million in Critical Capital Outlay funds, said Mike Gladden, superintendent of the Ruidoso Municipal School District.

The Public School Capital Outlay Council was to make awards Aug. 5, but delayed while considering whether to include health and safety issues, Gladden said. Gentry Construction, mean-

while, offered to maintain its bid until Oct. 25.

"The board will vote on accepting the bids so we can begin. We're extremely pleased," Gladden said. "The district and the community are getting the type of facility that they deserve."

Gladden said the first priority for the funds is the high school theater.

Other high-priority projects include replacing stucco on the exterior of the high school, replacing the flooring of the gymnasium corridor and enhancing the school-based health facility at the high school.

The Legislative Public School Capital Outlay Council voted Monday to award \$103 million to 52 school districts in New Mexico. Classrooms, districts with low assessed valuations, districts with high student growth rates and those with continuation projects were given priority in selecting the districts, according to a release by the New Mexico Department of Education.

Funding for the capital outlay awards comes from Severance Tax Bonds and the state lottery.

## State issues bonds to rebuild U.S. 70

The \$95 million financing package would upgrade the highway from Ruidoso Downs east to Riverside.

Over objections from some legislators, the State Highway Commission approved \$95 million in bonds Friday to pay for the reconstruction of U.S. 70 from Riverside to Ruidoso Downs.

Because state revenue is declining, the Legislative Finance Committee advocated dropping the expensive project and instead spending a few million on U.S. 84/285 north of Santa Fe.

"We always intended to do U.S. 70," said Rhonda Faught, adjutant secretary for the state Highway and Transportation Department. "The problem is that we have seen a hit to our revenues on the state side, which made us rethink how many more bonds we can afford to issue."

The money to repay the bonds for the 38-mile U.S. 70 project is coming from additional money produced by a federal bill passed in 1997, Faught said.

"We've received federal money since 1916," she said. "Every four to six years they pass a new highway bill. In 1997, for the 1998 fiscal year, T-21 was approved, which gave us a whole lot more money."

Members of the state Highway Commission said they only were willing to issue bonds to be repaid from money over and above the 1997 level, she said.

Some legislators pointed out the opposition to the U.S. 70 project in the Hondo Valley area.

"But there's also opposition to the U.S. 84/285 project," Faught said. "There's always someone who objects."

State officials hope to close on the bond sale by the end of January and to have the money available within 30 days of the closing, she said.

The Hondo Valley project continues a 30-year vision started in the 1970s, when Congress designated U.S. 70 as a priority primary route and allocated \$44.7 million to improve the section from Las Cruces to the Texas state line.

The project's final environmental impact statement will wrap up soon, and a federal court hearing is scheduled Oct. 31, on a lawsuit to block the project filed by rancher Gerald Ford.

## Reservation fire nearly contained

Blaze burns 58 acres of oak brush and grass

A fire that charred 58 acres of oak brush and grass on the Mescalero Apache reservation this week was 85 percent contained by 3:30 p.m. Tuesday, incident commander Leland Pellman said.

The fire, named Burnt Forest, was reported Monday by a Ski Apache employee, who saw a large smoke column coming from the No. 5/Turkey Springs area, said Rachel LaPaz, public information officer for the Branch of Forestry of the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

No structures were at risk, LaPaz said. About 200 fire fighters have been involved.

## Courtroom technology saves time and money



In less than an hour Monday, Magistrate Judge William Butts arraigned two people in Ruidoso even though they were sitting in jail in Carrizozo.

The new video arrangement saved about 90 minutes of travel time and eliminated the need for an officer to supervise the transport of prisoners from the county seat 75 miles round trip to the village.

In front of about a dozen guests who showed up to watch the demonstration, Butts turned on two television monitors, one facing his desk and the other, the audience. Cameras in his chamber and in a special "booth" for inmates allow the judge and accused offender to see one another as they communicate.

"The state bought all this equipment for the court and the jail," Butts said. "The county pays the monthly charge for a (high-speed telephone) line and for the upkeep of equipment at the jail end. The

cost of the camera alone is \$15,000.

"This is a pilot program. Sixteen courts got this equipment. As soon as I found out that Ruidoso was closing its jail and there would be a great expense connected to transporting prisoners, I called and asked the state to put us at the top of the list and they listened, thank God."

He anticipated the system being ready in April, but it took two months for the installation of the special line by Valor Telecommunications. The state also used another month to order acoustical tile for the booth at the jail to keep down the noise, Butts said.

Since it was installed, he has used the video system for one or two arraignments (for misdemeanor charges) or first appearances (for felony charges) almost daily, he said. On Mondays, he may see six or seven prisoners on the video set-up, Butts said.

"I like it," he said. "At first, there were some objections from the state public defender because no attorney is present with the client, but seldom do we see an attorney in this courtroom on a first appearance."

Although the video procedure is not taped, an audio tape of the session is maintained.

The judge, his staff and the jailer serve as witnesses, Butts said. An inmate always has the right to call an attorney, he said. The majority want a public defender, and that requires a financial review and approval from the Alamogordo office of the public defender.

He extended an invitation to Ruidoso Municipal Judge Mike Line to use the system too, Butts said.

"That should save him some transportation," the judge said.

Lt. Wolfgang Born of the Ruidoso Police Department, said he faced a transport decision earlier that morning. He ended up sending a detective to pick up a prisoner in Carrizozo to avoid depleting his day-shift of police officers. Three officers were on duty, but one already was testifying at a trial in Las

Cruces.

"We'll remind Judge Line of the benefits," Born said. "This should save us lots of money."

Al Junge, a former village councilor, asked if many villages the size of Ruidoso with a tourist industry, are without local jails.

"I don't know of any of this size without a jail," Butts said.


Junge pointed out that neighboring Ruidoso Downs has a small jail. But Butts said State Police weren't allowed by former police chief Eddie Lerma to bring their prisoners, because of the liability issue and lack of manpower.

Although both of the inmates arraigned Monday pleaded not guilty and were either assigned a public defender or told to hire an attorney before Nov. 6, Butts said between the camera and the facsimile machine, he also can handle guilty pleas on the spot.

"If they plead guilty, I fax them their constitutional rights and watch them read and sign them," he said. "I sentence right then."

The equipment currently is approved only for arraignments, not for trials or other court proceedings, although that probably will change with time and experience, he said.

# Hot Shot event dedicated to New York

The 14th Annual Hot Shot Challenge starts at 9 a.m. on Saturday, and this year, will be dedicated to New York City.

"The race starts at the bottom of a 40-percent incline and detours through Trap and Skeet and there's a one-mile Fun Run for kids, as well as 5K, 10K and 15K runs," said Rachel LaPaz, public information officer for the Forestry Branch of the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

The 15K race starts at the junction of Highway 70 and Route 6; the 10K Team Challenge starts at milemarker 2 on Route

6; and the 5K race starts at the top of Gaines Tank on Route 6. The Fun Run for children starts at the junction of Jose Second and Route 6, and all the runs finish at the West Conference Center of the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

For the Team Challenge, members of the Hot Shot fire fighting crews compete by groups of five, and the winning team hosts the following year's run, LaPaz said.

Mescalero holds the title and hosts this year's race and, since first started by the Mescalero Hot Shots in 1987, has hosted all events so far. Only Hot Shot teams can take the traveling trophy home.

The cost to participate is \$15 per runner

(the Fun Run for children is free) and LaPaz said the Mescalero Hot Shots.

Awards will be given for all the races. Children participating in the Fun Run will receive medals. Awards will be given to men and women in age categories: 13-19, 20-29, 30-39, 40-49 and 50-plus.

To register, go to the Hunt Lodge, Trap and Skeet, 7-8:30 a.m., allowing 30 minutes to get to starting places. T-shirts will be given to the first 75 paid entries.

The Hot Shot Challenge is dedicated to the heroes, victims and their families impacted by the New York City terrorist attacks and all proceeds will be donated to the American Red Cross.

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# Reports: Mail service slower

Bill payments and birthday cards sent from Lincoln County may be a little late arriving this month after two "scares" at the Alamogordo postal distribution center for the "883" ZIP code area.

Although postal service spokeswoman Margaret Romero, in the district office in Albuquerque, said mail is being delivered at the same pace as before reports of anthrax contamination, several residents of Ruidoso complained of major delays.

One man said the Otero District Court confirmed a letter he mailed Tuesday, Oct. 16, arrived seven days later. His letter included a money order issued by Allsup's convenience store.

A spokesman for that corporation said if money orders don't arrive, people can seek reimbursement with a money order receipt and an additional charge.

Romero said no incidents of

possibly contaminated letters or packages were reported in Lincoln County. But two scares caused the evacuation of the post office in Alamogordo, according to Postmaster Ken Ohlman. The first substance turned out to be cocoa and the second, a cleanser.

Romero said she had no details on the Alamogordo situation, but that mailings of a company's samples of hot cocoa caused alarm all over the country.

Last week, Amway also generated some reports when it mailed out samples of a soap, she said. A charity sent "a little bit of dirt to signify how some people live in squalor," an action that prompted many calls to law enforcement officials by the recipients, she said.

"Customers have been educating themselves through our Web site and their own research," Romero said. "We've had few reports of possible biological agents compares to the rest of the country."

"I like to think that's because we're rural and the

people here have good horse sense."

The postal service is approaching the anthrax situation by briefing internal customers, employees and those receiving mail at home on what to watch for, as well as working with private mailing houses on how to protect employees.

The Centers for Disease Control and Federal Bureau of Investigation are coordinating to determine the origins of mail that arouses suspicions.

Directives were issued on how to handle suspect mail that include isolating the item, placing it in a sealed plastic bag, if possible, and washing hands in soap and water, Romero said.

"I don't recommend people change their habits in paying bills or sending mail," she said. "The mail is going through the system as normally as it was, but when that mail arrives at a corporation, some companies are handling it differently, especially back East."

The delay in some cases may be at the corporate end, she said.

## Recreation center gets re-energized

A bond issue defeat wasn't quite final, it seems.

**D**on't ever say those who want Ruidoso citizens to have good health and fitness lack energy.

Ruidoso voters said "no" a year ago to a bond issue that would have provided funds for construction of a substantial recreation complex, including an indoor swimming pool, off Hull Road and within walking distance of the White Mountain school complex and the Ruidoso Convention Center.

Despite the bond defeat, the village since then has paved a road along the edge of the site, added substantial paved parking and successfully promoted a "community built" playground for children in the same area.

Visible during the play-

ground project last month was a new petition displayed at the volunteer sign-up table (complete with some familiar plans) for the recreation plaza.

Then last week, Joe Zagone, a long-time youth recreation advocate, used the Lincoln County Health and Wellness Council meeting as a venue for renewing an appeal for the multi-million-dollar project.

He suggested that the whole community get behind the center: "Sell the Senior Center and put it on one side (at the new site) and the teen center on the other," he suggested.

If it comes to that, we might also suggest that construction of a recreation center during wartime would be a wonderful demonstration of faith in the future, and our children.

## Graduate grade: Incomplete

**WASHINGTON, D.C.** — Tables were turned this week as 32,000 graduate students and recent PhDs graded doctoral programs in a groundbreaking online survey conducted by the National Association of Graduate-Professional Students.

Students graded their doctoral programs' implementation of educational practices recommended by the National Academy of Sciences, the Association of American Universities, and other educational leaders. Report cards for more than 1,300 doctoral programs, generated from the survey results, are available online at <http://survey.nagps.org/>.

"Graduate students often report feeling overwhelmed by the process of higher education and helpless to change things," said association President Kimberly Suedkamp Wells, one of the survey authors and a doctoral student at the University of Missouri-Columbia. "Our survey is important because it provides students with the opportunity to feel like they can actually make a difference in their educational experience."

Students are most satisfied in doctoral programs where they have the freedom to pursue a broad range of career options, to make informed choices about their own education, and to have those choices respected. While 81 percent of students reported satisfaction with their programs overall, only 45 percent are satisfied with their preparation for teaching and 38 percent with

career services. According to Adam Fagen, survey author and a doctoral student at Harvard University, "even programs that excel at research may get an incomplete when it comes to preparing students for non-research aspects of their careers."

"It's a real problem when PhDs can't function outside the university," said survey author Geoff Davis, a Dartmouth math professor turned software developer. "Getting science and engineering PhDs into industry is the best way to get new research and ideas out of the lab and into the world." While 89 percent of survey respondents believed their doctoral programs are doing a good job of preparing them for academic careers, only 52 percent felt prepared for nonacademic careers.

A particular area of concern is the lack of information about the career outcomes of former students. Only 30 percent of respondents reported receiving information on graduation rates for their programs during the application process, and only 35 percent received information on job placements for recent program graduates.

Women and under-represented minority students were less satisfied with their experiences than their counterparts. Twenty-eight percent of women and 40 percent of minority students said that their programs did not provide supportive environments for members of under-represented groups.



## Let's just hope it is a 'rainmaker'

I read your front-page story of Oct. 17 in complete disbelief.

"Subdivision Plan Spans 1,000 Acres" is your title. This proposed subdivision development, near the Spencer Theatre, might just as well be on Mars as far as being a feasible possibility. The Utah-based corporation will call this ill-advised proposition "Rainmaker" and they, as well as the rest of us in semi-arid Lincoln County, need to hope that it is a huge rainmaker. Is it even necessary to point out that it will include golf courses? Now those of us concerned about viable water resources for our existing population will have to address another, even bigger threat to very fragile water resources.

Bonito Volunteer Fire Chief Chris Denne is reported to welcome the development because he believes it would give his department more hydrants and two large water storage tanks with which to fight fires in his jurisdiction. It is also likely that with some 673 new residences and a vague number of new businesses that there would be a greater number of fires for Mr. Denne's department to fight. We in Lincoln County are one dry winter away from water-related disasters. They would include forest fires, dry wells, water shortages in municipal systems, and yes, worst of all, dead grass on fairways and greens.

I do hope that those people who have a long-term investment in this beautiful place will resist the efforts of "Rainmaker" and others like them to make a quick fortune at the expense of so many.

The Lincoln County Commission has a huge responsibility in this issue.

I wish I had more faith in that noble body of representatives to stand up to "the big guys" for the majority of us in the county.

Let your opinions be heard on this. Direct them to your county commissioner. This is a very big deal for all of us!

# Planning board approves plan for medical office

A new medical office soon may be under construction on Porr Drive off State Highway 48.

Dr. Frank J. DiMotta has received a recommendation for approval of half of his applications from the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission.

Board members last week unanimously recommended rejecting rezoning from Commercial 1 to Commercial 2 classification, and then unanimously approved a commercial site development plan for the land, including a variance for the physician to construct a larger-than-allowed building.

The village council ultimately will decide the zoning issue.

Village planner Darrell Bremner said commissioners didn't want to change the zoning to allow more varied uses.

The 1.1-acre property at 208 Porr Drive in Young Heights is zoned neighborhood commercial, which will allow a professional office of up to 2,000 square feet. DiMotta wanted C-2, community commercial, which allows office buildings of any size within setbacks and parking limits.

The land to the north of the property is zoned low density mobile homes, to the east and south community commercial, and to the west single-family residential use and neighborhood commercial.

DiMotta's application states that the rezoning

would meet a village-wide need for more spaces for doctor's offices. The staff didn't verify that opinion, Bremner wrote in his review.

The village's Comprehensive Plan proposes this area as commercial use, so either zoning would be appropriate, he wrote.

Giving some history, Bremner said the lot was considered in 1996 for C-2 zoning, but was kept C-1 as a buffer to the residential district to the north and west and to reduce traffic from possible C-2 uses. At the time, no specific use was proposed for the lot. If property is rezoned C-2, any use within the category could go there in the future, the planner pointed out.

In the related application, the board granted a variance

to allow DiMotta to build a 5,300-square-foot medical office with 40 parking spaces.

Approval of the variance was an alternative to the rezoning first proposed by DiMotta.

Village rules call for the property to be screened from residences to the north. Screening can be by plants or a fence.

The driveway at the front of the building is wide enough for one-way traffic and the drive at the rear can accommodate two-way traffic and emergency fire equipment access. Only 16 parking spaces were required.

Commissioners asked for more information on driveway grades and drainage calculations as a condition for approval.

In other petitions reviewed

Tuesday, the zoning commission:

• Approved a variance for a carport setback at 152 Coronado Drive, Lot 3A, Block 1, Highwood Addition for applicant Gilly H. Hufford, Eagle Land and Aerial Surveying Co., agent. The carport was built without a permit.

• Approved a license to use the right of way in Country Club Drive, on Lot 1A, Block 2, Lookout Subdivision by applicant Mike Gentry, surveyor D.T. Collins, agent.

The applicant proposes to build four walls into the right-of-way to allow landscaping and a driveway.

The applicant agreed to pay \$69.21 per year based on use of 167 square feet of land at \$1.15 per square foot times 10 percent.



Warriors get needed district win over Santa Teresa, 41-14

The Ruidoso Warriors didn't just come through when needed, they made it look easy. Ruidoso (5-3, 1-1 Dist. 4AAA) shut down the Santa Teresa Desert Warriors Friday night at Horton Stadium, putting together an impressive 41-14 win that set up a key Nov. 2

match-up with Portales. If the Warriors can beat the Rams in Portales, they would earn a playoff spot.

But none of that would be if Ruidoso hadn't beaten the Desert Warriors for their first district win.

The Warrior defense sparked the team early, holding Santa Teresa on its first possession, and then intercepting a pass on its second. Senior Chad Swanner picked off the Francisco Mijaras throw at the Desert Warrior 38, and returned it to the 1-yard line.

Senior Darryl Bagley punched it in on the next play to give the Warriors a quick 7-0 lead.

Tim Lucero picked off a pass on Santa T's next drive, returning it to the 14 and setting up a 10-yard TD run by Tyler Line to give the Warriors a commanding first quarter lead.

Line also got an interception in the fourth quarter.

The Desert Warriors never challenged, but the finishing blow seemed to come early in the second half, with Ruidoso only up 20-0.

Junior quarterback Josh Adams found senior wideout Phillip Darley on a quick slant

and hit him for a 71-yard TD pass, his second score of the game. Four minutes later, Adams took advantage of a poor Santa Teresa punt and scampered 34 yards for another touchdown. That made the score 34-0 with just over six minutes left in the third.

Warrior coach Les Carter said he had hoped for this kind of effort coming in.

"We felt like if we did not make a lot of mistakes, we could control the game," he said.

Sophomore Jess Shendo became the fifth Warrior to score on the night with an 8-yard TD run late in the fourth period.

The Desert Warriors scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns after the game was sailed away.

Going in, the Mescalero Chiefs football team wanted to make the Lake Arthur Panthers work for a win. But that's not what happened.

The Panthers made quick work of Mescalero, ending the Chiefs' season with a 61-6 defeat. The game ended at halftime by virtue of the 45-point mercy rule.

Mescalero (2-6, 0-3 Dist. 1 Six-Man) could not get started against Lake Arthur (7-1, 3-0), failing to score until it was down 29-0 in the

second quarter.

The Chiefs hurt themselves early, coughing up the football after giving up a 55-yard punt return for a TD. The fumble led to another touchdown.

The lone highlight for Mescalero was Raymond Bignouth's 57-yard TD run. But the Panthers answered right back, returning the ensuing kickoff 55 yards for a score. They never looked back, putting together three more touchdowns and a safety for the final tally.

Chief coach Rodney Wright, despite notching only two victories in his first season, became the school's all-time winningest coach earlier this year. Mescalero had won just one game in three years before this season.

Wright said that while the win-loss totals were not what he had hoped for, he feels the Chiefs have laid the foundation for a winning program this year.

"If you want to rate our season as a whole, I think we had a fantastic season," he said.

Changes lie ahead for the Chiefs, but how drastic they are depends. Mescalero High School is barely under the NMAA's Class A maximum of 150 students. With the new school being built, there is a chance next year's enrollment could push it over that limit. If so, the Chiefs would be forced to enter an 11-man Class AA team in 2002. Wright said he believes the program will remain whether it is six-man or 11-man.

"I think we took great strides," he said. "The kids did a great job of building a foundation for a championship team."

The Chiefs lose five seniors from this team, including Bignouth, who had 1,188 rushing yards this year. Mescalero will return 10 of 12 regular starters, however.

"We've got a great core of kids coming back," Wright said. "I'm real excited about next year's possibilities."

**Fishing report for Ruidoso area, Oct. 24, 2001**

**Ruidoso River** - The river was stocked two weeks ago with over 900 hungry Rainbows. The water flow is about normal for this time of year, but is dropping due to lack of rain. The water is gin clear so wear clothes that blend in with the background. Large Stoneflies are abundant in the river now, Rock Worms are declining in size and quantity, and Scuds are on the increase in the waters. Tie a dry fly on as a lead fly then tie a nymph dropper about 12-18 inches behind. Use the lead fly as your strike indicator. Effective and fun way to fish small waters.

**South fork** - One still needs to hike a ways up the stream to find fish. A ways is two or three miles upstream. Once found the fish are healthy and hungry. The fish here are not fussy. Caddis dry flies and small nymphs of just about any pattern will work here. Several local fishermen have hiked 2 to 3 miles up the Southfork to be rewarded with several nice Rainbows and Brookies.

**Bonito Lake**: Not much has changed here from last week. If driving to the Bonito area, be aware there is road construction going on, be alert and expect delays. The lake has taken on a green coloration due to a large algae bloom. The fly patterns that have been working are Humples, Dark Hendricksons, and Parachute Adam flies have been consistent producers before dark on the main lake body. A damselfly nymph tied as a dropper behind your dry fly offering continues to bring an unexpected take. For the spin cast fishermen, try a hot pink, renegade pattern propeller fly or a black with grizzly hackle propeller fly behind a bubble rig.

**Eagle Lakes**: Eagle Lakes are closed for the season.

**Grindstone**: Grindstone was stocked two weeks ago with over 2,000 Rainbows that averaged 9 inches in length. The fall evenings have helped drop the surface temperature of Grindstone Lake. That one fact will help the fishing quality pick up fast on the lake. Float tubers continue reporting doing well by tossing a sinking tip line and stripping a dark woolly bugger with some flash or a streamer 8 to 10 feet deep. Float tubing will end Oct. 31, so plan your last few trips now. Damselfly and dragon fly imitations continue working well. For spin casters, tie on an Olive or Black propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the barbs down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water.

**Lake Mesalero**: The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark woolly buggers continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito, or Hendrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk.

### SDE school ratings

766 public schools in New Mexico at a press conference in Albuquerque Thursday.

"As the ratings will show, public schools are taking seriously our intention to increase student performance in New Mexico and close the achievement gap," said State Superintendent of Public Instruction Michael J. Davis. "Educators from across the state have been asked to step up to their responsibility to children, and they have."

Davis will also highlight the strides made by probationary schools in the past year to meet standards, provide information on schools removed from school improvement and address the SDE's efforts to support schools that are facing corrective action.

"The reality is that some schools in New Mexico will be subject to takeover next year," Davis said. "We are working now to ensure a smooth transition so that students' best interests will be served."

This is the second year for schools to be rated as "exemplary," "exceeds standards," "meets standards" or "probationary" under the state's Accountability Program. Schools are rated on student achievement, dropout and attendance, parent and community involvement and school safety. Not rated are alternative schools, new schools, charter schools that have not been in operation for two years and K-2 schools.

## First MA degree earned fully at ENMU-Ruidoso

Randall Robins earned a master's degree in English in Ruidoso watching television in the evening — and teaching math full-time at Tularosa Middle School. It took him 3 1/2 years to complete the required 40 credit-hours and he did it at Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso.

"I found it to be a lot more fun than just regular classes," Robins said. "You had time to gather your comments — all the professors always wanted us to comment on things, and you had a little more time to prepare your answer. You could converse with other people in the room about what the professor was talking about, so anytime you have communication, you have education."

Robins, who already had a master's degree in agriculture, is the first person ever to complete the master's program in English without ever going on the main campus, said Jim Miller, director of the Ruidoso Instruction Center. Right now, 13 graduate students are taking ITV classes in Ruidoso (and 80 students in all are taking ITV classes) in three programs: English, education and business. Miller said people can get their teaching or administrative licenses in some education fields and several other teaching endorsement or license areas as well.

"The fastest growth (in ITV) has been at the bachelor's degree level, and then slight growth at the master's degree level, and that growth is pretty well controlled by what the university puts over the air," Miller said. "We believe a lot more students would be interested if there were more offerings."

To accommodate master's level students, Miller said, the classes have to be offered in the evenings or weekends, and with only three broadcasting stations in Portales and three receiving classrooms in

Gaston will finish in May and Wellman in the summer. Wellman said she gets all the periodicals she needs for research and all interaction with the main campus from the Internet.

Ruidoso, the number of graduate classes offered is limited. But, he said, with three classrooms that take up to 10 students each, the Ruidoso center could take on several hundred graduate students.

Gary Huybregts, dean of the College of Business, said the ITV schedule is fairly full five days and five evenings a week. To increase the number of graduate offerings would require either reducing the number of undergrad classes or increasing the capability of broadcasting and receiving more graduate classes — which means adding more classrooms in both Portales and Ruidoso, an expensive proposition.

Classes that require labs or other those requiring more interaction are not chosen for ITV, said Phil Shelley, director of graduate school at Portales who runs the on- and off-campus graduate program. Faculty in anthropology, for example, Shelley's field, give seminars, and until two-way video is available, this type of class will not be delivered by ITV. A new instruction center is being built at ENMU-Roswell and the network will convert to digital television toward the end of 2002, he said.

Robins, who lives in Nogal, didn't have any trouble taking either the required or the electives courses he needed for his master's degree, though, and never had

to wait for classes, although sometimes he did take them out of order, with the college's approval. He even took his comprehensive exam in Ruidoso, with Miller supervising — a first for Ruidoso.

"I did everything but the Spanish on ITV, and they offered Spanish at the high school at night," Robins said. "I never had a teacher not

answer me quickly on the Internet. I would get my papers back faster than in regular classes, because as soon as they graded them, they faxed them to me, and if there were comments, they did it on e-mail."

Robins said all the professors on his graduate committee drove to Ruidoso at least once, and some three or four times to talk to him about his progress.

"I think we're really lucky at Ruidoso to have that site," he said. "I can't imagine why more people don't take advantage of it."

The ITV classrooms are available for classes from 7:30 a.m. until 10 p.m. during the week and sometimes on weekends, said Luanne Hodson, the facilitator for instructional television at ENMU-Ruidoso.

Tuition for the ITV graduate classes is \$97 a credit hour, the same as for graduate classes at the main campus, Miller said, and the classes are offered at five sites: Ruidoso; Roswell; Hobbs; Cannon Air Force Base and Clovis Community College.

"These graduate students have a full-service library, financial aid, academic advisement and books at the bookstore right here, so they don't have to do it long distance in any fashion," he said.

Section 4. The polls for said election will be opened at 10:00 a.m. on the day of said election and will be closed at 7:00 p.m. Each voter will cast his or her ballot at the polling place.

Section 5. The election committee shall receive no ballot unless the person offering to vote is a taxpaying elector of Alpine Village Sanitation District. A "taxpaying elector" means a person, qualified to vote at general elections in the State, who either has paid or incurred a general tax liability on real property within the District in the twelve months immediately preceding the election or who is purchasing real property within the district under a real estate contract where a property tax has been paid or incurred on the real property in the twelve months immediately preceding the election.


