Ruidoso native named to head local chamber

Native Ruidosoan Patric Pearson has been named executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

"It was a family decision," Pearson said of plans to return to his hometown, adding that his wife, Christy, embraced the idea.

"She used to vacation here with her family in Ruidoso," Pearson said.

"She has family in Corona. And my parents still live here."

The Pearsons have a daughter, Emma, 21 months, and are expecting another child in March.

A 1985 graduate of Ruidoso High School, Pearson attended Texas Tech University for a year before finishing his education at the University of New Mexico.


He has been living in Jacksonville, Fla., where he has worked for IBM subcontractor Information Display Systems, which provides computer networking support at professional sporting events.

Charter to boost TV rates

Company says rising operating costs, \$8 million upgrade led to 23% hike

Customers of Charter Communications taking the basic video service package will see their rates increase by about 23 percent starting Dec. 1.

In a letter to customers dated Oct. 26, Charter general manager Bill Mason wrote that the price of basic service will go up \$7.99 per month from \$35 to \$42.99. With taxes and fees for its franchise, for the Federal Communication Commission and copyrights, a monthly bill in Ruidoso will add up to about \$47, according to a company spokesman. Basic service covers 50 channels.

Charter serves about 8,000 customers in Ruidoso and another 300 each in Capitan and Carrizozo. Basic service customers in the two outlying villages now pay \$30.59 per month. Because they don't receive as many channels as Ruidoso, they will pay \$32.99 under the increase, the spokesman said.

Not affected are subscribers with long-term agreements for digital service, who will see only a slight adjustment in copyright fees until their arrangements expire, Mason wrote.

Although local residents are complaining to village council members about the rate increase, the council abdicated its rate approval power several years ago.

Mason said the hike is necessary because of steadily increasing operating costs, such as programming. The company also has spent nearly \$8 million upgrading its network to provide quality pictures and reliability, he wrote.

"We know you have a choice for video entertainment, so we want to continue to earn your business."

One of those choices is offered by Mountain Communications, headed by Rick Volquardsen.

"We're definitely an alternative," he said Thursday.

The company offers several different promotions for all pocketbooks.

"One that's very timely right now is that if you present a cable bill, we'll give you \$100 off the normal \$199 plus tax start-up charge for equipment and installation. The monthly charge is \$9 per month for one year," he said.

Other options include leasing the satellite equipment, he said.

Volquardsen said that his company is interested in buying out Charter in the Ruidoso area. He'd like to see the service owned locally again, he said.

His father, Fred Volquardsen, started cable in Ruidoso, Capitan, Carrizozo and Tularosa years ago, he said.

Several other companies also are listed in the Yellow Pages as selling satellite services.

Developers downsize affordable housing plan

A development plan originally proposed to have half its 150 apartments designated as affordable housing has been revised to have only 20 percent set aside as affordable.

Ruidoso village council members learned this week.

That means the Grindstone Canyon apartment complex will have 30 "affordable" units and 120 at market price, said Dan Stanger of the former CDS, now Bridge Partners.

Stanger told council members at their regular meeting Tuesday the change was made because original plans would have eliminated prospective tenants who make more than the \$14,900.

Therefore, if a household has two incomes of \$14,900 they would not qualify for the

affordable housing units.

The income range is based on the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development median income level for Ruidoso.

Mayor Robert Donaldson said the HUD median incomes will increase by the time the complex is built.

"The resort communities don't fit the normal guidelines for the tax credits," Donaldson said. Once affordable housing is built, more employees will be attracted to Ruidoso, he said.

Sale of Ruidoso Care Center delayed by employee, patient concerns

Closing the sale of the Ruidoso Care Center may take until Dec. 1, says a spokesman for the local non-profit group buying the facility on Resort Drive.

Protection of patients and employees remain two main thrusts of contract negotiations, Steve Kreins said Thursday.

"Obviously, we didn't close Nov. 1 as we had hoped," he said of the deal between Integrated Health Services Inc. and the newly formed

Lincoln County Care Center Inc. "Everything is going fine, but we'd rather do it right than do it fast. Our primary concern is the rights of the patients and of the employees."

Job security for employees and being able to keep those who want to stay in Ruidoso at the center is a focus, Kreins said. Written confirmations also must follow verbal assurances that all inspections are complete, such as structural, environmental and licensing, he said.

"We should have all of that within the next few days," he said.

Ruth Wade is expected to stay on as adminis-

trator of the center, although she remains an IHS employee until the deal is closed, he said.

New patients are being admitted following the lifting of a freeze, but only one of eight patients referred to other facilities after IHS officials said the center would close, has returned, he said.

"From what we understand, all who transferred want to come back," Kreins said.


Initially, IHS announced only the skilled care and Alzheimer's units were targeted for closing. By the time company officials said the entire center would shut down, people in the community had rallied an effort to buy the facility and keep it opened. Kreins credited Vaunda King, who has a relative at the center, with raising community awareness and instigating the effort to keep the center open.

"If it wasn't for her, the center would be closed by now," he said.



Judge rules against rancher

Rancher Gerald Ford and two of his employees had sought to stop the reconstruction of U.S. Highway 70 by filing a federal lawsuit against the Federal Highway Administration.

A U.S. District Court judge ruled Tuesday that rancher Gerald Ford failed to prove his case against the Federal Highway Administration. Ford and two of his ranch employees sued the district administrator of the federal agency in early summer in an effort to stop a reconstruction project on U.S. Highway 70.

Ford contended that the FHA did not properly conduct the required environmental review of the project.

Judge Leroy Hanson in federal court in Albuquerque issued a verbal ruling from the bench saying Ford did not provide the facts to prove his case, said Steve Bunch, assistant general counsel with the state Highway and Transportation Department.

Although only the federal agency was sued, based on the application of the national environmental review rules, the state cooperated with the U.S. Attorney's office because the highway agency is handling the U.S. 70 project.

"The project is paid for primarily with federal dollars, but the FHA contracts with us," Bunch said.

The judge said he will issue a written opinion later.

The Ford suit was the only legal action standing in the way of the project at this point, Bunch said.

The first phase is under construction from Roswell to Riverside. A final decision has not been issued on the second phase, 38 miles west from Riverside to Ruidoso Downs.

However, the project consultant and department staff have recommended expanding the scenic but often deadly two-lane highway to four lanes. The State Highway Commission recently approved the issuance of \$95 million in bonds to pay for the project.

Ford and his attorney could not be reached for comment Thursday.

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Mescalero election Tuesday

Incumbent tribal president Sara Misquez faces challenger Mark Chino, son of the late Wendell Chino, who led the tribe for more than 40 years.

Voters on the Mescalero Apache Reservation will go to the polls Tuesday to elect a president, vice president and four members of the tribal council.

The race for president pits incumbent Sara Misquez against challenger Mark Chino.

Misquez for many years worked as administrative assistant to the late Wendell Chino, who led the tribe for

more than 40 years. She stepped in as president after the removal of Paul Ortega, who was vice president when Chino died in November 1998. She subsequently was elected to the presidential post.

Mark Chino, who has spent his career in law enforcement, is the son of Wendell Chino and this is his second run for office.

No matter who wins the position of vice president, he will be a new face for that title. Incumbent council member Arthur "Butch" Blazer will face off with Ferris Palmer, former tribal administrator.

Incumbent Frederick Chino Sr. lost his bid for president in the primary and

did not seek reelection for vice president.

Eight people are running for four seats on the council. The incumbents are Gregory Mendez, Sandra Platero, Berle Kanseah and Christie La Paz.

They are being challenged by former council member Raymond Kirgan, school board chairman Michaelene Ahidley, forestry worker Joseph Geronimo and Thora Padilla, who heads the resource management and protection office for the tribe.

In the primary, 914 valid ballots were cast.

About 3,000 people live on the reservation that lies within Otero County, but abuts Ruidoso in Lincoln County.

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

Council supports assisted-living center

A planned project near Midtown nears reality

Score one for the old folks. Those residents who wanted to keep an assisted-living complex out of their Grindstone-Wingfield neighborhood lost an appeal to the Ruidoso Village Council last week. That means the Oregon-based developer of a planned 84-unit facility can apply for a building permit, and possibly break ground before the end of November. It's possible to sympathize with area neighbors, but the fact is Baby Boomers everywhere are approaching retirement age, and many of them, and some of their still-living parents, are seeking an inde-

pendent nesting place. That is the idea behind assisted-living centers — comfortable, safe, apartments in which men and women, still active and capable, can live independently, with assurance that there is help if necessary. When the council unanimously supported the facility last week, spontaneous applause broke out among local supporters. Among them were people who said they hope to remain in their hometown, and not be forced to move elsewhere seeking a similar facility when help became necessary. Now they won't have to.

Putting the drama in Byzantine perspective

We've been fascinated by perspective — that art-word describing the appearance of things from a given point — ever since the time in the fifth grade when we tried to draw a picture of railroad tracks appearing to recede in the distance.

We were reminded of that difficult concept this week as we flipped through the November issue of New Mexico Business Journal, and on page 44 found a picture of the old Dowlin Mill, the "Ruidoso birthplace" that Carmon Phillips revived far back in the prior century and turned into a picturesque tourist attraction. The perspective we noticed in that magazine — a color photograph of the mill and its waterwheel made from a low angle, with a wide-angle camera lens, and some sunflowers just inches from the lens — created an image much more appealing than the rather mundane old building striving to keep from being shaken by the thundering traffic on Sudderth Drive.

(Lynn Kidder of Ruidoso probably took the picture; it's her name on the accompanying article called "No Longer a State Secret," and the article admiringly expounds on Ruidoso's growth and dynamic prospects.)

That photograph reminded us of another image we saw the other night, one made from the orbiting International Space Station about midday on Sept. 11.

That perspective depicted a large piece of New York and New Jersey, with a vast plume of smoke sailing across Long Island from the tip of Manhattan. Nothing better illustrated the scope of the disaster at the World Trade Center, apparently wrought by one Osama bin Laden. And, thinking of that particular individual of Arabic descent, we began to reflect on an established — but now little used — art technique called (and this is somehow appropriate) Byzantine Perspective.

That, we recall reading somewhere, is the name given to a kind of art created primarily in the Middle Ages, and particularly in the Arab world. It was a time when only the royal were subjects of artistic depiction. Most artists being quite adept at flattering their subjects, the convention was established that if lesser mortals must be included in the picture, they were of much smaller stature.

In other words, the picture's perspective was determined based upon "importance." Any touch of worldly perspective was purely by accident. As we pursued this thought a little farther into the land of fantasy, we could imagine a Byzantine portrait of an American president and an Arabian terrorist on the cover of Time Magazine come December.

We just haven't figured out yet which the Time editors will make larger, and which smaller.

Car seats for children



RUIDOSO NEWS STAFF WRITER

A report recommending corrective measures at the headwaters of the Ruidoso River to reduce erosion and silting of the stream may be the basis of projects next spring.

Representatives of three entities working to improve conditions plan to use the winter to gather additional information, meet environmental requirements, put a dollar figure next to the work and decide which recommendations to tackle first.

Danny Glover, who heads the snow-making operation at Ski Apache managed by the Mescalero Apache Tribe primarily on land owned by the U.S. Forest Service, said some of the recommendations may not be physically or financially feasible.

Since the Apache Bowl area of the mountain blew out a few years ago with heavy flooding, he's instituted several improvements, he said. Other points farther down stream from the resort also contribute

significant amounts of silt, he said.

Richard Carlson, in charge of recreation lands within the Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest, said time is needed to get together with representatives of the tribe, the service and the Ruidoso River Association.

The report prepared by Basin Hydrology of Park City, Utah, for the federal agency, focused on Ski Apache watershed improvement and management.

The authors wrote that the basic approach to watershed stabilization is to maximize its ability to allow infiltration and to reduce runoff through good vegetative coverage, to disperse water from high runoff areas into low runoff areas, to prevent channels from coming into contact with eroding or sloughing areas and to trap sediment before runoff enters a stream channel.

"This approach to watershed restoration relies on natural processes to reduce accelerated runoff and associated erosion," they wrote. "This in turn provides benefits to downstream waters and reduces long-term maintenance costs."

They noted that Ski Apache management continues to implement drainage and erosion control measures as part

of its general operation. But some of the measures are only partially effective while others have prevented a much larger problem from developing in the watershed, they wrote.

The study included a map with dozens of points highlighted where work is being proposed.

Recommendations include that:

- An aggressive revegetation program be implemented.
- Water bars or rolling dips in high traffic areas should be installed and directed into forested areas where possible.
- A series of small retention ponds and other erosion control devices should be installed.

Three years ago, the river association was awarded a \$200,000 Clean Water Act

grant to restore a degraded Rio Ruidoso back to its historic designation of a high-quality cold water fishery, explained Dick Wisner, executive director of the association.

He identified the two main problems as:

- Low stream flow that damaged the fish population and that was aggravated by diversions into Grindstone

Reservoir until a new timetable was worked out with the village of Ruidoso.

"Too much sediment was entering the river.

Solving the second problem is more elusive, he said.

"Ultimately this sediment loading was traced to the North Fork of the river and then on to several specific areas of erosion on the Ski Apache resort," Wisner said, adding that an old Chinese proverb says "To fix a river, you must fix the mountain first."

The Forest Service, the association and the tribe joined in arranging the study paid for by the association with money from the state Environment Department.

"The plan offers specific mitigation for each of the problem areas, especially the Deep Freeze ski run, the parking lot and the sediment ponds," Wisner said. "Happily, all parties are now working constructively together to determine exactly how to implement the plan and how to pay for the work, which won't be cheap."

The first step is to meet all environmental requirements such as surveying cultural resources and for the Endangered Species Act, he said. That's currently out for bid.

Former councilor calls for required tree removal

■ Village urban forester Rick Delaco said he is not ready to support former councilor Al Junge's suggestion for mandatory tree removal.

A former village council member is calling for Ruidoso officials to mandate that residents thin trees on their home and commercial tracts.

"To remove the forest fire peril on all properties within the village limits will require mandating," Al Junge wrote the Ruidoso Wildland Urban Interface Group in a letter read during a meeting Tuesday.

Delaco could be costly and deadly, he contended.

"Unless the village is willing

to take action against the non-conforming, the entire forest thinning plan, paid for by the government, will be lost and the homeowners of Ruidoso will be the losers," Junge wrote.

He asked Ruidoso urban forester Rick Delaco to start working with village administration to develop the steps necessary to implement mandated thinning. One of the ways might be to include standards for trees per lot as part of building permits when they are purchased, he has suggested.

But Delaco said he's not

ready to recommend mandated thinning.

"As far as the village working on municipal property, what we accomplish is a good example to show what can be done," he said. "This group is not in a position to dictate to members how to go about the business to get it done. This group is to help secure financial assistance and offer technical advice."

He is investigating how other communities manage consistent thinning and will get back to the village council with a recommendation,

Delaco said.

But Junge contended that hoping to secure compliance "by example" doesn't make sense.

Delaco countered that if the village moved ahead and cleared where owners were not willing to do the work, liens would have to be filed to collect the money, "and there would be a lot of liens out there."

Many issues must be resolved before any compliance program can be instituted, he said. Meanwhile, residents are being encouraged to get involved on projects supple-

mented with government money.

Barbara Luna, who heads the Capitan district of the state Forestry Division, said, "We're finding that a lot of absentee land owners are interested in thinning their trees. They read about it in the newspaper and it's amazing how many are calling us. It blew the theory that absentee land owners are not interested."

The overall goal should be a partnership of private and public, "not that government is the hero and residents the victims," Delaco said.





MEET BILL TUCKER

After 18 years as a volunteer, a retired grocery store owner receives the Lincoln National Forest supervisor's

honor award

Bill Tucker was retiring from the grocery business and wanted something to do, but he wasn't sure what. Camping one day in the Eagle Creek area, he saw his old friend, Ira Caster.

"The way I remembered Ira, he was always dressed in a suit, walking around with a briefcase and very business-like," Tucker said. "Then, here he was taking his time, talking to people, enjoying the outdoors. I said, 'this is what I want to do.'"

Caster was one of the many seasonal employees of the Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest.

It took Tucker two years for a position to open up, but for the past 18 years, he's worked as a temporary employee in fire prevention at South Fork Campground and Bonito Lake.

Recently, Tucker, 67, was the recipient of the Regional Forester's Honor Award for his outstanding service to the district.

Matt Reidy, fire management officer for the district, explained that Tucker, along with Caster, who still works in the Eagle Creek area, is responsible for changing signs that alert forest users to the current level of fire danger and prevailing restrictions.

"As the seasons change, the signs also change," Reidy said. "They go out and meet and greet folks, especially if there are changes in restrictions. They make sure people are aware of the fire danger and rules."

"They check for compliance on firewood collection and ensure people stay within designated areas and don't venture on closed roads."

The district employs from 40 to 50 temporary employees each year, varying

from high school students to retirees, Reidy said.

Seasonal employees are hired usually for a six-month period, he said. "They are folks we use to supplement our work force. They're all different ages. We get people who work on the wildlife crews and are college students, folks who work fire and fuels management that are out of either college or high school."

"We don't hire very many college students for that because our fire seasons start in April and most of those folks still are in school."

The recreation officer hires high school students, ages 16 to 19 under the Youth Conservation Corps, he said.

Usually two different crews are put together to work on trail construction and wildlife habitat improvement projects. Different professionals in the district also take them out on educational sessions focused on forest and wildlife management, he said.

Some retirees are hired to man water towers.

Fire and fuels management includes employees who work on the district's fire engines, on fire suppression, thinning projects and are members of the Hot Shots, a wild land fire fighting group.

"This year, we had a six-person suppression and fuels crew," Reidy said. "They were thinning, chipping trees and slash, fighting fire and doing prescribed burning."

Other crews may remove hazardous trees from campgrounds when not tending district engines or fighting fires.

Volunteers offer another valuable resource to the district, Reidy said. They act as camp hosts at South Fork near Bonito lake and at the revamped Oak Grove on Ski Run Road.

Other volunteers come in and do trail work, such as the Boy Scouts and equestrian groups, he said.

Persons or groups who want to volunteer should contact Richard Carlson, recreation lands officers, at the district office on Mechem Drive and Cedar Creek Road.

Those who want to work as temporary employees should pick up an application package at the same office. The packets are available now. They need to be filled out and mailed this month, Reidy said.

The service rates the applications, and in January districts submit their request for names.

"They will send them to us with the applications," Reidy said. "We'll review them and start job interviews."

For Tucker, his years with the Forest Service have fit his personality and schedule perfectly.

After spending most of his life in the grocery business - starting with his father's business and then opening his own store in 1960 in Tularosa - he was looking for a change when he sold 20 years ago.

"I always worked with the public," he said. "I enjoy people, visiting and talking with them."

Over the past 18 years, Tucker said the number of people using the forest has increased dramatically along with their manners.

"People are more inclined to pick up all of their trash and keep things clean," he said.

When not in Ruidoso, where his wife, Veda, was born, the couple spends five months a year on the west coast of Mexico.

But unlike a "regular" job, when he comes back in the summer, life is literally a picnic everyday, he said, adding, "I pack my lunch and when it's time to eat, I pick a table under a tree and enjoy the view."

REPORTING FROM THE ORIGINAL WAR ZONE

I stayed two nights in Connecticut with a very good friend of mine. On Friday, three days after the WTC tragedy, I went back to Greta's boss' home/office

and retrieved the bicycle I had rented the day of the tragedy. In a cold rain (could I expect anything less?), I began the long ride from the upper west side to my apartment next to Ground Zero. Just down the street, I pulled onto the sidewalk and entered a beauty salon to ask for a couple of garbage bags to use as protection from the moisture. The people in the shop were very sweet and gave me a couple of black Glad bags. The only problem then was that my hands were soon numb -- but who's complaining?

The bike shop from which I had rented

the bike was closed (can't imagine business is very good for renting bikes to tourists right now), so I simply continued on my way south to the apartment.

The next stop was Pier 40, which was supposedly the only place for residents of apartments south of Canal Street (about a mile or so north from my apartment; in other words, deep down in no man's land). In the building that is Pier 40 were dozens of people signing releases to allow PETA and other agencies to retrieve their pets from their apartments. According to every authority there, no one was being allowed

past Canal.

I hopped back on the bike and rode right up to a military blockade. They told me - in no uncertain terms - to turn around and go back where I had come from. I saw a procession of fire trucks slowly heading down the West Side Highway, so I simply cut in between several of them, and - as I nonchalantly rode along - was waived through the barricade. But just a hundred yards further, I was stopped again. I showed the man my

The shape of the recession

With September data finally available and this week's rush of October data, we can finally start gauging in a meaningful way the impact of Sept. 11th's horrific attack.

The data shows that airlines suffered a 31 percent drop in airline passenger miles compared to September of 2000. Logically, this 31 percent drop in air travel could be applied to most of the other sectors of the travel industry such as hotel and restaurants.

Likewise, the large 8.5 percent drop in September's durable goods orders exceeded the consensus estimate by a large margin. Without a doubt, there will be a contraction in the third quarter's GDP of approximately 0.9 percent. Given the slow start in October, the most likely scenario calls for a larger contraction in the 2.8 percent range in the fourth quarter.

So what type of recession are we facing? The fundamental economic conditions and government's fiscal and monetary policies point to a mild recession even given the uncertainty in the progress of the war on terrorism. The following elements support this outlook.

Corporate profits have already taken a hit with the economy slowing even prior to the attacks. The growth in taxable corporate profits had slowed during the last couple of years compared to early 1990s.

It is too soon to be absolutely certain, but the most recent monetary policy and stimulus package should result in a profit recession more like the 1990-91 recession than the recessions of the early 1980s. The U.S. economy will benefit from the fact that we have lower unemployment at this point of the recession than we had entering any of the last three recessions. At the start of the recession in 1990 the economy was already coping with an unemployment rate of 6.1 percent versus the current 4.9 percent through September.

At the current level of the U.S. labor force, this amounts to an additional 1.6 million

additional employed workers producing and spending. These additional paychecks will also help offset some of the concerns about the low savings rate going into this recession.

Another key to the shape and duration of the recession is the change in personal consumption expenditures. In most recessions, the PCE experiences a brief but sharp contraction. Our current expectations are for a 1.5 percent contraction in the preliminary estimates for the third quarter PCE. Most of the drop in consumption will come from durable and non-durable goods sales.

Automotive sales have already shown signs of softening, but with the aggressive zero percent financing October sales appear to be holding steady. Likewise, furniture and home furnishings represent another major category that has been helped by the strength in new and existing home sales. Low mortgage rates will offset some of the reluctance to buy as job losses become a bigger factor. It is most likely that existing and new home sales will fall by 5 to 10 percent over the next couple of quarters, and this will reduce the corresponding sales in furniture and furnishings.

This combination will present one of the bigger hurdles for complete economic recovery.

However, services have been the prime driver of economic growth since the 1980s with strong emphasis on education and medical services. Services now account for the employment of more than 82 percent of the workforce. Additionally, services have proven to be more stable than consumer goods. This stability will help minimize and shorten this recession.

Food and furniture combine to create a market niche

Clare Bay Trading Company combines dining and home furnishings in a fashion that blurs the boundaries of traditional fine dining by allowing diners free reign of the store.

It is a new concept in Ruidoso, and perhaps in much of the nation.

Owners John and Dolores Lamb lived and worked in Clare Bay, Ireland, while John worked for a European government commission. Lamb developed the idea for the Ruidoso Clare Bay while working for furniture companies and looking at their strengths and weaknesses.

Lamb said he has seen only one other company that incorporated two different ideas, ABC Carpet in New York City. The reason the business works is because it's the way people live; people don't compartmentalize their lives but instead the edges are blurred, he said.

"People take a park bench and put it inside," Lamb said.

Customers who come into Clare Bay can have a glass of wine while sitting in one of the furniture displays. It's an informal approach to fine dining.

Lamb said they wanted to be different from other businesses in the community. "We weren't interested in being direct competitors," Lamb said. But at the same time, they wanted to focus on the local community and treat the tourism business as a plus.

"Dolores and I enjoy dining out, so it's a great combination," Lamb said.

The store focuses on four aspects of living — home furnishings, decorative accessories, gourmet food gift items for at-home dining, and fine restaurant dining.

Clare Bay features fusion cooking, a combination of different tastes, Lamb said. Originally the restaurant offered a "tapas" menu, meaning diners would order two or more dishes and share, but the menu has expanded to entrees from all over the world.

The furnishings featured at Clare Bay are from 35 different manufacturers and include many different styles from country French to early American. The home furnishing business requires much advertising Lamb said, but the dining aspect allows people to come in once a month and notice the different displays.

Clare Bay is currently searching for a new chef and

has received more than 60 applications, and will re-open when one is chosen, Lamb said.

The home furnishing side is still open, but business has slowed down since the closure of the restaurant in mid-September. "The furniture part is still profiting," Lamb said.

Clare Bay received the HnZhn' Ze Beautification Award in June from the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

The Lambs have lived in Alto for six years, and Lamb does product and marketing development for furniture companies in El Paso.

Agricultural Outlook

Weak farm economy aids urban sprawl

Farmers in Fayette County, Tenn., liked living within an hour's drive of Memphis. That was before urban sprawl threatened the rural character of this largely agricultural county. The story is much the same in any rural county near a thriving urban area, and now a weak farm economy and strong housing market are adding to the problem.

Standing in his cotton field near Somerville, Tenn., Fayette County Farm Bureau President Willie German says, "Land has become so valuable for development that it's really put a strain on the farmers to be able to produce a \$200 an acre crop versus selling the land for \$8,000 or \$10,000."

Some farmers have found that a pretty easy decision to make. As a result, housing developments are

starting to replace cotton fields and cattle pastures. "I think the ag economy is really hurting us now, because there are a lot of folks who wouldn't have sold their land if they could have made a living off the farm," says German.

For developers and growth-minded politicians, the weak farm economy is a strong ally. At a ribbon-cutting ceremony, Fayette County's mayor was reported to have said, "Many people do not realize that this is no longer an agricultural community. It has changed. Farmers are losing money."

When the Fayette County Review newspaper asked the mayor about his remarks, he conceded that agriculture is the county's largest industry, but he wasn't betting on its future.

Ironically, it is the rural heritage that makes the county so attractive. People like

pastured cattle, white-speckled cotton fields, rolling hills and back roads. If farming goes away, scenic value goes with it. Even many newcomers understand this.

The Committee to Protect Fayette County's Rural Heritage and the Farm Bureau are opposing a 20-year plan supported by the county mayor that would place all rural land in a "planned growth area" category — making it ripe for housing development. Harris Armour is a farmer who is a member of the rural heritage committee and a Farm Bureau board member. He wants the county to retain its rural character but realizes how difficult that can be.

"It's been hard and there will be some farmers I'm sure that won't farm next year, and of course they are going to be relying on their land as a source of income," says Armour. A growth plan that is

too restrictive could impede farmers who want to sell. A plan that brings too much development forces farmers to sell because it leads to more regulations on farming and higher property taxes.

Armour hopes for a compromise on the growth issues in Fayette County that will not be shortsighted. An improved farm economy would strengthen agriculture's hand here and across the country, and it's not just farmers who will benefit. "We all leave our record on the land whether you are farming or whether you are in the city," says Armour. "I just feel it is important that we leave a record that is worth reading. We need some open land and we need production agriculture."

Tours give kids a first-hand look at agriculture

Nearly 1,300 students from Valencia, Socorro and Bernalillo counties attended the October tours this year.

LOS LUNAS — Mike English, superintendent of New Mexico State University's Agricultural Science Center at Los Lunas, held up some freshly picked red and green chile pods in front of about 50 elementary school students one morning in late October.

"We're the only state in the nation with an official state question," he boomed, rows of chile, cotton and corn stretching out behind him. "Anybody know what that is?"

"Red or green," came a chorus-like reply from the students, all seated on a low-rider truck with bales of hay that served as a makeshift outdoor classroom.

"That's right, and it's all about chile, which is an important agricultural crop in New Mexico," English replied.

The students, fifth- and sixth-graders from Daniel Fernandez Intermediate School in Los Lunas, were participating in one of about two dozen tours that the science center

offered during October.

Nearly 1,300 students attended from elementary schools in Valencia, Socorro and Bernalillo counties.

The center began offering the annual tours in 1998 to give children a fun, hands-on lesson in agriculture.

"The main thing is just to let them know where their food comes from, that milk is not just from the grocery store and

that blue corn tortillas come from blue corn," English said. "Kids today have virtually no contact with farms, and this gives them a basic understanding of, and, hopefully, an appreciation for agriculture and plant sciences."

The kids take a hayride around the farm, with stops at research plots and other sites. They learn about crops like alfalfa, chile, and corn, and

they visit the center's cottonwood production area to hear about tree planting and stream bank restoration. They also learn about weather's importance to agriculture at the weather monitoring station, and they get a lengthy introduction to entomology.

"I'm an entomologist by training, so I go into some depth with them about insects and the insect world," English

said. "We have portable show-cases with lots of bugs. They really like that, and it helps make the lesson stick in their minds."

The tour concludes in a cornfield, where the children pick popcorn off stalks and then walk through a 1.5-acre field maze.

"The walk through the cornfield and maze gives them a real opportunity to touch and

feel, which is the way kids at this age learn best," English said.

Fifth-grade teacher Mary Ann Chavez from Los Lunas, whose classes tour the farm every year, says the field trip complements classroom learning.

"It reinforces what I teach them at school," Chavez said. "Right now we're studying plants and seeds and the process of all this, so it's a great hands-on learning experience to accompany the curriculum."

The children agree. "I learned about corn and vegetables and how to plant trees," said fifth-grader Natashia Bryant. "And they showed us a whole lot of bugs. I really like this place."

Forest insects: Pests or partners?

CORVALLIS, Ore. — The massive insect epidemics that have plagued Pacific Northwest forests in recent years are mostly a reflection of poor forest health conditions, overcrowding, overuse of chemicals, fire suppression and introduction of monocultures or non-native species, a new report concludes.

Beyond that, these insect attacks are actually nature's mechanism to help restore forest health on a long-term basis and in many cases should be allowed to run their course, according to Oregon State University scientists in a new study published this week in the journal Conservation Biology In Practice.

Native insects work to thin trees, control crowding, reduce stress and lessen competition for water and nutrients, the researchers found. Some levels of insect herbivory, or plant-eating, may even be good for trees and forests, and in the long run produce as much or more tree growth.

"There is now evidence that in many cases forests are more healthy after an insect outbreak," said Tim Schowalter, an OSU professor of entomology. "The traditional view still is that forest insects are destructive, but we need a revolution in this way of thinking. The fact is we will

never resolve our problems with catastrophic fires or insect epidemics until we restore forest health, and in this battle insects may well be our ally, not our enemy."

Historically, Schowalter said, destructive forest insects such as the mountain pine beetle or tussock moth were native to Pacific Northwest forests and served an essential role in keeping them healthy. When trees became too crowded, the insects would eliminate weaker trees and reduce competition. But since the beetles' reproductive pheromones only carried effectively about 15-20 feet, naturally open stands of mature pines were protected against widespread outbreaks.

In these same forests today, fire suppression has allowed shade-tolerant, fire-intolerant species to crowd the understory, create an entire forest stressed for water and nutrients, and beetles can skip from one weak tree to another across entire stands. But the solution in cases such as this, Schowalter said, is to address the fundamental issue of overcrowding through forest thinning, controlled fire and insect attack, allowing the pine beetles to actually help in the long-term process of restoring forest health.

Compress the swollen area with a bandage. Begin the wrap at the toes and continue it up about four inches above the ankle. Do not wrap it so tightly that it causes more pain or cuts off circulation to your toes.

Extraordinary, poignant

and hilarious, her tale begins in obscurity and rises to international fame as Brice becomes one of the most celebrated comedienne of American musical theater for more than 25 years.

Produced by Mainstage Artists (which previously brought "Hello! Dolly" and "Crazy For You" to the Spencer stage), all the splendor of the Ziegfeld Follies is recreated, as is Brice's private life; her dauntless determination and personal angst is shared in a tuneful score by Tony Award winner Jule Styne. Memorable songs, such as People, Don't Rain on My Parade, Who Are You Now and Rat-Tat-Tat-Tat, first made famous by Barbra Streisand in the original 1967 stage version, blend humor and heartbreak at a pace the audience will remember long after the lights go down.

Just four days later, on Wednesday, "Ragtime" lyrically sings out the immigrant odyssey that lies at the core of America's greatness.

Based on the best-selling novel by E.L. Doctorow, this inspired story of innocence lost and freedom won is the winner of four 1998 Tony Awards. It is an epic and emotional drama of three remarkable families — one upper-middle class white, one socialist immigrant Jewish and one Harlem black — whose dramatic lives intertwine with one another and with such legendary characters as Harry Houdini, Henry Ford, J.P. Morgan and Emma Goldman.

Doctorow clearly understood as he wrote his novel that historical fiction should not only depict the real-life characters but also probe the effects of the age on vividly realized fictional Protestant, Jewish and African-American families.

Just as ragtime music cre-

ates tension through its syncopated rhythms, the musical sensation "Ragtime" (with a book by playwright Terrence McNally and a score by Lynn Ahrens and Stephen Flaherty) portrays the nature of change and class upheaval through contrasting cultures.

Time called it, "The number one theatrical event of the year: A brilliant work of musical storytelling, social comment and canny staging that marks a glorious culmination for the American musical at the end of its first century."

Photo competition starting at Hubbard

The 10th Annual Fall American Photographic Competition opens at the Hubbard Museum of the American West with a reception for museum members today from 6 to 8 p.m. and Saturday for the general public.

An "American West" category has been added this year to the categories of landscape, architecture, people and an open category, and the museum will make a purchase award for the permanent collection.

This show draws photographers from all over the United States and Mexico, said Leland DeFord, assistant curator for the museum.

"This is the largest show we've put on," DeFord said.

Last year, 160 photographs were juried into the show, while this year 220 photographs were accepted, representing the work of 70 photographers.

The photographs were juried by National Geographic photographer David Buckley. In Lincoln County, 29 photographers submitted

photographs and 24 were selection for the exhibition.

"It was such high quality of work that it was very difficult for the juror to eliminate a lot of work," DeFord said. "That's an increase of 60 works, or about a 40 percent larger show this year."

The Fall American Photographic Competition originally was under the umbrella of the All American Festival in August, ending on Labor Day with the All American Futurity, DeFord said, but the show became so large and popular that it earned its own time slot about five years ago.

"It's an extremely diverse group of photographers and photographic work this year, which combines black and white, color and a lot of digital work," he said. "There was much more digital work and of a very high quality. Differentiating between a digital print and one that was produced in a traditional darkroom is very difficult."

This is the first year for international submissions to the competition, with those from Mexico.


13 Ghosts

'Out of the fast lane'

Carrizozo artist Fred Lafave came home to get away from it all

Fred Lafave has been drawing since he was a toddler in Carrizozo, a town he describes as like a Norman Rockwell painting with its movie theater, two drugstores and the school "unbeaten state football champions."

His mother supported his interest and bought him painting sets, and when he was 10 and won a partial scholarship for commercial art instruction, she urged him to apply himself. Later, at the University of New Mexico, he began learning the history of art and was taken by the impressionist, surrealist and cubist artists. This affinity is evident in many of his paintings, with their Picasso-like elements of intersecting lines and values.

In the 1970s, Lafave studied Eastern philosophies and began painting and writing during meditations, he said. "Automatic writing" was one of the practices of the Surrealist Manifesto of the 1930s, and Lafave incorporated it into his own creative expressions.

"Every time I do one of these, it's surprising," he said. "I like the way it comes out with the flow of consciousness."

But he also likes to paint the concrete world around him, and goes through cycles of painting portraits and landscapes.

"One feeds the other," he said. "I may spend a month painting landscapes, people and situations and the next month I may feel a need to get into this other side and get into automatic painting."

Lafave works out of his living room, having found

that when he had a separate room for a studio, he didn't want to use it, or would enter it to discover that his inspiration had departed.

Although he displayed his work in galleries in Albuquerque in the '70s, he left art behind, pursuing a career in cable television there and in California, until he moved back to Carrizozo in 1992 — "to get out of the fast lane," he said. "I

kind of had lost the drive to be an artist in a sense. I was pursuing 'Let's climb the corporate ladder' and all that turmoil."

Since his return, he's gotten back into painting and music and has built up a sizable portfolio of paintings, while painting statues for McGary and pottery for Earthly Greens. His paintings can be seen at Carrizozo Joe's or by appointment by calling 491-9955.






Halloween Craft Project: Get 24

Death takes a holiday

Part I

Aright, already — so I took some liberties with the title of this article. Sue me. I confess that it was just too much of a temptation not to borrow the title of an old 1930s film that starred Frederic March, and had, I thought, a title with a real ring to it.

It was about the Angel of Death taking a vacation. For those of you familiar only with more modern fare, the recent (well, in the last few years) "Meet Joe Black," was a remake of the March film.

In the movie, Death takes a much-needed vacation (he *does* work hard, after all) and falls in love with a mortal. In the original film, at least, the plot included the twist that while Death is on holiday, no one dies, *anywhere*.

OK. By now, you must be wondering what any of this has to do with the Old West. I know I would. Here's the connection: Many, MANY writers have compared him to, or at least referred to John Wesley Hardin as Texas' Angel of Death. Considering Hardin's record as a man-killer, this is

an understandable conclusion. And, in 1874, three years before his capture, Hardin, along with his wife and daughter, went to Florida, on a, well, *sort of* vacation.

I admit that it wasn't the resort then that it is now, either. And Hardin *WAS* on the dodge, but still, he took his family to Florida. I lived in Florida for a time, and that was part of the reason that I initially became interested in his time there, which was not without its share of the sudden deaths that customarily surrounded John Wesley Hardin wherever he went.

But *no one in Texas died!* Well, at least by John Wesley's hands... like I said, I just liked the title, I never said I wasn't reaching for it.

It's a poor writer indeed who has to take four paragraphs just to explain

the headline to his audience. I'll be even more embarrassed if my editor should change the header without reading the story. Editors have been known to do that, you know. Of course, I know you wouldn't do that, would you Mike? Huh? Huh?

I'm babbling, but I really do have a story to tell and this is the part where I intend to get on with it (when I'm in babbling mode, I'm never really sure what will fall out of my head and onto the page — hence the desperate need for editors). For those of you unfortunate enough to have read this far, you may wish to point out to any subsequent readers that they should start reading with the subhead:

Everyone needs a vacation

For those familiar with the saga of John Wesley Hardin, it should come as no surprise to find that he managed to arrange a "police escort" for his wife and daughter to New Orleans. Wherever he went John Wesley Hardin charmed everyone, er, well nearly everyone. It's hard to say he charmed virtually everyone with some 40 or so dead men down his back trail. Surely they weren't impressed by his charm... But it really did seem that most people found his manners impeccable and his manner itself charming.

Hardin had his family sent to New Orleans where he met them so that they might continue his headlong flight from Texas as a family unit. He may have been a cold-blooded killer to some, but it was never any secret to anyone who knew him that he truly loved his wife and family. The man chosen to escort Hardin's wife Jane and daughter Mollie to New Orleans was Harry Swain, who was conveniently married to a cousin of Wes' named Jenny. He also happened to be the

chief of police at Brenham, Texas.

But what of that? Details, details...

Gainesville

After a week or so of sight-seeing in New Orleans, the Hardins took a steamboat to Cedar Key, Florida. There is an old hotel that is still in operation where the little family may have stayed for a night or so before continuing on into central Florida. Unfortunately, a fire destroyed most of the hotel records some years ago and even more unfortunately, another fire destroyed the records at Gainesville, the Hardins' first destination. It was there that Hardin purchased a business from a local man.

A phone call to that place some years ago revealed that the man who Hardin names in his autobiography as being the man from whom he bought the business — Sam Barnett — was Alachua County's first clerk-treasurer. It is doubtful that Barnett was aware of the true identity of the pleasant young man who called himself "J.H. Swain." The rewards on John Wesley's head were plentiful at that time, to say the least.

Wes refers to the place in his book as a "grocery business," and then adds, "— groceries and liquors." It's a good bet that "liquors" was the operative word. As luck would have it, on the very first morning he opened for business, two Texas cattlemen named Harper and McCulloch strolled into the "grocery" through what were undoubtedly batwing doors (in a grocery?). They recognized John Wesley instantly, as they had been personally acquainted with him on the cattle trail to Kansas. But their acquaintance with the young gunman had been pleasant and both men pledged to keep the secret of his new identity, as Hardin planned to

never return to Texas.

"Never," as anyone who has been around awhile will tell you, is about the biggest word in the English language.

It was less than a week before Hardin became involved in a violent incident. This time, he was on the side of law and order, although the lines have become a little hazy in the years since. According to John Wesley, his establishment had only been open for business for a few days when he was compelled, apparently by what he considered to be his civic duty, to come to the rescue of a local lawman who was under attack by a mob for his arrest of a black man.

Hardin, in his book, was smugly certain that the man was guilty of raping a "respectable white lady," and that whatever he got, he deserved. Wes' subsequent actions bore this point of view out. However, at this late date, it is virtually impossible to say whether or not Eli, the name of the unfortunate man who was charged with the crime, was truly guilty just as Hardin claimed. It was, as I said, the Reconstruction South...

Seeing the marshal besieged by the angry mob, the likeable young newcomer to Gainesville came out onto the sidewalk and asked the lawman if he needed assistance. In his book, written over a decade later, Hardin put these unlikely words into the man's mouth: "Yes, I summon you, Swain, to assist me in my legal duties." Yeah, right. I think we can all imagine the true nature of the marshal's "summons," right? Anyway, Hardin remembered this as being "about the 1st of May, 1874."

Again, according to Hardin, a "big black Negro" asked him what he had to do with it. Our Hero's somewhat-less-than-polite retort was to knock the

guy into the middle of next week. The next man to approach him got an even less pleasant response. Hardin shot him. He does not say whether or not the fellow died of his wounds in his book, but only mentions that "we landed that whole mob in jail, except the one I had knocked down and the one I had shot." Draw your own conclusions.

Then, Hardin gleefully goes on to announce that a few nights later, he, and what he refers to as a "band of vigilantes," but was obviously just another mob, went to the jail at midnight and burned it to the ground — and Eli along with it. He then proceeds to tell us how it was all put "a-right" by the coroner, who was a member of the mob.

Golly.

It is interesting to note that two months later — and Hardin had not left Florida — Texas newspapers were reporting him to be here, there, and everywhere. In August, according to the newspapers, John Wesley Hardin had been captured and incarcerated in Rusk County and Shreveport. He wasn't even in that part of the country, much less the states of Texas or Louisiana.

Micanopy and on to Jacksonville

In January of 1875, Hardin sold his saloon — sorry, grocery store — and relocated to Micanopy (pronounced Mick-un-opie), which is only about 18 miles away. (Want to see Micanopy? Check out the Michael J. Fox movie "Doc Hollywood" — it was filmed there). There, he traded in horseflesh, which had been a lifelong passion, and opened another saloon — another lifelong passion.

However, he sold out after only a few weeks, possibly getting nervous about the two

Texas cattlemen, their knowledge of his whereabouts, the rewards on his head, and the close proximity of Micanopy to Gainesville. He took Mollie and Jane, who was pregnant again, to Jacksonville, in the northeast corner of the state. Even then, Jacksonville was a resort town for northerners.


At Jacksonville, John Wesley Hardin became a butcher. (There are many who would say that he had already been in that business for years). He did not reopen another saloon. Hardin could be headstrong and foolish, but he was never stupid. Of all the businesses he could engage in, the saloon business was the one with the most potential for violence, for reasons that are obvious and for reasons which John Wesley was already intimately familiar. His wife Jane was also familiar with these facts, and she was already annoyed with Wes' habit of shooting those who irritated him. He didn't want, after all, to get in dUTch with the Little Woman.

Once again, at Jacksonville, Hardin's considerable charm held sway. One of his closest friends and associates in Jacksonville was a man named Gus Kennedy, who was a Jacksonville City Policeman. Everyone who met John Wesley Hardin was taken with him, and he is listed in the 1876-1877 Jacksonville City Directory as "Swaine, (sic) John. H. meat, City Market, h(ouse) 127 Pine (Street)." Wes does not appear in any later directories — and for good reasons, but because of space concerns, they are reasons that I will tell you about next week.
