**Council upholds assisted-living center approval**

Next step for Oregon firm is to get a building permit

Residents who wanted to keep an assisted living complex out of their neighborhood walked away disappointed from a special meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council.

They lost an appeal of the village Planning and Zoning Commission's approval of a site plan and conditional use on a 9.3-acre tract at the corner of Grindstone and Wingfield streets.

Albert Pitts, the Roswell attorney hired to represent those who filed the appeal, contended that proper legal notice was not given, that the project would change the character of the neighborhood, too few parking spaces were planned, the commission failed to consider a petition signed by opponents, that irrigation plans would violate the village's conservation rules and that no written decision or stated basis for the decision was given.

But the village council upheld the commission's decision, following the lead of village attorney John Underwood, who rebutted Pitts' assertions.

The location is the second picked by Sun West Management Inc. of Salem, Ore., for an 84-unit assisted living operation that includes a secured section with 24 memory-care rooms.

The first tract, at the corner of Sudderth Drive and Center Street, was dropped after objectors pointed out the use would interfere with a proposed system of one-way streets through mid-town laid out in the village's transportation master plan.

When the unanimous vote was concluded last week, applause broke out in the room from local supporters, many of them elderly, who said they hope to live in the complex as an alternative to being forced to move to another town that offered the special living arrangement.

Marilyn Nishitani, one of the key organizers of the project, said Tuesday, the next step is to obtain a building permit.

"They hope to break ground in about three weeks," she said. "By the response we've received, no doubt exists of the real need for this project."

Opponents said they don't dispute the need, but contended the complex is inappropriate for the area, specifically citing the odors that may be produced from preparing hundreds of meals.

**Group ponders Upper Canyon emergency plan**

Creating an alternate emergency evacuation route in Upper Canyon seems physically and financially unfeasible, members of the Ruidoso Wildland Urban Interface Group agreed Tuesday.

They said a more productive approach would be to focus on thinning trees in the narrow canyon, realigning or improving the road, installing better bridges and coming up with an escape plan that visitors and home owners can react to quickly.

Representatives of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the U.S.

Forest Service and Ruidoso Urban Forester Rick Delaco outlined the problems with three proposed escape routes and a suggested safety zone.

Upper Canyon, a heavily populated and high dollar property area, is considered a priority because only one road leads into and out of the sector at the west end of town.

Many of the people with homes are seasonal residents and several motels, cabins and bed and breakfast businesses operate there, exposing visitors who are unfamiliar with the area to risk in the event of forest fire or flooding on the Rio Ruidoso. Steep terrain would hinder any of the pro-

posed routes, said Delaco and Matt Reidy, fire management officer for the Forest Service.

The cost of one alternative could hit \$300,000, Reidy said.

Another that ends up in Park Canyon would carry high ecological and aesthetic impacts, he told members of the multi-agency coalition.

Delaco said ideally, blocks of neighbors will go together on thinning projects once they see the benefits in other demonstration areas.

Besides reducing the risk of fire, those benefits include the return of natural grasses and springs.

"Let's get the logging industry to take a look and see what they could do," Delaco said.

**Lack of moisture pushes fire danger to 'very high'**

Although no fire restrictions currently are in effect, forest supervisor Jose Martinez urged all forest users to be careful with campfires and other potential sources of ignition.

Weather stations around the Lincoln National Forest indicate that fire indices are higher than they have been in many years, officials said.

"The fall seasons in our area are generally dry, but this year due to the current drought conditions, the monsoons did not provide the necessary moisture to keep the forest wet," the U.S. Forest Service said in an advisory.

A sign posted at the Forest Service

office on Mechem Drive asks for snow, rain, fog - "any moisture will dew."

Fire danger on the Smokey Bear Ranger District is listed as 'very high,' as it is also in the Sacramento and Guadalupe districts, the agency said.

Forest supervisor Jose Martinez asked all campers, hunters or anyone making a fire in the forest to use fire rings.

Open campfires, charcoal grills, wood stoves or a cigarette thrown from a vehicle in the Forest can lead to a dangerous forest fire, even during this relatively moderate fire danger period, Martinez said.

Although there are no fire restrictions in place on the Lincoln National Forest, Martinez said people should extinguish all campfires and not leave them unattended.



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# Homeowners team up to protect themselves from wildfire

Homeowners in Alto Village and Sun Valley are joining together within their communities to create defensible space against wild fires.

"We're starting to see home owner associations take the lead in bringing in services," said Matt Reidy, fire management officer for the Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest.

He met with about 120 home owners in the Alto Golf and Country Club association who are "very interested" to find out what money is available to thin trees on private land, he said Tuesday.

Reidy was reporting during a Ruidoso Wildland Urban Interface Group meeting on U.S. Forest Service projects aimed at reducing fire hazards. "The work probably will be done in blocks of seven to 12 owners who have multiple lots," he said. "Some very exciting things are happening there (Alto)."

"They are paying for a forest debris pick up. They brought in large commercial dumpsters from Sierra Contractors for three weekends for residents to

bring their slash."

Reidy said the efforts of private landowners, federal, state, county and municipal agencies aren't being overlooked.

"We have a National Fire Plan Review and the Lincoln National Forest was selected as one of two in the region of Arizona and New Mexico as far as measuring the success of implementing the plan," Reidy said. "We were identified as one of the true leaders. We are way ahead of the pack and will continue that way."

Two consecutive years of fires that threatened housing areas around Ruidoso and destroyed property in Los Alamos and the Cloudcroft area galvanized federal support for projects to remove fuel for wild fires and to improve the watershed. Those actions work in tandem to reduce the risk of catastrophic fire.

Jose Martinez, who heads the Alamogordo office of the U.S. Forest Service, said members of a project review committee looking at areas applying for money told him this

part of the state is "way ahead" of others because of community groups that have organized, such as the interface coalition.

Ruidoso urban forester Rick DeIaco said it's important to gather the necessary science to back each move. "It's hard to argue with science, the research that says what approaches do and don't work," he said.

Barbara Luna, who heads the Capitan district for the forestry division of the state

Department of Natural Resources and Minerals, said the Ruidoso Urban Interface project was funded by a \$900,000 grant, plus another \$185,000 marked strictly for individual land owners to thin the trees.

Target areas include the Camelot subdivision area at the south end of Ruidoso, Upper Canyon and Sun Valley, she said.

"They have really come together," she said, adding that 109 land owners have signed on for tree thinning as a block. Other lots will be handled on an individual basis in

priority areas such as the Black Forest subdivision.

"We're getting to land owners as fast as we can," she said. "But we're also doing the areas of Tiberon and Mayhill and Cloudcroft (in Otero County). We have committed half of the \$300,000 to projects."

Agency officials enjoy working with home owner associa-

tion such as Alto for another reason, she said. "They do the leg work like establishing the value of property, estimating the cost and doing it as a block project," Luna said.

By the end of January, all of the money for projects on private land should be allocated, she said. They must be completed by May 11.

In contrast to what many

local people expected, the experience of the forestry division has been that most seasonal residents who own land are interested in the thinning projects. Many have read about programs that can help with the expense and have called to sign-up, she said.

He was ordered to pay a \$200 fine and \$199 in fees.



**KIDS AND CORRECTIVE LENSES**

Although most children between the ages of 3 and 18 receive some sort of vision screening through their school system, each child should be seen annually by a licensed Doctor of Optometry. While screening does provide an indication for corrective lenses, it does not tell about eye health, depth perception, color vision or peripheral vision. These visual conditions can only be determined by a comprehensive eye health and vision examination. Other conditions including strabismus (abnormal alignment of the two eyes or turned eye), amblyopia (poor sight in one eye) and emmetropia (good vision at distance but not at near) usually require corrective lenses. Children who have eye problems are occasionally misdiagnosed with Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD) or other conditions that don't necessarily address their vision. Vision therapy such as eye exercises or vision training may help correct certain visual disorders and thus make visual tasks, especially reading, enjoyable.

Lenses for children are often made of plastic material. However, a polycarbonate lens is recommended since it is the most impact-resistant and thus the safest lens available. Glass lenses are not recommended for children. Prisms can be a helpful tool for enabling a child who experiences double vision. Specialty lenses are lighter, thinner and reduce the magnification of the eye.

## A taxing proposition at the courthouse

New emphasis on an old saying

Despite potential danger when we open our mail boxes, warnings from Washington and threats from Baghdad and Kabul, mundane things like tax bills continue undeterred.

Neither national calamity nor international conflagration held up the mailing of 27,702 property tax notices by the Lincoln County treasurer last week, even if there was concern about the fact that some of those thousands of tax bills will bring responses from around the nation and beyond the seas — from frightfully unknown post offices far and near.

An enemy whose avowed goal is to kill anyone not of a particular creed, demonstrably without concern for his own survival, is a very dangerous enemy indeed.

Use of the mails to spread disease, this nation has found, has

sprea that threat to every corner of the country, and it is understandable that the FBI this week warned of other possible attacks on this nation, based on "credible but nonspecific" evidence.

No wonder our own county treasurer, Joan Park, has taken precautions in handling mail coming into her office; everybody should be doing the same thing.

Perhaps recognizing the possibility that sporadic anthrax is not the only threat to people in the homeland, she has even taken precautions to protect tax records against loss or destruction by having backup electronic and hard-copy records stored at remote sites.

Nobody can blame her for doing her job, but it does give a totally new twist to a very old saying: "Nothing is so certain as death and taxes."

## Overkill and the Green credo

SEATTLE, Wash. — Even such mythical detectives as Sherlock Holmes or Hercule Poirot would have difficulty trying to find the culprit that killed the mammoths, mastodons and other megafauna that once roamed North America.

Scientists have been picking over the bones and evidence for more than three decades but can not agree on what caused the extinction of many of the continent's large mammals.

Now, in two new papers, a University of Washington archaeologist disputes the so-called overkill hypothesis that pins the crime on the New World's first humans, calling it a "faith-based credo" that bows to Green politics.

"While the initial presentation of the overkill hypothesis was good and productive science, it has now become something more akin to a faith-based policy statement than to a scientific statement about the past," said Donald Grayson, a UW anthropology professor.

Writing in the current issue of the *Journal of World Prehistory* and in a paper to be published in a forthcoming issue of the *Bulletin of the Florida Museum of Natural History*, Grayson said there are dangerous environmental implications of using overkill hypothesis as the basis for introducing exotic mammals into arid western North America.

He looks askance at the idea of introducing modern elephants, camels and other large herbivores into the southwest United States. "Overkill" proponents have argued


that these animals would still be around if people hadn't killed them and that ecological niches still exist for them. Those niches do not exist. Otherwise, the herbivores would still be there."

If early humans didn't kill North America's megafauna, then what did? Grayson points to climate shifts, during the late Pleistocene epoch, which ended about 10,000 years ago, and subsequent changes in weather and plants as the likely culprits in the demise of North America's megafauna. The massive ice sheets that covered much of the Northern Hemisphere began retreating.

In North America, this icy mantle prevented Arctic weather systems from extending into the mid-continent. Seasonal weather swings were less dramatic and didn't reach as far south as they presently do. But with this change, the climate became more similar to today's, marked by cold winters and warm summers.

As a result, an unusual patchwork aggregation of plant communities ceased to exist and there was a massive reorganization of biotic communities. At the same time, new data developed by Russell Graham, a paleontologist with the Denver Museum, shows that small mammals such as shrews and voles were moving about the landscape and becoming locally extinct.

And there were the extinctions of some 35 genera of large North American mammals, including horses, camels, bears, giant sloths, saber-toothed cats, mastodons and mammoths.

## Coming soon: a 'virtual observatory'

BALTIMORE, Md. — Astronomers from 17 institutions have announced that they're starting an ambitious new project to put the universe online via the Internet.

The National Virtual Observatory (NVO), headed by astronomer Alex Szalay of The Johns Hopkins University and computer scientist Paul Messina of the California Institute of Technology, will unite astronomical databases of many earth-bound and orbital observatories, taking advantage of the latest computer technology and data storage and analysis techniques.

The goal is to maximize the potential for new scientific insights from the data by making them available in an accessible, seamlessly unified form to professional researchers, amateur astronomers and students.

The new project is funded by a five-year, \$10 million Information Technology Research grant from the National Science Foundation. Organizers characterize their goal as "building the framework" for the National Virtual Observatory.

Szalay, the Alumni Centennial Professor of Astronomy in Johns Hopkins' Krueger School of Arts and Sciences, views the NVO as a significant step forward in formalizing a third major approach to scientific

research that's been growing in usefulness and popularity in recent years.

"First, you have science conducted through theoretical models," he explains. "Next, you have science tested through experiments. The new approach, scientific exploration through computational methods, is developing in response to the tremendous volumes of data we're starting to gather in many of the sciences."

According to Szalay, advances in technology and technique now annually double the total information astronomers gather each year from observatories.

"If we do not develop ways to distill information and insights from these floods of data, we will end up like shipwrecked sailors on a desert island, surrounded by an ocean of salt water and unable to slake our thirst," co-principal investigator Messina says.

Messina notes that the NVO was inspired by the Digital Sky Project, an NSF-funded project led by Caltech computer scientist Tom Prince that is working to make data from four different astronomy databases available through one seamless web portal.

The NVO will take some of its basic techniques from an earlier multi-disciplinary, multi-institutional NSF-funded project led by Szalay. That project, started two years ago, worked to

develop different and improved methods for accessing and analyzing large volumes of scientific data.

A key challenge for the NVO will be developing ways to simultaneously analyze data from several of the dozens of astronomical databases available today. "Each of those databases is organized differently, which makes it quite difficult to perform analyses of data from several collections simultaneously," Messina explains. "Those kinds of investigations promise to yield important scientific discoveries, though, so the NVO will work to streamline our ability to do such analyses."

Computationally, NVO will do this work through a set of approaches and techniques developed in the 1990s known as "grid" computing. Grid computing lets scientists in multiple institutions easily and rapidly share data and other problem-solving resources.

Szalay compares the effects of this technique for users to the electronic power grids set up for large regions of the United States. Power grids gather and use resources from a variety of sources, but without the user ever being aware such gathering processes are occurring.

"We'll rely on the same kinds of techniques to transfer data and (run computer programs) in a transparent way," Szalay says.

# Downs, ex-cop face lawsuit

Ruidoso Downs police officer Kenneth D. Arther, the police department and village government are being sued for personal injuries, damages and for violating the civil rights of a local resident.

According to the lawsuit filed in Lincoln County District Court Aug. 24, Steven Powell was involved in a minor automobile accident two years ago.

Arther confronted Powell, who was standing by his car. The suit contends the offi-

cer uttered racial slurs and sprayed mace in Powell's face without justification. When Powell went down on one knee and then tried to rise, Arther stuck him on the ankles and back, and swung at his head, the suit states.

Powell said he ran to a friend's house and then allowed officers who followed to enter. When he tried to explain, Arther maced him again, according to Powell in the suit.

This isn't the first time Arther has been accused of using excessive force. Two years ago, he was the focus of other allegations, but appar-

ently was cleared to the satisfaction of town officials.

Dan Bryant, attorney for the village, said he hasn't received notice or a copy of the suit.

The three defendants also are being sued for false arrest, assault and battery and acting in bad faith. The suit contends village officials were aware of past accusations against Arther and failed "to do anything of a constructive nature" regarding the use of excessive force by the officer.

The suit asks for actual and punitive damages to be determined at trial.

# Excess trees finding a market

Projects boost chances for thinning the forest around Ruidoso

Lincoln County residents are fortunate that two local businesses are finding uses for slash and small diameter trees cut in forest thinning projects, say members of a group formed to coordinate the reduction of wild fire fuel.

Sierra Contracting sold a 500 cubic yard load of mulch created from forest waste to a mine reclamation project in Lordsburg, said company representative Van Patton.

Sherry Barrow through Wood Utilization Dynamics Inc. (WUD), her new business at the Glencoe Rural Events Center, will be using small-diameter trees.

"They will be starting a wood shaving operation," said Matt Reidy, fire management officer for the Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest. "Within weeks, they will be able to accept small-diameter trees working with local contractors to obtain and deliver them."

"We're lucky to have businesses that can use this material," said Ruidoso urban forester Rick DeLaco. "You can talk about cutting trees, but if you can't use them, they just sit there in a pile on the property."

Patton said his company perfected a process to create high-quality compost. He would like to see the state Highway and Transportation Department follow the lead of a corresponding agency in Texas, including mulch in specifications for highway projects.

He suggested that State Rep. Dub Williams, a Republican from Glencoe, and officials with the forestry division contact DOT officials and suggest they take a look at the possibility.

"The Texas DOT is way ahead by utilizing this type of

material in its specs on highway projects," Patton said. "They use it for reseeding. We could sell all we have for the project on U.S. 70 from Roswell, if they would just spec it in. It's less expensive and more effective."

The company then could open up mulching and compost facilities all over the state in areas when thinning is needed to remove fire hazards.

That would reduce transportation costs and help communities dispose of the slash, Patton said. The mulch can be used in erosion control and ingredients can be added to discourage weeds, Patton said.

"We also have a 'soft' commitment from a grower in Las Cruces to take 2,500 yards that will be ready late next spring," he said.



The Tigers immediately picked up a first down and moved into Panther ground, but a loss of five on second and seven hurt the drive. Two successive incomplete passes turned the ball back over to Animas.

But again the Capitan defense stood tough, forcing a three-and-out by the Panthers. Silva caught the Animas punt at his own 15, and was immediately hammered by the Panther coverage.

Silva fumbled, but the Tigers kept it. The bigger concern was Silva, who was hurt on the play. He eventually walked off under his own power.

"We didn't play as well as we are capable of playing," said Warrior coach Albert Ronquillo. "The hustle was there. We were



# Lobos soar past Air Force; NMSU has big collapse

New Mexico got a huge conference win, but the same could not be said for the Aggies.

Lobo quarterback Casey Kelly passed for three touchdowns and Holman Wiggins' 47-yard punt return in the second half led the Lobos to a 52-33 victory over Air Force on Saturday.

Kelly, a former walk-on making only the third start of his career, picked apart the Falcons' defense, completing 20 of 40 passes for 324 yards. Wiggins and defensive back Stephen Persley, meanwhile, delivered big-play TDs as the Lobos (3-4, 2-2 MWC) finished with 620 total yards. Air Force (4-3, 2-2), which

lost 68-33 to Brigham Young Oct. 20, again collapsed defensively.

Kelly shook off a pair of first half interceptions to lead the Lobos to their biggest scoring game in four years.

New Mexico coach Rocky Long said Kelly is still making mistakes - he's thrown six interceptions in three games - but also is delivering big plays.

Persley's 25-yard return of a fumble by Air Force quarterback Keith Boyea with 48 seconds left in the first half put the Lobos in front for good. Boyea, who also threw two interceptions, made a bad pitch and Persley scooped up the ball without breaking stride. Holman's punt return gave

the Lobos a 38-27 lead. He got a couple of blocks down the right sideline and hurdled a teammate at the Falcons 20. Holman scored moments after the Falcons had held the Lobos on a fourth-and-goal from the 2.

Air Force pulled to 38-33 on Boyea's 1-yard run on the first play of the fourth quarter, but New Mexico put the Falcons away with a 16-play, 80-yard drive that took more than 6 minutes off the clock. Jarrod Baxter bulled his way into the end zone from seven yards out.

Air Force scored on its first play from scrimmage - a 65-yard run by Boyea - but New Mexico's defense allowed the Falcons just one score in the second half. New Mexico ran off 98

plays to Air Force's 46 and had the ball for nearly 40 minutes.

Kelly threw two interceptions in the first half but also kept New Mexico in the game with the three TD passes, each of which finished off an 80-yard drive.

Kelly and Joe Manning, who had a career high eight catches for 115 yards, teamed up for scoring passes of 15 and 35 yards and Kelly threw an 18-yard TD pass to Dwight Counter.

## Middle Tennessee 39, NMSU 35

Dwone Hicks scored on a 9-yard run with 1:09 left as Middle Tennessee scored 28 fourth-quarter points to beat New Mexico State 39-35 on

Saturday.

The Blue Raiders (6-2, 4/1 Sun Belt Conference) trailed 35-11 after Aggies backup quarterback Buck Pierce scored on a 1-yard keeper with 4:22 left in the third quarter.

But Reshard Lee scored fourth-quarter touchdowns on runs of 1 and 12 yards to cut New Mexico State's lead to 35-25.

On the Raiders' next series, Wes Counts connected with Kendall Newson for a 64-yard touchdown pass to make it 35-32.

After Middle Tennessee stopped the Aggies (3-5, 2-1), the Raiders drove 68 yards for Hicks' winning touchdown.

The Aggies drove the ball to midfield in the ensuing drive, but quarterback K.C.

Enzminger's lateral was dropped by Kenton Keith behind the line of scrimmage and Middle Tennessee's Jykinie Bradley recovered the ball at the 50.

New Mexico State built a 22-8 advantage with 37 seconds remaining in the half as Kenon Johnson scored on a 4-yard run in the second quarter and Enzminger scored his second touchdown on a 10-yard keeper less than three minutes later.

The Blue Raiders added a 44-yard field goal by Brian Kelly on the final play of the first half.

The Aggies took the second-half kickoff and built their lead to 29-11. Johnson capped a six-play, 82-yard drive with a 1-yard run.


The third game started tied 1-1. Then Portales' Jaytha Cuipepper went to the service line and knocked home eight straight points for a 9-1 lead.

## Fishing report for Ruidoso for Oct. 31, 2001

Ruidoso River - Not much change from last week. We have had about two weeks of great fall weather, in which the fishing on the River has been outstanding. The water flow is about normal for this time of year, but is dropping due to lack of rain. The water is gin clear so wear clothes that blend in with the background. Large Stoneflies are abundant in the river now. Rock Worms are declining in size and quantity, and Scuds are on the increase in the waters. Tie a dry fly on as a lead fly then tie a nymph dropper about 12-18" behind. Use the lead fly as your strike indicator. Effective and fun way to fish small waters.

South fork - One still needs to hike a ways up the stream to find fish. A ways is two or three miles upstream. Once found, the fish are healthy and hungry. The fish here are not fussy. Caddis dry flies and small nymphs of just about any pattern will work here. Several local fishermen have hiked two to three miles up the South fork to be rewarded with several nice Rainbows and Brookies.

Bonito Lake: Not much has changed here from last week. If driving to the Bonito area, be aware there is road construction going on; be alert and expect delays. The lake has taken on a green coloration due to a large algae bloom. The fly patterns that have been working are Humpties, Dark Hendricksons, and Parachute Adam flies have been consistent producers before dark on the main lake body. A damselfly nymph tied as a dropper behind your dry fly offering continues to bring an unexpected take. For the spin cast fishermen, try a hot pink, renegade pattern propeller fly or a black with grizzly hackle propeller fly behind a bubble rig.

Eagle Lakes: Eagle Lakes are closed for the season.

Grindstones: The fall evenings have helped drop the surface temperature of Grindstone Lake. The cooler temperatures helps the fishing quality pick up fast on Grindstone Lake. Float tubers continue reporting doing well by tossing a sinking tip line and stripping a dark wooly bugger with some flash or a streamer 8 to 10 feet deep. Float tubing will end Oct. 31, so plan your last few trips now. Damselfly and Dragon fly imitations continue working well. For spin casters, tie on an Olive or Black propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the barbs down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water.

Lake Mesquero: The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark wooly buggers continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito, or Hendrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk.

### Grant to benefit area Head Start programs

The U. S. Department of Human Health and Services has announced that the Lincoln county Head Start program has been awarded a grant of \$153,263 to increase services and purchase equipment and supplies in several of the school districts served by the Region IX Education Cooperative.

Melina Atencio, director of the LCHS program, said \$100,000 of the grant will be dedicated as start-up funds to prepare to serve 16 additional Head Start children in the Ruidoso area beginning in September, 2002. The program will be full-day over a 12-month period.

"While the grant provides funds to assist in the development of the program, it does not include funding for facilities," Atencio said. "We are seeking community partners who can help us identify a facility for this expanded program," she said.

The remaining \$53,263 will be used for Head Start playground improvements in Capitan, Carrizozo, Hondo and Ruidoso. Funds also will be used to buy equipment, supplies and curriculum materials for instructors in Capitan, Carrizozo and Hondo, she said.

### Community college grads get better pay

SANTA FE - Education has a substantial, positive impact on students who take part in community college programs.

This conclusion was documented by a study released recently by the New Mexico Commission on Higher Education, prepared in collaboration with the New Mexico Department of Labor and the New Mexico Association of Community Colleges.

The study established the impact on three areas related to economic opportunity: Employability, increases in

annual wages, and sustaining career growth through continuing education.

The study was based on enrollment data submitted to the commission by state community colleges for students who enrolled in the fall of 1996 and completed a program by the spring of 1999.

Key findings:  
• The average annual wage of community college graduates increased 68 percent, from \$14,492 before enrollment to \$24,276 after graduation.

• The top five industries employing program graduates are: General medical and surgical hospitals, semiconductors and related devices, elementary and secondary schools, offices and clinics of medical doctors, and health supply services.

Prior to enrollment, the top five employers were restaurants, grocery stores, department stores, elementary and secondary schools, and general medical and surgical hospitals.

• Clear benefits were demonstrated for program graduates continuing enrollment in higher education. Forty-one percent of graduates continued to enroll at a state community college or university within one year of graduation.

### GED test Friday

The November GED test for Ruidoso/Lincoln County residents has been moved up from Nov. 9 to this Friday, Nov. 2.

Those wishing to take the test must bring two forms of identification. The examination costs \$20.

Successful completion of the test brings a high school equivalency diploma from the state.

November and December are the final months for testing on the current GED examination. A new examination and new testing rules will go into effect beginning Jan. 1.

## Changes ahead for every junior high and high school student in Ruidoso

Ruidoso High School's cafeteria was packed with parents and eighth through 10th-grade students the evening of Oct. 23 — despite a volleyball game scheduled for that time.

The occasion of the gathering was a workshop for parents and students who will be affected by significant changes school district plans to make in graduation requirements, course offerings and career planning and advisement beginning next fall.

The new scheme is called "Ruidoso Career Pathways," and it's hoped that it will assist students to plan their high school careers and course work around their passions and talents, said Paul Wirth, high school principal and assistant superintendent of schools.

"We're reaching to be a Blue Ribbon high school in the country," Wirth told parents and students. "We feel that if we follow some of these things, we can be one of the best schools in the country."

Preparing students for life after graduation is the hoped-for result of the program, and Wirth described the reasons for it by citing student comments.

"Students tell us school is boring. School needs to strike the interest of our students," Wirth said. "A lot of our students say school isn't relevant; students are not attending school the way we'd like, even though our attendance is higher than the state average. Drop-out rates are lower than the state average but we still have dropouts."

Wirth also said that some graduates who went on to college complained that they were not totally prepared, and those

who stayed in the area felt they were not prepared for business careers.

Career Pathways is a philosophy and a process of restructuring education from kindergarten through high school, starting early on to identify students' interests and strengths, and then to plan careers and training around those interests and strengths.

Advisory classes already help students make some of these decisions, Wirth said, but will be introduced earlier and courses set up to prepare students to follow their individualized career pathways. Going beyond course work, the plan will include work experience, internships, community experiences and extracurricular activities that will prepare students for careers that follow their passions.

Wirth said the district will ask for additional funding for counseling services and professional development.

Development of the model began in October of 2000, when committees at the middle school and high school began meeting and brainstorming, followed by the creation of a steering committee of 40 community members that met five times over the last year and three subcommittees that visited 10 schools in Texas and New Mexico.

The plan was discussed at three school board meetings during that time, and when the board meets on Nov. 13, feedback from this meeting in the cafeteria will be presented and approval sought from the board to continue implementing the program.

Current eighth-graders will be affected first by an increase in credits required for graduation from 24 to 25, Wirth said. Also new is a requirement of three classes each in math and science instead of two. Students who are freshmen in 2002-2003

will be required to complete one full credit of success skills classes, to create a career portfolio and digital portfolio for all four years of high school and to complete 1/2 credit of computer or technology classes.

The 2002-2003 freshman class will be able to enroll in one of three introductory career pathway classes: business/media/technology and hospitality/tourism; fine arts/liberal arts and human services; and science/engineering/medicine and industrial/agricultural.

Each of these courses will be 12-week exploratory classes to help students make informed career decisions.

"Through career activities, assessments and inventories and advisement from school and home, students will be guided to identify personal strengths, passions and possible career goals," the proposal, dated Oct. 22, states. "All Ruidoso High School students will choose and actively pursue their own unique career paths. Students will graduate with marketable skills and the necessary academic credentials required to pursue higher learning and chosen careers."

Wirth said guide books for each grade are being finalized and will be available to parents and students. Manuals were handed out to current ninth- and 10th-grade students and their parents and others for eighth-graders to prepare them for high school.

During the question-and-answer session of the one-hour meeting, a parent asked how "locked in" a student is, once a career pathway is chosen. Wirth said the core classes will be the same no matter which career pathway is chosen, and flexibility will be built into the program. Joy Taylor, the high school counselor, said the four-year plan can change from year to year as student interests change.

## Nob Hill Early Childhood Center boosts 'Invitational Education'

All staff get renewed inspiration on "invitational" learning with an in-service provided by an expert on the system.

"United We Stand... Invited We Stay," was the motto for Nob Hill Early Childhood Center teachers, custodians, and bus drivers at the in-

service session for the International Alliance for Invitational Education (IAIE) given by Kate Asbill on Friday at the Gateway Church of Christ.

Asbill introduced invitational education to Cloudcroft 14 years ago. Since then, she has traveled around the U.S. and, recently, South Africa, teaching schools the principals of invitational education: trust, respect, optimism and being inten-

tional. Dr. Bill Purkey created the philosophy of invitational education in the 1970s.

"My goal is to put theory into practitioners (teachers)," Asbill said.

Terri Hardeman, speech pathologist at Nob Hill, said teachers were trained in invitational education and now all the staff will receive training.

"Schools should be most inviting for students, staff and family mem-

bers," Hardeman said. Nob Hill won the nationwide Inviting School Award in 2000. Six staff members from the school accepted the award in North Carolina.

Asbill dresses in costumes to teach about invitational education. One of the characters, Meditate, gives a prescription to "RELAX" — Reflect, Enjoy, Laugh, adjust your Attitude and eXercise. Hardeman said the highest goal for Nob Hill is

to keep the students as excited about learning as when they first enter the classroom. Another goal is to keep teachers' excitement level as high as when they first began teaching.

Hardeman said the result of the program is that children want to come to school and feel comfortable in the educational environment.

Staff turnover at Nob Hill also is very low. "Inviting doesn't happen by accident," Hardeman said.

## Water supply still the main concern

The eyes of Lincoln County commissioners, developers and home owners with domestic wells that are sputtering dry will be focused on the office of the State Engineer over the next few months.

"I'm looking at the Rainmaker as a precipitating event," county manager Tom Stewart said of a proposed gated community planned off Sierra Blanca Airport Road. "I'm wondering what the State Engineer will say about 700 units when we have problems with water now."

Commissioners had hoped to have a hydrological model of the county's water supplies neatly wrapped up to use as a guide in approving or restricting development before it was hit with a massive subdivision. But the study hasn't started.

The county set aside \$60,000, but didn't receive hoped-for money from the state Legislature toward the total cost.

State Engineer Tom Turney has committed to assisting as the county tries to initiate the work needed to create the hydrological model, Stewart said. County officials also are garnering additional information from a Pecos Water Basin study that includes Hondo.

But commissioners backed away from a chance to require community water systems for smaller subdivi-

sions as a way of preventing a repeat of Ranches of Sonterra. In that community, as many as 499 domestic wells may someday be pumping, because the developer proposed less than the water system trigger number of 500 lots.

Others argue that whether a system or individual wells are used, consumption already is out-pacing recharge of the aquifer, the system of underground water-bearing strata.

Distressed residents along Eagle Creek contend what was an intermittent stream doesn't flow at all anymore. Springs indicated on maps as recently as a decade ago are no longer producing water along hiking trails. Others complain about the expense of digging deeper wells when water levels drop.

Still, engineers for developments such as Kokopelli, Ranches of Sonterra, The Hideout golf course and the new Rainmaker subdivision affirm in their reports that the area has plenty of water. Conservation measures such as using recycled waste water to irrigate a golf course are proposed at Rainmaker.

Another positive move, spawned by a major negative, may help the county in the long term.

After two years of massive fires, plenty of federal money is being pumped into efforts to reduce the number of trees and mass of underbrush in the forest, hills and streams

throughout the county. That action also will reduce the overall drain on water supplies.

Demonstration projects have shown that springs and natural grasses often return after a thinning.

But long-time residents say snow and lots of it is what is required for a major aquifer recharge.

Worries over water have spawned activism on the part of groups in Lincoln, along the Bonito River and Eagle Creek. They oppose transfers of water rights from one basin to another.

Rancher Sally Canning recently reminded commissioners that owning water rights doesn't mean water actually is available.

The Ruidoso River Association evolved into a major voice in the fight to rehabilitate that freshwater fishing stream and became a player in the Upper Hondo Watershed Coalition, which is moving ahead with a \$100,000 grant aimed at improving water quality.

While waiting for a revised 40-year water plan, which aims at validating the legal need for water rights held by the village, Ruidoso village councilors authorized a multi-phased project to reduce leakage in village water lines and to better regulate water pressure.

By increasing the level of the reservoir at Grindstone dam, the amount of leakage from that structure also decreased.

# Fort Stanton: An expense or wise investment?

Studies may guide decisions about the future of historic Fort Stanton, but action is needed immediately to prevent additional deterioration of its buildings, says the president of a fort advocacy group.

The state Legislature must change its thinking from the fort being an expense to becoming an investment, said Tony Hoffman, president of Fort Stanton Inc.

The group was formed shortly after the fort was closed as a state hospital in March 1995, with the goal of turning the complex into a living museum.

But at this point, the goals are more modest.

"We're just hoping to get enough money for minimal stabilization of the buildings," Hoffman said.

His group is one of several involved in the Fort Stanton Partnership, which operates a small museum on the grounds of the 1855 fort that lies 13 miles northeast of Ruidoso.

"Less than 20 percent of the buildings are being used," Hoffman said. "When it's that little, you can get rapid deterioration."

"From our perspective, there have been enough studies."

Even with state and/or federal involvement, a private source willing to invest money in the fort will be needed, he said. That source and its intentions must first be identified.

Last August, several members of the state Legislative Finance Committee seemed lined up solidly behind efforts to pump some money into the fort. Since then, terrorist attacks rocked an already uneasy national economy and revenue projections for New Mexico over the next year are being adjusted downward.

That's not good news, but the group remains committed, continuing to operate the museum from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Thursday through Monday.

"Since it has been in the hands of the state Corrections Department, the fort has been

pretty much off limits," Hoffman said. "We've been surprised at the number of people who have found it. It's not really pointed out on maps. I'm pleased that so many people from out of town have tracked it down. We're getting 150 people a week."

"I think it shows what could be done."

About 20 percent of the Legislature, including finance

committee members, visited the fort in tours arranged by the partnership.

"It was surprising how many had never been to the fort before," Hoffman said. "The trips were important to show them what we have when they're asked to commit money to its future."

"They also seemed ready to invest in it, instead of looking at the expense, but we've had

no positive results at this moment. It should all come together in January when the Legislature convene again."

That's when partnership members, Lincoln County commissioners and legislators will hear the results of two reports; a study by Kells & Craig on future uses for the fort and a look at the feasibility of designating the fort as a state monument.

"We're trying to get a handle on the results," Hoffman said, adding that Kells & Craig sent a draft to the property control division of the state General Services Department.

"They changed some things and the final version wasn't finished until Oct. 25," he said.

County Manager Tom Stewart is using the down time to try to line up economic development money to pay for a business plan for the fort, as the next step to the Kells & Craig study.

Fort Stanton Inc. is moving ahead on other fronts to promote the fort, including starting a radio station geared to

funnel information to tourists and give air time to community issues and groups.

"We hope to hear some time this month on the license," Hoffman said. "It will, in effect, be an extension of the chamber of commerce" and offer more chances to promote the fort.

Ensuring that the fort is definitively identified on maps also will help, he said.

"The fort could add a totally new dimension to attractions in the valley," he said. "It has the potential to be a great draw. There are groups of buffs who schedule their annual trips along stops with forts. And we have plenty of Germans stationed at Holloman Air Force base drive up to see the internment area used during World War II. We've even had some people from Germany come here directly."

The fort will celebrate its 150th year in 2005.

"It would be a great time to celebrate the fort's grand opening as a new tourist draw," he said.

## Old fort embraces a colorful past, a hopeful future

•June 1855: Territorial Gov. Merriwether signs a treaty designating a reservation near the fort and establishing a new post. The fort was named after Captain Henry W. Stanton of the 1st Dragoons, killed that year during a campaign against the Apache.

•April 1861: Union forces set fire to the fort as Confederate troops move into the area. Apache attacks quickly convince the southern forces to abandon the fort.

•August 1896: The garrison at Fort Stanton is withdrawn.

•1899: the fort was set aside by executive

order and was turned into the Marine Hospital Tuberculosis Sanitarium.

•1953: The state of New Mexico assumes control of the property, continuing its operation as a hospital, but eventually focusing on a residential program for the developmentally disabled.

•1994: State officials, in line with changing philosophies of care, decide to close the DD program and staff begins working on a conversion to a long-term nursing center.

•March 1995: Newly elected Gov. Gary Johnson looks at the high operating expenses at the fort and closes it.

es at the fort and closes it.

•1996: Fort Stanton Inc., a volunteer group dedicated to the preservation of the fort and its conversion into a living museum, forms.

•November 1996: The Department of Corrections moves women prisoners from adjoining Camp Sierra Blanca into the a portion of the fort as a minimum security prison.

•August 1998: The women's prison at the fort is closed in a state Corrections Department consolidation move.

•June 2000: Amity Foundations launches an alcohol and drug rehabilitation center for state Department of Corrections prisoners who are on parole or probation.

•October 2000: The firm of Kells & Craig is selected to look at the best future use for the fort.

•August 2001: Members of the state Legislative Finance Committee tour the fort and are given a preview of the Kells & Craig consulting report, which is scheduled to be presented to the full Legislature when it convenes in January.

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
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# Highway 70 projects near construction phase

U.S. Highway 70 is continually developing from the four-lane resurfacing of the Mescalero reservation, to the widening to four lanes from Ruidoso Downs to Riverside.

Officials announced funding on Oct. 19 for U.S. 70, a 38-mile stretch from the Downs to Riverside. The State Highway Commission approved \$95 million in bonds to pay for the project.

State officials hope to close on the bond sale by the end of January and to have the money available within 30 days of the closing, said Rhonda Faught, adjutant secretary for the state Highway and Transportation Department.

The purpose of the project is to improve safety on U.S. 70 by widening the road.

Max Valerio the highway department's preliminary design bureau chief, said the project is awaiting environmental clearance.

This is a formalized process that includes a design build, which is the first in the state, and is one of two pilot projects approved by the Legislature.

In the past, selecting a contracting firm was based on the lowest bid, but the selection process will now be based on quality. The list of prospective firms will be narrowed down to two to five companies.

"The contract should be in place by June 2002 and construction should begin not long after that," Valerio said.

## Master plan to guide village road work

The transportation master plan for the village of Ruidoso has been approved and will be an in-house project to improve other roads heavily traveled besides Sudderth and Mechem drives.

Mayor Robert Donaldson said the focus of the plan would most likely focus on roads that showed a high pattern of traffic such as Hull Road and Paradise Canyon and Wingfield Street and

Grindstone Canyon Road. He said another road to be considered is Porr Drive because of the increase in new residents and traffic. "Ruidoso is a mature community and there is not a need for new roads," Donaldson said.

The topography of the roads will be a main concern when deciding what roads to enhance. The old master plan didn't look at topography, which plays a big role

when deciding what roads to work on, Donaldson said. Another aspect is to identify intersections that are unsafe and make these intersections top priority.

Donaldson said the village is committed to maintaining and paving of roads. For the first time, the village has a regularly scheduled pot hole maintenance crew. "We don't need a master plan to maintain roads," he said.

The resurfacing of U.S. 70 from Mescalero to Ruidoso began on Aug. 20 and was completed on Oct. 26.

The project cost \$2.9 million, assistant district engineer of

the New Mexico Highway Department Virginia Lorenzo said.

Widening the two-lane section to four lanes from Ruidoso to the road that leads to the Inn

of the Mountain Gods is scheduled to go to bid in June 2002, Lorenzo said.

The project will take about two years to complete but that could change, Lorenzo said.

Bonuses will be paid to contractors to complete the project quickly.

"We also want to minimize the impacts to the businesses in town," Lorenzo said.

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
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# Managing an urban forest takes coordination

■ The Wildland Urban Interface group meets monthly to improve public safety and promote economic development.

Many people move to Lincoln County because of the forested mountains, only to learn that the trees in these forested areas grow too densely for the health of the forests and that they create a fire hazard.

The Wildland Urban Interface group meets monthly to discuss ongoing and upcoming projects to enhance public safety and economic development for the communities within the interface, said urban forester Rick Delaco with the Village of Ruidoso.

Delaco said the group is working in three areas: collaborations with federal agencies, projects on municipal land and providing technical advice and service through a public awareness program that encourages residents to create defensible space around their homes to protect them to reduce the fire poten-

tial.

"It's like a big jigsaw puzzle and different people have different pieces," Delaco said. The nine land-holding agencies include the U.S. Forest Service, the Smokey Bear Ranger District, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the Mescalero Apache Tribe, the villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, Lincoln County, the State Land Office, the Bureau of Land Management and New Mexico State Forestry, representing private land holders — or residents in need of technical advice.

In the Grindstone area, 186 acres of municipal land were scheduled to begin a project of wildfire hazard mitigation on Oct. 26, thinning trees of 12 inches in diameter or less and larger trees, if they're dead. Contracts will go in and cut and chip those trees 5 inches in diameter or less, along with needle materials, and remove them, or the Fire Department will go in and burn the

pieces. Larger trees will be cut into 8-foot lengths and left on the ground. These are not a fire hazard, Delaco said.

A 438-acre piece of municipal land in the Eagle Creek area is another project, and for this the Village of Ruidoso received a three-year grant of \$339,245 from the federal Collaborative Forest Restoration Program, part of the National Fire Plan. This project is also for low-intensity thinning and field work will begin in the next 30 days, Delaco said, with cutting contracts going out in March or April for cutting to start in the summer.

The Village of Ruidoso received \$300,000 in funding allocated to the Western Wildland Urban Interface Program, a federal cost-sharing program that is also part of the National

Fire Plan administered through New Mexico State Forestry, Capitan District.

"The village has been encouraging defensible space," Delaco said, "utilizing its forest waste pick-up service, which is part of the Solid Waste Department. Residents can trim leaves, rake their needles and we transport them to Sierra Contracting and they turn it into compost."

This program is under way and residents apply to have the Forest Service assess the density of the trees on their properties. This assessment determines how much money is available to the landholder in the cost-sharing program. For an acre of heavy-density trees, homeowners can either hire someone to thin and later be reimbursed up to

\$1,200 an acre, or do the work themselves. Throughout this past summer, Delaco said, almost 100 residents utilized this lot-assessment program.

To enhance public awareness of the issues, the Wildland Urban Interface Group held two fire-wise workshops with about 150 attendees in April, discussing defensible space and fire-related and forest health related issues.

In addition, the Emergency Management Project Impact Program bought half-page ads on defensible space in the newspaper.

Delaco said the funds now available for these ongoing programs are sufficient because "there are only so many contractors that can cut trees, but

we're hoping to continue to write grants to continue these programs." The Eagle Creek project is a three-year program. The Forest Service will continue to develop buffer strips around the community and this is also ongoing. The Mescalero Apache Tribe is working at fuels reduction by thinning on the reservation.

"Everything that everybody does contributes to the whole of the project," Delaco said. "This is a 10- to 15-year project to get the forest in healthy shape. When you do good forest restoration, you also accomplish wildfire hazard mitigation ... The forest will benefit from a health point of view because of increased water and nutrients available to the remaining trees."

## New businesses rise to meet the need

An important aspect of forest management in the Ruidoso area is thinning trees and disposing of the forest waste, and two local businesses have recently begun turning this waste into compost, mulch and animal bedding material.

Sierra Contracting and Composting Inc. of Ruidoso Downs has developed a way to recycle forest waste into compost, eliminating the need to transport it to a landfill. From June 30 through September, the company composted about 8,800 cubic yards of forest waste

for the Village of Ruidoso — the equivalent of 300 transport truckloads that otherwise would have gone to the nearest landfill — in Oro Grande, 81 miles away.

Van Patton, president, bought White Mountain Composting 1 1/2 years ago, and then bought a 12-foot, 515-horsepower tub grinder to chip the forest slash, which is then put in big windrows for composting.

"We start the composting process with a mixture of pelletized urea and water as an inoculant, we water it, we stir it and we let Mother Nature do her thing," Patton said.

The bulk of the material comes from thinnings to prevent wildfire around

Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, Patton said; people's yards, gutters and defensible-space projects.

"A homeowner can call Rick Delaco (urban forester for the Village of Ruidoso), and he'll assess their property," Patton said. "They can do the thinning, pile it next to the curb and the village brings it to us rather than to the landfill at Oro Grande. That's what makes our little operation pretty important in my mind ... because you've got a huge mountain of this stuff that's going to regenerate itself every two or three years; why just chuck it in a landfill?"

30,000 cubic yards for Ruidoso and we're also a diversion point for the county," Patton said.

The Village of Ruidoso has two lightning loaders that pick up yard waste and forest thinnings from curbs.

Patton's grinder reduces the materials by 2/3, he said, and after the composting process, which takes about six months, it's reduced another 50 percent, and is then a usable product.

Sierra Contracting in September sold its first batch of composted forest waste to a mine reclamation project near Lordsburg.

"It takes nature years and years and years to do what we

do in six months," said Paul Wetzel, general manager for Sierra Contracting.

Sherry Barrow Strategies is the second new business to address recycling of forest waste materials and forest-fire prevention — transforming the waste into animal bedding.

Barrow, a local radio personality, will use timber harvesters to supply her with 25 cords per day of the commercially undesirable small-diameter trees such as Ponderosa pines, which are abundant in the Ruidoso area.

Barrow has a four-year lease of the Glencoe Rural Events Center to recycle this timber into wood shavings for animal bedding.

Barrow's business received

an \$80,000 grant in April from The Four Corners Sustainable Forests Partnership, and \$250,000 will come under the Economic Action Program and Community Fire Planning program, part of the monies directed toward reducing fire potential and forest health in New Mexico.

But Barrow intends to become self-sustaining eventually and estimates that eight jobs will be created by the business, as well as 10 other employment opportunities.

Barrow's project will involve various small businesses, including contractors, small mills and timber harvesters. She plans to develop other products from the small-diameter trees down the line.






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
