Texas-New Mexico Power seeks 8.4% rate hike

■ Citing the loss of its largest customer, Phelps Dodge Corp.'s Chino Mines, and other factors, the utility is asking for its first increase in base rates since 1993.

While two other utility providers in Lincoln County are lowering their rates, Texas-New Mexico Power is asking for an increase of 8.4 percent. The actual impact on monthly residential bills would vary from 6 percent to about 8 percent, depending on usage, according to data supplied by the power company. Officials estimated an average increase of \$2.35 per month.

If granted, it would be the first hike in base rates since 1993. The power company serves 11,127 customers in

Lincoln County.

In a pamphlet sent out with recent bills, the power company notified customers that a rate increase application was submitted July 3 to the New Mexico Regulatory Commission.

But since that submission, several events have occurred impacting the process. They include the announced closure of Phelps Dodge Corp.'s copper mine near Silver City, which is Texas-New Mexico's largest customer in the state.

A spokesman for the state Public Regulatory Commission said originally commissioners assigned the case to hearing examiner Michael Barlow,

but then decided to hear it themselves. A mediator was assigned in the hope that a settlement could be reached. A schedule was set up, but dates may change, depending on the result of that effort.

In a fact sheet on the rate request supplied by local spokesman Jim Bassett, Texas-New Mexico officials stated that the company is not recovering its cost to serve customers under the existing rate structure. Although it will lose its major customer, TNMP doesn't have the option of curtailing operations to reduce its costs, officials say.

"The company has a legal obligation to serve customers, and can't meet that obligation if it's losing money," they stated. "That's why the pricing structure needs to be adjusted to recover actual costs."

The company is seeking additional revenues of \$6.4 million to be derived from its base rates, an increase of 8.43 percent from its test-year period ending Dec. 31, 2000. The proposed changes would affect all customer classifications.

Monthly bills for residential customers without demand meters using 250 kilowatt hours, now \$31.73, would increase to \$33.30 if the hike is granted.

Highway crash kills 6-year-old

Dead girl's brother hurt

A 6-year-old El Paso girl was killed Monday in a traffic crash on U.S. Highway 54 between Oscura and Carrizozo, police said.

The dead child's brother suffered a head laceration and was taken to Gerald Champion Hospital in Alamogordo.

State Police and the hospital would not release the children's names.

The children's father, Omar Marquez, was driving the vehicle with his wife and the two children as passengers.

The vehicle, a 1998 Plymouth, was travelling north when it drifted off the road.

Marquez over-compensated, causing the car to skid into the side of the mountain, according to police.

The four were not wearing seatbelts, police said.

A National Geographic television crew was in Ruidoso filming local doctor of naturopathy Pablo Falcon Saturday through Monday for a national series on taboos.

Show producer Pam Caragol said the 13-hour series will have segments from all over the world. The U.S. segment was filmed at Falcon's clinic in White Mountain Plaza and along a stream near Bonita Lake.

"I was looking for people who do interesting things that are taboo by society's standards and wanted to work with folks who were working past their barriers with healing techniques," Caragol said.

In Falcon's case, the practice of drinking urine for therapeutic purposes is the focus, and the producer interviewed two people to portray the views

of a "veteran" client of Falcon's and one new to the experience. The crew shot a healing session with Ruidoso resident Sue Russell near Bonita Lake.

Russell said she's never been a client of Falcon's and expressed trepidation about "the idea of returning discharge into functional matter," referring to the practice of drinking urine for therapeutic benefits.

Caragol said, "We're looking at the way he works with Native American practices, how he melds these with more modern practices, barriers he comes across working with people's attitudes of modern medicine, the leap of faith required to try something new and his knowledge as a healer. It's really fascinating to meet him in person."

Other subjects of the television series include death, marriage and sex. The segment on Falcon is part of the healers theme.

There is no air date yet for the series.

Rural road speed trap a quick fix

Troubles run deep in county

Drivers speeding up and down the hills on Juniper Springs Road may be surprised to find a Lincoln County deputy waiting for them around a curve.

"If they want to speed like that on a gravel road where two cars already have overturned, that's their business, but I don't want to meet them on the crest of a hill when they're in the middle," Loma Grande resident Patsy Hume said Tuesday.

Hume took her concerns about the road to the county commission last month. Contributing to the dangerous condition of the route is that over time and multiple grading procedures, it has narrowed to as little as 14 feet across in places, she said.

"I wanted to know if they could give me any relief," said the 24-year resident of the rural development on State Highway 37 east of Nogal.

Although commissioners pointed to \$58,000 spent on the road four years ago, they acknowledged that each time it is graded and ditches are worked on, the width has decreased.

"They didn't say no," Hume said. "I'm not unhappy. They will try to work on it the next time it's scheduled for regular grading and maybe do some additional work."

She also asked for a speed limit to be posted, but was told that enforcing speed laws on county roads is nearly impossible.

"There's also a liability issue if the county posts a speed limit sign," County Manager Tom Stewart said. By state law, the standard speed on unposted county roads is 35 mph.

In response to a request from Commission Chairman Rex Wilson, Undersheriff Rick Virden said he would try to schedule some deputies in the area.

"The long-term solution is to improve the road," Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said at the October board meeting. "We could make it a school bus route," which would make the road eligible for a financial cooperative project with the state.

Commissioner William Schwettmann said he's glad he won't be on the commission after another 15 months when his final term runs out, because the board "is just postponing the inevitable. This county will be facing a horrendous situation with roads."



Ruidosoans get postal caution

A notice received in the mail recently by nearly every resident of Lincoln County was sent from the postal service's Washington, D.C. headquarters. It was shotgunned all over the nation after reports that cases of inhalation and skin anthrax, caused by a bacterium, were dispersed in letters. They don't signal any particular threat in the local area, a spokesman for the Ruidoso Post Office said. "We've been lucky" and have received no calls from residents of contaminated letters or even mail that raised suspicions, he said. The one-piece, postcard-like notice lists things that should make people suspicious about a

piece of mail. They are:

- It is unexpected or from someone you don't know.
 - It's addressed to someone no longer at your address.
 - It's handwritten and has no return address or bears one that you can't confirm is legitimate.
 - It's lopsided or lumpy in appearance.
 - It's sealed with excessive amounts of tape.
 - It's marked with restrictive endorsements such as "personal" or "confidential."
 - It has excessive postage.
- The service advises anyone who is suspicious of a piece of mail not to handle the letter or package. Don't shake it, bump it or sniff it. They should wash their hands thoroughly with soap and water, and then noti-

fy local law enforcement authorities.

Meanwhile, a La Brea, Calif., company called Coast to Coast Safety is offering mail-room respiratory kits for biological terrorism response. A small \$9.95 kit is designed for single use when a suspicious letter or package needs to be checked out. A larger \$29.95 kit provides one employee a new mask and two pairs of gloves for each day over a one-month period. One set of safety glasses must be washed daily. 

Head-on crash hurts two

Jerry Jones, 45, was airlifted to University of New Mexico Hospital with serious injuries.

A Ruidoso man was in serious condition Tuesday in an Albuquerque hospital with injuries he suffered in a head-on crash on Paradise Canyon Road.

Jerry Glen Jones, 45, of Ruidoso was westbound Friday evening when his vehicle went off the road near the intersection of Foothill Road, causing the car to slide sideways, then crossing both lanes of traffic and striking a vehicle driven by Harvey

Bonnell, who was going east, police said.

Bonnell told police Jones was driving in excess of 40 mph when he spun off the road and then crashed into his truck. Bonnell was driving between 30 and 35 mph, he said.

Officer Dale Harrison found Jones lying on the ground directly across from the passenger door of his vehicle bleeding from the head, unconscious and having trouble breathing.

Both drivers were taken to Lincoln County Medical Center. Jones later was airlifted to University of New Mexico Hospital.

Ruidoso doctors said he suffered a possible concus-

sion, damaged liver and possible brain injury.

Bonnell may have fractured his sternum.

Jones was not wearing a seat belt and had four prior drunk-driving arrests, police said.

A blood sample was not taken at the hospital before Jones was airlifted because of time considerations, but police said an officer would be waiting to take one at UNM Hospital.

Criminal charges are pending further investigation.

Jones' vehicle was badly damaged on the front, passenger and rear sides of the vehicle. Bonnell's vehicle had heavy damage.

County slates special meeting to focus on grant application

Commissioners expected to apply for building health office in Ruidoso

A special meeting of the Lincoln County Commission Thursday will focus on the county's application for a Community Development Block Grant.

The meeting starts at 9 a.m. in the commission room of county courthouse in Carrizozo. The special meeting is required to meet the deadline to submit the application.

Commissioners are expected to approve an application for a \$250,000 grant to be used toward the construction of a separate building next to the existing county substation on Kansas City Street in Ruidoso.

Combined with a \$491,880 allocation from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, they plan to create a 4,096-square-foot space for the county public health office, which is operated by the state Health Department.

The staff of the public health office has asked for more space

several times over the past five years, citing the large clientele of multiple health-related programs that operate in the building.

If the new center is built, space would be vacated in the existing 2,400-square-foot building for a center for independent living for the disabled and possibly other programs.

In explaining the need for an independent living center, Debbie Raymond wrote that such centers are not residential programs, but are designed to empower those with all types of disabilities and to give them a chance to make decisions that affect their lives.

The independent living movement started in Berkeley, Calif. and New York City in the early 1970s. Amendments to the Rehabilitation Act of 1978 created the opportunity to start centers throughout the nation, she wrote.

Under the guidelines, centers must be operated as private, non-profit corporations with an independent board of directors. More than 51 percent

of the board members and staff must be people with disabilities.

Such centers are committed to helping those with disabilities "remain in the least restrictive environment within their communities," Raymond wrote. "They take the initiative to work for increased housing, transportation, accessibility, public education and personal assistance services."

Information and referral, which can save a disabled person time and money trying to run down on their own, is the most important factor at any center, she wrote. Center members research their areas to find out what type of services are available and to avoid duplication.

Peer counseling also is part of the emphasis.

"They keep track of various support groups for referral and help with families understanding various disabilities," Raymond wrote.

Centers provide consumer advocacy and community advocacy.

Ruidoso doctor elected to academy board

Dr. Arlene M. Brown, a family physician in Ruidoso, was elected to the Board of Directors of the American Academy of Family Physicians last month in Georgia.

The election by the AAFP's governing body, the Congress of Delegates, occurred at the group's annual meeting in Atlanta.

The AAFP, established in 1947, represents more than 93,100 family physicians, family

practice residents and medical students nationwide.

Brown is the founder and owner of Family Practice Associates of Ruidoso. She is an assistant clinical professor of family, community and emergency medicine at the University of New Mexico School of Medicine and has taught at the William Beaumont Army Medical Center in El Paso, Texas.

Do You Have Defensible Space?



Proper landscaping reduces the threat of fire. Follow these basic rules to create a defensible space around your home:

• Remove dead and dying plants and low hanging branches.
• Prune trees and shrubs from the site.
• Use fire-resistant plants and low hanging branches.
• Use fire-resistant plants and low hanging branches.

Fire-safe Landscaping

• Create a defensible space perimeter by trimming trees and brush within 30 feet around your home.
• Prune trees to a regular base up to 100 feet surrounding your home.
• Stack firewood at least 30 feet from your home.
• Store flammable materials, liquids and solvents in metal containers outside the home at least 30 feet away from structures and wooden fences.

• No matter where you live, always install smoke alarms on every level of your home. Test them monthly and change the batteries at least once a year. Consider installing the new long-life smoke alarms.

Maintain Home Heating Systems

• Have your chimney inspected and cleaned annually by a certified specialist.
• Install fire chimneys and place spark arresters on top.
• Extend the chimney at least three feet above the roof.
• Remove branches hanging above and around the chimney.

Have a Fire Safety and Evacuation Plan

• Install smoke alarms on every level of your home.
• Test them monthly and change the batteries at least once a year.
• Practice fire escape and evacuation plans.
• Mark the entrance to your property with signs that are clearly visible.

• Know which local emergency services are available and have those numbers posted.
• Provide emergency vehicle access through roads and driveways at least 12 feet wide with adequate turnaround space.
• Village ordinance requires you to have your street address visible (minimum 4" in height).

Follow Local Burning Laws

• Do not burn trash or other debris without proper knowledge of local burning laws, the village of Ruidoso does not allow outside burning of any type!

Choose Fire Resistant Materials

• Check your local nursery, forester or county extension service for advice on fire resistant plants that are suited for your environment.
• Create fire safe zones with stone walls, patios, swimming pools, decks and roadways.
• Use rock, mulch, flower beds and gardens as ground cover for bare spaces and as effective firebreaks.

• There are no "fire-proof" plants. Select high moisture plants that grow close to the ground and have a low sap or resin content.
• Choose plant species that resist ignition such as rockrose, iceplant and aloes.
• Fire-resistant shrubs include hedging roses, bush honeysuckles, currant, cotoneaster, sumac and shrub apples.

• Plant hardwood, maple, poplar and cherry trees that are less flammable than pine, fir and other conifers.

Maintain Your Home and Surrounding Property

• Maintain a well-pruned and watered landscape to serve as a green belt and protection against fire.
• Keep plants green during the dry season and use supplemental irrigation, if necessary.
• Trim grass to a regular base up to 100 feet surrounding your home.
• Stack firewood at least 30 feet from your home.

• Store flammable materials, liquids and solvents in metal containers outside the home at least 30 feet away from structures and wooden fences.

So, just what is 'affordable'?

Fine planning, but with a 20 percent solution

Ruidoso's vaunted "affordable housing" project in Grindstone Canyon just got less affordable.

Call it, if you will, a technical glitch having to do with median income levels in a resort community, or overstating the goal in the early - read "promotional" - stages of the village-backed project.

The fact remains that a 150-unit apartment project now will provide just 30 so-called "affordable" apartments, instead of the 75 initially claimed. The developer now will be able to rent the remaining 120 at whatever the market will bear.

Mayor Robert Donaldson's administration heavily pushed the project, on village-owned land, as a means of bringing badly needed service workers into the community.

Speaking for the developer,

Bridge Partners (formerly CDS Investments, the Utah-based company now promoting a 1,000-lot subdivision near the Spencer Theater), Dan Stanger told the Ruidoso village council last week that changes had to be made.

Original plans would have eliminated prospective tenants who earn more than \$14,900 per annum, he said.

The way we figure it, a worker would need to earn a minimum of \$7.16 per hour to make \$14,900 per year. Not many "service workers" like restaurant servers are around who make that much, and they're the ones who really need that affordable housing.

It will be interesting to see what the story is after HUD's new median income figures come out. But the odds are it won't help the worker pool.

Better presidential predictions

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. - Forecasting the winner of the next presidential election could produce a decided shift away from traditional polling, according to two papers being delivered at the annual convention of the Institute for Operations Research and the Management Sciences here.

The papers, which come in the wake of the disputed 2000 contest, offer pollsters, campaigns, and news organizations innovative ways of predicting which candidate will win the presidency in 2004.

Forecasting Tips from Pork Belly Traders "Election Forecasts from a Futures Market" is by Forrest Nelson, Joyce Berg, and Thomas A. Rietz of the University of Iowa. Nelson spoke Monday at the Fontainebleau Hilton Resort.

In a unique approach, the authors shun voter polls and turn instead to a predictor borrowed from the stock exchanges.

The authors point to weaknesses in the predictive power of traditional polls. Although polls quote a margin of error, they say, pollsters do not attempt, nor can they be expected, to measure the degree of uncertainty.

In contrast, they explain, futures markets have an advantage over traditional polls.

Futures traders are constantly concerned with the concept of uncertainty about an event that has not yet taken place. Those who observe these markets cope by using mechanisms for measuring the degree of uncertainty about an eventual outcome.

The University of Iowa runs

Iowa Electronic Markets, its own futures markets in which investors can buy futures shares.

IEM ran a presidential election market in 2000. From the middle of May on, says Rietz, "our market predicted a dead heat. At times that wasn't exciting news since the public wants you to predict the winner. In fact, predicting 'too close to call' was a much better prediction than the one from the polls, which were predicting large wins for Bush."

In the other paper, researchers, noting the discrepancy between the popular totals favoring Al Gore and the Electoral College vote that chose George Bush as President, recommend new analytical methods that focus less on a candidate's share of the popular vote and more on the probable number of votes that the candidate will win in the Electoral College.

"A New Approach to Estimating the Probability of Winning the Presidency" was presented by Edward H. Kaplan, Yale School of Management, and Arnold I. Barnett, Sloan School of Management, MIT, on Tuesday.

Current polls focus almost exclusively on the popular vote, say the authors. The Kaplan-Barnett model, in contrast, converts state-by-state polling results into a probability distribution for a candidate's total number of electoral votes.

The model, say the authors, may show a high probability that a specific candidate will take a state's electoral votes although popular vote totals suggest that the contest is too close to call.

Memorial services for Willie H. Gibson, 57, of Roswell, will be held at a later date in Claremore, Okla.


Mr. Gibson died Wednesday, Oct. 31, 2001, at a local nursing home.

RHS volleyball team downs Grants, heads to Albuquerque

The Ruidoso Warriors volleyball team has literally taken the road to the state playoffs. After traveling to Santa Teresa and Lovington to earn a spot in the Region C title game, the Lady Warriors headed north to Grants, where they beat the Lady Pirates in five games.

The win means another road trip for Ruidoso — this time to Albuquerque and the State Semifinals. The Warriors are two wins away from the Class 3A title, but it hasn't come without a fight.

Saturday's match-up with Grants was a tight, back-and-forth

affair that saw both teams struggle at times. Ruidoso got its problems out of the way early, coming back after falling in the first game, 15-6. The Warriors took the next two, 15-1 and 15-11.

Ruidoso coach Albert Ronquillo said his team was a little flat at the beginning.

"Part of it was, that's a long trip," he said. "This is a Regional Championship. The girls had never been in that situation."

Fortunately for the Warriors, they overcame their nerves and started playing like they have much of the second half of the season. Ruidoso overcame a slow start to start the year and got hot during district play, enabling it to make the postseason.

Now that the Warriors are there, they are making the most of it.

Down two games to one, the Pirates clawed their way to a fifth game, notching a 15-11 win in the fourth. Ronquillo said everything went right for Grants in the that game.

But it was not to be for the Pirates, as the

Warrior offense was clicking in the deciding game. After scoring the first two points in the fifth, Grants seemed to fade, giving Ruidoso a 15-9 win and a berth in the State Semifinals.

"I think Grants was out of gas," Ronquillo said.

The coach also said he was pleased with the support his team got so far from home.

"Grants had a lot of fans in that gym. But we had a lot too," he said.

Passing was the key for Ruidoso, Ronquillo said, as the strong defense and setting by the Warriors allowed senior Carrie Line to tee off on the Pirates. Line often got an open look for a kill, thanks to Ruidoso's middle hitters, including Tamara Grant and Rachel Loya. They were effective enough to keep the Grants defense honest and prevent double teams on Line.

Ronquillo also attributed the win to the conditioning of the Lady Warriors. They put forth a strong effort the entire way, he said.

In what may have been the ugliest game of the year, the Ruidoso Warriors football team saw its hopes for a run the state title come to an end.

The Warriors (5-4, 1-2 Dist. 4AAA) fell to the Portales Rams 24-22 Friday night in a battle for second place in District 4AAA.

Carter said he was proud of his team.

"The kids rose to the occasion, and gave themselves an opportunity to win the game," he said.

The mistakes weren't limited to the offense, though. Ruidoso's defense twice on one drive committed penalties on Portales punts that allowed the Rams to keep the ball. The Rams took advantage, getting a six-yard

"We didn't pass the ball well, bottom line," Carrizozo coach Bill MacVeigh said. "... We weren't able to generate

any offense at all."

Things actually started well for the Grizzlies, as they jumped out to a 9-1 lead in the first game. But the Roadrunners were able to serve the ball hard and consistently, throwing the "Zozo defense off.

And while the loss was a disappointing end to the year, 2002 looks bright for the Grizzlies.

Carrizozo loses only one senior, defensive specialist Bianca Baea. MacVeigh said her leadership and passing abilities would be missed.

"She's steady. She works hard," he said. Everybody knew she could pass the ball. Just a real steady player."

The coach added that he is confident that someone will step up in her place next year. "Zozo's 2002 goals include winning district and going to state, he said.

Current fishing report for Ruidoso and the area, as of Nov. 7, 2001

Ruidoso River - Not much change from last week. We have had about two weeks of great fall weather, in which the fishing on the river has been outstanding. The water flow is about normal for this time of year, but is dropping due to lack of rain. The water is quite clear so wear clothes that blend in with the background. Large Stoneflies are abundant in the river now. Rock Worms are declining in size and quantity, and Scuds are on the increase in the waters. Tie a dry fly on as a lead fly then tie a nymph dropper about 12-18" behind. Use the lead fly as your strike indicator. Effective and fun way to fish small waters.

South Fork - One still needs to hike a ways up the stream to find fish. A ways is two or three miles upstream. Once found the fish are healthy and hungry. The fish here are not fussy. Caddis dry flies and small nymphs of just about any pattern will work here. Several local fishermen have hiked 2 to 3 miles up the Southfork to be rewarded with several nice Rainbows and Brookies.

Bonito Lake: Not much has changed

here from last week. If driving to the Bonito area, be aware there is road construction going on; be alert and expect delays. The lake has taken on a green coloration due to a large algae bloom. The fly patterns that have been working are Humble, Dark, Hendrickson, and Parachute Adam flies have been consistent producers before dark on the main lake body. A damsel fly nymph tied as a dropper behind your dry fly offering continues to bring an unexpected take. For the spin cast fishermen, try a hot pink, renegade pattern propeller fly or a black with grizzly hackle propeller fly behind a bubble rig.

Eagle Lakes: Eagle Lakes are closed for the season.

Grindstone: The fall evenings have helped drop the surface temperature of Grindstone Lake. The cooler temperatures help the fishing quality pick up fast on Grindstone Lake. Float tubers continue reporting doing well by tossing a sinking tip line and stripping a dark wooly buggie with some flash or a streamer 8 to 10 feet deep. Float tubing is over. Damsel fly and

Dragon fly imitations continue working well. For spin casters, tie on an Olive or Black propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the bars down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water.

Lake Mead: The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark wooly buggies continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito, or Hendrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk. Please practice Catch and Release wherever and whenever you can. We have moved our local shop. New address is 2501 Sudderth Drive. Come see us for daily fishing information. 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

'Endangered places' deadline near

Officials with the New Mexico Heritage Preservation Alliance want residents of New Mexico to nominate sites for possible inclusion on the state's most endangered places list.

Friday is the deadline to submit a nomination. Fort Stanton, a 1855 fort about 13 miles northeast of Ruidoso, was placed on the list in 2000.

"We started in 1999 and Fort Stanton was on our second list," said spokesman Julianne Fletcher. "We still consider it on the list and we check back periodically to let supporters know about grants and other opportunities."

Her groups encourages people to nominate sites across the state.

"We have found that being

listed as endangered focuses attention on cultural issues across the state and provides a means for New Mexicans to succeed in protecting our heritage," said Katherine Slick, president of the alliance board.

She cited as one of their success stories, the nominators of the Cavate Pueblos at Bandelier National Monument, who recently were awarded a \$73,000 Architectural Conservation Grant from the Getty Grant Program. The pueblos were named as one of the 2001 Most Endangered Places in New Mexico. Situated in Frijoles Canyon, they are threatened by erosion and weathering.

They were built and occupied between 1150 and 1550 and are considered to be the ancestral home to the Tewa

and Keres people, who still reside in the area.


To qualify for nomination, a building, structure, house, site, district, ruin or cultural landscape must be at least 50 years old, within state boundaries, historically, culturally or architecturally significant, and in danger of being lost, destroyed or substantially altered.

SDE announces 2001 public school ratings

SANTA FE -- The New Mexico State Department of Education has announced that 84 percent of the state's public schools that were rated are meeting or exceeding the state's accountability standards. A total of 675 of the state's 766 public schools were rated; of these 58 rate as "exemplary," an increase of 21 over last year; 104 rate as "exceeds standards," an increase of 51; 404 rate as "meets standards," an increase of six; and 109 rate as "probationary," a decrease of 55.

The ratings were announced at a news conference at Barcelona Elementary in Albuquerque on Oct. 25, one of 65 schools to improve its probationary rating and not enter school improvement this year.

This is the second year for schools to be rated under the state's Accountability Program. Schools are rated on student achievement, dropout and attendance, parent and community involvement and school safety. Not rated are alternative schools, new schools, charter schools that have not been in operation for two years and K-2 schools. The ratings are available on the SDE's Web site at www.sde.state.nm.us.

National dean's list out

Fourteen Lincoln County and Mesalero students are among the approximately 149,000 students included in the 24th Annual Edition of The National Dean's List, 2000-2001, published by Educational Communications Inc., the largest recognition program and publication in the nation honoring high-achieving college students.

Students are selected by their college deans, registrars or honor society advisers and must be in the upper 10 percent of their class, on their school's dean's list, or have earned a comparable honor. Listed students are eligible to compete for \$50,000 in scholarship awards funded by the publisher, and may also use a referral service for future employment opportunities.



Once again, school ratings under a cloud

The state Department of Education's grades of New Mexico schools for 2001 are out. Some area school administrators say they can't interpret the results, others say the data used was incorrect — and the lead auditor with the Legislative Finance Committee wasn't allowed to see the data.

The SDE presented the ratings of all New Mexico schools at a press conference Oct. 25.

The LFC's auditor, Christine Chavez said, "We asked to look at this year's (data) and they said it wouldn't be ready until they ... present it to the board in November ... We weren't aware they were even working on it, because when we asked for it, they said it was still raw data."

For the second year of the SDE's school accountability program, schools were rated as "exemplary," "exceeds standards," "meets standards" or "probationary," based on student achievement on standardized tests, dropout rates, attendance rates, parent and community involvement and public safety.

Schools were faxed memos with their ratings but with no explanation, except in the cases of Corona and Hondo, which received the test scores used to rate their schools.

In Hondo's case, the test scores were wrong, the superintendent said.

Corona and Hondo school districts received "probationary" ratings. The superintendents of instruction of these districts question why the assistant superintendent of Accountability and Information, Patricia Rael, released the ratings before the districts could verify the accuracy of the data used.

Hondo's superintendent, John MacCallum, said he contacted Rael the morning before the press conference and told her "our ratings for last year were incorrect — they had made a technical error — and I told her the data for this year is incorrect."

Last year, the state Department of Education erroneously awarded money to schools rated as "high improving" schools, and then had to pull the grants and release a new list of "high improving" schools.

Department of Education releases the ratings to the district by fax the same day it holds the press conference," MacCallum said. "Given their track record ... why wouldn't they let the schools see the data first to verify its accuracy?"

Travis Lightfoot, superintendent of Corona Public Schools, said that because it's such a small school, the state department determined last year that it doesn't make statistical sense to include it in the ratings since one child can make a significant difference. Last year, Corona was rated as a probationary school and the information was released, but the rating was later retracted.

Now Lightfoot wonders why Corona received a probationary rating this year, after the decision not to rate such small schools.

"With that publication coming out in the *Albuquerque Journal*, I've had numerous phone calls from interested community members and parents as to what has occurred," Lightfoot said. "Last year it was quite inconvenient for us ... the next week it was retracted but it wasn't printed in bold letters that Corona wasn't a probationary school."

Lightfoot also said he couldn't come up with the same figures the SDE used to make the ratings.

Rael said that last year some of the ratings got into the newspaper before the districts received them, and the districts weren't informed first this year because, "The thunder would be stolen; we wanted to hit the street with a good message." She said she will recommend looking at whether to rate the 44 schools in the state with enrollment of fewer than 10 students per class.

Chavez said the audit did look at last year's ratings and found that in some schools only 30 percent of the students were tested, rather than 100 percent, as the SDE claimed.

"Schools that were rated 'exemplary' or 'exceeds standards' only tested 70 percent of the kids or fewer, and schools that were rated 'probationary' seemed like

they tested 100 percent — if the data we were using to determine the percentage was accurate from the tables they gave us."

Chavez said the law requires that all students be tested or that documentation is sent to the SDE explaining why they are not tested.

The SDE staff told her they weren't rating smaller schools because students would be identifiable in very small classes. She said she was surprised that Hondo and Corona had been rated this year.

"I don't know if they changed their policy or just screwed up again," Chavez said.

"I think they're aware that the data is wrong and I'm wondering how many districts have incorrect data. The public has the right to expect accurate information, and the state Department of Education is not providing that," MacCallum said.

The other districts in the county, which were rated as "meets standards" or above, did not receive copies of the data used to make their ratings, and so do not know whether their ratings are accurate.

Capitan Elementary School's rating went from "exceeds standards" last year to "meets standards" this year. Elementary principal Dick Clevenger said he has difficulty with the whole rating process because no one has ever explained it to administrators, so it's hard for him to explain to parents and teachers or to know how to improve or what a school is doing well.

"I think the state has a duty not only to explain the process but how it works and make sure we get the results before they make it public," Clevenger said. "The community wants an explanation and sometimes you can't give it because you don't understand it, and that's totally unfair."

The Legislative Finance Committee may go back and look at school ratings.

"It could happen if there are enough rumblings," Chavez said. "If schools are already complaining that data is wrong and if they end up retracting these data like they did last year, they could ask us to go back and just look at the ratings."

Rael said data packets listing how data points were categorized and tabulated to provide the ratings are still being prepared for the school districts, and that she will provide workshops on the process throughout the state.
